Citizens Blast City on Eastland Move

The city of Twin Falls, wanting to make Eastland a fivelane arterial roadway, admits a mistake in staking and spray painting lawns to prepare for work.

In about mid-June, Mark Burgess found stakes driven into his lawn on Eastland Drive in Twin Falls, and spray paint marking it up.

It was the day Burgess was supposed to have an open house with his real-estate agent, and two months after he poured several thousand dollars into preparing his house for the market. But with city workers having pounded in the stakes to mark 10 feet of lawn he stands to lose - a move Burgess contends is illegal entry to his property - he said his agent told him not to bother trying to sell.

He's now living in a trailer behind the church he pastors at in Heyburn, he said – unable to sell his Eastland house, thinking he will owe more than it's worth

when Eastland is expanded to five lanes, and holding a moral aversion to bankruptcy.

He was one of more than two dozen people who showed up Wednesday at the Twin Falls City Council Chambers, and one of several people to blast city officials for what all parties agreed to be poor handling of rights of way along Eastland. The city is trying to expand North Eastland to five lanes, a multi-million project that will take 10 feet from many property owners along that corridor.

Lawmakers **Still Eyeing** Change to College Boards

JEROME • State lawmakers are still open to the idea of changing community college governing boards so that all counties in each college's taxing district have representation.

The idea was floated in the last legislative session, but that bill died. The effort followed the November 2010 election for two College of Southern Idaho trustee seats. The contested races resulted in a full slate of board members from Twin Falls County, but none from Jerome County after longtime board trustee LeRoy Craig of Jerome lost his seat to Karl Kleinkopf of Twin Falls. The bill that died would have required CSI to divide its Twin Falls County and Jerome County district into zones based on population, while keeping unchanged the fivemember size of the board. But on Wednesday, the home was bathed in white primer by Paint Magic volunteers. Today, a bluish-gray will be stroked onto the old wooden panels.

"This is a vintage home and it's going to have a beautiful facelift," said Denise Duey, Walmart employee and Paint Magic volunteer. Duey has a love for Old Towne Twin Falls, and giving homes a

makeover is something she's proud to do. This is her first year on Walmart's Paint Magic team and she said the relationships she's developed with her coworkers and the Hamletts has been rewarding.

The couple is hearing-impaired and on Wednesday, Kenton's brother Darrel Hamlett interpreted for them.

"He said he is really thankful for this," Darrel said as Kenton signed. "They are doing a lot of work."

Paint Magic received around 86

applications for its annual, colorful service, and 23 homes owned by senior or disabled community members were chosen to be painted.

Jerome Schools Make Large Cuts to Cover \$1.3 Million **Budget Shortfall**

The Jerome School Board formally approved the district's proposed 2011-12 budget on Tuesday in a special meeting, bringing significant cuts across the board.

The district is working with \$17 million – a \$1.3 million drop from last year's funds.

State funding has dwindled increasingly each year and districts are looking at ways to offer quality education with less money. For Jerome, that meant decreasing supplies, materials and textbook funding by 10 percent. Teachers will be furloughed 8 1/2 days and 15 staff positions were cut, including eight certified teachers. Superintendent Dale Layne said the teacher eliminations were dispersed throughout the schools and only equal a 4 percent cut in certified staff.

"The hardest thing is dealing with personnel,"

said Brian Bridwell, business manager. "We had to tighten our belts for another year and we've tried to maximize federal funding."

Programs were slashed as well. Layne said the middle school golf program was hacked and the high school's debate team was removed, along with the night school. The J- Center, Jerome's alternative school, will extend its hours to 5 p.m. to accommodate those who need classes later in the day.

Assistant coach and the middle school athletic director positions are also going to be vacant in the upcoming year.

Jerome received more than \$700,000 in additional state funding on Monday and Layne said he had hope for the future. The district will save the funds to buffer the next fiscal year.

The scene contrasted with one of the city's last major rights-of-way deals. When Twin Falls wanted to expand Washington Street, officials spent five years negotiating with property owners on a fair price per square foot. The process began with each parcel being assessed by a certified third party and then the city and the property owner negotiating until a price was agreed on.

This time, the window's much smaller. The city sent out the appraisal notices containing offers many at the meeting called "robbery" – and hoped to begin the work this fall.

At the meeting, property owners' complaints ranged from never being notified the city was going to claim the right of way to getting what they said were unfair -

ly low assessments for their property.

Some said they were offered as little as \$2 per foot of right of way. For Burgess and several others, the battle now isn't about stopping what was called a "super highway" from running past their houses: It's about getting a fair price for what seems to be guaranteed construction.

"That's robbery," Burgess said of his assessment. "If you think we're not going to fight this, you'd be wrong."

City Manager Travis Rothweiler opened the meeting with an apology and a promise that this communication breakdown won't happen again.

"How we performed in this was not up to our standards as a city, or up to my standards," Rothweiler said.

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Jerome Sheriff Seeks Money to House Inmates, Provide Raises

The Jerome County Sheriff's Office is over budget for outof-county inmate housing. Even if it gets a bump in next year's budget, it may not be enough.

Sheriff Doug McFall is asking county commissioners to approve \$134,000 in fiscal 2012 – a \$4,000 increase, 3.1 percent from this fiscal year – as part of a requested \$1.73 million departmental budget.

The county jail, which is 35 years old, holds just 30 inmates

"We're going to exceed it by quite a bit," McFall said of the cost to house inmates in other counties. According to a report provided by McFall, the department had already spent \$84,598 - 65 percent of this year's allotted money – as of April, just halfway

through the fiscal year.

"We don't think next year will be enough," he said, adding "we're optimistic about it right now."

McFall is also seeking extra money in a few other vital categories:

• Employee raises. McFall said he has recently lost people to other agencies that can offer a bigger paycheck. He proposes a 10.1 percent increase to his overall employee budget, which accounted for \$1.16 million of fiscal 2011's \$1.57 million budget.

• Fuel. The department requests a 3.4 percent increase for its 28 vehicles.

In total, the sheriff's office seeks a 10.1 percent increase from what commissioners granted in fiscal 2011.

"The budget pretty well speaks for itself," McFall concluded. "With the economy the way it is, we're hoping for some improvement. But I held it as tight as I could."

ITD Finishes Transition to New Driver's License

The Idaho Transportation Department announced on Tuesday the transition to central-issue driver's licenses is complete.

ITD introduced the new procedure for obtaining or renewing driver's licenses and identification cards in May on a staggered schedule across the state.

The process included removing equipment that formerly produced the cards at local Division of Motor Vehicles offices installing and new equipment.

Cards are now sent via mail from a secure location, which serves 24 states total.

Feds Ask City to Remove Lake Levee Trees

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) -The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is calling on the city of Coeur d'Alene to remove hundreds of trees that line the levee along Lake Coeur d'Alene.

Agency officials say the trees along the levee are too big and are destabilizing the levee's soil.

City officials are considering the request, but acknowledge removing 500 or so trees may be unpopular with the public.

The levee runs along Rosenberry Drive, known by locals as "dike road," and draws thousands of people annually as a place to park for events at the local community college or events along the beach. It also includes a trail popular for walkers, joggers and bicyclists.

The levee was built in the 1940s and rules that it must be managed with the Corps' safety and flood control standards.

Sweet, Belated Vindication for Idaho's Chief Budget Forecaster

gighteen months ago, Mike Ferguson couldn't get arrested in Boise. The Idaho state government's longtime chief economist had predicted the governor and the Legislature would have \$2.43 billion in tax revenue to work with for the fiscal year 2011.

Preposterous, countered Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter and the House Republican leadership. They said it would be more like \$2.29 billion, and they budgeted accordingly.

Senior members of the budget-writing Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee were perhaps cautious about Ferguson's forecast, but respectful of his track record. Ferguson had, after all, served three Republican governors – Phil Batt, Dirk Kempthorne and Jim Risch – before Otter came along in 2007. Senate Finance Committee Chairman Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, had worked with Ferguson for nearly 20 years, and House Appropriations Committee Chairwoman Maxine Bell, R-Jerome, for almost as long

More fundamentally, Bell and Cameron understood that budgeting to a dubious \$2.29 billion revenue figure would mean big cuts in core state programs – education and Medicaid – that couldn't be easily reversed even after economic conditions improved.

Actually, Ferguson - who retired last December turned out to be a little conservative with his prediction. When the state closed the books on June 30, it had collected \$2.444 billion in taxes for the year.

So the question must be asked: Were Otter and the GOP legislative stalwarts simply wrong back in January 2010, or did they intentionally low-ball their forecast for political reasons?

"The thing that I think changed, and that is worrisome, is that the governor and the Legislature have taken to essentially rejecting the work of professional economists that are hired and paid a salary to do that work," Ferguson told the Spokesman-Review of Spokane, Wash., this week. "... people's lives and health are at stake, people's futures are at stake, in terms of the quality of the education system, the way that people receive services relating to health care, disabilities."

".... the year and a half ago that my forecast was reiected, that was the first time ever that a governor had rejected the professional forecast and expressly adopted something different. And that happened again this year. So basically, there's a pattern emerging." And not just in the realm of economic crystal-ball gazing. During the last legislative session, the Idaho Attorney General's Office was frequently asked if bills being considered were unconstitutional. On a half dozen occasions - on union-busting, nullification of national health care, a 22-week limit on abortions in Idaho — the state's lawyers said yes.



Meet John Boehner, a Herder of Cats

ohn Boehner is in a box. The House speaker's Republican caucus doesn't entirely trust him. His understudy, Majority Leader Eric Cantor, has set him up for a fall with the Tea Party set. Worst of all, his political arch rival is now praising him.

"Speaker Boehner and myself had been in a series of conversations about doing the biggest possible deal," President Obama announced at a news conference Monday morning, confirming reports of their clandestine meetings. "I want to say I appreciate Speaker Boehner's goodfaith efforts."

If this weren't damaging enough for Boehner, Obama added that "I have a stake in John Boehner successfully persuading his caucus that this is the right thing to do." Obama further vouched that "Speaker Boehner has been very sincere," adding: "I think he's a good man who wants to do right by the country." It was possibly the biggest interparty kiss since Joe Lieberman planted one on President George W. Bush and an hour later the speaker called his own news conference in the Capitol so he could wipe the presidential



lipstick from his cheek. "I appreciate what the president said today," a somber Boehner replied. "But the gulf between the two parties now is about policy."

Boehner is right. The gulf is about policy: the policy of his Tea Party backbenchers not to compromise on anything. This has put Boehner, a dealmaker, in the impossible position of leading a House Republican caucus that is inherently ungovernable.

As The Washington Post's Paul Kane expertly documented, it was largely Boehner's idea to use the debt-limit vote as a way to strike a "grand bargain" that would restore the nation's finances. Surprisingly, Obama went along with it, offering some \$4 trillion in spending cuts and putting on the table reforms to Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid and the tax code.

Boehner took that sweet deal to Cantor and House Majority Whip Kevin McCarthy, they told him the caucus would balk. Last weekend, Boehner shut down the grand-bargain talks.

A puffy-eyed Obama, appearing with his top advisers in the White House briefing room Monday morning, voiced sympathy for Boehner. Asked by CBS's Chip Reid whether the real obstacle was the "Tea Partyers on the Hill," Obama concurred: "His politics within his caucus are very difficult."

Asked by National Journal's George Condon whether Boehner could deliver the votes of his caucus, Obama replied that "the politics that swept him into the speakership were good for a midterm election; they're tough for governing. And you know, part of what the Republican caucus generally needs to recognize is that American democracy works when people ... are willing to make some sensible compromises to solve big problems. And I think that there are members of that caucus who haven't fully arrived at that realization yet. Cantor clearly has not. Minutes after Obama finished his news conference, the majority leader sat with

reporters at a table on the third floor of the Capitol to offer his response. "We are not going to raise taxes that's all," he proclaimed. As for Boehner, Cantor maintained that they are "on the same page" and that any suggestion to the contrary was mere "soap opera."

The star of this soap opera, meanwhile, was scrambling to reassure his restive caucus that he would never even think about suggesting a tax increase. "Anyone that knows me and knows my record knows I'm not going to agree to a tax hike," he told radio host Laura Ingraham.

Boehner did not dispute an estimate presented to him by Fox News' Chad Pergram that 80 to 120 House Republicans - a third to half his caucus – would oppose an increase in the debt limit with or without a tax increase. And he declined a request to name a concession his own side could support.

"I agree with the president that we cannot allow our nation to default on our debt," he said. "But to prevent

Didn't matter. The Legislature passed them and Otter signed them anyway.

Which leaves two possibilities: Either legislators and our governor are becoming too smart to require professional advice, or they're engaging in social engineering - damn the consequences to real people.

Ferguson knew what he was talking about. So did Chief Deputy Attorney General Brian Kane, who wrote most of the legal opinions that lawmakers rejected.

Can we say the same for lawmakers themselves?

Idaho Cattle Group to Back Felony Animal Cruelty Law

BOISE • Under threat of a voter initiative, an Idaho cattle group says it supports legislation to punish thirdtime animal cruelty offenders with a felony.

The Idaho Cattle Association's feeder council voted unanimously at a recent meeting to pursue the bill in 2012, according to the association's July newsletter.

Idaho, North Dakota and South Dakota are the only states without felony animal cruelty penalties. Agriculture groups have long been wary of removing Idaho from that list, for fear any new law could be used by groups opposed to ranching or animal agriculture to fight these traditional activities.

The association's feedlot group says getting behind legislation now will help it control the outcome - and show the public that cattle producers take pride in caring for their animals.

A phone call to the Idaho Cattle Association wasn't returned. But according to the newsletter, "Members felt as though it was important for the ICA to take initiative on the matter so that the association can control the outcome of the bill?

The association says the feeder council's vote will serve as a policy guide that will be taken up at the Idaho **Cattle Association Annual** Convention in Sun Valley in November.

The Idaho Humane Society, Stop Torturing Our Pets, and other animal welfare groups are now gathering signatures for a 2012 ballot initiative under an umbrella group they're calling Idaho 1 of 3.

Their initiative, on file with the Idaho Secretary of State's office, would define animal torture and make such crimes a felony on the first offense. For animal cruelty, the measure would increase misdemeanor fines to \$400 for a first offense, up from a current \$100 fine, and triple fines for a second offense to \$600.

It would also make a third animal cruelty conviction within a 15-year period a felony, punishable by between six months and three years in prison and a \$9,000 fine.

Virginia Hemingway, president of Idaho 1 of 3, said any measure - regardless of whether it's a bill in 2012 or an initiative that November - should address animal torture. She said her group may support a bill next legislative session, but it will depend on how it is written.

"We're after two groups of people: People who torture animals, and the repeat offenders," Hemingway told The Associated Press.

Jeff Rosenthal, Idaho Humane Society director, said Wednesday the Idaho Cattle Association council's vote was good news and likely reflects a commonsense, locally crafted approach to a long-unresolved issue.

"They're very much a major player in the state, and if that represents their collective stance, that's very encouraging," Rosenthal said.

In 2009, an animal cruelty bill that teamed Idaho's agricultural community and animal welfare advocates including Hemingway went nowhere, in part due to opposition from the national group Humane Society of the United States that feared it left a loophole for puppy mills.

The Humane Society of the United States is separate from Rosenthal's group, but its involvement in past debates – and the perception among Idaho agriculture groups that the organization has a radical agenda - has the Idaho Farm Bureau leery of any new measure, too.

Univ. of Idaho Extension Office in Jeopardy

COEUR D'ALENE • The fate of a University of Idaho extension office in Kootenai County is uncertain as local government officials weigh budget cuts.

Kootenai County Clerk Cliff Hayes plans to recommend that local government officials end the \$160,000 in annual funding for the 95-year-old university center based in Coeur d'Alene. Hayes has an Aug. 1 deadline to present his budget plan to county commissioners, the Coeur d' Alene Press reports.

The extension programs benefit the community but with restricted revenues, the county must focus on essential services such as law enforcement, said Hayes, a Republican who ousted longtime Kootenai County Clerk Dan English, a Democrat, during the November 2010 election with 60 percent of the vote.

"The taxpayers of this county cannot afford to fund everything people would like us to fund," Hayes said.

The university will no longer kick in the other \$260,000 in funding for the center if the county's contribution stops, said Jim Wilson, who heads the extension office. The center will have to wait until county commissioners approve a final budget before any decisions are made, Wilson said.

"Until we have that information, it's a little bit premature for us to come out and say anything, becould cause things change," Wilson said.

Gretchen Hauser is among local residents who are protesting the potential cuts to the center, which runs the local 4-H Youth Development program. The group is making phone calls and writing letters to local government officials in opposition of the potential move.

The center provides research and educational programs in subjects including forestry and horticulture. The 4-H program provides kids with something positive to do, said Hauser, a 58-year-old who volunteers with the program.

"I know money is tight, it's tight for everybody," Hauser said. "But you have to look at the long-term ramifications."

3 MUMBAI BOMBINGS MINUTES APART KILL 21, WOUND 141 MORE

MUMBAI, India • Three coordinated bombings tore through the heart of India's busy financial capital during rush hour Wednesday, killing 21 people and wounding 141 in the worst terrorist attack in the country since the 2008 Mumbai siege.

Bloody bodies were strewn in the dirt of Mumbai's crowded neighborhoods and markets. Doors were ripped off storefronts, motorcycles were charred and a bus stop was shredded. After the blasts in three separate neighborhoods, police set up checkpoints and were put on high alert.

The bombings came just months after peace talks resumed between India and Pakistan, which New Delhi has blamed for past attacks.

Arup Patnaik, a top police officer, said the attackers used improvised explosive devices in the attack, hidden in an umbrella in the Jhaveri Bazaar jewelry market and kept in a car in the business district of Opera House. The third blast in Dadar area was caused by an explosive device concealed in an electric meter at a bus stop, the Press Trust of India news agency said.

Prime Minister Manmohan Singh condemned the blasts and appealed to the people of Mumbai "to remain calm and show a united face?"

There was no immediate claim of responsibility, and Indian officials refused to speculate on who might be behind the blasts.

Indian officials have accused Pakistan's powerful spy agency of helping coordinate and fund earlier attacks, including the Mumbai siege, which killed 166 people over three days. Peace talks between the countries were suspended after the siege and resumed only recently.

Pakistan's government expressed distress about the loss of lives and injuries soon after Wednesday's blasts were reported.

U.S. President Barack Obama also condemned the "outrageous attacks."

"The American people will stand with the Indian people in times of trial, and we will offer support to India's efforts to bring the perpetrators of these terrible crimes to justice," he said in a statement. "I have no doubt that India will overcome these deplorable terrorist attacks."

Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton said she will go ahead with her plans to visit India next week despite the bombings. Standing with India "is more important than ever," she said.

Suspect Allowed to View Child Porn in Washington Jail

TACOMA, Wash. (AP) • A legal loophole is allowing a Washington state man accused of child sex crimes to view child pornography in jail.

Weldon Marc Gilbert is acting as his own lawyer in the case, and that means he's entitled to review the evidence.

The evidence in the case includes more than 100 videos seized from Gilbert's Lake Tapps home after his 2007 arrest. Authorities say some of the footage was shot by Gilbert.

"Make no mistake – I don't like it," Pierce County Sheriff Paul Pastor told KOMO-TV. "But it is not my choice whether to do it or not to do it. ... There's no question that this makes me grind my teeth."

The materials normally would be contraband at the Pierce County Jail, but restricting Gilbert's access to the videos could result in a mistrial, the station reported Wednesday.

"We don't want to do it, but we have to follow the law," Pierce County prosecutor Mark Lindquist said.

Gilbert worked as a pilot and is accused of using offers of flying lessons, money and alcohol to lure more than a dozen boys to his home, where police say he then molested them.

When Gilbert views his videos, he is with an investigator in a room visible to jail guards, KIRO-TV reported.

Gilbert pleaded guilty in federal court in 2009 to producing child pornography, and received a 25-year sentence. But, *The News Tribune* reported, the deal was contingent on Gilbert also pleading guilty in state court to sex crimes, with prosecutors recommending a sentence of no

more than 17 years, to run concurrently with the federal sentence.

When a judge told Gilbert his state sentence could be as long as life in prison, he withdrew his guilty plea.

GOP Leaders: Nation Can't Afford to Default

The executive and legislative branches of federal government continue debt-limit talks in the nation's capitol.

WASHINGTON (AP) • Hope dimming for a broad debt-limit deal, Congress and the White House scrambled Wednesday to salvage deficit-reduction talks while top congressional Republicans said the nation cannot afford to default on its obligations — for economic reasons and their party's own good.

Ahead of a fourth negotiating session

at the White House in as many days, Senate Republican leader Mitch Mc-Connell defended his proposal to give President Barack Obama new powers to increase the nation's borrowing limit without GOP support.

"I refuse to help Barack Obama get re-elected by marching Republicans into a position where we have co-ownership of a bad economy," McConnell said on a radio talk show, contending that letting the nation go into financial default would give Obama reason to blame Republicans for the negative fallout. House Speaker John Boehner added his own warning against default, even as he expressed frustration with the White House over its role in negotiations to trim long-term federal deficits.

"Nobody wants to go there, because nobody knows what's going to happen," he said of a potential financial default. "It's a crapshoot."

In comments to a small group of reporters, Boehner said he has not been able to get commitments from the president and his White House team about cutting big entitlement *Please see* **GOP, N2**

The withdrawal of the proposed bid is a blow to the company's strategy to bolster digital operations and benefit from BSkyB's rising cash flow. — *Bloomberg News*

LAWMAKER: US AIRPORTS ARE NOT SECURE ENOUGH

WASHINGTON • U.S. airports are still vulnerable to terror attacks, despite billions of dollars invested in security enhancements since 9/11, a Republican congressman said Wednesday.

Rep. Jason Chaffetz, R-Utah, led an inquiry into what he described as the Transportation Security Administration's security deficiencies. He cited government statistics of more than 25,000 security breaches at U.S. airports since November 2001 — an average of slightly more than five security breaches a year at each of the 457 commercial airports.

The TSA has said that number is misleading and represents a small fraction of 1 percent of the 5.5. billion people screened since the 2001 terror attacks. A security breach is broadly defined to include instances ranging from a checked bag being misplaced after it went through security screening to a person who was caught in the act of breaching security and immediately apprehended, the TSA said.

CIA VACCINATION RUSE SPARKS FEAR IN PAKISTAN

Son of victim sought in NY home fire that killed 3

WHITE CREEK, N.Y. (AP) • A man wanted for questioning in a suspicious, deadly house fire early Wednesday was believed to be armed and traveling with his girlfriend and their 4-month-old son, according to authorities.

State police said Matthew Slocum, 23, is the son of a woman who died in the fire Wednesday in White Creek, 35 miles northeast of Albany.

Slocum, an ex-convict, may be holding his girlfriend, Loretta Colegrove, 25, against her will along with their son, Raymond, police said in Amber alerts issued in New York and New England. He is described as about 6 feet tall and near 200 pounds, with swastika tattoos on his arms. He was seen wearing a black T-shirt with a skull and crossbones on it.

The alerts were issued after Slocum left the burning home in a black 2003 Ford Mustang. He was reported near Adams, Mass., at about 5 a.m. and authorities said Wednesday afternoon he might have been seen near Gilsum, N.H., about 75 miles northeast.

Guns known to be in the

home couldn't be accounted for, and police told the Post-Star they were asking neighbors whether they heard shots before the fire.

The 4 a.m. fire killed Slocum's mother, Lisa Harrington. Also killed was her husband, Dan Harrington, a deputy highway superintendent, and his son Josh. Police said the fire might have been arson.

"They were good people. Dan was a real good employee," White Creek town Supervisor Bob Shay told the Glens Falls Post-Star. "We all feel horrible. It's just so sad."

He said Harrington and his wife served on the town recreation committee.

Slocum went to prison in 2006 for breaking into a house and stealing cash, a New York prison spokesman said. He was released but returned to custody twice for violations before his parole expired in December 2009.

On Wednesday afternoon, emergency crews remained on the scene of the charred remains of the house, set back from a remote country road on heavily wooded property.

Police have not released any information about the cause of the fire.

"Anything that compromises the perception and impartiality of medical personnel undermines the activities of medical personnel everywhere, especially in places where access to health care is badly needed and security conditions for health care workers are already difficult," O'Brien said.

McConnell's and Boehner's remarks came amid a flurry of debt-related developments Wednesday that reflected the rising urgency of an Aug. 2 deadline to increase the government's borrowing authority or fall into a first-ever default.

Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke warned lawmakers that their failure to raise the nation's borrowing limit could trigger a major financial crisis. He said that if the government defaults on its debt, it would throw "shock waves through the entire financial system."

Adding pressure, the Treasury Department said Wednesday the federal budget deficit was on pace to break the \$1 trillion mark for a third straight year. The deficit totaled \$971 billion for the first nine months of the budget year. With three months to go, this year's deficit will probably top last year's \$1.29 trillion, according to the Congressional Budget Office.

In one hopeful sign for compromise seekers, Republican Sen. Tom Coburn said he might rejoin the socalled Gang of Six, the bipartisan group of senators who have been working for months to reach a bipartisan agreement on a big deficitcutting deal that would blend spending cuts with a tax code overhaul.

And several lawmakers initiated steps that they said were designed to ease the impact of a default.

McConnell's proposal stood as the most ambitious effort to address the debt limit if negotiations between the White House and congressional leaders fail.

The plan would, in effect, guarantee Obama requests for new government borrowing authority unless Congress mustered vetoproof majorities to deny him. The plan would permit Obama to secure increases in the debt ceiling – needed for the government to pay its debts – and would let Republicans avoid politically damaging votes.

While McConnell appeared to accept the dire consequences of a government default, a group of conservative lawmakers discounted their own leaders' fears that defaulting on the nation's debt would be disastrous.

GOP presidential hopeful Michele Bachmann was one of three House members Wednesday who disputed Obama's assertion that a default would mean that Social Security recipients might not receive their checks after Aug. 2. The Social Security Trust Fund is financed by government securities – the ones that the government would not be able to guarantee in a default.

A two-hour negotiating session Tuesday produced no progress after a day of poisonous exchanges between Democrats and Republicans.

Explaining his plan, Mc-Connell said on the Senate floor Wednesday that it would "make the president show in black and white the specific cuts he claims to support. If he refuses he'll have to raise the debt ceiling on his own."

"But he's not going to get Republicans to go along with that."

In an interview with radio talk show hostess Laura Ingraham, McConnell also said: "When we cannot force a result, we need to do the next best thing, and that is to clarify the differences between the parties."

McConnell's proposal immediately ran into stiff opposition among tea party conservatives and seemed unlikely to pass the House, but neither the White House nor House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, dismissed it out of hand.

Obama has said he does not want to address the debt ceiling incrementally. But on Wednesday, White House spokesman Jay Carney merely said McConnell's idea was "not the preferred option."

famed Jhaveri Bazaar jewelry market at 6:54 p.m. A minute later, a blast hit the busy business district of Opera House, several miles (kilometers) away in southern Mumbai. At 7:05 p.m., the third bomb exploded in the crowded neighborhood of Dadar in central Mumbai, according to police.

Because of the close timing of the blasts, "we infer that this was a coordinated attack by terrorists," Home Minister Palaniappan Chidambaram said.

A lifeless body lay on a cart. Survivors carried the wounded to taxis. One man was dragged out of the area on a red board used as a stretcher. Bleeding victims crowded into the back of a cargo truck to be taken to a hospital, where wards were filled with the wounded, slathered in white burn cream.

At Jhaveri Bazaar, a witness described two motorcycles exploding in flames and saw at least six bodies.

"People were shouting 'Help me, help me,'" the man told Headlines Today television.

People hugged and wept. Crowds gathered in the blast areas as police questioned witnesses, and investigators wearing gloves sifted through the debris for clues.

The government said the blasts killed 21 people and wounded 141 others.

"India is not going to cow down," Cabinet minister Farooq Abdullah said. "Let those perpetrators of this terror remember, we will find them and Inshallah (God willing) we will give them the justice that India believes in?"

A U.S. official said there were no immediate claims of responsibility, or firm indication of which terrorist group might be behind the attack. The official spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss matters of intelligence.

The blasts marked the first major attack on Mumbai since 10 militants laid siege to the city for 60 hours in November 2008. That attack targeted two luxury hotels, a Jewish center and a busy train station.

C. Uday Bhaskar, a defense analyst, said the bombings showed that Mumbai remained vulnerable despite precautions taken after the 2008 attack.

Some media incorrectly reported Wednesday's blasts happened on the birthday of Ajmal Kasab, the only surviving gunman from the 2008 Mumbai attacks. Kasab, who was sentenced to death in Mumbai, was born on Sept. 13.

The city has been on edge since the 2008 attack. In December, authorities deployed extra police on city streets after receiving intelligence that a Pakistan-based militant group was planning an attack over New Year's weekend.

In March 2010, Mumbai police said they prevented a major terrorist strike after they arrested two Indian men, who, police said, were preparing to hit several targets in the city. In September, police issued a terrorism alert for the city during a popular Hindu festival.

Budget Deficit on Track to Top \$1 Trillion with 3 Months to Go

WASHINGTON (AP) • The federal budget deficit is on pace to break the \$1 trillion mark for the third straight year, ratcheting up the pressure on the White House and Congress to reach a deal to rein in spending.

The deficit totaled \$971 billion for the first nine months of the budget year, the Treasury Department said Wednesday. Three years ago, that would have been a record high for the full year.

With three months to go, this year's deficit will likely top last year's \$1.29 trillion gap, according to the Congressional Budget Office. But it is expected to come in below the record \$1.41 trillion reached in the 2009 budget year. The budget year ends Sept. 30.

When a massive new water line in southeastern Twin Falls starts to flow, so will the jobs.

That's the hope of Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency Executive Director Melinda Anderson. She said she's gotten several inquiries from manufacturing companies seeking to relocate to that part of Twin Falls - but their interest would immediately evaporate cause the current market is on the hunt for buildings of 100,000 square feet or more. So, the Urban Renewal Agency launched the \$2.1 million water line project to make the space possible for the large buildings. Irminger Construction Inc. of Boise broke ground on the project this week. Construction is expected to last until the end of October, as 1.6 miles of pipe are installed. The pipe will travel down Kimberly Road from Hankins to 3300 East, and south until the railroad track.

"This is about jobs," Anderson said. "Getting more jobs and bringing more jobs to this entire community."

The extra water, up to 4,000 gallons per minute, will most immediately

is essentially ready to go, water flow aside, Anderson said.

"This is the closest thing that we have to a large-size piece of property in the city of Twin Falls that is ready to go," Anderson said. "Right now, this is our best opportunity to get something on the ground sooner rather than later."

Derald Bontrager, president of Jayco, largely echoed Anderson, lauding the jobs the expansion will likely bring to the community and calling it "definitely a plus" for anyone in the area.

"It'll certainly benefit the sale of those properties and open the door to some construction that may not have otherwise been feasible, not only for our property, but some properties along the way," Bontrager said. He said his company has been working with Anderson on the project for sometime.

Netflix Price Hike Angers Users, Some Drop Plan

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) • Some Netflix customers called it a slap in the face. Others a betrayal. Many threatened to drop the movie service.

On Wednesday, many of them vented on Twitter, Facebook and elsewhere, seething over Netflix Inc.'s decision to raise its prices by up to 60 percent for the millions of subscribers who want to rent DVDs by mail and watch movies online.

By Wednesday afternoon, more than 40,000 people had responded to a post on Netflix's Facebook page announcing the change, with some saying they would switch to rivals such as Hulu.com's paid service and to Redbox's DVD-rental kiosks.

Outrage bubbled on Twitter, and on Netflix's blog a posting about the new plans had garnered 5,000 comments - the limit allowed by the site's host, Google Inc.-owned Blogger - which included many seething customers.

On Tuesday, the company said it was splitting up its two services, which means that subscribers who want both streaming video and DVD-by-mail access will have to get separate plans that cost at least \$16 per month total.

Netflix had been offering both services as a single package that was available for as little as \$10 per month. The price changes took effect immediately for new subscribers, and will begin Sept. 1 for current Netflix customers.

RUPERT • Motorboats, ski boats and fishing boats are all expected sights on Idaho's many lakes and reservoirs. But off in the distance at one southern Idaho lake, a sail rises from the water atop a 20-foot sailboat owned by Steve and Julie Davis.

I was caught off guard when I first saw the Twin Falls couple setting up their sailboat at Lake Walcott in June.

Within the first few minutes of talking with them, however, I began to understand why sailing is a perfect pastime for these Idaho boaters.

"I don't know what it is, it's just fun," said Steve, a teacher at Canyon

Ridge High School in Twin Falls. "You are always trimming the sails and watching the wind. It's a thinking man's sport."

While Steve likes the excitement, Julie likes the calm, relaxing atmosphere of the sailboat.

"I'm happy just sitting here reading a book," Julie said. "You aren't moving quickly, you can enjoy the birds; there's just a lack of noise when there's no one

else on the water."

There is no lack of wind to propel the Davises favorite outdoor toy. In fact, on occasion the couple have run into too much wind. On July 8, Julie and Steve were concerned the wind might be too strong to get the sail up. They've had to turn back because of uncontrollable conditions before.

"You just don't have the control you need when the wind is that strong," Steve said.

Wind speeds above 20 mph can make the water choppy and gusty winds make it hard to control the sail, he said.

The fact that the boat is propelled by wind is part of why Julie enjoys sailing instead of other types of boating.

"I like that it's green," Julie said. "I don't like the idea that we aren't changing the water."

s any history buff knows, the 15th and 16th centuries are known as the Age of Exploration, when Europeans sailed beyond the Mediterranean to find and colonize unknown lands. Will 23rd century historians describe our current explorations of the solar system in such romantic terms?

Columbus and his forebears began with reconnaissance missions to chart the new territories, with longer stays coming after. So has been the pattern



with planetary missions, which commenced with Mariner 2's, flyby of Venus in late 1962. Mariner 4 flew past Mars in 1965, but before any other new worlds were visited, landers and orbiters had been deployed.

The Soviets crashed Venera 3 onto Venus's surface in 1966, Venera 7 softlanded on Venus in 1970, and Mariner 9 became the first planetary orbiter (around Mars) the following year.

As of today, probes have flown past every planet, and one (New Horizons) will fly by Pluto in 2015. The MESSENGER probe (Mercury's first artificial satellite) has been orbiting the innermost planet since March. The European Space Agency's Venus Express has been studying Venus's clouds from orbit since 2006. Mars has three

working orbiters (NASA's Mars Odyssey and Mars Reconnaissance Orbiter, and ESA's Mars Express) and one working rover (Opportunity).

There are no spacecraft currently at Jupiter, but the Juno orbiter is scheduled to launch next month. Cassini has been orbiting Saturn since 2004. And Saturday, if all goes as planned, the Dawn probe will begin or biting the second largest main belt asteroid, Vesta. The Apollo landings

just told me that I am in the will and should receive about \$50,000. My bankruptcy attorney says I have to give the money to the Bankruptcy Trustee. Can't I just dismiss my bankruptcy and keep the money?".

nswer: The filing of a bankruptcy creates an "estate". All assets that exist on the date of filing become part of the estate and can be liquidated for the benefit of your creditors unless the assets are exempt under state law. Idaho law provides sufficient exemptions so that most Idaho debtors do not have any assets liquidated. However, the Bankruptcy Code specifically identifies inheritances that you become entitled to within 6 months after filing your bankruptcy case as property of the estate just as if the inheritance had existed on the date your case was filed. The Bankruptcy Court would not approve dismissal because your creditors are entitled to the money in your estate. Since Idaho law does not exempt your inheritance, uncle Donald's bequest to you will be used to pay the claims of your creditors and to pay administrative expenses of your case. After the expenses and claims are paid, the rest of the money will be returned to you.

Summer Science – Eastern Idaho Youth Get Creative with Nature

IDAHO FALLS • Last week, 10 hungry youngsters studied, created and munched on bird's nests at Freeman Park in Idaho Falls.

As part of the Museum of Idaho's Junior Rocky Mountain Adventure Summer Science Camp, elementary school-aged students learned about and explored eastern Idaho's environmental elements.

"We learned that (bird's nests) can be made out of sticks, mud and other gross things, like regurgitated food," 10-year-old Abby Hansen said.

Though the group tried to

be as accurate as possible, they bent nature's rules when it came to snack time.

"Since we learned about birds and bird's nests, we're going to make our own bird's nests. But I can guarantee you it's not regurgitated," instructor Zoe Jorgensen said.

The children laughed and chatted as they molded a mixture of noodles, peanut butter and marshmallows into their own "bird's nests," complete with jelly bean and raisin "eggs."

Throughout the weeklong camp, Jorgensen and the kids examined bugs, plants, animals, water and the solar system.

Bow Fishing Helps Keep Archery Skills in Shape

Question: "I recently saw an outdoor program about bow fishing for carp? What are the rules for shooting fish with a bow and arrow?"

Answer: Bow fishing is a great summertime diversion from target shooting and 3D shoots. It also keeps archery muscles in shape and your eye sharp and ready for judging distance.

Idaho Fish and Game Commission rules prohibit archery as a method of take for all game fish, but nongame fish species such as carp, suckers and the northern pike minnow (formerly squawfish) are legal quarry for bow fishing, with no limits.

A valid fishing license is required when bow fishing; however, the archery validation, required for big game hunting, is not needed. The bow-fishing season is closed if the season for taking game fish with hook and line is closed.

Nongame fish are not required to be salvaged, so "waste" is not an issue when



discarded. But all nongame fish taken should be disposed of in a lawful and ethical manner. Large numbers of carp left to rot along beaches and in areas frequented by the public would be prosecuted for littering.

Carp, the most commonly bow fished species in Idaho, also provide some good eating. At this year's sportsmen's fish fry at the Magic Valley office, about 40 pounds of deep-fried carp fillets were scarfed down. And Dick Wallace, one of my well-respected professors at the University of Idaho, used to can a mean pickled carp with onions and spice.

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Largemouth Bass Deliver Explosive Hits on Topwater Lures

KANSAS CITY, Mo. • Bob Greene was witnessing the calm before the storm.

It was 5:45 a.m., and the surface of the private lake he was fishing was glass-calm. The only signs of life were the occasional flickering of minnows in the shallows.

But that was about to change.

When Greene cast a topwater lure to the edge of a laydown, he made one pull and the bait made a loud blooping sound. Then another.

The third time, a bass hiding under the branches couldn't take it. It crashed to the surface and pounced for the kill.

Then it discovered its prey had hooks. And the fight was on

The bass jumped, shaking its head as it tried to get free. But in a matter of seconds, Greene had the fish in the boat and was admiring his catch, a bass he estimated at 3 to 3 pounds.

"I just love that when they come up and make a swirl so big that it looks like someone flushed the toilet or threw a bowling ball in the water," Greene said with a laugh. "That's when the adrenaline gets pumping."

That's part of the reason Greene, a tournament fisherman from Leavenworth, is so attached to topwater fishing

When he dreams, he sees

the wake of a big bass stalking a topwater lure wobbling across the surface in an erratic manner.

That dream has become reality many times in Greene's fishing career. He remembers a hot July day last summer when he was fishing a tournament at Mozingo Lake.

On only his second cast of the day, a huge bass erupted on the Spro Popping Frog he was working across matted weeds.

After a short fight, he pulled a 6.33-pound largemouth into the boat.

"I was targeting holes in the matted weeds," Greene said. "When I pulled it into one of those holes and let it sit for a second, that bass just crushed it."

It's experiences like that one that has Greene hooked on topwater fishing. He still remembers the first bass he caught on a surface lure.

"When I was a kid, I bought more lures than I

knew how to use," Greene said. "I had this Jitterbug and I was working it across the water, not really paying much attention. All of a sudden, this bass just came up and attacked it.

"I got it in and I thought I had caught the biggest bass in that lake. But in reality, it was probably about a 2pound fish.

"But to a kid, that was an exciting deal."

That excitement has never worn off. Greene still thrills to the sight of a bass hitting on top.

Consider the trip to that private lake Tuesday morning. Greene started fishing a Zara Spook, a bait that zigzags across the water in an erratic manner.

But the bass quickly showed Greene that they didn't want any part of it. So he switched to a Lucky Craft G Splash, a popper-type lure that makes more of a commotion. And that made a huge difference.

On Greene's first cast, a healthy bass shot to the surface and attacked the bait when it paused. Once that fish was unhooked and set free, Greene cast for more.

Two hours later, Greene and I had caught and released 21 bass on topwater lures. We later added another 22 bass on small plastic lures.

But it was the topwater fishing that excited Greene. When he goes fishing, it's always part of his repertoire.

He usually restricts his use of topwater lures to prime

LONGVIEW, Wash. • Lewis and Clark may have paddled down the Columbia River six years before David Thompson, but Thompson's adventures two centuries ago are equally remarkable.

A group of modern paddlers who will stop in Kalama and Longview hope to spread the word about Thompson as they retrace his 1,100-mile route down the Columbia.

Paddlers in the David

world's greatest surveyor. Some of his maps were used for a century before more accurate ones were made.

Still, McDonald said Thompson is much better known in Canada, particularly its northern parts, than the United States.

When Thompson paddled down the Columbia in 1810-11, he hoped to beat John Jacob Astor's sailing expedition to start a fur trading post at what is now Astoria. Astor, however, won the race by two months.

Complaint Just First Step in Title IX Investigative Process

One hundred Idaho high schools were accused of violating Title IX as itregards to sports, but schools typically only find out they're under investigation if accusations like the ones revealed Monday have merit.

Many of the Idaho high schools accused in a discrimination complaint may have never found out they were under suspicion if the legal document had never surfaced Monday.

A 600-page complaint, dated June 23, suggested 100 schools have potentially fallen foul of Title IX legislation, which requires schools receiving federal funding to promote equal opportunity for males and females. Twenty of the schools listed are in District IV, which covers south-central Idaho and the Wood River Valley.

But at this point the 100 schools are only alleged to have committed wrongdoing, and they won't be getting any further correspondence unless the U.S. Office of Civil Rights in Seattle deems the allegations may have merit. "We are evaluating the allegations to determine if they are appropriate for investigation and resolution," Jim Bradshaw, press officer for the U.S. Department of Education, wrote in an email Wednesday.

Mariners: Are They Buyers or Sellers in MLB's Second Half Trade Market?

Seattle has hovered within 3 games of the AL West lead for most of the season, but a five-game skid going into the All-Star break saw the Mariners sink to 7 1/2 games out of first place as the second half starts. That has the team stuck in no-man's land about what to do at the trade deadline, which is July 31.

SEATTLE (AP) • An underperforming offense, mixed with dominating pitching has left the Seattle Mariners at the All-Star break with a surprising record, mixed with a tinge of missed opportunity.

It's created a murky definition for the 43-48 Mariners who before the year appeared headed for a rough season trying to bridge a troubled past with the promise of young stars and a bright future.

But as the second half begins on Thursday night at home against AL West-leading Texas, Seattle faces a balance between taking advantage of its pitching staff and attempting to be a contender, or continuing its youth movement toward 2012.

The final week before the All-Star break could have sealed which direction the Mariners head in the second half, with five straight losses that dropped Seattle 71/2 games back in the division.

They begin the second half with a brutal 13-game stretch four at home versus Texas, then a road trip to Toronto, Boston and the New York Yankees.

By the time Seattle returns home on July 29, its status should be clearer.

Then again, just using the "contender" phrase associated with the Mariners in a season with no expectations is an accomplishment for first-year manager Eric Wedge.

The surprising success is largely due to a pitching staff that has the second-best ERA in the American League and has tried to make up for the Mariners anemic offense that has seen underperformances by everyone from Chone Figgins and his .183 batting average to a slumping Ichiro Suzuki.

But for all Seattle's rotation of

Felix Hernandez, rookie Michael Pineda, a resurgent Erik Bedard and Jason Vargas and Doug Fister have done, it may not be enough to overcome the team's offensive problems.

"You want to be able to go out there and give everyone a break from time to time," Wedge said just before the All-Star break. "I feel we're going to be a better offensive club in the second half, but the fight has been good. The experience in all these close games is going to come back to help us.

"Every day is tight. Having the experience of playing those tight games, those tough games emotionally, mentally whatever it is, it's taxing and these guys have been able to come through and handle it."

It hasn't been the easiest first half for Wedge to manage.

The Mariners have debuted eight rookies during the first three months and with that can come headaches.

The team has also had to deal with substandard performances by some of the veterans.

Troubled outfielder Milton Bradley was sent packing in May. Jack Wilson and his \$5 million salary has become a bench player, same with Figgins now after the arrival of third base prospect Kyle Seager.

Jack Cust, thought to be a possible answer for Seattle's lacking left-handed pop, has been replaced as the regular designated hitter by a combo of others.

The Mariners might stick around on the fringes a bit longer thanks to its pitching.

Hernandez is the reigning AL Cy Young Award winner, yet has the fourth-best ERA among Seattle's starters.

Pineda has flashed an arm that makes fans dream of Hernandez

Tuesday's MLB All-Star Game in Phoenix. and Pineda at the top of a dominant staff for years to come.

Fister is just 3-10, but has a 3.09 ERA, while Vargas already has thrown four complete games. All five Seattle starters have sub-

3.50 ERAs. In the bullpen, Brandon League stepped into the closer role and became an All-Star with 23 saves in the first half.

"I'm close but I've been inconsistent. I throw one game good then one OK. I've got to be more consistent and just try to do what I did last year," Hernandez said.

Much of the final 21/2 months will focus on the development of second baseman Dustin Ackley, first baseman Justin Smoak, Seager and outfielders Greg Halman and Carlos Peguero.

Just 20 games into his major league career, Ackley might already be the Mariners best hitter with a .304 average and three homers.

Smoak has endured a twomonth slump but has flashed a bat that made him the centerpiece of what Seattle acquired from Texas in exchange for Cliff Lee last summer.

Seager rolled through the mi-

Idaho is the third state to be hit with a spate of Title IX allegations involving high school athletic departments. The Oregonian reported in June that nearly 100 schools in the state had been accused, and Washington had a similarly large complaint revealed in April. The crux of the complaint alleges that schools use cheer and dance participation numbers to inflate Title IX counts, in spite of a July 2010 federal ruling that cheer and dance cannot satisfy the requirements. Jerome Athletic Director Ty Jones denied Monday that the school includes cheer and dance in its Title IX counts. He added that the school allocates equal funding for boys sports - including football – and girls sports as part of its comprehensive plan to satisfy requirements.

Harrison Unloads on Goodell, **Teammates in Magazine Interview**

NEW YORK (AP) • Heavily fined Pittsburgh Steelers linebacker James Harrison calls NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell a "crook" and a "devil," among other insults, in a magazine article.

The 2008 AP Defensive Player of the Year hasn't been shy about ripping the league after he was docked \$100,000 for illegal hits last season. In the August issue of Men's Journal, his rants against Goodell reach another level of wrath.

"If that man was on fire and I had to (urinate) to put him out, I wouldn't do it," Harrison told the magazine. "I hate him and will never respect him."

His other descriptions of the commissioner include an anti-gay slur, "stupid," "puppet" and "dictator."

If the Steelers had defeat ed the Green Bay Packers in the Super Bowl, Harrison said, he would have whispered in Goodell's ear during the trophy ceremony: "Why don't you quit and do something else, like start your own league in flag football?"

Harrison also criticizes other NFL execs, Patriotsturned-commentators Rodney Harrison and Tedy Bruschi ("clowns"), Houston's Brian Cushing ("juiced out of his mind") - and even Rashard Mendenhall and Ben Roethlisberger for their perform-

ances in the Super Bowl loss. Harrison calls the running back a "fumble machine" for his fourth-quarter turnover. Mendenhall said on Twitter on Wednesday he didn't have a problem with what Harrison said "because I know him." But he also included a link to his stats from last season, which show he didn't have a pattern of fum-

Of the quarterback's two interceptions, Harrison says: "Hey, at least throw a pick stead of asking the D to bail you out again. Or hand the ball off and stop trying to act like Peyton Manning. You ain't that and you know it, man; you just get paid like he

Rooney II said in a statement that he hadn't seen the article or talked to Harrison.

"We will discuss the situation at the appropriate time, when permitted once the labor situation is resolved," he said.

Harrison also questions whether a black player is punished more for a hard hit on a white player than the opposite. Beyond the insults, Harrison makes some serious points about what he believes are the league's misguided attempts to increase safety.

He explains how nonguaranteed contracts make players more likely to hit high, because in the short term, a torn knee ligament is more costly than a concussion.

Harrison suggests the real way to prevent head injuries is to shorten the season to 14 games, start offseason workouts later and trim the length of training camp so "we're not bangin' heads so much in August; that's where the brain trauma comes from."

Star QBs: It's Time for NFL, Players to Deal

NEW YORK (AP) • Calling the players' offer "fair for both sides," star quarterbacks Tom Brady, Peyton Manning and Drew Brees - plaintiffs in an antitrust suit against the NFL - said Wednesday "it is time" to wrap up negotiations on a deal to end the league's lockout.

At the bargaining table, though, it wasn't that easy.

On the day Brady, Manning and Brees spoke as a group publicly for the first time, players and owners spent nearly 11 hours meeting at a Manhattan law office before pausing for dinner.

"We're just taking a break long day," players' association chief DeMaurice Smith said.

Regardless, negotiations were expected to continue today. With each passing day, the need to strike a bargain and end the first NFL work stoppage since 1987 becomes greater.

Deadlines are coming up next week to get training camps and the preseason started on time. Although it seems the sides have agreed on the basic elements of how to split more than \$9 billion in annual revenues, among the key sticking points recently have been how to structure a new rookie salary system and what free agency will look like.

In a statement released to The Associated Press via the NFL Players Association, New England's Brady, Indianapolis' Manning and New Orleans' Brees said: "We believe the overall proposal made by the players is fair for both sides and it is time to get this deal done."

They continued: "This is the time of year we as players turn our attention to the game on the field. We hope owners feel the same way."

In response, the NFL issued a statement saying: "We share the view that now is the time to reach an agreement so we can all get back to football and a full 2011 season. We are working hard with the players' negotiating team every day to complete an agreement as soon as possible."

Brady, Manning and Brees are among 10 players who are named plaintiffs in an antitrust suit that is pending in federal court in Minnesota. That class-action lawsuit was filed March 11, hours after federally mediated negotiations to arrive at a new collective bargaining agreement broke down, and the old labor contract expired. The NFLPA immediately dissolved itself, meaning players no longer were protected under labor law but instead were allowed to take their chances under antitrust law.

On March 12, the owners imposed a lockout on the players, a right management has to shut down a business

when a CBA expires. During the lockout, there can be no communication between the teams and current NFL players; no players – including those drafted in April – can be signed; teams won't pay for players' health insurance.

A series of court rulings followed, including one last week from an appeals court that said the lockout could continue.

Talks gained steam in May, overseen by a court-appointed mediator, U.S. Magistrate Judge Arthur Boylan, who is on vacation this week. Boylan ordered both sides to speak with him in Minneapolis next Tuesday, and the owners have a special meeting set for July 21 in Atlanta, where they could vote to ratify a new deal if one is reached.

That means there's intense pressure on Smith and NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell to keep things moving in a positive direction. Disruptions to the planned preseason schedule would decrease the overall revenue pie.

In an added complication, a federal judge has set an Aug. 8 hearing for NFL retirees, who claimed Wednesday that the league and NFLPA "have conspired" to set low retiree benefit and pension payments in the negotiations. The retirees also say they have been illegally and intentionally excluded from the talks.

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Cavendish Takes Tour's Stage 11, Sprinter Lead

Generally regarded as the best sprinter in the cycling world, Mark Cavendish has never won the sprinter's title at the world's most prestigious cycling race.

LAVAUR, France (AP) • British sprinter Mark Cavendish won Wednesday's 11th stage with a blistering late attack to clinch his third stage win of this year's Tour de France, and Frenchman Thomas Voeckler kept hold of the race leader's yellow jersey for another day.

Cavendish nearly lost a shoe in the final stretch of Wednesday's stage, but kept his cool to beat Andre Greipel of Germany at the line to take the leading sprinter's green jersey.

The prolific Cavendish claimed the 18th

He was second last year behind Alessandro Petacchi of Italy, and second to two-time sprint champion Thor Hushovd in 2009. Cavendish pulled out before the Alpine stages in 2008 to save energy for the Olympics.

Voeckler, meanwhile, said he expects to lose his yellow jersey in the Pyrenees.

Defending Tour de France Alberto Contador wants to show his rivals he is still the world's best climber when the race hits the Pyrenees on Thursday. It just depends whether his troublesome right knee lets him.

The three-time champion has been bugged by a swelling in his right knee since he crashed on last week's fifth stage, and he banged the same knee again when falling of

his bike on stage 9 last Sunday.

With two mammoth climbs up the Col du Tourmalet and an uphill finish to Luz-Ardiden awaiting him on Thursday's 12th stage, the Spaniard feels quietly confident his body will not let him down. It had better not, otherwise Andy Schleck and Cadel Evans, his main Tour rivals, will not hesitate to try to knock him out of contention.

Cruel, but that's the Tour. After all, Contador did not wait around when Schleck's chain came off last year.

"My knee is responding well so I'm obviously very happy," Contador said Wednesday's 11th stage. "But keep in mind that I didn't climb the Tourmalet today. I have to see how it responds and on that basis I will make a decision how to do the race on the last climb tomorrow."

Evans is the best placed of the main Tour contenders and the Australian veteran currently leads Schleck by 11 seconds overall, and Contador by 1 minute, 41 seconds.

At the Dyspeptics Club the player sitting West today is regarded as something of a loose cannon. You never know in which direction he is going to be shooting, and as East will tell you, quite often he has been the victim of "friendly fire." However, in today's deal it was South who took something of a mortal wound, and despite repeated and loaded questions, was never able to discover if he was the victim of malice or a lucky accident.

Before I tell you precisely what happened, consider the play in three no-trump when West leads a fourth-highest club six.

Declarer takes East's jack with his king and infers from the spot led that West has four clubs ready to cash as soon as the defenders get on lead. The best chance for the contract will therefore be to run the spades with the aid of a finesse. (This line succeeds whenever West has the spade queen in a two- or three-card suit. Playing for that layout, South would emerge with nine tricks.)

But compare what happened at the table when West kicked off with a deceptive club two. Now declarer believed clubs were breaking 4-3, so it was safe for him to knock out the diamond ace rather than rely on the spades. West won his diamond ace and impassively cashed out the clubs.

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DEAR ABBY: I agree with Homes

your advice to "Driven Away in Georgia" (May 26), whose mother widowed has become so bitter, all eight of her children avoid her. As a clinical neuropsychologist who works with people with dementia and other agingrelated problems, I'd like to share my thoughts.

When a spouse dies, previously undetected earlystage dementia can become apparent to others. If the surviving spouse had preexisting cognitive deficits, they may have been concealed by the competency of the other spouse. After the spouse dies, the structure and functional support once provided is suddenly removed. Symp-toms then become apparent to family members.



Another diagnostic option might be depression, which can often resemble dementia in elderly people. There are medications that can help manage and even slow down the progression of dementia, and early intervention may partially stabilize her at a higher level of functioning. You were right to recommend that family members become more involved rather than back away since this woman clearly needs either psychiatric or neurological intervention, or both. Thank you for shedding light on a very common problem that can touch any family.

Thank you for sharing your expertise and raising awareness for those with family members who are also struggling with similar issues. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: In addition to concerns about dementia, the mother may be overwhelmed with living life as a widow. The eight surviving children should try to arrange for part-time hired help for her household chores that build up. If Mom is living on limited income, she may be crushed with financial stress. Perhaps it's time for her to downsize to a more manageable home. Instead of avoiding her, these "kids" need to find out exactly what problems are overwhelming their mother and get her help.

Cattle Group to Back Animal Cruelty Law

BOISE • Under threat of a voter initiative, an Idaho cattle group says it supports legislation to punish third-time animal cruelty offenders with a felony.

The Idaho Cattle Association's feeder council voted unanimously at a recent meeting to pursue the bill in 2012, according to the association's July newsletter.

Idaho, North Dakota and South Dakota are the only states without felony animal cruelty penalties. Agriculture groups have long been wary of removing Idaho from that list, for fear any new law could be used by groups opposed to ranching or animal agriculture to fight these traditional activities.

The association's feedlot group says getting behind legislation now will help it control the outcome – and show the public that cattle producers take pride in caring for their animals.

A phone call to the Idaho Cattle Association wasn't returned. But according to the newsletter, "Members felt as though it was important for the ICA to take initiative on the matter so that the association can control the outcome of the bill."

The association says the feeder council's vote will

serve as a policy guide that will be taken up at the Idaho Cattle Association Annual Convention in Sun Valley in November.

The Idaho Humane Society, Stop Torturing Our Pets, and other animal welfare groups are now gathering signatures for a 2012 ballot initiative under an umbrella group they're calling Idaho 1 of 3.

Their initiative, on file with the Idaho Secretary of State's office, would define animal torture and make such crimes a felony on the first offense. For animal cruelty, the measure would increase misdemeanor fines to \$400 for a first offense, up from a current \$100 fine, and triple fines for a second offense to \$600.

It would also make a third animal cruelty conviction within a 15-year period a felony, punishable by between six months and three years in prison and a \$9,000 fine.

Virginia Hemingway, president of Idaho 1 of 3, said any measure — regardless of whether it's a bill in 2012 or an initiative that November should address animal torture. She said her group may support a bill next legislative session, but it will depend on how it is written.

"We're after two groups of people: People who torture animals, and the repeat of-

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fenders,' Hemingway told The Associated Press.

Jeff Rosenthal, Idaho Humane Society director, said Wednesday the Idaho Cattle Association council's vote was good news and likely reflects a common-sense, locally crafted approach to a long-unresolved issue.

"They're very much a major player in the state, and if that represents their collective stance, that's very encouraging," Rosenthal said.

In 2009, an animal cruelty bill that teamed Idaho's agricultural community and animal welfare advocates including Hemingway went nowhere, in part due to opposition from the national group Humane Society of the United States that feared it left a loophole for puppy mills.



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
