GOODING • Sitting below Mary Fullmer's front lawn is a money pit. project gone wrong or a continuously broken water pipe. Instead, the Gooding resident says she's being forced to throw money at an irrigation system she can't use.
The city of Gooding charges its residents an annual $\$ 104$ irriga-
tion system fee, even to those tion system fee, even to those
who don't or can't use the system.
The irrigation system has been around for years, as well as the fees, said Gooding Mayor Duke Morton. The amount collected from the fees goes back to fix
repair the irrigation system. repair the irrigation system. tem," he said. "But we can't stop charging people. I even have to pay the fee, and I don't use the irrigation system either." Fullmer, 77 , lives alone and on a fixed income. Pipes connecting the irrigation system to her prop-
erty were cemented off when she moved into her house six years ago. She pays the fee every year, but said she struggles to make ends meet.
She argues the city shouldn't harge her anymore
"During the summer I live off working," Fullmer, a school bus driver, said. "I'm already forced to pay flood insurance that I'm pretty sure I'll never use." Paying the fee would be less of a burden if she actually saw the money applied to repairing city
infrastructure or even the sidewalks outside her house, Fullmer said.

Foes of Luna's reforms were successful in getting a repeal initiative on the November 2012 ballot, which some see as a setback for him. But if the measures survive - and there's plenty to suggest they will, given Luna's 21 percentage victory over his Democrat-
ic rival last November - that could be viewed as abarometer on the superintendent's future political fortunes. Opponents insist Luna misled voters about what he was planning for schools when he said nothing about his reform plan before November's election.
"The notion of a 'Gov. Luna' I find very troubling. I do think our referenda questions next year will be considered a referendum on Tom Luna's leadership. If
people were really
happy with Tom Luna's plan, we would not have succeeded in getting that many, signatures."

lieve the woodpecker will be harmed by the logging set to begin this week at the Angora fire site where 3,000 acres of national forest and 25 homes burned in 2007. But they said that contrary

## Idaho Couple Uses Sonarto Find Body

FAIRBANKS, Alaska Within fifteen minutes of startingtheir search,two volunteers from Idaho spotted the body of a drowning victimin Harding Lake that had eluded searchers for almost success: an underwater imaging technology these volunteers have brought twice to Harding Lake and four times to Alaska.
The technology is called side-scanning sonar. It's not a lifesaving tool, but can
help give closure to families of drowning victims classified as "missing."
In Alaska, it is not unusual for the bodies of drowning victims to go unrecovered. Out of 162 recreational decade, bodies were not recovered in at least 34 cases, according to the State Office of Boating.

PROVO, Utah (AP) • A Brigham Young University linguistics professor is researching the case of the missing T . The unusual pronunciation of cerand words like "mountain," "kitten," and "button" isn't unique to Utah, said professor David Eddington, but it is certainly far more prevale
in other Western states.
And young Utah females arly prone to not pronounce the "T," Eddington told the Deseret News.
"We found cases of it in New York, Michigan, Southern California,' Eddington said. "But in Utah what we
found is that generally it's younger people and especially women." For his research, Eddington record words.
What he found was that if someone had lived at least two-thirds of their life in Utah, they were much more likely to
speak with the unusual pronunciation. speak with the unusual pronunciation. 'kitten,", Eddington said. "And then I listened more (in Utah) and started to hear 'KIH-un!"'
Eddington said that males are far less likely than females to lose the T in their
pronunciations, but he thinks men will likely follow suit in the future.
"Linguists have found that young women are always, or generally, on the forefront of linguistic changes,' Eddington said.

And of course, he noted, no one can say the pronunciation is wrong since language is always evolving, and young of talking.
"You go back to Roman times," Eddington said, "and you hear Romans alking about how the young people don't speak correctly."

## OilSpill Brings Callsfor Scrutiny of Small Lines

HELENA, Mont. • A north-
western Montana oil spill that went unreported for a month has led to calls for increased scrutiny over the thousands of small flow pipelines within
oil and gas fields.
Flow lines
contained within the fields
and pipe unprocessed oil, gas and water from wells to holdingtanks and separating facilities and aren't regulated like larger pipelines, such as
the one that broke under the the one that broke under the month.
But flow lines often face the same issues of corrosion and defects, and should fall under the same federal regulation as larger transmission pipelines, co
vocates say.
"They'reunregulatedlines and they periodically have nasty spills," said Lois Epstein, engineer and Arctic program director for The Wilderness Society in Alaska. "It's a problem. Whether
there is any motivation to do there is any motivation to do
anything about it, is where we're at right now." The broken line at the Cut Bank oil field on the Blackfeet Indian Reservation 50 miles east of Glacier National Park may have been slowly leaking oil for up to two discovered it on June 12. FX Energy officials attributed the break to shifting ground during last month's heavy rain and flooding.
The Salt Lake City-based company fixed the break and wells that fed the line, but never reported it to the tribe or the Bureau of Land Management, which oversees the tribe's minerall lease
The spill - estimatedto be up to 840 gallons - then spread nearly a mile down a
steep coulee and intothe Cut Bank Creek before a neighboring landowner discovered the stained ground on July 12 .
A cleanup crew has been digging oil by hand from the steep, treacherous ravine for have beenno signs of wildlife affected by the spill. The company is paying for
the cleanup and has pledged the cleanup and has pledged to permanently plug the wells that fed the broken line. Grinnell Day Chief, the said the company has been very cooperative.
FX Energy is one of the largest of the 15 oil and gas companies with production or exploration leases on the
Cut Bank field. Combined with its five wells at Bears Denfield and a small interest in two wells at Rattlers Butte field, FXEnergy leases a total of 10,732 acres in Montana and produces 184 barrels of oilper day.
The broken flow line is one of many that gather oil from declining field, which has been producing oil since the 1940s. Many of the 4 -inch flow lines are 40 or 50 years old, said Don Judice, the BLM's Great Falls supervisor. Because the failed line ony carried wells to a central tank and never left the oil field, there were no requirements toinspect it, test it for corrosion or perform any preven-

Norway Suspect Borrowed from Unabomber's Manifesto
DENVER (AP) • Parts of the manifesto written by the suspect in Norway's terrorist a attack were taken almost word for word from the writings of "Unabomber" Ted Kaczynski.
The passages copied by Anders Behring Breivik appear in the first few pages of Kaczynski's manifesto. Breivik changed a Kaczasyski icreed on leftism and what he considered to be leftists' "ffeelings of inferiority"" " mainly by substituting the words "multiculturalism" "cultural Marxism" for "leftism."
For instance, Kaczynski wrote: "One of the most wide-
spread manifestations of the craziness of spread manifestations of the craziness of our world is left ism, so a discussion of the psychology of leftism can lems of modern society in general."
Breivik's manifesto reads: "One of the most widespread manifestations of the craziness of our world is multiculturalism, so a discussion of the psychology of multiculturalists can serve as an introduction to the discussion of the problems of Western Europe in general." Breivik did not cite Kaczynski, though he did for many other people whose writings he used in his 1,500 -page
