# Finding Magic Valley's Homeless

New data shows a rise in homeless people in southern Idaho, but the definition may be too narrow.

Homelessness doesn't always

happen to whom you think it

"I've worked all my life and I've never been on unemployment," said Sam Neyhart, a homeless father of two. "I'm not lazy."

Yet after a series of medical problems and a messy divorce, Nevhart has not had a steady residence for more than a year. In the spring, he and his family were forced to sleep in his car for a week. Finally, Neyhart moved his family into Valley House, a shelter in Twin

"I was apprehensive to go to a homeless shelter," he said. "I thought it was going to be dangerous, but I had to go somewhere."

Homeless testimonies like these challenge the stereotypes that all who are without a home are either there by choice or are lazy, said Leann Trappen, community services director for South Central Community Action Partnership. SCCAP is a nonprofit low-income assistance organization in Twin

Earlier this week, the Idaho Housing and Finance Association released the state's newest count of its homeless population. According to the report, the state's homeless population is 2,199, a 6 percent decrease from 2010. However, in eight south-central Idaho counties, the numbers have slowly been increasing throughout the past five years.

In 2008, the report recorded 69 homeless individuals in the eightcounty Magic Valley area. The

number jumped to more than 100 this year.

"Most people are not aware that there is a homeless problem in Idaho," said Trappen, who led the

local region in counting the number of homeless people for the IH-FA. "When they do, it's usually in a negative context?

# **Down on** the Farm, **Investors** See Big **Potential**

A new breed of gentleman farmer is shaking up the American heartland: Rich investors with no ties to farming are betting big on a patch of earth.

Braden Janowski has never planted seeds or brought in a harvest. He doesn't even own overalls.

Yet when 430 acres of Michigan cornfields was auctioned last summer, it was Janowski, a brash, 33year-old software executive, who made the winning bid. It was so high - \$4 million, 25 percent above the next-highest — that some farmers stood, shook their heads and walked out. And Janowski figures he got the land cheap.

"Corn back then was around \$4;" he says from his office in Tulsa, Okla., stealing a glance at prices per bushel on his computer. Corn rose to almost \$8 in June and trades now at about \$7.

A new breed of gentleman farmer is shaking up the American heartland. Rich investors with no ties to farming, no dirt under their nails, are confident enough to wager big on a patch of earth — betting that it's a smart investment because food will only get more expensive around the world.

They're buying wheat fields in Kansas, rows of Iowa corn and acres of soybeans in Indiana. And though farmers still fill most of the seats at auctions, the newcomers are growing in number and variety - a Seattle computer executive, a Kansas City lawyer, a publishing executive from Chicago, a Boston money manager.

The value of Iowa farmland has almost doubled in six years. In Nebraska and Kansas, it's up more than 50 percent. Prices have risen so fast that regulators have begun sounding alarms, and farmers are beginning to voice concerns.

"I never thought prices would get this high," says Robert Huber, 73, who just sold his 500-acre corn and soybean farm in Carmel, Ind., for \$3.8 million, or \$7,600 an acre, triple what he paid for it a decade ago. "At

# Technology Helps Heyburn Woman Adapt

Medical practices common five decades ago left Linda Croft with damaged sight and hearing. But medical advances are helping her to function.

**HEYBURN** • Linda Croft was born 13 weeks early. She weighed 3 pounds, 3 ounces. That was in 1947, when saving such premature infants was, well, in its infan-

At the time, doctors didn't know their common practices would leave the Heyburn woman almost blind and nearly deaf.

Her doctor followed the thencurrent wisdom, giving her pure oxygen to help her lungs breathe as she lay in her incubator. At a month old, Croft contracted pneumonia and received more oxygen and a mixture of penicillin and streptomycin, another antibiotic.

The streptomycin destroyed her hearing. The oxygen damaged

Those problems would alter anyone's life. But now, thanks to technological and medical advances, Croft's story may be one that is heard less and less. Already she is seeing - and hearing - the benefits of modern technology.

"They're doing some wonderful work with electronics," Croft

When she was growing up, public schools wouldn't accept her because of her hearing and vision problems, she said. They

all referred her to the Gooding School for the Blind. Her parents pushed against that ruling and found a Catholic school, St. Theresa's Academy in Gooding, that would let Croft participate in the normal curriculum.

She completed schoolwork with the help of good lighting and some understanding of her hardships -and graduated as valedictorian.

Now, Croft reads with the aid of an electronic screen that enlarges the text. A closed-circuit television can also pick up text from books set on a 14-inch screen. Her PenFriend, an audio labeling tool, scans and speaks the names of her books and

Even her hearing aids work with each other, shutting one down to filter out background noise as needed.

Croft found many of the devices with the help of Brenda Knight, a home instructor with the Idaho Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired.

"Each visually impaired person sees differently and so different appliances work for them," Knight said. The medical community has

since done its own work to im-

prove the chances for babies born almost a trimester early. Please see TECHNOLOGY, M2

Tracy Larsen, manager of St. Luke's Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, said oxygen needs of premature babies are now carefully weighed. Any infant born after 28 weeks or less of pregnancy may not be able to breathe on its own, she said. Electronic devices monitor what the babies' need, and oxygen is mixed with room air at varying percentages.

Meanwhile, research on infant vision problems are also advancing. A laser treatment for bleeding in the eye has been in use for sometime, said Dr. Denton Roberts, of Boise-based Retina Specialists of Idaho. But a new procedure that involves an injection into the eye is showing promise at stopping bleeding quicker and saving more of the infant's vision, he said.

Combined, there's less reason for today's infants to start out life like Croft did. If a person should develop vision or hearing problems, technology may offer more

the price we got, it's going to take a long time for him to pay it off – and that's if crop prices stay high?"

Buyers say soaring farm values simply reflect fundamentals. Crop prices have risen because demand for food is growing around the world while the supply of arable land is shrinking.

At the same time, farmers are shifting more of their land to the crops with the fastest-rising prices, which could cause those prices to fall - and take the value of farms with them. When the government reported June 30 that farmers had planted the second-largest corn crop in 70 years, corn prices dropped 8 percent in two days.

And even if crop prices hold up, land values could fall if another key prop disappears: low interest rates.

When the Federal Reserve cut its benchmark rate to a record low in December 2008, yields on CDs and money market funds and other conservative investments plunged, too. Investors were unhappy with earning less, but they were too scared about the economy to do much about it.

As they grew more confident - and more frustrated with their puny returns they shifted money into riskier assets like stocks and corporate bonds. To many Wall Street experts, this hunt for alternatives also explains the rapid rise in gold, art, oil — and farms.

Those who favor farms like to point out that, unlike the first three choices, you can collect income while

you own it. You can sell what you grow on the farm or hand the fields over to a farmer and collect rent.

In Iowa, investors pocket annual rent equivalent to 4 percent of the price of land. That's a 60-year low but almost 2.5 percentage points more than average yield on five-year CDs at banks. That advantage could disappear quickly. If the Fed starts raising rates, farmland won't look nearly as appealing.

For now, though, investors can't seem to get enough of it.

At a recent auction of 156 acres in Iowa, the 50 or so farmers who showed up withheld their bids out of respect for a beloved local farmer who had rented the land for two decades and wanted to own it. But his final bid of \$1.1 million was topped by a California insurance executive. In Iowa, 25 percent of buyers are investors, double the proportion 20 years ago.

"They were angry, but what are they going to do about it?" says Jeffrey Obrecht of Farmers National, the brokerage that ran the auction. He told the farmers they shouldn't worry because some of the new investors will find a new way to make money in a few years and start selling their land. Other dangers lurk for in-

vestors. In Iowa, corn prices are high partly because corn is used to make ethanol, a fuel additive subsidized by the federal government. The U.S. Department of Agriculture expects 40 percent of the nation's corn crop this year will go to factories that make it. But with Washington running up

record deficits, it's anyone guess how long the subsidy

will remain. As with stocks, U.S. farms can swing wildly in value along with the economy. Despite the fragile recovery, though, farm prices are nearing records now, capping a decade of some of the fastest annual price jumps in 40 years.

In Iowa, farm prices rose 160 percent in the decade through last year to an average \$5,064 per acre, according to Iowa State University.

Concern that farm prices may be inflated is serious enough that the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. held a conference for farm lenders in March titled "Don't Bet the Farm?' Thomas Hoenig, head of the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, oversaw dozens of bank failures when a farm boom turned bust 30 years ago. Today, he suggests prices may be in an "unsustainable bubble.''

Veteran bond trader Perry Vieth doesn't think so. Vieth, the former head of fixed income investments for PanAgora Asset Management in Boston, started buying farms with his own money five years ago, when buyers with no farming experience were rare.

"Agriculture was sleepy," he says. "People looked at me like, 'What are you doing?""

Now he's buying for 71 wealthy investors. Ceres Partners, his 31/2-year-old private investment fund, owns 65 farms, almost half bought since November. He says he's returned 15 percent annually to his investors overall.

Though Vieth says prices in some places have climbed too high – he won't buy in Iowa, for instance — he says the price of farms elsewhere will rise as big money managers start seeing them as just another tradable asset like stocks or bonds and start buying.

"When Goldman Sachs shows up to an auction, then I'll know it's time to get out," he says.



## Stricter **Taxi Laws** for Sun Valley Cabbies?

A proposed dress code includes collared shirts, closed-toe shoes with socks, and casual dress pants or dress shorts.

KETCHUM (AP) • The manager of a central Idaho airport has proposed an amendment to airport regulations for taxi drivers out of concern some are giving tourists a bad first impression of the resort area that includes Ketchum and Sun Valley.

"Most of the companies are doing a great job, but there are some who are not operating to the standard we'd like to see;" Manager Rick Baird told the Idaho Mountain Express. "They are the first and last impression for many people who arrive in the valley?

The proposed regulations presented last week to the Friedman Memorial Airport Authority include more strict dress and vehicle appearance

The dress code includes collared shirts that identify the driver's employer, closed-toe shoes with socks, and casual dress pants or dress shorts. Clothing must also be clean and wrinkle-

"We don't think shorts and a muscle shirt is appropriate when they're picking up people who are getting their first taste of the valley," Baird said.

The new rules would also prohibit drivers from entering the terminal unless getting advance written permission from Baird. Baird would also have the power to suspend drivers who don't follow the new rules.

"The myth that's in the driver world right now is that drivers don't have to adhere to the regulation because it has no teeth," Baird said. "This changes some of the ways we do business out here."

Baird said airport customers most often complain about solicitation from taxi drivers.

Board member and Hailey City Councilwoman Martha Burke said she felt she was "assaulted" by drivers fighting over her fare.

Taxi drivers oppose the regulations, saying their job is tough enough already.

"We're just out here, fighting for a fare, trying to make a living, and the airport is making it harder and harder," said Otis Miller, a driver for Cornwell Limo Service.

Trappen said that the recession and the weak job market have hindered those seeking to improve their living conditions.

Diann Williams, a homeless woman also living in Valley House, agrees.

After multiple medical issues with her hip, Williams was left unemployed and broke. Before she knew it, she could no longer afford her rent and medical bills. She checked into the shelter in April.

"I am not ashamed to be homeless," she said. "I'm paying off my debt and I'm not going to stay here forev-

IHFA defines homelessness as a person without shelter. Using the Point in Time method, volunteers only count those who were without a shelter or used a non-housing structure to sleep in for a particular night in January. The IHFA then submits its findings to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Devel-

opment.

People like Neyhart and Williams would not be considered homeless in Idaho under this definition.

"There are many people who don't have a stable place of residence but they rarely get counted," Trappen said. "The PIT method is one way to get an estimate of the amount of homeless people in Idaho but it is not the best method."

According to Williams, more attention needs to be given on how people become homeless.

"No one wants to be homeless," Williams said. "There are more people out there who are without a home than you would think. This needs to be addressed."

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## Hundreds Mourn Fallen **Soldiers** in N. Idaho

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) • Hundreds of friends, family and service members at a memorial service mourned two northern Idaho soldiers who died in Iraq earlier this month.

## Flooding in N. Idaho's **Kootenai River Delays Sturgeon Spawning**

KALISPELL, Mont. (AP) • A biologist with Idaho Fish and Game says the spawning season for endangered white sturgeon in the Kootenai River in northern Idaho was a bit delayed this

Pete Rust tells the Daily Inter Lake that adhesive mats on the river bottom didn't start collecting eggs until May 31, about two weeks later than normal.

Biologist Brian Marotz of Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks says flows from Libby Dam in Montana stayed just below flood stage for a month.

Dam officials had planned a spill test to release additional water to help sturgeon reach spawning grounds but the high snowpack made that unnecessary this year.

Rust says four female sturgeon tagged with sonic transmitters were detected moving into spawning areas upstream of Bonners Ferry in Idaho.

# Hail Damage Scrubs at Least 13 More United Flights From Denver

**DENVER (AP)** • United Airlines canceled 13 more departures from Denver International Airport on Sunday while it inspected airplanes for damage from last week's hailstorm.

United spokesman Mike Trevino said he didn't know if any Sunday arrivals were canceled because of the hailwhich storm, struck Wednesday.

Denver International Airport's website listed about 20 United arrivals that were canceled at one point Sunday, but it wasn't known how many were attributed to the hailstorm.

All 13 departures canceled on Sunday were United Express regional flights, Trevino said. A 14th United Express flight was canceled for reasons unrelated to the storm, he said.

Eleven United planes remained out of service for inspection, Trevino said. He didn't know how many were damaged.

United said it had canceled more than 100 Denver flights on Thursday and Friday because of the hail inspections.

Frontier Airlines spokesman Peter Kowalchuk said 37 of the airline's flights were canceled Sunday, while 18 were set to be canceled on Monday.

Frontier officials were working to subservice aircraft — effectively renting planes from other airlines, Kowalchuk said. That's one reason why there were fewer Monday cancellations, he said.

Southwest Airlines, another big carrier in Denver, said three of its planes were damaged by hail, but with 550 planes in its fleet, it didn't have to delay or cancel flights.

animal parts. ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) • Two men accused of participating in a walrus ivory and polar bear hide trading ring have pleaded guilty to breaking federal marine mammal laws, and a third person is expected to plead guilty on Tues-

> day. Federal agents found hundreds of pounds of walrus tusks and two polar bear hides when they searched the home of Jesse James LeBoeuf and his companion, Loretta Sternbach, in April, the Anchorage Daily News reported.

LeBoeuf and Sternbach were accused of trading cigarettes, guns, snowmachines and other items to Natives in the village of Savoonga in exchange for federally protected animal parts. Co-conspirator Richard Weshenfelder marketed the tusks and hides on the Internet and helped sell the parts to out-ofstate buyers, a federal indictment said.

LeBoeuf and Sternbach also illegally sold and transported walrus parts and tusks to outof-state buyers, the indictment said.

By law, only Natives living on the Alaska coast can hunt the mammals, and they can't sell the raw ivory to private collectors.

Authorities believe the trading was done in two trips to Savoonga on Saint Lawrence Island, which lies in the Bering Strait between mainland Alaska and Russia. LeBoeuf and Sternbach live in Glennallen, about 180 miles northeast of Anchorage.

Weshenfelder, of Anchorage, and LeBoeuf pleaded guilty on Friday. Sternbach is set to enter a guilty plea on Tuesday.

Prosecutors are seeking a nine-year sentence for LeBoeuf and a fiveyear sentence for Weshenfelder. All three defendants are expected to be sentenced in Novem-

# Former Uruguayan Military Dictator Dies at 83

Juan Maria Bordaberry suspended the constitution, banned political parties, ordered tanks into the streets and ruled by decree until the generals ousted him three years later. Democracy wasn't restored until 1985.

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay • Former President-turneddictator Juan Maria Bordaberry, whose self-coup launched more than a decade of military rule in Uruguay, died Sunday in his home where he was serving a sentence for leading efforts to

Bordaberry, 83, had been suffering from breathing problems and other illnesses that kept him from serving the 30-year sentence in prison. His death was confirmed to The Associated Press by his son, Sen. Pedro

A wealthy conservative landowner, Bordaberry was elected president in 1971 during a chaotic time in Uruguay, when wealthy elites and leftist Tupamaro guerrillas both saw armed revolution as a real path to power.

The Tupamaros were alcrushed Uruguayans awoke to tanks surrounding the legislative palace on the cold winter day of June 27, 1973. The military had become so powerful that Bordaberry had to give up control in order to survive politically. Rather than lose a minor political fight in Congress, he suspended the constitution, banned political parties, ordered tanks into the streets and ruled by decree until the generals ousted him anyway three years later. Democracy wasn't restored until 1985.

Meanwhile, Bordaberry lived quietly out of public view, and as the dictatorship ended, Uruguay's congress approved amnesties that protected both military figures and former guerrillas - including Uruguay's current president, former Tupamaro leader Jose Mujica.

That pact threatened to

break on Nov. 16, 2006, when a judge ordered Bordaberry arrested for the killings of four Uruguayans who had fled to Argentina. Weeks later, another judge added charges of especially aggravated homicide in the killings of 10 leftist detainees. Both sets of crimes were determined to be beyond the scope of the amnesties. He was eventually sentenced to the maximum 30 years in prison in February 2010 for violating the constitution by leading the coup.

Bordaberry's family considered him to be a victim of political pressure from the Broad Front coalition of center-left parties, unions and social movements that has governed Uruguay since 2005.

But his prosecution also marked the beginning of efforts by this small South American country of 3.5 million people to end impunity for those responsible for the disappearances and torture of hundreds of Uruguayans, and the exile of thousands of political dissidents.

A peace commission found in 2003 that the dictatorship killed 175 leftist political activists, 26 of them in clan-

destine torture centers. Earlier, the Tupamaros also committed killings and other crimes after taking up arms in 1963 against democratically elected governments, and many of the guerrillas who weren't killed served long prison terms. Mujica, for one, spent more than a decade behind bars.

Investigative judges linked Bordaberry to the abductions and killings in May 1976 of leftist Sen. Zelmar Michelini and House leader Hector Gutierrez of the traditional National Party, prominent lawmakers who were seized from their homes in exile in Buenos Aires. Their bulletriddled bodies and those of

# Tea Party Debt Plan Takes Center Stage

washington • The next step in the weeks-long saga over how to increase the government's borrowing cap is to let House tea party forces try it their way.

A Republican "cut, cap and balance" plan set for a House vote Tuesday would condition a \$2.4 trillion increase in the so-called debt limit on an immediate \$100 billion-plus cut from next year's budget and adoption by Congress of a constitutional amendment to require a balanced budget.

"Let's let the American people decide," said Rep. Jim Jordan, R-Ohio, on "Fox News Sunday." "Do they want something common sense as cutting spending, capping the growth in government and requiring a balanced budget amendment to the Constitution?"

The idea appears to be to allow tea party-backed GOP lawmakers to have the run of Congress this week in hopes that they'll ultimately be able to stomach a plan emerging in the Senate to give President Barack Obama sweeping power to order a \$2.5 trillion increase in the debt limit without approval by Congress.

The cut, cap and balance plan, however, is a dead letter with Obama and in the Democratic-controlled Senate — as is a separate effort by Republicans in that chamber to adopt a balanced budget amendment. Amending the Constitution requires a 2/3rds vote of

both Houses, including 67 votes in the Senate, where Republicans control just 47.

"No one believes there are 67 votes for any version of that," said Dick Durbin of Illinois, the No. 2 Senate Democrat, on CBS' "Face The Nation."

Public opinion polls show that voters like the idea of a balanced budget, but the government faces such massive budget gaps - it now borrows more than 40 cents of every dollar it spends - that the cuts required to eliminate the deficit were too draconian for even the GOP-dominated House to endorse balancing the budget anytime soon. The House Republican budget still leaves deficits in the \$400 billion range after 10 years.

The immediate issue is allowing the government to continue to borrow from investors and foreign countries like China to pay its bills — which include a \$23 billion batch of Social Security checks set to go out the day after an Aug. 2 deadline to avoid default.

With the deadline just over two weeks away and with a recent round of White House talks failing to generate a breakthrough, Sen. Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., the cagey leader of his party in the Senate, has proposed a plan that would allow Obama to automatically win a large enough increase in the debt to keep the government afloat until 2013 unless both House and Senate override him by veto-proof margins.

CARACAS, Venezuela • In his monthlong fight against cancer, Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez has placed utmost importance on secrecy, carefully offering only scraps of information about his condition.

Now, as he begins planned chemotherapy in Cuba, Chavez appears to have found the perfect place where he can tightly guard details of his illness and keep the prying eyes of the news media far away.

The Venezuelan leader first underwent surgery in the island nation on June 20 to remove a cancerous tumor from his pelvic region. He returned Saturday night, saying he would be starting a "second phase of treatment."

### NASA's Elite Corps Shrinks as Shuttles Retired

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. • NASA's mighty astronaut corps has become a shadow of what it once was. And it's only going to get smaller.

It's down to 60 from an all-time high of 149 just a decade ago, with more de-

partures coming once Atlantis returns this week from the very last space shuttle voyage.

With no replacement on the horizon for the shuttle, astronauts are bailing fast, even though the International Space Station will need crews for at least another decade.

# HARRY POTTER' TAKES DOWN DARK KNIGHT' AT BOX OFFICE

LOS ANGELES • The boy wizard has vanquished the dark knight and a band of pirates with a record-setting magic act at both the domestic and international

box office.

# Anthony Lies Low on First Day of Freedom

ORLANDO, Fla. • This is what freedom looks like for Casey Anthony: \$537.68 from her jail account, no job, estranged parents, a criminal record, lawsuits pending against her and the scorn of multitudes who think she got away with murder.

She quickly gave reporters the slip after walking out of jail Sunday, but whatever life she manages to build for herself will be lived under a media microscope and the shadow of countless threats.

Experts who have helped other notorious defendants through rough times say she will have opportunities as well, but it won't be easy for the 25-year-old, who was found not guilty of killing her 2-year-old daughter, Caylee, but convicted of lying to investigators.

With her hair in a bun, Casey Anthony walked out the front door of an Orlando-area jail shortly after midnight, wearing a pink T- shirt, blue jeans and sneakers, and escorted by sheriff's deputies holding semi-automatic rifles. Protesters shouted "baby killer" and "you suck" as she climbed into an SUV.

The vehicle sped away and darted into a parking garage at a building where one of her attorneys has offices. Where she went next is unknown.

Soon after her release, there was police activity at Orlando Executive Airport as two vehicles pulled up to a twin-engine private jet bound for Columbus, Ohio, but no one saw Anthony get out and onto the plane. Ohio is the home state of Anthony's parents, but an official at the Columbus airport said the aircraft was only carrying golfers back from a Florida vacation.

"Casey is in good hands," said Todd Macaluso, a former member of Anthony's defense team who declined to comment further.

Her lead attorney, Jose Baez, did not respond Sunday to email and phone messages left by The Associated Press, nor did other lawyers on her defense team and those representing her father and mother.

Another former Anthony lawyer, Terry Lenamon, said he had no clue where she was headed, and that probably only a few people close to her knew.

"I wouldn't want anyone

"I wouldn't want anyone to know," he said. "I think she needs to go underground and I think she needs to spend some time to get her life back together."

Anthony's July 5 acquittal shocked and enraged many around the country who had been following the case since Caylee's 2008 disappearance. Anger has spilled onto social media sites and elsewhere. Her legal team said on Friday it had received an emailed death threat with a manipulated photo showing their client with a bullet hole in her forehead.

Anthony did not report her daughter's disappearance for a month and was arrested after telling a string of lies about the case to police. Caylee's remains were found in December 2008 near the home Casey Anthony shared with her parents.

Prosecutors alleged that Anthony suffocated her daughter with duct tape because motherhood interfered with her desire for a carefree life, but her lawyers said the girl drowned in an accident that snowballed out of control. Some of the jurors who acquitted Anthony said they believe she bears some responsibility for her daughter's death but that prosecutors failed to prove that she murdered the child.

Anthony had remained in jail to finish a four-year sentence for lying to investigators. With credit for the nearly three years she'd spent in jail since August 2008 and good behavior, she had only days remaining when she was sentenced July 7.

Her public vilification did not ease with her release from jail. "A baby killer was just set free!" Bree Thornton, 39, shouted as the SUV left the jail.

## Ex-Murdoch Aide Brooks Arrested; London's Police Chief Resigns

Both developments are ominous for Murdoch's News Corp. and a British power structure that nurtured cozy relationship with his papers.

LONDON • An intensifying voicemail hacking and police bribery scandal cut closer than ever to Rupert Murdoch and Scotland Yard on Sunday with the arrest of the media magnate's former British newspaper chief and the resignation of London's police commissioner.

Though the former executive, Rebekah Brooks, and the police chief, Paul Stephenson, have denied wrongdoing, both developments are ominous not only for Murdoch's News Corp., but for a British power structure that nurtured a cozy relationship with his papers for years.

Brooks, the ultimate social and political insider, dined at Christmas with Prime Minister David Cameron. His Conservative-led government is now facing increasing questions about its relationship with Murdoch's media empire

media empire. The arrest of the 43-yearold Brooks, often described as a surrogate daughter to the 80-year-old Murdoch, brought the British police investigations into the media baron's inner circle for the first time. It raises the possibility that Murdoch's old friend Les Hinton, who resigned Friday as publisher of The Wall Street Journal, or his 38-year-old son and heir apparent, James, could be

Until her resignation Friday, Brooks was the defiant chief executive of News International, Murdoch's British newspaper arm, whose News of the World tabloid stands accused of hacking into the phones of celebrities, politicians, other journalists and even murder victims. In the tumultuous last two weeks, she had kept

her job even as Murdoch shut down the 168-year-old News of the World and tossed 200 other journalists out of work.

On Sunday she showed up for a prearranged meeting with London police investigating the hacking and was arrested. She was being questioned on suspicion of conspiring to intercept communications — phone hacking — and on suspicion of corruption, which relates to bribing police for information.

Brooks' spokesman, David Wilson, said police contacted her Friday to arrange a meeting and she voluntarily went "to assist with their ongoing investigation." He claimed that Brooks did not know she was going to be arrested.

Hours after Brooks' arrest, Stephenson said he was resigning as commissioner of London's force because of "speculation and accusations" about his links to Neil Wallis, a former News of the World executive editor who was arrested last week in the scandal. Wallis worked for the London police as a parttime PR consultant for a year until September 2010.

Stephenson said he did not make the decision to hire Wallis and had no knowledge of allegations that he was linked to phone hacking, but he wanted his police force to focus on preparing for the 2012 London Olympics instead of wondering about a possible leadership change.

"I had no knowledge of the extent of this disgraceful practice and the repugnant nature of the selection of victims that is now emerging," Stephenson said. "I will not lose any sleep over my personal integrity."

Brooks' arrest was the latest blow for Murdoch, the once all-powerful figure courted by British politicians of all stripes. Now Murdoch is struggling to tame a scandal that has already destroyed News of the World, cost the jobs of Brooks and Hinton and sunk the media baron's dream of taking full control of a lucrative satellite broadcaster, British Sky Broadcasting.

Deputy Prime Minister Nick Clegg said Murdoch "needs to come absolutely clean about what he knew, about what his senior executives knew, and why this culture of industrial-scale corruption — so it is alleged — appeared to have grown up without anyone higher up in the food chain taking any real responsibility for it."

Rupert and James Murdoch are to be grilled by U.K. lawmakers Tuesday over the scandal. Brooks also had agreed to be questioned before a parliamentary committee, but her arrest throws that appearance into doubt.

"Obviously this complicates matter greatly," said Wilson, her spokesman. "Her legal team will have to have discussions with the committee to see whether it would still be appropriate for her to attend."

## Tables Turn on Murdoch as Scandal Rocks Empire

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) • To his many enemies, Rupert Murdoch is getting his comeuppance.

Murdoch's tabloid newspapers long have reveled in the misdeeds of others with salacious photos and pun-packed headlines. Now, one of the world's most powerful media executives is learning what it's like to be enveloped in his own scandal.

"There is a feeling that Murdoch has been king of the world for too long and it's about time that somebody brought him back to Earth," said Mungo Mac-Callum, a political journalist and commentator who once worked for a Murdoch-owned newspaper, The Australian.

But no one is calling press conferences to gloat about Murdoch's troubles. Even his bitterest media rivals are keeping quiet.

Liberty Media chief John Malone, who engaged in media-mogul head butting with Murdoch over his stake in Murdoch's News Corp and other issues, did not return a message seeking comment that was left with a spokeswoman.

CNN founder Ted Turner, who once challenged Murdoch to a boxing match in Las Vegas, was unavailable, according to a spokesman.

New York Daily News Publisher Mort Zuckerman, whose newspaper fights every day for front page dominance with the Post for New York's tabloid audience also did not return a message seeking comment.

But others aren't as charitable. In recent days, Murdoch has drawn comparisons to a cruel monarch, Richard Nixon, even the devil.

Michael Sidibe, executive director of UNAIDS, said the gap in access to HIV treatment should be closed both within and between countries.

## Herman Cain says communities have right to ban mosques

Republican presidential candidate Herman Cain said Sunday that commu-

nities have a right to ban Islamic mosques. Appearing on "Fox News Sunday," the former Godfather's Pizza CEO said protests and legal challenges to a planned mosque in Tennessee city are an example of local residents

pushing back. Cain said his view doesn't amount to religious discrimination because he says Muslims are trying to inject Shariah law into the U.S.

Shariah is a set of core principles that most Muslims recognize and a series of rulings from religious scholars. It covers many areas of life and different sects have different versions and interpretations of the code.

Asked if his view could lead any community to stand up in opposition to a proposed mosque, Cain replied, "They could say that." He pointed to opposition to the planned mosque in Murfreesboro, Tenn., as an example.

"Let's go back to the fundamental issue that the people are basically saving that they are objecting to," Cain said. "They are objecting to the fact that Islam is both religion and (a) set of laws, Shariah law. That's the difference between any one of our other traditional religions where it's just about religious purposes.

"The people in the community know best. And I

happen to side with the people in the community."

Cain's comments were denounced as "unconstitutional and un-American" by a spokesman for the Washington-based Council on American-Islamic Relations. "It's clear that Herman

Cain has decided that he will score political points every time he bashes the Muslim community or its constitutional rights," council spokesman Ibrahim Hooper said in a phone interview.

Cain previously stirred controversy by saying that he would not want a Muslim bent on killing Americans in his administration. Campaigning

Murfreesboro last week, Cain sided with mosque opponents.

"I happen to also know that it's not just about a religious mosque," he said Sunday. "There are other things going on based upon talking to the people closest to the problem. It's not a mosque for religious purposes. This is what the people are objecting to."

# Perry's credentials as conservative as they come


Texas Gov. Rick Perry has phoned influential Republicans in New Hampshire and Iowa as he weighs whether to enter 2012 race for president.

**AUSTIN, Texas** • Should Rick Perry conclude that voter discontent has left him an opening to enter the presidential race, the longtime Texas governor would be among the GOP field's most conservative candidates.

Primary voters would get a skilled politician with TV anchorman looks, a Southern preacher's oratory and a cowboy's swagger, matched by a disarming candor and sense of humor. The former cotton farmer from Paint Creek in West Texas has never lost an election in nearly three decades as a politician.

What they wouldn't get is a candidate whose politics are positioned to unite a Republican electorate that stretches from moderate pro-business fiscal conservatives to evangelical social conservatives, with the tea party falling somewhere along the spec-

"Texans, God love them, have that bigger-than-life persona about politics and that doesn't necessarily play everywhere," said Christopher Nicholas, a Republican political consultant who has worked extensively in the Northeast and Midwest. "I haven't heard a lot of Republicans call Social Security a disease."

Perry has. He branded Social Security and other New Deal programs "the second big step in the march of socialism," according to a book published last year. The "first step" was a national income tax, which he has said stands alongside the direct election of U.S. senators as a major mistake among the amendments to the U.S. Constitu-

In the just-completed Texas legislative session, Perry's "emergency items" included laws that require a photo ID in order to vote, a sonogram before a woman had an abortion and enforcement of federal immigration laws by local police.

He rejects the idea of global warming and the theory of evolution, arguing for natural climate variations and intelligent design of the universe.

In fact, he said last year when promoting his book, "Fed Up: Our Fight to Save America From Washington," which was a state's rights treatise that railed against the federal government, that he's too conservative to run for national office.


"The best concrete evidence that I'm really not running for president is this book, because when you read this book, you're going to see me talking about issues that for someone running for public office, it's kind of been the third rail if you will," Perry told The AP shortly after winning re-election in 2010.

Perry doesn't shy away from his deep conservatism. He embraces it with the same vigor with which he dismisses those who found his shooting of a coyote while the governor was jogging or spending tens of thousands of campaign dollars on a luxury rental home unbecoming a state chief executive.













hen it closed the books on fiscal year 2011 on June 30, the state of Idaho had \$85 million more than it anticipated.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter had two options with part of that money: He could have expanded the grocery tax credit or he could have called a special session of the Legislature to restore some of the

draconian cuts lawmakers made in Medicaid earlier this year.

The governor chose the former. He chose wrongly.

"My preference would be ... restoring some of the current programs we have cut," Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, told The Associated Press. "Health and Welfare would be a high priority."

Cameron, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, said he'd rather partially restore Department of Health and Welfare programs including Medicaid, the health insurance program for the poor and disabled.

That would have leveraged federal matching funds of roughly \$40 million, putting back about half the money the program is losing.

Instead, \$15 million is going to expand the grocery tax credit that's of only marginal benefit to most Idahoans

Following a 2008 legislative compromise, Idaho's grocery tax credit has been lifted to \$70 annually for low-income residents and \$50 for others. The 2011 Legislature wanted to delay expansion, citing uncertain budgets, but Otter's decision to boost the credit will provide an additional \$10 back on nearly everybody's income taxes.

Getting an extra 10 bucks is nice, but it pales in comparison with the needs of Medicaid recipients — Idaho's most vulnerable citizens — and providers.

Last session, the Legislature voted to reduce Medicaid spending by \$35 million, but the real cut was \$107 million because of a cost-sharing agreement between the federal government and the

House Minority Leader John Rusche, D-Lewiston, said institutionalizing those cuts when money is available will ripple throughout the system: higher prison costs, busier emergency rooms, more human pain.

"The consequence of that is we're going to pay more in (later) years," Rusche said.

Why would Otter do that when he had an alternative?



# Debbie and Frank's debt ceiling

ne of the most popular sayings among conservative politicians these days is: "If the government had to run its budget the way a family does, we'd see a lot of changes real quick." The government, though, does run its budget the way a lot of families do. Imagine if journalists covered the finances of households:

"As the deadline to approve an increase in the Peterson family debt limit approached without a compromise in sight, tensions rose Friday.

"Debbie and Frank Petersons' expenses have traditionally exceeded revenue, starting with a Caribbean honeymoon in 1991 that they paid for entirely on a Visa at 27.99 percent interest (it has now cost them \$72,000). Their debt limit has been increased 16 times since.

"Lately, each new authorization has come only after an extended battle. The Peterson family rules require both Debbie and Frank sign off on any increase.

"The situation is dire.



While the family's debt load is high, its payment record is sterling. Now, if the two do not take out a second mortgage by Aug. 2 and use the proceeds to pay existing debt, they would likely default, pulling down the whole house of cards.

"Both say the second mortgage is necessary, but Debbie won't sign until Frank agrees to spending cuts. Frank is willing to cut expenses (entirely different ones than his wife), but demands Debbie also get a job.

"'We don't have a revenue problem, we have a spending problem,' Debbie said. 'The man is dropping \$15,000 a year on golf memberships, greens fees, balls, tees, clubs and hideous pants. He's a 34 handicap. That's the kind of lowhanging fruit that we need to cut."'

"'Cutting golf is a jobs killer, and it's off the table,' says Frank, a consultant who claims links funding is repaid three times over by the clients he picks up there. Economists call this the 'golf multiplier'.

"'Debbie, by not working, imposes a double whammy.' Frank added. 'She's not bringing in the income we need, and she's left with endless free time to spend a fortune on shoes, dealing any hope of an economic revival a deadly blow.'

"Debbie argues that any money she earned would go to day care for the couple's three children. She says she cleans house, cooks meals and chauffeurs the kids 16 hours a day, and doesn't believe a just plan to balance the budget would be based on her going barefoot.

"Experts say neither fix would solve the family's issues, because over 85 percent of Peterson spending goes to 'entitlements:' their home, cars, camps and enrichment activities for the children, and vacations.

Neither side is willing to address those items, the 'third rail' of Peterson politics.

"Even if these expenses could be slashed, the Petersons face trouble down the road because crucial investments have been ignored.

Their retirement plan consists of lottery-tickets and prayer. College funds are nonexistent, and any hope the kids might attend on athletic or academic scholarships has been quashed by coaches and teachers.

"It's almost certain the two will agree to raise the limit. The most likely scenario involves Frank canceling a winter golf trip to Myrtle Beach and Debbie returning a pair of Manolo Blahnik pumps. But most financial advisers agree that without increases in revenue or cuts in the big-ticket items, the stage will merely be set for the confrontation to play out again next year. Eventually, the couple won't be able to maintain the debt they have, or find anyone to lend them more, and the whole situation will collapse."

That's what's going to happen with the federal government, too, not because our politicians are awful, but because they're just like us.

## WHO: Blood Tests for TB Are Unreliable

**GENEVA** • Widely used blood tests to detect tuberculosis are "dangerous" to patients because they are unreliable and can produce wrong results, the World Health Organization warned

Sunday.

The U.N. health agency said it will issue an unprecedented recommendation against using such tests for the infectious lung disease that affects some 14 million people worldwide. As much as a third of the world's population is thought to harbor the bacteria that causes TR

"The tests are not reliable and a waste of money and time, putting proper care at risk," said Mario Raviglione, the director of WHO's Stop TB department.

A review of the tests has shown that they produce too many false negative and false positive, according to WHO.

Raviglione told The Associated Press that the blood tests "are in fact dangerous to patients, since some cases will not be detected and some will be called TB when in fact they do not have it,"

The WHO guidance will be issued later this week. It is the first time that WHO has issued a "negative" policy, specifically counseling against the use of a particular method for diagnosing a disease.

The use of TB blood tests is common in developing countries such as India, where an estimated 3 million people are infected with the disease.

The Lancet medical journal reported in January that some of the blood testing kits used there are made in developed countries where such tests aren't licensed. They are ordered by doctors who receive greater commissions for the blood tests than for the older and more reliable sputum microscopy method, the journal reported.

"Many of these tests are used in the private-forprofit sector, charging poor people who do not understand the lack of value of the test," Raviglione said.

# Killing of Adviser Another Blow to Afghan President

KABUL, Afghanistan • Gunmen wearing explosives killed a close adviser to Afghan President Hamid Karzai and a member of parliament on Sunday in another insurgent strike against the Afghan leader's inner circle.

Jan Mohammed Khan was an adviser to Karzai on tribal issues and was close to the president, a fellow Pashtun.

His killing, which the Taliban claimed responsibility for, came less than a week after the assassination of Ahmed Wali Karzai, the president's half brother and one of the most powerful men in southern Afghanistan.

Two men wearing suicide bomb vests and armed with guns attacked Khan's home in the western Kabul district of Karti Char, said Defense Ministry official Gen. Zahir Wardak. Khan, who was governor of the Pashtundominated Uruzgan province in the south from 2002 until March 2006, was shot along with Uruzgan lawmaker Mohammed Ashim Watanwal, the official

Police killed one of the attackers before he could detonate his explosives, while the other was still barricaded inside the home, said the head of the Kabul police investigation unit, Mohammed Zahir. A member of the police's anti-terrorism unit was also killed, he added. The surviving guman was alone in the house, Zahir said.

The assassination came as international military forces handed over security for Bamiyan province to Afghan security forces, part of a transition process in which seven areas are to be handed

this month.

It also came one day before Gen. David Petraeus, the top NATO commander in Afghanistan, hands over responsibility for the military campaign in Afghanistan to his replacement, Lt. Gen.

over to Karzai's government

John Allen.

It was unclear how influential Khan was with Karzai, but he was thought to wield considerable influence in Uruzgan.

Taliban spokesman Zabiullah Mujahid claimed responsibility for the attack on behalf of the insurgent group.

Mujahid said the Taliban killed Khan because he was assisting coalition forces in carrying out night raids against Afghans.

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

# Japan Stuns U.S. Women to Win World Cup Final on PKs

Japan scored with 10 minutes left in regulation and 3 minutes remaining in extra time to force a shootout, then won the Women's World Cup when the United States missed its first three penalty shots.

FRANKFURT, Germany • Amid the sorrow that lingers throughout Japan, perhaps a little joy - courtesy of the determined women on its World Cup

They beat the Americans for the title in a riveting final Sunday night, 3-1 on penalty kicks, after coming from behind twice in a 2-2 tie. The star of the shootout was feisty goalkeeper Ayumi Kaihori, who made two brilliant saves in the shootout.

All tournament long the teammates poignantly reminded the world they were playing for their battered country, still reeling from the devastation of the March 11 earthquake and tsunami.

Did they ever.

They held the gleaming trophy high above their smiling faces as confetti swirled around the podium, flecking their hair with gold.

"Before we went to the match tonight we had some commentary on television and we heard comments on the situation in Japan," coach Norio Sasaki said. "We wanted to use this opportunity to thank the people back home for the support that has been given."

This was Japan's first appearance in the final of a major tournament, and they had not beaten the Americans in their first 25 meetings, including a pair of 2-0 losses in warm-up games a month before the World Cup. But the Nadeshiko pushed ahead, playing inspired soccer and hoping their success could provide even a small emotional lift to their nation, where nearly 23,000 people died or were reported missing.

## Voeckler Keeps Tour Lead, Doubts He'll Win

Thomas Voeckler was expected to lose the yellow jersey in the Pyrenees, but that didn't happen. Now, as the Tour de France heads to the Alps, many think he could hold the lead all the

MONTPELLIER, France (AP) • Thomas Voeckler stayed with the big Tour de France favorites in the mountains.

He's had the lead for six days. And no less a cycling connoisseur than Lance Armstrong thinks the Frenchman could be wearing the yellow jersey when the race ends July 24 in

"I will fight, of course, but I musn't be dishonest," Voeckler said after Sunday's flat Stage 15, won by British sprint star Mark Cavendish. "I consider that I have zero percent chance of winning the Tour de France."

For many French fans, Voeckler has rekindled cautious optimism that cycling's greatest prize could return home for the first time since 1985, the last of Bernard Hinault's five vic-

Voeckler's retort: Don't

expect me to do it. "I don't want to lie to the public," he said. "Maybe it would make for good publicity, I don't know, but it doesn't interest me. ... I'm not going to announce to the French people that 'I'm in yellow, I have a chance to

"Voeckler is in incredible form," said Contador, who has increasingly used mind games since winning the Tour in 2007 and the last two years. "He has a big lead. It will be hard to make that up."

Evans calls the overall standings "a bit strange."

"I think people still look at the Schleck brothers as favorites, but they're two minutes down. ... So it's still about Voeckler for now."

Armstrong knows the French rider well: He wrested the yellow jersey from Voeckler after his 10day run in it in the 2004 Tour. Armstrong tweeted that if Voeckler finished the stage with the favorites "then we have to say he can win the TdF." He did.

Then the seven-time Tour champion went fur-

"Final TT is 42km. He's French. It's the Tour de FRANCE," Armstrong wrote, referring to the final time trial. "He won't lose 2:06 in the final time trial ASSUMING... He keeps them close on Alpe d'Huez."

Fellow French riders who've seen Voeckler up close more recently are cautious, with one floating the more reasonable chance that he could become the first top-three French finisher since Richard Virenque was second in 1997.

"I think he can limit the damage in the big Alpine stages, but the last time trial ..." said Cofidis team rider Samuel Dumoulin. "A place in the top five is possible or even, in the right circumstances, a place on the podium."

Voeckler and his squad want to just race and see how things turn out, possibly as a way to manage expectations and sidestep the question: Can he really win?

"I don't answer this question, and I don't ask it myself," said Jean-Rene Bernardeau, manager of Voeckler's Europear squad. "Thomas will give everything he can in the next week."

On Sunday, Voeckler and the contenders cruised across after Cavendish in the mostly flat, 120-mile route through vineyards from Limoux to Montpellier that favored sprinters



# TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:

**In A.D. 64,** the Great Fire of Rome began.

In 1536, the English Parliament passed an act declaring the authority of the pope void in England.

**In 1610,** highly influential Italian baroque artist Michelangelo Merisi da Caravaggio died in Porto Ercole at age 38.

In 1792, American naval hero John Paul Jones died in Paris at age 45.

In 1911, actor Hume Cronyn was born in London, Ontario, Canada.

**In 1932,** the United States and Canada signed a treaty to develop the St. Lawrence Seaway.

In 1940, the Democratic national convention at Chicago Stadium nominated President Franklin D. Roosevelt for an unprecedented third term in office.

In 1947, President Harry S. Truman signed a Presidential Succession Act which placed the speaker of the House and the Senate president pro tempore next in the line of succession after the vice president.

In 1969, a car driven by Sen. Edward M. Kennedy (D-Mass.) plunged off a bridge on Chappaquiddick Island near Martha's Vineyard; his passenger, 28year-old Mary Jo Kopechne, drowned.

In 1981, six weeks after being paroled from prison, Henry Abbott, acclaimed for his book "In the Belly of the Beast," fatally stabbed waiter Richard Adan. (Abbott was convicted of manslaughter and sent back to prison; he later committed suicide.)

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush, en route to an economic summit in Italy, stopped over in Britain as he began his second trip to Europe in a month.

Five years ago: The Senate voted after two days of emotional debate to expand federal funding of embryonic stem cell research, sending the measure to President George W. Bush for a promised veto. A doctor and two nurses who'd labored at a floodedout New Orleans hospital in Hurricane Katrina's chaotic aftermath were arrested and accused of killing four trapped and desperately ill patients with injections of morphine and sedatives. (A grand jury later declined to indict Dr. Anna Pou and the

nurses.) One year ago: Pakistan and Afghanistan sealed a landmark trade deal in the presence of U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, who pushed the two neighbors to step up civilian cooperation and work together against al-Oaida and the Taliban. A suicide bomber struck antial-Qaida Sunni fighters waiting for paychecks southwest of Baghdad, killing 45. Gunmen fired indiscriminately into a crowd of mainly young people in a rented hall in Torreon, Mexico, killing 17 people. Louis Oosthuizen of South Africa shot a 1-under 71 for a seven-stroke victory at 16-under 272 in the British Open.

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bridge is full of technical jargon, but some terms are more abstruse than others. For example, does the Devil's Coup evoke a mental image of the play involved? I thought not.

However, there are some strategies whose names do conjure up the play that needs to be found, such as "avoidance play." Consider today's deal in four hearts on the lead of the spade king, where proper technique will see declarer producing two avoidance plays.

As declarer you can see that there is a risk of four losers (one in each major and two in clubs), but that you can almost insure your contract by keeping East off lead for the unwelcome club shift. Hence the need for the avoidance strategy.

You duck the top spade lead to prevent West from underleading his spade queen to East's jack. You win the spade continuation and cash the heart ace. The play is simple in the extreme if either defender shows out or produces the trump queen. Assuming that does not happen, you must next lead a trump and cover East's card. That might let West score a trick if he has the doubleton heart queen, whereupon he can hold you to 10 tricks by cashing the club ace. However, your contract is safe, and you have protected yourself against a layout like the one shown in the diagram, where playing a trump to the king would be fatal.
