## Shoshone gas leak causes brief evacuation

A natural gas leak prompted Shoshone police to block off streets and evacuate homes Sunday, but in the end was easily resolved.

Law enforcement was called out to the site, at the intersection of North Greenwood and West Third streets, at roughly 4 p.m. A person putting a fence up in his backyard hit a residential gas line, said Shoshone Police Cpl.

Officers blocked the intersection and evacuated homes in the immediate area as a precaution before Intermountain Gas arrived to shut off the gas around the leak. In all, the incident lasted about an hour, Thompson said.

## Rupert gears up for 5-day festival

Magic Valley's Fourth of July celebrations kick off this week

RUPERT — For the past 85 years, Rupert has celebrated its hometown atmosphere during the Fourth of July with multiple days of free concerts, delectable food and engaging activities.

And as in other Magic Valley cities, the spirit of independence will return this week, with holiday activities in Rupert starting Thursday and running up through July 4.

Food vendors will line the curbs of the city's center park, filling the air with the tempting smells of edibles, while local and past-favorite bands entertain the crowds piling onto blankets and lawn chairs each night. On the edge of town at the Minidoka County Fairgrounds, local daredevils will vie for cash purses in events like wild cow milking and ribbon roping. Others will turn out to watch the ponies run at the Rupert Downs and to root for on their favorite lawnmower racer.

"This is one of the biggest celebrations in Rupert," said Jason Gibbons, chairman of the Rupert Fourth of July Committee. "A lot of people who used to live here come back for this each year."

Gibbons said each day of the five-day celebration is packed with events, many of them free of charge.

"The committee brought in two headliner bands this year: Kahuna Beach Party from Colorado, which does a Beach Boys tribute, and High Street Band from Boise, which was popular last year.

"There is a variety of music for everyone," Gibbons said. "High Street Band loved it so much here last year that they called us and wanted to come back."

## Summer school gives migrant children a boost

A mix of Spanish and English filled the lunchroom at Oregon Trail Elementary School on Friday. Children raced around the small room or sat on the low brown benches, exchanging smiles over brightly colored stickers and lists of short words in English.

After three weeks of migrant summer school, the pre-kindergarten through fifth-grade students celebrated their last day with crafts and games. Each activity was designed to practice what they learned during the three weeks of summer school, then take that knowledge home to continue practicing through the warm months.

## Power grid change may disrupt clocks

Anything that flashes '12:00' when it loses power may be just a bit off every second

WASHINGTON — A yearlong experiment with the nation's electric grid could mess up traffic lights, security systems and some computers — and make plug-in clocks and appliances like programmable coffeemakers run up to 20 minutes fast.

"A lot of people are going to have

things break and they're not going to know why," said Demetrios Matsakis, head of the time service department at the U.S. Naval Observatory, one of two official time-keeping agencies in the federal government.

Since 1930, electric clocks have kept time based on the rate of the electrical current that powers them. If the current slips off its usual rate, clocks run a little fast or slow. Power companies now take steps to correct it and keep the frequency of the current — and the time — as precise as possible.

The group that oversees the U.S. power grid is proposing an experi-

ment that would allow more frequency variation than it does now without corrections, according to a company presentation obtained by The Associated Press.

Officials say they want to try this to make the power supply more reliable, save money and reduce what may be needless efforts. The test is tentatively set to start in mid-July, but that could change.

Tweaking the power grid's frequency is expensive and takes a lot of effort, said Joe McClelland, head of electric reliability for the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

## Crash blocks traffic outside truck stop

A two-vehicle crash Sunday blocked traffic around the Travelers Oasis north of Hansen, but resulted in no injuries. Idaho State Police reported that shortly before 12:30 p.m., Joy Hawkins, 60, of Shedd, Ore., was turning out of the Travelers Oasis — just off of Interstate 84 exit 182 — to head eastbound on State Highway 50. A semitrailer waiting to turn into the

truck plaza blocked Hawkins' view. She pulled out into traffic, according to ISP, and the side of her vehicle was struck by another driven westbound by Donald Hoffner, 77, of Rupert. Both Hawkins and Hoffner were wearing seat belts and neither were injured. One westbound lane of Highway 50 was blocked for about an hour and a half. The incident continues to be under investigation.

## Twin Falls council to take up animal shelter contract

The Twin Falls City Council could have a fairly quiet meeting tonight, with a short agenda and one public hearing before it. The meeting will start at 5 p.m. at the council chambers, 305 Third Ave. E. in Twin Falls. Council members will be asked to renew People for Pets' contract to run the city animal shelter, as it has since 1989. The organization's current contract began on March 26, 2007, and will expire this year on Sept. 30. City Manager Travis Rothweiler recommended renewing the contract for five years in a staff report. The council will also hold a public hearing on whether to allow an 8,000-square-

foot multi-tenant commercial development at 1434 Pole Line Road E., the southwest corner of Pole Line and Locust Street North. On May 24, the city Planning and Zoning Commission recommended 4-3 against approving the change. But city staff supports its passage, subject to a couple of conditions such as using an existing well for landscaping water and sorting out concerns with neighboring business Harbor Freight Tools. Also on the agenda are a beer and wine license for the Zulu Bagels and Java Jungle outlet at 565 Washington St. N., and awarding Peace Officer Standards and Training certifications to three Twin Falls police officers.

"Is anyone using the grid to keep track of time?" McClelland said. "Let's see if anyone complains if we eliminate it." No one is quite sure what will be affected. This won't change the clocks in cell-phones, GPS or even on computers, and it won't have anything to do with official U.S. time or Internet time. But wall clocks and those on ovens and coffeemakers — anything that flashes "12:00" when it loses power — may be just a bit off every second, and that error can grow with time. It's not easy figuring what will run fast and what won't. For example, VCRs or DVRs that get their time from cable systems or the Internet probably won't be affected, but those with clocks tied to the electric current will be off a bit, Matsakis said. This will be an interesting experiment to see how dependent our timekeeping is on the power grid, Matsakis said. The North American Electric Reliability Corp. runs the nation's interlocking web of transmission lines and power plants. A June 14 company presentation spelled out the potential effects of the change: East Coast clocks may run as much as 20 minutes fast over a year, but West Coast clocks are only likely to be off by 8 minutes. In Texas, it's only an expected speedup of 2 minutes. Some parts of the grid, like in the East, tend to run faster than others. Errors

add up. If the grid averages just over 60 cycles a second, clocks that rely on the grid will gain 14 seconds per day, according to the company's presentation. Spokeswoman Kimberly Mielcarek said the company is still discussing the test and gauging reactions to its proposal, and may delay the experiment a bit. Mielcarek said in an email that the change is about making the grid more reliable and that correcting the frequency for time deviations can cause other unnecessary problems for the grid. She wrote that any problems from the test are only possibilities. In the future, more use of renewable energy from the sun and wind will mean more variations in frequency on the grid, McClelland said. Solar and wind power can drop off the grid with momentary changes in weather. Correcting those deviations is expensive and requires instant backup power to be always at the ready, he said. The test makes sense and should not cause too much of a hassle for people, said Jay Apt, a business professor and director of the Electricity Industry Center at Carnegie Mellon University. But Tom O'Brian, who heads the time and frequency division at the National Institute of Standards and Technology, expects widespread effects. He said there are alternatives if people have problems from the test: The federal government provides the official time by telephone and on the Internet.

## Judge mulls lawsuit over anti-union laws

BOISE — A judge could rule this week on whether Idaho's newest anti-union laws should be stalled until a lawsuit plays out in federal court. The laws, intended to weaken the power of labor organizations in Idaho, were passed during the 2011 legislative session and go into effect July 1. But two building and construction unions have sued in Boise's U.S. District Court, saying the laws are unconstitutional because the state is attempting to preempt matters already governed by Congress. Chief U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winnill heard arguments on a motion for a preliminary injunction last week. Deputy Idaho Attorney General Clay Smith said the attorneys on both sides spent about 45 minutes presenting their cases to Winnill, who took the matter under advisement. The labor unions want an answer before July 1; Smith said Winnill is expected to rule sometime this week. He declined to comment further on the case. "The argument is a simple one, actually," said James Piotrowski, one of the attorneys representing the labor unions. "The Constitution gives Congress power to regulate interstate commerce, and it has done so in the National Labor Relations Act. The Idaho law is the state of Idaho's attempt to regulate an aspect of the private sector, and they're not free to do so."

The first law prohibits so called "project labor agreements" that require contractors to forge pacts with unionized workers as a condition of winning a government construction job. The second new law prohibits unions from using dues to subsidize member wages to help union-shop contractors win projects. The subsidies, known as job targeting programs, can reduce a union contractor's overall costs and allow it to submit a more competitive bid. Supporters of the laws say project labor agreements essentially exclude nonunion shops from projects, and that job targeting programs artificially manipulate the market. But from the time the laws were proposed, union members have warned that the prohibitions would be an invitation for lawsuits. The Idaho Attorney General's office has warned lawmakers that those suing would likely win. In a January letter to lawmakers, Assistant Chief Deputy Attorney General Brian Kane said that job targeting programs are protected under the National Labor Relations Board and under the national Labor Management Relations Act and that previous challenges to the federal laws in other states have been shot down in federal courts. Idaho's law barring project labor agreements also might violate federal laws, Kane said, telling lawmakers that a lawsuit "would not be surprising." Nevertheless, the Legislature passed the laws. And the Idaho Building and Con-

struction Trades Council AFL-CIO and Southwest Idaho Building and Construction Trades Council AFL-CIO promptly sued. Piotrowski is optimistic about his clients' chances. "There are lots of cases out there about federal pre-emption, but I've been unable to identify one where the state has tried to inject itself into a matter already as governed by the National Labor Relations Act as this one," Piotrowski said. "This is a matter of federal law and not state law and needs to remain in federal law." The case puts the Idaho Attorney General's office in a somewhat awkward position. In a memo opposing the preliminary injunction request, Clay Smith wrote that the unions are claiming the laws are invalid in all of their applications, and notes that that claim is a heavy burden to prove. The memo also contends that the unions haven't shown that the Attorney General's office is likely to take any enforcement action infringing upon NLRA-protected rights. Smith points out that Kane's letters to lawmakers "reflect a careful, nuanced position" regarding potential enforcement of the new laws. Idaho has a long history of opposing unions. A quarter-century ago Idaho became a right-to-work state, which means that workers can't be required to join unions as a condition of employment. As a result, union membership has declined and with it, the power of unions.

## Rightwing bloggers fear Chinese takeover of Idaho

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's attempt to spur economic development by encouraging Chinese investment has resulted in "nonsense" from conspiracy theorists who accuse state officials of trying to develop a "Little China in Idaho," a state official said. Don Dietrich, director of the Idaho Department of Commerce, tells the Idaho Statesman that right-wing bloggers and talk radio reports have led to hundreds of emails from around the country from people worried Idaho officials are trying to cash in by selling the state's sovereignty to China.

"Given what they're reading, they are rightfully concerned," Dietrich told the newspaper. "But what they are reading is in some cases nonsense." Republican Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter led a trade mission to China last year. And the China National Machinery Industry Corp. has proposed developing a technology zone south of Boise Airport. Otter has a long conservative history in Idaho, one of the GOP's strongholds. But earlier this month when he hosted a "Capital for a Day" in Castleford in south-central Idaho, he faced ques-

tions from area residents about China and Idaho. He said the Chinese investment is producing tax revenues and jobs while being limited by state and federal laws. He said there is a lot of false information being circulated as fact. "There was probably a day long ago when I, too, would be concerned about this," Otter said. Idaho exported \$657 million in goods to China in 2010, making China the state's third-largest trading partner. Dietrich said that will likely increase. "We sell them more than we buy," Dietrich said.

David Shambaugh is a China scholar at George Washington University who spoke last year at Boise State University about the U.S.-China relationship. He said fear mongering could drive Chinese investment elsewhere, but also noted some types of items should be off limits, such as telecom companies and molybdenum, a material used to strengthen steel. "We Americans need to look at inbound China investment with our eyes open for potential national security concerns, but we should welcome it because it brings jobs," he said.

This year, 136 students practiced math, reading and language for an extra three weeks and Olivas said their progress during that time will give them a cushion for the fall. All of the materials from the last day of school go home with the children and a few parents looked over their students' shoulders on Friday as they practiced vocabulary.

In a recent report from the U.S. Census Bureau, data from 2008 shows more Hispanic students are finishing high school and fewer are dropping out than were 10 years ago. For Hispanics ages 18 to 24, 12 percent more were enrolled in high school in 2008 compared to 1998.

Going to college is something Daniela Arevalo's set on doing, although she doesn't have a career picked out yet. The 12-year-old moved to Idaho six years ago and has attended the summer school every year. She said the classes helped her in the beginning when she was just starting to learn English.

"It's really fun. You learn more things here than in regular school. If you are low in math you can learn more tools to help you," she said, adding that her parents work hard so she can have money to go to college and further her education in the future.

On Friday, Arevalo and seven of her classmates cut out photos and glued them into a scrapbook. The older students had been given disposable cameras during the summer school to document their life stories and the pictures were developed earlier in the week.

Oregon Trail secretary Mary Doerrs said this year's last-day celebration was changed from a fiesta to a fun workshop where parents could attend and learn how to help their children.

"We've seen their growth and now they get to take home what they learn," she said. "They get to walk away with an educational tool to practice with their parents."

# Wolves still divisive as Idaho, Montana prepare for hunts

BILLINGS, Mont. — Public opinion on gray wolves remains sharply split as Montana and Idaho wildlife officials prepare to resume hunts for the predators after Congress removed their endangered species protections.

Montana State Fish, Wildlife and Parks commissioners are due to meet July 14 to adopt a quota of 220 wolves to be killed during fall rifle and archery hunts.

Idaho's hunt is scheduled for adoption in late July. Final details still are being worked out.

More than 450 people submitted comments on the Montana proposal in recent weeks. They ranged from calls to sharply increase the quota and allow trapping and poisoning of wolves, to pleas for a less-aggressive approach so the wolf population could further expand.

There were an estimated 566 wolves in Montana at the end of 2010. Once this year's pups are factored in, wildlife officials say the fall

hunt will reduce the number by 25 percent to approximately 425 wolves.

Dozens of individuals and livestock and hunting groups said the proposed quota was too low. They warned that the predators' population would quickly rebound, leading to more attacks on cattle and sheep and further reductions in elk herds that are pursued by wolves and hunters alike.

"This vicious cycle will continue to allow too many wolves to prey on our remaining, already low (deer and elk) populations," said Patrick Byrne of Anaconda.

But others said a large wolf population is needed to restore balance to the natural landscape by cutting down on overgrazing by elk and culling sick and weak animals from big game herds.

Norman Bishop of Bozeman suggested the Northern Rockies region could support up to ten times more wolves than the current population of 1,651 in Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Oregon and Washington.

"Let the wolves perform

their keystone role in ecosystem recovery," Bishop wrote.

Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks spokesman Ron Aasheim said the state had tried to strike a balance between conserving wolves and controlling their numbers to address attacks on livestock and big game. He added that would mean reductions in wolf populations in some areas.

Out of more than 240 people who submitted original comments either by letter or email, roughly two-thirds were in favor of the hunt or wanted it expanded, according to an analysis by The Associated Press. The remaining one-third wanted the hunt cancelled or urged restraint in the setting of quotas.

A mass email campaign generated by Defenders of Wildlife generated 215 comments in opposition.

Responses came from as far away as South Africa and the United Kingdom, with some of the most extreme comments from outside the region.

# Sun Valley bans ATVs from city streets

KETCHUM — The Sun Valley City Council has voted to ban ATVs from the central Idaho resort town's upscale streets.

The Idaho Mountain Express reports that the council on Tuesday unanimously passed an ordinance that prohibits most restricted-plate vehicles, including ATVs.

Other vehicles included in the ban are utility-type vehicles, off-highway vehicles and certain motor-bikes.

Lawbreakers face a fine of \$85.

Sun Valley Mayor Wayne Willich says safety concerns are the main reason for the ban.

## 23 hurt as Pa. school bus overturns on interstate

CHAMBERSBURG, Pa. (AP) — A school bus transporting children to camp overturned on a rural Pennsylvania interstate Sunday afternoon, injuring nearly two dozen people and closing the northbound highway lanes for hours.

Pennsylvania State Police said the bus from Cumberland Valley Christian School in Chambersburg collided with a passenger vehicle on Interstate 81 at about 4:40 p.m. near Chambersburg.

All of the occupants of both vehicles were taken to hospitals.

State police said 17 adults and children were taken to Chambersburg Hospital, and six other patients were taken to Waynesboro Hospital.

Summit Health spokeswoman Jessica Walter gave slightly conflicting numbers of victims, saying 18 adults and children from ages 9 to 12 were taken to Chambersburg Hospital, and seven other patients were taken to Waynesboro Hospital.

Troopers and Walters said all were reported to be in stable condition and there were no life-threatening injuries. The injuries were described as "minor to moderate."

Trooper Tom Pinkerton said it was too soon to know if any charges would be filed.

"However, preliminarily, the driver of the Cadillac is the person that contributed to this crash," Pinkerton said.

# Bachmann says bid to unseat Obama in 2012 not 'personal'

WATERLOO, Iowa — Republican Rep. Michele Bachmann said Sunday her bid to unseat President Barack Obama shouldn't be viewed as "anything personal" against the Democrat — he's "just wrong" on his policies for America.

In an interview with The Associated Press on the eve of her entry in the 2012 GOP presidential race, the Minnesota congresswoman said she does not foresee problems moving from frequent naysayer to the country's proposer-in-chief. She said voters can expect her to propose an economic agenda that includes cuts to corporate taxes and phase-outs of taxes on inheritances and investment earnings.

Her economic turnaround plan will also include a repeal of unspecified environmental regulations, she said.

"Look, I love the environment. I love clean air, clean water. I'm a sportswoman. I love the outdoors. We will keep that. But the EPA has been an expansion department," she told the AP from outside her girlhood home

in a now-gritty Waterloo neighborhood, where she says her Democratic parents taught her lifelong sensibilities.

Of Obama, she said, "I don't have anything personal about our president. But he's just wrong. But his policy prescriptions have been wrong."

The nothing-personal message was a departure from her 2008 comments questioning whether Obama had "anti-American" views. She has said she wishes she framed her criticism differently.

Bachmann, a tea party favorite, planned to kick off her campaign Monday in Waterloo where she has been greeted with a new poll predicting she'll be a force in the state that opens the GOP nomination context. The Iowa Poll released Saturday by The Des Moines Register showed her in a statistical tie with Republican rival Mitt Romney among likely caucusgoers.

The poll showed Romney with 23 percent support and Bachmann with 22 percent among those who said they

were likely to vote in the nation's first Republican nomination contest. The top five included Georgia businessman Herman Cain, at 10 percent, and former House Speaker Newt Gingrich and Rep. Ron Paul of Texas, with 7 percent each.

Speaking later to hundreds at a nearby ballroom, Bachmann effusively mentioned her Iowa roots.

"We need more Waterloo. We need more Iowa. We need more closeness, more families, more love for each other," she told her enthusiastic crowd.

## Pride parade celebrates NY's passage of gay marriage law

NEW YORK — The floats were there, the music and dancing, too — all the usual staples of one of the world's oldest and largest gay pride parades. But this year, something new joined the spectacle on the streets of New York City: proposals and wedding plans.

New York's parade turned into a carnival-like celebration of same-sex marriage Sunday as hundreds of thousands of revelers rejoiced at the state's new law giving gay couples the same marital rights as everyone else.

"We've been waiting to get married in Central Park for years, and now we got here just in time for history to be made," said Bryce Croft of Kettering, Ohio,

who attended the festivities with her partner, Stephanie Croft.

The two women are not yet legally married although they share the same name, and they are in the process of moving to New York and getting married. They were in a Manhattan restaurant late Friday when they learned that the bill had passed.

"We cried over dinner, right into the mozzarella sticks," Stephanie Croft said, adding that they had already selected a spot in Central Park — the boulder she had marked with Bryce's name two years ago. After the two got settled, Bryce planned to seek a sex-change operation to become a man.

The star of Sunday's show was undoubtedly New York Gov. Andrew

Cuomo, who fought to get the bill over its final hurdle in the GOP-led state Senate. The law makes New York the sixth state to extend full marriage rights to gay couples and doubles the number of gay people nationwide who are eligible to marry.

"Thank you, Governor Cuomo" and "Promise kept" read signs lining both sides of Fifth Avenue. Throngs of cheering supporters all but mobbed Cuomo as he led off the parade just after noon.

"New York has sent a message to the nation," the governor said before the march. "It is time for marriage equality."

He called his state "a beacon," adding, "If New York can do it, it's all right for everyone else in the country to do it."

## Trucking company in Nev. train wreck had citations

SPARKS, Nev. — A Nevada trucking company under scrutiny for a fiery crash with an Amtrak train that left at least six dead has been cited repeatedly by state authorities for crashes, unsafe driving and operating a truck with tires so bald the vehicle had to be taken off the road.

A man working for John Davis Trucking Co., of Battle Mountain, Nev., drove a truck through crossing gates and into two of the train's double-decker cars Friday, killing him and five people on the train.

Federal records reviewed by The Associated Press on Sunday showed the state Department of Public Safety cited the company for two crashes in the last two years, including one in February 2010 that injured a person in Washoe County.

In a January inspection, authorities found tires on one company tractor-trailer so bald they deemed the rig an imminent hazard to public safety.

Meanwhile, Nevada Highway Patrol Trooper Chuck Allen said Churchill County coroner officials were sifting through the rubble of the rail cars gutted by the fire. He said they have asked at least one forensic anthropologist to assist them.

"I think it was so hot that they want to make sure they are not missing anything," Allen told the AP. "They want to figure out if there are any more bodies and if so, how many. They want to rule out the possibility that, yes there are more, or that no, there are not."

Investigators also looked for clues as to why the truck driver plowed through the railroad crossing.

"Not necessarily just drugs or alcohol, but fatigue, driver inattention," Allen said. "Did he have a (citizen band radio)? Was he talking to his buddies behind him? If so, was he looking in the side-view mirror and not looking at the road ahead? I don't think we'll ever know for sure."

It's expected to take up to a year to pinpoint the cause of the crash.

## As water ebbs in Minot, thoughts turn to recovery

MINOT, N.D. — The Souris River began a long, slow retreat in Minot on Sunday, leaving behind an arduous rebuilding job for more than 4,000 homeowners and hundreds of business operators, most of whom lack insurance to pay for it.

Because they don't have coverage, federal assistance could amount to as little as a few thousand dollars apiece. Loan and grant programs will provide some help, as will an emergency relief fund just being set up.

Still, there was at least one ray of hope: State lawmakers might be able to lend a hand, thanks in large part to North Dakota's oil boom, which generates \$1 billion a year in tax money and has helped shield the state from the worst of the recession.

Few people in Minot carried flood insurance — only 375 homes in the flooded areas, said John Ashton, a spokesman for the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

Mike and Jodi Picard checked with neighbors when moving into their house less than two years ago and found that just one had flood insurance. The river was a quarter-mile away, and the prevailing opinion was that "we were not in a floodplain anymore" after a 1969 flood led to construction of levees and straightening of the river channel.

"Now you really kick yourself for not having it," said Jodi Picard.

The Souris topped out Sunday nearly 2 feet below projections heading into the weekend, and it appeared damage might not extend beyond the homes and businesses that took on water Friday. Officials warned against overconfidence until the river fell enough to take the pres-

sure off levees. The National Weather Service projected the river would decline 2 feet by midweek.

The Picards stood on a bridge overlooking the swollen river, straining for a glimpse of their house in a distant cul-de-sac. It appeared water was knee-deep on the main floor.

The couple was staying with relatives in the area but said they were determined to return home. After the water recedes, they'll pump the basement dry, tear out drywall and insulation and make needed repairs.

State lawmakers will probably consider offering flood relief during a special session this fall. They have \$386 million in a rainy-day fund, as well as another \$136 million in a school-aid fund that could be diverted to the many communities touched by floodwaters this year. Both funds are fattened by state oil revenues.

"It's a long trip, and there's the (18-hour) drive and spending all day at the yard playing, going to the

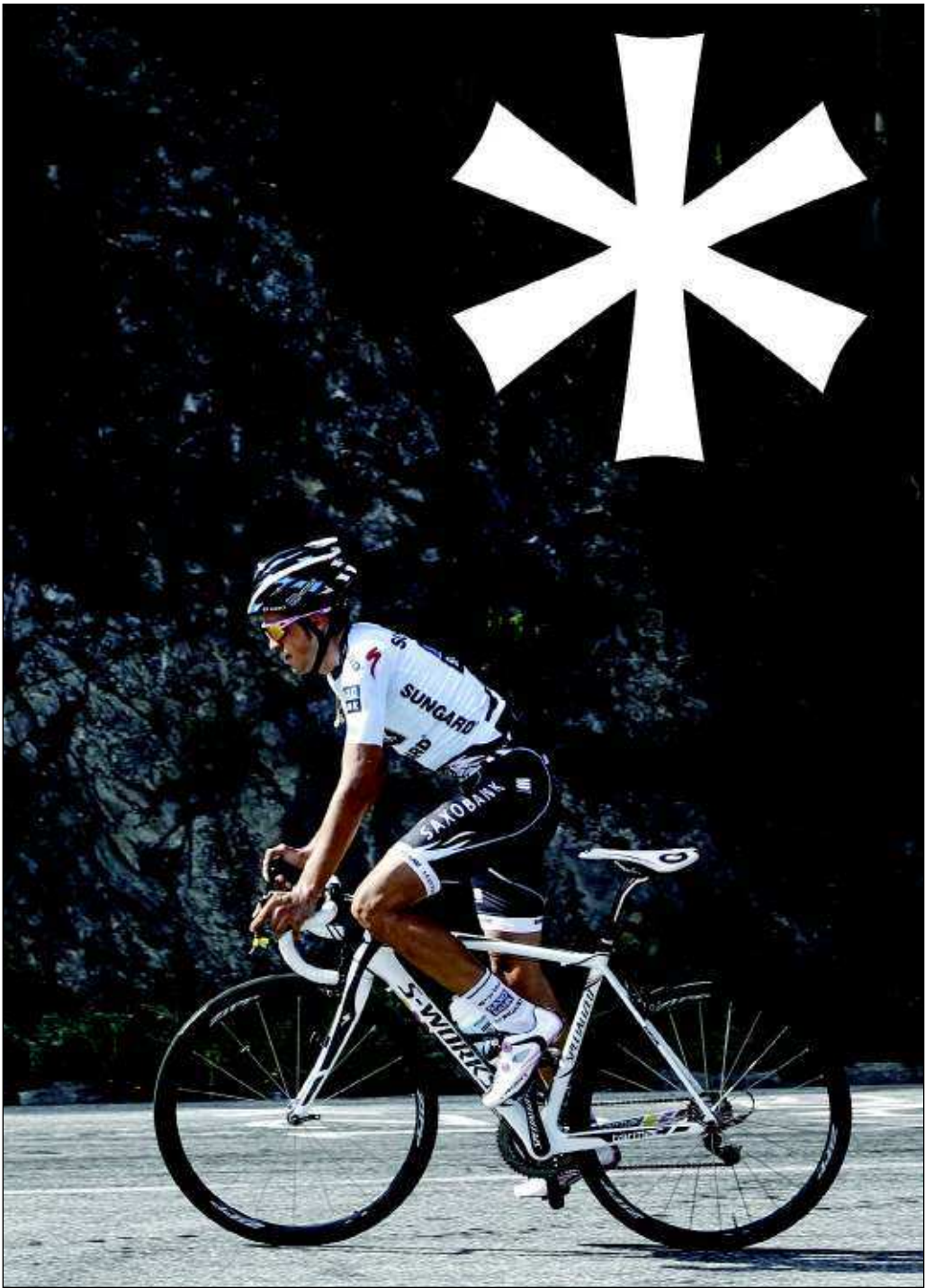

# Kurt Busch takes his first NASCAR road race win

SONOMA, Calif. — It certainly seemed as if Kurt Busch's season was in serious trouble just two months ago, when poor performances led to an intense radio tirade against his entire Penske Racing organization.

What could have destroyed his race team has actually had the opposite effect.

Busch's impressive turnaround continued Sunday with a dominating run at Infineon Raceway, where he earned his first career road course victory and his first win of the season.

"We've been on a great run these last few weeks," Busch said. "To get a road course win, it's a big check mark on my list. It's just really neat to bring home that 'W.'"

Busch led a race-high 76 laps and beat Jeff Gordon by almost 4 seconds for his first win of the season. It's a marked turn for Busch, who unraveled

over his team radio at Richmond in early May because of how poorly his Dodge had been running.

The rant led to behind-the-scenes changes at Penske Racing that have sparked both Busch and teammate Brad Keselowski, who won at Kansas earlier this month. Busch, despite three consecutive poles, was winless but inching closer and closer.

It finally came on a road course, of all places. Busch was winless in 10 career starts at both Sonoma and Watkins Glen, the only two road courses on the Sprint Cup circuit. And Busch helped Keselowski finish 10th with advice and a tour of the track on Friday.

"It's a good feeling to know that the two teams are working as closely together as they ever have," Busch said. "Knowing that Brad is definitely maturing, seeing him bust off a top 10 at a road course is great. We went around the race track, I pointed out some of the

the top five.

"I enjoy winning at Magic Valley Speedway," Rice said.

Budweiser Super Stocks driver Casey Pehrson had visions of his first win dancing in his head until a caution late in the main event race brought him back to reality. Not only was Pehrson's big lead erased, it brought his archival right alongside for the restart.

"I was not happy at all when that yellow came out," Pehrson said. "I looked at the board and I knew Kris (McKean) was behind me, so I was a little nervous."

Pehrson elected to take the inside lane for the restart and gained a

And even though he's yet to drop a set through three matches — something he'd never managed to do at the All England Club — Rafael Nadal keeps talking up his opponent's chances.

As the 125th edition of the grass-court Grand Slam tournament heads into Week 2, all of the principal players are still around, as are the story lines that drew interest at the start, from the Williams sisters' comebacks to the dominance of

the leading men.

After Sunday's traditional day of rest at Wimbledon, action resumes Monday with all 16 men's and women's fourth-round matches. Two stand out in particular: Top-seeded Nadal faces No. 24 Juan Martin del Potro of Argentina, while No. 23 Venus Williams faces No. 32 Tsvetana Pironkova in a rematch of a 2010 quarterfinal won by the Bulgarian.

The Williams sisters have combined to win nine of the past 11 Wimbledon singles titles, and while Serena has played only five matches in the past 11½ months, and Venus missed about five months with a hip injury, both are clearly capable of producing top-level tennis.

"Yeah, I'm still alive, and it feels good," said Serena Williams, who could become the first woman since Steffi Graf in 1991-93 to win Wimbledon three years in a row. "You know, I'm hoping to be

around — and planning to be around — a lot longer."

Also in the picture are top-seeded Caroline Wozniacki, hoping for her first Grand Slam title, and 2004 Wimbledon champion Maria Sharapova.

"Well, there's no doubt you have to improve with the second week coming. I think that's always the toughest part," said Sharapova, who's won three major titles but none since 2008. "That's where you hope you raise your level."

The top four men — Nadal, No. 2 Novak Djokovic, No. 3 Federer and No. 4 Andy Murray — filled out the semifinals at the French Open, and no one would be too surprised if they did that again at Wimbledon. They lost a total of three sets during Week 1.

Djokovic and Murray are two-time semifinalists at Wimbledon, but neither has been to the final.

## HE'S NO. 1?

- Novak Djokovic isn't just going for his first Wimbledon championship this week. If he reaches Sunday's final, or defending champion Rafael Nadal fails to win the tournament, Djokovic will overtake Nadal for the world's No. 1 ranking when the new standings are released next Monday.
- The world tennis rankings are based on points accumulated over a rolling 52-week period. Nadal cannot improve his point total at Wimbledon, as he won last year, but Djokovic, who lost in the semifinals in 2010, is just 65 points behind Nadal in the rankings.
- Even if he is the runner-up, Nadal would lose at least 800 ranking points, more than Djokovic would have yielded had he lost in the first round of the tournament (710). Djokovic would gain 480 points by merely reaching the final.



# Dodgers rally for two in ninth to top Angels

LOS ANGELES — Clayton Kershaw outlasted Jered Weaver in a matchup of Los Angeles aces and the Dodgers rallied for two runs in the bottom of the ninth inning to beat the Angels 3-2 on Sunday, preventing a Freeway Series sweep.

Pinch-hitter Aaron Miles, batting for Kershaw, drove in the tying run in the ninth on a sacrifice fly and Tony Gwynn Jr. won it with a two-out single off Jordan Walden. The Dodgers ended a three-game skid, though they remain nine games below .500.

Kershaw (8-3) gave up six hits in his second consecutive complete game, tying a season high with 11 strikeouts for the second straight outing. He didn't walk a batter in his 100th career start.

## GIANTS 3, INDIANS 1

SAN FRANCISCO — Madison Bumgarner bounced back from a one-out, eight-run performance with one of his best starts, striking out a career-high 11 batters in seven innings.

Chris Stewart hit a two-run double for his first RBIs in more than four years and Aubrey Huff added an run-scoring single for the Giants, who have won five straight following a season-worst five-

# Jacobson wins first PGA Tour title

CROMWELL, Conn. — Fredrik Jacobson promised 5-year-old daughter Emmie that he would get her a trophy this year like the ones she saw other players hold up on TV.

Promise kept.

Jacobson closed out his first PGA Tour title Sunday, shooting a 4-under 66 in the Travelers Championship for a one-stroke victory over John Rollins and Ryan Moore.

“It’s been haunting me,” Jacobson said. “I’ve been on the board, I’ve been asked so many times from the kids, ‘Did you get a trophy this week daddy? Did you get a trophy this week?’ Nope, no trophy. So, I’m excited about that. I’m glad I’m not breaking that promise for her!”

Jacobson, a 36-year-old Swede who joined the tour eight years ago and has three European Tour victories, had just one bogey in the tournament and finished at 20 under, two shots off the course record.

“I was hitting so many fairways,” said Jacobson, who tied for 14th last week in the U.S. Open at Congressional. “It started clicking the end of last week. The last two days I struck the ball the best I ever have at the U.S. Open.”

Rollins and Moore closed with 63s. Moore missed a 4-foot par

putt on 18.

“I’m not beating myself up over that putt,” Moore said. “That happens in golf.”

## TSENG RUNS AWAY WITH LPGA CHAMPIONSHIP

PITTSFORD, N.Y. — Yani Tseng left no doubt she’s the best female player in the world, running away with the LPGA Championship by 10 strokes Sunday and, at 22, becoming the youngest to win four LPGA majors.

The top-ranked Tseng closed with a 6-under 66 to finish 19-under 269 at Locust Hill Country Club, matching the LPGA record low score at a major.

Tseng bettered Se Ri Pak, who was 24 when she won her fourth major.

Morgan Pressel (71) finished second. Kerr (69), Suzann Pettersen (67) and Paula Creamer (69) tied for third at 8 under.

## 2-TIME HEART TRANSPLANT RECIPIENT COMPTON WINS

LEON, Mexico — Two-time heart transplant recipient Erik Compton has won the Nationwide Tour’s Mexico Open, closing with a 7-under 65 on Sunday for a two-stroke victory over Richard H. Lee.

The 31-year-old Compton was

diagnosed at age 9 with cardiomyopathy, an enlarging of the heart that hinders its ability to pump blood. Three years later in 1992, he received a new heart. That one failed in 2008, and he had another transplant.

Compton finished at 17-under 271 on the El Bosque Country Club course. He earned \$126,000 to push his season total to \$215,709, putting him in position to earn a 2012 PGA Tour card as a top-25 finisher on the developmental tour’s money list.

## HUSTON WINS MAIDEN CHAMPIONS TITLE

ENDICOTT, N.Y. — John Huston shot a 7-under 65 to win his first Champions Tour title, taking advantage of three straight bogeys by Mark Wiebe to capture the Dick’s Sporting Goods Open.

## LARRAZABAL OUTDUELS GARCIA IN MUNICH

MUNICH — Spain’s Pablo Larrazabal won the BMW International Open, beating countryman Sergio Garcia with a birdie on the fifth hole of a playoff.

They closed with 4-under 68s to finish at 16-under 272. They also each qualified for the British Open next month at Royal St. George’s.

apex points, exit points, shifting points. He absorbed it like a sponge.

Murray hopes to give Britain its first male champion at the All England Club — well, at any Grand Slam site, actually — since 1936.

Djokovic, whose 43-match winning streak ended with a loss to Federer in the French Open semifinals, takes on No. 19 Michael Llodra, at 31 the oldest man left and finally in the fourth round on his 11th appearance at Wimbledon. Murray meets No. 17 Richard Gasquet, while the last American man in the field, No. 10

Mardy Fish, plays 2010 runner-up Tomas Berdych.

One thing to keep an eye on Monday: Nadal’s fitness. He slipped behind the baseline a couple of times during his third-round victory over Gilles Muller, and afterward acknowledged he was bothered by a right leg muscle. But he also said he can “play with that, without problems.”

After so many years of dominance on clay — he won his sixth French Open championship this month — Nadal has become quite good on grass. Since the

start of Wimbledon in 2006, he is 29-2 at the tournament. His only losses were to Federer in the 2006 and 2007 finals; Nadal won the 2008 and 2010 titles, and was sidelined in 2009 by tendinitis in his knees.

“Against him, you should play unbelievable tennis. You should play everything perfect, and then maybe you have a little chance,” said del Potro, who was forced to play every day from Monday through Saturday because of rain. “He will be the big favorite.”

performed over the next three days. But the Spanish cycling federation dismissed those tests because clenbuterol takes several days to leave a person’s system, and then cleared Contador of the positive test, accepting his explanation that he inadvertently consumed infinitesimal doses of clenbuterol in contaminated beef.

The International Cycling Union and World Anti-Doping Agency appealed that ruling to the Court of Arbitration for Sport. The case originally was scheduled to be heard in June, but the CAS pushed the dates back to August, acceding to a request from Contador’s legal team for more time to prepare. That cleared the way for the Spaniard to compete in this year’s Tour, which starts Saturday and goes through July 24.

“It’s hard to understand that a year later, we still don’t have an answer and we have

to wait until after the Tour to get an answer,” Tour director Christian Prudhomme said. “There is an incredible time lag between the world of the sports media and that of sporting justice.”

While the UCI deplored “excessively long” proceedings in Contador’s case, it said that until the CAS rules the Spaniard has the right “to be treated like every other rider who takes the start of the Tour de France.”

Even the distraction Lance Armstrong caused by coming out of retirement to compete in the 2009 Tour, which race organizers called an embarrassment to the event, falls short of what Contador’s participation this year could do to further sully cycling.

Though rumors and accusations of doping dogged Armstrong throughout his career, and he is currently under investigation by a federal grand jury, the Texan never tested positive for a banned substance.

Contador’s decision to defend his title in the grueling three-week race ahead of his impending hearing sets up the possibility he could win a fourth Tour title only to be stripped of it and banned from the sport if the CAS rules against him weeks later. He would lose all his victories since the positive test, including last year’s Tour title and the Giro d’Italia crown he won in May.

While a negative ruling would severely taint the 28-year-old’s legacy in the sport, being cleared could cement his status among cycling’s all-time greats.

He already is one of only five riders to have won all three of the sport’s Grand Tours: the Tour, the Giro and the Spanish Vuelta. A fourth win in the Tour would give him his seventh Grand Tour victory, tying him with Armstrong, Miguel Indurain and Fausto Coppi. Only cycling legends Eddy Merckx (11), Bernard Hinault (10) and

Jacques Anquetil (8) have won more.

A victory in July also would give Contador his third consecutive Tour title, a feat achieved by only five other men: Louison Bobet, Anquetil, Merckx, Indurain and Armstrong, the all time record holder with seven straight.

Wearing the yellow jersey at the finish in Paris on July 24 also would put Contador in position to make history by becoming the first cyclist to win all three Grand Tours in the same season.

While this year’s Tour appears to be tailor-made for Contador with six high-mountain stages and four hilltop finishes, he said winning will be hard because of the toll the Giro took on his legs.

“It is very difficult to win the Tour anyway, because it requires a specific approach,” he said. “The Giro was not the ideal preparation, because it was extremely difficult.”



# Violence breaks out after storied Argentine club relegated

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — River Plate was relegated to the Argentine second division for the first time in its 110-year history Sunday, sparking ugly street battles between police and fans with dozens injured inside and outside River's Monumental stadium.

The drop came after a 1-1 draw with Belgrano in the second leg — Belgrano won the first leg 2-0 — of a demotion playoff. Mariano Pavone scored in the sixth minute for River, and Guillermo Farre tied it in the 62nd.

Violence broke a minute

before the match was over. Angry fans pelted players with objects thrown from the stands, and police replied with high-powered fire hoses.

As fans were pounded with jets of water, River Plate's players huddled on the pitch, many in tears, including goalkeeper Juan Pablo Carrizo.

The mayhem quickly spread outside River's 50,000-seat stadium. Alberto Crescenti, head of emergency medical services, said at least 55 people had been injured, some of them police.

"Right now there is no fa-

tality," Crescenti said.

Police used water cannons outside the stadium immediately after the match, hoping to disperse fans quickly. Fans who poured out of the stadium faced police with batons and shields at every exit, while attack dogs were ready and helicopters hovered over the stadium.

The area outside the stadium, located in the leafy northern suburb of Nunez, looked like a war zone with police battling hand to hand with River Plate hooligans, who are known by the colorful nickname "Los Borrachos del Tablon" — the

Drunks in the Stands.

Police fired rubber bullets and tear gas, and brought in mounted units to try to keep order.

Young, angry fans responded by throwing rocks at police, setting fire to rubbish bins and vehicles, and ripping down metal street barriers. Smoke also billowed from one end of the stadium with reports concession areas and other parts of the stadium had been set on fire.

Fans were also seen ripping up stadium seats and using part of them as weapons in fights.

Half a half dozen ambu-

lances entered the stadium area about 45 minutes after the match ended, with live television coverage showing medics working on the injured and street fights erupting just a few feet away.

As the troublemakers were driven away from the stadium, there were reports of stores and shops being broken into on one of Buenos Aires' most famous thoroughfares — Avenida Del Libertador.

Fearing this kind of violence, Argentine authorities deployed about 2,200 police — reported to be the largest security operation

for a football match — to control the crowd of 50,000.

Suggestions to play the match in an empty stadium were turned down by interior ministry officials after consulting with the Argentine Football Association and its president Julio Grondona.

The violence was predicted. On Wednesday, the first leg in Cordoba was stopped for 20 minutes early in the second half after River Plate hooligans ripped through a fence and raced across the field taunting and pushing River Plate players.

# Magic Valley can't sustain the amount of water we're using

**D**o you enjoy the lifestyle that south-central Idaho provides you? Would you like your grandkids to have the same privilege?

Then you need to be alarmed by the findings of a new study of the Eastern Snake River Plain Aquifer, the amount of water it holds and how fast it's disappearing.

By using data collected every five years and comparing that to measurements drawn on a daily basis, Idaho Department of Water Resources hydrologist Mike McVay estimated recently that the Lake Erie-sized underground aquifer has been depleted at an average rate of 225,000 acre-feet of water per year since 1980.

That's a dazzlingly high rate, and it's scary not because there's a danger that the aquifer will run dry anytime soon.

As the water level recedes further underground, it will cost more — and require new methods — to reach it.

Perhaps prohibitively expensive. Where's the tipping point of whether the current economic activity we enjoy in south-central Idaho is viable, or not?

McVay's statistics emphasize the urgency of funding the Comprehensive Aquifer Management Program.

"We are concerned about the depletion of the aquifer," said Randy MacMillan, vice president of research and environmental affairs at Clear Springs Foods in Buhl. "This is a resource that we depend on, but is it going to be around in a healthy enough state for the next 20 years?"

MacMillan's timeline is apt. We may be within a generation of an irrevocable decision about the future of the aquifer.

"We've yet to reach any equilibrium to the aquifer," he said. "It is continually depleting and that is a concern. We are a supporter of the Comprehensive Aquifer Management Plan and we're still hopeful projects can be put in place to stop the decline in the aquifer, but it's difficult to get things going."

CAMP is unloved and underfunded, shunned by key stakeholders.

Last winter, the Legislature appropriated \$2.46 million for CAMP, but that's a drop in the bucket in the 10-year effort to repair the aquifer critical to south-central Idaho's economy.

Rich Rigby, a senior adviser for the IDWR, says some water users are already walking away from CAMP. And that way lies disaster.

Do the math: If we're losing a quarter-million acre feet a year even in a billion acre-feet aquifer, how long will it be before the current uses of the water aren't viable?

The depletion of the aquifer is a four-alarm emergency for the Magic Valley's economy, and far too few people recognize that CAMP is a solution.

So far, the only solution.

**Our view:** Is the Comprehensive Aquifer Management Program the only way out of the long-term water emergency that's facing the Magic Valley? No, but it's the best tool we have so far.

# Cigarette smokers shrug off graphic warning labels

**W**ASHINGTON — I showed them gruesome pictures of a blistered and festering lip. No effect.

The federal government unveiled nine graphic images that will be required on all cigarette packs. They will be accompanied by messages such as, "Warning: Cigarettes are addictive," "Warning: Cigarettes cause cancer" and "Warning: Smoking can kill you."

How about a gray, curdled lung, marbled with black streaks?

Not a cringe among them.

"OK, how about this one?" I flipped through my manila folder, past the gangrenous foot, the degenerated eyeball and the grayish, waxen corpse.

Here it is: a sweet, innocent baby, squinting in a cloud of secondhand smoke.

Shrug.

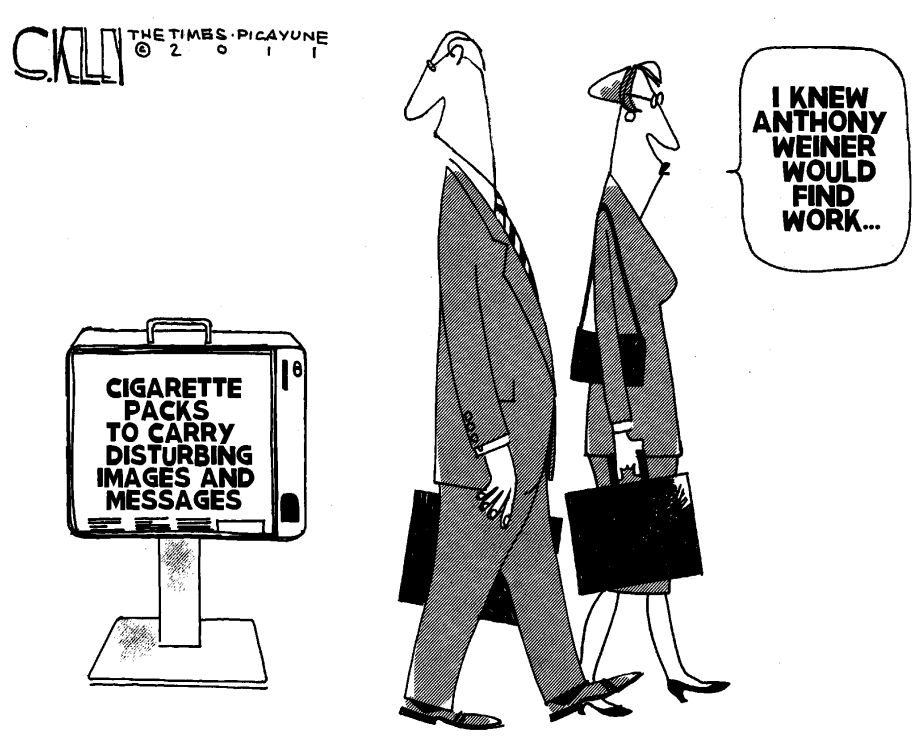
So much for shocked straight.

I got this ho-hum response while prowling the smoke-break alleys of downtown Washington last week, showing folks photos that governments think might encourage them to quit smoking.

We looked at ones that the U.S. Food and Drug Administration is requiring on all cigarette packs by fall 2012 — a rotating series of graphic images warning of the dangers of smoking. There is a blackened mouth with sores, smoke wisping from a tracheotomy hole, emotional photos of babies and mothers crying.

The baby photo did nothing for Phyllis Wilder, who was on a cigarette break from her job as an office manager on K Street.

"How about your own baby? What if her face was on the warning label on your cigarettes?" I asked Wilder.



"You know, she's been asking me to quit for years. And I'm going to. Really. I'm really going to quit," said Wilder, who is 50 and has been smoking since she tried her first cigarette at 16.

"I've tried quitting so many times. But really, I'm going to do it for her now. She's 14. And this time, I've gotta do it," she said, as she's said many times before.

Nah, someone else's baby isn't going to make her quit any faster when even her own kid's face isn't enough to slay the addiction.

I know. My dad smoked for 40 years. My brother and I begged him to quit. My mom woke up every day with headaches in the smoke-filled house. Dad would've laughed at a warning label purporting to be more powerful than his family's pleas. Even his grandson telling him he smelled foul from cigarettes didn't make him stop.

It took lung cancer, surgery, a relapse and chemotherapy to get him off the smokes.

The images that the FDA chose to use are pretty tame compared with the graphic tobacco-warning labels in other countries. The face that

looks like a blistered and scorched marshmallow, which smokers in Singapore see whenever they light up, is especially gross. Canada has photos of dirty lungs. Malaysia has a foot blackened with gangrene. Venezuela has a mouth with gums blistering with pus.

Smoking is a nasty, pernicious and deadly addiction.

And smokers such as Wilder know that.

"I saw my mom go on oxygen. I saw my grandmother go on oxygen. I know. I know," said Daniel Eagen, 36, who was pulling on a Marlboro red one hot afternoon this week in the alley outside the fancy downtown D.C. restaurant where he is a sous-chef.

"It's just, I need it to relieve the stress from in there," he said, pointing to the kitchen behind him, which was winding down after the lunch rush.

He has tried the programs, the electronic cigarette, the pills, the gum.

Warning labels, in the end, seem pretty silly to someone who has spent a lifetime wrestling such an ominous demon.

"It's like those awful pictures of abortions they use," Wilder told me. "It's compli-

cated. Yeah, everyone knows a dead fetus is an awful thing to see. But you're not going to change minds with one picture. It's not that easy."

Smoking has been on the decline in the United States for years without such graphic messages, but that drop has hit a plateau, with about 20 percent of Americans still puffing, according to a recent Gallup poll on smoking.

Heck, even President Obama quit.

The fear is that the message isn't getting through to teens. I saw the generational divide as I approached people this week. Folks older than 30 put their hands up, cig still smoking in one, when I asked them about their habit: Guilty as charged. Addict. Trying to quit. Here's my name.

The younger ones? Denial runs deep.

"No, thanks, I don't want to talk," a Capitol Hill suit in his 20s told me, cigarette in hand outside the Cannon Office Building. "I'm not really a smoker."

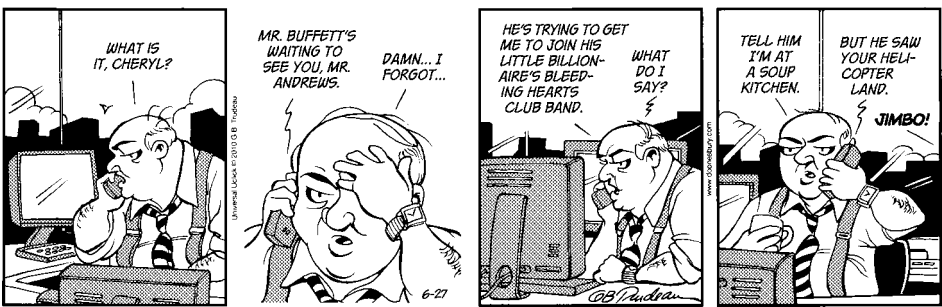

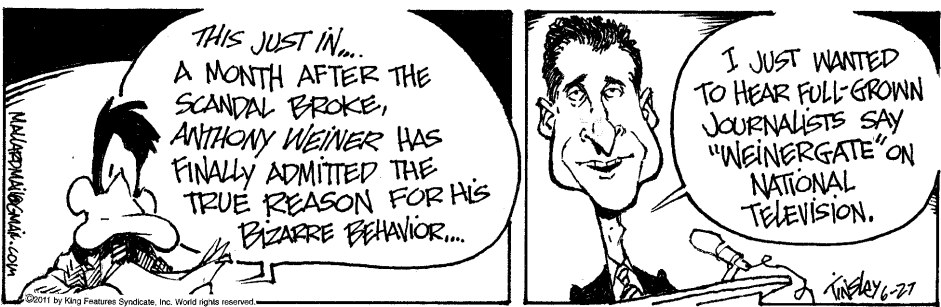

## Rebels claim advances in western mountains

TRIPOLI — Rebels in Libya's western mountains said they have advanced and are battling Moammar Gadhafi's forces in a strategic town southwest of the capital, ramping up pressure against government troops on a second front.

The rebels' claim of an advance into the outskirts of the town of Bair al-Ghanam, some 50 miles from Tripoli, follows weeks of intense fighting in the Nafusa mountains in which opposition forces have slowly pushed Gadhafi troops back toward the capital.

Libya's rebels control the eastern third of the country and pockets, including a number of Nafusa mountain towns, in the west.

Gomaa Ibrahim, a rebel military spokesman in the Nafusa mountains, said opposition fighters and government troops have been fighting since early Sunday on the periphery of Bair al-Ghanam.

### NIGERIA

## 25 killed in 3 bomb attacks in northeast

MAIDUGURI — Suspected members of an Islamic sect bombed three beer gardens in northeastern Nigeria, killing 25 people and wounding 12 others on Sunday, authorities said.

Police blamed the attack on a group known locally as Boko Haram, which earlier this month carried out an attack on the nations police headquarters.

Authorities said two men riding on a back of motorcycles threw bombs at beer gardens, which are popular nightspots for locals.

Boko Haram, whose name in the local Hausa language means "Western education is sacrilege," has claimed responsibility for a series of attacks in the northeast.

## Palestinian leaders to go for UN recognition

RAMALLAH — The West Bank Palestinian leadership on Sunday formally decided to press ahead with efforts in September to win U.N. recognition of a state in the West Bank, Gaza Strip and east Jerusalem, in what could be a blow to efforts to restart Israeli-Palestinian peace talks.

The leadership, made up of the Palestine Liberation Organization's decision-making body and officials of the Palestinian Authority, the self-rule government in the West Bank, said in a statement that the goal was to bring a state of Palestine into the family of nations of the world.

## Chavez's brother talks of armed struggle

CARACAS — One of Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez's brothers said Sunday that backers of the hospitalized leftist leader should not rule out armed struggle in the future, though they prefer to maintain power at the ballot box.

Adan Chavez's statement came as speculation mounted about the health of the president, who has been convalescing at an undisclosed location in Cuba after reportedly undergoing emergency surgery 16 days ago.

Chavez's older brother said Venezuela's ruling party wants to retain power by defeating foes in elections. But he told government supporters that they should be ready to take up arms if necessary.

"As authentic revolutionaries, we cannot forget other forms of fighting," he said during a prayer meeting for the health of his 56-year-old brother in the leader's home state of Barinas.

# A decade on, no clear answers in Afghan war

KABUL, Afghanistan — For 10 years, ever since the towers fell, the United States has fought a war in a distant land — in hopes, it says, of protecting American interests and making the world safer from terrorism. Now, as President Barack Obama plans to end U.S. combat operations in Afghanistan by 2014, the question remains as muddy as ever:

What happened here?

There have been victories — and setbacks. More than 1,522 American service members have died. There has been talk of a more stable, safer Afghanistan and frequent, obvious evidence to the contrary. The country's president and the United States share an uneasy relationship, and it's difficult to tell the story of the past decade in a single, concise statement.

Which is not surprising. Over more than 30 years of warfare, there has rarely been clarity in Afghanistan. You can't always tell who's on which side, and sometimes people are on both. Conventional battles are common, as is shadowy guerrilla warfare. Yesterday's enemy is today's ally. Tomorrow he's an enemy once again.

Afghans are dying by the thousands in a conflict which began to free them from al-Qaida, whose leaders are mostly hiding in Pakistan — a nominal American ally.

America's chapter in Afghanistan's struggle is drawing to a close. President Barack Obama has said he will withdraw a third of nearly 100,000 U.S. troops by next summer and end combat operations in 2014 — with or without even a semblance of a lasting success.

Much work remains unfinished even after almost a decade of war and billions of dollars in aid. Although battered, the insurgents still control large swaths of the country, and it is nearly impossible to travel safely from the capital to the southern city of Kandahar.

Efforts to establish effective government, especially at local levels, have achieved limited success at best. Afghanistan's own security forces remain far from capable of defending the country on their own. And only about 2,000 of the estimated 25,000-40,000 insurgents have joined a highly touted program to reintegrate into society.

In announcing the timetable, Obama spoke of building a "partnership with the Afghan people that endures" long after the last American service member has gone home. His words were aimed at reassuring the Afghans that America would not abandon them.

That pledge was reminiscent of the Soviet assurances to their Afghan

clients when they, like the British a century before, concluded that fighting in Afghanistan wasn't worth the cost in blood and treasure and withdrew in 1989.

Moscow left behind a friendly government and a well-equipped Afghan army. Three years later, that government collapsed, the army fell apart and the country was again engulfed in war.

America entered Afghanistan in October 2001 to strike at al-Qaida after the 9/11 attacks in the United States. Another goal was to oust the ruling Taliban that arose from the chaos in the wake of the Soviet defeat and also Osama bin Laden and his network.

The Taliban were dispatched with relative ease by U.S. air power and ground forces provided by militias that had resisted the hard-line Islamist movement. The U.S. and its partners established a government in Kabul, setting the stage for democratic elections.

But the Bush administration shifted its attention and resources to Iraq and a new war to bring down Saddam Hussein.

Faced with a monumental challenge and limited resources, Afghan President Hamid Karzai turned for support to the militias and warlords that Washington

had used to oust the Taliban.

With that, the new government sank into a quagmire of corruption and favoritism — opening the door to the revival of the Taliban. By 2006, the country was facing a full-blown insurgency.

Old alliances shifted back and forth. The man who invited bin Laden to Afghanistan is now a member of parliament and a Karzai crony. The warlord who helped rescue Karzai from fighting in Kabul in the 1990s now leads one of the main insurgent groups fighting his government.

Obama entered office promising to focus attention on the Afghan conflict, which he described as a "war of necessity" as opposed to Iraq, a "war of choice." He doubled the number of U.S. forces in Afghanistan and in December 2009 dispatched 30,000 more troops in a "surge" to try to stop the Taliban momentum.

In doing so, Obama in effect changed the character of the war. His commanders employed the counterinsurgency strategy that brought some success in Iraq, coupling military force with an ambitious, troop-intensive plan to push insurgents from their strongholds so the local government could build a system of services and insti-

tutions to win the loyalty of the people.

The military always knew there would never be a winner in the war. Instead, it hoped to create the necessary groundwork for a process of reconciliation and reintegration to encourage insurgents to re-enter Afghan society.

But the investment proved too much for an American

public weary of war and struggling with an economy marked by job loss and rising deficits.

Even with troop reductions, the United States is facing huge expenses if it sticks by Obama's plan. Building and funding a 300,000-member Afghan army and police will cost an estimated \$6 billion to \$8 billion a year even after 2014.

# Oils add fragrance to fitness class

I'm not a huge yoga fan — I'm cursed with short, chronically tight hamstrings, rendering me horribly inflexible — but I had heard good things about Suelin Buhidar's spa yoga class. Word on the street is it's more relaxing than typical yoga classes.

I could use a little calming, so I decided to check it out.

Spa yoga is a fairly normal yoga class, except Buhidar uses essential oils to help her students feel relaxed (or, depending on the oil blend, energized). Buhidar has been teaching yoga for about three years but added oils to some of her classes just a year ago.

Her students rave about the oils: "I think they are energizing," Beth Patten said.

It sounded good to me, so I packed up my yoga pants and headed to the Y.

**What went down:** I got to the 12:15 p.m. class a couple of minutes early, giving me time to grab a loaner mat, blocks and a silver ball. Only a handful of other people were there — which isn't the norm, one student noted.

Buhidar started the class by passing around a slightly spicy, pleasant-smelling oil blend with instructions to apply it to our wrists, temples and tops of our heads, if we desired. I complied, and managed to avoid getting it in my eyes (as I know from experience, peppermint oil does not belong on your eyeball). Before getting started with poses, we held our wrists to our faces and breathed deeply. The essential oil blend smelled amazing.

The class reminded me of beginning yoga or gentle

yoga. The poses weren't challenging; still, a basic knowledge of yoga would help, as there was less instruction on how to strike specific positions than I've had in other classes. No big deal — just follow the teacher and ask for help if you need it. I had problems with a few of the moves, and Buhidar was quick to help. Throughout the class, I caught brief whiffs of the essential oil, which reminded me to keep breathing.

I expected more "spa" in spa yoga. But smelling the oil during class did set it apart from other hatha yoga classes I've taken, and I heard the same assessment from spa yoga's regulars.

"It's a different feel to it," said Jesse Nussbaum. He especially likes a bold oil blend called Valor that Buhidar sometimes brings to class.

# 'Exergames' a great way to burn calories, studies discover, as long as they are fun

"Exergames," interactive digital or video-based games such as Wii Fit and Dance Dance Revolution, are part of today's fitness landscape for children and young adults. But do they really offer a substantial calorie burn? Two studies find that some of the games do, but whether they're fun enough for people to stick with them is another thing.

The first study, published online in the Archives of Pediatrics and Adolescent Medicine, set out to quantify how many calories children burned while engaging in a number of exergames, and compared those activities with walking on a treadmill at 3 mph.

Researchers analyzed energy expenditure among 39 boys and girls, average age about 11, as they spent time on the games and the treadmill. The participants were also asked to rate how well they enjoyed the games, a

mix of commercial and consumer products: Sportwall, the Jackie Chan Alley Run by Xavix, Lightspace Bug Invasion, Cybex Trazer Goalie Wars, Dance Dance Revolution and Nintendo Wii Boxing.

Walking at 3 mph on a treadmill produced a metabolic equivalent, or MET, of 4.9 among the children. MET values approximate how much oxygen the body uses during an activity. Light gardening has a MET of 2, a challenging hike has a MET of 6 to 7, and running at 8 mph has a MET of 13.5.

The Wii game came in at 4.2, Dance Dance Revolution was 5.4, the Lightspace game was 6.4, the Xavix game was 7, the Cybex Trazer was 5.9, and the Sportwall was 7.1. All games were played at a moderate to vigorous intensity, and four of the games surpassed treadmill walking in calorie burn.

The children liked the Sportwall game the most, and the Xavix game the

least. Children who were overweight or at risk for becoming overweight enjoyed the games more than kids with lower body mass indexes.

In the study, the authors said that although exergaming may not be the answer to getting sedentary children moving, it does have potential: "It appears to be a potentially innovative strategy that can be used to reduce sedentary time, increase adherence to exercise programs, and promote enjoyment of physical activity," they wrote. "This may be especially important for at-risk populations, specifically children who carry excess body weight."

But when it comes to sticking with a fitness program, it's all about what people like to do. In a study on interactive video games published online in the journal Medicine & Science in Sports & Exercise, researchers measured calorie burn and enjoyment among

100 men and women age 18 to 35 who played four types of games: shooter, band simulation, dance simulation and fitness.

All but the shooter games substantially provided greater calorie expenditure over resting. On average, the shooter games created a 23 percent increased energy expenditure over rest, band simulation produced a 73 percent increase, dance simulation came in at 298 percent over rest, and fitness games was highest: 322 percent more burn than rest.

Although the band simulation games were the most popular, they didn't provide the highest levels of activity. In fact, they didn't even reach light levels of exercise. Despite that, the authors were optimistic that the games could have some effect on couch potato lifestyles: "Replacement of television watching with play of these games may be a tactic for reducing sedentary behavior."

He hated seeing them sit out of group rides and wanted to get them moving.

"I just think, overall, it's healthier for them," he said.

So he rounded up a couple of old cycles from yard sales and thrift stores, cleaned them, taught himself how to repair them, and gave them to the kids. The project snowballed, and soon children were giving him old bikes to fix up and give to others.

Wampler, who has seizures and memory problems, isn't employed and spends most of his days at home. It gives him plenty of time to work on the bikes, he said.

Wampler appreciates, as almost none of the children currently own helmets and he's concerned about their safety.

Between rides Wednesday, the children congregated in Wampler's open garage,

comparing bikes and chatting about colors. Garret Karl, 12, and Max Sanasan, 10, wanted neon orange. Sanasan received a free bike from Wampler, and Wampler fixed up Karl's bike, which was in bad shape.

Cousins Nueva Sakuma, 10, Saivin Elimo, 14, and Melta Mitipok, 14, knew how to ride bikes, but had never owned one. Wampler gave bikes to Sakuma and Elimo a few weeks ago, and is working on Mitipok's now.

"Mine's the purple one," she said, pointing at a frame hanging from Wampler's garage.

Wampler's generosity has brought plenty of smiles to the neighborhood.

"It's awesome," Elimo said.

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

Today's deal demonstrates play in a single suit, where the success of the contract hinges on a proper appreciation of the spot cards.

The auction was unremarkable. When North pre-empted, South wisely decided to bid what he thought he could make, knowing that slam was unlikely and that hearts would almost certainly play better than spades, even if dummy had more spades than hearts.

West led the club king, on which his partner dutifully followed with the queen to suggest good clubs. It would have been easy for West to continue clubs, but he realized that the contract was highly unlikely to go down if declarer could run the diamonds. If not, the best defense had to be to shift to a top trump to kill the potential spade ruff. How should declarer play now?

At the table South made the most of his resources. He won and played two more rounds of trump, ruffed the club return, then carefully led a low spade toward dummy's jack. It was unlikely, if not impossible, that the jack would score. More practical was that the spade 10 would come down in three rounds and that declarer's spade nine would control the fourth round of the suit. As you can see, if declarer tackles spades from the top, he stands no chance, but with today's lie of the cards, he can come home if he follows the recommended line.

**ANSWER:** Leading a diamond, whether a high or low one, seems to be an all-or-nothing proposition. Since there is nothing about your hand that suggests the black suits are behaving for declarer, you might opt to go passive with a trump. If not, a spade lead looks to be your best shot to set up tricks without giving too much away.

"Railroad Killer" Angel Maturino Resendiz, linked to 15 murders, was executed in Texas for the slaying of physician Claudia Benton in 1998.  
**One year ago:** Wary of slamming on the stimulus brakes too quickly but shaken by the European debt crisis, world leaders meeting in Canada pledged to reduce government deficits in richer countries in half by 2013, with wiggle room to meet the goal. Pope Benedict XVI lashed out at what he called "deplorable" raids carried out by Belgian police as part of an investigation into priest sex abuse.

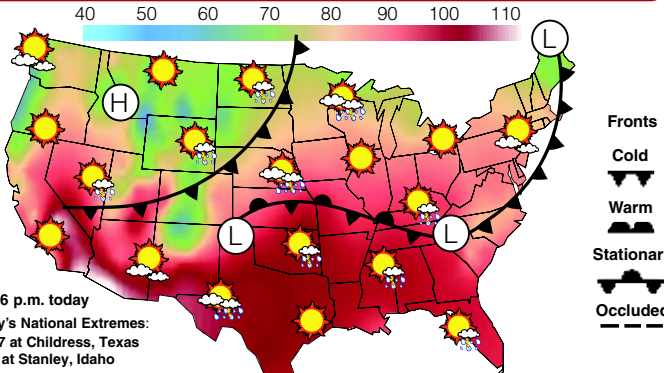
