High School Juniors Prepare for Projects

Though some districts have required them for years, a new state mandate will bring senior projects to all public high schools next year.

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High school juniors are getting a start on their senior projects, which are now a graduation requirement across the Gem State.

But Robyn Barnes, a teacher at Canyon Ridge High School in Twin Falls, says the projects are more than a requirement — they'll help students develop skills they'll need to be successful after high school.

"We know it's something that will really benefit students," she said.

For the first time, high school students — starting with the class of 2013 — are required by the state to complete a senior project in order to graduate. The requirement is one component of increased high school graduation requirements passed by the Legislature in 2007.

Although some school districts have required senior projects for years, it's a first for the Twin Falls School District.

Associate Superintendent Patti O'Dell said projects offer students

Man Falls 150 Feet in Canyon

Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office says Marcus Toothman suffered life-threatening injuries when he fell as he and his girlfriend hiked down the south face of the canyon wall.

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A 19-year-old Buhl man suffered life-threatening injuries when he fell 150 feet down the south face of the Snake River Canyon Wednesday morning.

Marcus Toothman was hiking with his girlfriend, 26-year-old Jasmica Doddroe, of Twin Falls, east of the Perrine Bridge. After a nearly three-hour rescue effort, he was taken to Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise, where he was in critical condition Wednesday evening.

According to Twin Falls County sheriff's spokeswoman Lori Stewart, the couple was hiking down toward the river when Toothman lost his footing and fell. Doddroe made her way down to him and used his cell-phone to call for help shortly before 11:30 a.m.

At about 11:45 a.m., a pair of sheriff's deputies stood atop the bridge, looking down into the canyon for the hikers and communicating with them via cellphone until more help could arrive. A boat containing Magic Valley Paramedics was dispatched, along with an air ambulance, which landed on top of the bull's-eye recently painted on the flatlands where BASE jumpers land after hurtling off the Perrine Bridge.

By 1 p.m., city and county officials had shut down foot traffic along the bridge and parts of the nearby Canyon Rim Trail so spotters could continue to work from above. An ambulance containing hundreds of feet of rope and other climbing equipment parked on the trail, and a team of city firefighters rappelled down the face of the canyon wall.

The rescue team reached Toothman within 45 minutes, and took another 15 to 20 minutes to load him into a gurney and gently lower him from the canyon wall. Paramedics met the team near the bottom of the

Mule Deer Face Hard Times This Winter

Biologists and landowners debated Tuesday what to do in the wake of the Blair Fire, which destroyed habitat near Glenns Ferry.

GLENNS FERRY • Summer may be just ending, but the Idaho Department of Fish and Game is already worried about the approaching winter.

The Blair Fire in August destroyed thousands of acres of mule deer habitat just north of Glenns Ferry. The burn left a herd of 5,000 animals with little-to-no habitat to survive the winter.

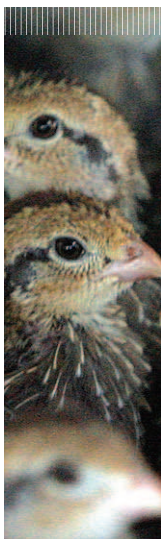
"What the deer do this winter is anybody's guess," said Randy Smith, Fish and Game regional wildlife manager based in Jerome. "But we want to be prepared as much as we can."

Smith spoke at a public meeting hosted by Fish and Game on Tuesday at Glenns Ferry High School, meant to brief the public about the severity of the damage and discuss management options for the deer.

Smith said the agency expects the deer will move south, where they will face busy roads and private land. If this happens, highway mortalities and damage by deer to fields and property will rise.

A 20-mile stretch on Interstate 84,

HAILEY • A Federal Aviation Administration official affirmed the agency's support for air service in the Wood River Valley Tuesday night, saying "We're not walking away from this community and this issue."

But she stopped short of guaranteeing that permits for Hailey's Friedman Memorial Airport will always remain in the face of the design deficiencies at the area's air hub.

"When we started this process, we had every expectation of bringing home a solution both sides could live with. But since, the world has changed," said FAA Airports Division Manager Donna P. Taylor. "We want to make sure we're hand-in-hand marching towards a goal we can both support."

Taylor addressed about 100 people, including government leaders, pilots, congressional aides and a representative of the Sun Valley Co., at a meeting of the Friedman Memorial Airport Authority Board at Wood River Middle School. She then met separately Wednesday with airport board members in a string of meetings held seemingly contrary to Idaho open meeting law.

Taylor, who approves any decisions regarding a new or existing airport, said addressing Friedman's safety issues has been a FAA priority because it is a commercial airport. But she suspended work on a draft

starting at milepost 109, will be particularly popular for deer crossing, said Mike Todd, Fish and Game's regional wildlife habitat biologist.

"It's best to assume all these animals are suicidal," he said.

Several people at the meeting asked if Fish and Game would set up feeding posts for the deer to keep them from likely starvation. However, the agency is concerned feedings this winter will encourage herd growth and complicate next year.

"What we will get is more deer on less range," said Regan Berkley, a Fish and Game biologist. "It'll be a bigger problem next year."

Several ranchers expect deer deaths and damage will go hand-in-hand this winter. Lee Presley, a rancher on King Hill Creek, predicted deaths regardless of what's tried and expects the number of deer on his land this winter to grow.

"There will be a hell of a death loss this year," Presley said. "Some of these guys may go out and try to do something about it, but it's not going to help. Deer are going to die."

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management has drafted a rehabilitation plan for burned land it owns. The \$2.5 million management plan will span three years and halt grazing in the burned area for two years.

Fish and Game is still determining what help with deer harming private property it will provide this winter. However, the more private landowners agree to work with the department, the more likely that costs like hay seed will be lower.

Still, not all are confident the management plans will work or are the best for this situation.

"We're trying to come up with a plan that's natural for the deer in an unnatural environment," said Jim Kast, owner of 101 Ranch Inc. in Glens Ferry. "How is this going to work?"

Former Senior Center Employee Pleads Guilty to Grand Theft

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RUPERT • The former interim director of the Minidoka County Senior Center entered a guilty plea to felony grand theft Monday.

Holly Anne Najera, 30, of Rupert, was charged after allegedly stealing nearly \$3,000 from the senior citizens center while she was employed there.

Under a plea agreement, a related felony burglary charge will be dismissed.

Najera will be sentenced at 10:30 a.m. Nov. 14 in Minidoka County 5th District Court before Judge Jonathan Brody.

Najera was charged in May for allegedly using an unauthorized financial card issued in the senior center's name and linked to a center checking account. Najera was employed at the center from June 2005 until August 2010 and was the center's interim director when she resigned.

The state will request \$2,965.33 in restitution.

environmental impact statement for proposed replacement airports south of Bellevue two weeks ago due to the escalating cost of building a new airport.

Taylor said the FAA had spent \$6.1 million of \$7 million allotted for the study. But, with partial designs, the cost of a new airport jumped from a \$100 million starting point to \$300 million. And that didn't include costs that would likely be involved with mitigating the impact on the area's sage grouse, a candidate for endangered species protection.

At best, the FAA could have picked up half the cost of building the new airport. But even that's questionable given Congress' increasing reluctance to spend money, Taylor said.

"Does it make sense to spend the last million dollars and staff time for an alternative no one can afford?" she asked.

The suspension doesn't mean the FAA is pulling back from doing all it can to assure area aviation continues, Taylor said. But the agency is concerned with the number of Friedman aircraft diverted to Twin Falls and Boise during winter storms.

The community has to determine whether it can expand the current airport to meet operational standards or whether it wants to forge ahead with one of the 16 possible new airport sites identified earlier.

"You can review other sites. But, at the end of the day, if you can't afford to build it, it may be the perfect solution but a solution that

Airport Board Meetings Closed Under Questionable Circumstances

The Friedman Memorial Airport Authority Board met Wednesday with FAA official Donna P. Taylor in closed meetings of a type Idaho's top attorney has advised against.

Board President and County Commissioner Tom Bowman didn't cite any exemption in state code for closing the meetings, but said rather that officials were concerned about speaking in front of reporters — the meetings were closed to the public to encourage everyone present to speak their mind. Four meetings were spaced out to avoid a quorum of any one government body being present in each one, Bowman said, in an attempt to keep them legal.

Doing so appears to contravene advice by the Idaho Attorney General's Office in regard to open meeting law. An attorney general's manual on the subject states: "The requirement that the Open Meeting Law be complied with whenever a quorum of a governing body meets to deliberate or to make a decision should not be evaded by holding smaller meetings with less than a quorum present or by having a go-between contact each of the governing body members to ascertain his/her sentiment." A guideline issued by the office in 1994 defining such "serial meetings" reaches a similar conclusion.

When asked later if he felt Wednesday's meetings went against the attorney general's advice, Bowman offered no comment.

The meeting Bowman participated in, he said, focused on technical questions about items like the length of the runway.

"From what I heard everybody maintained their composure," he said. "And from what I understand, Donna Taylor feels she has a much better idea of the lay of the land and community sentiment now."

will never become reality," she added.

Blaine County Commissioner Larry Schoen said he was pleased that the FAA still wants to partner with the community to find a solution.

One board member warned she and her husband couldn't continue to live in the valley without air service because his business is built around travel.

"This community has been through a real tough time. Now we're in a holding pattern. My concern is we could lose our air service

while searching for solutions," said Friedman board member Martha Burke. "Do we have to start over?"

"I don't know," Taylor replied. "I would feel presumptuous in even speculating what your next step should be. It's not our role."

The Airport Authority Board continued its discussion with Taylor in closed meetings Wednesday. The board plans to have an open public meeting to discuss what to do next on Sept. 27, said Board President and County Commissioner Tom Bowman.

Rupert Straw Maze Shoots for World Record

Guinness World Record officials will be in town Oct. 1 to measure the towering straw pyramid and attached mazes.

RUPERT • A Rupert company hopes to capture the first Guinness World Record for longest straw maze when officials come to verify its statistics Oct. 1.

Looming more than 30 feet above ground, the golden pyramid and its labyrinth of paths that extend to three other mazes is believed to be a good prospect for the newly minted title of "world's

longest straw maze."

"It's kind of exciting to think this is going to happen in little Rupert, Idaho, which is not very well known," said Melynda Kearl, manager of Garden Cents, which built the pyramid and surrounding mazes.

Kearl said Guinness recently created a new straw maze category that the structure will fit into.

"We had a pyramid last year, but it's nothing like it is this year," said Kearl, who es-

in the area's largest school district opportunities to build their research and presentation skills while being guided through the process.

"We always believed that they're a really terrific opportunity for kids to demonstrate what they've learned in their school experience," she said.

For next year's Twin Falls seniors, projects will consist of a project proposal, research paper, hands-on project, journal and a presentation/portfolio. Students can choose a topic that matches their interests, O'Dell said.

The hands-on part of the project can incorporate a career, academic or community service focus.

Canyon Ridge junior Alexandria Goedhart, 16, is thinking about a career as an architect and hopes to com-

plete an internship in her hometown of Jerome.

Samantha Jackson, 16, also a junior at Canyon Ridge, said she's considering doing a community service-based project by visiting children at a cancer ward.

For their projects, students must choose a mentor who is either a teacher or community member.

"The mentor should be someone who's an expert in the field," Barnes said.

Students can start preparing for their senior projects as early as their freshman year. During their junior year, students will draft a thesis statement for their research paper, as well as a hands-on project idea, and present it to a panel of judges for approval.

Barnes said hands-on projects will ideally be completed the summer before a student's senior year. Senior projects culminate with an open house before graduation.

What is a Senior Project?

The Idaho State Department of Education defines a senior project as a "comprehensive assignment that is designed to be a culmination of each student's academic experiences from his/her high

school career." The state only requires that "a research paper and oral presentation must be completed by the end of the 12th grade year." The state gives school districts leeway to come up with more specific requirements.

Ahead of the Curve

Several Magic Valley school districts have required students to complete senior projects for years, ahead of the state requirement. They include: **Filer School District** • Superintendent John Graham said senior projects have been required for Filer students for nearly 15 years, adding that the district has served as a model for others in the state. "The basic concept is that the project will help the community and one that's tied into what students want to do for post-high school education or work,"

he said. **Jerome School District** • Jerome students have been required to complete a senior project since 2005. "We will continue as we've been doing," Superintendent Dale Layne said. **Kimberly School District** • Senior projects have been required for five years in Kimberly and are run through senior English classes. Requirements include writing a research paper of at least 10 pages and completing a hands-on practical experience. "It's more than just getting on the computer and doing research," said Luke Schroeder, Kimberly High School principal.

KIMBERLY APPROVES RENOVATION BUDGET

KIMBERLY • By a split vote Tuesday, the Kimberly City Council approved a plan to renovate its new City Hall after the old building was condemned in spring 2010.

The city purchased the building that formerly housed the Rock Creek Rural Fire Protection District for \$221,000 after the fire district relocated to Red Cap Corner. Council chambers and all city offices will eventually be housed under one roof.

The work will be paid for through the city's building fund, which currently holds \$635,000. Renovations were estimated to cost \$543,220 with other funds budgeted for a security camera system, cabling, fencing, asphalt and furniture.

New construction was estimated at approximately \$1 million.

Council members Mitzi Cheldelin and Brandon Hoobler objected to the budget, with Mayor Dave Overacre breaking a 2-2 tie.

Cheldelin originally supported the idea because she thought it would save money, but said Tuesday she felt otherwise and would like to see City Hall remain downtown.

"It's a lot of money for what we want done," she said.

Overacre said the city has expanded its building fund for the last 15 years, and called for a vote. "We're not going to voters for additional

funds," he said.

The city has worked out a lease with Family Health Service to build a new facility after the old City Hall is demolished.

In other business:

- Kimberly voters will decide in November whether to adopt a single-stream recycling program for an additional \$3.50 per month on their garbage bill.

Western Waste Services has provided services to Kimberly since 2008. It would operate the recycling program and has requested an additional five-year contract extension.

Jay Markle with Western Waste said the transfer station landfill cost has also increased. The new rate, \$35.50 per ton, is effective immediately.

- Current city watering restrictions were extended to Oct. 1, when metered rates will kick in. Penalties for violation are \$10 for the first unauthorized use and \$25 for any subsequent unauthorized use of water.

With the metered rates, residents can water as much as they can afford to, Cheldelin said.

The cost will add up, however, and the council voted unanimously to give the Kimberly School District a break on its new metered bill. The city will delay billing the school district until July 1, 2012, due to budget constraints.

Superintendent Kathleen Noh said her district's bill is expected to jump from about \$5,000 to more than \$18,000 once water use is tracked.

The Pitfalls of a Third-party Candidacy

Post columnist Matt Miller has joined Tom Friedman and others in calling for a third-party, or independent, candidate for president, a radical centrist to take over American politics, shake it by the lapels and blow up the political order and its awful two-party system. Their model is Americans Elect, an impressive organization created by policy and business entrepreneur Peter Ackerman that is using the Web to gain millions of adherents for an Internet convention to nominate a third presidential candidate; the group is moving rapidly to get on state ballots for 2012.

When it comes to dismay over contemporary political dysfunction, we yield to no one. But the call for a third way, in this case, is misguided.

A strong independent candidacy from the center could have several outcomes. Imagine the most improbable — election as president. Winning the White House requires winning a majority of the 538 electoral votes. In a general election with three credible candidates, the ability of any one to collect 270 is limited — and the ability of a third candidate to prevail means running the table on a series of firmly blue and red states. A third candidate would most likely have to find another way — namely, to win a sufficient plurality of electoral votes, combined with a plurality of popular votes.

If no candidate gets a majority in the Electoral College, the House decides the outcome among the top three vote-getters, voting by state. In other words, a third candidate would have to prevail in a House where all but a handful of representatives are Democrats or Republicans, and where small delegations with strong partisan leanings — think Wyoming, South Dakota, Delaware and Hawaii — are the least likely to vote for a third candidate.

Even if an independent did prevail, how would he or she govern? Few in the House or Senate would feel allegiance to or affinity for the newly elected president. Nothing in the movement for an independent presidential candidate is affecting recruitment of House and Senate candidates. That recruitment is already far along for 2012 and, combined with the redistricting process, is moving us toward more, not less, polarization in Congress. It is tough enough for a president to deal with Congress when about half of its members share a party allegiance with the executive. An independent with no partners appealing to a nonexistent congressional center? Fuhgeddaboutit.

Far more likely is that an independent or third-party candidate, whether an ideological one such as George Wallace or a non-ideologue such as John Anderson or Ross Perot, would fall short. But consider three ways a third candidate can affect the outcome of a presidential contest.

First, a third candidate can end up tilting the contest toward another candidate. In 2012, the nightmare scenario for us would be angry or demoralized independents and discouraged centrist Republicans gravitating toward the third candidate, enabling a far-right Republican nominee to prevail with a narrow electoral majority or with a plurality followed by a win in a deeply divided House. (Americans Elect, to its credit, has tried to draft electoral rules so that, in the plurality scenario, its electors would pledge to vote for the most centrist or reasonable major-party nominee.)

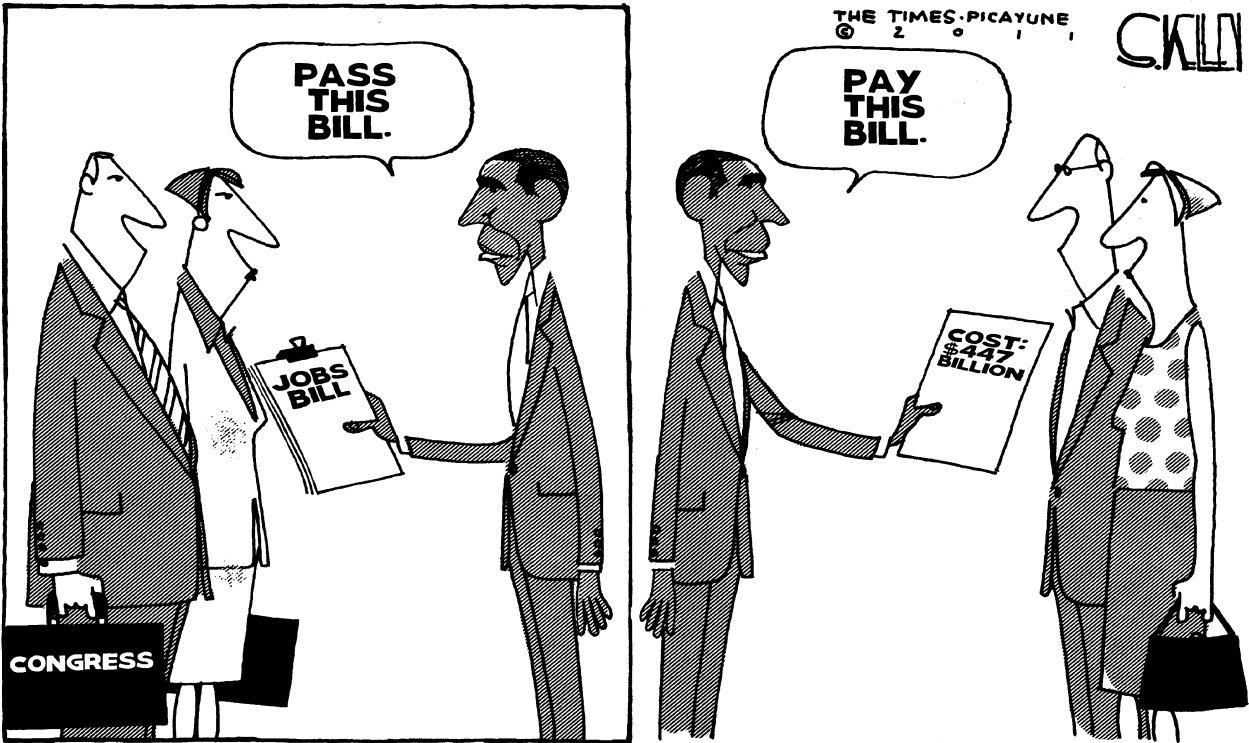
Second, one of the major-party nominees could win a clear electoral victory, albeit with diminished popular support because of the three-way contest. The reduced popular support would undercut the legitimacy of the result and curtail momentum for the victor. In this tough environment, any diminishment of legitimacy for the winner is undesirable.

The only positive scenario is that the third candidate speaks tough truths to Americans and, like Perot in 1992, changes the dialogue and the dynamic in positive ways. Miller and Friedman could both name issues, such as a major increase in the gasoline tax, where President Obama, like his predecessors and opponents, have feared to tread. But most other tough truths about deficits and debt — Miller’s commendable obsession — have been told repeatedly by figures such as Alan Simpson, Alice Rivlin, Mark Warner and Warren Buffett, with little effect on public opinion.

Of course, a candidate in a presidential campaign can have an outside impact. But whether a candidate would take on not just those issues but bigger ones — such as bold action in a faltering economy, how to deal with immigration, and how to shape America’s role in an uncertain world — is not at all clear, especially since we don’t know who that third-party candidate would be.

Job Creation 101

WASHINGTON • We need a re-fresher course in Job Creation 101

to judge how much, if at all, President Obama’s proposed \$447 billion program of spending increases and tax cuts might revive America’s sputtering job machine.

Recall that the private sector is the main employment engine. Businesses create jobs when two conditions are met. First, extra demand for their products justifies more workers. Second, the extra demand can be satisfied profitably. There are qualifications to these generalizations (start-ups, for instance), but these are the basics.

As for government, it’s less a job creator than a job changer. It supports jobs (soldiers, teachers, scientists) by taxing, borrowing and regulating. If government taxed, borrowed or regulated less, that money would stay with households and businesses, which would spend it on something else and, thereby, create other jobs. Politics determines how much private income we devote to public services.

To this observation, there’s one glaring exception. In a slump, government can create jobs by borrowing when the private economy isn’t spending. But the effect is temporary and isn’t automatic.

Obama’s controversial \$825 billion “stimulus” program in 2009 conformed to

this logic. He claims it created or saved jobs. I think he’s right. At the time, consumers and companies — terrified by the financial crisis — had gone in to lockdown. The new government outlays and tax breaks induced spending that otherwise wouldn’t have occurred. How many jobs were saved or generated is harder to say. The Congressional Budget Office estimates a peak total somewhere between 1.4 million and 3.6 million.

By similar logic, the new package might raise employment. Macroeconomic Advisers, a well-known forecasting firm, estimates the program could add 1.3 million payroll jobs by year-end 2012. However, it also notes the effect would be temporary unless Congress renewed the program.

Unfortunately, the story of the original stimulus is more complex. It was only a partial success, because it failed in its main mission: triggering a strong, self-sustaining economic recovery. Typically, this happens when pent-up demand for cars, appliances and housing boosts spending and hiring, which support more spending and hiring. This process has been weak. Even

with the stimulus, we lost 8.75 million payroll jobs in the slump; so far, we’ve regained only 1.9 million.

This weakness has many possible explanations. One is the severity of the housing collapse. Potential buyers are waiting until prices reach bottom. Another is Americans’ eroded financial position. Since 2007, households have lost \$7 trillion in wealth, mostly from lower home and stock prices. To restore that wealth, many Americans are saving more, spending less and repaying debt.

Exactly, say advocates of more stimulus. Condition One for private-sector job creation isn’t met: Demand is insufficient. Slowdowns in the United States and Europe confirm this. Governments need to “borrow and spend” to bolster demand, writes Martin Wolf, the *Financial Times’* economic commentator. Deficit reduction should be long-term.

It’s a strong argument — but hardly airtight. Crucially, it doesn’t say why the past year’s continuing massive stimulus (huge budget deficits, low interest rates) didn’t do more for economic growth. The answer, I think, is psychology. Small changes in precautionary behavior by anxious consumers and companies offset stimulus. Suppose, for example, consumers raised their savings rate by three percentage points; that

would neutralize three quarters of Obama’s program.

The surprise and brutality of the financial crisis left a powerful legacy of risk aversion. Companies — like consumers — have become defensive. They accumulate a cash hoard against unknown threats. Our political leaders have also compounded the caution and fear; indeed, government policies sometimes cause unwanted behavior.

Start with Obama. He has run two parallel administrations, pretending he could pursue separate jobs and social agendas as if they were unrelated. His health-care “reform,” by requiring employer-paid insurance, will raise employment costs. Did he really think this wouldn’t affect the profitability of hiring? (See Condition Two above.) Many Obama policies frustrate job creation.

Switch to Capitol Hill. It’s more of the same. Republicans and Democrats exult in vitriolic attacks on each other. Their pleasure from mutual vilification comes at the public cost of lower confidence. By contributing to this, the disarray over long-term deficits also undermines employment.

Our jobs debate should acknowledge these realities. No policy will succeed unless it results in self-sustained hiring by private firms. This means giving job creation precedent over other goals.

It ought to be about building confidence, not scoring political points. This is a tall order. As the 2012 election approaches, it may be too tall.

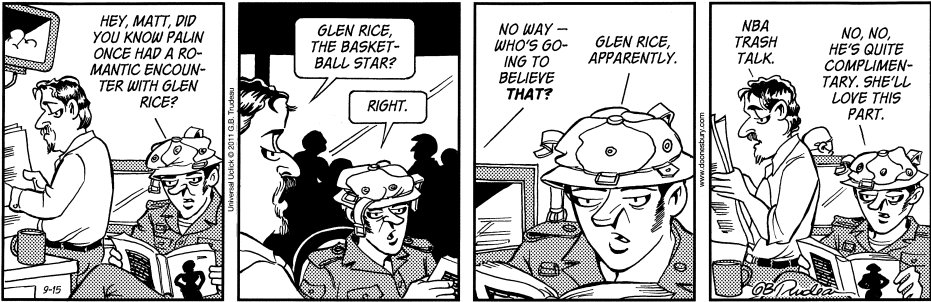

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Inmate, CCA Reach Settlement in Idaho Prison Lawsuit

Dozens of other inmates who sued CCA are in settlement talks with the company.

BOISE • An inmate who sued a privately run Idaho prison over allegations of extreme violence and medical neglect has reached a settlement with the operator, Corrections Corporation of America.

Meanwhile, dozens of other inmates who also sued Nashville, Tenn.-based CCA in federal court are in settlement talks with the company, possibly ending their potential class-action case by the end of the week.

Marlin Riggs and the other inmates claimed the Idaho Correctional Center south of Boise was so violent that it's called "Gladiator School," and that guards used inmate-on-inmate violence as a management tool and then denied injured prisoners adequate medical care.

The settlement between Riggs and CCA was filed under seal in Boise's U.S. District Court on Monday, and both sides reached a confidentiality agreement, so the terms weren't available. Before the settlement, Riggs was seeking \$55 million in damages.

Neither Riggs' attorney, James Huegli, nor CCA spokesman Steve Owens immediately returned messages from The Associated Press seeking comment. A CCA spokeswoman at the Idaho Correctional Center referred all calls to Owens.

Riggs filed his lawsuit in

2009, saying that CCA's prison guards failed to protect him from violence at the hands of other inmates even though he told the guards he was about to be attacked. He also contended that after the attack, CCA employees failed to adequately treat his injuries.

Several other inmates at the prison filed similar lawsuits in federal court around the same time, and a judge decided to consolidate them into one case. The American Civil Liberties Union took on the task of representing the inmates in the consolidated lawsuit, and they asked for class-action status on behalf of everyone at the lockup.

CCA has denied all of the allegations in the lawsuit, saying that the Idaho prison is run in accordance with state and federal standards.

In the joint lawsuit, Riggs originally asked for \$155 million — the total net income that CCA reported for 2009 — and the rest of the inmates asked the court to order CCA to take steps to reduce the violence at the prison. Once Riggs' case was split from the other prisoners' claims, however, he changed his request for damages to \$55 million. The rest of the inmates still aren't asking for money from the company, just for changes in the way CCA runs the lockup.

Just before Riggs and CCA began settlement talks, U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge tossed out Riggs' claim of in-

adequate medical care, saying he had failed to take all the steps required by the prison's formal complaint policy before taking the matter to the courts.

In his lawsuit, Riggs said he was "one of the scores of prisoners brutally assaulted as a result of defendants' deliberate indifference to prisoner safety."

Riggs, who is 48, was living in a general population housing unit called L-Pod in 2008 when he said gang members in the unit ordered him to begin paying "rent" or face being beaten. Riggs said they followed up the threat by stealing his headphones, food and other personal belongings. The next day, Riggs said, at least four inmates returned to his cell and told him he must leave or fight all of them.

Riggs told the prisoners he would leave, and he pressed the cellblock's emergency button. A guard let him exit and sent him to talk to another guard.

But when Riggs said he'd been threatened and asked to leave the unit, the guard asked Riggs to name the inmates who had threatened him. Riggs said he didn't know their names, but pointed out that the guard could look at security video to identify the prisoners. Riggs also offered to identify the inmates through photographs, but the guard refused to use either option. Instead, he ordered Riggs to

return to his cell, according to the lawsuit. Riggs asked to speak to another guard, who also ordered Riggs back to the cellblock.

By that time, the other prisoners were at dinner and Riggs was able to call his family to explain the situation. Within minutes of the end of the call, Riggs was attacked and beaten by another inmate, according to the lawsuit.

He was knocked down, repeatedly kicked in the face and torso, his nose was broken, and the left side of his face was "smashed in." Blood spatters from the attack even reached the ceiling, according to the lawsuit.

Riggs said that one of the guards who had ordered him to return to the cellblock eventually intervened, taking Riggs to the prison doctor. But while the prison doctor confirmed that his nose was broken, he refused to have the injuries X-rayed — a practice Riggs said was part of a common ICC effort to conceal the severity of attacked inmates' injuries. He was then sent to a segregated cell, where he was kept without medical follow-up for 15 days.

The attack left him in enormous and constant pain, Riggs said in the lawsuit, and he ultimately needed an operation to allow him to breathe normally.

"During those 15 days, Riggs was constantly bleeding from the nose, bones in his face were loose, there was a noticeable dent in his face, he was bleeding from the ears and nose, and he had difficulty breathing. When he slept, Riggs would lie in a pool of blood," the lawsuit said.

Court Upholds Teen's Murder Conviction

POCATELLO (AP) • The Idaho Supreme Court has upheld the murder conviction of a Pocatello teen found guilty of killing his classmate and the life sentence that went with it.

But the high court threw out Brian Draper's conviction of conspiracy to commit first-degree murder, saying that jurors were given erroneous instructions on the conspiracy charge.

Draper and another teen, Torey Adamcik, were convicted of stabbing fellow Pocatello High School student Cassie Jo Stoddart to death in 2006. All three were 16 at the time, and Draper and Adamcik were charged as adults.

The *Idaho State Journal* reports that the Idaho Supreme Court ruling means that Bannock County prosecutors will have to decide whether to re-try Draper on the conspiracy charge.

Hailey Voters to Decide on Plastic Bag Ban

HAILEY (AP) • Central Idaho voters are set to weigh in on whether to ban plastic grocery bags.

Students from Hailey collected enough signatures to get a citywide ban on November's ballot.

The *Idaho Mountain Express* reports Wood River High School's environmental club members want people to use reusable bags or recycled paper bags.

A bag manufacturer,

Hilex Poly Co., with a plant in nearby Jerome, Idaho, opposes such bans, contending its facilities use up to 30 percent recycled content.

Worldwide, efforts to ban or discourage plastic bags have met with mixed success.

Seattle city leaders voted to tax plastic grocery bags, though voters rejected the 20-cent surcharge in 2009.

Boise Man Refuses Trial Delay on Murder Charge

BOISE (AP) • A Boise man charged in the death of his former fiancée is expected to stand trial in October after refusing to a delay requested by his attorneys.

Authorities allege Lloyd Hardin McNeil suffocated Natalie Davis and then set fire to her Boise home before fleeing town earlier this year. He also is accused of stealing her car and taking two dogs and an engagement ring from her apartment hours before Davis was found dead March 5.

McNeil was indicted by a grand jury in May and has pleaded not guilty to second-degree murder, arson and grand theft.

The *Idaho Statesman* reports that Ada County prosecutors and attorneys for McNeil had sought to postpone his Oct. 13 trial date to allow them more time to analyze evidence in the case. But McNeil objected, and against the advice of his counsel, he refused to waive his right to a speedy trial.

felony assault charges in Gallatin County in Montana for an alleged attack on Davis at a Bozeman-area campsite in July 2010. A judge dismissed those charges after the death of Davis, the victim and "key witness."

Less than 12 hours before she was found dead, Davis told Boise police she had just fought with McNeil and that he tried to shove pills down her throat. She told officers that she had packed her car and was moving back to California to get away from McNeil.

But police say Davis gave them a bogus description of the man, saying his name was Michael and that he had a military haircut, according to court documents. McNeil had dark curly hair and a full beard at the time. Davis also told police she did not want to press charges against McNeil.

Fruitland Bar Owner Faces Tax Evasion, Gambling Charges

Thomas Dale Overstreet, 66, of Fruitland was arrested Wednesday on an indictment charging him with a laundry list of charges including income tax evasion over four years.

The indictment also charges the bar owner with operating an illegal gambling business, conspiracy to commit money laundering, 22 counts of money laundering, bulk cash smuggling out of the United States, and criminal forfeiture, according to a release from U.S. Attorney for Idaho Wendy J. Olson.

Overstreet pleaded not guilty before a U.S. Magistrate judge Wednesday in Boise. The case will go to trial next month.

If convicted, Overstreet faces up to 20 years in prison and a half-million dollar fine on each count of money laundering.

The indictment alleges that Overstreet earned substantial income from his Fruitland bar, Club 7. A substantial part of that income was from his illegal gambling business, which produced profits of more than \$1 million between mid-2003 and 2010. He did not file an individual tax return during this period.

The indictment also alleges Overstreet took various actions to evade paying federal taxes, laundered gambling proceeds through an ATM and check cashing service and transported cash into Mexico.

An undercover Internal Revenue Service agent met with Overstreet in April to discuss purchasing Club 7, which Overstreet had listed for sale.

Overstreet has owned the bar since 1990. According to the federal complaint, Overstreet told the agent he didn't declare much of his income.

YELLOWSTONE FIRE DECLARED CONTAINED

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) • The Trischman Fire in the park's south central region was declared 100 percent contained Tuesday.

Sixteen smokejumpers and a park helicopter suppressed the fire. The fire was fought due to its available fuel load and its potential impact to populated park areas.

The 3-acre, lightning-caused fire was located in a remote area 4.5 miles west of Shoshone Lake and 6 miles southwest of Old Faithful.

Five other lightning-caused wildland fires, managed as the Heart Complex, continue to burn in the back country of Yellowstone National Park, causing limited and temporary closures of back country campsites and trails.

The Point Fire on the eastern shore of Yellowstone Lake is the largest at about 1,100 acres. The four other small fires — the Gibbon, Ouzel, Huckleberry and Pitchstone — are being allowed to burn.

The fire danger rating in Yellowstone is currently "very high."

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ARCHAEOLOGISTS SEEK EVIDENCE OF EARLIEST IDAHOANS AT INL SITE

Before the Idaho National Laboratory existed, before the vast fields of potatoes, the key feature of eastern Idaho's economy was the Big Southern Butte.

For thousands of years, archaeologists say, nomadic tribes made regular trips to the butte to mine its deep deposits of obsidian — a black volcanic glass that forms sharp edges when broken. The tribesmen took full advantage of this phenomenon and shaped obsidian into all manner of tools and weapons.

Through time, eastern Idaho's abundance of obsidian grew famous, and the tribes began to trade tools and weapons formed from it as something of a currency. Evidence of their activity is littered about the INL site in the form of broken obsidian flakes and, sometimes, fully formed spear and arrow tips.

But the question remains: Just how old are the oldest artifacts that have been found in the area?

For the past two summers, an INL archaeologist and a graduate student have been digging — literally — for answers to that question. Their excavation site — a tiered hole on the bank of the Lost River that measures about 8 feet at its deepest — is the first archaeological dig on the INL site born purely of a push to research the land's history.

For years, archaeologists have drooled over the promise of what lies just beneath the surface of the INL site. It's not just the fact that millions of obsidian chunks are strewn across the landscape. Or that, thousands of years ago, the climate of eastern Idaho made the INL site an extremely habitable place in certain seasons.

Almost as important is the fact that, for the past 60 years, most of the site has remained virtually untouched by human hands.

"The INL site is like a treasure trove because, yeah, it's been protected by the government since the 1940s," Texas A&M student Josh Keene said. "It's a really, really ideal place to work."

As Keene and his cohort, Clayton Marler, wrap up this year's work at the dig, Keene suspects some of the artifacts they've unearthed are as old as 10,000 years. That's an impressive number, no doubt, but they have yet to find what could be called the Holy Grail of archaeology in the Americas: evidence of human life that predates the so-called Clovis era.

Archaeological orthodoxy long held that the 13,000-year-old Clovis era — named for a dig near Clovis, N.M. — represented the earliest appearance of humans in either North or South America. That began to change when archaeologists dug up human artifacts in southern Chile that some believe predate the Clovis era.

Since those discoveries of the late 1990s, other digs thought to contain pre-Clo-

vis artifacts have begun popping up around the Americas. Keene said the archaeological community's increasing acceptance of the theory that humans could have arrived in the Americas as early as 15,000 or 16,000 years ago has led some to revisit Clovis-era sites.

"Now, basically, people have more open minds about it," he said. "People are also more accepting of people publishing pre-Clovis stuff. Whereas in the past, a lot of the stuff, they just blew it off without thinking about it."

At their dig on the banks of the dried-up Lost River, Keene and Marler found

thousands of arrow points, animal bones and fire-cracked rocks in the first 3 to 6 feet of excavation. They then hit a layer of stones called a "cobble layer" that contains artifacts perhaps as old as 10,000 years. They went deeper into older layers, curious of whether they'd find any evidence of pre-Clovis human life at the site. No dice.

"The artifacts stop at the cobble layer," Keene said. "Underneath it is nothing. It's a really stark contrast."

The fact that Keene and Marler haven't found any pre-Clovis evidence of humans at their dig hasn't dampened their enthusiasm for it. Keene said he eventually wants to return to the Intermountain West to continue with similar digs.

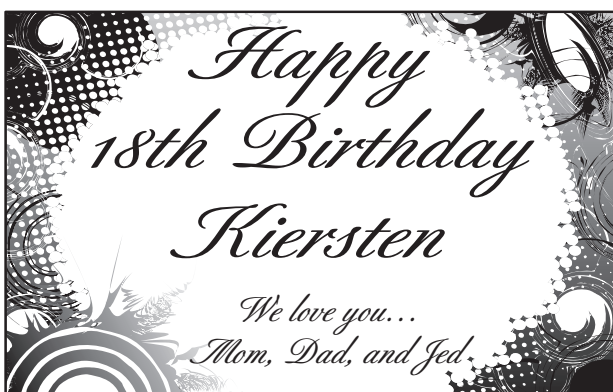
Marler said the fact that he's been able to focus on simply following the traces of the area's earliest humans has been reward enough.

The Idaho Transportation Department says radar tracking showed the plane lost altitude and descended rapidly. The wreckage was located at 4:40 p.m. Tuesday.

Future NASA Rocket to be Most Powerful Ever Built

WASHINGTON (AP) • To soar far away from Earth and even on to Mars, NASA has dreamed up the world's most powerful rocket, a behemoth that borrows from the workhorse liquid-fuel rockets that sent Apollo missions into space four decades ago.

But with a price tag that some estimate at \$35 billion, it may not fly with Congress.

NASA Administrator Charles Bolden and several members of Congress on Wednesday unveiled the Obama administration's much-delayed general plans for its rocket design, called the Space Launch System. The multibillion-dollar program would carry astronauts in a capsule on top, and the first mission would be 10 years off if all goes as planned. Unmanned test launches are expected from Cape Canaveral, Fla., in six years.

Calling it the "largest, most powerful rocket built," NASA's exploration and operations chief, William Gerstenmaier, said the rocket will be tough to construct. But when NASA does it, "we'll have a capability to go beyond low-Earth orbit like no other nation does here on Earth," he said in a telephone briefing Wednesday.

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House Probing Loan to Failed Solar Co.

House Republicans questioned Wednesday whether the White House rushed approval of a half-billion-dollar loan guarantee for a now-bankrupt solar panel manufacturer once cited as the kind of renewable energy company worthy of federal stimulus money. Solyndra Inc. was a major presence in Washington and spent millions of dollars on lobbying there. The collapse of the Fremont, Calif.-based company once touted by President Barack Obama ultimately left taxpayers on the hook for \$528 million, raising questions if the loan was rushed to accommodate a company event in September 2009 that featured Vice President Joe Biden.

Obama Touts Jobs Bill Benefits for Small Business

RALEIGH, N.C. • President Barack Obama urged enthusiastic college students Wednesday to join him in his fight to get Congress to act on his new jobs bill. "Every single one of you can help make this bill a reality," the president called out at a hot and noisy rally at North Carolina State University.

Someone in the crowd yelled out, "I love you!"

"If you love me you got to help me pass this bill," the president responded.

It was Obama's second campaign-style rally in two days as he pushes for action on his \$450 billion jobs plan. His program is running into a buzz saw of opposition from Republicans — and even some in his own Democratic Party — over his plans to raise taxes on the wealthy and corporations to pay for it.

The president was in Ohio Tuesday, and last week in Virginia, as he travels key electoral states to sell the plan with the economy stuck in neutral heading in to his 2012 re-election campaign.

On Wednesday Obama's focus was small businesses, which would be helped by Social Security payroll tax cuts. Before speaking, he toured WestStar Precision, a small business in the Raleigh suburb of Apex. It makes specialized components for the aerospace, medical and alternative energy industries.

He also announced plans to try to speed payments to federal contractors.

Republicans have accused Obama of playing politics by presenting them with tax hike ideas they've already rejected. But Obama said Wednesday, "We've got to make sure everybody pays their fair share, including the wealthiest Americans and the biggest corporations."

"It'd be nice if we could do it all, but we can't. We've got

to make choices. That's what governing's about. And we know what's right," the president said.

He told the students: "The time for hand-wringing is over. The time for moping around is over. We've got to kick off our bedroom slippers and put on our marching shoes."

The president's trip to North Carolina, a traditionally Republican state he won in 2008, drew scorn from Republicans.

"This president is in love with the sound of his own voice, he's in love with campaigning, he's in love with fundraising, and he's in love with the stump," said Republican National Committee Chairman Reince Priebus. "And he's doing what he loves to do best, which is to go to battleground states, masquerade as official business, use taxpayer money to do it, and

campaign."

As the president barnstormed the country to build support for his plan, which he first unveiled last week in a speech to Congress, he drew support from House Democrats.

About 50 Democratic lawmakers called Wednesday for quick passage of the jobs bill and urged Americans to make their case in calls to lawmakers.

"Fourteen million people do not have 14 months to wait," said Rep. John Larson, D-Conn., who was surrounded by his colleagues on the steps of the Capitol's East Front. He was referring to the number of unemployed Americans and the time until the next election.

Still, there appeared to be little if any chance that the proposal would pass Congress in one piece.

Republicans who control the House have made clear

they have little interest in Obama's plans to increase spending for things like school construction, highways, bridges and other projects, which accounts for nearly \$200 billion of the legislation. GOP lawmakers seem more open to Obama's plans to extend unemployment insurance and cut the Social Security payroll tax for workers and businesses.

Even in the Democratic-led Senate, Majority Leader Harry Reid has suggested that Obama is unlikely to get his way in his call for immediate action by Congress. Reid has said there are some other issues that need to be dealt with first, including transportation funding.

Obama has made clear he'd sign a portion of the legislation if that's all Congress could agree on, although he's said he would continue to fight to pass the whole thing.

SAT Reading, Math Scores Down in 2011, College Board Reports

LOS ANGELES • More bad news on the national education front: The College Board announced Wednesday that the average SAT reading score for the high school class of 2011 fell 3 points from 2010's average — to 497, making it the lowest reading score since 1972.

The average math score dipped to 489, 1 point lower than last year. And the average writing score dropped 2 points from last year's score.

And then there's this: The board found that just 43 percent of college-bound seniors met the SAT benchmark score of 1550 (the critical-reading, mathematics and writing scores combined). The benchmark score indicates that a student has a 65 percent likelihood of achieving a B-minus or higher during the first year of college. And remember, that's 43 percent of students who are planning to go to college.

In a statement sent to news outlets, Jeanne Allen, president of the Center for Education Reform, articulated what some people might feel after reading the SAT report. "Student achievement remains stagnant and we continue to let failure fester in our education system, jeopardizing the

future of our children and our country," she said.

The organization that offers the ACT, the nation's other college-entrance exam, recently announced that just 25 percent of students who took its test met all four of that group's readiness benchmarks.

But the College Board managed to put some positive spin on the seemingly dire statistics. In the news release, the board pointed out that more college-bound students in the class of 2011 took the SAT than any other high school graduating class in history. Also, the class of 2011 was the most diverse class in history to take the SAT.

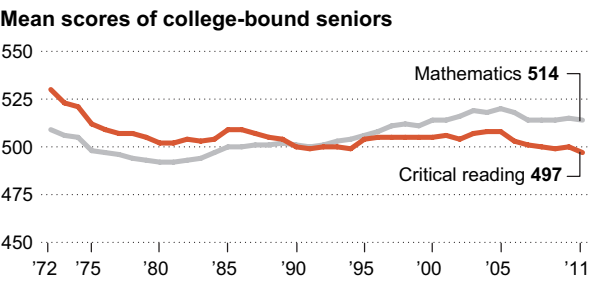
Here is some more information about the people who took the SAT in 2011:

- 44 percent were minority students.
- 36 percent were first-generation college-goers.
- 27 percent reported that English was not the only language first learned at home.

And for those who still get upset when recalling the stress of the SAT experience, the College Board adds this: "The College Board continues to advise that, for individual high-stakes decisions such as admission, SAT scores should always be used together with high school grades and other factors."

Scores on the critical reading portion of the SAT fell to their lowest level on record last year, and combined reading and math scores reached their lowest point since 1995.



U.S.: Embassy Attack a Propaganda Win for Militants

KABUL, Afghanistan • American officials Wednesday blamed the bold attack on the U.S. Embassy on a Pakistan-based group allied with the Taliban, acknowledging that the assault brought a propaganda victory for the insurgents even as they played down its military significance.

The attack underscored holes in Afghan security: Six fighters with heavy weapons took over an unfinished high-rise that authorities knew was a perfect roost for an attack on the embassy and NATO headquarters about 300 meters (yards) away. They then held out against a 20-hour barrage by hundreds of Afghan and foreign forces.

It appeared likely that either weaponry had been stored in the 12-story building ahead of time or that some insurgents had entered in ad-

vance with a supply of guns and ammunition.

By the time the fighting ended at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, the insurgents had killed 16 Afghans — five police officers and 11 civilians, more than half of them children. Six or seven rockets hit inside the embassy compound, but no embassy or NATO staff members were hurt. All 11 attackers — including four suicide bombers who targeted police buildings elsewhere in the city — were killed, authorities said.

Police could be seen clapping their hands in celebration on the roof of the high-rise. Others carried the mangled bodies of insurgents down flights of rough concrete stairs and piled them into the back of a waiting ambulance.

Although the Taliban claimed responsibility for Tuesday's assault, U.S. and Afghan officials said the Haqqani network likely carried it out on their behalf. The Haqqanis have emerged as

CALIF. BORDER CROSSING SHUTS AFTER SCAFFOLD COLLAPSES

SAN DIEGO (AP) • Scaffolding collapsed on more than a dozen cars at the nation's busiest crossing Wednesday, injuring 11 people and halting all U.S.-bound traffic, authorities said.

A construction worker at the San Ysidro crossing between San Diego and Tijuana, Mexico, was in serious condition, said Maurice Luque, spokesman for the San Diego Fire-Rescue Department. The others were taken to hospitals with minor injuries.

The wooden scaffolding erected over several lanes near vehicle inspection booths collapsed shortly before 11 a.m. onto 15 cars, authorities said. Luque said three people had to be extricated from the cars, while the others walked away.

All 24 U.S.-bound vehicle lanes and additional lanes for U.S.-bound

Ex-Marine Honored for Saving 36 in Afghanistan

Meyer the first Marine who is living to receive the honor for actions in Iraq or Afghanistan.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. • Dakota Meyer was ambling through the cafeteria of his Kentucky high school in 2006 when he came upon a recruiter for the Marines. Curious, the beefy senior struck up a conversation, but told the military man he was hoping to play college football after graduation. “Yeah that’s what I would do, because there’s no way you could be a Marine,” the recruiter told him.

Meyer walked away, the taunting words ringing in his ears. He returned five minutes later, ready to enlist.

Now more than five years later, the Kentucky farm boy is poised Thursday to receive

the military’s highest award, the Medal of Honor, lauded for charging through heavy gunfire on five death-defying trips to rescue comrades ambushed by insurgents in Afghanistan in September 2009.

All told, Meyer saved 36 lives — those of 13 Marines and Army soldiers along with 23 Afghan soldiers — all while providing cover for the troops to fight their way out of a withering, six-hour fire-fight with the Taliban that killed five other U.S. soldiers. And Meyer personally killed at least eight insurgents despite being wounded himself, according to the military.

President Barack Obama will bestow the medal on Meyer at a White House ceremony today, making the soft-spoken 23-year-old former Marine the first from his branch who is living to receive the honor for actions

in Iraq or Afghanistan.

Meyer, who left the military after tours of duty in Iraq and Afghanistan, is now back to pouring concrete at his construction job in a far

more bucolic setting — the tiny community of Greensburg in central Kentucky. He acknowledges that he struggles with the honor, the national attention. Though la-

beled a hero, he said he saw close friends die that fateful morning of Sept. 8, 2009, as they were unexpectedly pinned down in Kunar Province, a hotbed of clashes with the Taliban.

“It’s hard, it’s ... you know ... getting recognized for the worst day of your life, so it’s... it’s a really tough thing,” Meyer said, struggling for words. Meyer insisted his fallen comrades also be remembered, so memorial services are being held in the hometowns of the slain soldiers to coincide with the White House ceremony Thursday.

Meyer said he’ll be humbled by the memory of his fallen comrades who will be honored as he receives the award.

One of the memorial services will be Thursday afternoon at a Columbus, Ga., cemetery for gunnery sergeant Johnson, a father of

three who served nearly 13 years in the U.S. Marine Corps.

Will Duke, one of the organizers of the service, said that memorial also honors an “American hero.”

“He joined the Marines, he went through hard training. He and his family sacrificed a great deal. And Sgt. Johnson ended up giving the ultimate sacrifice,” Duke said. “We want to make sure he is remembered and receives the honor and respect he deserves.”

Duke said the service was being held at Meyer’s request and spoke volumes about his character.

“I can tell by his actions, not only the actions he took in earning the Medal of Honor in Afghanistan but also the actions he is taking now. Essentially by requesting these memorial services for his fallen comrades, he’s saying this is about them.”

U.S. ‘Hopeful’ Iran Sets Course to Free American Hikers

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) • The proposed bail-for-freedom deal for two Americans jailed as spies looked increasingly Wednesday like a repeat of last year’s release of their companion: Quarrels between Iran’s judiciary and president, and then a private jet dispatched by the sultan of Oman for the captives’ first leg home.

But even as Washington expressed hope that Shane Bauer and Josh Fattal could be nearing the end of more than two years in custody, the details of when — or even if — they will be freed remained clouded amid the complexities of internal Iranian politics and third-party diplomacy between Washington and Tehran, two

longtime foes.

The first twist came from Iran’s powerful judiciary, which said it was still reviewing the bail provisions — and handing a potentially embarrassing rebuke to President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad after his prediction that the Americans could be released in a matter of days.

The statement by the hard-line judiciary appeared to be a message that only its officials — and not the president — can set the terms of any possible release. Ahmadinejad is locked in a bitter power struggle with Iran’s ruling clerics who control the courts.

It also could be a swipe at his hopes of timing the re-

lease of Bauer and Fattal with his expected arrival in New York next week for the U.N. General Assembly session.

Just hours after the judiciary’s declaration, however, the Gulf state of Oman dispatched a private plane to Tehran, according to an official of Oman’s Foreign Ministry.

The Omani official gave no further details on any possible timetable for the release of the Americans, who were detained along the Iran-Iraq border in July 2009 along with friend Sarah Shourd. The Omani official spoke on condition of anonymity because of the sensitivities of the negotiations.

GOP Celebrates its New York Win

WASHINGTON (AP) • Savoring the unlikely of victories, Republicans called their triumph in a New York City congressional race a repudiation of President Barack Obama’s policies on the economy and Israel on Wednesday as public and private polls showed his approval ratings plummeting in a district he carried handily in 2008.

“We’re not going to sugarcoat it, it was a tough loss,” conceded the House Democratic Campaign Committee. Yet party officials and the White House insisted the race was not a referendum on the president as he seeks re-election with the economy stagnant and unemployment stuck at 9.1 percent.

In New York, Rep.-elect Bob Turner, outpolled state Assemblyman David Weprin in a light-turnout election. He will replace former Democratic Rep. Anthony Weiner, who resigned in disgrace earlier this year in a sexting scandal. Represented by Democrats since the 1920s, the district includes portions of Brooklyn and Queens, is home to three times as many

registered Democrats as Republicans and is nearly 40 percent Jewish.

Those district demographics customarily spell victory for a Democrat, but in a smattering of interviews on the day after the election, former Obama supporters gave voice to their changed feelings.

“Unfortunately the Democrats have let us down lately,” said Anne Lenihan, 65, of Queens, who said she supported the president in 2008. “I’m disappointed in the Democrats and we need change.”

Mark Russell, 37, a Democrat, said he didn’t vote because he could not get excited about supporting Weprin, despite numerous calls from the Democratic get-out-the-vote operation.

“In 2008 I voted for Obama, and I made a big mistake then,” said Kelly Redmond, 47, who cited the economy and the president’s policy toward Israel as reasons for supporting Turner.

Concerns that surfaced in the race included an administration policy in the Mideast that some Jews find not suffi-

ciently supportive of Israel. Obama’s urging of Israel to halt housing settlements in the West Bank has been a point of controversy in the district. Also, Weprin drew criticism for his vote in the New York Assembly in favor of a measure legalizing gay marriage, legislation generally unpopular with Orthodox Jews.

Among political leaders in both parties, reaction to the results fell along lines that are well-established for a special election in which a House seat changes hands from one party to the other. The winning side almost always claims a broad national significance, while the losers point instead to local concerns. In fact, that happened most recently elsewhere in New York, when Democratic Rep. Kathy Hochul won a seat in May that had been in Republican hands for years.

Speaker John Boehner issued a statement saying “New Yorkers have delivered a strong warning to the Democrats who control the levers of power in our federal government. It’s time to scrap the failed ‘stimulus’ agenda

and the misguided policies on Israel and focus on getting America back to creating jobs again.”

“An unpopular President Obama is now a liability for Democrats nationwide in a 2012 election that is a referendum on his economic policies,” contended Texas Rep. Pete Sessions, head of the National Republican National Congressional Committee.

pedestrians were closed, and travelers were directed to another border crossing about five miles east, U.S. Customs and Border Protection officials said. Mexico-

bound lanes remained open. About 50,000 vehicles and 25,000 pedestrians enter the United States each day at the San Ysidro crossing. Heightened border security after 9/11 has resulted in waits that can last hours during morning rush hour and other peak travel times.

The 30-year-old border crossing facility is undergoing a \$577 million overhaul by Hensel Phelps Construction Co., based in Greeley, Colo. Jeff Wenaas, the construction firm’s chief executive, did not immediately respond to a message seeking comment.

CBP initially said 17 travelers and construction workers were injured. Luque said the fire department examined 24 people at the scene, including 13 who were not injured.

CBP said it was unclear when the border crossing would reopen.

one of the biggest threats to Afghanistan’s stability, working from lawless areas across the border in Pakistan’s tribal region.

Nearly all Taliban attacks in and around the Afghan capital have been executed by the Haqqanis, who are also allied with al-Qaida. The Haqqani network was also blamed for a weekend truck bombing in eastern Wardak province that wounded 77 U.S. soldiers.

“It’s tough when you’re trying to fight an insurgency that has a lot of support out-

side the national borders,” U.S. Ambassador Ryan Crocker said. “It’s complicated, it’s difficult but clearly for a long-term solution those safe havens have to be reduced.”

U.S. officials have been pressing Pakistan to go after Haqqani militants. But relations with Islamabad have not been good, particularly after the U.S. raid in May that killed al-Qaida leader Osama bin Laden.

Crocker said Tuesday’s attack would not affect the transfer of security responsibilities from the U.S.-led military coalition to the Afghan security forces. Foreign forces are to completely

withdraw combat troops by the end of 2014.

U.S. Marine Corps Gen. John Allen, the top commander of U.S. and NATO forces in Afghanistan, said the assault did not mean that Afghan security forces weren’t doing their job, arguing that potential attacks are thwarted in Kabul nearly every day.

However, he did allow that the violent standoff gave the Taliban the headlines they wanted.

“I’ll grant that they did get an IO (Information Operations) win,” Allen told reporters in the capital.


NATO’s senior civilian representative, Simon Gass,

called the attack “extremely frightening even for the citizens of Kabul.”

Both men argued that the insurgents depend on these spectacular attacks because they can’t take and hold ground.

“This really is not a very big deal,” Crocker said. “If that’s the best they can do, you know, I think it’s actually a statement of their weakness.”

But in Kabul, the fear expressed by some residents showed the effectiveness of the current militant campaign. This week’s attack was the third major insurgent assault in the capital since late June.

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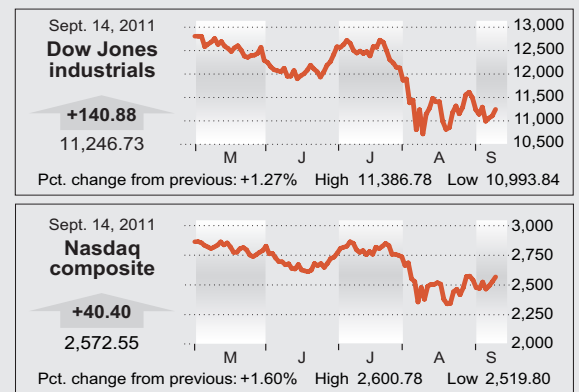

Cautious Consumers Pull Back on Retail Spending

WASHINGTON (AP) • U.S. consumers grew more cautious last month amid wild stock market swings, zero job growth and heightened concerns that the economy has weakened.

Retail sales were flat in August. At the same time, wholesale inflation leveled off. The latest data could give the Federal Reserve more impetus to adopt additional stimulus next week.

“The combination of those two reports sets the stage for, and warrants, additional action by the Fed,” said Michelle Meyer, an economist at Bank of America Merrill Lynch.

Wall Street looked past the weak retail sales data. Growing optimism that European leaders would be able to contain their debt crisis drove stocks higher. The Dow Jones industrial average closed up 140 points for the day.

In August, consumers spent less on autos, clothing and furniture, the Commerce Department said Wednesday.

Hurricane Irene disrupted sales along the East Coast, analysts said. But many consumers were also spooked after a grim month that renewed recession fears.

The government reported that the economy barely grew in the first half of the year. Lawmakers fought over raising the debt ceiling. Standard & Poor's downgraded long-term U.S. debt for the first time in history.

Stocks tumbled – the Dow lost nearly 16 percent of its value from July 21 through Aug. 10.

As a result, consumer confidence fell in August to its lowest level since April 2009, when the economy was still in recession. And employers added no net jobs during the month.

The government retail sales report is the first major read on consumer spending for August. Consumer spending is important because it accounts for 70 percent of economic activity.

The economy's weakness is helping to keep prices in check.

The Labor Department said its Producer Price Index,

which measures price changes before they reach the consumer, was unchanged in August after a 0.2 percent rise in July. A drop in energy prices in August offset higher food costs.

The price of oil, cotton and other commodities have come down in recent months, after pushing up most measures of inflation earlier this year.

Slow inflation gives the Fed more room to take steps to boost the economy.

Fed Chairman Ben Bernanke acknowledged last week that inflation rose sharply in the spring. But he repeated his belief that the increase was temporary and that price pressures would

moderate soon.

Fed policymakers meet for two days next week. Many economists expect they will decide to shift money out of short-term mortgage-backed securities and into longer-term Treasury bonds.

The move could push down longer-term interest rates, including rates on mortgages, auto loans and other consumer and business borrowing.

The central bank could take other steps, such as cutting the interest rate it pays on the reserves banks hold at the Fed. That could encourage banks to lend the money rather than keeping it parked at the Fed.

Report: BP Ultimately Responsible in Gulf Spill

A key federal report goes further than other investigations and puts ultimate responsibility on BP for the worst offshore oil spill in U.S. history and the deaths of 11 rig workers, especially regarding the cement seal that was put in place the day before the explosion that triggered the spill.

The report, released Wednesday, said in the days leading up to the disaster, BP made a series of decisions that complicated cementing operations, added risk, and may have contributed to the ultimate failure of the cement job.

Other companies also shared some of the blame, according to the report, which noted that Transocean, as owner of the Deepwater Horizon, was responsible for conducting safe operations and for protecting personnel onboard.

The report said BP, and in some cases its contractors, violated seven federal regulations at the time of the incident. They include the failure to take necessary precautions to keep the well under control at all times, to perform a cement job that kept the oil and gas down hole, and to maintain the blowout preventer – which is supposed to lock in place to prevent a spill in

case of an explosion – in accordance with industry-accepted practice.

The details were contained in the final report from an investigation team of the U.S. Coast Guard and the agency that regulates offshore drilling. The panel held hearings in the year following the April 20, 2010, Deepwater Horizon catastrophe. The Coast Guard-Bureau of Ocean Energy Management Regulation and Enforcement investigation was among the most exhaustive.

The panel's report will be used to shape reforms to offshore drilling safety and regulation. It also will be used by lawyers for victims involved in the multibillion dollar court battle over the oil spill, and by government agencies that are considering civil and criminal charges against BP and other companies.

Other investigations spread around the blame more evenly, faulting misreadings of key data, the failure of the blowout preventer to stop the flow of oil to the sea and other shortcomings by executives, engineers and rig crew members.

The report said the decisions included using only one cement barrier and BP's choice to set the production casing in a location in the Macondo well that created additional risk of influx of oil or gas.

By raising pheasant and quail, a Filer teen is helping a sportsmen’s group give back to the environment.

At one time in his life, a young Doug Palmer walked the landscape with a 12-gauge shotgun in his hands, looking for pheasants in the Magic Valley. He didn’t have to look far; there were plenty of birds.

“I’ve loved hunting all my life,” the Twin Falls man said.

Things are different today. Palmer is older, and there aren’t as many pheasants because of depleted habitat and increased predator threats.

A group of concerned hunters, including Palmer, hopes to increase hunting opportunity with the Sportsmen for Fish and Wildlife-Idaho sur-

rogator program, now in its fifth year.

The valley’s seven surrogators — large box-like structures that raise game birds until they’re old enough to live on their own — have released around 1,100 pheasants and 700 bob-white quail this year alone, Palmer said.

But it’s a drop in the bucket compared with what the group wants to do: Restore the pheasant population and help grow other game species such as quail. To do that, the group needs responsible outdoorsmen to help out.

There’s more than one way to cleanse your body in the outdoors.

For one Hagerman church, that means fasting while hiking.

Yes, when the three-day Hike ‘n Fast begins Tuesday, participants can drink fruit juices and broth. But they’re not to have any food during the duration of the hike.

“It’s a really good way to detox the body,” said Jim Gallagher, a member of the Sabbath Rest Advent Church, which is sponsoring the hike. “It gives your organs a really good rest, the opportunity to regroup. It helps clear your mind, and it’s good for the soul!”

Those who participate in the hike — at Malad Gorge, Box Canyon and Thousand Springs — will walk between eight and 12 miles a day.

The church held a similar hike last year for church members but this year has invited the public. Gallagher expects 20 to 25 people to participate.

“We pretty much are a church group that is engaged in keeping all three — mind, body and soul — in tip-top shape,” he said.

Organizers will bring snacks along for those who might need an extra energy boost, but for the most part participants will do without food for three days. They’ll go home for the night to rest, then regroup the following day. People could cheat at home by having a meal, but Gallagher said it’s not recommended.

Are there side effects that participants should worry about?

Besides lower efficiency as a hiker, there shouldn’t be, said Dr. David Martin Spritzer, a family practice physician with St. Luke’s Magic Valley Medical Center.

“They won’t be able to hike as fast as if they were eating normally,” he said.

The important thing is to stay properly hydrated. “It

Riding Croy Creek

The initial phase of a new trail system wraps up in Hailey, giving Idaho mountain bikers more places to ride.

HAILEY • Ten years ago you had to ride old mountain and logging roads if you wanted to mountain bike in Hailey.

Now there are 22 miles of trails specifically designed for mountain biking and more on the drawing boards.

Bureau of Land Management Idaho State Director Steve Ellis marked the completion of the initial phase of the Croy Creek trail system this past weekend by leading two dozen mountain bike fans on a ride beginning at the trailhead west of Hailey and ending with a run down the new Punchline flow trail.

“It all started in 1998 when we contacted the Shoshone Field office requesting some trails in Hailey. Bill Baker, who’s now the BLM Twin Falls district manager, agreed to help and we were off and running,” said Chris Leman, who at the time headed up a grassroots organization called Big Wood Backcountry Bicyclists.

The BLM worked with Blaine County Recreation District and the county to cobble together a \$80,000 grant that the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation collected from offroad vehicle gas taxes with another \$10,000 from Big Wood Backcountry Bicyclists and yet another \$10,000 from a memorial fund honoring Whit Henry, an avid bicyclist who was killed in an automobile accident.

It then used some of President Barack Obama’s stimulus money this summer to build a new flow trail

If You Bike

What Is It? The Croy Trail Network is located about three miles west of Hailey on Croy Canyon. To get there, turn west from Main Street onto Bullion Street and follow the road to the BMX track near Rotarun Ski area.

What It Features: The network features 20 miles of mountain bike trails, five of which are open to motorcycles. All but the Punchline flow trail are open to equestrians, hikers and dogs. All the new trails feature plenty of corners to keep the speed down and the fun factor up. In addition, the four-mile Lambs Gulch Loop, an old jeep road has been given a few more curves to make it

crammed with roller coaster-like dips, drops and berms that bicyclists can bank off.

The trails have made a huge impact on the recreational scene in the Wood River Valley, said Leman. They allow Hailey and residents to access bikes from home without having to drive to Ketchum and Sun Valley to access trails. And they provide early and late season biking when trails to the north are still covered with snow.

“They’re hugely popular,” Leman said. “The BLM estimates they had 5,000 visitors their first year of opera-

tion. You can go out on a spring afternoon and see 50 other people riding.”

In addition, the trails have attracted people from out of town who then visit Hailey’s restaurants and bike shops, said Billy Olson, who owns the Powerhouse bicycle shop and café in Hailey.

Chip Deffe, who owns Sun Summit South bicycle shop, says he’s seen a resurgence in mountain biking among Hailey residents who had given up mountain biking after moving from Ketchum where they could swing one leg over their bike in their driveway and

more bicycle friendly.

At a Glance: Bull Dog climbs up the highest, traveling 3.2 miles to Bullion Gulch.

- Two Dog Trail covers 3.7 miles boasting small climbs and descents as it makes a loop around the northeast sector of the area.
- Wilson Gulch Trail is an 8/10-mile connector trail.
- And the Bullion connector is a 2.5 mile trail that takes people across Bullion Gulch to the 6-mile Hidden Valley loop, which is furthest to the west.
- The Lambs Gulch Trail is accessible from the Democrat Gulch road, which veers off to the north just before the BMX area.

Hunt Foes Ask Feds to Protect Nevada Bear Group

RENO, Nev. • Opponents of Nevada's first approved bear hunt are arguing the state's black bears should be protected under the federal Endangered Species Act.

The *Reno Gazette-Journal* reported Wednesday that advocacy groups Big Wildlife and NoBearHuntNV.org filed a petition with the U.S. Department of Interior to list bears they refer to as the "Sky Island" population as a "distinct species."

Hunters have killed seven bears since the season began Aug. 20. The Nevada Wildlife Commission authorized up to 14 male and six female bears to be killed. Critics say the hunt will have a "critical impact" on a stressed bear population.

Fires May Affect Hunter Access

Fires burning in Idaho's backcountry have raised concerns about public safety, and hunter access.

In the interest of public safety the U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management may close access to some areas as fires grow or new fires start, according to a news release by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. Those road closures may affect access to some hunting units.

Fish and Game will not recommend closing hunts or altering season dates in response to fire restrictions. Most fires are not large enough to affect an entire hunt unit.

Hunters affected by a fire closure can adjust their schedule to hunt later in the season or exchange general tags to hunt in a different area. But tags must be exchanged before the season begins. Hunters with controlled hunt tags affected by a fire closure may exchange them for general season tags before the controlled hunt begins. But controlled hunt fees would not be refunded.

The department will consider requests for rain checks or refunds in the event that access to a hunting unit is blocked by fire. Hunters requesting a rain check will be required to submit their tags and permits with a letter describing the conditions of their request.

Rain checks would be evaluated case-by-case at the end of the hunting season, and will be valid in 2012 and offered only for the same species and hunt area as the hunter held in 2011.

Written requests should be sent to the license section at Fish and Game, P.O. Box 25, Boise ID 83707 when the season is over.

Hunters and anglers, and anyone else heading into the backcountry, are advised to check with Forest Service ranger district offices or county sheriffs' offices before heading out. Fire updates can be found at inciweb.org/state/13/.

Madison was a little young to shoot, but Goodman said it was a memory they will not forget.

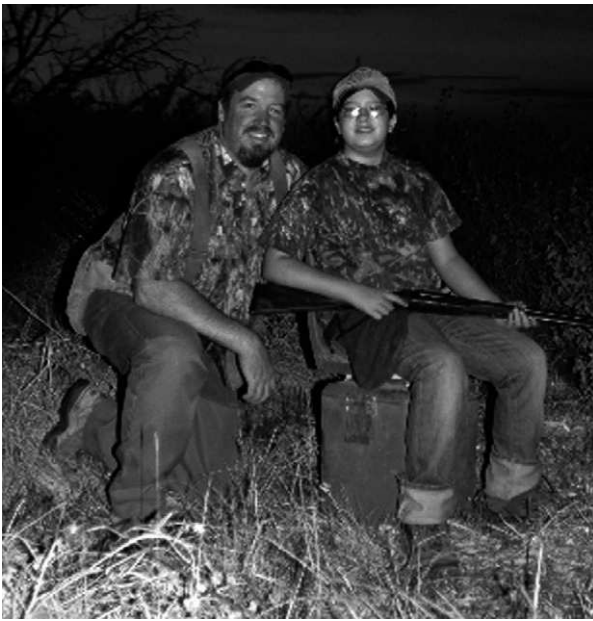
"On this weekend, there was a special bond between father and daughter that Madison and I will cherish the rest of our lives," he said.

Charles "Chip" Stewart brought his daughter, Zoe, 11. The main idea, he said, was to get the kids together and hopefully form a bond.

Hendricks knows about bonds and traditions. His father, Dwight Hendricks first brought him to the Crooked River Lodge 24 years ago. In fact, Dwight Hendricks was along for this hunt, as well — three generations of the same family hunting together.

That's what Wilson likes to see. "We've been in business 27 years, long enough to have three generations from several families hunting with us," he said. Wilson's crew hunts a wide assortment of small and large game.

Dove hunting is a social event on some levels, a wing shooting test on others.

Most hunters consider mourning doves the most challenging of the common game birds. Particularly when they're riding a hot wind, even experienced hunters miss more shots than they make. It can be daunting for youngsters.

Zoe Stewart had shot clay targets only once, managing to break just one with a 20-gauge shotgun. For the hunt, she was shooting a side-by-side .410 Merkel that her grandfather had bought as a family heirloom to be handed down through generations.

Most people think a .410 is a kid's gun because the gun is small and so are the shells. The recoil is light. The shot pattern is small, however, making the .410 a better choice for experts than for beginners.

Chip Stewart shoots sporting clays. He knows about shotguns, and Zoe will have a 20-gauge for next year's hunt.

"Zoe was gung-ho," he said. "She wanted to see what Daddy was doing out there and she was intrigued about shooting."

Zoe got two doves on her

Saturday afternoon hunt and is already asking her dad about clay target practice so she can become a better shot. That's what he wanted to hear.

"Even if Zoe decides that she doesn't want to do this particular thing, the experience was good for her," said Stewart. "Plus we shared some great father-daughter time."

Chris Hendricks was a little nervous about his daughter's first dove hunt.

"In the truck, on the way to the field, we discussed lots of things, including safety, just like my father did with me at that age," he said.

"She finally had two birds fly into the wind directly toward us. Tiffany let loose with her 28-gauge, and one of the birds tumbled to the ground. Her smile was ear to ear, and I think I ran faster than she did to pick up the bird.

"What a moment!" Hendricks recalled. "Tiffany's first dove, my father in the field with us, an incredible sunset just beginning — it's one of those moments you never forget."

FALL TURKEY SEASON OPENS TODAY

Turkey hunters have smiles on their faces today: General fall season has opened in many different parts of the state, including a large portion of the southwest region.

Fall turkey hunters typically find less competition in the field because of other hunting seasons that open in the fall, and they are more likely to bag a bird.

Here's a breakdown of some of the hunts:

Today through Dec. 15: General fall hunt in game management units 1, 2 (except Farragut State Park and Farragut Wildlife Management Area) 3, 4, 4A, 5 and 6.

Today through Oct. 31: General fall hunt in game management units 73, 74, 75, 77 and 78.

Today through Oct. 9: General fall hunt in game management units 8, 8A, 10, 10A, 11, 11A, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 16A, 17, 18, 19, 20, 22, 23, 24, 31, 32 (except that portion in Payette County), and 32A. Units 33 and 39 are closed to fall hunting.

Nov. 21 through Dec. 31:



General fall hunt in game management units 8, 8A, 10A, 11, 11A, 13, 14, 15, 16 and 18. This hunt is open on private lands only.

The daily bag limit is one turkey of either sex per day. No more than three turkeys may be taken per year, except in units 1, 2, 3 and 5, where up to five turkeys may be taken in a single day during the fall season.

Turkey hunters will need a general or extra tag. General tags not used in the spring general or controlled

hunts are valid for the fall hunt. Special unit tags are valid only for the fall season in units 1, 2, 3 or 5.

Turkey tags are available at all license vendors for \$19.75. An extra turkey tag costs \$12.25, and the special unit tag costs \$5.

May 3, 1949-Sept. 11, 2011

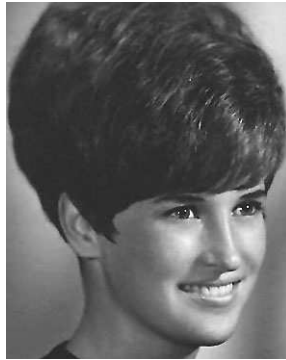
SPOKANE, Wash. • Janice Kay Severn went home to be with her Lord and Savior Jesus Christ on Sunday, Sept. 11, 2011.

Q. We realize that it is important to prepare for a serious emergency such as a natural disaster. Do you have any simple suggestions to get us started?

A. Whatever your age it is wise to think about "emergency readiness." Some experts suggest a 3-step approach. First, know the basics. Recognize risks your community faces (such as blizzards, floods, tornados, earthquakes). Know how to turn off your home's gas and electricity. Know your neighbors! Second, keep emergency supplies on-hand so you can survive at home until help arrives. Include ready-to-eat food, medications, water, pet food (if needed), a first-aid kit, and a battery-powered radio and flashlight (and extra batteries), a list of emergency contact numbers, and a cell phone. Pre-pack an "evacuation bag" with items you would need to make a safe and quick evacuation from your home. Third, make a personal plan for special needs you or your loved ones have. If vital medical equipment is powered by electricity, explore options for temporary emergency power. If you rely on a home health provider, know their emergency plan. Also, your community leaders have a plan to respond to a serious emergency. Be sure to know what it is.

Country Music Pioneer Dies

DETROIT (AP) • Wade Mainer, a country music pioneer who is credited with inventing the two-finger banjo picking style that paved the way for the Bluegrass era, has died. He was 104.

Mainer died Monday at his home in Flint Township, about 60 miles northwest of Detroit, according to the funeral home where his service was to be held.

He was a member of late brother J.E. Mainer's Mountaineers, one of the most popular sibling duos of the 1930s. He made recordings for all the major labels of the day, including RCA in 1935, and invented a two-finger banjo picking style that paved the way for the bluegrass era.

BOISE • Lost in all the record-setting numbers that quarterback Kellen Moore has posted during his career at Boise State is a running game that's been his complement. It just wasn't that much help in the fourth-ranked Broncos' season opening win over Georgia. So consider getting running back Doug Martin and the rest of Boise State's running game going one of the priorities when the Broncos return to the field on Friday night at Toledo. Martin was held to 57 yards on 24 carries in the opener and Boise State as a team was held to just 129 yards on the ground. While that might seem like a decent total, consider that it's one of the 10 worst running games by a Boise State team since Moore took over as quarterback at the start of the 2008 season. "We didn't run the ball exactly like we wanted to," Boise State coach Chris Petersen said of the effort two weeks ago in the Georgia Dome. "But we were really proud of how we ran it because we kept slamming it up in there, because if you don't do that and don't have some effectiveness you can't throw it the way we want to throw it." The Broncos didn't try to overpower Georgia's interior bulk. Instead, they used short passes — made more effective by Moore's accuracy — as an extension of their run game.

TRUFANT, HILL LONE LINKS TO 'REMATCH'

RENTON, Wash. • Leroy Hill looks back on his rookie season six years ago with the Seattle Seahawks and knows it couldn't have gone more perfect: starting as a rookie on a dominant team that concluded its season with the only Super Bowl appearance in franchise history. The surprise isn't so much what's happened to the Seahawks since losing a Super Bowl to Pittsburgh 21-10 that year, but that Hill is just one of two players remaining on Seattle's roster that played in that title game against the Steelers. Faces like Matt Hasselbeck, Lofa Tatupu, Shaun Alexander and Walter Jones, all key components of that Super Bowl run, are elsewhere, while Hill and cornerback Marcus Trufant remain as the only survivors with Seattle heading to Pittsburgh on Sunday. "You lose a Super Bowl ... and it's so hard to get back. I realize that now," Hill said. "I remember every play of that game almost and they still have got a lot of the same guys. Playing Pittsburgh, it's always 'they beat us in the Super Bowl' but a lot of these guys don't understand it because they weren't on that team. But I feel it." Hill and Trufant remain as the only links to the Seahawks lone NFC championship team. The coaching staff, the front office and most of the locker room has gone through the revolving door of Seattle's waterfront headquarters. And the fact that it's Hill and Trufant which remain to tell the story of that 2005 Seahawks team is almost as surprising as the run Seattle made that season. "I don't know if it's shocking. That's just how the business can throw you sometimes," Trufant said. "You get guys in and you get guys out and that's just how it is. 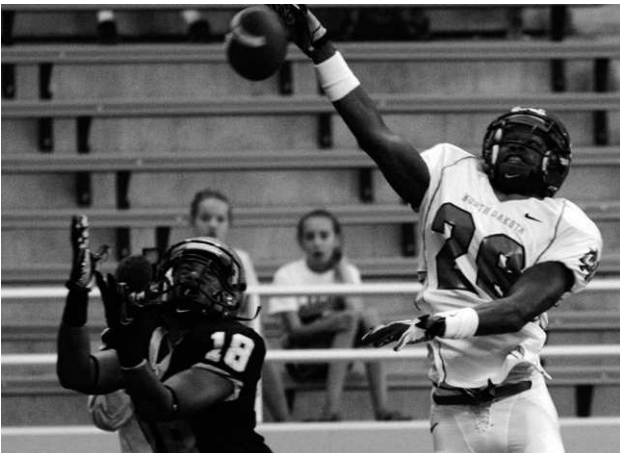

"I felt bad, but as a man I felt that I had to call them and let them know," he said.

Informing NMSU of his switch might have been the only awkward few minutes of the past two months for Scott, the Vandals' leading receiver going into Saturday's trip to No. 9 Texas A&M.

The 5-foot-11 junior from East Palo Alto, Calif., came to Moscow for the first time just before camp, almost completely unaware of Idaho's system, personnel and coaching staff. He also had no idea what his role would be.

But with injuries to the team's top wideouts, Preston Davis and Justin Veltung, Scott has blossomed into a favorite target for Brian Reader – a quarterback he played against in high school in the Bay Area.

After two weeks he's in the top four in receptions and yards in the WAC, and this comes after a productive fall camp when he found out he would be on scholarship.

"At times you sit back and it feels like a movie or a dream or something," he said "Something like this ... it happened so fast. It's kind of like I don't want to wake up from it. I really don't."

Scott spent the past two years at Foothill College in Los Altos Hills, Calif., where he garnered all-conference honors at wideout and had a 3.4 grade-point average. But he attracted no interest from Division I schools and had little help from his coaches.

So this summer he started contacting schools himself. Fresno State and San Jose State told him they were set at receiver, so his chances of playing as a walk-on weren't good. He got the same vibe from Tennessee-Chattanooga.

But New Mexico State was interested, and Scott liked how its coaching staff treat-

ed him. Then he heard from Criner, who became intrigued with Scott after talking to the staff at nearby College of San Mateo.

Watching Scott's game tape, Idaho coaches could see his potential. Receivers coach Luther Carr expected Scott to play right away, largely because he could see he was a physical, aggressive receiver – despite weighing just 178 pounds.

Robb Akey also hoped for this kind of contribution from Scott. But he always has reservations with JC transfers.

"... Division I football is a step up, a different world than what junior college film is," the Vandals' fifth-year coach said.

Scott, though, has made what seems like effortless transition. He started in place of Veltung in the Vandals' opener against Bowling Green and on the second play from scrimmage caught a 51-yard trick pass.

Last week, with Veltung making his way back from a turf toe injury, Scott snared his first touchdown and was just shy of a 100-yard receiving day.

How has he had this immediate of an impact? One reason, Carr noted.

"He's a great route runner. Runs real hard routes," Carr said. "He's probably more quick than fast, but his first couple steps off the line of scrimmage – kind of like Max Komar – are real explosive."

Comparisons to Komar, a former Vandals receiver who played for the Arizona Cardinals last year, would no doubt be welcomed by Scott. Then again, two months ago, he was just hoping to make Idaho's team.

"Coming in so late and everything moves so fast, if you don't jump on that train, then you're going to be left behind," he said. "Fortunately, I picked things up pretty quickly and here we are."

only to get moved back to running back later that season when an injury left the position thin. He became the Broncos' starter and ran for 1,260 yards and 12 touchdowns during his junior season.

Oh, and he's also raised his stock with scouts who now see Martin as having NFL potential because of his ability to run between the tackles.

Because of his versatility and willingness to play whatever position, Martin's become one of the most respected players in the Broncos locker room.

"It also teaches the importance of patience, I think. Doug was probably always naturally a running back, but he's just (said) 'I'll play anywhere, I'm a football player first,'" Moore said. "He bumped around, bumped around and found his way back to running back and got into a role that worked out pretty well."

While Martin was the workhorse and will be for most of the season, he was helped in the opener by the change-up provided by a healthy D.J. Harper, who missed most of last season with a knee injury, had a key 44 yards and a touchdown against Georgia and Harper's slashing style is a counterbalance to Martin.

But everyone knows it's Martin who will carry the load.

"Doug is such an unbelievable worker, and he's such a great kid and he's tough. He's got all these things you love and you can put the rose-colored glass on and anything he does is good," Petersen said. "I don't know, he's a really good player."

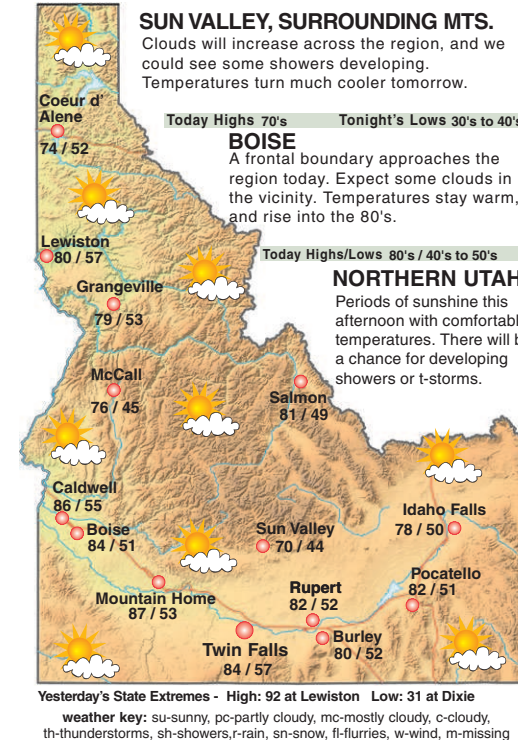

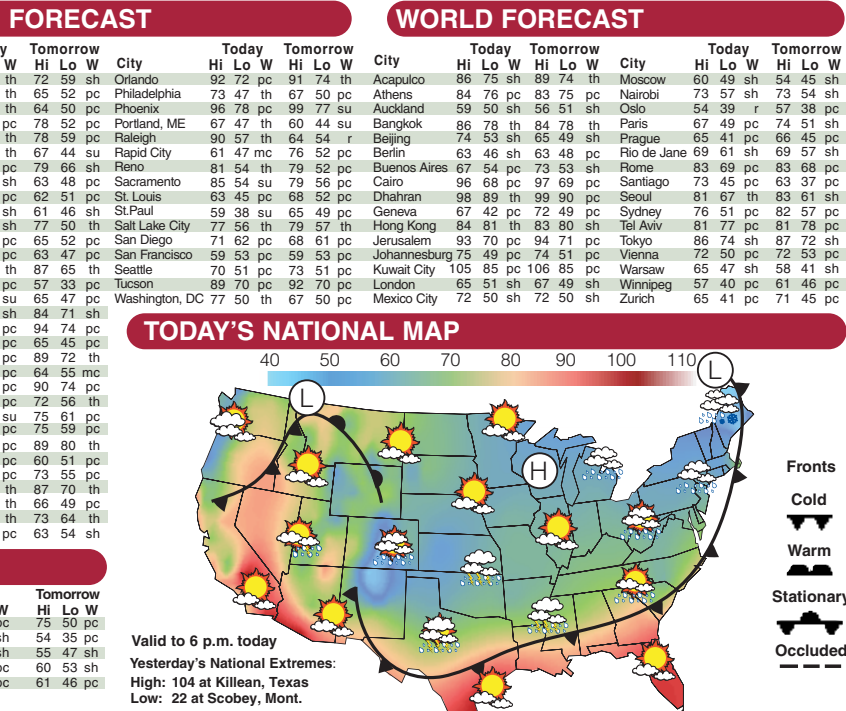

Trufant was already established by the time Seattle faced the Steelers for the title in Detroit. He'd been Seattle's starting cornerback from nearly the moment he was drafted 11th overall out of Washington State in 2003. It's a position he still holds now in his ninth season, through coaching changes, front office changes and other players brought in to challenge the veteran cornerback.

Asked if the Super Bowl loss to Pittsburgh really feels like it happened nearly a half-dozen years ago, Trufant simply smiled and said, "it kind of flies by."

"Years fly by and that's why you've got to really enjoy it," he said. "You've got to put your time in and you've got to go 100 percent because before you know it the years just fly by."

Hill and Trufant will see one more reminder of the Super Bowl on Sunday with Bill Leavy refereeing the game. Leavy was the referee for that Super Bowl and acknowledged last summer during an annual training-camp rules interpretation session with the Seattle media that he made mistakes in Seattle's disputed loss to the Steelers.

Both Hill and Trufant said Wednesday it's not an issue. "I said it then and I'll say it now, 'Nobody's perfect,'" Trufant said. "That's how it works."

Sally Brock of England reported this deal, in which she had declared four spades rather than the somewhat easier three no-trump. Brock was not sure she would be buying a balanced hand opposite, but did know of the 5-3 spade fit.
Against four spades, West led the club 10. Brock won in hand and played the spade queen, then the ace, followed by a third trump to dummy. Next, she played a diamond to her king, then exited with a second diamond, which ran to East’s jack.
East now switched accurately to a heart. Brock won with the ace and ruffed a diamond, hoping the ace would fall. When it didn’t, she crossed to her heart king and played the diamond queen, discarding dummy’s heart jack. With nothing left but clubs now, East had to lead around to the club queen.
Subsequently, Brock noted that had she started drawing trumps with the spade ace first and the queen second, then when West’s jack appeared, she could have overtaken her queen with dummy’s king and played a diamond. Another trump to dummy would have allowed her to play a second diamond and come to 10 tricks more easily.
But Brock later considered what might have happened in this variation if West had started with a spade holding of J-9-8-2. Wouldn’t dropping the spade jack on the second round be a terrific false-card, tempting declarer to overtake — and create a spade loser where none had existed before?

ANSWER: Your hand is certainly good enough for you to raise to three diamonds, rather than tamely passing. The only question is if you have enough to do more than produce the courtesy raise. Calls of both three clubs and two spades would sound like cue-bids in support of diamonds. I think you would need a fifth diamond, or maybe the diamond queen instead of the jack, to be worth either of those actions.
