Looking Back and Ahead, America Remembers 9/11

NEW YORK • Determined never to forget but perhaps ready to move on, the nation gently handed Sept. 11 over to history Sunday and etched its memory on a new generation. A stark memorial took its place where twin towers once stood, and the names of the lost resounded from children too young to remember terror from a decade ago.

In New York, Washington and Pennsylvania, across the United States and the world, people carried out rituals now as familiar as they are heartbreaking: American flags unfurled at the new World Trade Center tower and the Eiffel Tower, and tears shed at the base of the Pentagon and a base in Iraq.

President Barack Obama quoted the Bible and spoke of finding strength in fear. George W. Bush, still new to the presidency that day, invoked the nation-

she will never ever be lost to her family and her friends,” Rhodes said after she read a segment of the list of the dead at ground zero. “Today we honor her by letting go of the sadness over losing her and embracing the joy of having known her.”

It was the 10th time the nation has paused to remember a defining day. In doing so, it closed a decade that produced two wars, deep changes in national security, shifts in everyday life — and, months before it ended, the death at American hands of the elusive terrorist who masterminded the attack.

The anniversary took place under heightened security. In New York and Washington especially, authorities were on alert. Ahead of the anniversary, the federal government warned those cities of a tip about a possible car-bomb plot. Police searched trucks in New York, and streets near the trade center were blocked. To walk within blocks of the site, people had to go through checkpoints.

Americans Gather Across the Country

At churches, we prayed. At fire stations, we laid wreaths. At football stadiums, hands and baseball caps over hearts, we lifted our voices in song and familiar chants of “USA!” — our patriotism renewed once more as we allowed ourselves to go back in time, to the planes and the towers and the panic and the despair, to the memories that scar us still.

On Sunday, the 10th anniversary of the nation’s worst terror attack, Americans remembered — in our own ways, all across the land — a day that is simply impossible to forget.

“Would it be nice not to see the planes fly into the buildings all the time? Yes. But we can honor all the people,” said 37-year-old Lea Pfeifer, who marked the anniversary by participating in a “Freedom

Walk” at Virginia’s Arlington National Cemetery along with her husband and 2-year-old son. “I think we carry that horror with us every day.”

Far from the main ceremonies in New York, Pennsylvania and Washington — on small-town main streets and in courthouse squares, in big-city parks and on state-

house steps — thousands upon thousands gathered to unveil monuments, pledge allegiance and celebrate resilience.

The anniversary was remembered with public gatherings and private ceremonies, with gestures large and small. Facebook profile pictures were changed to

American flags. Online tributes allowed people to recall where they were that morning a decade ago when American life forever changed. Said one in a Yahoo news tweet: “Heard about it in geography class. Saw footage in a piano lesson later — not a note played for the entire hour.”

The nationwide memorials were as distinct as America itself: In Las Vegas, firefighters and police officers ascended the 108-story Stratosphere. In Nashville, Tenn., at a honky-tonk that bills itself as “Hillbilly Heaven,” a five-piece country band played gospel as a goateed

Amid fluttering flags and candle-filled paper bags lining the sidewalks of the city park, Twin Falls’ 9/11 commemoration on Sunday offered a time for reflection and

the expression of gratitude to the people who take up the mantle of protecting the rest of us.

Idaho Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, praised area police, firefighters and medical personnel and spoke of the responders’ bravery in confronting a crisis this summer, when a chaotic Friday morning in July ended with an officer shot, an innocent man dead and a man accused of murder.

“It tied everything into the present day,” Twin Falls resident Mary Coakley said.

Twin Falls City Council to Tackle Utility Rates, Lake Issue

Utility rates, getting rid of city-owned property and a study of water loss at Blue Lakes will all get attention from the Twin Falls City Council today.

The council will meet at 5 p.m., at 305 Third Ave. E., to discuss the

following items:

- Scheduling a Sept. 26 public hearing on proposed utility rate increases. The increase proposals come amid projected city revenue shortfalls without changes. The council won’t vote on any increase today, just decide whether to hold a public hearing.

The city has already cut expenses

and personnel to keep shortfalls down, according to a city memo.

Utility increases under consideration include: 6 percent for water, 8 percent for sewer and a \$3 monthly increase to sanitation rates. For water users, the increase amounts to \$1.99 more per month for an average user who goes

through 18,000 gallons monthly.

- Discussing the disposal of excess city-owned properties. Part of that includes 6.71 acres of canyon rim open space and a 3.59-acre access strip to the developer of the Evel Knievel jump site as part of an agreement in which the developer would give the jump site and access strip to the city.

In all, the city will look at six properties to potentially sell. Any decision would first need a public hearing before making a sale.

- The council will hear a presentation from Brockway Engineering about its “dye tracer” study. The study will show the results of dye tracer tests completed at upper and

MILITARY FUNERALS WITHOUT MOURNERS IN WOOD RIVER VALLEY

Guardsmen take pride in holding ceremonies, even if no one shows up.

HAILEY • While thousands of people gathered across the country Sunday to honor those who fell on 9/11, seven Idaho Army National Guardsmen staged a lonely military ceremony in the Hailey Cemetery.

Only a television news crew and a correspondent for the *Times-News* showed up for the ceremony honoring four Wood River Valley veterans.

“A lot of times families don’t want anything to do with the military so they don’t show,” said Spc. Brendan Bleeker.

The ceremony was the first in the Wood River Valley to provide military funeral honors to those who have not previously been recognized for their service with a military honors funeral.

Such funerals are now required by law, said Bleeker.

This year the Idaho Army National Guard Honor Guard expects to provide such services at more than 1,000 funerals around the state for deceased veterans of World War II, the Korean War and other conflicts, said Col. Tim Marsano. The Idaho Army National Guard has held most of the ceremonies

in Boise.

Sunday’s ceremony honored George Downing Wieman, who served in the Flying Navy in the Panama Canal during World War II; James Henry Hitson, who enlisted in the Navy shortly after the onset of World War II; Lloyd Clayburn Moore, a corporal and assistant platoon sergeant in C Company 92nd Armored Infantry Battalion 6th Armored Division during the 1950s; and Frank A. Stephenson, a World War II veteran who died earlier this year at Blaine Manor.

Staff Sgt. Ulysses Mittelstadt, a Jerome resident who heads up the National Guard Armory in Hailey, played “Taps” on a bugle without performing a single note. The guard has increasingly resorted to using sound recordings as fewer guardsmen know how to play the bugle, he said.

Four others fired a three-round volley, a tradition that dates to the Civil War, said Bleeker. Both the North and South, having suffered a multitude of casualties, would stop in the evening to bury their dead. Afterward, they would shoot the three-round volley to let the other side know they had finished.

Spc. William Kirk said it didn’t bother him that the guard performed the ceremony in the absence of a crowd.

“It’s an honor to do this,” he said. “It shows our respect and gratitude to these men.”

Hundreds Gather at Rupert Square to Remember 9/11

Rupert event pays homage to first responders, those who sacrificed during the 9/11 attacks.

RUPERT • Several hundred Mini-Cassia residents paused in their daily lives Sunday to congregate on the Rupert Square in remembrance of the 9/11 terrorist attacks and to honor the community’s first responders.

“I think it’s really neat that people want to celebrate, but what happened 10 years ago is sad as well,” said Anita Satterwhite, of Heyburn.

A large American flag suspended from the Rupert Fire Department’s ladder truck fluttered in the slight breeze as people lined up for hot dogs, hamburgers and fish wraps, and to donate to the upkeep of the POW/MIA memorial in the park.

“This makes me proud from the tip of my toes to the top of my head,” said Rupert City Councilman Todd McGhie, as he cooked hamburgers and surveyed the crowd. “This is America at its best. Ten years after 9/11 a lot of people have forgotten the sacrifices that were made. These people haven’t forgotten.”

The proceeds from the event will go to help fund the ongoing maintenance of the POW/MIA memorial on the Square.

“I feel sadness,” Rupert Fire Chief Roger Davis said before the patriotic program began. “It’s very sad to remember the sacrifices that were made at Ground Zero

on this day.”

Idaho Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, spoke during the ceremony and said 10 years ago when he realized the country was under attack he had a “sick feeling” as he contemplated all the lives lost and families that would mourn.

“There is no greater sacrifice than to give one’s life to save another,” Cameron said.

Cameron said he also remembers not only the mourning but the sorrow, disbelief, anger and increased patriotism he witnessed in the following days.

Cameron said although the country was wounded, the attackers misjudged America’s response and the country did not weaken or falter, but came together to “cut the head off the snake.”

“Although it took 10 painful years, the world is now safer for our children and grandchildren without (Osama) bin Laden,” Cameron said.

2 FROM T.F. INJURED IN HIGHWAY CRASH

While not comparing the loss of nearly 3,000 lives on 9/11 to the recent shooting and hostage situation in a Twin Falls hotel, Heider’s reference reminded Coakley and others that crises aren’t something only America’s cities experience. The people who live among us as spouses, fathers, mothers, friends and colleagues voluntarily put themselves in harm’s way to help others.

Dave and Janice Degner, of Kimberly, viewed the event as a way to show their appreciation to those responders.

“We still have the respect for our law enforcement officers and EMS people, and it’s still strong,” Janice said.

The 10th anniversary of the terrorist attacks on New York and Washington D.C. was marked in Twin Falls by with speeches, songs, a 21-gun salute and the tolling of a bell for the fallen emergency responders who gave their lives a decade ago. Remarks from other

speakers touched on the sense of shock, grief and resolve to overcome such trials, which soon turned into the sense of pride in the country and for those who serve through the military or domestic security agencies.

“It was very solemn, but patriotic,” Leticia Coronado said after the ceremony. “It’s a way to share this experience with others, because it affected people in different ways.”

preacher talked about 9/11 between songs.

“We can’t avoid the suffering that life brings,” evangelical preacher Ron Blakley said. “But good things can happen on a bad day.”

On this day, there were motorcycle rides in Alaska and California, a blood drive and dog walk in Texas, a Beach Boys concert in Colorado and many more events aptly named to capture the pervading themes surrounding the anniversary. In Grand Prairie, Texas, the First United Methodist Church saluted service members and first responders with a “Spirit of America Musical.” In Cooper City, Fla., the American Legion planned a “Let Us Not Forget” poker run to raise money for care packages for soldiers overseas.

In a small park next to the county courthouse in Bennington, Vt., senior citizens watched from lawn chairs as Boy Scouts presented wreaths and World War II veterans rang the bell of an aircraft carrier four times — one for each attack of Sept. 11, 2001. A monument containing steel from the World

Trade Center was exhibited as one victim’s father spoke to the hundreds gathered, calling for hope over whatever anguish might linger.

“It is easy to look at that piece of steel and despair,” said Don Goodrich, 68, whose son Peter perished when United Airlines Flight 175 hit the south tower of the World Trade Center. “But despair is what Osama bin Laden and those whose follow him want for us. This we must not do.”

In Richmond, Va., Mary Purcell attended a 9/11 remembrance ceremony to represent her mother, who was too overcome with emotions that came flooding back 10 years after her close brush with the attacks. Mary Bannister was headed to the World Trade Center for a meeting when the first plane struck, her daughter said.

“She couldn’t cry that date because she was running for her life,” Purcell said. “This weekend, though, is affecting her greatly. She has shed a lot of tears for the fallen.”

Purcell said the annual 9/11 anniversaries have not had the same effect on her mother as this one.

“It took 10 years to hit home for my mother,” Purcell said. “She saw a lot that day.”

Some, like Georgia firefighter Doug Harms, had never done much to mark the anniversary in years past but felt compelled this time to take part.

Harms chose to organize an event in front of the DeKalb County police and fire headquarters in suburban Atlanta, where several hundred people — including dozens of police officers and firefighters in uniform — gathered for the dedication of a memorial to the first responders who died in the attacks.

A giant flag hung from the extended ladders of two fire trucks served as a backdrop as part of an I-beam from one of the World Trade Center towers — centerpiece of a new sculpture — arrived at the memorial in a motorcade of emergency vehicles. A police officer played bagpipes, the Pledge of Allegiance was led by a retired New York City police officer and volunteer firefighter who survived the collapse of the second tower, and an invocation was delivered by an imam.

“I know that if I’d been in New York that day, I would have been in the towers with them,” said Harms. “Any one of us would have.”

In New Hampshire, Jayne Peck, 53, of Concord, said

she had planned to watch the anniversary services from home on TV but decided Sunday morning to attend a two-hour long ceremony outside the state Capitol instead.

“Just the sense of being here, it’s more real,” she said. “I can’t quite put it into words. I just wanted to be here.”

It was like that for so many — that need to be with others, whether to stand in silence or share memories or find ways to do something that mattered.

To 80-year-old Martha Ann Baird, there was no sweeter sound on this day than that of the hammers and saws used to build seven homes as part of a Habitat for Humanity event in Nashville. She said she couldn’t imagine sitting at home, watching the endless loop of Sept. 11 sadness on television. As she cut a moisture barrier sheet so other volunteers could attach it to the side of a dove-grey home, she said focusing on the future — on building and moving ahead — was a more positive way to commemorate the day.

“We need to be erasing the barriers instead of calling to mind the things that have been divisive,” she said.

The names of the fallen — 2,983 of them, including all the victims from the three Sept. 11 attack sites and six people who died when terrorists set off a truck bomb under the towers in 1993 — echoed across a place utterly transformed.

In the exact footprints of the two towers was a stately memorial, two great, weeping waterfalls, unveiled for the first time and, at least on the first day, open only to the relatives of the victims. Around the square perimeter of each were bronze parapets, etched with names.

Some of the relatives were dressed in funeral suits and others in fire department T-shirts. They traced the names with pencils and paper, and some left pictures or flowers, fitting the stems into the recessed lettering.

At the south tower pool, an acre in area and 30 feet deep, Mary Dwyer, of Brooklyn, remembered her sister, Lucy Fishman, who worked for Aon Corp., an insurance company that occupied seven floors near the very top.

"It's the closest I'll ever get to her again," she said.

One Sept. 11 relative pronounced the memorial breathtaking. An underground section and a museum won't open until next year, but for many of the families, the names were enough.

"It breaks me up," said David Martinez, who watched the attacks happen from his office in Manhattan, and later learned that he had lost a cousin and a brother, one in each tower.

At memorial services, people talked of grief and loss and war and justice. But they also talked of moving forward.

"Every year it becomes more significant," Barbara Gorman said at a service for the Port Authority dead, which included 37 police officers, one of them her husband, Thomas. "My kids are 25, 21, 18. They understand now. It's not so much a tragedy anymore as history, the history of our country."

In the decade between then and now, children have grown. The second-graders who were with Bush on the morning of Sept. 11, 2001, will graduate high school next spring. And children who were in the cradle or the womb on that day are old enough to read names at the anniversary, old enough to bear the full burden of their grief.

"You will always be my hero," Patricia Smith, 12, said of her mother.

Nicholas Gorki remembered his father, "who I never met because I was in my mother's belly. I love you, Father. You gave me the gift of life, and I wish you could be here to enjoy it with me."

Alex Zangrilli said: "Dad, I wish you were here with me to give me advice, to be on the sidelines when I play sports like all the other dads. ... I wish we had more time together."

Madeline Hoffman smiled as she said to her father:

"Everyone always tells me I look and act just like you." And Caitlin Roy, whose father was a firefighter, said: "I want to thank you for the nine years you spent as my dad. They were short but not without their benefits. We're taken care of now. We're happy."

Obama, standing behind bulletproof glass and in front of the white oak trees of the memorial, read a Bible passage after a moment of silence at 8:46 a.m., when the first jetliner slammed into the north

tower 10 years ago.

The president, quoting Psalm 46, invoked the presence of God as an inspiration to endure: "Therefore, we will not fear, even though the earth be removed, and though the mountains be carried into the midst of the sea."

Obama and Bush, joined by their wives, walked up to one of the pools and put their hands to some of the names. Bush later read from a letter that President Abraham Lincoln wrote to a mother believed to have lost five sons in the Civil War: "I pray that our heavenly father may assuage the anguish of your bereavement."

In a ceremony at the Pentagon, Biden paid tribute to "the 9/11 generation of warriors."

"Never before in our history has America asked so much over such a sustained period of an all-volunteer force," he said. "So I can say without fear of contradiction or being accused of exaggeration, the 9/11 generation ranks among the greatest our nation has ever produced, and it was born — it was born — it was born right here on 9/11."

Defense Secretary Leon Panetta paid tribute to 6,200 members of the U.S. military who have died in the Iraq and Afghan wars. One hundred eighty-four people died at the Pentagon.

In Shanksville, Pa., a choir sang at the Flight 93 National Memorial, and a crowd of 5,000 listened to a reading of the names of 40 passengers and crew killed aboard the fourth jetliner hijacked that day a decade ago. Obama and his wife traveled to the Pennsylvania town after their visit to New York and placed a wreath at the memorial.

Across the country and around the world, sporting events paused to remember the 10th anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks. From New Zealand to New York, shows of American spirit were on full display.

NEW YORK • From coast to coast, American flags as large as football fields were unfurled inside stadiums and fans of all ages sang the national anthem with gusto Sunday in a red-white-and-blue observance of the 10th anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks and start of the country’s most popular sport: the NFL.

Robin Berretta, wearing a blue Giants No. 27 Brandon Jacobs jersey, traveled from New York to Landover, Md., for the game at the Washington Redskins. Some of her friends suggested she shouldn’t attend.

“Everyone’s very paranoid,” Berretta said. “And they’re not even from New York.”

She was unfazed, saying, “I even took the Metro.”

In presentations relayed to video screens around the league, “Taps” was played from Shanksville, Pa., where one of the hijacked jets crashed a decade earlier, and Arlington National Cemetery. A recorded message from actor Robert DeNiro was broadcast on videoboards reminding fans that “we honor those brave men and women by continuing to show our unity and strength as a country.”

NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell marked the day in Landover, where he spoke to FOX from the sidelines of the Giants-Redskins game.

“We remember our great country and the people that died in this tragic incident, the first responders and their families and all the people that kept our country safe,” he said. “This is a chance for everyone to come together and feel great about our country, the sacrifices so many people have had and what we all have in front of us. We’ve got a lot to be proud of.”

Reminders of the changes wrought by that sorrowful day were apparent outside MetLife Stadium in East Rutherford, N.J., where every car entering the parking lots for the Jets-Cowboys game was checked by New Jersey State Troopers with

bomb-sniffing dogs.

“It shows they’re not taking any of this lightly,” said Lee Loughridge from Mount Arlington, N.J. “I’m glad they’re doing it. This is serious. We knew there would be delays, so we just came early and didn’t have to worry.”

Jets players wore navy blue T-shirts during warmups with the words “Never Forgotten” on the back.

“Actually, I would’ve felt uncomfortable if I hadn’t seen all the security here today,” said Lamar Williams, from Paterson, N.J.

Former President George W. Bush praised the rescue workers of that day in a televised pregame show segment prior to the openers.

No. 4 Boise State (1-0) opened its season in Atlanta on Sept. 3 without senior safety Cedric Febis, sophomore receiver Gerald Boldewijn and sophomore defensive tackle Ricky Tjong-A-Tjoe.

The school announced the day before its opener against Georgia that the three players from Amsterdam faced NCAA eligibility problems. All three played their senior seasons in Boise high schools before signing with Boise State.

“We don’t have any new news for the Amsterdam kids, we’re hoping we’ll know something soon,” Petersen said while opening his weekly news conference. “I’m like you guys, I check every day.

“I know we’re going to know more (this week).”

Febis was slated to be one of Boise State’s starting safeties and Boldewijn was expected to be one of Kellen Moore’s primary targets. Tjong-A-Tjoe had 6.5 tackles for loss in a backup role in 2010.

Don’t let Hagerman’s youth fool you: The Pirates may only have five seniors on the team, but they’re scary good. Hagerman can throw the ball when needed, and on Friday it ran the ball practically at will, totaling nearly 450 yards on the ground. Carey is (still) the team to beat in Class 1A Division II: It doesn’t seem to matter what players the Panthers put out there, they just keep winning football games. They’ve gone 62-8 the previous six seasons, with playoff appearances in each of those seasons and three state titles. What’s more, at 3-0 they’re one of just two unbeaten in their classification after two full weeks of play. Six mooted contenders already have a combined 12 losses.

Texans Paste Manning-less Colts

HOUSTON • The Indianapolis Colts were lost without Peyton Manning on Sunday.

Matt Schaub threw for 220 yards and a touchdown, Ben Tate rushed for 116 yards and another score in relief of injured Arian Foster, and the Texans dominated Kerry Collins, Manning's replacement, in a 34-7 victory.

The Texans looked like they're finally ready to take over the AFC South.

Manning, the four-time MVP, didn't travel with the team to Houston as he recovers from his third neck surgery in the past 19 months. His streak of 227 consecutive starts, including playoffs, came to an end.

The 38-year-old Collins was lured out of retirement less than three weeks ago to take a crash course in the offense. He fumbled on consecutive snaps that set up Texans touchdowns in the first quarter, and was sacked three times. The Colts mustered only 236 yards and 15 first downs against Houston's 3-4 defense guided by new coordinator Wade Phillips.

JETS 27, COWBOYS 24 EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. • Nick Folk kicked a 50-yard field goal with 27 seconds left, giving the New York Jets the win in the final game of the NFL's first full Sunday with the commemoration of the 10-year anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks as an emotional backdrop.

Dallas had never before lost a game when leading by 14 points in the fourth quarter (240-1-1).

RAVENS 35, STEELERS 7 BALTIMORE • Joe Flacco threw three touchdown passes, Haloti Ngata led an inspired defense that forced a team-record seven turnovers, and Baltimore easily beat the defending AFC champions.

Ray Rice ran for 107 yards and scored twice for the Ravens, who bolted to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter and never let up against their bitter rivals. It was a rematch of a second-round playoff matchup last January, when the Steelers rallied to beat Baltimore 31-24.

BEARS 30, FALCONS 12 CHICAGO • Brian Urlacher had an interception and returned a fumble for a touchdown, Jay Cutler threw for 312 yards and two scores and Chicago sacked Atlanta's Matt Ryan five times.

In a matchup of reigning division champions, Urlacher picked off Ryan to set up an early 56-yard TD catch by Matt Forte, and in the third quarter the linebacker

The Eagles had 239 yards rushing and were 8 for 11 on third downs. The defense applied constant pressure and piled up five sacks, two by Justin Babin. Darryl Tapp forced a fumble by Sam Bradford that led to a 56-yard touchdown return by Juqua Parker.

BILLS 41, CHIEFS 7 KANSAS CITY, Mo. • Ryan Fitzpatrick threw four touchdown passes, two of them to journeyman tight end Scott Chandler, and Buffalo romped to victory.

Fitzpatrick finished with 208 yards passing for the Bills, who hadn't score 40 points in an opener since a 40-7 victory over the Los Angeles Rams on Sept. 6, 1992.

Stafford threw for 305 yards and three touchdowns to help Detroit to its fifth consecutive victory dating to the final month of the 2010 season.

Divided We Legislate

I am saddened by what I heard when I was home for the August congressional recess. The American people are fed up with finger-pointing, blame games and infighting by all of us in Washington — the president, Congress and the media.

They are angry and frustrated, and they want Congress to do its constitutional duty. Only 12 percent think we are doing a proper job. It is easy to see why the public is losing confidence in the federal government.

In our debates over the fiscal 2011 spending bill and the debt limit, Congress put off its duties until the eleventh hour in favor of partisan squabbling and stubborn political games. I am ashamed of our performance — of us all, on both sides of the aisle. As a member of Congress who takes pride in this institution and holds its history and procedures in high regard, I am deeply disappointed by the unwillingness of members of all parties to come together for the common good.

Our Founding Fathers intended no parties when they created this institution. And until recently, members took the time to stay in Washington and learn the substance of issues, as well as the rules laid out by our forefathers in the Constitution and by previous generations in Congress. We learned how to draft good, bipartisan bills. Most members of Congress wouldn't remember, and for many Americans this may seem hard to believe, but there was a time not so very long ago when Republicans and Democrats worked well together. We worked long hours, typically five days a week or more for months at a time. Members of both parties came to the table ready to work, debate and negotiate.

For many years, legislation was drafted from the middle, and we passed bipartisan bills frequently. It wasn't uncommon for an important bill to get 400-plus votes; we didn't stop just because we had 218. Members didn't engage in partisan misbehavior for the sake of a good Twitter hit or the opportunity to call out the other side on cable news. Rather, members had respect for one another and for the political spectrum. They man-

aged to limit outside parties from disrupting the legislative process for political gain.

We in Congress are tearing our country apart and weakening the foundation established by great leaders before us. Is anyone in Congress truly proud that we have not produced a budget? That we caused the downgrading of U.S. government securities, as well as appalling disorder and confusion in financial markets? Or that this situation caused the lack of job creation and economic growth that has contributed to the hopelessness and misfortune of millions of Americans?

This partisan viciousness needs to stop. I am ashamed of our recent record. I am disgusted with our performance, Republican and Democratic alike. There has been failed leadership and, worse, failed following within the ranks — and we owe the country far better. In our most combative moments, we must remember that no cause is greater than this institution and the ideals on which it was founded; no single man or woman is greater than this body and the collective wisdom we are capable of exhibiting. If we hold on to that core principle, we can make changes that will be better for Congress as an institution and for the American people.

We must all help this body improve and call upon our colleagues to join in doing better. It is our duty. If we do not, the people, in their righteous and justified outrage, will get rid of us all — as well they should. I beg my friends in Congress and the administration to put the interests of this great nation before partisan political interests and not let the rivalries of the past prevent us from acting in ways that will better the future of our nation.

There is no magic way to swiftly create jobs or to ease the interconnected problems of unprecedented long-term unemployment, unacceptable levels of overall unemployment and stubbornly stagnant economic growth. The era of the trillion-dollar stimulus is over. Indeed, the wisdom of another massive stimulus package has to be considered in the context of the mounting national debt and accompanying concern about whether leaders will ever summon the political will to address it.

But the shaky state of the economy, the need to at least avoid making it worse by too-quick fiscal contraction and the evident human

toll of the crisis all counsel in favor of some significant action along the lines of the president's proposal.

Mr. Obama's package totals \$447 billion — what used to be big money before the even larger 2009 stimulus bill. The president said that, unlike in 2009, that amount would have to be offset with savings down the road, and he promised to provide details next week when he outlines his debt reduction plan to the new congressional supercommittee. It will be essential to see not only how the president proposes to pay for the package but how he envisions making certain that those savings materialize.

The centerpiece, accounting for about half the spending, is prolonging and increasing this year's payroll tax cut for individuals and extending it to businesses. This tax break would be unaffordable on any continuing basis, but with con-

sumer demand so weak, it could encourage both spending and hiring. Will workers spend every penny of their tax savings? No, but history suggests enough will to make the cut worth trying. Will employers pocket the savings or use them to create jobs? Would those be jobs that would have been created anyway? Some almost certainly would have been. But the marginal benefit in a low-growth economy might be worth the cost.

A tax cut to individuals and employers ought to be the part of the president's program that Republicans are most likely to support. The president also seeks another extension in the duration of unemployment insurance, which is appropriate given the increase in the ranks of the long-term unemployed, but he would couple this extension with reforms that would allow unemployed workers to use their benefits to gain work

experience or start businesses.

The remainder of the package involves speeding planned infrastructure spending, sending money to state and local governments to avoid layoffs of teachers and first responders, and similar efforts. We are most enthusiastic about the infrastructure proposal, because it would accelerate spending that would have happened anyway and because the nation's deteriorating roads and other facilities are such an obvious target for investment.

Mr. Obama's package stands almost no chance of passage in the form he proposes. But if combined, as promised, with a serious debt reduction outline next week, it offers the plan that congressional Republicans have been demanding. It sets the stage for an important debate this fall — and quite probably during the months of campaigning to follow.

The system today is only interested in psychoanalyzing and socializing children. It no longer fulfills any expectations that children be

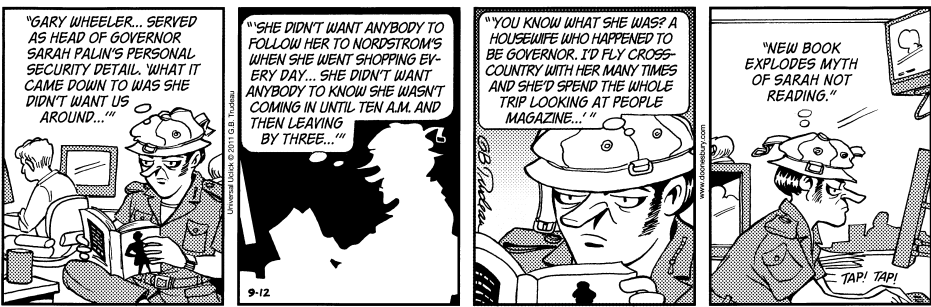

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ONE DEAD, TWIN FALLS WOMAN INJURED IN MOTORCYCLE CRASH

Expect Jobs Deal ‘Yes’ on Tax Cuts

WASHINGTON • The real takeaway from President Barack Obama’s jobs agenda?

Workers probably can count on continuing to pay lower Social Security taxes. Employers may not have to pay as much, either. The long-term unemployed probably will keep drawing jobless benefits. Congress can be expected to ratify new trade agreements with South Korea, Colombia and Panama.

But don’t expect Congress to funnel tens of billions of dollars into rebuilding schools and blighted neighborhoods, or helping local governments pay teachers and firefighters, or setting up an “infrastructure bank” to leverage federal loans for roads, water systems and other public works projects.

“Enough of the stimulus,” House Majority Leader Eric Cantor, R-Va., said Friday on CNBC. “We can’t afford to keep spending money we don’t have.”

Republicans who control the House quickly dismissed anything smacking of “stimulus” in Obama’s proposed American Jobs Act after his speech Thursday night. They embraced tax cuts for businesses, changes to unemployment insurance and promises to cut the red tape that delays construction projects.

They appear poised to accept, albeit grudgingly, extending this year’s Social Security payroll tax cut for workers and including in it the Social Security taxes paid by employers, despite doubts in GOP ranks and among economists that the tax cut has done much to boost the economy.

“Republicans are not for increasing taxes,” Cantor told reporters.

Last December, Congress passed a one-year cut in Social Security taxes, reducing the rate for workers from 6.2 percent to 4.2 percent for 2011. Employers still pay the 6.2 percent rate, which is applied to wages up to \$106,800.

Obama proposes to extend the tax cut for a year and make it bigger, reducing the Social Security taxes paid by workers to 3.1 percent for 2012. He’s also now proposing to extend the payroll tax cut to businesses on the first \$5 million of their payroll. About 98 percent of companies have payrolls below the \$5 million threshold, according to the White House.

Extending and enlarging the payroll tax cuts costs \$240 billion.

Obama urged lawmakers to “pass this jobs plan right away.” But he left the responsibility for paying for the \$447 billion plan to a special bipartisan House-Senate panel created to reducing deficits by at least \$1.2 trillion over the coming decade. The panel’s top Republican wasn’t happy about it.

“This proposal would make the already arduous challenge of finding bipartisan agreement on deficit reduction nearly impossible, removing our options for deficit reduction for a plan that won’t reduce the deficit by one penny,” said Rep. Jeb Hensarling, R-Texas. “It’s not the role of this

7 oil workers found alive in Gulf of Mexico:

Seven of 10 oil workers missing in the Gulf of Mexico were found alive Sunday, according to Mexico’s state oil company, three days after evacuating their disabled rig in a tropical storm and escaping in an enclosed life raft. Two bodies also were found but have yet to be identified, and rescuers are still searching for one worker who remains missing, Petroleos Mexicanos, or Pemex, said in a statement.

Libya fighters’ push stalled by Gadhafi troops:

Fierce resistance by Moammar Gadhafi loyalists entrenched in two strongholds has stalled the rebels’ final push for complete control over Libya. Three weeks after the fall of Tripoli appeared to herald the end of Libya’s brutal civil war, the protracted battle over the loyalist bastions of Bani Walid and Sirte, Gadhafi’s hometown, has dashed hopes of a speedy “declaration of liberation” that would start the clock ticking on a transition to democracy.

Bomb at U.S. Base Reminder of Raging War in Afghanistan

KABUL, Afghanistan • A powerful Taliban truck bomb that wounded 77 American soldiers and killed five Afghans outside a combat outpost served as a reminder on Sunday that 10 years after the Sept. 11 attacks, nearly 100,000 U.S. troops are still fighting a war that shows no signs of slowing down.

No U.S. troops were killed when the massive bomb loaded on a truck filled with firewood exploded Saturday night just outside the gates of Combat Outpost Sayed Abad in eastern Wardak province. NATO said a protective barrier at the entrance absorbed most of the force of the blast, although the area outside the base was hit hard.

Officials said the Afghans

killed included a policeman and four civilians, including a 3-year-old girl. Another 17 Afghans — 14 civilians and three policemen — were wounded. The provincial governor said the blast was so powerful it damaged about 100 shops in the near-

by Sayed Abad bazaar.

Although Saturday’s truck bombing occurred outside the base, the number of injuries it caused was significant. Combat outposts usually house about 200 troops.

The Taliban claimed re-

sponsibility for the attack. Earlier, they had issued a statement vowing to fight until all foreign troops leave. The radical Islamic movement, which gave shelter to Osama bin Laden and al-Qaida when it ruled Afghanistan, also stressed that it had no role in the Sept. 11 attacks, and it accused the U.S. of using them as a pretext to invade the country.

“The Afghans have an endless stamina for a long war,” the statement said. “Through a countrywide uprising, the Afghans will send the Americans to the dustbin of history like they sent other empires of the past.”

The attack occurred just over 40 miles or about an hour’s drive, from Kabul in an increasingly lawless district in a key province that controls a strategic approach to the capital.

World Shares in Painful Remembrance of Sept. 11

PARIS • An American expatriate in Paris cries over an indelible memory of sadness. Buglers play taps from Brussels to Bagram, Afghanistan. An Israeli retiree remembers her daughter: “My world was destroyed. For me, every day is Sept. 11.”

The world’s leaders and citizens reflected Sunday on the 10th anniversary of the terror attacks that were directed at the United States, but claimed the lives of people from more than 90 countries.

The pain extends from New York to the suburbs of Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, where Pathmawathy Navaratnam wakes up every day and wishes “good morning” to the son she lost in the World Trade Center attacks.

“He is my sunshine. He has lived life to the fullest, but I can’t accept that he is not here anymore,” she said of Vi-

jayashanker Paramsothy, a 23-year-old financial analyst. “I am still living, but I am dead inside.”

Mostly somber commemorations stood out against pockets of protest and claims that the attacks were a government conspiracy rather than the work of the al-Qaida terrorist network. The Taliban, which gave refuge to al-Qaida leader Osama bin Laden when they ruled Afghanistan, denied any role

in the Sept. 11 attacks on the same day one of their suicide bombers killed five Afghans and injured many more people, including 77 U.S. soldiers.

Pope Benedict XVI, at an outdoor Mass in Ancona, Italy, prayed for victims and urged the world to resist what he called the “temptation toward hatred” and instead work for solidarity, justice and peace.

On a square overlooking the Eiffel Tower in Paris, hundreds turned out for a ceremony at two nine-story scaffolding towers erected as makeshift replicas of the twin towers — with “The French will never forget” written on them. Children released doves in the air to symbolize peace.

MILITARY JETS SAFELY ESCORT FLIGHT TO NYC

NEW YORK • Two fighter jets escorted a Los Angeles-to-New York American Airlines flight after three passengers locked themselves in a bathroom Sunday, the 10th anniversary of the Sept. 11 attacks, officials said.

A law enforcement official said it wasn’t thought to be terrorism, and American Airlines spokesman Tim Smith said, “In our eyes, it’s a big nothing.”

The North American Aerospace Defense Command scrambled two F-16 jets to shadow Flight 34 until it landed safely at New York’s Kennedy Airport at 4:10 p.m. Sunday, the Transportation Security Administration said in a statement.

The nature of the incident was unclear, but the passengers locked themselves in a bathroom and were still inside when the plane landed, the law enforcement official said. The official was not authorized to speak publicly and

spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity.

Law enforcement met the flight and will interview passengers, the TSA statement said. The FBI responded to the airport.

Passenger Steven Ciobo said nothing seemed amiss until he saw police lights on the runway after the plane landed. He looked out the window while still in flight and didn’t notice anything.

“To be honest, none of us suspected anything,” said Ciobo, who works for Australia’s Parliament, adding he got up at one point for the bathroom and noticed a long line but didn’t think twice and sat back down.

When the plane landed, he said, the airline workers told them to remain

committee to spend more money we don't have on jobs we don't get."

The White House promises to send up soon a list of ideas on how to pay for it all.

Republicans also have qualms about the almost \$50 billion cost of extending for one more year a jobless benefits program that allows up to 99 weeks of benefits for the long-term unemployed and covers about 5 million laid-off workers. But GOP leaders may go along with the idea after Obama embraced reforms, such as expanding to other states a Georgia program that uses unemployment funds for on-the-job training.

"I don't think they want a fight over that," said Jack Howard, a GOP lobbyist.

Republicans are enthusiastic about ratifying Obama-backed trade deals with South Korea, Colombia and Panama. They say the lowered trade barriers would help businesses and create jobs.

The pacts are snagged over renewing expanded aid and job training for workers who lost their jobs because of foreign competition. That aid is a core demand of Democrats who are unenthusiastic about the trade deals. While Republicans have promised to allow votes on the trade assistance, they haven't guaranteed it would pass.

Still, with both Obama and Republicans supporting the trade deals, they probably will win Senate and House ratification by year's end.

Cantor and other House Republicans also support initiatives aimed at small businesses. One would extend past its scheduled January expiration a tax break that allows companies to treat the cost of new equipment as a fully deductible business expense instead of an asset whose value declines with age.

They may be sympathetic to Obama's initiatives to award tax credits to companies that hire veterans or the long-term unemployed.

"We are always for lowering taxes, incentivizing the growth of business," said Rep. Marsha Blackburn, R-Tenn. "We're going to be looking for opportunities to cut taxes to stimulate the growth of small business and jobs creation."

TEXAS FIRE DESTROYS 1,554 HOMES, 17 PEOPLE MISSING

BASTROP, Texas • Drawn to the quaint Central Texas town of Bastrop by the promise of life in a quiet, wooded area, Frank Davis moved into his new home two Saturdays ago. The next day, he and his wife evacuated when a monster wildfire moved in.

Now, there's nothing left.

"The fire was so hot, there are even panes of glass that melted," said Davis, a 47-year-old home remodeler who came to Bastrop from Austin, about 30 miles away. "It's all gone."

The number of homes destroyed by a still-raging wildfire here rose on Sunday to 1,554 and will increase further as emergency crews enter areas where the blaze has been extinguished. Seventeen people

remain unaccounted for, but officials believe they could simply be out of town.

Bastrop County officials joined by Democratic U.S. Rep. Lloyd Doggett sought to provide new information to hundreds of residents evacuated a week ago, when blustering wind whipped up by Tropical Storm Lee swept across parched, drought-stricken Texas — helping to spark more than 190 wildfires statewide that killed four people.

The worst of the fires is the one in Bastrop that has consumed more than 34,000 acres.

Crews have now contained more than 50 percent of the blaze, paving the way for people to begin returning home and trying to rebuild their lives from the remains of the smoldering rubble.

For Davis, a first-time homebuyer who paid cash and moved in without insurance, that means living in a mobile

home on his charred property while he rebuilds. In the meantime, he and his wife are staying with relatives.

"I do intend to stay," he said.

Davis saw his property when a sympathetic police officer let him slip into an otherwise inaccessible area so he could catch a glimpse of his land.

Others who were forced to evacuate have not yet had that opportunity. Many still don't know what became of their homes.

Beginning Monday, county officials will begin allowing them to slowly re-enter scorched areas as authorities ensure the land has properly cooled and hotspots are extinguished. Some were given only minutes to evacuate as the raging blaze surrounded homes and neighborhoods. Some had time to gather a few important belongings, others fled with only the clothes on their back.

even after 10 years."

At Bagram Air Field near Kabul, the Afghan capital, about 500 soldiers gathered around a construction beam from the World Trade Center for a memorial ceremony. It was briefly interrupted by a reminder of war when a fighter jet buzzed closely overhead.

"We serve today in Afghanistan so our children will not have to fight this evil tomorrow — so that they may live their lives without fear of terrorism or religious extremism," said Maj. Gen. Daniel Allyn, the U.S.-led coalition's commander for eastern Afghanistan.

At NATO's headquarters in Brussels, a French soldier played taps and the flags of 28 alliance states were lowered to half-staff as a tribute to the victims. About 130,000 NATO troops — two-thirds of them Americans — now serve in Afghanistan. More than 2,700 service members have died in that war.

World leaders made gestures of solidarity from Spain, where Prince Felipe attended a commemorative planting of 10 American oak trees, to Kyrgyzstan, where President Roza Otunbayeva spoke at a U.S. air base that offers vital support to coalition forces in Afghanistan.

"This tragedy consolidated humanity and brought it together in the fight against the common enemy of terrorism," Otunbayeva said.

Kindness was remembered along with the suffering in eastern Canada, where communities gave shelter to thousands of international air passengers stranded after the attacks forced the U.S. to

shut down air travel. Gander, Newfoundland, hosted about 6,600 passengers — nearly one per resident.

"You affirmed our faith in the goodness of people. You were the best of us," U.S. Ambassador David Jacobson said at a memorial service where Gander Mayor Claude Elliott accepted two steel beams from the trade center.

"Good can outfight evil any time," Elliott said. "Human kindness and love and compassion are what our world is lacking today. We need more of it."

In Japan, the anniversary of the attacks was overshadowed by the six-month anniversary of the earthquake and tsunami that killed some 20,000 people, but it was not forgotten. Both tragedies were remembered in the battered northeastern city of Ishinomaki, where a damaged replica of the Statue of Liberty stood above candles lit in honor of tsunami victims.

A dozen Japanese workers were among the 23 Fuji Bank employees who never made it out of their World Trade Center office. In Tokyo, loved ones paid their respects Sunday, laying flowers in front of a small section of ground-zero steel before clasping their hands and bowing their heads.

At least 35 victims were from the Dominican Republic alone, Foreign Minister Carlos Morales Troncoso said. At a diplomatic event in Santo Domingo, he spoke of the heroism of police officers, firefighters, and doctors and said the world saw "the worst of humanity but also the best of humanity" that day.

In a forest outside Jerusalem, where a bronze

sculpture of the American flag stands in memory of the 9/11 victims, 65-year-old retiree Miriam Avraham remembered her daughter Alona, who was on board United Airlines Flight 175 when the plane plowed into the South Tower of the World Trade Center.

"Sept. 11 is everything," said Avraham, who wore a photograph of her smiling, 30-year-old daughter pinned to her shirt. "My daughter was killed. My world was destroyed. For me, every day is Sept. 11."

In Manila, dozens of former shanty dwellers in one neighborhood offered roses, balloons and prayers for another victim, U.S. citizen Marie Rose Abad. It used to be squalid and reeking of garbage. But in 2004, her Filipino-American husband, Rudy, built 50 brightly colored homes, fulfilling his late wife's wish to help impoverished Filipinos. The village has since been named after her.

As some remembered the dead, others railed against the U.S. response to the attacks and claimed the government itself was involved.

In Pakistan, where U.S. forces killed bin Laden in May, demonstrators chanted and held up banners that repeated conspiracy theories alleging American or Israeli involvement in the Sept. 11 attacks. The largest of the protests, organized by an Islamist political party, drew about 100 people.

Outside the U.S. Embassy in London and close to a memorial ceremony, a few dozen protesters shouted "USA terrorists!" Some brandished posters condemning the wars in Iraq and

Fire Officials: 18 Homes Destroyed in Wash. Blaze

GOLDENDALE, Wash. (AP) • Eighteen homes have burned in a blaze moving through dry forests near Washington state's Satus Pass and that number could increase, officials said Sunday.

The fire has burned through more than 6 square miles about 20 miles north of the Columbia River and about 12 miles northeast of city of Goldendale since last Wednesday. The 4,250-acre fire is 30 percent contained as of Sunday.

"Things are going very well. The winds have been very calm, which has been very helpful," fire spokesman Guy Gifford said Sunday afternoon. "The fire is doing what it's supposed to be doing."

Winds forecasted for late Sunday and early Monday could change the situation, and crews were working Sunday to establish a 50-foot perimeter around the fire's edge. More than 800 firefighters have been called across the state to help.

Kenya Police: Briton Killed, Wife Kidnapped

NAIROBI, Kenya • Armed men shot dead a British man and kidnapped his wife from a beach resort in northern Kenya near the border with lawless Somalia, officials in the East African nation said Sunday.

Police Commissioner Mathew Iteere said Sunday that the couple arrived at the resort Saturday after visiting Kenya's Masai Mara reserve. He said they were the resort's only guests.

Other sources said they were staying at the Kiwayu Safari Village resort about 30 miles (about 50 kilometers) north of the island resort of Lamu.

Iteere said attackers were able to enter their dwelling easily as the door was just a piece of colorful cloth hanging from a rod. He said police believe the husband resisted and was shot.

Iteere said the attackers took the woman away by boat. He did not say where the attackers may have been from.

A Kenyan security official said a policeman arrived at the scene and saw six men carrying away the woman. He didn't shoot out of fear she could be hurt. The official spoke on condition of anonymity as he said he wasn't authorized to speak to journalists.

Britain's Foreign Office confirmed the attack in a statement and said they are working closely with Kenyan officials.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNTY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO, AMENDING TITLE 7, CHAPTER 2, BY ADOPTING TWIN FALLS COUNTY CODE TITLE 7, CHAPTER 2 SUBSECTION 3, WHICH ESTABLISHES THE REQUIREMENT OF ADDRESSING FOR STATE HIGHWAYS WITHIN TWIN FALLS COUNTY, IDAHO AND REPEALING ALL CODE SECTIONS OR PARTS THEREOF IN CONFLICT HEREWITH, ESTABLISHING SEVERABILITY AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Twin Falls County, Idaho, deems it necessary to protect and promote the public health, safety and community welfare of Twin Falls County; and

WHEREAS, the Twin Falls County Board of Commissioners anticipates the need to establish the requirement to provide accurate and consistent addresses with regards to State Highways within Twin Falls, County.

WHEREAS, a draft of this ordinance, was considered by the Twin Falls Board of County Commissioners at a duly noticed public hearing on the 3rd day of August, 2011.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF TWIN FALLS COUNTY, IDAHO:

Twin Falls County Code Title 7 Chapter 2 is hereby adopted as follows:

7-2-3: REQUIREMENTS:

A. The Twin Falls County Board of County Commissioners adopt the grid address system and do hereby require each and every residence and/or business to have assigned a proper grid address and the number is to be posted on the property attached as close as possible to the main driveway entrance of the property where it will be visible from the road.

B. State Highways within Twin Falls County will be addressed using mile post markers with respect to US Highway 30, 50, 74, and 93. Every residence and/or business to have assigned a proper address and the number is to be posted on the property attached as close as possible to the main driveway entrance of the property where it will be visible from the road.

7-2-4 Severability:

The ordinance is hereby declared to be severable. ORDINANCE NO. 221

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING STANDARDS AND PROCEDURES FOR APPEALS OF DECISIONS OF THE PLANNING AND ZONING COMMISSION AND THE PLANNING AND ZONING ADMINSTRATOR RELATING TO ZONING PERMITS AND USES, PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY AND REPEALING CHAPTER 3 SECTION 9 APPEALS AND ANY OTHER PROVISIONS THAT CONFLICT WITH THIS ORDINANCE AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Twin Falls County, Idaho, deems it necessary to protect and promote the public health, safety and community welfare of Twin Falls County. WHEREAS, the Twin Falls County Board of Commissioners anticipates the need to provide for appeals of decisions by the Planning and Zoning Commission, and Zoning Administrator, WHEREAS, a draft of this ordinance was considered by the Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Commission at a duly noticed public hearing on the 12th day of July, 2011.

WHEREAS, a draft of this ordinance, and the recommendation of the Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Commission was considered by the Twin Falls Board of County Commissioners at a duly noticed public hearing on the 25th day of August, 2011.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF TWIN FALLS COUNTY, IDAHO:

The Board of County Commissioners of Twin Falls County, Idaho hereby adopts the following as Twin Falls County Code Title 8 Chapter 20 Appeals:

8.20.1 Purpose:

The Purpose of this ordinance is to establish standards and procedures for appeals of the decisions of the Planning and Zoning Commission and Planning and Zoning Administrator including, but not limited too; conditional or special use permits, animal feeding operations, variances, subdivisions, and home occupations. "Commission" herein refers to the Planning and Zoning Commission and "Board" herein refers to the Board of County Commissioners

8.20.101 Decisions that may be appealed:

A. Administrator Decisions: A final determination or decision by the Administrator on the issuance of a permit or certificate, or on the interpretation of any provision of this Ordinance may be appealed to the Board. Upon request of an applicant, the Administrator will make the final decision in writing, providing the date of, and reasons for, the final decision.

B. Commission Decisions: A final decision of the Commission, including, but not limited to, an animal feeding operation, variance, preliminary subdivision plat, Conditional or Special Use permit may be appealed to the Board.

8.20.102 Appeals: Who may file

A. A determination or decision of the Administrator may be appealed by the applicant or by any other affected person(s). An affected person as used herein shall mean one having an interest in real property which may be adversely affected by the decision or determination made. (Idaho Code Section 67-6521).

B. A final decision of the Commission may be appealed by the applicant or any other affected person.

C. Appeals based on allegations or grounds not regulated by Twin Falls County Code shall not be considered.

8.20.103 Notice of Appeal

A. Notice of Appeal must be filed with the Planning and Zoning Department on a form provided by that office, along with the required fees, within fourteen (14) calendar days after the date of the Administrator's final determination or written decision; or within fourteen (14) calendar days after the Commission's final written decision. Failure to file a Notice of Appeal within the time allowed shall result in dismissal of the appeal.

B. Upon the filing of the Notice of Appeal, the Planning and Zoning Department shall send a copy of the Notice of Appeal to the Board.

C. The filing of a Notice of Appeal shall automatically suspend the effect of the decision appealed, pending the final decision on the appeal.

D. No activity shall take place or any permit for construction or use be issued until after the fourteen (14) calendar days period for filing a Notice of Appeal has lapsed.

8.20.104 Procedure for appeal of the Planning and Zoning Administrator's decision

A. Within fourteen (14) days of filing the Notice of Appeal, the appellant shall file a written statement with the Planning and Zoning Department explaining the basis for the appeal and reasons for the Board to reverse or remand the decision of the Administrator. Upon receipt of the written statement, the Planning and Zoning Department will forward the statement of reasons for the appeal and the project file to the Board for review.

B. The Board will review the appellant's statement of reasons, and may uphold, reverse, or amend the decision, or may remand the decision to the Administrator with instructions for further consideration. No public hearing is required for an appeal of the decision of the Administrator, but the Board must make its decision at a regularly noticed meeting of the Board, at which the Appellant and the Administrator may make presentations to the Board.

8.20.105 Procedure for an appeal of the Planning and Zoning Commission's decision

A. A transcript of the Commission proceedings on the appealed decision is required. The Planning and Zoning Department shall copy the media of the Commission proceedings, arrange to have the media transcribed and submit these items to the Board. The Appellant shall pay the cost of preparing the Commission meeting transcript. Payment for the transcript must be made before the Board schedules a hearing on the appeal.

B. Within fourteen (14) calendar days of filing the Notice of Appeal, the appellant shall file a written statement with the Board explaining the basis for the appeal and reasons for the Board to reverse or remand the decision of the Commission. The statement may be formal or in letter form. If the appellant requests an extension of time due to a delay in the transcript preparation, that request must be in writing, and in no case shall be granted to extend beyond fourteen (14) calendar days from the time the transcript is completed.

C. Also within fourteen (14) calendar days after filing the Notice of Appeal, the appellant shall file with the Board proof of personal or mailed service of the Notice of Appeal on the applicant (if applicable), all property owners who received mailed notice of the Commission hearing at which the decision was made, and all persons who personally appeared or filed a written comment at the Commission hearing at which the decision was made. Failure to comply with this requirement may result in dismissal with prejudice of the appeal by the Board.

D. The appellant shall pay a transcript deposit at the time of filing the statement of reasons for the appeal. The transcript shall be paid for by the appellant at the current rate as established by resolution by the Board. If the cost for preparation of the transcript exceeds the deposit, the Appellant shall pay the difference before the appeal is heard by the Board. If the transcript cost is less than the deposit, the County will reimburse the appellant the difference within thirty (30) calendar days.

E. The completed transcript will be provided to the Board, and the Administrator. The appellant and respondents, if any, may obtain a copy of the transcript from the Administrator when the transcript fee is paid in full by the Appellant.

F. Any person entitled to receive service of the Notice of Appeal who wishes to contest the appeal (referred to as "Respondent(s)"), must file with the Board a written request to participate in the appeal within fourteen (14) days of service of the Notice of Appeal. Failure to timely file a written request to participate in the appeal may result in being barred from further participation in the appeal. The Respondents, if any, may file a written statement within fourteen (14) calendar days after filing the written request to participate in the appeal, or within fourteen (14) calendar days after Appellant's written statement, whichever is later.

G. The Appellant, Respondent or County may submit a written request for a hearing before the Board on the appeal. No new evidence or factual information may be introduced at the appeal hearing. If neither party submits a written request for a hearing on appeal within forty five (45) days after the filing of the Notice of Appeal, the Board may issue a decision based on the record at a regularly scheduled Board meeting without a hearing.

8.20.106 Board Review on appeal

A. If a hearing on the appeal is timely requested, Board consideration of the Administrator's decision or a decision of the Commission shall be made at a regularly noticed meeting of the Board. Only affected persons, as defined herein, may present information and/or argument on the appeal hearing.

B. Upon hearing the appeal, the Board shall consider only the transcript record and arguments of affected persons who appear at the hearing. The Board will give respectful consideration to, and may yield to the decision of the Administrator or Commission, unless it finds an error in interpretation or application of the terms of Twin Falls County Code, or finds other mistake in the process or factual conclusions on which the decision is based. No new evidence or factual information may be introduced at the appeal hearing.

C. The Board shall issue a written decision explaining its action concerning the appeal. The Board may affirm, reverse or modify, in whole or in part, the order, requirement, permit, decision, or determinations appealed or make any additional conditions which in its deliberations it may find warranted under the provisions of Twin Falls County Code; or may remand the decision to the Commission or Administrator for further consideration.

D. Unless the Board remands the decision to the Commission or Administrator, the decision of the Board shall constitute a final decision concerning such matter, and will constitute an exhaustion of administrative remedies. The decision of the Board may be appealed to District Court for judicial review as provided by Chapter 52, Title 67 of the Idaho Code.

E. Every final decision concerning a site-specific land use request shall be accompanied by a notice to the applicant regarding the applicant's right to request a regulatory taking analysis pursuant to Section 67-8003 of the Idaho Code.

F. Any action to grant a Conditional or Special Use permit, either through affirmation, modification, or reversal of the Planning and Zoning Commission's decision, must include required findings for a Conditional or Special Use permit as provided in Twin Falls County Code.

8.20.107 Repeal of Conflicting Provisions:

This ordinance hereby repeals all provisions of Twin Falls County Ordinances which conflict with the provisions of this ordinance.

8.20.108 Severability:

Irrespective of the basis of the invalidity, if any term or condition of this ordinance is invalid the remaining terms and conditions of this ordinance are severable.

Effective Date:

This ordinance shall be effective upon passage and publication as provided by law.

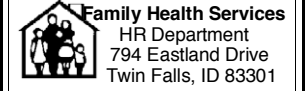

You might have avoided play-
ing an anti-percentage heart
slam today if you had been using
Keycard Blackwood, when the
trump king counts as an ace. But
once you are there, you’d better
make your slam!

The play of this hand focus-
es on the trump suit. Had there
been no bidding, the normal
play in hearts would be low to
dummy’s jack. If both follow low,
the ace is played, and on a good
day the suit will be 2-2. If East
plays the 10 under the jack, the
closed hand can be re-entered
for a lead of the queen through
West’s king.

However, West’s takeout dou-
ble of one major pretty much
guaranteed support for the oth-
er. So you should play West for
at least three hearts. If he has
four hearts or the K-10-8, you are
a dead man walking. However, if
West has the heart K-10-6 or the
K-8-6, you are alive and well.

Lead the heart queen at trick
two, which will surely be cov-
ered. If East plays the heart six,
you have no recourse. However,
if East produces the heart eight
or 10, re-enter the closed hand
to lead the heart nine, repeat-
ing the finesse and almost cer-
tainly picking up the suit for no
losers. As an added bonus, after
drawing trumps, you will make
an overtrick if spades break 3-2
or the jack is singleton. You can
pitch four diamonds from dum-
my on four spades, eventually
ruffing your singleton diamond
in dummy!

ANSWER: A trump lead looks
sensible, in case declarer wants
to try to ruff a major in dummy.
If you lead a trump, you should
choose a small one, in case your
partner has a singleton king or
queen. That way you avoid crash-

President George W. Bush, branding the attacks in New York and Washington "acts of war," said "this will be a monumental struggle of good versus evil," and that "good will prevail."

Five years ago: In a speech in his native Germany, Pope Benedict XVI quoted from an obscure medieval text that characterized some teachings of Islam's founder as "evil and inhuman," unleashing a torrent of rage across the Islamic world (the pontiff later said he sincerely regretted that Muslims were offended). Syrian guards foiled an attempt by suspected al-Qaida-linked militants to blow up the U.S. Embassy in Damascus.

One year ago: The United States won its first world basketball championship since 1994, beating Turkey 81-64 behind a sensational performance from tournament MVP Kevin Durant, who scored 28 points. Lady Gaga swept the MTV Video Music Awards with eight wins, wearing a dress made of meat as she accepted the video of the year award for "Bad Romance." Movie director Claude Chabrol, one of the founders of the French New Wave movement, died in Paris at age 80.
