Trabert, wearing diving gear, was squeezing two bot tles of red water dye into a natural, oval-shaped hole

The city of Twin Falls would like to cut that flow, but others may rely on that water for their own use.

Trabert, diving with his father, city staff engineer Mike Trabert, is working with Brockway Engineering to see how that hole and other cracks in the lake affect water levels - and to see if they can be restricted to keep Twin Falls in compliance with legal agreements without hurting downriver water rights holders.

It all goes back to the thirst of thousands of Twin Falls residents and lawns above the canyon. When the city started pumping water at the Blue Lakes site in the mid-1990s, it pledged to not dramatically Please see DRAIN, M3

OUTLOOK AMERICAN **ECONOMY:** JUST HOW BAD IS IT?

WASHINGTON • Shoppers won't shop. Companies won't hire. The government won't spend on economic stimulus - it's cutting instead. And the Federal Reserve is reluctant to do anything more.

Without much to invigorate growth, the economy may be in danger of slipping into a stupor like the one Japan has failed to shake off for more than a decade. And Wall Street is spooked.

The Dow Jones industrial average Wednesday barely broke an eight day losing streak, finishing up about 30 points. A nine-day losing streak would have been the Dow's first since February 1978.

Even with the gain, the Dow has fallen 828 points, or 6.5 percent, over the past nine trading days. Investors didn't even pause to celebrate the resolution over the weekend of a dangerous debt standoff in Washington.

Stunned by news last week that the economy barely grew in the first half of 2011, economists are lowering their forecasts for the full year and Please see ECONOMY, M3

After hosting their final public meet ing, state regulators and outside groups are still a long way from agreeing on regulating how largescale poultry operations interact with the groundwater supply.

The Idaho State Department of Agriculture has until the end of the month to hand over a draft of rules to legislative committees.

In the spring, the Legislature transferred inspection and regulation authority over poultry operations to ISDA from the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality. On Monday, ISDA hosted its final public meeting for those interested in submitting proposals.

Agency representatives devoted the majority of the time to discussing regulations to protect Idaho's groundwater. Some groups want requirements more stringent than what large beef and dairy facilities are held to, citing a chance to firm up such protections while the poultry industry is young.

"At this point, there is no consensus on groundwater regulation," said John Bilderback, section manager for the ISDA dairy and confined-animal feeding operations bureau. "The only agreement we have is that we may regulate production wells, which the dairy and beef farms do already."

Representatives from the Idaho Conservation League and Humane Society are pushing for more rules.

"We have serious groundwater issues now," said Courtney Washburn, community conservation director for Please see POULTRY, M3

Declo Men Charged With Burglary Found Not Guilty


BURLEY • Two Declo men charged with felony burglary were found not guilty Wednesday after a day and a half of testimony and just 40 minutes of jury deliberation.

The charges against brothers Bret Charles Kelsey, 51, and Ronald John Kelsey, 49, stem from a Dec. 14 incident when the Kelseys were accused of taking things out of a house foreclosed on by First Federal Savings Bank.

Both Deputy Prosecutor Blaine Cannon and defense attorney Allen Browning centered their arguments around whether the Kelseys knowingly committed the felonies or whether they believed that they had permission to be in the house.

The brothers testified that Leesa Woodbury, Ronald Kelsey's girlfriend, had asked them to retrieve some children's toys and clothes from a house at 450 East 152 South in Cassia County. Though Woodbury had lived in the house, which belonged to her ex-husband Darin Woodbury, it had been vacant for about a year following a fire and had been foreclosed on by First Federal Savings Bank. Both brothers testified that they believed the house still belonged to Leesa Woodbury when they entered it by unscrewing plywood that had been placed over the entryways.

When Cassia County sheriff's deputies responded to the call, they found rolls of copper wiring in the basement that Ronald Kelsey had allegedly pulled from the ceiling. Ronald Kelsey testified that he was also preparing to take the house's water heater, pressure tank and

furnace, as he believed the house was going to be demolished.

"It wasn't a salvageable value," he said. "It was just stuff we were going to store to see if we could use it someday."

The brothers also testified that there was no signage indicating that neither Woodbury still owned the house and that it instead belonged to the bank.

"I would have been surprised knowing about that one, I didn't know it was going under foreclosure," Bret Kelsey said.

In closing arguments, Browning highlighted the brothers' cooperation with police and Summit Restoration employees, who were re-covering the roof with a tarp and received help from the Kelseys.

"The entire case here does rest on criminal intent," he said. "They're not trying to hide what they're doing. They're wide open."

As the "not guilty" verdict was read, Bret Kelsey clapped his hands together happily.

"I want to run up and down Main Street," he said after court recessed. His brother, though not lacing up his running shoes, was also pleased.

"I'm glad they came to the right decision," Ronald Kelsey said. "We were innocent. I don't know what else to say?"

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T.F. Dairy Operator Sentenced for Environmental Violation

A Twin Falls dairy operator has been sentenced to 60 days in jail and a \$12,000 fine for violating the Clean Water Act.

On March 23, a jury found Mike Vierstra, 53, guilty of negligent discharge of a pollutant in federally owned water without a permit. Sentenced Wednesday, he also received three years of probation.

Vierstra is the operator of a 1,200-cow dairy southwest of Twin Falls.

In 2009, the Idaho State Department of Agriculture received reports about wastewater discharges from Vierstra's dairy. ISDA inspectors tracked the waste to an open pipe on Vierstra's property, according to a press release from the U.S. Attorney for the District of Idaho and the Environmental Protection Agency.

The case was investigated by the EPA's Environmental Criminal Division.

"Defendant Vierstra failed time and time again to comply with the law," said Tyler Amon, the division's special agent in charge in Seattle, in the release. "His jury conviction and today's sentence demonstrates that there are profound consequences for polluting our nation's waters."

recalculating the odds that the economy will slide back

into recession. Kurt Karl, chief U.S. economist at Swiss Re, has cut his 2011 forecast for growth this year to 1.8 percent from 2.6 percent. And he has bumped up the likelihood of another recession to 20 percent from 15 percent.

"The last week has made it much more likely that corporate profit estimates will be revised lower," said Nick Kalivas, a vice president of financial research at MF Global.

The stocks that have fallen the furthest have been those of companies that fare best in economic expansions. Industrial companies like Caterpillar and Boeing, energy companies like Exxon Mobil and Chevron, and retailers like Amazon and Coach have all fallen by more than the broader stock market.


Investors have pushed government bond yields to their lowest level of the year. The 10-year Treasury note now yields 2.6 percent. Bond yields typically fall when the economy is weak because nervous investors view bonds as a safe place to park their money, and there's less chance that inflation will erode their value.

The economy started sputtering early in the year. Economists at first thought the slowdown would be temporary, the result of a short-term rise in gasoline prices and an earthquake in Japan that disrupted shipments of auto parts and electronics.

But the weakness persisted. And it worsened as a political fight over debt and deficits raised the risk that the U.S. government would not be able to pay all its bills.

"It now seems fairly clear that those shocks have done a lot more damage than we expected," says Leo Abruzzese, global forecasting director for the Economist Intelligence Unit. "They seem to have had a devastating effect on confidence."

After the government reported that the economy grew at an annual pace of 0.4 percent in the first quarter and 1.3 percent in

the second, Abruzzese is cutting his estimate for 2011 growth from 2.4 percent to less than 2 percent.

It's hard to see anything lifting growth to the 2.5 percent needed to keep unemployment from rising, let alone the 5 percent needed to bring the rate down significantly from June's 9.2 percent.

"Sales are what keeps the market moving higher, and there's not much demand when there's only 0.4 percent growth," said Andrew Goldberg, U.S. market strategist at JP Morgan Funds.

When the economy grows less than 2 percent over a 12-month period, it risks slipping into recession, says Mark Vitner, senior economist at Wells Fargo Securities. Over the most recent such period, the economy grew just 1.6 percent.

Few economists are predicting another recession, despite a series of weak economic reports. Gasoline prices have come down from their high of almost \$4 a gallon in May. And Japanese factories are starting to crank up again after the March earthquake.

At the heart of the economy's problems are the debts that consumers built up during the early and mid-2000s. Many borrowed against the equity in their homes, convinced that house prices would rise forever.

When housing prices collapsed, people were left owing more than their homes were worth. Others charged up their credit cards. Now it's payback time, and Americans are spending less or spending cautiously as they slash their debts.

Companies are reluctant to hire until they're convinced enough customers are ready to buy their products or services. Corporate profits are booming, though, because companies laid off millions of workers, learned to operate more efficiently with smaller staffs and expanded in growing markets overseas.

"If companies were inclined to hire, they could," Abruzzese says.

So companies are waiting for consumers to spend, and consumers are waiting for companies to hire them or offer generous pay raises and job security. It's a tough cycle to break.

impact the water level in the lake owned by the Blue Lakes Country Club.

"When we started pumping, unknown to everyone, we dropped the lake level way down and caused a bit of excitement at the country club," Mike Trabert said. He added later: "We're just trying to hold to what we said we're going to do."

Hence the six pounds of red dye dumped by the Traberts on Tuesday. They wanted to confirm the results of a study done in the '90s to track where the water goes when it is sucked out of the lake. Today, they plan to conduct a similar experiment on a recently discovered crack that is also draining the lake.

Though the crack is a mystery, the hole is believed to drain into Alpheus Creek, which feeds a trout farm further on. That leads to the city's second concern – plugging the hole would help make up for Twin Falls' pumping, but if that act infringes on the trout farm's water right it could lead to even greater issues.

The Traberts say the pull of the hole starts at a certain threshold: they once watched a crawdad disappear when it moved just a little too close. When some



of the dye floated to the surface and obscured the younger Trabert's vision, it floated over the hole and disappeared in mere moments.

"It was pretty ominous," a mostly submerged Patrick Trabert yelled to project supervisor Charles E. Brockway, of Brockway Engineering, who watched the work from shore.

Brockway posted dye monitors at every place the lake might drain: the two springs that feed into Alpheus Creek and the creek-fed canal that flows to the trout farm. They also posted dye-absorbing packets in the Snake River. Every bit of information will help in the search for a long-term fix.

"Water supply is important to the city and the lake is important to the country club and we just want to preserve the aesthetics of it," Brockway said.

Hailey approximately \$313,000 for a one-year contract with the option to renew for fiscal 2013 or beyond. It's a savings of nearly \$60,000 from the current contract with the Blaine County Sheriff's Office.

Koch said that money could go toward other Bellevue projects, such as chipsealing roads or giving additional funding to the public library or fire department.

"If we save enough money, maybe we can go back on our own in a few years," Koch said of the future of the Bellevue Marshals.

the Idaho Conservation League. "We need regulation not only for the poultry industry but for beef and dairy as well."

While a handful of poultry farms are currently working in the state, the industry is expected to boom as other states have enforced stricter operating rules.

"At this point, the discussion is agency-focused since not that many poultry facilities are operating in the state right now," Bilderback said. "More operators are expected to come to the state, which is why we need to prepare now."

Time for a 'Grand Bargain' on Restoring Salmon Runs?

In his federal deficit-reduction initiative, U.S. Sen Mike Crapo, R-Idaho, proposed that all options be considered. That everything-is-onthe-table approach is the only way to solve a political impasse that, like salmon restoration, seems intractable.

It's 555 miles from U.S. District James Redden's Portland, Ore., courtroom to Twin Falls, but Magic Valley waters users hang on his every word.

On Tuesday, Redden ruled in favor of environmentalists who say the Obama administration's plan to manage Columbia Basin dams doesn't go far enough to revive and protect Northwest salmon runs.

But the judge didn't hand down the "train wreck" of painful measures they had hoped would force the Pacific Northwest to accept the removal of four dams on the lower Snake River in Washington.

Still, the 82-year-old jurist once again refused to take dam breaching off the table.

Redden retained jurisdiction over the case until the federal government writes a new plan with a 2014 deadline. He told federal fisheries officials he doubted they could write a plan that meets the federal Endangered Species Act without either dam removal or increasing flows from federal reservoirs that produce power and irrigate crops in Idaho.

But Redden said any water used for salmon would have to be obtained under the law, and that's good news for Idaho water users. An agreement between the state of Idaho and the Nez Perce Tribe in 2005 was approved by Congress and limits how much water can be taken from southern Idaho for fish.

Until there's some resolution to the three decadelong, \$8 billion quest to restore the fish that are a symbol of the Northwest's wild character, the riverconnected economy - including Idaho farmers remains under a cloud of uncertainty.

The best suggestion we've heard comes for U.S. Sen. Mike Crapo, R-Idaho. Crapo has proposed a new forum for talks that would leave all options on the table, including dam removal.

Editorially, this newspaper has long opposed the breaching of Lower Granite, Little Goose, Lower Monumental and Ice Harbor dams, but if that's what it takes to achieve a comprehensive solution it's

Can We Govern Ourselves?

You've read about cults that lose touch with reality and gather on some hilltop to greet the end of the world.

We have a large cult-like group in the House of Representatives who have lost touch with economic reality and whose delusions may cause the country they say they love incalculable harm.

Even with a last-minute deal between Congress and the president to wriggle past Tuesday's debt deadline, "wriggling" doesn't count for much in the world of credit and markets. The core problem remains and we'll continue to pay through the nose until we address it.

The elements of that core problem are: The U.S. government is spending too

much, taking in too little, and borrowing more.

The big spending increas es go for health care and payments to the elderly and others in need of support. So, bringing revenue and expenditures into balance isn't just a matter of closing down a few bridges to nowhere or cutting a new fighter the Pentagon wants; it requires fundamentally restructuring our basic support for the retired and the ill.

The extremist Republicans in the House want no tax increases. But they are not willing to make, and find no support for, the drastic spending cuts required by a revenue freeze. It's no accident that the budget proposals they put forward never add up.

What's at issue is whether we can govern ourselves. If we run up our national debt, like Greece, until it overwhelms us, people who lend to us will charge much higher interest rates, and then some day they will not lend to us. Imagine a meeting of the Chinese politburo where they debate what kind of austerity measures to demand in return for a U.S. bailout.

The Republican extremists in the House are bring-

ing us to the brink of disaster with their rigid ideology and have diddled with the numbers to obscure the cost and consequences of their untested ideas. But they have been right on one important point: The deficit must be addressed. One other consistent point of view has been present in this debate. New York Times columnist Paul Krugman and others have argued that the biggest economic problem we face is unemployment, and that just slashing spending will create more unemployment, reduce government revenue, and set us back rather than move us forward.

POCATELLO (AP) • Defense attorneys for a Pocatello man charged with murder in connection with his estranged wife's death say they've reached a plea agreement with prosecutors.

Michael Lane Sparks was arrested in May on a charge of first-degree murder in the death of 41-year-old Judith Rachel Johnson. Police said Johnson was beaten with a rifle and a baseball bat

Sparks was scheduled for a preliminary hearing on Tuesday, but the Idaho State Journal reports that at the proceeding Sparks' public defenders said a plea agreement was reached.

Sparks will now be arraigned in district court, and that judge will decide whether to accept the terms of the plea agreement.

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Date Set for Road Rage Trial

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) • A northern Idaho man whose conviction of second-degree murder was overturned will stand trial again on the charge this month.

The Coeur d'Alene Press reports that 50-year-old Jonathan W. Ellington's three-week jury trial is expected to start Aug. 29 in front of 1st District Judge John Luster. Ellington, of Hayden, was convicted in

August 2006 after prosecutors said he was involved in a road-rage incident that turned deadly when 41year-old Vonette Lee Larsen was run over.

Earlier this year, an Idaho Supreme Court granted him a new trial. The high court cited prosecutorial misconduct and the likelihood that an Idaho State Police officer committed perjury in its ruling.

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Idaho Appellate Court Overturns Meth Conviction

BOISE • The state's appellate court has thrown out the drug conviction of a Canyon County man after finding the prosecutor in the case made impermissible comments during his closing arguments.

In a unanimous ruling Wednesday, the Idaho Court of Appeals said Aniceto Betancourt IV should be given a new trial on the possession of a controlled substance charge because the prosecutor in the case made comments about his refusal to consent to a search of his vehicle.

According to the ruling, Betancourt was stopped by an officer because the vehicle he was in didn't have a front license plate. When the officer asked Betancourt where he had been and where he was headed, Betancourt told him that he'd been sleeping in the passenger's seat of the vehicle when he heard gun shots, jumped

into the driver's seat and drove away, according to the ruling.

Betancourt also said he was carrying a concealed weapon for which he had a permit, and when the officer asked if he could get the weapon from the vehicle, Betancourt refused, saying he wanted to protect his civil rights and did not consent to a vehicle search.

The officer said he smelled alcohol on Betancourt's breath and arrested him on suspicion of drunken driving, and after his arrest, Betancourt's vehicle was searched. The officer said they found methamphetamine under the passenger's seat and Betancourt later tested positive for methamphetamine.

During the trial, the officer testified that after cooperating initially, Betancourt refused to answer further questions without a lawyer present. Jurors were also shown portions of a video of the traffic stop, including a segment that included Betancourt telling the officer he couldn't look in the vehicle. During closing arguments, the prosecutor reminded the jurors of the video and asked them to take note of the fact that Betancourt didn't want officers to search his vehicle.

That was improper, the appellate court found – Betancourt was simply invoking his Fourth Amendment right to be free from unreasonable searches and seizures, and his decision to do so shouldn't be used to imply guilt.

"While our system of criminal justice is adversarial in nature, and the prosecutor is expected to be diligent and leave no stone unturned, he or she is nevertheless expected and required to be fair," Judge John Melanson wrote for the court. "However, in reviewing allegations of prosecutorial misconduct we must keep in mind the realities of trial."

In fact, the appellate court

found, the state's strongest evidence that Betancourt knew there was methamphetamine in the vehicle may have been his refusal to

allow a search.

"As a result, we cannot conclude beyond a reasonable doubt that the prosecutor's impermissible comments regarding Betancourt's invocation of his Fourth Amendment rights did not contribute to the jury's verdict," Melanson wrote.



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REPORT: COLLISION OF TWO MOONS MAY HAVE CREATED LUNAR BULGES **ON ONE SIDE**

LOS ANGELES • Once upon a time, the sky above Earth may have held two moons - until they smashed into each other to create the lunar body we know today. Such a collision early in the solar system's history could explain why the moon is lopsided, and why its far side looks so different from the face we can see, according to a report in Thursday's edition of the journal Nature.

Round as it may seem from our vantage point, the moon in fact bulges on one side - the far side, which is packed with high, jagged mountains. That's a more severe surface than the smooth side we see, filled with basins of volcanic rock.


The moon was formed about 4.5 billion years ago, after a Mars-sized body slammed into the molten Earth and flung a ring of debris into space. Much

Obama Urges Congress to Resolve FAA Shutdown

WASHINGTON • President Barack Obama urged Congress on Wednesday to end the partial shutdown of the Federal Aviation Administration, which began nearly two weeks ago because of a partisan standoff over air service to rural communities and union organizing.

Obama noted that nearly 4,000 FAA workers have been furloughed, another 70,000 workers involved in airport construction projects are affected and the country stands to lose more than \$1 billion in revenue from uncollected airline ticket taxes during the shutdown if Congress leaves the problem hanging until lawmakers return in September.

A White House official later confirmed that Obama called House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, about the FAA flap on Wednesday.

The Republican leader's public response was the whole problem can be resolved almost immediately if Senate Democrats will only accept a mere \$16.5 million in air service subsidy cuts that the House last month attached to a bill to extend FAA's operating authority. of that debris coalesced into a rocky satellite, which was roughed up about half a billion years later by a barrage of asteroids and other interplanetary material, leaving scars in the form of craters.

But at what point the moon became lopsided, and how, is still unclear.

Some scientists speculated that the moon's internal dynamics pushed material around. Others wondered whether the mountains were created by debris ejected from a freshly smashed crater.

Erik Asphaug, a planetary scientist at the University of California, Santa Cruz, had a different idea. Researchers knew that space debris could theoretically get stuck around one of the moon's Lagrangian points - places in space where the gravity of the moon and Earth cancel each other out. In those areas, the debris could coalesce to form another moon, but it would only remain stable for a short time before the sun's gravity threw it off course.

So Asphaug and colleague Martin Jutzi of the University of Bern in Switzerland designed a model in which a moonlet about one-third as wide as the moon maintained a stable orbit around the Earth for tens of millions of years, until it floated from its Lagrangian point into the moon's path.

The moonlet would have crashed head-on with the larger lunar body, but the collision would have happened at relatively slow speeds of between roughly 4,500 and 6,700 miles per hour, the scientists calculated. At that rate, the material in the moonlet would splat onto the moon rather like a ball of mud hitting a surface. The rocky peaks on the far side of the moon are remnants of that impact, Asphaug said.

The force of the collision would have pushed the moon's internal magma sea over to the near side, which could explain why the visible half is rich in potassium, uranium and other elements, Asphaug and Jutzi wrote in Nature

"It's a really new idea that puts a completely different take on the origin of the lunar dichotomy," said Robin Canup, a planetary scientist with the Southwest Research Institute in Boulder, Colo., who was not involved in the study

"So this is a lose-lose-lose situation," he said.

Oklahoma Woman Claims Famed Hijacker is Her Uncle

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) . When an FBI agent pleaded several years ago for help finding notorious skyjacker D.B. Cooper, he wondered, offhandedly, if someone's "odd uncle" might be their guy.

Marla Cooper believes that her late uncle Lynn Doyle Cooper was the man who hijacked a plane in 1971 and parachuted away with \$200,000 ransom into a rainy night over the Pacific Northwest.

The FBI has for years tried to find out if D.B. Cooper survived the jump, chasing more than 1,000 leads as the man who pulled off the nation's only unsolved hijacking became part of American folklore.

Sao Paulo Council Calls for Heterosexual Pride Day

SAO PAULO (AP) • The city council of South America's biggest city has adopt ed legislation calling for a Heterosexual Pride Day to be celebrated on the third Sunday of each December.

Sao Paulo Mayor Gilberto Kassab must sign the legis lation for it to become law and has said only that he is studying it. His office declined Wednesday to say whether he supports the proposal.

The legislation's author, Carlos Apolinario, said the idea for a Heterosexual Pride Day is "not anti-gay but a protest against the

privileges the gay community enjoys?'

As an example, he mentioned how Sao Paulo's huge gay pride day parade is held every year on Paulista Avenue, one of the main thoroughfares in this city of 20 million people, while the March for Jesus organized by evangelical groups is not allowed on the same avenue.

"I respect gays and I am against any kind of aggression made against them," Apolinario said. "I have no trouble coexisting with gays as long as their behavior is normal?"

CAIRO • From a bed inside the defendants' cage, an ashen-faced Hosni Mubarak showed a glimmer of his old defiance. Egypt's former president wagged his finger in the air and denied all charges against him Wednesday as he went on trial for alleged corruption and complicity in the deaths of protesters who helped drive him from power.

The spectacle, watched live on state television by millions of Egyptians, calmed the fury of those who suffered under his rule - some of them parents of children gunned down during the uprising that toppled the longtime president.

The father of a slain protester, among those sweltering in the heat outside the courtroom on the third day of the Muslim holy month of Ramadan, was ecstatic.

"The biggest achievement of this revolution is that all these crooks and scum are in a cage," said Mohammed Mustafa El-Aqqad. "We're here to tell Hosni, 'Happy Ramadan. Congratulations on your new cage?"

The ailing 83-year-old Mubarak lay on a hospital bed as his sons, onetime heir apparent Gamal and wealthy businessman Alaa, stood protectively beside him, at times trying to shield their father from the

That strategy was successful during the debt limit negotiations, but Democrats said they are drawing a line on the FAA shutdown.

"When you look back at their (Republican) threats to shut down the entire government — remember that? unless they got tax breaks for the rich, followed by holding the full faith and credit of this government hostage to their desires to cut government spending. And now here we are a third time ... I hope the American people wake up. This is their modus operandi: government by crisis that they make up," Sen. Barbara Boxer, D-Calif., said.

Democrats offered bills in the House and Senate to extend FAA's operating authority with no strings attached, but action on the measures was blocked by Republicans. The House left town for its August recess on Monday night, and the Senate on Tuesday. But it's still possible for Congress to pass those bills by unanimous consent without lawmakers returning to work if the leaders of both parties agree, Democrats said.

Obama also noted Congress has a procedural way of ending the shutdown without coming back.

"And they can have the fights that they want to have when they get back (in September)," he said. "Don't put the livelihoods of thousands of people at risk, don't put projects at risk, and don't let \$1 billion at a time when we're scrambling for every dollar we can, get off the table because Congress did not act."

The president said his "expectation, and I think the American people's expectation is that this gets resolved before the end of this week."

Rep. John Mica, R-Fla., chairman of the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, told The Associated Press that House GOP leaders will only agree to their own bill with \$16.5 million spending cuts to subsidies for air service to rural communities.

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid added: "The issue is the labor issue: an antiworker agenda of one airline, Delta Airlines. That's what this is all about."

Republicans want to overturn a National Mediation Board rule approved last year that allows airline and railroad employees to form a union by a simple majority of those voting. Under the old rule, workers who didn't vote were treated as "no" votes.

The sight of Mubarak lying helplessly in bed inside the grim metal and wire cage was a stunning moment for Egyptians — and for a region known more for its presidents-for-life and absolute monarchs than democracy or accountability.

With Arab Spring revolts sweeping the Middle East, the sight of Mubarak during Wednesday's hearing could serve as a powerful cautionary tale for other autocratic leaders who have long acted as if they alone were fit to rule. From Libya's Moammar Gadhafi to Syria's Bashar Aslawyer Fathy Abul-Hassan, who represents several victims' families.

"The defense strategy is to milk whatever sympathy Egyptians may still have for an 83-year-old, bedridden leader. It is an obvious ruse," he said, standing next to the father of a 22-year-old protester killed in Cairo on Jan. 28.

Wednesday's hearing was held in a large lecture room at the national police academy in a suburb east of Cairo. Big enough for at least 1,000 people, it was only about a third full with lawyers, witnesses, the media and policemen, including a hundred or so young police conscripts who succumbed to the fatigue of the dawn-to-dusk Ramadan fast and fell asleep halfway through the fourhour proceedings.

The police trainees filled a section of the room next to the defendants' cage, leaving the three judges and five prosecutors with the only direct view of the Mubaraks and seven other defendants. Authorities had promised earlier that up to 600 people would be able to attend, including relatives of slain protesters, but after multiple administrative mix-ups, only a handful of relatives were in the courtroom. The hearing was chaotic at times, with lawyers shouting over each other and pushing forward toward the bench. Presiding judge Ahmed Rifaat struggled to maintain order. Mubarak's arrival in the courtroom was greeted by a lone shout of "Long live the revolution!" by a female lawyer attending on behalf of one of the victims. It was one of the few outbursts of anti-Mubarak rhetoric, with another lawyer telling the judge: "Your honor, those murderers standing before you have sold their conscience to the devil." The hearing was the first time Egyptians had seen Mubarak since Feb. 10, when he gave a defiant TV address refusing to resign. In the courtroom, a prosecutor read the charges against Mubarak – that he was an accomplice along with then-Interior Minister Habib el-Adly in the "intentional and premeditated murder of peaceful protesters" and that he and his sons received gifts from a prominent businessman in return for guaranteeing a low price in a land deal with the state. The businessman, Hussein Salem, is being tried in absentia. He is under arrest in Spain, and Egypt is seeking his extradition. Mubarak, el-Adly and six senior police officers could be sentenced to death if convicted of ordering the protesters killed.

Alaska Officials Watch Volcano as Lava Dome Grows

ANCHORAGE, Alaska • A growing lava dome has been spotted in the summit crater of an Alaska volcano, leading officials to raise the alert level. The Alaska Volcano Observatory says the observation increases the possibility but doesn't guarantee an eruption at Cleveland Volcano. Officials say the dome has grown from about 131 feet to 164 feet in diameter since Friday. Weak thermal anomalies also have been detected. If the dome continues to grow, lava may flow onto the volcano's flanks. Officials say this would not be hazardous to airplanes. Shortlived eruptions could send an ash cloud up to 20,000 feet.

There is no real-time seismic network at the volcano, located 939 miles southwest of Anchorage on an uninhabited island. Officials are not able to track local earthquake activity related to volcanic unrest. — The Associated Press

in the Cooper case. FBI agent Fred Gutt declined Wednesday, however, to say whether Marla Cooper was connected to that lead.

"It is an unsolved crime and we are obligated to address that if new, credible information comes to us," he said, adding that the case is a low priority. The FBI is focused on criminal activity that threatens communities today, he said.

Marla Cooper told ABC News, which first reported her comments in an interview broadcast Wednesday, that she made the connection by piecing together her memories and her parents' comments over the years. Cooper, however, did not say why she chose to speak out now.

Cooper claimed on "Good Morning America" that she heard her uncle, L.D. Cooper, and another uncle planning something "very mischievous" over the holidays in 1971. "I was watching them using some very expensive walkietalkies that they had purchased," she said. Cooper claimed shortly after takeoff in Portland, Ore., that he had a bomb, leading the flight crew of the Northwest Orient plane to land in Seattle. Passengers were exchanged for parachutes and ransom money.

The flight then took off for Mexico with the suspect and flight crew on board. The hijacker parachuted from the plane after dark as it flew south, apparently over a rugged, wooded region not far from Marla Cooper's grandmother's home in Sisters, Ore. Marla Cooper said her un-

cle, L.D. Cooper, came home claiming he had been in a car accident.

"My Uncle L.D. was wearing a white T-shirt, and he was bloody and bruised and a mess, and I was horrified. I began to cry. My other uncle, who was with L.D., said, 'Marla, just shut up and go get your dad," she said.

Marla Cooper said she heard her uncle say at the time, "We did it. Our money problems are over. We hijacked an airplane."

She said that, just before he died in 1995, her father mentioned his brother and said, $then\,contacted\,the\,agency.$

Gutt said only after the FBI contacted the tipster directly did the person speak with investigators.

The lead focuses on a suspect who died more than 10 years ago.

Marla Cooper did not discuss on ABC how or when she reached out to the FBI, but said she recently provided investigators with a guitar strap belonging to her uncle to be tested for fingerprints.

Investigators have tested a guitar strap from the suspect who is the subject of the new lead, Gutt said Wednesday, but found it wasn't suitable for fingerprint analysis.

They are now working with family members to identify other items that can be ana-lyzed.

But the FBI doesn't have a timeframe for how long it will take to vet the lead, which is something they've known about for more than a year, Gutt said.

People watching the spectacle across the region proclaimed it a watershed.

"This is the beginning of democracy in the Arab world," declared Rabha Idris, an engineer from Libya, where the uprising against Gadhafi's rule is into its seventh month.

"This is a new era," enthused Zainab Hassan, a 22year-old university student from Bahrain, a tiny Gulf Arab nation whose Muslim Shiite majority is demanding equality with the Sunni minority. "The people now believe they can be free from dictatorship."

Many in Egypt savored the humiliation of the man who ruled with unquestionable power for 29 years, during which opponents were tortured, corruption was rife, poverty was widespread and political life was stifled.

With skepticism that Egypt's military rulers would allow one of their own -a former air force commander and a war hero - to be prosecuted in front of the world, the scene went a long way toward satisfying a key demand that has united protesters since Feb. 11, when Mubarak fell following an 18-day uprising.

"This is the dream of Egyptians, to see him like this, humiliated like he humiliated them for the last 30 years," said Ghada Ali, the mother of a 17-year old girl in the city of Alexandria who was shot to death during the crackdown.

"I want to see their heart explode like my daughter's heart exploded from their single bullet," she said, breaking down in sobs.

Still, the sight of Mubarak being wheeled into the courtroom in a hospital bed may win him some sympathy, said Marla Cooper said her uncles said they were going turkey hunting around Thanksgiving.

On Nov. 24, 1971, a man who gave his name as Dan "'Don't you remember he hijacked that airplane?"' In 2009, she said, her mother made a similar comment that raised her suspicions again.

Cooper said she contacted the FBI "as soon as I was sure that what I was remembering were real memories."

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Judge Upholds Congress' Change to Wolf Status

HELENA, Mont. • The way Congress went about removing endangered species protections from the Northern Rockies gray wolf undermines the rule of law, but it did not violate the Constitution, a federal judge ruled Wednesday.

U.S. District Judge Donald Molloy reluctantly upheld a budget rider passed by Congress in April that stripped wolves of federal protections in Montana, Idaho and parts of Washington, Oregon and Utah.

The provision was inserted by Republican Rep. Mike Simpson of Idaho and Democratic Sen. Jon Tester of Montana. The measure marked the first time since the passage of the Endangered Species Act in 1973 that Congress forcibly removed protections from a plant or animal.

Molloy, who twice blocked attempts to lift federal protections for the predators before Congress' action, did not hide his distaste for the provision.

"The way in which Congress acted in trying to achieve a debatable policy change by attaching a rider to the Department of Defense and Full-Year Continuing Appropriations Act of 2011 is a tearing away, an undermining and a disrespect for the fundamental idea of the rule of law," Molloy wrote in his order.

But, he added, past rulings by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals requires him to interpret the rider as not violating the separation of powers, the constitutional principle ensuring none of the three branches of government tramples on the independence of the other branches.

Conservation groups had challenged the rider's constitutionality, arguing that it violated the separation of powers because its only aim was to countermand Molloy's past rulings without making any changes to the Endangered Species Act.

But the judge ruled against them, upholding the congressional rider because of what Molloy called "magic words" included in it.

The budget rider directed the Interior secretary to remove wolf protections "without regard to any other provision of statute or regulation that applies to issuance of such rule?"

The use of that exact phrase amends the Endangered Species Act by implication, Department of Justice attorneys argued, even if the rider didn't reference the specific law.

Molloy said the 9th Circuit has upheld that interpretation in the past so he must abide by it, even though he clearly disagrees with the appellate court.

"In my view, the Ninth Circuit's deference to Congress threatens the Separation of Powers; nonspecific magic words should not sweep aside constitutional concerns," Molloy wrote.

It was not immediately clear whether the

conservation groups planned to appeal Molloy's ruling. Kieran Suckling, the executive director for the lead plaintiff in the case, the Center for Biological Diversity, did not immediately return a message for comment after business hours Wednesday evening.

Congress' actions turned over wolf management to the Northern Rocky Mountain states except for Wyoming. There are an estimated 1,651 in Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Oregon and Washington.

Idaho and Montana are planning to hold wolf hunts this fall to reduce the populations of the predator in those states.

Tester said in a statement that now that the court has made its ruling, it's time to move ahead.

"Returning Montana's wolves to Montana management was the right thing to do, and we did it in a responsible way with utmost respect to existing law and to our Constitution," he said.

Wolves in Wyoming were not included in the budget rider due to concerns among federal officials over a law allowing the predators to be shot on sight across most of the state.

But earlier Wednesday, the state and the U.S. Department of Interior reached an agreement over how to end federal protections for wolves there.

Wyoming would commit to maintaining at least 10 breeding pairs and 100 wolves outside Yellowstone National Park. There are now about 340 wolves in the state, of which 230 are outside the park.

WYOMING, FEDS ANNOUNCE PLAN FOR DELISTING WOLVES

CHEYENNE, Wyo. • Wyoming and the U.S. Department of Interior have reached an agreement over how to end federal protections for wolves in the state, officials announced Wednesday.

Environmentalists blasted the deal. They say Wyoming's plan – unique among Western states – to classify wolves as predators that could be shot on sight in most areas fails to give the animals enough protection.

Gov. Matt Mead hailed the agreement, saying wolves have taken a heavy toll on livestock and wildlife in the state since they were reintroduced in the 1990s. Wyoming is the last state in the Northern Rockies that still has federal oversight of its wolf population.

"This is far from the end of this process, but I think we have come up with something that fits with Wyoming's values and economy," Mead said.

"For years ranchers and sheep producers have been asked to sacrifice, and they have. We have lost significant numbers of elk and moose, and we have not had a say in the management of an animal inside Wyoming," Mead said. "It's time for that to change...."

Interior Secretary Ken Salazar has traveled to Wyoming repeatedly in recent months to work on the agreement.

The gray wolf's recovery serves as a "great example" of how the Endangered Species Act can work to keep imperiled animals from becoming extinct, Salazar said Wednesday.

"The agreement we've reached with Wyoming recognizes the success of this iconic species and will ensure the long-term conservation of gray wolves," he said.

Environmental groups, however, decried the deal. They say it doesn't afford Wyoming wolves adequate protection and couldn't stand on its own merits if Congress fails to pass pending language to exempt it from legal challenges.



"We do think that it's important that wolf management decisions be based on science, and not on these kind of closed-door political negotiations," said Collette Adkins Giese, a lawyer with the Center for Biological Diversity in Minnesota. "That really does set a dangerous precedent for the Endangered Species Act." Under the agreement,


Under the agreement, Wyoming would commit to maintaining at least 10 breeding pairs and 100 wolves outside Yellowstone National Park. There are now about 340 wolves in the state, of which 230 are outside the park.

Wolves immediately outside Yellowstone would be subject to regulated hunting in a zone that would expand slightly in the winter months to give wolves more protection in an area south of Jackson. Those in the rest of the state would be classified as predators that could be shot on sight.

Wyoming's commitment to classifying wolves as predators in most of the state has been a stumbling block to ending federal wolf management for years even as neighboring states have taken over their own wolf management. Idaho and Montana are planning licensed hunts this fall in which hundreds of wolves could be killed.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service went as far as helping Wyoming revise its wolf management plan in 2007 and approving it the next year in a move that set the stage for the state to assume wolf management. However, the federal agency repudiated Wyoming's plan just months later after U.S. District Judge Donald Molloy of Missoula, Mont., criticized it in response to a lawsuit brought by environmental groups.

Drought Forces Texas Ranchers to Cut Herds

McALLEN, Texas (AP) • The drought that has baked pastures and dried ponds has ranchers in Texas and Oklahoma – the nation's top two beef producers – culling their herds. Some have sold off all their cattle, but Texas cattle rancher Charles Kothman is hanging on and hoping for rain.

Some ranchers say they may sell out and get back into the business down the road. Others may never get back in, Kothman said.

Cattle ranchers either have to sell cattle during droughts or buy feed because their barren pastures can't sustain the animals. If they opt to buy hay while watching for rain clouds, they risk running into bankruptcy. If they sell off cows of calf-bearing age instead, they do it knowing rebuilding the herd later will be a long, costly process.

Texas is coming off its driest nine-month period ever and its hottest June on record. Most of the state is in one of the two worst drought stages. The U.S. Department of Agriculture rated 94 percent of its pasture and range land as either poor or very poor last week. The rating means there's no food for grazing livestock. 

Transportation Limits May Stunt Ag Expansion

As the U.S. hopes to increase exports in the coming years, the nation's aging infrastructure could require billions in improvements to meet needs.

NEW ORLEANS • President Barack Obama wants to double U.S. exports, including agricultural commodities and products, by 2015. Researchers hope to double crop yields by 2030 to feed a world population that's expected to double by 2050.

But any large-scale expansion of U.S. ag exports will only be possible if the nation can get more commodities and farm products to market, something some experts say the country already struggles to accomplish.

"When it comes to agriculture and transportation, we are trying to attach a garden hose to a fire hydrant," said Mike Steenhoek, executive director of the Soy Transportation Coalition. "We see increased production and increased demand for our products, but our transportation infrastructure is way behind."

While flooding-fueled backlogs at Mississippi River ports garnered headlines this spring, transportation woes begin at many farms. Many rural roads aren't capable of handling the weight of modern tractors or semitrailers, and transportation funding shortages across much of the nation have left many roads left to shoulder heavy loads well past their life expectancies.

Differences in crop usage also often dictates how goods are shipped, which is why Rick Calhoun, vice president at international food products producer Cargill, has advocated for years for simultaneous rail, truck and barge infrastructure improvement.

"You can't do it sequentially," he said.

But with a national budget crunch, that's easier said than done.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has estimated an annual trust fund of \$500 million is needed to conduct backlogged repairs of the nation's waterways, with half coming from the government and half from private sources. A private effort to fund a terminal for super container ships to redistribute freight in the Gulf of Mexico is expected to exceed \$1 billion in costs.

With the high costs involved for infrastructure improvement, Hammes said the form that commodities will be shipped in will ultimately determine where upgrades will be made and who will pay for them.

"Private funds will be spent by the sector that demands it," he said.

CARGILL RECALLING 36M POUNDS OF GROUND TURKEY

WASHINGTON (AP) • Meat giant Cargill is recalling 36 million pounds of ground turkey linked to a nationwide salmonella outbreak that has killed one person in California and sickened at least 76 others.

Illnesses in the outbreak date back to March and have been reported in 26 states coast to coast.

Cargill said Wednesday that it is recalling fresh and frozen ground turkey products produced at the company's Springdale, Ark., plant from Feb. 20 through Aug. 2 due to possible contamination from the strain of salmonella linked to the illnesses.

Company officials said that all ground turkey production has been suspended at the plant until the company is able to determine the source of the outbreak.

"Given our concern for what has happened, and our desire to do what is right for our consumers and customers, we are voluntarily removing our ground turkey products from the marketplace," said Steve Willardsen, president of Cargill's turkey processing business.

The Minnesota-based company said

it was initiating the recall after its own internal investigation, an Agriculture Department investigation and information about the illnesses released by the CDC this week.

All of the packages recalled include the code "Est. P-963" on the label, according to Cargill. The packages were labeled with many different brands, including Cargill's Honeysuckle White.

The CDC said this week that cultures of ground turkey from four retail locations between March 7 and June 27 showed contamination with the same strain of salmonella, though those samples had not been specifically linked to the illnesses. The CDC said preliminary information showed that three of those samples were linked to the same production establishment, but it did not name that plant.

A chart on the CDC's website shows cases have occurred every month since early March, with spikes in May and early June. The latest reported cases were in mid-July, although the CDC said some recent cases may not have been reported yet.

The states with the highest number sickened were Michigan and Ohio, 10 illnesses each, while nine illnesses were reported in Texas. Illinois had seven, California six and Pennsylvania five.

The remaining states have between one and three reported illnesses linked to the outbreak, according to the CDC: Alabama, Arizona, Georgia, Iowa, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Missouri, Mississippi, North Carolina, Nebraska, Nevada, New York, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Tennessee and Wisconsin.

Fish and Game to Propose Waterfowl Seasons

Waterfowl will be the talk of the town come Aug. 24, when the Idaho Fish and Game Commission will consider proposed seasons and limits.

The meeting will be held at commission headquarters in Boise.

Proposed seasons include 107-day goose seasons with a 10-bird daily bag limit on snow, blue and Ross's geese and a four-bird limit on Canada and white-fronted geese.

Proposed duck seasons, including mergansers, common snipe and American coot, would be 107 days, with a seven-bird limit on ducks, but no more than two female mallards, two redheads, two pintails or one canvasback. The scaup season would be 86 days, with a daily bag limit of three, and possession limit of two times the daily bag limit. The daily bag limits on common snipe would be eight, and the limit on coots is 25.

Proposed season dates would fall between Sept. 24 and Jan. 29. The youth waterfowl hunt is proposed for Sept. 24-25.

Fish and Game is considering several options including a split season structure for the 2011-12 waterfowl seasons. The specific season structure proposals and an opportunity to provide comments will be available on the Fish and Game website, fishandgame.idaho.gov.

They don't miss having a house, because their RV offers all the comforts of home - only on a smaller scale, Binay said. The 38-foot-long Monaco, even with its side extension, is not quite 400 square feet. It includes a queen-sized bed, double-sided refrigerator, stove, heating and air conditioning, foldout sofas for extra beds and a 42-inch color television. Though they don't have a permanent residence, the whole country is the Binays' backyard.



es in California, under the shade of mountains in Colorado and, most recently, near a babbling brook in southcentral Idaho.

It's a lifestyle the couple have grown to enjoy, but they readily note it's not for everyone. In fact, if you don't plan

to live out of an RV, they recommend you don't buy one. The Binays paid \$140,000 for their "home on wheels." Depending on the style, they can cost more than \$300,000.

Norman said there seems to be a common misconception about people who own RVs: that the owners have pockets overflowing with money. That's not always the case, he said. For some, owning an RV is a mortgage.

"We're different," he said. "We live out of ours. But if you're just planning on using it for vacation every year, it's not worth it. ... It'd cost you less to rent a five-star hotel."

Bob and Cassie Davis see it differently.

Several years ago, the Davises visited Yellowstone National Park and camped beneath the rugged Wyoming

spectacular, Cassie didn't enjoy sleeping in a tent.

Now when they head to the mountains, they do so in style. Last week, the couple camped in the shade of trees in the South Hills. Within easy reach were the amenities of home - bed, refrigerator, air-conditioning and shower.

Their 1990 model, which they've owned for about five years, isn't as fancy as newer models, which have side extensions and improved features, but it suits their needs just fine and has room to accommodate three friends.

The downside, Bob said, is that at today's gas prices it costs around \$175 to fill the RV, which gets only about seven miles a gallon.

But that hasn't stopped them from traveling long distances. Their favorite trip is to the beaches of Southern California.

Besides the beaches and mountains, some people who own RVs "camp" at RV parks, where for a fee they can hook up their machines to water and propane. Otherwise, they bring their own.

Too Much Gun? Try a Moderate Rifle Cartridge

t recently occurred to me that I am a living fulfillment of the biblical prophecy that human beings stubbornly resist learning wisdom in their youth. Even though this realization came to me in my late 50s, it's not too late for those of you of more tender years to benefit from this pearl of truth: We all shoot better with guns that we are not afraid of.

Rifles, handguns, and shotguns that kick us back into yesterday and split the stratosphere with their muzzle blast, assault our nerve-laden flesh and without disciplined practice make accurate shooting difficult. It's not unlike trying to thread a needle with a lumbering brute standing nearby ready to pound your shoulder; you're not going to do your best work.

I spent my youth lusting after and pursuing just about every magnum cartridge that had surfaced since the late '50s. If it had "magnum" etched on the barrel, I had to have it. I bought and shot .300 magnums, 7mm magnums, 338 magnums, 357, .41 and .44 magnums, 12- and 20gauge magnums at both targets and game. I just loved to brag about and show off my latest magnums to my friends. And, I collected a couple pickup truck loads of game with them over the years.

Nowadays I send thousands of .17 and .22 rimfire rounds downrange during the off seasons. This practice develops and instills the muscle memory necessary for proper shooting form and trigger release in the field. My magnum rifles don't come down off the rack much anymore. For antelope on the open sage flats, whitetail in the riverine tangles, and mule deer and elk in the alpine country I pack either a 7mm-08 Remington, .270 Winchester or a tried and true .30-06 Springfield. Because I no longer have to anticipate

ear-ringing muzzle blast or pounding recoil, the animals that get centered in the crosshairs usually end up in the freezer.

Other excellent cartridges in this class are the .243 Winchester, .25-06 Remington, .308 Winchester, 7mm (7X57) Mauser, and the .280 Remington.

For beginning or smaller stature hunters, Federal (Fusion Lite) and Remington (Managed-Recoil) each market a line of "lite" hunting ammunition. This ammo features readily expanding bullets at reduced velocity (and recoil). With good accuracy, adequate punch and only half the recoil, these loads are just the ticket for big game out to 200 yards, which is as far as most of us should shoot. One of my daughters has harvested several deer with the Fusion Lite .308 ammo; it's deadly stuff.

So if you're training a beginning hunter or just want to put some of the joy back into shooting and hunting with high-power rifles this fall, consider the virtues of the moderate cartridge clan. Good shooting!

Woman Sets Appalachian **Trail Fastest-Hike Record**

Jennifer Pharr Davis set the unofficial record for the fastest hike of the entire Appalachian Trail, yet she said she never ignored the beauty of the 2,180-mile trek from Maine to Georgia.

She saw 36 bears, moose, porcupines and just about every sunrise and sunset during her journey, which lasted exactly 46 days, 11 hours, and 20 minutes since she left Mount Katahdin in Maine on June 16.

"Fastest is so relative," Davis said Tuesday after estimating she had slept about 30 of the past 48 hours. "My average was 3 mph. So what are you not going to see at 3 mph?"

She emerged from the woods Sunday with her husband by her side and walked to the granite slab on Springer Mountain in Georgia at the trail's southern end. There cheering for her were her parents and dozens of other family members and friends.

There were a lot of tears. Everyone was like, 'Are those happy tears?' I just said they're everything tears. I'm so happy. In a way, I'm sad it's

over. I'm tired. It was just like every emotion was coming out at once," Davis said.

She had gone through five pairs of hybrid hiking and running shoes while averaging about 47 miles a day, or nearly two marathons.

No one keeps official speed records for the trail, but Davis said she broke Andrew Thompson's 2005 mark for the fastest supported "thru hike" by just over 24 hours.

Davis has logged more than 10,000 miles on long-distance trails worldwide. She first hiked the Appalachian trail in 2005 as a recent Samford University graduate with a degree in Classics after spending years studying ancient Greek and Roman literature and history. Her homage to her education was her trail nickname, Odyssa. It was a traditional Appalachian Trail hike, with a heavy backpack, a tent and provisions doubling as a journey of self-discovery.

The second trip came in

2008 when with the support of her newlywed husband, Brew Davis. She set the unofficial women's record of 57 days and eight hours. Just like this trip, he followed her along nearby roads, meeting her at crossings with food, water or a tent so she could hike with just a few water bottles, energy bars and her cell phone.

Since she carried less gear, her hike was quieter, allowing her to see more animals and to get more in sync with nature.

Davis also provided the boost she needed when she was ready to quit during the first days of the trip in Vermont after being chilled by a sleet storm in the White Mountains. He pointed out she was ahead of the record and would feel even worse if she quit.

"There's no way I could have done it without him," Davis said. "Not just the physical, logistical support,

but his emotional support."

The Appalachian Trail winds its way through 14 states and gets close to 3 million visitors a year. About 1,500 of those people try to hike the entire trail in one trip, and about a quarter of them make it all the way, according to the Appalachian Trail Conservancy.

For many of the "thru hikers," the trail turns into a communal experience. But Davis' pace kept her chances at making new friends to a minimum. An average day had her up by 5 a.m. and asleep around 10 p.m. "I said good morning and good night to the sun every single day on the trail," she said.

But the solitude always made her appreciate nature's boundless beauty.

"You have the trail to yourself. There's usually not any other hikers. More animals are on the trail at that time. You get to appreciate the sunset and the sunrise."

For people seeking a bit more excitement, a guided whitewater tour down the Hagerman section may fill the bill. This section of the Snake is located about 25 miles downstream from Twin Falls and offers Class III rapids.

Randy McBride, owner of High Adventure River Tours, one area company that provides guided trips, said the section is perfect for the entire family.

"From 2 year olds to 92 year olds," McBride said. "The rapids aren't wild enough that you have to be a pro and the trips can be tailored to the level of involvement you want to have in the ride. We can accommodate riders who just want to sit and enjoy the ride and those that want to paddle."

On the other end of the spectrum is the Murtaugh section of the Snake, known for its, "raging Class V rapids, when the flows are right."

This section is about 20 miles upstream from Twin Falls and is renowned as one of the best day trips in the country. It boasts 16 major rapids in 14 miles and the river drops some 25 feet per mile.

Another whitewater guide, Idaho Guide Service, provides trips along the Milner section, offering parties a chance to mingle with history along the way. The Class III water provides a great backdrop for stories from the Hunt Party and Oregon Trail.

IN NORTHWEST WISCONSIN . Though often short of cash, fishermen are gamblers. Otherwise you can't explain why they play such long odds. I myself have tossed a hat into the lottery ring on occasion, thinking big.

Dave Zentner was waiting for us in the small town of Brule, Wis., his canoe on top of his truck. He had driven from his home in Duluth, and with him were the paraphernalia of a night fisherman: fly rod, mosquito dope, headlamp, extra batteries. His wide-brimmed hat lay on the seat beside him, and through the truck windows his varnished canoe paddles glistened, catching the low angle of early evening sun.

Warm, with a clear sky, this was July 4th, Independence Day.

"Looks like it could be a good night," Dave said.

My sons were along, and the four of us angled in our two vehicles toward the Brule River, hoping to time the hatch of Hexagenia Limbata, the second-largest mayfly in the nation - a real airplane.

Coming and going according to its own schedule, the "hex" is mysterious almost beyond understanding. Good setups for its emergence from river mud are hot and humid late June and early July days. Once atop a river's surface ("duns"), these bugs soon fly, mate, drop eggs and die, creating what we were hoping for tonight: a spinner fall of spent mayflies onto still water.

Nothing so much as the sight of a hex spinner floating topside on a hot summer night triggers the rise of fat-sided brown trout, whose giant slurpings can be telltale of their positions, and their vulnerability.

It's then that an angler casts a hex spinner imitation, judging in the dark distances that he can only imagine, and hoping his fly hits the target.

Launching our canoes, we paddled with the current, finessing our craft among boulders and around deadfalls. This portion of the river divides bogs where jack pine and spruce, tamarack and cedar stand thick. Also there are white pines, and a bald eagle soon lifted from one, dipping low over the river before struggling for altitude.

We hadn't paddled long when we rounded a bend, surprising a big doe that stood brisket deep in the chilled stream. Not far away, a hooded merganser scurried her young away from our approach. To the west, thunderstorms threatened that we hoped would hold off until we finished our business

sometime after midnight. Darkness gathered, and we paddled on.

"Night fishing," the fly fisherman and entomology guru Ernie Schweibert once said, "can get into your blood, and your senses become amazingly attuned to it. You will find yourself casting accurately to rises you only hear. The slightest disturbance near your fly puts the reflex on edge; you must strike at these rises, for it is easy to assume your fly to be elsewhere and never strike at a good fish."

After not quite an hour of stroking, we settled our canoes alongside a heavily vegetated shoreline and tied on big hex imitations, sizes 6 and 8. No duns lay on the water, which in itself wasn't a bummer. As many as three days can separate the time a dun takes wing and when it falls back to the river as a spinner.

Looping some line over the river, getting a feel for things, my younger son, Cole, asked: "You think it will happen?"

He was in the front of my canoe. "I don't know," I said. "I hope so."

Often hex spinners start to fall about the time whippoor wills croon their signature tunes.

Whip-poor-will. Whip-poor-will.

Sedge wrens sing out also, and howls of coyotes often rattle through the unseen forest. On nights when the sky hangs over anglers like a black umbrella, with barely a moon, the effect is otherworldly, ethereal.

"There's one bug," Dave said, seeing a single hex spinner on the water.

He and my other son, Trevor, were upstream a short distance from Cole and me, just far enough to be unseen in the dark, save for when one of their headlamps flashed on.

The lights weren't kept on long because they gathered so many mosquitoes so quickly. Wood ticks were another issue: The other night when Dave quit fishing, he had more than 100 on him. Were there but that many hex spin-

ners to fish to. "As far as hex hatches, it hasn't been

a very good year so far," Dave had told the boys and me before we headed north Monday. "Maybe it will happen tonight. Maybe not. We can only try."

*Why There Are Permits in a Second-*Round Drawing

"I was unsuccessful drawing a controlled hunt tag for mule deer. In previous years I noticed that permits were available during the second round drawing in a hunt that I had applied for. Why would there be permits available in a secondround drawing ...?"

The second-round drawing for leftover controlled hunt permits also contains permits that had been drawn and designat ed to individuals but were not purchased by Aug. 1.

This is a common question among unsuccessful controlled hunt applicants. The reason there may be permits available during the second drawing is because applicants that have successfully drawn a controlled hunt permit have until Aug. 1 to purchase their permits and tags.

Successful applicants whose plans have changed can consciously decide to not purchase their controlled hunt permits and tags and instead purchase general tags and hunt a different area.

Once a controlled hunt permit and tag is drawn and purchased the applicant is only allowed to



hunt that controlled hunt. General any weapon big game tags may be purchased at any vendor up until the last day of the hunting season. Nonresident hunters are subject to tag quotas for big game species.



Wrangling with White Sturgeon on Oregon's Columbia River

ON THE COLUMBIA RIV-**ER, Ore.** • We knew the fish was big by the way line peeled off the reel, but not until it burst from the water in an explosion of spray and fins and power, did we realize just how big.

It's the first morning of a two-day fishing trip for white sturgeon on the Columbia River near Portland, Ore., and we're here, five of us, watching a massive fish clear the water surrounded by some of the most beautiful country imaginable.

The Columbia Gorge, an 80-mile canyon through the Cascade Range, is like something out of "Lord of the Rings?

Everything about the Columbia Gorge, it seems, is big, including the rock cliffs that dwarf us and the white sturgeon for which the Columbia River is famous. Larger cousins of the lake sturgeon that inhabit Lake of the Woods and Rainy River, white sturgeon are the largest freshwater fish in North America. They routinely exceed 10 feet and have been known to reach 20 feet.

As freshwater fishing goes, it doesn't get any bigger than this.

That's why we're here.

Epic adventure Joining me on this epic ad-

venture are Peter Howard, 23, of Stockholm, Wis.; Evan Laurie, 24, of Olympia, Wash.; Jon Falch, 29, of Peyton, Colo.; and Rich Thorpe, 36, of Bedford, Mass.

At 50, I'm the elder statesman of the group, and I'll be grateful for the younger arms and stronger backs of my fishing companions before the trip is over.

We're fishing with Oregon sturgeon guide Charlie Foster. Owner of Northwest Sturgeon Adventures, Foster, 45, of Estacada, Ore., has been serving up "Oh My God" white sturgeon encounters since 1995.

Foster says the largest white sturgeon he's ever brought to the boat measured 13 feet, likely exceeded half a ton, and took three people more than 2 hours to land.

No wonder, then, that Foster markets himself exclusively as a sturgeon guide. Sure, the Columbia River has big walleyes, salmon and steelhead, but nothing puts a bend in the pole or cramps up the arms like a big white sturgeon.

By law, "oversize" white sturgeon 60 inches and longer can't be kept or even brought into the boat. Catch a big one, and you're going to have to get in the water with the fish if you want a photo.

That's our goal.

"To see 7-, 8-, 9-foot fish like that is pretty cool," Foster said. "It's pretty hard to get excited about anything else.

Nine times out of 10, everybody's going to catch the biggest fish they've ever caught."

Big wall, big fish

That quickly becomes apparent when one of the rods bristling off the back of Foster's 22-foot Alumaweld fishing boat begins to twitch. We're anchored in about 85 feet of water near a sheer rock wall, and the shad Foster has rigged with 9/0 hooks and weights ranging from 32 ounces to 48 ounces rest downstream in about 100 feet of water.

It's a place, Foster says, that has produced big fish.

"I got spooled here two years ago," he said. "And that was after chasing it down the river. I was going 10 mph backwards, and I still couldn't keep up with it."

As Foster explains, sturgeon initially mouth the bait with their rubbery lips, and the bite that's now making the rod twitch is barely perceptible, at first. But then the sturgeon finds the shad to its liking, and line peels from the reel.

Laurie, who says he hasn't fished in years - Howard paid for his trip as a birthday present - is chosen to go first. At Foster's cue, he closes the bail and sets the hook.

Imagine tying into a freight train going downhill at full speed, and you'll have an idea what happens next. Laurie



nswer: The goal of a personal bankruptcy is to obtain a court order called a "Discharge". The Discharge Order eliminates a debtor's legal obligation to repay debts that existed on the date the bankruptcy case was filed. Most debts are dischargeable. The exceptions are most tax debts, domestic support obligations such as child support most student loans, fines and criminal restitution obligations, debts arising from personal injuries caused by the debtor while intoxicated and occasionally a debt the court decides is not dischargeable, usually because the debt was obtained through fraud. The Discharge Order is usually issued about three months after the bankruptcy case is filed in a Chapter 7 case, and after the last plan payment is made in a Chapter 13 case. The order specifically prohibits your creditors from attempting to collect their debts from you. However, the Discharge Order does not prevent you from repaying any debt you wish to repay, such as debts that are secured by liens on property such as your car or your home. Because the liens remain enforceable through repossession or foreclosure, if you want to keep the car or the home, you will want to voluntarily repay the debt.



Dad: 'Shock' Over Son Who Died After Arrest

FULLERTON, Calif. • In

the nearly two decades since his son descended into madness, Ron Thomas has worried every day that the schizophrenic 37-year-old would die of exposure or illness on the streets. He never imagined the end would come in a violent confrontation with police.

The death last month was the end of a trajectory that began when Kelly Thomas was in his early 20s and started showing the first signs of what would later be diagnosed as schizophrenia: he shuttled between addresses, preferred to sleep on the floor and stopped showering.

In treatment, Thomas did well and was able to hold down a job - but when he stopped taking his pills, he disappeared onto the streets. He racked up an array of charges, from public urination to assault with a deadly weapon, and alarmed his parents with father said Wednesday he was stunned when he learned police officers caused his son's severe head and neck injuries.

"When I arrived at the hospital to see him, I honestly thought that gang bangers had got a hold of him like the cowards sometimes do and just beat him with a baseball bat in the face," he said. "Immediately my thoughts were to get with Fullerton police ... and I didn't learn until a certain amount of hours later the truth. That put me in absolute shock."

A police spokesman, Sgt. Andrew Goodrich, said the case was an isolated incident.

"We have a good department full of good individuals," he said. "We've made more than half-a-million law enforcement contacts over the past 4.5 years ... This is the only instance of this kind that's happened."

Goodrich said officers receive training on how to deal with the mentally ill and the homeless. But an attorney representing the department, Michael D. Schwartz,

said that "public perception of officers' trying to control a combative, resistive suspect rarely conform to those officers' training, experiences, and what those officers were experiencing at the time or reality."

The revelations have caused growing outrage in this quiet college town. More than 70 people spoke at the Council meeting City Wednesday, and a city councilwoman called for the resignation of the police chief. Thomas' father and others were planning a protest outside the police station this weekend, the second in as many weeks.

"My son needs a voice," he said. "Now, the people have become Kelly's voice and, yeah, I'm leading the charge."

Kelly Thomas was an outgoing child who loved to play the guitar, participated in Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts and aspired to be a wildland firefighter, said his father, who raised him alone after he and Thomas' mother divorced.

After his diagnosis, he went to a live-in facility that provided meals and monitored his medication, his father said. Thomas was able to hold down a job at a gas station and then a printing facility and even started to train with the California Department of Forestry and Protection.

But each time he began to improve, he stopped his medications and wound up back on the streets, moving between Yorba Linda, Placentia, Fullerton and Cypress - all places where he had once lived or had family and friends. One of the hardest parts of his death has been hearing their son described as homeless, the father said.

"That's the heartbreaking part for all of us. We all have ideas of what we'd like our kids to be like and to do in life. With Kelly, we didn't get to realize that and it constantly broke our heart," his father said. "Kelly wasn't homeless at all, he had so many homes, but he wanted to be a drifter and he did."

Life on the streets led to criminal charges.

He pleaded guilty to assault with a deadly weapon other than a firearm in 1995 and since 2004 has had a string of arrests for a host of lesser crimes including public urination, trespassing, battery, unlawful camping, petty theft and vandalism. He racked up traffic violations for jaywalking and failing to obey traffic signals.

his bizarre behavior.

"My daughter and I have talked for years that we'd get the call that something had happened to him, whether it was from organ failure because he's not drinking enough fluids or the elements or maybe gang activity," said his father, Ron Thomas.

Last month, he was sitting on a bench at the **Fullerton Transportation** Center, a hub for buses and commuter trains where homeless people congregate, when six police officers arrived to investigate reports of a man burglarizing cars nearby. Police said he ran when they tried to search his backpack and that he resisted arrest.

The incident was captured by a bystander with a cell phone, and bus surveillance tape released Monday showed agitated witnesses describing how officers beat Thomas and used a stun gun on him repeatedly as he cried out for his father.

On the cell phone video, a man can be heard screaming over a fast, clicking sound that those on the tape identify as a stun gun being deployed.

Thomas was taken off life support five days after the July 5 altercation. His







Reinstated Brooks Re-signs with CSI Men

Jerrold Brooks is back.

"He has fulfilled all the requirements that we've placed on him," said CSI athletic director Joel Bate. "He's at the end of the rope now. According to our drug and alcohol policies and academic requirements, he has been reinstat ed."

The 5-11 sophomore guard averaged 15.4 points for the 33-4 national championship squad and his reinstatement gives the Golden Eagles 10 players signed for the 2011-12 season.

The former BYU quarterback was earmarked late last season as the face of the future for the Washington Redskins.

ASHBURN, Va. (AP) • For the first five practice days of training camp, John Beck has enjoying having the Washington Red-skins starting quarterback job all to himself, getting the first-team work while the team waited for Rex Grossman to re-sign and become eligible to take part.

On Wednesday, the fifth day of the solo run, Beck sported a new look, switching jerseys from No. 3 to No. 12.

A number change during camp usually isn't a big deal, especially for a player who hasn't been in a regular season game since 2007, but Beck is the type who doesn't mind telling a story from start to finish. Plus, his unexpected rise to contender for the No. 1 spot – and the extraordinary confidence that Mike Shanahan has expressed in him – has made Beck the most compelling story of camp.

So here's the condensed version of the tale behind the jersey. It started when Beck wore No. 14 in his first year of flag football because he worshipped Ty Detmer.

"First year of tackle football, my coach, I think he was a big Terry Bradshaw fan or something," Beck said. "He gave me 12 and I was, like, furious. I went home, just so mad. But I rode 12 the entire time through Pop Warner, junior high, high school and college."

Beck couldn't wear No. 12 after he was drafted by Miami because it belonged to Bob Griese and had been retired. He got it back when he went to Baltimore for a season and wanted it again when he joined the Redskins during training camp last year, but it already belonged to receiver Malcolm Kelly and there wasn't time to make the switch.

his commission – a state government agency that promotes potatoes across the United States and world would pay for it out of its existing \$12 million to \$14 million annual budget. It gets the money from a 12.5cent tax levied on every 100 pounds of Idaho potatoes.

Muir says the decision follows the tradition of other bowl games that were once named after commodities such as the Orange Bowl in Florida or the Cotton Bowl in Texas.

Kelly's Ducks from the

Pac-12 conference won't play in the Idaho game, at least not until 2013, because the game has a contract to feature teams from the Western Athletic Conference and the Mid-American Conference until then.

This year, the game is scheduled for a wintry Dec. 17.

Since 2007, the Boise bowl game had corporate sponsors from the transportation world - Roady's Truck Stops and Udrove, which makes software for truckers to manage their in-cab paperwork.

But for most of its 15year existence, the game has been known as the Humanitarian Bowl, a nod to the World Sports Humanitarian Hall of Fame that's located on the campus of Boise State – even though there's no official affiliation.

Kevin McDonald, the executive director of the game, said it became clear early on that to butter up the Idaho Potato Commission, a name change was needed.

"They wanted some form of the potato bowl," McDonald said. "If we were going to strike a deal, the length of the term had to be right, and (it was necessary) for us to change our name?



touchdown. He would score 22 touchdowns five different ways — 19 on defense and special teams, the most in NFL history. He returned two interceptions at least 90 yards for touchdowns in a single season, another first. He made the NFL's alldecade team in the 1990s as both a cornerback and a punt returner.

But those are just lines on a resume. They don't do justice to what kind of threat he was during his peak years. That was best evidenced by the feeling fans, foes and even teammates had every time a ball headed his way; everyone held their breath to see what he would do with it.

Sanders had the speed and moves to weave his way through traffic, into the open field. And that's where the real show began.

What previous generations considered taunting a beaten foe, Sanders considered performance art. Putting a ball behind his head or strutting or taking scissor-steps, he was always looking for fun ways to showcase himself. He wanted to be more than a great player, to be someone who all by himself was worth the price of admission. Love him or hate him, he often was.

"Deion did it all," Parker said. "He would dream the impossible dream and then go out and make it happen. He wasn't going to be limited or defined by someone else's views."

After establishing himself as an All-Pro with the Atlanta Falcons, Sanders wanted to show he was more than a great player on a mediocre team. So he went to the San Francisco 49ers to help them try ending Dallas' two-year reign as Super Bowl champs. He was voted the NFL's top defensive player of that season. The 49ers indeed won it all, knocking off the Cowboys in a classic NFC championship game, highlighted by Sanders' stifling performance against Michael Irvin. Then, to further prove

what a difference-maker he was, Sanders switched sides, joining Irvin and the Cowboys the next year and helping them regain the throne as Super Bowl champs.

ORDINANCE NO. 3006

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO, AMENDING TWIN FALLS CITY CODE §§10-12-2.3(I) AND 10-12-2.4(I) BY CHANGING THE TIME REQUIRED FOR ACCEPTANCE OF A FINAL PLAT APPLICATION AND FILING, AND LIMITING EXTENSIONS FOR THOSE TIME REQUIREMENTS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO:

Section 1: That Twin Falls City Code §10-12-2.3(I) is amended as follows:

10-12-2-3: PRELIMINARY PLAT:...

(I) Approval Period:

Failure to file and obtain the certification of the acceptance of the final plat application by the Administrator within one two years after action by the Commission shall cause all approvals of said preliminary plat to be null and void, unless an extension of time is applied for by the subdivider and granted by the Commission. Only one extension may be granted by the Commission for a term of two years.

. City Council Resolution No. 2010-6 adopted on July 14, 2010, authorized the establishment of the Urban Renewal Agency. The Agency conducted its first meeting on January 31, 2011. Since January 2011, the Agency has worked on the preparation of the urban renewal plan. The Agency expenses have been limited to legal expenses and other planning expenses. Those activities have been funded by the city of Heyburn in an amount of \$20,000. Expenses through June 30, 2011, total \$21,741. The Agency expects to incur additional expenses of \$5,000, through September 30, 2011. The budget below shows the breakdown of anticipated expenses for FY 2012. Again, for FY 2012, the Agency's revenues will be limited to the remaining amount of the City's initial advance. The Agency may receive a second advance of \$25,000 to consider a second project area and to provide for operating costs for FY 2012. This second advance is secured by a commitment from the project developer to reimburse the City and Agency under certain conditions.

This public hearing on the proposed budget is required for formal adoption of the FY 2012 budget. The proposed expenditures and revenues for FY 2012 have been tentatively approved by the Heyburn Urban Renewal Agency Board of Directors on August 1, 2011.







De-clarer drove out the trump ace, ruffed the next club, drew the rest of the trumps, ran the hearts, and did not even need to take the spade finesse for his contract. At the end of the first trick,

East can tell from the auction that declarer rates to have a singleton club and either five cards or six in the majors, together with almost every missing high card. A spade return can hardly help; instead, East should try to disrupt declarer's communications in case South has this actual handpattern. At trick two, East shifts to a

heart, hoping that declarer only has a doubleton heart. Declarer wins the king and plays the diamond queen. East wins the ace and plays a second heart, leaving declarer unable to run the hearts because there are still trumps out.

The best chance he has for his contract is to try to cash a third heart, then take the spade finesse But East can ruff in at once, and there is an inevitable spade loser now



- STRIVING HIGHER IN CALIFORNIA DEAR STRIVING HIGH-**ER:** With today's job market what it is, it's possible that without further training your boyfriend may not be able to find another job that offers the same wages and/or benefits as the one he lost. Remind him that his unemployment benefits are finite – they're not going to last forever.

He needs to understand that when that happens, you are not going to support him. He may be depressed, but the longer he sits around, the longer it'll take him to become motivated. Even if he can't find work right now, he can seek further job training. He can also do volunteer work, which would get him out and circulating and help him to make more contacts that could lead to permanent employment.







cut his 2011 forecast for growth this year to 1.8 percent from 2.6 percent. And he has bumped up the likelihood of another recession to 20 percent from 15 percent.

"The last week has made it much more likely that corporate profit estimates will be revised lower;' said Nick Kalivas, a vice president of financial research at MF Global.

The stocks that have fallen the furthest have been those of companies that fare best in economic expansions. Industrial companies like Caterpillar and Boeing, energy companies like Exxon Mobil and Chevron, and retailers like Amazon and Coach have all fallen by more than the broader stock market.

Investors have pushed government bond yields to their lowest level of the year. The 10-year Treasury note now yields 2.6 percent. Bond yields typically fall when the economy is weak because nervous investors view bonds as a safe place to park their money, and there's less chance that inflation will erode their value.

The economy started sputtering early in the year. Economists at first thought the slowdown would be temporary, the result of a short-term rise in gasoline prices and an earthquake in Japan that disrupted shipments of auto parts and electronics.

But the weakness persisted. And it worsened as a political fight over debt and deficits raised the risk that the U.S. government would not be able to pay all its bills.

"It now seems fairly clear that those shocks have done a lot more damage than we expected," says Leo Abruzzese, global forecasting director for the Economist Intelligence Unit. "They seem to have had a devastating effect on confidence."

After the government reported that the economy grew



at an annual pace of 0.4 percent in the first quarter and 1.3 percent in the second, Abruzzese is cutting his estimate for 2011 growth from 2.4 percent to less than 2 percent.

It's hard to see anything lifting growth to the 2.5 percent needed to keep unemployment from rising, let alone the 5 percent needed to bring the rate down significantly from June's 9.2 percent.

"Sales are what keeps the market moving higher, and there's not much demand when there's only 0.4 percent growth," said Andrew Goldberg, U.S. market strategist at IP Morgan Funds.

When the economy grows less than 2 percent over a 12month period, it risks slipping into recession, says Mark Vitner, senior economist at Wells Fargo Securities. Over the most recent such period, the economy grew just 1.6 percent.

Few economists are predicting another recession, despite a series of weak economic reports. Gasoline prices have come down from their high of almost \$4 a gallon in May. And Japanese factories are starting to crank up again after the March earthquake.

At the heart of the economy's problems are the debts that consumers built up dur-

ing the early and mid-2000s. Many borrowed against the equity in their homes, convinced that house prices would rise forever.

When housing prices collapsed, people were left owing more than their homes were worth. Others charged up their credit cards. Now it's payback time, and Americans are spending less or spending cautiously as they slash their debts.

Companies are reluctant to hire until they're convinced enough customers are ready to buy their products or services. Corporate profits are booming, though, because companies laid off millions of workers, learned to operate more efficiently with smaller staffs and expanded in growing markets overseas.

"If companies were inclined to hire, they could," Abruzzese says.

So companies are waiting for consumers to spend, and consumers are waiting for companies to hire them or offer generous pay raises and job security. It's a tough cycle to break.

In the past, the government has helped by spending on infrastructure projects or jobs programs. This time, it's cutting at all levels. In the second quarter, government cutbacks reduced economic growth by 0.2 percentage points.

Agency representatives devoted the majority of the time to discussing regulations to protect Idaho's groundwater. Some groups want requirements more stringent than what large beef and dairy facilities are held to, citing a chance to

operations bureau. "The only agreement we have is that we may regulate production wells, which the dairy and beef farms do already."

Representatives from the Idaho Conservation League and Humane Society are pushing for more rules.

"We have serious groundwater issues now," said Courtney Washburn, comtry industry but for beef and dairy as well."

While a handful of poultry farms are currently working in the state, the industry is expected to boom as other states have enforced stricter operating rules.

"At this point, the discussion is agency-focused since not that many poultry facilities are operating in the state right now," Bilderback said.

Fatal Crashes Down in 2010

Idaho's roadways were statistically safer in 2010 than the year prior. But more crashes were caused by people who chose to drive under the influence of alcohol or narcotics.

Idaho's number of fatal vehicle crashes and the lives they claim continue a downward trend.

The Idaho Transportation Department recently released its 2010 crash report, which notes that fatalities dropped for a fifth straight year. The 2010 tally was 209 fatalities from 185 crashes, 7.5 percent fewer deaths statewide than in 2009.

In District 4, which includes the eight counties of south-central Idaho, 39 people were killed on Idaho roadways last year. That figure has continued its downward trend since 2007.

Although the number of deaths is decreasing, the cause of those crashes increasingly points to impaired driving. The report cites 96 fatal crashes as the result of driving under the influence, nearly a 30 percent increase from the year prior.

"Have you ever tried to take pictures of pigs on the run?" Gillespie asked. "We have our tricks, though – we give them watermelon and marshmallows and they come right over?


