Classes Start at CSI

It's time for students to start hitting the books again at the College of Southern Idaho. The first day of class officially kicked off at CSI on Monday. Here's a look at how the college's school year is starting off:

• **ENROLLMENT:** The college's enrollment on Monday was about 7,400 students, said Doug Maughan, a spokesman for CSI. But more will come. When high school classes start across the Magic Valley, an estimated 1,500 to 2,000 more students will sign up for dual-credit courses.

• EXTENDED REGISTRATION: You may have missed the first day of classes, but you didn't miss the deadline to register for courses. CSI will continue accepting registration from students through the rest of this week. That deadline's short-

ened compared to the past, when it used to end about two weeks after the semester started. It's also one more reason why the enrollment could rise in the days ahead.

• **EXPANSION:** There are visible signs of future work at the college. A nearly \$3 million addition at the Fine Arts Center is taking shape and will provide a band lab, instrument storage, music library and percussion lab. That project's expected to be done by the end of December, with some interior renovations continuing into 2012.

T.F. Council **Continues Search** for Road Funding Without Higher **Taxes**

City grants to the M.V. Arts Council, Crisis Center and Southern Idaho Tourism were spared in latest budget talks, despite falling under Councilman Clow's knife.

The Twin Falls City Council moved closer Monday night to closing the gap between what is set aside for road maintenance next fiscal year and what the city engineer says is

But council members also opted to push the budgeting process closer to the last minute so they can get more information.

The council moved a total of \$180,101 into the road maintenance budget through a combination of cuts to the Parks and Recreation Department's capital improvement budget made last week, savings from a new pool contract, pushing out the schedule for saving for the pool's winter bubble replacement, and trims to the city contingency fund.

The final budget ordinance appears set to be voted on Monday in a special meeting. The council does

not typically meet on the fifth Monday of a month. It will also push the process closer to the city's Please see COUNCIL, M2

Otter: Feds' Money Needed for Health **Exchanges**

A Sept. 30 deadline looms for Idaho to apply for a \$40 million federal grant to build an exchange.

BOISE (AP) • Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter and many state lawmakers agree: Idaho would be shortsighted to pass up millions of federal dollars to help set up health insurance exchanges, because spurning the cash could mean Washington would impose a plan on Idaho that puts many private insurance agents out of business.

Under the disputed health care overhaul passed by Congress in 2010, Idaho and other states must set up health insurance exchanges by January 2014 — or the federal government could intervene.

There's a Sept. 30 deadline for Idaho to apply for a \$40 million federal grant to build an exchange tailored to

On Monday, however, the Spokesman-Review reported that Otter's insurance chief, Bill Deal, told an interim health care committee in Boise that as many as 2,500 insurance agents could be forced to close up shop if Idaho doesn't have an exchange set up in time and Washington imposes its own, one-size-fitsall solution for Idaho.

What is a Health **Insurance Exchange?**

Health exchanges are an attempt to create competition in the insurance marketplace. Theoretically, individuals and small business could band together to get better pricing on options, giving them leverage akin to larger corpora-

Why the Idaho Controversy?

• Idaho has joined a multi-state lawsuit seeking to overturn 2010's Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act because it including the requirement that residents buy insurance — or face fines.

 Since the passage of the law, state lawmakers have been reluctant to accept any associated money, not wanting to be perceived as supporting the overhaul.

• During the 2011 Legislature, for instance,

House lawmakers rejected the agency's \$10 million budget starting July 1 over objections that it included \$2.5 million from the federal government to help develop the exchanges.

Deep Throat Honored, but Not Here

There's no monument in Twin Falls to the city's most famous son. For that, you must visit a parking lot in Rosslyn, Va.

Earlier this month, the Arlington, Va., Historical Preservation Council installed a sign in front of a gray brick parking garage at 1401 Wilson Blvd. There, W. Mark Felt, Twin Falls High School Class of '31, brought down a president.

For 11 months between October 1972 and November 1973, Felt – associate director of the FBI gave Washington Post reporter Bob Woodward the essential details of the attempt by the administration of President Richard Nixon to cover up a White House-orchestrated burglary at the offices of the Democratic National Committee at the Watergate complex in Washington, D.C., in June 1972. Felt's information, published by the Post, led to a high-profile congressional investigation and Nixon's resignation in August

"Deep Throat" was Felt's code name.

"We thought we should probably do a marker and let people know this, indeed, is where all these things took place," said Michael Leventhal, historic preservation coordinator. "As with all these changes ... you don't want to lose that something happened and this is where things occurred."

Felt always met Woodward in parking space 32-D at 2 in the morning. If the G-man had information for the reporter, he'd leave a message on Page 20 of a copy of The New York Times in Woodward's apartment building lobby.

"Felt said I would have to observe strict counter surveillance techniques ... "Woodward wrote in his 2006 book Secret Man. "Take the alley, don't use your own car. Take a taxicab from a point several blocks from your hotel where they are cabs after midnight. Get dropped off and then walk to a second cab in Rosslyn. Don't get dropped off directly at the parking garage. Walk the last several blocks to the garage ..."

Nixon's men didn't discover Deep Throat's identity until long after the

president left office. Felt outed himself in a 2005 article in Vanity Fair; Nixon himself died in 1994.

"The FBI was at war, but not with the usual suspects," Woodward wrote. "The war was with Nixon and his men. So Felt took to the underground parking garage. He never voiced pure, raw outrage to me about Watergate or what it represented ... Nixon was trying to subvert not only the law but the (FBI). So Watergate became Felt's instrument's to reassert the (FBI's) and thus its supremacy."

In May 1973, Nixon passed over Felt - then the agency's No. 2 man – and hired William Ruckelshaus as director. Felt retired a month later, and died in

The sign now marking the spot was first drafted by the Arlington County government in 2008, but sat in the Historic Preservation office waiting for a special occasion for it to be erected on city streets, according to Washington, D.C., radio station WTOP. After three years of waiting for an organization to create some pomp, Leventhal's department finally installed it earlier this month "as we do things in Arlington: nicely, quietly, professionally, and (then) go about our business."

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Proposed Minidoka Co. Cycling Law Moves Forward

RUPERT • Minidoka County commissioners gave unanimous approval Monday to move forward with a new county ordinance to improve bicycle and pedestrian safety.

Among other changes, the ordinance as drafted would require motorists to put at least three feet of space between themselves and cyclists and pedestrians while passing.

"I really like that, I think it's a good idea," Commissioner Sheryl Koyle said.

The draft ordinance will now be published and a public hearing held before commissioners make any final decision on it. That timeline had not yet been set.

Sheriff Kevin Halverson said if the ordinance passes, he believes it will be the first one of its kind in the state.

Halverson said the effort was prompted by a bicyclemotorist crash Aug. 9 where Sally Stephens was struck by Jack Corey, 75, of Rupert. According to the sheriff's report Corey allegedly did not see Stephens as she rode to work in Burley along 100 East Road near Idaho Highway 24.

Stephens was taken by air ambulance to a Utah trauma center and was released Aug. 14. She had multiple pelvic fractures and a head injury.

Corey was cited with a driving infraction, failure to exercise due care while driving, and pleaded guilty to the charge. He was fined \$85.

Stephens' husband, Ken Stephens, said he and Sally have been riding bikes for 20 years.

"I've had cars come so close to me," he said.

Halverson said it will come down to educating the public about bicycle safety and incorporating those messages into new driver training courses.

"I think this is a wonderful way to start," Ken Stephens

County Prosecutor Lance Stevenson said state lawmakers in 2009 and 2010 failed to pass a similar law because of its wording.

The Minidoka County draft ordinance would also cover people who are on roadways performing work.

deadline to get its budget information to the county, which levies property taxes and disperses them. The city budget as it stands now is about \$46 million.

The budget changes put the total road maintenance budget at \$930,101 - a dramatic increase over last year's \$550,000 but still a third of a million dollars short of what City Engineer Jackie Fields originally requested. However, she wasn't disappointed Monday night, noting that the funding would get the city close to an eight-year cycle for seal-coating its roads.

Councilman Lance Clow suggested the savings from the pool budget and the contingency fund, putting the latter in line with what City Manager Travis Rothweiler called historical standards. Both were unanimously approved.

The city's municipal powers outsource grant budget also came under Clow's scissors only to be pulled out by the other council members. The grants totaling \$100,000, with Clow proposing lopping a quarter off - help fund several community organizations, with Clow eyeing cuts to the Magic Valley Arts Council, the Crisis Center of the Magic Valley and Southern Idaho Tourism.

The measure was voted down 4-2, with Councilwoman Rebecca Mills Sojka abstaining because her husband is in the municipal band, another recipient. Only Clow and Councilman Trip Craig voted for the cuts. Craig said he would reluctantly support the measure if it was the will of the coun-

"There is a thing called quality of life," Councilman Greg Lanting said before voting "no."

The additional \$366,000 the council opted to include in its published tentative budget remained there Monday, despite a vote to remove it. The vote failed 2-5, with Mills Sojka and Councilman Will Kezele supporting it.

That additional money was included so the council wouldn't "paint itself into a corner," as Craig said. Some council members said they don't intend to leave it in but wanted to see how changes to the state's sale tax distribution affect the city budget before voting it out. Clow said he didn't want to vote on it yet because he could still be persuaded to raise taxes if an important need arose.

Buhl Intersection Will Remain 4-way Stop

One of the main intersections leading into Buhl will remain a four-way stop for now, as the Idaho Transportation Department works to replace a traffic signal destroyed Friday night.

Stop signs were put in place at the intersection of Broadway Avenue and Clear Lake Road - also U.S. Highway 30 and Idaho Highway 46 – after a

semitrailer attempting to turn off of Clear Lake Road hit the traffic signal on the northwest corner. The signal pole cracked near the base and had to be removed, according to

ITD is also considering other temporary traffic control at the intersection until repairs are made.

Typically, signal poles can take as much as four months to be manufactured and delivered. The pole foundation will also have to be inspected to ensure it wasn't damaged.

"We don't keep a large stockpile of signal poles because it's costly and not very common for them to be hit or taken out of service," District Four Traffic Engineer Bruce Christensen said. "Because of the traffic volumes of this intersection, we'll try to expedite the order but it will still take time for it to be replaced."

particularly, with our domestic insurance companies and our agents, and that's a big issue," Deal told lawmakers. "I think it would be a definite economic disaster from the standpoint of more unemployment?"

On Monday, Otter said the time for taking such stands had passed, given the potential for federal intervention in Idaho's insurance system if the state missed the dead-

Idaho is "at a crossroads;" Otter said. "If we do not apply for the grant, then under the Affordable Health Care Act, the federal government will come in and establish and impose upon us an insurance exchange."

Though they're dubious of the federal overhaul, many of the state's Republican lawmakers who attended Monday's interim session were in step with the governor: Take the money, as long as it doesn't lock Idaho into accepting portions of the federal reforms they don't agree with.

Sen. John Goedde, R-Coeur d'Alene, said it's unlikely that Idaho is going to have the money to develop exchanges on its own, given budget constraints.

"When we're having a tough time finding money to pay our part of Medicaid claims, I think \$40 million is unrealistic in state money for development of the exchange," Goedde said. "The key is if there are more strings we haven't heard about to the federal money."

Others said time was of the essence, given the consequences of missing the dead-"We should not be wasting

any time;" said Sen. Joe Stegner, R-Lewiston. "We're going to be extremely shortsighted if we let this opportunity pass."

Clark Cleveland was arraigned on two complaints of assault and propelling bodily fluids on Monday in Twin Falls 5th District Magistrate Court. According to his case file, Cleveland is alleged to have repeatedly hit Deputy Matthew White, who works in the Twin Falls County Jail for the sheriff's office, while White served Cleveland his evening meal on Aug. 3. Cleveland also supposedly spat on the deputy.

The affidavit notes White had bruising and swelling around his forehead and left eye.

A preliminary hearing is scheduled for Sept. 2. A \$100,000 bond was set for Cleveland, although he will remain in jail as he awaits a January 2012 trial date for murder and multiple counts of aggravated battery. Bond was denied for those felony complaints.

Cleveland allegedly killed Tracy Ivie, of Lindon, Utah, on July 15 after fleeing police from an attempted traffic stop on U.S. Highway 30 near

He recently crashed his vehicle near the Hampton Inn in northwest Twin Falls and fired multiple shots at police while entering the hotel, then barricaded himself in a stairwell with a female hostage and eventually surrendered.

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Local Views Vary on **Online Education**

To some, online classes are a valuable tool. To others, they've been an exercise in frustration.

Personnel from the Idaho State Board of Education heard both perspectives Monday at a public hearing in Twin Falls on a new state requirement for such class-

High school students entering class as freshmen in the fall of 2012 would have to take two online courses to graduate under a proposed rule. Monday's feedback will be given to a board subcommittee drafting that

Trent Siler, a teacher at Filer High School, said the school unsuccessfully tried to put some of its well-performing students in a precalculus online course a couple of years ago.

Students were unable to understand the material and had difficulties contacting the teacher, who took weeks to respond, Siler said, adding that most of the students failed.

Bonnie Mahannah, a mother from Castleford, said her son took online courses at Castleford School District last year and had technical problems, such as getting materials uploaded.

That's time-consuming and frustrating, particularly if a teacher takes a couple of days to get back, she said.

"When it gets down to the wire and things don't work, we're stuck," she said.

Wiley Dobbs, superintendent of Twin Falls School District, said student interest in online courses has been high, with successful pass rates of 93 percent and 94 percent for the last two semesters. Last year, 555 students in the dis-

Groundwater Pumpers Move Ahead in Fish Farm Purchase

Southern Idaho groundwater pumpers are moving forward in their purchase of three fish farms, including

the majority of Blue Lakes Trout Farm's production facilities.

Four groundwater districts await a judge's approval to take on long-term debt for the unusual purchase, meant to resolve a cycle of water calls and lawsuits that stand to affect water use across the region.

A hearing is scheduled to take place before a Power County judge on Oct. 13.

The total price for the farms is \$30 million, but the districts are asking for a tad bit more to cover any unforeseen costs.

Getting judicial confirmation is one of the final steps for the deal, said Bruce Smith, the trout farms' attorney. The confirmation process is similar that used by a city wanting to spend a large sum of money, but that doesn't hold a vote.

"Judicial confirmation gives people a sense of security that what you're doing is prudent," Smith said.

The deal would allow the pumpers to purchase Blue Lakes Trout, Clear Lakes Trout and Rim View Trout fish farms in the Thousand Springs area, along with the

associated water rights. That's more than 400 cubic feet per second as currently flowing.

"The appraisal value actually came in a little higher than the price we're paying for it. We think this is a fair price based on the appraisal," said Randy Budge, groundwater attorney.

If the judge signs off, the purchase will be financed through the Idaho Water Resource Board, which will distribute revenue bonds to front the costs of the farm purchase.

The Aberdeen-American Falls, Bingham, Magic Valley and North Snake groundwater districts will have 20 years to repay the water board's bonds. Though not listed as

part of the court filing, the Southwest Irrigation District previously stated it would participate in the purchase.

Purchasing the water rights would allow the pumpers to mend injuries inflicted on senior water users' rights. They could supply the water to other users to re-

solve current and future water calls in the Thousand Springs area.

Blue Lakes Trout Farm would also be removed from a two-party pending water call. Both Blue Lakes and Clear Springs Foods have accused groundwater pumpers of infringing upon their water rights.

Seeking judicial confirmation is the last step in the process, Budge said. If all goes smoothly, pumpers could be finished with the purchase by December.

"We fully expect the judge to approve the deal," he said.

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



Words, and Fear

ast Friday in a meeting with the Times-News editorial board, Senator Jim Risch used the word "Gestapo" to describe what he thought to be overbearing tactics employed by the Environmental Protection Agency. Lest we forget, the real Gestapo was the German secret police that operated under the oppressing leadership of Heinrich Himmler.

The real Gestapo killed people. Literally.

Use of the term to mean something less is uncalled for, but far too frequent. Earlier this month, Vice-President Joe Biden referred to Tea Party Republicans as "terrorists" for tactics he thought inappropriate in working through the debt limit issue. And Glenn Beck just can't seem to stop using the word "Holocaust" to emphasize his agenda demonize his opponents.

Using these emotion-laded words as a means of making a partisan-politics point is just plain wrong, regardless of your party affiliation. So Senator Risch, knock it off!

But alas, Risch didn't stop there. He continued on to paint a dismal picture of the U.S. economy that, according to him, "is much worse than you think." Well perhaps it is, but why is it that all "bad" spending occurred only during Democratic administrations? Risch, a self-proclaimed "good Republican," answered his own question during last Thursday's gathering. "Being a good Republican," Risch said, "I'll argue that the Democrats started after World War II and they took us every year, more spending, more programs..." In other words, the election of a new President and a new Congress is looming and it's time to scare the hell out of people by telling them things are much worse than you think and-by the way-it's the other guy's fault.

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Five Myths About Rick Perry

ou're probably thinking, "I've seen this movie before: West Texas boy makes middling grades in college, gets elected governor and - to the consternation of gobsmacked Democrats, who misunderestimate his folksy appeal runs for the Republican nomination for president." But if that's all you know about Rick Perry, you're probably one of those pundit-savants who's asking whether the country is ready for another White House occupant from the Lone Star State. The fact is, the most recent entrant into the GOP race is nothing like the caricatures being promoted on the left and the right. Here are some myths that need debunking, and quick.

1. He's a Bush clone. Biographical similarities aside, Perry is not the second coming of George W. Bush, either stylistically or substantively. Bush governed Texas with a light touch and had a good relationship with the Democ-



rats in the Legislature. Perry is more hard-knuckled in his dealings not only with Democrats but with insufficiently conservative Republicans – what we in Texas pejoratively call "moderates." Beyond that, Bushworld is no fan of Perry. Speculation as to why ranges from professional rivalry to personal dislike, but regardless, during the 2010 GOP primary for governor, the top-tier Bushies including Karl Rove, Karen Hughes and Jim Baker – all backed Perry's opponent, Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, and they've shown no enthusiasm for Perry's presidential bid.

2. He's a hillbilly dimwit. Just because he wears cowboy boots and drops his G's doesn't mean he's a dummy. Perry may be a small-town boy who went to an ag school (Texas A&M University), but he's an ex-

tremely cagey and strategic politician who has been among the state's most successful governors at getting what he wants.

3. He's an ideological purist.

It's true that Perry was 10th Amendment before 10th Amendment was cool, a believer in the notion that states are the laboratories of democracy - and that nothing good comes topdown from government. But at least three times in his career, Perry has thrown over those core principles. In 2007, he pushed for the mandatory inoculation of young girls with the human papillomavirus vaccine as a way to prevent cervical cancer. In the run-up to the campaign, Perry called for constitutional amendments banning same-sex marriage and abortion, in direct opposition to his long-held insistence that the feds should stay out of states' business.

4. He opposes federal stimulus money.

Perry made headlines during the 2009 legislative session when he turned

down \$555 million in federal stimulus funding to extend unemployment insurance, citing the strings attached, and he has made a talking point out of the "failed stimulus." But Texas took more than \$17 billion in stimulus money in 2009 to balance the budgets from that biennium and the previous one. Perry defends the decision by saying Texas is a donor state and, true enough, it sends more money to Washington than it gets back in benefits and services.

5. He has presided over an unqualified economic miracle.

When Perry says Texas has less than 10 percent of the nation's population but has created more than 40 percent of its jobs in the past two years, he's not exaggerating. But there's more to the story than those top-line statistics.

The unemployment rate in Texas is 8.4 percent as of Friday – worse than that of 25 other states. Texas has more minimum-wage jobs than every state other than MississippI. And growth in public sector jobs in Texas has been 19 percent over the past 10 years, vs. just 9 percent growth in privatesector jobs.

When Secrecy Gets Out of Hand

knows what a secret is. But apparently our nation's national security establishment does not.

Consider this strange case from earlier this year. On June 8, the National Security Agency, a topsecret government spy agency, heralded the "declassification" of a 200year-old publication, translated from the original German, on cryptography. It turns out, however, as reported by Steven Aftergood of the Federation of American Scientists on his blog Secrecy News, that the 1809 study had long been publicly available and had even been digitized and published online through Google Books several years earlier. In fact, the 19th century study had not met the government's own standards for classification in the first place.

The day after this odd "declassification," the government's four-year prosecution of NSA whistleblower Thomas Drake under the Espionage Act collapsed when the government withdrew charges. The official expla nation was that the government had to drop its prosecution to protect sensitive information about the NSA's targeting of a particular telecommunications technology that the judge would have com pelled it to disclose.

But in my opinion, the classified information
Drake was charged with having possessed illegally
— like the 1809 study — never should have been classified in the first place.

Drake, once a high official at the NSA, was prosecuted because, as the government put it, he was



found in "unauthorized possession of a document relating to the national defense, namely, a classified

The charges stem from Drake's leaking of information to a journalist. Drake acknowledges that he approached a *Baltimore Sun* reporter with information, but he insists that he never offered any classified information. "I went to a reporter with a few key things: fraud, waste and abuse," he said in an interview with the *New Yorker*.

Having served as an expert witness for Drake's defense, I have read the email in question, and it clearly does not meet even the minimal criteria for classification, namely that it "reasonably could be expected to result in damage to the national security."

Various government officials involved in the Drake case have made the point that individual employees do not get to decide on their own that information they have access to should be declassified; that is the government's role.

Still, government officials are obligated to follow the standards set forth by the president through a 2009 executive order.
They are not allowed to exceed its prohibitions and limitations in deciding what to classify. Classifying information that should not be kept secret can be just as harmful to the national interest as unauthorized disclosures of appropriately classified information.

Fixing the Economy: We Got it Wrong

n early January 2009
two White House-bound
economists — Christina
Romer and Jared Bernstein — predicted that if the
stimulus bill were passed,
unemployment would peak
at 8 percent by midyear and
then start coming down. If
there were no stimulus, they
said, joblessness might hit 9
percent and not peak until
2010.

Romer and Bernstein had the risky job of hyping policy, but they weren't alone in their optimistic views. Forecasters at the Congressional Budget Office, the Federal Reserve and most private banks all thought that the economy had a natural tendency to right itself, sooner or later. What it needed, the activists urged, was a push.

Well it's now obvious that the push didn't do the job. Even with it, unemployment is higher than the Romer-Bernstein worst case. The optimistic forecasts now look embarrassing, ranking right up there alongside Irving Fisher's 1929 comment that stocks had reached "a permanently high plateau."

About the time Romer and Bernstein issued their assessments, I wrote a cover essay for Washington Monthly attacking predictions of early recovery. The "return to normal" would not happen, I wrote, because the effects of a financial collapse could not be reversed. But though this fact was obvious and in plain sight, somehow many economists missed it. Let's examine that epic failure.

First, the economic models in use were obviously faulty. Why? Because they had assumed a "natural rate of unemployment" to which the economy will return whatever happens. This idea originated with Milton Friedman as part of his attack on John Maynard Keynes — who had argued, based on the stark evidence of the Great Depression, that



mass unemployment can persist indefinitely. An economist who builds the natural rate into a model is like a doctor who assumes that her patient will always get better eventually, even without treatment. No such doctors exist, of course; that so many economists think this way is just strange.

Second, the glide path to recovery was obviously wrong. Why? Because it was based on postwar business cycles, and recessions from 1950 to 1990 were caused mainly by tight policies or outside shocks to a fairly sound system. Those recessions did have a corrective: as time passed "pent-up demand" would build and a new credit boom would start. In 2009, because American households were now massively upside-down on their mortgages, this could not happen.

Third, the forecasts were reinforced by checking with all the top forecasters, and this was the wrong thing to do. Why? Because in a deep crisis the consensus view, which is necessarily an average, is always wrong! Extreme situations require extreme assessments, meaning that someone must stand up and overrule the crowd. But led by its technicians, Team Obama simply assumed away the crisis, calling it instead a "Great Recession" which again implied that it would end just because recessions always had.

The next mistake was to base policy on the forecasts. The sensible thing would have been to paint the bleakest possible picture, emphasizing the extraordinary crisis, and so justify the largest possible policy action. Then if things turned out all right

President Obama would have gotten credit, and any excess actions could easily have been cut back. Instead, the president set himself and his policies up for blame.

The solution is not another "stimulus" — a term that stinks of needles and quick fixes. The solution has to be a long-term strategy: both a new direction for economic activity and new institutions to provide the money. The proposed national infrastructure bank — a permanent institution — is the

right sort of thing and would be a good place to start.

To go further, let's admit that our problem is not budget deficits or public debt — not now and not later. Let's agree that cutting Social Security and Medicare — inflicting pointless pain on the elderly — will not help. Let's build a new financial system to serve public purpose and private business.

Time is short, but at least in recent days it's becoming clear: We're getting it wrong and we must change.

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Maintenance, Repair Price Tag Grows for Idaho Universities

MOSCOW (AP) • Several reported. Officials estimate years of cuts in state funding have forced administrators at Idaho's four public universities to delay millions of dollars in maintenance and repair projects to buildings, heating systems and other infrastructure upkeep on campus.

The estimated costs tied to the backlogs vary depending on the size and age of each campus. It explains why the University of Idaho, the state's oldest campus, has a list of delayed projects now pegged at \$200 million, up from \$70 million six years ago.

"We're just attacking maintenance as we go,' University of Idaho Vice President for Facilities and Administration Ron Smith told the Lewiston Tribune. "It's really hard, because you can't get any other partners that want to help you do repair and maintenance. And you can't get donors on board, because it's not sexy to do that?'

The biggest chunks of the deferred maintenance projects at the Moscow campus include major building system repair and replacement, estimated at \$48 million, The Tribune

the utility system needs repairs or replacement pegged at \$37 million and construction to comply with federal disabilities laws totaling \$18 million.

Over the last few years, state lawmakers have appropriated about \$3 million annually for each of the four campuses to address maintenance and repair issues, making it difficult to make significant headway in clearing the growing inventory of maintenance needs, Smith said.

A survey compiled by Boise State University has calculated the school needs \$75 million over the next five years to ensure the facilities can be maintained at current levels. The former junior college, which has grown to 5 million square-feet divided among 200 buildings, is newer than its counterparts but is reaching a point where several buildings need structural repairs or replacement of air or heating systems nearing the end of their 30-year lifespan.

"Roofs are at the top of the list, as are mechanical systems," James Maguire, vice president for campus planning, told the AP.

Law To Help Troubled Homeowners Goes Into Effect in Idaho on Sept. 1

BOISE • Behind in your mortgage? A new law requires mortgage lenders to give homeowners in default a notice about requesting a loan modification review or a meeting with the lender to discuss options for preventing a foreclosure.

While the law requires the meeting, it does not require servicers or lenders to modify homeowners' loans.

"Homeowners in foreclosure or in danger of foreclosure should familiarize them-

selves with the rights this new law affords them," Attorney General Wasden said.

The law, which goes into effect Sept. 1, also requires lenders to notify homeowners whether they qualify for a loan modification within 45 days of a modification request. Lenders cannot proceed with a trustee's sale during the 45-day period. Homeowners will receive written notice of the date and time of a future trustee's sale if a scheduled sale date is postponed.

Under the law, people who

are not licensed with the Idaho Department of Finance or exempt, such as attorneys, are prohibited from charging a fee for loan modification services.

Man Pleads Not Guilty in'02 Triple Homicide

BOISE (AP) • A man accused of killing his girlfriend and two children and burning their bodies in the desert south of Mountain Home in 2002 has pleaded not guilty to three counts of first-degree murder.

The *Idaho Statesman* reports that Alberto Lopez-Orozco entered the pleas Monday in an Elmore County court-

Once considered one the FBI's most wanted fugitives, Lopez is charged in the slaying of 29-year-old Rebecca Ramirez and her sons, ages 2 and 4.

Authorities say Orozco left Idaho and the U.S. shortly after the slayings and hid in Mexico for years. He was finally apprehended in Mexico in October 2009 and extradited to Idaho last year.

A judge scheduled a jury trial in the case to begin Feb. 6. Orozco is being held in the Elmore County Jail.





Hibiscus plants thrive on attention. Pruning hibiscus is a great way to give these plants just what they need. Pruning helps stimulate budding on new shoots. It also rejuvenates the plants after their long winter nap while encouraging them to maintain an attractive appearance and healthy, vigorous growth. Let's look at when to prune hibiscus and the best techniques when pruning hibiscus plants.

When to Prune Hibiscus

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spring. For the most part, hibiscus plants can be lightly pruned in late summer or early fall. No hibiscus pruning should be done during late fall or winter.

One of the downsides to waiting later in the season to prune is that plants may not develop as many branches, and they will put out fewer blooms. Therefore, it is oftentimes better to prune dead or weak growth entirely

after the plants beginning sprouting in spring.

In fact, spring should be the only time for complete cutting back. Pruning hibiscus plants entirely helps rejuvenate them for summer blooming. Branch tips can be pinched, or tip pruned, throughout the season, however, to encourage bushier growth.

Hibiscus Pruning How To

Before pruning hibiscus, make sure your pruning shears are sharp and clean, preferably sterilized with alcohol gel, to prevent the spreading of any disease from affected branches, if any. When pruning hibiscus plants, they should be cut about a third of the way back, leaving at least two to three nodes on the branches for new growth to emerge. These cuts should be made just above the nodes, leaving about a quarter inch. Remove

any weak, diseased, or dead growth, as well as crossing or leggy branches. Branches that are growing toward the center of the plant should also be removed.

Once temperatures have sufficiently warmed towards the end of spring, you can help give blooms an extra boost by increasing the amount of fertilizer.

Balanced Budget Amendment to Get Votes in Congress

WASHINGTON • As a "supercommittee" tries to find \$1.5 trillion in new deficit cuts this fall, Republicans will be pressing a far more ambitious goal: passing an amendment to the Constitution to require a balanced federal budget.

The idea is being pushed most forcefully by conservative activists eager to shrink the government and its spending but disappointed with the results they've achieved so far in Washington, where Democrats control both the White House and the Sente

"Spending cuts and caps are steps in the right direction," said Rep. Pete Sessions, R-Texas. But a balanced budget amendment is "the only permanent solution to control government spending and end our nation's spending-driven debt crisis," Sessions said.

House GOP leaders — short of the two-thirds margin required to pass the amendment — have held off scheduling a vote. But both House and Senate are required to hold votes this fall as one of the conditions of recently enacted legislation to raise the government's borrowing cap.

It's a decidedly uphill battle, even though Republicans control the House with larger numbers than they had in 1995, when a balanced budget amendment sailed through the chamber with 300 votes. It fell just one supporter short of the required two-thirds margin in the Senate.

There appear to be fewer Democratic backers now than there were in 1995, when 72 House Democrats voted for the amendment. For starters, there are far fewer southern white conservative and moderate Democrats in the House than there were back then.

CAIRO • President Barack Obama called Monday for a "peaceful, inclusive and just" transition in Libya, telling rebels that "the Libya that you deserve is within your reach" as they battled to clear Moammar Gadhafi's supporters from Tripoli.

"For over four decades, the Libyan people had lived under the rule of a tyrant who denied them their most basic human rights," Obama said. "Now the celebrations that we've seen in the streets of Libya show that the pursuit of human dignity is far stronger than any dictator."

Fierce fighting continued in some areas of the country, however, and Obama warned that the situation "is still very fluid." The six-month fight, aided by a NATO-led coalition, turned in favor of the rebels only in the past two weeks, and took far longer than the Arab Spring revolutions in neighboring Egypt and Tunisia.

Powerful Hurricane Irene Heads to Bahamas, U.S.

NAGUA, Dominican Republic • A rapidly strengthening Hurricane Irene cut a destructive path through the Caribbean on Monday, pounding Puerto Rico and the Dominican Republic with strong winds and rain as it followed a track that could carry it to the U.S. Southeast by the end of the week

Irene grew into a Category 2 hurricane late Monday and the U.S. National Hurricane Center in Miami said it could become a monstrous Category 3 storm as early as Tuesday. Forecasters said it could still be that strong when it passes over the Bahamas and slams into the United States, possibly landing in Florida, South Carolina or Georgia.

Earlier, the storm slashed

directly across Puerto Rico, tearing up trees and knocking out power to more than a million people, then headed out to sea north of the Dominican Republic, where the powerful storm's outer bands were buffeting the north coast with dangerous sea surge and downpours.

The first hurricane of the Atlantic season was a large system that could cause dangerous mudslides and floods in Dominican Republic, the hurricane center said. It was not expected to make a direct hit on neighboring Haiti, though that country could still see heavy rain from the storm.

Dominican officials said the government had emergency food available for 1.5 million people if needed and the country's military and public safety brigades were on alert.

Indiana Scout Leader Dies in Random Slaying

INDIANAPOLIS • As a 76-year-old scoutmaster led two young charges on a nature hike, they stopped to identify a tree — a pause authorities say put them in the path of a man who emerged from a nearby home with a 12-inch knife and stabbed the group's leader, leaving him to bleed to death on the

The attack Sunday afternoon on the Nickel Plate Trail in Bunker Hill, 60 miles north of Indianapolis, killed Arthur Anderson, a scouting volunteer for 50 years who also mentored young computer whizzes at Kokomo High School and held a patent for an electrical device.

Authorities say that after approaching Anderson from behind and stabbing him without provocation, 22-

year-old Shane Golitko returned to the home where he had earlier assaulted his mother, breaking her arm, and stabbed his two dogs, killing one of them. He fled in his mother's Jeep, leading police on an eight-mile chase before he was arrested.

Authorities said it wasn't clear what set Golitko off, and neither drugs nor

alcohol were involved.

"It was a senseless act," said Indiana
State Police Detective Tony Frawley,
who had stated in a court affidavit that
Golitko told him "that the reason he got
the knife from his bedroom was to 'stab

the guy with the gray hair."

Golitko, who is charged with murder and two felony counts of battery, is being held without bond in the Miami County Jail in Peru pending a Thursday court appearance in Miami Circuit Court. The prosecutor's office did not yet know of an attorney representing

Golitko, and no one responded to a call to his home.

His mother, Valerie Henson, 48, had called police Sunday afternoon to say she had fled to a neighbor's home after an argument between her and her son escalated and he "kicked and punched her multiple times," Frawley's affidavit said. She was treated for a broken arm.

Golitko went to his

room for the knife, then walked outside 150 yards to the trail "to the area where he had previously seen a male subject with 'gray hair,'" Frawley said.

Hospitals Giving Faster Heart Care, Study Says

The time it takes to treat major heart attack patients plunged from a median of 96 minutes in 2005 to 64 minutes last year, researchers find.

In a spectacular turnabout, hospitals are treating almost all major heart attack patients within the recommended 90 minutes of arrival, a new study finds. Just

five years ago, less than half of them got their clogged arteries opened that fast.

The time it took to treat such patients plunged from a median of 96 minutes in 2005 to only 64 minutes last

year, researchers found. Some hospitals are moving at warp speed: Linda Tisch

was treated in a mere 16 minutes after she was stricken while visiting relatives near Yale-New Haven Hospital in Connecticut this month. Emergency responders called ahead to mobilize a team of heart specialists.

Once she arrived, "they had a brief conversation and I went straight into the OR. My family was absolutely flabbergasted," said Tisch, 58, who went home to Westerly, R.I., two days later.

Tisch wasn't a fluke. The hospital took 26 minutes on another case on Thursday.

"Americans who have heart attacks can now be confident that they're going to be treated rapidly in virtually every hospital of the country," said Yale cardiologist Dr. Harlan Krumholz. He led the study, published online Monday by an American Heart Association journal,



And Republicans have made the task more difficult by pushing a significantly more stringent tea partybacked version of the amendment now than they did in 1995. The new version would virtually make it impossible for future Congresses to raise taxes by requiring a two-thirds vote in both House and Senate. It also would force a huge shrinking of government programs by capping spending at 18 percent of the nation's total economic output each year.

"There are lots of reasons not to like the original balanced budget amendment," Norquist said, warning that it could lead to tax increases imposed by lawmakers squeamish about cutting spending, or even by federal courts.

Given the enormity of the nation's fiscal gap, future Congresses facing a balanced-budget mandate would surely consider tax increases as a way to ease cuts to defense, Social Security, Medicare and other domestic programs.

Even tea party-driven House Republicans shunned such cuts earlier this year when adopting a nonbinding GOP budget blueprint that forecast deficits in the \$400 billion range for most of the decade. Republican decided against offering a balanced budget because it would have forced cuts on current recipients Medicare and Social Security benefits.

Prosecutors Seek to Dismiss Charges Against Strauss-Kahn

NEW YORK • New York City prosecutors asked a judge Monday to dismiss all criminal charges against Dominique Strauss-Kahn because the hotel maid who created a cross-continental sensation by accusing him of sexual assault repeatedly lied to them.

The Manhattan district attorney's office said in court papers that the accuser, Nafissatou Diallo, repeatedly gave false information to investigators and grand jurors about her life, her past and her actions following her encounter with the French diplomat.

"In virtually every substantive interview with prosecutors, despite entreaties to simply be truthful, she has not been truthful on matters great and small," the lawyers wrote.

Diallo and her attorney, Kenneth Thompson, met briefly with representatives of the Manhattan district attorney's office to discuss the decision not to proceed with the prosecution. Thompson didn't say what had happened inside or reveal what his client was told, but he recited a short

statement condemning prosecutors for their handling of the case.

"Manhattan District Attorney Cyrus Vance has denied the right of a woman to get justice in a rape case," he said. "He has not only turned his back on this innocent victim. But he has also turned his back on the forensic, medical and other physical evidence in this

Thompson is asking a judge for an order disqualifying the prosecutor's office from handling the case. Diallo is also suing Strauss-Kahn, seeking to make him pay financially if not with his freedom, a move that the diplomat's lawyers said helped erode her credibility.

Strauss-Kahn is scheduled to go before a judge Tuesday. His lawyers, William Taylor and Benjamin Brafman, issued a statement saying that he and his family were grateful for the decision.

Second Body Found at Calif. **Home Where** Officer Shot

EL CAJON, Calif. (AP) • A second adult body was found Monday in the charred debris of a Southern California home where a gunman opened fire, critically wounding a police officer, police said.

The second body was found toward the back of the burned-out home in El Cajon, a working class city east of San Diego, police spokesman Lt. Mark Coit said. It was believed to be the body of Beverly Rakov, 51, the mother-inlaw of suspected gunman Kevin Collier. The other body found in the home Sunday night was believed to be that of Collier.

Coit said both bodies were burned beyond recognition so forensics tests would be needed for positive identification.

Collier is suspected of killing his baby daughter in his truck, then torching his home, in a dramatic series of events that ended with him critically wounding El Cajon Officer Jarred Slocum, 28.

Slocum was hospitalized in critical but stable condition after having surgery for a gunshot wound to his forehead that fractured his skull.

Collier, 32, texted friends and family on Sunday that he had killed his daughter and motherin-law, Coit said.

The baby was found inside the truck with a gunshot wound to the head, and authorities were trying to determine whether the girl was Collier's 1year-old daughter, Rhilee, Colt said.

Slaying

"His life revolved around youth and being a servant," Solis said, adding that Anderson worked closely with new scouts and with younger scouts in particu-

What is remarkable about this improvement, Krumholz said, is that it occurred without money incentives or threat of punishment. Instead, the government and a host of private groups led research on how to shorten treatment times and started campaigns to persuade hospitals that this was the right thing to do.

"It's amazing and it's very gratifying. I'm surprised that we were able to achieve that type of dramatic improvement" so quickly, said Dr. John Brush, a cardiologist at Eastern Virginia Medical School in Norfolk, Va., who helped the American College of Cardiology design its campaign, which involved more than 1,000 hospitals.



Getting Libyan Oil Back to Market Could Take Years

NEW YORK • It could be a year or more before Libya produces enough oil to start exporting it in large amounts again. But once the oil starts flowing, it should bring the price of gasoline down even further.

International oil prices fell Monday because of the prospect that those shipments will hit the market again.

The shipments stopped six months ago as the rebellion in Libya raged. The conflict damaged pipelines and fields and forced out foreign oil engineers who once helped the nation export 1.5 million barrels of oil every day.

Before the country can begin producing oil in large amounts again, security

must be re-established, a new government must be formed, the United Nations must lift international sanctions, and damage to oil fields and pipelines must be repaired.

The prices of crude oil and gasoline were already falling sharply because of concerns that the slowing global economy will slow demand from drivers and businesses.

The ouster of Libyan

leader Moammar Gadhafi would clear the way for a new government and a return to oil production. But bringing Libyan oil production back to levels that will make a difference will take months if not years, experts say.

"This isn't going to lead to an overnight restart of Libyan oil exports," says Jim Burkhard, managing director for global oil at IHS CERA, an industry research group.

Western Dairy Production Up

The West led the U.S. in milk production last month, but analysts don't expect that to

"With corn prices firm and dairy producer equity tight, don't expect milk production out West to keep flowing strong if losses become a reality, which seems likely at least for a short stint," said Dave Kurzawski, a dairy ana-

lyst with FCStone. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's latest dairy report, milk production in the 23 major dairy states during July totaled 15.4 billion pounds, up 0.8 percent from July 2010. The Pacific Northwest – primarily Idaho - was up 5.3 percent.All western states averaged 4.7 percent growth, while all other regions declined in production.

Wilson Gray, University of Idaho extension dairy economist at Twin Falls, was somewhat surprised to see that production was up that much in the West. Hot weather in the Midwest was

blamed for much of its decrease, while cool weather may have allowed Idaho cows to keep producing at high levels into the summer. Some producers say production peaked in June, when it usually peaks earlier.

Going into the fall, dairies face a much different price structure – one that could return some operations to red ink, especially if milk prices have already peaked.

The concern is while milk prices have risen from a year ago, so have hay and corn. Strong milk prices are now expected to soften in 2012. If corn remains at its current price, that would result in the lowest milk-feed ratio in at least 40 years, says Alan Levitt, an analyst who writes the CME's Daily Dairy Report.

The milk-feed ratio is an indicator of profitability. It measured below 2 in July, while a ratio of 3 or more is considered positive for milk production.

Gray expects dairies to begin feeling the impacts of lower milk prices and higher corn prices this fall. Many

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

dairies are already feeling the pinch of a tight hav crop. Not only are alfalfa acres down this year, but the late spring has delayed harvest. Hay growers in the Magic Valley are only 11 percent done with their third cuttings com-

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pared to 61 percent in a more-normal year. That's pushing hay prices higher lo-

Dairies may soon find themselves competing with livestock producers in Asia as well. U.S. hay, the country's third-largest crop by value, is now cheaper to ship to China than to farmers in central California, according to the PNW Dairy Monitor.

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:

In 1305, Scottish rebel leader Sir William Wallace was executed by the English for treason.

In 1754, France's King Louis XVI was born at Versailles.

In 1914, Japan declared war against Germany in World War I.

In 1926, silent film star Rudolph Valentino died in New York at age 31.

In 1927, amid protests, Italian-born anarchists Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti were executed in Boston for the murders of two men during a 1920 robbery.

In 1939, Nazi Germany and the Soviet Union agreed to a non-aggression treaty, the Molotov-Ribbentrop Pact, in Moscow.

In 1944, Romanian prime minister Ion Antonescu was dismissed by King Michael, paving the way for Romania to abandon the Axis in favor of the Allies.

In 1960, Broadway librettist Oscar Hammerstein II, 65, died in Doylestown, Pa.

In 1973, a bank robberyturned-hostage-taking began in Stockholm, Sweden; the four hostages ended up empathizing with their captors, a psychological condition now referred as "Stockholm Syndrome."

In 1989, in a case that inflamed racial tensions in New York, Yusuf Hawkins, a 16-year-old black youth, was shot dead after he and his friends were confronted by a group of white youths in the Bensonhurst section of Brooklyn.

Ten years ago: Rep. Gary Condit, D-Calif., interviewed by Connie Chung on ABC, denied any involvement in the disappearance of Washington intern Chandra Levy. (Ingmar Guandique, an illegal immigrant from El Salvador, was convicted in Nov. 2010 of murdering Levy, and was sentenced to 60 years in prison.) Thierry Devaux, a Frenchman using a motordrivan narachuta was res cued and arrested after becoming snagged on the Statue of Liberty in New York Harbor. NATO soldiers streamed into Macedonia as part of a mission to help end six months of ethnic hostilities by collecting and destroying rebel weapons.

Five years ago: A previously unknown militant group released the first video of two Fox News journalists who'd been kidnapped in Gaza. (Reporter Steve Centanni and cameraman Olaf Wiig were later freed.) The Citadel released the results of a survey in which almost 20 percent of female cadets reported being sexually assaulted since enrolling at the South Carolina military college. Jazz trumpeter Maynard Ferguson died in Ventura, Calif., at age 78.

One year ago: A dismissed policeman armed with an automatic rifle seized a bus in the Philippine capital with 25 people on board, mostly Hong Kong tourists; the gunman released nine of the hostages and demanded his job back to free the rest. (The hijacking lasted 11 hours before the gunman opened fire on his hostages; a Manila SWAT team then killed the hostage-taker, but not before eight tourists also died.) A jury in Goldsboro, N.C., convicted former Marine Cesar Laurean of first-degree murder in the death of a pregnant colleague, Lance Cpl. Maria Lauterbach. (Laurean was sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole.) Tiger Woods and his wife, Elin Nordegren, officially divorced.

In today's deal from the 2004 Cavendish tournament, many East-West pairs were going down for large numbers after East had opened the bidding. Quite often South could double three notrump, and Al Roth, the apostle of sound bidding, would have been able to say, "I told you so." However, Billy Cohen as South was in a position to collect a different sort of large number. Having missed his winning play at the table, he should be applauded for his subsequent analysis and his public-spirited masochism in then passing it on to the Daily Bulletin.

He declared two hearts doubled on the auction shown and won the spade-nine lead cheaply in hand. The defense was threatening a spade ruff, so if declarer delays drawing trumps, East-West will obtain an easy sixth trick. Suppose you lead a low heart up toward dummy, where the queen will hold the trick. Now what? If you play a spade, the defense will surely arrange to get a ruff; if you lead a heart to the 10, that holds the trick too. The defense now doesn't get a ruff, but you can never collect your third spade trick. The winning move is to lead the heart 10 at trick two! Whether a defender wins this trick or ducks it, this play gives you your entry to dummy when you need it. The defense gets only one heart trick now, and you get to repeat the spade finesse in peace and quiet.

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
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


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
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Reform Is Needed, But Who Will Set it in Motion?

To paraphrase what a famously crooked alderman once said about politics in Chicago, "College football ain't ready for reform."

But it could be in short order. Like a fugitive on the run, the game and its handlers can't catch

their breath and don't dare quit peeking over their shoulders. If the nearly



dozen scandals uncovered in just the past season or so failed to remind us how widespread corruption is, well, soon come the games them-

Those begin in earnest with Oregon vs. LSU in Cowboys Stadium, a Sept. 3 contest in which local prosecutors reviewing arrest reports could have a bigger say about who lines up for either side than the coaches. Two weeks later, Ohio State is at Miami, a matchup so tarnished that NCAA investigators probably will enjoy it more than

Considering the history of college football reform, all could be forgiven by season's end and fans' anger trained once more on the sideshow that is the Bowl Championship Se-

But for the moment, it's the cops and not the robbers who have momentum on their side.

Granted, NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell is not going to be mistaken for Eliot Ness. But his decision to make disgraced former OSU star Terrelle Pryor sit out five games — the same penalty the NCAA imposed, but was powerless to enforce once he jumped to the pros — was a promising first step.

The college game has been the NFL's de facto minor league since the days of Red Grange, so if nothing else, Goodell's willingness to discipline NFL job entrants for violations committed at State U. acknowledges there is a relationship. The commish can't go after Cam Newton, or Reggie Bush for that matter, but at least now there's a precedent. As they used to say about voting in Chicago, he should take advantage of the privilege early and often.

Simply punishing players, though, is picking on the weakest link and barely begins to address a systemic problem. It's comical every time the NCAA threatens or levies a "lack of institutional control" charge against any school, since it's an institution that can't control its own members. College presidents took over running the NCAA a dozen years ago, but their idea of policing themselves amounted to

"We're really excited for a new season and a new coaching staff," said offensive lineman Cody Bunn.


"They've brought some discipline and new expectations for us. I'm really excited to see what we can do and we feel like this is going to be a great season."

The Cup was brought to Ketchum courtesy of Jim "Beets" Johnson, assistant equipment manager with the Boston Bruins. The Bruins won the Stanley Cup for the first time in 39 years in mid-June, giving Johnson the Idaho's connections to the NHL are scant, with only two nativeborn players ever produced by the Potato State. 



little more than a plea to hold down the room-service tabs at the organization's retreat in Indianapolis a few weeks ago.

The attendees insisted on a higher grade-point average for their teams and a few other cosmetic changes and tried to pass them off as real reforms. The ink was still drying on those when Miami got embarrassed, which should have embarrassed all those presidents even more, since the scold they put in charge of NCAA enforcement, Paul Dee, just happened to be the athletic director there while all those fabulous yacht parties and strip-club soirees were taking place.

Who was it that said "high-profile athletes demand high-profile compliance" when the Southern California dynasty that Bush helped build turned up in the dock? Right, the same Paul Dee.

Desperate to prove the presidents are serious this time, or perhaps to hold onto what little credibility hasn't been shredded, NCAA boss Mark Emmert let it be known this weekend that the "death penalty" was still on the table for flagrant cheaters. But he quickly made clear he didn't have the Miami case in mind. No need, since there's little chance of anybody calling his bluff.

SMU football was a casualty the last time the NCAA handed out the death penalty — barring a program from competing in a sport - and more than two decades later, the Mustangs are barely competitive. Having seen what it cost once, the presidents hardly have the stomach to punish one of their own. Besides, in the current big-dollar environment, just unwinding the TV contracts already in place amounts to setting the table for the networks' lawyers.

So how about an intermediate step. Under a provision the NCAA has already green-lighted, coaches — as well as schools - will effectively have report cards that reflect the academic progress of the players during their tenure, so that future employers will have a better measure of what kind of programs they run.

The measure makes coaches more accountable for their charges, but let's not stop there. Former Florida coach and current TV commentator Urban Meyer proposed that coaches who get caught knowingly breaking rules get suspended, the same way their players do. It's only one more deterrent. But let Goodell sign on just as he did in the Pryor case, and we might have a reform movement with legs.
