Idaho Power sees solar energy in future

Solar power, business growth and the lingering effects of the recession have all factored into Idaho

Power Co.'s latest growth plan, re-

The Integrated Resource Plan explains the utility's business plan, growth predictions and future projects it hopes to spearhead within the next 20 years.

Among the highlights: The company has seen a drop in energy use for the first time since 2001,

according to the document. In 2009, energy use contracted by 3.5 percent, followed by another decline of 1.2 percent in 2010. Idaho Power believes the decline is related to the stalled customer growth the company experienced during the peak of the recession. The report estimates Idaho Power will regain the amount of customers it had before the economy soured by

Renewable energy has been in the utility's plan for some time, and Idaho Power is again looking to renewable energy with the expectation of growing customers and, eventually, more energy use. A series of renewable energy projects is scheduled to begin within the next 10 years. Unlike in previous plans, this one includes a solar demonstration project.

"Solar energy is really unlike wind or natural gas," said Mark Stokes, the company's manager of power supply planning. "Unlike wind, our peak energy-use days are on our hottest days when the wind isn't blowing. Solar panels could be critical for adding energy when the wind can't."

While the state does not regulate how much of a utility's energy must come from renewable sources, the cost of solar panels has been trending down, Stokes said. The lower costs sparked an interest among company stakeholders to begin testing solar energy use.

"We know the technology is out there, this will be a time for us to learn how it can sync up with our load and integrate the energy into our system," Stokes said.

Police to ask voters for a new station in Nov.

JEROME – When it comes to public safety improvements, Jerome city residents will now have two major decisions in the upcoming November election.

Already, Jerome County will seek a bond to pay for a larger, improved jail. Now, the city of Jerome will also ask voters to pay to buy a building that will become the new home of the Jerome Police Department.

At the intersection of both proposals are city voters, who will make the decision about the police station, plus play a major role in the countywide jail bond election.

City leaders say the police station bond isn't intended to compete with the county's jail proposal, saying it's a matter of timing and needing to move quickly to buy a building that

can be turned into a new police station. The Jerome City Council approved on Tuesday a plan to pay a \$20,000 refundable deposit to hold a building along the 800 block of East Main Street, with the option to buy it for \$355,000 if the bond issue passes

County, St. Luke's sign lease agreement for ambulance service

Even after completion of the new St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center on Pole Line Road and months of nuts-and-bolts planning to transition the old hospital back to Twin Falls County, the two entities aren't done being intertwined.

The Twin Falls County commissioners have OK'd a lease agreement with St. Luke's Magic Valley to continue operating a paramedics' base in downtown Twin Falls, near City Park, so as not to hamper emergency response times, Commissioner Leon Mills said.

Because of the base's proximity and its location, "it just made sense to continue that relationship with the county," hospital spokeswoman Laura Stewart said. "It really is just a central location to that part of Twin Falls, that downtown Blue Lakes area."

The base is one of three in Twin Falls, Stewart said. Another one near Martin Street and Addison Avenue, by the old hospital campus, serves the western part of Twin Falls. A base on Kimberly Road by the cemeteries serves the east side of town.

Mills said St. Luke's will pay \$500 a month to use the property, with either party having the option to cancel the agreement with two months' notice — a clause to allow for painless separation if the county finds a potential buyer for the property on Shoshone Street or if St. Luke's finds a better location in the city.

The move also fits with the commissioners' prior philosophy for the hospital's transition: No matter the urgency, don't let the move interfere with patient care.

"(The deal with the paramedics' base) is just a nice example of the county and St. Luke's working together to provide that nice community service," Stewart

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Burley seeks advice from Ada Co. sheriff

BURLEY — Burley officials brought in a criminal justice leader Tuesday with experience in police service contracts to learn the ins and outs of the documents, as the city continues to wrangle with county officials over renewing a police contract.

"Citizens don't care what the badge says, citizens don't care what the patch says, citizens don't care what the car says when they need help," said Ada County Sheriff Gary Raney, who contracts police services with the cities of Eagle, Kuna and Star. "They want someone to come and help and that's what I think you have to keep in mind as government leaders and elected officials first



New danger found in asbestos town

decade, the people of Libby have longed for the day asbestos that turned their town into the deadliest Superfund site in America.

Now they are being forced to live through the agony all over again, thanks to two giant piles of bark and wood chips on the edge of town.

An Associated Press investigation found that the federal government has known for at least three years that the wood piles were contaminated with an unknown level of asbestos, hauled truckload after truckload of the material away from the site and placed it in yards, in city parks, outside schools and at the local cemetery. The Environmental Protection Agency did not stop the removal of the material until the AP began investigating in early March.

Regulators still do not know what effect the material could have on public health, but EPA documents imminent danger. obtained by the AP showed that the agency found potentially deadly asbestos taken from the piles of scrap wood in 2007. The sprawling piles came from a now-defunct timber mill that took thousands of trees from a five people are unemployed. forest tainted with asbestos from a nearby mine.

The potential for more contamination has frayed nerves in the town of 3,000 people and further eroded confidence in the government to clean up the mess knowledged that removal of that to date has killed an estimated 400 people and sickened 1,750.

"We thought we were coming to an end and now we have this issue all over again," said Lerah Parker, who spread dozens of truckloads of the material around her property.

The source of Libby's asbestos was a W.R. Grace vermiculite mine that at its peak produced 2 million tons of ore annually and employed 200 people. Vermiculite stripped from a mountain on the edge of town was shipped around the world to make insulation, only for authorities to later discover the ore was loaded with deadly asbestos.

The EPA has spent more than \$370 million over the past 11 years cleaning up Libby. Contractors in moon suits carting off tainted materials have become a constant reminder of the severity of the contamination.

The wood chips and bark became a popular item for anyone in Libby looking to add some landscaping touches to their yards, and for contractors who packaged the product and sold it around the country.

Local officials estimate that 1,000 tons were used in landscaping and for erosion control in Libby. Over the past decade, as much as 15,000 tons were sold and hauled out of town to destinations unknown, according to the economic development official who was sell-

ing it. The EPA is now scrambling to gauge the public health risk and is preparing to issue guidelines about how residents should handle the wood, including warnings not to move or work with the material when it's dry to avoid stirring up asbestos. But the agency has decided it won't track down

spread recontamination just after the EPA in May declared it had reduced the dangers facing Libby.

"How many more years is it going to take?" asked Parker, who suffers from asbestosis, an incurable disease caused by inhaling asbestos fibers that scars the lungs and slowly starves them of air. "Are we supposed to sit here and hold our breath?"

Parker and her husband have been working to restore their property since it was demolished during the cleanup. Over the last several years, they hauled about 30 loads of the bark and wood chips from the former Stimson Lumber Co. mill.

They showed a reporter more than 300 trees they had planted, each one ringed with bark a foot deep. Scattered across the property were thousands of newly planted berry bushes, vines, shrubs and other plants - all ringed with the bark.

The material is easily found around town, where landscapers, city workers and homeowners paid small fees to haul it out. Those who have used it described it as ideal landscaping material - cheap, plentiful and attractive.

After the EPA tested samples from the piles and found evidence of asbestos in 2007, agency scientists never determined just how much contamination was present. Air samples taken from the site were negative.

Truckloads of the chips and bark continued to be shipped from the site as recently as last fall. A pile that witnesses said once towered as high as a four-story building and covered five acres has been reduced to remnants. A second pile, The presence of the bark now roughly half gone, still towers at least 20 feet.

System that led to the construction of a new hospital, the county now faces a major real estate challenge - and a conundrum:

How much of a purpose-built hospital is suitable for any other

The county just commissioned a space study for the Addison Avenue West medical office building and don't expect results for about two months. From there, commissioners will decide whether to move nonlaw-enforcement county facilities into that building or use the old Twin Falls Clinic and Hospital building on Shoshone Street. There's no timeline for the deci-

They've already spent \$60,000 on studies associated with county departments moving into the buildings and remodeling information. The county has at least \$5 million set aside for final renovations, including \$4.6 million St. Luke's gave the county for remodeling.

As for filling the other 14 buildings the county inherited from St. Luke's, commissioners said they've already received some interest from adjacent building owners hoping to expand, and there have been preliminary talks with the city of Twin Falls concerning it taking a building for a new City Hall.

It's worth taking time to explore at the possibilities, but we tend to agree with Commissioner George Urie, who's the in-house pragmatist about the future of the

Urie has said that if the county can't find the right tenants for the properties, they're likely to be demolished.

And the meter is running. The county just signed up an on-site caretaker for the old hospital property and a private security service. The longer the old hospital is empty, the deeper the money pit becomes.

We hope a new day is coming for the old hospital campus and for the West Addison neighborhood that surrounds it. But Twin Falls County taxpayers can't afford to wait indefinitely for that to happen.

Reader thankful for **Ehrlick conviction**

What an ordinary day, Iune 29, 20011. It was Robert Manwill's day. Justice was served.

or people who believe that oil markets are rigged or broken, the first week of May offered Exhibit A.

That week, the price of crude oil plunged more than \$16 a barrel, erasing about \$32 billion of the market value of Exxon Mobil and presaging an easing of prices at the pump, where the cost of a gallon of gas had hit record

On that Thursday alone, the price of oil fell off a cliff, tumbling more than \$10 a barrel.

Yet the physical amount of oil in the market didn't change that week. Libya's oil exports had been offline for more than two months. In the oil world, the surface was relatively calm. But a couple of signs of economic weakness spooked traders, who suddenly worried that demand would be less than they had expected. Goldman Sachs, a believer in rising crude oil prices, predicted a temporary pullback. Poof! More than a tenth of the value of a barrel of oil disappeared.

For consumers, oil prices are like a bad case of malaria - feverish one month and tolerable another. Such wild fluctuation makes it nearly impossible to discern: What is the right price for oil?

Today's crude oil prices are nearly 10 times as high as they were in 1998, and twice as high as in 2005. They hit a record of \$147 a barrel in July 2008, only to sink to less than \$40 a barrel by the end of that year.

In March, amid intense fighting in Libya, President Obama said that there wasn't a serious supply shortage and that rising oil prices weren't reason enough to tap

the nation's Strategic Petroleum Reserve. Then on June 23, he suddenly said that turmoil in Libya justified the largest-ever release of reserves. It was more of an economic stimulus than a national security measure.

Because oil prices fluctuate so much, however, it will be impossible to measure Obama's success or failure. If prices continue to drop, as they were doing before his move, will he deserve credit? If they rise, will he deserve blame? If it works, will we want him to do it again?

That will come down to the question of price. In a competitive market,

the price of oil would be linked to the marginal cost of the next barrel. In other words, the price for the first 88 barrels would be affected by the cost of producing the 89th barrel, in effect the cost of replacing each barrel used. But in the world of oil, it's

hard to say what that replacement cost is. Producing oil is not like churning out computer chips, where costs are similar everywhere.

In Canada, it costs somewhere between \$40 and \$60 a barrel to mine and melt the viscous goo known as tar sands. Yet in the Gulf of Mexico, where giant drilling rigs plumb deep waters, the cost

of finding and developing oilfields can be relatively modest. Chevron, for example, has a \$7.5 billion platform that will tap into a half-billion-barrel field at an average cost of about \$15 a barrel.

And that's the thing: There is no free market. There are obstacles everywhere. Pipelines. Politics. Oil spills. Warfare. They make it hard to figure out a marginal price for the next barrel of oil because it's not clear whether the cheapest barrel can get anywhere near a tanker, refinery or consumer. Some argue that an era of

limits has begun. Yes, there is a peak to world oil production out there somewhere, because we're gobbling up the plants and plankton that have been simmering for millions of years in the sedimentary cooker faster than the Earth can replace them. But we keep postponing that peak — by finding new fields, getting more oil out of old ones or clamping down on consumption.

Still, supplies could remain tight because of fast consumption growth in China, where every year it's increasing by more than half a million barrels a day. The world has about 3 million to 4 million barrels a day of spare capacity right now, but Post.

prices edge up when that cushion shrinks.

The only way to restore balance in coming years will be through higher prices but that could constrain economic growth. Robert Mc-Nally, founder and president of the Rapidian Group, estimates that prices will have to rise 13 to 15 percent a year to effectively ration supplies. "You can have 4 percent economic growth or doubledigit crude oil prices," he says, "but you can't have both."

That goes back to Obama's release of strategic reserves. "The administration will be repeatedly tested" on its strategic oil reserves policy, McNally says. "If you believe half of this, how do you get reelected next year?" he says. "You have to prevent the rationing. So you have to throw the reserves into the market."

For union members public or private, it's work

s New Jersey throws its weight behind Wisconsin and Ohio in rolling back the collective bargaining rights of public sector employees, we are once again going to hear the argument that public sector unions ought not to be confused with their private sector counterparts. They're two different animals entirely.

Private sector workers, so the argument goes, have historically organized to win better working conditions and a bigger piece of the pie from profit-making entities like railroads and coal mines. But public sector employees work for "us," the ultimate nonprofit, and therefore are not entitled to the same protections.

This is a fond notion at best. Yes, public school teachers were never gunned down by Pinkerton guards; municipal firefighters were never housed in company-owned shanties by the side of the tracks. But none of this cancels their rights as organized workers. No ancestor of mine voted to ratify the Constitution, either, but I have the same claim on the Bill of Rights as any Daughter of the American Revolution. Collective bargaining is an inheritance and we are all named in the will.

The two-labors fallacy rests on an even shakier proposition: that profits exist only where there is an accountant to tally them. This is economics reduced to the code of a shoplifter — whatever the security guard doesn't see the store won't miss. If my wife and I have young children but are still able to enjoy the double-income advantages of a childless couple, isn't that partly because our children are being watched at school? If I needn't invest some of my household's savings in elaborate surveillance systems, isn't that partly because I have a patrol car circling the block? The so-called "public sector" is a profit-making entity; it profits me.

Denying this profitability has an obvious appeal to conservatives. It allows a unionbusting agenda to hide behind nice distinctions. "We're not anti-union, we're just against certain kinds of unions." But the denial isn't exclusive to conservatives; in fact, it informs the delusional inno-

cence of many liberals. I mean the idea that exploitation is the exclusive province of oil tycoons and other wicked types. If you own a yoga center or direct an M.F.A. program, you can't possibly be implicated in the more scandalous aspects of capitalism – just as you can't possibly be to blame for racism if you've never grown cotton or owned a slave.

The fact is that our entire economic system rests on the principle of paying someone less than his or her labor is worth. The principle applies in the public sector no less than the private. The purpose of most labor unions has never been to eliminate the profit margin (the tragedy of the American labor movement) but rather to keep it within reasonable bounds.

But what about those school superintendents and police chiefs with their fabulous pensions, with salaries and benefits far beyond the average worker's dreams?

Tell me about it. This past school year, I worked as a public high school teacher in northeastern Vermont. At 58 years of age, with a master's degree and 16 years of teaching experience, I earned less than \$50,000. By the standards of the Ohio school superintendent or the Wisconsin police chief, my pension can only be described as pitiful, though the dairy farmer who lives down the road from me would be happy to have it.

He should have it, at the least, and he could. If fiscal conservatives truly want to "bring salaries into line" they should commit to a model similar to the one proposed by George Orwell 70 years ago, with the nation's highest income exceeding the lowest by no more than a factor of 10. They should establish that model in the public sector and enforce it with equal rigor and truly progressive taxation in the private.

Right now CEO's of multinational corporations earn salaries as much as a thousand times those of their lowestpaid employees. In such a context complaining about "lavish" public sector salaries is like shushing the foul language of children playing near the set of a snuff film. Whom are we kidding? More to the point, who's getting snuffed?



Exxon assured feds failed Montana pipeline was deeply buried in river

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) -Exxon Mobil Co. had reassured federal regulators and officials from a Montana town since December that an oil pipeline beneath the Yellowstone River was safe, buried deep enough to avoid any accidental ruptures.

Then, on Friday night, the pipe failed, spilling an estimated 42,000 gallons into the flooded river.

The cause of the accident remains under investigation, but the prevailing theory among officials and the company is that the raging Yellowstone eroded the riverbed and exposed the line to damaging rocks or debris.

There is still no definitive word on how far downriver the spill could spread.

Oil has fouled miles of the waterway that flows from the famed Yellowstone National Park, upriver from the spill, and across farmlands and prized fishing grounds to North Dakota. Crude has been reported as far as 240 miles downstream, although most appears to be concentrated in the first 25 miles.

As residents along the river deal with an oil-smeared shoreline and workers clean up the mess, the accident has raised concerns about the impact that the season's floods may be having on the network of pipelines buried under riverbeds.

Wyoming Gov. Matt Mead and U.S. Interior Secretary Ken Salazar are set to meet Thursday in Cheyenne to discuss the wolf issue. U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service Director Dan Ashe also is scheduled to attend.

Mead and Salazar have held a series of meetings since late last year intended to allow Wyoming to follow the lead of other states in the Northern Rockies and take over management of wolves from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.



Auto industry is on hiring spree

DETROIT - Volkswagen opened a plant in Tennessee last month with 2,000 workers. Honda is hiring 1,000 in Indiana to meet demand for its best-selling Civic. General Motors is looking for 2,500 in Detroit to build the Chevy Volt.

Two years after the end of the Great Recession, the auto industry is hiring again - and much faster than the rest of the economy. As an employer, it's growing faster than airplane manufacturers, shipbuilders, health care providers and the federal government.

The hiring spree is even more remarkable because memories of the U.S. auto industry's near-death experience are fresh. In 2009, General Motors and Chrysler both got government bailouts and entered bankruptcy, and auto sales hit a 30year low.

In June of that year, about 623,000 people were employed by the auto industry in the United States, the fewest since the early 1980s. Now the figure is almost 700,000, a 12 percent increase.

Sales are back up, too, and automakers are hiring by the thousands to meet increased demand.

"The buzz is incredible around here about what opportunity we're going to get if we can build a great product," says Ben Edwards, who went to work for Volkswagen in Chattanooga, Tenn., last year and is now a team leader on an assembly line that installs tires and seats.


Edwards was working as a general contractor until the housing market dried up. He says the pay at Volkswagen, which starts at \$14.50 an hour, is fair and the benefits are generous.

Besides hiring 2,000 people itself, Volkswagen figures the plant, where it will make its new Passat, will create 9,000 spin-off jobs in the region, including 500 at autosupplier plants that are springing up nearby.

Automakers are hiring again because car sales are rising. Americans bought 10.4 million cars and trucks in 2009 and 11.6 million in 2010. This year, they're on track to buy 13 million or more, and auto companies are adding shifts to meet the demand.



And Coeur d'Alene's obstacle course, open for roughly three weeks, is at 403 N. Second St., connected to the next-door businesses, Downtown Guns and Ammo.

It's more than just blasting zombies. It offers real-life firearm training courses for the general public to law enforcement agencies. The training courses use a smokeless, non-toxic marking cartridge from a converted firearm. The cartridges, made by Simunition, don't penetrate and the discharges are quiet, so the shooter doesn't have to wear ear protection.

The courses incorporate home-based and real-life situations, like an attack at an ATM machine, or a home invasion, to give it more realism. Using live attackers adds stress for the trainee, making the lesson more valuable.

"The live targets add a whole other element to the training," Johnson said.

But it's the zombie blasting that's taking off.

U.S., Mexico sign multi-year cross-border trucking agreement

MEXICO CITY - U.S.and Mexicanofficials signed an agreement Wednesday allowing each country's trucks to traverse the other's highways, implementing a key provision of the North American Free Trade Agreement after nearly two decades of bickering.

Transportation secretaries Ray La-Hood and Dionisio Perez-Jacome signed the three-year memorandum, which is based on an agreement announced in March by Presidents Barack Obama and Felipe Calderon.

NAFTA, signed in 1994, had called for Mexican trucks to have unrestricted access to highways in border states other jobs.

But until now, Mexican trucks have seldom been allowed farther than a buffer zone on the U.S. side of the border. In retaliation, Mexico had imposed higher tariffs on dozens of U.S. products.

The Mexican government has now agreed to suspend those tariffs as long as the agreement is in place.

The public debate surrounding the accord had mostly focused on the safety of Mexican trucks. But labor unions and other groups were strongly opposed to the agreement, which they say will cost Americans trucking and

Electronic monitoring systems will track how many hours the trucks are in service. 

In late afternoon trading, the Standard & Poor's 500 index lost less than 1 point to 1,337. Rupert Murdoch's News Corp. was among the index's biggest losers, dropping 4 percent, as a phone-hacking scandal engulfed one of the media giant's tabloids. Some British legislators called on regulators to block News Corp. from taking over British Sky Broadcasting.

The policy shift brings a bit of consistency to the longstanding practice of top U.S. leaders recognizing the service of those who died while fighting for their country. Until now, many of the military service chiefs and secretaries wrote to families of those who committed suicide while in combat. But in most cases, the president and secretary of defense did not.

Mental health and troop advocacy groups welcomed the change but said those who die outside war zones also should be recognized and that more should be done to prevent suicide among service members.

President Barack Obama said the decision was made after an exhaustive review of the previous policy, and was not taken lightly.

"This issue is emotional, painful and complicated, but these Americans served our nation bravely. They didn't die because they were weak;" Obama said in a written statement. "And the fact that they didn't get the help they needed must change."

The complex and wrenching emotions of the issue are evident on a war memorial at Fort Hood, Texas. Gen. Peter Chiarelli, the Army vice chief of staff, said Wednesday that the greatest regret of his military career was his decision to leave one name off that monument. The soldier — one of the 169 1st Cavalry Division troops Chiarelli lost during a yearlong deployment in Iraq had committed suicide. So just 168 names are listed on the memorial.

NEW YORK (AP) Lawyers for Dominique Strauss-Kahn met with prosecutors Wednesday for what the defense called a productive discussion, but there was no immediate word on what would happen to the sexual assault case that has been threatened by doubts about the accuser's credibility.

The two sides met privately for about 90 minutes in Manhattan District Attorney Cyrus R. Vance Jr.'s offices, but participants were tight-lipped about the exchange, which came five days after prosecutors said the accuser had not been truthful about her background and the aftermath of the alleged attack. Lawyers for the former

leader of the International Monetary Fund called the session with Vance and assistant prosecutors "constructive."

Vance's office said only that it was continuing to investigate and that no decisions had been made about the case's future.





Look ahead

If you're in an area where signs are posted to keep an eye out for rattlesnakes, use caution. They're probably not far away. You won't likely find such warnings on remote trails, but if you're in desert terrain, often where there's sagebrush and rock, the snakes might be there anyway.

One of the things Teresa learned is that you should always look ahead of you when hiking on trails not just where you're stepping, but several yards in front of you. You're looking for dark oval patterns that often blend in with rocks on the trail. Teresa said the snake she saw was stretched out on the trail and did not coil until she got

"Be alert," said Kelton Hatch, conservation educator with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. "Pay attention to your surroundings."

This way your chance of encountering a rattler unaware is lessened.

Give it room

Paying attention to what's ahead of you allows you to make proper judgements if you see a snake.

"If you encounter a rattler," Hatch said, "give it a wide berth and walk

Snakes do not have external ears but are sensitive to vibrations and will "feel" your footsteps as you get close to them. Snakes can strike only within half their length, Hatch said. But don't take chances. Rattlers coil up when they feel threatened, so it's difficult to tell how long the snake might be.

"There's nothing wrong with killing a snake if you feel threatened by it," said Gary Hompland, conservation officer with Fish and Game.

But if you're not within striking distance, there might be other options such as walking around it.

"Just because you see a rattlesnake doesn't mean you have to kill it," said Hatch. "They are beneficial to the environment and good at rodent control. They eat a lot of mice and things like

WHERE ARE THE SNAKES?

Rattlesnakes are most active during the day. They rest in shade when the weather is extremely warm, and often go onto trails and roads to glean warmth from rocks as evening approaches or in early

They can be found underneath rocks, shrubs and plants.

"But there's not one under every rock," said Kelton Hatch of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

What if you're bitten?

About 25 percent of all rattlesnake bites are dry, non-venomous bites. But don't take chances. If you're bitten by a rattlesnake, stay calm and seek medical help immediately.

Do not cut the wound, as this can cause extensive bleeding, according to BitesandStings.com. Because human mouths are full of bacteria, sucking venom from the wound can cause infection, making treatment more difficult.

Tie a tight bandage a couple of inches above the bite. This slows the dissemination of the venom. Do not cut off your circulation, or you can damage the healthy tissue not receiving the proper amount of blood below the wound.

Carry a snakebite kit. Kits such as the Sawyer Extractor contain a syringe-like device that extracts venom from the wound without the complications of bleeding or wound contamination.

Rattlesnake bites are extremely painful and life-threatening without medical intervention. But according to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, more people die from bee and wasp stings than rattlesnake bites. Each person reacts differently to bites, Hatch said. But most people who are bitten by a rattler — as long as they get medical help — make a full recovery without lasting effects from the bite.

Going without medical treatment can result in death within the day or following day due to venom disrupting blood flow and the function of vital organs.

BULLSNAKES GET A BAD RAP

Rattlesnakes have triangular heads, narrow necks and thick bodies. They are brown with dark oval patterns on the back and a lighter underside. Their rattles, which have multiple layers, are formed by shed skin and sound like a raspy buzz when knocked against each other.



Wyoming gunners savor automatic fire, freedom

NATRONA COUNTY, Wyo. – The row of machine gunners sprayed a steady stream of bullets hundreds of yards downrange into the Wyoming prairie, destroying propane tanks, fire extinguishers and the occasional stick of dynamite or sacrificial radio-controlled model airplane.

These enthusiasts were celebrating machine guns and machine gun rights and they've been doing so annually at the Northern Rockies Machine Gun and Cannon Shoot, whose 2011 edition was held recently at a ranch west of Casper.

"A lot of people give us a bad rap and say, 'Why do you need a full-auto gun?" said Quinton Miller of Casper, one of several dealers offering machine guns for rent. "Well, because we can."


The shoot featured a wide array of machine guns and earsplitting noise: Large ones on tripods pulsed with a profound thumping bass. Small ones, designed to fit under suit coats, emptied their magazines with jagged rips of sound. Gunners wore both foam ear plugs and ear phones to prevent hearing damage from the wall of

With both hands on the twin wooden handles of a tripod-mounted machine gun, one shooter simultaneously pulled back on a safety toggle with two fingers while pushing forward with both thumbs on a plunger that serves as a trigger.

The gun fired, moving on its tripod with a surprisingly gentle, rocking motion, sucking a belt of loaded cartridges in one side and spewing smoking, empty casings out the other. nless you live under a rock, you're likely aware that a small but vocal minority of our national legislators are pushing for a total ban on semi-automatic firearms and high-capacity magazines.

The best part is, you can make this conversion for a fraction of the cost of buying a specialty

.22 target rifle. This affordable metamorphosis is made possible by the modular nature of

the 10/22. Simply loosen the bedding screw and barrel band (if present) and the stock drops free. Back out two screws from the barrel retainer and the barrel slips from the receiver. Drift out two steel pins and the trigger group parts company with the receiver. Then it's just a matter of gathering the desired components

and reassembling. As mentioned earlier, the array of customizing accessories for the 10/22 is legion. Many area sporting goods stores carry a fine selection. Numerous sources also are available online, such as MidwayUSA, Brownells and Cabelas, which distribute the largest variety of aftermarket selections.

For specific brands, check out fajen.com, shootersridge.com, butlercreek.com, and volquartson.com. Boise-based Tactical Solutions produces what many aficionados consider the highest quality 10/22 accessories available anywhere.

For this project, I attached a Shooters Ridge camo-finished thumbhole stock. This excellent synthetic model features a soft rubber recoil pad, easy grip forearm panels, sling swivel studs, and a steel bedding

pillar for stability.

For optimum accuracy, I chose an 18-inch Shooters Ridge .910 fluted target (bull) barrel. With their Benz Match chambers and carbide button rifled bores, these premium barrels are one-hole shooters.

To prevent the 10/22's notorious accuracy-diminishing bull barrel droop, I firmly secured the barrel with a Tactical Solutions Vblock retainer. To cushion the violent bolt slam, I fitted a Clark recoil buffer and screwed down a Weaver Picatinny rail to allow wide latitude in optic choices.

Final results: Not only was the heavy barrel/thumbhole stock combo easier to stabilize at the range and in the field, its accuracy potential absolutely went through the roof. My plain Jane 10/22 evolved from pounding out decent 11/2-inch groups at 50 yards to drilling wonderfully tight 1/2-inch clus-

Just imagine, for less than two Benjamin's you too can transform your run-of-the-mill 10/22 plinker into a certified tack-driving machine. Why not give it a try?

Grand Teton grizzly family snarls traffic in national park

CHEYENNE, Wyo. – A grizzly bear clan famous for its frequent roadside appearances in Grand Teton National Park is keeping park rangers especially busy this summer tending to tourist critter jams.

The cubs are cute - no question about that — but a female grizzly with cubs happens to be one of the most dangerous animals in North America. And this Grand Teton clan has a history: One attacked a hiker; another was shot and killed by a hunter.

Biologists speculate the unusually camera-friendly behavior by Grizzly No. 399 and her daughter, No. 610, might serve to keep at bay adult male grizzlies, which sometimes kill cubs not their own. Five spunky cubs recently have joined the clan, adding to the tourist traffic.

"It's very important for people to remember that these are wild bears and that they are very protective," said Steve Cain, senior wildlife biologist at Grand

No. 399 has attacked before. In 2007, the year after she gave birth to a litter of three cubs, she bit a man who came across the four bears feeding on a just-killed

were born to No. 399 and their cars and didn't get too two to No. 610, who has been close. especially visible in recent weeks.

No. 610 – the bears are numbered in the order they've been trapped for study - has been frequenting the same area where she grew up, and biologists say she's emulating her mother's roadside habits.

Few people have observed the grizzlies as much as wildlife photographer Tom Mangelsen, who lives near the park and a short drive from the territories of No. 610 and No. 399.

He thinks the opportunity for one photo in particular is only a matter of time, possibly while elk are calving and attracting grizzlies to the Willow Flats area not far from Jackson Lake Lodge.

"The ideal thing for me would be to see if they walk past each other and see if they greet and meet each other. Typically females will tolerate other females, and even more so with their own offspring," Mangelsen said.

What you should know about drawings and controlled hunts

uestion: "In the new big game hunting brochure I noticed several controlled hunts listed with unlimited numbers of permits allowed. Since I was not successful in the first drawing I was wondering if I could apply for one of these in the second drawing?"

Answer: A well-known wildlife professor and scholar at the University of Idaho once said to me, "wildlife populations generally survive quite well in spite of all of our attempts to control or manage them. The real art and science of management involves controlling the numbers of consumptive and nonconsumptive sportsmen."

As he said, much of our efforts to manage wildlife requires biologists to develop hunting seasons that allow a level of harvest in line with wildlife population goals. Hunting opportunities can be manipulated to increase or decrease harvest based on the types of hunting regulations adopted by the commission.

Examples of regulations that encourage increased harvest would be open hunts, any weapon, long seasons, and timing hunting seasons when animals are most vulnerable such as during the rut or during winter when they are congregated.

Examples of regulations that may decrease or regulate harvest would be weapons restrictions, controlled hunts, shorter seasons, or moving the hunting season out of the rut to a time when animals would be more difficult to locate.

In either case, economics and weather can play a huge role in making regulations successful or fail to produce the desired management outcomes.

Within our current rules, a hunter successfully drawing a controlled hunt permit, and purchasing his tag, is only allowed to hunt that specified controlled hunt. This rule prohibits those drawing hunts from huntASK THE **OFFICER** Gary **Hompland**



so requires a commitment from a hunter during the application period because he cannot apply in any oth-Wildlife manager's use of

controlled hunts with no limits on the number of permits (unlimited controlled hunts) means that everyone who applies for these opportunities are successfully drawn. Many applicants select an unlimited controlled hunt as their second choice on their application to ensure they draw at least something.

An unlimited controlled hunt may be selected by managers where there is a need to stabilize or reduce harvest.

Unlimited controlled hunts also help regulate hunter numbers in some previously open hunts with high hunter congestion. Another benefit of this option is that everyone who really wants to hunt a specific big game unit still can.

If the desired management outcome or goal is successful this option maximizes hunting opportunity to the extent possible without having to reduce opportunity by going to a limited entry controlled hunt.

Unlimited controlled hunts are not available to hunters in the second drawing. Hunters successfully drawing unlimited controlled hunts during the first drawing may purchase their tags up to the last day of their unlimited controlled hunting season.





Riots erupt in Egyptian city over police trials

CAIRO (AP) - Hundreds of Egyptian protesters lobbed rocks at the security headquarters and set fire to police cars for a second day Wednesday in a flashpoint city as growing impatience over delays in trying former regime officials and police accused of killing protesters threatened to plunge the nation back into crisis.

In a bid to defuse rising anger, the Interior Ministry announced that hundreds of high-ranking police officers will be sacked for their role in the harsh crackdown on anti-government protests earlier this year that left nearly 850 people dead. Interior Minister Mansour el-Essawi said in a statement that it will be the largest shake up in the history of his ministry.

Justice for those who killed demonstrators has become a rallying point for the protest movement, nearly five months after Hosni Mubarak was ousted in an uprising after a nearly three-decade rule marred by complaints of widespread corruption and police abuse.

The two days of rioting in Suez - a city at the southern tip of the strategic Suez Canal that saw some of the most dramatic confrontations between police and protesters was prompted by anger over a court order on Monday to release seven police officers charged with killing demonstrators.

Prosecutor-General Mahmoud Abdel-Meguid had promised to appeal the court order and return the police officers to jail.

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Libyan rebels seize 2 mountain towns

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) -Rebel fighters in western from dawn until after night-Libya seized two mountain towns from government troops Wednesday as their counterparts east of the capital Tripoli suffered heavy losses in intense fighting with government troops.

Meanwhile, the embattled regime of Moammar Gadhafi sought to show it remains in control of the country, laying out plans to try rebel leaders for treason in court next week.

In the eastern rebel stronghold of Benghazi, tens of thousands of rebel supporters poured into the city's main square for a rally aimed at sustaining momentum for their nearly five month-old uprising. Fighting began in February when popular movement against Gadhafi quickly escalated into armed conflict.

The civil war has been largely deadlocked, with the rebels controlling the east and Gadhafi clinging to large parts of western Libya, but unable to retake rebel bridgeheads there. The rebels made some gains Wednesday, taking two Nafusa mountains and pushing further from the west, toward the town of Zlitan, 12 kilometers to the

The alliance said its warplanes have destroyed 2,700 military targets, including 600 Libyan tanks and artillery guns and nearly 800 ammunition stores, since NATO began bombing Gadhafi-linked sites in March under a U.N. mandate to protect Libyan civilians.

Secretary-General Anders Fogh Rasmussen warned that Gadhafi's forces remain a threat. "Without NATO there would be a massacre. Gadhafi would be free to use his tanks and missiles on towns more towns in the western and markets;" he said. "We will not let that happen?"

Triangle of hunger batters millions in East Africa

WAJIR, Kenya - Thousands of families are walking for days in search of food in a triangle of hunger where the borders of Ethiopia, Kenya and Somalia meet. Hundreds already have died, and images of children with skinny, malnourished bodies are becoming commonplace in this corner of Africa.

Even Somalia's top militant group is asking the aid agencies it once banned from its territories to return. Thirsty livestock are dying by the thousands, and food prices have risen beyond what many families can afford.

Hawo Ibrahim said she and her seven children trekked 15 days from a town reaching a refugee camp in northeast Kenya.

"We have seen misery and hunger on our way;" said Ibrahim, 32, who said her husband went mad after the family lost its livestock to drought. "The most painful thing was when you don't get anything for your thirsty and hungry children."

Aid agencies are appealing for tens of millions of dollars in emergency funding. Oxfam — which hopes to raise \$80 million, its largest ever appeal for Africa – says 12 million people are affected by hunger. At least 500 Somalis are known to have died from drought-related diseases, though Oxfam says the actual number is likely higher.

Huge storm on Saturn yields detailed images

LOS ANGELES - Saturn's Great White Spot, a recurring storm on that planet that has intrigued scientists since it was first observed in 1876, is a windy, towering cloud of ammonia and water spewing out super jolts of thunder and lightning. Now astronomers and NASA's Cassini spacecraft, which has been orbiting Saturn since 2004, have captured the most detailed views to date of the phe-

The luminous storm, which may be the gaseous planet's main mechanism for dissipating heat, occurs approximately once every Saturnian year, the equivalent of about 30 Earth years. The latest round — the most intense on record - was first noticed by groundbased professional and amateur astronomers as a bright speck on Saturn's northern hemisphere on Dec. 5, about nine years before schedule.

Their observations coincided with Cassini's detection of a deluge of radio waves emitted by Saturn. These radio waves are a signature of lightning and can be used as a measure of its strength.

During the days that followed, that small blemish, moving westward at approximately 65 mph, grew to a size nearly equal to the diameter of the Earth. Two months later, the behemoth stretched across the entire planet, spanning more than 180,000 miles.

"It turned into a very spectacular storm, with so many (lightning flashes) we couldn't resolve individual ones;" said Donald Gurnett, a physicist at the University of Iowa and a contributing author of one of the two reports, which were published Wednesday in the journal Nature.



Basque in Idaho

From the mid-eighteenth century until after World War II, large numbers of young Basques left the Basque Country for other parts of the world, often for economic or political reasons. In the Western United States, Basques were often employed in sheepherding, ranching and farming. No U.S. State is more associated with Basque people and culture than Idaho. It has a large population of ethnic Basques and their descendents. The largest concentration of Basques communities is in the area around Boise with Gooding and the surrounding communities next.

The Basques call their language Euskara. The Basques have traditionally called their country Euskal Herria, which means 'the Basque Country'. This designation includes the territory of the traditional seven provinces, located in northern Spain and southern France. "Basques took great pride in being hard workers and being good citizens" as evidenced by the number of Basques in leadership positions in business and politics. Probably the most well known Basque in the State government is former Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa.

The Gooding Basque Association strives to maintain and share our culture with all who are interested. We utilize our Cultural Center in Gooding to this end, hosting Basque dinners every first Friday of each month except July. In July we hold our annual Gooding Basque Association Picnic on the third Sunday of the month. This year's picnic will be July 17th at the Gooding County Fairgrounds.

Come join us Sunday July 17th at the fairgrounds. Even if you are not Basque, we'll make you Basque for a day. You can sample our food, including Basque style BBQ lamb, salad, rice, beans and this year, roasted pork loins. We'll have something for every member of the family from Basque Dancing exhibitions (in traditional costume),

Basque sports and contests for adults (weight carrying, bota contest, Basque style tug of war) & sports and contests for younger kids including races, junior tug of war, rides and other activities. Part of our activities will include our traditional auction (live lambs, Dutch oven bread & gift baskets). The day begins with a Catholic Mass at 11 am with the BBQ lunch at a little after noon. CRHS wrestler takes term "no offseason" to another level

ever again will Braydon Metcalf complain about a high school wrestling practice being too hard.

Not after running 1.5 miles from the dorms on the campus of Pennsylvania State University, running every last step of gigantic Beaver Stadium (capacity 107,282), then running all the way back.

Not after wrestling for an entire hour against the same person — no water breaks, no bathroom breaks, no gear adjustments.

Not after a week in the most intense wrestling camp, hosted by the reigning NCAA champions and guided by arguably the best wrestler the United States has ever produced.

Most importantly, not with all the things he now needs to impart on the younger wrestlers in the Canyon Ridge program.

As far down as the high school level, there's no longer much (if any) of an offseason from a given sport.

Even less so for guys like Metcalf, whose tireless pursuit of a state championship landed him in a prime camp, clashing with the best of the best from around the country.

When Metcalf got a sponsorship to attend essentially any one wrestling camp he wanted, he immediately thought of regional camps he'd already attended. He quickly was reminded that any camp he wanted meant exactly that: any camp he wanted.

From then on, there was just one he set his heart on — an ultra-intensive camp from June 25 to July 2 at Penn State, home to the national champions and coach Cael Sanderson, a U.S. wrestling legend at age 32.

It had been full for months, but almost as if by providence a spot opened up, and Metcalf became the only Idaho wrestler in attendance.

For seven full days and parts of two others, there were three things wrestlers could do attend practices, sleep, and eat.

"If we weren't too tired to eat," Metcalf said Wednesday. "My dad used to come home and we'd have dinner ready, and he was too tired to eat. I never understood that, but I do now."

Aside from Beaver Stadium and hour-long grudge matches, Metcalf and the others came ready to wrestle and to learn.

For someone new to that elite level of wrestling, there was a lot for Metcalf to take in. But he wrote down as much as he could so he could remember it and share it with his teammates.

The biggest moment was when he finally mustered up the courage to approach his idol, Sanderson, who was 127-3 with four state titles in the Utah high school ranks and a perfect 159-0 at Iowa State with four national ti-

Oh, yeah, and he won a gold medal in the 2004 Olympics.

But Metcalf might have learned more from the way Sanderson carries himself than from any wrestling move.

"He's my biggest role model ever. The epitome of perfect (as a wrestler)," Metcalf said. "It took me two days to go up to him and ask him about the kind of grip he likes to use, pick his brain.

"It was kind of weird talking to him because he's so bashful, but this guy could rip my head off at any moment if he really wanted to. I learned I need to be more modest about myself and don't let my ego get to me. If you're going to be like him, you're going to be pretty dang good."


Now home from his once-in-a-lifetime experience, Metcalf acknowledges this season presents his last chance, in more ways than

He'll have to shake the reputation of being hotheaded – Metcalf was ejected from both the 2010 Twin Falls-Canyon Ridge football game and the 2011 Red Halverson Invitational wrestling tournament for striking an opponent — but he's determined to be known for something else: improving on his fifth-place finish at state, and being a good leader for the Riverhawk program.

"I know I mess up one more time and I'm not going to be a part of this program ... being successful has everything to do with attitude and maturity," he said. "When I went to this camp, I was there for the whole Canyon Ridge team, to learn as much as I could.

"This is a landmark for me, because I got messages from all my wrestling buddies that want to wrestle against me every day in practice. I feel like I'm one of the first seniors to go through Canyon Ridge with full respect, full captain title and it'll be because I'm at that maturity level.

"Did I learn anything from the camp? Not

DURBAN, South Africa The victory margin was massive and the message loud and clear: Persistence paid off for South Korea in the Winter Olympics.

After two stinging defeats in a decade of trying, the South Korean city of Pyeongchang finally won its Olympic prize Wednesday, burying two European rivals in a landslide vote for the 2018 Winter Games and bringing them back to the lucrative Asian market.

The Koreans lost narrowly in the final round of voting for the 2010 and 2014 Games, but this time they defeated Munich and the next year. Annecy, France, by a onesided margin that few had expected.

Needing 48 votes for victory, Pyeongchang won an overwhelming 63 of the 95 cast in the first round of the secret ballot. Munich received 25 and Annecy sev-

Cavendish wins Tour's crash-marred fifth stage

CAP FREHEL, France (AP) -Mark Cavendish of Britain won a windy and crash-marred fifth stage of the Tour de France in a mass sprint on Wednesday, while Thor Hushovd of Norway kept the leader's yellow jersey.

Defending champion Alberto Contador fell in a crash and RadioShack rider Janez Brajkovic broke his collarbone and pulled out of the race during the 102-mile stage from Carhaix to Cap Frehel on the English Channel.

Cavendish, a sprint specialist, collected his 16th career Tour stage victory and his first this year by speeding past Philippe Gilbert of Belgium - who finished second and Jose Joaquin Rojas in third.

"I am really happy. It was a difficult finish," said Cavendish, who rides with the HTC-Highroad team. "I put every thing into it ... If we win, it's not because we're lucky, it's because we're good."

"It's always sweet to silence the ignoramuses," he said.

But Gilbert succeeded in making him work hard in the sprint.

Christophe Kern, the French time-trial champion, dropped out of the race after yet another crash.

"I kept hearing over the radio, 'Crash! Crash!', and then I saw guys like Gesink coming back to the peloton all covered in dirt," Evans said. "It was a dangerous day, Ithink."

With his jersey torn over his right shoulder, Boonen struggled through wincing pain behind an escort from Quick Step teammate Andy Engels – and finished more than 13 minutes behind the main



Former Jazz player Armen Gilliam dies

PITTSBURGH (AP) - Armen Gilliam, who was part of the UNLV Runnin' Rebels basketball team that made a run to the Final Four in 1987 and played for several NBA teams, has died. He was 47.

The Allegheny County Medical Examiner's Office said Wednesday that Gilliam died Tuesday night at the LA Fitness gym in Bridgeville while he was playing basket-

The office said the cause of death has not yet been determined pending an autopsy which was to be completed later Wednesday.



After college, the Phoenix Suns drafted Gilliam as the No. 2 overall pick in the first round of the draft. Besides the Suns, Gilliam also played with the then-Charlotte Hornets, Philadelphia 76ers, New Jersey Nets, Milwaukee Bucks and

Utah Jazz. He retired in 2000. "We are deeply saddened to learn about the loss of Armen Gilliam," said Rod Thorn, president of the 76ers. "He was a hard-working, physical player during his distinguished 13 years in

BA and we are proud of the contributions he made to the Sixers from 1990 to 1993. "On behalf of the entire Sixers organization, we send our deepest condolences to the Gilliam family during this

very difficult time." Nicknamed "The Hammer," Gilliam was the leading scorer on the 1987 UNLV team coached by Jerry Tarkan-

In a statement released by UNLV, Tarkanian, who coached basketball there from 1973-1992, called him one of the best players the university ever had.

"In my ratings, I had Larry Johnson No. 1 and Armen No. 2. He was such a great person. Everybody loved him and he loved everybody," Tarkanian said. "He was such a gentle person and such a caring guy. I am all shook up over it. I think the world of him and am just really shocked."

Gilliam's No. 35 UNLV jersey was retired during a halftime ceremony at the Thomas & Mack Center in November 2007. He became the eighth player in the program's history to receive that honor.

He played at UNLV from 1984-87 and was a key member of UNLV's second NCAA Final Four team in 1987. That team finished the season with a 37-2 overall record and was 18-0 in Big West Conference play.

Gilliam coached and played for the Pittsburgh Xplosion in the American Basketball Association in 2005 and 2006. He also coached Division III Penn State-Altoona from 2002-05.

Born as Armon Louis Gilliam, he later changed the spelling of his first name to Armen to better suit the pro-

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Exxon assured feds failed Montana pipeline was deeply buried in river

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) -Exxon Mobil Co. had reassured federal regulators and officials from a Montana town since December that an oil pipeline beneath the Yellowstone River was safe, buried deep enough to avoid any accidental ruptures.

Then, on Friday night, the pipe failed, spilling an estimated 42,000 gallons into the flooded river.

The cause of the accident remains under investigation, but the prevailing theory among officials and the company is that the raging Yellowstone eroded the riverbed and exposed the line to damaging rocks or debris.

There is still no definitive word on how far downriver the spill could spread.

Oil has fouled miles of the waterway that flows from the famed Yellowstone National Park, upriver from the spill, and across farmlands and prized fishing grounds to North Dakota. Crude has been reported as far as 240 site of the spill, raised quesmost appears to be concentrated in the first 25 miles.

As residents along the river deal with an oil-smeared shoreline and workers clean up the mess, the accident has raised concerns about the impact that the season's floods may be having on the network of pipelines buried under riverbeds.
