FILER • Blaze Requa, 16, has spent most of his birthdays away from home but in a place sure to make most 8-year-olds jealous: camping at the Twin Falls County Fair.

His family is one of the relative few to have secured a spot at the fairgrounds for their recreational vehicle. They'll stay there for more than a week as Requa prepares his pigs for show and others in the family take in

their own activities.

Being on-site makes it easier to take care of all the last-minute responsibility that comes with show animals, including the 6 a.m. pen cleaning after a day that can have 4-H'ers working until after midnight.

"It's like a home base," Requa's dad, Twin Falls County farmer Brad Requa, said.

Grouped up with other 4-H families, the impromptu RV camp becomes like a "cozy family," as one of the campers described it.

Kelli Schroeder, who is part of the camp, said they even take turns cooking for each other.

Deadlines For School Merit-pay Plans is Today

When state legislators approved creating merit bonuses for teachers as part of this spring's education reforms, the concept was still extremely abstract.

Now, districts are sorting out how the bonuses will actually work. Here's what the Twin Falls School District concluded:

Who can receive merit pay?

In order for certified school employees to receive bonuses, both local district and state goals must be met. The first round of bonuses is scheduled to go out to employees in fall 2012.

Who came up with the district's plan?

A 12-member committee, chaired by elementary programs director Ted

Poppellwell, met in June and July. The Twin Falls school board approved the plan Aug. 24.

What does it say?


The district based its share of bonuses primarily on student test scores. The district favored test scores over other measures such as graduation rates or parental involvement.

How will local success be measured?

Kindergarten through fifth-grade teachers can receive bonuses based mainly on student reading scores. Scores will be averaged district-wide for each grade level. Turning in completed assessments to the district office will also factor in.

Middle and high school teachers can receive bonuses based on test scores

State Study: Idaho and Regional Wages Lag Behind Average

Idaho wages slipped further below the national average as the Great Recession took its toll on the Gem State. And in south-central Idaho, wages are even lower than the state's average.

The findings are in a report released this week by the Idaho Department of Labor. The state's average wage was \$18.56 an hour in May 2010, which is 15 percent below the national average of \$21.35.

The state's average wage ranking dropped a notch to 38th among U.S. states in 2010, according to the report.

In south-central Idaho, the average wage for 2010 was just \$16.81, or 9.4 percent less than the state's average.

Not many people can love a skunk. But for Betty Wooten, it was second nature to nurture an animal nobody else could stand.

"My mom couldn't turn her back on anything," said Kathie Fogg, Wooten's daughter. "We always had a ton of critters in the house!"

For as many quirky and unusual animals she cared for in her house, Wooten also took on just as many community advocacy projects in the Magic Valley.

Wooten died on Aug 24. She was 83 years old. But her memory remains strong in the people and organizations she was active in throughout the years.

Wooten grew up in Kimberly and eventually married and settled down in Twin Falls. In 1968, she went to work at the newly founded South Central Community Action Agency. Now called South Central

T.F. Learning Center to Close, but Officials Plan to Form Another

The Southern Idaho Learning Center is closing its doors at the end of the year, but Executive Director Dori Madsen hopes to keep services going under a new nonprofit organization called the Southern Idaho STAR Center.

The center, which provides a variety of services to struggling Magic Valley students, is currently located in a rent-free Twin Falls County-owned building on Shoup Avenue. But the county plans to close down the building by Dec. 31 in order to potentially sell it in the future.

The upstart organization's goal is to raise \$100,000 in seed money for a new center by Dec. 1.

"At that time, we'll sit down and decide whether a new center is a go or not," Madsen said.

She said she's still working with the county to search for a new location that's rent-free or has low rent.

The organization is looking for a building with at least 3,000 square feet that could be used for the learning center, as well as a retail store to offer teacher supplies.

Board members at the learning center decided to close the organization under its current name at the end of the year. Madsen said one reason for that is to break ties with the Southern Idaho Learning Center Foundation, which was formed in 2008 to provide funding for the organization.

"They haven't provided sustainable funding for us," she said, adding that the foundation has provided money for scholarships, but not for the organization's operating costs.

Madsen said she and learning center staff members pursued donations on their own and received a \$15,000 donation from Glanbia Foods for fall scholarships.

Help Out

Idaho Learning Center Foundation, didn't return a phone call Wednesday.

The Scottish Rite Foundation created the learning center about 20 years ago and used to provide about 4 percent of the center's annual budget, Madsen said, but doesn't anymore.

However, Madsen is working to see if that group will provide seed money for a new center.

If a new center isn't up and running in January, Madsen said that will leave a void in the community.

"We're unique," she said. "There's no other service that provides remediation to kids who are struggling"

Last year, the learning center provided services to about 1,265 school-aged children who suffer from

learning disabilities or fall behind in other educational settings. Students are referred to the center by schools or their physicians.

Twin Falls pediatrician Dr. Jack Trotter said the learning center fills a "much-needed niche" in the community.

"If (the center) were to close down, people in the city would be looking at a two-hour drive to something that might possibly be equal," he said.

Parent Beth Hewes signed her daughter Cloee up for a session at the center this summer after Cloee's teacher said she may have to repeat first grade.

As a result of the session, Hewes said Cloee is going into second grade with confidence in her abilities.

Community Action Partnership, it's a nonprofit low-income assistance organization in Twin Falls.

Those close to Wooten describe her personality as "driven," or "intelligent," and at times, even "intimidating."

"It was very young back then, there was a lot of learning," said Michelle Picklesimer, SCCAP's financial officer. "She grew up with the organization."

In 1989, the U.S. Department of Energy and the state of Idaho named Wooten the Business and Financial Manager of the Year. She was heavily involved in the planning process of Valley House, Twin Falls' transitional housing organization. She also helped start the Boys and Girls Clubs of Magic Valley.

"Betty once saw a family with a dog walking on the street. After talking to them and inviting them into the SCCAP office, she found out they were homeless and hungry," said Leanne Trappen, SCCAP's community services director.

Both Trappen and Wooten spent the rest of the day driving the family around town, all of them packed snugly in a Ford Ranger, until they could find a hotel that would accept pets.

"I never forgot that day," Trappen said. "It was inspiring how passionate she was about serving those who were underserved."

Fogg said her mother's blend of fierce tenacity and compassion has been passed down to her children and grandchildren.

"As a kid, I was somewhat clueless what I was doing when I was helping my mother raise money or volunteer at an event," she said. "But now I see how important that is. All of us kids are trying to pass that onto our kids. We all are volunteers and try to do whatever we can do to help others around us."

For those who would like to pay their respects, Wooten's funeral service is scheduled for 11 a.m. Saturday at Relyea Funeral Chapel at 318 N. Latah St. in Boise. A reception and lunch will follow at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints Chapel at 701 S. Curtis Road in Boise.

from student finals. Scores will be averaged district-wide by department. Teachers can also receive bonuses by submitting course syllabi and curriculum to district office.

As the plan exists now, middle and high school teachers are eligible for bonuses if test scores are at 80 percent of the 3-year average. The maximum amount of merit pay from finals can be reached if scores are at 95 percent of the average.

District Superintendent Wiley Dobbs said the percentages are a work in progress, and could change.

"We don't want to scare teachers off with this yet," he said.

Employees who aren't regular classroom teachers can earn bonuses for outlining how they'll help teachers meet standards.

What's the state's part?

Around the Valley

Other area school districts and charter schools also had to submit their pay-for-performance plans to the Idaho State Department of Education today. Here's a look at three others:

- **Minidoka County School District:** The Minidoka County School Board approved pay-for-performance plans Aug. 25. Instead of a district-wide plan, each school developed its own plan. At several schools, bonuses are tied to the number of times school employees communicate with parents per trimester. Other schools are focusing on student assessment scores.
- **Cassia County School District:** Individual school plans were approved by the Cassia County School Board Aug. 23. At Declo High School, as well as most of the elementary schools, bonuses will be tied to how much communication employees have with parents. Other schools, such as Declo Junior High, are focusing on student attendance rates.
- **Jerome School District:** At elementary schools, bonuses are tied to student scores on reading assessments. Jerome Middle School bonuses will be based on the percentage of parents who attend parent/teacher conferences.

For a few area teachers, summer wasn't a time to take a break. Though their salaries are spread across 12 months, Idaho educators are only paid for contract days around the time schools are in session. According to the Idaho Education Association, many educators use the summer months to learn new skills, complete required continuing education credits, take workshops, revamp or develop new lesson plans and pursue advanced degrees. IEA highlighted various summer efforts by teachers in a recent release, including the following: Peggy Shufeldt Hess of Cassia County attended a best practices workshop

put on by the Idaho State Board of Education, along with a NASA class. Lauren Metzler of Filer attended the "making grades work" conference in Wendell. She also packed up two classrooms and set them up in new locations for this fall. Theresa Higginbotham Silvester of Buhl attended the total instructional alignment conference in Pocatello and took the last two classes for her master's degree in American history and government. IEA, the state teachers union, represents elementary and secondary teachers, education support professionals, school administrators, retired educators, and students preparing to become teachers.

T.F. Teen Gets Probation for Stealing Credit Cards

A Twin Falls teen received probation for stealing a Filer woman's credit card from her car and going on a mall shopping spree earlier this year. Tyler Roper, 18, will serve a three-year probation in lieu of prison time, as he pleaded guilty to felony burglary and felony possession of a financial transaction card. He was sentenced on Monday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court. For the

burglary, Roper received a prison term of three to six years, and an additional two to five years for possession of a transaction card. He was fined \$1,000 for each count, but \$800 was suspended in each instance. Roper must also complete 60 hours of community service and pay victim restitution of \$649.99. He was arrested and arraigned in May on 13 felony charges, but 11 were dismissed upon entry of a guilty plea in July.

The only region in the state with a lower wage average is southwestern Idaho, which was at \$16.29 an hour. Jan Roeser, a regional economist with the Idaho Department of Labor, said several factors contribute to southern Idaho's wage levels. Those include the pay scales at retail stores; the area's strong agricultural sector, which has many seasonal workers; and service-oriented jobs, including the tourism-related hotels and restaurants in Blaine County, she said. Paul Miller, a branch manager with S.O.S. Staffing in Twin Falls, has seen plenty of frustration over the region's low wages from job-seekers. The national company's local office helps people find work throughout the Magic Valley, including general labor, clerical, and manufacturing jobs. "It just seems like everybody is struggling to find positions that are a decent paying wage," Miller said. Getting an employer to pay the region's average is tough, though. Most positions that are available tend to pay \$8 to \$10 an hour, he said. Miller said there's an increasing willingness among local clients to move out of state for better-paying jobs that hit the \$15- to \$19-an-hour mark, including the oil and natural gas fields in neighboring Wyoming. Despite the region's standing, there is a bright spot: the average south-central Idaho wage actually increased 42 cents per hour from 2008 to 2010. Roeser said the economic development of new jobs in Mini-Cassia have helped the region's figures show an overall improvement.

Let's pretend that Democrat Keith Allred, and not Republican C.L. “Butch” Otter, had been elected governor of Idaho last November.

And let's say that you opened your mailbox Monday morning to find an envelope with Allred's name on the return address

The letter, let's pretend, was from the Idaho Education Association soliciting funds to help overturn Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna's education reforms of the past legislative session.

Our View

Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter is supposed to be doing public policy, not infomercials.

“Your contribution of \$500, \$250, \$100 or \$50 will help protect Idaho children,” the letter might have read. “It's up to us here in Idaho to set an example that the rest of the country will follow.”

Send Allred the money, the letter might have asked, care

of the IEA.

Republicans in his state — and a lot of independents — would have gone into orbit, and rightly so.

And yet that's exactly what our Republican governor did for the Idaho Freedom Foundation, a conservative lobbying organization that supports Otter's agenda.

Call us cynical, but we were under the impression that the governor of this state wasn't supposed to be the agent of any special interest group.

If Otter wants to write a personal check to the IFF or attend one of its fundraisers, that's his business. But he went too far when he signed up to be its shill.

IFFhas mailed out a similar solicitation under the signature of former U.S. Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho. That's perfectly appropriate; Symms is a private citizen.

Otter is not. More than a quarter-million Idahoans voted to hire him to run the state, not a marketing campaign for his favorite private cause.

Rick Perry Channels Dick Cheney

Rick Perry has jettisoned the “compassion” that sometimes leavened the conservatism of his predecessor in the Texas governor's mansion.

If Perry's style resembles anybody's in George W. Bush's White House, it is that of former vice president Dick Cheney, whose just-published memoir *In My Time* might as well have been titled “Right Every Time (Even Though I Was Surrounded by Idiots).” Think of Perry as Bush without the charm.

The man who suddenly tops the Republican presidential polls is no libertarian. Rick Perry is a theocrat.

By his own account, he is a cultural warrior, seeking to save marriage, Christmas and the Boy Scouts from liberals, gay people and moral relativism. His latest treatise, the Tea Party-inspired *Fed Up!* touches only briefly on matters such as abortion and gay marriage. For an eyeful of the full Perry, crack his 2008 book, *On My Honor*.

In the book's most talked-about passage, he likens homosexuality to alcoholism. “Even if an alcoholic is powerless over alcohol once it enters his body, he still makes a choice to drink,” Perry writes. “And, even if some-

one is attracted to a person of the same sex, he or she will make a choice to engage in sexual activity with someone of the same gender.”

Imagine those words crossing Bush's lips. Or these: “The radical homosexual movement seeks societal normalization of their sexual activity ... They must respect the right of millions in society to refuse to normalize their behavior.”

Perry's politics are religious in a way not seen before in modern-day mainstream presidential candidates. “Either faith in Christ can cleanse all people of their sin, or none, but not some,” he writes. “The truth of Christ's death, resurrection, and power over sin is absolute. ... What we believe about it does not determine its truthfulness.”

Perry has no use for those who “want to recognize Jesus as a good teacher, but nothing more.” Of those non-Christians, Perry asks, “why call him good if he has lied about his claims of deity and misled

two millennia of followers?”

The governor forecasts divine punishment for those who hold different political views. “Shall they stand before God and brag that they fought to scrub His glorious name from the nation's pledge?” he asks. “Shall they seek His approval for attacking private organizations merely because these organizations proclaim His existence?”

So it all comes back to the Boy Scouts.

I have no beef with the Scouts. (I quit my troop when I was 12, not because of excessive godliness but because the older boys kept getting high.) My problem with Perry's zeal is one of my problems with the Tea Party generally: Though it claims to be libertarian, it is remixing the religious right's greatest hits.

In a series of hoary bromides, the supposedly libertarian Perry condemns the “litigious advocates of licentious behavior” (that's the ACLU) and informs us that “Sometimes the rules must protect society at large at the expense of individual expression when that expression is deemed harmful to others and society at large.”

Among the things Perry “deems” harmful: universities (students “have been

taught that corporations are evil, religion is the opiate of the masses, and morality is relative”); human rights commissions (“often nothing more than a front for attacking institutions that teach traditional values”); and evolution (he says “the weight of evidence” supports intelligent design). Perry polishes the old “war on Christmas” chestnut and finds a way to cast Mitt Romney (now his rival for the nomination) as a defender of gay scoutmasters.

Though he speaks now as a small-government conservative, Perry argues in his book: “We are close to a tipping point in American society. If you believe there is right and wrong, that there are acceptable standards of behavior ... then you have a stake in this war. If the attackers win many more victories ... the culture war may be lost before we know it. If that happens, we will find ourselves living in a world where moral relativism reigns and individualism runs amok. Now is the time to enlist in this effort, to stand up and be counted.”

Onward, libertarian soldiers?

Bring Teachers' Pay Into This Century

Our ability to compete for the jobs of tomorrow depends, above all, on our capacity to educate children today. Yet we are still operating under yesterday's system to attract and retain new, talented teachers. It is outdated and designed to fail.

Study after study affirms what I saw in the classroom every day as superintendent of Denver Public Schools: Nothing makes a bigger difference for student learning than great teaching. To get enough of the teachers we need, teaching has to be a great job where talented people

are supported and rewarded.

That won't happen without reforming a compensation system that was designed deep in the last century for a labor market that no longer exists. It's based on a society that discriminated against women, and left them with limited professional options.

When talented women

had to choose between becoming teachers or nurses, we could convince them to teach “Julius Caesar” for 30 years with a small salary that built toward a generous pension in retirement. Fortunately, women today can choose from an array of lucrative professions. But our system of teacher compensation has yet to evolve to reflect this choice.

We pay new teachers extremely low starting salaries. They are eligible for only small increases as they advance through their careers. But instead of competitive salaries, we offer a pension

system that is back-loaded. It invests potential early-career earnings into late-career rewards, causing teachers' total compensation to swell at the end of their careers. The effective cost to the system can be \$150,000 or more a year.

This setup provides perverse incentives: Teachers who are ready to move on might stick it out in the classroom until they qualify for full retirement benefits. Meanwhile, new teachers aren't enticed. Nearly 50 percent of new teachers leave the profession within the first five years, well prior to achieving full benefits.

We urgently need a new system — one that provides competitive salaries from the start, and opportunity for growth, attracting talented people entering the workforce to the profession.

Top-performing teachers

who take on the toughest challenges should have the opportunity to make six-figure incomes early in their careers. We should differentiate their salaries based on the difficulty of their assignments and their ability to drive results in the classroom.

Every teacher who has entered under the current system is owed what they were promised. Honoring the commitments that have been made while financing a new system will take some creativity. But we have to do it to be successful.

Across the nation, districts have begun recognizing this reality and are beginning to redesign their pay structures.


Teacher compensation isn't the only factor in cultivating great teaching. Other important priorities include changing how we measure

student performance, providing more flexibility to teacher-preparation programs and improving how we train and support principals.

Yet with a million teachers set to retire nationwide in the next few years, an inadequate system to recruit and retain new teachers, and schools that are struggling to meet high expectations, we can no longer afford to continue a 20th century system in a 21st century world. It is time we reform our compensation structure to allow us to recruit from a strong pool of talent and to prevent us from losing our most successful newcomers to other jobs.

Idaho Woman is First in Nation to Challenge Fetal Pain Law

Lawsuit asks judge to find state’s criminal sanctions unconstitutional, in part because they wrongly burden women in regions like southeastern Idaho that lack abortion providers.

BOISE • An eastern Idaho woman has filed what is believed to be the first lawsuit in the nation to directly challenge the constitutionality of a so-called “fetal pain” abortion ban.

Jennie Linn McCormack filed suit in federal court against Bannock County’s prosecuting attorney, contending Idaho’s new law banning abortions after 20 weeks of pregnancy violates the Constitution.

Idaho is one of six states that have enacted such bans in the past two years. The bans are based on the premise that a fetus may feel pain at 20 weeks.

McCormack, who was briefly charged with having an illegal abortion, is seeking class-action status in her lawsuit against prosecutor Mark Hiedeman. The suit also challenges other parts of Idaho abortion law.

McCormack was charged with a felony in June after police said she took pills to terminate her pregnancy last December. Police found the fetus in a box at McCormack’s Pocatello home Jan. 9, and an autopsy determined it was between five and six months gestation. Police said McCormack told them she didn’t have enough money to

go to a licensed medical professional, so her sister helped her access abortion-inducing drugs online.

A judge later dismissed the criminal case without prejudice for lack of evidence. That means the prosecutor may refile charges if he chooses, unless the federal courts stop him from doing so.

In the lawsuit, McCormack challenges the lack of access to abortions for women in her region, as well as the ban on abortions after 20 weeks.

She notes there are no elective-abortion providers in southeastern Idaho, forcing women seeking the procedure to travel elsewhere.

McCormack was unmarried and unemployed at the time of her pregnancy — with an income of \$200 to \$250 a month — and already had three children. She couldn’t afford the time or money it would take to travel to Salt Lake City to get an abortion, the lawsuit says.

If McCormack prevails, it will be a win for women across the region, said her attorney, Richard Hearn of Pocatello.

“If we’re successful, they’ll be able to access legal and safe abortions in southeastern Idaho,” whether performed with medicine or surgically in a clinic, Hearn said Wednesday.

Hiedeman could not be immediately reached for comment.

Idaho law bars women from getting abortions from anyone but licensed Idaho physicians, and requires that second-trimester abortions be performed in a hospital. Women who purposely cause their own abortions, or who get abortions from unlicensed physicians, face up to five years in prison and up to a \$5,000 fine.

McCormack is asking a judge to find that those criminal sanctions are unconstitutional, in part because they wrongly burden women in regions like southeastern Idaho that lack abortion providers.

Another Idaho law, passed during the 2011 Legislature, bans abortions once a fetus has reached 20 weeks on the belief that fetuses begin to feel pain at that stage. Idaho was one of five states — along with Kansas, Alabama, Indiana and Oklahoma — that enacted bans modeled after a fetal pain bill passed in Nebraska in 2010.

McCormack says the new law violates the Constitution because it doesn’t contain an exception allowing for abortions if necessary to preserve the mother’s health, and because it prohibits some abortions even before a fetus has reached viability. Roe v. Wade barred states from prohibiting abortions done before the age of viability, and other legal rulings have since determined viability occurs at 22 to 23 weeks gestation.

Blaine Woman Charged With Embezzling \$530K

KETCHUM • Blaine County officials say a former office manager for a real estate brokerage in central Idaho is charged with embezzling more than \$530,000 from the company over a seven-year period. The *Idaho Mountain Express* reports 49-year-old Tracy Dalin is charged with eight felonies. The case was

investigated for two and a half years. Jail officials say Dalin voluntarily surrendered at the sheriff’s office on Aug. 10 and was released after posting a \$10,000 bond. An initial court appearance is set for Sept. 12. Prosecutors allege Dalin took the money from Sun Land Investments in Bellevue. — Associated Press

State Police Make Big Meth Bust

Detectives say they purchase nearly 175 grams of methamphetamine off a Jerome man.

Narcotics detectives seized nearly 175 grams of meth during a recent investigation of a 23-year-old Jerome man.

Edgar Raul Aguilar-Bautista faces three counts of felony trafficking in methamphetamine after Idaho State Police detectives used a confidential informant to make three purchases of meth this month. Two buys were made in Jerome before a third arranged buy resulted in Aguilar-Bautista's Tuesday arrest in Twin Falls.

The ISP report notes that the informant carried documented cash during each buy and walked away with meth, allegedly sold by Aguilar-Bautista. The first buy allegedly occurred on Aug. 3 at the Jerome Dairy Queen, where the informant brought \$2,600 — half for a drug debt and half for meth. Detectives seized 29.5 grams from the buy. The second instance happened at Rolberto's Mexican Food restaurant in Jerome, and \$1,300 was swapped for 28 grams.

The third buy was arranged for the parking lot of Sportsman's Warehouse in Twin Falls. The informant was to buy 114.8 grams with \$5,500. ISP was joined by multiple local jurisdictions for the final seizure and arrest.

In total, detectives turned up with 172.3 grams of methamphetamine.

Aguilar-Bautista was arraigned in Twin Falls County 5th District Magistrate Court on Wednesday, as Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loebs has filed for jurisdiction in the case. A \$250,000 bond was set, and Aguilar-Bautista remains in custody at Twin Falls County Jail. A preliminary hearing is slated for Sept. 9. Online court records show no felony criminal history for Aguilar-Bautista in Idaho.

Report Finds Half of Americans Drink Too Much Sugar

ATLANTA • Half of Americans drink a soda or sugary beverage each day — and some are downing a lot. One in 20 people drinks the equivalent of more than four cans of soda each day, even though health officials say sweetened beverages should be limited to less than half a can. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention released the figures Wednesday in a report said to be the government’s first to offer national statistics for both adults and kids. Sweetened drinks have been linked to the U.S. explosion in obesity and related medical problems, and health officials have

been urging people to cut back for years. Some officials have proposed an extra soda tax and many schools have stopped selling soda or artificial juices. But advocates say those efforts are not enough, and on Wednesday a coalition of 100 organizations announced a new push. The effort includes the American Heart Association and some city health departments, which plan to prod companies to stop the sale of sugary drinks on their property or providing them at business meetings. There will also be new media campaigns, like one starting soon in Los Angeles that will ask “If you wouldn’t eat 22 packs of sugar, why are you drinking it?”

NYPD Monitored Where Muslims Ate, Shopped, Prayed

Documents offer rare glimpse into program shaped and steered by CIA that sometimes blurred line between domestic, foreign spying.

NEW YORK • From an office on the Brooklyn waterfront in the months after the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks, New York Police Department officials and a veteran CIA officer built an intelligence-gathering program with an ambitious goal: to map the region’s ethnic communities and dispatch teams of undercover officers to keep tabs on where Muslims shopped, ate and prayed. The program was known as the Demographics Unit and, though the NYPD denies its existence, the squad maintained a long list of “ancestries of interest” and received daily reports on life in Muslim neighborhoods, according to documents obtained by The Associated Press. The documents offer a rare glimpse into an intelligence program shaped and steered by a CIA officer. It was an unusual partnership, one that occasionally blurred the line between domestic and foreign spying. The CIA is prohibited from gathering intelligence inside the U.S. Undercover police officers, known as rakers, visited Islamic bookstores and

cafes, businesses and clubs. Police looked for businesses that attracted certain minorities, such as taxi companies hiring Pakistanis. They were told to monitor current events, keep an eye on community bulletin boards inside houses of worship and look for “hot spots” of trouble. The Demographics Unit, a team of 16 officers speaking at least five languages, is the only squad of its kind known to be operating in the country. Using census information and government databases, the NYPD mapped ethnic neighborhoods in New York, New Jersey and Connecticut. Rakers then visited local businesses, chatting up store owners to determine their ethnicity and gauge their sentiment, the documents show. They played cricket and eavesdropped in the city’s ethnic cafes and clubs. When the CIA would launch drone attacks in Pakistan, the NYPD would dispatch rakers to Pakistani neighborhoods to listen for angry rhetoric and anti-American comments, current and former officials involved in the program said. The rakers were looking for indicators of terrorism and criminal activity, the documents show, but they also kept their eyes peeled for other common neighborhood sites such as religious schools and community centers. The focus was on a list of 28 countries that, along with “American Black Muslim,” were considered

Swollen Rivers Start Falling in NE

KILLINGTON, Vt. — Swollen rivers began falling Wednesday in much of the Northeast, allowing relief crews to reach the last of the tiny Vermont towns that had been entirely cut off from help by Hurricane Irene’s fast-moving floodwaters. The receding water eased the flooding that had paralyzed parts of the region and revealed more damage to homes, farms and businesses across the flood-scarred landscape. Repair estimates indicate that the storm may rank among the nation’s costliest. — *Associated Press*

Pakistan’s Fatal Fertilizer

U.S. officials say around 80 percent of Afghan bombs are made with fertilizer produced by a single company in Pakistan and smuggled across the porous border.

MULTAN, Pakistan • The main ingredient in most of the homemade bombs that have killed hundreds of American troops in Afghanistan is fertilizer produced by a single company in Pakistan, where the U.S. has been pushing unsuccessfully for greater regulation. Enough calcium ammonium nitrate fertilizer for at least 140,000 bombs was legally produced last year by Pakarab Fertilizers Ltd., then smuggled by militants and their suppliers across the porous border into southern and eastern Afghanistan, according to U.S. officials.

The U.S. military says around 80 percent of Afghan bombs are made with the fertilizer, which becomes a powerful explosive when mixed with fuel oil. The rest are made from military-grade munitions like mines or shells. The United States began talks a year and a half ago with Pakistani officials and Pakarab, one of the country’s largest companies. But there is still no regulation of distribution and sale of calcium ammonium nitrate fertilizer. “If you have a host country that has a factory making a substance that ultimately becomes the problem, then that country has to contribute at least half the solution,” said Democratic Sen. Bob Casey of Pennsylvania, who

led a congressional delegation to Pakistan last week to press army and civilian leaders for action. U.S. officials say Pakistan and Pakarab have expressed willingness to regulate the fertilizer, which is also widely used in the manufacture of bombs used by insurgents to kill thousands of soldiers and civilians inside Pakistan. They acknowledge the difficulties: 15 years after ammonium nitrate was used in the Oklahoma City bombings, the U.S. government only presented its proposals to regulate it on Aug. 2. But with the death toll from homemade bombs rising almost daily inside Afghanistan, continuing inaction by Pakistani authorities will add more strain to a U.S.-Pakistani relationship already frayed by allegations that Islamabad is aiding Afghan insurgents on its side of the border.

Obama Yields to GOP on Timing of Speech

President asked Congress for prime-time slot on Sept. 7, giving him a grand stage for a televised address on jobs, but it would have upstaged a GOP presidential debate set for the same time.

WASHINGTON • In a retreat after an hours-long test of wills Wednesday, President Barack Obama agreed to deliver an address on jobs and the economy to a joint session of Congress on Sept. 8, yielding to House Speaker John

Boehner, who had balked at Obama’s request for a Sept. 7 speech. Obama’s address still gives him a grand stage to unveil his economic agenda, but it falls on the same evening as the opening game of the National Football League season. White House officials were working on the precise timing of the speech.

The change now will allow a planned Sept. 7 Republican presidential debate in Simi Valley, Calif., to proceed without Obama upstaging it. Still, by seeking a rare joint session of Congress as his audience, Obama will get a nationally televised address that puts him face to face with Republican lawmakers who bitterly oppose his agenda and have vowed to vote down any new spending he might propose. “It is our responsibility to find bipartisan solutions to help grow our economy,

Gadhafi Spokesman Rejects Rebel Demand To Surrender

BENGHAZI, Libya — The spokesman for Moammar Gadhafi’s collapsing government on Wednesday rejected a rebel ultimatum to surrender or face an all-out military assault, and two of Gadhafi’s sons sent mixed signals from hiding about dealing with the rebel government. A senior rebel official coordinating the hunt for Gadhafi, Hisham Buha-giar, said the deposed Libyan leader is believed to be either in the area of Bani Walid, a desert stronghold of Gadhafi loyalists 104 miles southeast of Tripoli, or in Sirte, his home town and tribal power base on the Mediterranean coast 278 miles east of the capital, Reuters news agency reported. Both areas were hit Tuesday by NATO airstrikes, and

rebels say they are closing in on Sirte from the east and west. Libya’s Transitional National Council — the de facto government of the country since the rebels gained control of key areas last week and Gadhafi disappeared from view — has said loyalists have until Saturday to relinquish control over the pockets of the country where they still hold sway. In response, Gadhafi spokesman Moussa Ibrahim dismissed the council as an unlawful group and said Gadhafi’s son Saadi was willing to negotiate and form a transitional government in coordination with the rebels — something opposition leaders have made clear is unacceptable to them. “No dignified, honorable nation would accept an ultimatum from armed gangs,” Ibrahim said in a phone interview with the Associated Press.

“This is a test,” Casey said. “The key thing now is to see results.”

The only producer of calcium ammonium nitrate fertilizer in Pakistan, Pakarab operates two factories in Punjab province, the country's agricultural heartland.

The largest is on the outskirts of Multan, an ancient city surrounded by thousands of acres (hectares) of mango orchards and cotton fields. A sprawling industrial complex of smoking chimneys, pipes and tanks surrounded by high walls, the 39-year-old facility churns out the chemical 24 hours a day when it's operating.

Lines of trucks wait outside to transport sacks of fertilizer to 2,000 distributors around the country, who then sell it to millions of Pakistani cotton, fruit and wheat farmers.

Around Multan, dealers sit in small shops in front of piled-up sacks of ammonium nitrate and other fertilizer, haggling with farmers.

Most say they are aware ammonium nitrate can be used as an explosive, but none has been told to report suspicious purchases.

Pakistani fertilizer producers are not permitted to export to Afghanistan because they are subsidized by the government and their products are meant for domestic use only. But the low price of fertilizer in Pakistan, and a chronic shortage in Afghanistan, has meant that smuggling has long been rife.

The chemical, known as CAN, is often trucked into southern Afghanistan repackaged as a harmless fertilizer. Other times, it's hidden under other goods, often after border guards have been paid a bribe, according to smugglers at the Chaman border and U.S. officials.

One dealer, Mohammad Wassem, told The Associated Press wealthy people with links to the insurgents placed orders for all three fertilizers produced by Pakarab.

They sold the two safer varieties domestically, then trucked the ammonium nitrate across the border.

and if we are willing to put country before party, I am confident we can do just that,” Obama wrote Wednesday in a letter to Boehner, R-Ohio, and Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev.

With new August unemployment numbers ready to be released Friday, Obama is under pressure to lay out his plan. In seeking a joint session of Congress to deliver it, he is turning the effort into a public relations campaign.

The timing dispute created an inauspicious start to the jobs debate and introduced tensions before Congress even returns from its annual summer recess.

It began with the White House releasing the letter at noon Wednesday from Obama to Boehner and Reid asking them to convene a joint session of Congress for his address at 8 p.m. Sept. 7.

Usually, presidential requests to address Congress are routinely granted after consultations between the White House and lawmakers.

In this case, the White House notified Boehner's office on the same day it released the letter requesting the session. A White House official, speaking on condition of anonymity because of the sensitivity of the topic, said Boehner's office raised no objections or concerns.

But Boehner, in his formal reply, said the House would not return until the day Obama wanted to speak and that security and parliamentary issues might be an obstacle. The House and the Senate each would have to adopt a resolution to allow a joint session for the president.

Boehner spokesman Brendan Buck said no one in Boehner's office signed off on the date and accused the White House of ignoring established protocol of arriving at a mutually agreed date before making public announcements.

Boehner's letter did not mention the Republican debate on Wednesday or Thursday night's NFL game between the New Orleans Saints and the Green Bay Packers, a game certain to draw a large TV audience.

“ancestries of interest.” Nearly all were Muslim.

Mayor Michael Bloomberg said last week that the NYPD does not take religion into account in its policing. The inclusion of American black Muslims on the list suggests that religion was at least a consideration. On Wednesday, Bloomberg's office referred questions to the police.

How law enforcement agencies, both local and federal, can stay ahead of Islamic terrorists without using racial profiling techniques has been hotly debated since 9/11. Singling out minorities for extra scrutiny without evidence of wrongdoing has been criticized as discriminatory. Not focusing on Muslim neighborhoods has been equally criticized as political correctness run amok. The documents describe how the nation's largest police force has come down on that issue.

NYPD spokesman Paul Browne said the department only follows leads

and does not simply trawl communities.

“We do not employ undercover or confidential informants unless there is information indicating the possibility of unlawful activity,” Browne wrote in an email to the AP.

That issue has legal significance. The NYPD says it follows the same guidelines as the FBI, which cannot use undercover agents to monitor communities without first receiving an allegation or indication of criminal activity.

Before the AP revealed the existence of the Demographics Unit last week, Browne said neither the Demographics Unit nor the term “rakers” exist. Both are contained in the documents obtained by the AP.

An NYPD presentation, delivered inside the department, described the mission and makeup of the Demographics Unit. And a police memorandum from 2006 described an NYPD supervisor rebuking an undercover detective for not doing a good enough job reporting on community events and “rhetoric heard in cafes and hotspot locations.”

Government Sues to Block
AT&T, T-Mobile Merger

WASHINGTON • The Justice Department took the unusual step Wednesday to try to block AT&T's \$39 billion purchase of T-Mobile USA, arguing that the proposed merger would lead to higher wireless prices, less innovation and fewer choices for consumers.

Now AT&T, the nation's No. 2 wireless carrier, and No. 4 T-Mobile are plotting a legal response to challenge federal regulators.

In its civil antitrust lawsuit, the Justice Department said the merger would stifle competition in the wireless industry. The deal, which is still under review at the Federal Communications Commission, would catapult AT&T past Verizon Wireless to become the nation's largest wireless carrier, leaving Sprint Nextel as a distant third-place player and certain to struggle.

AT&T quickly signaled that it won't abandon the transaction, leading to expectations of a fierce court battle.

AT&T has several incentives to take up a legal fight with regulators. In court, the burden is on the Justice Department — not AT&T — to show that the combination would harm competition. If the deal doesn't go through, the company will be forced to pay T-Mobile a \$3 billion break-up fee and give it some wireless spectrum rights.

AT&T said it will ask for an expedited court hearing “so the enormous benefits of this merger can be fully reviewed.”

In a statement, T-Mobile's owner, the German company Deutsche Telekom, said it is disappointed by the Justice Department's action and “will join AT&T in defending the contemplated merger.”

The companies could wage a strong defense in court.

Morgan Reed, executive director of the trade group, Association for Competitive Technology, said AT&T has at least one key fact on its side: Deutsche Telekom has said it does not plan to continue to invest in upgrading the T-Mobile network to deliver faster wireless. That means, “T-Mobile is not a competitor anymore,” Reed said.

“T-Mobile has already stepped away from the table,” Reed noted. “We're at three nationwide wireless carriers no matter what.”

The association, which represents more than 3,000 small and independent application developers, believes the merger would benefit the wireless broadband industry.

In addition, the Justice Department lawsuit portrays T-Mobile as having been a strong competitor in the past, but merger analysis is forward looking, said Washington attorney Robert Bell, who has represented clients in mergers for over 25 years.

“To the extent AT&T can show there's good reason to believe that T-Mobile is going to be a very different kind of competitor in the future — for example, weaker financially, less innovative — then the lawsuit becomes quite a bit different,” Bell said.

ANTITRUST SHOWDOWN: The Justice Department is seeking to block AT&T's proposed \$39 billion acquisition of T-Mobile USA on the grounds that it would reduce competition and increase prices in the wireless communications market.

THE STAKES: AT&T will have to pay a \$3 billion breakup fee if the deal is called off. That gives the company a huge incentive to take the case to court. Similarly, the Justice Department seems intent on demonstrating its resolve to enforce merger guidelines issued late last year.

THE RISKS: A legal battle could expose confidential information and cause uncertainty that hurts AT&T's stock and business.

law professor Joseph Bauer said he was “pleasantly surprised” by the Justice Department's challenge of the deal because it has become so rare for the antitrust regulators to block major mergers during the past decade.

During a news conference, Deputy Attorney General James Cole said the merger would result in “tens of millions of consumers all across the United States facing higher prices, fewer choices and lower quality products for mobile wireless services.”

T-Mobile has been an important source of competition, including through innovation and quality enhancements such as the rollout of the first nationwide high-speed data network, according to Sharis Pozen, acting chief of Justice's antitrust division.

AT&T and T-Mobile compete nationwide, in 97 of the largest 100 cellular marketing areas, according to the suit filed in U.S. District Court in Washington. They also vie for business and government customers.

The lawsuit says the acquisition would eliminate a company that has boosted competition with low pricing and innovation.

T-Mobile had the first handset using the Android operating system, BlackBerry wireless email, the Sidekick smart phone, national Wi-Fi “hotspot” access and

7 Best Spots for Kid Fishing

Where in south-central Idaho can youth drown a worm? Try these family-friendly fisheries.

Jonathan Pierce stood next to his dad, Travis, comparing fishing rods — standing them on end to measure their height, shaking them for flexibility.

The Wendell pair were at Sportsman’s Warehouse in Twin Falls on Friday. That night was to be 10-year-old Jonathan’s first time cat fishing, and Travis wanted to make sure his son had a new rod-and-reel combo for the occasion.

Jonathan has had plenty of experience catching other kinds of fish — bass, crappie, trout.

“It’s just fun, something for the whole family to do. It’s a way to not be cooped up inside all day,” he said, noting that bass is his favorite fish to catch. “They put up a good fight.”

Their Friday destination was Dogwood Creek in Gooding. Despite its name, it’s actually a 15-acre reservoir. Travis has always had good luck at Dogwood, one of south-central Idaho’s great spots for parents to take their kids fishing.

What makes a fishery family-friendly? Accessibility, facilities

and the high probability of catching fish, said Doug Megargle, regional fisheries manager for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

“First and foremost is the expectation to see a bobber move,” he said.

Here are seven of the valley’s family-friendly waters:

Camas Ponds

Though the area lacks a restroom, the two fisheries that make up the Camas Ponds — one mile east of U.S. Highway 20 in Fairfield — are a kid-friendly place because of its frequently stocked rainbows and accessible shoreline. Parents don’t have to worry much about youngsters’ fishing lines getting caught in reeds.

Besides fishing, the nearby Centennial Marsh and Camas Prairie Wildlife Management Area provide bird-watching opportunities.

To get to Pond No. 1, from Fairfield go one mile east on U.S. 20. Turn north at the sign that reads “Kids Pond.”

For Pond No. 2, from Fairfield go one mile north on Center Street. Turn right on Work Road and travel .4 miles east. Turn left. The pond

is .25 miles past a small gravel pond.

Crystal Lake

Twin Falls resident Garth York and his two sons always have good luck catching rainbow trout at Crystal Lake, in the Niagara Springs Wildlife Management Area in Wendell.

At work Friday at Sportsman’s Warehouse, York, who is the store’s fishing manager, got a call from his sons: When are we going fishing?

“I have to get off work first,” York replied. He planned to take them to Crystal Lake that evening.

Fishing, he said, provides good bonding time for him and his sons and keeps the boys busy.

“I think that’s one of the main reasons why fishing is good,” York said. “It keeps kids out of mischief.”

Crystal Lake offers picnic areas, accessible shorelines and nearby fish hatchery.

Hiking the Black Pine Mountains

This mountain range near Malta might not be as well-known as other Idaho ranges, but it offers something others do not: A bird’s-eye view of Utah and the Great Salt Lake.

Among the numerous mountain ranges jutting up from the Idaho landscape, the Black Pine Mountains might not win many popularity contests. They are mostly unrecognizable by name to even the locals, yet anyone cruising down Interstate 84 to Salt Lake City passes by them.

But while lacking the pizzazz of other ranges that sport rocky crags or alpine lakes, the Black Pines contain a certain appeal of their own.

The mountains have been described in a book titled “Exploring Idaho’s Mountains,” as “the most distinctly defined mountain range in Idaho; it is surrounded by wide flat valleys, and rises steeply on all sides.” The author, Tom Lopez, writes that the 17-mile string is “a textbook example of a Great Basin range.”

That appreciative analysis struck a cord with me. After further reading I learned that a hiker standing on one of

its mountaintops could see the Great Salt Lake, and I immediately began planning a trip.

Hiking accounts posted online and information from Lopez’ book present a multitude of routes to the Black Pines’ summits. I chose to drive south from Malta and approach the mountains from the west. A dirt road depart-

ing from State Highway 81 gradually climbs that classic product of a basin and range feature, an alluvial fan, before ending inside Sixmile Canyon.

No ATV trail or hiking path exists beyond the road’s end, which, according to Scott Nannenga, supervisor for the Sawtooth National Forest Minidoka

SD Pheasant Outlook Good Despite Fewer Birds

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. • Pheasant hunters should have another good season in South Dakota despite an estimated 46 percent drop in bird numbers from last year, state wildlife officials said this week.

The drop is from historic highs, as roadside counts from 2003 through 2010 were at levels not seen in 40 years, said Tom Kirschenmann, chief of wildlife for the state Game, Fish and Parks Department.

But last year's harsh winter was tough on hens, cutting into reproduction and reducing the population. Kirschenmann said it wasn't just the cold. Having the ground covered with snowpack for much of the winter stresses birds by making it more difficult to find food and forcing them to use more fat reserves, he said.

"To get through those hard difficult times, after a while it takes a toll on those birds," Kirschenmann said Friday.

Statewide brood surveys estimate 3.55 pheasants per square mile statewide, down from

6.54 of the birds per mile in 2010. The 10-year average is 6.04 pheasants per mile. Drops were documented in Pierre, Chamberlain, Mitchell,

Aberdeen, Yankton, Huron, Watertown and Sioux Falls.

Declines were most pronounced in the east, where grassland nesting habitat is being lost to crops.

Acres enrolled in the Conservation Resource Program are currently at 1.17 million, down from 1.56 million acres in 2007. The reduction equates to more than 600 square miles of grassland habitat.

"Without grassland habitat, you just don't have the reproduction recruitment from the nesting standpoint," Kirschenmann said.

But officials said the pheasant population in the main part of South Dakota's pheasant range still will provide quality hunting opportunities during the season that runs from mid-October

through the end of the year.

The counts in the main pheasant range are similar to or higher than the counts in 2002, when

hunters bagged 1.2 million pheasants. Pheasant hunters harvested 1.8 million pheasants in 2010.

There's still going to be some very good pheasant hunting opportunities across the state," Kirschenmann said.

North Dakota's numbers are also likely down, according to that state's spring pheasant crowing count survey.

Roadside brood surveys to be released later this fall will give biologists a better insight into what to expect, but the crowing count released in June showed a 6 percent drop statewide from last year.

Officials there said many adult birds did not survive the winter before last and fewer adult birds and poor chick production the following spring due to cool, wet weather also hurt the population.

his first catch of the day.

He was at the Twin Falls lake, as he often is during summer, with his parents and siblings. Besides fishing, the Twin Falls family likes Dierkes for its docks, playground and restroom.

Located near Shoshone Falls, Dierkes Lake is a popular destination for hikers and rock climbers, too. Most anglers come to catch the lake's hatchery-stocked rainbow trout, but, like the Lamoreaux family, they also pull bass and bluegill from the water when weather is warm.

When water temperatures rise, Megargle said, trout fishing slows down.

Emerald Lake

There's a variety of fish to catch at Emerald Lake and right now is a good time to try your luck at panfish.

Located off Interstate 84 about a mile northeast of Heyburn, the lake is stocked with rainbow trout, said Fish and Game's Regional Fisheries Biologist Scott Stanton, but kids also like it for its bass and bluegill. Parents like it for its accessibility.

"It has easy access just off the highway," he said. The trout fishing probably will pick up again come late September when temperatures cool. And if you decide you want to try another fishery, Stanton said there are several other family-friendly waters not far away: Connors Pond in Burley, Lake Walcott in Rupert and the Rupert Gun

Club Pond, to name a few.

Filer Ponds

The three fisheries known as the Filer Ponds have grown in popularity since the first line was cast there by a youngster in 2008.

But now's not the best time to fish the ponds, Megargle said. Trout have pretty much stopped biting because of warm water temps. Bullheads and carp, which have gotten into the ponds through irrigation sources, are being caught in their place. That's both good and bad, Megargle said.

"I don't think it's a fishery where most people want to see bullheads," he said. "The other thing we run into in midsummer is vegetation. We're working with the canal company to minimize vegetation."

Megargle said Fish and Game plans to remove carp from the ponds later this year. The department has not stocked trout for several weeks, but will likely do so in late September when temperatures drop. Trout just don't do well in warm water, he said.

The ponds, north of Filer at 4035 N. 2300 E., have easy shoreline access and, when stocked, usually make a lot of young anglers happy.

The smaller pond is for those 12 and younger, while the larger ponds are for anglers of all ages.

Magic Reservoir

With a low-gradient open shoreline and a variety of fish, Magic Reservoir is perfect for young

anglers, according to the Fish and Game website. Anglers like the reservoir for its rainbow trout, brown trout, perch and smallmouth bass.

Amenities include boat ramps, camping area, fishing docks, picnic shelters and restrooms.

"Water levels vary depending on irrigation demands," according to Fish and Game, "so some access points may be high and dry certain times of the year."

Riley Pond

Kenadee Wareham giggled as she held up the small rainbow trout her mother, Cindy Brown, caught at Riley Pond.

"We come here all summer," Brown said.

Unlike Filer Ponds, Riley Pond in Hagerman is still a good trout fishery in summer. Water is cooler because it's fed by a natural spring, Megargle said.

The pond — part of the Hagerman Wildlife Management Area, located on State Fish Hatchery Road off U.S. Highway 30 — is a popular fishery for stocked rainbow and golden trout. There also is plenty of other nature for visitors to enjoy, such as a variety of butterflies, songbirds and waterfowl.

Nearby is the Hagerman State Fish Hatchery's show pond, where for a quarter kids can feed its bass, trout, muskie and sturgeon.

Easy shoreline access, picnic benches, shade trees and restrooms make Riley Pond a friendly place to take your family — and catch your limit of hatchery-raised trout.

Ranger District, is a common characteristic to the mountain range.

"The Black Pines are the least accessible in terms of motorized use and formal trails, of the three units that we manage," he said.

The range hosts few hikers, Nannenga said, but is favored by a particular type of deer hunter, who, if lucky enough to draw a tag, wants a different experience than that found in places like the South Hills.

With no conventional route to follow, I wove through the juniper forest that reaches down into the bottom of Sixmile Canyon.

After escaping the tangled trees and attaining the ridge, the hike became a simple, not-too-steep climb toward Black Peak. Luckily, the timing of my journey coincided with a flush of flowers composed mostly of Indian paintbrush in various hues spread out across the open mountain-side. A couple of voluntary detours led me to several north-facing pockets of quaking aspen and Douglas fir, but with sizeable mounds of snow still drifted around their trunks, I returned to unobstructed progress up the mountain's colored slope.

I discovered a pair of bluebirds perched in a tiny grove of short, twisted aspens and shortly after imagining their song as a chorus of encouragement, I stood atop Black Peak. That apex offers a spectacular view westward to the Jim Sage and Albion Mountains, and, with binoculars, an inspection into portions of the City of Rocks.

Far beyond those granite formations and their surrounding hills rise the peaks of the Jarbidge range; northward across the Snake River Plain the Soldier, Smoky, Pioneer and Lost River mountain ranges

If you hike

What: Black Pine Mountains, located south of Malta in Minidoka County.

blend together into one long fortress.

A rock cairn on Black Peak marks the highest point of the Black Pine range at 9,395 feet, and after removing a couple of stones from the monument, I found the summit register. Only six entries from the past two years, with my note representing the first of this season, confirmed the mountain's obscurity.

It wasn't yet time to descend, however — an unobstructed view of the Great Salt Lake could only be attained from Black Pine Peak, its summit resting only 10 feet lower and just more than a mile southward. Traversing the crest that links the range's two highest peaks requires little more than an easy stroll with little up-and-down.

Trail:

There's no conventional route to follow, so you'll have to weave through juniper and trees. But the scenery is great with old cabins that dot some fields and the occasional songbird.

What Else to See: Snow drifts still hang from the eastern edge of the crest. A small metal structure that houses communication hardware sits on top of Black Pine Peak, but its main attraction consists of the view offered southward into Utah and the Great Salt Lake.

Haze and dust stirred up from the valley floor limited the visibility somewhat, but not enough to keep me from sighting the north end of ancient Lake Bonneville's salty remnant.

And while the lack of pristine air proved frustrating, it also provided motivation, along with the surprising ease in reaching the top of this lonely mountain range, to some day make a return visit.

Wolf Seasons Open in Idaho

Wolf hunting seasons opened Tuesday in Idaho.

Seasons run through Dec. 31 in Island Park and Beaverhead wolf management zones, from Aug. 30 through June 30 in the Lolo and Selway zones, and from Aug. 30 through March 31 in the remaining nine of the state's 13 wolf management zones.

Licensed hunters may buy two tags per calendar year — \$11.50 for resident hunters, and \$31.75 for nonresidents.

Harvest limits are set in five zones — 40 in the Salmon, 60 in the Sawtooth, 25 in the Southern Mountains, 10 in the Beaverhead and 30 in the

Island Park zones — to preserve connectivity with populations in other states.

Fish and Game will monitor the hunt daily. The seasons will close when the harvest limit for that zone is reached or the season closing date, whichever comes first.

A wolf trapping season opens Nov. 15 and runs through March 31 in the Panhandle zone, except for units 2 and 3; in the Lolo zone; in the Dworshak-Elk City zone, except Unit 10A; in the Selway zone; and the Middle Fork zone. All other zones are closed to trapping.

F&G Commission Adopts Proposed Rule Changes

The Idaho Fish and Game Commission at a meeting Aug. 24 adopted a proposed change to the Landowner Appreciation Program, changes to wildlife salvage rules and minor changes to a number of other rules.

Landowners in five game management units — 40, 41, 42, 45 and 52 — who meet the conditions of the Landowner Appreciation Program, have been eligible for an allocation of additional tags equal to 25 percent of the number of controlled hunt tags to be issued for deer, elk and pronghorn hunts in those units.

The standard allocation is 10 percent.

The commission agreed to a proposed change that would reduce the allocation of LAP tags to 10 percent for landowners in those five game management units. But the landowners would be eligible for an additional 15 percent allocation as an incentive to provide benefits to hunters.

Incentives include a managed public access agreement, a depredation release agreement, a habitat improvement project and offering special sporting opportunity, such as veteran or

youth hunting opportunity.

Commissioners also adopted a proposed rule that would allow people to salvage animals that may be lawfully hunted or trapped but have been accidentally killed in a vehicle collision, provided they report the incident to Idaho Fish and Game within 24 hours and obtain written permission to keep the animal within 72 hours.

A permission form would become available from Idaho Fish and Game.

The rule also would allow people to sell parts, except the meat, from such salvaged animals, not including bighorn sheep.

These and other recently adopted rule changes must be approved by the 2012 Idaho Legislature before they take effect.

WATERFOWL SEASONS SET

It's done — the Idaho Fish and Game Commission on Wednesday adopted a 107-day waterfowl season for 2011-12.

A youth hunt was set for Sept. 24 and 25.

Daily duck bag limits are seven birds in the aggregate — no more than two female mallards, two redheads, three scaup, two pintails, one canvasback — with a

possession limit of 14 birds after the first day and no more than four female mallards, four redheads, four pintails, six scaup and two canvasbacks.

Daily limits for Wilson's snipe are eight, with a possession limit of 16 after the first day; and the daily limit for coots are 25 with a possession limit of 25 after the first day.

Daily bag limits for dark geese — Canada, greater white-fronted — is four per day. Daily limits for light geese — snow, blue, Ross's — are 10 per day.

Details on seasons will be available in a brochure at license vendors and on the Fish and Game website within about a week.

FISHING REPORT

Anglers Report Some Success at Area Waters

Magic Reservoir: Boat anglers are reporting moderate success. Water is still up and bank fishing is doing well. Night crawlers and pink marshmallows are very popular right now. Boat anglers are reporting better success when they are fishing deeper water.

Salmon Falls Reservoir: Anglers report catching walleye, trout, bass, crappie and perch. Most boat anglers are fishing between Greys Landing and the Gravel Pit, and reporting quite a few walleye and good size perch.

Jigging with worms is popular right now, as well as wedding rings and crank baits. The water is still high and most boaters are putting in at the dam. The Gravel Pits have plenty of water and offer a variety of fishing.

Because of the high water, bank fishing is concentrated around the docks and areas like Whiskey Slough, China Pit, and Antelope Bar.

Roseworth Reservoir: Anglers report pretty good trout fishing.

Little Camas: Fishermen are reportedly doing fair. Water levels are still relatively high allowing for boat access. Algae is starting to come on strong, but anglers are still harvesting rainbow trout.

Big Wood River: The river is fishing well since water levels dropped. The dry fly action has been pretty good.

Little Wood Reservoir: Anglers are doing fairly well catching 14- to 15-inch rainbow trout with the occasional cutthroat trout. Most anglers seem to be concentrating on the upper end of the reservoir near the inlet. Boat access is good.

Filer Ponds: The ponds have essentially shut down due to warm water temperatures. Stocking will resume when water quality improves — likely in September.

Oakley Reservoir: Anglers report catches of rainbow trout. Boat anglers were doing the best. Shoreline fishing was decent but spotty. No walleye fishing reports available.

Silver Creek: Fishing is reportedly slow to moderate. Delayed vegetation

growth (cold spring) was making fishing difficult; however, the vegetation has finally come in raising water levels and concentrating fish in channels and deep water. Some anglers are reportedly having success fishing after dark for large browns.

Snake River: Sturgeon fishing is slow likely due to warm water temperatures. The river flows have decreased but the warm water seems to be slowing catch rates down.

Bruneau Dunes: Anglers report having fun with bass and bluegill. Vegetation is getting heavier, but float tubers are still having success.

Question: I have to file bankruptcy, but need to keep my only car. I owe way more than it's worth. I think I can make the payments.



Answer: In a Ch. 7 bankruptcy, your choices are to surrender the car or to keep it and pay. If you keep it, you must agree to reaffirm your debt and continue making the monthly payments, or redeem it by paying what the car is worth instead of what you owe on it. To redeem, you ordinarily have to pay in a lump sum. Chances are, if you could afford to redeem, you would not have to file bankruptcy.

In a Ch. 13 bankruptcy, you may be able to do the equivalent of redemption by paying back only the value of the car, with reduced interest, over the life of your Ch. 13 Plan. This is called a "cram down" because you don't pay the entire loan, only the value of the car. Your payments will probably go down because the loan term can be extended. Whether you qualify for a "cram down" depends in part on whether the loan was for the purpose of buying the car, or whether the title to the car was taken as collateral for a personal or business loan. If the loan was not for the purpose of buying the car, you probably qualify for a "cram down". However, this is a highly technical point in a very complex body of law. An experienced bankruptcy attorney can identify the best option for you very quickly.

Court Case Lifts Lid on Secret Post 9/11 Flights

WASHINGTON • A hidden network of U.S. companies, coordinated by a prominent defense contractor, played a key role in the covert airlift that transported terrorism suspects and their American minders, according to newly disclosed documents in a New York business dispute between two aviation companies.

The court files of more than 1,700 pages shed new light on the U.S. government's reliance on private contractors for flights between Washington, foreign capitals, the U.S. military base at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, and, at times, landing points near once-secret, CIA-run overseas prisons. The companies included DynCorp, a leading government contractor that secretly oversaw a fleet of luxury jets, and caterers that unwittingly stocked the planes with fruit platters and bottles of wine for the transoceanic routes, according to the court files and testimony.

The business dispute stems from an obscure four-year fight between a New York-based charter company, Richmor Aviation Inc., which supplied corporate jets and crews to the government, and a private aviation broker, SportsFlight Air, which organized flights for DynCorp. Both sides cited the government's program of forced transport of detainees, or "extraordinary rendition," in testimony, evidence and legal arguments. The companies are fighting over \$874,000 awarded to Richmor by a New York state appeals court to cover unpaid costs for the secret flights.

The court files — they include contracts, flight invoices, cell phone logs and correspondence — paint a sweeping portrait of collusion between the government and the private contractors that did its bidding — some eagerly, some hesitantly. Others turned a blind eye.

Among the new disclosures:

- DynCorp, which was reorganized and split up between another major contractor and a separate firm now known as DynCorp International, functioned as the primary contractor over the airlift. The company had not been previously linked to the secret flights.
- Airport invoices and other commercial records


provide a new paper trail for the movements of some high-value terrorism suspects who vanished into the CIA "black site" prisons, along with government operatives who rushed to the scenes of their capture. The records include flight itineraries closely coordinated with the arrest of accused 9/11 mastermind Khalid Sheik Mohammed and the suspected transport of other captives.

- The private jets were furnished with State Department transit letters providing diplomatic cover for their flights. Former top State Department officials said similar arrangements aided other government-leased flights, but the documents in the court files may not be authentic since there are indications that the official who purportedly signed them was fictitious.
- The private business jets shuttled among as many as 10 landings over a single mission, costing the government as much as \$300,000 per flight.

Some flights landed at airports near where CIA black sites operated — Kabul, Bangkok and Bucharest. Others touched down at foreign outposts where obliging security services reportedly took in U.S. terror detainees for their own severe brand of persuasion — Cairo; Damascus, Syria; Amman, Jordan; and Rabat, Morocco. Billing records show scores of baggage handlers, ramp officials, van and car providers, satellite and flight phone firms, hotels and caterers routinely serviced the flights and crews and earned tens of thousands of dollars.

The court records do not specify who was aboard the planes beyond a count of crew and passengers. But in several cases, the flights dovetail with the arrests and transport of some of the most prominent accused terrorism suspects captured in the months immediately following 9/11: Mohammed, the purported mastermind, and Ramzi bin Alshib, his key logistics man; Abd al-Nashiri, who allegedly planned the 2000 bombing of the USS Cole; and Hambali, an Indonesia terror leader tied to the 2002 bombing of a Bali nightclub.

The detainees all vanished into the CIA's now-shuttered "black site" prison network and all are now at Guantanamo awaiting military trials.

Poet Maya Angelou Takes Issue With Shortened Quote on MLK Memorial

WASHINGTON (AP) • Poet and author Maya Angelou is taking issue with a paraphrased quotation from Martin Luther King Jr. inscribed in his new memorial in Washington, saying the shortened version makes the civil rights leader sound like an "arrogant twit" because it's out of context.

The words were from a sermon King delivered Feb. 4, 1968, at Atlanta's Ebenezer Baptist Church, two months before he was assassinated, about a eulogy that could be given when he died.

King said, "Yes, if you want to say that I was a drum major, say that I was a drum major for justice. Say that I was a drum major for peace. I was a drum major for righteousness. And all of the other shallow things will not matter."

On Tuesday, Angelou, who consulted on the memorial, told *The Washington Post* that the shortened version of those words sounds egotistical and should be changed.

It reads: "I was a drum major for justice, peace and righteousness."

The phrase is inscribed on a statue of King without quotation marks because it is paraphrased. It is not grouped with 14 quotations from King that are part of the memorial plaza.

The paraphrased version "minimizes the man," said the 83-year-old Angelou. "It makes him seem less than the humanitarian he was. ... It makes him seem an ego-tist."

King would have never said of himself that he was a drum major, Angelou said, but rather that others might say that of him.

"He had a humility that comes from deep inside," Angelou told the *Post*. "The 'if' clause that is left out is salient. Leaving it out changes the meaning completely."

Memorial planners said they were fond of the quota-

tion but that it had to be shortened because of a change during the King statue's creation. They originally planned to use most of the "drum major" quote but changed its placement, and sculptor Lei Yixin told them there wasn't enough space.

"We sincerely felt passionate that the man's own eulogy should be expressed on the stone," said Ed Jackson Jr., executive architect of the memorial. "We said the least we could do was define who he was based on his perception of himself: 'I was a drum major for this, this and this.'"

Project planners outlined the problem and their proposed solution to the U.S. Commission of Fine Arts, which had to approve the memorial's design. The federal arts panel did not object, Jackson said.

Angelou was one of the memorial's Council of Historians tasked with selecting the inscriptions for the memorial. But she did not attend meetings about the inscriptions, Jackson said.

Two other memorial advisers were consulted, Jon Onye Lockard and James Chaffers of the University of Michigan. But Jackson said he ultimately had to make the decision.

Lockard told the *Post* he was fine with the shortened inscription.

"If there's any comment about anything, it's late," he said, noting others also have recently criticized pieces of the memorial. "I think it's rather small of folks to pick at

things. ... This has been going on for 14 years, and all of them have had plenty of time to add their thoughts and ideas?"

Logger Cuts Off Toes After Foot Pinned

DENVER • Jon Hutt was doing logging work all alone in a remote Colorado forest when his six-ton trailer fell onto his right foot.

The pain was excruciating, no one was around to hear his cries for help and he couldn't free himself from the big piece of equipment. So he pulled out his 3-inch pocket knife and cut off his toes to get free.

"It hurt so bad," the 61-year-old Hutt said, "I would cut for a while and then I had to rest."

Hutt then climbed into his semi tractor-trailer, his foot wrapped in a shirt, and began driving for help. Hutt's ordeal was first reported in the *Grand Junction Daily Sentinel*.

Hutt, who runs a crane business and does logging "for fun," had gone into the woods by himself on Aug. 19 to retrieve a pile of fallen aspen trees to cut for winter firewood. A trailer that was attached to his truck slipped and landed on his foot.

The wiry, 180-pound man told The Associated Press that he began cutting off his toes about 30 minutes later when he realized no one could hear his cries. Hutt said he couldn't reach his cell phone, which was in his truck and out of range anyway.

During her formative years, Grace lived in India. She attended boarding school at Woodstock School in northern India until the Friesen family returned to the United States when she was 16 years old. Grace never lost her heart for missions and, throughout her life, the stories she told of her childhood were flavored with Hindi words and phrases.

Grace loved to teach. She studied education and took her first job teaching all eight grades in a one-room school house in Galva, Kan., when she was in her early 20s. On May 25, 1947, she married Clifford Slatter, and the couple settled south of Filer on Clifford's farm. Moving to southern Idaho was a big change of culture and lifestyle for Grace, but adaptability was one of her unique strengths. Grace loved the farm and enjoyed harvesting and preserving home-grown produce from her garden and fruit trees throughout her life. Returning to college when her youngest child was in school, Grace earned her bachelor's degree. She enjoyed teaching second grade in Wendell, then Hagerman and finally for many years in Hollister. She put a great deal of imagination and effort into making learning interesting for her students and gained enormous satisfac-



tion from watching their progress.

Grace was deeply involved with Summer Bible School which Filer Mennonite Church held at Mount Rock

Grange each summer and continued to be generous with her teaching skill in Bible school and Sunday school until her loss of hearing prevented it. Grace loved to keep her hands busy and, after retiring from teaching school, she began again to use the skills she learned earlier in life, crocheting scrubbers, knitting dish cloths, baking bread and pies, and making jams and pickles. She sold them, donating the proceeds to support the International Gift Sale and other relief projects both locally and abroad.

Clifford preceded her in death in May of 2002. Five children survive her, Virginia (Del Buerge) of Dawson City, YT, Canada, Pat (Tom Losser) of Filer, Lowell Slatter of Brookville, Ohio, Evelyn Slatter of Newnan, Ga., and Lois (Gary Hooley) of Filer. Grace enjoyed each of her 12 grandchildren and deeply grieved the loss of grandson, "Jakie," in 1978. She has 24 great-grandchildren (all surviving). Grace is survived by one brother, Paul Friesen of Hesston, Kan.

Billy Drake, Who Was a Top Gun for Royal Air Force in WWII, Dies at 93

Billy Drake, a British fighter ace whose daring and skill made him one of the Royal Air Force's most successful pilots of World War II, died Aug. 28, the *Daily Telegraph* of London reported. He was 93. The cause and location of death could not be confirmed.

Group Captain Drake was credited with 24.5 aerial kills — another pilot was given half of one kill — and he reportedly destroyed a dozen more enemy planes parked on the ground.

He harbored an interest in flight since a boyhood ride in a flying circus biplane. He decided to join the Royal Air Force in his late teens, after seeing a recruitment call in a magazine.

After Germany invaded Poland in 1939, Drake was sent to France, where he spent the first months of the war sitting idle. At that point, France was not equipped with sophisticated radar, so the pilots had no early alert in the event of aerial attack.

He told interviewers that the first sign of an enemy

plane often was the condensation trail the aircraft left as it swept through the moisture-rich sky.

Following one such contrail, Drake scored his first victory against a German Messerschmitt fighter plane in the spring of 1940.

During another sortie not long after, he had to abandon formation after he realized his plane was not equipped with an oxygen supply for high-altitude flying. On the way back to base, he encountered several German Dornier bombers and attacked with his machine guns. He watched one bomber catch fire and crash.

Distracted, Drake didn't notice a German fighter swooping in behind him. Seconds later, his cockpit was engulfed in flames. He bailed out and landed in the countryside.

"The French farmers thought I was a German because I was very blond in those days, so they walked toward me very cautiously with scythes and pitchforks," he said. But after "I was able to show them my wings, they couldn't have been nicer."

Badly wounded by shrapnel in his back and legs, he was taken to a hospital in France and then back to England. After recuperating, he flew reconnaissance missions over the English Channel during the Battle of Britain.

"I would land, grab a cup of tea and I'd be shouting, 'Fuel her up — let's go again,'" he said.

Drake later commanded units based in North Africa and on the Mediterranean island of Malta.

Many of his fellow pilots became casualties. "You accepted that they could be shot down, and if they were, bad bloody luck. That's war," he explained. "You'd go up to their room and see if there was anything you could borrow."

After the war, he served as an military attache in Switzerland and retired in 1963 as a commander at a Royal Air Force base in Devon.

Drake said he was not haunted by memories of his wartime experiences.

"You never thought about the fact you'd taken a life," he told Britain's Daily Express in

2004. "When you got involved in an aerial battle, it was metal versus metal."

A descendant of British naval hero Francis Drake, Billy Drake was born Dec. 20, 1917, in London. He spent much of his childhood in Switzerland.

His father's passion for clay pigeon shooting aided the development of young Billy's hand-eye coordination before his military service.

Upon retirement, Drake spent 20 years in the Algarve coastal area of Portugal, where he managed properties and ran a bar. In recent years, he lived in Teignmouth, Devon. The Telegraph said he was twice married and is survived by two sons from his first marriage.

Drake flew nearly every sortie wearing a cravat in the colors of English Epsom Derby winner Hyperion around his neck.

"By God, we had a good time. That's not to say we behaved in the way Hollywood likes to portray Battle of Britain pilots. Of course, there were a few randy ruffians who would chase any girl," he told the Sunday Mirror, a British publication, last year. "But generally we all had girlfriends, and we didn't use the war as an excuse to sleep with them. We were gentlemen."

The dirt starts flying tonight and continues through Saturday at 7:30 p.m. each night. After the Friday night performance, there will be a slack for the timed events.

Brazile has won eight all-around cowboy world titles and 14 world titles. He competes in tie-down roping and team roping with partner, Patrick Smith. He currently leads the 2011 all-around world standings and has earned over \$217,000.

Tonight is Tough Enough To Wear Pink Night. People attending are urged to wear pink to support breast cancer awareness and honor breast cancer survivors. Proceeds benefit the 900 Women campaign.

Sankey Rodeo Company will be partnering with Jeff Robinson Bucking Bulls and New West Rodeo to produce this year's stampede. Jeff Robinson was named 2010 Professional Bull Riders Stock Contractor of the Year and is known for having one of the deepest bullpens in the history of the PBR.

The prize money has been raised to \$6,000 per event with the header and heeler in team roping receiving equal money. Fan favorites will include nut-ton bustin, wild cow milking, and wild ranch cowboys riding saddle broncs with cowboy stock saddles.

The Magic Valley Stampede Board of Directors has chosen to honor the history of generations of three Idaho ranch families in 2011. The Thursday night performance of this year's rodeo has been dedicated to the Lickley Ranch of Jerome. The Friday performance will feature the Bedke Ranch of Oakley and Saturday's performance has been devoted to the Callen Point Ranch

in Rogerson.

Josie Young had hoped to compete in the bareback riding at the Stampede but after suffering a broken leg July 28, decided on Wednesday to limit his activity to the team roping competition with his father, Mickey.

"I've had kind of a rough year," said the Kimberly cowboy. "I was in the top ten early in the year and in February, I herniated a disc. Then I came back and in mid May, I broke my hand and wrist. So after breaking my leg, I decided to just stay close to home."

Staying close to home is probably a good idea. After getting married in January, Young and his wife are expecting a son in a couple of weeks.

With all the injuries, why keep riding?

"It's a passion," said Young. "Injuries are part of the deal. I worked so hard to get to the National Finals Rodeo in 2008 and then I got hurt. So I think I have some unfinished business. If I decide to quit, I want it to be my choice to stop and on my own terms."

Young's partner is more than capable. Mickey Young was an eleven-time NFR bareback riding qualifier.

"It's really cool team roping with him and my dad is pretty excited," said Young. "He wanted to rodeo with me so we've been practicing every night and entered some rodeos. I always like to enter and support the rodeos close to home."

DeMers is ranked 12th in the bareback riding world standings and has earned almost \$60,000. He has a busy weekend planned with a Friday night performance in Ellensburg, Wash., followed by a trip to Filer on Saturday night then hit the road to Walla Walla, Wash., on Sunday. And if all goes well, it will be back to Ellensburg, for the finals and another ride on Monday.

"Filer is a good rodeo and is on the way to the other rodeos," said DeMers who was just named as an assistant coach for the College of Southern Idaho rodeo team. "They've added some money so it is worth competing, especially when you need some money."

Illness Forces Venus to Withdraw from Open; Two New Faces Win

NEW YORK (AP) • Her 2011 U.S. Open done and tennis future in doubt because of an immune system disease, Venus Williams rode away from Arthur Ashe Stadium in the back seat of a car a little before 5 p.m. Wednesday.

Inside, one young American, Christina McHale, was preparing to speak at a news conference about reaching the third round with a surprise victory over a past Grand Slam finalist. Another, Irina Falconi, was on court, starting a match that would end with her waving a giant U.S. flag to celebrate her own upset.

As those events unfolded — the most stunning, of course, being seven-time major champion Williams' withdrawal shortly before her second-round match because of an illness she hadn't previously disclosed — it was possible to see a symbolic shift for U.S. women's tennis.

Williams revealed she recently was diagnosed with Sjogren's syndrome, which doctors say is usually not life-threatening. The most common complaints are dry eyes and dry mouth; in rare cases, it can cause joint pain.

"I am thankful I finally have a diagnosis and am now focused on getting better and returning to the court soon," said Williams, who has played only 11 matches in the last 11 months.

Lately, as the 31-year-old Williams and 29-year-old sister Serena have dealt with health problems and played less frequently, people have wondered when — and perhaps whether — another American woman would make an impact in the sport. For one day, at least, McHale and Falconi did just that.

"I've heard so much about media talking about American tennis, and I really

wanted to portray that there's a huge wave of American players," Falconi explained when asked why she pulled out the flag she keeps in her bag. "I strongly believe in all that is USA, and I wanted to represent it and show the world that it's coming. It's coming. No need to wait any longer."

McHale, a 19-year-old from Englewood Cliffs, N.J., delivered a 7-6 (2), 6-2 victory over eighth-seeded Marion Bartoli of France, the runner-up to Venus Williams at Wimbledon in 2007. Falconi, a 21-year-old who went to Georgia Tech, followed that up by beating 14th-seeded Dominika Cibulkova of Slovakia 2-6, 6-3, 7-5.

"I think there's a lot of American play-

ers — young American players — right now that are all kind of pushing each other. So I think it's exciting," said McHale, who knocked off top-ranked Caroline Wozniacki at hard-court tuneup tournament in Cincinnati in August.

"We all push each other to want to do better," McHale.

On Wednesday night, 2003 U.S. Open champion Andy Roddick beat 96th-ranked Michael Russell 6-2, 6-4, 4-6, 7-5 in all-American first-round match. Enduring a rough season filled with injuries, No. 21 Roddick dropped out of the top 20 in the rankings for the first time in a decade.

Historical Rivalries in Jeopardy After Texas A&M Announcement

HOUSTON (AP) • The official Texas A&M fight song includes a line that bids farewell to Texas, "so long to the orange and white." By this time next year, Texas A&M may have said goodbye to a lot more than its storied, century-old rivalry with Texas.

Texas A&M announced Wednesday that it will leave the Big 12 Conference by July 2012 if it can find another home, preferably in the Southeastern Conference.

The decision could set off another round of conference realignment in college sports and it raises questions about the future of the Big 12, which is starting the football season with 10 teams after losing Nebraska and Colorado. The Big 12 said it would move quickly to find at least one replacement for the Aggies but offered no timeline.

"The presidents and chancellors of the nine remaining member institutions are steadfast in their commitment to the Big 12," Big 12 Commissioner Dan Beebe said in a statement. "As previously stated, the conference will move forward aggressively exploring its membership options."

The Southeastern Con-

ference said it hadn't received an application from Texas A&M to join the league and that it would have no further comment. The SEC has reaffirmed its 12-school membership, but remains open to expansion talks.

Leaving the Big 12 "is in the best interest of Texas A&M," said university President R. Bowen Loftin, who formally notified the league with a letter after earlier securing details on the withdrawal process. He said he hopes the move can be amicable and presumably hopes to negotiate a reasonable exit fee.

"We are seeking to generate greater visibility nationwide for Texas A&M and our championship-caliber student-athletes, as well as secure the necessary and stable financial resources to support our athletic and academic programs," Loftin said. "This is a 100-year decision that we have addressed carefully and methodically."

Texas A&M, which has been in the Big 12 since its founding in 1996, said it will submit an application to join another, unspecified conference. If accepted, Texas A&M will leave the Big 12, effective June 30, 2012.





THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

“Reading maketh a full man, conference a ready man, and writing an exact man.”

There are plenty of excellent bridge players who claim never to have read a textbook. Personally, though, I find that articles and books do help me play better. I learned basic technique — not to mention some of the more complex plays — by reading up on them. However, one of the most obscure combinations you will ever see is featured in this deal's spade suit, and I had never seen it reproduced in a book until very recently.

There might be something to be said for playing six clubs today, but six no-trump looks like the normal spot. How should you develop tricks in spades? The answer is to run the spade queen! If the suit is 3-3, it is a blind guess which finesse to take. But if the suit is 4-2, your spade intermediates will let you pick up three of the four honor-doubletons by leading the queen. No other play caters to that.

It is only fitting that when this combination came up in the Cavendish tournament a few years ago, it was Fred Gitelman, author of “BridgeMaster,” which features this precise combination, who was at the helm in six no-trump. He made the right play and was rewarded when the cards cooperated.

Just for the record: if you did not have the spade eight, your best play would be to lead low to the 10. This gives you a 50 percent chance against the 3-3 breaks and also picks up either doubleton honor in East.
