Making Sense of the Debt Ceiling Discussion

Congress has until Aug. 2 to raise the federal borrowing limit or the government will run out of money and possibly default on its debt. House Republicans say they won't raise the debt limit without equal spending cuts. President Barack Obama and Democrats have insisted that higher revenues must be included.

What is the debt ceiling?

It's a legal limit on how much debt the government can accumulate. The government takes on debt two ways: It borrows from investors by issuing Treasury bonds, and it borrows from itself, mostly from the Social Security trust fund. The federal government created the debt limit in 1917. Congress has increased the debt limit 10 times since 2001.

What is the federal deficit, and how does it differ from the debt?

The deficit is how much government spending exceeds tax revenue during a year. Last year, the deficit was \$1.29 trillion. The debt is the sum of deficits past and present. Right now, the national debt totals \$14.3 trillion.

Why is the prospect of not raising the debt ceiling so worrisome?

The government now borrows more than 40 cents of each dollar it spends. If the debt ceiling does not rise, the government would need to choose what to pay and what not. Any default could lead to financial panic weakening the country's credit rating, the dollar and the already hobbled economy. Interest rates would likely rise, increasing the cost of borrowing.

Who holds the \$14.3 trillion in outstanding U.S. debt?


The U.S. government owes itself \$4.6 trillion, mostly borrowed from Social Security. The remaining \$9.7 trillion is owed to investors in Treasury securities. Nearly half of that -\$4.5 trillion — is held by foreigners including China with \$1.15 trillion and Japan with \$907 billion.

How did the debt grow from \$5.8 trillion in 2001 to its current \$14.3 trillion?

While some drug seizures are down, marijuana and meth still dominate state drug busts.

Twin Falls police recently made arrests for heroin and painkillers, but those narcotics are still in the minority of what's moving through Idaho's drug underworld.

Three people from Ada County face felony charges of trafficking heroin after police busted them in the parking lot of the Twin Falls Buffalo Wild Wings. Also recently arrested was Ryan Hilliard, 25, a

Twin Falls man who is charged with allegedly possessing heroin and selling painkillers to a police informant.

Still, marijuana and methamphetamine remain the predominant drugs in Idaho, according to area police and the latest statewide Crime in Idaho report.

"The majority is obviously marijuana and meth," said Twin Falls Police Lt. Craig Stotts. "I don't know if it's a nationwide trend, but prescription drug sales and abuse is up there as well."

Schools Rush to Prepare for Merit **Pay Law**

Local decisions will direct where 63 percent of an estimated \$38 million in teacher bonus pay will go in 2012.

School districts across Idaho have an additional task to finish this summer before students return to class.

Educators are working on customized plans that will set the stage for future decisions about which teachers are awarded bonuses based on student performance. With the Legislature's approval of a package of education reform bills, districts are now tasked with crafting plans that reflect the needs and priorities of their schools.

It's no simple task. But districtlevel decisions will determine where 63 percent of the state's pay-forperformance funding goes. Under the new law, school districts have more than a dozen criteria to choose from, with the flexibility to tailor different measurement methods to different grade levels.

The options are plentiful: student test scores, graduation and dropout rates — even parental involvement can all have a role in the plans, which must be sent to the State Department of Education by Sept. 1.

Still, school officials caution that the work will continue beyond then as the new plans are tweaked. And this is all before the first round of bonus checks are distributed to teachers in fall 2012.

Jerome School District's board approved its plan on Tuesday night, with an eye toward improving interaction between teachers and parents in the secondary grade levels. In the Please see PAY, M2

battalion chief later called in to cancel the aerial assistance. The helicopter was diverted to help fight a fire seven miles northwest of Oak-

The fire near Dierkes Lake came close to damaging homes in the Hidden Lakes Subdivision, but only one house suffered landscape damage. While the subdivision is not unaccustomed to experiencing wildfires throughout the years, it is one of the few certified Firewise Communities in Twin

Firewise Communities is a multi-agency program that teaches homeowners how to prevent and protect against wildfires.

"We can only offer suggestions," said Heather Tiel-Nelson, the BLM's Twin Falls District spokeswoman. "It is really up to the homeowner to do the work and do as much as they can to protect their home."

The wet spring has not helped in preventing fires in the area either, said Brian Cunningham, Twin Falls Fire Department battalion chief.

"Our season has started later, but absolutely everybody ought to be on high alert," he said. "It's dry out here right now and hot. The conditions are right to have these kinds of fire for the rest of the summer."

The source of the fire is still being investigated by the Twin Falls Fire Department and BLM fire officials, Cunningham said. Tuesday night, Twin Falls Battalion Chief Jack Barnes said officials believe it was humancaused.

primary grades, the school district will rely on state reading tests.

In middle school and high school, the district will look at the level of contact between parents and teachers, including participation in parent-teacher conferences, said Superintendent Dale Lavne.

Layne said teacher contact with parents tends to drop when students enter the middle school grades, adding that parental involvement is one of the state-approved measures.

"Parental involvement has been one that we've been trying to do in the past," he said. "This will be a good chance for us to step that up."

The district came up with its plan with input from administrators and teachers from each school. Layne said the timing, which required gathering staff during the summer, was a challenging logistical hurdle.

Scott Rogers, superintendent of Minidoka County School District, agreed. In his district, planning efforts will step up when teachers return in mid-August.

Rogers said it's too soon to say what the plan will look like, stressing that it's crucial for it to receive the staff's blessing.

amount of other drugs seized tapered off.

Marijuana seized is measured in terms of pounds of processed material and number of raw plants. ISP officials in Meridian noted the bulk of the 220,000 pounds reported in 2010 was seized by Boise police, but they did not have a specific figure to disclose. The number of plants seized increased by about 250 from 2009 to 2010 for a total of 4,913.

That number still isn't an accurate total - the ISP reports aren't a true reflection of what was seized in the state, only what jurisdictions report. For instance, deputies from Gooding and Jerome counties found 7,200 marijuana plants during July and August 2010, most of which were growing among corn stalks or on public land.

Heroin may have been the big find for city police last week, but police statewide seize far more of other controlled substances. While 138 grams of heroin were reported as seized last year, meth weighed in at 44 pounds and approximately 1,200 grams of cocaine were confiscated.

Deputy Blas Martinez of the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office agreed that meth and marijuana continue to dominate the local drug scene.

"They're a constant. They're always there," he said, with the majority of the drugs coming from out of the area. Martinez said the trend is moving away from when people cooked up meth in their home garage.

Also, the number of drug-crime arrests increased in many jurisdictions between 2009 and 2010. Nearly 100 more arrests were made last year law-enforcement agencies within Twin Falls County, the report shows. Many in other counties showed slight bumps in arrests, while some deviated with a downward trend.

Across the state, drug arrests were up by 12 percent. Twin Falls police showed an 8.5 percent increase, and it was the jurisdiction with the most arrests -454 in 2010.

Area officials weren't able to provide a specific reason why seizures and arrests are up, as they don't consider the difference between 2009 and 2010 a huge spike.

"I like to think our hard, diligent work is paying off," Lt. Stotts said.

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Twin Falls City Looks for Way to Fight Rising Dump Fees

With the threat of rising dump fees taking some of the oomph out of the city of Twin Falls' recycling program, city officials took the issue to the county, which holds weight in the matter.

Trouble is, despite Twin Falls County accounting for more than 40 percent of all the solid waste sent to the regional Milner Butte Landfill, the county might not be big enough to allay city concerns.

Representatives of the city, including City Manager Travis Rothweiler and Councilman Lance Clow, went to the Twin Falls County commissioners on Wednesday to air their grievances with the proposed Southern Idaho Solid Waste budget, which includes a proposed \$1per-ton increase to dumping fees. The increase is at least partly attributable to the city's single-stream recycling program, as the solid waste board works to cover its budget despite falling tonnage.

Clow also said the expense/revenue side of SISW is weighted toward the smaller counties it serves: Paying for the waste operations is proportionally split, while revenue from a methane-capturing utility program is handled differently, meaning Twin Falls County gets 30 percent of any profit despite paying 35 percent of all costs.

Twin Falls County fills only one seat out of seven on the Southern Idaho Solid Waste Board, with Blaine, Cassia, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln and Minidoka counties being the others. So, despite Twin Falls having more than three times as much waste as the next county, it would need to convince the others to institute a more favorable policy.

"I think the (Twin Falls) county commissioners do care about what is going on, but their hands are tied with the solid waste district," Clow said after the meeting.

He said he is disappoint ed in SISW for not inviting the city of Twin Falls – the city that produces the most waste in the county that produces the most waste to its last regular meeting before local budgets are finalized for the year. Clow said he's made sure the district was aware of the city's concerns over the past several weeks and he nonetheless intends to attend the next meeting.

Commission County Chairman George Urie, who represents Twin Falls County on the waste board, said he brought up the city's concerns to the rest of the board, but it didn't elicit much response. Some of the smaller counties rely on the current funding formula because they have tighter budgets, he said. Plus, he said, the smaller counties founded the waste district and put up the initial costs for it.

"(The other commissioners) didn't act very receptive to change, and if they want to keep it that way, they'll keep it that way," Urie said. "We're just one vote out of seven:

He said he'll work with the city on any solutions it proposes because county residents will benefit as much as city residents. But aside from possibly combining the county's smaller recycling program with the citywide program, he doesn't see any changes to the system in the immediate fu-



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Grizzly Bear Charges Prompt New Specific Grand Teton Rules

People who don't obey park rangers' orders to get away from wild animals could face a hefty fine, whic would be set at a judge's discretion.

CHEYENNE, Wyo. • Grand Teton National Park is clarifying its rules against getting too close to wildlife after a grizzly bear on two separate occasions charged at tourists who were watching her from atop their cars.

The new rules emphasize that people need to heed any ranger or other park official who tells them to move away from wildlife. Park officials say people who don't listen can be fined anywhere from \$100 to \$5,000, depending on what a judge thinks about what they

The rules don't change the distance people are supposed to keep away from grizzlies and wolves, which remains no less than 100 yards.

But the new rules spell out that people must not interfere with the movement of wildlife. The new rules also say people need to make their best effort to move away whenever they've discovered that they're accidentally too close to wildlife.

A grizzly killed a hiker in Yellowstone National Park three weeks ago - Yellowstone's first death from a grizzly in 25 years but that's not the main reason for the policy change in nearby Grand

Two female grizzlies with cubs have become big tourist attractions in Grand Teton this summer. The grizzlies have been easily visible and have created traffic jams by spending a lot of time near roads, behavior biologists speculate discourages aggressive male grizzly bears from threatening their cubs.

On two separate occasions this summer, one of the grizzly mothers charged at people who were watching her from on top of cars. Nobody was hurt, and park officials said they're responding with rules that are in-

tended to protect people. "That was definitely a red flag for us, that she felt threatened or disturbed enough to charge a person who was on top of their car," Grand Teton spokeswoman Jackie Skaggs said Wednesday.

Yellowstone also is clarifying its wildlife viewing rules along the same lines but won't have its changes in place until perhaps this fall, said Yellowstone spokesman Dan Hottle.

"Grand Teton was just in a little different situation that forced them to clarify their rules a little quicker," Hottle said.

Until now, Grand Teton didn't strictly enforce the 100-yard minimum for people who were inside their cars, Skaggs said.

This summer's big traffic jams with tourists sitting on top of their cars, leaning out of windows and sunroofs, and blocking the grizzlies and their cubs from crossing roads forced the change.

"As these wildlife jams have become more congested and bigger we have seen more reaction by the bears to these situations, she said.

some people have tried to feed the grizzlies. Yellowstone and Grand Teton both have gone to great lengths over the past few decades to make sure bears don't get used to eating human food - a bad habit that can make them dangerous to people and require bears to be euthanized.

Skaggs said.

A team of about a dozen volunteers led by a park ranger helps patrol Grand Teton's "critter jams." The duties of the Wildlife Brigade include asking people to move their cars farther up the road if it looks like their vehicles are blocking a bear or other wildlife from crossing.

"For the most part the average park visitor is so thrilled to see these bears, they immediately follow the directives that are given by the Wildlife Brigade. They get in their cars and move their cars when they're asked," Skaggs said.

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

Tribal Leader Calls for Oil Spill Accountability

HELENA, Mont. • Crews reported being a third of the way through the cleanup of a northwestern Montana oil spill Tuesday, as the chairman of the Blackfeet Indian tribe called on state and congressional leaders to ensure that energy companies don't shirk their responsibilities in future

on Wednesday afternoon.

Up to 840 gallons of crude spilled from a broken flow line at an oil field FX Energy Inc. operates on the Blackfeet Indian Reservation before the company discovered and patched the break in June. But the company never reported the spill. It spread almost a mile down a steep ravine and into Cut Bank Creek before a neighboring landowner reported it nearly a month later, on July 12.

About a dozen people are excavating oil-stained soil and draining contaminated pools by hand, as the ravine is so steep and rugged that crews

Charges Considered for 26 people Protesting Activist Case

SALT LAKE CITY • City prosecutors on Wednesday considered criminal charges for 26 people arrested after they blocked traffic and the light rail downtown while protesting the sentencing of an environmental activist who thwarted a 2008 government auction of oil and gas leases.

A federal judge on Tuesday sentenced Tim DeChristopher, 29, to two years in prison and three years of probation, and fined him \$10,000. He was accused of running up bids at the auction of oil and gas leases on public land near Utah's Arches and Canyonlands national parks.

DeChristopher maintains his actions were an act of civil disobedience designed to bring attention to the problems of climate change.

The protesters had staged a sit-in outside two entrances at the federal courthouse downtown where the sentencing took place, then used plastic zip ties to link their wrists together to form a human chain and sat in the street in front of the U.S. District Court building.

"We had to make sure that adequate attention was brought to this cause," said Ashley Anderson, the co-founder of DeChristoher's climate change activist nonprofit group and one of those arrested. "Business as usual and the status quo was what we intended to disrupt ... we wanted to show that business as usual is what is killing the plan-

Police Chief Chris Burbank offered protesters the choice of leaving on their own, be cited and released on the spot, or be arrested taken to spokeswoman Jones said.

"They wanted to be arrested," she said.

All 26 were cited for failing to disperse or comply with a police officer, obstructing the operations of a bus and traffic offenses. Jail records show 19 were booked and released without bail. Seven others were cited, but not booked.

The records shows those booked in jail range in age from 20 to 66. Most were from Salt Lake City, with some from Arizona, Colorado and New York.

Assistant city prosecutor Scott Fisher said the charges include misdemeanors and infractions. Prosecutors were reviewing the cases to decide whether the citations reflected sufficient charges or if different or more serious charges should be filed, Fisher said.

Court appearances are set for Aug. 9 at the Salt Lake City Justice Court.

DeChristopher was convicted on two felony counts of interfering with and making false representations at a government auction in March. He could have received a 10 year prison sentence.

Supporters reacted to the sentencing with tears, shouting and singing of protest songs.

"We've known for a really long time that he would probably go to prison, but when the judge actually said it and he was gone ... that was the shock," said Anderson.

The price tag to replace the Perrine Bridge will be at least \$1 billion. How would the Magic Valley pay for it? Kempthorne sold us a bridge, but the uncertainty is more costly

Six years ago, our horizons were wider here in the Magic Valley.

As part of his debt-funded Connecting Idaho initiative, then-Gov. Dirk Kempthorne proposed building a third bridge across the Snake River Canyon at Twin Falls. Cost: \$184 million.

This week, as the Idaho Transportation Department completed one its periodic inspections of the 35-year-old Perrine Bridge, and the talk was just about making sure the span reached its planned 50-year life expectancy.

What happened in the meantime to downsize our ambitions?

A recession, of course, and a consequent shift in nation's priorities that left debt financing less an option for government. Plus, it turns out, Kempthorne lowballed the potential cost of a third bridge. The actual price tag would probably be closer to \$1 billion.

All of which swept the prospective third bridge off ITD's radar as part of Connecting Idaho, which was funded through grant anticipation revenue vehicle bonds to be paid for by future federal highway payments to Idaho.

The economic impact of constructing a third bridge would have been substantial. Connecting the Highway 93/30 Bypass — completed earlier this year with federal stimulus funds — with an alternate route to Interstate 84 somewhere between Wendell and Jerome could have meant billions of dollars in new revenue to the Magic Valley.

Instead, for better or worse, our economic future is probably tied exclusively to the Perrine Bridge and to the 45-year-old Hansen Bridge.

Trouble is, there's more transportation infrastructure built — and coming — than the Perrine and Hansen bridges can accommodate, forcing us to ration our resources.

When the time comes — and it will — when commute traffic backs up from the intersection of Blue Lakes Boulevard North and Pole Line Road in Twin Falls to the junction of U.S. Highway 93 and I-84 in Jerome County, what will our response be?

Building more access to the Perrine Bridge would be futile. New bridge or no new bridge, we must look elsewhere — perhaps to a south-bank to north-bank span within the Snake River Canyon somewhere west of the Perrine Bridge, with Canyon Springs Gradeand Blue Lakes Grade-style roads on either side.

That's far from an ideal solution, but we have a dwindling range of options in the next few decades.

The bigger question is what happens when the Perrine Bridge itself has to be replaced. It will turn 50 — the end of its nominal lifespan — in 2026.

Another, bigger bridge will have to be built at the same site. But how will we pay for it, and between now and then how best to plan for growth on both sides of the canyon?

The Perrine Bridge is the single most important element in the economy of south-central Idaho. Without it — north side and south side — we'd be out of business.

Opening Statements Set for Thursday in Jeffs Trial

SAN ANGELO, Texas (AP)

• A judge on Wednesday dealt a blow to the defense of polygamist religious leader Warren Jeffs, refusing to suppress evidence police seized during a 2008 raid on his sect's remote West Texas compound.

District Judge Barbara Walther's decision clears the way for a small mountain of documents - including marriage and birth records, and thousands of pages of Jeffs' own writing in personal journals — to be presented to the jury during Jeffs' sexual assault trial. Jurors also may be able to see DNA evidence collected from children living on the com-

Opening statements in the case are now set for Thursday morning, after one more suppression hearing.

This time, Jeffs' attorneys are seeking the suppression of evidence recovered when Jeffs was arrested, after a 2006 traffic stop along a highway outside Apex, Nevada. Walther said she

would hear arguments on that for about an hour before the jury is seated, then wanted both sides to be ready with opening statements.

Jeffs, head of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, is charged with sexually assaulting two underage girls. If convicted, he could receive a maximum sentence of 119 years to life in prison.

He also is scheduled to go to trial on a separate bigamy charge in October. Jeffs' sect is a radical offshoot of the mainstream Mormon church that believes polygamy brings exaltation in heaven. It has more than 10,000 members nationwide, and his high-powered defense team - which has included seven attorneys is being financed by an FLDS land trust believed to be worth more than \$110 mil-

Jeffs was in hiding and had made the FBI's "Most-Wanted" list by August

MAN WHO POSED AS TEXAS STUDENT **GETS PRISON TIME**

LUBBOCK, Texas • A former star athlete who posed as a teenager to play high school basketball in West Texas was sentenced Wednesday to three years in prison after reaching a plea deal, a prosecutor said.

Guerdwich Montimere, 23, pleaded guilty to two counts of sexual assault and three counts of tampering with government records, said Ector County District Attorney Bobby Bland.

Officials say the naturalized U.S. citizen from Haiti had graduated from high school in Florida, where he also played basketball, years before he moved to Odessa and presented himself as a ninth-grader named Jerry Joseph. Montimere was 21 and 22 when he played one season at Odessa Permian High, the same rabidly competitive school that inspired the book and movie "Friday Night Lights" about high school football. Montimere helped lead the Panthers to the 2010 state playoffs, but the team had to forfeit after his story unraveled.

Montimere was indicted last year on six felony charges, including sexual assault and tampering with government records. His trial was to begin next week in Odessa, and he had faced up to 20 years in prison if convicted on the original counts. The indictment accused him of identity theft. The sexual assault counts accused him of having sex with a 15-year-old girl.

"Sometimes your best

defense is to take the road with the least amount of risk. He could have gotten 20 years," Montimere's at-

torney, Dusty Gallivan, said. A message was also left with Montimere's mother, Manikisse Montimere.

Suspicions were raised about Joseph after coaches from Florida at a post-season amateur basketball tournament in Arkansas said they recognized him as Montimere, a 2007 graduate of a Fort Lauderdale, Fla., high school.

Because he was living with Odessa basketball coach Danny Wright and not a parent or guardian, Montimere had to apply to the University Interscholastic League in Austin to play high school basketball. A waiver was granted and he was the star of the team.

Wright, who still calls Montimere by the name Jerry, said he was livid once he learned Joseph wasn't who he said he was.

"I was blindsided," Wright said. "I never saw it coming. I just thought he was a big kid?'

Montimere was named the District 2-5A Newcomer of the Year, an honor that was stripped when his deception was exposed. The Panthers also forfeited their 16 wins, although Wright said the "team would have been good with or without Jerry."

Bland noted Montimere will have to register as a sex offender. Gallivan said that was "one of the biggest obstacles to overcome" when it came to reaching a deal, but that Bland wouldn't budge on the issue.

9 PERCENT DROP IN NEB. **ABORTIONS** SO FAR IN'11

OMAHA, Neb. • The number of abortions performed in Nebraska dropped 9 percent in the first half of the year over the same period in 2010, according to figures available Wednesday from the state Department of Health and Human Ser-

Nebraska Right to Life attributed the decline in large part to enactment of a state abortion ban tied to the disputed notion that a fetus can feel pain at 20 weeks. The law that went into effect in October targeted Dr. LeRoy Carhart and his Bellevue

"Legislation does save lives," said the group's executive director, Julie Schmit-Albin. "Carhart admitted when (the ban) was enacted last fall that he would be forced by the law to do late-term abortions out of the state?"

After the Nebraska law went into effect in October, Carhart opened a clinic in Germantown, Md., and has been pursuing one in Council Bluffs, Iowa. He still offers abortions in Nebraska.

The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services said preliminary reports show there were 1,153 abortions performed in Nebraska in the first six months of 2011. The figure was 1,288 for the same period last year.

State law requires doctors to file reports with the state Department of Health and Human Services on each abortion performed. Until this year, the reporting of gestational age was optional and the vast majority of reports didn't include it. So, there was no way for the state to know how many abortions were performed after 20 weeks

Former Leader of Idaho Non-Profit Group Faces Theft Charges in Pocatello

POCATELLO (AP) • The former leader of an Idaho nonprofit group that helps people with disabilities has been served a felony summons after law enforcement said she embezzled more than \$100,000, resulting in some employees losing their benefits.

The Idaho State Journal reports that 35 charges are possible against Nancy John, former chief executive officer at New Day Products and Resources, after a 11/2 -yearlong Pocatello police investigation.

John turned herself in to authorities on Tuesday afternoon and was allowed to remain free. She's scheduled to make her initial court appearance Aug. 9.

Bannock County Deputy Attorney Prosecuting

JaNiece Price said she declined to pursue John's arrest based on her record and because she likely won't take off.

"In dealing with embezzlement cases, you have to do a pretty thorough investigation," Price told the newspaper. "It's a detailed process that takes a lot of time verifying information on both sides."

Phone numbers linked to John were disconnected. A search of public records by The Associated Press indicates she has had an address in Glendale, Ariz., a suburb of Phoenix, since June.

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

GOP Leaders Ramp Up Pressure to Pass Debt Plan

House Speaker John Boehner gave marching orders for other Republicans to support their plan over Democrat options.

WASHINGTON • House GOP leaders mounted a furious bid Wednesday to win support for legislation designed to ease the nation's debt crisis, delivering a tongue-lashing to their most conservative lawmakers and casting Thursday's roll call as nothing less than a vote of confidence in their stewardship of the chamber.

House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, began Wednesday by ordering his fellow Republicans to fall in line and continued pushing for support throughout the day. He and his lieutenants repeatedly warned rank-andfile Republicans that Boehner's plan was their only alternative to a Democratic option offered by Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., or the financial calamity that could be precipitated by a government default.

With investors growing increasingly anxious about whether Washington will make the Aug. 2 deadline for raising the federal debt ceiling, the stock market tumbled Wednesday, sending the Standard & Poor's 500-stock index down 2 percent, the most in nearly two months.

Republicans claimed that momentum was on their on side as Boehner spent Wednesday afternoon huddling with members of the 87-strong class of freshmen that delivered him the gavel after the 2010 midterm elections. But aides and lawmakers suggested the decisive votes could belong to about two dozen veterans with no strong allegiance to their leadership. Some estimates showed nearly 20 Republicans declaring their intent to oppose the bill.

Republicans received a dose of good news when congressional budget analysts credited Boehner's legislation with \$917 billion in spending cuts. Boehner's team had revised the bill Tuesday night after the Congressional Budget Office estimated that the initial draft represented \$850 billion in cuts, far less than he had advertised.

Across the Capitol, Reid continued to oppose Boehner's two-step approach to lifting the debt ceiling, which would entail expanding the government's borrowing authority for a few months and then holding another vote early next year on a further increase.

Reid's own deficit-reduction plan, which calls for raising the debt ceiling enough to cover federal obligations into 2013, faced challenges of its own from the GOP, which objects to the accounting in the bill.

States Brace for Grad Rate Dips as Formula Changes

KANSAS CITY, Mo. • States are bracing for plummeting high school graduation rates as districts nationwide dump flawed measurement formulas that often undercounted dropouts and produced inflated results.

Education wonks long have

suspected the statistics used by some people to determine how their neighborhood high school is faring — or even where to buy a house — can be figured using various formulas that produce wildly different results.

Now, many states are facing a sobering reset: Some could see numbers fall by as many as 20 percentage points.

Liz Utrup, a spokeswoman for the U.S. Education Department, said graduation rate numbers will soon appear to decrease "across the board" as states move to a uniform calculation that requires them to track each student individually, giving a more accurate count of how many actually finish

high school. "Through this uniform method, states are raising the bar on data standards, and simply being more honest," U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan said.

Most states are required to convert to the new calculation this year, but the number won't count as part of federal No Child Left Behind benchmarks until the 2012-13 school year. Schools that consistently miss those measures face sanctions.

All but two states - Idaho and Kentucky, which need more time to develop student tracking systems – will start submitting the

N. KOREA **PREDICTS NUCLEAR ARMS RACE**

North Korea warns that U.S. could start another Cold War-like arms race if it keeps modernizing nuke stockpile and missile defense systems.

UNITED NATIONS • North Korea's U.N. ambassador said Wednesday that U.S. modernization of its nuclear weapons and expansion of its missile defense systems will eventually spark a new nuclear arms race.

Sin Son Ho told a General Assembly meeting on revitalizing the Conference on Disarmament, which North Korea chairs this month, that if "the largest nuclear weapon state" – a reference to the United States – wants to stop the spread of nuclear weapons "it should show its good example by negotiating the Treaty of Abolishing Nuclear Weapons?"

"The total and complete elimination of nuclear weapons remains the consistent policy of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea;" he said, using his country's official name.

But Sin said modernization projects including making small nuclear weapons that can be used like conventional weapons and expanding missile defense systems show that the U.S. "has lost its legal or moral justifications to talk of proliferation

His remarks came on the eve of talks between U.S. Ambassador Stephen Bosworth and North Korean Vice Foreign Minister Kim Kye Gwan in New York on Thursday and Friday on the possibility of reviving disarmament talks after more than a year of animosity and high tension between the rival Koreas.

The discussions aim to build on last week's talks between nuclear negotiators from North and South Korea in Indonesia, the first such meeting since disarmament talks collapsed in 2008.

Sin challenged the missile defense systems "being pushed under the pretext of responding to so-called ballistic missile developments by

what they call 'rogue states." The nature and scope of these systems demonstrate that the real target is "none other than the gaining of absolute nuclear superiority and global hegemony over the other nuclear power rivals," he said.

The 65-nation Conference on Disarmament, the world's only multilateral forum for nuclear arms diplomacy, hasn't produced anything substantial since the 1996 nuclear test-ban treaty, a pact now on hold because key nations, including the U.S., have not ratified it.

Last September, Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon hosted a high-level meeting at the U.N. to try to revitalize the conference, but the deep divisions that have stalled action were still evident — and they were evident at Wednesday's follow-up meeting as well.

The Conference on Disarmament works on the basis of consensus, which means one country can hold up action.

The U.S. and others warned last September that either the Conference on Disarmament gets moving on a long-proposed treaty to ban production of atomic bomb material, or they would start negotiations outside the conference. The warning was aimed at Pakistan, the latest nation to block negotiation of a Fissile Material Cutoff Treaty.

Is rural America disappearing from ... America? The 2010 U.S. Census says people are moving from the country to the city.

WASHINGTON • Rural America now accounts for just 16 percent of the nation's population, the lowest ever.

The latest 2010 census numbers hint at an emerging America where, by midcentury, city boundaries become indistinct and rural areas grow ever less relevant. Many communities could shrink to virtual ghost towns as they shutter businesses and close down schools, demographers say.

More metro areas are booming into sprawling megalopolises. Barring fresh investment that could bring jobs, however,

FBI Abduction Team Searches for Missing N. Hampshire Girl

"We are still desperately looking for her," said Senior **Assistant Attorney General** Jane Young, who typically handles homicide cases.

She held a press conference Wednesday night with the head of the local FBI office, Kieran Ramsay, but wouldn't take questions.

The specter of the girl's disappearance hung heavy over Stewartstown, a community of 800 residents with one blinking streetlight and a handful of stores.

"It's creepy," said Shannon Towle, who owns Towle's Mini-Mart on Route 3. "Things like this don't happen here. I know that's kind of a tired phrase. I'm an overprotective mom as it is. Now it's going to be way worse."

About 80 people, many with candles in hand and tears in their eyes, gathered for a nighttime vigil for Celina in neighboring Canaan, Vt. A framed picture of the girl sat on a picnic table, surrounded by

Friends and classmates and people who didn't know Celina were among those in the sobbing crowd.

A family friend, Rebecca Goodrum, of nearby Beecher Falls, Vt., said she was praying Celina, whom she's known since she was 2, is

"It feels like a lost section of the town," Goodrum said Wednesday night. "She was beautiful. She was the light of everything?"

Celina's stepfather, Wendell Noyes, described her as a quiet girl who would not have left home on her own. He declined to comment further on her disappear-

Residents described Celina as a sweet, friendly child. One of Celina's best friends, 11-year-old Makayla Riendeau, said Celina loves her mother and likes her stepfather and wouldn't run away. She said Celina is very athletic, is a stickler about getting her school work done on time and loves having friends over to her house.

By Wednesday afternoon, family members and friends were camped out on the porch of the three-story wooden home and shooed away reporters.

decade as young adults left and the people who stayed got older, moving past childbearing years.

"This place ain't dead yet, but it's got about half a foot in the grave," said Bob Frees, 61, of Moundsville, W.Va., which now has a population of just over 9,000. "The big-money jobs are all gone. We used to have the big mills and the rolling plants and stuff like that, and you could walk out of high school when you were 16 or 17 and get a \$15an-hour job."

Demographers put it a bit more formally.

"Some of the most isolated rural areas face a major uphill battle, with a broad area of the country emptying out," said Mark Mather, associate vice president of the Population Reference Bureau, a research group in

Washington, D.C. "Many rural areas can't attract workers because there aren't any jobs, and businesses won't relocate there because there aren't enough qualified workers. So they are caught in a downward spiral."

Rural towns are scrambling to attract new residents and stave off heavy funding cuts from financially strapped federal and

state governments. Delta Air Lines recently announced it would end flight service to 24 small airports, several of them in the Great Plains, and the U.S. Postal Service is mulling plans to close thousands of branches in mostly rural areas of the country. The University of Kansas this month opened a new medical school with a class of eight in Salina, a regional hub of nearly 50,000 people, in hopes of supporting nearby rural communities that have no doctors at all.

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THE MARKET AT A GLANCE

Stocks plunged Wednesday as the U.S. edged closer to defaulting on its debt and the economy showed more signs of deteriorating. Major indexes gave up all of their gains for the month.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 198.75 points, or 1.6 percent, to 12,302.55, its biggest one-day drop since early June. It has fallen for four days straight. The S&P 500 fell 27.05 points, or 2 percent, to 1,304.89. The technology-focused Nasdaq composite index fell 75.17 points, or 2.6 percent, to 2,764.79, its worst day in five months.

The Dow is headed for its worst weekly decline in nearly a year and is now 4 percent below the 2011 high it reached on April 29.

STATE-FUNDED PROGRAM TEACHES JOB SKILLS

Idaho Youth Corps program helps young Idahoans find summer work and sharpen their work force skills.

JEROME • Newly married and fresh off her first year of veterinary technician studies at the College of Southern Idaho in May, Jessica Cowen hoped to find summer work around animals.

Through the Idaho Youth Corps summer job program administered by the Idaho Department of Labor, Cowen's wish came true.

"I love my job," Cowen said Monday while exercising a husky cross shelter dog she's nicknamed Fang.

The gig is part-time; Cowen works about four hours a day at the shelter answering the phone, cleaning kennels, feeding animals, filling out paperwork and dealing with the public.

"The hardest part is handling rude people over the phone. That gets tricky," said Cowen, a 21-year-old Wendell resident. "I don't like that part of the job."

Cowen plans to gain full-time employment as a veterinary technician after she finishes a two-year program at CSI, and the skills she's learned this summer should come in handy with that pursuit.

"The program gives young people an opportunity to learn some soft skills: coming to work on time, learning what appropriate work attire is, how to work with a team, following instruction. It's that first notch in their belt that will hopefully help them secure better work later in life," said Ben Phillips, IDL grants manager.

The program began in 2009 with an infusion of \$2.9 million in federal stimulus funds. More than 830 young Idahoans were able to participate that year. Although those stimulus funds are now spent, the department saw the benefit of the program – which pays half of employees' minimum \$7.25 hourly wage — and decided to keep it going.

This year, IDL budgeted \$250,000 for the program and has put about 130 participants to work.

The falling availability of jobs through the program came just as the need for them has risen. In July 2009, when the program began, unemployment among Americans age 16-24 was at 18.5 percent, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. It increased to 19.1 percent last year and has continued to rise.

Idaho Department of Labor Region-

al Economist Jan Roeser said that means young people who want to work have to get out and find it.

"There aren't as many jobs as there were in 2006-2007, but there still are positions in fast food, medium service, restaurants," Roeser said. "However, some businesses may want candidates with additional skills ... maybe someone who speaks Spanish. ... or they want a resume. Some teens may not want to take the trouble."

Youth Corps participants are working in a variety of jobs, from outdoor conservation projects to office work for government agencies, schools, nonprofits and other organizations.

Jerome Animal Control Officer Gordon Leininger said without the program, the city wouldn't be able to afford Cowen's service.

"We're closing in on the end of our budget year and it's always tight anyway," he said. "This program has meant a world of difference for the shelter because we're always in need for extra help."

Cowen will likely volunteer at the shelter once her run with the program expires in mid-August, but she's enjoying her paycheck for now.

U.S. IKEA Plant Workers Vote to Join Union

DANVILLE, Va. (AP) • Workers at IKEA's only U.S. factory overwhelmingly voted Wednesday to unionize amid complaints they have been paid less, injured more and treated worse than the thousands of Europeans who work for the Swedish furniture giant.

The vote among workers at IKEA subsidiary Swedwood Danville was 221-69, according to IKEA and the union that will represent them in collective bargaining, the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers. The union said 312 workers were eligible to vote.

Swedwood acknowledged the vote and said it would honor its workers' wishes.

"As we have communicated from the start of this process, we fully support the right of our co-workers to make this decision," Ken Brown, site manager at the plant, said in a statement. "We accept their decision and will work with their union in a mutually cooperative and respectful manner."

Street had listed a litany of grievances – lower pay than their Swedish counterparts, unsafe working conditions, racial discrimination — that was in stark contrast with IKEA's vaunted global reputation as labor- and environment-friendly.

IKEA denied the allegations and said its own and independent reviews found the workers' complaints groundless.



Salmon Season Ends in Some Areas

A number of Idaho's chinook salmon seasons will close this week because fish have moved through the fishery areas and anglers have harvested a number of the available fish.

Areas that will close at the end of fishing hours today include the Park Hole section of the lower Salmon River and the South Fork Salmon River.

Closing the Park Hole section means all lower mainstem sections of the Salmon River will be closed to salmon fishing. The Little Salmon River will remain open.

All sections of the South Fork Salmon River will close to salmon fishing at the end of fishing hours today.

The daily limit in the southern section is six jack salmon smaller than 24 inches in total length, and the possession limit is 18 jack salmon. No adult salmon may be kept.

The upper Salmon River, from about the town of North Fork upstream to Ellis, remains open to salmon fishing.

In the Clearwater River drainage, all sections remain open to chinook salmon fishing. In the mainstem Clearwater River downstream of Orofino Bridge and the North Fork Clearwater River, anglers may harvest only jack salmon. The Snake River from Dug Bar upstream to Hells Canyon Dam also will remain open.



Kind of Trail Riding A growing group of mountain bikers find their 'adrenaline rush' at a complex trail system south of Kimberly

 $\mbox{{\bf KIMBERLY}} \bullet \mbox{{\bf With knobby tires rolling over boulders and}$ dusty terrain, mountain bikers of southern Idaho describe their sport as "thrilling," "exciting" and an "adrenaline rush."

One trail system south of Kimberly, called the Indian Spring Trail System, helps the sport live up to its reputation.

"There is something for everyone," said Nathan Fuller, president of the Southern Idaho Mountain Biking Association. "The lower trails are easier and there are technical trails for the experts?

Earlier this year, the Bureau of Land Management, with help from the International Mountain Biking Association, started planning new trails and maintenance for the old ones.

SIMBA also is talking with the BLM. The group hopes the trails extension will increase the number of riders who enjoy this outdoor activity and sustain the trails that already are in

When the trail system was originally marked the bikers rode illegally because the BLM didn't allow bikes or other mechanical vehicles on the land. Over the years, however, the BLM has eased its restrictions on the area and now there are nearly 40 miles of bike trials.

New bikers find it easy to better their skills on these trails because there are some that are challenging and some that are not.

"You can find anything you want out here," said Theresa Hyndman of Twin Falls, who started riding two years ago. Hyndman and some of the other bikers bring their dogs with them when they ride.

"They beat me up (the hills) but I beat them down," Hyndman said.

The area has created a community of bikers from the Magic Valley and elsewhere. Riders that aren't associated with SIMBA also share the trail with the organization.

"Mountain biking is really growing in this area," said Joe Aguirre of Twin Falls, who is not a member of SIMBA but rides the Indian Spring Trails at least once a week.

F&G Commission Still Reviewing Wolf Season, Quotas

Question: "I bought my 2011 wolf tag when I purchased my elk and deer tags. When will we know what the wolf seasons and quotas will be?"

Answer: The Idaho Fish and Game Commission is taking public input right now to use with recommendations from the department to set the 2011 wolf season when it meets in Salmon on July 27 and 28.

The department's proposal for the 2011 wolf season includes hunting and trapping and can be viewed in detail on the department's website listed below.

The primary objective this year is to use hunting and trapping as a means to reduce the statewide wolf populations to a level that is sustainable, meets federal recovery goals and reduces conflicts statewide. Specific proposals seek to maximize wolf harvest where wolf conflicts are the greatest.

Mandatory harvest reporting provides valuable information for ongoing monitoring and future season adjustments.

Part of the process to obtain public input involves a random survey of sportsmen and Idaho citizens. Input will be taken online from through July 25.

Below is a synopsis of the department's proposal; for more detail check out the website below.

• Wolf hunting seasons throughout most of the state are proposed to run from Aug. 30 to March 31. Limit two wolves per hunter, per year.

• Harvest quotas will be proposed in the Salmon, Southern Mountain, Beaverhead, Island Park and Sawtooth elk hunting zones, where hunting proved effective and additional wolf mortality occurs from control actions to resolve ongoing livestock depredations. Actual quotas have not yet been determined. These areas are also important corridors for population continuity



within Yellowstone, Wyo., and Montana populations. In the Beaverhead and Island Park zones the hunting season would close on Dec.

• The remainder of the state will not have wolf harvest quotas. For biologists to monitor statewide harvest a requirement to report harvested wolves within 72 hours would also be implemented.

· Based on hunter success in 2009 and the inability of hunting pressure to manage wolves across most of their range in North America, a trapping season has been proposed from Dec. 1 through Feb. 15 in all or some of the Panhandle, Lolo, Dworshak-Elk City, Selway and Middle Fork Zones.

 With support of the Idaho Trappers Association, state regulations would require wolf-specific training before trapping for wolves, reporting requirements and restrictions on the types of traps used. The department proposal is for a bag limit of five wolves for trapping.

• Fish and Game reviewed trapping seasons in Alaska and western Canada in developing its proposal. A 10-week trapping season will be evaluated for Idaho trapper participation, catch rates, gear effectiveness, incidental take and potential conflicts with other uses.

As soon as the commission sets the wolf seasons, department staff will post the new rules at license vendors and regional of-





What Comes After the Hubble Space Telescope?

ith the space shuttles now embarking on their second careers as museum exhibits, there's no shortage of opinions on what constitutes the program's greatest achievements. As an alumnus of the Hubble Space Telescope project, perhaps I may be forgiven for my bias in voting for the dramatic 1993 repair of Hubble's flawed optics.

But the shuttle can boast of another Hubblerelated achievement that's often overlooked: Five visits to Hubble over 15 years not only swapped old equipment for state-of-the-art upgrades, but also boosted its decaying orbit to forestall eventual atmospheric re-entry. Without further shuttle reboosts, many have asked what will replace Hubble when (sometime after 2019) it plummets into the Pacific Ocean on a controlled, fiery death dive.

The canonical answer is that Hubble's successor will be the James Webb Space Telescope, with a mirror 2.7 times wider. Webb is scheduled for launch no earlier than 2018, although recent Congressional budget slashing may force its total cancellation (despite \$6.5 billion having already been spent, and construction of the telescope nearing completion). But Webb is actually not an optical telescope; its instruments will operate exclusively in the infrared part of the spectrum. So unlike Hubble, none of Webb's images will appear in natural colors.

But make no mistake: Assuming it survives its brush with the austerity

axe, Webb will produce spectacular science which will build on Hubble's accomplishments. Still, to most eyes, it won't be Hubble's successor.

Big science requires long-term thinking, and drafts of a largest-ever optical space telescope are already on the drawing board. At Hubble's home, the Space Telescope Science Institute, astro-engineers are dreaming of the Advanced Technology Large-Aperture Space Telescope (ATLAST), a behemoth 3.4 to 7 times wider than Hubble. Currently, ATLAST would launch no sooner than 2025, but when - or if it actually happens remains to be seen.




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uestion: I have to file bankruptcy, but

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nswer: In a Ch. 7 bankruptcy, your choices are to surrender the car or to keep it and pay. If you keep it, you must agree to reaffirm your debt and continue making the monthly payments, or redeem it by paying what the car is worth instead of what you owe on it. To redeem, you ordinarily have to pay in a lump sum. Chances are, if you could afford to redeem, you would not have to file bankruptcy.

In a Ch. 13 bankruptcy, you may be able to do the equivalent of redemption by paying back only the value of the car, with reduced interest, over the life of your Ch. 13 Plan. This is called a "cram down" because you don't pay the entire loan, only the value of the car. Your payments will probably go down because the loan term can be extended. Whether you qualify for a 'cram down" depends in part on whether the loan was for the purpose of buying the car, or whether the title to the car was taken as collateral for a personal or business loan. If the loan was not for the purpose of buying the car, you probably qualify for a "cram down". However, this is a highly technical point in a very complex body of law. SEOUL, South Korea • Walls of mud barreling down a hill buried 10 college students sleeping outside Seoul, and flash floods submerged streets and subway stations in the South Korean capital, killing at least 36 people.

The students were engulfed by a landslide Wednesday in Chuncheon, about 68 miles (110 kilometers) northeast of Seoul, said fire marshal Byun In-soo. A married couple and a convenience store owner also

The roar of the landslide sounded like a massive explosion or a freight train, witnesses interviewed on television said. They described people screaming as buildings were carried away by rivers of mud.

About 670 firefighters, soldiers, police and others rushed to rescue those trapped and extract the dead from the mud and wreckage in Chuncheon, where 24 others were injured and sev-

eral buildings destroyed. Yonhap news agency reported the 10 students attended Inha University in Incheon, but did not confirm they all were South Korean. The group was volunteering

ing the lower part of a submerged two-level bridge. at a local elementary school.

The heavy rain since Tuesday left about 620 people homeless and flooded 720 houses and about 100 vehicles throughout South Korea, the emergency management agency said.

About 17 inches (440 millimeters) of rain fell on Seoul and more than 13 inches (340 millimeters) on Chuncheon in the last two days, about 15 times more than the average two-day rainfall at this time of year, according to the state-run Korea Meteorological Administration.

Weather officials said another 10 inches (254 millimeters) could fall in northern South Korea, including Seoul, through Friday.

The Seoul Metropolitan Police Agency issued a traffic emergency, mobilizing more officers to deal with the inclement weather.

Seoul, a bustling capital of 10 million, shut down portions of two major highways stretching along each side of the main Han River because of high water, said disaster

official Kim Ji-hwan. A dam located just east of Seoul was discharging 16,400 tons of water per second, said Cha Jun-ho from the Han River Flood Control Office. The dam already discharged about 1,000 tons per second days before the recent down-

CIRCUMCISION BAN TO BE STRICKEN FROM SF BALLOT

A California Superior Court judge ruled on a proposed law that would have made male circumcision illegal, saying it is a state matter, not a city matter.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) • A judge said Wednesday she intends to strike a ban on male circumcision from the city's Novem-

Superior Court Judge Loretta Giorgi said in a tentative ruling that the proposed law prohibiting circumcision of male children violates a California law that makes regulating medical procedures a function of the

"It serves no legitimate purpose to allow a measure whose invalidity can be determined as a matter of law to remain on the ballot," Giorgi wrote.

Giorgi ordered San Francisco's elections director to remove the controversial measure from the ballot that would have made the city the first in the nation to hold a public vote on whether to outlaw the circumcision of minors.

The citizens' initiative, which made the ballot in May after supporters gathered the required 7,163 signatures, would have made the practice a misdemeanor offense punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000 or up to one year in jail.

The initiative did not offer exemptions for religious rituals such as the Jewish bris or Muslim khitan.

The city attorney's office, which had

joined several Jewish organizations in challenging the ban in court, said Giorgi plans to hear arguments on the issue Thursday before making her ruling final.

Backers had argued the ban was necessary to prevent a form of genital mutilation from being forced on children.

Critics contended the initiative posed a threat to constitutionally protected religious freedoms and cited comic books and trading cards distributed by the measure's proponents that carried images of a blonde, blue-eyed superhero and four evil Jewish characters.

The ban's sponsor, anti-circumcision activist Lloyd Schofield, said that he disagreed with the judge's interpretation and deliberately crafted a local ordinance "because for 10 years, no one on a statewide or national level would even consider this."

Even if San Francisco voters will not be able to make their views known, the attention surrounding the ballot initiative has been good for circumcision opponents, Schofield said.

"The mission won't be accomplished until men enjoy the same protection as women from forced genital mutilation, but everything we can achieve on the way to that goal is a step in the right direction," he said. "Just getting people to think and discuss this is very rewarding because people don't think about this, they just do it auto-

Though state law prohibits cities and counties from regulating medical procedures, two California Assembly members have introduced a bill that would specifically pre-empt local governments from enacting laws regarding male circumcision.

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REPORT: EQUIPMENT FLAWS CAUSED **CHINA CRASH**

BEIJING (AP) • Design flaws in signal equipment and human error caused last weekend's high-speed train crash that killed at least 39 people, state media reported Thursday. The reports come in the

face public anger in China about the government's handling of the accident near Wenzhou in Zhejiang Province. dPremier Wen Jiabao has called for a sweeping and transparent probe into the crash between two bullet trains, which also hurt more than 190 people. Six train cars derailed and

four fell about 65 to 100 feet from a viaduct Saturday night after one train plowed into the back of a stalled train.

The government has ordered a two-month safety campaign for its railway system amid questions about how the crash occurred. Wen called for the campaign to be widened to target all transport infrastructure, coal mines, construction sites, and industries dealing with dangerous chemicals.

The accident was the biggest blow yet to China's burgeoning high-speed rail ambitions that have been highlighted as a symbol of the countries rising economic and technological prowess.

NY PILOT RESCUED FROM LAKE HURON: PEOPLE DEPEND ON ME

HARBOR BEACH, Mich. (AP) • A New York pilot who crashed into Lake Huron and survived without a life jacket by swimming and treading water for about 17 hours says he was finally rescued Wednesday when he frantically waved a sock to get the attention of people on a boat.

Michael Trapp, 42, said he shed his pants and shoes to stay afloat amid daylight, darkness and high waves off Michigan's eastern coast. He told a TV station that he was inspired to keep going because "there's a lot of people that depend on me."

"It's amazing what goes on in your mind when you're laying in water and you look up at the skies and watch the shooting stars and watch meteorites go round. Gives you time to realize what's important in life at that point," Trapp told WWNY-TV in Watertown, N.Y., from a hospital in Harbor Beach, Mich.

Later Wednesday, he was transferred to a Covenant HealthCare hospital in Saginaw, Mich. There, he issued a brief statement of appreciation.

"Feeling good, really sore from treading water ... anxious to see family, in good spirits, happy to be out of the water," the statement said. "Currently, extremely thankful to the good folks at Harbor Beach and Covenant HealthCare."

The Gouverneur, N.Y., man, who owns an auto repair shop, was flying a small plane alone to a family reunion in Eau Claire, Wis., when his engine began stalling over Lake Huron on Tuesday. He said he contacted the Federal Aviation Administration and declared, "I'm going in right now."

"Holy moley," Trapp thought to himself, "what in the world just went on?"

He told the TV station that he took off his pants and shoes and "just went into survival mode." He doesn't consider himself physically fit at 5 feet, 10 inches tall and 200 pounds.

"I kept going, kept going. There's a lot of things I want to do yet," Trapp said.

He said he was unsuccessful in using a credit card to try to reflect the sun and get the attention of several boats that were in the area. Finally, people on a boat called Eagle's Nest spotted him waving a sock around 10:30 a.m. Wednesday and pulled him aboard — "by the grace of God," he said.

Trapp believes he swam 15 miles after his two-seat Cessna crashed 17 miles from shore, the U.S. Coast Guard said.

Harbor Beach Police Chief Sid Schock said Trapp was "quite chilled" but talking when he was put in an ambulance, about 125 miles northeast of Detroit. He was examined at a local hospital, then transferred about 90 miles to Covenant Health-Care in Saginaw where he was in good condition, spokeswoman Kristin Knoll said.

Trapp told WWNY that he couldn't walk. He did not immediately return a phone message from The Associated Press seeking comment about his extraordinary ordeal

The president of the Harbor Beach hospital, Ed Gamache, would not discuss Trapp's health but said he was talking to doctors and in "excellent spirits."

"It's a remarkable story;" Gamache said.

At Trapp's auto garage in Gouverneur, N.Y., there was high praise for the boss.

"He's just strong-willed," Mike Cutway said of Trapp's survival swim.

Jim Dreyer, a Grand Rapids-area man who has swum across Lake Huron and other Great Lakes, said Trapp's weight probably helped insulate him against cold water.

"It's amazing what the human spirit is capable of," Dreyer told the AP.

Soldier Found Guilty of Killing Afghan Civilian

A military jury convicted Sgt. Derrick Miller of the U.S. Army National Guard, not believing his legal defense of self-defense.

FORT CAMPBELL, Ky. • A U.S. Army National Guardsman was sentenced Wednesday to life in prison with the chance of parole for the murder of an Afghan civilian.

Sgt. Derrick Miller of Hagerstown, Md., shook hands with several soldiers in his unit after the 10-member military jury delivered the sentence at Fort Campbell after two hours of deliberation. The 28-year-old was found guilty of premeditated murder.

His attorney had argued during two days of testimony that Miller acted in self-defense when he shot a man last September. The military has identified him as Atta Mohammed but his name was not used in court.

Defense attorney Charles Gittins told the jury that Miller stopped the man for questioning when he walked through a defensive perimeter that Miller's unit had set up around a mortar unit.

Gittins said Miller believed the man could be a threat to his unit and that during questioning the man tried to grab Miller's weapon.

Gittins told the military panel during closing arguments that if they believed Miller acted in self-defense, they must acquit

"You have Sgt. Miller's life in your hands," Gittins said.

But Spc. Charles Miller, an eyewitness and Guardsman from Maryland, testified he heard Sgt. Miller threatening to kill the man if he didn't tell the truth and then straddling the man, who was lying on his back, before shooting him in the head.

Prosecuting attorney Maj. Matt Calarco said during closing arguments, "Immediately following the event the accused said, 'I shot him. He was a liar:"

The jury deliberated for less than three hours before finding Miller guilty.

Miller showed no reaction to the jury's decision to convict, but family members cried quietly in their seats.

Miller, a husband and father of two, was assigned to a Connecticut National Guard unit and attached to the 101st Airborne Division at the time of the shooting in Eastern Afghanistan. After joining the National Guard in 2006, Miller had three combat deployments and had recently been promoted, said Capt. Michael Tregle, one of his two attorneys.

"Derrick Miller made a bad decision, but he deserves the opportunity for life," Tregle said during the sentencing phase.

Calarco said Miller's shooting of an unarmed Afghan civilian and leaving his body in a latrine, was not in accordance with military standards.

KERRY LIFTS HOLD ON CASH FOR CUBA DEMOCRACY PROMOTION

WASHINGTON (AP) •

A senior U.S. senator says the Obama administration has agreed to review its democracy promotion programs in communist Cuba.

Sen. John Kerry of Massachusetts had been blocking \$20 million in funding for the programs. Frederick Jones, who is Kerry's spokesman, says Kerry on Wednesday lifted his hold. But the funds still face a hold from fellow Democratic Sen. Patrick Leahy of Vermont.

Jones has said the State Department and USAID have agreed to report results of their review to lawmakers.

Kerry has said he was seeking to ensure the effectiveness of the program to promote human rights and basic freedoms.

Established in 1996, the Cuba Program has been beset with reports that some grantees misused funds and the government provided little oversight.

Rep. Ileana Ros-Lehtinen of Florida, the chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee who was born in Havana and fled with her parents following the Cuban Revolution, praised Kerry and expressed disappointment with Leahy.

"The people of Cuba certainly don't deserve to be victims of this type of political wrangling or manipulation," Ros Lehtinen said.

"Each day this hold remains is another day that those seeking freedom and democracy on the island are denied the critical assistance these programs would provide?"

San Diego Police: Sailboat Too Crowded in Fatal Calif. Mishap

SAN DIEGO • Too many people were on board a sailboat that capsized and killed two passengers during an outing in San Diego Bay for people with special needs, police said Wednesday.

The San Diego Harber De

The San Diego Harbor Police found that overloading, the vessel's condition and the absence of lifejackets contributed to the March 27 mishap.

Investigators said the sail was held together with duct tape and staples, and the vessel had wear and tear to be expected of a boat made in 1988.

When it capsized, there were 10 people aboard the 26-foot boat, which is designed to sleep six people, said Harbor Police Chief John Bolduc. Investigators also found the weight on board was unevenly distributed.

San Diego County prosecutors reviewed the findings and do not plan criminal charges.

"We just don't feel like we have enough evidence to support a charge of criminal negligence," Bolduc said. "We can't re-create exactly what happened that evening, but we think there are some contributing factors, but certainly none that

rise to the level of criminal charges."
Police had strong words

for Heart of Sailing Foundation founder George Saidah, who was piloting the boat and frequently took passengers on trips for the Bloomington, Ind.-based charity.

"We are not labeling him an experienced captain, he's labeled himself as that," Bolduc said at a news conference. "We don't know what his specific experience was, but certainly every vessel operator needs to know the limitations of their vessel and they ultimately have to oversee the safety of their passengers."

Saidah did not immediately respond to an email seeking comment.

John Shean, an attorney and Heart of Sailing's board president, said he had not seen the police report and could not comment on its findings.

"They spent four months looking into this," Shean said. "I'm sure they've done a thorough job."

In March, Shean said a gust of wind caused the boat to tip. He said Wednesday that he still believed that was a factor. However, Bolduc said investigators found no evidence that weather contributed the benefit of the said of the said

tributed to the mishap. Chao Chen, 73, and his son, Jun Chen, 48, of San

Diego, died from drowning. They were the grandfather and uncle of an 11-year-old autistic boy on the boat. Bolduc said neither adult was wearing a life jacket, though there were "plenty" available on board.

All eight others aboard, including an adult with special needs, were dumped into 55-degree water.

Life jackets are required for children under 16 and recommended for adults. Heart of Sailing was

founded in 2004 by Saidah, a software entrepreneur and sailor who was motivated by his experience with a loved one with a cognitive disorder. Shean said the group has voluntarily suspended voyages on the West Coast since the March mishap and hopes the trips can resume now that the investigation is complete.

The sailboat's manufacturer, Costa Mesa-based MacGregor Yacht Corp., has said that when a 1,200-pound water tank that runs along the centerline of the hull is full, the boat should spring back up immediately if it leans too far into the water.

Investigators said they found the tank empty after it was upside down for three hours but could not determine if it was full when the boat capsized.

The bill, approved by voice vote by a House Appropriations subcommittee, also would clamp new restrictions on aid for Pakistan as well as Middle East allies such as Egypt and Yemen, requiring the State Department to first certify that those countries are cooperating in the fight against terrorism.

A Republican-backed provision would cut aid for family planning organizations and reinstate the "Global Gag Rule;" which prohibits agencies that receive U.S. funds from either performing abortions or providing advice or information about the procedure. The rule was repealed by President Barack Obama in January

Although the bill's prospects are uncertain the measure would need to be approved by the Democrat-controlled Senate and signed by Obama international relief groups attacked some of the proposed aid cuts as irresponsible, saying they would hamper global efforts to reduce poverty and respond to famines and other crises. The measure would cut foreign-aid funding by about 11 percent from current

The cuts "will have a huge impact on the lives of those who are already marginalized in the poorest corners of the Earth," said Samuel Worthington, president of InterAction, an alliance of U.S.-based international nongovernmental organizations.

Republican lawmakers said the bill would prioritize programs that serve U.S. national interests while scaling back overall spending. "In this difficult geopolitical and economic climate, the American people deserve a policy that is based on American principles, looks out for American interests and wisely invests American dollars," Rep. Kay Granger, R-Texas, chairwoman of the Appropriations subcommittee on State and foreign operations, said Wednesday.

Republicans and Democrats agreed on several key provisions, including an increase in aid for "frontline states" - Pakistan, Afghanistan and Iraq. Granger and the subcommittee's ranking Democrat, Rep. Nita Lowey, D-N.Y., both favored attaching strings to aid for Pakistan and several Middle Eastern countries, though Lowey decried cuts in disaster relief, health programs and family planning.

Serb Mob Sets Kosovo **Border Post on Fire**

JARINJE, Kosovo • Polish and American peacekeepers exchanged fire with attackers in northern Kosovo late Wednesday and fired tear gas to disperse a mob of violent Serbs attacking an outpost at Kosovo's border post with Serbia, a NATO official said.

The violence erupted hours after Kosovo's special police ended an operation to take over control of two borders posts leaving once policeman dead. A mob of about 200 Serbs hurled firebombs and set a customs post ablaze soon after Kosovo police withdrew.

NATO responded by sending hundreds of troops in an attempt to quell the violence and came under fire as it did so, NATO spokesman, Cpt. Hans Wichter told The Associated Press. No injuries were

"The gate is now clear," Wichter said, but added there was a risk of further attacks on the border post as around one hundred demonstrators are close to the checkpoint.

Additional French and American troops were sent to a second post bordering Serbia, also under threat of at-

The violence is a setback for NATO-led efforts to broker a deal that would leave Kosovo officials in charge of the border crossings after special police units and local Serbs remove roadblocks.

NATO's Kosovo commander, Maj. Gen. Erhard Buehler is still talking to both sides in search of a solution, Wichter said.

Video shown on Serbia's state-run RTS television showed masked men demolishing the border post as European Union police leapt into cars and evacuated the

area. The mobs attacked a crew from the official Serbian Tanjug news agency, seriously injuring one of two cameramen and slightly injuring another.

The attacks follow days of mounting tension between ethnic Albanians and minority Serbs after Kosovo Prime Minister, Hashim Thaci ordered special police units to take over two disputed border posts that were previously manned by Serb members of the police under EU supervision.

Thaci blamed the attack on Serbia's top leaders saying they want to partition Kosovo along ethnic lines.

"There will be no turning back and Serbia's plan for the division of Kosovo's north will never happen?'

Earlier on Wednesday Kosovo authorities declared the operation over, and said special police units withdrew from the area.

Nicholas Hawton, spokesman for the EU police mission in Kosovo, condemned the attack and appealed for people to remain calm, while Serbia's President Boris Tadic also urged an "immediate end" to violence in the north of Kosovo, a statement from his office said.

"(The) hooligans who cause violence are not defending Serbia or the Serbian citizens," said Tadic. He also called on Kosovo Serbs to re-

The European Union has condemned the police action that led to the rise in tensions in Kosovo.

Crowds of Serbs staged a similar attack on the same border posts in 2008 in reaction to Kosovo's declaration of independence.

The borderposts were torched and United Nations staff — then in charge of the checkpoints - forced to abandon them. Customs controls were never fully established ever since.

Broncos Can't Wear

All Blue at Home

Rival coaches claim the all-blue setup provides Boise State an unfair advantage because it makes it harder to break down game film.

BOISE (AP) • Boise State players will no longer sport their all-blue uniforms for conference games on Bronco Stadium's iconic blue turf, the result of a concession school officials say they made last year as part of the team's entrance into the Mountain West Confer-

League Commissioner Craig Thompson said Tuesday during the league meeting that coaches believe Boise State gets a competitive edge when players wear blue helmets, jerseys and pants at home.

The Broncos have worn all blue at home for several years and built a 77-2 record and a 32-game winning streak on their home turf since 1999.

Coach Chris Petersen says his team intends to wear the signature all-blue uniforms for nonconference games against Tulsa and Nevada, but he finds the restriction for league games silly and an erosion of the team's identity.

"It's a tragedy of college

football," Petersen told The Idaho Statesman. "I thought it was ridiculous. That's our colors. That's who we are. That's who our fans have wanted us to be since I've been at Boise State. That's what it's been through and through."

Petersen also notes the rule doesn't apply to schools that wear all green uniforms and play on green turf or natural grass, like Colorado State or Hawaii.

The Broncos have other fashion options for home games - gray, orange or white jerseys and white pants. Team officials will have to apply for an NCAA waiver if they opt to don white jerseys at home.

"We have some combinations, and we'll have to use them," Petersen said.

Boise State's blue advantage has never been scientifically proven. But opposing coaches and players for years have complained about difficulties watching game film and tracking nuances in Boise State's presnap movements. Petersen argues the use of high-definition cameras and film has remedied any visual challenges, but the league's members and commissioner aren't buying it.

"What we heard from our coaches is 'a competitive advantage? It's as simple as that," Thompson said.

Pac-12 Launches Network

NEW YORK (AP) • Even during its run to the BCS title game last season, Oregon played one contest that wasn't televised.

Ducks coach Chip Kelly will no longer have to hedge when out-of-state recruits' parents ask if they'll be able to watch their sons on TV. The Pac-12 announced Wednesday that it was launching its own net-

"Instead of saying, 'As long as we're playing well, we're on TV; it's a guarantee now that every game is available," Kelly said.

The location of the announcement was appropriate: Commissioner Larry Scott made it while holding a media day far from the Pacific in New York City for the second straight year. The nationwide network and the cross-country trips are part of Scott's grand plan to raise the conference's profile all over America.

The new venture is actually the Pac-12 Networks, plural. There will be a national channel along with six regional offerings: Washington, Oregon, Northern California, Southern California, Arizona and Mountain.

Scott called it "a truly unique, one-of-a-kind initiative to create exposure that's unprecedented." The Big Ten showed the value of a conference network when it launched one in 2007, but this is the first to combine national and regional channels.

The Pac-12 partnered with cable companies Comcast, Cox, Time Warner and Bright House to distribute the networks but wholly owns them.

Once the channels launch in August 2012, they will broadcast about 850 sporting events a year - 350 nationally and 500 regionally. Subscribers will also be able to watch games on mobile devices.

NEW YORK (AP) • Dustin Ackley and the rest of the Seattle Mariners had the same thought as they piled up the hits Wednesday: Don't stop.

By the time they were done, everyone was happy to talk about the No. 17.

The Mariners snapped their 17-game losing streak with a 9-2 victory over the New York Yankees, boosted by a season-high 17-hit attack that featured strong performances by Ichiro Suzuki and Ackley.

"It seemed like everything was clicking today," Ackley said. "It's a good feeling."

Felix Hernandez pitched seven innings for his third straight win in the Bronx. Suzuki had four hits and scored two runs. Ackley tripled among his three hits and drove in three runs as the Mariners did something they failed to accomplish during the skid: They turned an opponent's mistake into a big inning.

Seattle took 21 days worth of frustration out on three relievers, scoring five runs in the seventh inning - highlighted by Mike Carp's bases-loaded triple - after Robinson Cano flubbed a flip to Derek Jeter at second base for an error.

The Mariners added two more in the ninth when Adam Kennedy hit an RBI double that center fielder Curtis Granderson lost in the sun, then scored on Carp's single to give Seattle its most runs since it had nine in a win against Tampa Bay on June 5.

"These guys haven't felt good in a long time," manager Eric Wedge said. "We've got a long flight, an off day tomorrow and this is a real big win for us. When you've got a monkey on your back that size, it's damn hard to get it off."

Pete Carroll's second training camp in charge of the Seahawks already has a specific question: who will be the quarterback when the season begins on Sept. 11 at San Francis-

It could have been a simple answer had Seattle and Hasselbeck reached agreement on a new contract that likely would have kept him in a Seahawks uniform for the rest of

In what turned out to be his final game as a Seahawk at home, Hasselbeck threw a playoff career-high four touchdown passes as he directed one of the biggest upsets in playoff history when Seattle beat New Orleans 41-36

in January.

The final image from that night was Hasselbeck walking off the field with his son hoisted on his shoulders and his daughters at his side. Hindsight shows it was a storybook final image to a career in Seattle that started off shaky but eventually saw Hasselbeck lead the Seahawks to the highest points in their history, including their only Super Bowl appearance.

"I wish he was here, because he's a good friend of mine and he's a leader for this team and this organization," Seattle tight end John Carlson said. "He's beloved in this city for what he does on the field but also what he does off the field, so he will be greatly missed."

With Hasselbeck gone the job will fall immediately to Charlie Whitehurst — at least until Aug. 4, when Tarvaris Jackson can get on the field along with the rest of Seattle's

free agent signings. Jackson was Seattle's first free agent target, agreeing to a deal that ultimately allowed Seattle to pull back from Hasselbeck. After Jackson was locked up, Seattle spent Day 2 of free agency agreeing to a three-year deal with offensive lineman Robert Gallery, plugging the final gap in Seattle's line.

Bringing in Gallery was expected the moment Tom Cable was hired as an assistant head coach in charge of the offensive line and revamping Seattle's running game.

Later Wednesday, the Seahawks added another big name when a person with knowledge of the agreement told The Associated Press that Seattle had agreed to terms with former Minnesota wide receiver Sidney Rice. The person spoke on condition of anonymity because free agents aren't allowed

title. to sign contracts until Friday. Foxsports.com first report-

ed Rice's five-year deal with Seattle. Two seasons ago, Rice was a Pro Bowl selection after catching 83 passes for 1,312 yards and eight touchdowns.

While Rice and Gallery bring big names to the Seahawks, much of the focus during training camp will be on Whitehurst and whether he can make the strides he failed to make last year when he was first brought over from San Diego in a trade and given an opportunity to win the starting

The only two starts Whitehurst made last season came in games that Hasselbeck was injured, although one of those was the season finale when Whitehurst managed the Seahawks to a 16-6 win over St. Louis to wrap up the division

NBA Sides to Resume **Lockout Talks** Monday

The lockout started in June after both sides were too far apart to reach a new labor agreement before the old one expired.

NEW YORK (AP) • NBA owners and players will resume talks toward a new collective bargaining agreement Monday, a month after the lockout started, people with knowledge of the plans said Wednesday.

Though representatives from the sides have been talking and met on multiple occasions since July 1, this will be the first meeting to include Commissioner David Stern, union executive director Billy Hunter and president Derek Fisher of the Lakers, and owners, the people told The Associated Press. They spoke on condition of anonymity because the talks are supposed to be confidential.

The sides were still far apart on numerous economic issues when owners voted to lock out the players when the old collective bargaining agreement expired at the end of the day June 30.

The first full meeting after the lockout in the summer of 1998 also came in early August, and the NBA went on to lose games to a work stoppage for the only time.

That possibility looms again, with owners seeking significant changes to the division of revenues, salary cap and other financial areas. The league says it lost about \$300 million last season and has no chance to make a profit under the old system, which guaranteed the players 57 percent of basketball-related income.

Players offered to reduce that to 54.3 percent, but say the owners' last proposal for a new CBA would cut their guarantee around 40 percent.

The NBA has released its 2011-12 schedule, which would begin on Nov. 1, but that would be jeopardized if the sides can't start chipping away at their differences soon.

Hunter indicated after the last talks that perhaps they could start with something besides the finances when talks resumed, since they could never get past that hurdle and onto other things previously.





London Calling: One Year Left Until 2012 Olympics

LONDON (AP) • London celebrated the one-year countdown to the 2012 Games with the first dive into the new Olympic pool, the presentation of medals and a call to the world's athletes to compete in the country that "invented modern sport."

Exactly one year from Wednesday - on July 27, 2012 - London will be staging the opening ceremony of the Olympics, the first city to host the world's biggest sports festival for a third time after previous games in 1908 and 1948.

In a live televised ceremony in Trafalgar Square, IOC President Jacques Rogge formally invited 202 national Olympic committees from around the world to send their athletes to the British capital.

"The athletes will be ready, so will London," he said.

The ceremony took place in the same square where thousands of people celebrated on July 6, 2005, when Rogge opened a sealed envelope in Singapore and announced that London had won the right to host the Olympics, beating rival bids from Madrid, Paris, New York and Moscow.

"A dream was born when the IOC awarded the 2012 Games to London," Rogge said. "The world's finest athletes began dreaming of competing in this magnificent city, in packed state-ofthe-art venues, and in front of passionate crowds.

"As in 1908 and 1948, they knew they would be coming to the nation that invented modern sport and the concept of fair play."

British Prime Minister David Cameron said the Olympics would showcase the nation at its best.

"This has the makings of a great British success story," he said at the ceremony. "With a year to go, it's on time, it's on budget. ... We must offer the greatest ever games.

The festivities started across town at the new, gleaming aquatics center in the Olympic Park in east London, where 2009 world champion Tom Daley performed the first dive into the pool, knifing cleanly into the water with an inward 11/2 somersault pike.

"It was great - a bit cold actually," Daley said. "It's going to be awesome."

A few minutes later, several former British Olympic athletes - including javelin throwers Steve Backley and Tessa Sanderson and 400meter runner Roger Black – took part in the first "race" in the pool. Olympic swimmer Mark Foster was the easy winner.

The ceremony also featured the unveiling of the Olympic medals by Princess Anne, an IOC member and former Olympic equestrian competitor. The medals are the biggest for a Summer Olympics — measuring 3.35 inches in diameter and weighing 13.2 to 14.1 ounces.

Designed by British artist David Watkins, the medals feature Nike, the Greek goddess of victory, on one side. On the other is a complex image containing five symbolic elements, including the River Thames.

The show also included a performance of David Bowie's song "Heroes" by British pop group The Feeling and a typically bombastic speech by colorful London Mayor Boris Johnson.

"The streets will be ready," he said. "The trains will be ready. The taxis will be ready. The theaters will be ready. The buses will be ready. The hotels will be ready.

"The Olympic venues are already so ready that we might as well call a snap (early) Olympics tomorrow and catch the rest of the world napping. The people of London will be ready to welcome the world's finest athletes to the greatest games that have ever been held."

Friends Remember Peterson

Yesterday's National Extremes

The troubled Olympic freestyle skier was found dead Monday in Utah, in what police ruled a suicide.

PARK CITY, Utah (AP) • Hans Gardner shouted as he headed down the steep ramp and slapped his thigh the way Olympic silver medalist Jeret "Speedy" Peterson often did.

"I wanted to go out there and be as strong as I could ... while letting him motivate me," the rookie said Wednesday, a day after learning that police said one of the world's most innovative freestyle skiers had killed himself just miles down the road in Lambs Canyon.

"It definitely was hard. I cried up on the ramp," Gardner said. "We're all going to miss him a lot. I want to let his legacy influence me in a positive way."

Though the 29-year-old Peterson gained fame for his moves - the one-of-a-kind Hurricane - he also had personal problems. He had been cited for drunken driving Friday in Hailey, Idaho, and had pleaded not guilty.

Monday night, Utah authorities say he called 911 before shooting himself.

Police found Peterson near his car along the canyon road between Salt Lake City and Park City. They said a suicide note was found nearby. Authorities will turn it over to

Peterson's family, but don't plan to release it.

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

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

During the Spingold tournament, at last summer's Nationals in New Orleans, Milan Macura of the Czech Republic generously volunteered this deal, where he had missed a small extra chance.

Macura declared four hearts,

and on a spade lead and continuation, he ruffed and took two rounds of trump. He next cashed dummy's two top clubs. The 4-1 club split seemed to be forcing him to rely on the diamond finesse, but Macura could tell from the discarding that the diamond finesse was unlikely to succeed. Accordingly, he now played ace, king and a third diamond, hoping to endplay East for a ruff and discard. Alas for him, Rose Meltzer as West alertly ruffed her partner's diamond winner to cash her side's club tricks for down one.

As Macura pointed out, a better line would have been to ruff the spade continuation at trick two, draw two rounds of trump ending in dummy, and ruff a third spade. Then he could lead a low club from hand, planning to duck the trick altogether.

If East wins the trick and has a club left, declarer is in no danger. If not, the defenders must concede a ruff and discard or lead diamonds into the tenace, unless East has the third trump. If West puts up a high club on the first round of the suit to avoid an endplay on his partner, declarer wins in dummy, and the club spots are now good enough to hold the losers to one trick.

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After years of living in apartments, I have learned the direction of a blind's slats should change depending on the location of the window.

If the window is on the ground floor, the blind should be closed slats up. Otherwise, people can see in from the floors above. This information is particularly useful in multistory neighborhoods and apartment complexes.

Charges Considered for 26 people Protesting Activist Case


SALT LAKE CITY • City prosecutors on Wednesday considered criminal charges for 26 people arrested after they blocked traffic and the light rail downtown while protesting the sentencing of an environmental activist who thwarted a 2008 government auction of oil and gas leases

A federal judge on Tuesday sentenced Tim DeChristopher, 29, to two years in prison and three years of probation, and fined him \$10,000. He was accused of running up bids at the auction of oil and gas leases on public land near Utah's Arches and Canyonlands national parks.

DeChristopher maintains his actions were an act of civil disobedience designed to bring attention to the problems of climate change.

The protesters had staged a sit-in outside two entrances at the federal courthouse downtown where the sentencing took place, then used plastic zip ties to link their wrists together to form a human chain and sat in the street in front of the U.S. District Court building.

"We had to make sure that adequate attention was brought to this cause," said Ashley Anderson, the co-founder of DeChristoher's climate change activist nonprofit group and one of those arrested. "Business as usual and the status quo was what we intended to disrupt ... we wanted to show that business as usual is what is killing the planet."



Opening Statements Set for Thursday in Jeffs Trial

SAN ANGELO, Texas (AP) • A judge on Wednesday dealt a blow to the defense of polygamist religious leader Warren Jeffs, refusing to suppress evidence police seized during a 2008 raid on his sect's remote West Texas compound.

District Judge Barbara Walther's decision clears the way for a small mountain of documents - including marriage and birth records, and thousands of pages of Jeffs' own writing in personal journals — to be presented to the jury during Jeffs' sexual assault trial. Jurors also may be able to see DNA evidence collected from children living on the com-

Opening statements in the case are now set for Thursday morning, after one more suppression hearing.

This time, Jeffs' attorneys are seeking the suppression of evidence recovered when Jeffs was arrested, after a 2006 traffic stop along a highway outside Apex, Nevada. Walther said she would hear arguments on that for about an hour before the jury is seated, then wanted both sides to be ready with opening state-

Jeffs, head of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, is charged with sexually assaulting two underage girls. If convicted, he could receive a maximum sentence of 119 years to life in prison.

He also is scheduled to go to trial on a separate bigamy charge in October. Jeffs' sect is a radical offshoot of the mainstream Mormon church that believes polygamy brings exaltation in heaven. It has more than 10,000 members nationwide, and his high-powered defense team - which has included seven attorneys is being financed by an FLDS land trust believed to be worth more than \$110 million.

Jeffs was in hiding and had made the FBI's "Most-Wanted" list by August 2006, when Nevada highway patrolman Eddie Dutchover pulled over a new, red Cadillac Escalade for having an obstructed license plate. A tall, lanky passenger in the back said his name was John Findley, then nervously began eating a salad. When pressed, the man finally blurted out his real, full name: Warren Steed Jeffs.

The vehicle was registered to another church member and the driver, Warren's brother Isaac, authorized authorities to search the Escalade. They uncovered laptops and thumb-drives and are believed to have found audio recordings where Jeffs admits to marrying underage

Jeffs' attorneys don't want that evidence admitted in his trial, and Thursday's hearing is to determine whether Jeffs has the standing - as someone other than the driver or owner - to challenge the search of the vehicle. Expected to testify are Dutchover and an FBI agent who was called to the scene the night of the arrest.

But Jeffs and the FLDS didn't become a national story until nearly two years later in April 2008, when the FBI and police SWAT teams raided the church's Yearning For Zion compound outside tiny Eldorado, about 45 miles south of the oil and gas town of San Angelo, where Jeffs' trial is taking place. More than 400 children were placed in protective custody, and women who live on the ranch appeared on airwaves across the country wearing their traditional, frontier-style dresses and hairdos from the 19th centu-

Police moved in after receiving an anonymous call to an abuse shelter, alleging that girls were being forced into polygamist marriages. Based on that report, Walther signed the search warrant authorizing the raid.

The call turned out to be a hoax, made by a woman in Colorado. But once on the ranch, police saw underage girls who were clearly pregnant and were told about polygamist marriages prompting the charges against Jeffs and 11 other FLDS men.



MAN WHO POSED AS TEXAS STUDENT GETS PRISON TIME

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) • A former star athlete who posed as a teenager to play high school basketball in West Texas was sentenced Wednesday to three years in prison after reaching a plea deal, a prosecutor said.

Guerdwich Montimere,

23, pleaded guilty to two counts of sexual assault and three counts of tampering with government records.

Officials say the naturalized U.S. citizen from Haiti had graduated from high school in Florida years before he moved to Odessa.



9 PERCENT DROP IN NEB. **ABORTIONS** SO FAR IN '11

OMAHA, Neb. • The number of abortions performed in Nebraska dropped 9 percent in the first half of the year over the same period in 2010, according to figures available Wednesday from the state Department of Health and Human Ser-

Nebraska Right to Life attributed the decline in large part to enactment of a state abortion ban tied to the disputed notion that a fetus can feel pain at 20 weeks. The law that went into effect in October targeted Dr. LeRoy Carhart and his Bellevue

"Legislation does save lives," said the group's executive director, Julie Schmit-Albin. "Carhart admitted when (the ban) was enacted last fall that he would be forced by the law to do late-term abortions out of the state?"

After the Nebraska law went into effect in October, Carhart opened a clinic in Germantown, Md., and has been pursuing one in Council Bluffs, Iowa. He still offers abortions in Nebraska.

The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services said preliminary reports show there were 1,153 abortions performed in Nebraska in the first six months of 2011. The figure was 1,288 for the same period last year.

State law requires doctors to file reports with the state Department of Health and Human Services on each abortion performed. Until this year, the reporting of gestational age was optional and the vast majority of reports didn't include it. So, there was no way for the state to know how many abortions were performed after 20 weeks

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
