# AfterIdaho Dental Cuts, the Pain Runs Deep

Idaho cut Medicaid-based dental service spending by \$1.7 million this year in a cost-saving reform package. In just the first month of the fiscal year, area dentists say they're already noticing the change.

Idaho's recent Medicaid coverage cuts are not going unnoticed.

As a pediatric dentist at Smiles 4 Kids in Twin Falls, Dr. Garth Stoddard has seen the effects of the Legislature's decision to trim state Medicaid spending first-hand.

"It's frustrating to have cuts and not have anyone seem interested in what these cuts will mean," he said.

The state's cost-saving Medicaid reform passed earlier this year left more than 42,000 Idahoans under Medicaid without non-emergency dental coverage. The dental program

cuts — part of larger, \$34 million reform-based savings — are estimated to save the state \$1.7 million from the general fund and \$3.9 million in fed-

The cuts will only affect adults over the age of 21. Children and pregnant women will continue to receive Medicaid-provided dental services.

Stoddard estimated the office sees 600-700 Medicaid patients a month. However, he said he expects that number to grow as a result of the Medicaid coverage cuts.

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Parking Lot **SAGLE (AP)** • A northern Idaho company that aims to transform U.S. highways into a vast energy-producing network is getting \$750,000 from the federal government for the next phase of its project: A solar parking lot capable of sending electricity

back to the power grid. Solar Roadways, of Sagle, announced Wednesday it won a Small Business Innovation Research grant for its project from the Federal Highway Administration.

Company founders Scott and Julie Brusaw plan to use the cash to create a prototype parking lot for testing. But their real dream is for a road system built of 12-foot-by-12-foot solar panels rather than traditional as-

Brusaw estimates the panels might cost three times more than asphalt but would produce electricity that could be sent back to the power grid, helping governments and private industry pay for them. He's hoping his work helps convince otherwise conservative, risk-averse road construction agencies that his panels are suitable for a rollout on an estimated 28,000 square miles of asphalt and

**ROGERSON** • Byrd Golay and Jack Oyler want a bridge over Salmon Falls Creek and they want everyone to know it.

southwest Twin Falls County

They've bent the governor's ears, pleaded their case to the Twin Falls County commissioners, brought out Twin Falls Republican Rep. Stephen Hartgen to mediate and more − all in an effort to preserve a bridge that just saw its 100th birthday and to open southwest Twin Falls County to more vehicles.

The Salmon Falls Dam, which acts as the creek's vehicle crossing from Rogerson, is visibly crumbling on the top. Its narrow right of way means only one vehicle can cross at a time and its strong curve means trailers are almost a no-go. Oyler and Golay worry that the China Mountain Wind Project proposed in the area – a project waiting for permitting from the U.S. Bureau of Land Management that won't start until summer 2013 at the earliest - will force an extra 750 vehicles onto the bridge, dramatically increasing the chance for an accident. Oyler, a former insurance adjuster, said he's had his fill of filing claims from those who misnavigate that pass.

Golay said he is serious enough about the project and wanting to protect the dam that he bought the

# Idaho Educators Learn New Skills at i-STEM

Science, math seminars in Twin Falls, Coeur d'Alene help Gem State educators bring new ideas to public school students.

Terry Jacobs spends a lot of her time washing test tubes.

She'll now have more hours for other pursuits after learning a cost-saving trick Wednesday – build the tubes for her students out of straws anchored upright in clay on a paper plate.

It was one extra lesson Jacobs took away from a training course about using the body to teach aspects of science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) disciplines. About 150 teachers from across southern Idaho have flocked to the College of Southern Idaho campus this week for a few creative lessons in the subjects.

The teaching seminar has been filled with lectures, hands-on experiments and classes that connect the subjects in imaginative ways.

On Wednesday, the kindergarten through 12th-grade teachers split into

tered to Suburban Propane of Twin Falls, left the west side of the roadway and struck a power pole's support wires at 8:29 a.m., blocking part of the twolane highway until about 12:30 p.m.

A small amount of propane reportedly leaked from the truck after the

Wolff was extricated from the vehicle but was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash, according to the sheriff's report. It remains unknown if drugs or alcohol were a factor in the crash.

"No one's having to reach into their own pocket to pay for it," Golay said after he and Oyler made their pitch to the Twin Falls Highway District on Wednesday.

The bridge nonetheless cost a pretty penny to build, and just how pretty is also a point of contention: Golay and Oyler say they have talked with local contractors and engineers

and concluded a cost of \$6 million; RES America says it would be closer to \$16 million to bridge the creek.

Getting a public-private bond to pay for a bridge might be tricky: The Twin Falls Highway District originally intended to use taxes brought in by the proposed wind farm to maintain the roads it is already responsible for, administrator Karen Dalton said.

"One of the reasons we

endorsed the wind farm project is for some funds to pay for the work out there," Dalton said.

District Commissioner Ron Pierce said his commission would consider the bridge idea when all three of its members were present; the chairman was Wednesday.

Regardless, Golay said he and Oyler will keep pursuing their project until it happens.

"I don't think we're going to let up," Golay told the highway commission when Pierce told him he wanted all three commissioners to look at the proposal. "We're going to keep pursuing this, but we want you guys to know what's going on because we're concerned. Our biggest concern is the dam. That should be your concern too."

concrete across the nation that get enough sun to produce electricity.

"It's a perfect time to do this, because our highway infrastructure is falling apart and our power infrastructure is falling apart," Scott Brusaw told The AP on Wednesday. "Both of them need to be rebuilt. This is a project that combines those two?"

The technology could be made more financially viable through creative financing that includes federal and state subsidies for alternative power, tax breaks and investor-owned utilities' need for green energy to satisfy requirements being passed individually by states like Washington, Oregon and California, he said.

Even so, transportation experts say convincing highway agencies and others reconcrete projects to shift gears will be among Solar Roadways' biggest chal-

Steve Albert, the director of the Western Transportation Institute at Montana State University in Bozeman, said he's familiar with Brusaw's work and is excited by its potential, but cautioned that highway and construction engineers are naturally risk-averse when adopting new materials that differ radically from tried-andtrue asphalt.

"The big issue is, local, state and federal organizations involved in transportation are very slow to change;" Albert said. "They're going to be real hesitant to try something that is a paradigm

Albert said he would welcome the opportunity to test Solar Roadways' panels at his school's transportation proving ground at a former eastern Montana Army Air sponsible for big asphalt and Corps base — once home to pilots training for battle in World War II.

Previously, the Idaho company received \$100,000 from the federal government for its startup project.

The company's structurally engineered panels, encased in sturdy, breakproof glass and connected by underground wires, include LED lights for road markers as well as heating elements. That's they wouldn't be subject to damaging freeze and thaw cycles and water penetration that leave traditional asphalt roads and concrete sidewalks cracked, potholed and broken, Brusaw said.

He estimates that one mile of solar roadway could eventually power as many as 500

The panels, which would include an embedded microprocessor for real-time control and communication with those controlling the power grid, would be designed to last at least 20

"And at the end of that 20 years, you don't throw it away, you refurbish it," Bru-He hopes that after com-

pleting this next phase — his company's contract with the federal highway agency is due to last two years — he'll be ready for commercial production of panels for parking lots, driveways, walkways and other surfaces in locations such as playgrounds, amusement parks, patios, bike paths and even airports. It's in these places where

the panels will have to pass muster before Solar Roadway — and its federal financiers in Washington - will be ready to move on to highways that will require extremely robust durability standards.

"They told us, 'We're not going to let you start slapping them down on highways," Brusaw said. "They said, 'Start with parking lots, learn your lessons and go from there."

different groups across campus to focus on subjects like wind energy and the human body.

Jacobs, a science teacher at the Idaho Science and Technology Charter School in Blackfoot, appreciated the handmade way to measure the acidity of liquids.

"Our funding has been cut too, so this would be way cheaper to buy 100 straws than more test tubes," she

I-STEM is in its second year of bringing teachers to North Idaho College in Coeur d' Alene and CSI to help them learn more about the STEM subjects and collaborate with other teachers.

The seminar started on Sunday and will end today.

Between the two campuses and another seminar that will take place next week in the Treasure Valley, around 400 teachers, administrators and presenters will take part in i-STEM.

Louis Nadelson, a researcher for i-STEM, said results from last year's testing of teachers before and after the seminar showed that educators gained significantly more confidence in teaching the STEM concepts. This year, he is interested in measuring how the seminar affects students in the classroom.

"How will we do that? It's a really good question because everyone has been battling how to measure students' knowledge," Nadelson said.

According to Change the Equation, a nonprofit that focuses on STEM concepts, only 38 percent of Idaho eighth-grade students scored at or above proficiency standards on national math scores in a 2011 report.

Nadelson said the STEM subjects are key to a student's future and making quality decisions in careers, lifestyles and beyond. For Mary Towler, a junior

high math teacher in Idaho Falls, the week has been a way to learn how to incorporate more science activities into her classroom so the two subjects resound.

"There have been a lot of hands-on opportunities to teach us how to combine science and math," she said. "The collaboration has been great."

• \$22,000 for safety gear for nine new on-call recruits for the Jerome Fire Department. The recruits are currently in training and will be on the job in August. The gear includes helmets, gloves, boots and uniforms.

• Renewing a \$17,869 agreement with Microsoft that covers the city's system of computers, servers and

# Shoshone Sorts Out Accommodating ITD Building

SHOSHONE • With the Idaho Transportation Department looking to construct a building in Shoshone, the City Council on Tuesday debated the blueprint's proposed water solution.

ITD's plans call for a sixinch pipe hookup to the city's sewer system, which is currently comprised of fourinch pipes. An upgrade to the sewer system could include larger pipes, but is not slated to begin yet.

"So the question is should we upgrade our line to meet their requirements?" City Clerk Mary Kay Bennett said.

City Maintenance Supervisor Aaron Aggeler said that aside from starting the upgrade early, there are other options to meet ITD's re-

"I talked to a few guys from the state and we had a few ideas on the table for them," Aggeler said.

The council supported a proposal to hook a four-inch pipe up to the city's water system and then connect that to a six-inch pipe that would lead to the building. Aggeler said the solution

would not affect water flow.

In other business, the city is considering purchasing a pickup for its maintenance crew, though some controversy remains over whether the new vehicle should have four- or two-wheel drive. Though the two-wheeldrive models staff looked at are about \$2,000 less than a four-wheel version, Aggeler said his crew prefers fourwheel drive for at least part of the year.

"I know if I have my choice, I'd have a four-wheel drive for the winter, but I won't complain one way or the other with a new truck,"

Councilman Dan Pierson said he didn't mind whether the city bought a four-wheel or two-wheel as long as officials are able to act fast enough.

"I don't have any issue with getting a four-wheel drive," Pierson said. "We just need to be able to jump on it when the prices come out."

The council also learned about a change affecting its next year's budget, in the midst of planning for it. Jerome County is raising the fees for Shoshone to contract with its building inspector, from \$20 per hour to \$25.01.

# Calif. Man Pleads Not **Guilty of Trafficking Pot**


One of three men accused of transporting marijuana through Idaho has pleaded not guilty to trafficking.

# Crapo & Co. May Have Solved Debt Limit Impasse

uesday was a very good day for Idaho Republican Sen. Mike Crapo.

President Obama, a Democrat, gave his endorsement to a deficit reduction plan offered by a bipartisan group of six senators that includes Crapo, urging congressional leaders to use that blueprint as the basis for a bill he can sign into law before the Aug. 2 debt limit deadline.

Obama acknowledged that his backing of the "Gang of Six" proposal "doesn't get us out of the House of Representatives" and "doesn't get us out of the Senate" and cautioned "there are still going to be a lot of difficult negotiations" before the plan could be approved.

But the president's backing seemed to be a potential breakthrough.

He called the plan "a very significant step" because "Democratic senators acknowledge that we've got to deal with our long-term debt problems that arise out of our various entitlement programs" and Republican senators "acknowledge that revenues will have to be part of a balanced package that makes sure that nobody is disproportionately hurt" from reducing future budget deficits.

The Gang of Six — Crapo; Sen. Tom Coburn, R-Okla.; Sen. Saxby Chambliss, R-Ga.; Sen. Mark Warner, D-Va.; Sen. Dick Durbin, D-Ill., and Sen. Kent Conrad, D-N.D. — is proposing draconian changes in the way the federal government does business. Their plan includes:

• Cutting more than \$4 trillion over the coming decade — including up to \$500 billion in cuts from federal health care programs.

• Reducing \$1 trillion tax breaks on mortgage interest, higher-cost health plans, charitable deductions, retirement savings like individual retirement accounts and tax-free savings accounts known as 401(k)s, and tax credits for families with children.

Capping Cabinet agency budgets for four years.
 Curbing Social Security benefits by moving to a

• Curbing Social Security benefits by moving to a lower inflation adjustment for annual cost-of-living updates.

• Lowering income tax rates to a bottom rate of 8-12 percent; a middle rate of 14-22 percent; and a top rate of 23-29 percent — to replace the current system that has a bottom rate of 10 percent, with five additional rates topping out at 35 percent. The corporate tax rate is cut from 35 percent to as low as

Overhauling programs like Medicare, Social Security and farm subsidies.

Conventional wisdom says a measure so dramatic could never pass Congress. But these are extraordinary times.

If the federal government defaults on its obligations on Aug. 2 because Congress fails to raise the debt ceiling, it will harm every American.

Crapo, a member of Obama's deficit reduction commission, has stayed the course on debt reduction, not only by sticking to his principles but by listening to what the Democrats have to say.


"I think we have the most powerful proposal on the table right now in terms of having the votes to get passed," he said Tuesday.

House Republicans have said they would not support any plan that increases taxes. But Crapo said the Gang of Six plan would reduce taxes by \$1.5 trillion. Reducing the rates while cutting out the tax breaks would increase federal revenues and balance the plan between spending and revenues enough to get Democrats on board.

"It will produce far more taxes by growing the economy," Crapo said.

It's an innovative and courageous plan. Let's hope there's enough courage in Congress to give it a fair hearing.

# Republicans Have Kicked Reagan to the Curb

fter he switched to the Republican Party in 1962, Ronald Reagan famously quipped: "I didn't leave the Democratic Party. The party left me."

Now, the Republican Party is doing the same thing to him — and Democrats are happy to take Reagan back.

At Tuesday morning's meeting of the House Democrats, caucus chairman John Larson rallied his colleagues for the day's debtlimit debate by playing an audio recording of the 40th president.

"Congress consistently brings the government to the edge of default before facing its responsibility," Reagan says in the clip. "This brinkmanship threatens the holders of government bonds and those who rely on Social Security and veterans benefits. Interest rates would skyrocket, instability would occur in financial markets,



and the federal deficit would soar. The United States has a special responsibility to itself and the world to meet its obligations."

"Kind of sums things up," Larson said, playing the same clip again at a news conference.

Nobody knows what Reagan, who died in 2004, would make of the current fight over the debt limit. But 100 years after Reagan's birth, it's clear that the Tea Party Republicans have little regard for the policies of the president they claim to ven-

Tea Party Republicans call a vote to raise the debt ceiling a threat to their very existence; Reagan presided over 18 increases in the debt ceiling during his presidencv.

Tea Party Republicans say they would sooner default on the national debt than raise taxes; Reagan agreed to raise taxes 11 times.

Tea Party Republicans, in "cut, cap and balance" legislation on the House floor Tuesday, voted to cut government spending permanently to 18 percent of gross domestic product; under Reagan, spending was as high as 23.5 percent and never below 21.3 percent of GDP.

That same legislation would take federal spending down to a level last seen in 1966, before Medicare was fully up and running; Reagan in 1988 signed a major expansion of Medicare.

But while Reagan nostalgia endures, a number of Republicans have begun to admit the obvious: The Gipper would no longer be welcome on the GOP team. Most recently, Rep. Duncan Hunter

Jr. of California called Reagan a "moderate former liberal...who would never be elected today in my opinion." This spring, Mike Huckabee judged that "Ronald Reagan would have a very difficult, if not impossible time being nominated in this atmosphere," pointing out that Reagan "raises taxes as governor, he made deals with Democrats, he compromised on things in order to move the ball down the field."

bate, a procession of Democrats — Vermont's Peter Welch, Maryland's Chris Van Hollen, New York's Paul Tonko, Texas' Sheila Jackson Lee and Gene Green — claimed Reagan's support for their position. ### Default Would Harm Homeowners, Businesses

t's easy to understand why the government will have more trouble borrowing if it fails to pay its debts, or even has a difficult time paying its debts. It's a bit harder to see why ordinary Americans, the city of Pittsburgh, hospitals in Iowa, and mediumsized corporations will have more trouble borrowing. But they will. And their trouble borrowing is the main channels through which a default, or even something too close to it for the market's comfort, could deal a body blow to the economy.

On Wednesday, Moody's warned it was putting the U.S. government credit rating on review for a downgrade. But they didn't stop there. Another 7,000 debt products that are "directly linked to the U.S. government or are otherwise vulnerable to sovereign risk" were also put on review for a possible downgrade. That's about \$130 billion worth of



debt. If America tumbles, so do they. But Moody's still wasn't done. An unknown amount of "indirectly linked" debt is also getting reviewed.

If America's credit rating falls, it's taking a lot more than just Treasury securities with it. It's going to take the whole credit market with it. Which, as you'll remember, is exactly how the subprime housing sector took the economy down in 2008.

The first to fall will be "directly linked" debt.
These are bonds that rely on payments from the federal government. Naomi Richman, a managing director in Moody's Public Finance division, puts it bluntly: "There are certain kinds of

"There are certain kinds of municipal bonds that are directly reliant on Treasury paying or some other direct payment," she says. "If those bonds don't receive their payment, they have no other source of revenue." So down they go.

Then there's the "indirectly linked" debt. That's debt from state government, local governments, hospitals, universities and other institutions that rely, in some way or another, on payments from the federal government. If Medicaid stops paying its bills, all the hospitals that rely on Medicaid's payments become less creditworthy. If we stop funding Pell grants, then all the universities that enroll students who pay using financial aid become less creditworthy. And since the federal government passes one-fifth of its revenues through to the states, and the states pass those revenues through to cities, if the federal government stops paying its bills, all states and all cities are suddenly in worse financial shape, which will make it harder for them to get loans.

And then there's everything else. Mortgages.
Credit cards. Loans that businesses take out to expand. Much of the debt in the American economy, and in fact globally, is "benchmarked" to Treasury debt.

This is how a default gets into the rest of the economy: It takes everything the financial markets thought they could know and rely on and upends it. It then shuts off credit, or makes it prohibitively expensive, for nearly every participant in the economy, from states and cities to hospitals and universities to homebuyers and credit-card applicants. That, in turn, freezes all of their activity, which destabilizes everyone who relies on them, which then destabilizes financial markets further, and so on.

He had a previous 2005 misdemeanor DUI conviction in Blaine County.

A driver with two prior DUI convictions within a 10-year span can be charged with a felony, under state law.



# **Idaho Lottery reports** record payout to state

BOISE (AP) • The Idaho Lottery says it's turning \$37 million over to the state this year for its annual profit payout.

That's the biggest payout since the Idaho Lottery started in 1989.

The proceeds of the Idaho Lottery are designated to be split evenly between the state Department of Education's public school building account and the state building fund, but three years ago state lawmakers enacted a five-year shift that also sends a portion of the proceeds to a fund that helps match school bond

Last year, the profit payout, or dividend, was \$36.5

The Spokesman-Review reports that Gov. C. L. "Butch" Otter welcomed the payout on Tuesday, saying every dollar that the lottery contributes is a dollar that doesn't have to come from taxpayers.

# Pocatello, Student Spar over Prayer in Public

**POCATELLO** (AP) Pocatello officials and the leader of an Idaho State University student organization for atheists and agnostics say they expect to reach an agreement soon on the city council's practice of starting meetings with prayer.

ISU student James Harless, the president and founder of the group Free Thinkers, Atheists and Agnostics for Religious Tolerance, filed a complaint with the city over the council's practice of starting every

meeting with an invocation that often comes in the form of a prayer.

Mayor Brian Blad told the Idaho State Journal that he and other city leaders believe the invocation is legal, and anyone in the community can offer to lead it. But Harless claimed legal opinions back his position, and both sides believe the issue can be resolved within a month.

"The council still agrees it's something the community wants to do. Anybody who would like to can step up and volunteer to do it?" Blad said. "We represent everybody and all. I don't care what religious belief you are, and if you aren't at all. As long as you want to do an uplifting thought, that's an invocation?

Even Harless has accepted an invitation to lead the invocation, Blad said.

But Harless stressed that while he accepted the city's gesture of good faith, he didn't invoke anything but the Constitution.

"I quoted some Founding

Fathers. I quoted some laws. I did bring to light that anybody who gets up and gives an invocation, the courts consider them to be speaking for the body which they are addressing," Harless said.

Monica Hopkins, executive director of the ACLU of Idaho, said her organization is investigating a complaint filed by Harless about the invocations. But she said that right now, the ACLU of Idaho is not seeking any action against Pocatello's city coun-



# Judge Rules Boise Must Release Records over Cleaning Dustup

**BOISE (AP)** • A judge has ordered the city of Boise to turn over documents related to the termination of a \$368,000 contract with a cleaning company.

Clearview Cleaning Services owner Sylvia Hampel filed a complaint in April against the city in Idaho's 4th District Court, claiming a contract for her company's services was canceled without explanation.

Boise city officials canceled the contract Feb. 28, a day before Hampel's company was scheduled to start cleaning city hall, public libraries, the police department and other facilities, the Idaho Statesman reported. Hampel sued city officials after they refused a public records request seeking more information about the contract termination.

The city claimed the documents were exempt from public disclosure and pertained to a "law enforcement investigation."

In a ruling issued Friday, 4th District Judge Thomas Neville said the emails in

question were not exempt. "The city has held out all 10 of these documents as in-

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vestigatory records of an active criminal investigation, and a review of the plain language of seven of the documents reveals that this is simply not the case," Neville wrote in his ruling.


The judge ordered the city to turn over the 10 emails to Hampel.

excavation crew recently made a startling discovery at the bottom of Pearl Harbor when it unearthed a skull that archeologists suspect is from a Japanese pilot who died in the historic attack on Dec. 7, 1941.

Archaeologist Jeff Fong of the Naval Facilities Engineering Command Pacific described the discovery to The Associated Press and the efforts under way to identify the skull. He said the early analysis has made him "75 percent sure" that the skull belongs to a Japanese

They also contacted local police and ruled out the possibility that it's from an active missing person case, said Denise Emsley, public affairs officer for the Naval Facilities **Engineering Command** Hawaii, which was being inundated with media calls Wednesday about the skull from international news organizations.

The items found with the skull, which was determined not to be from a Native Hawaiian, provided some clues: forks, scraps of metal and a Coca-Cola bottle Fong said researchers have determined was from the

# **GOP Presidential Candidates Join Twitter Debate**

**WASHINGTON** • You think presidential debates are challenging? Try limiting your answers to 140 characters.

Six Republican presidential hopefuls traded tweets in the first presidential debate conducted through Twitter on Wednesday, outlining their agendas across the popular social media service.

In brief responses that buzzed across cyberspace, the GOP field challenged President Barack Obama's approaches to the ongoing debate over the debt ceiling, job creation and the U.S. involvement in Libya. Republican candidates criticized Obama's handling of the economy and efforts to reform health care, while using the medium to share links to introductory videos and websites.

"Obama failed. With ur help we can return the people's voice to the WH, restore fiscal sanity & make Obama a 1 term president," said Minnesota Rep. Michele Bachmann, reflecting the clipped jargon commonly found on Twitter.


Obama held a town hall forum through Twitter earlier this month, answering questions from followers and promoting his agenda. Politicians and campaigns have taken to the social media service because it has become increasingly popular with voters and gives lawmakers the chance to connect directly with their constituents.

While televised debates can lead to longwinded answers, the Twitter forum places a premium on being terse. Asked whether a president can create jobs without expanding the role of the federal government, former Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum tweeted: "The federal govt kills jobs!" Former New Mexico Gov. Gary Johnson, responding to a question on whether the U.S. should have gone into Libya, tweeted: "Absolutely not" and then followed up: "Iraq, Afghanistan, Libya – Get out now!'

Addressing the economy, Georgia businessman Herman Cain told followers: "Government doesn't create jobs. Businesses create jobs. Government needs to get out the way."

Former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., offered a punchy economic plan: "Control spending. Put Americans back to work. Get back to a balanced budget as we did when I was Speaker." Gingrich was one of several candidates to post a link to his introductory video and later invited followers with more questions to go to his Google+ Hangout.

Michigan Rep. Thaddeus McCotter, who recently entered the Republican field, answered several questions through multiple tweets. Asked about the role of the tea party in next year's election, McCotter said its role "remains 2 be determined — not by its members — but by the GOP's actions."

WASHINGTON • Running out of time, President Barack Obama softened his stand and signaled Wednesday he would back a short-term deal to prevent a disastrous financial default on Aug. 2, but only if a larger and still elusive deficit-cutting agreement was essentially in place. He called lawmakers to the White House in a scramble to find enough votes from both Republicans and his own party.

The president, pushing for a big compromise that would cut the nation's budget deficit and extend the government's tapped-out borrowing power, had threatened to veto any stopgap expansion of the nation's debt limit. He even challenged House Majority Leader Eric Cantor not to call his bluff about it in one confrontational moment last week.

Obama's now-calibrated position, offered by spokesman Jay Carney, reflected the reality: that leaders are nearly out of time to head off unprecedented trouble. Carney said if a divided Congress and the White House can agree on a significant deal, Obama would accept a "very short-term extension" of the debt limit to let bigger legislation work its way through Congress.

Even a few days matters, given the stakes. The government will exhaust its ability to borrow money and pay its bills come Aug. 2, an outcome that could sink the country back into recession, halt Social Security checks and other payments, send interest rates higher and erode the creditworthiness of the richest nation on earth.

At the White House, Obama met privately with the Democratic leaders of the House and Senate, and then separately with House Speaker John Boehner and Cantor. All signs pointed to a legislative battle that would play out until the last minute.

The latest talks centered on a single but complex question: What will it take to muster enough votes from both parties to muscle legislation through the House and Senate and raise the national debt limit by the deadline. Congressional leaders say they want to prevent default, but they are far from agreed on

The heat dome forms when a high pressure system develops in the upper atmosphere, causing the air below it to sink and compress because there's more weight on top. That raises temperatures in the lower atmosphere, said Eli Jacks, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Silver Spring,

The dome of high pressure also pushes the jet stream and its drier, cooler air, farther north - it's now well into Canada — while hot, humid air from the Gulf of Mexico circulates clockwise around the dome, traveling farther inland than normal.

Combined with generally clear skies and the sun's higher summertime angle, "it gets really hot," Jacks said.

The cruel result: eye-popping heat index readings measuring temperature combined with humidity. In Newton, Iowa, it was 98 degrees Wednesday with a heat index that made it feel like 115. A day earlier, Newton's heat index hit 129 degrees.

In Indianapolis, the thermometer read 98 degrees but it felt like almost 114. Chicago's Midway Airport recorded a high of 99 degrees, which felt like 108. Humidity levels in some of the hottest cities ranged from 40 to 60 percent.

The formation of the dome also explains why conditions in, say, North Dakota aren't much different this week than in Houston. The big difference is that people in Houston are accustomed to hot weather. Those in the north are

"In places where the highest temperature you ever expect is in the 80s and you're at 102, there are big health concerns," because fewer people have air conditioning or fans, Jacks said. "Heat is the No. 1 killer out of all weather hazards?"

What's more, because of the humidity, even nighttime brings little relief.

Humidity makes the weather feel far hotter because the body, which cools itself by perspiring, has to work harder when the air is already moist.

"It's harder to cool down," said Jannie Ferrell, a National Weather Service meteorologist.

The sweltering weather served to make life even more uncomfortable for people displaced by the flooding of the Souris River in Minot, N.D., where about 150 people are living in a tent city outside the an ice rink.

"The RVs all have air conditioners, but the tent folks have been moving their tents around trying to find shade," said Chuck Emery, manager of the Maysa Arena. The rink's air-conditioned basement has been converted into a kennel for campers' pets.

Although heat domes are not rare, this one is unusually large and longlasting. It began three days ago and may persist for seven to 10 days in some locations, meteorologists said.

### Serbia

Serbia has been under huge pressure to bring war crime suspects to justice ever since the regime of Slobodan Milosevic fell in 2000.

While most defendants turned themselves in and some were arrested, the issue remained open until the capture of Hadzic and, only in May, Ratko Mladic, the Serb general accused of genocide in

As arresting ICTY fugitives was a key demand of the European Union to let the Balkan country progress on it membership application, the bloc's leaders quickly welcomed Hadzic's capture.

"This is a further important step for Serbia in realizing its European perspective and equally crucial for international justice," European Commission President Jose Manuel Barroso, EU President Herman Van Rompuy and EU foreign policy chief Catherine Ashton said in a joint statement.

Dutch Foreign Minister Uri Rosenthal — whose country pushed for a tough EU line on ICTY arrests - recognized that "Serbia has acted according to its responsibility;" but made no promises on agreeing to Serbia obtaining EU candidate status and starting accession

"The Netherlands will treat Serbia as any other country aspiring to become a member of the EU. That means it will have to fulfil the conditions with regard to good governance, economy and democracy," Rosenthal said in a statement.

**ICTY Chief Prosecutor** Serge Brammertz said Hadzic's arrest "is an important milestone in the tribunal's history," which will allow it to "complete it work."

The U.N. court was initially meant to complete all its trials by 2008, but due to late arrests and procedural delays it acknowledged in May that its ongoing court cases will run until mid-2014.

Mladic and Hadzic's trials are expected to further delay the ICTY's closure.

Hadzic was one of the leaders of a Serb insurgency in Croatia from 1991 to 1995, in the wake of the disintegration of the Yugoslav federation.

Riding a surge of nationalism in the late 1980s and early 1990s, he rose from working as a clerk in a factory warehouse to become prime minister and president of a selfproclaimed Serb republic in Croatia from 1991 to

During his tenure in office, ethnic Serbs, backed by Slobodan Milosevic's regime in Belgrade, gained control over one-third of Croatian territory.

The ICTY wants him on charges of crimes against humanity and violations of the laws or customs of war targeting non-Serbs in areas under Serb control in Croatia.

His indictment contains 14 counts, including persecution; extermination and murder; imprisonment, torture, inhumane acts and cruel treatment; deportation and forcible transfer; and wanton destruction, plunder of private and public property.

### END OF MINN SHUTDOWN BRINGS RELIEF, FRUSTRATION

Minnesota's state government shutdown ended Wednesday after 20 days, millions in lost revenue and frustration on the part of residents and politicians. The stoppage made the state a national example of political dysfunction, a small-scale mirror of the dispute in Washington over whether to raise the debt ceiling. But while federal lawmakers appeared close to a deal to slash spending, no such progress was made in Minnesota, where the budget was widely panned for just putting the problems off until later. - The Associated Press

On Wednesday, it had begun moving out of Texas and the Dakotas, headed east and northeast. By Thursday, temperatures in Washington were forecast to hit 100, and the heat could linger for days along the Atlantic seaboard.

Thunderstorms can develop around the perimeter of the dome — called the "ring of fire" — bringing temporary relief to some areas. But this dome is so large that the heat rebuilds quickly, said Kevin Birk, a National Weather Service meteorologist in Illinois.

No widespread deaths have been reported, but the heat sent dozens of people to hospitals and disrupted many routine activities.

As hot air blew over the cooler waters of Lake Michigan on Tuesday, a thick fog shrouded many of Chicago's beaches. Lifeguards had to turn away swimmers because they could not see beyond the water's edge.

A Veterans Affairs hospital in Fargo, N.D., had to reschedule more than 50 surgeries after cooling systems struggled to keep up with the weather. Some floors and other surfaces became wet, potentially compromising the sterile environment needed to operate.

In Detroit, more than 70 schools without air conditioning were to close Wednesday afternoon. Power outages and mechanical problems closed several oth-

Relief is on the way. Cooler air should begin moving into the Plains states this weekend, as a strong pool of air from the jet stream begins to push hot air out of the way in the Dakotas and into Minnesota before making its way east.

By Monday, temperatures in many places will drop into the mid-80s, although cities in the East could still be sweltering.

"This is really an exceptional event, I think it's fair to say ... in terms of scope and duration," Jacks said.

Back in Kansas City, the construction crew has been starting around 5:30 a.m. to get as much work done before the hottest hours of the day.

Crew member Dan Danuser said he guzzles plenty of water while on the job. When he gets home, he retreats to a dark room.

"It's hard with all the asphalt and concrete around," Danuser said. "It's different when you are out on grass and open areas. But when you get in town, there is no breeze, and the asphalt just makes everything hotter:"



His challenge with fellow Democrats is to persuade them to accept changes to the popular entitlement programs of Medicare and Social Security. With Republicans, Obama is slamming into opposition from conservatives who refuse to consider tax increases. Obama wants a mixed approach of higher taxes on the wealthy and spending cuts that share the pain.

"There is still time to do something significant," Carney said, urging compromise.

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid of Nevada said Tuesday that the head of the Congressional Budget Office has told him it could take the scorekeeping agency two weeks to come up with an official cost estimate for even a relatively modest package of spending cuts.

Parliamentary experts say that if the Senate takes up the debt limit measure this Saturday, it could take more than a week, until Monday, Aug. 1, to pass the measure through the Senate, give the House time to

consider it and make changes and then gain Senate approval one more time.

The Obama administration and Congress are also working on a backup plan to increase the debt limit if no big plan can be reached. It would allow Obama to raise the ceiling on his own unless overridden by Congress. Yet many House Republicans loathe that idea and have pledged to vote against it, raising doubts about how tenable even the fallback choice is.

That plan is the result of work by the Democratic and Republican leaders of the Senate, Reid of Nevada and Mitch McConnell of Kentucky.

Obama is trying to seize on momentum from a proposal from a bipartisan "Gang of Six" senators that would cut the deficit by almost \$4 trillion but lacks many specifics.

A House Democratic aide familiar with the meeting said House Democrats stand with Obama for a big bargain but without hurting seniors through cuts to Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid.

Keeping details tight as time grows sensitive, the White House provided no press coverage of either meeting.



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### LEOPARD INJURES 11 PEOPLE IN INDIA **BEFORE DYING**

KOLKATA, India • A leopard that mauled 11 people in a fierce showdown with Indian villagers has died of knife wounds after being captured.

The snarling adult, male leopard leapt at locals and forest officials as they tried to drive it into a wildlife sanctuary in West Bengal

Forest official Dharma Dev Rai says villagers used knives, stones and batons to beat back the cat. It injured six villagers, a policeman and four forest guards before being hit with a tranquilizer gun Tuesday.

The cat died within hours, and a post mortem is being conducted. It happened near Siliguri, about 373 miles (600 kilometers) from Kolkata.

The people are recovering from their injuries, mostly swipes from the cat's claws.

Leopards are protected in India though more are straying into villages for food.


### **Debt Concerns Overcome Boost** from Apple, Others

# REVILED BANK OF AMERICA TRIES TO CHANGE IMAGE

**HACKENSACK, N.J.** • Luis Morales, owner of Andre's Wine and Spirits in Leonia, N.J., opened a business checking account at the Bank of America branch across the street from the shop when he acquired the business three years ago. Last year he closed the account in a huff and switched to another bank.

"Too many fees," he said, explaining the move. An unexpected 15-cents per-transaction charge and an unexplained "point of service fee" were the deal breakers, Morales said.

Scott Rozman can sympathize. The Guttenberg, N.J., resident, a career consultant and life coach, said he is pulling his money out of the bank over what he calls a "sneaky" \$3 check-imaging fee that showed up on a statement earlier this year.

A teller told him he had to "opt out" of the service to avoid the fee that went into effect in January. "I said, 'I never opted in. Opt me out. Now?" The teller removed the fee, but the next month it was on his statement again, he said.

"They really want to nickel-and-

dime you to death," Rozman said. Fees and mortgage servicing dysfunction amid the nation's worst-ever foreclosure crisis have helped make the Charlotte, N.C.-based bank, the nation's largest, among the most reviled. The J.D. Power and Associates Customer Satisfaction Index ranked Bank of America 32nd among 33 banks this

year in the mid-Atlantic region.

A report earlier this month by the Atlantic magazine said Bank of America ranks among the "19 most-hated companies" based on a survey by the

American Customer Satisfaction Index. "When you have approximately 58

"They are among the leaders in eliminating what most consumer advocates believe to be the worst deposit account fee ever, the standard overdraft protection fee," he said. "They were horrible for many years, but we were glad they came along?

million consumer and small-business relationships, it's impossible to prevent all problems from happening," said spokesman T.J. Crawford. "That being said, it's our priority to resolve any issue to our customers' satisfaction while trying to prevent those issues from arising in the first place."

Crawford said customers receive fee disclosures when they open accounts and are notified in advance when fees change. Notices alerting customers of the \$3 check-imaging fee were sent in September, he said.

The company broke with the industry last year and voluntarily eliminated lucrative overdraft protection fees on debit card point-of-sale transactions, said consumer advocate Ed Mierzwinski, director of U.S. Public Interest Research Group. Such fees could add up to hundreds of dollars before customers knew they were over-

In an effort at greater customer outreach, the bank last week issued its first "Social Responsibility Report" that outlined 2010 accomplishments in community development lending, charitable giving and increased "fairness and transparency" in products and services.

Bank of America agreed in February to pay \$410 million to about 1 million consumers to settle complaints it manipulated the order of checks to maximize those penalty charges.

But Mierzwinski also said the company remains among the leaders in making it more difficult to avoid paying checking account fees.

Meanwhile, thousands of homeowners are suing Bank of America for improperly "robo-signing" foreclosure filings and for failing to modify loans under the rules set down by the federal government's Home Affordable Modification Program (HAMP).

Idaho author Margaret Fuller recently expanded her popular Sawtooth trails book, offering more options for hikers, bikers and horseback riders.

If you're looking for a place to hike without a lot of foot traffic, Margaret Fuller has a suggestion.

"The Sawtooth, White Cloud and Boulder Mountains are as beautiful as any other mountains in the U.S. and more beautiful than many, but they have far fewer people," she said. "The solitude lets visitors feel they are living long ago

and might see pioneers around the next bend in the trail"

The Weiser author offers more than just a handy newspaper quotation. She recently revised and updated her book "Trails of the Sawtooth and White Cloud Mountains," which offers a wealth of knowledge about the area's trailheads. salmon season is rising. The hatchery chinook sport harvest could approach the South Fork quota of 1,100 fish, according to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.


Like most of Idaho's chinook seasons, the South Fork season has been delayed by high stream flows. Historically, South Fork Salmon River salmon runs delayed by early season high flows enter the river very quickly once flows begin to drop.

Catch rates in the lower Salmon and Little Salmon rivers are high, and harvest could approach the 9,000 adult salmon quota.

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


**nswer:** The Bankruptcy Abuse Prevention and Consumer Protection Act of 2005 requires that in order to be a debtor in bankruptcy, an individual must first obtain a "pre-bankruptcy credit briefing" from a non-profit credit counseling agency approved for that purpose. Because there are no approved local agencies, the counseling may be obtained by telephone or online. Debtors are also required to complete a course in "personal financial management" in order to obtain a bankruptcy discharge. Debtors who do not complete the personal financial management course by the deadline risk having their case dismissed without a discharge. Whether the counseling and financial management requirements actually benefit debtors is an open question. By the time debtors reach my office, they are usually well past the point where credit counseling can help much. For my readers who recognize that they are in trouble financially, but wish to avoid a bankruptcy if possible, I suggest they call Consumer Credit Management Services at (208) 733-2227. Consumer Credit has provided credit counseling and debt management services on a non-profit basis in Twin Falls for around 40 years and has helped many people with their debts.



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t's often been said that "desperation is the father of inspiration." This was certainly the case with respect to the development of what many firearms enthusiasts consider to be the most effective combat and defensive pistol cartridge of all time: the .45 ACP (Automatic Colt Pistol). One hundred years after its introduction in the equally timeless Colt Automatic Pistol, its popularity and prowess continue to increase.

To get some sense of the social and political elements responsible for the genesis of this remarkable pistol round, let's turn back the clock to the year 1898.

In response to the public outcry over the abusive treatment of Cuban nationals by their Spanish-backed government, the U.S. Navy ordered the battleship U.S.S. Maine to steam to Cuba. Soon after its anchoring in Havana harbor, the battleship was rocked by a tremendous explosion. The stricken ship quickly sank to the bottom, taking many young American sailors with it. Smoldering tensions between the U.S. and Spain now erupted into full flame. With the battle cry, "Remember the Maine," echoing in their ears, the United States Congress declared war on

The Spanish-American

War, which proved to be a vicious, mostly one-sided campaign, concluded within the year. Through treaty negotiations, Puerto Rico, Guam and the Philippine Islands were ceded to the United States. In one fell swoop, the U.S. had exponentially increased its economic and strategic influence in the Caribbean and the Pacific.

U.S. occupational forces in the Philippines immediately came into conflict with a people hardened by decades of Western oppression. Hostilities between the two cultures quickly erupted into the PhilippineAmerican War, which raged from 1899 to 1902. The second phase of this conflict, known as the Moro Rebellion, waged on till 1913 and markedly demonstrated the inadequacy of American small arms.

Armed with modified sugarcane cutting machetes (bolas), limbs wrapped in leather, and fortified by hallucinogenic potions, the Moro warriors proved nearly unstoppable by the .38 Long Colt and .30-40 Kragwielding American troops. The search began immediately for a handgun cartridge "with greater stopping power and to be a caliber not less than .45."

When the Army's handgun selection trials began in 1906, two semi-automatic designs stood head-andshoulders above the pack: one by Savage and the John

Browning-designed Colt. Ordinance officials sent both designs back for reworking and refinement.

John's modified pistol and .45 ACP cartridge swept the renewed trials in 1911. On March 29, 1911, the Colt 1911 and its hefty .45 caliber cartridge were selected as the official U.S. sidearm. It served our fighting men during both World Wars and the Korean and Vietnam wars until it was replaced by the Nato-standarized Beretta M-9 pistol in the higher capacity 9mm Parabellum (Luger). Elite U.S. military units, police tactical teams, and the FBI continue to pack the manstopping 1911/.45ACP com-

Demand among civilian shooters has never been greater and numerous manufacturers produce specialty .45 ACP semiautos and revolvers and ultra-high performance ammunition to fuel the inexhaustible demands of the competitive and self-defense markets.

At 100, today's .45 ACP is more popular than ever. If you're in the market for a powerful, reliable handgun, you'd do well to consider one chambered in .45 ACP. There's still lots of kick left in the old war horse.

# **Anglers Report Good Catches**

Fishing has picked up on many south-central Idaho waters, including these:

Magic Reservoir boat anglers are reporting good success. Fish being caught here are regularly 15 inches or larger. Most fishermen are using worms, marshmallows PowerBait.

Anglers at Salmon Falls Reservoir report catching walleye, trout, bass, crappie and perch. Walleye and perch seem to be more plentiful between the Gravel Pit and Greys Landing, but trout are being across the reservoir. All kinds of bait and lures are being used.

Anglers report good trout fishing at Roseworth Reservoir; the same for Little Camas where the fish are between 12 and 17

inches. Some anglers have reported catching smallmouth bass. The reservoir is almost full and bluegreen algae is starting to show up.

Kokanee are the catch at Anderson Reservoir. Lately, 13-inch kokanee have been caught from the bank. Boat anglers are finding kokanee about 50to 60-feet deep and fishing seems to be better from about Fall Creek up.

For fly fishing, Silver Creek is the main fishery this spring. However, fish are rising to casts at the Big Wood River. The water is still running hard and wading is a challenge.

The South Fork of the Boise is still high.



moved the family to Boise. They relocated to Caldwell the next year, where Wayne practiced law. 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# Safety of Dissolvable Tobacco Disputed

Health officials fear products may initiate a new generation of smokers.

LOS ANGELES • Tobacco company rep David Howard waxes enthusiastic when he talks about a brand new product his employer, R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co., has developed: a pellet of finely cured tobacco, binders and flavoring that dissolves in the mouth in 10

Under test market in two U.S. cities - Denver and Charlotte, N.C. – Camel Orbs will join two dissolvable tobacco lozenges already on the market if it graduates to broader distribution. And Howard is optimistic it will.

"These products provide smokers with an option to enjoy the pleasure of nicotine without bothering others," Howard said. "No secondhand smoke. No spitting. No cigarette butt?'

Dissolvable tobacco consists of small pieces of compressed, finely ground tobacco powder, binders and flavorings that are shaped into pellets, sticks or strips. When placed in the mouth, they dissolve within minutes, providing a nicotine hit.

The tobacco industry says that the products contain far fewer cancer-causing chemicals such as tobacco-specific nitrosamines and are a "harm reduction" strategy that, like electronic cigarettes, might help people turn to less risky tobacco habits or eventually quit smoking.

But public health officials and anti-smoking advocates fear that the products will help initiate a new generation of smokers. The flavoring and packaging appeal to children, they argue, and teenagers will gravitate toward a product they can easily hide.

On Thursday, the Food and Drug Administration will take up the issue with an advisory committee hearing on the effect of dissolvable tobacco products on public health.

"Tobacco companies are always one step ahead of the sheriff;" said Sen. Sherrod Brown, D-Ohio, one of several senators who asked the FDA to review the products. "They have found ways to evade the rules and regulations and public health warnings?'

The first dissolvable tobacco product, a lozenge called Ariva, debuted in 2001. But in the last year the number of products on sale or in test marketing has jumped and major tobacco companies have entered the arena. Reynolds is markettesting two other products, Camel Strips and Camel Sticks, in addition to Camel Orbs. Philip Morris is test marketing a dissolvable to-

At the same time, use of smokeless tobacco - snuff, chew, electronic cigarettes and, increasingly, dissolvable tobacco — is growing at a rate of about 7 percent per year, according to a 2010 report by Research and Markets, an international market research and data company.

In some states, use of smokeless tobacco products among men is almost as high as the national prevalence of cigarette smoking among adults, which stands at 20.8 percent, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Across the U.S., 7 percent of U.S. adult males use smokeless tobacco, according to the CDC.

Use among kids is growing too. According to a 2010 survey by Monitoring the Future, an annual nationwide study funded by the National Institute on Drug Abuse, 8.5 percent of 12thgraders said they'd used a smokeless tobacco product in the last 30 days compared with 6.7 percent in

"Because it has a mild taste, we're concerned dissolvable tobacco will be a starter product for kids," said Matthew Myers, president of the Washingtonbased anti-smoking group Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids. "Traditionally, girls have not used smokeless tobacco products. But this product does not have a substantial smell or require spitting. There is a real concern that this product will appeal to adolescent girls, particularly those concerned about weight."

Public health officials also have expressed concern about the effect on teeth and gums of holding the product in the mouth for 10 to 20 minutes and the effect on the stomach of swallowing the tobacco chemicals.

Few studies have been done specifically on the potential health risks of dissolvable tobacco.


One study, published in March in the Journal of Agricultural and Food Chemistry, tested four dissolvable tobacco products, three of which were being test-marketed, and found they contained mostly nicotine and a variety of flavorings, sweeteners and binders. Some products contained coumarin, which has been banned as a flavoring agent in foods because of its link to liver damage, said study author John V. Goodpaster, an assistant professor in the forensic and investigative sciences program at Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis.

Studies on other smokeless tobacco products show they are considerably less risky than smoking cigarettes and cigars, which raises the risk of lung and a variety of other cancers, respiratory illness and heart disease.

MADISON, Wis. • A firstgrader at Crestwood Elementary School once offered Rosie the Crossing Guard a chicken drumstick from her lunch because she thought Rosie stayed outside the entire day.

For multiple generations of Crestwood students it was a universal idea – morning and afternoon, rain or shine, snow or heat, for 47 years, Rosie was always there to shepherd students safely across Old Sauk Road.

But after retiring at the end of the school year for health reasons, Rose Hiestand passed away Saturday after a short bout with cancer. She was 83.

Decked in a blaze orange vest with a stop sign in one hand and a cheery de-

meanor, Hiestand crossed nearly 10,000 children during her career, according to Madison police crossing guard supervisor Patti Knoche. Driving gave Hiestand motion sickness, as did taxis, subways and other public transit where she grew up in Yonkers, N.Y., her daughter Rose Mary Belk said.

One of nine children, Hiestand dropped out of school in ninth grade to work at a laundromat and help her family pay the bills. She met her husband of 65 years, Gene Hiestand, in New York while he was serving in the Navy. They moved back to his hometown and raised a daughter down the road from Highlands Mendota Beach Elementary.

When there was an opening for a crossing guard, Hiestand took the job because it was close enough to walk. It wasn't long before neighbors started bringing her coffee.

"I don't think she planned on being a crossing guard for that many years," Belk said. "But she just liked the people and the kids so much she just kept going and going and go-



# THE INS AND OUTS OF TITLE IX

Ten days after 100 Idaho high schools were named in a federal Title IX complaint, here's a broader look at the legislation each is accused of violating.

It's been 10 days since 100 Idaho high schools were named in federal complaints about violating Title IX legislation regarding gender discrimination.

But being accused of Title IX violations and being found out of Title IX compliance are different mat-

From academics to athletics, anywhere federal education funding goes, the complexities of Title IX follow. Here are the nuts and bolts of Title IX.

What exactly is Title IX? Title IX is short for Title

IX of the Education Amendments of 1972. Title IX addresses gender discrimination in schools that receive any kind of federal funding. Gender-specific programs like Boys State and Girls State are exempt.

### How does a school be-

come Title IX compliant? There is a three-prong test for Title IX compliance. Schools must prove they are complying in at least one of

- the following areas: Providing athletic participation opportunities that are substantially proportionate to the student enrollment:
- Demonstrating a continual expansion of athletic

opportunities for the underrepresented gender;

• Full and effective accommodation of the interest and ability of underrepresented gender.

### What do sports have to do with Title IX?

A: Sports are one of the most common points of emphasis in Title IX disputes. The law is designed to ensure equal opportunity for male and female athletes. Criteria used by the U.S. Department of Education in evaluating athletic

- departments include: Accommodation of the interests and abilities of
- members of both genders; • Provision of equipment, supplies and travel
- allowance: • Game and practice
- Publicity about avail-

able programs.

# NFL Retirees Sue League Over Concussions

LOS ANGELES (AP) • Mark Duper, Ottis Anderson and 73 other former players sued the National Football League, claiming it concealed information about the danger of concussions for decades.

The negligence, fraud and liability suit was filed Tuesday in Los Angeles Superior Court. Many players' wives also are plaintiffs.

The suit alleges the NFL knew as early as the 1920s of the harmful effects of concussions but concealed them from coaches, trainers, players and the public until June 2010. It also names helmetmaker Riddell, the NFL's of-

ficial helmet supplier.

It seeks unspecified dam-"We have not seen the

complaint but would vigorously contest any claims of this kind," NFL spokesman Greg Aiello said in a state-Riddell spokeswoman

Laura Moore said the company had not yet reviewed the complaint and its policy was to not comment on pending litigation.

Concussions are movements of the brain inside the skull from an impact. The former players contend that they suffered repeated concussions from hits and tackles during their years in the NFL that caused brain damage. They contend the injuries left them with problems such as dementia, headaches, memory loss, blurred vision, sleeplessness and ringing in the ears. Some claim the injuries caused depression, anxiety, "explosive mood changes," poor judg-

ment and substance abuse. According to the suit, the NFL knew for decades that multiple blows to the head can cause long-term brain injury but fraudulently denied it, even as independent evidence showed that players were at risk.

The Mild Traumatic Brain

Injury Committee was established by the NFL in 1994 to study the risk of longterm brain injury to players. The suit contends that the committee published "false, distorted and deceiving" findings that the risk was minimal in order to deceive Congress, players and the public.

The NFL only warned active players in June 2010 of the risks associated with multiple concussions and Riddell failed to warn active players until around the same time, the suit claims. The NFL has never warned past players, according to the

NFL players didn't vote Wednesday on a full proposal to settle the league's labor dispute, citing several outstanding issues, a person familiar with the negotiations told The Associated

The person said there was agreement among representatives of all 32 clubs on what items needed to be resolved before any offer would be accepted. A second person, also speaking on condition of anonymity because the talks are supposed to be secret, said those players gave what was termed "conditional approval" of the proposal – as it stood Wednesday.

"We still have a lot of work to do," said Pro Bowl offensive lineman Tyson Clabo, who played for the Atlanta Falcons last season.

The meeting at the NFL Players Association headquarters lasted nearly 10 hours and included the group's executive committee and the team reps.

In Atlanta, where the owners' labor committee met, general counsel Jeff Pash said the sides would talk through the night in hopes of having a final agreement ready to go today.

"It's obviously a complicated agreement, but I think both sides are at the point where they can close, they should close, and we should be in a position to take votes," Pash, the owners' lead negotiator, said following a five-hour session at a hotel near Atlanta's airport.

Commissioner Roger Goodell joined the meeting of nine of the 10 members of the labor committee, which hoped to recommend a finalized proposal to all club owners, who are

due there today. Remaining issues are believed to include how to set aside three pending court cases: The players' antitrust lawsuit against the NFL in federal court in Minnesota; the TV networks case, in which players accused owners of setting up \$4 billion in "lockout insurance," money that the league would receive even if there were no games played in 2011; and a collusion case, in which players said owners conspired to restrict salaries last offseason.

"I think that's the healthy outcome: to have a complete, comprehensive, global agreement that settles all the disputes and puts us on a path where we are going forward together as business partners, the way it should be, rather that going forward with one hand and fighting over something that should

Asked whether owners would consider approving an agreement today, Carolina Panthers owner Jerry Richardson smiled and said: "I'm always ready for a vote."

New England Patriots owner Robert Kraft, who is on the labor committee, wasn't expected to participate because his wife, Myra, died Wednesday, at age 68, after a battle with cancer.

Earlier Wednesday, NFLPA president Kevin Mawae cautioned not to assume the lockout will be over by the weekend, saying that his group was "not tied" to a deadline for getting a deal done in the next 24 hours.

"We want to go back to work, but we will not agree to a deal unless it's the best deal for the players," Mawae said in the morning.

"Our goal today is to see what is on the table and discuss outlying issues," he said. "The players are not tied to a July 21 timeline. Our timeline is that which gives us the best deal for the players - today, tomorrow or whatever it might be."

If the four-month lockout - the NFL's first work stoppage since 1987 - is going to end in time to keep the preseason completely intact, the players and owners almost certainly must ratify the deal today. The St. Louis Rams and Chicago Bears are scheduled to open the preseason Aug. 7 in the Hall of Fame game.

Asked whether that exhibition game will be played, Pash replied: "We'll see. It's getting tight. It would be pretty challenging. That's one of the things we'll have to focus on."

If owners do vote today, at least 24 would need to OK the deal. If it's passed by both sides, team executives would be schooled later today and Friday in Atlanta in the guidelines and how to apply them; topics would include the 2011 NFL calendar, rookie salary system and new free agency rules.

Ten players - including quarterbacks Tom Brady, Peyton Manning and Drew Brees, Chargers receiver Vincent Jackson and Patriots guard Logan Mankins filed their antitrust suit March 11. That was the day the country's most popular sports league was thrown into limbo: Negotiations broke off, the old collective bargaining agreement expired, and the union said it was dissolving itself and becoming a trade association. That meant players no longer were protected under labor law but could pursue their cause in court under antitrust law. The owners locked out

players hours later.

"Obviously, there's the litigation with the named plaintiffs, and I am not familiar with the whole legal part of it.... But at the end of the day," Mawae said, "the deal we are working on is the deal that's best for all the players in the NFL, and not just four guys."



# Norwegian Wins Stage 17, Voeckler **Retains Tour Lead**

The race leader lost 27 seconds to all his rivals after driving off the course during a fast descent. He leads by 1 minute, 18 seconds.

PINEROLO, Italy (AP) • Edvald Boasson Hagen of Norway won the 17th stage of the Tour de France on Wednesday, the first of three days in the Alps, while Thomas Voeckler retained the yellow jersey but lost time after riding off course on the final descent.

Defending champion Alberto Contador made repeated attempts to get away from his rivals, but was caught on each occasion. He finished in the same time as Cadel Evans. the Schleck brothers and Samuel Sanchez.

Voeckler lost 27 seconds and is 1 minute, 18 seconds ahead of Evans. The 2010 Giro d'Italia champion Ivan Basso also lost time.

Boasson Hagen completed the 111 miles across the Alps from Gap to the Italian town of Pinerolo in 4 hours, 18 minutes. Bauke Mollema of the Netherlands was second, 40 seconds back.

Voeckler went too fast on a hairpin turn, skidded onto the shoulder of the forested Alpine road, then raced back to try to catch Contador and Sanchez after they sped by.

"It's a pity, because I saw that Contador, Evans and the Schlecks finished together. If I'd taken fewer risks, I would have finished with them," he

The high-speed pursuit led to another mishap in which he jumped a curb, rolled into a car park and almost crashed.

"It was a fraction of a sec-

ond, but it seemed like an eternity. I closed my eyes and lifted the front wheel and when I opened my eyes, I was still on the bike," Voeckler said. "So I said, 'OK, here we go: U-turn and back to the race."

Contador was not downhearted by failing to get away. "I felt good, and you've got

to try," he said. He didn't want to talk about the stages left. Boasson Hagen recorded

his second stage win and the fourth overall for Norway in this year's race. "It was very difficult yes-

terday, and today I was able to do better," Boasson Hagen said. "I felt I was capable of attacking on the last climb." Mollema was second after

Frenchman Jonathan Hivert crashed on the perilous final descent of the Pramartino. Hivert got back on his bike and came in ninth.

Boasson Hagen praised the large contingent of Norwegian fans that has been supporting him and Hushovd throughout the race.

"It's really great to see all the Norwegian flags and Norwegian people around the course. It gives some extra power."

Evans becomes more of a favorite for the title with every day he keeps his nearly twominutes edge over Contador.

"With shadows and stuff it was real hard to see. Voeckler ran off the road in front of me twice I think. It makes you take things more cautiously. You don't ever want to lose time to anyone," the Australian said. "I've got a good advantage over Alberto now, but Alberto has shown in years gone by what he can do when he's really at his top?

The announcement on his website only deepened the mystery around Woods, who has fallen to No. 20 in the world and hasn't played since May because of injuries to his left leg that first were described as "minor."

In the 20 months since Woods was caught having multiple extramarital affairs, he has lost four major sponsors, changed swing coaches, was divorced from his wife and now has axed his caddie.

"I want to express my deepest gratitude to Stevie for all his help, but I think it's time for a change," Woods said. "Stevie is an outstand-

ing caddie and a friend and has been instrumental in many of my accomplishments. I wish him great success in the future."

Woods did not say who would replace Williams one of only two caddies he has employed full-time.

"Needless to say, this came as a shock," Williams said in a statement on his website.


Williams worked the last three tournaments for Adam Scott. That included the U.S. Open and British Open,

To prevent the fishery from exceeding the non-tribal harvest share of adult adipose fin-clipped hatchery Chinook salmon, the Bureau of Fisheries recommends the entire South Fork Salmon Fishery-Lower section must be closed to fishing for Chinook salmon. To provide anglers continued opportunity to harvest hatchery jack salmon the Bureau of Fisheries recommends that the South Fork Salmon River Upper section remain open to the retention of adipose fin-clipped jack Chinook salmon. Natural origin Chinook salmon that are listed under the Federal Endangered Species Act and spawn in the mainstem South Fork Salmon River must transit the lower section of the fishery to reach spawning areas but fewer than half transit the upper section of the fishery. The Bureau of Fisheries recommends that jacks-only fishery be constrained to the upper section to reduce incidental fishery related mortalities among the mainstem South

Pursuant to his authority under Idaho Code Section 36-106(e)(6) (A), the Idaho Department of Fish and Game Director hereby closes the waters of mainstem South Fork Salmon River downstream of a posted boundary about one mile upstream of Fourmile Campground to salmon fishing effective at the close of legal fishing hours on July 20, 2011. 





Try to familiarize yourself with your opponents' carding methods. Nevena Senior did so to her advantage on this deal.

The popular contract was three no-trump declared by South, most commonly on the lead of a top heart and continuation. Most declarers correctly won the third heart, then took the spade finesse. Next, they played the club ace and a club to the king, but when it turned out that West had the guarded club jack, they could make no more than eight tricks.

Senior, too, ducked the first two hearts and won the third, reading the suit to be 4-4 when East encouraged at the first trick but had not produced the jack. She continued with the spade finesse, and next cashed the ace, in case East had started with the doubleton king. When West discarded a diamond on the second spade, declarer paused to regroup.

Had West held five diamonds, she felt that it was at least possible that he would have preferred that attack initially, so she placed him with four of these as well. That left four spaces in West's hand, which had to be filled by clubs.

So, Senior cashed a top club in hand to cater for a singleton jack with East, then successfully finessed dummy's club eight. After cashing the king, she returned to her hand with the diamond ace and ran the clubs for nine tricks and her contract, as well as most of the matchpoints.




