Tussle over Redistricting Puts Idaho Voters in Limbo

BOISE • More than 700,000 registered voters are in political limbo because the panel drawing up Idaho's new legislative and congressional boundaries hasn't agreed on a final map.

In the end, the Idaho Supreme Court may decide the issue.

If no map is adopted before Sept. 6, here's a likely scenario: Secretary of State Ben Ysursa could file a lawsuit with state high court justices charging the sixmember redistricting commission with violating the state Constitution. The Supreme Court would likely order panelists back to Boise for another try.

And if the May 15, 2012 primary election approaches with still no agreement in sight, the justices could draw their own plan, as a last resort.

"They can do whatever they want to do," Tim Hurst, Ysursa's


top deputy, told The Associated Press. "I'm not guessing what they'll do."

During the 2001 redistricting, multiple lawsuits ended up in justices' hands, delaying the map until March 2002 — just before the primary election filing deadline.

A new map will be based on this foundation: Urban areas that grew faster during the last decade will pick up representatives, while Idaho's rural spaces will see power diluted.

But Idaho's sparse population and unorthodox shape, from its forested northern panhandle to its border with Nevada and Utah, don't exactly lend themselves to crisp, uniform legislative or congressional districts. Moving one boundary just a hair north or south can throw the best-made plan off kilter.

WATCH FOR CHILDREN

Police Remind Motorists to Slow Down in School Zones, Watch for Students

Twin Falls police want to remind students, parents and all motorists to take extra precautions around school zones as the new academic year begins soon.

The speed limit at most elementary, middle school and high school zones in the city is 20 mph, and police maintain their "Zero Tolerance" policy for those who choose to ignore the law. School zones are in effect from 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays. Some zones are equipped with a flashing yellow light to alert motorists that the reduced speed is in effect. The fine for speeding in a school zone is \$151.50.

Officer Luke Allen said the department issued 47 school zone citations – which include a harsher fine than a regular speeding citation – from Aug. 30, 2010, to June 3. That figure dropped drastically from the 2009-10 academic year, in which 198 citations were written. Allen noted that an officer has discretion over when to issue a citation.

Drivers should also watch for students crossing the street in school zones, and for the crossing guards on duty at elementary schools to better ensure student safety.

Two Sides in Parks and Rec Budget Change

The Twin Falls Parks and Recreation Department saw 15 percent of its budget disappear in an hour at last week's city council meeting. And with more than \$800,000 in other city-wide line items being questioned, tonight may see even more cuts.

Clyde Thomsen Park in Twin Falls was the first new city-built park in Twin Falls in more than 15 years, coincidentally, about the age it is now.

It features a looping asphalt path, with the asphalt laid directly onto the ground when it was built. Today, the trail is showing its age: Cracks slither through it and its edges are becoming jagged and broken from heavy lawnmowers trimming too close.

Replacing it was a goal of city Parks and Recreation Director Dennis Bowyer in the upcoming year. He got \$140,000 set aside for the work in the preliminary city budget, only to have it yanked away when the city council started tweaking the proposal. The cash was formally pulled and voted on last week when the council went on a flurry of lineitem cuts that left Bowyer's department with a collective 15 percent decrease in funding. He said he'll try to get the path repaved this year at a substantially lower

cost, with the complete rework, including making the asphalt flush with the ground, now a goal for the future.

"We're still hoping we can do this, but maybe pushed back four or five years," he said.

The council started diving into next year's budget line-by-line last week, looking for savings after several members of the community railed against the possibility of higher property taxes, even if the cash would have been set aside for road maintenance. *Please see* **BUDGET, Ma** If You Go

The **Twin Falls City Council** will continue its discussion of the upcoming fiscal year's budget. The most recent turn in the debate has council members looking at individual line items as they search for ways to better fund road maintenance without raising and possibly even reducing — city property taxes.

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Peace Corps Volunteers on a Quest for Due Process

Lawmakers and crime victims have complained that the Peace Corps suffers from a 'blame-the-victim' culture.

A Peace Corps volunteer had been raped in Bolivia and wanted justice. Within hours, Julie De Mello was on an airplane from Washington to meet the victim.

De Mello, employed by the Peace Corps inspector general as a senior federal agent investigating crimes against volunteers, worked with the 23-year-old victim, Erin Bingham, to sketch the attacker. De Mello went with Bingham to a police lineup, hired a lawyer to represent her and worked with local police to track down witnesses. De Mello believes her advocacy helped convict the rapist in 2008. He was sentenced to 10 years in prison.

Today, a Peace Corps volunteer who is the victim of a violent crime is likely to get a far less aggressive U.S. government response. De Mello quit three years ago, after the agency grounded her and the four other investigators who routinely traveled abroad to help local police investigate.

The Peace Corps in 2008 moved the responsibility for working with local police from the inspector general's office to its own in-country security staffers, most of whom have little or no law enforcement training but who are already on the scene in the host countries. After the change, the rate of prosecutions in sex crimes involving volunteers dropped slightly, records show.

Peace Corps officials say the system is working, and spokeswoman Allison Price said it is difficult to draw conclusions from incomplete statistics kept by the agency. She said the decision to move crime response to local security staffs "was made to ensure a proper alignment of functions," but she declined to elaborate.

"We take the security of all volunteers seriously," said Edward Hobson, chief of the Peace Corps' Office of Safety and Security and a Please see DUE PROCESS, M2

COMMERCIAL TRUCK BREAKS THROUGH MEDIAN, SPILLS PIPING ON I-84 NEAR JEROME

Interstate 84 near Jerome was shut down for several hours Sunday when a commercial truck driver veered into the opposite lanes of travel and spilled a load of 50-foot piping.

Chang-Yi Huang, 42, of Brooklyn, N.Y., was traveling westbound on I-84 at about 8 a.m. Sunday when he became distracted, according to an Idaho State Police media release. Huang then drove off the shoulder, overcorrected, drove through the median and came to a rest facing westbound in the eastbound lanes. He spilled his load in the westbound lanes in the process.

Huange was taken to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center in Twin Falls by ground ambulance, where he was treated and released with minor injuries. He was wearing a seatbelt.

The eastbound lanes were partially blocked by the wreck for about four hours. The westbound lanes were completely blocked for about 5.5 hours. ISP is investigating the crash.

More decisions like those affecting Bowyer's department may happen at tonight's Twin Falls City Council meeting, where further budget discussions appear to be the big topic. Last week, council members asked for more information on – or the defense of – more than \$800,000 in proposed city spending. The total budget is currently set at \$46.2 million, which includes a \$380,000 increase that the council added so it has wiggle room in the last weeks of the budgeting process. The total spending in the budget can still be lowered.

The budget questions from the council range from \$10,000 for utility vehicles to discussion on \$135,000 set aside for three new police cruisers. Other cost cutting proposals, such as replacing travel for training with online classes and decreasing the miscellaneous contingency line item, were also discussed last week with the council.

former forensic investigator in Orlando. "If a volunteer chooses to pursue legal options after a crime, we stand beside them every step of the way."

Victims and critics say the change was among many missteps the Peace Corps has made in protecting its 8,655 volunteers and trainees. The humanitarian organization, which this year celebrates its 50th anniversary, has come under fire in recent months for its handling of sexual assaults and the death of a volunteer in West Africa. The young woman, Kate Puzey, was killed days after she told Peace Corps staff that a fellow teacher was molesting students.

In May, Peace Corps Director Aaron S. Williams acknowledged problems and promised changes at a congressional hearing, where lawmakers and crime victims complained that the Peace Corps suffers from a "blamethe-victim" culture.

Rep. Ted Poe, R-Texas, chief House sponsor of a bill that would force the Peace Corps to give sexual assault victims more support, said in an interview that he did not know the Peace Corps had shifted responsibility for crime investigations to in-country security personnel.

"It would seem to me that in criminal cases, you need trained officers responding rather than people who have other duties," he said.

Peace Corps staff members operate in each of the 77 developing countries where volunteers are posted. They function separately from the U.S. embassies and include security officers who handle many duties. Often, they have no law enforcement background.

Former agents and inspectors general at the Peace Corps said they believe that shifting responsibility to the security staff lessened the chances general's office handled the cases; the percentage remains the same today.

But the drop in sexual assault cases that result in prosecutions — from about 60 percent to 46 percent, according to figures provided to a congressional committee — underscores what critics call a serious step back for volunteers.

Inspector General Kathy A. Buller last year questioned how effectively the current system is in protecting volunteers. In a report, Buller wrote that the "lack of a comprehensive security policy" could not "ensure consistent support to volunteers."

But Buller, who was hired in 2008, said in a statement that her office should not be investigating crimes and that the shift of responsibility was appropriate. Otherwise, she said, her office "would be responsible for reviewing a program under its administration," creating a conflict.

Peace Corps officials say they have made improvements that Buller recommended: Local security programs are now reviewed more thoroughly, and security staffs are offered online training, they said.

The inspector general's office first took responsibility for investigations in 2003 as the Peace Corps faced several unsolved slayings. Walter Poirier, a volunteer in Bolivia, disappeared in 2001 and was never found. Congressional auditors and news accounts criticized the Peace Corps' response.

The inspector general's office hired local lawyers and signed an agreement with the Defense Department to perform autopsies when a volunteer died. Legal cases were laid out in detail in reports to Congress. Dozens of cases were prosecuted.

Julia Campbell, a volunteer from Fairfax County, Va., disappeared in 2007 in a remote village in the Philippines. She was found slain 10 days later. An investigator trained in criminal searches broke the case, working with

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unwieldy districts like District 31 in southeastern Idaho, where travel often requires detouring through Wyoming. The two-year-old law encourages legislative districts containing more than one county to be linked by state highways.

Meanwhile, Democrats argue the roads provision undercuts the Idaho Constitution's mandate for them to avoid splitting up the state's 44 counties.

"Our plan is as nearly constitutionally perfect as we could get," said Moses, a Boise union organizer.

Esposito, a campaign consultant to GOP lawmakers including U.S. Rep. Raul Labrador, said the Democrats' insistence on this point creates the same problems that plagued the last redistricting: A mammoth megadistrict in northern and central Idaho stretching almost from Lake Pend Oreille to Riggins, about 250 miles.

"Ultimately, it might take a court decision to find out if something is constitutional," Esposito said. "I'm hoping it doesn't come to that."

Last Wednesday — in advance of a scheduled break until Aug. 30 — Frasure met privately with Anderson, while Finman sat down behind closed doors with Kane, for several hours in what the panel called "sidebar conversations." The line of thinking? A little oneon-one time, far from the glare of live Internettelevised hearings at the Idaho Capitol — and scrutiny from feverish party mates who would look askance at their commissioners giving too much ground — could result in progress.

Afterward, Frasure left hope that there will be a last-minute deal.

"I didn't come here to fail," he said. "I am putting on a brand-new set of glasses." that crimes will be solved.

"We just felt like this was going to be a travesty and tragedy for volunteers to not have an advocate," De Mello said.

Peace Corps volunteers always have faced dangers abroad. Volunteers reported more than 1,000 rapes, attempted rapes and sexual assaults from 2000 to 2010, statistics show. Because many crimes go unreported, Peace Corps officials believe the real numbers are higher.

But when volunteers become crime victims, the U.S. government cannot prosecute in a foreign country. It can, however, pressure local authorities – as the federal agents did. That responsibility now falls to the Peace Corps' local security officers. U.S. Embassy staffers may help, but their resources are limited.

Volunteers in developing countries often deal with police officers who are overloaded with work and undertrained, and they get no special treatment. "A ÃPeace CorpsÄ volunteer would not be any higher on the totem pole than anyone in the country who was a victim of a violent crime," said Henry Mulzac, a former detective who worked on the inspector general's team.

The Peace Corps contends that the number of arrests in crimes against volunteers has remained about the same since responsibilities were shifted. About a third of the reported cases resulted in arrests when the inspector the Philippine army. Campbell's killer was sentenced to 40 years in prison.

But by 2008, Peace Corps leaders concluded that the watchdog office should drop the investigative role. Then-Director Ronald A. Tschetter said local police should handle criminal investigations. The inspector general should focus on waste, fraud and abuse, he said.


Geoffrey A. Johnson, then the acting inspector general, argued that Tschetter's approach would not be as effective. "The majority of law enforcement agencies where Peace Corps programs operate are severely understaffed, undertrained, underpaid and ill-equipped," he wrote in protest in a memo to Tschetter.

Volunteers and their families have continued to complain about problems dealing with local police forces, and some believe the decision to rely on in-country security staffs has seriously hampered the quest for justice.

Bingham, the volunteer raped in Bolivia, allowed The Washington Post to use her name in praising the work of DeMello. (The Post normally does not identify victims of sexual assault.)

Without a trained investigator, she said, her case would have languished. Prosecutors in the small city where she was attacked had never tried someone for rape — let alone used DNA evidence in court, DeMello said.

"Julie was so experienced," Bingham said. "She fought so hard for me in all aspects."



Sheriff: No Sign of Foul Play in Couple's Death

BOISE (AP) • A law enforcement official says investigators have found no sign of foul play involving the deaths of a Meridian couple missing for three weeks whose bodies were found late Friday in a remote area near the central Idaho city of Lowman.

Boise County Sheriff Ben Roeber says the couple's vehicle apparently went off a narrow gravel road over an embankment of about 60 to

80 feet and rolled before coming to rest on its tires.

Roeber says 81-year-old Charles Rigg and 77-yearold Barbara Rigg apparently survived the crash because their bodies were found outside the vehicle. He says it's unclear how long they lived after the accident.

Roeber says the couple's white schnauzer named Sassy was found alive in the area and returned to the family.

Police Seek Witnesses After SF Stadium Shootings

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) • Police interviewed witnesses and looked for suspects Sunday after two men were shot and wounded following a San Francisco 49ers-Oakland Raiders preseason game, while the NFL and the mayors of the two cities jointly called for an end to "intimidation" and acts of violence at sporting events.

Saturday night's shooting in the parking lot at Candlestick Park evoked memories of another recent disturbing act of post-game violence involving two rival California pro sports teams — the near-fatal beating in March of a San Francisco Giants fan outside Dodger Stadium.

In Saturday's attacks, a 24-year-old man, who reportedly was wearing a "F—the Niners" T-shirt, remained hospitalized in serious condition Sunday after being shot several times in the stomach.

He had managed to stumble to Candlestick Park stadium security for help despite the severe injuries, police said.

A second victim, a 20-year-old man, was treated for less serious wounds in a separate shooting, also after the game.



Teton H.S. Player's Concussions Prompt Awarness, Prevention

Teton High School football player Kort Breckenridge sustained a series of concussions six years ago and now suffers from brain damage. New cognitive testing has become more common among high school sports as concussion research has accelerated over the past five years.

DRIGGS • Six years have passed since a series of concussions nearly killed Teton High School football player Kort Breckenridge.

Memories of Breckenridge collapsing on the field, the emergency brain surgery that saved his life and his permanent brain damage prompted the Teton County School District to take action.

Last week in the high school gym, senior quarterback Logan Petersen stood on one foot with his eyes closed as Caroline Faure clicked a stopwatch. Faure ran Petersen and the other 50 Teton varsity and JV football players through several balance tests, noting each time a player lost balance.

The tests were difficult, but the players weren't competing against one another. Instead, their performance gave Faure a baseline to test each player against if they take a hard hit or show symptoms of a concussion.

Petersen said he sees Breckenridge limp while walking the sidelines at football games. He hears Breckenridge's slurred speech. He said he'll gladly struggle through a few awkward tests to ward off long-term consequences. tests) will help out."

Faure has tackled concussions in youth sports as a personal crusade. An assistant professor at Idaho State University and the founder of the Center for Sports Concussions at ISU, Faure also ran the Teton players through a neurocognitive test in the school computer lab.

The ImPACT test — the same test used by the NFL — measured players' attention span, reaction time and working memory, the first cognitive faculties diminished by concussions.

If a player takes a hard hit, he must take the test a few days later or when symptom-free. If a player's scores are in line with the baseline test, the player returns to the field. Scores below the baseline show lingering symptoms, meaning the player must sit out at least until the score returns to the baseline. Neurocognitive testing has become more common in high school sports as concussion research has accelerated over the past five years. Players from 23 Idaho high school football teams take the neurocognitive test, including players from Twin Falls, Wood River, Teton, Salmon, Idaho Falls and Skyline high schools. Teton, however, is the first district in the state to mandate the tests.

Breckenridge struggles to remember anything for longer than 15 minutes, and he may need supervision the rest of his life. But he's alert and pleased that his alma mater is ahead of the curve. Teton also tested its boys and girls soccer teams and will test the basketball and wrestling teams in the winter

and pitched a bill to the Idaho House of Representatives aiming to curb concussions in high school sports.

Breckenridge spoke on the House floor about how surgeons removed the right hemisphere of his skull, and how his brain ballooned beyond his ear.

He spoke about talking to God as he lay in an induced coma for two weeks.

"Kort's Law," as Faure's bill was known, had three legs. The first leg mandated concussion training for all youth coaches and required concussion information to be available for all players and parents. The second mandated instant removal from competition and practice for any symptomatic player. The third required clearance from a medical professional for the player to return.

Lawmakers passed only the first leg into law. Faure was frustrated that the language about the required training was weak and lacked criteria, but she said it gives her something to build on.

Idaho schools are making progress toward pulling concussed players off the field and preventing subsequent and more devastating injuries. Teton football coach Bill Vasas said he's wiser to concussion symptoms than he was three years ago even though he wasn't Kort Breckenridge's coach in 2005.

Last year, the Teton coaching staff identified two players with concussions and held them out of competition.

"They've done a great job educating us what to look for," Vasas said. "It's not just the big hits and the things you associate a concussion with. It's the little symptoms you don't even think about. Now, we can look at a kid and say, 'OK, maybe he's a little bit off. We'll check him."

Coaches aren't doctors. Testing gives coaches a new tool and a way to explain to a symptomatic kid or a frustrated parent why Johnny has to sit out.

But testing doesn't solve the biggest problem in preventing second and third concussions – convincing players to report the first one.

Looking back, Ray Breckenridge said his son had at least 10 concussions between seventh and 12th grade. As a registered nurse, Ray Breckenridge saw the hits during games, then saw the symptoms at home.

But Kort hid his symptoms as well as he could. A mostly honest kid, he lied to coaches and his father when they questioned why he was rubbing his eyes or uncharacteristically moody or when an A grade fell to a D.

Vomiting after contact is

one of the most clear-cut symptoms. Only after Breckenridge can be life-altering. Teton athletes have a taste of that reality because of Brecken-

ridge.

what's at stake.

Only after Breckenridge nearly died did his teammates come forward with stories about him vomiting behind the bus after games.

Susan Thompson's five sons have played in the Redskin program. Two suffered concussions.

As Faure ran players through the tests, Thompson said she had no faith that her sons would report a concussion even after hearing Faure detail the long-term risks.

"They are boys," she said. "They are supposed to be tough, so probably not. That's the scariest part."

Which raises the million dollar question: If Kort Breckenridge was a senior today instead of 2005, would he be forced off the field to prevent the sequence of concussions that nearly killed him?

Ray Breckenridge said yes. "No question," he said.

"The testing picks up on things that you can't fake. I'm convinced if we'd had that in place, we would have picked up those subtle changes early enough that we could have eluded the major ordeal."

Don't Let Politicians Drive an ATV into Wildlife Management

Professional fish and game management was a hardwon achievement in Idaho. Let's not throw it away.

hould Idaho turn hunters riding ATVs loose to go where they will in the Idaho backwoods? Maybe, or maybe not. That's a wildlife management decision.

But legislation to accomplish the same thing could go a long way toward dragging the Idaho Department of Fish and Game back into politics.

It took decades for Idaho to build firewalls between politicians and professional game managers. For the first 39 years of Fish and Game's history, legislators, county commissioners, the governor and just about anyone else with political influence could and did call up the state game warden and tell him how to do his job.

And who to hire.

Every time Idahoans got a new governor, they got a new Fish and Game Department from director down to conservation officers, with little regard for any qualifications in managing wildlife.

And it goes without saying that those local game wardens sometimes took their orders from someone other than their supervisors at Fish and Game.

Finally, Idahoans had enough. In 1938, they began signing petitions for a voter initiative to turn management of Fish and Game over to a board of commissioners, appointed by the governor but independent in their management. That fall, the measure passed by a 3-to-1 margin.

The following year, the commission hired its first professional director and implemented a merit system for choosing employees.


In the 72 years since, governors have occasionally tried to chip away at the independence of the commission, but by and large politicians have kept out of game management.

Now they're knocking on the door again.

In the next legislation session, state Sen. Tim Corder, R-Mountain Home, is likely to reintroduce bills that would strip the state's wildlife management agency of much of its authority to regulate where hunters can steer ATVs on state, U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management territory.

Last winter's proposed legislation, which was shelved in the Senate Resources and Conservation Committee, would have curbed Fish and Game's ability to regulate where hunters can drive their vehicles in a third of its 99 hunting units.

Not surprisingly Fish and Game took exception to that, viewing Corder's bills as an attempt to undermine its capability to manage Idaho's trophy mule deer, elk and other big game as it sees fit. Under current hunting regulations, the state requires armed hunters who head out onto public land in about a third of Idaho's 99 hunting units to stick to established roads, while keeping away from off-road vehicle or jeep trails and areas that are otherwise open to unarmed recreational ATV riders.



When Being Jus' Folks is Hard Work

ant to be authentic? Good luck! These days it takes deliberate effort, focus, even a long-term commitment to change. This might sound surprising to those of you who associate authenticity with just being yourself, but misconceptions about authenticity abound, not least among them the idea that it comes naturally to everyone.

Then again, I'm referring not to the traditional definition of authenticity, but its expanded contemporary definition. Call it "aw, shucks authenticity." Instead of "true to one's own personality, spirit or character" (Webster's words), it's more like " successfully evoking a culturally agreed-upon idea of ordinariness." That is, rolling one's sleeves up to one's elbows or convincingly wearing plaid shirts, being "plain-spoken," or displaying small-town roots as proof of trustworthiness.

I exaggerate, but only slightly. Somehow authenticity has gone from a broad term about candor and genuineness to a code word for chimerical perceptions of simple American values and a simple, even rural middle-American life. Never mind that there's nothing simple about life in rural America and never mind that concerns about authenticity are a hallmark of existentialist philosophy, which doesn't necessarily jibe with the Wal-Mart meme. It's still managed to become a staple of advertising and self-help discourse (eat authentic tapas! achieve authentic happiness!) and, especially in its aw-shucks form, a major factor in the 2012 political races.



These days the word is thrown around so profligately you'd think that all other traits once considered political assets - experience, intelligence, leadership – pale in comparison to conveying the impression of being an ordinary Joe. In 2008, the Palin campaign made the aw-shucks ethos its calling card, but it was there even before she joined the fray (remember Hillary Rodham Clinton drinking shots in an Indiana bar or Obama's sad attempt at bowling?).

Now, we're swimming in "authentic" candidates. Just the other day, Michele Bachmann told a crowd in Iowa, "I'm a real person, not a politician." Earlier this month a Politico article about Sen. Rand Paul's support for his father's campaign described the need for "an anti-establishment, authentic candidate." The Atlantic Wire wrote

for the bogus is easily scrambled. Once we were drawn to glamorous public figures we could put on a pedestal; today we prefer to idolize those we can see as just like us. To describe someone as "down to earth" is high praise. But to run for president (or to even consider it), requires more hubris, energy and ambition than people "just like us" could ever muster. Sure, some politicians come by some their awshucks qualities honestly. Some legitimately prefer pulled pork to poached salmon (that would be you, Bill Clinton). But most are, for better or worse, "extraordinary" each in his or her own way. No matter how humble they try to appear, running for president is an intrinsically unhumble pursuit.

And that's just part of the problem with this new definition of authenticity. Not only is it artifice, and hence a contradiction, it's downright exclusionary. It forgets that mean people can be authentically mean, shallow people can be authentically shallow and snobby people can be authentically snobby. John F. Kennedy, for instance, a real American hero president, was authentic all right - authentically rich, Harvard-educated and privileged – but he definitely wasn't a plaid-shirt guy. Putting aside his politics, can you imagine him winning an election today? Can you imagine him (or, say, George H.W. Bush for that matter) pandering to Tea Party sensibilities by employing folksy aphorisms, bowling or entering a mud wrestling match for most authentic Christian? I can't. But even if you can, surely we can all admit that authenticity these days is less an innate state than a high-maintenance hairstyle. All that time in front of the mirror, when the nation has bigger things to worry about.

This is an explosive issue among hunters themselves. Some outdoorsmen think riding down game on a snarling ATV violates the ethics of the sport.

But of the all the states where this debate it being played out - and there are several - Idaho is place most like to see ATV-riding hunters off-trail first.

And it that happens, it will take place on a slippery slope.

If the Legislature can dictate hunting regulations, where's the line between professional game management and politics?

They only thing that keeps politics out of wildlife management in Idaho is the self-control of the politicians - and broad public agreement that the resource must be protected by professionals.

Idahoans didn't come to that conclusion naturally; that consensus was forged by bad experiences with a Fish and Game Department whipsawed by elected officials.

Let's not go there again.

Tussock Moths Make Impact on Idaho, Wash. Forests

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) . Forest experts say tussock moths appear to be at or near a 10-year cyclical peak with caterpillars feeding on Douglas fir and grand fir trees in eastern Washington state and northern Idaho.

Entomologists say the tussock moth outbreaks usually subside within two to three years.

Experts in the two states say that last year the species was active in 140,000 acres in Kootenai County in Idaho and 570 acres in Spokane County in Washington state. Estimates aren't available for the size of this year's outbreak.

Tom Eckberg of the Idaho Department of Lands tells The Spokesman-Review that the trees often appear dead but usually recover with new buds appearing in the spring.

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
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Idaho Falls Man Killed When Tree **Fallson Home**



GOP May OK Tax Increase That Obama Hopes to Block

WASHINGTON • News flash: Congressional Republicans want to raise your taxes. Impossible, right? GOP lawmakers are so virulently anti-tax, surely they will fight to prevent a payroll tax increase on virtually every wage-earner starting Jan. 1, right?

Apparently not.

Many of the same Republicans who fought hammer-and-tong to keep the George W. Bush-era income tax cuts from expiring on schedule are now saying a different "temporary" tax cut should end as planned. By their own definition, that amounts to a tax increase.

The tax break extension they oppose is sought by President Barack Obama. Unlike proposed changes in the income tax, this policy helps the 46 percent of all Americans who owe no federal income taxes but who pay a "payroll tax" on practically every dime they earn.

There are other differences as well, and Republicans say their stand is consistent with their goal of long-term tax policies that will spur employment and lend greater certainty to the economy.

"It's always a net positive to let taxpayers keep more of what they earn," says Rep. Jeb Hensarling, "but not all tax relief is created equal for the purposes of helping to get the economy moving again." The Texas lawmaker is on the

House GOP leadership team.

The debate is likely to boil up in coming weeks as a special bipartisan committee seeks big deficit reductions and weighs which tax cuts are sacrosanct.

At issue is a tax that the vast majority of workers pay, but many don't recognize because they don't read, or don't understand their pay stubs. Workers normally pay 6.2 percent of their wages toward a tax designated for Social Security. Their employer pays an equal amount, for a total of 12.4 percent per worker.

As part of a bipartisan spending deal last December, Congress approved Obama's request to reduce the workers' share to 4.2 percent for one year; employers' Please see TAX INCREASE, N2

Stock Market Begins to Feed Economic Fear

Fear could drag down the markets even further as stocks have fallen four weeks in a row.

NEW YORK • The stock market is starting to feed economic fear, not just reflect it.

Stocks have fallen four weeks in a row. Some on Wall Street worry that the resulting blow to confidence, not to mention 401(k) statements, has set off a spiral of fear that could push prices even lower, cause people and businesses to pull back and tip the economy into a new recession.

"I'm nervous that fear will lead companies to stop hiring and people to stop spending," says Jim Paulsen, chief investment strategist of Wells Capital Management, famous for his usually bullish take on the markets.

A home sales report this past week showed that more sales than usual fell apart at the last minute, which suggests plunging stocks and dismal economic news gave buyers cold feet. At least 16 percent of deals were canceled ahead of closings last month, four times the rate in May.

Beth Ann Bovino, senior economist at Standard & Poor's, says that another big plunge in stocks could "push us closer to the brink?"

They brought weapons and ammunition for Tripoli residents who join the rebellion, said Munir Ramzi of the rebels' military council in Misrata. NATO Secretary-General Anders Fogh Rasmussen said Gadhafi's regime was "clearly crumbling" and that the time to create a new democratic Libya has arrived. The sooner Gadhafi "realizes that he cannot win the battle against his own people, the better," he said in a statement, adding that NATO will continue to strike his troops if they make "any threatening moves toward the Libyan people?" In a statement early Monday, President Barack Obama said the way to prevent more bloodshed was for Gadhafi "to relinquish power once and for all." Obama said the rebel leaders must pursue a peaceful Please see LIBYA, N2

The Standard & Poor's 500 stock index ended Friday at 1,123.53, down 5 percent for the week. The average is down 16 percent during the fourweek losing streak. One reason for the drop is fear that another recession, if not certain, is more likely now.

The run of bad economic news started last month when the government said the economy grew much more weakly in the first half of this year than thought. Growth, at an annual rate of 0.8 percent, was the slowest since the Great Recession ended in June 2009.

The economic weakness has made investors more likely to sell stocks at the first hint that things are getting worse. And last week, they got signs aplenty.

A regional survey by the Federal Reserve said manufacturing had slowed in the mid-Atlantic states by the most in more than two years. Existing home sales fell in July for third time in four months. Another report showed that exports from Japan, the world's third-biggest economy, had slumped for the fifth straight month. Japan is still reeling from the effects of an earthquake and tsunami in March. Please see FEAR, N2

little resistance as Moammar Gadhafi's defenders melted away and his 42-year rule rapidly crumbled. The euphoric fighters celebrated with residents of the capital in Green Square, the symbolic heart of the fading regime.

Gadhafi's whereabouts were unknown, though state TV broadcast his bitter pleas for Libyans to defend his regime. Opposition fighters captured his son and one-time heir apparent, Seif al-Islam, who along with his father faces charges of crimes against humanity at the International Criminal Court in the Netherlands. Another son was in contact with rebels about surrendering, the opposition said.

"It's over, frizz-head," chanted hundreds of jubilant men and women massed in Green Square, using a mocking nickname of the curly-haired Gadhafi. The revelers fired shots in the air, clapped and waved the rebels' tricolor flag. Some set fire to the green flag of Gadhafi's regime and shot holes in a poster with the leader's image.

By the early hours of Monday, rebels controlled large parts of the capital. They set up checkpoints

alongside residents - many of them secretly armed by rebel smugglers in recent weeks. But pockets of pro-Gadhafi fighters remained: In one area, Associated Press reporters with the rebels were stopped and told to take a different route because of regime snipers nearby.

"We were waiting for the signal and it happened," said Nour Eddin Shatouni, a 50-year-old engineer who was among the residents who flowed out of their homes to join the celebrations. "All mosques chanted 'God is great' all at once. We smelled a good scent, it is the smell of victory. We know it is the time?"

The seizure of Green Square held profound symbolic value and marked a stunning turn in the tide of the 6-month-old Libyan civil war. The regime has held pro-Gadhafi rallies there nearly every night since the revolt began in February, and Gadhafi delivered speeches to his loyalists from the historic Red Fort that overlooks the square.

The sweep into the capital came

after the rebel fighters advanced 20 miles from the west in a matter of hours. They took town after town and overwhelmed a major military base meant to defend Tripoli, 16 miles from the city. All the way, they met little resistance and residents poured out on the streets to welcome them.

In a series of angry and defiant audio messages broadcast on state television, Gadhafi called on his supporters to march in the streets of the capital and "purify it" of "the rats?'He was not shown in the messages.

His defiance raised the possibility of a last-ditch fight over the capital, home to 2 million people. Government spokesman Moussa Ibrahim claimed the regime has "thousands and thousands of fighters" and vowed: "We will fight. We have whole cities on our sides. They are coming en masse to protect Tripoli to join the fight?"

But it appeared that Gadhafi's military was abandoning



transition to democracy.

It was a stunning reversal for Gadhafi, who earlier this month had seemed to have a firm grip on his stronghold in the western part of Libya, despite months of NATO airstrikes on his military. Rebels had been unable to make any advances for weeks, bogged down on the main fronts with regime troops in the east and center of the country.

Gadhafi is the Arab world's longest-ruling, most erratic, most grimly fascinating leader - presiding for 42 years over this North African desert republic with vast oil reserves and just 6 million people. For years, he was an international pariah blamed for the 1988 bombing of a Pan Am jumbo jet over Lockerbie, Scotland, that killed 270 people. After years of denial, Gadhafi's Libya acknowledged responsibility, agreed to pay up to \$10 million to relatives of each victim, and declared he would dismantle all weapons of mass destruction.

That eased him back into the international community.

But on February 22, days after the uprising against him began, Gadhafi gave a televised speech amid violent social unrest against his autocratic rule. In the speech, he vowed to hunt down protesters "inch by inch, room by room, home by home, alleyway by alleyway." The speech caused a furor that fueled the armed rebellion against him and it has been since mocked in songs and spoofs across the Arab world.

As the rebel force advanced on Tripoli, taking town after town, thousands of jubilant civilians rushed out of their homes to cheer the long convoys of pickup trucks packed with fighters shooting in the air. One man grabbed a rebel flag that had been draped over the hood of a slow-moving car and kissed it, overcome with emotion.

Some of the fighters were hoarse, shouting: "We are coming for you, frizz-head?" In villages, mosque loudspeakers blared "Allahu Akbar," or "God is great."

"We are going to sacrifice our lives for freedom," said Nabil al-Ghowail, a 30year-old dentist holding a rifle in the streets of Janzour, a suburb just six miles west of Tripoli. Heavy gunfire erupted nearby.

As rebels moved in Tripoli, thousands celebrated in the streets of Benghazi, the rebels' de facto capital hundreds of miles to the east. Firing guns into the air and shooting fireworks, they cheered and waved the rebel tricolor flags, dancing and singing in the city's main square.

The housing market, which usually helps lead an economic recovery, keeps getting worse. The plunging stock market and scary economic news won't make it any better.

"What you're seeing with the economy, on the job front - it's scaring a lot of people," says Brian Fine, a loan manager at Mortgage Master in Rockville, Md. He says the housing market will languish until buyers

were exaggerated, but that didn't seem to matter. For investors, the prospect of banks scrambling for cash dredged up bad memories of the global credit freeze that hit in the fall of 2008

and they sold stocks. "A negative feedback loop ... appears to be in the making," two economists at Morgan Stanley wrote Thursday in a widely cited report that itself seemed to beget more fear and selling. It warned that the U.S. was "dangerously close" to recession.

Stock investors aren't the

and sellers feel more secure about the economy.

"People are really motivated by larger economic trends. It's all about if you feel confident enough to buy a home right now," he says.

The news from Europe got worse, too. Its economy has slowed considerably even in Germany, which has been its greatest source of strength. Fear spread that European banks, already ailing because they hold bonds of countries that are struggling with debt, were having trouble getting short-term loans to pay for day-to-day activities.

Some Wall Street analysts say reports of trouble

only ones worried. Martin Fridson, global chief credit strategist at BNP Paribas Investment Partners, notes that investors in bonds issued by the riskiest U.S. companies are dumping them, too. These investors fear that in a recession companies might not be able to pay interest on these so-called junk bonds.

The selling has forced up the average interest rate on the bonds to 8.3 percent. If investors had faith in the economy, the rate would be 4.6 percent, Fridson says.

"I'm nervous," says Fridson, who has followed the junk bond market since 1984. "I think there's a very material risk of falling into recession."

rate did not change. Obama wants Congress to extend the reduction for an additional year. If not, the rate will return to 6.2 percent on Jan. 1.

Obama cited the payroll tax in his weekend radio and Internet address Saturday, when he urged Congress to work together on measures that help the economy and create jobs. "There are things we can do right now that will mean more customers for businesses and more jobs across the country. We can cut payroll taxes again, so families have an extra \$1,000 to spend," he said.

Social Security payroll taxes apply only to the first \$106,800 of a worker's wages. Therefore, \$2,136 is the biggest benefit anyone can gain from the one-year reduction.

The great majority of Americans make less than

\$106,800 a year. Millions of workers pay more in payroll taxes than in federal income taxes.

The 12-month tax reduction will cost the government about \$120 billion this year, and a similar amount next year if it's renewed.

That worries Rep. David Camp, R-Mich., chairman of the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee, and a member of the House-Senate supercommittee tasked with finding new deficit cuts. Tax reductions, "no matter how well-intended," will push the deficit higher, making the panel's task that much harder, Camp's office said.

But Republican lawmakers haven't always worried about tax cuts increasing the deficit. They led the fight to extend the life of a much bigger tax break: the major 2001 income tax reduction enacted under Bush. It was scheduled to expire at the start of this year. Obama campaigned on a pledge to end the tax break only for the richest Americans, but solid GOP opposition forced him to back down.

Many Republicans are adamant about not raising taxes but largely silent on what it would mean to let the payroll tax break expire.

Republicans cite key differences between the two "temporary" taxes, starting with the fact that the Bush measure had a 10-year life from the start. To stimulate job growth, these lawmakers say, it's better to reduce income tax rates for people and for companies than to extend the payroll tax break.

"We don't need shortterm gestures. We need longterm fundamental changes in our tax structure and our regulatory structure that people who create jobs can rely on," said Sen. Lamar Alexander, R-Tenn., when asked about the payroll tax matter.





If you need four tricks to defeat a contract but can see only three, it may be vital to set up the fourth, even before securing the second.

Against four hearts, West led the club three to East's ace. In spite of declarer's attempt to muddy the waters by dropping the 10, East knew that his partner's lead was a singleton. The four was the missing spot-card, and West would have led his top card had he held a doubleton.

East returned a club and his partner duly scored a ruff, but apart from the king of trumps, that was the end of the defense, as South's losers in spades and diamonds could later be discarded on dummy's clubs.

Could the defense have done better? Yes. The club ruff can wait, as East knows that he will come in again with the heart king to deliver it. On the bidding, West is marked with a high card. If that card is the spade king, it needs to be speedily set up as a winner before South's losing spades disappear. A spade return at trick two will set the contact since East will score his trump king in due course and administer the club ruff.

East knows that declarer has a completely balanced hand with five hearts, so there is no way for declarer to dispose of his club on dummy's spades. Moreover, even if declarer has great diamonds, the clubs in dummy will not all evaporate.

ANSWER: Although you need less from your partner in spades than in clubs to set up a suit for your side, declarer's bidding suggests he is more worried about clubs. So perhaps a low club is best. However, if you suspect East of being a trickster, the spade lead might be better, since East could be trying to fake club weakness.

Space shuttle Discovery glided to a landing, bringing home three spacefarers who had spent nearly six months aboard the international space station. Five years ago: A Russian Pulkovo Airlines jet carrying 170 people crashed in eastern Ukraine, killing all aboard. Paramount Pictures severed its ties to actor Tom Cruise after 14 years, citing what it called unacceptable conduct. One year ago: Chilean President Sebastian Pinera confirmed that all the miners trapped deep underground for 17 days were still alive after a probe came back with a handwritten note, "All 33 of us are fine in the shelter."
