FLOODING CONCERNS AND SOME RELIEF IN IRENE'S WAKE

Tropical storm Irene has taken the lives of at least 21 people.

NEW YORK • Stripped of hurricane rank, Tropical Storm Irene spent the last of its fury Sunday, leaving treacherous flooding and millions without power — but an unfazed New York and relief that it was nothing like the nightmare authorities feared.

Slowly, the East Coast surveyed the damage — up to \$7 billion by one private estimate — but for many the danger had not passed.

Rivers and creeks turned into raging torrents tumbling with limbs and parts of buildings in northern New England and upstate New York.

Flooding was widespread in Vermont, and hundreds of people were told to leave the capital, Montpelier, which could get flooded twice: once by Irene and once by a utility trying to save an overwhelmed dam.

“This is not over,” President Barack Obama said from the Rose Garden.

Meanwhile, the nation’s most populous region looked to a new week and the arduous process of getting back to normal.

New York lifted its evacuation order for 370,000 people and said subway service, shut down for the first time by a natural disaster, will be partially restored Monday, though it warned riders to expect long lines and long waits. Philadelphia restarted its trains and buses.

“All in all,” New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg said, “we are in pretty good shape.”

At least 21 people died in the storm, most of them when trees crashed through roofs or onto cars.

The main New York power company, Consolidated Edison, didn’t

\$1.5 BILLION FOR ONE MORE DAY

Study says if U.S. Postal Service loosened delivery timeframes for some services — adding one day for first-class and priority mail — it could cut its projected losses by 15 percent.

Come rain, snow, sleet or hail, Americans are accustomed to getting their mail on time and without a hitch.

Inclement weather still doesn’t slow the U.S. Postal Service, which is facing a far more dangerous enemy: declining mail volume and financial losses.

The Postal Service is considering the prospect of loosening the time lines that determine how quickly mail must get to its destination. It’s not a long delay that’s under consideration — just one

more day for first-class and priority mail.

The Postal Service’s inspector general called for a study into the idea, which was recently released. According to the study, the Postal Service could save as much as \$1.5 billion annually by loosening delivery time frames for high-speed services.

Nationwide, the USPS lost \$8.5 billion last year and is on track to lose \$9 billion this year, a spokesman said.

In general, the Postal Service delivers its first-class and priority mail in one to three days. In an age of email and social networking, the study raises questions about the need for speed and the value of reliability, regardless of when deliveries

make it.

No decision has been made on the idea. It would yield the Postal Service savings by allowing more ground shipments instead of air shipments, consolidating mail-processing operations and trimming back employees.

Local opinions of customers entering the post office in downtown Twin Falls varied based on their needs.

“That would be bad for us,” said Matt Fuller, a law clerk with Fuller Law Office in Twin Falls.

The law office relies heavily on the post office to get legal documents to clients quickly, he said, adding that overnight delivery is frequently needed.

But Leslie Hass of Filer, who still likes to pay her bills via snail mail instead of electronically, took the possibility in stride.

“I don’t care, as long as it’s postmarked,” she said.

Twin Falls City Council Holds Special Meeting to Finish Up Budget

The Twin Falls City Council will break with normalcy when it meets tonight, meeting on the fifth Monday of a month, and do it for a yearly necessity: Finalizing the city’s budget.

It has spent the past few weeks diving deeper and deeper into the almost \$46 million budget put forward by City Manager Travis Rothweiler in his preliminary budget proposal, seeking to divert cash toward road maintenance.

Tonight’s agenda has Rothweiler asking the council to adopt the budget so it can be sent to the county for property tax distribution. The city needs to have its property tax request sent to the county by early next week.

This budget is relatively equal with this year’s, overall, with property tax rates in the city remaining static. The city council was able to increase city

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Idaho Juvenile Detainees Learn Value of Gardening

CALDWELL • Inside the Southwest Idaho Juvenile Detention Center in Caldwell, a lush vegetable garden thrives at the hands of the young detainees.

Since spring, students at the center’s Pat Anderson School have transformed a plot of dirt surrounded by security fences into beds of rich soil bursting with growth.

Monday morning, they harvested their crop, netting almost 300 pounds of fresh corn, potatoes, cucumbers, and other vegetables, which they will donate to local charities.

Wearing mandatory striped pants and white T-shirts, the students dug eagerly in the soil. They said they were happy to give the food away to needy people; they were also just happy to get outside in the sun, regardless of temperatures that spiked toward 100 degrees.

“I’m getting my daily supply of Vitamin D!” one student said, jokingly, as he pulled small red potatoes from the earth.

About 1,500 students pass through the detention center each year. The average stay is about two weeks, and attending the center’s Pat Anderson School is mandatory, even in the summer.

The garden, funded by a \$2,000 state grant and built with materials donated from local businesses, acts as an

outdoor classroom.

The garden gives the students a hands-on application for their lessons, math teacher Jan Adams said.

For example, her class measured the garden beds and calculated the amount of lumber and soil needed to create raised beds. They've since monitored the growth of the vegetables.

The garden also teaches students to work toward a common goal and take pride in ownership, according to language arts teacher Janet Smith.

"They're working together cooperatively — planning, building, weeding, watering — and every time an adult tries to pull a weed they chew us out," she joked.

For students at the detention center, many of whom have grown up in rough urban environments, the garden also offers a deeper lesson, a chance to reconnect with the land.

"Some have never seen a garden. They don't even know where their vegetables come from," said garden coordinator Craig Olsen.

Heidi Martin, a child nutrition coordinator with the Idaho Department of Education, said the detention center's garden could be a model for other alternative school gardens in the state. Her department funded 15 school gardens this year, with the aim of increasing student knowledge of nutrition and agriculture.

"This is one of the most impressive school gardens I've seen," Martin said. "We see the most success at alternative schools, because gardening really gives them a chance to learn and grow and see their accomplishments."

road maintenance funding by \$180,101 for a total of \$930,101 — a dramatic increase over this year's funding of \$550,000 and an increase of 24 percent over what was in Rothweiler's proposed budget.

The cuts came from requested capital projects from the Parks and Recreation Department, saving from changes to the YMCA's city pool management contract, by pushing out the replacement schedule for the pool's winter bubble and trimming the city's contingency fund.

Grant Funds Emergency Programs

The grants through the

Federal Emergency Management Agency include \$7,825 to Minidoka County, \$6,087 to Twin Falls County and \$2,800 each to Jerome and Cassia counties.

tional board that distributes funds to high-need areas.

It is now up to county commissioners and the organizations to decide how the money will be spent in the counties.

Twin Falls Postmaster Bill Reese said that the Postal Service's value of reliability would remain intact if the delivery time is lengthened. That's echoed in the report, which states: "Some of the Postal Service's largest business mailers have stated that they

value consistency over speed and they would tolerate slightly slower service to save costs."

Even without the delivery time frames changing, the Postal Service is making efforts to trim back costs.

The Postal Service is working on moving the Magic Valley's mail processing to Boise, a move that will save \$623,000 each year — but also

at the cost of more than two dozen local jobs.

Twenty jobs are expected to be created in Boise with the transfer and the USPS hopes to find the six other employees new positions also, though it'll require reassignment or transfers, Reese said. Details might be available on that next week, he said.

"The goal is for us to place everyone in a job," he said.

have to go through with a plan to cut electricity to lower Manhattan to protect its equipment. Engineers had worried that salty seawater would damage the wiring.

And two pillars of the neighborhood came through the storm just fine: The New York Stock Exchange said it would be open for business on Monday, and the Sept. 11 memorial at the World Trade Center site didn't lose a single tree.

The center of Irene passed over Central Park at mid-morning with the storm packing 65 mph winds. By evening, with its giant figure-six shape brushing over New England and drifting east, it was down to 50 mph. It was expected to drop below tropical storm strength — 39 mph — before midnight, and was to drift into Canada later Sunday or early Monday.

"Just another storm," said Scott Beller, who was at a Lowe's hardware store in the Long Island hamlet of Centereach, looking for a generator because his power was out.

The Northeast was spared the urban nightmare some had worried about — crippled infrastructure, stranded people and windows blown out of skyscrapers. Early assessments showed "it wasn't as bad as we thought it would be," New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie said.

Later in the day, the extent of the damage became clearer. Flood waters were rising across New Jersey, closing side streets and major highways including the New Jersey Turnpike and Interstate 295. In Essex County, authorities used a five-ton truck to ferry people away from their homes as the Passaic River neared its expected crest Sunday night.

Twenty homes on Long Island Sound in Connecticut were destroyed by churning surf. The torrential rain chased hundreds of people in upstate New York from their homes and washed out 137 miles of the state's main highway.

In Massachusetts, the National Guard had to help people evacuate. The ski resort town of Wilmington, Vt., was flooded, but nobody could get to it because both state roads leading there were underwater.

"This is the worst I've ever seen in Vermont," said Mike O'Neil, the state emergency management director.

Rivers roared in New Jersey and Pennsylvania. In the Hudson Valley town of New Paltz, N.Y., so many people were gathering to watch a rising river that authorities banned alcohol sales and ordered people inside. And in Rhode Island, which has a geography thick with bays, inlets and shoreline, authorities

were worried about coastal flooding at evening high tide.

The entire Northeast has been drenched this summer with what has seemed like relentless rain, saturating the ground and raising the risk of flooding, even after the storm passes altogether.

The storm system knocked out power for 4½ million people along the Eastern Seaboard. Power companies were picking through uprooted trees and reconnecting lines in the South and had restored electricity to hundreds of thousands of people by Sunday afternoon.

Under its first hurricane warning in a quarter-century, New York took extraordinary precautions. There were sandbags on Wall Street, tarps over subway grates and plywood on storefront windows.

The subway stopped rolling. Broadway and baseball were canceled.

With the worst of the storm over, hurricane experts assessed the preparations and concluded that, far from hyping the danger, authorities had done the right thing by being cautious.

Max Mayfield, former director of the National Hurricane Center, called it a textbook case.

"They knew they had to get people out early," he said. "I think absolutely lives were saved."

Mayfield credited government officials — but also the meteorologists. Days before the storm ever touched American land, forecast models showed it passing more or less across New York City.

"I think the forecast itself was very good, and I think the preparations were also good," said Keith Seitter, director of the American Meteorological Society. "If this exact same storm had happened without the preparations that everyone had taken, there would have been pretty severe consequences."

In the storm's wake, hundreds of thousands of passengers still had to get where they were going. Airlines said about 9,000 flights were canceled.

Officials said the three major New York-area airports will resume most flights Monday morning. Philadelphia International Airport reopened Sunday afternoon, and flights resumed around Washington, which took a glancing blow from the storm.

In the South, authorities still were not sure how much damage had been done. North Carolina Gov. Beverly Perdue said some parts of her state

were unreachable. TV footage showed downed trees, toppled utility poles and power lines and mangled awnings.

Virginia Gov. Bob McDonnell had initially warned that Irene could be a "catastrophic" monster with record storm surges of up to 8 feet. But the mayor Virginia Beach, Va., suggested on Twitter that the damage was not as bad as feared, as did the mayor of Ocean City, Md.

One of two nuclear reactors at Calvert Cliffs, Md., automatically went offline because of high winds. Constellation Energy Nuclear Group said the plant was safe.

In New York, some cabs were up to their wheel wells in water, and water rushed over a marina near the New York Mercantile Exchange, where gold and oil are traded. But the flooding was not extensive.

"Whether we dodged a bullet or you look at it and said, 'God smiled on us,' the bottom line is, I'm happy to report, there do not appear to be any deaths attributable to the storm," Bloomberg said.

New York officials could not pinpoint when the trains would run again but warned that the Monday commute would be rough. The New York subway carries 5 million riders on an average weekday.

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High Speed Chase Ends in Crash Near Mountain Home

A high speed chase took law enforcement officers from near the city of Jerome to Mountain Home, where the suspect apparently crashed and was apprehended.

It is unclear what caused the Sunday afternoon chase; an on-duty sergeant with one of the responding agencies did not return a message relayed through Southern Idaho Regional Communications dispatchers.

According to scanner traffic, the suspect hit speeds in excess of 100 mph and may have driven

into oncoming lanes of travel. The suspect also appeared to have a handgun, but dropped it out of the vehicle before the end of the pursuit.

When the vehicle crashed, it also apparently started a brush fire.

They drive fast and get into a lot fender-benders. They don't always stay on the road and they never use a turn signal.

Yet at the end of the night, they're rewarded for doing it. Driver's Education was never like this.

Ranging in age from 10 to 14, the youngest racers at Magic Valley Speedway do not yet have driver's licenses, but Saturday nights they're let loose on the one-fifth mile track to race in what often becomes one of the most competitive and exciting events of the evening.

Quale's Electronics Jr. Stingers driver Kirstan "KC" Gillogly, age 14, is competing in her second year in the division.

She has already driven the No. 58 car into the winner's circle several times this season, but she has no intentions of stopping there.

It came down to another battle between Kris McKean and TJ Woodhall, but McKean held steady to win the Mr. Gas Late Models race Saturday night at Magic Valley Speedway.

With six cars in the starting grid, cautions shuffled up the field before the first lap was up on the scoreboard. Bobby Latham took the lion's share of the bad luck after contact with Woodhall sent him to the pits for the rest of the event with a broken brake line.

Once the race got rolling, McKean led the pack lap after lap. Still, Woodhall, with Jeff Pohlman directly behind, kept applying the pressure to McKean to the finish line.

"We had a faster car but just could not get around him," Woodhall said. "And

with Jeff (Pohlman) running my butt I didn't want to lose that position either."

Woodhall finished as the runner-up yet another time. Although Pohlman has the championship locked, McKean continues to rattle Woodhall's cage for second in the standings.

SOUTH WILLIAMSPORT, Pa. • An American flag draped around his shoulders, Braydon Salzman couldn't contain his glee when he found California teammate Nick Pratto to give him a postgame hug.

The boys from Huntington Beach are headed home with a Little League World Series championship.

Pratto singled in the winning run with two outs and the bases loaded in the bottom of sixth inning, and Salzman pitched a complete-game three-hitter in a 2-1 victory Sunday over Hamamatsu City, Japan, and the tournament title.

"USA! USA," yelled fans before Pratto's single.

"I was just thinking. 'Oh God, Oh God,' Before I was getting in the box," the 12-year-old Pratto said. "But once I got into the box, I calmed myself by telling myself to just look for a good pitch."

Pratto's clutch hit returned the World Series title to the United States with the type of victory even the big leaguers dream about. A U.S. team has now won six out of the last seven World Series, with Japan's win last year the exception.

Pratto tossed his helmet in to the air after rounding first before his teammates mobbed him in the infield. The teams exchanged handshakes at the plate before California's giddy

Scholarship true freshman Jake Van Ginkel is

Goodale and Frisina will get another chance to prove themselves Saturday when the Broncos go through a situational scrimmage that focuses on special teams.

"They are very, very close — in a good way," Choate said.

One possible factor in the decision is Frisina's lack of leg strength. His range stops at about 42 yards. That's fine for field goals, but the kicker also needs to serve as the backup kickoff specialist for road games.

"We're pretty much the same kicker," said Frisina, a walk-on from Brea, Calif. "(Goodale) has just got a little more distance and a little more height on me on his kicks."

"... My strength is accuracy. Forty-two yards and in ... they've told me that's where the money's going to be made. We've got to make those kicks." Frisina was 20-for-31 on field-goal attempts in two years at Saddleback. He has been kicking since his freshman year of high school.

He started at quarterback as a high school senior but decided at a young age that he would need to kick to have a future in football because of his size. He's just 5-foot-

NEW YORK • First came the end of Roger Federer's remarkable run of reaching a record 10 consecutive Grand Slam finals.

Then he failed to make it to a major semifinal after a record 23 in a row.

The U.S. Open marks Federer's last chance to prevent the close of another streak: In each season from 2003-10, he won at least one Grand Slam title — and sometimes as many as three. He's 0-

for-2011 heading into the year's last major tournament, where play is scheduled to begin Monday morning, after what the U.S. Tennis Association said was "minimal damage" to the site over the weekend from Tropical Storm Irene.

This U.S. Open also is Federer's first major tournament since he turned 30 on Aug. 8. That age tends to represent a barrier to success in tennis: Of the past 100 Grand Slam titles, only five were won by a man past his 30th birthday. The last to do

it was Andre Agassi at the 2003 Australian Open.

Federer, though, said that his age hasn't affected his expectations.

"Hasn't changed anything. I'm still as professional. I'm still as hungry. Everything's still completely normal," he explained. "It's just a number that's changed. I'm ready to go."

His resume is filled with some rather impressive numbers, including a total of 16 Grand Slam titles and five consecutive U.S. Open championships from 2004-08, before his 40-match winning streak at Flushing Meadows ended in the 2009 final

against Juan Martin del Potro. Last year, Federer lost in the semifinals to Novak Djokovic.

For his career, Federer is 223-33 in Grand Slam matches, an .871 winning percentage. He can tie Agassi for the second-most victories at majors — Jimmy Connors retired with 233 — by beating 54th-ranked Santiago Giraldo of Colombia (who, for the record, is 2-10 in Grand Slam play) on Monday.

They're slated to play their first-round match in Arthur Ashe Stadium at night, after seven-time major champion Venus Williams meets Vesna Dolonts of Russia.

Other matches on the Day 1 schedule include 2006 U.S. Open champi-

on Maria Sharapova against Heather Watson of Britain; reigning Wimbledon champion Petra Kvitova against Alexandra Dulgheru of Romania; 2010 U.S. Open runner-up Vera Zvonareva against Stephanie Foretz Gacon of France; 19-year-old American Ryan Harrison against No. 27-seeded Marin Cilic of Croatia; and No. 8 Mardy Fish — the highest-seeded American in New York for the first time — against Tobias Kamke of Germany.

With 2005, 2009 and 2010 champion Kim Clijsters sidelined by a stomach muscle injury, the third-seeded Sharapova joins Williams' younger sister, Serena, as the women considered most

likely to win the title two weeks from now.

For the first time since the 2004 Australian Open, neither Federer nor Rafael Nadal is seeded No. 1 at a Grand Slam tournament.

Instead, that honor went to Djokovic, who is producing one of the greatest seasons in tennis history. He's 57-2 with nine titles, including at Wimbledon and the Australian Open.

He's also 5-0 against Nadal.

Drink Some Beer and Help Idaho Public Schools

Government vs. the private sector. Where should one end and the other begin? That debate has been simmering for a long time, but with the economy in the dumps, it has heated up considerably. Both private industry and government have turned over every stone they can find to increase revenue — or compensate for money they’ve lost. The issue was front and center a year ago when the Idaho Land Board voted to spend \$2.7 million on Affordable Self-Storage in Boise. At that time, the Land Board — which consists of Gov. Butch Otter, Schools Superintendent Tom Luna, Attorney General Lawrence Wasden, State Controller Donna Jones and Secretary of State Ben Ysursa — voted unanimously in favor of the purchase, although Otter and Luna have since said their “aye” votes were a mistake.

The property was purchased with proceeds from Idaho’s endowment land portfolio with the intention of giving the money the business makes to the state’s public schools and other institutions. According to the Associated Press, the storage business generated about \$30,000 in annual taxes as a private business, but it now yields \$20,000 per month to the state.

This isn’t the only example of state government getting involved in businesses that compete with private enterprise. The state also owns timberlands that compete with private forestry companies

Now another similar proposal has been floated. This time the Department of Lands is looking for someone to build a brewpub on a property it manages in downtown Boise.

So why would a conservative state like Idaho, which traditionally touts limited government, do these things?

The answer is simple — it is required by the Constitution to do so.

Idaho was originally given 3.7 million acres from the federal government as “trust land” at the time of statehood in 1890, and about 2.5 million of those acres remain. The deal was that the state would have to manage those lands so as to generate as much money as possible to support schools and other important endeavors. The exact wording in Article IX, Section 8 of the state Constitution is the state is obligated to manage the lands “in such a manner as will secure the maximum long-term financial return.”

Other states had similar agreements, and some, desperate for cash, sold those lands outright. The one-time windfall was nice, but once that money has been spent, it’s gone. And with few signs the economy is going to improve, they’ll be hurting in the next few years. Idaho would be wise to hold on to its land.

The property being proposed for the brewpub (a 95-year-old building near the Capitol) is 86 percent vacant and loses tens of thousands of dollars. The property itself isn’t part of the endowment acreage, but it’s part of the endowment’s holdings.

Nonetheless, it makes sense to find a prospective tenant who can turn those losses into profit for the state at a time when schools are scavenging for cash.

However, such a business shouldn’t have any unfair advantages over the private sector. On that point the critics are right. It was an argument they made in regards to the storage facility, which doesn’t have to pay property taxes. Because of that, it could conceivably charge lower rates, which would give it an unfair leg up on private storage businesses.

To that end, Rep. Marv Hagedorn, R-Meridian, has a reasonable compromise — amend the endowment lands’ tax-free status to level the playing field with private business. That way such enterprises would have to play by the same rules as private enterprise.

Purists who rue any form of government competition with the private sector may not like it, but these same people also profess to cherish the Constitution. And Idaho’s is very clear — we have a judiciary responsibility to get the maximum amount of money we can from our trust land.

Look at it this way — the more money that’s generated from those lands, the less the state has to take from us in taxes. That should play well in Idaho.

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U.S. Workers are Victims of a Speedup

Mind racing at 4 a.m.? Guiltily realizing you’ve been only half-listening to your child for the past hour? Checking work email at a stoplight, at the dinner table, in bed? Dreading once-pleasant diversions, like dinner with friends, as just one more thing on your to-do list?

Guess what: It’s not you. It’s the speedup. To keep profits climbing in tough times, corporations have laid off staff and piled more and more work onto the remaining employees.

Webster’s defines speedup as “an employer’s demand for accelerated output without increased pay,” and it used to be a household word. Bosses would speed up the line to fill a big order, goose profits or punish a restive workforce. Workers recognized it, unions fought it — and, if necessary, walked out over it.

Now the word we use is “productivity,” and pundits across the political spectrum revel in the fact that year after year, American companies are wringing more value out of their employees than they did the year before. Just counting work that’s on the books we now put in an average of 122 more hours per year than Brits, and 378 hours more than Germans. Worldwide, almost everyone except Americans has, at least on paper, a right to at least one day a week off, paid vacation time and paid maternity leave.

Sure, but we all have to do more with less — employers struggling to survive the downturn are just tighten-

ing their belts, right?

That’s true for some. But in the big picture, the data show a more insidious pattern. After a sharp dip in 2008 and ’09, U.S. economic output quickly recovered to near pre-recession levels. The United States did better than most of its fellow G-7 economies. But U.S. workers didn’t see the benefit: During the recession far more people here lost their jobs than anywhere else, and far fewer were hired back once the recovery began. And who knows what will happen now that the economy has made another downward turn?

Yes, some positions always get “rationalized” away, thanks to technological or organizational improvements — and, of course, offshoring remains a major factor. But increasingly, U.S. workers are also falling prey to what we’ll call offloading: cutting jobs and dumping the work onto the remaining staff. Consider a recent *Wall Street Journal* story about “superjobs,” a nifty euphemism for em-

ployees doing more than one job’s worth of work — more than half of all workers surveyed said their jobs had expanded, usually without a raise or bonus. All that extra work helped fuel nearly a sixfold increase in U.S. productivity from 2008 to 2010.

Workforce down, output up: No wonder corporate profits are up 22 percent since 2007, according to a new report by the Economic Policy Institute.

Which brings us to another shared delusion: multitasking. It seems the obvious fix — I’ll just answer this email while I help with your homework. But research shows most of us cannot actually multitask. And not only that: If you attempt to multitask constantly, your mental circuitry erodes and your brain loses its ability to focus.

Think you’re the exception? Nope, warns Stanford sociologist Clifford Nass. “You’re really lousy at it. No one talks about it — I don’t know why — but in fact there’s no contradictory evidence to this for about the

last 15, 20 years.” Actually, it’s not hard to guess why no one talks about it: We need to believe there’s a personal workaround for what we’re conditioned to see as a personal shortcoming. When, in fact, the problem is the absurd premise that our economy can produce ever more with ever less.

How have we been so brainwashed? For a lucky few, money and perks help sugarcoat the daily frenzy. But for most Americans, it’s just fear — of being passed over at best, downsized at worst.

Not that there aren’t winners in the speedup economy. Although incomes for 90 percent of U.S. workers have stagnated or fallen for the last three decades, the wealthiest 0.1 percent are making 6.4 times as much as they did in 1980. And that 22 percent increase in profits? Most of it accrued to a single industry: finance.

In other words, all that extra work you’ve taken on — the late nights, the skipped lunch hours, the missed soccer games — paid off. For them.

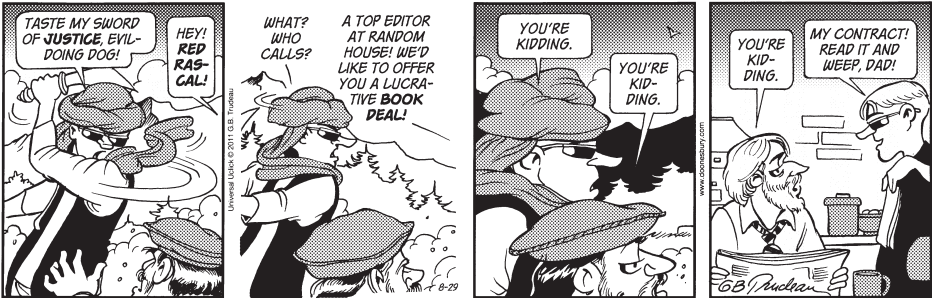

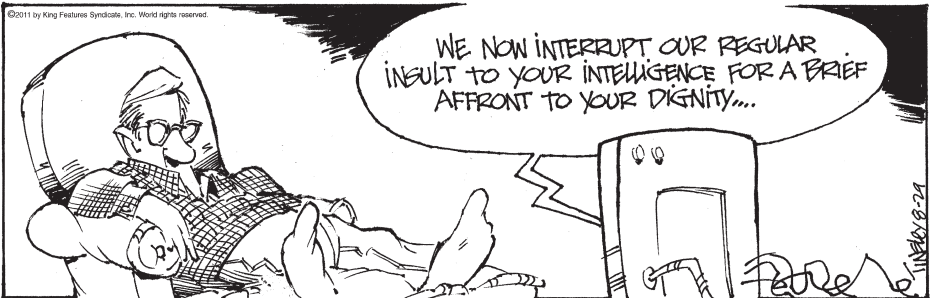
We must stop the insanity of thinking that Chinese communists and more socialism will save our economy. We must demand fair trade agreements to bring back U.S. jobs.

Agency Mulls Expansion for Redfish Lake Lodge

KETCHUM (AP) • The popular and remote Redfish Lake Lodge could get a facelift through a proposal under consideration by the U.S. Forest Service.

Lodge General Manager Jeff Clegg said the plan, if approved, would include steps to preserve the central Idaho lodge's history, replace the existing convenience store with a larger one, add some guest rooms and improve visitor safety by separating vehicle from pedestrian traffic.

"Right now, it's a little more like New Jersey on some weekends than the Sawtooths," Clegg said. "We do everything we can, but when you've got a lot more demand than you have spaces, people get creative with their parking."

The U.S. Forest Service wants to hear public opinion on the proposal because the lodge operates on the Sawtooth National Recreation Area under permits issued by the Forest Service. No federal funding will go toward the project, which will be fully

paid for by the lodge. The public comment period runs until Sept. 10, and if approved construction could begin as early as fall 2012.

The current parking layout requires lodge guests to cross the parking area to reach the existing general store and public restrooms. Many of the vehicles pull boats and trailers, limiting mobility and creating complicated bottlenecks.

"It's just a matter of time before someone gets hurt," Clegg said.

The proposal would create more parking in front of the new store and force traffic to travel one way when driving past the lodge. Guests would no longer need to cross the parking lot to reach the store or facilities.

The area has been designated a historical district, so any new building would have to blend in with the traditional log lodge and log cabins, which were built in the late 1920s and early 1930s. Clegg said the cost of construction — which would use concrete logs and other

modern materials — would be covered by revenue from the added rooms.

The lodge and guest cabins currently average 90 percent occupancy, with demand exceeding the number of rooms during busy periods, he said.

The building would be 5 feet shorter than the lodge, and therefore would not be visible from the lake or the beach.

To make up for any lost historical character, the lodge has agreed to two major changes that would help preserve and even improve the vintage feel of the lodge area. The most visible change will be moving the original log gas station, built in 1931, to the lakefront. Now being used as a bike shack, the relocated building would house exhibits on the history of the lodge and also serve as a stage for live music.

"Right now, it's tucked in a corner in the parking area," Baldwin said. "It has some character, and by moving it into this area, it will be more front and center."

Body of Missing Idaho Sheepherder Found

IDAHO FALLS (AP) • Clark County Sheriff Bart May says the body of missing sheepherder Tom Nick has been found by searchers.

The 67-year-old sheepherder was reported missing Tuesday after he failed to show up for a meeting with a sheep owner. He had last been heard from on Aug. 21, when he called his girlfriend from a remote location between Round Top and Red mountains.

May said volunteer Ike

Tomlinson was flying the mountainside in a powered parachute Saturday afternoon when he found Nick's body in steep terrain in the Irving Creek drainage area.

Idaho's suicide rate is high, with nearly 15 deaths per 100,000 people. In Kootenai County, that rate jumps to more than 25 deaths out of every 100,000.

MOUNTAIN HOME (AP) • The Elmore County Sheriff's Office says a 46-year-old Mountain Home woman has drowned at the Anderson Ranch Reservoir.

Detectives said Anne L. Butler was at the reservoir Saturday afternoon with her boyfriend when she went into the water and began struggling. Detec-

tives say her boyfriend, who couldn't swim, went to find someone with a cell phone to call for help. Sheriff's deputies arrived within the hour and found Butler's body about 15 feet from the shore.

The sheriff's office says detectives believe alcohol was a factor in Butler's death.

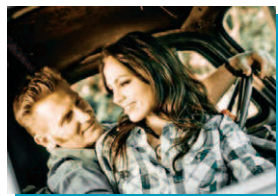

29 Dead in Suicide Bombing in Iraq Mosque

BAGHDAD • A suicide bomber blew himself up inside Baghdad’s largest Sunni mosque Sunday night, killing 29 people during prayers, a shocking strike on a place of worship similar to the one that brought Iraq to the brink of civil war five years ago.

Iraqi security officials said parliament lawmaker Khalid al-Fahdawi, a Sunni, was among the dead in the 9:40 p.m. attack.

Maj. Gen. Qassim al-Moussawi, a spokesman for Baghdad’s military op-

erations command, confirmed the bombing happened inside the Um al-Qura mosque during prayers in the western Baghdad neighborhood of al-Jamiaah. The blue-domed building is the largest Sunni mosque in Baghdad.

“I heard something like a very severe wind storm, with smoke and darkness, and shots by the guards,” said eyewitness Mohammad Mustafa, who hit in the hand by shrapnel. “Is al-Qaida able to carry out their acts against worshippers? How did this breach happen?”

That the bomber detonated his explosives vest inside the mosque is particularly alarming, as it is reminiscent

of a 2006 attack on a Shiite shrine in the Sunni city of Samarra that fueled widespread sectarian violence and nearly ignited a nationwide civil war. In that strike, Sunni militants planted bombs around the Samarra shrine, destroying its signature gold dome and badly damaging the rest of the structure.

Under deposed dictator Saddam Hussein, a Sunni, Iraq’s Shiite majority was persecuted and repressed. Shiites took power after his ouster, stoking Sunni resentment that bore the insurgency.

COPS FIND FIVE BODIES IN RURAL AREA NEAR MEXICO CITY

MEXICO CITY (AP) • A phone call to a relative of a missing person led police to excavate a corn field in a farming town not far from the capital, and discover the decomposed bodies of five people, authorities said Sunday.

A man, who has not been identified, told the family of the disappeared person that 23 bodies were buried in a field at Almoloya de Juarez, a town about 60 miles from Mexico City, Mexico state attorney general’s spokesman Alfredo Albiter said.

The excavation ended Sunday, and the forensics team found only five bodies, Albiter said. The bodies hadn’t yet been identified and he didn’t know if the body of the missing person was in the grave.

Mass graves have become an increasingly common discovery in Mexico’s brutal drug war, which has claimed more than 35,000 lives since President Felipe Calderon launched an offensive against drug traffickers in late 2006. Others put the dead toll at 40,000.

Several Mexican regions have seen a surge in violence often related to the drug business.

In the Pacific resort city of Acapulco, police found the decapitated body of a 25-year-old woman in the trunk of a sedan parked outside a home Sunday, Guerrero state police said. The motive for the crime were not clear.

Elsewhere in Acapulco, three men were shot dead in two separate incidents and their bodies left in public view in residential neighborhoods.

Syrian Unrest Raises Fears About Chemical Arsenal

In 2008, a secret State Department cable warned of a growing chemical weapons threat from a Middle Eastern country whose autocratic leader had a long history of stirring up trouble in the region. The leader, noted for his “support for terrorist organizations,” was attempting to buy technology from other countries to upgrade an already fearsome stockpile of deadly poisons, the

department warned.

The Middle Eastern state with the dangerous chemicals was not Libya, whose modest stockpile was thrust into the spotlight last week because of fighting there. It was Syria, another violence-torn Arab state whose advanced weapons are drawing new concern as the country drifts toward an uncertain future.

A sudden collapse of the government of Syrian President Bashar al-Assad could mean a breakdown in controls over the

country’s weapons, U.S. officials and weapons experts said in interviews. But while Libya’s chemical arsenal consists of unwieldy canisters filled mostly with mustard gas, the World War I-era blistering agent, Syria possesses some of the deadliest chemicals ever to be weaponized, dispersed in thousands of artillery shells and warheads that are easy to transport.

Syria’s preferred poison is not mustard gas but sarin, the nerve agent that killed 13 people and sickened about 1,000 during a ter-

rorist attack on the Tokyo subway system in 1995. Sarin, which is lethal if inhaled even in minute quantities, can also be used to contaminate water and food supplies.

Although many analysts doubt that Assad would deliberately share chemical bombs with terrorists, it is not inconceivable that weapons could vanish amid the chaos of an uprising that destroys Syria’s vaunted security services, which safeguard the munitions.

Gadhafi Forces Killed Detainees, Survivors Say

TRIPOLI, Libya • Retreating loyalists of Moammar Gadhafi killed scores of detainees and arbitrarily shot civilians over the past week, as rebel forces extended their control over the Libyan capital, survivors and a human rights group said Sunday.

In one case, Gadhafi fighters opened fire and hurled grenades at more than 120 civilians huddling in a hangar used as a makeshift lockup near a military base, said Mabrouk Abdullah, 45, who escaped with a bullet wound in his side. Some 50 charred corpses were still scattered across the hangar on Sunday.

New York-based Human Rights

Watch said the evidence it has collected so far “strongly suggests that Gadhafi government forces went on a spate of arbitrary killing as Tripoli was falling.” The justice minister in the rebels’ interim government, Mohammed al-Alagi, said the allegations would be investigated and leaders of Gadhafi’s military units put on trial.

So far, there have been no specific allegations of atrocities carried out by rebel fighters, though human rights groups are continuing to investigate some unsolved cases.

AP reporters have witnessed several episodes of rebels mistreating detainees or sub-Saharan Africans suspected of being hired Gadhafi guns. Earlier this week, rebels and their supporters did not help eight wounded

Calif. Would Be First State to Ban Foam Containers

SACRAMENTO, Calif. • Restaurant owner Gary Honeycutt says a push in California’s state Legislature to ban the plastic foam containers he uses to serve up takeout meals could cost him thousands of dollars in an industry where profit margins already are razor thin.

BJ’s Kountry Kitchen, in the heart of California’s farm country, uses about 26,000 of the 9-inch foam clamshells a year, mostly for takeout by the customers who come in for the restaurant’s popular breakfast omelets.

“We put cheese on those omelets. And when we put the cheese on, it’s really hot and bubbly and it goes right through the biodegradable stuff,” he said. He expects his costs would more than double if the state requires him to

use only biodegradable cartons.

The bill by Democratic state Sen. Alan Lowenthal, would prohibit restaurants, grocery stores and other vendors from dispensing food in expanded polystyrene containers, commonly known as Styrofoam, beginning in 2016. If signed into law, the measure would make California the first to institute a statewide ban on such containers. More than 50 California cities and counties already have similar bans.

The bill would exempt school districts and city and county jurisdictions if they implemented programs that recycled more than 60 percent of their foam waste.

Lowenthal said litter from the foam containers is one of the most abundant forms of debris found in city streets, sewers and beaches.

No group immediately claimed responsibility for Sunday's bombing, but suicide attacks generally are a hallmark of al-Qaida, which is dominated by Sunnis. Intelligence officials have speculated that al-Qaida will do almost anything to re-ignite sectarian violence, but the group recently had focused on attacking Iraqi security forces and the government to prove how unstable Iraq remains.

Two security officials and

medics at two Baghdad hospitals put the casualty toll at 29 dead and 38 wounded. All spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to release the information.

Al-Moussawi put the death toll at only six and said there was no significant damage to the mosque. Conflicting death tolls are common immediately after attacks in Iraq.

In a statement early Monday, Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki called on Iraqis to stand strong against terrorists and "pursue them wherever they are."

"This is a scenario that's on the radar screen if things go downhill," said a U.S. security official who monitors events in Syria. "A lot of people are watching this closely." Syria first developed chemical weapons in the 1970s and slowly amassed a sophisticated arsenal under the close supervision of then-President Hafez al-Assad and, later, his son Bashar, the current president. Using technology obtained in part from Russian scientists, the Assads sought to create a strategic deterrent against Israel, its vastly more powerful southern neighbor, whose forces humiliated Syrian troops in the 1967 Arab-Israeli war and captured the strategic Syrian plateau known as the Golan Heights.

Many countries, including the United States and Russia, gradually eliminated their chemical-weapons arsenals, but Syria refused to sign the U.N. Chemical Weapons convention and proceeded to develop an ever larger and deadlier stockpile. The CIA has concluded that Syria possesses a large stockpile of sarin-based warheads and was working on developing VX, a deadlier nerve agent that resists breaking down in the environment.

By early in the last decade, some weapons experts ranked Syria's chemical stockpile as probably the largest in the world, consisting of tens of tons of highly lethal chemical agents and hundreds of Scud missiles as well as lesser rockets, artillery rockets and bomblets for delivering the poisons.

Jeffrey Feltman, the State Department's chief diplomat for the Middle East, last year cited Syria's chemical weapons program as a primary reason for continuing U.S. economic sanctions against the Assad regime.

"We will continue pressing the Syrian government on its problematic policies," Feltman said in testimony before a House committee. The 2008 State Depart-

ment cable, obtained and made public by the anti-secrecy group WikiLeaks, was prompted by a Syrian attempt to obtain glass-lined reactors and other high-tech equipment from a private Indian firm. U.S. diplomats pressed the Indian government to block the sale. "We are concerned that the equipment in question is intended for, or could be diverted to Syria's chemical weapons program," the cable stated.

It was unclear whether the sale, which at the time was in its final stages, was allowed to proceed. Syria tops the list of Middle East countries with potentially vulnerable weapons systems, but U.S. officials say the political turmoil in the region has prompted a reassessment of the risks posed by arsenals elsewhere as well. Several Middle Eastern countries possess large numbers of conventional weapons as well as nuclear research reactors whose fuel rods could be used in a "dirty bomb." There is no evidence that advanced munitions have been stolen. But U.S. officials acknowledge increasing uncertainty about the control of weapons depots in countries undergoing prolonged periods of unrest.

Western officials have been less concerned about Libya's chemical stockpile, which was all but dismantled after Moammar Gadhafi agreed about eight years ago to renounce weapons of mass destruction. In reality, it was never especially impressive, having barely advanced beyond early 20th-century technology, weapons experts say. At the time Libyan rebels overran Gadhafi's main compound in Tripoli last week, the stockpile consisted of 11 metric tons of mustard agent and 845 tons of chemical precursors, none of it directly usable in weapons and all of it stored in steel barrels inside a fortified bunker.

"We assess that the facility is secure," the State Department said Friday in a statement on the Libyan program.

men, presumably Gadhafi fighters, who were stranded in a bombed out fire station in Tripoli's Abu Salim neighborhood, some pleading for water.

Najib Barakat, the health minister in the rebels' interim government, said Sunday that he does not yet have a death toll for the weeklong battle for Tripoli. Hundreds have died and more bodies, some in advanced stages of decay, are still being retrieved from the streets.

Barakat said efforts are being made to identify bodies. At the least, the corpses of suspected Gadhafi fighters, especially non-Libyans, are being photographed before burial, to allow for possible future identification by relatives.

In fighting late Sunday, pro-Gadhafi elements fired Grad rockets at rebel forces gathering in the town of Nawfaliyah, not far from Gadhafi's home town of Sirte, rebels said.

Rebels gave residents there 10 days to allow rebel forces in peacefully or face an assault. A rebel spokesman said many

Gadhafi loyalists have fled to Sirte and are preparing for a fierce battle.

Rebels rode into Tripoli a week ago, then fought fierce battles with Gadhafi forces, especially at the former Libyan leader's Bab al-Aziziya compound and the Abu Salim neighborhood, a regime stronghold.

As the rebels consolidated their control and Gadhafi fighters fled, reports of atrocities began emerging over the weekend.

Human Rights Watch said it has evidence indicating regime troops killed at least 17 detainees in an improvised lockup, a building of Libya's internal security service, in the Gargur neighborhood of Tripoli. A doctor who examined the corpses said about half had been shot in the back of the head and that abrasions on ankles and wrists suggested they had been bound.

The group spoke to Osama Al-Swayi who had been detained there, along with 24 others.

On Aug. 21, detainees heard rebels advancing and shouting "Allahu Akbar!" or "God is great" he told Human Rights Watch.

"We were so happy, and we

knew we would be released soon," he said. "Snipers were upstairs; then they came downstairs and started shooting. An old man (and another person) were shot outside our door. (The rest of us) ran out because they opened the door and said, 'Quickly, quickly, go out!'"

He said the soldiers told them to lie on the ground. He said he heard one soldier saying, "Just finish them off." Four soldiers fired at the detainees.

"I was near the corner and got hit in the right hand, the right foot and the right shoulder. In one instant, they finished off all the people with me. ... No one was breathing. Some of them had head wounds," he told the rights group.

Gadhafi forces set up another detention center in a hangar near their Yarmouk military base in southern Tripoli.

Abdullah, who was at the hangar Sunday, said he had survived a massacre there last week. He said he had been detained in the city of Zlitan to the east on Aug. 16 and was brought to the hangar with other civilian captives. All were beaten and tortured,

he said.

"They didn't even ask us questions," he said, "They just beat us and called us rats."

On Tuesday, he said, more than 120 prisoners were in the hangar when a soldier told them they'd be released at dusk, Abdullah said. A short time later, guards hurled hand grenades inside, then opened fire. He was shot and wounded in his side, but fled the hanger. He hid outside when soldiers returned and fired on other survivors. When they left, he escaped.

Ahmed Mohammed, 25, also said he survived the massacre and told a similar story. Neither knew how many had been killed nor how and when the bodies had been burned.

Amnesty International spoke to another survivor, Hussein al-Lafi, who said three of his brothers were killed that day.

"They (the guards) immediately opened fire, and I saw one of them holding a hand grenade. Seconds later, I heard an explosion, followed by four more. I fell on the ground face down. Others fell on top of me and I could feel their warm blood ... People were screaming and there were many more rounds of fire."

"It's not biodegradable, it's not compostable, and if it's in the water for a long time, it breaks up into small beads and lasts for thousands of years. It costs millions to clean up beaches," he said.

San Francisco banned polystyrene containers in 2007, but the city's ingrained emphasis on conservation made the switch relatively easy, said Rob Black, executive director of the Golden Gate Restaurant Association.

"I do know that many of the restaurants had already started a transition to compostable or biodegradable containers, so it was actually not as big of a transition as people might think because it was already something that was happening within the culture here," he said.

Other jurisdictions across the country have banned Styrofoam, including Suffolk County in New York and the coastal city of Freeport, Maine.

Opponents of the bill say it fails to address the root

cause of litter — the litterers themselves. Litterbugs will toss out the containers whether they're made of polystyrene or biodegradable cardboard, said Michael Westerfield, corporate director of recycling for Dart Container.

"At the end of the day, people that litter don't care what type of product they're littering," he said.

Dart, one of two companies in California that make the Styrofoam products, employs about 600 people in the state. The company already makes the biodegradable alternative, but the two California plants are incapable of producing anything other than the Styrofoam material.

"If you get rid of manufacturers like Dart, how do you know all the alternative materials will come from California? The reality is, they won't," he said.

The California Chamber of Commerce has labeled the measure as one of its "job-killer bills," saying it threatens manufacturing jobs while increasing costs for restaurants that will have to spend more on alternative containers.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

Today's deal proved too challenging to both expert declarers. Can you do better?

Both tables in the match between Netherlands and France stopped sensibly low at four hearts, but Marc Bompis for France found the deceptive diamond lead. Declarer, Wubbo de Boer, protected himself against the wrong eventuality when he went up with the diamond ace and played the heart king. The 4-0 heart split doomed him, since East, Henri Szwarc, won, cashed the heart queen, and exited with a spade. Now there was only one home for a spade loser. Declarer had to lose a further spade and a heart trick for one down.

At the other table Christian Mari didn't exactly find the best line either after a spade lead, but he had a chance to recover. He won the first trick, cashed the club king, and played a heart to dummy's king and East's ace. East cashed his heart queen and got out with a spade, but Mari could win and play a diamond up. When diamonds were not 6-0, he escaped, since he could now cash two clubs to throw his spade losers away and could then simply concede one more trump trick.

The right play is to unblock the club king at trick two and then ruff a spade in dummy. Now you pitch your second spade loser on the club ace and play the heart king. This way you are sure to lose no more than three trump tricks, whatever the lie of the cards.

ANSWER: There is no good reason to lead anything but a club now, and if you are going to do so, leading the queen to try to retain the lead and plan the defense makes good sense. There is a reasonable chance that dummy or declarer may have a higher club than you, but if that is not so, you may be happy to have remained on lead to trick two.


