10 Years On, Patriot Act Vote Still Defines Otter

BOISE • Despite nearly 30 years in government, Idaho Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter in many ways has come to be defined by a single vote he cast on Oct. 24, 2001.

The nation was still reeling from the Sept. 11 attacks and Congress was racing to pass the USA Patriot Act, which gave the FBI and



other law enforcement agencies unprecedented power to search telephone and other public records without a court order.

Then a congressman, Otter was among three Republicans who cast a "no" vote as the law went onto passage.

The decision instantly burnished his libertarian credentials on a national stage, flashed the contrarian

streak that his supporters love him for and elevated his profile ahead of an eventual run to become governor in 2006.

"Maybe that was the incident that a lot of people used to define me," Otter told The Associated Press. "But I've always held a strong belief in the separation of powers?

Otter, in Congress for all of 10 months before the Patriot Act vote, almost didn't get to speak on the U.S. House floor against the bill opposed only by Rep. Ron Paul of Texas and Bob Ney of Ohio.

He'd gone to then-House Majority Leader Dick Armey, a Republican from Texas, only to be rebuffed.

"He said, 'Oh, Butch, you can't do that. If you speak against this, your people in Idaho won't send you back here again," Otter recalled. "I said to him, "Mr. Armey, if this vote will cause me to lose the election, then I don't belong here."

So the freshman congressmen

went to an unlikely ally: a Democratic leader, John Conyers of Michi-

Jeff Malmen, the Idaho Power Co. lobbyist who was Otter's congressional chief of staff in 2001, remembered a hint of incredulity in Conyers' voice when Otter asked for two minutes to speak.

"Convers reaction was, 'Really? You want to do what?"" Malmen

Teacher Bonus Benchmarks Go Beyond **Test Scores**

Area districts' plans to dole out merit-based teacher bonuses in 2012 will be based on everything from technology to parent-teacher interactions.

Student test scores aren't the only focus of some local school districts' plans to award teacher bonuses.

Under a package of education reform bills passed earlier this year by the Legislature, school districts were required to develop their own pay-forperformance plans, which count for part of an undetermined amount of bonuses to be awarded by the state in

To earn bonuses, teachers will need to both fulfill state and local benchmarks. Although many district plans tie teacher bonuses to test scores, the state gave local education officials nearly 20 options to choose from and some aren't as conventional.

Bonuses at some Cassia County School District schools will be based on how much contact teachers have with parents. Curriculum Director Dana Bradley said many high schools were already working to increase communication with parents.

"Parent involvement is directly linked to student performance," she

At Declo High School, bonus eligibility will be based on the number of formal and informal contacts teachers with parents. Each teacher must contact at least 50 parents throughout the school year "formally" through methods such as face-to-face communication, phone conversations, emails, or by sending a postcard or letter.

"We are looking at contact outside of informing parents about student grades," Bradley said. "We want a new level of contact."

The other half of Declo High's plan includes "informal" parental contact, such as mass emails or group parent meetings. To receive the largest bonus, a teacher must reach 90 percent of his or her students' parents this school

In the past, most Cassia County high schools didn't track contact teachers had with parents — only attendance at parent-teacher conferences.

On Thursday, the first night of rodeo action, the beer garden was virtually deserted at about 7 p.m. with maybe a few rodeo fans taking a few minutes to leave the stands and sip a silver can of Coors Light. The restrictions placed upon consumption did not allow patrons to drink in the stands, and an on-duty deputy made sure no one left the designated drinking area.

Within Otter's inner circle, there was some concern about how Idaho voters would react, especially with America still trying to deal with the hijackings that killed nearly 3,000 and the anonymous anthrax attacks that followed.

A deep fear had gripped the country about when, not if, another attack would come. In Idaho, then-Gov. Dirk Kempthorne closed off streets around the state Capitol and surrounded the building with concrete barriers, a few of which remain.

"At the time, there was this rush to do anything that would make people feel secure," Malmen said.

"There weren't a whole lot of people spending time thinking about the bill and what its real effects might be," he said. "It was a hard vote; there was a lot of pressure?

In the 2002 election, Otter Democrat Betty faced Richardson, a former U.S. attorney from Idaho who pointedly highlighted her rival's Patriot Act stance. That November, however, Otter won by 18 points.

In some ways, that one vote helped dispel a lingering image of Otter as merely an affable cowboy who'd nearly had his political fortunes derailed by a drunken driving

arrest a decade earlier.

This was no longer "Mr. Tight Jeans'' - Otter won the title one night in 1992 at Boise's Rockin' Rodeo Inn. He was a serious lawmaker willing to stand up even to a president from his own party, when he thought the federal government had gone too far.

When he returned to Washington, D.C., in 2003, Otter kept up the pressure.

He was among bipartisan lawmakers who passed an amendment that would have gutted funding for so-called "sneak and peek" searches, enhanced surveillance warrants that allowed law enforcement to do clandestine searches on private property.

The amendment attached to the Patriot Act extension was ultimately stricken during negotiations with the U.S. Senate, but the atmosphere between Bush's Justice Department and Otter grew very chilly, Otter recalled.

When then-Attorney General John Ashcroft visited Boise in August 2003 during a country tour to drum up support for the Patriot Act, Otter was nowhere in sight. "He didn't invite me," Otter said.

A decade on, Otter's Patriot Act vote still lingers in the state's congressional politics.

Freshman U.S. Rep. Raul Labrador, who represents the same swath of conservative western Idaho that Otter

did, joined a group of 144 lawmakers from both parties in February to block extending Patriot Act provisions.

Among the provisions were roving wiretaps and secret surveillance of non-U.S. citizens who weren't known terrorists.

"There was a lot of pressure from our leadership in Congress to vote the party line," Labrador said. "But I believe my vote against the Patriot Act renewal reflects

what I consider to be Idaho's deep respect for civil liberties, as well as Butch's lega-

After that vote, Otter telephoned Labrador to give him

a thumb's up. "He just wanted to give him an 'attaboy' for following his convictions and voting his conscience," said Jon Hanian, Otter's spokesman. "As the governor knows, it can be a very lonely place to

Since data wasn't available to build plans around, "this year will be a baseline for (schools)," Bradley said. The state will allow school districts to adjust their goals. she said, "if data shows they're a little too optimistic."

Jerome Middle and High schools also have plans that tie bonuses to parent contact attendance parent/teacher conferences. The schools chose those options because the state's plan already focuses on student scores on the Idaho Standards Achievement Test, said Jerome School District Superintendent Dale Layne.

Also, only certain grade levels take the ISAT, which Layne says leaves out some teachers.

"We're trying to find a way to involve all teachers somehow through the process," he

Murtaugh School District is taking a slightly different approach for its plan – use of technology in the classroom to determine whether fourth-through 12th-grade teachers get bonuses.

It's not an option allowed by the state, but Superintendent Michele Capps said she doesn't think it will be a problem getting a waiver approved.

Under the "teaching with technology" measure, teachers must complete a certain number of goals, such as teaching interactive lessons, to receive a bonus.



Another Season of Debating About BSU

With its win over Georgia Saturday, Boise State hopes to run the table and crash the BCS this season, but the debate will always stir on the Broncos' status among college football's elite.

The first college football Saturday of the year was not even a day old and Boise State had already ensured that yet another season would be dominated by

bickering about the Broncos. Championship tender? Or pretender?

Here we go again. The latest statement by coach Chris Petersen's team had to feel extra special to Broncos fans.

No matter how many times Boise State knocks off big name teams from elite conferences, some fans dismiss the accomplishment because the Broncos play so few games against topflight

opponents. Southeastern Conference fans have been particularly adamant about putting Boise State at the kiddie

It is an indisputable fact that Boise State, even now that it has switched from the Western Athletic Conference to the Mountain West, does not play a schedule

with as many potential pitfalls as most teams in the SEC, Big Ten, Pac-12 and maybe even the watereddown Big 12.

Mississippi State of the SEC, for example, has a schedule featuring six teams that started the season ranked. Georgia is one of two teams on Boise State's schedule that were in the preseason poll.

Which is why so many looked at the Broncos' playing the Bulldogs 70 miles away from their Athens, Ga., campus as Boise State's toughest test of the season.

But it's getting harder and harder to argue this Boise State program is not one of the very best in the country.

This is the third straight season impeccable quarterback Kellen Moore and the Broncos have started by beating a ranked team. Georgia joined Oregon and Virginia Tech as Broncos' conquests.

"I love playing early in the season in games like this. It sets the tone for the rest of the season. It's a taste of what a big bowl game can be

like with this type of atmosphere," Boise State Byron Hout told the Idaho Statesmen. "If you can do the right thing you can find yourself in another event like this at the end of the season."

If it were only so simple for Broncos.

Where do they go from here? Well, it seems the move to the MWC will only bump up Boise's degree of difficulty a bit this season.

The next time we'll see the Broncos will be in Toledo, playing an above average Mid-American Conference

Boise State then returns to the blue turf to face Tulsa, which opened the season with a 47-14 loss to No. 1 Oklahoma, and Nevada. The Wolf Pack handed Boise State its only loss last season, but that was on the road and quarterback Colin Kaepernick is no longer galloping around defenses in Reno.

The last nonconference game is against another old WAC rival, Fresno State, which has been playing nail to Boise State's hammer for years now. The Broncos have won nine of 10.

In the MWC, TCU was supposed to be Boise State's toughest test — and could still turn out to be.

But the Horned Frogs

started their season with a 50-48 loss at Baylor on Friday night and their Nov. 12 game will be in Boise.

Boise State is 59-2 at Bronco Stadium since 1999, so good luck with that Frogs.

Fact is, the Broncos might have already peaked - and that's what ticks off Boise State supporters. They'll be favored - often huge favorites — in their remaining 11 games.

Their lopsided victories will be greeted with a shrug by most poll voters and those big margins don't even register in the BCS computer rankings, which are programmed more to pay lip service to sportsmanship more than to determine the best teams.

What Boise State needs to reach the BCS title game in addition to going unbeaten — is for Georgia to right itself and reach the SEC title game, TCU to avoid another loss and maybe for Nevada, Fresno State or Air Force to pull off an upset or two just not against the Broncos.

Meanwhile, the debate

And thanks to a postseason system that allows only two teams to play for the national championship, it's unlikely anything will get resolved.

Frozen by the leg cramps that simultaneously hit his right hamstring and thigh about two hours after he'd won his third-round match, Nadal stopped taking reporters' questions and between deep paused breaths to plead in Spanish, "Can you call a trainer for me, please?"

Then slowly - and scarily to those watching, because it was unclear at that moment to anyone but Nadal himself exactly what was wrong the defending champion slithered out of the chair and

went down to the ground, hidden from view by a table. Within minutes, Nadal was sitting up, and then standing, after being given bags of ice to soothe his painful leg and bottles of water and Gatorade to drink.

Even if it all amounted to nothing serious from a medical standpoint - as Nadal and his manager would later insist, chuckling – it was a bizarre scene, one at least as memorable as anything that took place on court Sunday at the year's last Grand Slam tournament.

"It's bad luck it happened here," Nadal said, "and not in

the locker room." His point was that tennis players often deal with cramps, particularly after competing in the sort of conditions Nadal did while beating 2002 Wimbledon runner-up David Nalbandi-

Lee Roy possessed a combination of grace, humility, and dignity that is rare. His engaging smile and blessed to be in his presence. Best of all, he was all genuine. One would be blessed to have a father, son, uncle, brother, or friend like Lee Roy Selmon."

In nine seasons with the Buccaneers, Selmon had 781/2 sacks and earned six consecutive Pro Bowl selections. He retired after the 1984 season.

Snuffing Out Youth Smoking

our of the nation's largest tobacco companies went to court last month to try to block graphic health warning labels that are scheduled to begin appearing on cigarette packages next fall. With hundreds of thousands of young Americans annually developing deadly tobacco addictions before their 18th birthdays, this would be a huge setback for our children's health.

Our country has made significant progress in reducing tobacco use since the first surgeon general's report linking smoking to cancer in 1964. But in recent years, youth smoking rates that had been falling have stalled.

Today alone, nearly 3,500 children, in big cities and small towns across America, will try their first cigarette. About 850 of them will become daily smokers. And almost 300 will eventually die prematurely because of a deadly tobacco addiction that started before they were eligible to vote.

What can be done to protect our children? A good first step would be continuing to implement the bipartisan tobacco control legislation signed in 2009 by President Obama that established the graphic warning labels.

Selected based on rigorous research, the labels are to appear on all cigarette packages and advertisements beginning in the fall of 2012 to provide a clear and factual picture of the risks associated with smoking. They'll warn Americans of all ages about the addictiveness of cigarettes and their serious health consequences. which include stroke and heart disease.

These are some of the same messages conveyed now by written warning labels. But experts tell us that these images and the revised warning statements are far more effective at grabbing people's attention and getting the information to sink in.

Just as important, the law has banned many of the clever strategies tobacco companies used to market their products to youth. As part of a 1998 court settlement, tobacco companies agreed to end their youth advertising campaigns. Yet we know that young smokers today still disproportionately use the most heavily marketed brands.

Under the law, cigarette companies are forbidden from using backdoor marketing tactics to try to recruit youths. The cellphone jewelry and berryflavored lip balm that RJ Reynolds used to promote its new Camel No. 9 brand



banned are cigarette brand sponsorships of concerts and sporting events, and selling cigarettes in chocolate, vanilla or strawberry flavors.

Overall, these rules will make it much harder for the tobacco industry to use its nearly \$10 billion marketing budget to reach and recruit child smokers.

Of course, tobacco use is a serious health danger for Americans of all ages. In recent years, smoking rates have stopped falling for adults as well as youth. And tobacco remains not only the No. 1 cause of preventable death in the United States, killing 443,000 people a year, but also a huge drain on our economy, costing nearly \$200 billion a year in lost productivity and added health-care costs — more than the economies of New Mexico, West Virginia and Maine com-

That's why the Obama administration is also doing more to help the 70 percent of adult smokers who say they want to quit. Thanks to last year's health-care law, all Americans in new health plans can get smoking cessation counseling without paying a co-pay or deductible. In addition, Medicare has changed its policy to begin covering voluntary tobacco cessation counseling for seniors before they get sick. And each of the new graphic warning labels will include a toll-free number, 1-800-QUIT-NOW, for people who want to kick the habit.

In the end, the most effective way to prevent tobacco addiction is to stop people from starting. And we know that most smokers start young; nearly 90 percent of adult daily smokers smoked their first cigarette before their 18th birthday. As a 1981 internal tobacco company document put it: "Today's teenager is tomorrow's potential regular customer."

We can't afford to continue watching hundreds of thousands of our children develop a dangerous and preventable addiction before they've even entered adulthood. That's why the Obama administration will continue to take all appropriate steps to reduce the marketing, sale and appeal of tobacco products to America's youth.

A Jobs Program - anda Boon For Children

resident Obama plans to announce a jobs package next week. For those of us angered by Washington's recent predilection for selfinflicted economic wounds,

this is very good news. But as always, the devil is in the details. Especially in a climate where both political and popular forces are skeptical of the government's ability to help on the jobs front, the plan needs to be crafted to resonate with the public and to get a strong bang for the buck.

That's where FAST! comes in. Fix America's Schools Today is a proposal - from the 21st Century School Fund, the Economic Policy Institute and the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities – to address the backlog of repairs at the nation's 100,000 public schools. It's an idea that efficiently marries big problems to a big solution.

One big problem is that most school districts in our country have been deferring maintenance and repairs for years. The has led to inefficient, and thus expensive, energy use, unsafe drinking water, mold, poor air quality, inadequate fire safety systems and structural dangers. With local governments hammered by the recession, school districts do not have the resources to address this

backlog, nor will they for many years to come.

The other big problem is that after the housing bust, employment opportunities crashed for construction workers. So far this year, their unemployment rate has averaged 18 percent.

An efficient and common-sense solution is a government infrastructure program to put many of these workers back on the job fixing our nations' schools.

There's a lot to recommend FAST. First, the resources can be quickly distributed through formulas that Congress already uses. All 16,000 school districts receive funds under "Title I" programs. FAST could be set up to ensure that within

a month of enactment, every state and a hundred of the local education systems with the greatest needs would get funding. Any school district with a roof to insulate and repair, for example, could begin work before the end of the year.

The rest of the districts could apply, and recipients would be chosen based on need, along with estimates of jobs created and energy savings generated.

Another reason the president should consider this his top priority for improving infrastructure and putting America back to work is that FAST is more laborintensive than road and bridge construction. One lesson of the 2009 Recovery Act is that roadwork has become more capital-intensive. Right now, we need jobs for people, not machines. The work that FAST would enable — insulating buildings; fixing or replacing windows, roofs and HVAC systems; and implementing green measures, such as adding solar panels or wind generators — is still highly labor-intensive.

Given the depth of the backlog, FAST is scalable. Although the full cost of needed repairs is in the hundreds of billions, we propose a \$50 billion program that would create about half a million jobs. To avoid adding to the deficit

and to complement the energy-efficiency theme of the repairs, the cost of the program could be fully offset by closing loopholes that benefit the oil and gas industries, such as an \$18 billion tax break for manufacturers that somehow goes to oil and gas extractors, too, or an \$11 billion tax break on the depletion of oil or natural gas fields that extraction companies get well before depletion, and one that keeps giving even after the full costs of the properties have been deducted.

As its name suggests, FAST could quickly get to work fixing a vital but dangerously ignored American institution while putting hundreds of thousands back to work and providing students with better learning environments.

Such an initiative also conveys an important message to our children. It's hard for them to square the message that we, their parents, are concerned about and committed to their educational success when we send them off to schools that are in ill-repair or even unsafe.

FAST should be at the top of the president's jobs agenda next week.

Idaho Power is in the process of installing "Smart Meters." The purpose of

these meters is to modify your behavior by assessing punitive costs for "inefficient use" of electric service. At the moment, the meters are being marketed to you as convenience - a helpful and cost-saving device. Once they are fully implemented, the squeeze play will begin and they will bleed you dry for what is an essential service. Remember Enron? Smart Meters are the same strategy targeted at the end consumer.



Black Salespeople Claim Racism **Behind Utah Arrests**

JEREMY RANCH, Utah (AP) • Eight African-American door-to-door salespeople are claiming racial discrimination after they were arrested for soliciting without a license in the Summit County community of Jeremy

The eight told the Deseret News of Salt Lake City that they were booked, while a white coworker was not arrested.

Their white colleague, 20-year-old Kristin Riege, backs up their account. She said she had just finished a sale when an officer in an unmarked police truck pulled up to her and flashed a badge.

"He said, 'Be careful out there. We have just arrested all of your co-workers," Riege said. "He never told me to stop working."

Sheriff Dave Edmunds said he has no knowledge of that happening. He dismissed the notion that the arrests were racially motivated, calling it "an outrageous claim?"

"My deputies say they never contacted her, so that's news to me," he said, adding that his deputies looked for a ninth person for nearly three hours but didn't find her.

The sheriff's office has a zero-tolerance stance for those who work without a county-issued business license because residents have had problems with pushy salespeople, the sheriff added.

"We have begun to book these people every time," Edmunds said. "It doesn't matter who they are. Race, color, creed, whatever. We book them

Workers in Northern Rockies More Likely to Work Two Jobs

HELENA, **Mont. (AP)** • of people working two jobs. Workers in the northern Rockies region are more likely to work two jobs, likely due to the nature of rural and seasonal economies, an economist says.

In 2010, Montana, Idaho, and Wyoming all had more than 7 percent of their workers holding down two jobs, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. The national average was a little under 5 percent according to the U.S. Census Bureau.

Scott Rickard, an economist who directs The Center for Applied Economic Research at Montana State University Billings, told the Billings Gazette that relatively low wages combined with an average cost of living in that state could account for the high number

Rickard points out that workers with two jobs may

be better insulated from economic downturns because they have one job to fall back on if the other is Some occupations tend to

have more multiple-job holders than others.

Throughout the country, firefighting has the highest percentage of multiple job holders for men. Firefighters are followed by emergency medical technicians and paramedics, secondary school teachers, social workers, and school teach-

For women, the list is headed by dental hygienists, followed by psychologists, post-secondary teachers, physical therapists and other therapists. Women were more likely to hold two jobs, according to an article in U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics Monthly Labor Review.

The reasons cited for working two jobs are fairly predictable: Workers want to make more money, pay off debt, learn about another job, or simply likes the second job.

Utah Ends 4-day Workweek Experiment

SALT LAKE CITY • Utah's experiment with a first-in-the-nation fourday workweek for state

workers is over. Beginning Tuesday, they will be back on the job five days, but they won't be working a full week just yet. The Labor Day holiday will shorten the week to four days.

Lawmakers scratched the experiment, saying it was not saving as much money as hoped and that residents were complaining about not having access to services on Fridays.

The change won't be easy for many employees, said Todd Sutton of the Utah Public Employees Association. Some had arranged daycare schedules for the four-day week, while others were using their free Fridays to work second jobs or vol-

"Employees struggled because they adapted their lives to one schedule," Sutton said. "And then it goes to a different schedule?

Former Utah Gov. Jon Huntsman launched the "4/10" workweek - 10 hours a day, Monday-Thursday — for thousands of employees in 2008 to improve efficiency, reduce overhead costs and conserve energy at a time when budgets are tight and resources are dwin-

A 2010 legislative audit showed the savings never materialized, in part due to a drop in energy

The bill that stopped the experiment called on state offices to be open five days, but left it up to the executive branch to determine whether to still schedule workers on for the four-day weeks.

The failure of Utah state government to see the savings, however, isn't reflective of what has been happening in other states and cities that have tried the alternative work week.

In Provo, Utah, one of the state's largest cities with more than 100,000 people, the four-day workweek has been in place for years, with city offices open Monday through Thursday, 7 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Mayor John Curtis said the 4/10 system has improved employee morale and seems to save money. He said the four-day workweek may be more effective at a local level than with a state govern-

"Our residents see city employees working, and they know the city is responsive to them," Curtis

"People don't have that same interaction with state employees ... and the state needs hundreds of offices, while we only need one," he said.

In El Paso, Texas, Mayor John Cook is proposing a year-round four-day workweek after experimenting with it during the past two summers.

"It has a positive impact on productivity and saved us a lot of money," he said.

Cook said the projected savings for the city of about 800,000 people was more than \$400,000 annually, primarily because of lowered utility and fuel costs.

SALT LAKE POLICE LOOK INTO ATTACKS ON GAY MEN

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • Police say they don't know yet whether a pair of attacks that seriously injured two gay men were hate crimes, but Utah's gay community has called for a stop to the violence.

"Anytime there's an allegation of something like that we consider all aspects of the case," police Detective Cary Wichmann said. "But until a detective is able to determine it's a hate crime, there's no way to

The two attacks occurred Aug. 26 near the downtown nightclub Club Sound, which holds gay-themed events each Friday. Dane Hall, 20, said he heard someone shout gay slurs at him just before he was struck from behind and knocked to the ground.

In the second attack, club owner Tom Taylor said he was leaving the nightclub when a bloodied man who lived nearby asked for help. Taylor said the man was sleeping on a couch in his boyfriend's apartment when a group of men broke in, beat him and then chased him onto the street.

"They were close in time and location, but there's not initial indication that (the attacks) were related," Wichmann said.

Hall said he saw four men over him as he was repeatedly punched in the face. One attacker stomped on his head, he said. "My cheek bone was shattered."

He lost six teeth and fractured his jaw in three places. Doctors found a chip of his jawbone jammed into his brain, said Hall.

"I never thought this would happen here," Hall said. "My physical appearance will never be the same.

The man that Taylor helped was not identified. Taylor said he was looking at security camera footage from the club to see if either attack or the alleged assailant were recorded.

"We can't let these kinds of things not get taken care of," Taylor said.

If police determine either attack was motivated by anti-gay sentiments, the police chief would become involved in the investigation because such crimes are taken very seriously, Wichmann said.

Meanwhile, the state's gay community called for a halt to the violence.

Activist and Utah Pride Center board president Nikki Boyer said it's hard to understand what motivates a person to beat someone

because they are gay. "We're gaining accept-

ance," Boyer said. "But

there's still so much hate and bigotry. I don't have an answer. None of us do."

SAUCIER, Miss. • Tropical Storm Lee dumped more than a foot of rain in New Orleans and spun off tornadoes elsewhere Sunday as its center came ashore in a slow crawl north that raised fears of inland flash flooding in the Deep South and beyond.

Areas of Alabama, Louisiana and

Mississippi near the coast reported scattered wind damage and flooding, but evacuations appeared to be in the hundreds rather than the thousands and New Orleans' levees were doing their job just over six years after Hurricane Katrina swamped the city.

National Hurricane Center specialist Robbie Berg said Lee's flash flood threat could be more severe as the rain moves from the flatter Gulf region into the rugged Appalachians.

Closer to the Gulf, the water is "just going to sit there a couple of days," he said. "Up in the Appalachians you get more threat of flash floods - so that's very similar to some of the stuff we saw in Vermont?"

Vermont is still cleaning up and dig-

ging out dozens of communities that were damaged and isolated last week when heavy rain from Tropical Storm Irene quickly flooded mountain rivers.

No deaths had been directly attributed to Tropical Storm Lee, though a body boarder in Galveston, Texas, drowned after being pulled out to sea in heavy surf churned up by Lee. A man in Mississippi suffered non-life-threatening injuries when authorities said he was struck by lightning that traveled through a phone line.

The vast, soggy system spent hours during the weekend hovering in the northernmost Gulf of Mexico before its center finally crossed into Louisiana west of New Orleans, pelting a wide

Competition: Underemployed

Hurricane Katia Quickly Strengthens to Cat. 2 in Atlantic

MIAMI (AP) • The National Hurricane Center says Hurricane Katia has strengthened to a Category 2 storm in the open Atlantic.

There are still no watches and warnings in effect and it's too soon to know if it will threaten land. Forecasters warned that Bermuda could begin seeing strong surf and rip currents this week.

At 3 p.m. MDT Sunday, the storm's center was about 365 miles northeast of the Northern Leeward Islands and moving northwest at 12 mph.

It had sustained maximum winds that jumped up to 105 mph after wavering earlier in the morning between a tropical storm and weak hurricane status.

Forecasters expect Katia to strengthen further and said it could be a major hurricane by today.

Two Mexicans Deny Terrorism, Face 30 Years for Tweet

MEXICO CITY • Think before you tweet.

A former teacher turned radio commentator and a math tutor who lives with his mother sit in a prison in southern Mexico, facing possible 30year sentences for terrorism and sabotage in what may be the most serious charges ever brought against anyone using a Twitter social network account.

Prosecutors say the defendants helped cause a chaos of car crashes and panic as parents in the Gulf Coast city of Veracruz rushed to save their children because of false reports that gunmen were attacking schools.

Gerardo Buganza, interior secretary for Veracruz state, compared the panic to that caused by Orson Welles' 1938 radio broadcast of "The War of the Worlds." But he said the fear roused by that account of a Martian invasion of New Jersey "was small compared to what happened here."

"Here, there were 26 car accidents, or people left their cars in the middle of the streets to run and pick up their children, because they thought these things were occurring at their kids' schools," Buganza told local re-

The charges say the messages caused such panic that emergency numbers "totally collapsed because people were terrified," damaging service for real emergencies.

Veracruz, the state's largest city, and the neighboring suburb of Boca del Rio were already on edge after weeks of gunbattles involving drug traffickers. One attack occurred on a major boulevard. In another, gunmen tossed a grenade outside the city aquarium, killing an tourist and seriously wounding his wife and their two young children.

On Aug. 25, nerves were further frayed when residents saw armed convoys of marines circulating on the streets, making some think a confrontation with gangs was imminent.

That is when Gilberto Martinez Vera, who works as a low-paid tutor at several private schools, allegedly opened the floodgates of fear with repeated messages that gunmen were Please see TWEET, N2

WASHINGTON • The job market is even worse than the 9.1 percent unemployment rate suggests.

America's 14 million unemployed aren't competing just with each other. They must also contend with 8.8 million other people not counted as unemployed part-timers who want full-time work.

When consumer demand picks up, companies will likely boost the hours of their part-timers before they add jobs, economists say. It means they have room to expand without hiring.

And the unemployed will face another source of competition once the economy improves: Roughly 2.6 million people who aren't counted as unemployed because they've stopped looking for work. Once they start looking again, they'll be classified as unemployed. And the unemployment rate could rise.

Intensified competition for jobs means unemployment could exceed its historic norm of 5 percent to 6 percent for several more years. The nonpartisan Congres-

sional Budget Office expects the rate to exceed 8 percent until 2014. The White House predicts it will average 9 percent next year, when President Barack Obama runs for re-election.

The jobs crisis has led Obama to schedule a major speech Thursday night to propose steps to stimulate hiring. Republican presidential candidates will likely confront the issue in a debate the night before.

The back-to-back events will come days after the government said employers added zero net jobs in August. The monthly jobs report, arriving three days before Labor Day, was the weakest since September 2010.

Combined, the 14 million officially unemployed; the "underemployed" part-timers who want full-time work; and "discouraged" people who have stopped looking make up 16.2 percent of working-age Americans.

The Labor Department compiles the figure to assess how many people want full-time work and can't find it - a number the unemployment rate alone doesn't capture.

In a healthy economy, this broader measure of unemployment stays below 10 percent. Since the Great Recession officially ended more than two years ago, the rate has been 15 percent or

The proportion of the work force made up of the frustrated part-timers has risen faster than unemployment has since the recession began in December 2007.

That's because many companies slashed workers' hours after the recession hit. If they restored all those lost hours to their existing staff, they'd add enough hours to equal about 950,000 full-time iobs, according to calculations by Heidi Shierholz, an economist at the Economic Policy Institute.

Libya Rebels: Talks for Loyalist Town Have Failed

TARHOUNA, Libya • Negotiations over the surrender of one of Moammar Gadhafi's remaining strongholds have collapsed, and Libvan rebels were waiting for the green light to launch their final attack on the besieged town of Bani Walid, a spokesman

Rebel negotiator Abdullah Kanshil said the talks had broken down after Moussa Ibrahim, Gadhafi's chief spokesman and a top aide, had insisted the rebels put down their weapons before entering the town, some 90 miles southeast of Tripoli.

Rebel forces control most of the oil-rich North African nation and are already setting up a new government, but Gadhafi and his staunchest allies remain

on the run and enjoy support in several central and southern areas, including Bani Walid and the fugitive leader's hometown of Sirte.

The rebels have said the

hard-core loyalists are a small minority inside the town, but are heavily armed and stoking fear to keep other residents from surrendering.

"We feel sorry for the people of Bani Walid," said Kanshil, himself a native of the town, speaking to reporters at a rebel checkpoint about 40 miles to the north. "We hope for the best for our town."

The rebels have extended to Saturday a deadline for the surrender of Gadhafi's hometown of Sirte and other loyalist areas but some have warned they could attack Bani Walid sooner because many of the most prominent former regime officials were believed to be inside.

At 5 p.m. EDT, the National Hurricane Center said Lee had maximum sustained winds of 45 mph. Its center was about 110 miles westnorthwest of New Orleans, moving north-northeast at 5

Some of the damage on the Gulf Coast, where tropical storms are an almost yearly event, appeared to come from spinoff tornadoes that touched down in southern Mississippi and Alabama.

Dena Hickman said her home in Saucier, Miss., was

damaged overnight by what she believes was a tornado. It happened too fast for her to get her 12-year-old daughter, who uses a wheelchair, out of her bed and into a safer place.

"I laid on top of her to try to protect her. It all happened so quickly I couldn't do anything else," she said.

Her family weathered the storm, but it damaged shingles on their roof, flipped a 34-foot camper on its side, ripped off the roof of a cinderblock building that houses a water pump and pulled the doors off of a metal shop building. The contents of a neighbor's pulverized trailer were scattered across the Hickmans' yard.

In New Orleans, almost 14 inches of rain fell by midafternoon Sunday. Downpours caused some street flooding Saturday and Sunday, but pumps were sucking up the water and sending it into Lake Pontchartrain. The mayor's office said all 24 of the sewerage and water board pumps were working at capacity.

Flooding in Livingston Parish forced an estimated 200 families from their homes, said Mark Benton, parish director of the Office of Emergency Preparedness.

A possible tornado struck southern Mobile County in Alabama, snapping oak limbs, knocking out power and damaging at least one home. No injuries were reported, but the blast awoke Frank Ledbetter and ripped up the sign for his art gallery.

"It just got louder and louder and louder. I woke my wife up and said, 'It's a tornado? We just dove into the closet in the bedroom," he said.

Mississippi Emergency Management Agency spokesman Greg Flynn said flooding was reported in Mississippi's six southernmost counties, with some homes flooded with an inch or two of water in coastal Jackson County. Shelters were opened in Jackson and Hancock counties, but few people were using them.

children taking from schools.

"My sister-in-law just called me all upset, they just kidnapped five children from the school," Martinez tweet-

In fact, no such kidnappings occurred that day. Defense lawyer Claribel Guevara said the rumors already had started and that Martinez Vera was just relaying what others told him. She said he never claimed to have firsthand knowledge of the incident.

But in a subsequent tweet about the kidnap rumor, he said, "I don't know what time it happened, but it's true." He also tweeted that three days earlier, "they mowed down six kids between 13 and 15 in the Hidalgo neighborhood." While a similar attack occurred, it didn't involve children.

Prosecutors say the rumors were also sent by Maria de Jesus Bravo Pagola, who has worked as a teacher, a state arts official and a radio commentator. She says she was just relaying such messages to her own Twitter followers.

"How can they possibly do this to me, for re-tweeting a message? I mean, it's 140 characters. It's not logical," said Guevara, quoting her client.

Better known on the radio and social networks as "Maruchi," her Facebook site now features the Twitter logo, a little bluebird, blindfolded and standing in front of the scales of justice, with the slogan "I too am a Twit-Terrorist?"

Online petitions are circulating to demand her release, and the pair's cause has been taken up by human rights groups that call the charges exaggerated. Amnesty International says officials are violating freedom of expression and it blames the panic on the uncertainty many Mexicans feel amid a drug war in which more than 35,000 people have died over the past five years.

"The lack of safety creates an atmosphere of mistrust in which rumors that circulate

on social networks are part of people's efforts to protect themselves, since there is very little trustworthy information," Amnesty wrote in a statement on the case.

In violence-wracked cities in the northern state of Tamaulipas, citizens and even authorities have used Twitter and Facebook to warn one another about shootouts.

Anita Vera, Martinez Vera's 71-year-old mother, said her 48-year-old son still lives at her house with his girlfriend. She said he told her that he had posted his messages after the panic had already started.

"He told me "Mom, I didn't start any of this, I just transmitted what I was told,"' Vera Martellis said after visiting her son in prison.

"He used the computer, but I swear that my son never wanted to do anybody harm, or start a revolution, like they say he did," said Vera, who ekes out a living selling flowers.

Raul Trejo, an expert on media and violence at the National Autonomous University of Mexico, said the terrorism charge is unwarranted, but described the case as "a very incautious use of Twitter."

He noted that in Mexico, "Twitter has been used by drug traffickers to create panic with false warnings." In one case, a wave of messages about impending violence shut down schools, bars and restaurants in the central city of Cuernavaca last year.

Trejo said Twitter users must learn "not to believe everything, and simply take the Twitter messages as an indication that some (report) is making the rounds?"

But the real problem appears to be that governments cannot prevent drug cartel violence or even accurately inform citizens about it. Local news media are often so battered by kidnappings and killings of reporters that, in many states, they are loath to report about it.

"These Twitter users had accounts with a few hundred followers," Trejo noted. "If these lies grew, it is not so much because they propagated them, but because in Veracruz as in most of the rest of the country, there is such a lack of public safety

that the public is inclined to believe unconfirmed acts of violence ... The government doesn't make clear what is happening?

Defense attorneys also say their clients were held incommunicado for almost three days, unable to see a

It appears one of the most serious sets of charges ever brought for sending or resending Twitter messages.

Tweeter Paul Chambers was fined \$625 and ordered to pay \$3,225 in prosecution costs last year for tweeting that if northern England's Robin Hood Airport didn't reopen in time for his flight, "I'm blowing the airport sky high!!"

Venezuelan authorities last year charged two people with spreading false information about the country's banking system using Twitter and urging people to pull money out of banks. They could serve nine to 11 years in prison if convicted.

In 2009, a Chinese woman was sentenced to a year in a labor camp for posting a satirical Twitter message about the Japan pavilion at the Shanghai Expo.

That's without having to hire a single employee.

No one expects every company to delay hiring until every part-timer is working full time. But economists expect job growth to stay weak for two or three more years in part because of how many frustrated part-timers want to work full time.

And because employers are still reluctant to increase hours for part-timers, "hiring is really a long way off," says Christine Riordan, a policy analyst at the National Employment Law Project. In August, employees of private companies worked fewer hours than in July.

Some groups are disproportionately represented among the broader category of unemployment that includes underemployed and discouraged workers. More than 26 percent of African Americans, for example, and nearly 22 percent of Hispanics are in this category. The figure for whites is less than 15 percent. Women are more likely than men to be in this group.

Among the Americans frustrated with part-time work is Ryan McGrath, 26. In October, he returned from managing a hotel project in Uruguay. He's been unable to find full-time work. So he's been freelancing as a website designer for small businesses in the Chicago area.

Some weeks he's busy and making money. Other times he struggles. He's living at home, and sometimes he has to borrow \$50 from his father to pay bills. He's applied for "a million jobs."

"You go to all these interviews for entry-level positions, and you lose out every time;" he says.

Nationally, 4.5 unemployed people, on average, are competing for each job opening. In a healthy economy, the average is about two per opening.

Facing rejection, millions give up and stop looking for

Norman Spaulding, 54, quit his job as a truck driver two years ago because he needed work that would let him care for his disabled 13year-old daughter.

But after repeated rejections, Spaulding concluded a few weeks ago that the cost of driving to visit potential employers wasn't worth the expense. He suspended his job hunt.

He and his family are getting by on his daughter's disability check from Social Security. They're living in a trailer park on Texas' Gulf Coast.

"It costs more to look than we have to spend," he

Eventually, lots of Americans like Spaulding will start looking for jobs again. those work-force dropouts had been counted as unemployed, August's unemployment rate would have been 10.6 percent instead of 9.1 percent.

Emma Draper, 23, lost her public relations job this summer. To pay the rent on her Washington apartment, she's working part time at the retailer South Moon Under. She's selling \$120 Ralph Lauren swimsuits and other trendy clothes.

Her search for full-time work has been discouraging. Employers don't call back for months, if ever.

"You're basically on their timeline," Draper says. "It's really hard to find a job unless you know somebody who can give you an inside

Retailers, in particular, favor part-timers. They value the flexibility of being able to tap extra workers during peak sales times without being overstaffed during lulls. Some use software to precisely match their staffing levels with customer traffic. It holds down their expenses.

"They know up to the minute how many people they need," says Carrie Gleason of the Retail Action Project, which advocates better working conditions for retail workers. "It's almost created a contingent work force?"

Draper appreciates her part-time retail job, and not just because it helps pay the bills. It takes her mind off the frustration of searching for full-time work.

"Right now, finding a job is my job," she says. "If that was the only thing I had to do, I'd be going insane. There is only so much time you can sit at your computer, sending out resumes."



A summary of the proposed changes to the plan follows and a complete text of the proposed changes can be obtained at the office of the Jerome County Clerk, Monday through Friday during the hours of 8:30 a.m. to

The proposed revisions will correct grammar, errors and update wording in the Water Quality section of the plan. The Preface has been changed to delete Minidoka County as a member county and the description of the Planning Area reflects this change. The Situation Statement has been revised to include aquatic species, recharge, cloud seeding, climate change and federal mandates and court decisions. Aquaculture facilities are now included under the Situation Statement for CAFO's. Item 19 under Policy Statements pertaining to water usage and diversions has been deleted. A section on aquatic nuisance species has been added which includes goals, objectives and strategies for preventing the introduction of these species. This section calls for education of the public, law enforcement sportsmen and recreational groups. It also promotes the development of boat and equipment cleaning stations at recreation areas in the region. The Hydro Power situation statement has been updated and a new strategy AO1.a has been added to ensure there are no negative impacts to water quality from modifications to existing facilities. Municipal and Industrial waste treatment section has been revised to include commercial enterprises and the term "Middle Snake River" used throughout this section has been revised to "waters of the region". Goal B, Strategy BO1.b has been added requiring commercial and light industrial land uses to use municipal waste treatment systems unless there is insufficient capacity and what a developer must base their plans on when constructing private systems. BO1.c has been added, calling for increased monitoring and enforcement of regulations for certain commercial and light industrial uses. BO1.f has also been added encouraging continued monitoring for pharmaceuticals in ground waters of the region. Goal C with objectives and strategies has been added to this section dealing with the development of heavy industry in the region. The purposed of this Goal is to protect surface and ground water quality within the region as it relates to heavy industry development. A waste treatment plan must include a contingency plan and assure there will be no negative impact from the escape or discharge of pollutants. This goal also calls for the construction of monitoring wells, proper handling of commodity storage and solid waste landfills, dust and smoke stack remediation plans. The Field Agricultural Situation Statement has been updated to reflect the current number of farms, number of acres farmed and economic The goals, objectives and strategies of the Field Agricultural section has minor changes to correct spelling and phrases. Strategy BO2.g was added to promote research and the use of approved genetically engineered crops to reduce the use of pesticides and fertilizer. The Animal Agriculture Situation Statement has been changed to reflect current economic information for livestock operations. The definition of a Concentrated Animal Feeding Operation (CAFO) has been changed to the definition used by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). A definition of an animal unit has been removed from the plan as each member county has their own definition of an animal unit. Strategies BO1. a, b, d, e ,f and g have been eliminated and incorporated under new Strategies BO1.a, b and c. BO1.e is new and encourages monitoring for pharmaceuticals in ground and surface water. BO1.f is also new and encourages increased monitoring and enforcement of regulations for chemical storage, mixing, application, wasted disposal and spills including fuel storage. The Ground Water Recharge Situation Statement has been changed to reflect current information and recognize the Comprehensive Aquifer Management Plan (CAMP) in the recharge portion of the plan concerning the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer. Strategy AO1.d was eliminated under ground water recharge since the concern was already covered by strategy AO1c. In the Definition Section the definitions for Chemical, Nutrient, Organic and Sediment Contaminants are removed and replaced by a definition for Contaminants as defined by the EPA. The definitions for Commercial and industrial properties are eliminated since both are defined by the member counties. The plan allows cities and member counties to work together in forming community advisory boards, delineating water protection areas, identifying potential sources of contamination, managing drinking water protection areas and planning for the future. This section outlines regulatory and non-regulatory approaches to protecting source water from contaminant sources within drinking water protection areas. Protection areas will be defined by the cities, drinking water associations and counties and set forth by overlays to county zoning maps. The Drinking Water Protection Plan will be implemented by the adoption of a Drinking Water Protection Ordinance by each county. A sample ordinance is attached to this section of the plan. implementation will include an overlay to the county zoning map, an inventory of potential sources of contamination and the recognition of a contingency plan for contamination. sample ordinance defines various water protection overlay districts depending on the time of travel for source water. Each district includes a description of land uses that will or won; Çt be allowed with the county being the ultimate authority for land situated outside the city limits of the boundaries of a water association.

A new section to the Coordinated Water Resource Management Plan titled Implementation is added. The implementation portion of the plan reflects the way the plan has been adopted by the member counties. It calls for the application of policies included in the plan to apply to policies, resolutions and ordinances adopted by the member counties. It calls for coordination with planning and zoning commissions of the member counties as well as state and federal government agencies. It also calls for education, adoption and practice of water quality protection and conservation measures both in county facilities and new development. It further mandates that the plan must be continually reviewed and update as needed.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

"The thirteenth generation Unlucky number this! — My grandma loved a pirate, And all my faults are his!" – Abbie Farwell Brown

Would you open that South hand one club or two no-trump? With such an easy rebid, I think one club is impeccable, but at one table in an international multi-teams event held in The Hague, South opened two notrump. Now a revealing auction in which South showed spades and North implied hearts saw South arrive in three no-trump on the lead of the club six which could have been from just about anything.

Declarer's approach was to win in dummy and lead a low spade to the jack and queen. Back came a second club, and South ran the clubs, played the spade ace and a spade to the king, and when that suit did not behave, he took a diamond finesse. When this lost, he considered himself unlucky. Do you agree with his assessment?

South was not unlucky; he had simply overlooked the textbook solution to maximize his chances for nine tricks. Win the first club in hand and play the spade ace, followed by a spade to the king; then play a third spade toward the jack. As the cards lie, this makes nine tricks easily.

You might object that this line gives up a trick unnecessarily if the spade queen were onside and the suit split 3-3, but the point is that you only need three spade tricks for the contract. You can afford to let the opponents get away with an extra trick from time to time — as long as you make all the contracts you can.

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:

the first 1774, Congress Continental assembled in Philadelphia.

In 1793, the Reign of Terror began during the French Revolution as the National Convention instituted harsh measures to repress counter-revolutionary activities.

In 1836, Sam Houston was elected president of the Republic of Texas.

In 1914, the First Battle of the Marne, resulting in a French-British victory over Germany, began during World War I.

In 1939, four days after war had broken out in Europe, President Franklin D. Roosevelt issued a proclamation declaring U.S. neutrality in the conflict.

In 1945, Japanese-Toguri American Iva D'Aquino, suspected of being wartime broadcaster "Tokyo Rose," was arrested in Yokohama. (D'Aquino was later convicted of treason and served six years in prison; she was pardoned in 1977 by President Gerald R. Ford.)

In 1961, President John F. Kennedy signed legislation making aircraft hijackings a federal crime.

In 1975, President Gerald R. Ford escaped an attempt on his life by Lynette "Squeaky" Fromme, a disciple of Charles Manson, in Sacramento, Calif.

In 1986, four hijackers who had seized a Pan Am jumbo jet on the ground in Karachi, Pakistan, opened fire when the lights inside the plane failed; a total of 22 people were killed in the hijacking.

In 1991, the 35th annual Naval Aviation Symposium held by the Tailhook Association opened in Las Vegas. (The gathering was marred by reports that dozens of people, most of them women, had been sexually assaulted or otherwise harassed during the meeting.)

Ten years ago: Mexican President Vicente Fox arrived at the White House as the first state visitor of the Bush presidency. Peru's attorney general filed homicide charges against Alberto Fujimori, linking the expresident to two massacres paramilitary death squads in the early 1990s. (Fujimori was later convicted of crimes against humanity and sentenced to 25 years in prison.) Sports commentator Heywood Broun died in Hale Kingston, N.Y., at age 83.

Five years ago: A cook was charged with shooting and dismembering the owner of a Maine bed-andbreakfast and three other people in a Labor Day weekend rampage (Christian Nielsen was later sentenced to life in prison). Felipe Calderon was declared Mexico's president-elect after two months of uncertainty over a disputed election. Boeing executive Alan Mulally was named president and CEO of Ford Motor Co., succeeding Bill Ford, the great-grandson of

founder Henry Ford. One year ago: A Los Angeles police officer shot and killed Manuel Jaminez, a Guatemalan immigrant, in a case that sparked angry protests. (A civilian oversight panel later said the officer was justified in using deadly force against Jaminez, who witnesses said was drunk and threatening passersby with a knife.) Jefferson Thomas, one of nine black students to integrate a Little Rock high school in America's first major battle over school segregation, died in

Columbus, Ohio, at age 67.
