Higher Taxes for Better Roads?

The Twin Falls City Council is asking for more input before it makes a \$157,000 decision on road maintenance funding.

About three weeks ago, Todd Schwarz jokingly handed Twin Falls Mayor Don Hall a \$5 bill.

Schwarz said Hall quickly handed it back and quipped that he wasn't the first to try and get a proposed tax increase out of the way.

In July, Hall pitched upping city spending by 1 percent - an increase to property taxes of about \$5 per \$150,000 of value. That would add up to \$157,000 more that Hall said would be earmarked for road funding.

Schwarz, who works with Hall at the College of Southern Idaho, said he thinks residents are overtaxed in general, but

Hall's proposal makes sense.

"I think our roads in Twin right now are doing more than \$5 in damage to our vehicles every year," Schwarz said. "So, I think (the proposal) a good investment."

He added that he's a big proponent of economic development efforts and he doesn't think deteriorating infrastructure is a good way to attract new business and industry.

Hall hasn't cast a vote for the increase nor committed to it. He said it would take more than a few jokingly waved \$5 bills to Please see TAXES, M2

Jarbridge **Area Sees** Explosion ofElk

In a state that has seen multiple elk herds decline, one area is bucking the trend.

Elk populations have expanded in the Jarbidge area, according to recent herd counts from the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

The latest count totaled more than 1,300 animals, said Jerome Hansen,



Magic Valley regional supervisor. However, the number tends to fluctuate since the herds frequently travel between the Idaho and Nevada border, he said.

"The herds are really growing," Hansen said. "Part of the reason is because the habitat has changed since the Murphy Complex Fire."

The Murphy Complex Fire burned 650,000 acres in 2007. It had a dramatic impact on the people and habitat in the area.

U.S. Bureau of Land Management crews worked to rehabilitate the area and reseed it with new plants. While there have been multiple reseeding projects since the fire, the area's Please see ELK, M2

Idaho Power's Bright' Future

Idaho Power Co. plans to build a one-half to 1megawatt pilot solar panel plant in southwest Idaho that is estimated to cost \$2-4 million.

BOISE • Idaho Power Co. plans to build a pilot solar panel plant so it can gain expertise in a field that could one day become a significant part of its power generating operations, an official says.

Idaho Power wants to build a one-half to 1-megawatt plant using solar panels in southwest Idaho, said Mark Stokes, the company's power supply planning manager. Estimated cost is \$2 million to \$4 million.

"There is a kind of research and development component to this," Stokes told the Idaho Statesman. "It's not just as simple as throwing some solar panels out there and you are done."

The state's biggest utility plans to ask for bids later this year but hasn't decided whether to put the solar panels on the ground or rooftops. Idaho Power has 492,000 residential, business and agricultural customers.



Typically, one ends up in a hospital after one too many drinks. Very rarely can a person walk into a hospital and receive a cold beer as medical treatment.


While it has no plans to open a bar, St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center applied for and received a beer and wine license in late Iulv.

"I would really appreciate any input from the public," Hall said at Monday's council meeting. "I've had several people talk to me about the proposal, but certainly not a great amount of people."

Monday will be the time to do that. It is the date of the mandatory public hearing before the final city budget is adopted, and may mean the difference between a budget the same as this year or one that that is more than 2 percent higher – with the tax increase to go with it. The hearing is on all aspects of the budget.

Councilman Will Kezele brought up continuing the debate on raising road revenues at the last council meeting, but the other council members deferred until they heard more from residents. While Kezele didn't explicitly support the increase, he also noted that city staff will lay off two employees Oct.1 and will freeze about eight other now-open positions, which created at least some of the savings that will go toward an increased roads budget.

City staff proposed spending about \$200,000 more on roads next fiscal year, bringing the total to \$750,000 – which is still about \$550,000 short of what city engineers say is

needed just to keep up with routine maintenance on streets.

"It does look like we are still insufficient in upkeep of the roads, which I am concerned about, mainly in the sense that if we can't upkeep the roads, we are replacing the roads and the cost of replacement is much more difficult to handle," Kezele said.

Even Councilwoman Rebecca Mills Sojka, the sole vote against even a theoretical increase when the council set the upper limit on its budget, said she could support a tax increase if overwhelming support for it appeared in the council chambers.

"I plan to just be open and truly listen, and whatever the public says, we should listen," she said. "I have a hunch, though, that people won't say, 'yes, please come raise our taxes.""

Filer Man Gets **Probation** for Drive-By Shooting

A 19-year-old man received a suspended sentence for putting bullet holes in parked cars.

On Monday, Kristofer Hass was ordered to five years probation in lieu of a five-year prison sentence at a sentencing in Twin Falls County 5th District Court. Hass pleaded guilty to felony malicious injury to property in late May.

Hass told police he fired 18 to 25 rounds in a drive-by shooting, purposely aiming for cars and other property but not people, during the early morning hours of March 9. Witnesses say Hass and three other men were asked to leave a house party at a residence on the 1500 block of Vista Circle in Twin Falls earlier that night. No one was injured in the shooting.

The state charged Hass with five felony counts, all but one of which were dropped.

Golf Course Road Turn Lane Closed

Twin Falls-based Gordon Paving Inc. is the contractor for the \$985,000, federally funded project.



WOMAN PLEADS NOT GUILTY TO METH TRAFFICKING

A Kimberly woman has pleaded not guilty to felony trafficking in methamphetamine.

Lynnsey Cummings, 29, entered her plea last week in Twin Falls County 5th District Court, and an Oct. 4 trial date was set. She faces a minimum penalty of three years in state prison and a \$10,000 fine if convicted.

Twin Falls police claim they found approximately 30 grams of methamphetamine in her vehicle in May, after a resident on Paint Brush Drive reported a suspicious vehicle. The witness said Cummings was lying in the fetal position in the car, talking about receiving subliminal messages from the radio. She had left the area before police could arrive, but they later located her at an apartment complex on Elizabeth Boulevard.

Continued from the front page "It's not something we use very often," said Lisa Burgett, a St. Luke's hospitalist. "This is for somebody who comes to the hospital for say, a broken hip, but they admit they have three or four beers every night."

Giving alcohol-dependent patients one to two beers keeps them from being miserable, Burgett said. It usually shortens their hospital stay by several days, which helps reduce costs for the hospital and patient.

"We'll give them a beer to keep them from withdrawal," she said. "To get the patient out of room in three days instead of a week so they can get to rehab."

Serving alcohol as a means for medical care is not a new idea, but not many hospitals

Osterhoudt Pleads Not Guilty



"The elk herds now are not big enough to affect habitat growth," said Jim Clott, a BLM wildlife biologist. "But there is plenty of grass for them to eat. Sagebrush needs a long time to take place."

As the area recovers, grass was the first plant to take off quickly, and is a food source suitable for elk, said Brad Lowe, the region's Fish and Game landowner coordinator.

"Grass is the first thing that establishes," Lowe said. "There is a concern for cheat grass but the reseeding seemed to help. The goal is to restore sagebrush."

"Elk herd numbers vary around the state," Hansen said. "This is one of the areas they're up. It's going to be a neat season."



KIMBERLY • The city of Kimberly was presented two awards Tuesday evening by Southern Idaho Rural Development for its performance in Operation Facelift.

Kimberly was selected as most improved city, and El Cazador was selected its most improved business following the effort to spruce up Magic Valley downtowns earlier this year. Larry Hall, director of SIRD, presented a plaque to Mayor Dave Overacre and cochairs Mitzi Cheldelin and Jake Tolman for overseeing Kimberly's efforts.

"It's been a pleasure to be part of the project for the last six months," said Hall.

Cheldelin, who also serves

as councilwoman, said city staff alone put in more than 60 hours of volunteer labor, while a total of 1,000 hours came from volunteers. Citizens, several school groups including the high school football team, city maintenance, the police department and the Rock Creek Fire District also volunteered.

"We couldn't have done it without the fire district because they helped us safely paint the high spots with their ladders," Cheldelin said.

The majority of the project involved painting, but there was masonry work done on the post office and minor repairs.

With 14 buildings in Kimberly being revitalized, it "changed the face of downtown Kimberly from one end to the other," Cheldelin said.

FILER NARROWING **FIGURES FOR** SEWER INCREASE

FILER • The near future for residents in Filer will include an increase in their monthly sewer charges.

City officials said Tuesday that an exact figure for any increase has yet to be determined. But a final number and effective date will be released for public comment before a new water treatment facility comes online at the end of this month.

Mayor Bob Templeman said raising the current rate of \$47.50 isn't something he really wants to see, but is an inevitable part of running the city and assuring the plant is self-sustaining.

"When we proposed building this thing back in 2006, a rate increase to \$60 or \$80 was part of the bond information package," he said. "I'm confident we'll be able to keep it somewhere in-between there."

The cost of plant testing procedures is expected to make setting a solid firstyear maintenance and operation budget difficult, but tentative figures run between \$250,000 and

\$383,000. Though the City Council plans to use the higher amount as a safety buffer, Templeman and City Maintenance Director Bud Compher both believe \$250,000 is probably more realistic.

"Along with the main plant, we've made upgrades to the collection system and that'll be a savings," Compher said. "Our pumps and blowers are more energy-efficient, too."

Public information meetings regarding the rate change will be held at noon Tuesday at the Filer Senior Haven, 222 Main St., and 6 p.m. Aug. 23 in the council chambers at 300 Main St.

Also recently, the council awarded Twila Knutson, owner of Knutson's Kustom Kutting, a plaque for having the most-improved business in Filer following Operation Facelift.

"They painted three buildings and two of them belonged to me," Knutson said.

Calif. Man Pleads Guilty to Amended Drug Charge

A California man has pleaded guilty to an amended charge of felony possession of marijuana.

Alfonso Guillen-Fierros,

34, of Wilits, Calif., entered his plea on Monday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court after agreeing to a plea deal. He was originally charged with felony conspiracy to commit marijuana trafficking after Idaho State Police say they found four pounds of pot stuffed inside a flat-screen TV box in the trunk of a car.

According to the deal, the state will argue for a prison sentence of two to five years with three years of probation. Sentencing is slated for Sept. 6.

Guillen-Fierros was one of three men arrested during a

drug patrol along U.S. Highway 93 in south Twin Falls County.

Michael McCormick, 25, of Ukiah, Calif., has pleaded not guilty to felony trafficking in marijuana and felony conspiracy. His trial date is set for Oct. 12. Rafael Ayala, Ir., 33, also of Ukiah, has a district court arraignment scheduled for Sept. 12.

John McGee and the Power of Denial

ometimes in public life, wishful thinking can be breathtaking to behold. On Tuesday, the Canyon County Republican Central Committee rejected a resolution to investigate state Sen. John McGee's June conviction for driving under the influence.

The Caldwell Republican, you'll recall, was arrested on June 19 after he took a Ford Excursion and cargo trailer from the southwest Boise home of a stranger and got it stuck in a yard down the street.

Asked where he was going at the time, McGee replied, "Jackpot."

Our view: State Sen. John McGee, R-Caldwell, is clinging fast to the theory that if you just ignore something you've done wrong, it will go away.

What do you think? We welcome viewpoints from our readers on this

and other issues.

In July, the Idaho Republican Central Committee voted a motion of no-confidence in McGee, who is the chairman of the Canyon County Republicans. And yet on Tuesday, the Canyon County GOP Central Committee voted 22-10 to do nothing about McGee; the panel also voted 23-6 not to address McGee's DUI again.

We wonder what would have happened to McGee had he been, say, a Democrat. Or a moderate Republican.

Said Canyon central committee member Ronalee Linsenmann, who tried to get the GOP panel to take action against McGee, "We're trying to create a caste system where some people just don't suffer ... consequences.

"If we want to renew the faith in the Republican Party, we need to act like our reputation matters."

Outside of Canyon County, few believe McGee's victim-of-circumstances defense, which included an unsubstantiated claim by his lawyer that McGee had suffered from some kind of medical condition which led to his bewildering behavior.

A breath test showed the four-term lawmaker's blood-alcohol content was nearly twice the legal limit, police said. McGee pleaded guilty to the DUI and a charge of operating a vehicle without the owner's consent was dropped.

at the Iowa State Fair is not enough to sweeten the mood. Three years ago, Barack Obama's unlikely presidential dream was given wings by rapturous Iowans young, old and in-between - who saw in the freshfaced, silky-voiced black senator a chance to leap past the bellicose, rancorous Bush years into a modern, competitive future where we once more had luster in the

"We are choosing hope over fear," Sen. Obama told a crowd of 3,000 the night he won the Iowa caucuses.

hope, as America reels from the latest humiliating blows on the economy and in Afghanistan. The politician who came across as a redeemer in 2008 is now in need of redemption himself.

Faced with a country keening for reassurance and reinvention, Obama seems at a loss. Regarding his political skills, he turns out to be the odd case of a pragmatist who can't learn from his mistakes and adapt. Many of his Democratic supporters here, who once waited hours in line just to catch a glimpse of The One, are disillusioned. "We just wish he'd be more of a fighter," said one influential Democrat. An-

other agreed: "You can't blame him for everything. I just wish he would come across more forceful at times, but that is not the dude's style. Detached hurts you when things are sour. You need some of Clinton's 'I feel your pain' compassion."

The president has been so spectacularly unable to fill the leadership void in Washington that the high-spirited Michele Bachmann feels free to purloin Obama's old mantra.

"The power behind our campaign is hope and a fudos and eight other soldiers killed by a Taliban rocketpropelled grenade in Afghanistan was once more too little, too late. It was just like his belated, ineffectual response on the BP oil spill and his reaction to the would-be Christmas Day bomber; it took him three days on vacation in Hawaii to speak about the terrorist incident when the country was scared about national security, and then he spent the next week shuttling from the podium to the golf course.

Bachmann has been riding around Iowa in her bus, with Elvis music and her name emblazoned 25 times on the outside, mocking Obama for going to Camp David last weekend and burrowing in, while the country was roiling.

His inability to grab a microphone and spontaneously assuage Americans' fears is strange. If the American servicemen had died on a Monday, he wouldn't have waited until Wednesday to talk about it. He doesn't like the bully pulpit, just the professor's lectern. After failing to interrupt his Camp David weekend to buck up the country on one of its worst days in history, he tacked on his condolences for the soldiers' families to his economic pep talk, in what had to be the most inept oratorical segue of

his presidency.

He long ago should have gone out into the country to talk to Americans in person and come up with a concrete plan that people could print out from the White House website and study. Hasn't he learned how dangerous it is to delegate to Congress? His withholding and reactive nature has made him seem strangely irrelevant in Washington, trapped by his own temperament. He doesn't lead, and he doesn't understand why we don't feel led.

Obama has spent a lifetime creating his persona superior, wise, above all parties and interests, all-seeing, calm, unflappable.

But as Drew Westen, a liberal psychology professor at Emory University wrote in The New York Times on Sunday, puzzling about what has happened to his former hero's passion, the president never identifies the villains who cause our epic problems.

It's unclear, Westen wrote, whether that reflects his aversion to conflict or a fear of offending donors, or both.

Obama's assumption that you can rise above ascribing villainous motives has

Feds Reneged on Land Deal With Tribe

MOUNTAIN HOME • The federal government broke its word over a land deal with an Indian tribe from Idaho and Nevada, stymieing economic development plans that could include a bingo hall or casino – and resurrecting native groups' enduring mistrust for the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Last October, a federal administrative law judge approved transfer of a 26-acre parcel just east of Boise along U.S. Interstate 84 to the Shoshone-Paiute Tribes, according to documents obtained by The Associated Press on Tuesday.

The tribes are headquartered on the isolated Duck Valley Indian Reservation but hope to develop an offreservation-but-Indian owned property with possible gaming, agriculture or light manufacturing to boost

its economy. Though documents show Bureau of Indian Affairs regional director in Portland, Ore., Stanley Speaks, approved the deal last year, his agency's lawyers were telling the judge by March he should dump it on technical grounds: Federal law, they argued, forbid him from signing off on such a transaction.

The result: U.S. Department of Interior Chief Administrative Law Judge Earl Waits reversed his order on June 1, canceling the transfer.

Shoshone-Paiute lawyers said this sudden turnabout amounts to an illegal property taking that conjures up a bygone era when Indians accused the federal government of not honoring its treaties.

"It is precisely this kind of abusive conduct - in this case, informing a tribe they own certain lands and then purporting to reverse the decision - that has all too of-

ten been the hallmark of relations between the Bureau and Indian tribes," wrote Keith Harper, the Shoshone-Paiute Tribes' lawyer, in a July 15 letter to BIA director Larry EchoHawk seeking help.

"The actions of the BIA to this point paint an embarrassing picture of the government approving a land transfer to the tribe and then arbitrarily taking the land in violation of the regional director's word," Harper wrote.

EchoHawk, a member of the Pawnee Nation of Oklahoma and former Idaho attorney general, didn't return phone calls Tuesday or Wednesday through his Washington, D.C.-based spokeswoman, Nedra Darling.

EchoHawk's son, Paul EchoHawk, is representing members of the family that wants to transfer the property to the tribes.

Neither Speaks nor Department of Interior lawyer Colleen Kelley in Portland returned calls Wednesday seeking comment.

Waits also didn't return a phone call.

In 2009, the Shoshone-Paiute Tribes and heirs of a deceased Indian woman, Wallace Bruce Ogg, began talks to transfer a portion of an 80-acre parcel they owned to the tribe.

By shifting what's known as "restricted fee land" to tribal ownership, it could open the door to the tribe establishing a gaming operation even though it's located miles away from the Duck Valley reservation. The tion - between Mountain Home, Idaho and Elko, Nev., has helped lead to a 40 percent unemployment rate

Though Speaks' lawyer conceded the transfer would "further the preservation of Indian Country'' as well as "tribal self-sufficiency and self-governance," she contended that Waits overstepped his authority by dividing up the land the way he did: 26 acres of restricted land to the tribe, with 53 acres staying with Ogg's heirs.

"Approval of that agreement was beyond the scope of the statutory authority to consolidate (the tribes' and the heirs') interests during probate," Kelley wrote on March 31.

Waits agreed in June, writing in his new order: "I lack subject matter jurisdiction." On July 1, the tribe and Ogg's heirs filed appeals of Waits' new order with the Department of Interior's Board of Indian Appeals.

Shoshone-Paiute Chairman Terry Gibson told the AP on Tuesday he's angered by this about-face long after the deal appeared completed. Elmore County had recorded the transfer order for the tribes.

It particularly galls Gibson that the 26 acres are part of aboriginal lands in southern Idaho that the tribes contends were stolen by the U.S. government following the Bannock War of 1877 and now he's been blocked from getting just a small sliver of them back for his people.

Gibson said developing this new property less than 30 minutes from Idaho's

largest population center in Boise to the west and the Mountain Home Air Force Base to the east – whether it's for a bingo hall or casino, greenhouses or light manufacturing - will generate income to help pay off a loan that's now holding together the tribal health care system, as well as build a new tribal administration office.

"We have the perfect example of the old tactic of making promises to tribes, then on down the road, they take this land away from us," Gibson said. "It's not like they'll be doing us some great favor by giving us our land back. But for them to make it as difficult as they can, I don't think that's proper."

Bonner County Grapples with Deep Budget Cuts

SANDPOINT • Funding could cease for the Bonner County Fair and the University of Idaho Extension Office as county commissioners try to balance a budget that includes employee raises and no tax hike for landowners.

Other options for curbing expenses include reducing full-time employees' hours from 40 to 35, two-to three-day worker furloughs and cutting funding to the Bonner County Historical Society.

The commission spent more than three hours shaping the potential contours of the budget on Tuesday, but made no decisions on funding for the fair, extension office or historical society.

The board is slated to continue its discussions throughout the rest of this week. It has until Friday to finalize the budget so it can be published by the state's deadline.

Still in the budget, for now, are cost-of-living wage increases for all employees of around 3 percent. Also in the spending plan are wage hikes for commissioned sheriff's deputies.

The base pay for commissioned law officers could increase from \$15.69 to \$18 or perhaps even \$19 per hour. The Bonner County Sheriff's Guild has been lobbying for pay increases to bring the department into parity with other jurisdictions,

which lure deputies away because of better wages.

"My goal, very simply, is to solve some of the problems that we currently have, and one of the biggest problems we have is the sheriff's office - we're losing people," Commissioner Mike Nielsen said.

Commissioner Cornel Rasor agreed.

"I've come to the conclusion that the hole in the sheriff's office has to be plugged," said Rasor, who also wants to avoid raising taxes if possible.

Commission Chairman Lewis Rich said he, too, is loathe to any tax increase.

"I don't want to raise taxes, although we've had to in the past two years a very small amount to what we could take," he said.

The commission parsed the budget line-by-line and down to the number of bullets court bailiffs really need to retain their qualifications.

Nielsen's crosshairs frequently fell upon what he perceived to be redundant contingency funds and employees' travel expenses.

Four vacant positions which occupy space in the current budget were eliminated on Tuesday. The vacant positions were in the Recorder's Office, the Planning Department, 911 and the jail.

Bonner County Clerk Marie Scott warned commissioners that reserve funding is being depleted to dangerously low levels.

Spokane Man Sentenced for **Defrauding Home Owner**

COEUR d'ALENE • A 28year-old Spokane man was sentenced Tuesday to more than five years in prison on three counts of wire fraud and "aid of racketeering enterprises," federal prosecutors said.

U.S. District Judge Edward J. Lodge ordered Travis J. Sneed to serve three years of supervised release following his prison term of 63 months and to pay more than \$730,000 in restitution to a victim. Sneed pleaded guilty on March 21.

According to court documents, Sneed was simultaneously involved in two separate schemes to defraud.

The first involved a home and property owner in Coeur d'Alene who entered into an agreement with Sneed to develop her land into condominiums along the Spokane River.

The homeowner mortgaged her property, and the majority of the money – almost \$600,000 - went to Sneed.

He sent the money to his out-of-state attorney, who paid the money into Sneed's bank account. The bulk of the money was not used as promised.

At sentencing, Lodge told Sneed he was "nothing more than a conartist" and that he is "continually working in a fraudulent and self-serving manner."

While this scheme was ongoing, Sneed developed and ran an Internet fraud scheme where he represented that he owned computer components and sold them on the Internet.





cheating investors out of more than \$2 million and using the cash for his own benefit.

Federal prosecutors say 59-year-old Dale Edward Lowell, of Colbert, Wash., pleaded guilty to one count of wire fraud Tuesday.

Investigators say Lowell, while living in northern Idaho in 2005, started raised money from investors by telling him he was a savvy options trader. He also told investors he had taken steps to cover losses.

Altogether, prosecutors say Lowell duped 22 investor groups and raised about \$2.2 million that he ultimately lost in the market, used for personal expenses or to pay off investors to keep the scheme going.

He faces up to 20 years in prison. Sentencing is scheduled for Oct. 31.

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Miracles in the Surf

Pulled lifeless from the frigid Pacific after getting caught in a riptide and being underwater for up to 20 minutes, Charles Ostrander, 12, is now conscious and out of intensive care. How? Some say there were miracles on the Washington beach Friday.

LONG BEACH, Wash. • Charles Ostrander's head hung back lifelessly as he was carried out of the frigid Pacific, 15 minutes or more after a riptide sucked in the 12-year-old.

Today, he's alive. How?

You could say prayers. There were many along the beach late last week as his body bobbed limply just below the ocean's surface. But there was also a team of volunteer rescuers, the medics who performed CPR well after all seemed lost, and another 12-year-old who risked her own life to help him before anyone else could.

And there was the ocean itself. At 56 degrees, the water was cold enough that it may have bought rescuers a lit-tle time.

The boy, who goes by his nickname, Dale, has spoken a few words since his ordeal and was moved out of intensive care Wednesday. It's unclear whether he'll fully recover, but his parents, Chad and Kirsten, have hope.

"There's been several miracles just in the circumstances of finding him, the fact that he's not dead, the fact that he can move, the fact that he can speak," Chad Ostrander said. "Unbelievable." Dale was visiting the southwest Washington coast with members of his church youth group Friday when the ocean's strong currents pulled him and another boy far from shore. They were just wading, not swimming, said Dale's father, who was at the family's home in Spanaway, Wash., when it happened.

"A riptide hit them, kind of knocked them off their feet," said Shanon Kissel, a sawmill worker who was boogie boarding in a shallow area nearby with his daughter, Nicole.

Nicole took off after Dale on her boogie board, even though her father was yelling that she was going into a dangerous area.

"She didn't hear me. She just kept going after Dale," Kissel said.

The boy, dressed in a long-sleeve shirt and long pants, struggled onto Nicole's three-foot boogie-board. The Please see **RESCUE**, N2

NEW YORK • Scientists are reporting the first clear success with a new approach for treating leukemia turning the patients' own blood cells into assassins that hunt and destroy their cancer cells.

They've only done it in three patients so far, but the results were striking: Two appear cancer-free up to a year after treatment, and the third patient is improved but still has some cancer. Scientists are already preparing to try the same gene therapy technique for other kinds of cancer.

"It worked great. We were surprised it worked as well as it did," said Dr. Carl June, a gene therapy expert at the University of Pennsylvania. "We're just a year out now. We need to find out how long these remissions last."

He led the study, published Wednesday by two journals, New England Journal of Medicine and Science Translational Medicine.

Cameron Vows 'Fightback' as Birmingham Seethes

LONDON – Thousands of extra police officers flooded the streets of London on Wednesday to deter rioters, and Prime Minister David Cameron warned that the government will take any necessary action to restore order and confidence to Britain's streets.

Even as Cameron promised not to let a "culture of fear" take hold, tensions flared in Birmingham, where a murder probe was opened after three men were killed in a hit-and-run drive as they took to the streets to defend shops from looting. "We needed a fightback and a fightback is under way," Cameron said in a somber televised statement outside his Downing Street office after a meeting of the nation's crisis committee. As if to indicate his resolve, he underlined "nothing is off the table" — including water cannon, commonly used in Northern Ireland but never deployed in Britain.

The number of arrests in London alone climbed to 820, with courts staffing around the clock to process alleged looters, vandals and thieves — including one as young as 11. Cameron has recalled Parliament from its summer recess for an *Please see* **BRITAIN, N2**

KABUL, Afghanistan • An airstrike by international forces has killed the Taliban insurgents responsible for the downing of a U.S. helicopter this weekend in which 38 U.S. and Afghan troops died, including the militant who launched the fatal rocket-propelled grenade, the military claimed Wednesday.

The claim of success comes amid fears that as U.S. troops begin to leave Afghanistan, the country is far from stable and remains deadly for those forces who remain. As U.S. troops thin out, special operations forces like those that died in Saturday's helicopter crash are likely to make up a greater part of the American force in Afghanistan.

F-16 fighter jets killed the insurgents responsible on Monday, according to the top U.S. commander in Afghanistan, Marine Corps Gen. John Allen.

The military provided few details to back up the claim, but Allen said he was confident the airstrike killed fewer than 10 insurgents involved in the attack on the U.S. Chinook helicopter. "We tracked them as we would in the aftermath of any operation, and we dealt with them with a kinetic strike, and in the aftermath of that we have achieved certainty that they, in fact, were killed in that strike," Allen said. He spoke by video from his Kabul headquarters.

In a separate statement, the military said the strike killed a Taliban leader and the insurgent who fired the rocket-propelled grenade at the helicopter. That statement also cited intelligence gathered on the ground. It did not provide further details.

"This does not ease our loss, but we must and we will continue to relentlessly pursue the enemy," Allen said. The crash was the deadliest single loss for U.S. forces in the nearly 10-year Afghan war.

The military is still seeking the top insurgent leader that troops were going after in Saturday's mission, Allen said.

Allen defended the decision to send in the Chinook loaded with special operations forces to aid Army Rangers pursuing insurgents in a dangerous region of eastern Afghanistan.

"The fact that we lost this aircraft is not ... a decision point as to whether we'll use this aircraft in the future," Allen said. "It's not uncommon at all to use this aircraft on our special missions."

pair paddled ferociously toward shore as the rip current pulled them even farther from it.

Nicole said Dale told her, "Keep paddling. We're almost there."

"He told me his name, how old he was," she said. "I said a bad word and he said, 'God doesn't like that?"

Shanon Kissel said he reached the other boy who was not identified and pulled him onto his own board. He yelled at bystanders to call 911 and went to call for help himself.

When Kissel got back in the water he saw Nicole and Dale clinging to her board, turned sideways in rolling waves about 150 feet beyond the crashing surf. He was swimming out to the children when a wave knocked the pair off her board.

"She turns around to face him like she's gonna go back after him," Kissel said. "I had to tell her to get back on the board."

She did, but Ostrander had disappeared.

Fire officials and other rescuers arrived. Some stood atop trucks, using binoculars to try to locate the boy. Members of Dale's church group cried and prayed, kneeling in the sand.

Eddie Mendez, a volunteer water rescuer, was

Generally, the chances of surviving a neardrowning increase when a person is young, the water is cold and the time spent underwater is short. Dr. Mark Morocco, an emergency room doctor at the Ronald Reagan UCLA Medical Center, said medical literature cites at least one case in which a person survived after being submerged for about an hour.

Morocco said the fact that Dale was wearing long sleeves probably helped him.

It is not clear how long the boy was actually underwater. Mendez said about 15 minutes elapsed between the time rescuers were dispatched and the time Dale was pulled from the ocean.

Morocco, who was not involved in Dale's care, said swift treatment was key. He credited rescuers for continuing resuscitation efforts even though the boy lacked a pulse and reflexes.

"When this kid came out of the surf, he looked dead," he said. "But you have to ignore the fact that he looks dead" and give CPR.

Dale starting talking on Monday. When his parents encouraged him to cough to clear his throat, he replied, "I don't have to."

Doctors have cautioned his parents that even if Dale survives, he could have permanent brain damage. The physicians "were very clear that he had been under for too long, had been without oxygen for too long," Kirsten Ostrander said. "We trust (God) no matter what."

It involved three men with very advanced cases of chronic lymphocytic leukemia. The only hope for a cure now is bone marrow or stem cell transplants, which don't always work and carry a high risk of death.

Scientists have been working for years to find ways to boost the immune system's ability to fight cancer. Earlier attempts at genetically modifying bloodstream soldiers called T-cells have had limited success; the modified cells didn't reproduce well and quickly disappeared.

June and his colleagues made changes to the technique, using a novel carrier to deliver the new genes into the T-cells and a signaling mechanism telling the cells to kill and multiply.

That resulted in armies of "serial killer" cells that targeted cancer cells, destroyed them, and went on to kill new cancer as it emerged. This is the first time it's been done against cancer, June said.

For the experiment, blood was taken from each patient and T-cells removed. After they were altered in a lab, millions of the cells were returned to the patient in three infusions.

The researchers described the experience of one 64year-old patient in detail. There was no change for two weeks, but then he became ill with chills, nausea and fever. He and the other two patients were hit with a condition that occurs when a large number of cancer cells die at the same time -a sign that the gene therapy is working.

Texas Plan Will Turn Sewage into Drinking Water

FORT WORTH, Texas • In parched West Texas, it's often easier to drill for oil than to find new sources of water.

So after years of diminishing water supplies made even worse by the secondmost severe drought in state history, some communities are resorting to a plan that might have seemed absurd a generation ago: turning sewage into drinking water.

Construction recently began on a \$13 million water-reclamation plant believed to be the first of its kind in Texas. And officials have worked to dispel any fears that people will be drinking their neighbors' urine, promising the system will yield clean, safe water. Some residents are prepared to put aside any squeamishness if it means having an abundant water supply.

"Any water is good water, as far as I'm concerned," said Gary Fuqua, city manager in Big Spring, which will join the cities of Midland, Odessa and Stanton in using the water.

When the water finally reaches the tap, Fuqua said, its origin is "something I wouldn't think about at all?'

Similar plants have been operating for years in Tucson, Ariz., parts of California and in other countries. Water experts predict other American cities will follow suit as they confront growing populations, drought and other issues.

"It's happening all over the world," said Wade Miller, executive director of the WateReuse Association based outside Washington. "In some places ... resources are down to very low levels, and this is one of the few resources available."

The Colorado River Municipal Water District in West Texas began considering a wastewater recycling plant back in 2000 and broke ground last month on the facility in Big Spring, about 100 miles southeast of Lubbock. When finished late next year, it should supply 2 million gallons of water a day.

The timing couldn't be better. This year's drought has made a bone-dry region even drier, causing crops to wither and animals and fish to die off by the thousands.

reservoirs in West Texas may dry up if the drought persists through next year, as climatologists have predicted could happen. That means the district's water supply could be reduced from 65 million gallons a day to 45 million, said John Grant, the water district's general manager.


"We have limited water supplies in Texas, and you have to turn to other sources of water," Grant said.

The new system could actually improve the taste of the region's water by removing the minerals and salt that give it a distinctive briny flavor, he added.

The idea to recycle sewage isn't new. Fort Worth and other cities across the nation have long used treated wastewater to water grass and trees and irrigate crops. But the new treatment plant in West Texas will be the first in the state to provide drinking water.

Astronauts aboard the International Space Station have been drinking recycled urine and sweat since 2009 and consistently given the

For years, NASA had been working on equipment that would enable astronauts to recycle their wastewater for drinking, cooking and bathing. The system was launched to the space station in late 2008, and it took several months to conduct enough tests - in orbit and on the ground - to ensure the water was safe to consume.

Siblings' Run from South Ends in Colorado Crash

PUEBLO, Colo. • An FBI manhunt for three heavily armed siblings accused of shooting at a police officer in Florida and robbing a Georgia bank ended Wednesday with a police chase in Colorado, where shots were fired at officers before the suspects' car rolled and crashed into a guard rail.

The mayhem capped a cross-country search for the two brothers and sister that authorities had warned were armed and extremely dangerous. Police recovered two AK-47 assault rifles and a MAC-11 pistol at the crash site.

"Ladies and gentlemen, I'm proud to say we won," Pasco County, Fla., Sheriff Chris Nocco said. "We continuously said that if these three fugitives wanted a battle with law enforcement, we would win that battle. And that's what happened today."

Stanley, 26, were arrested after the 20-mile chase on Interstate 25 that ended in Walsenburg, about 150 miles south of Denver.

Their sister, Lee Grace Dougherty, 29, was shot in the leg after she pointed a gun at a police officer while trying to escape on foot, authorities said.

The manhunt began Aug. 2 in Zephyrhills, Fla., when police Officer Kevin Widner tried to pull over a car for speeding. The occupants of the white Subaru fired at least 20 rounds and shot out the tire of Widner's patrol car after a five-mile chase at speeds up to 100 mph, authorities said. Widner wasn't hurt and did not return fire.

Sheriff's investigators said they linked the siblings to the case when they found Ryan Dougherty's ankle monitor near the scene of that chase. He had been issued the monitor after being convicted of sending sexually explicit text messages to an 11-year-old girl.

A few hours later and 210 miles to the north, three people wearing masks charged into the Certus Bank in Valdosta, Ga. One waved an AK-47 assault rifle while another carried a machine pistol.

They fired into the ceiling and fled with cash in a white

sedan similar to the Subaru in the Florida shooting.

Soon, police posted photos of the siblings on electronic billboards across the Southeast. Citizens reported spotting the car near Forsyth, Ga., and Chattanooga, Tenn. Authorities said they believed the fugitives had put New York tags stolen from Ryan Dougherty's girlfriend on the Subaru.

"May the Lord look over all of us, because these three are on some type of mission. And it is a violent mission," declared Sheriff Noc-

Police feared the siblings were carrying a small arsenal of weapons. Background checks done by gun sellers showed Ryan Dougherty bought an AK-47 assault rifle - like the one used in the bank robbery – at a pawn shop two years ago. Similar checks showed his brother also owned guns.

Bachmann Points to Foster Parenting – on Her Terms

STILLWATER, Minn. • From her first campaign to her latest, Republican presidential contender Michele Bachmann has used her time as a foster parent to help create an image of a family-focused Christian driven by compassion and social conviction.

Now, with the national spotlight shining bright, the Minnesota congresswoman is claiming her family is off limits.

In this instance, Bachmann is trying to have it both ways and may end up undercutting an authentic streak that's helped her rise in polling to challenge the front-runner for the Republican nomination, Mitt Romnev

"I am running for the presidency of the United States," Bachmann said recently when asked to comment on reports of controversial treatments offered at her husband's counseling clinic and about the family's federally subsidized home loan. "My husband is not running for the presidency. Neither are my children. Neither is our business. Neither is our foster children?"

Yet, when it suits her, Bachmann mentions that she and her husband have been "the proud foster parents of 23 great children?' And she portrays her entry into foster parenting as an act of faith, saying that she and husband Marcus, a trained therapist, were following the lead of fellow parishioners at her church.

"Our hearts were broken for at-risk kids," she said last month in an unpublicized appearance at Jonathan House, a communal center in Washington for young Christian men.

In a brief interview last spring, Bachmann told The Associated Press that her house had as many as nine children at once, her own five plus four more. She gave a similar account at Jonathan House, according to video someone in attendance posted on the Internet.

"We brought our first child in and we got a phone call. 'Would we take another?' And we did. Got a phone call, 'Would you take another?' And we did. Got another phone call. 'Would you take another?' And we did," Bachmann said.

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



Stocks Resume Sell-Off; Dow Down 519

NEW YORK • Back to reality and back down, Wall Street focused on the bleak landscape ahead for the economy Wednesday and wiped out its big gains from a day earlier and then some.

The Dow Jones industrial average closed down 519 points and has now lost more than 2,000 in less than three weeks. Swings of several hundred points in just minutes, accelerated by computerized trading, have become com-

monplace. This time, the selling was



steadily lower in the last two hours.

The market has traded that way for two weeks, lurching up and down. The most extreme example was Tuesday, when the Dow swung more than 600 points in the one hour and 45 minutes after the Fed's statement.

The stomach-churning highs and lows are reminiscent of the fall of 2008, the depths of the financial crisis, when there were swings of 800 or even 1,000 points in a day.

Computerized trading systems - programmed to analyze charts, capitalize on the tiniest changes in price and execute trades with no human intervention – are making the market rougher. High-frequency trading programs make up about half of the trading volume in a normal market day but 70 percent or more on a volatile one. The programs pounce on stock changes to make just slivers of a penny but do it so often that it adds up. Other investors also use charts and market indicators to make trades based on market momentum. The bet is that if the market is rising, it will keep rising, and if it's falling, it will keep falling. More investors are turning to this strategy because the sudden slowdown in the economy has left them unable to judge companies based on their fundamentals, like projected profits. The more people use a momentum strategy, the faster the indexes rise or fall.

When Reese Widmier goes outdoors, he often brings along one of his best friends – a 10-year-old chocolate Lab named Grizz.

If it's cold outside, the Twin Falls man might put a vest on Grizz or even booties on his feet. The vest helps keep Grizz warm and serves as a life preserver, while the booties protect the Lab's paws from ice, burrs or rough terrain.

"He's a good friend," Widmier said. "And the kids love him."

So Widmier wants to do what he can to make the outdoors a pleasant experience for Grizz.

That's exactly what all dog owners should so, said veterinarian Zsigmond Szanto of Twin Falls Veterinary Clinic and Hospital.

prepare first. Here's what you need to know:

Vaccinate and Tag

Vaccinating your dog is just good pet ownership. Common vaccines treat against Lyme disease, leptospirosis, rabies and distemper; others against heartworm, fleas, gastrointestinal parasites, often available in one product, according to PuppyBasics.com.

Once you return from being outdoors, examine your dog for ticks and burrs and remove them as soon as possible.

Owners also should make sure their dogs are properly licensed and tagged in case they become lost in the mountains and are found by another party, Szanto said.

Twin Falls resident Steve Clayton went outdoors this week and brought along his dog Toby, also a Labrador. But instead of letting Toby ride in the back of his pickup, Clayton made sure he was secured in a pet crate.

"I don't think it's a good idea to carry your dog in the back of a pickup unless you've got a shell or something," he said.

If they're standing in the back of a pickup, dogs can easily get hurt if you have to stop quickly.

Because Clayton has trained Toby, the dog jumps right into his crate when Clayton heads to the truck. "He knows when we're heading outdoors," he said. "He'll go right in."

Bring Plenty of Water

It's pretty easy for Toby to get dehydrated if he doesn't have plenty of water. The same goes for your dog.

Tyler Hine of Twin Falls reads 'The Eagle Has Flown' while camping in the South Hills with his dog, Lady. Before bringing your dog along on outdoor adventures, give some attention to vaccinations, training and canine first aid.

Doggy First-Aid Kit

- Clean bandage material (socks can be taped over cut feet)
- White adhesive tape
- Gauze, or clean cloth for cleaning wounds
- Water
- Leash

Bike Mania

A new Sun Valley bike trail appeals to adrenaline junkies.

SUN VALLEY • Bicyclists in Sun Valley are tasting Forbidden Fruit. And they're loving it.

The new Forbidden Fruit trail, near the Adams Gulch area near Ketchum, is a new-generation mountain bike trail taking advantage of gravity to thrill even the biggest adrenaline junkies.

The single-track trail is crammed with roller coaster-like dips, drops and luge-like berms that bicyclists can bank off so they're hanging almost horizontally over the trail for a split second.

And the 1.3-mile one-way trail is closed to other uses, allowing bicyclists to go downhill unimpeded without worrying about meeting a hiker coming up the trail.

"It's really like a bobsled run," said Sun Valley Ski Instructor John T. Smith. "The idea is to use your brakes and pedals as little as possible and just go with the flow."

The Bureau of Land Management opened Punchline - a 1.3mile bike-specific single-track flow trail in the sage-studded Croy Canyon just west of Hailey this summer, as well.

And Sun Valley Resort is working with Randy Spangler of Trail Solutions and Chris Leman, a Ketchum cyclist who has worked

If You Go

To get to Forbidden Fruit, drive north out of Ketchum along Idaho Highway 75, turning left onto Adams Gulch Road across from Big Wood Golf Course. Follow this to the Adams Gulch trailhead.

Bicycle two miles on the Adams Gulch Loop dirt trail until you come to a fork. Take the trail to the left, which leads to Eve Gulch. You'll see a temporary sign marking the exit for the trail first. Continue on the original trail until you come to a small clearing with a sign marking the beginning of Forbidden Fruit Trail.

To get to Punchline, turn west from Hailey's Main Street onto Bullion Street. Follow this a few miles out Croy Canyon to the vicinity of Rotarun ski area. The flow trail can be accessed between Croy Creek Trailhead and Wilson Trail.

on trails around the country, to design a flow trail for Baldy.

The trail would include a portion suitable for beginners from the top of the mountain to the historic Roundhouse restaurant, with an intermediate portion from Roundhouse to the bottom of the mountain. The design, which has to be presented to the Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management, could very well stretch over five miles as it switches back and forth on the mountain, said Leman.

The concept of flow trails has been around for 10 years but only as bootleg trails in forests or someone's backyard. One of the first was built at Whistler, B.C., about five years ago. Now there are multiple flow trails in two dozen locations nationwide, according to the International Mountain Bicycling Association (IMBA). And they're all designed to attract many of the nation's 7.1 million mountain bikers.

This summer workers for BLM, Ketchum Ranger District, IMBA and Trail Solutions put a Sweco trail dozer with a four-foot wide footprint to work, along with a mini-excavator. And by June's end, Sun Valley had its first flow trails.

"The banked turns resemble a super speedway," said Leman. "It's an exhilarating experience. You can jump off a lift over a table top. And, if you don't clear the flat top, you can set your bike down without any bad consequences. And you can jump rollers one or two at a time depending on how fast you want to go."

Both of the new trails in the Sun Valley area are considered intermediate to advanced.

Forbidden Fruit is considered a little more advanced with larger features.

Punchline has a smoother surface with a few rock drops. Each turn links into the next, with each raised feature placed so that it flows with the trail leading into it, said BLM Recreation Planner John Kurtz.

Deanna and Vince Sydlosky checked out the temporary signs posted at Forbidden Fruit cautioning first-time riders to go slow as they prepared to embark on the trail for the first time last week.

The Sydloskys were real estate agents in Florida when they decided to buy a home in Sun Valley eight years ago.

"We were drawn by the mountain biking," said Deanna Sydlosky. "Florida has some technical riding around its phosphate mines. But the mountain biking here is unbelievable."

A few minutes later, Deanna was liking the Forbidden Fruit she was riding.

"It's a little spooky going up on the banks. But that's why you take it slow the first time around," she said.

Having ridden Forbidden Fruit, John T. Smith says he prefers old school riding trails.

"But the new trails are fun," he said. "And they're awesome for the new school riders who like technical riding."

Spey Is the Casting Way for Future Fly Anglers

MINNEAPOLIS • If you live long enough, the past comes 'round and meets the future, completing a circle.

So it is with Bob Nasby, the St. Paul fly fisherman and casting instructor.

Perhaps also, Nasby argues, it soon will be with legions of other fly anglers who discover – or rediscover – the new benefits of an old art form: spey casting.

"I'm convinced spey casting will be the dominant casting method for future generations of fly anglers, whether they fish big water or small, for steelhead in rivers of Alaska or in trout streams here in Minnesota," Nasby said the other day while standing shin-deep in the St. Croix.

If that occurs – if fly anglers eventually forgo the long-held American tradiit won't be without some confusion.

It took me awhile to figure it out, too," Nasby said.

Some background: For centuries, spey, or double-handed, casting has been commonly practiced in Scotland, among other locales worldwide where rivers

Don't Let Your Boat Spread Weeds

Question: "On the news the other night I saw something about washing my boat to prevent the spread of weeds. How can my boat spread weeds?"

Answer: Across the country government agencies are alarmed about the spread of exotic weeds and exotic wildlife that could have deleterious impacts on our native wildlife species and society in general.

Everyone is familiar with terrestrial noxious weeds like Canada thistle and yellow star thistle and their affects on private pastures and public land. However, few are aware that there are also noxious animals and plants invading our rivers and ponds.

Most of these aquatic plants and animals are transported from water to water on boats, in live wells and on fishing equipment. When loading and unloading at boat ramps everyone is encouraged to examine their trailers and boats for remnants of plants, leaves, or seed heads that might be transported to the next water where the boat is used. Pressure washing your boat after your boat ing trip is recommended. All fishing equipment and boats should be thoroughly dried to kill spores and eggs.

Examples of aquatic plant pests include water hyacinth, hydrilla, water milfoil and purple loosestrife. There are many others.

Aquatic pests such as the Zebra Mussel, Quagga Mussel, and New Zealand Mudsnail can be transported in the bilges, cooling system of boats, or in live wells. It is important that all water holding compartments are

drained. Additionally fish must be killed and cannot be transported alive from the waters where they were caught. A general prohibition of all live fish bait imports, except night crawlers, is designed to help prevent these aquatic pests from entering Idaho as hitch-hikers with the live bait.

Anglers using waders should make sure all mud and debris is washed off the waders before leaving the fishing area. Waders should then be air dried in sunlight if possible.

As anglers expand their fishing activities across the state and country aquatic plant and animal pests may be transported with them in their boats and fishing gear. It's important anglers and recreational boaters take part in preventing the spread of these pests. Please take the time to clean and dry your fishing gear and boat. The future of your favorite fishing spot depends on it.

Anglers and boaters will notice checking stations on Idaho's borders where staff inspect boats coming into Idaho from other states. Idaho law requires all vehicles towing boats stop for an invasive species inspection. Several boats coming into Idaho have been discovered this summer transporting the hitch-hiking mussels.

Contour Elite Fishing Charts Can Point the Way

TRAVERSE CITY, Mich. • The new side-scanning and down-looking sonars for anglers are simply amazing. The view is like a black-andwhite television picture rather than the crude lumps and valleys visible on conventional fish-finders.

But those sonars cost \$1,500-\$3,000, far beyond what most anglers can afford. However, there is a good compromise that won't break the bank and will help anglers locate productive fishing spots they might overlook with a conventional fish-finder.

The Contour Elite series of fishing charts from Strategic Fishing Systems is designed for use on a home desktop or laptop computer before a trip as an adjunct to the sonar on the boat.

The marine chart on my Humminbird fish-finder showed a lot of likely spots along the shoreline where the bottom dropped sharply from 10-20 feet and where smallmouths like to congre-

gate on warm, sunny days. Before traveling to the lake, I'd looked up the location on the Contour Elite system.

When I searched for smallmouths in Duck Lake, a submerged hump and an underwater point stood out in red like sore thumbs. And there are three-dimensional views available.

Contour Elite uses Lakemaster charts that many anglers already have loaded on their fish-finders, and it's easy to learn for anyone familiar with GPS.

The system offers realtime GPS tracking, which is great for selecting areas you want to target or setting up trolling routes. Once you have set up that information, you can export it to many handheld or boat-mounted fish-finders.

The Contour Elite maps let anglers search a lake by species of fish, time of year and day, light levels, water clarity and wind conditions. A search can be narrowed further to include vegetation, water depth and proximity to points or coves.

First-aid kits for dogs contain most of the same items you'd need for humans - scissors, gauze and bandages - plus a few doggy treats, Szanto said.

Kits are available at pet stores, or you can make your own. Either way, he said, it's a good idea to bring along extra bandages.

Limit Activity

In extreme heat, limit your dog's activity or focus it to cooler times of the day. Like humans, canines get worn out and can overexert themselves.

Clayton said he believes it's important to prepare your dog physically by taking him outside and letting him get used to activity.

Encountering Wildlife

ters, there's not much you can do if your dog gets sprayed except to make sure he gets cleaned up quickly and often. Professional skunk-spray washes are available, but even these often take multiple treatments.

Szanto said he's seen a few cases over the years where a dog has been sprayed in the eyes. It usually doesn't cause blindness, but it does cause serious irritation. So it's a good idea to see a vet.

"Other than that, Fido will be riding in the back of the car," he said with a chuckle.

What about Snakes?

If your dog is bitten by a rattlesnake, you have about 60 to 90 minutes to get to a veterinarian, Szanto said.

Though dogs instinctively are good at avoiding snakes, some bites are unavoidable. Bites often happen if the owner calls the dog to retreat from a coiled rattler. When the dog moves, he said, the snake strikes.

Carry a snake-bite kit as part of your first-aid supplies. Some people prefer to give their dogs antivenom treatments before going outside, Szanto said, but this usually takes several treatments ahead of time.

If you're on your way to a clinic, it's a good idea to call ahead so the vet can be ready to treat the bite as soon as you arrive.

"Snakebites in this area are extremely low compared to other areas," Szanto said. "I think there's generally a mutual respect between pets and snakes?

MEDFORD, Ore. • If you were to stand on a distant ridge overlooking the Sucker Creek drainage, the work site would resemble a big sandbox filled with yellow construction toys.

"They look like a bunch of Tonka toys in the sandbox when we were growing up," Kevin O'Brien of the Illinois Valley Soil and Water Conservation District told The Mail Tribune.

"But an extreme amount of design work has gone into this," he added. "Not everybody gets to build rivers and move them around. We are doing it with a lot of permits, a lot of design and a lot of technical review."

Indeed, there is nothing playful about the two excavators, bulldozer and loader growling and grumbling as they move earth to restore a valuable fishery in the largest tributary of the Illinois River.

The three-year project is under way about a dozen miles east of Cave Junction.

The fishery rehabilitation project is digging away at a half-mile of stream straightened out by 150 years of mining.

The goal is to turn it back into a meandering creek that is ideal for young coho salmon and other native fish that thrive in cold, clear water. Coho is listed as threat ened under the Endangered Species Act.

"Basically, we are trying to restore the natural meander pattern in the stream," said Ian Reid, a fish biologist with the Rogue River-Siskiyou National Forest.

"What I envision when we are done is an area where fish survival is high," he added. "Coho is the primary species we are interested in but there are several other species steelhead, Chinook salmon, Pacific lamprey - that will also benefit from this."

Much of this year's work will be concluded by the end of next week, said project manager Liz Berger, the forest hydrologist.

"The whole main stem of Sucker Creek has been diverted into a side channel we have constructed," she said. "This allows us to work in a dry channel."

A pump is drawing water out of the channel being built and diverting it into a floodplain where it will seep underground back into the stream.

"Next year, we will be connecting the main stem of Sucker Creek across the stream, making a new meander into this forested section of Forest Service land," she said of the final year of the project, estimated to cost about \$1 million.

That work will include implanting fir and cedar logs into the gravel to create riffles and spawning gravels for the fishery, she said.

"Part of this is to slow down the flow and improve fish habitat and water quality," she said. "Before we had a straight line channel through here. There were no large pools through here."

This year's efforts will restore the natural meander pattern to some 500 feet of the stream. In addition to the main stem channel work, the project will create a 400foot side channel used for spawning and rearing by native fish. The side channel will connect to a rearing pond and back to the main channel to allow the rearing and movement of fish throughout the system, Reid said.

The section was selected because it has high potential for fish habitat improvement, Berger said.

"It also is a section that was listed for highest stream temperatures," she said. "The potential for improvement is great here."

Consider this: The water temperature routinely rose three degrees in the halfmile stretch before work began, she observed.

Mining continues in the area but the agency is working in partnership with miners who are working a private parcel immediately upstream from the project.

"They are allowing us to drive across their land and are working with us," Reid said, noting the mining firm, Carlon's Gravel Pit, is both mining for gold and selling aggregate as a by-product.

There is also a mining claim for a suction dredge

operation in the area, he noted.

"By the time this whole thing is done, it will probably be in excess of a million-dollar project," O'Brien estimated.

About \$210,000 is being spent on the project this year, compared to about \$500,000 last year, O'Brien said.

"The impact of this project goes all the way down Sucker Creek," O'Brien said. "One thing it will do is lower the stream temperature. That will have a direct impact on the city of Cave Junction."

The only incorporated town in the Illinois Valley, Cave Junction draws its water from the Illinois River not far from where Sucker Creek pours into the river, he noted.

"Without all of these partners working together, this would not have been able to happen," O'Brien said, noting the project has also brought much needed money into the local economy.

Funding for this year's work was provided in part by Ecotrust, U.S. Forest Service, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Fisheries, Oregon Department of Environmental Quality and the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board.

Nev. Traffic Stop Yields 452 Pounds of Cocaine

LAS VEGAS • A Canadian man was arrested on drug trafficking charges outside Las Vegas after police found a record 452 pounds of cocaine in his semi-trailer truck during a routine traffic stop Wednesday.

Gaston Danjou, 51, was pulled over for driving erratically and was going to get off with just a warning, but his nervous response to police questioning prompted investigators to search his vehicle, where they found the drugs worth \$16.4 million. He now faces charges of cocaine possession, drug trafficking and transporting a controlled substance in what state officials are calling the largest cocaine bust in state history.

Investigators believe Danjou was taking the cocaine from California through Nevada to other western states. It was unclear how he obtained the cocaine, but investigators believe he was working for someone else because of the amount found on the truck.

"It would be safe to say that 452 pounds would be connected to a larger organization," Las Vegas police Lt. Laz Chavez said.

Danjou was driving along a rural stretch of Interstate 15 near Jean, a city roughly 30 miles from Las Vegas, when a Nevada Highway Patrol trooper observed him swerve into adjacent traffic lane three times. Under questioning, Danjou immediately appeared suspiciously nervous, the trooper wrote in an arrest report. The truck driver, who was transporting construction materials on a flatbed for a private company, said he was from Quebec and the owner of the truck.

"He appeared to be more nervous than any normal person would be if they were being contactAuthorities say they have no doubt that meth trafficking remains brisk. Record busts are being reported in some states that fund their own cleanups.

But in places that rely on federal money, law enforcement agencies feel paralyzed. At least one sheriff became so frustrated that he considered burning meth waste illegally in a landfill rather than leaving it in neighborhoods where curious children could find it.

In Warren County, Tenn., about 70 miles southeast of Nashville, deputies had "always been very aggressive on meth," Sheriff Jackie Matheny said. By midsummer a year ago, they had busted some 70 meth labs. This year, that number tumbled to 24.

"When you have to kind of kick it into neutral, it makes you sick to your stomach because we know it's out there," Matheny said.

Making matters worse, sheriffs say, was the suddenness of the loss, which didn't give cash-strapped local governments any time to come up with another way to pay for cleanups that typically cost \$2,500 to \$5,000 per lab.

"We didn't have an opportunity to prepare," Matheny said. "We just got a phone call saying, 'You're not going to have funds anymore? It just absolutely crippled us.""

The AP analysis involved building a database of lab seizures in the nation's top 10 meth-producing states based on 2010 figures. Combined with numbers from the first half of 2011, the statistics showed that seizures had dropped sharply in states that depended on federal money. Yet busts were skyrocketing in states that pay for their own cleanups.

The AP also conducted 50 to 60 interviews to confirm the trend, speaking with police officers, sheriffs and meth-lab specialists in many of the top 10 states.

Lab seizures were down 32 percent through May 31 in Tennessee, which led the nation in seizures in 2010. The numbers were similar or worse in other leading meth states: down 33 percent in Arkansas, 35 percent in Michigan and 62 percent in Alabama.

All of those states relied heavily on funding from the federal Community Oriented Policing Services, or COPS program. It offered local agencies \$19.2 million in 2010. That money was not renewed and is unlikely to come back.

"Do you really think our labs fell that much?" asked Tommy Farmer, state meth task force coordinator for Tennessee. "Hell no."

Other figures confirm that meth is thriving. The most recent national survey from the Department of Health and Human Services shows that after declining for several years, the number of first-time meth users rose in 2009 to 154,000, up from 95,000 the previous year. The National Drug Intelligence Center reports that shipments of meth from Mexico are also on the rise.

In states that have developed their own lab cleanup programs, full enforcement has continued. Missouri, the leader in meth lab busts for a decade before falling to No. 2 behind Tennessee last year, has seen a 9 percent increase in seizures through May 31. Kentucky seizures are up 34 percent, Illinois up 36 percent.

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

California Coastal **Crusader to Retire**

LOS ANGELES • They might not know his name but the millions of visitors annually lured to California's 1,100 miles of coastline are no doubt familiar with his work.

Peter Douglas, who has worked four decades to rein in development and keep vast stretches of one of the world's most breathtaking coastlines natural, announced his retirement Wednesday as the executive director of the California Coastal Commission. The 69-year-old, whose gravelly voice choked up as he talked about his decision at what will be his last series of commission hearings, has been battling lung cancer and will go on sick leave before officially retiring in November.

"It was a very difficult decision and it was disease driven," he told the Associat ed Press. "I'm at peace with it – it's been an incredible 41 years. It's been a meaningful, purposeful legacy."

In the 1970s while working as a legislative aid Douglas co-authored the proposition that created the coastal commission and, later, as a consultant for a state assembly environmental committee he co-drafted legislation that would become the country's most stringent coastal protections. Since then he's served as the agency's deputy director and executive director and is largely credited with helping to turn the start-up panel into one of the nation's most powerful land-use authorities.

His fans, which are numerous, say many of the commission's accomplish-

without controversy. Douglas has spent years sparring with developers and property owners who have seen their projects dramatically changed, whittled down and even rejected over Coastal Act compliance issues. Critics have charged that his staff unfairly targets certain projects and tackles minor land use decisions that should be left to local communities.

Douglas, who survived nearly a dozen efforts to have him fired over the years, said he takes special pride that their agency has never been corrupted. Indeed, over the years there have been some colorful show-downs between Douglas, who often wears bolo ties and hiking pants and drives an old biodiesel-using Mercedes that smells of fries, and some of the country's rich and powerful over public access requirements or development plans in environmentally sensitive areas.



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ments would not have been possible without Douglas, whose staff advises the commission on how they should vote on issues.

"While God and nature created California's unparalleled coastal splendor, the preservation of our magnificent coastline simply wouldn't have happened without the work of Peter Douglas," said Senate President Pro Tem Darrell Steinberg upon hearing the news.

Sarah Christie, the commission's legislative liaison who has worked at the commission since 1999, agreed.

"The Hearst Ranch would be a golf resort, Monterey Bay would be lined with luxury condominiums instead of a public boardwalk, there would be no public access to any of Malibu's beaches, the cottages at Crystal Cove would have been demolished and San Onofre State Park would have been paved over for a toll road," she said. "The list goes on and on."

Voters established the largely independent, quasijudicial commission out of growing concern that rampant development would eclipse the state's world-famous beaches, as well as the average person's ability to get there. The commission is composed of 12 voting members appointed by the governor, the state Senate Rules Committee and the Assembly speaker.

Coastal programs in other states don't have the reach or legal muscle of the California Coastal Commission thanks largely to the Coastal Act. The law placed a priority on public recreation over private development, created protection for nesting birds and other animals, and gave the agency authority to enforce the law.

But his tenure hasn't been

battled for decades to stop the public from using a stretch of Carbon Beach in front of his Malibu compound, before relenting in 2007. Geffen cited concerns about traffic, privacy and the potential environmental harm sunbathers would cause.

This year, amid speculation that the commission might approve a clutch of environmentally friendly mansions that U2 guitarist The Edge and other landowners wanted to build along a bluff overlooking Malibu, Douglas stood up and said he had "never seen a project as environmentally devastating as this" proposed in the Santa Monica Mountains. The commission voted against it.

Some of the commission's decisions at the advice of Douglas have had surprising reach.

In the 1980s, Douglas advised the commission to vote against allowing for the expansion of the Jonathon Club, a private white men's club on the beach in Santa Monica unless they ended policy alleged to be discriminatory.

"I think it would be a travesty if a state agency gives it's good housekeeping seal to a club on public land that wouldn't let half of you commissioners into their membership," he recalled telling the commission. "The club fought it, went to the Supreme Court and we won?"

The commission's current chair Mary Shallenberger, who has known Douglas for decades, believes that even some of those who have squared off with Douglas may miss him.

"It's going to be the rare person who doesn't respect the work that he's done and his passion for it," she said

Association Tentatively **Approves New Wrestling** Classifications

In an effort to avoid situations like those seen at the state boys basketball tournaments in March, the Idaho High School Activities Association is adopting a new tactic.

The organization plans to implement an online ticket purchasing feature on a limited basis for state events, beginning with some state football events,

IHSAA board member Ty Jones told the Times-News Wednesday after the board's August meeting.

"People will be able to go online and print their tickets. They'll have to bring them to the event - no phone apps or anything as of right now," Jones said. "It's just as basic as you can be right now."

Fans can access the ticket outlet from the IHSAA's website, which will redirect them to the purchasing outlet, according to IHSAA secretary Amanda Quinlan.

Jones said the online option will incur a \$2 convenience charge issued by the ticket outlet. That money does not revert to the IHSAA. Fans can still purchase tickets on-site for events that have online ticketing available.

A number of fans endured lengthy waits for tickets at state basketball events at the Idaho Center and Borah High School in March due to overcrowding, leaving fans of teams with later games to wait outside until the earlier games had finished and a mad rush for seating once entry was allowed.

The goal is three months away, but it's also just four places removed from where the College of Southern Idaho volleyball program started its season on Wednesday.

The Golden Eagles began formal practice with their traditional two-a-days, one in the morning Wednesday and the other in the afternoon following a two-hour break.

"We had a good day. I would have liked the girls to be in a little bit better shape than they were, but I was pleased with the effort, with the attitude and with their willingness to be coached and get on board with what we're doing," said sixth-year coach Heidi Cartisser. BSUAthletic Director Let Go

has been let go as the school faces sanctions because of violations in the football program and other sports.

University President Bob Kustra announced Wednesday that Bleymaier's career of 30 years at the school will end Sept. 8.

"After a careful management review and discussions about the future of the program, I determined that new leader ship will be needed as we commit our-

selves to the highest level of attention and enforcement of NCAA standards, and also continue to move Boise State athletics to the next level of success,"Kustra said in a statement

The football violations under review were committed between 2005 and 2008. The program already is dealing with several self-imposed penalties, including fewer scholarships for the next two years and reduced practice time.

The 57-year-old Bleymaier told The Associated Press he met with Kustra last Thursday for 30 minutes and lobbied to keep his job, but wasn't successful.

JOHNS CREEK, Ga. • Even as he took the high road Wednesday in a nasty split with his longtime caddie, Tiger Woods lowered his standard of success on the eve of the PGA Championship.

It wasn't long ago that Woods said it couldn't be a great year without winning a major.

Now he would consider the year a success because he no longer hurts.

To be clear, he is thinking only about winning when the PGA Championship gets under way Thursday in the stifling heat at Atlanta Athletic Club. That much hasn't changed, and probably never will.

Asked for a realistic expectation in the final major - remember, this is only his third time teeing it up since April and he hasn't won any tournament in 21 months -

He doesn't seem to be going anywhere at the moment.

Woods remains the central figure at the PGA Championship, as he has been at the majors since his career began, only this time it's for all the wrong reasons. 

A. ELIZABETH BURR-JONES (Public Censure)

NOTICES

On August 1, 2011, the Idaho Supreme Court issued a Disciplinary Order imposing a Public Censure upon Burley attorney, A. Elizabeth Burr-Jones, based upon her professional misconduct.

- The Idaho Supreme Court found that Ms. Burr-Jones violated I.R.P.C. 1.5(f) [A lawyer shall provide an accounting upon request], 1.15(a) [A lawyer shall hold property of clients that is in the lawyer's possession separate from the lawyer's own property], 1.15(c) [A lawyer shall promptly deliver to the client any funds the client is entitled to receive], 1.15(d) [A lawyer shall keep property in which two or more persons claim an interest separate until the dispute is resolved and shall distribute all portions of the property as to which the interests are not in dispute] and 1.16(d) [A lawyer shall return unearned fees and costs upon termination of representation].
- The Idaho Supreme Court's Disciplinary Order followed a stipulated resolution of an Idaho State Bar disciplinary proceeding in which Ms. Burr-Jones admitted that she had violated the Idaho Rules of Professional Conduct set forth in the preceding paragraph.
- The Complaint filed in this proceeding related to Ms. Burr-Jones' representation of two clients in civil cases. In the first matter, the client paid Ms. Burr-Jones a \$1,600 retainer fee in January 2009. In February 2009, the client terminated the representation and requested the return of his file and an itemized accounting. At the time of termination, Ms. Burr-Jones owed the client a \$947.95 refund. Ms. Burr-Jones did not provide the requested file, accounting or refund despite multiple requests. The client filed a grievance in December 2009. In January 2011, Ms. Burr-Jones provided the \$947.95 refund. In April 2011, she paid the client an additional \$108.50 in interest.
- In the second matter, the client paid Ms. Burr-Jones a \$1.500 retainer fee. In October 2002, the Court ordered the client's exhusband to pay her \$1,815, reflecting \$1,500 in attorney fees and \$315 in costs for an airline ticket. In July 2009, the client's ex-husband was arrested and posted bond. In August 2009, the Court converted \$2,200 of the bond to pay court-ordered obligations to the client. The payment was sent to Ms. Burr-Jones and deposited into her office's general account. Between September 2009 and May 2010, the client called Respondent's office numerous times requesting the \$1,815 payment. The client received varying responses regarding the amount and status of the funds she was entitled to receive. In July 2010, the client filed a grievance and, later that month, Ms. Burr-Jones provided the \$1,815 payment. In April 2011, Ms. Burr-Jones paid the client an additional \$94.82 in interest.
- This public censure shall be published in the Advocate, the Times-News and the Idaho Reports. The public censure does not limit Ms. Burr-Jones' eligibility to practice law.

Hence the partnership reached the Goldilocks level of four diamnds — not too low, not too high, just right.

Since North-South had avoided a no-trump contract and North had shown an unbalanced hand, West guessed to lead the diamond ace and a second diamond. If South had made the mistake of going for spade ruffs in the long trump hand, he would have found that there was also a fourth club to look after, and that this could not be ruffed without letting West on lead to play a third round of trumps. Declarer found a better solution by ducking a heart into East's hand at the third trick.

Then he could play to take two heart ruffs in his own hand, losing one heart, one diamond, and one club. In total, he scored four tricks in aces and kings, two heart ruffs in hand, and four trumps in dummy.

It is worth noting that if declarer plays the spade ace and ruffs a spade at tricks three and four, then leads out the club king and another club, ducking when East's jack appears, then West must overtake to be in position to play the third diamond. Otherwise, declarer's crossruff succeeds.

helped hide Anne Frank and her family. She didn't hesitate before saying "of course!" when asked for help, and when asked years after WWII, she said she would do it again in a heartbeat because it was the right thing to do.

As an LGBT and AIDS activist, I'm often asked why I do what I do if it doesn't affect me directly. I do it because it's the right thing. To me, if more people thought like Mrs. Gies, this world would be a much better place to live, so I try to remember her in everything I do.



FILER NARROWING **FIGURES FOR SEWER INCREASE**

FILER • The near future for residents in Filer will bring an increase in their monthly sewer charges.

City officials said Tuesday that an exact figure for any increase has yet to be determined. But a final number and effective date will be released for public comment before a new water treatment facility comes online at the end of this month.

Mayor Bob Templeman said raising the current rate of \$47.50 isn't something he really wants to see, but is an inevitable part of running the city and assuring the plant is self-sustaining.

"When we proposed building this thing back in 2006, a rate increase to \$60 or \$80 was part of the bond information package," he said. "I'm confident we'll be able to keep it somewhere in-between there."

The cost of plant testing procedures is expected to make setting a solid firstyear maintenance and operation budget difficult, but tentative figures run between \$250,000 and

\$383,000. Though the City Council plans to use the higher amount as a safety buffer, Templeman and **City Maintenance Director** Bud Compher both believe \$250,000 is probably more realistic.

plant, we've made upgrades to the collection system and that'll be a savings," Compher said. "Our pumps and blowers are more energy-efficient, too."
