Use It or Not, It'll Cost You

Gooding's irrigation system fee is a sore spot among some residents, including 77-year-old Mary Fullmer, who calls the fee a burden for those who don't or can't use the system.

GOODING • Sitting below Mary Fullmer's front lawn is a money pit.

It's not a home improvement project gone wrong or a continuously broken water pipe. Instead, the Gooding resident says she's being forced to throw money at an irrigation system she can't use.

The city of Gooding charges its residents an annual \$104 irrigation system fee, even to those who don't or can't use the sys-

The irrigation system has been around for years, as well as the fees, said Gooding Mayor Duke Morton. The amount collected from the fees goes back to fix and repair the irrigation system.

"It's an old and broken system," he said. "But we can't stop charging people. I even have to pay the fee, and I don't use the irrigation system either."

Fullmer, 77, lives alone and on a fixed income. Pipes connecting the irrigation system to her property were cemented off when she moved into her house six years ago. She pays the fee every year, but said she struggles to make ends meet.

She argues the city shouldn't

charge her anymore.

"During the summer I live off of credit cards because I'm not working," Fullmer, a school bus driver, said. "I'm already forced to pay flood insurance that I'm pretty sure I'll never use."

Paying the fee would be less of a burden if she actually saw the money applied to repairing city infrastructure or even the sidewalks outside her house, Fullmer

If Labrador, 43, wins 2012 re-election to Congress, that also could be a powerful springboard to the governor's seat in Boise.

"I hear more people talking about Raul Labrador than Tom Luna," said former state Senate Majority Leader Rod Beck, the conservative leader who helped shutter Idaho's GOP primary to all but registered party members earlier this year.

In a recent interview with The Associated Press, Labrador said he's concentrating on issues like the current debate over the debt ceiling and getting the federal deficit under control, declining to discuss 2014.

Foes of Luna's reforms were successful in getting a repeal initiative on the November 2012 ballot, which some see as a setback for him. But if the measures survive – and there's plenty to suggest they will, given Luna's 21 percentage victory over his Democratic rival last November — that could be viewed as a barometer on the superintendent's future political fortunes.

Opponents insist Luna misled voters about what he was planning for schools when he said nothing about his reform plan before November's election.

With the May 2014 primary still almost 3 years away, others are also in the mix to lead Idaho, should Otter exit.

When Brad Little was named lieutenant governor two years ago, some thought Otter was elevating the Emmett rancher's profile for a statewide race.

Attorney General Lawrence Wasden is also mentioned in the calculus of those who could seek higher office.

But Idaho's current GOP landscape would appear to favor a conservative Republican like a Luna or Labrador, since the closed primary likely means only registered Republicans will participate. Democrats and GOP members agree that perceived moderates like Little or Wasden may struggle in that environment.

In an interview in his 2nd floor Capitol offices, Little said in most places "I'd probably be way over on the right?'

Still, his record includes potential liabilities.

He backed Otter's failed gas tax and registration fee hikes in 2009, while Labrador made a name for himself helping kill them. And as a state senator, Little voted against putting a constitutional amendment to ban gay marriage on the ballot, before finally supporting the measure in 2006.

Little in 2008 was the lone lawmaker representing Canyon County to vote to require car emissions tests to protect air quality - tests that are hated among many rural southwestern Idaho residents as intrusion of big government.

Wasden's record also shows him siding with more moderate Idaho Republi-

Back in 2008, for exam-

ple, he favored giving former Republican Party Chairman Kirk Sullivan another term, while Luna joined Labrador in helping oust Sullivan because he opposed closing the GOP primary.

And on the Idaho Land Board, where Wasden sits with Luna, the attorney general is sticking by his vote last August to buy a storage business to boost investment returns for schools. Luna, who originally favored the deal, has switched sides, called his vote a mistake and sided with conservatives who insist the purchase put government in competition

with the private sector.

But just how those stances would impact his 2014 candidate appeal remains to be seen, the threeterm AG said.

"In three years, a lot of stuff can happen," he said. "Am I considering my options? Yes. A race for governor is one of those options. There are others?'

Luna and Labrador have similarities.

They're members of The Church of Jesus Christ Latter-day Saints, as is Wasden. As kids, Labrador and Luna spent time in Las Vegas, Nev., Labrador as the Puerto Rican-born son of a single mom, Luna a poor Hispanic kid whose family lived for

nearly a year in a tent. Luna and Labrador are also friends, important because Labrador has deferred to allies in the past. The immigration lawyer only entered the 2010 congressional race after another buddy, state Rep. Ken Roberts of Donnelly, exited.

So if Luna jumped in, Labrador might be reluctant to challenge him.

If Luna does decide to run for governor, there's another reason not to bet against him.

Though he admits to not having a runner's physique, Luna has completed three marathons – to stay fit and ward off the heart trouble that killed his father, he said.

But there's another, deeper motivation behind why Luna has again and again finished these 26.2 mile slogs on painful knees, one that provides important insight into the personal ambition that's propelled him from being a homeless kid in a tent in the Nevada desert to Idaho's top education job.

"People don't think I can," Luna said.

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N. Idaho Republicans **Get No-Confidence Vote**

SANDPOINT (AP) • The Region 1 Republican Central Committee in northern Idaho has approved a no-confidence vote against Sens. Shawn Keough of Sandpoint and Joyce Broadsword of

The committee approved the vote last week following redistricting proposals submitted this month by the two lawmakers.

"As elected state officials, your actions have demonstrated that you do not understand, care about, or are acting in a manner that is consistent in the best interests of your constituents," Region 1 RCC Chairman John Cross said in the letter of censure obtained by the Bonner County Daily Bee. "Instead, (you) have used your political positions to further personal agendas and promote the best interests of the opposing political party in direct opposition to the Republican ideals we hold dearly?

Keough and Broadsword said their goal in submitting a redistricting plan was to keep small cities together so residents could go to the polls with friends and neighbors.

"I'm saddened that some of our fellow Republicans need to curtail our freedom of speech and further saddened that they would condemn us for representing our district," said Keough. "It definitely

came as a surprise to us."

Donna Capurso, chair of the Boundary County Republican Central Committee, introduced the motion, which also contended Keough and Broadsword tried to cause electoral runoffs between conservative legislators to further a progressive agen-

The redistricting plan submitted by the lawmakers "was an improper action as it usurped the authority of the Redistricting Commission by interfering with their ability to provide credible, relevant and appropriate information to the public as they see fit," said Capurso in a press release Saturday.

Researchers from Two Universities to Study Wildfires He said he wants to find

LEWISTON (AP) • Researchers at the University of Idaho and Washington State University plan to use a \$1.2 million grant from NASA to study how extreme wildfires affect people and the environment, and how to make communities safer.

"The Forest Service spends more than half of its total budget fighting fires, and a lot of the reason for that expenditure is the risk to human communities, said Matt Carroll, a professor in the WSU Department of Natural Resource Sciences. "If we can make these communities more fire adapted, not only would it help the communities it

would save huge amounts of money:"

He said fighting large fires is becoming more difficult as people continue moving into forested areas.

Alistair Smith, a forestry professor at the UI College of Natural Resources and leader of the research project, said about 20 researchers will take part in the project.

"It's going to be very good for both the University of Idaho and Washington State University," he told the Lewiston Tribune.

Researchers said the trend of large-scale fires in the western United States is likely to continue as the climate warms and people move into forested areas. Researchers plan to examine how those large fires change vegetation, water quality and wildlife habitat. They will also examine how communities respond to fires, partly by looking at past fires.

"Can we start getting better educated guesses 100 and 50 years out, both socially and in terms of the vegetation, what is going to happen?" said Smith.

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USFS to 9th Circuit: Tahoe Logging Won't **Hurt Rare Bird**

RENO, Nev. • The U.S. Forest Service says it is not required to make sure there's enough black-backed woodpeckers to keep the rare bird from going locally extinct at Lake Tahoe as a result of a logging operation conservationists are trying to stop.

Lawyers for the agency told the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals in a new filing late Friday they don't believe the woodpecker will be harmed by the logging set to begin this week at the Angora fire site where 3,000 acres of national forest and 250 homes burned in 2007.

But they said that contrary to claims by environmentalists' seeking an emergency injunction, the Forest Service has no legal mandate to insure the viability of the bird's population within the 147,000-acre forest it manages around Lake Tahoe.



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

Montana Hospice Foundation Spends Little on Hospice Care

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP) • Internal Revenue Service filings show that the Hospice Care Foundation spent, on average, just 3 percent of its budget on building a hospice home in Missoula during the past four years.

At least two foundation board members have resigned in the last month, citing a failure of the nonprofit to disperse funds, The Missoulian reported.

"I would like to remind all that a nonprofit has to be geared toward raising funds and helping others, not merely holding an annual ball and draining old donations to fund operations," wrote Edward Guay in a June 28 resignation letter from the board of

The foundation puts on the Hospice Ball, which has gone on for three decades. But Tim Garden, board president, said the organization itself and the current board are fairly new, and they're working on giving money back to the communi-

Chief operating officer Kevi Berger said the foundation plans to delay work on the

hospice home but is close to giving out grants to hospice

"What I'm seeing is progress," Garden said. "I'm seeing some progress, and that's good. Does there need to be more done? You bet. But you've got to start somewhere?

According to the federal tax filings, the foundation in 2007, 2008 and 2009 spent only about 3 percent of its budget on programs to fulfill its mission. The board treasurer told the newspaper that 2010 showed similar num-

Charity Navigator, which evaluates charities, said nonprofits should be spending at least 75 percent of their budgets on programs and services.

"As a donor, I'd want to know why there's been no spending on programs," said Sandra Miniutti of Charity Navigator. "If that's intentional, then what are the plans? If they're really just saving money for the future, what are the concrete plans for all that money they have

raised?" The organization said most nonprofits it reviews spend just 15 percent on administration and 10 percent on fundraising, with the remaining 75 percent on programs and services.

In 2009, the Hospice Care Foundation spent 86 percent on administration, 9 percent on fundraising, and 5 percent on programs.

That year, according to its filing with the IRS, the Hospice Care Foundation's total revenue was \$78,694 and total expenses were \$79,917. Salaries accounted for \$59,354, while \$3,668 went "toward the establishment of a hospice facility?' The report said no money went for "bereavement support services."

The foundation's fund balance at the end of 2009 was \$921,139. Jim McNay, board treasurer, said the saved donations will be returned to the community in the form of grants, about \$35,000 in the first year.

"The \$35,000 actually puts us in a net negative cash flow, but that's OK because from my point of view, we're changing our direction to provide hospice care," McNay

said. "So it's OK to spend what we would call our corpus on granting because we haven't done that for a while."

Miniutti said most of the foundation's assets come from the Hospice Ball, and almost none from individual donors. She noted the foundation's assets don't show much growth over time.

"I think that combined with the fact that no money is really being spent on programs raises a red flag and makes you wonder what this group is all about," she said.

Berger said the nonprofit isn't a legal foundation required to give out a certain portion of the money it takes

But she said that if the organization is "diligently working to effectively reach" its goals, then it is meeting nonprofit standards.

"We have (documents) that show we've had multiple meetings, we've had conferences, we've had strategic (planning) trainings, we've had professional assistance. We have been actively working on a portion of what we were given the ability to do?

Idaho Couple Uses Sonar to Find Body

FAIRBANKS, Alaska • Within fifteen minutes of starting their search, two volunteers from Idaho spotted the body of a drowning victim in Harding Lake that had eluded searchers for almost two weeks. The secret to their success: an underwater imaging technology these volunteers have brought twice to Harding Lake and four times to Alaska.

The technology is called side-scanning sonar. It's not a lifesaving tool, but can help give closure to families of drowning victims classified as "missing."

In Alaska, it is not unusual for the bodies of drowning victims to go unrecovered. Out of 162 recreational boating deaths in the last decade, bodies were not recovered in at least 34 cases, according to the State Office of Boating.

Gene and Sandy Ralston, the couple who found the body of Patrick Hunsberger last week, have been volunteering to recover bodies since 1983 when they helped find a body on the surface of a lake and received a moving thank you note from the family of the victim.

"That really brought it home," Gene said. "It's the kind of thing you don't think is ever going to happen to your family. When it does, people are left helpless. But there are resources available?"

They were inspired to work as volunteers after seeing a company without any real expertise extort as much as \$30,000 from a grieving family for a body search. The Ralstons ask for their travel costs to be reimbursed, but do not charge for their time or the use of their equipment. Some law enforcement agencies in the Lower 48 have side-scanning sonar, but the equipment generally has to stay in the jurisdiction it was purchased in.

Now semi-retired from their work as environmental scientists, the Ralstons bought their side-scanning sonar in 2001 and have gone to assist between eight and 18 body recoveries per year in recent years. Their work has included helping the FBI find homicide victims and long road trips to help with body recoveries in Juneau and Newfoundland, Canada.

The side-scanning sonar device looks like a 6-footlong torpedo that maps the area below as it drags behind a boat. It works best in calm water because movement distorts the image. The device costs about \$22,000 for a standard model, but a customized one like the Ralstons use is more expensive. In 2005, the Ralstons added another vehicle, a remoteoperated submarine that is about the size of a desk chair and can recover bodies in addition to finding them.

The Ralstons came to Fairbanks in 2007 when the Tanana Chiefs Conference requested help finding three young people who died in a canoe accident on Harding Lake. It took more than a month to find all three. After the recovery, the couple named their boat after Kathy Garrigan, the final victim to be found.

This year's search also came at the request of the Tanana Chiefs. Patrick Hunsberger, 25, had been missing since he went jetskiing by himself July 4 and never returned.

A volunteer effort had been searching every day since three days after the accident when an official search was called off.

The instantaneous success of the side-scanning sonar after the Ralstons arrived was something of a fluke. The Ralstons had planned to spend a month searching the six square miles of lake but happened to see Hunsberger's body in their first sweep across the lake. They passed directly over it in their second sweep.

"We were speechless because it was so quick;" Gene Ralston said. "There must have been some divine guidance?"

By another coincidence, they found Hunsberger's body about 300 feet away from where they found Travis Alexander, another victim of the 2007 canoe accident.

A memorial service for Hunsberger was held Friday.

After the recovery, the Ralsons did a demonstration of their tools in the Lathrop High School pool for Tanana Chiefs Conference and Alaska State Troopers.

Of the two technologies, the remote-operated vehicle has better prospects as a law enforcement tool because it does not require as much training to use and might prove useful in uncovering evidence in places where it's too dangerous to send a diver, trooper spokeswoman Beth Ipsen said. But it's tough to say whether troopers would eventually move to request funding for either.

Biologists Look at Putting Bighorns in Bridgers

BOZEMAN, Mont. (AP) • Wildlife officials are considering reintroducing bighorn sheep into the Bridger Mountains in southwestern Montana.

"I think it's time to go. At least to have the discussion," Dan Vermillion, a state Fish, Wildlife and Parks commissioner and Livingston fishing guide, said during the panel's meeting Thurs-

Officials said any introduction of bighorns is years away and would happen only after public comments and an environmental analysis.

Fish, Wildlife and Parks in 2009 adopted a statewide bighorn sheep management plan that included identifying areas where bighorns could be reintroduced.

"If we're trying to recover bighorn sheep statewide, looking at unused habitat that is good potential habitat is a good start to statewide recovery," said Julie Cunningham, a biologist with Fish, Wildlife and Parks.

 $She \ said \ the \ Middle \ Cottonwood \ and$ Ross Peak areas could support between 118 and 352 sheep.

"We would love to see them back in the Bridgers," said Vito Quatraro, president of the Headwaters Sportsmen Association. "There's some habitat there, obviously there's some concerns that have to be addressed. It's got to be a collaborative effort between FWP and landowners and the sportsmen."

One concern is that putting bighorns in the area could harm a trophy mule deer population that has been in decline.

Fish, Wildlife and Parks in the mid-1990s was going to put sheep in the area, But just before that was to happen, a herd of sheep near Dillon contracted a deadly disease.

Kurt Alt, an agency biologist who led that effort, said Fish, Wildlife and Parks then implemented more stringent rules for transplanting bighorns in areas where they could roam onto private

"We'll dig up flow lines all the time and replace them. It's an ongoing battle because it's an old field. That's where most of the revenue goes," Pierce said.

A fix needs to come in the form of standardized federal regulations, Epstein said. Even though some states, such as Alaska, have their own flow line regulations, there needs to be federal legislation that establishes requirements for preventing corrosion, repairing defects and detecting leaks, she said.

The Department of Transportation's Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Administration, which regulates other pipelines, should also regulate these small lines, she said.

"A lot of the same things that cause problems with transmission lines are in these flow lines," she said.

BLM and tribal officials are still trying to find out why the company didn't report the spill. Company officials previously said they originally believed the leak was small and contained to the immediate area.

Once the spill reached the waters of Cut Bank Creek, the company had 24 hours to report it. But even if the spill was small and contained to the oil field, the company was still required to notify BLM within 15 days, Judice said.

Neither the tribe nor BLM was ever notified by the company. "We are very concerned

that an action that transpired back in June was not reported within the required time frame," Judice said. "We are awaiting a response ... to give a detailed accounting of what happened."

Pierce said he could not answer why the spill was not reported.

Day Chief said the tribe makes periodic inspections of the FX Energy oil field, but the spill happened in a remote area that hadn't by visited by him or his inspector in months.

BYU Professor Researches Missing T in Utah Speech

PROVO, Utah (AP) • A Brigham Young University linguistics professor is researching the case of the missing T.

The unusual pronunciation of certain words like "mountain;" "kitten;" and "button" isn't unique to Utah, said professor David Eddington, but it is certainly far more prevalent here than in other Western states.

And young Utah females are particularly prone to not pronounce the "T;" Eddington told the Deseret News.

"We found cases of it in New York, Michigan, Southern California," Eddington said. "But in Utah what we found is that generally it's younger peo-

ple and especially women?" For his research, Eddington recorded 57 volunteers reading the same

words. What he found was that if someone had lived at least two-thirds of their life in Utah, they were much more likely to

speak with the unusual pronunciation. "Every place I've been, people say 'kitten,'" Eddington said. "And then I listened more (in Utah) and started to

hear 'KIH-un!" Eddington said that males are far less likely than females to lose the T in their

pronunciations, but he thinks men will

likely follow suit in the future. "Linguists have found that young women are always, or generally, on the forefront of linguistic changes," Eddington said.

And of course, he noted, no one can say the pronunciation is wrong since language is always evolving, and young people have always had their own way of talking.

"You go back to Roman times," Eddington said, "and you hear Romans talking about how the young people don't speak correctly."

Rink Owner Pushed Kids Away as Gunfire Erupted


GRAND PRAIRIE, Texas (AP) • The owner of a Texas skating rink said Sunday that he pushed children out of harm's way when a parent suddenly opened fire on his estranged wife and her relatives at their son's birthday

The Saturday night shootings that left six dead, including the gunman, lasted just moments, said Forum Roller World owner Walt Hedrick.

"Kids were having fun and all of a sudden: 'Bang! Bang! Bang!" Hedrick said. "It was out of the clear blue.... I didn't know what was going on."

The gunman, whose son was celebrating his 11th birthday, ordered the children to leave the snack area before he began shooting, said Grand Prairie detective John Brimmer. No children were killed, but four people were wounded in addition to the adults who died, he said.

Police said Tan Do, 35, of Grand Prairie and his wife were having ongoing marriage problems that investigators believe led to the shootings about 7 p.m. Saturday at the skating rink in Grand Prairie,

NO DEBT DEAL YET: **GOP, DEMOCRATS** READY RIVAL PLANS

WASHINGTON • With bipartisan debt-limit talks deadlocked, House Republicans and Senate Democrats readied rival emergency fallback plans Sunday in hopes of reassuring world financial markets the U.S. government will avoid an unprecedented default.

In a conference call, Speaker John Boehner summoned his conservative rank and file to swing behind a "new measure" that could clear both houses of Congress.

"It won't be 'Cut, Cap and Balance' as we passed it," he said, referring to a measure killed in the Senate on Friday — that would have required spending cuts of an estimated \$6 trillion as well as congressional approval of a constitutional balanced budget amendment for ratification by the states.

The new approach is "going to require some of you to make some sacrifices," he added, according to a person familiar with his remarks.

Separately, President Barack Obama invited the two top congressional Democrats to a highly unusual White House meeting Sunday

FIRST DAY GAY MARRIAGE IS LEGAL IN NEW YORK **BRINGS OUT PROTESTERS**

ALBANY, N.Y. • Thousands of opponents of gay marriage took to the streets in loud and sometimes tense protests Sunday, the first day that legal same-sex weddings were performed.

The National Organization for Marriage held rallies in New York City, Albany, Rochester and Buffalo, saying Gov. Andrew Cuomo and lawmakers redefined marriage without giving voters a chance to weigh-in, as they have in other states. Protesters chanted "Let the People Vote!" at rallies across the state.

A rally in New York City that started with several hundred people crowding the street across from Cuomo's Manhattan office quickly swelled to thousands of people out in loud opposition to the new law.

N. KOREAN OFFICIAL TO GO TO U.S. FOR NUKE TALKS

BALI, Indonesia • A senior North Korean official will visit the United States this week to discuss the possible resumption of longstalled international negotiations on ending Pyongyang's nuclear programs, U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton said Sunday.

The news that diplomats could be close to reviving six-nation disarmament talks that broke off in 2008 comes after more than a year of animosity and high tension between the rival Koreas and raises hopes in a region

on edge. Two attacks Seoul blames on Pyongyang last year killed 50 South Koreans and led to threats of war.

AROUND THE WORLD

Clinton's invitation for North Korean Vice Foreign Minister Kim Kye Gwan to visit New York follows a crucial meeting Friday between nuclear negotiators from North and South Korea on the sidelines of a regional forum of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations, in Bali. It was the first such meeting since disarmament talks collapsed in 2008, and the envoys agreed to work toward the resumption of six-nation negotiations.

AFGHAN INSURGENTS HANG 8-YEAR-OLD BOY

KABUL, Afghanistan • Insurgents in southern Afghanistan hanged an 8-year-old boy six days after they abducted him, the Afghan government said Sunday.

The boy's captors had demanded that his father, a police officer, supply them with a police vehicle and he refused, said a statement from President Hamid Karzai's office. The militants hanged the boy Friday in Helmand province's Gereshk district.

"President Karzai both strongly condemns this act and rejects it as a brutal and cowardly crime that is not acceptable in any religion or culture," the statement said. It referred to the killers as "terrorists," but did not say if they belonged to the Taliban or another of the insurgent movements fighting foreign forces and their Afghan allies.

ANCIENT BELL FOUND IN JERUSALEM SEWER

JERUSALEM • A tiny golden bell pulled after 2,000 years from an ancient sewer beneath the Old City of Jerusalem was shown Sunday by Israeli archaeologists, who hailed it as a rare find.

The orb half an inch in diameter has a small loop that appears to have been used to sew it as an ornament onto the clothes of a wealthy resident of the city two millennia ago, archaeologists said.

When Eli Shukron of the Israel Antiquities Authority shook it Sunday, the faint metallic sound was something between a clink and a rattle.

The bell's owner likely "walked in the street, and somehow the golden bell fell from his garment into the drainage channel," Shukron said.

The relic was found last week. Shukron said it was the only such bell to be found in Jerusalem from the Second Temple period, and as such was a "very rare" find. The Second Temple stood from about 515 B.C. until A.D. 70.

Twenty Injured in Two Separate Seattle Shootings

SEATTLE • At least 20 people were injured in two separate, unrelated shootings that took place within hours of each other in Seattle suburbs over the weekend, authorities said.

In the first, 13 people were wounded after a fight erupt ed into gunfire at a lowrider car show late Saturday afternoon in Kent, about 20 miles south of Seattle, sending spectators ducking for cover and merchants hiding in stores.

About 10 hours later, in the neighboring city of Auburn, police said a jealous husband walked into a casino nightclub with a handgun and opened fire on his estranged wife, her male companion and her two sisters as they danced on the floor. Three others were

wounded before the suspect was tackled by a casino security guard as he fled the nightclub, authorities said.

"It's highly unusual that we have multiple shootings, especially this many shootings so close together," said Cmdr. Mike Hirman with the Auburn, Wash., police department. "They're not related, that's for sure, and I don't have any explanation."

No deaths have been reported in either shooting.

"What's unusual is that so many got shot and nobody got killed," said Ralph Fascitelli, board president of Washington CeaseFire, a statewide group that seeks to reduce gun violence. "To have two things back to back, it's a quirk, but I'm not surprised. It's a wakeup call to officials to do more about gun violence in this state. It's very lucky that nobody got

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) • A grizzly bear that was with her cub attacked several teens participating in a survival skills course in remote wilderness in Alaska, badly mauling two in the group, state troopers said Sunday.

The teens told troopers the attack occurred as they were lined up in front of each other for a river









Time for Burley to Get Serious Again About a New Airport

oes Burley need a new airport? Some residents say no.

But those same folks might be surprised: In the 12 months that ended in November, the old aerodrome — wedged between the Snake River and U.S. Highway 30 on Burley's east end — had 27,750 flights. That works out to 76 sor-

Seventy-nine aircraft are based at the 201-acre airport — a lot for a city of 10,345.

It's long past time to move the facility someplace

But just where that someplace might be has been the source of one of Mini-Cassia's longest-running political dramas.

The first effort to relocate the airport was a joint venture by several cities, Cassia County and Minidoka County. It fell apart in 1997 after disagreements brought the negotiations to an end.

Attend the Open House

An open house to explore possible new sites for the Burley airport will be held today at Burley City Hall, 1401 Overland Ave., from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Drop in anytime during the session to learn about the site selection process and provide comments.

Burley approached the project solo the second time, but was thwarted in 2008 when the Heyburn City Council annexed part of a property selected as the best site for the facility, located northwest of Interstate 84 and Idaho Highway 27.

> Blincoe Farms Inc., which owned a portion of the selected site, resisted Burley's plans to buy the land and asked Heyburn to annex it, preventing Burley from moving forward with the project.

Now the city is about to try again, and just in time. Since

2008 several major employers have opened up shop in Mini-Cassia and other are looking to do so. Despite the recession, the number of jobs in Cassia and Minidoka counties has grown by 37 percent in

And although there is no commercial passenger service at the Burley airport, companies are using

Burley will host an open house today to gather initial public comment on relocating the airport.

Mike Pepper, owner of KMP Planning, said the facility is out of compliance with Federal Aviation Administration standards for both the types of aircraft now using it, along with those that may in the fu-

The current airport can't expand because it is surrounded by state highways, the Snake River and commercial buildings.

Pepper says no potential sites have yet been identified. After today's meeting, an advisory team will start that process. A preferred site will eventually be chosen and presented to the Burley City Council in the spring of 2012.

Each development phase of the new airport, including site location, planning, engineering and environmental studies, land acquisition, and construction, is expected to take at least a year.

This is an important issue even for the majority of Cassia and Minidoka county residents who never go to the airport because the present site can't be used indefinitely. And the economic consequences of closing or scaling back use of the airport which, like Hailey's Friedman Memorial Airport would eventually happen for safety reasons if nothing is done — are serious.

Anti-Murdoch Media's Hands Aren't Clean Either

lee is not just an American TV show, it is also the emotion many people feel and express toward the trouble Rupert Murdoch's News Corp is having, since they consider Murdoch's properties a blight on their formerly pristine media landscape.

There are two strains running through the phone-hacking scandal that monopolizes much of the media attention in the UK. One is the attitude of the mainstream media types who are frustrated by the success of Murdoch properties, most notably Fox News Channel in America. They see Murdoch's troubles with the now shuttered News of the World tabloid as an opportunity to destroy the Murdoch empire, which they have been unable to do by competing with it.

The second strain is legal. After the apparent suicide of a former News of the World reporter and unprecedented resignations of high-ranking officers at



Scotland Yard, whose allegedly paid connections with News of the World are at the center of parliamentary and police inquiries, Labor and Tory politicians are positioning themselves for major political advan-

U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder confirmed the Justice Department is looking into allegations that employees of News International, a division of News Corp, hacked, or attempted to hack, into the phones of 9/11 victims. Several Democratic members of Congress and Rep. Peter King, R-NY, have called for such an investigation.

The response to this by the British and American mainstream media reeks of hypocrisy. Whatever one thinks of the morality of paying for news stories, the British press, under Labor

and Tory governments, have been doing it for years. Fleet Street was built on cash for gossip. American media are slightly more sophisticated in pursuing "exclusive" sto-

There are other forms of "payment" U.S. media make to politicians - mostly liberals — with whom they agree. They repeat the talking points of Democrats or refuse to challenge statements that are factually incorrect. They frequently fawn over people they like and challenge those they don't like. Call it a political version of an "in-kind" contribution.

People who broke the law by hacking into phones should be punished, but this is more about liberal attempts to destroy Fox News, which liberals hate because it communicates ideas, issues and opinions that were mostly unavailable, or ignored, until the network launched in 1996. Fox News has not been implicated in the British phone hacking, but that won't stop its enemies from trying to make

the connection. MSNBC's Martin Bashir compared Murdoch to Jack Abramoff and mobster James

"Whitey" Bulger. There were similar over-the-top comments by other broadcast "journalists."

People can debate Fox's slogan "we report, you decide," but the liberal mantra might more accurately be stated, "we distort, we decide."

The faux "virgins" in big media like to portray themselves as "above" the standards and practices of media owned by Murdoch, but past behavior exposes them as two-faced. Examples: In 2003, The New York Times reported that, "Michael Jackson struck a deal with CBS to be paid in effect an additional \$1 million for both an entertainment special ... and his interview on '60 Minutes '... part of yearlong negotiations." The news magazine denied paying Jackson for the interview, but an associate of Jackson's said at the time the deal included the '60 Minutes' appearance.

According to one of Casey Anthony's attorneys, ABC News paid \$200,000 for photos of her dead daughter, Caylee. CBS News got off with a mere \$20,000 "licensing fee"



Norway Suspect: Serbia Bombing 'Tipped the Scales'

OSLO, Norway • Anders Behring Breivik said he was a boy when his life's path began to turn. It was during the first Gulf War, when a Muslim friend cheered at reports of missile attacks against American forces.

"I was completely ignorant at the time and apolitical but his total lack of respect for my culture (and Western culture in general) actually sparked my interest and passion for it," the suspect in Norway's bombing and mass shooting wrote in his 1,500-page manifesto.

The 32-year-old Norwe-gian said it was the NATO bombing of Serbia in 1999 that "tipped the scales" for him because he sympathized with Serbia's crackdown on ethnic Albanian Muslims in Kosovo. A year later he said he realized that what he called the "Islamization of Europe" couldn't be stopped by peaceful means.

Police and Breivik's lawyer says he confessed to, but denied criminal responsibility for, Friday's bombing at government headquarters in Oslo and the mass shooting later that day at an island summer camp organized by the youth wing of the ruling Labor Party. At least 93 people were killed in the attacks.

Breivik's manifesto chronicled events that deepened his contempt for Muslims and "Marxists" he blamed for making Europe multicultural. He suggested his friends didn't even know what he was up to, and comments from several people who had contact with the quiet blond man indicate he

Norway Suspect Borrowed from Unabomber's Manifesto

DENVER (AP) • Parts of the manifesto written by the suspect in Norway's terrorist attack were taken almost word for word from the writings of "Unabomber" Ted Kaczynski.

The passages copied by Anders Behring Breivik appear in the first few pages of Kaczynski's manifesto. Breivik changed a Kaczynski screed on leftism and what he considered to be leftists' "feelings of inferiority" — mainly by substituting the words "multiculturalism" or "cultural Marxism" for "leftism."

For instance, Kaczynski wrote: "One of the most widespread manifestations of the craziness of our world is leftism, so a discussion of the psychology of leftism can serve as an introduction to the discussion of the problems of modern society in general."

Breivik's manifesto reads: "One of the most widespread manifestations of the craziness of our world is multiculturalism, so a discussion of the psychology of multiculturalists can serve as an introduction to the discussion of the problems of Western Europe in general."

Breivik did not cite Kaczynski, though he did for many other people whose writings he used in his 1,500-page

He used at least one portion verbatim: "Feminists are desperately anxious to prove that women are as strong and capable as men. Clearly they are nagged by a fear that women may NOT be as strong and as capable as men."

Breivik is accused of killing at least 93 people Friday by setting off an explosion in downtown Oslo and then gunning down young campers on a nearby island. Kaczynski is serving a life sentence in federal prison in Colorado for mail bombs that killed three people and injured 23 others across the U.S. from the 1970s to the 1990s.

From September 2009 through October 2010, Breivik posted more than 70 times on Dokument.no, a Norwegian site with critical views on Islam and immigration. In one comment, he entertained the idea of a European Tea Party movement.

In December of 2009, Breivik showed up at a meeting organized by the website's staff.

"He was a bit strange. As one could see from his postings, he had obviously read a lot but not really digesting it," said Hans Rustad, the editor of the website.

But Rustad said he "hadn't the faintest idea" about Breivik's murderous plans.

"Other people have the same views on the Net and they don't go out and become mass murderers. So how can you tell?" Rustad told The Associated Press.

In the document Breivik styles himself as a Christian conservative, patriot and nationalist. He looks down on neo-Nazis as "under-privileged racist skinheads with a short temper."

STRONG QUAKE JOLTS JAPAN

NEW YORK (AP) • The U.S. Geological Survey is reporting that another strong earthquake has jolted northeastern Japan, the same region devastated by March's massive quake and tsunami. There are no immediate reports of injuries or damage, and no tsunami warning is in effect.

The U.S.G.S. says the magnitude 6.2-quake struck at 3:51 a.m. today and was centered at a depth of 22.1 miles in the Pacific Ocean, 59 miles east of Fukushima prefecture. The epicenter is 175 miles northeast of Tokyo.

On Saturday afternoon, a magnitude-6.4 quake struck in the same area off the east coast of Honshu.

About 23,000 people died or were left missing across wide swaths of Japan's northeast coastline after the March 11 earthquake and tsunami. Another 80,000 have been forced to evacuate their homes because of the radiation threat from the Fukushima Dai-ichi nuclear plant.





EVANS NO LONGER UNDERACHEVER

After years of failing to live up to his promise in the pursuit of cycling's greatest prize, 34-year-old Australian Cadel Evans became the oldest Tour de France champion since World War II and its first champion from the southern hemisphere.

PARIS (AP) • Cadel Evans has been keeping fans back home up all night watching him become the first Australian to win the Tour de France. It's a

victory that's been a long time coming. Over the years, Evans has been better known for failing to live up to expectations than for overachieving.

He finished second in the 2007 Tour and was expected to win the next year, but was runner-up again. Last year, he was leading the race but crashed and fractured his left elbow. The pain was too much and he dropped out of contention in tears, ultimately finishing 50 minutes behind winner Alberto Conta-

This time, persistence, planning –

and a little good luck - paid off. "I hope I brought a great deal of joy to my countrymen, my country," Evans said Sunday after climbing onto the winner's podium on the Champs-Elysees. "It's been a pleasure and an honor to fly the flag over here."

The 34-year-old Evans, the oldest champion since before World War II, stood on the podium wrapped in his national flag, his eyes tearing up as he listened to the Australian national anthem. He then embraced Andy and Frank Schleck.

The brothers from Luxembourg had pushed him all the way to the end, but were finally defeated by his solo strength in Saturday's race against the

On the traditional Tour victory lap on Paris' Champs-Elysees, champagne in hand, Evans seemed to stop to cele-

NFL Players' Committee May Vote on Deal Today

NEW YORK (AP) • A vote on a settlement to the lockout is what every NFL fan wants. Nobody is sure when that might happen.

The players' executive committee will meet today in Washington after lawyers have worked through the weekend on issues that are holding up an agreement with the owners. Several people with knowledge of the meeting have told The Associated Press that no vote to recommend a deal is certain

The people spoke on condition of anonymity because the players association has not revealed its plans.

Owners approved a tentative agreement to end the four-month lockout on Thursday. But the players said they need more information before they can vote, and took issue with portions of the proposal. Several players only saw

that full proposal late Saturday.

Should the players' executive committee vote to accept the deal, it then would go to the 32 team representatives to approve. After that, some 1,900 players would need to vote, with a simple majority required for passage.

The 10 named plaintiffs in the players' lawsuit against the league - including Tom Brady, Peyton Manning and Drew Brees - must officially inform the court in Minneapolis of their approval of the pact, too.

Players also will need to vote to reestablish the NFLPA as a union; only after that happens could a full collective bargaining agreement be reached. But training camps and preseason games could occur while the sides put the finishing touches on a deal.



At least seven riders could have won it with only a few days remaining.

Contador, who is fighting a legal battle to hold on to last year's victory after a positive drug test, faded away in the final stages and finished fifth.

On Sunday's largely ceremonial ride to Paris, Contador smiled and chatted with Evans, even patting the Australian on the back. Afterward, the three-time Tour champion said he told "he Evans was the strongest rider, and it's normal that he won."

Evans' final margin of victory over Andy Schleck was 1 minute, 34 seconds, but all of that was achieved in Saturday's time trial. Evans hadn't panicked

when Andy Schleck had jumped ahead on the climb of the Galibier pass on Thursday and then took the overall lead in Friday's last mountain stage.

Evans' wife, Chiara, did. She was consumed with emotion — at times unable to bear the suspense when he needed to make up 57 seconds in the time trial to wrest the coveted yellow jersey from the younger Schleck brother.

"You don't want to know. I was really, really bad. Crying and everything, and calling everyone 'How many seconds?'" she

He's only the third non-European to win the Tour since it started in 1903. American Greg LeMond broke the European domination in 1986, with the first of his three wins, and his fellow American Lance

Armstrong won seven straight beginning in 1999. When Evans crossed the

line on Paris' most famed avenue Sunday, he was catapulted to global stardom. Although Evans has a high profile in his home

country, he is publicityshy and even many Australians find him a bit of a mystery. Evans has been trying to

win the Tour since 2005, and many observers were wondering whether his time had passed. Just last year, riding through the pain of the elbow fracture, he lost the yellow jersey and fell out of contention in Stage 9 in the Alps, when Schleck and Contador blew him away. Afterward, Evans broke down in tears, insisting he had let his team down.

This time, he rarely made his presence known, but

won Stage 4 and kept close to the favorites in the mountains. With a small lead that he'd picked up in the early stages of the race and a lot of strength in time trialing, he knew that he didn't need to attack in order to win.

Still, when Andy Schleck broke away from the field on the Galibier, observers thought Evans' BMC team had made a crucial mistake. But Evans remained calm and used his time trial skill to overcome the Schlecks.

Andy Schleck - who has finished second in the Tour three straight times - was calm about the loss.

"Cadel was the best of the Tour and he deserved to win," he said. "Second isn't bad, and my brother was on the podium too. I'll be back to win this Tour. We have a date for next year."

union can it negotiate such items as the league's personal conduct policy and drug testing.

But a person with knowledge of the executive committee meeting said it will be "to understand where things stand after this weekend's conversations. No talk of not voting, no talk of vote."

Orlando Cepeda and Roberto Clemente, said he felt proud to be a Puerto Rican.

"I always played for my island," Alomar said, dozens of Puerto Rican flags blowing in a gentle breeze on a sunny afternoon. "It is a true blessing to be able to share this moment with all of you. I have you in my heart. I am standing here today because of the fan support."

The switch-hitting Alomar won a record 10 Gold Gloves at second base, was a 12-time All-Star and a career .300 hitter. Alomar, a member of the Toronto Blue Jays' World Series championship teams in 1992 and 1993, is the first player to enter the Hall of Fame wearing a Blue Jays cap and just the 20th second baseman to be inducted.

Blyleven, the first Dutch-

born player to be enshrined, thanked his parents for the drive and determination he needed to succeed. Drafted by Minnesota in the third round of the 1969 amateur draft, he became the youngest pitcher in the majors when the Twins called him up June 2, 1970, after just 21 minor league starts. Still, his path toward the

Hall was a slow, steep one he drew the backing of only 14.1 percent one year - but on his 14th try became the first pure starting pitcher to get selected by the BBWAA since Nolan Ryan in 1999.

Gillick, a left-handed pitcher in college, said he knew he had to find another way to stay in the game after five years in the minor leagues. He found it in the front offices of four major league teams, winning 1992 and 1993 titles with Toronto and a 2008 title with Philadelphia.

NCAA Issues Mean Another Long Summer for ACC Programs

PINEHURST, N.C. (AP) ● If Georgia Tech running back Roddy Jones ever planned to seek advice on how to handle lingering NCAA uncertainty, he didn't need to look far.

Seated at a table some 20 feet away Sunday were two North Carolina players who spent the past year under a similar cloud.

For more than a year, the NCAA has been investigating allegations of improper benefits and academic misconduct in the Tar Heels' program. More recently, the Yellow Jackets must give back their 2009 Atlantic Coast Conference championship trophy and vacate their subsequent appearance in the Orange Bowl.

"People make mistakes," Jones said during the league's preseason media day. "Understanding that and moving forward from that probably will be the biggest lesson. Dealing with adversity and the stuff that we're going through now, blocking out distractions. Those are the biggest lessons that we should probably learn from

Those probes have combined to make for yet another long summer across the ACC, and the man who heads the league wants those questions answered so the focus can return to competition not compliance.

"Any time one of our schools has an NCAA problem, wherever it is and whichever one it is, I'm disappointed and concerned because that's not who we are as a league," commissioner John Swofford said. "When you have those kinds of problems, you don't step back from what your cornerstones are and what you're all about. You try to fix them and move forward."

Swofford touched on a range of mostly businessand rule-related topics during his 45-minute questionand-answer session, saying that multi-year scholarships are an idea worth discussing, that college sports are "at a tipping point" because so much money is involved and that the stoked emotions and intense competition in college sports inevitably lead some to exercise bad judgment.

"When those bad choices are made, quite honestly, to have the risk of doing so needs to be that, 'Hey, I'm not taking that risk. It's not worth it," Swofford said. "I'm not sure we've done that.

"I don't want to get out of balance here in terms of giving you the impression that I think everybody's head should be cut off. That's not what I mean," he added. "But I am for tough ramifications for rule-breakers. I am for consistency and how that's applied from case to case. I am for expediency. And I am for simplicity, so that people can understand what's going on, how it's going on and understand and see the consistency from case to case to case?

North Carolina continues to wait for the conclusion of an NCAA investigation that surfaced publicly last summer and wound up costing 14 players at least one game.

The school received its notice of allegations from the NCAA in June outlining "potential major violations," including unethical conduct by

former associate head coach John Blake and a failure to monitor the conduct of current and former players, and is scheduled to appear before the NCAA's committee on infractions in late October.

"Sometimes you do find yourself doing that, but you just try to stay away from that and think about what we can do in the future with the guys we do have," Cooper said. "But you'd be crazy to deny the potential that was there with all the guys that we had."

Bin Hammam Vows to Fight FIFA's Life Ban

LONDON (AP) • Mohamed bin Hammam vowed to overturn his bribery conviction and lifetime ban from soccer on Sunday, calling the decision an act of "revenge" by FIFA and its president, Sepp Blatter.

"The ban for life, that shows how much these people are angry, how much they are full of revenge," bin Hammam told the BBC's Sportsweek radio program.

FIFA imposed the ban on Saturday after finding the suspended Asian Football Confederation president guilty of bribery allegations in his campaign to unseat Blatter as head of the sport's world governing body, just months after he helped secure 2022 World Cup hosting rights for his tiny Gulf homeland of Qatar.

The scandal led to bin Hammam abandoning his campaign for the FIFA presidency.

Bin Hammam, who was not present at the hearing, denies the allegations, and plans to clear his name by launching several appeals, including at the Court of Arbitration for Sport in Switzerland.

"The first step for me is the appeals committee of FI-FA which is another kangaroo court," he said. "Then after that when we go to CAS things are going to be much improved. At that time I think FIFA will not have the full stage themselves."

Bin Hammam added that FIFA has yet to outline the charges against him.

"We wrote to FIFA about 10 days back asking them what are the accusations against Bin Hamman, because so far there are no accusations known to us," he said. "Surprisingly, after some days, maybe one or two days before the trial, FI-FA wrote back to my lawyers, telling them you will be know the accusations on the 22nd (of July). From that we knew that FIFA has already taken (the decision), they just wanted the platform to announce it."

The Qatari also said he will not resign from his FIFA post.

"I am not resigning, I am not going to resign. I will quit with the final say of Switzerland," he said.



Two highly capable declarers, one a former world champion, missed the extra chance that would have brought today's four-spade contract home. When West led two top diamonds, both declarers simply ruffed, forced a dummy entry in hearts, then took the spade finesse. After drawing trump without loss, they played three rounds of clubs, but when East turned up with four clubs to the Q-9, they were one down.

The extra chance is to find East with the spade 10 as well as the queen. Play three rounds of clubs before touching trump. When you regain the lead, you can ruff the fourth club in dummy and take the spade finesse.

Could this play cost your contract? Well, not if clubs are 3-3, but if West has the spade 10 and either player has a doubleton consisting of two of the top three missing clubs, the defense may get a trump promotion when you would have succeeded with the more straightforward line.

The answer is to cash one top club at trick three. If the queen, jack or nine appears, revert to Plan A, leading a heart to dummy to take the spade finesse. If only low clubs appear, continue with a second and third round of clubs. And if a defender has played the club nine from a doubleton nine, good luck to him!



old stones from the 1800s that are starting to crumble. This cemetery has become a favorite place for many to walk their dogs or ride their bikes. One woman lets her dog run off-leash and her young daughters play tag around the stones. Another neighbor allowed her children to set off fireworks. I was taught that in a cemetery, people should behave as if they are in a church. It upsets me to see this place used as a playground. This is a final resting place! Can you comment on proper etiquette in the

RESPECTFUL: DEAR Who is in charge of the upkeep of the cemetery? That individual should be informed about what's happening, so decorum can be re-established and activities that can cause it to deteriorate can be stopped. The idea that people have been using it as a dog park, where the animals can urinate and defecate on the graves, is appalling.

Cemetery etiquette is simple: Treat the graves as you would the graves of your parents, or as you would like your own to be treated. This includes no loud chatter, in case there are people in mourning there, not walking on the graves, not leaving chewing gum on the gravestones, keeping pets leashed (if they are brought there at all), and teaching children the difference between a cemetery and a playground.

DEAR ABBY: Why do men's pants come in sizes by waist and length and women's don't? I'm tall, and I'd like to find a pair of slacks that fit me off the rack instead of having to rip out seams. Most stores have pants with the same inseam and waist measurements, with the exception of petites. Why can't women's pants come in waist and length sizes as well?

DEAR MITZI: Good uestion. I discussed it with fashion designer Bradley Bayou, who said:

"Historically, women's fashion has always measured women only at the bust, hip and waist. It was considered improper (and unnecessary) to measure an inseam since women were only supposed to wear skirts and dresses. It wasn't until the 1930s and '40s, with Katharine Hepburn and Marlene Dietrich, that it became OK for women to wear pants — but only when measured by skilled tailors.

"Again, for the dignity of women, 'universal sizing' (short, average or tall) was created as the solution for not measuring a woman's inseam. It also costs less to manufacture women's pants in universal sizing for mass production. Pants with an inseam measurement were kept for higher-end slacks

or couture. "While currently some women's slacks/jeans have an inseam, they're primarily found in a universal size, while men's pants are - and always will be - available with an inseam listed."

DEAR ABBY: My partner and I are being married. We plan a small wedding with just family and a few friends. While it won't be in the main sanctuary, we will be having a church wedding in one of the church halls followed by a reception in the same hall. 

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
