

For Gun Lovers, 1,900 Acres May Fall Their Way

JEROME • Jerome County may have a new shooting range in its future.

Paul resident Kenny Riedlinger has approached the county with the idea to turn a 1,900-acre stretch of eastern Jerome County into a shooting range with firing distances of up to 1,200 yards.

County commissioners met with

Riedlinger on Monday to talk about the idea, which is still in the early stages. County leaders didn't give the project the green light, but unanimously agreed that a shooting range would have a better chance of working out in a different location, preferably public land in the Cinder Butte area northeast of Hazelton.

If the project becomes a reality, it would provide a shooting spot for Riedlinger's Kimama Butte Shooting Club – as well as the public - that would be easily accessible to people living in Mini-Cassia, Riedlinger said. "There's a big need for anybody to come out and shoot because all the gravel pits where people target practice are getting shut down," he said.

The idea is for the range to be available for hunting rifles and pistols, he said.

Much work is ahead, though.

The next step is for the county to file an application outlining the project with the Please see RANGE, M2

Filing Opens for Elections

City council seats will be up for election across the Magic Valley in November, two months after the filing deadline of Sept. 9.

Tired of the way your city is being run? Then, in the words of one freshly declared Twin Falls City Council candidate, "get off the sidelines" - the filing deadline for city council elections across the Magic Valley is less than two weeks away.

From there, its about two months until you and your neighbors have a say in who will represent you in setting ordinances, property tax rates and the overall management of your city.

Two people have already filed for Twin Falls city elections: Councilwoman Rebecca Mills Sojka, who was appointed to Republican State Sen. Lee Heider's seat last winter, and Suzanne Hawkins, a local business owner seeking Councilman Will Kezele's seat. Kezele said Monday night that he won't seek another term because a new business opportunity would demand too much of his time for him to serve at the best of his ability.

Kezele joins Councilman David E. Johnson as not seeking re-election this November. Johnson said earlier this month he felt he had served long enough and it was time for new blood on the council

That brings the guaranteed tally of contestants in Twin Falls to four: former Twin Falls Police Chief Jim Munn said he'll run for a seat being vacated by a departing councilman, and Councilman Trip Craig said he is going to run for a fourth term.

"I know at least in my circle, my little world in Twin Falls, a lot of people like to complain but no one really wants to do anything about it," said Hawkins, a political newcomer and longtime Magic Valley resident. "So I decided to get off the sidelines."

In recent years, Twin Falls city elections have been low-turnout affairs: the 2009 election had only one seat with a substantial challenge - a four-way race that ended with Greg Lanting's reelection - and only 12.7 percent turnout among voters registered in the city. The 2007 election saw three of the four seats contested, but still fewer than 20 percent of total voters turned out.

Rich Stivers, campaign manager for Munn, said the "dismal" turnout might be evidence that "maybe people flat out don't care" about local elections. He's part of an informal, nonpartisan group seeking qualified candidates to run for council - though stopping short of recruiting them outright - and aside from Munn, hasn't had much luck.

Private Clinics Look Forward to Hospital Merger

Private medical clinics are responding positively to a possible Magic Valley hospital merger.

Last Thursday, St. Benedicts Family Medical Center in Jerome announced it was discussing merging with St. Luke's Health System. Many of the details of the deal have not yet been released, but the merger is expected to be finalized by Oct. 1.

The deal may affect employment at St. Benedicts, but it may also benefit the local community by providing faster and better service to patients.

"Jerome patients go to Twin Falls for specialists and we see a lot of Twin Falls patients who come over here to Jerome for care," said Joshua Kern, a partner with Family Care Physicians, a private medical clinic in Jerome. The clinic is located within the St. Benedicts facility.

"A deal like this would continue to build stronger bridges between the two communities to provide a more seamless health care model," he said.

Kern was involved in some of the early merger discussions with St. Benedicts and St. Luke's, representing the private medical community in Please see MERGER, M2

Police Finger Burglary Suspects for More Attempted Thefts

say they've arrested the men seen in surveillance videos released to the public last week, videos that show two men and one woman attempting to burglarize a home on Galena Street. Both Jon Bellus, 20, and Ramon Garcia, 22, were identified as suspects within a few days of the Aug. 26 incident.

According to the police report, 94-year-old Mildred Soran was stirred from sleep around 3 a.m. by the sounds of someone trying to gain entry to her house. She saw flashlights outside her window and called 911. Police arrived to find the door to an attached garage kicked in.

Upon reviewing surveillance footage, police published the images on Friday for public awareness, as 30 residential burglaries have been reported since early June. A tip received last weekend pointed toward Garcia, whom was identified

When interviewed by detectives, Garcia and Carlson denied any knowledge of the incident.

Police identified Bellus as the other male suspect. Bellus told police he, Garcia and Carlson were the people in the video and how they picked the Galena Street house because it appeared to be unoccupied. Bellus also noted that Garcia said the video cameras looked fake.

Both men are charged with felony conspiracy to commit burglary. Garcia is held at Twin Falls County Jail on \$25,000 bond, and Bellus was detained on \$10,000 bond. Bellus has bonded out. Both are scheduled for a Sept. 9 preliminary hearing in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

They were slapped with the same charges earlier this year, as Twin Falls County prosecutors say they planned to steal painkillers from a pharmacy for the purpose of selling them. Garcia and Bellus were arrested in May. They pleaded not guilty and face trial in late September.

HAILEY • The future of air service in the Wood River Valley is now up in the air.

The Federal Aviation Administration has notified the Friedman Memorial Airport Authority Board that it has suspended indefinitely any further work on a draft environmental impact statement for the replacement airport project.

The FAA is concerned the project might not be affordable locally or for the federal agency itself, given the drying-up of federal funding, according to a letter from FAA Airports Division Manager Donna P. Taylor to Friedman Airport Manager Rick Baird.

Inflation and better data about costs pushed the estimated price tag from \$107 million for an unnamed site to between \$285 million and \$314 million, depending on the specific site considered.

The FAA, which spent about \$6 million on field studies, is also concerned

"If we are following up with a patient that is coming from the St. Luke's ER, then we can easily print out the patient's medical records and see the doctor's notes for that patient," she said.

Milliron says trying to retrieve non-electronic records from St. Benedicts takes quite a bit of time. Sometimes patients have come and gone before the clinic can receive a copy of

the records. Overall, Kern says having

a larger hospital will help increase quality of care. But he acknowledged the concern the public may have about the possible merger.

Byrne Accused of Leading Police on Low-speed Chase

The man who reportedly led police on a June highspeed chase that ended in a standoff at the Twin Falls ShopKo is accused

of leading police on another, lower-speed pursuit on Friday.

Dylan Byrne, 28, of Twin Falls, was charged with felony possession of a controlled substance after police attempted to stop him for pulling out in front of traffic while leaving a gas station on Washington Street North at about 12:45 p.m. The report states that Officer Ruben Murillo activated his overhead lights and pursued Byrne at 15 mph, as Byrne refused to yield.

Byrne allegedly drove nearly six blocks at that speed, running a stop sign



at the intersection of Jefferson Street and Heyburn Avenue before complying with the officer's lights and siren.

Upon searching the vehicle, Murillo said he found marijuana and a glass pipe with

methamphetamine residue in it. Byrne was arrested and detained at the Twin Falls County Jail. He was arraigned on his new charges on Monday, and a \$50,000 bond was set. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for Sept. 9.

In the matter of the high-speed chase from June, in which he allegedly drove at up to 90 mph along U.S. Highway 93 while eluding a Jerome County sheriff's deputy, Byrne awaits a Sept. 27 trial for unlawful possession of a firearm.

Garibaldi Changes Plea in Auger Falls Fire Case

The Buhl man accused of starting the 2010 Auger Falls Fire has pleaded guilty to one of three misdemeanor charges levied against him.

Don Garibaldi, 55, appeared in Twin Falls County 5th District Magistrate Court on Aug. 23 for a preand trial conference changed his plea to a misdemeanor charge of damage to forage on public lands from throwing away or leaving lighted substances.

His trial was set to start later this week. The state, which claims he started a fire that burned nearly 600 acres in the Snake River

Canyon near Twin Falls including Auger Falls Park, has dropped two other charges in the case.

According to the police report, Garibaldi is believed to have thrown out a still-lit cigarette butt while working on private land west of Twin Falls. Auger Falls Park is jointly managed by the city of Twin Falls and the U.S. Bureau of Land Management.

The charge of damage to forage on public lands from throwing away or leaving lighted substances carries a maximum penalty of six months in jail and a \$1,000 fine for each conviction. Sentencing is set for Oct. 12.

cludes Star Valley High School, spent five years working in eastern Idaho schools before moving to Wyoming. He said the state's willingness to invest in education was a big part of what drew him away from Shelly and Idaho Falls.

"The state makes a lot of money, and education is their top priority," he said. "The Legislature has chosen to spend its money on a strong schools system, and that puts a lot of resources at our disposal?'

For example, the state recently paid \$14 million to build an elementary school in Abrams' district, with no bond elections or tax increases needed.

At Star Valley High School alone, there are at least eight former Idaho teachers. Most of them also coached teams or advised clubs when they lived in Idaho.

Jeff Johnson left his job as a science teacher and football coach at Ririe High School last May. This is his first week as a teacher in Star Valley.

"Moving here allowed me the ability to free up some time with my family and took some of the financial pressure off of us feeling that I needed to pick up more coaching, or having my wife leave our youngest daughter while she worked

more," he said.


Higher Salaries Draw Idaho Teachers to Wyo.

For Idaho school administrators, it's a harsh reality that they can't do much to change.

"When it comes to salary, we aren't competitive with that, and we can't be," said Karla LaOrange, who does much of the recruiting for Idaho Falls School District 91. "I can't really say we can compete financially."

LaOrange said she sells teachers on the activities and lifestyles they can pursue in Idaho Falls, as well as the resources available through Idaho National Laboratory, the Idaho Falls Arts Council and the Museum of Idaho.

Idaho's budget woes have meant big cuts for schools. Over the past two years, Idaho Falls' two school districts each had about \$6 million in cuts. Eastern Idaho superintendents don't think they've seen the last of the cuts, either.





Otter: Damn the Consequences, Let's Low-Ball the Budget

Idaho Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter believes in cutting first, governing later.

ouble-talk and rhetoric aside, Idaho politicians fall into two categories: One believes that the state has a solemn responsibility to protect Idaho's public school students and its weakest citizens. The other is convinced that Idaho must cut taxes at all costs - especially taxes for the richest Idahoans.

Give him credit: Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter made it crystal clear last week in which camp he resides.

The governor proclaimed that he'll underestimate state tax revenue for the remainder of his term, forcing budget cuts that may later prove unnecessarv.

"You can expect the same thing the remainder of my time in office," Otter said last week in a talk at a luncheon sponsored by the Boise Metro Chamber of Commerce.

"The future budgets that we'll have in the state are going to not look an awful lot unlike budgets that we've had the last 3 $^{1\!/_{\!\!2}}$ years," the governor said. " ... We're still going to work at institutionalizing a lot of the changes that we made during this economic downturn."

Including, of course, record-breaking reductions in state spending for public schools and colleges and slashing the benefits to Medicaid recipients, the poorest and most desperate Idahoans.

First, a note about this newspaper's editorial history with Butch Otter.

We've endorsed him for election to statewide office nine times - including for reelection to a second term as governor last November - believing he's the kind of progressive conservative who reflects the views of most residents of this state.

Apparently, we were mistaken. Unlike his predecessors, Jim Risch, Dirk Kempthorne, Phil Batt and Cecil Andrus, this governor has changed his world view to match that of the flat-earthers who hijacked Idaho's Republican Party in 2008.

His new philosophy: Cut first, worry about the consequences later.

Idaho had cause to expect better of Butch Otter. He was always a fiscal conservative, but it seemed to us he had the best interests of all Idahoans at

Why Rick Perry's the Real Deal

few weeks ago it was possible to believe that Mitt Romney would win the New Hampshire primary and cruise easily to the Republican nomination. It's harder to see that now.

There have been a slew of polls showing Gov. Rick Perry of Texas surging to double-digit national leads. He leads across demographic groups – among educated Republicans and less-educated ones, among upscale and downscale. Most impressive, he's winning over the Republican activists who pay the closest attention and wield disproportionate influence

with primary voters. A poll by the conservative political Web sites, The Daily Caller/Conservative-



most electable, 46 percent named Perry, while only 20 percent named Romney. When asked who would do the best job on the economy, 27 percent said Perry and 14 percent said Romney. When asked who would do the best job controlling Washington spending, 20 percent chose Perry, 17 percent said Rep. Paul Ryan and only 8 percent chose Romney.

The evidence suggests that Perry's appeal will not be just a summer fad. He's benefiting from several of the trends that have fundamentally altered the Repub-

Romney could handle Perry. But that electorate no longer exists.

The events of 2009 and 2010 substantially shifted voter attitudes and nothing that has happened in 2011 has altered that shift.

Nationally, the events of 2009 and 2010 moved voters to the right. In 2008, Democrats had a 12-point party identification advantage among families earning between \$30,000 and \$75,000. That advantage is gone, according to a July Pew Research poll. In 2008, Democrats had a 7 percent advantage among white voters under 30. The Republicans now have an 11-point advantage with those young voters, according to the poll.

Within the Republican Party, the rightward shift has been even more vehetive, according to Public Policy Polling. Now it's roughly 73 percent. The number of moderate Republicans has withered.

The events of 2009 and 2010 also concentrated the Republican mind. It used to be that there were many themes in the Republican hymnal. Now there is only one: Government is too big, and it needs to be brought under control. It used to be there were many threats on the horizon. Now there is only one: the interlocking oligarchy of politicians, academics, journalists, consultants and financiers who live along the Acela corridor want to rip America from its traditional moorings.

Perry is benefiting from these shifts. He does best among the most conservative voters. He has a simple and fashionable message:He does very well with the alternative-reality right those who don't believe in global warming, evolution or that Obama was born in the U.S.



BOISE • University of Idaho administrators are asking a state judge to determine if it can legally release the personnel records of a former psychology professor accused of shooting a graduate student before turning the gun on himself last week.

University lawyers filed the request Monday in 2nd District Court for a ruling on the file of Ernesto Bustamante, who resigned his faculty position days before gunning down 22-year-old Kathryn Benoit at her offcampus home in Moscow late Monday.

Bustamante, 31, and Benoit, 22, were dating earlier this year, but she broke off the relationship in May after he threatened her with a gun and vowed to kill her, according to police.

Investigators also said last week that Bustamante, who referred to himself among students as "the beast" and a "psychopathic killer," had six guns and medication for bipolar disorder and severe anxiety among his possessions found in the Moscow hotel where he killed himself.

University officials have been under pressure from Benoit's family and the media to release the contents of Bustamante's personnel file. So far, the university has resisted, citing employee privacy laws.

Idaho Marriage Rates Near **Highest in the Nation**

IDAHO FALLS • New numbers released by the U.S. Census Bureau shows Idaho residents are more likely to get married and more likely to stay that way than their counterparts across the country.

The research published Thursday used data from 2009 to show that Idaho has one of the highest marriage rates in the nation. The marriage rate for men was more than 25 per 1,000, compared to the national average of about 19 per 1,000. The rate for women in Idaho was just over 25 per 1,000, compared to the national average of more than 17.

The Post Register reports that data from the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare's 2009 Vital Statistics report shows that at least one couple exchanged vows on every day of that year.



The Twin Falls City Council passed the city's new budget Monday night without any of the rapid and occasionally contentious cutting that marked the last several weeks of the process.

Several council members expressed their satisfaction with a budget that doesn't raise property taxes but found enough places to cut - including about 10 positions eliminated through hiring freezes and two layoffs - to almost double funding for road maintenance during the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1.

The final budget is about \$45.83 million and includes \$930,101 for road maintenance. Last year, the city set aside \$550,000 for the same budget item, while the budget proposed by City Manager Travis Rothweiler set that line item at \$750,000. City Engineer Jackie Fields said the city would need to spend about \$1.3 million to put repairs and resurfacing on the optimal eight-year rotation.

"It took us a long time to get here and, in the long term, our roads will be bet -



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to streets, but I am unwell to add additional tax burden to our citizens at this point," Councilman Greg Lanting said.

The money was added to the budget to increase the council's maximum spending cap in case it was needed; there was never widespread support on the council to keep it. Mayor Don Hall did propose adding \$5 in property taxes per \$150,000 of value, to a community-wide total of \$157,000, to help the roads budget hit the \$1.3 million mark, but after several community members disparaged the idea at a public hearing, it failed to gain traction, with even Hall abandoning the idea.

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N. Idaho Teens Screened for Heart Problems

POST FALLS (AP) • More than 220 teens and young adults showed up for a free heart screening courtesy of a program called Straight from the Heart by the Jordan Johnson Foundation.

Turnout at the Post Falls event on Saturday surprised organizer Cyndie (Johnson) Lempesis, whose son Jordan died of sudden cardiac arrest in 2006. The Post Falls student was just 15 years old.

Lempesis told the Coeur d'Alene Press she was thrilled by the numbers and hopes to offer the screening every spring and fall. Besides advising students of any potential heart problems, the data will be used in a University of Washington study on heart problems. Ten of those who attended were advised of abnormalities and told to talk to their doctors for follow-up.

Child Dies, Another Hurt When SUV Slides Into Lake

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) • A 5-year-old Coeur d'Alene boy is dead and his year-old brother is in critical condition after their car slid off a road and plunged into an Idaho lake.

The Kootenai County Sheriff's office says the boys' mother, 25-year-old Sarah Deshazer, was trying to turn their SUV around Sunday afternoon when a wheel went off the road and sent the vehicle went down an embankment into Lake Fernan, just east of Coeur d'Alene.

Spokesman Maj. Ben Wolfinger says in a release that she and her husband, 28-year-old Michael Deshazer, escaped before the SUV sank but could not reach the children before it plunged into 12 feet of murky water.

Firefighters reached the brothers shortly after the 1:45 p.m. accident and began CPR.

Wolfinger says they were rushed to a hospital where the 5-year-old was pronounced dead. The younger child is in critical condition.

Autopsy Confirms Hiker Killed by Bear

BILLINGS, Mont. • Wildlife agents were trying to capture a grizzly bear in Yellowstone National Park on Monday after it killed a Michigan hiker in the second fatal bear attack this summer at the famed park.

The body of John Wallace, 59, was discovered Friday in a backcountry area known for its high population of bears. An autopsy concluded he died from injuries sustained in a bear attack.

After a fatal mauling last month - the first inside the increasingly crowded park in 25 years – authorities let the responsible grizzly go because it was protecting its cubs.

This time, rangers have set traps with the intent to capture and kill the bruin that attacked Wallace. Its guilt would be established through DNA analysis connecting it to evidence found at the mauling scene, park officials said.

"We know of no witnesses to the attack," park superintendent Dan Wenk said Monday. "We're going to err on the safe side of caution since we'll never really know the circumstances in this case?"

The bear that killed Wallace is believed to be a different animal than the one in the July killing.

The earlier mauling oc-

curred about eight miles away from where Wallace's body was found. In that instance, a female bear with cubs attacked a couple from California, killing the man before fleeing.

There were no signs of cubs in the area where Wallace was killed.

Park spokesman Al Nash said the chances of trapping the killer bear are uncertain. A favorite food for some grizzlies, the nuts of whitebark pine trees, became available in the past several days. That typically draws bears to elevations higher than where Wallace was killed, Nash said.

Wallace entered the park alone last Wednesday and pitched a tent in a developed campground, Wenk said.

Authorities said he likely was killed Wednesday or Thursday during a solo hike along the Mary Mountain Trail. The trail is closed from March to June because it passes through an area frequented by grizzlies feeding on the carcasses of bison that died over the winter, park officials said.

Rare find discovered amid Montana gold rush town's Old West kitsch

VIRGINIA CITY, Mont. • The Gypsy sat for decades in a restaurant amid the Old West kitsch that fills this former gold rush town, her unblinking gaze greeting the tourists who shuffled in from the creaking wooden sidewalk outside. Some mistook her for Zoltar, the fortune-telling machine featured in the Tom Hanks movie "Big." Others took one look at those piercing eyes and got the heebiejeebies so bad they couldn't get away fast enough.

But until a few years ago, nobody, not even her owner, knew the nonfunctioning machine gathering dust in Bob's Place was an undiscovered treasure sitting in plain sight in this ghost town-turnedthemed tourist attraction.

The 100-year-old fortune teller was an extremely rare find. Instead of dispensing a card like Zoltar, the Gypsy would actually speak your fortune from a hidden record player. When you dropped a nickel in the slot, her eyes would flash, her teeth would chatter and her voice would come floating from a tube extending out of the eight-foot-tall box.

Word got out when the Montana Heritage Commission began

restoring the Gypsy more than five years ago, and collectors realized the machine was one of two or three "verbal" fortune tellers left in the world.

One of those collectors, magician David Copperfield, said he thinks she is even rarer than that.

"I think it's only one of one," Copperfield said in a recent telephone interview with The Associated Press.

Irene's Toll Jumps to 38; Vt. Towns **Battle Flooding**

In many cases, the most damage occured well after storm had passed, as rainwater turned rivers and streams into torrents.

MONTPELIER, Vt. • The full measure of Hurricane Irene's fury came into focus Monday as the death toll jumped to 38, New England towns battled epic floods and millions faced the dispiriting prospect of several days without electricity.

From North Carolina to Maine, communities cleaned up and took stock of the uneven and hard-topredict costs of a storm that spared the nation's biggest city a nightmare scenario, only to deliver a historic wallop to towns well inland.

In New York City, where people had braced for a disaster-movie scene of water swirling around skyscrapers, the subways and buses were up and running again in time for the Monday morning commute. To the surprise of many New Yorkers, things went pretty smoothly.

But in New England, landlocked Vermont contended with what its governor called the worst flooding in a century. Streams also raged out of control in upstate New York.

In many cases, the moment of maximum danger arrived well after the storm had passed, as rainwater made its way into rivers and streams and turned them into torrents. Irene dumped up to 11 inches of rain on Vermont and more than 13 in parts of New York.

"We were expecting heavy rains," said Bobbi-Jean Jeun of Clarksville, a hamlet near Albany, N.Y. "We were expecting flooding. We weren't expecting devastation. It looks like somebody set a bomb off?"

Meanwhile, the 11-state death toll, which had stood at 21 as of Sunday night, rose sharply as bodies were Please see IRENE, N2

KABUL, Afghanistan • Direct U.S. talks with the Taliban had evolved to a substantive negotiation before Afghan officials, nervous that the secret and independent talks would undercut President Hamid Karzai, scuttled them, Afghan and U.S. officials told The Associated Press.

Featured prominently in the talks was the whereabouts and eventual release of U.S. Army Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl of Hailey, who was captured more than two years ago in eastern Afghanistan, according to a senior Western diplomat in the region and a childhood friend of the Taliban negotiator, Tayyab Aga.

The U.S. negotiators asked Aga what could be done to gain Bergdahl's release. The discussion did not get into specifics but Aga discussed the release of Afghan prisoners at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba and in Afghanistan at Bagram Air Field.

Published reports about the clandestine meetings ended the talks abruptly, and sent Aga into hiding.

Collapse of the direct talks between Aga and U.S. officials probably spoiled

the best chance yet at reaching Mullah Mohammed Omar, considered the linchpin to ending the Taliban fight against the U.S.backed government in Afghanistan. The contacts were pre-



liminary but had begun to bear fruit, Afghan and U.S. officials said.

Perhaps most importantly they offered the tantalizing prospect of a brokered agreement between the U.S. and the Taliban — one that would allow the larger reconciliation of the Taliban into Afghanistan political life to move forward. Gadhafi's Family Flees to Algeria

TRIPOLI, Libya • Members of deposed Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi's family have fled to neighboring Algeria, the Algerian government said Monday.

Algerian state television reported that Gadhafi kin who arrived Monday through a border crossing between the two countries include his wife, Safiyah, his daughter, Aysha, and two of his sons, Hannibal and Mohammed. The group also included an undisclosed number of Gadhafi's grandchildren, Algeria said.

The Algerian government said it had informed both the United Nations and the rebel Transitional National Council that Gadhafi's relatives had arrived.

But there was no answer to a much bigger question: Where was Moammar Gadhafi himself?

Rebels have ended Gadhafi's 42 years in power, occupying his Bab al-Aziziya compound in Tripoli and consolidating control over the capital. But they are keen to capture Gadhafi and put him on

trial for crimes committed during his reign.

Since rebels moved into the capital a week ago, Gadhafi has been heard several times in broadcasts on loyal media, urging followers and loyal tribes to fight the rebels. A spokesman who has contacted international media insists that Gadhafi still is in Libya.

Rumors have swirled about his exact whereabouts. Some had suggested that Gadhafi, too, was in Algeria - a country rebels have accused of assisting him by sending mercenaries. Other unconfirmed reports suggest he has fled to the vicinity of his hometown, Sirte, about 250 miles east of Tripoli. Gadhafi retains substantial support in Sirte, where he liberally bestowed the state's largesse.

Rebels are converging from both east and west on the coastal city of more than 100,000, readying for what could be the bloodiest battle of Libya's sixmonth civil war.

Rebels say they are hoping to negotiate a surrender of Sirte to avoid more bloodshed, but say they will take if by force if necessary.

WASHINGTON • President Obama on Monday tapped a prominent labor economist to join his advisers and help steer a fall jobs agenda that will be critical to the president's re-election bid. In nominating Alan Krueger as chair of the White House Council of Economic Advisers, Obama gains an economist with expertise in the labor market and unemployment.

of turn-of the century penny arcade games. It would occupy a place of pride among the magician's mechanized Yacht Race, Temple of Mystery and various machines that tested a person's strength.

Copperfield acknowledged approaching the curators about buying the Gypsy a few years ago but declined to say what he offered. Janna Norby, the Montana Heritage Commission curator who received the call from Copperfield's assistant, said it was in the ballpark of \$2 million, along with a proposal to replace it with another fortune-telling machine. On top of that, he pledged to promote Virginia City in advertisements.

But Heritage commission curators, representing the Gypsy's owner – the state of Montana – rejected the idea, saying cashing in on this piece of history would be akin to selling their soul.

"If we start selling our collection for money, what do we have?" said Norby, the commission's former curator of collections.

The commission's acting director, Marilyn Ross echoed Norby's sentiments: "That is not something we would ever consider, selling off these antiques."

That dismissal has set collectors grumbling. Theo Holstein, a California collector and renovator of such machines, said he thinks the Gypsy is wasted in Virginia City and should be placed in a private collection for proper care. He said he is trying to gather investors to make a \$3 million bid that would top Copperfield's offer.

"They don't have any idea what they have. It's like they have the world's best diamond and they just pulled it out of their mineshaft," Holstein said. "It's good that it's there and it survived, but now it really needs to be part of the world."

Holstein said he wouldn't be surprised in the machine ultimately sold for \$10 million or more. Copperfield also said he is still interested in purchasing it.

That could put pressure on the state, which, like the rest of the nation, is facing hard fiscal times. Montana's budget is in the black, but keeping the effects of the recession at arm's length has meant deep budget cuts.

Those cuts have hit the Montana Heritage Commission hard. Just weeks after Norby spoke to the AP, her position and three others were eliminated as part of a larger reorganization to cut \$400,000 from the commission's budget, Ross said.

The state agency that oversees the commission, meanwhile, is not so quick to reject the idea of selling the Gypsy. Department of Commerce deputy director Andrew Poole said he has not seen any offers in writing, and if one were made, it would go through a bid process that includes the scrutiny of the commission and input from the public.

The state inherited the Gypsy in 1998 when it paid \$6.5 million to buy nearly 250 buildings and their contents in Virginia City and nearby Nevada City from the son of Charles Bovey. The Montana collector spent years buying up the buildings to preserve the two crumbling ghost towns and he stocked them with his ever-growing collection of antique games, music machines and oddities.

Bill Peterson, the heritage commission's former curator of interpretation, said the collection includes hundreds of thousands of items, so many that curators are still discovering them.

The tally of Irene's destruction mounted, too. An apparently vacant home exploded in an evacuated, flooded area in Pompton Lakes, N.J., early Monday, and firefighters had to battle the flames from a boat. In the Albany, N.Y., suburb of Guilderland, police rescued two people Monday after their car was swept away. Rescuers found them three hours later, clinging to trees along the swollen creek.

"It's going to take time to recover from a storm of this magnitude," President Barack Obama warned as he promised the government would do everything in its power to help people get back on their feet.

For many people, the aftermath could prove more painful than the storm itself.

In North Carolina, where Irene blew ashore along the Outer Banks on Saturday before heading for New York and New England, 1,000 people were still in emergency shelters, awaiting word on their homes.



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

Insurers Drive Stocks Higher


NEW YORK (AP) • So much for Irene. Stocks rose broadly Monday, led by insurance companies, after it became clear that the tropical storm caused far less damage than many had feared. An increase in U.S. consumer spending also helped, as did as did a rare piece of good news from Greece: a merger of two major banks.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 254.71 points, or 2.3 percent, to close at 11,539.25. It is now down just 0.3 percent for the year. It had been down as much as 7.4 percent for the year on Aug. 10.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 33.28 points, or 2.8 percent, to 1,210.08. The widely used market benchmark is now up 8.1 percent since on Aug. 8, when it hit low for the year because of a downgrade of the U.S. government's credit rating.

Damage From Irene Appears to be Less Than Feared

WASHINGTON • Insured damage from Irene will range between \$2 billion and \$3 billion, and the total losses will likely be about \$7 billion, according to preliminary estimates by Kinetic Analysis Corp. a consulting firm. Both figures are less than had been feared. Still, the long-term costs of Irene will likely grow as storm-ravaged areas deal with lost business, insurance claims, dislocated workers and transportation disruptions - costs that will take months to fully calculate.

The preliminary estimate from Kinetic Analysis, based in Silver Spring, Md., suggests that Irene will have caused far less insured damage than the \$6 billion the industry paid out after Hurricane Isabel struck the East Coast in 2003.

Grass Fuels Organic Dairy

A Hollister dairyman uses a vast network of interlocking pastures to monitor what goes into the cows that make his organic dairy run.

HOLLISTER • It's past 10 a.m. as cows ready to move to their new pasture mill impatiently through a delay in their routine.

But Sean Mallett, one of the owners of Nature's Harmony Organic Dairy, wants to demonstrate how easy it is to move dairy cows from one paddock to another in an intensive grazing management system. First, he explains to a group of more than 50 visitors how he began organizing pastures and the barn at his dairy near Hollister five years ago.

It's all part of a tour held last Thursday to show how strict grazing requirements for organic dairies are met, and how they benefit both producers and cattle. But the cows are only interested in their new pasture, and as Mallett finally lets loose a wire gate, about 500 of them move to a fresh paddock in less than three minutes.

"Even if we were a con-

ventional dairy, I would still graze," Mallett said. "I love what it does for the cows." The layout of Mallett's

dairy conforms to rules that at the time were pending for organic dairies but didn't go into effect until this year.

Mallett – along with his stepfather and mother, John and Susan Reitsma bought the former hog farm in 2005, intent to use it as a heifer feeding facility. But Mallett's research showed the site had potential for organic dairy use.

In 2006, they began planting a pasture mix of alfalfa, perennial rye, fescue and orchard grass. Lately, white clover has been added to the mix. According to pasture rules for organic production, animals must graze pasture at least 120 days per year. Animals must also take in a minimum of 30 percent dry matter from grazing pasture.

"We knew in 2006 that the pasture rules that went into effect this year were coming," Mallett said. "We

wanted to exceed them."

Because they had the luxury of starting the dairy from essentially bare ground, the owners located the milking barn as close to the plot's middle as possible. Pastures were seeded near the barn, and gravel lanes allow cows easy pasture access.

Cows graze paddocks of 3 or 6 acres for between 12-24 hours before they're moved to the next section. Each paddock is rested for about

30 days before it is grazed again.

A 35-acre feed yard is about a half mile from the milking barn, different from most conventional dairies that locate the feed yard closer. Mallett said he's willing to spend a bit more to move feed than to force cows to walk longer distances.

"The farther the cows walk, the more energy they burn and the less milk they produce," he said.

The Idaho Statesman reports that holding companies for Syringa Bank, Intermountain Community Bank and Idaho Banking Co. still owe a combined \$3.5 million for past-due TARP payments. U.S. Treasury observers are also attending board meetings of the holding companies for Syringa Bank and Idaho Banking Co.

Delayed payments to the program offer evidence that four years after the onset of the recession and three years after the nation's financial sector fell into disarray, some Idaho banks are still struggling.

"It's a challenge for right now," Scott Gibson, Syringa's president and CEO, told the Statesman.

The three banks with delayed TARP payments are not the only Idaho banks struggling in the wake of loan defaults and the collapse of the home and commercial real estate market that began to hit the state in late 2007. Syringa and Idaho Banking Co. are among six banks operating in the state under orders by government regulators to build up their cash reserves and shed troubled loans.

The recession also claimed as a victim one bank, the Ketchum-based First Bank of Idaho, which was shut down by the U.S. Office of Thrift Supervision in 2009.


Despite the ongoing challenges, many Idaho banking officials say they see a brighter future than a year ago. Investors have put \$1.4 billion into banks operating in the state in the past 18 months, and more banks have managed to erase some of the red ink in their financial statements by resolving troubled loans.

Because Idaho Banking Co. and Syringa are under regulatory orders to increase their capital, they're actually prohibited from paying dividends to shareholders without permission of regulators,


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Today is two-fer Tuesday: you get two problems from the same deal. Looking only at the North and South cards, you have to decide how you would play six notrump, and also how you would declare seven no-trump.

On the lead of the heart jack, the only suit in which you appear to have flexibility is clubs. In seven no-trump you need precisely four tricks from the suit. What are the options?

A somewhat simplistic approach is to stick with the adage 'Eight ever, nine never" and take the club finesse by cashing the club king and leading to the jack. So far so good — but that does not cover all the bases, in that it copes adequately only with the 3-2 breaks where the finesse works. But are there any 4-1 breaks you can cope with? Only the specific one shown here, where the bare club queen is onside. To negotiate that lie of the cards, you must start by taking the immediate finesse of the jack, but changing plans when the queen appears. You play dummy's ace, then cash the jack, and next finesse your nine.

In six no-trump you need take only three club tricks. Here you also start by cashing the ace, but if no honors appear, you lead next to the nine. If East shows out on the second round, you can change plans, putting up the king and playing back to the jack. This line insures three tricks against any lie of the cards.



ANSWER: You decided not to overcall two no-trump because you were a little too strong. You should see your plan through by now bidding two no-trump, which here suggests 18-20 or so. Do not be put off by having only one heart stopper. One guard rates to be sufficient here when the player with the long suit has a weak hand.

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

Petersen, Payback Don't Mix For BSU

Blowout 2005 loss to Georgia isn't a motivational factor for then-offensive coordinator.

BOISE • Boise State coach Chris Petersen says redemption is far from his mind as the No. 5 Broncos prepare for Georgia.

But who could blame him if payback didn't play even a small role in his motivation for the rematch with the 19th ranked Bulldogs.

Georgia thumped the Broncos 48-13 the last time the two teams met in 2005. At the time, Petersen was the offensive coordinator and Boise State was a small conference upstart, ranked for the first time in the preseason polls and looking for respect against a Southeastern Conference powerhouse.

Broncos fans may be yearning for some kind of revenge, but Petersen says the ugly and humiliating loss that unfolded at Athens six years ago has nothing to do with the team playing on the national stage in the Georgia Dome on Saturday.

"I've talked about it to our team, but it's not something ... they don't have anything to do with that," Petersen said Monday. "I had something to do with

INDIANAPOLIS • The Colts activated Peyton Manning from the physically unable to perform list Monday, clearing the way for the four-time MVP to play early in the season.

The team said Manning will participate in practice on a limited basis on a "scripted" and controlled basis as he continues to recover from neck surgery in May.

It's not clear whether Manning will be ready for the Sept. 11 opener at Houston. Manning has already ruled himself out of Thursday night's preseason finale at Cincinnati.

Manning has started 227 consecutive games, including the playoffs, the second-longest streak in NFL history for quarterbacks behind Brett Favre.

Indy's franchise quarterback had been on PUP since practice began Aug. 1. League rules require players on the physically unable to perform list to be activated by the team's final cuts, on Sept. 3, or sit out an additional six weeks. That wasn't something the Colts were going to do.

The surgery was expected to keep Manning off the field for six to eight weeks. But the recovery has gone slower than expected, and Manning in part blamed the 4 1/2-month lockout that kept him away from the team's trainers.

With Manning ailing, the Colts have been refining backup plans. They signed veteran backup Kerry Collins to go along with Curtis Painter, Dan Orlovsky and rookie Mike Hartline. Five-time Pro Bowl receiver Reggie Wayne said he believes Painter gives Indy the best chance at winning if Manning is not ready to start the season. Painter made his statement Friday by going 11 of 21 for 171 yards with two TD passes, and nearly led the Colts to their first preseason win in more than two years.



Texas A&M's departure would cast doubt on the future of the Big 12 and could lead to more major changes to college athletics.

The university said earlier Monday it had received a letter from Big 12 Commissioner Dan Beebe outlining the withdrawal procedure should the Aggies decide to leave the league.

The Aggies are interested in joining the Southeastern Conference and the dueling letters come less than a week after they formally told Beebe they are exploring their options and asked for the conference to outline the process if they decide to leave. 
