# BLAZE NEAR WENDELL SCORCHES 5,000 ACRES

Human-caused: BLM officials suspect the fire was started by people. Joint Effort: 10 fire engines and 7 aerial vehicles part of control efforts.

WENDELL • A human-caused wildfire scorched nearly 5,000 acres north of Wendell on Thursday afternoon.

The fire - called the Highway 46, Mile Marker 103 Fire — ignited at 1:33 p.m., the U.S. Bureau of Land Management said. Deemed humancaused, the blaze remains under investigation.

At nearly 5 p.m., nearly 5,000 state, private and public acres were charred. No structures were burned or threatened by 6 p.m. Thursday, the BLM said. Officials expect the fire to be contained by 6 p.m. today. However, there was no estimate yet for when the fire will be fully extinguished.

While no buildings were damaged, multiple junked vehicles were charred at L&L Classic Auto in Wendell, a salvage yard located along Idaho Highway 46. Firefighters devoted their efforts to extinguish blazes in old autos at the yard that also caught fire last September.

It was unclear late Thursday if the blaze began in the salvage yard or elsewhere.

The fire's smoke was enormous, visible even to people attending the Twin Falls County Fair in Filer.

Two air attack aircraft, three single-engine air tankers, three heavy air tankers, a lead plane, and three choppers aided ground crews that battled the fire line with 11 engines and two dozers, the BLM said. The aircraft flew toward clouds of smoke so thick that it seemed to swallow the airplanes and helicopters up at times.

Kevin Andrews, who farms in rural Gooding County, saw the smoke and drove from the fair to see where the blaze was located.



"Health care reform law is accelerating a trend that was already developing," Pate said.

The reform puts fi-

nancial incentive on preventive care actions. Unlike in the past, doctors will get paid for value, not volume.

St. Luke's will benefit integrating with St. Benedicts because it will be able to coordinate care between the Twin Falls and Jerome areas, Pate said.

"Now it's not just patients in our hospitals, but looking at the whole population and seeing how do we promote health," he said.

Though some fear the changes resulting from health care reform will lead to employee layoffs as providers seek to meet costs, St. Luke's will only consider cutting jobs as a last resort, Pate said.

"We feel especially sensitive to this issue. We are the largest employer in the state and we help drive the economy," he said. "It's important we recognize our role in the economy. We have the opportunity to look at care processes and find how we can prevent avoidable complications and preventable hospital admissions."

# Feds Kill 3 Wolves After Sheep Killed Near Carey

Federal officials killed three wolves on Wednesday after confirming they were the same wolves responsible for killing multiple livestock.

The wolves had killed four sheep on Flat Top Ranch near Carey this week and most likely three sheep in August, said Todd Grimm, the western district supervisor for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Wildlife Services.

"As soon as we confirm a depredation, we talk to the (Idaho Department of) Fish and Game supervisor to plan a lethal order," Grimm said.

However, Grimm said very few wolves are actually killed.

"We were in the right place at the right time," he said. "Less than half of the lethal control orders actually end up killing a wolf. This time a little bit of luck was involved."

The agency has killed close to 40 wolves this year. The number is down from years prior, Grimm

# **Buhl Man Arrested For** Selling Drugs in Boise

Chapa, 18, of Buhl, is also charged with a misdemeanor count of eluding police.

A Boise patrol officer says he was driving behind a tan Chevy Cavalier on North Mitchell Street, near the Sunflower Lane intersection, around 10 p.m. Wednesday when he saw the Cavalier go across the road and park on the wrong side of the street. The officer then watched another man walk up to the car and appear to give something to the driver, who was later identified as Chapa.

The officer then drove closer and shined a spotlight at the car, at which point the man on the street ran away and Chapa took off, driving the car northbound on Mitchell and reaching a speed of 50 mph in a matter of seconds, according to re-

The officer followed Chapa, who pulled his car over a short distance away in the 2600 block of Mitchell Street.

Boise police arrested Chapa for the eluding charge at that point. A Meridian Police K-9 dog detected the presence of drugs in the car a short time later and officers found two bags containing a total of 25 grams of marijuana and some scales in a backpack inside the car.

Boise police developed additional undisclosed evidence that Chapa was selling marijuana and then arrested him on the delivery charge. The man police saw walk up to the car on Mitchell Street was not found, according to reports.

Chapa made his initial court appearance Thursday. His next hearing is Sept. 15.

The crime of possession of marijuana with intent to deliver is punishable by up to five years in prison.

# Sandpoint Studies Impact Fees

Planning Commission is set to tackle the tricky issue of impact fees after an expert financial consultant presented his firm's study findings.

**SANDPOINT** • The Sandpoint Planning Commission is set to tackle the tricky issue of impact fees after an expert financial consultant presented his firm's study findings.

Carson Bise of the fiscal consultant firm TischlerBise recommended that the commission consider increasing several impact fees to cover the town's projected devel-

City officials requested the study as a part of their regular reexamination of impact fees every five years. According to planning director Jeremy Grimm, Bise is the national authority on the sub-

"We were lucky enough to have the preeminent impact fee advising council in the country do this study for us,"

Impact fees are one-time payments to the city for new commercial or residential developments. According to Bise, the total fees are determined based on need, benefit and proportionality.

The study identified four areas in Sandpoint that warranted improvement through impact fees: parks and recreation, police, fire and transportation. Impact fees help ensure that those key institutions keep pace with the town's development. The collected fees can only be used for capital improve-

According to Fire Chief Robert Tyler, the Tischler-Bise associates assigned to the study did an incredibly thorough job of analyzing the city's unique circumstances.

"What occurred in this study is far greater than what occurred in 2005," he said.

TischlerBise's findings recommended substantial increases in fees depending on the location of the development. Outside urban renewal areas, the study proposed an increase in maximum allowable fees for a single family home to an average \$7,048. Fees in the downtown urban renewal area would increase to an average \$6,533. Finally, fees in the northern urban renewal area would increase to an average \$6,595. The current average for all areas is \$3,882.

Similarly, fees for an average commercial development would increase to a proposed \$8.43 per square foot outside a renewal area, \$7.34 per square foot in the downtown urban renewal area and \$7.47 per square foot in the northern urban renewal area. The current total fee for all areas is \$2.34 per square foot.

# Getting From Point A to Point B

It's unusual to go through an entire budgeting process with unswerving commitment to the same top priority. In fact it's almost unheard of. Almost.

hose who had a hand in creating — and passing — the city of Twin Falls' 2011-12 city budget began the process committed to adding to this past year's \$550,000 budgeted expenditure for street maintenance. Although dozens of other items were discussed and dealt with, the council remained focused on keeping, or adding to the \$200,000 increase in road maintenance funds proposed by City Manager Travis Rothweiler. And when the budget was ultimately approved this past Monday the amount earmarked for road maintenance had risen to 930,101 - a 69 percent increase over this past year — without an increase in the overall city tax rate. That is, we believe, work well done.

Kudos to Rothweiler, the entire City Council and to City Engineer Jackie Fields for keeping street maintenance discussion front-and-center. But this would not have gotten done without the assistance - willing or otherwise - of the city's department heads that endured decreases. It's easy to be parochial and focused on "my" department in budget discussions. Although this was almost certainly present behind the scenes, when road maintenance won, everybody won.

What we deserve as a consequence is a better timeline with more well thought out sequencing of maintenance projects this next year. Getting around town does not need to be impossible in the short term in order to be better in the long run. Rothweiler and Fields have both admitted that city can and will do better with this in the future. We hope so.

All of this is not to say that the budget is perfect. It may be impossible for budget "perfection" to exist in years of reduced revenue. "Quality of life" items such as Parks and Recreation funding were decreased. The addition of three new police patrol vehicles was floated, explained and discarded. Perfectly "good" things were either eliminated or not added. That happens; resources are finite.

In the end the city acted in a manner that allows both residents and commercial carriers an easier way of getting from Point A to Point B. We agree with that decision.



Surgeon General Regina Benjamin gets it. She is a doctor whose mother was a hairstylist. She knows high-maintenance hair can be an obstacle to exercise, especially for African-American women like herself. She's performing a huge public service by calling women out on it.

"Oftentimes you get women saying, 'I can't exercise today because I don't want to sweat my hair back or get my hair wet;" Benjamin told The New York Times. "I hate to use the word 'excuse,' but that's one of them?'

# Wanted: Patriotic CEOs to Stop Corporate Moochers

ome of the biggest corporations in the U.S. are moochers. They're like the guy who shows up at your Labor Day picnic empty-handed. He drinks all your beer, eats four helpings of barbecue and leaves a huge mess for everyone else to clean up. Then he asks you for 20 bucks in gas money to get home.

A troubling number of U.S. corporations behave as moocher guests at our national cafeteria. They help themselves to all the taxpayer-funded goods and services we create and pay for together and leave patriotic small businesses and individual taxpayers with

According to a new report by the Institute for Policy Studies that I co-authored, 25 corporations among the top 100 firms paid their CEOs more in compensation than they paid in taxes. Twenty of them spent more on lobbying Congress than they paid in taxes.

Twenty of the 25 paid not one dime in federal taxes last year. Many use offshore tax havens to shift their profits overseas to avoid U.S. taxes. In fact, their hands are out, collecting millions in government subsidies.

This elite group of supermoochers includes Ford, eBay, Verizon, Boeing, Mo-



torola, Honeywell, Dow Chemical, General Electric, Coca-Cola Enterprises, Prudential Financial, Capital One Financial and International Paper.

These companies utilize roads, ports, Internet broadband, weather services - our entire public infrastructure. They spin off products created from a foundation of Uncle Sam's investments, such as the Internet, drug research and innovation in aviation and science. They hire educated workers from our school systems - and complain when they don't have adequate skills.

When someone tries to steal their product or idea, they rush to the U.S. court system and law enforcement agencies for help and justice. They rest assured knowing their global assets are protected by the U.S. military and government agencies.

They claim to love America. They just don't want to pay for its upkeep. At the end of the cafeteria line, with their tray piled with food, they point to you and me and say, "They're picking up the tab?"

Think about it: Where would Honeywell be without government research and contracts? Where would Boeing be without the U.S. taxpayer, including a recent contract for \$35 billion in new planes?

These companies imply they should be relieved from taxes since they are creating U.S. jobs. But as new studies show, many of these same global firms are shifting jobs overseas as fast as they can.

General Electric CEO Jeffrey Immelt advises President Barack Obama on how to create jobs in America. He was paid \$15.3 million last year as his company paid no U.S. taxes and collected \$3.3 billion in refunds. In the past three years, GE has closed more than a dozen U.S. factories and eliminat ed 19,000 American jobs. In the past decade, the percentage of GE's global workforce based in the U.S. has declined from 54 percent to 46 percent.

Many companies avoid disclosing the breakdown of their workforce between the United States and other countries. They don't want the public to know how aggressively they are outsourcing jobs. Once-patriotic U.S. firms now view the United States as a platform for shifting capital, jobs, and profits around the world to

their narrow advantage. Our country is part of a

dynamic global economy and there are many benefits to our communities as a result. We benefit from global trade in goods, food and services.

Unfortunately, some our biggest U.S. corporations use the global economy as a shield to avoid basic responsibilities. For example, some use subsidiaries in tax-haven countries like the Cayman Islands and pretend their profits are earned offshore and their losses in the United States. These 25 companies together have more than 556 subsidiaries in tax haven countries.

We need a few respected CEOs to step up and say, "There's something wrong when a CEO is paid more than the entire amount of taxes a billion-dollar company pays?"

We could really use some patriotic CEOs who understand that to have first class infrastructure and education systems the businesses that benefit must pay their fair share. They can't complain about government waste and inefficiency and shift their money offshore — leaving everyone else to pay.

An earlier generation of CEOs of these same companies would have been ashamed to personally be paid more than their company's entire U.S. tax bill. Today's CEOs get rewarded for dodging taxes and their national responsibility.

#### Only Three Tanks Hold Radioactive Waste at INL

Your recent editorial, "A Disaster Waiting to Happen," requires some clarification.

The article focused on dam safety but inaccurately stated that the Idaho National Laboratory has "more than a dozen 300,000-gallon underground storage tanks filled with high-level nuclear waste," and implied that a Mackay Dam failure could result in radiation releases from those tanks.

While it is true the tanks are located in a flood zone and a dam failure poses some risk, it should be noted that there are only three tanks still containing liquid radioactive waste, and they are scheduled to be emptied, cleaned and grouted over the next 18 months. Seven of the other eight tanks have already been emptied, their waste processed, cleaned and grouted, in accordance with an agreement with the state of Idaho.

One tank has never been

used for waste storage and has always been kept empty as a spare. CWI, our cleanup contractor, is in the process of start-up testing of the Integrated Waste Treatment Unit, which will use a steam reforming technology to process the remaining 900,000 gallons of liquid waste currently stored in three underground tanks. They are scheduled to begin processing waste at the end of this year or early next year. The remaining three tanks will then be cleaned and

grouted by the end of next year.



# After Irene: When Will the Power Come Back On?

WARWICK, R.I. • Cold showers. Meals in the dark. Refrigerators full of spoiled food. No TV. No Internet. Up and down the East Coast, patience is wearing thin among the millions of people still waiting for the electricity to come back on after Hurricane Irene knocked out the power last

"It's like 'Little House on the Prairie' times;' said Debbie McWeeney, who went to a Red Cross shelter in Warwick to pick up food and water after everything in her refrigerator went bad. "Except I'm not enjoying it at all."

With the waters receding across much of the floodstricken region, homeowners are mucking out their basements and dragging soggy furniture to the curb. But the wait for power drags on, with an estimated 1.38 million homes and businesses still without electricity, down from a peak of 9.6 million.

And criticism of the utility companies is mounting. In Rhode Island, a state senator is calling for an investigation, and Massachusetts' attorney general is demanding information from utilities on how they are dealing with the crisis, including how many crews are in the field and their response time.

The industry has defended its efforts, noting it warned the public that a storm like Irene was bound to cause prolonged outages and pointing out that flooding and toppled trees caused severe damage to utility poles, substations and other equipment.

# Gadhafi, in Hiding, Vows No Surrender in Libya

World leaders meeting in Paris on Libya's future after Gadhafi say NATO military operations will continue as long as needed.

TRIPOLI, Libya • In a fiery broadcast from hiding, Moammar Gadhafi warned Thursday that loyalist tribes in his main strongholds were armed and preparing for battle, a show of defiance hours after rebels extended a deadline for the surrender of the fugitive leader's hometown.

The rebels, who have been moving troops toward remaining Gadhafi bastions across Libya, had shifted the deadline for the town of Sirte in hopes of avoiding the bloodshed that met their attack on Tripoli.

"We want to save our fighters and not lose a single one in battles with

Gadhafi's forces;' said Mohammed al-Rajali, a spokesman for the rebel leadership in the eastern city of Benghazi. "In the end, we will get Sirte, even if we have to cut water and electricity" and let NATO pound it with airstrikes.

World leaders meeting in Paris on Libya's future after Gadhafi said the NATO military operations would continue as long as needed.

The rebels say the advance on Sirte is going well, and that their forces have already captured one nearby city. They also say they are closing in on Gadhafi, who came to power 42 years ago Thursday in a military coup that toppled King Idris.

The rebels have been hunting for Gadhafi since he was forced into hiding after they swept into Tripoli on Aug. 20

and gained control of most of the capital after days of fierce fighting.

"We won't surrender again; we are not women. We will keep fighting," Gadhafi said in a blustery tone in the audio statement, broadcast by Syrianbased Al-Rai TV. His voice was recognizable, and Al-Rai has previously broadcast statements by Gadhafi and

Gadhafi said the tribes in Sirte and Bani Walid are armed and "there is no way they will submit." He called for continued resistance, warning "the battle will be long and let Libya burn." In a second late-night audio also

broadcast on the Syrian channel, Gadhafi spoke in more measured tones and called for a long insurgency.

"We will fight them everywhere," he said. "We will burn the ground under their feet?"

Obama's re-election campaign. The bleak figures from the Office of Management and Budget, which also projected overall growth this year at just 1.7 percent, serve as further confirmation of a sputtering economy while dramatizing the challenge Obama will face in making his case for re-election. The 1.7 percent growth rate is a full percentage point less than the administration predicted at the beginning of the

The economy promises to be the leading-edge issue of the 2012 White House sweepstakes, and Obama already is facing a host of Republican rivals challenging his financial policies. No president in modern times has won re-election with unemployment as high as 9 percent, and Obama's poll numbers have suffered in recent weeks

amid a steady drumbeat of bad eco-

On the deficit, the White House reoort also projects red ink totaling \$1.3 trillion for the budget year coming to a close on Sept. 30. That's slightly higher than last year's deficit but more than \$300 billion less than the record sum that the White House predicted in Feb-

Tax receipts are up unexpectedly and spending is down from the administration's earlier predictions, in part because of GOP-mandated cuts to the day-to-day operating budgets of Cabinet-level departments and agencies.

Of Thursday's report, White House budget director Jacob Lew said: "We need to get back on a sustainable fiscal path" and we must "invest in longterm economic growth and job cre-

# **U.S.** Marks First Month With No Troop Deaths in Iraq

**BAGHDAD** • August marked the first month since the 2003 U.S.led invasion of Iraq that no American forces have died, according to an Associated Press tally.

Figures compiled by the AP show that no American forces died in Iraq in August either in combat or non-combat related situations, a significant achievement in a conflict that has claimed the lives of 4,474 American service members since it be-

All American forces are supposed to leave Iraq by December of this year, but U.S. and Iraqi offihave been discussing whether to have a long-term American military presence in the country.

There have been previous months during which there were no combat related deaths, but during which some people died in non-combat related situations.

The numbers come on top of what had been a jump in U.S. troop deaths for the first part of this year. In June, 15 U.S. troops died in one of the biggest losses of life for American forces in Iraq in

All but one of those deaths were combat related, and most came in southern Iraq, indicating the increased activity of Shiite militias in launching attacks against American forces.

Bases across southern Iraq have seen a deadly jump in rocket and mortar attacks, including the use of IRAMs, or improvised rocket assisted mortars, which are dead-

ly short-range munitions that can be launched from the back of a truck. American forces traveling on roads around the country have encountered an increased number of armor-piercing explosives known as EFPs, or explosively formed penetrators.

Shiite militias operating throughout southern Iraq and the Baghdad area are trying to portray themselves as driving out the Americans from the country and keeping them from trying to negotiate a long-term American troop presence here

# **Doctors Prescribing Fewer Antibiotics to Kids**

ATLANTA • The push to get pediatricians to stop prescribing antibiotics for the wrong illnesses is paying off a bit, a new government report found.

Since the early 1990s, there's been a 10 percent drop in prescription rates for antibiotics for kids 14 and younger, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported Thurs-

Antibiotics are often used but don't work — against viral illnesses like colds and flu. Antibiotics fight infections caused by bacteria. Misuse can lead to antibiotic resistance.

Experts say doctors inappropriately prescribe antibiotics more than 50 percent of the time, and more often with respiratory infections.

The CDC found larger declines - about 25 percent - in how often doctors used antibiotics against sore throats, colds and some other upper respiratory infections. But there was no significant change in how often they prescribed the drugs for ear infection, bronchitis and sinusitis.

The new findings represent progress, but also sug-

gest that doctors are still prescribing antibiotics too often, said Dr. Lauri Hicks, a CDC epidemiologist who worked on the study.

"The bad news is we still have a long way to go," she said.

The CDC study was the government's first look at the issue in about a decade. It was based on an annual survey of doctors' offices, and compared rates from 1993-1994 to 2007-2008.

The improvement could be partly driven by rapid diagnostic tests that help doctors pinpoint whether a sore throat is caused by a virus or strep bacteria, CDC researchers said. The study also found fewer parents took their kids to doctors for upper respiratory infections, which could be thanks to a vaccine against pneumococcal bacteria that became available in

A public health campaign about antibiotics may have also had some impact, CDC officials said.

Doctors have not always followed recommendations to cut back on antibiotics, partly because of pressure from parents, said Dr. Kenneth Bromberg, chairman of pediatrics at the Brooklyn Hospital Center in New

# Space Junk Littering Orbit; Might Need Cleaning Up

junk has made such a mess of Earth's orbit that experts say we may need to finally think about cleaning it up.


That may mean vacuuming up debris with weird space technology – cosmic versions of nets, magnets and giant umbrellas, according to the chairman of an expert panel that issued a new report on the problem Thursday.

There are 22,000 objects in orbit that are big enough for officials on the ground to track and countless more smaller ones that could do damage to human-carrying spaceships and valuable satellites. The International Space Station has to move out of the way of debris from time to time.

"We've lost control of the environment," said retired NASA senior scientist Donald Kessler, who headed the National Academy of Sciences report.

Since the space age began 54 years ago, civilization has littered the area just above Earth's atmosphere with leftover boosters and other parts that come off during launches, as well as old satellites. When scientists noticed that this could be a problem, they came up with agreements to limit new space junk and those plans had been working.

Those agreements are intended to make sure what is sent into orbit eventually falls back to Earth and burns up.

Obama plans to outline his ideas for jump-starting the economy and creating jobs in a primetime address to a joint session of Congress and the nation on Sept. 8. That date was negotiated only after the White House and House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, disagreed over Obama's request to give the speech a day earlier - Sept. 7 - at a time when the Republicans had scheduled a presidential debate.

The White House report said that higher oil prices, an economic slowdown in Europe, continuing weakness in the housing sector and the disruption in global supply chains after the devastating earthquake in Japan have dragged down the economy.

"In sum, economic growth and job creation, while positive, have not been strong enough to bring the unemployment rate down to an acceptable level;" the budget office reported.

fectively ended Gadhafi's rule, dismiss his threats as empty rhetoric.

All three were given a Saturday deadline to surrender. While the deadline extension was officially only for Sirte, rebels said it would also apply to Bani Walid and Sabha.

breach, saying that an investigative journalist had revealed the password needed to unlock the files in a book published earlier this year. Guardian journalists countered that it was sloppy security at Julian Assange's anti-secrecy website which helped expose the cables to the world.

In a 1,600-word-long editorial posted to the Internet, WikiLeaks accused the Guardian's investigative reporter David Leigh of betrayal, saying that his disclosure had jeopardized months of "careful work" that WikiLeaks had undertaken to redact and publish the cables.

"Revolutions and reforms are in danger of being lost as the unpublished cables spread to intelligence contractors and governments before the public," WikiLeaks said in its statement.

Leigh and the Guardian both denied wrongdoing, and the exact sequence of events WikiLeaks was referring to remained clouded in confusion and recriminations.

It has long been known that WikiLeaks lost control of the raw cables even before they were published. One copy of the secret documents leaked to The New York Times in the fall of 2010, and other media organizations, including The Associated Press, have since received copies independently of WikiLeaks.

But never before has the entire catalog of unredacted cables made its way to the Web.

Until recently, WikiLeaks released relatively small batches of files to its partner organizations - dozens of international media and human rights groups - so they could remove information which could put innocent people in jeopardy. Only then were the files posted online.

But with the unredacted cables now sloshing around in the public domain, all that work has effectively been thrown out the win-

said crews from as far as Kansas and Idaho are working 16-hour shifts, and "we're committed to getting this resolved as soon as possible."

In the meantime, people are taking cold showers or washing up at shelters, using camp stoves and grills to cook, competing for ice at the grocery store and relying on generators and hand-cranked radios. The late-summer weather, at least, has been mercifully cool across much of the East Coast.

Many homes that depend on wells have no water because they have no electricity to pump it. Relief agencies have been handing out drinking water. And a high school in Exeter, R.I., opened its gym to let people shower.

In some places, people on oxygen or other medical devices that require electricity have been taken to

shelters that have power. Irene has been blamed for at least 46 deaths in 13 states. With the streets drying out in hard-hit New Jersey, some towns faced new problems, namely

trash bins overflowing with waterlogged debris. In Vermont, with roads slowly reopening, the National Guard's airlift of food, water and other supplies to once cut-off towns was winding down.

# Mars Rover Opportunity Examining Rocks at New Site

LOS ANGELES • The Mars rover Opportunity is snapping pictures like a tourist since arriving at its latest crater destination, much to the delight of scientists many millions of miles away.

The solar-powered work-horse beamed back images of the horizon, soil and nearby rocks that are unlike any it has seen during its seven years roaming the Martian plains.

Opportunity is doing more than just sightseeing. It recently spent a chunk of time using its robotic arm to investigate a flat-topped boulder to find out what it's made of.

After a three-year drive, the six-wheel rover finally rolled up to the western rim of Endeavour Crater earlier this month to begin a new chapter of exploration.

Project managers chose the locale because it's older and different than previous spots Opportunity has visited. The view from orbit reveals tantalizing evidence of clay deposits believed to have formed in a warm and wet environment early in Mars' history.

The next task will be to search for more ancient rocks and hunt for the elusive clay minerals, said the mission's deputy principal investigator Ray Arvidson of Washington University in St.

Opportunity's latest feat comes months after NASA bid farewell to its identical twin Spirit. Both rovers parachuted to opposite ends of the red planet in 2004 and lasted beyond their original three-month task.

Spirit fell silent last year not long after it got mired in a sand trap. NASA diligently listened for a signal from the rover and gave up in late May.

To commemorate Spirit, the rover team named a spot on Endeavour Crater "Spirit Point?"

Opportunity will soon have company on the surface. NASA is set to launch a mobile laboratory named Curiosity in November after a two-year delay. Once it arrives in summer 2012, Curiosity will study a mountain inside a 96-mile-wide crater to determine whether conditions were favorable to support microbial life.

# BLM Task Force Urges Safety in Roundups

RENO, Nev. • The American Association of Equine Practitioners BLM Task Force concluded in the 35-page report presented to BLM on Tuesday that the agency's care, handling and management practices "generally support the safety, health status and welfare of the animals" but found several areas needing improvement.

The 10-member team of veterinarians who visited the sites leveled their strongest criticism at the "unacceptable" conditions at an overcrowded holding facility in Herriman, Utah, where horses were forced to stand in a 4- to 8-inch deep mixture of mud and manure

They also recommended establishment of a uniform surgical anesthesia protocol at all horse management sites after an observation team witnessed horses appearing to suffer pain during castration at a holding facility in Palomino Valley north of Reno.

# Quake Shifted 115-Ton Storage Containers at Va. Nuclear Plant

**WASHINGTON** • Last week's central Virginia earthquake jolted huge concrete containers holding spent nuclear fuel at the North Anna power plant about 115 miles southwest of here, shifting some one to four inches, said the plant's operator, Dominion Virginia Power

The containers, called casks, weigh 115 tons each and are filled with bundles of uranium dioxide fuel rods that no longer generate enough heat to produce electricity.

electricity.

The plant houses a total of 53 casks on two concrete pads. Of 27 casks on one pad, 25 shifted during the magnitude 5.8 earthquake that struck Aug. 23 some 12 miles south of the plant in Louisa County, Dominion spokesman Richard Zuercher said.

"They are safe and remain intact," Zuercher said.
"They are designed not to fall over, and they didn't fall over."

Sensors designed to detect leaks of helium gas, which fill the casks, indicated no leaks, Zuercher added.

The casks, which look like concrete silos, sit on two secure pads outside the two-reactor power plant, which remains closed pending inspections by a special team sent by the Nuclear Regula-

tory Commission this week. Each of the 27 casks on one pad is at capacity, hold-

ing 32 fuel rods.
On a second storage pad,
26 newer storage casks did
not shift, Zuercher said.
Some concrete flaked off the
outside of these newer
casks, which sit horizontally
instead of vertically like the
older casks. Thirteen of
those casks hold fuel; the
rest are empty.

The containers that moved were licensed and began taking fuel in 1998.

"This indicates that reactors that have these dry casks in these earthquakeprone areas, they're going to have to do more to protect them from ground motion," said Robert Alvarez from the Institute for Policy Studies, who has extensively studied nuclear waste storage. "One thing is to bolt them to the pads. And that's not a Home Depot-type job. The pads themselves also need to be examined to see if they're durable enough."

Zuercher said Dominion continues its own inspections of the facility alongside the NRC team. "We have not found anything significant, nothing that affects nuclear safety," he said. "Both units are offline and in cold shutdown."

On Aug. 26, Dominion notified the NRC that the earthquake may have shaken the facility more than it was designed to handle. An analysis of "shake plates" that record ground motion will be completed Friday, Zuercher said, and the company will then make a final determination if the ground motion exceeded the plant's design.

As at many U.S. nuclear plants, when fuel rods at North Anna lose power, they are moved to an indoor spent fuel pool. After cooling there for several years, workers move the rods to the so-called dry storage casks, which are outdoor and cooled by natural air circulation.

Fuel rods remain radioactive for thousands of years as they slowly decay.

Dry casks were designed as temporary storage, Alvarez said, but have become de facto long-term waste warehouses as the country has failed to build a permanent waste repository.

According to the NRC, 55 sites in the nation have nuclear waste in dry cask storage.

Starting in 1986, the federal government began planning to move the nation's nuclear waste to a permanent repository at Yucca Mountain in Nevada. But after President Obama took office in 2009, he defunded the partially built hole in the mountain and declared the project closed.

Lawsuits arguing for and against completing Yucca Mountain are now wending their way through federal courts.

# Grandpa Charged With Forcing Grand Canyon Hikes

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz. • An Indiana man forced his three young grandsons to hike 18 miles in triple-digit heat at the Grand Canyon and denied them food and water, authorities said.

Christopher Carlson, of Indianapolis, remained jailed Thursday on six counts of child abuse. The boys, ages 12, 9 and 8, told investigators that they had been hit, pushed, choked, pinched and squeezed during trips on a popular trail at the canyon's South Rim last month.

On the latest hike over the weekend down the Bright Angel Trail, temperatures reached 108 degrees at Phantom Ranch along the Colorado River. A ranger spotted the group with binoculars on the trail and saw Carlson shoving the oldest boy and whipping him with a rolled-up T-shirt, authorities said.

National Park Service Special Agent Chris Smith testified that Carlson told authorities that the boys had been overweight and that he thought the hike would get them into shape.

"He told me that he loved

his grandchildren very much, but at the same time there were tough people in the world and his grandchildren needed to be tough as well," Smith said.

Authorities said Carlson

Authorities said Carlson tortured and beat the boys, and instructed them to lie to park rangers about any injuries. Rangers and passersby noted the alleged abuse by Carlson, according to court documents.

The boys said Carlson also forced their fingers down their throats, making them

vomit.
Rangers fed and hydrated

the boys inside an ambulance and they were placed in the care of child protective services. One boy had symptoms of heat stroke, while the other two exhibited signs of heat exhaustion and dehydration.

The Bright Angel Trail can be deceiving. It starts at the top of the canyon at around 7,000 feet in elevation and drops to 2,400 feet by the river, and the temperature varies widely. The Park Service advises hikers not to make the trip to the river and back in one day. Warning signs are posted at the trailhead and along the trail.

Carlson took the children on the latest hike on Aug. 28. A man died the same day on another trail at the Grand Canyon due to heat exposure.

Defense attorney Luke Mulligan questioned the children's statements, saying it seemed improbable that they could have completed the hike without food and water. He also said the rangers could have removed the children from the canyon had they believed the children were at risk of serious injury or death.

"If the rangers didn't perceive it, are we going to put an extra burden on my client to perceive it?" Mulligan said.

But prosecutors said a ranger was successful in preventing Carlson from reaching the river on an earlier hike on Aug. 15, cooling down the children and giving a heads-up to other authorities in the park. Camille Bibles said Carlson was intent on avoiding rangers during the second trip.

"We're looking at the defendant's actions here, not putting the rangers on trial," she said.



# Economy Shows Signs of Growth

**WASHINGTON** • August began with rising fears that another recession was about to hit. That was then.

A month later, the economy and the stock market appear more resilient, suggesting that consumers, businesses and investors remain confident enough to keep spending.

A more authoritative test will come Friday, when the government issues the August jobs report. Employers are expected to have added 93,000 jobs, which would not be enough to significantly lower the jobless rate of 9.1 percent.

But it would solidify evi-

dence that the economy, though still weak, is growing steadily. Many analysts now expect it to strengthen in the months ahead.

A stream of data released Thursday bolstered the case for an economy that's healthier than it seemed just weeks ago:

 Americans kept shopping in August despite higher prices and a hurricane that battered the East Coast during the important back-to-

school shopping season. • Car buyers lifted U.S. sales last month for most automakers. Analysts had expected a weaker August because of anxiety about the economy and Hurricane Irene, which forced many dealers to close during the month's final weekend.

• Fewer people applied for unemployment benefits last week, a sign that the job market may be improving slightly.

 Manufacturing managed to expand in August for the 25th straight month. Last month's growth, though modest, defied fears that manufacturing, one of the economy's few sources of strength, had contracted last month.

All that delivered a sense of relief that the economy is still expanding – even if it's not enough to reduce unemployment, raise wages and drive the housing market out of its depression.

"Today's releases add to the evidence that underlying economic conditions aren't half as bad as feared a few

weeks ago," said Paul Ashworth, an economist at Capital Economics.

Early last month, some economists had warned that the economy might be sliding into a recession — that is, if it were not already in one. The economy had managed to plod ahead at an annual growth rate of just 0.7 percent for the first six months of the year. Growth that scant leaves an economy vulnerable to shocks.

And the shocks arrived. The worsening European debt crisis threatened U.S. banks. Politicians fought to the final hours over whether to raise the debt ceiling. Standard & Poor's downgraded long-term U.S. debt. A regional manufacturing index plunged.

# Idaho Repays Federal Loan for **Unemployment Insurance**

Repayment through bond issue saves Idaho employers from federal insurance tax increase.

Thousands of Idaho businesses were spared from a federal tax increase Thursday when state officials approved repayment of a

massive federal loan. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter agreed to repay \$202.4 million to the federal government on loans it borrowed in 2009 and 2010 in order to continue paying unemployment insurance benefits after the state's Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund went broke during the recession.

The loans were repaid with proceeds from bonds issued in mid-August that were authorized by Otter and the Legislature as part of a Department of Labor initiative to return the trust fund to solvency, said Labor officials.

The money had to be repaid to the federal government by Nov. 8, or Idaho's

50,000 employers covered by the unemployment insurance system would have been hit with an additional federal tax of \$21 per worker in 2012. That amount would increase annually until the entire loan plus interest — a total of about \$228 million — was repaid.

By repaying the loan early, the state saved Idaho employers more than \$650,000 in interest. The Department of Labor owed the federal government about \$5.5 million in 2011 interest on the money through August. The loan had been interest free until the beginning of this year.

More than 30 states had to borrow money from the federal government after seeing their trust funds dry up during the recession. Traditionally, these loans are repaid through an extra tax on a state's employers, imposed either by the state or by the U.S. Department of Labor. There is no legal authority in Idaho for the state to impose a surcharge to repay loans.

To avoid the additional federal tax, the Idaho Department of Labor obtained authority to issue bonds at an overall savings to business. Under terms of the bonds, which were underwritten by Goldman Sachs and issued through the Idaho Housing and Finance Association, the Department of Labor will repay bondholders over four years from revenues generated through the normal state unemployment insurance tax. The bondholder's interest rate is 1.017 percent, compared to the 3 percent to 4 percent rate the federal government is charging.

Overall, the state will pay about \$207 million to redeem the bonds by August 2015, plus the \$5.5 million in interest to the federal government this year. That compares to the \$228 million that would have been paid through higher employer taxes.

# **NEW GRANT** DISPLACED DELL

The U.S. Department of Labor on Thursday announced a \$277,617 National Emergency Grant supplemental award to continue providing training and re-employment to the hundreds of workers laid off when Dell Inc. closed its Twin Falls call center in January 2010.

"As the economy of Twin Falls begins to grow, properly trained workers will be a key to business success and expansion," Jane Oates, assistant secretary of the department's Employment and Training Administration, said in a written release. "This grant will give former employees of Dell the training they need to upgrade their job skills for the region's in-demand industries."

Funding is being awarded to the Idaho Department of Labor. In February 2010, a grant was approved for up to \$1,324,672, with \$614,808 released initially. The remaining \$709,864 was approved for release in December 2010. The supplement announced today brings the total amount awarded to \$1,602,289.





hen the World Trade Center towers came tumbling down on Sept. 11, 2001, the tragedy was forever imprinted on America's conscience. Those old enough to recall the horrific day likely remember the moment they heard the news.

"Where were you when the second plane hit the tower? I dare say that 90 percent of the population over the age of 18 know exactly where they were," said Tony Mannen. "They know what they were doing and who they were with."

# **Artistic Inspiration: Southern** Idaho's Iconic Trout Stream

**KETCHUM** • Artist James Cook has painted in every state, his sweeping brushstrokes taking in the Kansas plains, the Mississippi Delta and the jagged Sawtooth Mountain peaks.

But he has a special fondness for Silver Creek Preserve, a spring-fed world-class trout stream that sits under the Picabo hills. The Arizona artist was introduced to them 30-some years ago and has returned to Idaho every year to paint them anew.

"I first became engaged with Silver Creek from a hill looking down," Cook recalled. "The water is extraordinarily clear and the reflection from the sky just extraordinary. And the longer I spent looking at the reflections of cottonwood on the water the more the creek became alive to me."

Cook collaborated with Ketchum gallery owner Gail Severn on an exhibition titled "Light on Silver Creek" in honor of the preserve's 30th anniversary. He will be on hand to discuss his work during tonight's free Gallery Walk from 5 to 8 p.m. around Ketchum. And he'll discuss his work during a free Artist Chat at 10 a.m. Saturday at the gallery, 400 First Ave. N., in Ketchum.

He will donate a percentage of sales to the preserve.

"There's not anyone who paints Silver Creek the way James does," Severn said. "He captures the essence of Silver Creek. You can take a beautiful photo of the place and capture a second in time. But there's something about his

brushstrokes that capture the light, the movement of the water. They really, truly capture the vibrancy of the place."

Another exhibit in tonight's Gallery Walk lineup that should appeal to dog-loving residents of southern Idaho is Martin Usborne's series of photographs that he calls "Mute – The Silence of Dogs" at Gallery DeNovo, 320 First Ave. N.

Usborne, a London photographer, was left alone in a car as a youngster, and he never forgot his sense of abandonment even though he had no reason to fear his parents wouldn't return for him. He began noticing what he thought was the same kind of terror on the faces of many dogs he saw left in parked

One photograph features a border collie sitting with his

ear cocked as if listening for his human companion to return. In another, a black Lab sits expectantly, an almost bewildered look in his eyes.

"He's really captured the humanistic side to these dogs," said Gallery DeNovo assistant Gail Dwyer. "When you look into their eyes, there's a lot of angst - they seem to say, 'Is someone out there coming to get me?""

Art lovers are invited to bring their dogs with them to view the exhibit. The gallery will serve up dog water and doggy biscuits, along with its usual wine. Ten percent of sales will go to The Animal Shelter of the Wood River Valley. Gallery DeNovo will also sell copies of Usborne's photography book, titled "My Name is Moose," which captures Usborne's own Scottish terrier as he tries to measure up to a prize show dog only to realize his real worth may lie elsewhere.

Once viewers have finished looking into the eyes of dogs, they can step across the hall into the Friesen Gallery, which is showing Mary Josephson's exhibit "Look into My Eyes." The Portland, Ore., artist uses paintings, embroidery and mosaic tiles to encourage people to communicate person to person rather than through the answering machines, email, texting and tweeting that she says people hide behind nowadays.

"As a military brat I learned to look for clues to try to communicate with other children, to do what I call 'speedfriending;" she said. "I hope my work offers clues to communication."



in New York City. It had a popular first year, with the parts being read by other notable performers such as Anthony LaPaglia, Amy Irving, Helen Hunt, Stephen Lang, Susan Sarandon and Tim Robbins, among others.

The 90-minute play produced in full stage form in Twin Falls — tells the story of a fire captain, played by Hanson, who lost his crew while they tried to save the lives of others caught in the terrorist attacks. Faced with the daunting task to give their eulogies, he is left without words. He soon meets a writer, played by Yates, who is herself struggling to come to terms with the tragedy, and together they set out to write the eulogies of the firefighters.

"We're trying to pay re-

spect to the heroes that fell on 9/11," Mannen said. "It's life-affirming. It tells people's stories - normal human beings thrust into a situation way beyond their control, but who still try to control it in a heroic fashion."

Business manager Tamara Harmon said RAT tries to do something dramatic every year and in the past has produced such plays as "Death of a Salesman" and "A Streetcar Named Desire."

When Mannen, Harmon and her husband, Jud, who is the technical director, were introduced to "The Guys" through a friend, they knew it was something they wanted for Twin Falls.

"The three of us are pretty patriotic," Harmon said. "We felt like it was a perfect fit for the community."

The play's firefighter and writer are fictional, but based on real experiences. The actors have been touched by their roles, they said, but it hasn't always been easy psyching themselves up to play their parts.

"It's pretty tough to breathe any kind of life into the character," Hanson said.

Yates was pregnant with her first baby when the terrorist attacks happened. At the time, she thought: What kind of a world am I bringing my child into?

But, she said, the play is not so much a reflection of the tragedy as it is about hope. It's serious, sad and at times humorous.

As the two sit in the firefighter's living room, he shares with the writer memories of his friends who were

tual opponent. Crowell might start his first college game for the 19th-ranked Bulldogs. He'll surely get plenty of


carries Saturday night in a crucial opener against No. 5 Boise State. And, say this, he's certainly not lacking for confi-



**NEW YORK** • Neither her words nor her play indicated that Serena Williams was distracted one bit Thursday at the U.S. Open.

She would have been forgiven if they had, of course, given that her older sister Venus withdrew from the tournament 24 hours earlier and revealed a recently diagnosed immune system dis-

Focused as ever, Serena absolutely overwhelmed Michaella Krajicek of the Netherlands 6-0, 6-1 to reach the third round, showing precisely why many consider her the favorite to win a fourth championship at Flushing Meadows and 14th Grand Slam title overall.

How was it to set aside Venus' situation?

"It really wasn't that difficult, to be honest. I mean, she wants me to do the best; she wouldn't want me to suffer," Serena said. "So now, if anything, it should motivate me more."

If that's so, look out. She's lost three games in two matches this week. She's won 14 matches in a row and 29 of her last 30 on hard courts. On Thursday, she hit 10 aces, erased the only break point she faced, compiled a 25-5 edge in winners and made only 10 unforced errors in a powerful display that lasted all of 49 minutes.

"Did you guys see the match? Or was it too quick?" Krajicek asked reporters.

That was part of a pattern in Arthur Ashe Stadium on Day 4 of the year's

Djokovic won the first 14 games, sending reporters scrambling to find the last "triple bagel" at the U.S. Open (for the record, Ivan Lendl won by a shutout in 1987). Carlos Berlocq finally did win a game – earning a standing ovation in the process — but Djokovic won the match 6-0, 6-0, 6-2.

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

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

Ten years ago: South African surgeon Christiaan Barnard, who'd performed the first successful human heart transplant in 1967, died in Paphos, Cyprus, at 78. (The Yankees won, 1-0).

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# Feds Kill 3 Wolves After Sheep Killed Near Carey

Federal officials killed three wolves on Wednesday after confirming they were the same wolves responsible for killing multiple livestock.

The wolves had killed four sheep on Flat Top Ranch near Carey this week and most likely three sheep in August, said Todd Grimm, the western district supervisor for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Wildlife Services.

"As soon as we confirm a depredation, we talk to the (Idaho Department of) Fish and Game supervisor to plan a lethal order," Grimm said.

However, Grimm said very few wolves are actually killed.

"We were in the right place at the right time," he said. "Less than half of the lethal control orders actually end up killing a wolf. This time a little bit of luck was involved."

The agency has killed close to 40 wolves this year. The number is down from years prior, Grimm

# **Buhl Man Arrested For** Selling Drugs in Boise

**BOISE** • Andrew E. Chapa is being held in the Ada County Jail on a felony charge of possession of marijuana with intent to deliver after a police say he was caught making a deal out of his car in a West Boise neighborhood Wednesday night and then led officers on a short pursuit when they tried to pull him over.

Chapa, 18, of Buhl, is also charged with a misdemeanor count of eluding police.

A Boise patrol officer says he was driving behind a tan Chevy Cavalier on North Mitchell Street, near the Sunflower Lane intersection, around 10 p.m. Wednesday when he saw the Cavalier go across the road and park on the wrong side of the street. The officer then watched another man walk up to the car and appear to give something to the driver, who was later identified as Chapa.

The officer then drove closer and shined a spotlight at the car, at which point the man on the street ran away and Chapa took off, driving the car northbound on Mitchell and reaching a speed of 50 mph in a matter of seconds, according to re-

The officer followed Chapa, who pulled his car over a short distance away in the 2600 block of Mitchell Street.

Boise police arrested Chapa for the eluding charge at that point. A Meridian Police K-9 dog detected the presence of drugs in the car a short time later and officers found two bags containing a total of 25 grams of marijuana and some scales in a backpack inside the car.

Boise police developed additional undisclosed evidence that Chapa was selling marijuana and then arrested him on the delivery charge. The man police saw walk up to the car on Mitchell Street was not found, according to reports.

Chapa made his initial court appearance Thursday. His next hearing is Sept. 15.

The crime of possession of marijuana with intent to deliver is punishable by up to five years in prison.

# Sandpoint Studies Impact Fees

Planning Commission is set to tackle the tricky issue of impact fees after an expert financial consultant presented his firm's study findings.

**SANDPOINT** • The Sandpoint Planning Commission is set to tackle the tricky issue of impact fees after an expert financial consultant presented his firm's study findings.

Carson Bise of the fiscal consultant firm TischlerBise recommended that the commission consider increasing several impact fees to cover the town's projected devel-

City officials requested the study as a part of their regular reexamination of impact fees every five years. According to planning director Jeremy Grimm, Bise is the national authority on the sub-

"We were lucky enough to have the preeminent impact fee advising council in the country do this study for us,"

Impact fees are one-time payments to the city for new commercial or residential developments. According to Bise, the total fees are determined based on need, benefit and proportionality.

The study identified four areas in Sandpoint that warranted improvement through impact fees: parks and recreation, police, fire and transportation. Impact fees help ensure that those key institutions keep pace with the town's development. The collected fees can only be used for capital improve-

According to Fire Chief Robert Tyler, the Tischler-Bise associates assigned to the study did an incredibly thorough job of analyzing the city's unique circumstances.

"What occurred in this study is far greater than what occurred in 2005," he said.

TischlerBise's findings recommended substantial increases in fees depending on the location of the development. Outside urban renewal areas, the study proposed an increase in maximum allowable fees for a single family home to an average \$7,048. Fees in the downtown urban renewal area would increase to an average \$6,533. Finally, fees in the northern urban renewal area would increase to an average \$6,595. The current average for all areas is \$3,882.

Similarly, fees for an average commercial development would increase to a proposed \$8.43 per square foot outside a renewal area, \$7.34 per square foot in the downtown urban renewal area and \$7.47 per square foot in the northern urban renewal area. The current total fee for all areas is \$2.34 per square foot.
