## CRASH VICTIMS IDENTIFIED

**A Calif. family, visiting family in Mini-Cassia, died Sunday when their private plane crashed shortly after taking off from the Burley airport.**

**BURLEY** • A California family visiting relatives in Mini-Cassia was identified Monday as the one killed in Sunday's airplane crash

in Burley.

Randal Jay Whittle, 42, his 46-year-old wife, Vicki Whittle, and their children, 16-year-old MacLean Whittle and 13-year-old Brittany Whittle, were killed when their 1979 Cessna 210 sin-

gle-engine airplane crashed shortly after leaving the Burley J.R. "Jack" Simplot Airport.

National Transportation Safety Board Air Safety Investigator Kurt Anderson, of Seattle, said the group was apparently on their way to Provo, Utah, when the plane went down just south of the runway at about 2:30 p.m. It struck U.S. Highway 30 before crashing into railroad tracks on

the opposite side of the road.

"Several witnesses saw them take off and the landing gear retract into the wheel belly," Anderson said. "They said the plane then banked left and descended a little, and then the left wing hit the road and it slid across the road and hit the railroad tracks."

Anderson said the aircraft struck the east side of the railroad

## Crapo: Debt Ceiling Deal Not Enough

The American dream is in peril, with the federal debt crisis putting it in jeopardy, U.S. Sen. Mike Crapo said Monday.

Crapo, an Idaho Republican, spoke Monday to the Jerome Chamber of Commerce about the federal debt and the recent actions taken in Congress concerning the debt ceiling.

Crapo, who voted for the bill that raised the federal debt ceiling and put in motion spending cuts, said that more work is needed to rein in the growth of federal spending.

"The debt crisis is, in my opinion, potentially the greatest threat that the United States has ever faced, and I mean that sincerely," said Crapo, a member of the now-defunct

## BLM Crews Put Out Fire Near Devil's Corral

U.S. Bureau of Land Management fire crews have contained and controlled the wildfire that began Sunday at Devil's Corral in southern Jerome County.

The fire began at about 9 p.m. Sunday near Interstate 84 milepost 175, east of the U.S. Highway 93 interchange.

Idaho State Police temporarily closed I-84 be-

tween mileposts 173 and 182 to keep traffic out of the burn area.

The fire burned 184 acres but did not damage any structures.

Kyli Astle, BLM spokeswoman, said that while there were many reports of smoke in the area, most of the smoke is coming from nine fires in the Boise area.

Lightning was the cause of the wildfire, Astle said.

## Idaho Eyes \$179M Surplus

**Although the state's budget picture may look much better in July 2012, GOP lawmakers say most of a projected surplus is already spoken for, should it materialize.**

**BOISE** • Idaho is expecting a second straight year of budget surpluses when the 2012 fiscal year ends, but conservative Idaho lawmakers and Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter say it's much too early to count on the money.

Come next July, the state is projecting \$179 million in the bank, based on the spending plan passed by the 2011 Legislature. That's after an \$85 million surplus in the fiscal year that ended June 30, most of which was distributed to public schools.

But even if the surplus materializes, Republicans who control the state House and Senate say much of the cash is already spoken for, in the form of higher Medicaid costs, efforts to refill rainy day accounts and replacing one-time federal funding for schools that expires this year. And Otter expects states like Idaho may see less cash from Washington, D.C., as the federal government attempts to cut trillions from its budget to get the national debt under control.

"One of the first places they're going to look is how they can whittle back what they're giving to the states," said Jon Hanian, Otter's spokesman. "We have to be mindful of that. This notion we have a lot of money lying around just isn't true."

Idaho's 2012 revenue forecast is contingent on Idaho's economy stabilizing, something Otter's budget chief, Wayne Hammon, says remains uncertain given the national debt downgrade and European turbulence.

But if there is money left over, House Speaker Lawrence Denney said GOP lawmakers — especially in an election year — still aren't likely to

## 'A Cuttin' Mood' Takes Over T.F. Council

**Public hearing draws six people; a majority to rail against any tax hike. Mayor then says almost 'a mob mentality' for budget cuts took over.**

It started with cutting \$50,000 set aside for the city pool.

Then the Twin Falls City Council on Monday night started cutting money for proposed park improvements, getting to a net \$60,000 reduction on three cuts and one addition, before council members and the mayor started questioning the direction their discussion was heading.

"I almost feel we are in a mob mentality of 'let's cut!'" Mayor Don Hall said at about 9 p.m., four hours into the meeting. "I want us to have a thoughtful debate on this budget ... I am a bit disappointed that we haven't

# Where's Butch Cassidy's loot? Did he spend it?

News over the weekend that outlaw Butch Cassidy may have survived that famous 1908 shootout in South America and lived to a ripe old age in Washington state may renew interest in one of the enduring mysteries of Old West Idaho.

Stashed somewhere in this state, according to popular legend, are \$32,200 in gold coins buried by one of Cassidy's henchmen as he fled from a heist in Winnemucca, Nev.

Cassidy was a highway man who by nature didn't have much use for coins of the realm – he preferred currency and negotiable securities. But \$32,000 in 1900 coins – with gold at \$1,800 an ounce – could be worth tens of millions of dollars today.

The prevailing theory is that Harvey Logan – Kid Curry – hid the loot near a creek close to the stage-coach road between Spokane, Wash., and Wallace, roughly the same route as modern-day Interstate 90.

If Cassidy in fact made it back to the United States – and settled in Washington – there's a good chance that he went looking for the treasure.

Kid Curry wouldn't have been able to. Arrested for murder in Tennessee in 1902, he escaped and was gunned down in Colorado in 1904.

Associated Press reported that a rare books collector in Utah said he's obtained the manuscript of a 200-page book, *Bandit Invincible: The Story of Butch Cassidy*, which dates from 1934. It is twice as long as an unpublished novella of the same title by William Phillips, a machinist who died in Spokane in 1934.

The Utah collector, Brent Ashworth, speculates that Phillips was in fact Cassidy.

Cassidy – Robert LeRoy Parker was his real name – has long been believed to have been killed along with his sidekick the Sundance Kid in Bolivia in 1908 following the robbery of a silver mine courier. But that's been disputed by some historians and by Cassidy's sister.

None of the coins from the Winnemucca heist have ever been found.

"Gang of Six" group of senators that was charged with finding ways to trim federal debt.

Crapo added: "I don't think I've ever seen a time when we faced a greater risk of losing the American dream than we do right now, and this threat comes from within."

The numbers aren't small. The U.S. government has a national debt of \$14.5 trillion and borrows \$4 billion more than it takes in on each business day.

That comes to borrowing 40 cents for every dollar spent.

"The U.S. has been on a spending binge, if you will, for decades as it racks up this debt with the notion that we can spend ourselves into prosperity, and we don't ever have to pay the piper and account for this debt," Crapo said.

The recently approved legislation put in place a 12-member committee charged with finding at least \$1.2 trillion to trim. That's on top of another \$1 trillion of trims in federal spending that the law puts in place.

If the committee of congressional lawmakers, which does not include Crapo, cannot sell Congress on its proposal later this year, across-the-board cuts of \$1.5 trillion would automatically kick in.

Crapo said he hopes the committee goes beyond the \$1.2 trillion minimum, but that the two rounds of cutting will add up to at least a \$2.2 trillion step in the right direction.

"That's a good step,"

Crapo said. "It's a way better step than what we were doing last year. Last year, we were fighting over how much to raise taxes and how much to raise spending."

By contrast, the "Gang of Six" had a proposal that didn't pass Congress and would have trimmed \$4 trillion.

Crapo said there needs to be a focus not only on controlling spending, but also on the nation's revenue. That means putting in place

tax reforms that would cut rates and simplify the tax code, he said, adding that it's also important to curb the nonstop growth of federal regulations that impact businesses.

"We really need to be aggressively focused on a pro-growth jobs agenda as well as controlling the growth of spending," Crapo said.

tracks with such force that it bent the tracks. The plane, which was burning when emergency crews arrived, slid over the tracks and came to rest in dry grasses to the west.

Whittle had been a pilot for about five years and he and his family were in Idaho visiting his parents, said his brother, Dave Whittle of Springville, Utah.

"My parents were at the airport and saw the crash," Dave Whittle told the *Salt Lake Tribune*.

According to the Federal Aviation Administration, Randal Whittle held a third-class medical license and a private pilot's license with single-engine land and instrument ratings.

No information has been released about who was in control of the plane at the time of the crash, but FAA records show Randal Whittle as the only pilot license holder among the victims.

The Cassia County Sheriff's office declined Monday to release its report on the crash.

Anderson said the NTSB planned to take the plane to Boise for further investigation Monday night. However, due to the severity of the crash, very little was left of it.

"We are in the process of gathering log books from California and we've recovered the pilot's log from the site," Anderson said.

Anderson said an autopsy of the pilot would be performed in Boise and toxicology samples would be sent to Oklahoma. A preliminary report is expected to be released within a week, while a probable cause report will be issued in three to six months.

Funeral services for the victims are pending at Morrison Funeral Home, 188 S. Idaho Highway 24 in Rupert.

expand programs.

Instead, they'll want to show the largely conservative voters who sent them to Boise that they haven't abandoned the restraint that has dominated sessions since the downturn began in 2008.

"I would not be surprised to see a significant portion of people wanting to hold the line on the budget, and only do the statutory increases, if we have enough to do that," said Denney, R-Midvale.

There are already strings attached to any surplus money.

If Idaho tax revenue grows by more than 4 percent, for example, a portion must go to replenish rainy day funds that have been drained from \$350 million to nearly nothing.

What's more, Idaho hospitals, nursing homes and intensive care facilities for disabled adults are scheduled to end voluntary assessments – totaling \$35.5 million this year – that have bolstered the Medicaid health insurance program for low-income disabled people. If the assessments aren't renewed, Department of Health and Welfare spokesman Tom Shanahan said Idaho would likely have to fill that hole to preserve a federal match.

Idaho needs to step in if revenue is recovering, said Steve Millard, president of the Idaho Hospital Association industry group.

"If there are surpluses coming in now, the state can pick up more than they have in the past," Millard said. "This shouldn't be financed on the backs of the hospitals that have no say in the patients they receive."

For any surplus that re-

mains, Otter's office says he's intent on bolstering education.

And Idaho's colleges and universities have taken an enormous hit since the Great Recession began three years ago, with state funding falling to its lowest level in more than a decade. Students have been asked to pick up the tab, with higher tuition.

"If there's money left over at the end of the day, what the governor has said is, it's going to go to education," Hanian said.

Beyond that, lawmakers among the GOP majority say cutting taxes, not expanding programs, would be a better use of remaining cash. Rep. Marv Hagedorn, R-Meridian, a proponent of cutting Idaho's corporate and individual income tax rates, says, "We need to address all the things that restrict business from being successful."

before brought this up."

After a public hearing featured six speakers – four of them railed against any tax hikes – Councilman Will Kezele said he was in "a cuttin' mood" and dove in by asking for a vote on a \$140,000 cut to Thomsen Trail improvements. It passed 5-2, with Councilmen Greg Lanting and Trip Craig dissenting.

The council also voted to cut \$50,000 from the city pool, due to savings from a contract renegotiation with the YMCA; \$75,000 from Auger Falls Park system improvements; and \$25,000 for new shade installations at Harmon Park before a Times-News reporter needed to leave due to print deadlines.

The council did add \$180,000 back to the Parks and Recreation Department budget for restroom improvements at the Oregon Trail Youth Complex. Nonetheless, the cuts – a net 15 percent of the combined Parks and Recreation budgets – alarmed Councilman Trip Craig enough that he told the council that "if we're going to cut (the entire budget), let's cut it and just move on."

Councilwoman Rebecca Mills Sojka also wanted to bring a Twin Falls Police Department request of \$135,000 for three new patrol vehicles to vote, but it is unclear if that happened Monday night.

Kezele, who voted for all the cuts and the addition for Oregon Trail bathrooms, said he wanted to find areas to cut so road maintenance can be better funded. Roads were the subject of a property tax

hike, proposed by Hall, of \$5 per year per \$150,000 of property value. Hall said at the meeting he proposed it to get a community discussion going and didn't fight for it.

In a normal year, Kezele said he wouldn't suggest cutting so deep into parks and recreation. But in a year that's part of "the worst recession since the Great Depression," he wanted to find ways to put more money toward road maintenance – thus preventing multi-million dollar repairs associated with lax maintenance schedules – and possibly even reduce the overall tax rates for citizens.

"There are a couple of things in this budget that are nice," he said. "But if I need to weigh them against potentially millions in lost revenues because of road maintenance, well, that would just be foolish."

# Benites Changes Plea on Meth Trafficking Charges

A Kimberly man ac-  
cused of selling  
meth has pleaded  
guilty to two felony  
crimes.

Bernardo Benites,  
52, was scheduled to begin a  
jury trial in Twin Falls Coun-  
ty 5th District Court today,  
but he changed his plea last  
week as part of a deal with  
Twin Falls County prosecu-

tors. According to  
the deal, Benites has  
pleaded guilty to  
two counts of traf-  
ficking in metham-  
phetamine while  
two other counts of  
the crime were dis-  
missed. Also,  
penalty enhance-  
ments filed with his initial  
charges were dismissed.

Benites was arrested as  
part of a multi-agency inves-  
tigation into drug dealing in  
the Magic Valley earlier this

year, which resulted in 10  
federal indictments. The plea  
deal noted that local prose-  
cutors will not refer this case  
to further prosecution in fed-  
eral court. A joint recom-  
mendation in the deal calls  
for a prison sentence of up to  
15 years and a \$20,000 fine.

Officers from the Idaho  
State Police and the U.S. Bu-  
reau of Alcohol, Tobacco,  
Firearms and Explosives al-  
legedly found Benites in pos-  
session of 115.7 grams of  
meth during a Feb. 15 search

of his truck. Earlier that  
month, undercover officers  
allegedly made multiple  
meth purchases from Ben-  
ites and recorded the buys.

Of the individuals indict-  
ed by the U.S. Attorney, nine  
are awaiting court dates.  
Noel Diaz, 33, of Richfield,  
Julio Cesar Cardelas-Mar-  
tinez, 32, of Jerome, and  
Lazaro Ramirez Arreola, 39,  
of Parma, have pleaded  
guilty to conspiracy to dis-  
tribute meth and are sched-  
uled for sentencing next  
month.

Four defendants are slated  
for a September trial on  
multiple federal drug  
charges: Rocendo Lara, 55, of  
Jerome; Jesus Manuel  
Fontes, 49, of Bliss, and  
Manuel V. Guerrero. Ceila  
Ivonnne Loya, 31, of Wendell,

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# Idaho Lands Agency Issues Brew Pub Proposal

**BOISE** • The Department of Lands is looking for somebody who could build a brew pub in one of the downtown Boise properties it manages, a proposal request that is certain to re-ignite debate over whether Idaho is going into competition with the private sector as it seeks to boost earnings for schools, universities and prisons.

The agency said Monday it has been approached by a prospective tenant — the name hasn't been disclosed — about the possibility of remodeling space in a 95-year-old building near the Capitol to accommodate beer brewing facilities and a restaurant.

The building is among commercial properties now included in Idaho's endowment portfolio, land given to the state by the federal government at the time of statehood in 1890 to be managed to support schools, universities and colleges, prisons, and mental hospitals. The Boise Guardian website initially made the brew pub proposal public.

Since last August, when the five-member Idaho Land Board approved the endow-

ment fund's purchase of a self-storage business, conservative lawmakers and others have raised concerns that officials are abusing their constitutional mandate to produce as much revenue for schools and other institutions as possible from endowment lands.

There's a legislative interim committee meeting on the subject on Aug. 29-30.

Still, Kathy Opp, Department of Lands acting director, said there's nothing out-of-the-ordinary about this latest proposal: The endowment fund owns a building that's 86 percent vacant, so her agency is investigating the best way to fill the space and turn tens of thousands in losses into profits. The state's portfolio of downtown Boise buildings have been home to restaurants and wine bars, before, too, so this isn't uncharted territory.

"Let me make it very clear: We aren't going to run a brew pub," Opp said. "We've not put our commercial leasing program on hold because of this dialogue. We have existing properties to manage. I'm hopeful that everyone will understand the role of these statehood-granted lands

and we will be allowed to fulfill the mandate."

About 2.5 million acres remain from Idaho's original 3.7 million acre grant. The properties, which include timber in the state's forested far north to grazing land to downtown Boise parking lots, generates about \$48 million annually.

Groups including the Idaho's Children's Land Alliance Supporting Schools, which works to ensure endowment lands are managed properly, insist foes of the state's storage business acquisition last year — and now potentially the brew-pub push — are mischaracterizing the debate.

The alliance says such land doesn't belong to Idaho, but rather the trust that's overseen by the Idaho Land Board — made up of the governor, attorney general, superintendent of public schools, state controller and secretary of state — for the highest-possible long-term returns to make sure there's enough money to keep important institutions running.

Even so, members of the Land Board are now split over whether they went too far by buying Affordable Self-Storage in Boise last

August, a move that prompted opposition from a private storage-business industry group, the Virginia-based Self Storage Association.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter and schools chief Tom Luna originally supported the purchase but now say they made a mistake, while Attorney General Lawrence Wasden, Controller Donna Jones, and Secretary of State Ben Ysursa are sticking by their votes.

On Monday, Rep. Marv Hagedorn, R-Meridian, said he wants to preserve Idaho's endowment lands, because many other states that unloaded their own trust holdings to realize one-time windfalls now regret that they no longer have a steady stream of revenue, especially during lean budget times.

However, Hagedorn wants to amend the endowment lands' tax free status during the 2012 Legislature because he thinks it give them a leg-up when competing with private businesses.

"No matter what the state does with the endowment lands, it will competing with the private sector, whether it rents those lands, leases those lands or sells timber off of them," Hagedorn said.

## Sen. McGee Takes Leave From College Board

**BOISE (AP)** • Sen. John McGee is taking a leave of absence from his seat on the College of Idaho Board of Trustees.

The Caldwell Republican notified officials at the private school earlier this month of his intentions to take some time away from his duties on the board.

Trustee Jim Grigsby told IdahoReporter.com the board appreciates all the work McGee did for the school and respects his re-

quest for time away. It's not clear when McGee, who graduated from the College of Idaho, might return to the board.

McGee's decision comes two months after his arrest in Boise for driving under the influence of alcohol.

He later pleaded guilty to drunken driving in exchange for prosecutors dropping a felony charge accusing him of taking a vehicle that belonged to another person.

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## HEDGES

Established hedges require trimming to keep them dense and compact.

**When to trim hedges** - New hedges require formative pruning for their first couple of years after planting. Formative pruning is usually carried out in winter or spring. After this, maintenance trimming is carried out, usually once a year for informal hedges and twice a year for formal hedges. Some formal hedges may need three cuts a year. Maintenance trimming is generally carried out between spring and summer.

**Trimming techniques** - Hand-held hedge shears are fine for smaller hedges, but for large hedges you'll probably find it easier to use an electric or petrol hedge trimmer. No matter what you use always make

sure the equipment is sharp and well lubricated.

Always think of your safety when using a powered hedge trimmer. Wear safety goggles and sturdy gloves. Before starting, remove any obstacles on the ground. Avoid using powered tools above shoulder height and use sturdy step ladders or platforms, ensuring they are stable. Electric hedge trimmers are ideally used with a residual current device (RCD) and should not be used in damp conditions. Place the cable over your shoulder to prevent it being accidentally cut

**Formal hedges** - There is no need for the width of even vigorous hedges to exceed 60cm (2ft) if they are regularly trimmed. Formal hedges should be slightly tapered on both sides so that the base is wider than the top and light can reach the bottom of the hedge. This is known as cutting the hedge to a batter.

Follow these tips to ensure an even, symmetrical hedge:

- Cutting straight, crisp edges by eye can be difficult. Use a taut horizontal string tied between two stout canes to act as a guide to cut the top of the hedge level. Canes or stakes pushed into the ground help with vertical lines.
- To shape the top of the hedge (e.g. to an arch), cut a template of the shape required from cardboard or plywood. Place the template on the hedge and cut following the line of the template, moving it along as you proceed.
- When using shears, ensure that the top of the hedge is cut level and flat by keeping the blades of the shears parallel to the line of the hedge.
- When using a hedge trimmer, keep the blade parallel to the hedge and use a wide, sweeping action working from the bottom of the hedge upwards, so that the cut foliage falls away.

**Informal hedges** - Pruning an informal hedge is much like pruning normal shrubs. See the links below for more specific information on pruning shrubs.

In general, when pruning informal hedges, remove misplaced shoots and cut back the hedge to its required size. Use secateurs or loppers where practical, especially if the hedge has large evergreen leaves, to avoid unsightly leaf damage.

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## Keeping Fine Art Affordable is Group’s Goal

**COEUR D’ALENE (AP)** • In a large metropolitan area, Mike Bullard says, the opera is a money-making machine.

Staff, singers and orchestra are comfortably salaried, and dizzying ticket prices keep the productions well afloat.

Opera Coeur d’Alene looks a little different.

The organization is more about conjuring major performances almost completely from donations, raised throughout the year by a volunteer board. It involves bringing in international singers who can agree to a break from Carnegie Hall, as well as less-than-glamorous sleeping arrangements.

The purpose, said Bullard, Opera Coeur d’Alene board member, is to provide the highest level opera performance at prices the common Coeur d’Alene laborer can afford.

“You will never be able to go to the opera at \$35 and get this,” Bullard said. “You would pay \$200 or \$300 to get the same level of production in any of the big cities.”

Providing that kind of a deal isn’t easy, though. Especially in this econom-

ic climate.

The nonprofit is still short of the \$80,000 needed to put on the September production of “Faust,” Bullard said, and asking for the community’s help to make up the difference.

“In today’s climate, raising \$80,000 is not easy for a performance,” he said. “We are in shooting distance. This is going to happen, we have enough to know that.”

There’s a lot involved to put on an opera, Bullard reminded — costumes, sets, orchestra, singers of no small renown.

Not to mention advertising, he added. Now that the Spokane Opera has been gone for two years, Opera Coeur d’Alene wants to boost advertising in the Washington area and net in folks hungry for some well-scripted drama.

The bigger the audiences, the more tourism dollars are brought in to local restaurants and hotels, he pointed out.

“If we can get the word out, we’d like to bring people in the same way Ironman brings people in,” Bullard said. “That’s our vision, that this can be an economic stimulus for the area.”

Singers in the show have accumulated critical acclaim, including Vale Rideout, who has sung at Carnegie Hall and with the New York Philharmonic, and Broadway performer Shana Blake Hill.

When the singers visit for the performances, Bullard added, they stay in people’s homes.

“That’s how much they love singing in Coeur d’Alene,” said Bullard, who himself will be singing in the chorus for the performance.

## Oldest Survivor of Bataan Death March Dies at 105

**ST. LOUIS** • A doctor once told Albert Brown he shouldn’t expect to make it to 50, given the toll taken by his years in a Japanese labor camp during World War II and the infamous, often-deadly march that got him there. But the former dentist made it to 105, embodying the power of a positive spirit in the face of inordinate odds.

“Doc” Brown was nearly 40 in 1942 when he endured the Bataan Death March, a harrowing 65-mile trek in which 78,000 prisoners of war were forced to walk from Bataan province near Manila to a Japanese POW camp. As many as 11,000 died along the way. Many were denied food, water and medical care, and those who stumbled or fell during the scorching journey through Philippine jungles were stabbed, shot or beheaded.

But Brown survived and secretly documented it all, using a nub of a pencil to scrawl details into a tiny tablet he concealed in the lining of his canvas bag. He often wondered why captives so much younger and stronger perished, while he went on.

By the time he died Sunday at a nursing home in southern Illinois’ Nashville, Brown’s story was well-chronicled, by one author’s account offering an encouraging road map for veterans recovering from their own wounds in many wars.

“Doc’s story had as much relevance for today’s wounded warriors as it did for the veterans of his own era,” said Kevin Moore, co-author of the recently released “Forgotten Heroes of the Pacific War: One Man’s True Story,” which details Brown’s experience.

“The underlying message for today’s returning veterans is that there’s hope, not to give in no matter how bleak the moment may seem,” added Moore, whose nephew

just returned from military duty in Afghanistan. “You will persevere and can find the promise of a new tomorrow, much like Doc had found.”

Brown, recognized in 2007 at an annual convention of Bataan survivors as the oldest one still living, couldn’t muster the strength to talk about his experiences until about 15 or so years ago, said his granddaughter, Susan Engelhardt of Pinckneyville, Ill.

“I’m not a big military buff at all. But just reading the story about the death march and the situation in the Philippines, it’s an incredible story. And incredibly sad,” Engelhardt said. “He’s an incredible man, and he had an incredible legacy. He came through horrible times and came out on top, rebuilding his life. But so many of those men and women triumphed.”

Brown’s account described the torment that came about every mile as the marchers passed wells U.S. troops dug for natives but weren’t allowed to drink from once they became prisoners. Filipinos who tried to throw fruit to the marchers frequently were killed.

Brown remained in a POW camp from early 1942 until mid-September 1945, living solely on rice.

## Ready to Hear Legislature's New Excuses for Beggaring schools, Medicaid?

"We just can't" was the mantra for the 2011 legislative session in Idaho. Stay tuned for more of the same.

Crocodile tears don't get much bigger in Idaho than those that fell in the Statehouse back in January 2010.

We'd love to fund public schools adequately, said the conservative Republicans who run the Idaho House of Representatives, wringing their hands. We'd love to stop gutting higher education, health and welfare and corrections, but we just can't, they said. Times are tough.

So, over the objections of the governor's economic forecaster and many on the Legislature's Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee, they insisted on a state budget of \$2.29 billion.

They were a little low in terms in estimating actual tax income. Missed, in fact, by \$85 million, or 3.71 percent.

Let's put it this way: If the House Republicans had been launching a rocket to the moon and missed by 3.71 percent, it might have ended up on Venus.

So the news from the governor's office Monday that a \$179 million surplus is expected in the 2012 budget should be the basis of some mighty fine entertainment during the coming legislative session.

The grownups in the Legislature — senior members of JFAC, for example — may suggest that after backfilling some of the millions of dollars that have been cut from education, the state should consider restoring some of the reduction in funding for Medicaid — and thus save millions in federal matching money.

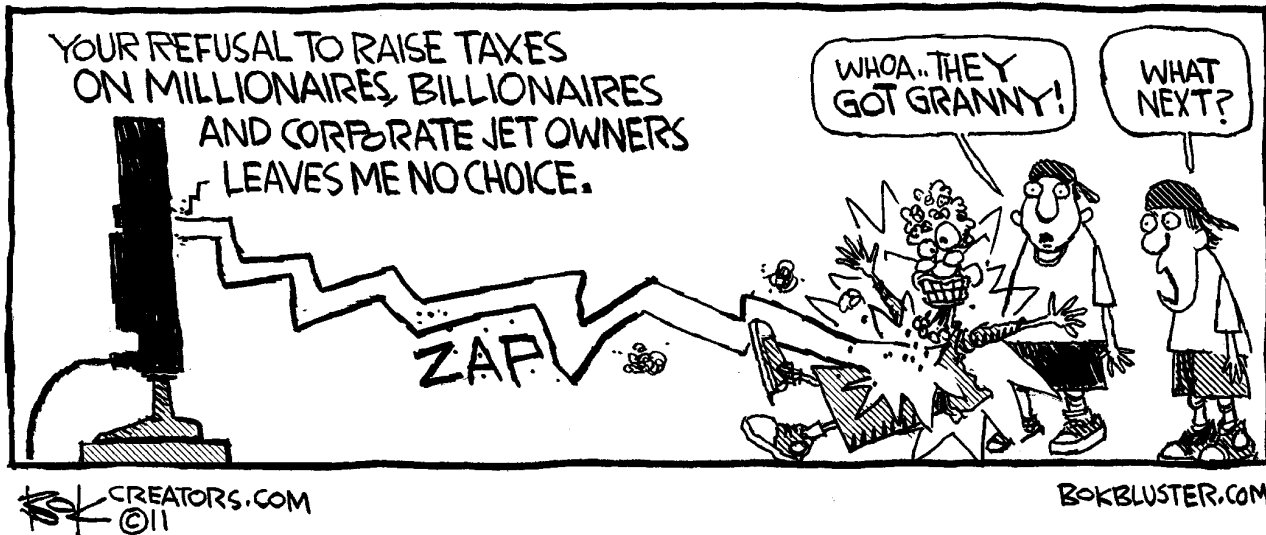
The House conservatives are sure to be armed and ready with lots of excellent excuses why Idaho shouldn't do that.

The revenue projection is flawed, they'll argue. What if, nationally, the recession comes back? Students and parents have already picked up the slack for the more than 25 percent cut in funding in higher education, they'll contend, and Medicaid recipients — having had their benefits dialed back by the 2011 Legislature — will have learned to live with less.

But the truth is, some conservatives in the House are out to cut taxes for corporations, businesses and Idahoans like themselves — don't hold your breath waiting for a sales tax reduction, which affects ordinary Idahoans more — and are more than willing to shortchange the state's students, Medicaid recipients and providers to get it done.

Trouble is, their fig leaf is disappearing. It's pretty darn hard to ignore a \$179 million surplus, which amounts to more than 5 percent of the fiscal year 2012 spending blueprint.

Idaho will have the resources during the upcoming fiscal year to repair some of the damage of three years of budget cuts. Whether they'll actually be spent for that purpose remains a long shot.



## Imagining a world without the New Deal

The Tea Party's backlash against the federal government envisions a return to an earlier, supposedly golden era in American history. Rep. Paul Ryan's budget plan floated in April would essentially privatize Medicare and Medicaid while lowering taxes on the top income bracket to their pre-1930 rate. House Republicans' plan to solve the recent debt crisis would have shrunk the government to its 1950s size.

In other words, conservative plans like these would effectively repeal Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal.

It would be a fight for economic survival with no coordinated effort at recovery. The New Deal shifted responsibility for social

welfare and economic development from city halls and state capitols to Washington. Starting in 1933, New Deal programs such as the Civilian Conservation Corps created more than 3 million jobs over the next three years. But like the recent Recovery and Reinvestment Act, New Deal spending was too modest — by 1932, nearly 12 million workers, or more than 25 percent of the labor force, were unemployed.

Still, FDR exercised his authority to put America back to work. Any who doubt the New Deal's effectiveness need only look at

the double-dip recession of 1937, after a conservative backlash in Congress scaled down relief spending. Without Roosevelt's intervention, the economic recovery that lasted from 1933 to 1937 would have been weaker and shorter.

But the New Deal brought more than jobs — it enhanced quality of life, especially among the most vulnerable. Without the New Deal's health and nutrition initiatives as well as investments in water and sewage-treatment infrastructure, millions of lives would have been lost.

Before the New Deal, it was unthinkable that retired people could turn to the government for income or medical care. That responsibility fell directly to their children, if they had them. That's why the Re-

publicans' proposed cuts to Medicare are so shocking — they shift these costs from the federal budget back to the family budget.

But even if these cuts get through Congress, they can't take away America's infrastructure. The New Deal's Public Works and Works Progress administrations spurred rapid productivity growth in the midst of the Depression. New roads and electrical power networks paved the way for post-World War II economic expansion built around the automobile and the suburban home. The New Deal also electrified rural America through cooperatives that distributed cheap, reliable power. This last legacy of the New Deal — fairness — may be its most important. If House Republicans have their way, we may be stranded in a world without it.

### An Empty Downtown

Will the last person leaving downtown Twin Falls please roll up the sidewalks?

The city and Urban Renewal Agency have dithered too long, ignoring responsibilities to maintain the downtown's viability. Main Street's empty buildings are a travesty to our community, but specific actions can kick start an urban revitalization process:

Remove every parking meter, using URA money to pay off debts (it has a \$6 million budget). Traffic will increase and the downtown immediately becomes more competitive with shopping malls but with a real personality.

Use URA funds to rebuild the entire public water system along Main Street, renovating tired landscaping and replacing broken sidewalks.

Update the city code to encourage renovation of second-floor Main Street buildings into residential units. Local banks can lend money to building owners seeking new revenue from residences, an action the

Community Reinvestment Act encourages.

Investigate legality of tax incentives for new small businesses locating downtown, spreading inducement over several years to ensure a commitment.

Discontinue wasting public money for consultants who reveal we need to attract business associations to promote activities or establish local improvement districts. Business owners can plant their own seeds for growth.

Set specific benchmarks to evaluate the progress.

Shopping malls and asphalt highways don't describe a city's heart, but public investment and private capital can invigorate our downtown heritage. The city council should redirect the URA's questionable priorities to attract business and employment in the city core. It's time public servants put people back on the sidewalks of our century-old city treasure.

I believe there are those of us who are concerned enough to care and learn how to help those who have been abused. They deserve dignity, freedom from fear and acceptance from community instead of blame in order to know the signs of an abusive relationship and how to leave a dangerous situation.

Survivors of abuse need community to move past the hurtful experiences that shaped their lives. They prevail, maintaining their gains, help others escape by persuading and educating the uninformed.

It helps to remember feeling small, hurt and humiliated. In our vulnerability, we can join hands with both victims and survivors when we feel the universality of being human and being hurt and stand against human cruelty.

Why would anyone stay in an abusive relationship? Here are some reasons: She has no resources of her own.

Her children need her. He threatens to kill her if she leaves, and she doesn't know about shelters to protect her and her children. Her fear is real, the threat is real, and the pathway to freedom cannot be found.

Physical pain is more bearable than shame. She feels dehumanized. Afraid of how other people will see her, she chooses to stay home and endure the pain.

A battered wife might love her spouse because she was trained from infancy to love an abusive parent.

Women stay with abusive men out of fear, isolation and unusual forms of love. "Leaving is dangerous for many, difficult for most," says Frank M. Ochberg, M.D. Consequences of abuse include depression, rejection sensitivity, anger and difficulty with trust. Ochberg states that counseling for victims should be practical, multi-disciplinary and geared to security needs.

Therapy is not the whole answer. While we treat and teach, we must join hands for complete healing.

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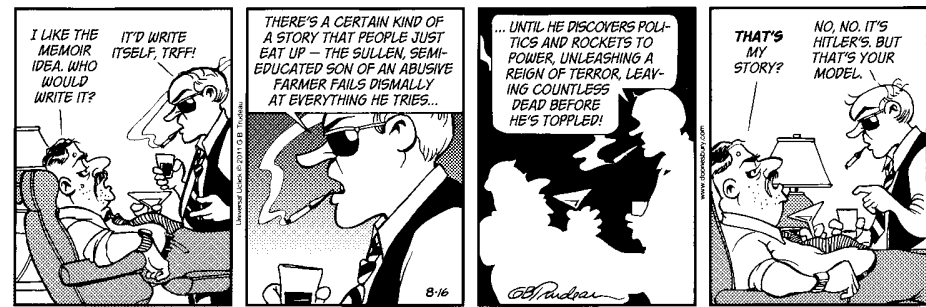

# Old Text, New Wrinkles: Did Butch Cassidy Survive?

**CHEYENNE, Wyo.** • Did Butch Cassidy, the notorious Old West outlaw who most historians believe perished in a 1908 shootout in Bolivia, actually survive that battle and live to old age, peacefully and anonymously, in Washington state? And did he pen an autobiography detailing his exploits while cleverly casting the book as biography under another name?

A rare books collector says he has obtained a manuscript with new evidence that may give credence to that theory. The 200-page manuscript, "Bandit Invincible: The Story of Butch Cassidy," which dates to 1934, is twice as long as a previously known but unpublished novella of the same title by William T. Phillips, a machinist who died in Spokane in 1937.

Utah book collector Brent Ashworth and Montana author Larry Pointer say the text contains the best evidence yet — with details only Cassidy could have known — that "Bandit Invincible" was not biography but autobiography, and that Phillips himself was the legendary outlaw.

Others aren't convinced. "Total horse pucky," said Cassidy historian Dan Buck. "It doesn't bear a great deal of relationship to Butch Cassidy's real life, or Butch Cassidy's life as we know it."

Historians more or less agree that Cassidy was born Robert LeRoy Parker in 1866 in Beaver, Utah, the oldest of 13 children in a Mormon family. He robbed his first bank in 1889 in Telluride, Colorado, and fell in with cattle rustlers who hid out at The Hole in the Wall, a refuge in northern Wyoming's Johnson County. He left the area before cattle barons hunted down cattle-rustling homesteaders in the 1892 Johnson County War.

Cassidy then served a year and a half in Wyoming Territorial Prison in Laramie for possessing three stolen horses. But for most of the next 20 years, his Wild Bunch gang held up banks and

trains across the West and in South America.

"Bandit Invincible's" author claims to have known Cassidy since boyhood and never met "a more courageous and kinder hearted man."

He acknowledges changing people and place names. But some descriptions fit details of Cassidy's life too neatly to have come from anyone else, said Ashworth, owner of B. Ashworth's Rare Books and Collectibles in Provo.

They include a judge's meeting with Cassidy in prison in February 1895. The judge offered to "let bygones be bygones" and to seek a Cassidy pardon from the governor. Cassidy refused to shake the judge's hand.

"I must tell you now that I will even my account with you, if it is the last act I ever do," Cassidy is quoted as saying by Philips.

Wyoming's state archives contain an 1895 letter by the judge who sentenced Cassidy. The letter relates how Cassidy seemed to harbor "ill-will" and didn't accept the "friendly advances" of another judge, Jay Torrey,

who had visited Cassidy in prison.

Cassidy had sued Torrey's ranch two years earlier for taking eight of his cattle, Pointer said.

"What's really remarkable to me is that, who else cares?" Pointer said. "Who else would have remembered it in that kind of detail...about an offer of a handshake and refusing it in a prison in Wyoming in 1895?"

Gov. William Richards pardoned Cassidy in 1896.

"Bandit Invincible" also describes how Ed Seeley, a rustler and prospector, told Cassidy's gang how to find a remote hideout in northern Wyoming's Bighorn Canyon. Pointer, who authored "In Search of Butch Cassidy," said he believes the Wild Bunch hid there more than at Hole in the Wall, which had become known to authorities.

"It had been used by (Seeley) one summer when he had been badly wanted by the sheriff's forces along in ninety-one. Unless one had a guide who knew the entire country, it was impossible to find the place," the manu-

script says of the canyon hideout.

Records show that a rustler named Edward H. Seeley was imprisoned at Wyoming Territorial Prison while Cassidy was there, Pointer said.

"That's just really exciting to me because this is really ephemeral stuff," he said. "No one who had not been there or done that would know that."

Nobody except for some cowboy who rode the range in the late 1800s, knew Cassidy's friends and maybe even knew the outlaw himself, Buck suggested.

"There's a sort of commonsense reason why Phillips would have got some stuff right," Buck said. "They knew each other."

In 1991, Buck and his wife, Anne Meadows, helped dig up a grave in San Vicente, Bolivia, said to contain the remains of Butch and his sidekick, Harry Longabaugh — the Sundance Kid. DNA testing revealed the bones weren't the outlaws, but Buck, a writer who lives in

Washington, D.C., said his research shows the two more than likely died in a shootout with Bolivian cavalry in 1908.

Stories abound of Sundance living long after his time in South America. But they're outnumbered by purported Cassidy sightings. A brother and sister of Cassidy's insisted he visited them at a family ranch near Circleville, Utah, in 1925.

"The majority of those who were there believed that, believed it was him that came back," said Bill Betenson, who recalled that his great-grandmother, Lula Parker Betenson, used to talk about the visit by a man she identified as her brother, Cassidy.

The manuscript has an ending fit for Hollywood. Cornered by the Bolivian cavalry while holding up a pack train, Butch and Sundance make a stand. Sundance is killed. Butch escapes to Europe, has plastic surgery in Paris, and schemes to return to the U.S. and reunite with an old girlfriend from Wyoming.

Most of the manuscript's accounts bear little resemblance to known Wild Bunch exploits. Pointer insists that Cassidy, as Phillips, was writing fiction. Phillips did offer the story to Sunset magazine without drawing interest.

The earliest documentation of Phillips is his marriage to Gertrude Livesay in Adrian, Michigan, in 1908, three months after Cassidy's last known letter from Bolivia, according to Pointer. Buck insists they married several months before a documented Bolivian shootout that probably was the one in which Butch and Sundance were killed.

In 1911, the couple moved to Spokane, where their closest friends said years later that Phillips let them in on a

secret: He was the famous outlaw.

In the 1930s, Phillips sold his interest in the foundering Phillips Manufacturing Company. He visited central Wyoming, where more than a few people in the Lander area, including one of Cassidy's old girlfriends, said it was Cassidy who spent the summer of 1934 camping out in the Wind River Range, telling tales about the Wild Bunch and digging holes in search of buried loot.

"All of these people were bamboozled by this faker from Spokane?" Pointer asked. "These weren't hayseed, duped ignorant people. These were pillars of our community. And if they said something, you had to better take it seriously."

Phillips' adopted son, William R. Phillips, believed his stepfather was Butch Cassidy, said Pointer, who interviewed him in the 1970s. William R. Phillips has since died.

In 1938, after her husband died of cancer, Gertrude Phillips told a Cassidy researcher that she and her husband had known Cassidy but that Phillips was not him. She did so only because she "didn't want the notoriety," Pointer said William R. Phillips told him.

DNA testing is unlikely to determine that Phillips, who was cremated, was Cassidy.

The many reports of later Wyoming sightings have convinced Carol Thiesse, director of the Fremont County Pioneer Museum in Lander.

"If Phillips wasn't, he certainly knew a heck of a lot about Butch," she said.

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## Soda Springs Rejects Parks Smoking Ban

**SODA SPRINGS (AP)** • A southeastern Idaho woman is upset the city of Soda Springs rejected an ordinance to ban smoking in local parks earlier this month.

Nichole Diemert says a resolution the city council passed in June to establish so-called smoke-free zones in the city's five parks didn't go far enough, and serves only as a polite request to smokers to go elsewhere.

The Idaho State Journal

reports Diemert and another resident, Jess Bowman, spearheaded a campaign in the conservative leaning town to snuff out smoking entirely in parks and a proposed city ordinance included fines for violators.

But the city council dumped that plan an Aug. 3 meeting.

City Clerk Tausha Vorrwaller says a majority of the council members felt

smokers could be trusted to respect the smoke-free zones.

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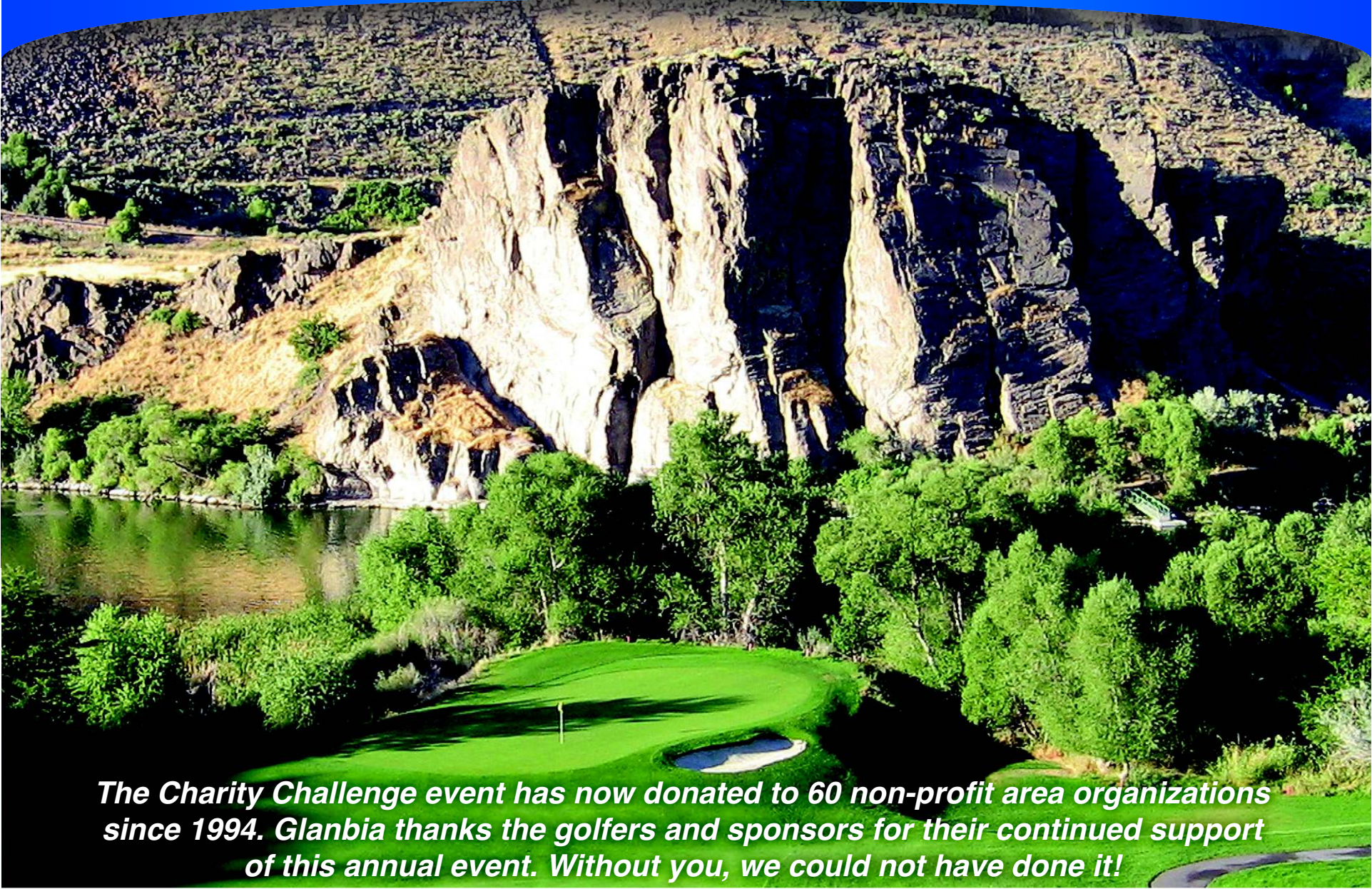

Bomb Blasts Rip Through Iraq, Killing 63 People; al-Qaida Blamed

**BAGHDAD (AP)** • A relentless barrage of bombings killed 63 people Monday in the most sweeping and coordinated attack Iraq has seen in over a year, striking 17 cities from northern Sunni areas to the southern Shiite heartland. The scope and sophistication of the bloodbath suggested that al-Qaida remains resilient despite recent signs of weakness. Such attacks, infrequent as they are deadly, will likely continue long after American forces withdraw from the country. “This is our destiny,” said Eidan Mahdi, one of more than 250 Iraqis wounded Monday.

Obama Criticizes GOP Presidential Rivals on Taxes

**CANNON FALLS, Minn.** • Hitting back against an emboldened GOP, President Barack Obama launched a rare direct attack Monday on the Republican presidential field, criticizing his potential 2012 rivals for their blanket

opposition to any deficit-cutting compromise involving new taxes. “That’s just not common sense,” Obama told the crowd at a town hall-style meeting in Cannon Falls, Minn., as he kicked off a three-day bus tour through Minnesota, Iowa and Illinois.

“You need to take a balanced approach,” he insisted. Obama recalled a moment in last week’s GOP presidential debate when all eight of the candidates said they would refuse to support a deal with tax increases, even if tax revenues were outweighed 10-to-1 by spending cuts.

Obama didn’t mention any of the candidates by name, and prefaced the remark by saying, “I know it’s not election season yet.” But his comment underscored that election season is indeed under way. The bus tour, although an official

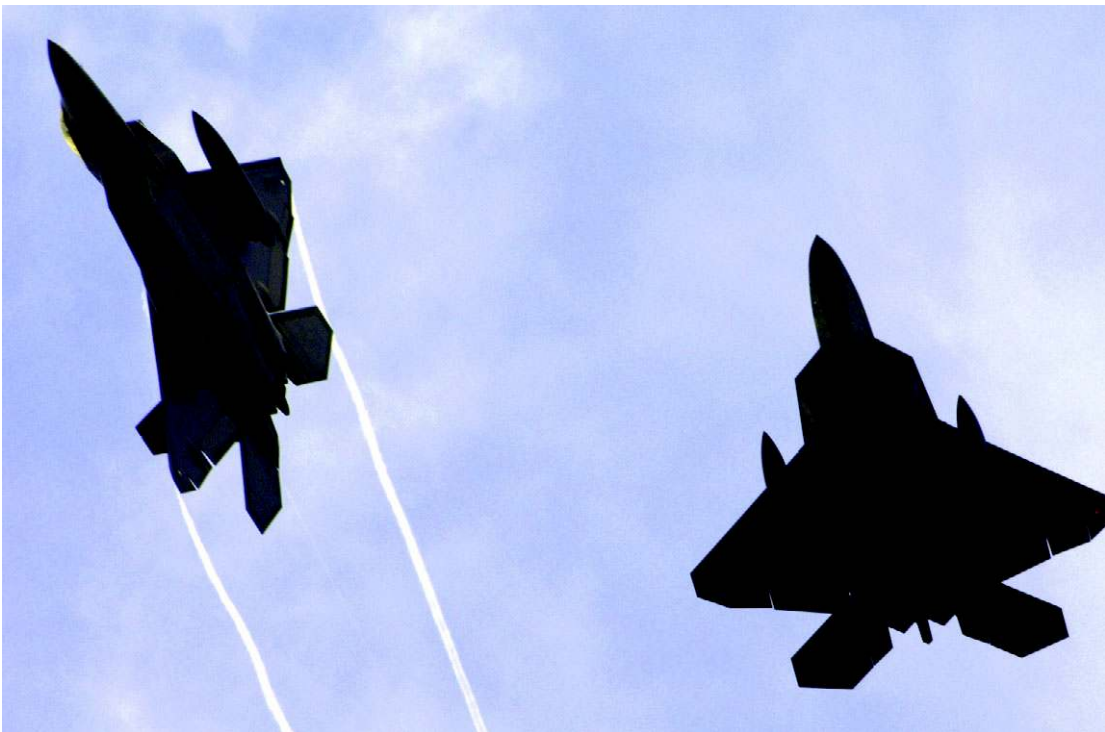

Golden Decade for Defense Companies Ending

**NEW YORK** • The wars in Iraq and Afghanistan are winding down, Osama bin Laden is dead, and the federal government is deeply in debt. This spells the end of what was a golden decade for the defense industry. In the decade since the Sept. 11 attacks, the annual defense budget has more than doubled to \$700 billion and annual defense industry profits have nearly quadrupled, approaching \$25 billion last year. Now defense spending is poised to retreat, and so are industry profits. “We’re about to go into the downhill side of the roller coaster here,” said David Berteau, a defense industry analyst at the Center for Strategic and International Studies. Congress agreed last month to cut military spending by \$350 billion over the next 10 years. The defense budget will automatically be cut by another \$500 billion over that period if lawmakers fail to reach a deficit-cutting deal by November. Defense industry stocks have already begun to suffer; they are lagging the S&P 500 in recent months. During the last defense spending downturn, which lasted from 1985 to 1997, defense

stocks underperformed the broader market by 33 percent, according to an analysis by RBC Capital Markets. The Sept. 11 attacks forced the world’s biggest and best-funded military to quickly retool itself. It needed to develop technologies, weapons and strategies to find and fight an elusive network of terrorists that seemed more sophisticated and dangerous than ever imagined. The U.S. spent \$1.3 trillion in the ten years following the attacks chasing al-Qaida and fighting two wars. That was on top of baseline military spending in excess of \$4 trillion. “After 9/11 the floodgates

opened,” says Eric Hugel, a defense industry analyst at Stephens Inc. The defense budget grew from \$316 billion in 2001 to \$708 billion in 2011. Federal spending on homeland security, which includes everything from airport security to border control, also rose dramatically. Last year dozens of federal agencies, including the Department of Homeland Security, spent \$70 billion on such programs, according to the Office of Management and Budget. That’s up from \$37 billion in 2003, the first year after DHS was formed. All that spending was reflected in the soaring performance of

the defense industry, led by the top five defense contractors: Lockheed Martin, Boeing, Northrop Grumman, General Dynamics and Raytheon. In 2001, revenues for U.S.-based defense contractors totaled \$217 billion, according to data compiled by the analytics firm Capital IQ. By 2010 revenues had grown to \$386 billion. Profits grew more than twice as fast over the same time period, from \$6.7 billion to \$24.8 billion. Contractors based abroad, such as BAE Systems, also flourished. BAE was the sixth biggest defense contractor in 2010, with \$7.2 billion in U.S. military contracts.

SHELL: OIL LEAK FROM BRITISH NORTH SEA PLATFORM ‘SIGNIFICANT’

**LONDON (MCT)** • An oil leak from a pipeline to a North Sea oil platform off the Scottish coast was Monday described as “significant” by Royal Dutch Shell, the Anglo-Dutch oil company. However, British government officials said the spill was expected to disperse naturally before reaching any shores. More than 200 tons of oil could have entered the North Sea following the leak, which was first confirmed by the company Saturday, a statement from Shell said. “It is not easy to quantify the total volume spilled, but we estimate so far that it is around 216 tons,” said Glen Cayley, technical director of Shell’s exploration and production activities in Europe. “This is a significant spill in the context of annual amounts of oil spilled in the North Sea. We care about the environment and we regret what happened. We have taken it very seriously and responded promptly to it.” The Shell-operated Gannet Alpha platform served by the pipeline is about 110 miles from Aberdeen, the oil-producing centre on the east coast of Scotland. Shell said work was continuing to stop the oil remaining in the pipeline from leaking. It estimated that the current rate of leaking was less than five barrels a day. The sheen was currently 0.3 miles in size. “We continue to expect that the oil sheen will disperse due to wave action and that it will not reach the shore,” Cayley said in a statement from Aberdeen.

Ind. Fair Honors Five Killed in Stage Collapse

**INDIANAPOLIS** • Hundreds of mourners gathered Monday at the Indiana State Fairgrounds to remember five people killed when high winds caused an outdoor stage to collapse onto an audience awaiting the start of a country music concert. Indiana Gov. Mitch Daniels told the roughly 500 mourners that the tragedy has broken the hearts of the state’s residents. He became emotional as he praised those who rushed to the stage to help the injured. “I cannot tell you how proud I am,”

Daniels said, his voice cracking, “to be the employee of six and half million people like that.” Daniels said Saturday’s stage collapse was especially sad because the state fair is “a family reunion of all Hoosiers,” where farmers and city dwellers gather for fun. Steven and Amanda Potaczek of the band 1,000 Generations opened the service with “Fail Us Not,” a song they wrote when one of their friends died in 2008. Amanda Potaczek said the song is about keeping trust in God when tragedies happen. “Stuff like this does not defeat him,” she said.

Wind gusts between 60 and 70 mph toppled the stage Saturday night as an estimated 12,000 people were waiting to see the band Sugarland. About four dozen people, some critically injured, were taken to hospitals. As Monday’s service drew to a close, five young people lined up in front of the stage holding bouquets of flowers in honor of the dead as the victim’s names were read aloud. Indiana’s first lady Cheri Daniels, who presides over fair events each year, said there are two options when tragedy strikes: to give up or rebuild. “We have decided that we want to

# Libyan Rebels Try to Isolate Tripoli, Gadhafi

**ZAWIYA, Libya** • Libya's rebels threatened to isolate Tripoli by blocking key supply routes and cutting oil pipelines on Monday after a dramatic weekend advance put them in the strongest position since the 6-month-old civil war began to attack Moammar Gadhafi's stronghold.

In Washington, the Obama administration said the U.S. was encouraged by the rebel advances and hoped they had broken a months-long stalemate with Gadhafi's forces.

"We are closing the roads for Gadhafi so there is no way for him to bring anything to Tripoli," a rebel field commander, Jumma Dardira, told The Associated Press.

The rebels' push into the strategic city of Zawiya on Saturday brought them within 30 miles of Tripoli, the closest they have ever gotten. After three days of fierce battles for the city of 200,000 on the Mediterranean coast, rebel commanders said they controlled the south and west of the city and were fighting for the refineries. Oil-rich Libya's only functioning refineries are in Zawiya.

Nuri el-Bouaisi, an oil production engineer in the city, said rebels had cut off pipelines that transport gasoline and diesel fuel to Tripoli.

"We shut down all four pipelines to Tripoli," said el-Bouaisi, whose claim could not be verified.

The rebels are also determined to cut key supply routes to Tripoli from the

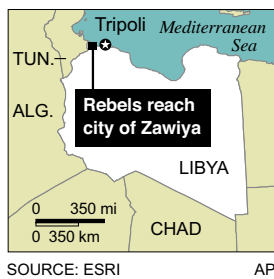

Ras Ajdir border crossing with Tunisia in the west and from the south, where Libya borders Chad and Niger. These are critical lifelines with NATO imposing a no-fly zone over the country.

Over the past two days, a number of rebel officials have claimed that they either cut or were close to cutting those two routes. However that could not be immedi-

ately confirmed.

In addition to gaining a foothold in Zawiya, the rebels claimed Sunday to have taken two towns near Tripoli on those key supply roads — Gharyan, 50 miles (80 kilometers) south of the capital and Surman, less than 10 miles west of Zawiya.

Dardira, manning a defensive position just south of Surman, said rebels were still clashing in the Sabratha area, 20 miles (32 kilometers) west of Zawiya on the coast.

The rebel advance was raising fears among Tripoli residents over the prospect that fighting might soon reach the capital. Long convoys of cars carrying civilians from the capital and other cities along the coast headed south to the western mountain range, a rebel stronghold near the border with Tunisia now considered

a safe haven.

"We are afraid of whatever is coming," said Mohammed Bilkheir, an accountant escaping Tripoli with his family. He said he was leaving to stay with relatives in the western mountains, fearing battles would break out in Tripoli.

Tripoli residents heading south said life was becoming increasingly difficult, with rising food prices, shortages of fuel and cash, as well as power cuts. Drivers took backroads to avoid being stopped by regime forces, they said.

Toward the end of their journey, they stopped at a desert checkpoint near the mountain range, registering their names with rebel troops before moving on. More than 150 families have made the drive south on Monday, said a rebel fighter keeping the list.

# Judge Halts Live Broadcasts of Mubarak Trial

**CAIRO** • The judge trying ousted Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak on charges of complicity in the killing of protesters who toppled his regime ordered a halt to the live broadcast of his trial Monday after a chaotic session in which lawyers pushed, shoved and scuffled to get on television.

Showing the hearings live on state television had been a nod by Judge Ahmed Rifaa to activists who complained that the military rulers now in charge of the country were dragging their feet bringing Mubarak and stalwarts of his regime to justice.

"The aim is to remove the humiliation. Now, God knows how long it (the trial) will take," said best-selling novelist and prominent rights activist Alaa el-Aswany.

The decision was met with suspicion by Ramadan Ahmed, father of a 16-year-old protester killed during the 18-day uprising that toppled the regime.

"This is not correct. How can I be reassured and feel the justice," said Ahmed, who was refused access to the courtroom. "I want to see justice realized before my eyes."

Rifaat said his decision to

stop the broadcasts was designed to "protect the public interest." He did not elaborate, but the presence of cameras, television commentators and journalists interviewing lawyers had given the trial a circus-like atmosphere.

Lawyers for the victims' families bickered over their turns to address the judge and came close to exchanging blows with Mubarak

supporters, all in front of the television cameras. Some among them just waved and smiled to the cameras.

"The decision is meant to stop the lust (that) people in the courtroom are showing for getting on television," said lawyer Mukhtar Noah, who represents the families of more than 200 victims.

"It was not a political decision."

Mubarak, who ruled Egypt unchallenged for 29 years, also faces charges of corruption together with his two sons — one-time heir apparent Gamal and wealthy businessman Alaa.

He could face the death penalty if convicted of complicity in the killing of 850 protesters thought to have been shot or run over by security forces during the uprising.

The trial was adjourned until Sept. 5.

# Cameron: Riot-hit UK Must Reverse 'Moral Collapse'

**LONDON** • Britain must confront a culture of laziness, irresponsibility and selfishness that fueled four days of riots which left five people dead, thousands facing criminal charges and hundreds of millions in damages, Prime Minister David Cameron acknowledged Monday.

As rival political leaders staked out their response to England's unrest, Cameron pledged to deliver a raft of new policies by October aimed at reversing the "slow-motion moral collapse" which he blames for fostering the disorder.

"This has been a wake-up call for our country. Social problems that have been festering for decades have exploded in our face," Cameron told an audience at a youth center in Witney, his Parliamentary district in southern England. "Just as people last week wanted criminals robustly confronted on our street, so they want to see these social problems taken on and defeated."

Work and Pensions Secretary Iain Duncan Smith said Monday he was checking whether those involved in the riots should have their welfare payments cut, while London mayor Boris Johnson said the young people convicted in the disorder would lose their right to use public transportation for free.

Cameron pledged to end a culture of timidity in discussing family breakdown or poor parenting, or in criticizing those who fail to

set a good example to their children or community.

"We have been too unwilling for too long to talk about what is right and what is wrong," Cameron said. "We have too often avoided saying what needs to be said, about everything from marriage to welfare to common courtesy."

In a rival speech, main opposition Labour Party leader Ed Miliband criticized Cameron's response as overly simplistic, and demanded that lawmakers focus on delivering better opportunities for disaffected young people.

"The usual politicians' instinct — announce a raft of new legislation, appoint a new adviser, wheel out your old prejudices and shallow answers — will not meet the public's demand," said Miliband.

He spoke at his former high school in Camden, north London, half a block from the scene of rioting Aug. 8, when shops were trashed and police came under attack.

"Are issues like education and skills, youth services, youth unemployment important for diverting people away from gangs, criminality, the wrong path? Yes, they matter," Miliband said.

The differing approaches to Britain's most serious riots in a generation are likely to dominate the country's annual political conventions, which begin next month. Miliband has called for a full public inquiry into the roots of the riots, while Cameron insists his government is able to adequately examine the issue.

White House event rather than a campaign swing, takes Obama through three states he won in 2008 but where he now needs to shore up his standing. It gives him a chance to return to the grassroots campaigning that helped propel him to the White House, and shed his jacket and tie to mix it up with voters in coffee shops and lunch joints far from the Beltway. The president is traveling in a new \$1.1 million bus purchased by the Secret Service.

In Iowa, Obama returns to a state that handed him a key victory over Democratic rival Hillary Rodham Clinton in their nomination fight but where Republicans have now been blanketing the state in preparation for its first-in-the-nation caucuses, attacking the president at every

turn. The bus tour comes on the heels of Rep. Michele Bachmann's weekend victory in the Iowa Straw Poll and Texas Gov. Rick Perry's contest-rattling entrance into the race.

It also comes after the president spent much of the summer holed up in the nation's capital enmeshed in bitter, partisan negotiations on the debt crisis that cratered his approval ratings and those of Congress amid a faltering economy and high unemployment.

Later in the town-hall meeting, Obama got a question on his signature health care law, and took a hard shot at Mitt Romney, a GOP front-runner who has had to defend implementing a health care plan while governor of Massachusetts that's similar to the federal version.

"You've got a governor who's running for president right now who instituted the exact same thing in Massa-

chusetts," Obama said, referring to a central component of his law — the requirement for nearly everyone to carry health insurance.

"This used to be a Republican idea," Obama said. "It's like suddenly they got amnesia."

In response to a question, Obama also took the chance to counter the anti-government stance embraced by the tea party and largely by the Republican presidential field.

He noted that although government doesn't do everything well, it is responsible for sending a man to the moon and for the military defending the country, among other things.

"When you go to the National Parks and those folks in the hats, that's government," Obama said.

"As frustrated as you are about politics don't buy into this notion that somehow government is what's holding us back," he said.

take heart and rebuild," she said, as the state fair reopened following a one-day closure.

Daniels ordered flags at the fairgrounds flown at half-staff in honor of the victims.

Four of the victims died at the scene: Alina Bigjohny, 23, of Fort Wayne; Christina Santiago, 29, of Chicago; Tammy Vandam, 42, of Wanatah; and 49-year-old Glenn Goodrich of Indianapolis. Nathan Byrd, a 51-year-old stagehand from Indianapolis who was atop the rigging when it fell, died overnight.

Nathan Byrd's older brother Randy Byrd, 54 of Indianapolis, said his brother was always a daredevil. Friends and colleagues knew he would fearlessly scale stage rigs, and dubbed him

"Save-the-Show Nate," Randy Byrd said.

The Byrd family sat at the front of the service, red-eyed and wiping away tears. Nathan Byrd's daughter, Natalie, remembered her father as a man who loved making everyone laugh.

"Nathan meant everything in the world to me," said Loretta Byrd, Nathan's mother.

Santiago managed programming for the Lesbian Community Care Project at Howard Brown Health Center in Chicago and was named to the Windy City Times' "30 Under 30" list in 2007.

Jamal M. Edwards, the center's president and CEO, said she was one of the organization's "brightest stars" and worked to improve the lives of women, especially those who were lesbian, bisexual and transgender. Santiago attended the concert with her partner, Alisha

Brennon, who was severely injured, Edwards said.

Bigjohny had been recently hired to teach seventh grade in Muncie, *The Journal Gazette* of Fort Wayne reported.

Kayla Sollers, 20, attended Manchester College with Bigjohny. She drove down from the campus Monday morning, bringing a sign with pictures of Bigjohny that read "Rejoice in Paradise. Alina Bigjohny."

"She was full of life, energetic and caring," Sollers said.

After the service, the fair quickly reopened, while visitors paid their respects to the five victims.

First Sgt. Dave Bursten of the Indiana State Police said the lack of damage to structures on the fair's midway or elsewhere supported the weather service's belief that an isolated, significant wind gust caused the rigging to topple.



# Studies Show 15 Minutes of Daily Exercise Can Help

**LOS ANGELES** • Don't despair if you can't fit in the recommended 30 minutes of daily exercise. Growing evidence suggests that even half that much can help.

It's still no excuse to slack off. Regular exercise strengthens muscles, reduces the risk of some diseases and promotes mental well-being. The more exercise, the better.

But not everyone has the time or willpower. So researchers set out to find the minimum amount of physical activity needed to reap health benefits. The findings by a study in Taiwan suggest just 15 minutes of moderate exercise a day can lead to a longer life.

This "may convince many individuals that they are able to incorporate physical activity into their busy lives," Dr. Anil Nigam of the University of Montreal said in an email. Nigam had no role in the research but wrote an editorial accompanying the Taiwan study published online Monday in *The Lancet*.

Fitness guidelines by the World Health Organization, the U.S. and other countries recommend that adults get at least a half-hour of moderate workout most days of the week. This can include brisk walking, bike riding and water aerobics.

Realizing that it might be difficult for some to break a sweat, health groups have suggested breaking it down into smaller, more manageable chunks of time such as three 10-minute spurts a day on weekdays.

The latest study, a large one led by researchers at the National Health Research Institutes in Taiwan, sought

to determine if exercising less than the recommended half-hour was still helpful.

The researchers noted that east Asians — including China, Japan and Taiwan — are generally less physically active than their Western counterparts and their workouts tend to be less intense.

About 416,000 Taiwanese adults were asked how much exercise they did the previous month. Based on their answers, they were put into five groups of varying activity levels from inactive to highly active. Researchers kept track of their progress for eight years on average and calculated projected life expectancy.

The study found those who exercised just 15 minutes a day — or 90 minutes a week — cut their risk of death by 14 percent and extended their life expectancy

by three years compared with those who did no exercise. Both men and women benefited equally from the minimum activity.

Each additional 15 minutes of exercise reduced the risk of death by another 4 percent compared with the inactive group. Researchers did not report how additional exercise affected life expectancy.

There were some limitations. Answers were self-reported. The study, though large, was observational, which means the health benefits may not be entirely due to exercise. But researchers said they took into account other factors that might affect health such as smoking and drinking. And outside scientists said the findings are in line with other studies.

For the sedentary, the key is this: Some exercise is bet-

ter than none.

"Get off the couch and start moving," said I-Min Lee of the Harvard School of Public Health.

In a study published in *Circulation* earlier this month, Lee and colleagues found that people who engaged in 15 minutes a day of moderate physical activity had a 14 percent lower risk of heart disease compared with inactive people.

That research, combining the results of nearly three dozen studies of people from North America and Europe, also found that the benefit increased with more activity and may provide more motivation to the physically fit.

People should strive to do the recommended level of exercise, but should not be discouraged if they can't achieve it right away. Start slow and gradually build up.

# NEW PECKING ORDER IN GOP FIELD SHIFTS RACE FOR NEW HAMPSHIRE

**DES MOINES, Iowa** • Suddenly facing two serious rivals, GOP front-runner Mitt Romney declared on Monday his business background sets him apart in the presidential race and dismissed the buzz over emerging challengers as "the political winds of the day." Rick Perry insisted no one could go "toe to toe" with him, and rising star Michele Bachmann tried to turn her Iowa straw poll victory into gains against both men.

In less than a week, the slow-to-begin race for the Republican nomination has accelerated and undergone a dramatic shift, essentially becoming a three-way contest for the chance to challenge President Barack Obama next year.

Romney, who has been riding high for months while other Republicans have been struggling to emerge from the pack, now finds himself facing two significant foes in Perry, the Texas governor who formally entered the race only Saturday, and Bachmann, the Minnesota congresswoman who won the Iowa straw poll that same day.

"It's a wide-open race," Gov. Terry Branstad declared after a five-day stretch that saw every Republican presidential candidate show up in his state, where party caucuses kick off the GOP nomination fight next winter. While Perry entered the nomination battle, former Minnesota Gov. Tim Pawlenty, exited, further reshuffling the deck.

Over the next few months, Romney, Bachmann and Perry will try to

win over a GOP electorate angry at the change Obama has brought and looking for a candidate who has the right mix of credentials to beat the incumbent Democrat.

Romney, who lost the nomination in 2008, hasn't been able to unite warring factions of the GOP electorate since entering the race earlier this year. Social conservatives and the tea party haven't warmed to his candidacy, and he has left some economic conservatives and Republicans in the party establishment underwhelmed. He's focused heavily on New Hampshire and has downplayed his campaign in Iowa, but that may change given that Bachmann and Perry, both of whom have support among the tea party and Christian evangelicals, are competing hard in this state where social conservatives dominate.

By Monday, the three Republicans with the strongest chance of winning the nomination fanned out across early primary states, all looking for the upper hand just as Obama opened a three-day Midwest bus tour.

Romney re-emerged in Litchfield, N.H., and quickly provided a window into how he would address Perry's entry into the race.

"Understanding how the economy works by having worked in the real economy is finally essential in the White House. And I hope people recognize that," Romney said, stressing his years of private business experience and drawing a contrast with Perry, Texas' longest-serving governor who never has worked in the private sector as an adult.

# Record Rains Trap Workers in Flooded NYC Elevator

**NEW YORK** • Two New York City construction workers barely escaped drowning in an elevator as storms dropped record rains over the weekend on parts of the nation's eastern half, washing out roads in New Jersey and forcing a small hospital in Ohio to move patients.

One of the workers, cabinetmaker Ed Tyler, of Milltown, N.J., told The Associated Press on Monday that he and colleague Wendell Amaker, of Roselle, N.J., were happy to be alive after their ordeal.

The storm dropped nearly 8 inches of rain on New York City's Kennedy Airport on Sunday and nearly 5 in Philadelphia, setting city records for any day. At Seabrook Farms, N.J., the

daily total was nearly 11 inches.

In most spots, the effects were bad but not disastrous — sometimes narrowly so, like on New York City's Staten Island, where Tyler and Amaker were moving materials for a senior center being built.

As rain drummed the borough around 9:30 a.m. Sunday, Tyler and Amaker were using an elevator to get supplies to a basement that, unknown to them, was filling up with floodwaters.

After they got in, the doors would not open, though they pressed buttons in vain.

"We hit the water; we heard swishing," Tyler said. Then the water started pouring in.

"I was freaked out — the water was almost chest-high," he said. They feared electrocution and jumped into a rubberized utility cart they had with them.

Of their two cell phones, one was wet and one had no signal. Finally, they decided to break open a ceiling emergency hatch.

Almost an hour after they became trapped, one cell phone suddenly caught a signal and they called 911.

In a few minutes, fire rescuers arrived, shut off power to the elevator and hoisted the men out through the ceiling hatch with a ladder.

"The firefighters told me to go home and take a shower, because the sewage pipes backed up and probably got mixed with the rainwater that came in," Tyler said.

No deaths or serious injuries were reported from the record-breaking cloudbursts, but the region wasn't out of the woods by Monday evening. Flood watches remained in effect as far north as Rhode Island even as the rains moved out to sea.

# Rembrandt Drawing Stolen From California Hotel

**LOS ANGELES** • A 17th Century drawing by Rembrandt was snatched from a private art display at a California luxury hotel while a curator was momentarily distracted, officials said Monday.

The theft of the \$250,000 sketch from the lobby of the Ritz-Carlton Hotel in the up-market seaside community of Marina del Rey happened around 10:30 p.m. Saturday night while someone who seemed interested in buying another piece held the curator's attention for a few minutes.

"When the curator turned

back to the Rembrandt, it was gone," Los Angeles County sheriff's spokesman Steve Whitmore said. It was not clear whether the person talking to the curator was connected to the theft, though Whitman said a team of at least two people was involved.

The sketch, called "The Judgment," was completed around 1655 and is signed on the back by the Dutch master. Rembrandt von Rijn is widely regarded as one of the finest painters in European art history and his worldwide name recognition has made his work a common target for thieves.

"Rembrandt is a name that criminals know or should know," said Chris Marinello,

executive director of the London-based Art Loss Register, an international database of stolen artworks. "When they come across one, they see dollar signs."

Marinello said the theft was likely a crime of opportunity and not an operation carried at the command of a mysterious criminal with a private art collection, as is often depicted in movies.

"Hollywood would love us to believe there are paintings being ordered stolen," he said. "We have yet to find that."

Artworks tend to surface either very quickly after they are stolen or else disappear into the underworld where they are traded between criminals at a fraction of their value.

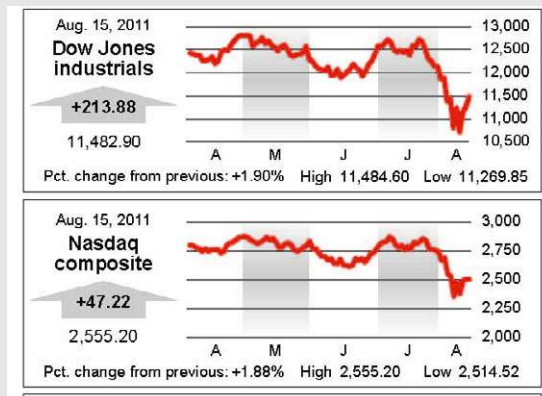

**SAN FRANCISCO** • Google Inc.'s \$12.5 billion deal to buy cellphone maker Motorola Mobility Holdings Inc. is aimed at giving the Internet search leader more legal firepower as it battles Apple Inc. and Microsoft Corp. to gain the upper hand in the increasingly important mobile computing market.

The all-cash acquisition announced Monday is the boldest move in Google's 13-year history.

Besides being by far the largest deal that Google has ever proposed, buying Motorola would push the company into phone and computer tablet manufacturing for the first time.

The proposed deal also is likely to increase government scrutiny on Google at a time when antitrust regulators in the U.S. and Europe already are parsing its business practices to determine whether it has been abusing its power to stifle competition. The inquiries are focused primarily on the company's Internet search and

advertising businesses.

If federal regulators approve the deal, Google CEO Larry Page's ability to avoid a clash of cultures will be tested. With 19,000 workers, Motorola Mobility's workforce isn't that much smaller than Google's payroll of 28,800 employees.

But this is deal more about patents than people.

Google, which is based in Mountain View, Calif., is framing its Motorola acquisition as a way to protect the competitive landscape at a time when Android and the device makers using the

software are facing a litany of lawsuits alleging that Google's operating system pilfered the patent-protected technology of other companies.

Motorola, which introduced its first cell phone nearly 30 years ago, has more than 17,000 patents with another 7,500 still awaiting approval. That trove presumably will give Google and its Android more patent protection against a list of legal antagonists that include three of the technology industry's most powerful companies — Apple, Microsoft and Oracle Corp.

# Sara Lee, Kraft Escalate Wiener War

**CHICAGO** • The nation's two largest hot dog makers took their legal beefs on Monday to federal court, where a judge will determine whether Oscar Mayer or Ball Park franks broke false-advertising laws in their efforts to become top dog.

The battle pits Chicago-area companies Sara Lee Corp., which makes Ball Park franks, against Kraft Foods Inc., which makes Oscar Mayer, in a case that could clarify how far companies can go when boasting that their product is better than a competitor's.

Despite the light-hearted remark by the judge, attorneys for the food makers struck a serious tone.

“There's never been anything of this scope . . . in the

entire history of hot dogs,” said Sara Lee's attorney, Richard Leighton, about what he described as Kraft's false and deceptive ad claims about making a better-tasting frank.

Sara Lee had fired the first volley in a 2009 lawsuit singling out Oscar Mayer ads that brag its dogs beat Ball Park franks in a national taste test. Leighton argued the tests were deeply flawed.

“They were served boiled hot dogs on a white paper plate,” he complained.

Kraft filed its own lawsuit in 2009, alleging that Sara Lee ran false and deceptive ads including a campaign in which Ball Parks are heralded as “America's Best Franks.” The ad further asserts that other hot dogs “aren't even in the same league.”

The budget below shows the actual expenses for FY 2010 and budgeted and actual expenses through July 1, 2011. For FY 2011, the Agency's revenues were again limited to the County's advance of \$18,000. Activities during FY 2011 have been limited to discussions and negotiations with a developer within the Project Area concerning public improvement infrastructure and reimbursement.

This public hearing on the proposed budget is required for formal adoption of the FY 2012 budget. The proposed expenditures and revenues for FY 2012 have been tentatively approved by the Jerome County Urban Renewal Agency Board of Directors on August 4, 2011.

One technical term you might hear at the bridge table is "stripping a hand." This refers to a process of eliminating some of the suits from a hand to reduce the options for a defender when he gets the lead. It may sound complex, but in today's deal, Roselyn Teukolsky demonstrated a route to success by employing the technique perfectly.

Incidentally, note North's three-spade bid, suggesting spade values and a better-than-minimum hand.

Against five diamonds West elected to lead the club ace -- a small slip that allowed Teukolsky to make the contract by force, despite the unfavorable heart distribution. She ruffed the club continuation, played off three rounds of spades, ruffing the third, then crossed to a top trump in dummy to eliminate the clubs. At this point she finally drew the last trump, ending up in dummy. Now she led the heart nine, covered by East with the 10. Roselyn put on the jack, leaving West on play. A heart return would give up the defense's trick there, and either black suit would allow declarer to throw a heart from dummy and crossruff the rest of the tricks.

Notice that on a passive spade opening lead, declarer will probably take the spade ace and lead the club queen from hand. If East is allowed to take this trick and play a heart through declarer, all the tension of the ending is broken up.

In his 105th start, Marcos Ambrose finally got his first checkered flag by topping Brad Keselowski and Kyle Busch on a two-lap dash.

The snakebitten Ambrose, deprived more than once of a NASCAR victory, beat Brad Keselowski and Kyle Busch on a two-lap dash to the checkered flag Monday to win the rain-delayed Sprint Cup race at

Watkins Glen International. Texas A&M Facing 'Lengthy' Realignment Process

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) • Texas A&M is looking into joining the Southeastern Conference, and contemplating remaining in the Big 12. School President R. Bowen Loftin offered his first detailed comments Monday on the Aggies' rather public interest in joining the SEC — a move that almost surely would set off another round of conference realignment. "We've made no decision about terminating our relationship with the Big 12," Loftin said. "This is all about what is best for Texas A&M, along with ... visibility for us and our athletes and financial resources. That's what it's all about. I think anybody in my shoes would have exactly the same kinds of concerns." He said there is no timetable for any decision and any realignment by Texas A&M will take place after a "lengthy" process. He acknowledged that Texas A&M had approached the

SEC, which has won the last five BCS championships in football but on Sunday reaffirmed its 12-school membership while leaving the door open to expansion. "There is no bid," Loftin said. "There has never been a bid to invite us into the SEC at any time in the past and if it were to occur in the future, we would certainly want to evaluate that." Loftin met with reporters shortly after receiving authority from the board of regents to take any action he deems necessary in terms of realignment. He said Texas A&M is looking only at the SEC right now, but didn't rule out other possibilities. "It's not so much what's wrong with the Big 12, it's what's right for Texas A&M and where we want to go in time," he said. The Big 12 will begin the football season in a few weeks with 10 teams after Nebraska (Big Ten) and Colorado (Pac-12) left in July, a year after a seismic shift in conference alignment.

After 1-8 Season, Raft River Seeks Redemption

MALTA • It's hardly worth mentioning. Raft River's 1-8 season last year was such an abnormality that it ranks somewhere between a blue moon and lightning striking twice on the Rarity Scale. A small blip on the Idaho high school football powerhouse's otherwise tradition-rich radar, it was Raft River's first losing season in 11 years. Between 1999 and 2009, the Trojans boasted a .815 winning percentage with two state titles, two state runner-up trophies and three third-place finishes. Quarterback Tanner Anderson and running back Emmet Boden return to lead Raft River's offense. In addition, Zach Zollinger and Joel Andreason are expected to make an impact on both sides of the ball. "We're just trying not to worry about what we did last year and just work harder and improve," Andreason said. "This year we have more experience and we should be able to step up our game."

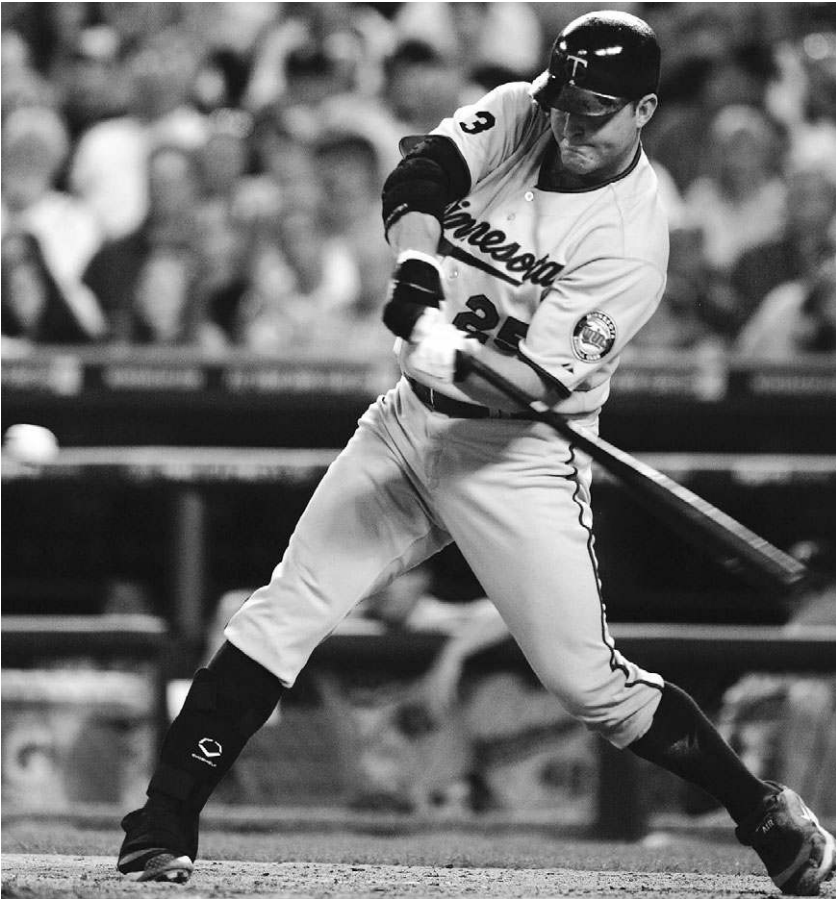
Thome became the eighth major league player to reach 600, hitting a three-run shot off Daniel Schlereth in the seventh inning to give Minnesota a 9-5 lead.

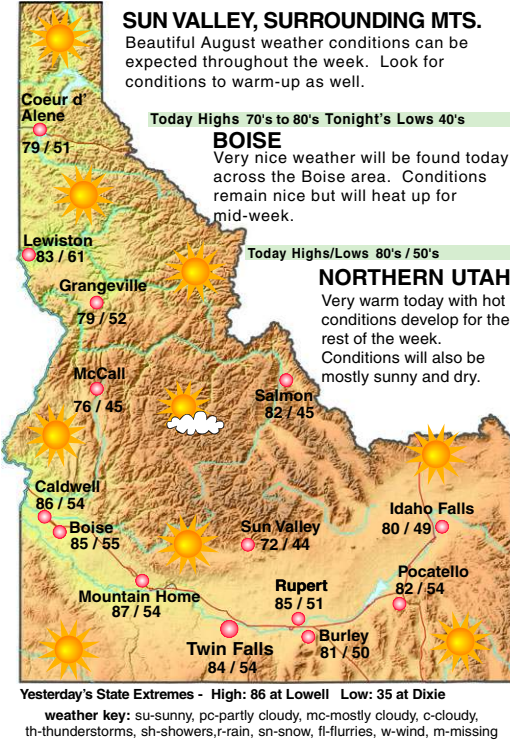

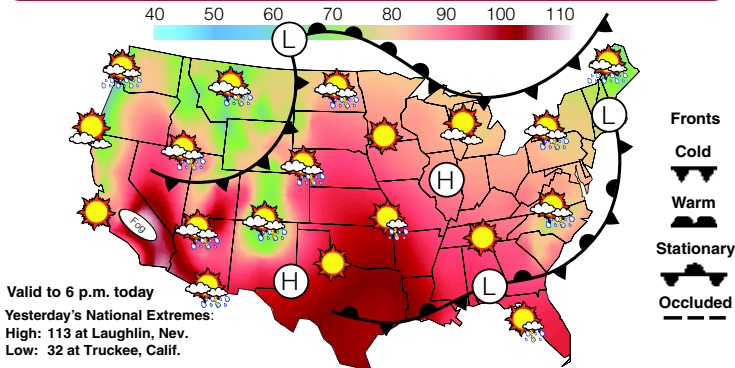

Tennessee. "When I was in college football, they shaved me bald — the whole incoming freshman class. A bunch of big guys grabbed you and shaved your head."

The Jacksonville Jaguars banned rookie hazing this year, saying it had gone too far. In recent years, rookies had been taped to goal posts, covered in baby powder, tossed in a cold tub and forced to accept ugly haircuts.

In professional baseball, rookies get a much milder treatment — no shaving, no forced haircuts, no taping to stationary objects.

"I don't even know if hazing would be the proper term to use as far as baseball

is concerned," said Rockies manager Jim Tracy, whose rookie indoctrination involved wearing a gaudy suit.

Whatever it's called in baseball, it's changing, too.

With young players taking on more prominent roles, they're getting treated more like equals in the clubhouse these days. Veterans say the latest rookie classes have been singled out far less than in the past.

"Because the game seems to be getting younger and younger, a lot of that stuff has totally changed," said Reds pitcher Bronson Arroyo, who was forced to fetch drinks for veterans during the middle of the night at team hotels when he was a Pirates rookie.

"There's a lot less going on." And most welcome it.

"It's changed," Orioles

manager Buck Showalter said. "In fact, I'm kind of glad it changed. I've never been a big fan of the whole thing."

Marlins infielder Wes Helms had to carry veterans' luggage onto team flights and serve them on the plane when he was a rookie.

"There's definitely less than when I came up," Helms said. "Now, you don't really have anything as far as making them do anything stupid throughout the year to embarrass themselves."

How rookies are treated depends upon the veterans in charge. Most teams force rookies to dress in embarrassing costumes for a road trip late in the season. They might be ordered to sing or dance at the front of the team bus.

Paul Konerko of the White Sox thinks rookie hazing shouldn't make a newcomer feel uncomfortable.

"I remember when I was a rookie, people made me feel uncomfortable, maybe crossed the line," said Konerko, who broke in with the Dodgers in 1997. "When that happens, when that player gets older, he says, 'I'm not going to do that because I know how it felt.' Or, 'I can't wait to do it to someone.' It's one of the two, and I think I'm the first one."

A lot of players see baseball's rookie treatment as something to be appreciated.

Seahawks' LeGree Anxious to Build a New Foundation

RENTON, Wash. • All the work leading up to the NFL draft was over. Mark LeGree, despite playing at Appalachian State, knew he would get a shot at playing in the pros after being taken in the fifth round by the Seattle Seahawks.

There was just the pesky lockout delaying the start of his professional career and blocking any money from coming into his wallet.

"I had a little bit of money left over and I was waiting for the lockout to end but I was getting low on my funds," LeGree said. "I was like 'I have to find a job.'"

So LeGree placed a phone call to Phil Washburn, co-owner of Capehart and Washburn, a general contracting firm in Boone, N.C. The previous summer, LeGree spent some of the time between his junior and senior seasons at Appalachian State working for the company, doing a variety of construction jobs.

But now he was bound for the NFL and the last person Washburn expected to hear from just a few weeks after the draft.

"He left me a message over the weekend, saying 'you know about the lock-out and I'm just laying around,' " Washburn recalled in a phone interview. "He was still doing his morning workouts every day, but I was happy to have him back."

LeGree's decision to spend some of the lockout doing manual labor speaks to the background of the 22-year-old free safety. He went to high school at Pacelli High School in Columbus, Ga., with just 28 kids in his graduating class. He only landed at Appalachian State by making a video of his high school accomplishments and sending it to the Mountaineers' coaches.

So doing a little construction work in the summer, if it meant a few more dollars in his pocket, was an easy decision to make even with a relatively large payday awaiting once the lockout was lifted.

Pirates, Top Pick Come to Terms

NEW YORK • A person familiar with the negotiations tells The Associated Press that UCLA pitcher Gerrit Cole and the Pittsburgh Pirates agreed late Monday night to a minor league contract with an \$8 million signing bonus.

The person spoke on condition of anonymity because the deal has not yet been announced.

Cole had been among 23 first-round draft picks facing a midnight deadline to reach agreements with major

league teams.

Cole is represented by agent Scott Boras, who was negotiating for the top pick for the third straight year after reaching agreements with Washington for pitcher Stephen Strasburg (\$15.1 million over four years) and outfielder Bryce Harper (\$9.9 million over five years).

Boras also was trying to reach deals for the fifth and sixth picks. High school outfielder Bubba Starling was taken by Kansas City with the No. 5 selection and Rice third baseman Anthony Rendon went next to Washington.

Just 10 of the 33 players taken on the first round June 6 had reached agreements entering Monday, including just one of the first nine picks: No. 3 Trevor Bauer, a teammate of Cole's on the UCLA pitching staff, agreed July 25 to a \$4.45 million, four-year contract with the Arizona Diamondbacks.

The Aug. 15 deadline, in its fifth year, applies to players taken in the draft who have remaining college eligibility. Agents have said that in many cases teams won't start negotiations until shortly before the deadline.

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
