



Political Boundaries Under Fire

Idaho Secretary of State Ben Ysursa asked the Idaho Supreme Court Wednesday to put the state's redistricting commission back to work. The 6-member panel tasked with drawing new legislative boundaries that will determine political clout until 2020 missed its 90-day deadline. A summary of Wednesday's events:

Wednesday's actions

• Idaho Secretary of State Ben Ysursa filed a petition asking the Idaho Supreme Court to force the commission back to work on a plan for new boundaries. Separately, the three Republican commissioners have filed a petition asking for legal clarification about the requirements that caused gridlock on the panel.

Why the actions were needed

• The state's redistricting commission failed to pass a plan for redrawn legislative and congressional district boundaries for Idaho within 90 days as required by state law. Without a new plan, Ysursa is stuck with an outdated, unconstitutional plan with unequal populations in districts.

What's next

• The court's ruling is needed before further action can be taken, although boundaries must be in place well before the May 2012 primary election. The commission could return to work after a ruling, though it's uncertain when.

Lawmakers Open to Shaking Up Redistricting System

Lawmakers irked by this year's redistricting gridlock could put an overhaul of the state's district-drawing system in front of voters after next year's legislative session.

The state's way of redrawing political boundaries could well face scrutiny — and perhaps even bills for changes — when state lawmakers gather for the next legislative session in January. So far, legislators are gathering plenty of ammunition to justify changing the system following the commission's failure to meet its legally-required 90-

day deadline to approve a plan. "If everybody holds their ground, it is a system that is set up to fail," House Speaker Lawrence Denney, R-Midvale, said in an interview with the *Times-News*. "...It did actually fail." By its nature, the commission's makeup requires its members to cross party lines to form a consensus, which has yet to happen in this round of redistricting.

St. Luke's Adds New Helicopter

The Twin Falls hospital's new air ambulance will get to and from medical emergencies across the Magic Valley quicker, smoother, hospital officials say.

With new technology comes the hope of saving more lives. Air St. Luke's, operated under St. Luke's Health System, is adding two Bell 429 helicopters to

its fleet. One of the new aircraft is based out of St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center in Twin Falls and will cover a 130-mile radius. The helicopter will make frequent stops to the Wood River Valley and Salt Lake City. St. Luke's is only the second

hospital in the country to purchase this type of Bell helicopter. The aircraft has been specifically designed to assist emergency responses, said Michael McGrane, director of Air St. Luke's. "We are investing in the safety margin," McGrane said. "We can do things today that we never could 20 years ago." St. Luke's doesn't own the helicopter but contracts with Boise-

based Idaho Helicopters Inc., which operates and maintains the aircraft. The hospital will use the \$6 million chopper to replace previously used Bell 430s. The older models will be sold once St. Luke's ground crews are trained on the new helicopter. The helicopter can cruise at up to 175 miles per hour, McGrane

Three More Declare for T.F. Council

With filing deadline looming, only one seat for the Twin Falls City Council is contested so far.

The field for the Twin Falls City Council elections widened to seven on Wednesday, but only one of the four seats is being officially contested. Local businesswoman Suzanne Hawkins will face off against two already-involved candidates: city Planning and Zoning Commission Chairman Wayne Bohrn and former Mayor Chris Talkington. The three are seeking departing Councilman Will Kezele's seat. Talkington last ran for council in 2009, when he lost a four-way race that ended with Councilman Greg Lanting's re-election. Talkington and Bohrn also sought appointment to a seat vacated by Lee Heider after he was elected to the state senate. The

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Schools Chief Seeks \$61M Share of Idaho Surplus

BOISE (AP) • Education would get about a third of the projected \$180 million budget surplus Idaho is expected to carry into the next fiscal year under a spending plan public schools chief Tom Luna submitted Wednesday to the governor's office. He wants at least \$61.7 million of the surplus to go toward public education in the 2012-2013 school year, according to the preliminary budget request Luna will give to the governor's office in September.

"With the economic forecast we're seeing, I believe this is a responsible budget proposal," Luna told The Associated Press. "But I also recognize that it's based on what we know today and if anything's consistent in this economy, it's change." Under Luna's budget request, more than \$20 million of that extra money would be used to replace funding that would be taken from salaries to pay for new education changes backed by Luna and the

governor, such as teacher merit pay. The shifting of money from funding for salaries to pay for classroom technology and teacher pay-for-performance was among the most debated parts of Luna's "Students Come First" plan, which was signed into law earlier this year. "Fortunately, the economy is going to help us carry out Students Come First," Luna said. Luna's proposed increased budget for next year includes about \$10.5 million to pay for student

growth and other changes signed into law as part of his Students Come First plan, which will also phase in laptops for teachers and students and limits union bargaining rights. The \$1.27 billion spending plan for public schools in the 2013 fiscal year represents a 5.1 percent increase in state general funds compared to the \$1.21 billion appropriation state lawmakers set aside for the current fiscal year, according to the state Department of Education.

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Secretary of State’s Office Files Suit Over Gridlocked Redistricting Work

Idaho Secretary of State Ben Ysursa has asked the Idaho Supreme Court to put the state’s redistricting commission back to work on a plan for new legislative and congressional districts.

Ysursa’s legal action is necessary because, under state law, the commission must approve a plan within 90 days of convening. The bipartisan six-member commission adjourned on Tuesday after failing to agree on a plan to redraw the state’s two congressional districts and 35 legislative districts.

That’s not the only filing, either. Separately, the three Republican commissioners — Lou Esposito, Evan Frasure and Lorna Finman — filed a petition Wednesday with the state’s supreme court for judicial review. The filing asks for court guidance in answering the legal disagreements that have led to gridlock between the GOP and Democratic commissioners.

The filing isn’t at odds with Ysursa’s case, and seeks guidance because the commissioners felt that without any assistance from the court, no agreement would be reached, said Chris Troupis, the attorney for the commissioners.

“We certainly have the same goals in mind, but we also are approaching it as

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Republican members of the commission,” Troupis said, adding that the Republicans believe that they can reach a plan in three days after getting guidance from the court.

Ysursa’s filing, made at 8 a.m. Wednesday with the court, asks the justices to give the commissioners direction or clarification on the hierarchy of what they should legally consider, said Tim Hurst, chief deputy of the secretary of state’s office.

For example, commissioners have disagreed about whether the constitutional requirement to keep counties whole carries more weight than a state law that encourages counties in the same district to be connected by a major highway.

Ysursa’s court filing says that that, due to the population shifts since the 2000 census, following the existing boundary lines drawn in 2002 would be unconstitutional and violate the “one-person, one-vote requirement of the Fourteenth Amendment’s Equal Protection Clause.

The filing asks that the commission agree on a plan within 60 days of the court’s ruling.

appointment ultimately went to Councilwoman Rebecca Mills Sojka, who is seeking election this year. She had no opposition as of Wednesday.

Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Shawn Barigar, who lost his council seat to Heider in 2007 after serving one term, also declared Wednesday. He is seeking Councilman Trip Craig’s seat. Craig said earlier he intends to run but has not yet filed.

Former Twin Falls Police Chief Jim Munn Jr. is seeking the seat being vacated by Councilman David E. Johnson.

In 2009, only the race for Lanting’s seat, one of three open seats, saw non-write in competition. In 2007, three of the four open seats saw non-write in competition. That election saw incumbents Barigar and Glenda Dwight lose their seats to Heider and Kezele, respectively.

The mayor, who is elected by the council to chair the meetings, is paid \$16,920 annually, while the other council members earn \$13,920.

The six-member commission has three members from each political party — four members are needed to approve plans that redraw the state’s legislative and congressional district boundaries. It’s a closely watched process that comes once each decade following the U.S. Census.

Denney said he’s not sure what the changes may be, adding that all options should be discussed.

Anything that the Legislature passes would be a proposed constitutional amendment that would need to go to voters for approval in an election.

Senate President Pro Tempore Brent Hill, R-Rexburg, said senators are already talking about options.

Those include doing away with an evenly split political representation on the commission and making it proportional to the Legislature’s makeup, which would give it a solid GOP majority. Another idea is adding a seventh member, which would avoid tied votes.

According to the nonpartisan National Conference of State Legislatures, 21 states have redistricting commissions. The other states rely solely on lawmakers.

Idaho’s first go at a commission system was a decade ago after the 2000 Census. Before then, the Legislature approved plans.

In other states, the roles of commissions vary. Maine and Vermont, for example, have commissions that only advise lawmakers on the process. Five other states use commissions only as a backup if law-

makers fail to meet deadlines.

Rep. Fred Wood, R-Burley, said he’d be in favor of adding a non-voting chairman to preside over meetings so redistricters can focus on drawing maps.

Rep. Stephen Hartgen, R-Twin Falls, said one possible

change is prioritizing Idaho’s law so it’s clear which requirements for new districts are most important.

Norm Semanko, chairman of the Idaho Republican Party has weighed in, saying it “doesn’t surprise” him that the commission with equally split Republican and Democratic membership hasn’t passed a plan.

Semanko added that he hopes the Legislature “will consider the idea of revisiting the makeup of the Commission so ten years from now we won’t have a repeat of this year, in which precious money, resources, and time were spent only to reach a stalemate.”

Larry Grant, chairman of the Idaho Democratic Party, said in an interview that the system can work if Republicans are willing to compromise.

“The thing that’s bothering the Republicans is they’re not

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happy that they only control 80 percent of the state,” he said. “There’s nothing wrong with a 3-3 split. It’s just that the Republicans don’t want to compromise. The commission worked last time. It can work this time if the Republicans want it to work.”

House Minority Leader John Rusche, D-Lewiston, said the commission’s differing opinions could perhaps have been solved with earlier legal direction, adding that he’s not ready to give up on the six commissioners.

“If everybody was working from the same set of rules, my guess is they would have had a map,” he said.

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Memorial for Stennett Brings in Scholarship Funds

KETCHUM • State Sen. Michelle Stennett provided the welcoming hugs. And Rep. Wendy Jaquet passed the basket Wednesday as legislators and friends came together at a luncheon to raise money for a scholarship fund in memory of late State Sen. Clint Stennett.

“There are a few people who you look to for counsel, for help when you need it. That was my good friend Clint,” said Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter, who flew to Ketchum for the fundraising luncheon on the eve of the Idaho Governor’s Cup golf tournament in Sun Valley.

“I know Clint would love this,” he added, looking at a group of more than 70 people, which included members from both sides of Idaho’s political isle, including Rep. Donna Pence, former Idaho House Speaker Bruce Newcomb, Sen. Dean Cameron and Sen. Robert Geddes. “Clint will continue to live in the lives of the kids who will get this scholarship.”

Stennett, who grew up in the Magic Valley, died in October 2010 of brain cancer after representing Blaine County for nearly 20 years. The Democrat was a strong proponent of education, having attend-

ed the College of Southern Idaho and Idaho State University after getting his GED.

“Clint was moving pipe and said, ‘There’s gotta be something better,’ ” said his friend Sally Long. “That’s what inspired him to get more education. And that’s what inspired him to advocate it for others. Clint was all about giving people a hand up.”

It was Lt. Gov. Brad Little who came up with the idea for The Clint Stennett Scholarship at Idaho State University.

“He was a proponent of education all the time. There was never a time he wasn’t pushing it,” Little said.

“He called it the great equalizer,” added Jaquet.

Art Vilas, president of Idaho State University, said the scholarship money will be used for residents of Blaine County who plan to major in any course of study in the College of Arts and Letters. They must have earned a grade-point average of 3.0 or higher in high school and be able to demonstrate a financial need.

Clint’s wife, Michelle Stennett, who helped Jaquet host the luncheon at the home of Dave and Trish Wilson, said she was gratified by the turnout.

“Clint was such a proponent of education, particularly higher education. And in these tough times it’s hard for many students to pay for that education,” she said.

Freeman Pleads Not Guilty to Child Porn Charges

A 23-year-old Twin Falls man has pleaded not guilty to possession of child pornography.

Shawn Freeman entered his plea last week in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on four felony counts of possession of sexually exploitative material. He initially faced 19 counts, but

most were recently dismissed by Twin Falls County prosecutors. An investigation of Freeman began nearly two years ago when the state attorney general’s office received a tip. A search turned up nearly 1,000 images of possible child pornography, investigators claim. A jury trial is scheduled for December.

T.F. Man Pleads Not Guilty to Delivery of Painkillers

A 25-year-old Twin Falls man has pleaded not guilty to four felony counts of delivering and possessing prescription painkillers and heroin.

Ryan Hilliard appeared last week in Twin Falls County 5th District

Court, where he entered his plea. He is scheduled for a December jury trial. Hilliard is accused of selling oxycodone and was arrested by police in July after a sting operation. He was also allegedly in possession of heroin. Hilliard bonded out in August.

Smoke Shop Burglary Suspect Gets Retained Jurisdiction

Caleb Faulkner’s attempt to score legal spice from a Twin Falls smoke shop will land him in a year-long stint in the state’s criminal retained-jurisdiction program.

The 18-year-old was sentenced to the program on Tuesday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court, and he could avoid a potential six-year prison term if he completes the treatment program. Faulkner pleaded

guilty to felony burglary in July.

Faulkner was arrested in April, suspected of using his truck to smash into both Smoke-N-Head smoke shops, one on Washington Street North and the other

on Blue Lakes Boulevard North. Police found Faulkner at the Blue Lakes Boulevard location with merchandise from the smoke shop. Restitution to business owner Allen Nagel will be determined at a future hearing.

Twin Falls Deputy Aids in Elmore County Heroin Bust

raised the suspicion of a Twin Falls County sheriff’s deputy passing through. The deputy notified law enforcement in Elmore Coun-

ty, who stopped the vehicle near King Hill.

Blair and Eatherton were arrested and charged with trafficking in heroin and

possession of methamphetamine. Their case will reside in the jurisdiction of the Elmore County 4th District Court.

Redistricting Panel Wasted Our Time and Money

This summer, the Idaho taxpayers gave six people a simple task: Use a set of rules to draw up boundaries that most closely match the ideal of “one person, one vote.” There were a few other guidelines — among them that all districts need to be within 10% on population, they should seek to keep county lines intact and they should preserve communities of interest. We gave those six people 90 days. At 5 p.m. on Tuesday, the commission called it a day, letting the deadline sail by without turning in their assignment.

In doing so, they violated our trust, set us down a path to wasting more taxpayer money and hobbled what seems like the best method to ensure all Idahoans receive a fair vote.

And it all comes down to politics. The panel, which consists of three Republicans and three Democrats, could have used logic to come up with a plan fairly quickly. Would that result in some incumbents running against each other? Most assuredly. Would it result in keeping a Democrat in power in Blaine County, or Twin Falls potentially electing a moderate Republican? Possibly.

None of those things should matter to the commission. Their job wasn’t to try to be fair to legislators or try to keep anybody’s seat secure. It was to make sure all of Idaho’s voters had as equal representation as possible.

Now, the state has had to tell our committee to get back to work — for real this time. Idaho’s secretary of state filed suit Wednesday, asking the state Supreme Court to intervene. In turn, the court has played the order of stern parent, and will likely order the commission back to Boise to finish what they left undone. The justices will coddle them with some clarifying advice on which of the redistricting rules should be honored above others, but, in the end, the same panel will still have to reach a conclusion.

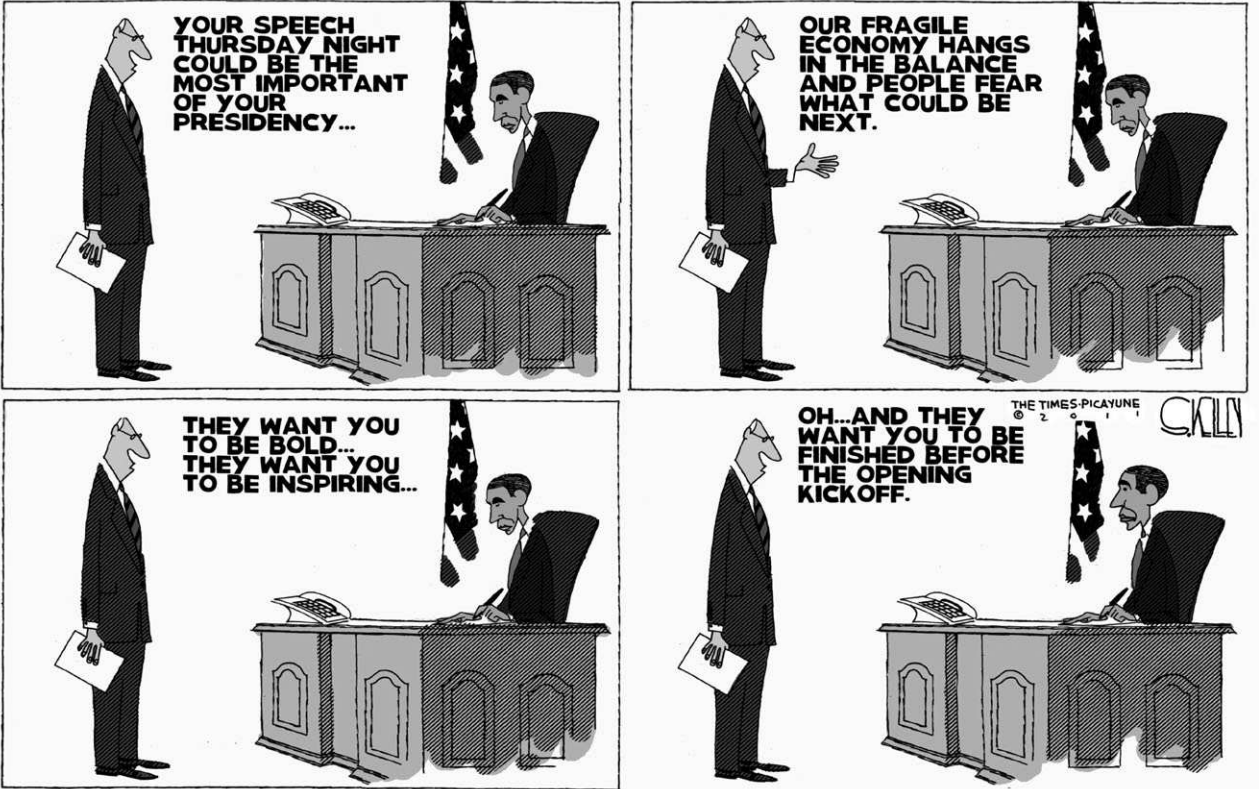
Does this strike anyone else as juvenile? We’re hopeful that this doesn’t progress to the next contingency: Should the group still be unable to agree on the borders, the Idaho Supreme Court will have no choice but to take things into their own hands and draw up the map themselves.

Secretary of State Ben Ysursa has asked the court to “defer to the Commission,” and suggests that “alternative means of apportionment should only be considered as a last resort.” We’re of the mind that the commission blew it, 60-day extension notwithstanding. We’re not opposed to the idea of the high court drawing up boundaries — perhaps they’ll be able to rise above the partisanship that plagued the committee.

In not completing their task, this committee has done more than delay our boundaries for the next decade — they’ve jeopardized what was a remarkably fair model to ensure every Idahoan got their equal share of clout.

If the system fails (worse than it already has), look for changes to the model for 2020 that hands redistricting back to the state legislature or changes the makeup of the evenly split panel.

Here’s betting that, should a new system come into play, it won’t yield a more egalitarian process.



Here’s One Stimulus Package Conservatives Could Support

No doubt, President Barack Obama will call for stimulus when he talks about job creation in his speech Thursday. Since many of us by now recoil at the word, perhaps it helps to ask, once again: Which Obama stimulus would be the least bad?

The answer, as it happens, is neatly framed in a recent photo of young women posing as Rosie the Riveter, the symbolic female factory worker from World War II. They were snapped on the occasion of Obama’s Labor Day visit to the Detroit area (unemployment 15 percent). Defense spending is the key: More hiring and spending by the Army, Navy, Air Force and affiliated departments, such as the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency, the high-end military technology developer known as DARPA.

This week, and not just because we are marking the anniversary of the Sept. 11 attacks, the case for defense spending as job creator takes the “least bad” prize.

Cover your ears to shut out the libertarian howls and look at the case as simple arithmetic: The most recent jobs report from the Bureau of Labor Statistics showed 14 million Americans unemployed.

Slide half a million from the unemployed column to the Pentagon, and you pull unemployment down substantially.

The jobs created by a Defense Department employment program would be superior to any others Obama could advocate, for several reasons.

1.) The military knows how to manage youth. Our great national problem isn’t merely unemployment; it’s youth unemployment. More than 25 percent of teenagers have no job. The television images of rioting in London held American attention partly because youth joblessness clearly played a role. No U.S. company (though McDonald’s comes close) has more experience handling youth than the military. The armed forces also have expertise in training the disadvantaged and unskilled.

2.) The military knows how to train college-age and mid-career men and women. The Reserve Officers’ Training Corps is already

on campuses. For older workers, the military knows how to impart useful skills, from systems technology to intelligence analysis to language instruction from Arabic to Spanish.

3.) The military moves fast when it comes to hiring or procurement. If a stimulus doesn’t take effect quickly, it isn’t really a stimulus, which is what Obama discovered after many millions of his 2009 spending package went unspent. Army and Navy recruiting offices are already rented, and as most Americans understand all too well, the military knows how to spend money quickly. This ability has won the support of economists such as Martin Feldstein, who has previously made the case for the military as a stimulus device.

4.) The military isn’t that expensive. You wouldn’t know it from reading authors such as Joseph Stiglitz, but today defense spending isn’t big relative to past outlays. Such expenditure measures 5 percent of gross domestic product. In 2000, when we believed we had a “peace dividend” after the Cold War ended, that level was 3 percent. In 1986, it was 6.2 percent. In 1953, toward the end of the Korean conflict —

which President Harry S. Truman called a “police action” — that share was almost 12 percent. As World War II ended, the spending was 36 percent.

Sure. But hasn’t military spending already ballooned relative to other government outlays? Even that point isn’t strong. In 1954, total federal spending was almost 19 percent of GDP and defense expenditure was more than 10 percent. The current estimates for total federal spending clock in at about 25 percent of GDP. At 5 percent of GDP, military spending makes up only a fifth of all federal outlays.

To all these reasons one can add a final and more controversial one. A more heavily militarized U.S. represents a deterrent to future wars. Though the peace dividend enabled us to reduce budget deficits in the 1990s, the cutbacks also sent a message to al-Qaida and other terrorist groups: “The U.S. isn’t ready to fight!”

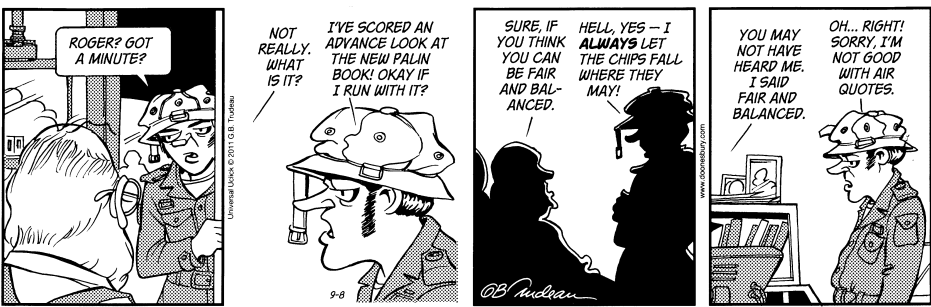
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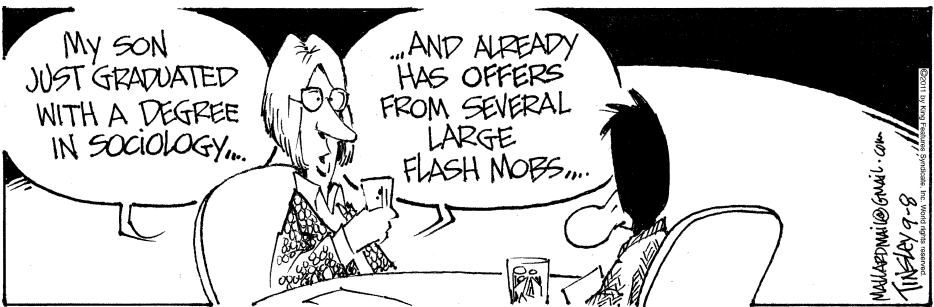
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Court Tosses Sentence of Condemned Idaho Inmate

BOISE • The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals on Wednesday reversed the death sentence of a man convicted of brutally slaying a former co-worker because the state allowed a jailhouse informant to lie on the witness stand.

Lacey Mark Sivak was sentenced to death for the 1981 murder of Dixie Wilson at the Baird Oil gas station in Garden City. The appellate court said that while his conviction was appropriate, the outcome of his sentencing hearing might have been different if prosecutors hadn't knowingly presented the testimony of an inmate who perjured himself.

Sivak's attorney, Bruce Livingston with the Federal Defender Services of Idaho, said the false testimony was at the heart of the case.

"The court ruling underscores how unreliable prison snitches can be. What's particularly troubling — outrageous — in this case is that prosecutors knew the inmate was lying and hid the truth as they sought an execution of Mr. Sivak," Livingston said.

Former Ada County prosecutor Jim Harris, who handled Sivak's murder trial, said, "To the best of my knowledge — and it's been 30 years — my office did not assist any of the witnesses with regard to pending charges until after their testimony had been preserved, on the record."

The appellate court said state attorneys could decide to hold a new sentencing hearing if they still want to seek the death penalty for Sivak's crimes. The court also noted that the other man accused of the crimes, Randall Bainbridge, had been sentenced to life in prison for the same killing.

According to court records, Dixie Wilson, a 30-year-old mother of three children, was killed on April 6, 1981, when she was shot at least five times in the head and face and stabbed approximately 20 times in the head, neck and shoulder. She was also molested by her assailants.

Feds Drop Charge Against Idaho Man Who Shot Grizzly

BOISE (AP) • Federal prosecutors on Wednesday dropped a misdemeanor charge filed against a northern Idaho man accused of illegally shooting and killing a male grizzly bear at his home in May, U.S. Attorney Wendy Olson said.

Jeremy Hill, 33, pleaded not guilty last month to unlawfully taking a federally protected species. His case has generated public and political backlash against federal officials.

As part of a deal, Hill agreed his actions violated a regulation of the Endangered Species Act against removing nuisance bears and paid a \$1,000 fine. The act classifies the grizzly bear as a threatened species in the lower 48 states, and the animals are protected by federal law.

Hill claimed he was protecting his children when three bears walked on to his property near Porthill, near the Canadian border, on May 8.

Olson said investigators were unable to determine the location of Hill's children at the time the bears were first seen in Hill's yard near the pig pen. But by the time Hill fired his final shot, he was aware that his wife and children were inside their home, Olson said.

"The United States Attorney's Office well understands Mr. Hill is a concerned husband and father who wants to protect his family," Olson said in a press release.

Hill said he was grateful for public support during the case, including from Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter, who came to his defense.

"We have been overwhelmed by the outpouring of concern from the many people who have contacted us," Hill said in a statement. "I received a federal civil ticket and have paid the \$1,000 fine to avoid putting my family through the emotional strain and the cost of a trial. I am glad this issue has been resolved out of court, and I am looking forward to putting this unfortunate incident behind me."

Olson said anyone who sees a grizzly near their home or campsite should immediately contact wildlife officials, who will take steps to remove the animal.

"These regulations are designed to ensure citizen safety and protect the grizzly bear," Olson said.

A court hearing for Hill in Coeur d'Alene in August drew dozens of supporters who claim he was doing nothing more than protecting his family. The crowd

was so large that the magistrate judge moved the hearing to a bigger courtroom.

A jury trial had been set for Oct. 4. Hill could have faced penalties of up to one year in prison and fines up to \$50,000 if convicted.

Otter had written a letter to Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar, saying he strongly supported the rights of individuals to defend themselves. He said Hill did what any parent would do, and the government should allow people to defend their loved ones.

Hill and his wife have six children, and their home is between two federal grizzly bear recovery zones — the Selkirk zone to the west and Cabinet-Yaak zone to the east. Biologists estimate that 100 grizzlies inhabit the zones.

Supporters say several of Hill's children were playing in the yard when the bear approached, and he notified Idaho wildlife officials after shooting it. The community raised \$19,500 for a defense fund for the family at a 4-H animal sale in Bonners Ferry.

The bears are a controversial topic in Boundary County, as habitat protection by federal agencies has affected the timber harvest and logging industry.

Kestner was moved

Wednesday from Oregon's Malheur County, where he was arrested earlier this week after a couple reported they had been held at gunpoint at their cabin near Lake Owyhee. The couple's report prompted a search in eastern Oregon and Kestner was taken into custody Monday.

Fate of Fire-damaged Trestle in Jeopardy

LEWISTON • The owner of the Bountiful Grain and Craig Mountain Railroad hopes a trestle destroyed by a wildfire in Winchester Canyon can be rebuilt, but he said it will be difficult.

The trestle, one of several that stretches across impossibly steep draws as the rails climb from Spalding to the Camas Prairie, was burned by the 75-acre Cudlesac Fire Friday.

"I have always said I wanted to be back on the prairie and, to be honest with you, I think I could have," Mike Williams said from his Richmond, Mo., office. "But this is definitely going to be a stumbling block for me."

The line has not provided service through the canyon and up to the grain fields of the prairie for several years. Williams said repairs were made to a key bridge along the route in 2008 in order to

bring the line back to life. Then the economy derailed and those plans were shelved. But in the back of his mind Williams never gave up hope that trains would once again be a key transportation link for prairie farmers.

"Every time I get up there I just keep telling myself this railroad needs to stay here forever, if for nothing else than the historic aspect and the accomplishment as an engineering feat."

There are more than 40 wooden trestles, some of them hundreds of feet high, between Spalding and Cottonwood. They are famous among train and railroad fans, some of whom like to visit the route in speeder cars. Williams described traveling the line as breath-taking.

"I've been over the entire Burlington Northern system and I've never seen anything as beautiful in my life," he said.

A fire that started near the

highway Friday afternoon raced up the steep slopes of the canyon and into a draw spanned by the trestle. The flames readily climbed and consumed the creosote soaked wooden structure.

"We dropped a lot of water on it with helicopter buckets but once that creosote catches on fire there is no hope," said Don Wagner of the Idaho Department of Lands.

The helicopter was able to keep flames away from another trestle just a few hundred yards away but the burned one is a total loss.

"It's gone. There is nothing there," Wagner said.

Williams said he became sick to his stomach Friday after hearing the trestle was ablaze and comforted only small bit when he learned it was not the famous curved trestle visible from the highway and was prominently featured in the Charles Bronson film "Breakheart Pass."

"When one of my employees told me it wasn't

Halfmoon it made me feel a little better," he said.

The fact the trestle, which was not insured, was straight and not curved bolsters the chances of it being rebuilt. Williams who also owns Railroad Materials Salvage Inc. said he has more than enough timbers and other materials to rebuild the structure but the cost of labor could be prohibitive.

He plans to tour the burned trestle.

"We just have to kind of look at it and see how much that is going to cost to see if it is something we will attempt or not."

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State Highway Head Issues Final Order for Exxon Mega-loads

BOISE (AP) • The Idaho Transportation Department issued a final order on Wednesday allowing Exxon Mobil to transport oversized oil equipment on a scenic corridor through north-central Idaho.

Transportation director Brian Ness said a permit already issued for a test shipment was "in full compliance" with state law and will now apply to as many as 200 shipments due to be moved from the Port of Lewiston to oil tar sands of Alberta, Canada.

Environmental groups and residents along the route had asked Ness to reject a hearing officer's findings allowing the shipments, maintaining they pose a safety and environmental threat. They have two weeks

to appeal Ness' order.

Despite Ness' order, Exxon Mobil's U.S. Highway 12 shipments remain stalled thanks to preliminary injunction blocking Montana's highway agency from allowing the loads to be shipped over that state's roadways into Canada.

Shipments of some smaller, reconfigured Exxon Mobil equipment have been using an alternate route. The Idaho transportation department announced that three shipments will be using U.S. Highway 95 and U.S. Interstate 90 from the Port of Lewiston to reach the Idaho-Montana state line.

Business groups that favor the shipments applauded Ness' order for shipments on Highway 12, saying it re-

flected Idaho's industry-friendly government.

"Ness is protecting the rights of private industry to utilize public roads — an essential step in encouraging private sector investment in our state and our workforce," said Alex LaBeau, co-chairman of the Drive Our Economy Coalition. LaBeau contended that opponents have "frivolously" used the courts and appeals process to halt important economic development.

Meanwhile, Friends of the Clearwater, a group that opposes the large shipments, announced they were seeking to intervene in a separate, contested administrative hearing over additional large loads on the corridor that parallels the scenic Lochsa River.

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Obama’s Best Jobs Plan Might be Status Quo

WASHINGTON • First, do no harm. Economists say the most important part of the jobs plan President Barack Obama will unveil Thursday night is the renewal of two measures already in place — a cut in Social Security taxes and emergency aid for the unemployed.

His new proposals, like spending more for transportation projects and cutting taxes for companies that hire the unemployed, probably wouldn’t add many jobs, they say. Not soon, anyway.

“These are not bold, new, big programs,” says Nari-man Behraves, chief economist with IHS Global Insight. “You put everything together, it’s going to be pretty small.”

The job market needs big help. In August, the economy generated zero job growth. And the unemployment rate is 9.1 percent, a level more typical for a recession than for a recovery in its third year.

For Obama, who also faces sinking approval ratings as he goes before a joint session of Congress and on

Obama Wants to Keep 3,000 to 5,000 U.S. Troops in Iraq

WASHINGTON • The Obama administration would like to keep about 3,000 to 5,000 U.S. troops in Iraq beyond the end of this year but has not begun formal discussions with the Iraqis about the size or makeup of the force, U.S. officials said.

Iraqi Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki has expressed a desire to keep some U.S. trainers in the country in 2012, past the deadline negotiated by the George W. Bush administration to remove all U.S. troops from the country.

But the Iraqi leader faces staunch opposition from key members of his coalition government who are deeply opposed to any U.S. presence. Some members of the coalition have threatened to boycott the government if it allows any U.S. forces to stay.

Senior U.S. officials have said they are hopeful that they will be able to reach an agreement with the Iraqis on maintaining the small training force. The Iraqis will have to agree to any U.S. presence.

U.S. officials said it is still not clear exactly what kinds of training the Americans would provide and how many trainers would be needed to accomplish the mission. The estimate of 3,000 to 5,000 troops reflects a general consensus on what is politically feasible in Iraq and the the United States.

U.S. officials want to keep troops in the country to help shepherd the growth of Iraqi military forces and also to keep an eye on Iran and Syria. Only about 46,000 troops on 47 U.S. bases remain, down from a high of 166,000 on 505 bases during the height of the “troop surge” in 2007.

Romney and Perry Spar Over Jobs, Social Security

Two GOP presidential frontrunners — and other contenders — snipe at one another, contradict allegations and interrupt media questioners to demand a chance to take each other on.

SIMI VALLEY, Calif. • Quick to tangle, Republican presidential rivals Rick Perry and Mitt Romney sparred vigorously over job creation and Social Security Wednesday night in a feisty campaign debate that marked a contentious new turn in the race to pick a 2012 challenger to President Barack Obama.

Far more than in earlier GOP debates this summer, the candidates mixed it up in their first faceoff since Perry entered the race and almost instantly overtook Romney as front-runner in opinion polls. Those two — as well as other contenders on stage — sniped at one another, contradicted allegations and interrupted media questioners to demand opportunities to take each other on.

“Michael Dukakis created jobs three times faster than you did, Mitt,” Perry jabbed in the debate’s opening moments, referring to one of Romney’s Democratic predecessors as governor of Massachusetts.

“As a matter of fact, George Bush and his predecessors created jobs at a faster rate than you did,” Romney shot back at Perry, the 10-year incumbent Texas governor.

The debate was the first of three in as many weeks, at a time when the economy is struggling, unemployment is seemingly stuck at 9.1 percent and

Jet Crash in Volga River Kills 43, Including Members of Russian Hockey League

The roster of Lokomotiv Yaroslavl included players and coaches from 10 nations.

TUNOSHNA, Russia • A private jet carrying a Russian professional hockey team to its first game of the season crashed shortly after takeoff Wednesday, killing 43 people — including European and former NHL players — in one of the worst aviation disasters in sports history. Two people survived the accident.

The crash also was the latest tragedy to befall the sport of hockey — following the sudden, offseason deaths of three of the NHL’s tough-guy enforcers that have shocked fans.

The chartered Yak-42 jet was carrying the team — Lokomotiv Yaroslavl — to Minsk, the capital of Belarus, where it was to play Thursday in its opening game of the Kontinental Hockey League season. Of the 45 people on board, 36 were players, coaches and team officials; eight were crew.

The plane apparently struggled to gain altitude and then hit a signal tower before breaking apart along the Vol-

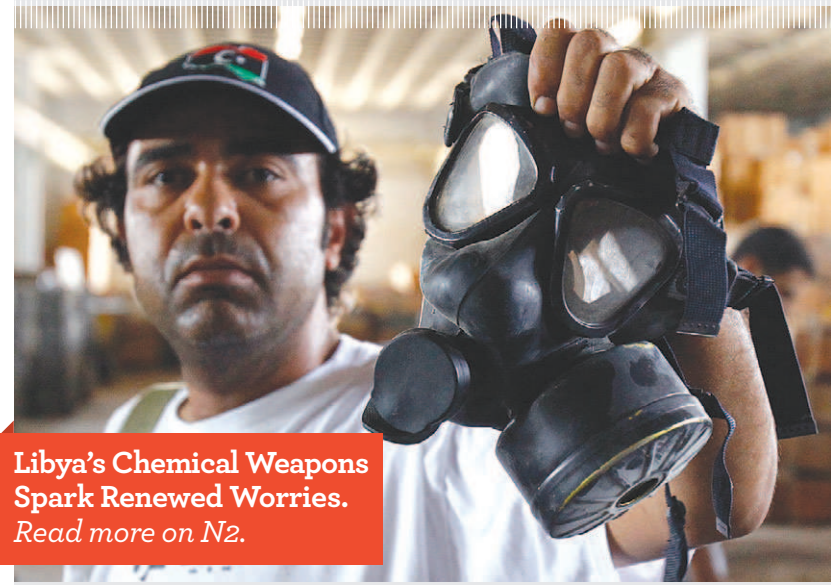

Obama's popularity is sinking in the polls — all events that could make the GOP nomination worth more than it appeared only a few months ago.

Perry and Romney stood next to each other on the debate stage at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library, a setting that invoked the memory of the conservative Republican who swept to two terms as president. And for much of the evening, the two men were at the center of the action, largely reducing their rivals to the roles of spectators looking for a way into the action.

Former Utah Gov. Jon Huntsman sided with Perry when he turned to Romney and said, "47th just isn't going to cut it, my friend," a reference to the rank Massachusetts had among the 50 states in creating jobs during Romney's term.

But he also sought to rebut Perry's claim to be chief executive of the country's top job-producing state.

"I hate to rain on the parade of the great Lone Star State governor, but as governor of Utah, we were the No. 1 job creator during my years in service," Huntsman said.

Businessman Herman Cain, Minnesota Rep. Michele Bachmann, Texas Rep. Ron Paul, former House Speaker Newt Gingrich and former Sen. Rick Santorum of Pennsylvania shared the stage for the debate hosted by MSNBC and Politico.

Not surprisingly, the GOP contenders had little good to say about Obama, either his record on creating jobs or the health care law they have vowed to repeal if they win the White House. Perry was an exception, volunteering his praise for the presidential order that resulted in the

death of Osama bin Laden in a U.S. military raid in Pakistan. He also said he was happy the U.S. prison at Guantanamo has been kept open.

On another foreign policy issue, Bachmann criticized Obama's decision to join an international military campaign in Libya.

Bachman also said she would provide the "strong, bold leader in the presidency who will lead" the effort to repeal the health care law passed at Obama's behest. "None of us should ever think that the repeal bill will just come to our desk," she said in a pledge that drew applause from the audience.

Gingrich resisted an effort to draw him into conflict with other Republicans on stage. "I'm frankly not interested in your efforts to get Republicans fighting each other," he said, sparking an even louder round of applause. He said all Republicans should "defeat efforts by the news media" to spark an internal struggle when the real objective is to defeat Obama in 2012.

But moments later, Cain said that after trying to defeat Democratic efforts to create national health care, "I'm running against Romneycare," the legislation that passed requiring residents of Massachusetts to purchase coverage.

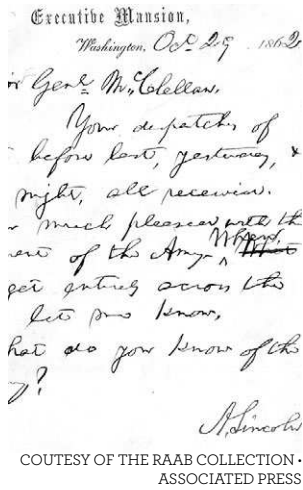
Social Security produced more sparks, when Perry said the program was a "Ponzi scheme" and added it was a lie to tell young workers they will ever receive the benefits they have been promised.

Romney quickly referred to Perry's book, "Fed Up," in which the Texas governor said that by any measure the program was a failure. Perry also said states should be able to opt out of the program, Romney added.

Perry was unrepentant — "You cannot keep the status quo in place and call it anything other than a Ponzi scheme," he said.

Libya's Chemical Weapons Spark Worries

AL-AJELAT, Libya • Documents showing the shipment of thousands of gas masks and chemical weapons protection suits to Moammar Gadhafi's remaining strongholds in the last weeks of his regime raised fresh concerns Wednesday about whether the deposed Libyan leader's forces could still have access to deadly mustard gas.

The Pentagon and an international monitoring organization have said that Gadhafi's remaining stockpiles are secure. But more than 11 tons of mustard gas is known to be accumulated in a country that suddenly lacks a strong central authority and where weapons are fast proliferating. Libyan rebels say they are concerned that Gadhafi holdouts could have access to the mustard

gas and could use it in a last-ditch effort to halt opposition advances.

"It hasn't happened yet, but it's not beyond Gadhafi," said Mohammed Benrasali, a senior member of Libya's civilian stabilization team.

Rebel commanders say the concerns are one reason they are moving cautiously as they try to drive Gadhafi loyalists from his home town of Sirte and a key military headquarters in the desert at al-Jufrah.

Gadhafi has used chemical weapons before, during a war with neighboring Chad in 1987. But he agreed to dismantle his weapons of mass destruction program in 2003 in return for rapprochement with the West. To demonstrate his commitment, he ordered the bulldozing of 3,300 artillery shells that could have been used to deliver chemical weapons.

But the stockpiles of mustard gas have taken longer to eliminate. A U.S. Embassy cable in November 2009 released by WikiLeaks suggested that Libya was dragging its feet to maintain leverage and obtain greater compensation.

As a result, 11.25 tons of the poison gas was still in Libya when the uprising against Gadhafi began in February, according to the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons, an international body that works closely with the United Nations.

Gadhafi long ago shut down three facilities where he produced sarin nerve gas and mustard gas.

U.S. officials were skeptical Wednesday about assertions that Gadhafi loyalists were preparing to use chemical weapons — or even possessed them.

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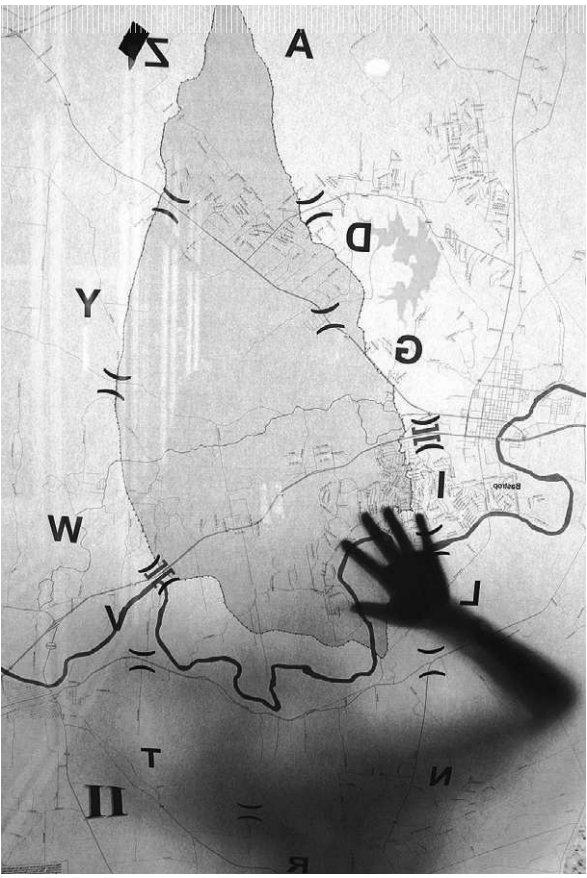

Firefighters Gain Ground Against Texas Wildfire

BASTROP, Texas • Firefighters gained ground Wednesday against one of the most destructive wildfires in Texas history even as the state said the number of homes lost reached almost 800, and an elite search team set out to find any victims in the smoking ruins.

Gov. Rick Perry, meanwhile, resumed his presidential campaign after rushing home over the weekend to deal with the crisis, traveling to California to meet his Republican rivals in his first nationally televised debate.

The blaze has left at least two people dead, blackened about 45 square miles around Bastrop and cast a haze over Austin, 25 miles to the west, where the air smelled strongly of pine and cedar.

Firefighters reported that the flames were at least 30 percent contained after burning uncontrolled for three days. They credited an easing of the winds from Tropical Storm Lee that had caused the fire to explode over the weekend. Nevertheless, the number of homes that the Texas Forest Service reported destroyed rose from around 600 the day before.

The wildfire is the most catastrophic of more than 170 blazes that have erupted in the past week across the Lone Star State, which is perilously dry because of one of the state's most severe droughts on record. In addition to the two victims

in the Bastrop area fire whose bodies were found Tuesday, the outbreak is blamed for two deaths elsewhere. A total of at least 1,188 homes have been destroyed by wildfires in Texas in the last week, including the 800 lost in the Bastrop-area blaze, according to the Texas Forest Service.

One of the two people killed in the Bastrop-area fire was identified Wednesday as Michael Troy Farr, 49, who died at his home in Smithville. Bastrop County officials did not immediately release details about the second victim, who they said was found at a different location.

Texas Task Force 1, a search team that was sent to New York following the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks and to New Orleans in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, set out in the Bastrop area using dogs trained to sniff out bodies.

Mike Fisher, the Bastrop County Emergency Operations Agency's incident commander, said he didn't know if there were any more dead, but "if there are bodies out there, that team is going to find them."

Several thousand people evacuated ahead of the fire, but only around 2,500 registered with the county.

Across the state, about 1,200 firefighters battled the blazes, including crews from as far away as California and Oregon.

The outbreak has made this the state's costliest wildfire season on record, with \$216 million in firefighting expenses since late

Kids Who Were With Bush on 9/11 Saw Change Sweep Over Him

SARASOTA, Fla. • The 16 children who shared modern America's darkest moment with President George W. Bush are high school seniors now — football players, ROTC members, track athletes, wrestlers and singers.

They remember going over an eight-paragraph story so it would be perfect when they read it to the president on Sept. 11, 2001. They remember how Bush's face suddenly clouded as his chief of staff, Andrew Card, bent down and whispered to him that the U.S. had been attacked. They remember how Bush pressed on with the reading as best he could before sharing the devastating news with the nation.

"It was like a blank stare. Like he knew something was going on but he didn't want to make it too bad for us to notice by looking different," said Lenard Rivers, now a 17-year-old football player at Sarasota High.

What the students can't say for sure is how that moment changed them. They were just second-graders. Their memories were only beginning.

"I think we all matured maybe a little bit," said Chantal Guerrero, now a 17-year-old senior at Sarasota Military Academy. "... But since we were only 7, I'm not sure what kind of impact it had, because we didn't know how things were before."

Lazaro Dubrocq, now a 17-year-old senior and captain of the wrestling team at Sarasota's Riverview High School, said it wouldn't be until middle school when he started seriously pondering his place in the chaotic events of Sept. 11.

"I was too young and naive to fully understand the gravity of the situation," said Dubrocq, who is headed to Columbia University to study chemical engineering next year. "As I began to age and mature, it helped me gain a new perspective of the world and it helped me mature faster as I began to understand that there are politics and wars and genocides that occur daily throughout the world. It helped me come to a realization that the world is not a perfect place."

Sept. 11, 2001, was a steamy Tuesday in southwest Florida. The children were sitting in two neat rows in room 301 of Emma E. Booker Elementary School. Bush planned to sit in the classroom with them before moving to the media center to talk about a national reading initiative.

Booker Elementary, in a low-income area of Sarasota, was chosen for the Bush visit because Principal Gwen Tose'-Rigell had turned it into a high-performing school. As presidential trips go, it was routine, mundane even. The children were chosen because they were some of the best readers.

Tose'-Rigell, who died of cancer in 2007, told The Associated Press in 2002 that Bush knew when he arrived at the school that some kind of plane had hit one of the

World Trade Center towers in New York. But the news was sketchy, and the decision was made to proceed with the program at Booker.

The moment when Card whispered to the president about the terrorist attack came when the children were reaching under their desks for a book called Reading Mastery II. On Page 153 was "The Pet Goat," the story the children read aloud as the president followed along with his own copy.

As they began the story, some of the children sensed something was different about the president.

"One kid described his face as (like) he had to use the bathroom," Guerrero said. "That's how we saw it in second grade. He just looked like he got the worst news in the world."

Teacher Kay Daniels was sitting next to Bush and knew something was amiss when Card came out of the adjoining classroom and approached the president. Everything about the day was so choreographed, and that wasn't supposed to happen.

"I had 16 little ones sitting in front of me, the media in the back of the classroom, and I had to keep going," said Daniels, now a reading teacher at a Sarasota

middle school. "Emotionally, (Bush) left us, but he came back. He did come back into the lesson, and he picked up the book and for a moment he stayed with us."

Bush dissected those moments recently in an interview with the National Geographic TV channel.

"At the back of the room, reporters were on their cell phones. They were getting the same message I got, which meant a lot of people would be watching my reaction to this crisis," he said. "So I made a decision not to jump up immediately and leave the classroom. I didn't want to rattle the kids. I wanted to project a

sense of calm."

After the story, Bush quickly shook hands with the children and left each with some M&Ms in a box bearing the presidential seal. Then he disappeared into the adjoining classroom, which had been set up as a command center for the visit. Minutes later in the media center, he stepped up to the podium and told the country about the attacks.

"Ladies and gentlemen, this is a difficult moment for America," Bush began. Teachers and students standing closest to him could see tears well in his eyes.

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91 Charged in Medicare Fraud Crackdown

WASHINGTON (AP) • A nationwide law enforcement crackdown has charged 91 people — including doctors and other medical professionals — with participating in Medicare fraud schemes involving \$295 million in false billing.

Attorney General Eric Holder and Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius said Wednesday that 70 people were charged in indictments unsealed Tuesday and Wednesday and 21 others were charged earlier. Charges were filed in Baton Rouge, La.; Brooklyn, N.Y.; Chicago, Dallas, Detroit, Houston; Los Angeles and Miami.

At a news conference, the attorney general said that those arrested are "jeopardizing the integrity of our health care system." Sebelius called the law en-

forcement initiative "a powerful warning to those who would try to defraud taxpayers and Medicare beneficiaries."

Eleven of the people charged were doctors, three were nurses and 10 were licensed health professionals. Over half the defendants — 46 — and \$160 million of the total in phony claims announced Wednesday came from South Florida, still leading the nation in Medicare fraud.

In Miami, U.S. Attorney Wilfredo Ferrer said investigators noticed a new twist in which people who already were receiving Medicare disability checks were recruited with promises they could live in a halfway house in South Florida — as long as they agreed to receive mental health services they did not need.

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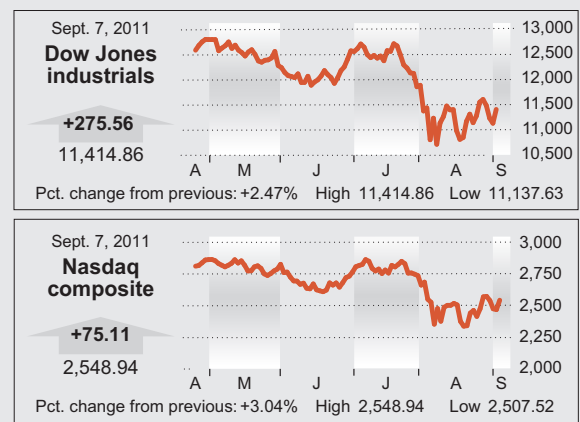

Shocker: Power Demand From U.S. Homes is Falling

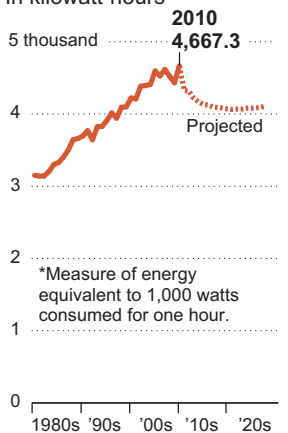
NEW YORK • American homes are more cluttered than ever with devices, and they all need power: Cell phones and iPads that have to be charged, DVRs that run all hours, TVs that light up in high definition. But something shocking is happening to demand for electricity in the Age of the Gadget: It's leveling off. Over the next decade, experts expect residential power use to fall, reversing an upward trend that has been almost uninterrupted since Thomas Edison invented the modern light bulb. In part it's because Edison's light bulb is being replaced by more efficient types of lighting, and electric devices of all kinds are getting much more efficient. But there are other factors.

under way. Executives were particularly surprised by a dip during the first three months of this year, the most recent national quarterly numbers available. Adjusted for the effects of weather, residential power demand fell 1.3 percent nationwide, an unusually sharp drop. Executives and analysts are perplexed because residential demand doesn't usually track economic ups and downs very closely. Even when the economy is stagnant, people still watch TV and keep their ice cream cold. "No one knows if it's customer concern about the economy or a structural change," says Bill Johnson, CEO of Progress Energy, which serves Florida and the Carolinas.

First Wolf Killed in Montana’s Archery Hunt

BOZEMAN, Mont. (AP) • Montana wildlife officials say the first wolf has been taken in this winter’s hunt. Fish, Wildlife and Parks spokesman Ron Aasheim tells the Bozeman Daily Chronicle an archer killed the male wolf in Stillwater County on Sunday.

This season, hunters are allowed to kill 220 wolves, compared with 75 in the first hunt in 2009. No hunt was held last winter.

This year’s hunt is taking place after wolves in Montana and Idaho were removed from federal protection by Congress.

Aasheim says 8,110 hunting licenses had been sold through Tuesday, just over half the number sold by the end of the 2009 season.

The archery season opened Saturday. The early backcountry season for hunting wolves with rifles begins Sept. 15 and the general season begins Oct. 22.

“This year we’re plan-

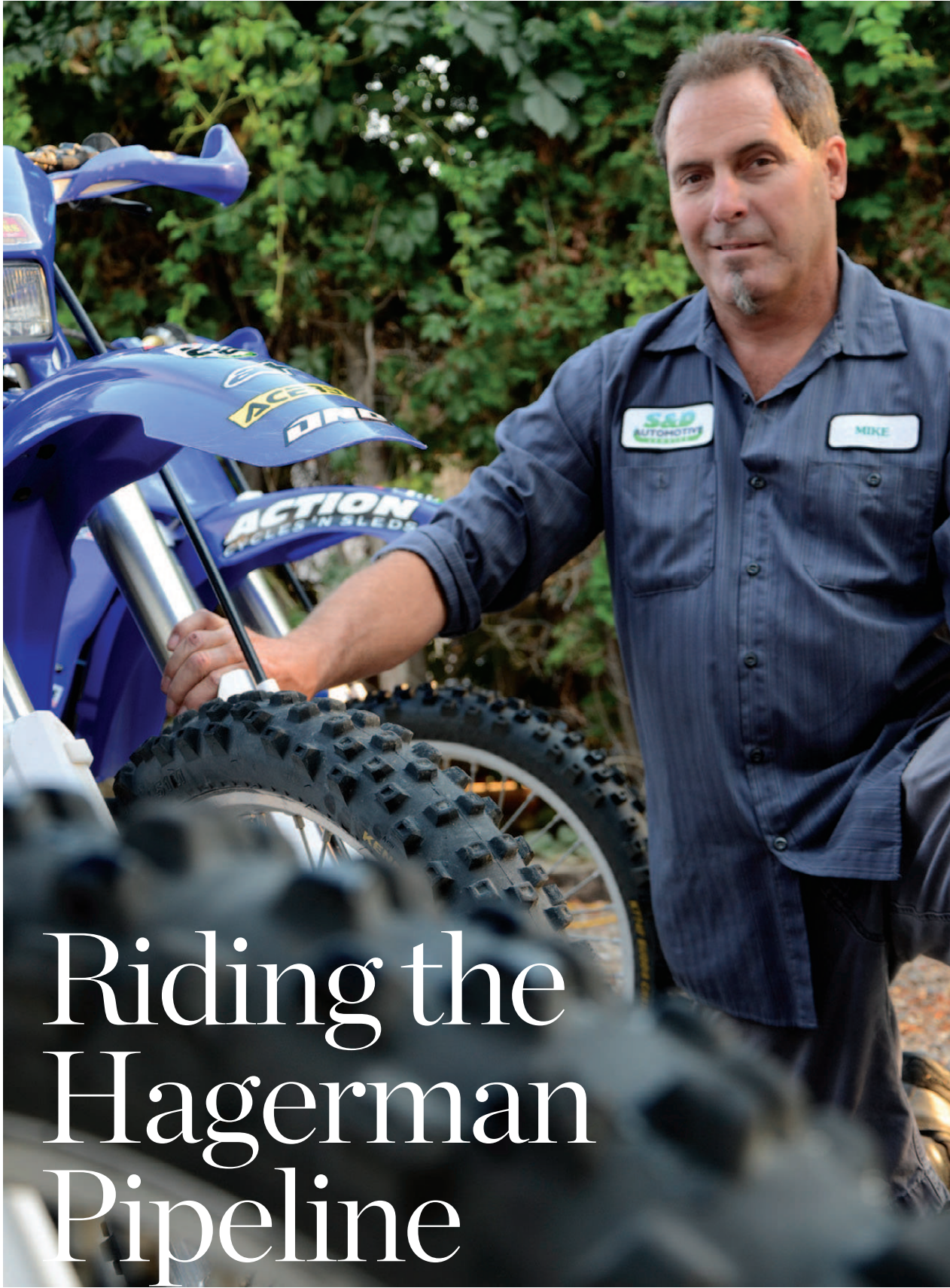

Ever since Mike Starry was 9 years old, he’s been riding the trails in Hagerman.

The Twin Falls man, now 46, hasn’t tired of them yet. He’s on the trails several weekends a year. This past May, as a member of the Magic Valley Trail Machine Association, he initiated a trail clean up.

It’s the least he could do for something that has brought him enjoyment over the past 37 years. He wants to

make the clean-up effort an annual event.

“Just the idea behind it, the way that trails everywhere seem to be closing,” he said. “It’s BLM land, so if we don’t take care of it they’ll close it too.”

Right now, however, he’s trying to get in as much riding as he can before Old Man Winter arrives.

Starry is one of many offroad enthusiasts who ride dirt bikes at what locally is known as the Hagerman Pipeline — a several-square-mile landscape of trails, berms, sand dunes and steep “pipeline” hills.

For sportsmen, however, checkmarks on the calendar provided just as much excitement, the countdown just as serious: Aug. 30 marked the beginning of Idaho’s hunting season.

“We go deer hunting in the Salmon area, it’s an open hunt and for the last five years we’ve always gotten our deer,” said Darren Harper, 48, of Jerome who is preparing for an annual week-long hunt with his father. “I like it because of the remoteness, not too many people are back there.”

While wives lament about becoming “hunting widows,” hunters sing a different tune: “It’s game time.”

Big Game

Migratory waterfowl and rifle season for big game is still months out, but opportunities exist for hunting in

the Gem State — deer and elk archery hunts from Aug. 30 to Sept. 30.

“In the big game world, right now it’s all about the archery hunts,” said Idaho Fish and Game Regional Wildlife Manager Randy Smith.

Hunters who didn’t win a permit in one of the few coveted controlled hunts need not worry, as most archery hunts throughout the state are open hunts.

Zone 54, in the South Hills, is especially popular among Magic Valley residents. The area is open to both antler and antlerless hunting and boasts a healthy mule deer population.

“The habitat is fantastic,

because of the precipitation and cooler weather earlier in the season the habitat grew extremely well,” Smith said.

Plentiful habitat means harvested animals should be robust, he said.

Upland Game

This year the opening date for the California and bobwhite quail, chukar and gray partridge season has been pushed back to Oct. 1. Traditionally, the season has opened around mid-September.

“The season will close Jan. 31, as it normally does,” Smith said.

Sharp-tailed grouse has a season running from Oct. 9-Dec. 31, and Smith said hunters often overlook this sporting opportunity.

“In eastern Cassia County ... there is a lot of sharp-tailed grouse habitat and there is a lot of room to hunt,” he said.

Smith said the sharp tails can be found in plentiful numbers; they are fun to hunt and give hunting dogs a great opportunity for sporting work.

“This bird, unfortunately is forgotten,” Smith said. “But it’s worth the drive to head over to that region and give hunting them a try.”

This year, the sage grouse season is from Oct. 1-Oct. 7, with a one-cock daily bag limit.

Game’s Access Yes! program comes into play. The voluntary program enrolls privately owned and permitted property to be openly used by sportsmen.

For early fall hunting, Antelope Springs Ranch’s roughly 15,000 acres gives hunters a way to access prime land filled with mule deer, elk, pheasants, chukars and more. The property is located in Owyhee County.

“The animals on our property run the gambit,” said owner Jared Brackett. “All that we ask is that people treat the land with respect, close gates behind them, and if they see others who are doing things they shouldn’t, take care of it.”

The Seven Dwarfs of Astronomy a Varied Bunch of Celestial Bodies

It was Walt Disney who gave Snow White's seven companions the names we know today. But astronomers have named seven dwarfs in the universe.

The largest astronomical dwarfs are dwarf galaxies, with only a few billion stars (one percent of the Milky Way's). They are either spheres or slightly squashed spheres ("ellipticals"), and are found in swarms around larger galaxies, which occasionally subsume them in acts of galactic cannibalism.

Stars come in dwarf varieties as well. Our own sun, although enormous compared to earth, is a stellar pipsqueak compared to the largest of its kin, and is thus considered a dwarf among "main sequence" (hydrogen-fusing) stars.

The smallest main sequence stars are so tiny that their gravity barely crushes their cores enough to sus-

tain hydrogen fusion. These midget stars glow dull red, and are known as red dwarfs.

Smaller still are the brown dwarfs, midway between stars and planets. They're only distinguished from giant planets by the fact that their cores are just hot enough to sustain deuterium ("heavy hydrogen") fusion — they only glow in the infrared.

Even tinier are the earth-sized remnants of sun-like stars that have exhausted their hydrogen, puffing away their atmospheres to leave their cores exposed.

These white dwarfs possess a stellar mass glowing white-hot, with temperatures as high as 300,000 degrees. Because they are so dense, they cool slowly to become black dwarfs, al-

though no white dwarfs have had time to reach this stage over the universe's 13.7 billion year existence.

The smallest — and most controversial — are dwarf planets, so named after Pluto's reclassification by the International Astronomical Union in 2006. Dwarf planets are, simply put, asteroids large enough that their gravity is strong enough to render them spherical, but too weak to dominate their orbital zone (like planets).

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Black Hills Provide Varied Fishing Opportunities

BLACK HILLS NATIONAL FOREST, S.D. • The brown trout looked the size of some salmon and wore neon colors of a brightness seldom seen without electricity.

Within seconds of Hans Stephenson setting the hook, we knew it would be the fish of a lifetime for most anglers.

As I watched the battle play out, I thought of something Stephenson had said after leaving another stretch of stream with fast action on smaller fish.

“I always feel somewhat spoiled living in the Black Hills,” said Stephenson, a well-traveled angler. “What sets us apart is the variety of trout fishing we have in a small geographic area.”

In a few hours on a recent summer morning, we found waters of quantity and quality a few minutes and miles apart.

We’ll get back to both, especially troutzilla, later.

The Black Hills cover about 1.2 million acres. Though best known for Mount Rushmore, the Crazy Horse Memorial and Custer State Park, the area offers much for anglers.

Clear, cool streams rang-

ing from step-across rivulets to deep, gorgeous lakes and bigger streams are easily found amid the slopes of ponderosa pine and mountain-like peaks.

Some waters are well-stocked for anglers with any equipment who want to do some catch-and-keep fishing.

Stephenson, a guide and

owner of an outfitting store in nearby Rapid City, S.D., prefers long stretches of streams where it’s catch-and-release and artificial lures only. Many such areas are wildfish only. Rugged hikes or long floats aren’t needed.

“You don’t need a drift boat like you do on big western rivers,” he said. “You can just walk and wade most of our streams.”

One of the Black Hills’ most productive quality waters is in an unlikely place.

Desmond Brook, a retired fly-fishing fanatic, has the time to fish the most remote reaches of the Black Hills. Instead, he seldom gets far from his Rapid City home. He estimates there are about 10 miles of quality fishing where Rapid Creek winds through the town.

“Last summer I fished 31 straight days and caught about 20 per trip,” Brooks said. “I usually have it to myself.”

Hundreds of grasshoppers in the vegetation along the knee-deep stream were proof why Brook exclusively fishes grasshopper imitations that he ties himself. His best fishing starts at noon when the bugs begin to get active.

In about an hour, we

caught 10 gorgeous brown trout from about 10 to 14 inches. Twice as many either came unhooked or we missed connecting at the strike.

Traffic noise was a constant as were people on a nearby paved trail. At one point we had to step aside so golfers could pitch to a green across the stream.

On this morning, Stephenson and I hiked a bit along a stream that wound through high-walled canyons well up into the hills.

Once he found the right flies, his prediction of quantity came true. From one pool we caught about 10 rainbows from 8 to 12 inches with a rogue 15-inch mixed in.

Though his time was limited, Stephenson insisted we hit a catch-and-release stretch where he hoped for photo-quality fish to finish the day. His success far exceeded his hopes.

Stephenson spotted a wide stripe of vibrant color tight to a mid-stream boulder. I stepped back and got to watch a good trout fisherman catch a great trout.

It took a few fly changes, but eventually the fight was on and heavily in the big brown’s favor.

Stephenson’s three-weight rod was as limber as a green willow switch and his line’s tippet 3 1/2-pound test. The fly’s size-18 hook was pea-sized and this was the rare fish that seemed to look larger as the fight progressed.

Most of the 20-plus minute battle was a stalemate as the strong fish stayed in the current but patience and good knots eventually began to win.

There were some dicey moments when the brutish fish was within a few yards of heading down some rapids. I caught my breath the four tries it took to get a size-nine fish into a size-three net.

The fish measured 25 inches with depth and width equally large. The tail and belly were blaze orange and red dots and yellows nearly as vibrant. After it swam away, we agreed it was the most impressive brown trout either of us had seen.

As we walked out, I complimented Stephenson on his ability to produce quantity and quality from two spots. “Things don’t always work out that way,” he said.

True, but in the Black Hills another option is always just a few minutes away.

For Fishing, the Right Kayak Makes a Difference

MIAMI • Kayak fishing has many pros and cons.

Pros: It’s a really cheap method of marine transportation.

It’s so quiet you can sneak up on the spookiest of fish.

There are no worries about running aground on the flats.

Cons: You can’t get from spot to spot quickly.

It’s difficult to sight-fish if your craft is too tippy to stand in.

Maybe you don’t want to paddle that hard to catch a fish.

It has been a while since I went kayak fishing, but I got the opportunity recently on a visit to the little burg of Isles of Capri near Naples, Fla. — gateway to the fish-rich shallow waters of the Ten Thousand Islands. It was a great location to explore the benefits and drawbacks of this fast-growing sport.

Our group of five anglers set out from the beach of a small restaurant at mid-morning, paddling various models of Hobie kayaks provided by a local sales representative. Outdoors writer

Jimmy Jacobs of Marietta, Ga., was aboard a Pro Angler — a heavy-duty fishing craft that, at nearly 140 pounds, is more of a boat than a kayak. I got to take the new Hobie Revolution 11 — a 48-pounder with a pedal propulsion system and a rudder that you can steer with your fingertips and strap onto a flats boat. It won an award from the judges at the recently concluded ICAST recreational fishing industry convention in Las Vegas.

The tide was flooding in as we crossed Johnson Bay, aided by a steady west-southwest wind. I had no trouble pedaling into wind and tide and using the rudder to adjust my course; I never even picked up the paddle.

When I neared Johnson Island, I pulled a light spinning rod out of its aft holder and cast a jerkbait.

The pedals allowed me to hold my position while casting toward the shoreline; it would have been impossible to wield rod and paddle at the same time.

On my second cast, I caught and released a small redfish that apparently liked the bait’s watermelon/holographic colors. Nearby, Ja-

cobs caught and released a flounder using something called a Bayou Chub.

Moving to the north side of the island, I made another cast and caught another redfish about the same size as the first. McBride said he had seen a snook flop out of the water but didn’t get a bite.

I continued ahead into the wind and tide, using the rudder to position my kayak for a head-on cast and the pedals to keep from drifting backward. Then I caught and released a third redfish.

I was really starting to like kayak fishing after a

long hiatus.

I was all set to keep going and try for a snook and a trout to complete an inshore slam, but a sudden lightning storm popped up to the southwest. We all saw it bearing down on us and beat a hasty retreat to the launch site, arriving just as the first heavy raindrops hit us. If I had been using just a paddle, I think the storm would have overtaken me. Instead, we all piled into the bar without getting soaked.

Sipping my celebratory drink, I decided that the “pro” list for kayak fishing just got longer.



2 MORE GRIZZLIES CAPTURED AFTER YELLOWSTONE ATTACK

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) • A Yellowstone National Park spokesman says two more grizzly bears have been captured as part of an investigation into last month’s mauling death of a Michigan man.

Park spokesman Al Nash said Wednesday that the adult male bears were captured Sunday in the Hayden Valley area, where 59-year-old John Wallace of Chassell, Mich., was killed on Aug. 25 while hiking alone in the park’s backcountry.

Nash says hair samples were taken from the animals for DNA testing. The bears were fitted with radio collars for tracking and released.

Park officials have said they will kill the bear that mauled Wallace if they can confirm its role through DNA analysis. Another bear captured last week also was released after being radio collared.

The last time the College of Southern Idaho volleyball program was underwhelmed with its ranking before it headed off to Houston, it came back ranked No. 1 in the nation and went on to win the national championship.

Although the sixth-ranked Golden Eagles feel they’re undervalued after a steady 6-2 start to the season, they’re not putting that kind of pressure on themselves as they head to the Patriot Day Tournament for the third straight season.

“We really just worked a lot on implementing our offense this week, and I think we’ve done a good job with that,” said CSI coach Heidi Cartisser. “We’re still working on teaching and getting the freshmen up to speed about what CSI represents and teaching them exactly about how we go about doing it.”

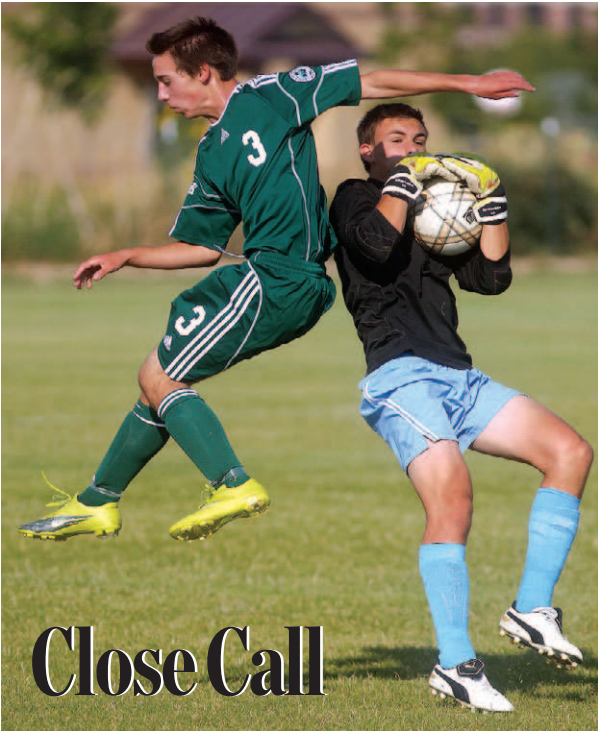
Wednesday’s NJCAA Division I poll had more than a little shakeup to it. No. 1 Western Nebraska remained atop the poll, but Western Wyoming moved up to No. 2 with Salt Lake jumping seven spots to No. 3, despite delivering a handful of less-impressive performances than its Scenic West Athletic Conference rival, which fell a spot from No. 5.

But the poll is a fickle matter – Miami Dade, a perennial power, fell out of the poll altogether, as did three of CSI’s opponents for this weekend: Temple, Panola and Midland, all from Texas. San Jacinto-Central, No. 8 in this week’s poll, is CSI’s other opponent.

Among other quirks, NJCAA regulations dictate that if statistics aren’t delivered to the home office, a team is ineligible for the poll. One of the top 10, Eastern Arizona, is listed as undefeated despite getting straight-settled by CSI last weekend. So the upheaval is to be taken with a grain of salt, according to Cartisser.

Would they like to be back in the top five this time next week?

“We just need to go in and sweep,” Cartisser said. “Our goal is to go in, make our presence known, get four wins and get out.”

Aggie Secession From Big 12 Hits Snag

MONTGOMERY, Ala. • The Southeastern Conference cleared the way for Texas A&M to join its ranks – with a wrinkle.

Baylor is considering suing if the Aggies leave the Big 12.

If and when the legal issues are resolved, the SEC will make the Aggies the league’s 13th team to complete a courtship Texas A&M initiated in July. The potential union announced Wednesday could lead to a massive realignment of the college football landscape, a significant push toward 16-team super conferences.

The SEC was set to become the first BCS conference with more than 12

members. League officials said they received “unanimous written assurance” from the Big 12 on Sept. 2 that the SEC was free to accept Texas A&M. The 12

presidents and chancellors all voted in favor of the addition late Tuesday.

Then the deal hit a snag. “We were notified (Tuesday) afternoon that at least

one Big 12 institution had withdrawn its previous consent and was considering legal action,” said Florida President Bernie Machen, chairman of the SEC leaders. “The SEC has stated that to consider an institution for membership, there must be no contractual hindrances to its departure.”

Big 12 Commissioner Dan Beebe said he “regrets” the confusion.

Beebe sent SEC Commissioner Mike Slive an email Tuesday night – obtained by AP – saying that Baylor had indicated “that its governing board has not waived the university’s rights” to take legal action against the move. He said the SEC must get waivers from each institution. Beebe

Rain washed out the matches for the second straight day at the U.S. Open, creating a logjam in the schedule and a bigger mess in the locker room, where the big-name players questioned the wisdom of putting them out on courts that were still damp thanks to a fine mist that was falling in the morning.

Shortly after they started, play was called, then late in the afternoon, the men were sent home.

Much later, and right after Serena Williams warmed up for her match against Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova, the U.S. Tennis Association finally scrubbed the women’s matches, too, calling everyone back for an 11 a.m. start Thursday, when the weather forecast is every bit as dodgy – an 80 percent chance of rain.

“Right now, it’s our intention to finish the tournament on time,” said tournament director Jim Curley, while acknowledging all the things working against that possibility.

If the weather cooperates, this will be a Grand Slam the likes of which very few of these players have seen. To win, a man on the bottom half of the draw – Nadal,

Roddick or Murray, for example – would need to win four matches in four days. The men on the top of the draw – Roger Federer and Novak Djokovic among them – had their quarterfinal matches postponed and are in for a long haul, as well.

But well before Nadal and Company pondered the weekend, they expressed their concerns about being put in harm’s way. When play was halted, they marched straight into the tournament referee’s office to discuss the situation.

“If you know you’re going to go on court only for 10 minutes, you don’t have to lie to the fans at that point, and you don’t have to lie to the players, too,” said Nadal, the defending champion, who trailed unseeded Gilles Muller 3-0 when play was stopped. “The players knew when we (went) on court that it was still raining, so it was a very strange decision, and we were upset about that.”

had indicated in a Sept. 2 letter that the Big 12 and its members would “waive any and all legal actions” if Texas A&M left — as long as it happened by Thursday.

SEC spokesman Charles Bloom declined further comment on Wednesday.

Texas A&M President R. Bowen Loftin said in a statement the Aggies “are disappointed in the threats made by one of the Big 12 member institutions to coerce Texas A&M into staying in Big 12.

All the legal infighting “has derailed SEC expansion for the moment,” said LSU Chancellor Mike Martin

“Clearly there is instability and a bit of chaos within the Big 12, which we hope will be resolved for the sake of Texas A&M and, indeed, for all of college sports,” Martin said.

Mississippi Chancellor Dr. Dan Jones said the SEC is not willing to get into a domestic dispute between Texas A&M and the Big 12, or wage a court battle for the Aggies.

“It’s in the hands of Texas A&M and the Big 12,” Jones said. “We’ve been clear that we’d be happy to receive them if they’re unfettered of obligations. We gathered to have a vote. We had a letter that clearly gave us legal clearance. It was frustrating to be gathered and then have things pulled out from under Texas A&M like that. We’re disappointed for Texas A&M.”

And there’s a lot of money at stake.

Texas A&M has made it clear it wants a higher profile and more revenue and that the Aggies are unhappy with the creation of the Longhorn Network at rival Texas. And the SEC would also reap additional revenue and extended visibility as a result of a move into the state of Texas.

“You know how many households there are in Texas? 8.9 million,” a person familiar with the situation has told AP previously, adding that the league had to listen when the Aggies came knocking. “Why would we want to hand that to the Pac 12 or any another conference?”

The person said it’s a “business decision” for the SEC.

The Aggies will likely have to pay an exit fee for leaving the Big 12. It cost Nebraska \$9.25 million and Colorado \$6.9 million. But that shouldn’t hold the move up considering the SEC distributed a record \$18.3 million in revenue to each of the 12 members this year.

With that kind of money — and possibly even more to be had — conference realignment across the country could be on the horizon.

Said Tennessee coach Derek Dooley: “The landscape is changing. It’s that old saying: It’s not about the money, it’s about the amount.”

The poaching of schools is already well under way.

Arkansas athletic director Jeff Long told the AP that his school had been contacted about joining the shrinking Big 12 — which has already lost Nebraska (Big Ten) and Colorado (Pac-12). Oklahoma president David Boren said last week that multiple conferences have expressed interest in the Sooners and he expects a decision within a few weeks.

PHOENIX • Oregon went looking for one of the big kids on the playground in its opening game and got punished around.

Star running back LaMichael James had one of the worst games of his career, Oregon had four turnovers and LSU’s big front lines pushed the Ducks around for a second straight loss to an SEC power that had Oregon coach Chip Kelly a bit prickly during the Pac-12 teleconference on Tuesday.

“They have good players, they’re well-coached,” snapped Kelly, whose team dropped nine spots to No. 13 in The Associated Press Top 25 after the loss. “Sometimes the other team deserves credit.”

Kelly wasn’t the only Pac-12 coach feeling a little frustrated after an inaugural weekend that included some disheartening losses, shaky wins and troublesome injuries.

It at least started off well.

Arizona State easily handled UC Davis at home Thursday night and Utah, despite laboring offensively after building a 24-0 lead, beat Montana State by 17. More good news came off the field with the revival of rumors that Texas and Oklahoma were again interested in heading West, re-opening the super conference possibility.

Saturday brought a few good wins.

Stanford, behind Heisman Trophy favorite Andrew Luck, crushed San Jose State in coach David Shaw’s debut, Cal rolled over Fresno State and Arizona, after a shaky second quarter, pulled away to rout Northern Arizona.

The rest of it didn’t go so well.

Headlined by Oregon’s loss to LSU at Cowboys Stadium, it was, for the most part, a Pac-12 plop in its opening weekend.

UCLA couldn’t keep up with Houston, a team it beat last season, and Colorado had its road losing streak extended to 18 games — 19, if you include the 2007 Independence Bowl.

Even some of the wins fell into the not-so-great category.

Washington needed a late interception to hold off FCS Eastern Washington by three, USC labored to beat rebuilding Minnesota by two and Washington State lost quarterback Jeff Tuel for six to eight weeks with a broken collarbone in the Cougars’ 64-21 rollover of Idaho State.

The worst of the weekend, though, came in Corvallis, where Oregon State was stunned by Sacramento State from the Big Sky Conference.

Already too close to a team they were supposed to steamroll, the injury-riddled Beavers lost in overtime when Sac State quarterback Jeff Fleming hit Brandyn Reed for a touchdown pass and found him again when they went for a two-point conversion in the 29-28 win.

“We’ve got a big, big opponent this week and we’ve got to try to find a way to compete to win that game,” Oregon State coach Mike Riley said, talking about this week’s opponent, Wisconsin.

UCLA coach Rick Neuheisel entered the season on the hot seat and last weekend’s loss to Houston likely won’t help.

The Bruins pulled away from Houston last year and knocked out quarterback Case Keenum in the process, but had no answer for him this time around. Playing with a sixth year of eligibility, Keenum picked UCLA apart, throwing for 310 yards and a pair of touchdowns in the Cougars’ 38-34 win.

UCLA also lost quarterback Kevin Prince to a concussion and has a tough schedule coming up, including games against Texas and Stanford.

USC, picked to win the Pac-12 South Division, got record-breaking days from Matt Barkley and Robert Woods, yet still had trouble shaking Minnesota.

NHL's Summer Unimaginably Worse

For the NHL, an already dark summer just became unimaginably worse.

From Anaheim to Montreal, the world's best hockey players struggled Wednesday to comprehend a shocking loss to their sport after a chartered Russian plane carrying the Kontinental Hockey League's Lokomotiv Yaroslavl team crashed, killing several NHL veterans in one of the worst air disasters in sports history.

Many players heard about the accident on their way back to work from summer breaks. Most NHL training camps open next weekend, and every club radiates optimism for the season ahead. But hockey is hurting after an off-season of tragedies and disappointments, including the deaths of three players in a four-month span before the catastrophic crash.

"The hockey world mourns yet again. Please God, we can't take much more," tweeted New York forward Brandon Prust, the former roommate of late Rangers enforcer Derek Boogaard.

Even a glorious, seven-game Stanley Cup series ended ugly with riots in Vancouver when the Canucks lost to the Boston Bruins.

Looting, vandalism and sporadic violence left 140 people injured and resulted in 100 arrests and millions in property damage.

"This has been a terrible summer for the sport all around," said Predators center David Legwand, who played four seasons in Nashville with Karlis Skrastins, a respected NHL veteran killed in the crash. "(Hockey) is a pretty tight-knit family, whether you play in Russia, Switzerland, Finland, Sweden ... it is a tough thing for everybody."

No NHL team was left unscarred by the obliteration of a top club in the KHL, which emerged as Europe's most lucrative league over the past three years, with teams in former Soviet republics competing with the NHL for players mostly from eastern Europe.

In the intertwined world of elite hockey, it's impossible to find two teams without players who share a common playing history, nationality or friendship. Lokomotiv's roster included three-time All-Star Pavol Demitra, a Slovakian who played for five NHL clubs; veteran Belarusian defenseman Ruslan Salei, who met his wife in Anaheim and raised his family in Orange County; and Czech forward

Josef Vasicek, who won the Stanley Cup with Carolina in 2006.

"I am still in disbelief about today's tragic news," said former Avalanche captain Joe Sakic, who played with Skrastins and Salei in Colorado. "Both Karlis and Ruslan were unbelievable individuals and great teammates. They will be sorely missed."

Hockey had been reeling since May 13, when Boogaard died in his apartment in Minneapolis. Three months later the

body of Rick Rypien of the Winnipeg Jets was discovered at his home in Alberta after a police official said a call was answered for a "sudden and non-suspicious" death. Although Rypien had suffered from depression for a decade, his brawling style of play raised additional questions about the mental health of enforcers.

Recently retired player Wade Belak hanged himself in Toronto on Aug. 31, a person familiar with the case told the AP.

Peyton Manning has quarterbacked the Indianapolis Colts every Sunday since Sept. 6, 1998.

He won't this weekend.

Manning will be in street clothes when the team opens the season at Houston, still recovering from neck surgery while Kerry Collins starts in his place.

"It's going to be a little different without Peyton," coach Jim Caldwell said. "He's one of a kind."

The streak is the second longest in history among NFL quarterbacks behind only

Brett Favre, whose 297-game run — 321 including the post-season — ended last season just before he called it a career.

Colts left tackle Anthony Castonzo was 10 years old when Manning's streak began. Veteran center Jeff Saturday has never snapped the ball to another quarterback to start a game during his pro career. In fact, no player on Indy's roster has participated in a regular-season or playoff game for the Colts without No. 18 at the controls.

Giants quarterback Eli Manning, Peyton's younger brother, now holds the longest active streak for a quarterback with 110 starts, including postseason play. He said he had not talked to his brother for a few weeks.

"I know he was dealing with a lot," the younger Manning said. "I don't know how he is feeling and what's going on. I know he wants to be out there. He gave his all and he will give his all to be back out there."

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Twenty years ago Tony Forrester wrote a bridge tip about the power of the closed hand — how declarer can generate tricks if he conceals his assets well. One of my favorite closed-hand stories deals with what I think will be close to a world record when it comes to stealing tricks.

North-South had found their best fit, although a level or two too high, and East had done well to find a takeout double, converted to penalties by West.

As the auction had shown, East was a thoughtful and competent player. But West was a weaker player, and instead of leading the obvious trump against three clubs doubled, he chose a heart. East won this to switch to his singleton club. South took this in dummy and decided to try for a crossruff. Since East was clearly stacked in spades, he led a low spade from dummy, hoping to give East a problem.

Everyone followed in tempo, but South was more than a little surprised to find his six taking the trick! East, who knew that declarer had at most one spade for this line of play, had gone with the percentages, hoping his partner had the spade six so that he could continue the attack on trumps. Unluckily for him, his play allowed declarer not only to steal a spade trick, but also to establish a heart trick. Now a mini-crossruff saw him escape for two down.

ANSWER: Here, your choice is between a double, which is NOT penalties but card-showing (tending to deny spades or you would have bid them yourself) and a call of four no-trump, which would be my choice. That call suggests both minors, and I admit you would be happier with 5-4 pattern. But your weak heart length does suggest that partner has a singleton, so I'd guess five of a minor will play just fine.

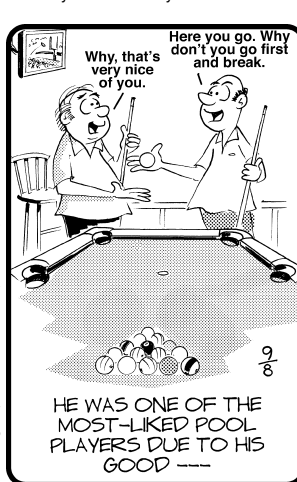

Research has shown that male adoptees struggle with their identity more than females do. After all, in our patriarchal society it is the male surname that most often does not get changed in marriage. Women are accustomed to the fact that they will most likely change their name.

This family needs to do some reading on the subject. There are many resources out there. A family counselor who isn't well-educated about adoption issues will not be helpful.

Unless you walk in an adoptee's shoes you cannot judge their actions. After all, the adoption decision is made without the consent of the child. We also resent being treated like children after we are adults. Noah is a 34-year-old adult able to make his own choices and decisions.

Noah is fortunate that he knows his birth father and didn't have to search a bureaucratic maze to obtain any information. Laws have been passed in several, not all, states allowing adoptees to get important information about their birth families that is necessary for taking care of ourselves and our own children.

DEAR DEBBIE: Your letter reflects the strong sentiments of many adoptees and their families who wrote to me expressing their disappointment in my reply to Noah's adoptive father.

Here are some of their responses:

DEAR ABBY: I am an adoptive parent in an open adoption with our children's birth families, and I vehemently disagree with what you wrote.

My children have two mothers and two fathers. My husband and I are the parents who are raising them, but that slip of paper signed by a judge does not erase their family of origin. It shouldn't. They have an adoptive family and a biological one and should be able to have a relationship with both.

My children also have two names. The names they were given at birth and the names my husband and I gave them when we adopted them as infants. They will always know about these two sets of names. When they are older, if they wish to be called by their birth name, we will have to respect that. It does not mean they love us less or that we are not their parents.

What is DOES mean is that adoption is more complicated than most people realize, and as our children grow into adults, we need to give them the space and freedom to discover for themselves who they are.

DEAR ABBY: I agree with you 100 percent! How horrible, disrespectful and mean-spirited of that 34-year-old son. I understand why he is interested in the family history of his biological father, but he could record that history for the future without changing his current surname. Doesn't Noah realize his biological father was an adult who made up his mind to give up his rights to his son, including the rights to his last name? If Noah doesn't respect his adoptive father for giving him his last name, and if Noah is set on changing his surname, it would be more respectful to take his mother's maiden name as his surname. I hope Noah reconsiders the issue he's creating, and at 34 he makes a wiser adult decision than his biological parent did.
