Simpson budget proposal trims EPA

Every government budget proposal has its winners and losers.

In this one, the biggest loser would be the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, with a potential cut of

\$1.5 billion. Among the winners would be the U.S. Forest Service's wildland fire management fund, which would get \$37 million more.

Both are in the budget proposal for the EPA, U.S. Interior



Department and other natural-resources agencies for the coming fiscal year. The House Interior and the Environment Appropriations Subcommittee, chaired by U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Idaho, approved the bill on Thursday, sending it to the full House Appropriations Commit-

The bill has a double-barreled goal of trimming back on federal government spending while also making a slew of regulatory changes that supporters contend are needed for economic growth. Those run the gamut from a one-year prohibition on regulating greenhouse gases from factories to reducing the backlog of applications to graze on federal lands.

"This committee is taking meaningful steps to help put our country's fiscal house in order," Simpson said.

Overall, the subcommittee's \$27.5 billion bill is 12 percent less than what President Barack Obama sought.

The EPA faces a potential 31 percent cut when factoring in a budget measure Congress passed in April.

"Some naysayers will no doubt try to portray Republicans as not supporting clean water, clean air, and a clean environment, but such

Anderson slit the bov's throat with a bread knife and Poyson bashed the victim's head against the floor and pounded him with a rock. That didn't kill Delahunt, so Poyson picked up the bread knife and drove it through the teenager's ear and into his nose. That too, failed to dispatch the victim, so Poyson continued to smash Delahunt's head against the floor. Forensic pathologists testified it took Delahunt 45 minutes to die.

Poyson found Wear's .22caliber rifle, borrowed ammunition from a neighbor and shot Kagen in the head as she slept, killing her instantly. He then shot Wear in the mouth, but the wound wasn't fatal. In the struggle that followed, Poyson beat Wear with the butt of the rifle, kicked him in the head on the pretext of having sex. and then picked up a cinder

Arrested 10 days later in an Evanston, Ill., homeless shelter, Poyson was eventually convicted in Arizona of three counts of first-degree murder, one count of conspiracy to commit murder and one count of armed robbery. Anderson and Lane were also convicted of the murders, and Anderson is also on Arizona's death row.

In the landmark 2002 case Ring vs. Arizona, the U.S. Supreme Court invalidated the death penalty law under which Poyson was sentenced because it allowed judges - and not juries – to impose capital punishment. The Arizona Legislature subsequently changed its death penalty statute to comply with the Supreme Court mandate.

In a post on the website of the anti-capital punishment advocacy group Canadian Coalition Against the Death Penalty, Poyson describes an abusive childhood in Jackpot and serving stretches in the Nevada Youth Training Center for

Boys in Elko; the Caliente, Nev., Youth Center, and from 1992-94 at the Idaho Department of Juvenile Corrections Center in St. Anthony. He was released when he turned 18.

Stevenson said cases are being overturned across the state due to the evidence rules, likely changing how prosecutors look at evidence going into trial.

"We will be looking at evidence we used to submit into court with a different eye," Stevenson said.

Taking these cases to court a second time will have a financial impact on county coffers, he said. It also means victims have to relive the crime once again.

How about putting cops in Jerome under one roof?

here's no question that the city of Jerome needs a different building to house its police station.

But does it really need to ask for it on Nov. 8?

That's also the day Jerome County will make its fourth attempt at a bond issue to build a new jail to replace the sagging, 37-year-old lockup on the verge of being closed by insurers as a liability hazard.

The Jerome County commissioners have bent over

But no matter how cheap and how lean, it's doubtful that Jerome County voters who live within the city would say yes to two spending proposals in the same election. Both the police station and the jail stand a better chance if one issue is on the ballot on Nov. 8 and the other in the first half of 2012.

Yet maybe this doesn't need to be an either/or proposition.

How about a single building to accommodate both the sheriff's office and the Jerome Police Department? That doesn't necessarily mean the two couldn't continue to operate independently of each other; it just means they would share a facility expressly designed for law enforcement.

Although planning for the jail is far advanced, perhaps the commissioners and the council members should at least discuss a joint venture before either the city or the county goes to the voters asking for money.

The worst scenario, it seems to us, would be competing ballot measures come November. That would be likely to make both the city's and the county's law enforcement dilemmas more acute.

The jail, it seems to us, is the higher priority because the cost of its closure would affect every taxpayer in the county.

Jerome County is spending upwards of \$20,000 a month now to house inmates elsewhere because there isn't enough room in the jail. If the lockup is closed, all of its prisoners would have to be sent elsewhere at a cost of almost \$1 million a year.

That's in addition to the tab for county deputies spending time on the road ferrying inmates to and from outsourced jails in Gooding, Hailey and Soda Springs to court dates in Jerome.

What's more, the current facility is a security risk and the greatest risk is to residents of the city of Jerome.

All of which is not to understate the urgency to find another building to house the city police station.

The current building, which dates from the 1920s and was formerly used as a telephone exchange, has no room for expansion. Cramped offices line the station's hallway.

The partially underground structure has leaky walls and a flat roof that drips, even with repairs.

On Tuesday, the Jerome City Council approved a plan to pay a \$20,000 refundable deposit to hold a building along the 800 block of East Main Street, with the option to buy it for \$355,000 if the bond issue passes muster with voters. The building sought was formerly office space for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

City officials concede the real need is for a new police station. The old Fish and Game office, they estimate, would tide the police department over for about a decade.

That's a short-term solution to a bigger problem, and both the city and the county need to be part of that conversation.

But I couldn't help myself. Every July Fourth weekend, I get sucked into the spooky little dimension of The Twi*light Zone.* As the annual Syfy marathon proves, Rod Serling's hypnotic show is as relevant as ever.

If Anthony Weiner had watched it, he might have been more aware of how swiftly, and chillingly, our technology can turn on us. Prosecutors and reporters, dumbfounded by dramatic reversals in the cases of tabloid villains D.S.K. and Casey Anthony, might do well to keep in mind Serling's postmodern mantra: Nothing is what it seems.

Agnes Moorehead may seem to be a lonely farmwoman under attack by scary little robots, but after she kills them and takes an ax to their spaceship, it turns out that she's the scary Amazon alien and the little men were U.S. astronauts from Earth.

Ensorcelled once more by that inimitable, smoke-filled Serling voice, which is reassuring and unnerving at once, I wondered how the ingenious TV writer would have used social media and search engines in his plots. Given the way Serling treated time travel, space odysseys, robots and aliens, the 21stcentury technology giants would probably have been ominous in one narrative and benign in another. (Just like in life.)

No doubt some characters would have been saved and others destroyed by Twitter, Facebook and Google.

"When you look at Twilight Zone episodes, everything is ambivalent," said Serling's friend Doug Brode, who, along with Serling's widow, Carol, wrote Rod

Serling and The Twilight Zone: The 50th Anniversary Tribute, published in 2009. "Rod had an open mind to the good, the bad and the inbetween of technology. He was a guarded optimist until the Kennedy assassination. After that, his work reflected his sense of hopelessness."

He said that Serling's father, a middle-class grocer, lost his business in the Depression, so Rod had an early lesson in reversals. Serling al so had a devastating experience while serving in World War II. During a lull at the Battle of Leyte Gulf in the Pacific, he was standing with his arm around a good friend and they were having their picture taken. At that moment, an Air Force plane dropped a box of extra ammunition that landed on Serling's friend and flattened him so fatally that he couldn't even be seen under the

"Many Zone episodes are about that split-second of fate where somebody arbitrarily gets spared or, absurdlv. does not," Brode said.

Serling himself lived a reversal, going from a trailer park after the war and 40 rejection slips in a row to having a big Hollywood house and a pool. But he grew dis-

dainful of Babylon's corrupting materialism and moved back to a cottage on Cayuga Lake in upstate New York. Serling fought furiously against censorship and ads, asking how you could write meaningful drama when it was interrupted every 15 minutes by "12 dancing rabbits with toilet paper?"

In one Twilight Zone, an inept screenwriter conjures up Shakespeare to help him. The Bard produces a dazzling screenplay but then storms out when the sponsor demands a lot of revisions.

Did Serling, who had a searing sense of social and racial justice, believe in God?

"Not Charlton Heston sitting on a cloud with the Ten Commandments, but absolutely, as a force in the universe, he did," Brode said. "Nearly 35 years ago, George Lucas told me that the whole concept of the Force comes from Rod Serling."

It's impossible not to watch a stretch of the endlessly inventive Serling and not notice how many of his plots have been ripped off for movies, and how ahead of his time he was. In a popular new Samsung ad, a young woman jumps up from the lunch table and begins screaming because the tarantula

screensaver on her colleague's phone is so lifelike; another guy at the table takes off his shoe and smashes it.

There's a Twilight Zone episode where a Western gunfighter time travels forward and goes into a bar, where he sees a TV with a cowboy coming toward him. Thinking it's real, he pulls out his pistol and shoots the screen.

Looking at this summer's lame crop of movies and previews you can appreciate Serling's upbraiding of the entertainment industry for "our mediocrity, our imitativeness, our commercialism and, all too frequently, our deadening and deadly lack of creativity and courage."

The Twilight Zone was never high in the ratings, and Serling died at 50 from the ravages of smoking six packs a day. He felt like a sellout and failure. He had sold syndication rights for his show to CBS for a few million, thinking he had not written anything of lasting value.

Sadly, he gave himself a trick ending. He died never realizing how influential he would be.

The data-reporting mess in Idaho schools

t was upsetting to me to see the Idaho Association of School Business Officials report on the ISEE, the longitudinal data system for K-12 education. Those most intimately involved with the management of our schools found a difficult-to-use system containing inaccurate data.

They felt that they have had to divert an inordinate amount of already scarce resources to work with the system. They requested that the state Department of Education "slow down," iron out the errors and bugs and make the system usable, before pushing its greater use. And they are frustrated with an implementation process that has been plagued by problems — little training and inadequate support by the department.

It was very reminiscent of what I was hearing (and still am hearing) about the Idaho Medicaid claims system last summer. Widespread and costly errors, a poor transition process, little help desk support and, as a result, a fiasco for the department, private sector businesses who provide Medicaid services, and the many Idahoans who

rely on those services.

In both cases, there's no question that a new system was sorely needed. In both cases similar systems and changes had been implemented elsewhere by the vendor. What was different here?

I submit that the state, Health and Welfare and the Idaho Department of Education were in over their heads. They were ill-equipped to manage a major system change. Financial constraints and staff reduction decisions, poorly written contracts, or simply "not knowing what they didn't know," made the projects more expensive and difficult and resulted in an inferior and unacceptable result.

Such bungling of major initiatives is likely to continue. We rely on a department team that only sees part of the whole, is often inexperienced in system and process change, and is often com-

prised of personnel who are intermittent due to turnover. We are hesitant to involve stakeholders and end users appropriately, we purchase services from entities who can't deliver or whom we can't properly manage, and we are driven by "budget" limitations rather than by quality and results, and set timelines based on externalities (i.e. federal reporting requirements or fiscal calendars) rather than reality.

These two areas (Medicaid, K-12 education) are the largest parts of our state budget, together totaling more than \$2 billion each vear. These are mission-critical applications. And in many ways, they are foundational to the future strategies of those areas. We need accurate claims and membership data to do Medicaid medical management and contracting to bring costs in line. Albertson Foundation is proposing a \$25 million expansion of ISEE into a robust reporting and management package. Not to mention that the Luna Plan calls for changes in performance evaluation, compensation of teachers, technology and online course requirements estimated at up to \$60

million per year.

The great irony here is in the oft-heard Republican mantra, "We need to run government like a business."

No self-respecting business would ever tolerate the sorts of troubled implementations that we've seen at two of our state's largest agencies. Ultimately, we need to run government like a well-run government - efficient, responsive, fiscally responsible, and accountable. But the calamitous implementation of these high-profile projects suggests such management and leadership is absent. And that's unacceptable for a business or a government.

No matter how bad it might make the governor or the superintendent look to slow down and wait to get things right, it is better for the state and her citizens to do so. Otherwise we will be compounding the errors and end up with much less than the citizens want and deserve, having paid much more than we can afford.



Park: Bear in mauling only protecting cubs

YELLOWSTONE NA-TIONAL PARK, Wyo. - A grizzly bear that mauled a 57-year-old hiker to death in Yellowstone National Park was only defending its cubs and had not threatened humans before. So park officials on Thursday decided to leave it alone to wander the backcountry.

The mauling - the park's first in 25 years — temporarily closed one of the park's top attractions, the south rim of the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone, on one of the busiest days of the year. Some tourists were left to wonder what was going on.

"It was not predatory and so we see no reason to take action against the bear," said Kerry Gunther, bear management biologist for Yellowstone.

The attack also highlighted the potential dangers, however rare, that face tourists who come in record numbers each year to a park through to emergency offiknown for its burgeoning cials. bear population and the Old Faithful geyser.

Whenever there is a runin or attack involving bears, park officials must decide whether the attack was defensive or an act of aggression. 

U.S. retailers had their best June sales results since 1999 as shoppers were lured into stores by warm weather and deep discounts. Kohl's Corp., Target Corp., and Urban Outfitters Inc. each gained more than 6 percent.

Investors have been concerned that high gas prices would constrain consumer spending as people looked for ways to save money. The higher sales figures reassured markets that consumers were becoming more willing to spend again.

An improving job market likely helped. The number of people who made firsttime claims for unemployment benefits dropped last week to a seven-week low of 418,000, the government reported. That's a sign that employers are laying off fewer

The Dow Jones industrial average gained 93.47 points, or 0.7 percent, to close at 12,719.49. The Standard and Poor's 500 index added 14 points, or 1.1 percent, to 1,353.22.

Requirements to include the warnings on all advertising also will likely force tobacco companies be more creative in their marketing.

In some countries where more graphic warning labels were introduced, tobacco companies sold split packs so smokers could break the pack in half so one side didn't have the labels, sleeves were made to cover the warnings, and sales of cigarette cases spiked, said Michael Cummings, chair of the Roswell Park Cancer Institute's Department of Health Behavior in New York.

Police: Michigan shootings suspect commits suicide

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. A gunman opened fire in Michigan homes Thursday, killing seven people before leading police on a high-speed chase through downtown Grand Rapids and taking three murder. A spokesman for hostages. The standoff ended when he killed himself with a gunshot to the head, authorities said.

The hostages were released unharmed.

Authorities did not have a motive for the suspect, Rodrick 34-year-old Shonte Dantzler, or disclose his exact relationship with those he killed.

The manhunt for Dantzler began after four people were found dead in one home and three were discovered in another across town. Two of the dead were children.

"We believe there were prior relationships with at least one person at each location, so we think there were some difficulties there," Police Chief Kevin Belk said.

Following the discovery of the bodies, Dantzler led officers on a chase, crashed his car and then took the hostages, police said.

Dozens of officers with guns drawn cordoned off a neighborhood near a small lake in the northern part of the city and shut down nearby Interstate 96.

Records show Dantzler was released from state prison in 2005 after serving time for assault less than the prison system said he had not been under state supervision since then.

At one point during the chase, the suspect crossed a wide grassy median on the interstate and drove the wrong way down the highway while more than a dozen squad cars pursued him. Belk said he crashed the vehicle while driving down an embankment into a wooded area of the highway, which remained closed hours later.

Two other people were shot when the suspect fired at police during the chase, but their wounds were not considered life-threatening. One man was wounded in what Belk described as a "road rage" attack after the suspect fired through the rear window of the vehicle. A woman was hit in the arm in a separate shooting.



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Umpires strike back, and back, and back again

f you tune into baseball games to see the umpire strike back, the All-Star break couldn't come at a worse time. July is already shaping up as one of the best months ever for ejections.

Since the calendar turned over, 17 players, managers and coaches have been sent to cool off early, the same number that were tossed during the first weeks of April, May and June combined.





The early leader in the clubhouse for best exit was Blue Jays pitcher Jon Rauch, who got a jump on things by shedding his jersey and hat even before stalking off toward the stalls. Then Tigers manager Iim Levland did Rauch one better. Leyland was still standing in the dugout when he got tossed for the second time in nine days, shortening his trip to the showers to a matter of

"Like I said after that one, something is going on," Leyland said Thursday. "It's just not good when there's that much tension around."

Even with another day to think things over, Levland hasn't figured out what's causing all the pile-ups between the umps and players, managers and coaches.

"In no way, shape or form am I blaming the umps. I want to be clear about that," Leyland said in a phone call from Kansas City, where his Tigers were preparing to play the Royals. "We've all got to do better, especially with what happens right after a call somebody doesn't like is made. For the good of the game, everybody needs to relax a little bit."

Blame it on rising temperatures, the replay videos available at every turn, a handful of Triple-A call-ups filling out the umpiring crews as vacation relief, or the mounting frustration some clubs express as their springtraining dreams circle the drain even before the season hits the midway point.

Then again, as Angels manager Mike Scioscia suggested the other day, maybe it's just "cyclical."

"I haven't noticed anything that would point to it being anything but random," he said.

So far, Scioscia's guess is as good as any other. According to MLB figures, 93 players, managers and coaches were ejected this season through June 30, less than the average of 102 over the same time period for the past half-dozen seasons. The totals have ranged between a low of 78 and a high of 116.

"You're never going to figure it out. And maybe if the umps got it right once in a while," chuckled Hall of Famer and former manager Earl Weaver, "you wouldn't be having all these problems."

Weaver acknowledged a moment later that he's hardly impartial. He's third on the

managers' list of all-time ejections with 97, trailing only Bobby Cox (131) and John McGraw (117). Weaver also watches only two dozen or so games a season from his home in Pembroke Pines, Fla., but he does have a theo-

"Umps are human beings and they have to take a lot of guff, so to some extent, they've always been like that," he said. "But from what I see, more and more they're taking exception to just about everything. I had plenty runins, but it seems like the old guys were more secure about the job. It's almost like the newer guys are being taught how to be mean in ump school or something."

Increased use of instant replay might ease the tension, but current rules allow it only on home-run calls, and there's no chance of that being expanded anytime soon. Former manager Joe Torre, now an MLB executive vice president, has been working

on mending fences between the umps and the clubs and a committee is weighing the merits of instant replay against the time it would tack onto each game.

But even if a decision to expand the use of instant replay was made, it would require amending the collective bargaining agreement. Negotiations are currently under way on a new CBA, but the topic hasn't even been seriously broached.

Besides, players, managers and coaches are all over the map on the issue.

"I think you could expand it, but to what degree, I don't honestly know," Leyland said. "I do not want to take human element out of the game, especially since we ought to be amazed how many times those guys are right.

"But it's the way the situations are being handled after the call that we have to get straight right now. I know Joe Torre is working his fanny off, but the relationship has got to be workable. Like I said, maybe we all just need to relax a little."



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



THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

At the table it would be easy to predict what would happen to most declarers in four hearts. They would cover the opening spade lead with dummy's queen, and East would take his ace and shift to a club.

The defenders can cash their two club winners and would probably exit with a spade. Declarer's only legitimate chance now would be to find a spade-diamond squeeze. However, West can guard spades while East controls the diamonds, so nine tricks will be the limit.

Curiously, though, the natural lead of the spade jack allows the contract to be made if South concludes that the spade ace is with East. Declarer must duck the first trick in dummy — a play far easier to find on paper than at the table. If East takes his spade ace to shift to clubs, declarer loses only two clubs and a spade since the two diamonds from hand can be discarded on dummy's spade winners. If the spade jack holds the trick, that leaves West on lead, and he cannot sensibly attack clubs from his side of the table. Best is to exit passively with a trump, but declarer can take a ruffing finesse against the spade ace, then throw a club on a winning spade honor. South can later develop a diamond trick for his 10th winner. In all, he loses one trick in spades and one in each

ANSWER: You have enough values to drive to game here, but you may have a 4-4 spade fit, which you would surely want to play in if it is available. To investigate, you can bid two clubs as Stayman if you play "system on," meaning that you use the same methods over a one-no-trump overcall as you do in response to a one-no-trump opening bid.
