

## Jury Indicts Cleveland on Murder

Ten new felony charges were levied Thursday against the Nevada man police say caused the July 15 shooting and hostage crisis in Twin Falls.

Clark Cleveland, only 26, faces a lifetime in a prison Twin Falls

grand jury handed down an indictment against Cleveland on

Wednesday, accusing him of first-

degree murder and 11 other felonies for allegedly unloading the clip of a .22-caliber semi-automatic pistol at seven human targets, wounding an officer, terrorizing a woman and claiming the life of a Utah man.

The Spring Creek, Nev., man held responsible for the July 15 hostage crisis in Twin Falls appeared Thursday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court for a 10:30 a.m. hearing in front of Judge G. Richard Bevan. After Cleveland

stood silent when asked for his plea, the court entered a plea of not guilty and set a trial date of Jan. 17,

The new charges come nearly two weeks after Cleveland ended the tense hostage situation by surrendering himself by police. Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loebs noted the scope of the investigation into Cleveland's alleged

"When we were still in the process of analyzing (the information), we spoke with a lot of agencies that worked on the case, put together reports from each agency,

reviewed a number of witnesses and then analyzed which charges to file," he said.

Twin Falls Police Capt. Matt Hicks noted last week that as many as nine agencies responded to the July 15 incident, making the event one of the largest deployments of law-enforcement personnel this area has seen.

The indictment contains charges of first-degree murder, aggravated battery on an officer, aggravated assault on an officer, aggravated assault, second-degree kidnapping and eluding an officer. It does not provide a narrative account of

# County Considers Tool to Keep Cattle Confined

As Twin Falls County considers fining large production animal owners for their wayward beasts, cattlemen are concerned a new law could become a tool of country squabbles.

**BUHL** • Joe Gellings checks his fences often.

With a herd of Salers cows fenced in at his rural Buhl ranch, the cattleman knows that keeping an eye on the electric wires is crucial. A wandering deer or dog could damage the fence and lead to a potential escape. He also makes sure his cows have plenty to eat so they're less likely to try breaking through the fence in search of feed.

Making sure their animals stay where they should be is part of daily life for the Magic Valley's farmers and ranchers. But exceptions occur, and problems with large, loose production animals

have Twin Falls County officials considering an ordinance to fine owners who don't keep their animals in check.

It's intended to provide a tool to streamline how the county holds owners accountable for their animals. Currently, if the county wants to recoup costs from responding to runaway animals, a civil action and a lengthy court process against the animals' owner is required, said Lt. Daron Brown of the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office, which brought the ordinance forward for consid-

This ordinance, if passed, would allow officers to write a citation, as they do with traffic offenses. During a Thursday hearing, county commissioners held

#### At a Glance Roaming Stock

Twin Falls County commissioners are considering passing an ordinance to fine residents who allow their large production animals to roam free. Here are the details:

Animals impacted: Livestock and fowl weighing more than 25

What it means: Owners may be punished if their animals are roaming free and not on the owner's property or under control. The costs: For the first violation, the fine is up to \$50 per animal, per day. A second offense within two years results in a fine of \$100 per animal, per day. A third offense is a misdemeanor, which can result in a fine of up to \$1,000 and six months in jail.

off on making a decision, which will come within 10 days.

Brown stressed that the ordinance is aimed at those who continually don't keep their livestock off roads and other people's property. He also says it's a safety issue, noting that he has hit an 800-pound heifer with a county vehicle.

"That's a lot of dense weight for a vehicle crash or a motorcycle to

run into," he said. "And people are injured because of it every year."

Officers also spend time preventing accidents.

Last week, deputies responded to an incident near Hollister with 30 loose cows. Deputies kept watch over the cattle to make sure they didn't approach U.S. Highway 93 until the animals' owner arrived.

This season will run from Aug. 30 until March 31, 2012. However, it will be extended in the Lolo and

until March 31, 2012 Nonresident wolf tags are cheaper now, down to \$31.75.

Selway zones until June 30 to coincide with black bear season. As originally suggested, the hunt will not include quotas except for areas near the Montana border.

This will be Idaho's second wolf hunt since the animals were reintroduced to the state in 1995. The first ran from fall 2009 to spring 2010 with 188 of a limit of 220 wolves Also new this time: a trapping

season will run from Nov. 15 until the end of the hunting season. The original proposal had suggested trapping should only be allowed for 10 weeks.

Kenny Anderson, the commissioner representing the Upper Snake River region, requested an increase to hunt limits in his region.

"I want more for my area, a better hunt and to take out more wolves," he said during the commission meeting.

Wolf tag sales have lagged this year in comparison to tags sold during the first season. One reason being that hunting and killing wolves is much harder than hunters originally anticipated. Earlier this month, Fish

## Will Oakley Become Cradle of Presidents?

itt Romney and Jon Huntsman Ir. both want to be president of the United States. If either is elected, all 763 residents of Oakley should be invited to the inauguration.

That's because it's hard to see how Huntsman or Romney would be in a position to run the free world without the Cassia County community's influence on their family histories.

Huntsman especially. He's the grandson of David Haight, an Oakley native who served on the Quorum of Twelve Apostles of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and the greatgreat-grandson of Horton Haight, the Mormon pioneer who essentially developed Oakley.

David Haight's daughter Karen married Blackfoot native Jon Huntsman Sr., who would become the Fast Food Container King.

While working for an egg producer, the senior Huntsman invented the plastic egg carton. He formed his own company in 1970, and soon developed the "clamshell" container for the Big Mac.

Before he became a titan of industry, Huntsman Sr. served in the Nixon administration. That later opened some doors for Jon Jr., who was hired on as a staff assistant to President Reagan. From there, he found a role in the administrations of a succession of presidents, with a brief break for a stint as governor of Utah.

Romney's grandfather moved to Oakley in 1913, pretty much because he had to. Gaskell Romney had been a prosperous expat American Mormon carpenter in Mexico, but lost everything in the 1910 revolution and had to return to the U.S. Romney's



dad, George, grew up poor in El Paso, Texas, and Los Angeles before Gaskell Romney relocated to Idaho because he could feed his family on a hardscrabble potato farm near Oak-

Too hardscrabble, it turned out. The enterprise

In 1916, the Romneys moved to Salt Lake City and eventually to Rexburg, where Gaskell Romney was able to make a living in the construction boom that accompanied U.S. entry into World War I. The family returned to Utah in 1921.

Mitt Romney was raised in Michigan and spent some time near Glenns Ferry as a youngster. After Brigham Young University, Harvard Law School and an LDS mission in France, he went to work for management consulting companies in Massachusetts, then started his own venture-capital firm

In 1999, Mitt Romney was hired to rescue the troubled 2002 Salt Lake City Winter Olympics. That accomplished, he returned to Massachusetts and successfully ran for governor in 2002. Romney sought the GOP nomination for president in 2008, losing to Sen. John Mc-Cain.

If there ever is a Huntsman or a Romney inauguration, the loser is sure to be invited:

They're third cousins, once removed.

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## Area Educators Attend Summer Institute

**WENDELL** • Attending summer school by choice?

Teachers do. More than 500 state educators visited Wendell this week for the two-day Idaho Summer Institute of Best Practices conference.

Institute Director Katie Cutler said the program began six years ago when the Wendell and Gooding school districts each had grant funding available for professional development.

Instead of sending a handful of teachers from each district to out-ofstate conferences, Cutler said, the districts pooled the money together and created a development conference for everyone.

"It's just grown from there," she said.

Now, the development training is given in Idaho Falls and Payette as well, and teaches everything from math and reading standards to tapping into the latest technology and fostering relationships with students.

Wendell Elementary School second-grade teacher Andrea McCarty attended seminars on how to help keep students motivated and engaged in the learning process, and was grateful for the session on upcoming state curricula changes.

"It's a good resource, especially since the conference is so close to home," McCarty said. "They really give you a lot of resources. ... I'm looking forward to having effective strategies, something that will be helpful to me so I can help

my students be more effective learners and so that they'll want to continue learning."

Planning for the summit begins nearly a year in advance, said Rob Sauer, deputy superintendent of the Idaho State Department of Education.

"We begin looking in September what will be taught in July," Sauer said. "It's about finding the needs that are in the field and then being able to match up the right people in the field to come and address those."

The program is funded in part through state funds. Educators also each pay a \$100 registration fee.

## **Buhl Highway Lane Closed Over Weekend**

One lane of U.S. Highway 30 near Buhl will be closed through the weekend after it collapsed into a hole created by a broken, abandoned water line.

The Idaho Transportation Department's emergency repair of the road is expected to extend into next week, after part of U.S. 30's eastbound lane sank into a ruptured pipe running under it on Wednesday. According to an ITD release, the pipe has been temporarily plugged by Buhl's water department, after ITD unearthed it during exploratory digging on Wednesday.

The hole ITD dug near Buhl's eastern city limit will remain open to dry over the weekend, and is protected by a concrete barrier with a temporary lane for eastbound traffic in U.S. 30's median. A 20 mph speed limit is in place through the work zone. ITD said water from the

ruptured pipe saturated the ground below the roadway, eroding the pavement. Crews expect to complete repairs by Monday, but drivers should use caution while traveling in the area until work is completed.

## **BPA to Raise Rates 7.8** Percent for Some Utilities hike was needed to help

PORTLAND, Ore. • The Bonneville Power Administration has reached an agreement on Northwest power rates it hopes will end years of dispute over the way consumers share the benefits of low-cost hydroelectricity from the Columbia River system.

The agreement affects the federal power marketing agency's residential exchange program, established in 1981 to provide customers of private utilities such as Portland General Electric, PacifiCorp and Puget Sound Energy with a share of the electricity sold mostly to consumer-owned public utilities around the region, The Oregonian reported.

The agreement includes all the investor-owned utilities in the region, their state regulators, ratepayer advocates for public and private utilities, and the consumer-owned utilities representing 88 percent of BPA's public utility demand.

Among BPA's public customers are many Mini-Cassia cities, including

Burley, Rupert and others. City councils were asked this year to sign off on the rate agreement.

**BPA Administrator Steve** Wright praised regional utility leaders and others who set aside longstanding litigation and its uncertain effect on power rates to support the settlement.

"Northwest citizens are far better off as a result of the time and patience the parties invested in the negotiations," Wright said.

Bonneville also announced plans to raise wholesale power rates for its consumer-owned utility customers by 7.8 percent in October, a bit less than the increase the agency was talking about a month ago, and far less than the 12 percent to 20 percent range that was discussed last year.

"A 7.8 percent rate increase is still a big, painful increase, but it's better than what Bonneville was suggesting initially," said Kevin O'Meara, deputy director of the Public Power Council, an advocacy group for publicly owned utilities.

There, he allegedly shot ISP Trooper Nick Walker in the leg, fatally shot Tracey Ivie, 43, of Lindon, Utah, in the chest and took a woman, now identified as Sharon Knudsen, hostage. Reports do not list Knudsen's age or place of residence.

Upon taking Knudsen at gunpoint, police say Cleveland barricaded himself in a hotel stairwell, starting a nearly three-hour standoff that ended in his surrender.

On Thursday afternoon, Loebs declined to provide a timeline for three of the major incidents of the morning: the shootings of Ivie and Walker and the abduction of Knudsen. The indictment of first-degree murder notes that Cleveland allegedly shot Ivie while holding Knudsen hostage. Exactly when Walker was shot has not been disclosed.

Cleveland also allegedly fired at five other officers -ISP Trooper Chris Clausing, Twin Falls Police Officer Aaron Nay and Twin Falls

## TF May Need Public Transit Long Before We Can Afford it

At the end of the day, only a community's investment makes public transportation viable.

South-central Idaho's most successful public transportation service is scuffling, and that bodes ill for the future of public transit in the rest of the region.

According to the Idaho Mountain Express of Ketchum, even though Mountain Rides' bus service has seen an overall 10 percent increase in ridership over last year, the company may have to reduce routes and cut staff to make ends meet in 2012.

That trend has implications beyond the Wood River Valley because Twin Falls, with 44,125 residents, is on the brink of the population threshold needed to support a comprehensive public transportation sys-

Nationally, public transit has been hard hit by the recession, and for exactly the reasons Mountain Rides is suffering: Local governments are dialing back support.

"The problem with cuts in local funding is that we leverage it to federal grant dollars," Mountain Rides Executive Director Jason Miller told the *Mountain* Express. "If we lose \$100,000 in local funding, we could actually be losing \$320,000 in overall funding."

Trans IV, the grant-funded, College of Southern Idaho-based system that offers personalized public transit in the Twin Falls area, could potentially lose funding from the city of Twin Falls as part of budget cuts — which would have a major impact on the serv-

It's happened elsewhere in Idaho. In Coeur d'Alene - which has about the same population as Twin Falls – the North Idaho Community Express and the Kootenai Area Transit System ran out of money and shut down service in January.

Mountain Rides provides free around-town bus service in the Ketchum-Sun Valley area and in Hailey, paid-fare bus service between the north and south valley and paid-fare commuter van service between the Magic and Wood River valleys. By tradition, it's integral to the way the 21,000 residents of Blaine County get around.

Public transit has a far lower profile in Twin Falls, but the need is growing. The city's master transportation plan predicts a steady increase in traffic in the next decade over a network of streets the city is already struggling to find the resources to maintain.

It may be years before there are enough resources in local government to change that. Combined with the real prospect of fewer transportation dollars from the federal government, Twin Falls may have a population of 70,000 or more before it can get serious about running a citywide network of buses.

By then, the total volume of traffic clogging the city's streets could be half-again - or even twice what it is today.

There will come a time when public transportation isn't an issue that can be kicked down the road any longer in Twin Falls. Going forward, our elected officials would be wise to keep that in mind.

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## Debt Crisis? It Pales in Comparison to the One in Your Wallet

Assuming we survive lawmakers' reckless disregard for the country's economic welfare during the next week, maybe it's time we took matters into our own

After all, we can complain about the federal debt, about Washington's wanton spending and the dishonesty with which leaders from both parties approach the crisis, but we are ignoring the potentially bigger problem: us.

As bad as the federal finances are, the finances of most American households are worse. Those who say the government should manage its money the way we do at home ignore the ugly truth - it is.

From 2001 to 2008, U.S. household debt almost doubled, to \$13.8 trillion from just under \$7 trillion, according to the Federal Re-



serve. In the past three years it has dipped, but the wave of debt has hardly receded. By the first quarter of this year, household debt was at more than \$13.3 trillion.

The ratio of total U.S. debt to gross domestic product was higher in 2007 than at any time since 1929, Amir Sufi, a finance professor at the University of Chicago, wrote recently for Bloomberg News.

Much of the rising household debt in the years leading up to 2007 was, of course, mortgage-related, and since then, many more households have been plunged into debt by job losses, medical expenses or

While politicians are right to be worried about the effect that mounting federal debt is having on the nation's financial health, high household debt levels are equally damaging to the nation's economy. Indebted households spend more of their income on interest, and have less to spend on goods and services.

So while we demand action from Washington, we should make some demands of ourselves as well.

The first thing is to stop adding to our discretionary debt - that is, the debt we choose to assume rather than debt that circumstances such as job loss force on us. High-interest borrowing is a particular concern. U.S. credit-card debt rose in May for the first time since 2008, topping \$793 billion, or more than \$14,600 per household, and

If you haven't already locked in your existing debt at a low interest rate, this week would be a good time to do so. Interest rates are likely to soar if the government defaults on its debt next week. Even if a default is avoided, rates probably will rise if the recovery gains steam.

Beef up your cash hoard. Personal finance gurus recommend an "emergency fund" of three to six months worth of spending capacity. Now, some are suggesting you double that. Of course, in the event of a default, the dollar's value will plunge, undermining your efforts. Still, the more you have in your cash hoard, the greater the chance there will be something left after Congress gets through with it.

Companies are in the same boat, and whether you're looking at your own employer or individual investments, companies with strong cash flows — those that spend less than they earn — will be better able to weather a crisis.

## Tests Show Suspect Idaho Sprouts Uncontaminated

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) • Tests show no traces of salmonella were found at a northern Idaho sprouts facility that was blamed for several cases of food poisoning.

Moyee Springs' Evergreen Produce recalled its alfalfa and spicy sprouts under pressure from the Food and Drug Administration, which said the plant was linked to 25 cases of salmonella poisoning in people from Washington, Idaho, Montana, North Dakota and New But The Tersev. Spokesman-Review reports test results from Thursday showed no traces of the organism on dozens of packages of sprouts, seeds, wash water and pro-

cessing surfaces.

FDA spokeswoman
Stephanie Yao said the
negative test results don't
rule out Evergreen as the
source, because the
pathogen could have tainted only a portion of the
food.

Nadine Scharf, the owner of Evergreen Fresh Produce, said she's had to lay off 10 of 14 workers and her company is on the verge of collapse after customers stopped making orders in

the weeks following the government action. She's had to sell three vehicles to raise cash to pay her bills.

"We are about down to

nothing," Scharf said.
Investigators with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said those who were sickened with salmonella, including three who were hospitalized, had all eaten spicy sprouts and alfalfa sprouts from Evergreen. The cases involved 10 people from Washington, three from Idaho and 10 from Montana.

Scharf said her 23-yearold company has followed a careful protocol of human hygiene, tests on wash water, quarterly inspections and routine disinfections for years, and her plant has always had a clean record. She's gone to producing 6,000 pounds of sprouts a week to producing small amounts of mung bean, clover and broccoli sprouts, Scharf said.

"Hopefully our business can get back on an even keel again," she said.

Since 1996, there have been 30 reported outbreaks of food-borne illnesses connected to raw or lightly cooked sprouts, the FDA said.

## Idaho Supreme Court Throws Out Guilty Plea in Murder Case

**BOISE** • The Idaho Supreme Court unanimously ruled Thursday that a lower court was correct to order a new trial for a man who said he was coerced into pleading guilty to murder.

A judge ordered the trial for Trevor Booth, who pleaded guilty to murder in the 2005 shooting death of Leonard Kellum. Booth had filed a petition for post-conviction relief, saying his attorney used coercive and threatening tactics to get him to make the plea.

He also claimed that his attorney wasn't adequately prepared to go to trial — even though Booth felt he had nothing to lose by facing a jury

Booth initially denied involvement in the shooting, but later admitted to it, according to court records. Booth said Kellum was his drug supplier and that Booth had fallen behind on payments. Booth said Kellum had threatened him and his family, and that he shot Kellum out of self-defense.

His attorney told him that his best bet was to plead guilty because if he went to trial, he'd face a mandatory life sentence. The attorney also told Booth and his family that a guilty plea would likely result in a fixed 10-year sentence.

Booth was given a sentence of 30 years to life in prison, but tried to appeal and lost that case. On the post-conviction relief petition though, Judge Gregory Culet agreed that the defense attorney's representation wasn't reasonable because he gave Booth erro-

neous information about the sentencing requirements.

The state contested the lower court's finding, saying that while the defense attorney's understanding of the sentencing statute was wrong, the prosecutor and judge on the original case both appeared to have shared the same belief. That, the state contended, showed that Harris' interpretation of the statute wasn't unreasonable.

But the high court rejected those arguments, saying in effect that two — or even three — wrongs don't make a right.

"The language of the statute makes it clear that in cases where the state chooses not to seek the death penalty, the court is required to impose an indeterminate life sentence with at least 10 years fixed," Justice Jim Jones wrote for the court.

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### **IDAHO WOMAN PLEADS GUILTY IN IMMIGRATION**

Crystal Tijerina, of Caldwell, faces up to 25 years in prison at her Oct. 12 sentencing in U.S. District Court in Boise. The 29-year-old pleaded guilty Wednesday to charges of mail fraud and misuse of U.S. government seals as part of an agreement with federal prosecutors.

The U.S. Attorney's Office say Tijerina offered assistance in filing immigration paperwork while operating the business, Soluciones Economicas, in a scheme that started in June 2009 and lasted nearly a year. Authorities say she took money from immigrants and gave them fraudulent documents with U.S. government seals.

Following his 1997 arrest and guilty plea to molesting two boys, Stowell was imprisoned in 2005 for a violation.

He was released in 2008, but was back behind bars five weeks later for violating parole. An officer found a laptop computer with Internet access in his Boise apartment.

## Polygamist Leader Mute as Trial Begins

SAN ANGELO, Texas • A Texas prosecutor told jurors Thursday he would present an audio recording of a polygamist sect leader raping a 12year-old and other evidence showing the 55-year-old impregnated a 15-year-old girl during the man's sexual assault trial.

The trial began shortly after Warren Jeffs fired his highpowered defense team and a judge allowed the ecclesiastical head of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints to defend himself.

But when it came his turn to present an opening statement, Jeffs was mute, sitting silently in his courtroom seat.

Then, as the prosecutor continued to present his case, Jeffs stared off into space, appearing not to be paying attention to the proceedings.

"You've sat here now for an hour and not said a word," District Judge Barbara Walther said, then added his continued silence could have "a very bad result."

The silence was a sharp contrast to Jeffs' earlier behavior in court. Then, he spoke for more than 20 minutes, telling the judge he had spent extensive time training his lawyers, but they weren't able to present "a pure defense." He then pleaded for more time to prepare the case by himself.

But Walther turned down that request. Jeffs has burned through seven attorneys in six months, and prosecutors complained his frequent switching of counsel was a delay tactic.

"Mr. Jeffs, the court is not going to recess these proceedings to let you go to law school," Walther said in deciding to start the trial as scheduled.

Jeffs' sect is an offshoot of mainstream Mormonism that believes polygamy brings exaltation in Heaven, and followers see him as God's spokesman on Earth. He is accused of sexually assaulting two underage girls at a remote compound in West Texas. If convicted, he could face life in

The surreal day in court began with Jeffs addressing Walther in long and complicated sentences frequently punctuated by awkward pauses when he would stare intently at the floor.

"The condition of my present defense is such that I cannot use them," he said of his attorneys. "They, not having all needed understanding for my defense, which wants for representation by one who knows and understands the facts of these truths."

Walther asked when he had arrived at the decision, and Jeffs launched into another long-winded answer, assuring her that neither he nor his attorneys have "been idle."

"This has been a continued labor on my part, seeing counsel often have ideas different from the needs at hand," he said, adding that his defense team never "had a true understanding of the facts."

Walther ordered all of Jeffs' attorneys to remain on as side counsel but held firm on no further delays.

"You cannot fire your lawyers in an attempt to get a continuance," she said. "We're going forward today, sir. Can you understand

about 80 miles south of Tampa. Two guns were nearby.

"He used a shotgun to his head and she used the rifle," said Bob Carpenter, a spokesman for the Charlotte County, Fla., sheriff's office. "It was in the head, too. It was a pact?'

The husband, 60, was found dead, and his wife, 57, died Wednesday after several days on life support at an area hospital, Carpenter said.

Jeffs said not allowing him more time to prepare wouldn't allow "true justice to be served, which is the purpose of the court of law in a nation that professes true justice be served."

Walther didn't grant Jeffs' motion to represent himself without first urging him to reconsider. She also said he would get no special favors.

"You have assembled one of the most impressive legal teams this court has ever seen and perhaps ever seen in the state of Texas," the judge said. She later added, "I urge you not to follow this course of action." Now that Jeffs is represent-

ing himself, what he will argue

in his own defense is unclear. One of his former attorneys, Deric Walpole, said Monday he would argue his client's constitutional guarantees of freedom of religion had been trampled by police. But Walpole also hinted Jeffs wouldn't testify or otherwise address

the jury during the case. Jeffs' sect has more than

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10,000 members nationwide, and his defense had been financed by an FLDS land trust believed to be worth more than \$110 million.

The charges against him stem from a massive police raid in April 2008 at Yearning For Zion, a compound about 45 miles south of the oil and gas town of San Angelo, where Jeffs' trial is taking place. More than 400 children were placed in protective custody, and women who live on the compound appeared on airwaves across the country wearing their traditional, frontier-style dresses and hairdos from the 19th centu-

Authorities moved in after receiving an anonymous call to an abuse shelter, alleging that girls on the compound were being forced into polygamist marriages. The call turned out to be a hoax, made by a woman in Colorado, and the children were returned to their families. But police saw underage girls who were clearly pregnant - prompting the charges against Jeffs and 11 other FLDS men.

All seven sect members who have been prosecuted so far were convicted, receiving prison sentences of between six and 75 years.

## Republicans Put Off Vote on Debt Limit

**WASHINGTON** • An intense endgame at hand, House Republican leaders put off a vote Thursday night on legislation to avert a threatened government default and slice federal spending by nearly \$1 trillion. GOP leaders announced their decision after abruptly halting debate on the legislation and plunging into an intensive round of meetings with re-

The decision created fresh turmoil as a divided government struggled to head off a default threatened after next Tuesday that would leave the Treasury without the funds needed to pay all its bills.

As the evening slipped by, the White House poked fun at Republicans led by Speaker John Boehner, who has become President Obama's principal antagonist in a contentious era of divided government. And Senate Democrats pledged to scuttle the measure — if it ever got to them — to force a final compromise.

Boehner summoned a string of Republican critics of the bill to his office.

Asked what he and the speaker had talked about, Rep. Jeff Flake, R-Ariz., said, "I think that's rather obvious. ... There's negotiations going on."

Based on public statements by lawmakers themselves, it appeared that five of some two dozen holdouts were from South Carolina. The state is also represented by Sen. Jim DeMint, who has solid ties to tea party groups and is a strong critic of compromising on the debt issue.

## 'Lone-Wolf' Terror Attack in Norway Stirs Angst in Europe

Two visions of the Norway atrocity emerge as Europe gropes for answers following massacre that killed 78.

OSLO, Norway • Norway casts it as the isolated act of a lone-wolf terrorist whose boasts of a far-flung network of anti-Muslim warriors were the fantasies of a deranged

European officials at an emergency counter-terror meeting see a continent-wide threat from rightwing extremists amid mounting Islamophobia – and warn of possible copycats.

Two visions of the Norway atrocity emerged Thursday as Europe gropes for answers following the massacre that claimed 78 lives.

The twin attacks carried out by Anders Behring Breivik have stirred questions in Europe about whether authorities have neglected the threat of right-wing extremists in their push to crack down on Islamist terror groups after 9/11.

Security officials insist they have not, and statistics from the European police agency Europol show no surge in right-wing terror.

Still, many politicians saw the Norway attacks as a violent expression of a far-right populist movement that has swept anti-Muslim parties calling for strict immigration limits into parliaments across the continent.

At an emergency meeting in Brussels, European Union counterterrorism officials warned radicals who share Breivik's ideology might be tempted to follow his lead.

## Arctic Scientist Under Investigation for Misconduct

JUNEAU, Alaska • Just five years ago, Charles Monnett was one of the scientists whose observation that several polar bears had drowned in the Arctic Ocean helped galvanize the global warm-

ing movement. Now, the wildlife biologist is on administrative leave and facing ac-

cusations of scientific misconduct. The federal agency where he works told him he's being investigated for "integrity issues," but a watchdog group believes it has to do with the 2006 journal article

about the bear. The group, Public Employees for Environmental Responsibility, filed a complaint on his behalf Thursday with the agency, the U.S. Bureau of Ocean Energy Management, Regulation and Enforce-

Investigators have not yet told Monnett of the specific charges or questions related to the scientific integrity of his work, said Jeff Ruch, the watchdog group's executive director.

A BOEMRE spokeswoman, Melissa Schwartz, said there was an "ongoing internal investigation" but declined to get into

specifics. Whatever the outcome, the investigation comes at a time when climate change activists and those who are skeptical about global warming are battling over the

credibility of scientists' work. Members of both sides, however, said that it was too early to comment on the case, since the agency has not yet released the details of the allegations against him.

Myron Ebell, of the Competitive Enterprise Institute, said the case reinforces the group's position that people should be more skeptical about the work of climate change scientists.

Even if every scientist is objective, "what we're being asked to do is turn our economy around and spend trillions and trillions of dollars on the basis of" climate change claims, he said.

## Libyan Rebels Say Chief Dies in Ambush

Earlier report of his arrest on suspicion of lingering loyalty to Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi raises questions about fate of Gen. Abdul Fatah Younis.

BENGHAZI, Libya • The chief of staff for rebel forces fighting to overthrow Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi was ambushed and killed Thursday, according to the rebels' leadership coun-

In a terse announcement that left many questions unanswered, the president of the council said Gen. Abdul Fatah Younis and two other commanders

were killed as they returned from the eastern front near Port Brega to the de facto rebel capital Reading haltingly from a brief communique,

Mustafa Abdul Jalil, president of the Transitional National Council, seemed to blame pro-Gadhafi assassins but did not specifically say they had been sent by the regime. Jalil refused to take

questions from reporters. Jalil did not address reports that Younis was summoned to Benghazi for questioning by the rebel leadership on suspicion of lingering loyalties to Gadhafi. One rebel loyalist in Benghazi with close ties to the council said Younis was to be "interrogated" Thursday by the council

about alleged contacts with government forces.

The AP quoted a rebel military spokesman as saying rebel security officers arrested Younis and two aides early Thursday at their operations room at the eastern front. The website of the Arab satellite channel Al-Jazeera reported that Younis had been arrested by the rebel council Thursday morning.

Those reports did not explain how Younis was killed by purported government assassins if he was in rebel custody.

Jalil said Younis had been summoned by a rebel judicial committee to "discuss military matters" and was killed on his way to Benghazi. His body had not been recovered, he said.

Jalil said one assassin was captured, but the others escaped. A rebel colonel and a major also were killed in the am-

## Drug Maker J&J Cuts Maximum Tylenol Dose

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) • Johnson & Johnson said Thursday that it's reducing the maximum daily dose of its Extra Strength Tylenol pain reliever to lower risk of accidental overdose from acetaminophen, its active ingredient and the top cause of liver failure.

The company's McNeil Consumer Healthcare Division said the change affects Extra Strength Tylenol sold in the U.S.

Starting sometime this fall, labels on Extra Strength Tylenol packages will now list the maximum daily dose as six pills, or a total of 3,000 milligrams, down from eight pills a day, or 4,000 milligrams. Next year, McNeil will also reduce the maximum daily dose of Regular Strength Tylenol and other adult pain relievers containing acetaminophen, the most widely used pain killer in the country.

Besides Tylenol, acetaminophen is the active ingredient in the prescription painkillers Percocet and Vicodin and in some nonprescription pain relievers. It's found in thousands of medicines taken for headaches, fever, sore throats and chronic pain.

But people taking multiple medicines at once don't always realize how much acetaminophen they are ingesting, partly because prescription drug labels often list it under the abbreviation "APAP."

## Finances, Health Costs Worry Boomers

**WASHINGTON** • The "golden years" may lose some luster for many baby boomers worried about the financial pressures that come with age.

Many of the nation's 77 million boomers are worried about being able to pay their medical bills as they get older, a new poll finds. The concern is so deep that it outpaces worries about facing a major illness or disease, dying, or losing the ability to do favorite activities.

Another major concern among the boomers: losing their financial independ-

The struggling economy, a longer life expectancy, ever-increasing health care costs and challenges facing

Social Security are putting added pressure on the boomers, those born between 1946 and 1964.

According to the AP-LifeGoesStrong.com poll, 43 percent of boomers polled said they were "very" or "extremely" worried about being able to pay for their medical costs, including long-term care. Almost the same number, 41 percent, said losing their financial independence was a big con-

"I always say I am going to work until I'm in the ground," said Ellie Krall of Manalapan, N.J., one of the boomers polled. "I don't see myself being able to fully retire like people were able to do years ago."

Across Europe, far-right groups were quick to distance themselves from the Norway attacker. Geert Wilders of the Netherlands' right-wing Party for Freedom tweeted: "Terrible attack in Oslo, many innocent victims of violent, sick

But some political leaders in Holland, which like Norway has grappled with an increasingly fractious debate about Muslim integration, said firebrand anti-Islamic rhetoric can fire the mind of a man like Breivik, who referred to Wilders repeatedly in his sprawling manifesto.

"Wilders has now distanced himself," said Dutch Labor Party head Job Cohen. "But I think it's good to realize that your words do have an effect — and that goes for all politicians, including Wilders. They can influence people and play a role in all kinds of ways."

Ahead of Thursday's emergency counter-terror meeting, EU Home Affairs Commissioner Cecilia Malmstrom spoke of a "huge lack of political leadership" in allowing rightwing sentiment to bleed into mainstream society.

"Blaming Islam or immigration for all sorts of problems has become normal," Malmstrom told the Brussels-based European Voice newspaper. She cited a "permissive climate" in which such views "are no longer seen as extreme."

German Interior Minister Hans-Peter Friedrich said

that somebody may actually try to mount a similar attack as a copycat attack or as a way of showing support," said Tim Jones, principal adviser to the EU's counterterrorism coordinator. In September, EU interior ministers are to meet to discuss responses to the Norway massacre.

Germany's intelligence agencies had far-right groups under "intensive" surveillance, but there was a greater risk in extremists like Breivik who operate alone and under the radar.

"Among the right extremists, we know of some who could be dangerous. But they're not the problem - those who we have an eye on — but rather those who radicalize in secret," he told the Rheinische Post.

European security officials, on high alert following the July 22 attacks against Norway's government and a Labor Party youth camp, say no information has emerged to support Breivik's claim of belonging to a shadowy group of modern-day crusaders against Islam, with cells all over Europe.

The head of Norwegian security service PST said the 32-year-old Breivik, most likely did it all on his own concocting, planning, and executing the massacre with near-total precision.





## Wireless Auction to Cut U.S. Debt?

**WASHINGTON (AP)** • The debt ceiling battle could produce an unlikely winner: smartphone users.

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid's current plan would direct the Federal Communications Commission to auction off highly valuable radio spectrum to wireless carriers desperate for more airwaves. Companies such as AT&T and T-Mobile USA say they need more capacity to keep up as their customers increasingly use iPhones, tablets and other portable devices to handle mobile applications, online video and other bandwidth-hungry services.

The plan could generate critical revenue for a government spending beyond its means. Congressional budget officials estimate the auctions would raise \$13.1 billion for deficit reduction.

Reid's proposal would also be a big victory for public safety officials: It would set aside airwaves and money for the construction of a nationwide wireless broadband network that would let police officers, firefighters and emergency medical workers communicate across agencies and jurisdictions. "Spectrum auctions are a win-win-

win," said Tim Doyle, a spokesman for the Consumers Electronics Association. But the proposal still faces significant hurdles. For one thing, a competing debt ceiling plan from House Speaker John Boehner contains nothing on wireless spectrum auctions.

## States Won't Give Higher Rates to Wind

Despite protest, nine projects proposed for the area won't be eligible to receive the state's favorable published rates for more of the power they planned to produce.

A handful of Idaho wind energy developers will have to negotiate how much they'll be paid for the energy they produce after state regulators said again that they'll offer special rates to only the

smallest producers. The Idaho Public Utilities Commission on Wednesday reaffirmed four June 8 orders stating that it won't extend to 14 proposed projects its previously larger cap on the Public Utility Regulatory Policies Act rates that created a favorable climate for the development of wind energy in Idaho. Contracts for the proposals - including nine in the Mini-Cassia area -

became effective on or after the deadline for the expanded rate cap expired, the PUC

said in a Wednesday release. The state is required to determine and publish the special rate for projects that develop up to 100 kilowatts. During the state's wind industry infancy, the PUC opted to extend the rate to projects that produce up to 10 megawatts - 100 times the mandated cap - through Dec. 14, 2010. The rate is based on the price of natural gas, and pays qualifying wind and solar producers based on the cost a purchasing utility - Idaho Power, Areva and Rocky Mountain Power in the Gem State avoids by not having to generate or buy power from elsewhere.

Idaho's regulated electric utilities petitioned the PUC last November to reduce the energy cap it offered, claiming that large Idaho wind projects were breaking themselves into smaller 10 MW projects in order to take advantage of PURPA rates that were higher than what they could negotiate with the utilities.

The utilities claimed the increased cap forced them into buying power they don't need at rates that aren't reasonable for their customers.

In June, the Northwest and Intermountain Power Producers Coalition argued that the 10 MW cap has

worked "remarkably well for Idaho" and called its loss "unfortunate."

But the proposed Cotterel project near Burley represents the type of development the utilities railed against. Shell-owned Cotterel WindEnergy Center initially responded to a 2009 Idaho Power bid request as one large 150 MW project, according to the PUC. But after an agreement wasn't reached, it was divided into five 10 MW projects, for which Cotterel submitted five PURPA contracts scheduled to start in 2014.

Under the 10 MW cap, the projects' projected earnings stretched to \$716.4 million over 20 years.



For Bridges, who rides with the Canyon Ridge High School rodeo team, constant risk is part of the sport.

For spectators at the Rowdy's bar on Wednesday nights, the up-close setting means seeing everything from the sweat dripping off cowboys after a rough ride, to the tending of injuries, to the inevitable spray of dirt from fighting bulls pawing the ground.

The weekly roundup isn't competitive, it's not tied to an association circuit and there's no big paycheck awarded during last call. But cowboys are drawn to an enthusiastic pen of fresh bulls and an adoring crowd, and there's no admission fee to take in the show.

"People will spend, but they want to be entertained," said Stacee Parks, a certified public account who owns the Gooding bar and restaurant with partner Johnny Urrutia, a local entertainer, Realtor

and former rodeo man of Gooding. "I've owned the bar for 16 years but had leased to several parties over the years, but about two years ago took it back over and remodeled it. We wanted to do something different, offer something unique and fun, and this fit the bill."

The bull riding was Urrutia's idea, Parks said.

"I'm the conservative one," Parks said, laughing. "At first I thought he was crazy. The idea of getting bulls in and preparing a riding area, keeping the crowd safe, I didn't know how we would pull it off."

But they did. Now in their second year, the Wednesdaynight rodeos are increasingly popular. Many people come earlier than the 7 p.m. start to have dinner before heading out the side door for the real

"People have come from

all over to see what this is all about," Parks said. "I have people calling all week to find

and drink coming. "It's a lot of fun," said Lori Nebeker of Gooding. "The social atmosphere is great, and it's something different to do. My husband used to ride, and so it kind of takes us back. It's just a great time."


The cowboys get a kick out of the close quarters, too.



## With Short Preseason, Doctors Stress Safety to NFL Teams

**NEW YORK (AP) • NFL** doctors and experts in heatrelated illnesses spoke with each team this week. The message, delivered loud and clear: practice caution.

These mandatory conference calls assume greater importance because of the 41/2-month lockout that ended Monday. Offseason workouts and minicamps were eliminated by the work stoppage.

"We don't know where these people are coming from, and normally they would be in their team's facility for four months training," said Dr. Douglas J. Casa, kinesiology professor at the University of Connecticut's Neag School of Education, and the chief scientist at the Korey Stringer Institute. "You might have a player going to Houston and he has been training in a more northern climate.


"We were trying to reiterate the most basic and important concerns when someone is exercising in heat. The real primal things: exercise in the heat, getting ready to handle it, the basic precautions, what are you looking for if there is a prob-

Stringer, an offensive lineman for the Vikings, died at 27 in August 2001 of exertional heat stroke. The institute, established in 2010, operates independently but has a working relationship with the NFL

"This has been a real point of emphasis since Korey died," said Dr. Andrew Tucker, the head team physician for the Baltimore Ravens. "With this unique preseason, coaches and clubs are under the gun to get a lot of

"It is a hyper-concern right now and being more cautious is essential," said Casa, stressing that the phone calls were not done to "scare people."

"We have no idea on the physical shape of these people," he added. "Some teams could have half the people there that are new faces.

General managers and coaches are worrying about signing players, and players are worrying about learning the playbook. Sometimes you must take a step back and safety has to come first."

Doctors and trainers always emphasize hydration and rapid cooling during rigorous workouts. Will players, particularly fringe ones trying to make an early impression, heed the danger signs and not push themselves too

That has been a problem more on the youth level than in college or the pros, Casa noted.

Jets head team physician Dr. Kenneth Montgomery predicts the elimination of a second daily, full-pads practice - the dreaded two-adays - will benefit everyone. And not only for training camps, but right into the season.

"It means a much safer practice when there is less contact," Montgomery said, "and players are not as beat up and they are less likely to get major injuries.

"When players will feel more healthy and rested as we finish training camps, they will feel better prepared and will perform optimally at each practice rather than, say, having just six hours of recovery after two-a-day sessions."

Montgomery sees an added benefit to that: Veterans who abhorred the oldstyle training camps just might stick around the game

"Wouldn't you like to keep a LaDainian Tomlinson around the younger guys and in the locker room as an influence?" he said.

returning to his triathlon roots in Burley each year, "not only as a tribute to that, but also it's my hometown and it was always on my bucket list to knock it off. Now that I've done it, I want to continue to do it for as long as I can."

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURLEY, IDAHO, AMENDING TITLE 10, CHAPTER 7 THE BURLEY CITY CODE RELATING TO THE DEFINITION OF JUNKED PROPERTY AND PROHIBITIONS RELATED THERETO; ALLOWING TWO (2) JUNKED MOTOR VEHICLES TO BE KEPT BEHIND OPAQUE FENCE; CLARIFYING THE EXCEPTIONS OF KEEPING SUCH ITEMS IN BUSINESS OPERATIONS; AND, PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL, AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.

WHEREAS, the City of Burley does recognize the value of promoting and protecting public health, safety, and general welfare by providing for the regulation of the accumulation of junk, including junked or abandoned vehicles, within the City of

WHEREAS, the City of Burley desires clarify the role of real property owners, tenants, occupants or other persons with interest thereto to maintain property free of junk and abandoned

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURLEY, IDAHO AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That Section 10-7-1 of Burley City Code shall be amended as follows:

#### **10-7-1: DEFINITIONS:**

HOUSEHOLD GOODS AND EQUIPMENT: All articles usually referred to as household goods and articles used in housekeeping including but not limited to chairs, tables, davenports, beds, refrigerators, stoves, washers, dryers, furnaces and appliances.

MACHINERY: All articles used for farm or domestic purposes, machinery or equipment, and all metal or wooden machinery, motors, equipment, tools or property.

MISCELLANEOUS PROPERTY: All other property including but not limited to rope, iron, brass, copper, tin, lead, rubber, rags, baggage, bottles, scrap, toys, bicycles, boats, containers and

MOTOR VEHICLE: Any vehicle propelled or drawn by power other than muscular power designed to travel on the ground by wheels, treads, runners or slides and to transport persons or property or pull machinery; a "motor vehicle" shall include, including but not be limited to, automobiles, trucks, trailers, motorcycles, <u>ATVs</u>, tractors, buggies or wagons.

NRFCKFD. ABANDONED, DISMANTLED,

DAMAGED, WRECKED, DILAPIDATED AND JUNK:

(A) Wrecked: The disordered or broken remains of anything that has been demolished or otherwise ruined and is in a state of ruin or dilapidation and as particularly applied to motor vehicles herein called a junk motor vehicle shall be further defined as an unsightly motor vehicle (or part or parts therefrom) which:

1.) does not carry a current or valid State registration and/or license and is not in a garage or other building;

2.), cannot be safely operated under its own power; or

3.) is not in a garage or other building and does not have any one of the following: foot brakes, hand brakes, headlights, taillights, horn, muffler, rearview mirror, windshield wipers, inflated tires, or adequate fenders.

(B) Abandoned: Abandoned is the relinquishment or giving up with the intent of never again resuming or claiming an interest in the thing. With regard to motor vehicles, a motor vehicle is deemed abandoned if it does not carry a current or valid state registration and/or license regardless of its operability.

(C)Dismantled: Dismantled is the taking to pieces of the thing. (D)Damaged: Damaged is that which has been impaired, injured, hurt and harmed.

(E) Dilapidated: Dilapidated is caved, fallen into partial ruin,

injured by bad usage or neglect. (F) Junk: Junk shall mean scrapped, wrecked, ruined or dismantled.

The foregoing words in this Section shall have such further meaning as may be defined in a generally accepted dictionary. (Ord. 807, 7-20-1970)

Section 2: That Section 10-7-2 of Burley City Code shall be amended as follows:

#### 10-7-2: ACCUMULATION PROHIBITED:

(A) No person shall place, allow, discard, maintain or store any dismantled, wrecked, abandoned, junked, damaged or destroyed household goods or equipment, motor vehicles, machinery or miscellaneous property upon any public street, alley, sidewalk or upon private property within the City.

(B) No person, whether he be the owner, tenant, occupant, lessee or otherwise of any private property or premises shall place, allow, discard, maintain, park, store or permit to be stored, placed, allowed, discarded, maintained, parked or stored upon a property or premises in the City, for a period of time exceeding forty eight (48) hours, any wrecked, dismantled, abandoned, junked, damaged or destroyed household goods and equipment, motor vehicles, machinery or miscellaneous property as in this Chapter defined. (Ord. 807, 7-20-1970)

(C) Notwithstanding any other provision it shall be permissible for any person to keep up to, but no more than, two (2) inoperable, junked or unused vehicles on his or her property so long as the vehicles are kept behind a six foot (6') opaque fence or structure which has the effect of blocking the view of the vehicles from public or private property.

Section 3: That Section 10-7-5 of Burley City Code shall be amended as follows:

#### 10-7-5: EXCEPTIONS:

This Chapter shall not apply to any property or premises where items are enclosed in a building or to any property or premises lawfully situated, licensed, and permitted to operated as a business where the same is a part of said business enterprise necessary to the operation of said business on said property or premises; provided, however, in the case of businesses whose inventory consists of the items, the property upon which such items are placed shall be enclosed by a fence at least six feet (6') in height and of such a material that such fence shall prévent persons outside the premises from seeing the materials stored on the premises through the fence. 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


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


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## Representing Self, Polygamist Leader Mute as Trial Starts

SAN ANGELO, Texas • A Texas prosecutor told jurors Thursday he would present an audio recording of a polygamist sect leader raping a 12year-old and other evidence showing the 55-year-old impregnated a 15-year-old girl during the man's sexual as-

sault trial. The trial began shortly after Warren Jeffs fired his highpowered defense team and a judge allowed the ecclesiastical head of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints to defend himself.

But when it came his turn to present an opening statement, Jeffs was mute, sitting silently in his courtroom seat.

Then, as the prosecutor continued to present his case, Jeffs stared off into space, appearing not to be paying attention to the proceedings.

"You've sat here now for an hour and not said a word," District Judge Barbara Walther said, then added his continued silence could have "a very bad result."

The silence was a sharp contrast to Jeffs' earlier behavior in court. Then, he spoke for more than 20 minutes, telling the judge he had spent extensive time training his lawyers, but they weren't able to present "a pure defense." He then pleaded for more time to prepare the case by himself.

But Walther turned down that request. Jeffs has burned through seven attorneys in six months, and prosecutors complained his frequent switching of counsel was a delay tactic.

"Mr. Jeffs, the court is not going to recess these proceedings to let you go to law school," Walther said in deciding to start the trial as

"When we were still in the process of analyzing (the information), we spoke with a lot of agencies that worked on the case, put together reports from each agency, reviewed a number of witnesses and then analyzed which charges to file," he

Twin Falls Police Capt. Matt Hicks noted last week that as many as nine agencies responded to the July 15 incident, making the event one of the largest deployments of law-enforcement personnel this area has seen.

The indictment contains charges of first-degree murder, aggravated battery on an officer, aggravated assault on an officer, aggravated assault, second-degree kidnapping and eluding an officer. It does not provide a narrative account of Cleveland's alleged actions that morning.

Based on information provided by officials, it is believed that Cleveland fled a traffic stop by an ISP trooper shortly before 8 a.m. on July 15, driving from near Filer toward Twin Falls. Police say he crashed into another vehicle at the intersection of Fillmore Street and Pole Line Road and ran to the Hampton Inn hotel on Fillmore Street, carrying a .22-caliber semi-automatic pistol.

There, he allegedly shot ISP Trooper Nick Walker in the leg, fatally shot Tracey Ivie, 43, of Lindon, Utah, in the chest and took a woman, now identified as Sharon Knudsen, hostage. Reports do not list Knudsen's age or place of residence.

#### The Indictment

A Twin Falls grand jury indicted Clark Cleveland on 12 felonies this week. Here's a roundup of those charges and the alleged crimes behind them.

Count 1: First-degree murder for fatally shooting Tracy Ivie.

Count 2: Aggravated battery on a police officer with a deadly weapon for shooting Idaho State Police Trooper Nick Walker in

Count 3: Aggravated assault with a deadly weapon for pointing a gun at witness Jeff

Count 4: Second-degree kidnapping for holding Sharon Knudsen hostage.

Counts 5-6: Aggravated assault on an officer with a deadly weapon for firing a gun twice at ISP Trooper Chris Clausing. Counts 7-8: Aggravated assault on an of-

ficer with a deadly weapon for firing a gun twice at Twin Falls County Sheriff's Deputy Eric Steele. Count 9: Aggravated assault on an officer

with a deadly weapon for firing a gun at Twin Falls County Sheriff's Deputy Ted Count 10: Aggravated assault on an offi-

cer with a deadly weapon for firing a gun

Upon taking Knudsen at gunpoint, police say Cleveland barricaded himself in a hotel stairwell, starting a nearly three-hour standoff that ended in his surrender.

On Thursday afternoon, Loebs declined to provide a timeline for three of the major incidents of the morning: the shootings of Ivie and Walker and the abduction of Knudsen. The indictment of first-degree murder notes that Cleveland allegedly shot Ivie while holding Knudsen hostage. Exactly when Walker was shot has not been disclosed.

Cleveland also allegedly fired at five other officers -ISP Trooper Chris Clausing, Twin Falls Police Officer Aaron Nay and Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies Eric Steele, Ted McIntyre and Morgan Case - but they were not hit. Loebs said Walker is expected to make a full recovery.

In all, it is believed Cleveland fired his weapon 10 times, each time with the intention to harm others.

Loebs initially charged Cleveland with two felonies: aggravated battery on an officer with a deadly weapon and eluding an officer. A preliminary hearing on those charges was set for this morning, but that case is now dismissed, superseded by the grand jury indictment. Cleveland remains in custody of the Twin Falls County Jail on \$2 million

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
