Anti-suicide Signs Offer Hope along Twin Fall's Perrine Bridge

The signs, an Idaho first, were recently posted after a local anti-suicide group and state transportation officials negotiated their placement.

The Perrine Bridge is one of the Magic Valley's most popular scenic destinations. Unfortunately, it's also a common destination for those contemplating suicide.

The exact number of people who have ended their lives by jumping off the bridge — and a tally of those who have made dark contemplations on its span 486 feet above the Snake River — remains unknown. But considering that one such death is too many, the Idaho Transportation Department has partnered with a local anti-suicide organization to provide an alternative to

IDAHO WRONGLY PAID \$82M IN JOBLESS BENEFITS

The U.S. Department of Labor found more than 9 percent of Idaho's payments were improperly charged.

BOISE • An Idaho agency that doles out unemployment benefits improperly made about \$82 million in payments over a three-year period, a federal audit found.

The report from the U.S. Department of Labor detailed improper payments by states across the country and was based on a sample of claims.

It found more than 9 percent of Idaho's payments were in error during the three-year period that ended June 30.

The state paid out a total of \$930 million in unemployment benefits during that time, according to the Idaho Department of Labor.

Nearly 70 percent of the improper payments in Idaho involved residents who continued to receive benefits after returning to work and people who were improperly disqualified from receiving benefits because the labor department could not validate they met the state's job search requirements.

The report did not reflect money the state recouped from improper payments that were detected, Idaho Department of Labor spokesman Bob Fick said Wednesday during an interview with The Associated Press.

"People in our compliance bureau question whether those numbers accurately reflect the error rate that

Idaho Lawmakers Safe After Bombing in Turkey

Stennett, Pence listed among the lawmakers who were blocks away from a Tuesday explosion that killed three.

BOISE • State Sen. John McGee says he and other Idaho lawmakers visiting the Turkish capital on Tuesday were unharmed when a car bomb went off close to a nearby high school.

The Idaho Statesman reports that McGee, R-Caldwell, posted to his Facebook account, saying he and his wife were a few blocks away from the explosion in downtown Ankara that killed three people and wounded 34 others.

McGee said he and other state lawmakers visiting the city on a trip sponsored by the Pacifica Institute were unharmed.

McGee and at least four other Idaho lawmakers are on the trip that started last Tuesday and was expected to end Saturday.

Others traveling include Senate Minority Caucus Chairwoman Michelle Stennett, D-Ketchum, and Rep. Donna Pence, D-Gooding.

Reached Wednesday by phone, Rep. Steven Hartgen, R-Twin Falls, said he believed Twin Falls Republican Sen. Lee Heider was also among the group.

"I've not heard from Lee or anybody (as of 3 p.m.)," Hartgen said. "The story that I saw said they were

Mapping Idaho

When Josh Anderson goes hunting, he brings three essential things besides his rifle: his pickup, three dirt bikes and a GPS unit. The pickup gets him to the desired location, the dirt bikes — which he places at strategic locations in a 15-mile radius — make hauling big game out of the forest easier, and the GPS, complete with mapping technology, decreases his odds of getting lost. There's a method to his madness, the Twin Falls man said. "I drag the deer to a dirt bike, ride to my pickup, then drive it to pick up the deer and the other dirt bikes, and head home," Anderson said. As for modern technology, it has helped him become a more successful hunter because he can take virtual tours of the places he plans to hunt.

voltage transmission Wednesday, when the U.S. Bureau of Land Management gave Cassia County residents an in-depth look at its study of the project's potential impacts.

Idaho Power and Rocky Mountain Power want to build the 1,103-mile Gateway West transmission line across Wyoming and southern Idaho, cutting across private and public land in Cassia County and other neighboring

Xavier Holds Special Meeting Tonight

The Twin Falls school’s trustees will meet one day before principal Everett Bomgardner’s paid leave is set to end.

Two weeks after Xavier Charter School’s principal was placed on paid administrative leave, the Twin Falls school’s board will have its first opportunity to act further on the matter.

Xavier’s board will hold a special meeting at 6 p.m. today, during which it may or may not make a further determination on the sta-

tus of first-year school principal Everett Bomgardner. Earlier this month, trustees placed Bomgardner on paid leave that is scheduled to end Friday.

Today’s meeting agenda doesn’t have an item listed about Bomgardner during the open session. However, topics related to school employees typically come up during an executive session, which is closed to the public.

Board Chairwoman Debbi Burr said in an email Wednesday that she’s unsure of what, if any, action the board will take as a re-

sult of the executive session. However, any action would need to take place when trustees resume the public portion of the meeting.

Reasons under Idaho Code for why a board could call a closed session include: hiring a public employee to fill a certain vacancy; to consider evaluating, dismissing or disciplining a public school employee; and to communicate with legal counsel.

actually occurs,” Fick said.

The state recovered \$3.9 million in improper benefit payments in 2007; \$3.8 million in 2008; \$4.2 million in 2009; and \$5.5 million in 2010, Fick said. So far this year, the agency has recovered about \$5.2 million as of August, Fick said.

The report found Idaho had the lowest error rate when compared to other states in the Pacific Northwest during the three-year time span. Washington state had the highest at 14.1 percent and more than \$775 million in improper unemployment payments, according to the report.

Oregon had a 12.2 percent error rate and \$392.4 million in improper payments while 11.8 percent of Alaska’s payments — or roughly \$56.1 million — were made in error.

The federal report was released last week and the data for the state was first reported by IdahoReporter.com, which is funded by the Idaho Freedom Foundation, a group that advocates against what it calls government waste and for free-market solutions.

States have a Sept. 30 deadline to submit plans to the federal government on how they plan to curb improper payments.

CSI SEEKS TO INCREASE GRADUATION, RETENTION RATES

The College of Southern Idaho is jumping on board with a national challenge to increase college completion rates.

CSI trustees agreed earlier this week to sign on with the Community College Completion Challenge, joining other institutions around the country that have agreed to make changes to encourage students to finish college.

“The focus is to have students graduate within three years,” Retention and Graduation Coordinator Erin Devlin said during a board meeting.

The initiative was launched last year by the American Association of Community Colleges and five other national organizations. It follows a goal set by President Barack Obama that the U.S. will have 50 percent more graduates with college degrees or certificates by 2020.

CSI uses three main indicators of student success: graduation, completion and retention rates.

The college’s graduation rate, which shows how many students graduate within three years of enrolling, is currently 18 percent.

The completion rate is

CSI statistics

18 percent graduation rate (within three years of enrolling)
51 percent retention rate (how many degree-seeking students come back for another school year)
71 percent completion rate (how many students earn a “C” or higher in their classes)

much higher — 71 percent. That measure is used to show how many students complete their classes with a “C” grade or higher.

The college’s 51 percent retention rate shows how many degree-seeking, full-time freshman students return during the next school year.

Statistics “are going to change,” Devlin said, since official counts are being completed this fall for retention rates, for example. Devlin, who was hired in July for the new retention and graduation coordinator position, is researching initiatives used at other community colleges similar to CSI to encourage students to finish college.

Adopting larger initiatives isn’t an overnight process. They would have to be incorporated into the college’s strategic plan.

counties. The proposal has faced stiff opposition from Cassia County landowners who want it moved south, to where it will cross less private land. Wednesday at the Burrey Best Western Inn & Convention Center, the criticism continued.

“The (BLM’s draft environmental impact statement) is a slap in the face to the Cassia County Gateway West Task Force,” said task force Chairman Brent Stoker. “The task force is not mentioned in this document at all. We’re really disgusted, it’s like the task force does not exist. We spent two and a half years on this trying to comply and we have nothing to show for it.”

While Stoker has been one of the most outspoken critics of the proposed project, not everyone at Wednesday’s forum panned Gateway West.

“I came out here to see how disruptive this will be to the agricultural community and to the rest of us,” said Heyburn resident Dan Jensen. “It looks like they are trying to respect the private landowners and keep the farmland intact.”

HEYBURN MAN INVOLVED IN FATAL COLLISION NEAR BLACKFOOT

Two eastern Idaho residents were killed Wednesday near Blackfoot when their car collided with a semi-trailer driven by a Heyburn man.

Idaho State Police are investigating the two-vehicle crash that occurred on Interstate 15 at milepost 83, between Fort Hall and Blackfoot.

Micah Story, 17, of Chubbuck, was traveling north on I-15 in a 2002 Ford Mustang. Jacob Colbo, 18, of Blackfoot, was a passenger in Story’s vehicle.

According to the police report, Story left the roadway for unknown reasons and drove through the median. As Story’s vehicle crossed into the south-

bound lanes, it overturned and was struck by a semi-trailer driven by George Hernandez, 57, of Heyburn.

Story and Colbo were pronounced dead at the scene. Both Colbo and Hernandez were wearing seat belts. It is unknown whether Story was wearing a seat belt.

Hernandez was not injured in the collision.

Northbound lanes were blocked for approximately two hours. Southbound lanes were blocked for approximately four hours.

The crash investigation is ongoing, but speed is not believed to be a factor.

those who may need it the most.

Signs now posted on each side of the bridge list the national suicide hot-line phone number with a simple question above it, “Need hope?”

The signs were designed to be intentionally vague, said Lori Stewart, co-chairwoman of Suicide Prevention Action Network of Idaho’s regional office.

“These signs are there for anyone who needs help — it doesn’t just have to be suicide,” she said. “We don’t want to leave anyone out.”

It has taken more than a year for SPAN to get approval from ITD to post the signs on the bridge. According to ITD, it is state policy that non-traffic related

signs are forbidden on bridges. When SPAN first applied for the signs, the request was rejected. Approval was only granted after multiple appeals and negotiations occurred between the two parties.

Now, the Perrine Bridge is the first bridge in Idaho to have an anti-suicide sign posted on it.

“There’s no normal when it comes to prevention measures on bridges,” said Kim Kane, executive director of SPAN in Boise. “Bridges are as different as the communities they are in. Barriers are the most effective, but it’s whatever you can do to meet the needs of your community that will work best when it comes to suicide prevention.”

Idaho has one of the highest suicide rates in the country. In 2010, Idaho’s suicide rate was 18.5 deaths

per 100,000 people.

Signs like those posted on the Perrine Bridge will hopefully raise awareness that Idaho needs more resources for those contemplating suicide. Currently, Idaho is the only state without its own anti-suicide hot-line.

“I’d like to see our legislators move closer to getting a suicide hot-line for Idaho,” Stewart said. “This is a huge issue for the state. Any message we can get out there to people to offer hope will help us move forward.”

Blaine School Trustees OK Increased Auditorium Costs

HAILEY • Blaine County School trustees voted unanimously Monday night to pour an additional \$660,000 into the remodel of the auditorium at the Community Campus.

The school district originally allocated \$880,000 of its 10-year, \$59.8 million plant facilities levy for the project. But the final cost of equipping it with revamped acoustics and lighting, catwalks and other amenities brings the cost up to \$1.54 million, members of

the auditorium advisory committee told the board.

“The committee worked hard to make sure what we put in is going to last. The focus truly has been on education,” said advisory committee member John Glenn, a member of the Company of Fools theater company.

Some in the audience questioned putting so much money into the auditorium, which will be used by high school and community arts groups, and suggested the money should be spent on technology upgrades.

But the district’s finance

manager, Mike Chatterton, countered that the Community Campus is only 35 years old — younger than some of the district’s other buildings.

And the facilities levy money can’t be spent on curriculum, added School Superintendent Lonnie Barber. One of the selling points of the levy was to provide a quality auditorium, and he maintained that the promise needs to be kept.

The auditorium had old lighting that required drama students to stand in certain places if they wanted to be in the spotlight. Its

acoustics were so poor that choirs presented their recitals in a Ketchum church.

Trustee Kathryn Graves said she believes the remodel is needed. “People have been talking about it for years,” she said.

Trustee Don Nurge agreed. “But to do this, we may need to make sacrifices elsewhere — some of which are unforeseen. I also want to be clear this should be the maximum dollar amount.”

The remodel, which has already started, should be finished in February, said Architect Buffalo Rixon. The auditorium, which was part of the old high school, will lose a little more than 100 seats in the remodel. But at 494 seats, it will provide one of the largest performing arts venues in the Wood River Valley.

Ex-lunch Lady Accused of Sex with Teen Arraigned

MERIDIAN • A former high school cafeteria worker accused of having a sexual relationship with a 17-year-old Idaho boy has been released from jail and ordered not to have contact with any minors other than her daughter.

KTVB-TV reports that 48-year-old Laurie J. Matthews of Meridian was arraigned Tuesday on a felony charge of sexual battery of a minor. A judge issued a no-contact order after prosecutors said Matthews had contacted an underage witness in the case.

Prosecutors claim Matthews had a relationship with the boy that started in September 2010, when she was employed in the Meridian High School cafeteria. She was fired in November, which is about two months before police say the relationship ended.

A preliminary hearing has been scheduled for Oct. 11.

Longtime Fish and Game Officer Killed by Tree

The tree was supporting a dead tree that had previously fallen into it, which apparently caused the tree to fall in a direction Teeter hadn't expected.

Teeter's son Kelly Teeter tells the *Idaho State Journal* that they were cutting firewood and the tree just fell on him.

Lon Teeter had ended his career as a conservation officer in Fish and Game's Region 5 in 2000. Regional supervisor Mark Gamblin says Teeter continued to perform volunteer work and was a full-time volunteer coordinator for the agency until 2005.

2 Teens Killed in Crash on I-15 near Fort Hall

POCATELLO • Idaho State Police say two teenagers died in a crash on Interstate 15 north of Fort Hall.

Troopers say a 2002 Ford Mustang driven by 17-year-old Micah Story of Chubbuck crossed over the median and into the southbound lanes on Tuesday afternoon. The Mustang overturned and was struck by a tractor-trailer.

The Idaho State Journal reports that Story and her passenger, 18-year-old Jacob Colbo of Blackfoot, were both declared dead at the scene.

The truck driver was unharmed.

Police are investigating the cause of the accident, but say they don't believe speed was a factor.

The crash closed southbound traffic on the interstate until about 7 p.m.

Police Search for Suspect in Attempted Kidnapping

BOISE • The Boise Police Department is searching for a suspect in the attempted kidnapping of a 6-year-old boy.

Police say witnesses reported late Monday that the man had picked up the boy by the arm and tried to place him into a child's seat on the back of his bike. Witnesses told police they heard the child screaming for his mother at about 10 p.m.

Police say the man was seen letting off the boy and riding off on his bike as one witness approached.

Witnesses say the man was believed to be in his mid-20s and was wearing a white long sleeve shirt, white pants, white shoes and a white ball cap.

Sun Valley Planning Process Irks Company

SUN VALLEY (AP) • A Sun Valley Co. official scolded Sun Valley leaders at a city council meeting, withdrew the company's application for changes to the city's comprehensive plan, and then walked out of the meeting.

"As far as I'm concerned, we're wasting our time here," Wally Huffman, Sun Valley Co.'s director of resorts and resort development, told city council members at the meeting last week. "If it helps the process, we withdraw the entire application. But this city, please, get your act together. This is not a fair process."

The company wants to revise the 2005 comprehensive plan and the land-use designation of the future land-use map for property belonging to Sun Valley Co. in the resort area of central Idaho.

"We're not here trying to get anything out of the city, or out of the people in this city," Huffman said. "What we tried to do in anticipation of moving forward the zoning process based upon the plan that we submitted to you in 2004 was to clean up the comp plan so we could then come back to you with the zoning ordinance."

Sun Valley Co.'s proposed changes included preserving some of its property as open space in exchange for rezoning other areas to allow for increased development. The Idaho Mountain Express reports (<http://bit.ly/oi3av0>) that some residents are against the proposed changes, citing concerns that they are too great a departure from the city's comprehensive plan.

Councilwoman Joan Lamb said the approval process could be improved, but it's also designed to bring in differing opinions.

"There is a divergence of views, and the process is intended to bring those out and have everyone have a chance to air them," she said. "I think really that's the issue more so than the process. There is a reason why it's not perfect. I feel very comfortable that our staff did everything that they should have done the way they should have done it."

But Councilman Bob Youngman said the process could use some changes.

"It's clear that our process is broken," he said. "We need to do something as a council about how this type of, any type, of comp plan amendment or rezoning is handled."

Sun Valley Mayor Wayne Willich said land-use planning and zoning is mainly dictated by state law, but the city could change some things inside that process.

Councilman Nils Ribi said part of the problem could simply be communication, with some constituents out of town for weeks or months each year.

"I think communication is a key thing," Ribi said. "I think the city has got to step up to the plate and start using more technology in getting information out."

Land Board to Update Management Plan

BOISE (AP) • Idaho Land Board members have voted to update a plan for managing the agency's \$3.6 billion endowment after some lawmakers said recent investments put it into competition with the private sector.

Members voted Tuesday to revise its plan in the wake of the \$2.7 million purchase of a storage business in Boise that led some lawmakers to seek ways to limit what the agency can buy.

"I for one, believe that clarification in our overall plan is probably appropriate, to help us focus our thoughts and our actions and also ed-

ucate the public and the Legislature about what we're trying to accomplish," said Attorney General Lawrence Wasden, a board member.

Plans call for the Land Department to work with Land Board members and their staff and present the proposed update to the Land Board in November.

Idaho has 2.5 million acres of endowment land worth \$2.3 billion, with another \$1.3 billion in an endowment trust invested in stocks and bonds. The land was granted by the federal government when Idaho became a state in 1890 to support public

schools, higher education and a state hospital.

State officials are constitutionally obligated to manage the state endowment lands for the maximum long-term financial return for beneficiaries. The Spokesman Review reports (<http://bit.ly/qDxtuU>) that board members said Tuesday they have no plans to stop fulfilling that obligation.

Last year the five Land Board members voted unanimously to spend \$2.7 million to add a storage business called Affordable Self-Storage in Boise as part of its efforts to diversify its invest-

ments. Much of the state's endowment is timber land.

The storage business is run by a private contractor, but storage industry officials and some conservatives cried foul, accusing Idaho of competing with the private sector.

Two board members, Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter and Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna, in July said their original vote was a mistake. Besides Otter, Wasden and Luna, the other two board members are Controller Donna Jones and Secretary of State Ben Ysursa.

Last month, Idaho lawmakers after two days of hearings vowed to return later this year with proposed new limits on the state lands agency's effort to reshape its endowment. Legislation they're working on could include restrictions on the kinds of property the Idaho Land Board can buy; provisions forcing Idaho to invest land-sale proceeds in stocks and bonds, not bank it for future land purchases; and compensating local governments for tax revenue they lose when the state adds new properties to endowment holdings.

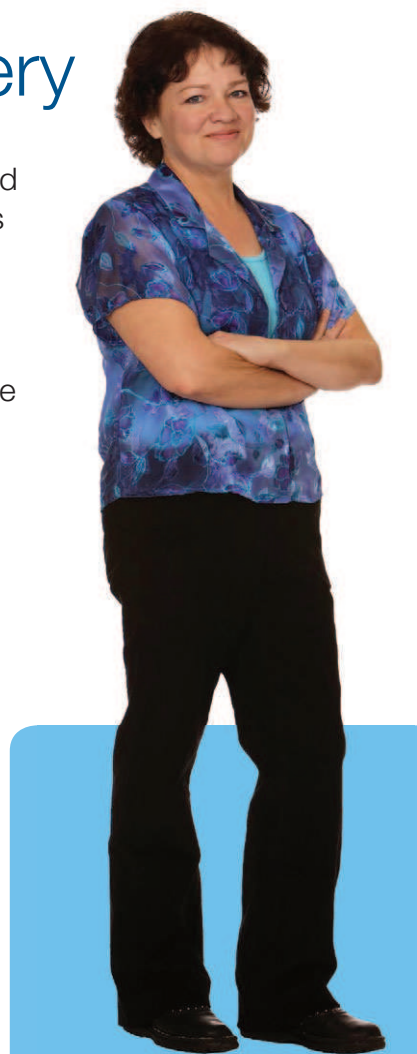

How the Light Bulb Saga Illuminates New Republicans

How many Republicans does it take to screw in an energy-efficient light bulb? The answer to that riddle tells us much about the state of the Republican Party in 2011.

The light bulb ban has become a rallying cry on the right. Rush Limbaugh called it an alarming advance of “statism.” Minnesota Rep. and Republican presidential candidate Michele Bachmann promised that “President Bachmann will allow you to buy any light bulb you want in the United States of America.”

The fact that there is no light bulb ban should in no way spoil the fun, of course, but the issue does have some history. Congress passed a bipartisan bill in 2007 requiring a phase-in of more efficient lighting. Under the law, which was drafted with industry input, a 100-watt incandescent bulb would have to use only 72 watts of energy in 2012.

Consumers, who would save a considerable amount in energy costs, wouldn't be required to switch to the even more energy-efficient and cost-saving fluorescent bulbs; they could keep using the traditional incandescent variety, provided those met the new standards.

The law passed the House with 95 Republican votes and was signed by President George W. Bush. There were no riots in the streets. Yet by the time Republicans took over the House in January 2011, this previously uncontroversial legislation had become the basis of an ideological war. Between 2007 and 2011, energy waste and pollution seem to have become inviolable conservative principles.

The Republican congressman who was co-author of the 2007 bill, Rep. Fred Upton of Michigan, renounced his own work. Republican Rep. Joe Barton, who had previously claimed the spotlight to apologize to BP for all the fuss about its oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico, introduced a bill repealing most of Upton's energy-efficiency provisions.

A radical reversal on light bulbs won't shake the foundations of the republic, but it's indicative of a party that is unmoored from both philosophy and substantive politics. Republicans today are defined not by what they are for but almost exclusively by what they are against. And they are against just about everything — including many things they used to be for.

The individual mandate was once a pet Republican idea for forcing free riders to pay for their share of society's health-care costs, a way to enlarge the risk pool so that a system of private insurance could continue to function without bankrupting individuals or the nation. Conservatives didn't rage against the idea when former governor Mitt Romney introduced it in Massachusetts. Now it's tantamount to death by socialism.

The problem here isn't hypocrisy, which abounds at all points on the political spectrum. It's that Republicans have abandoned market-based solutions in favor of no solutions at all. They've traded in their traditional small-government philosophy for anti-government rage.

In reality, there are very few Joe the Plumbers among the largely wealthy, educated and professionally successful members of the House and Senate Republican caucuses. Yet these politicians are so afraid of their noisy anti-government, anti-intellectual wing that they fear expressing support for even the most limited government — the kind that can fix a highway or keep a bridge from falling down.

In their current frame of mind, House Republicans and their brethren in the Senate may ultimately be legislating against themselves. If Republicans are so determined to be against something, maybe they ought to drop the war on light bulbs and pick a fight with E. coli.

Southern Baptist is the unofficial state religion, though atheists, agnostics and critics of America are represented at many universities. Texas Baptists go to church on Sunday mornings (and Sunday and Wednesday nights). They can recite the menu at a church supper, right down to the Jell-O squares with em-

bedded carrot shavings. Sweet tea is the preferred drink at such functions. Texans love their college football and the Dallas Cowboys.

Texans share a connection not found in any other state. Last week, I took my daughter's car to have her tires checked. She recently moved back to Washington from San Antonio and her car still has Texas plates. A man wearing a University of Texas cap yelled to me, “Go Texas!” That doesn't happen with Vermonters.

The Republic of Texas was once an independent country (from 1836 to 1845) before it became part of the United States on Dec. 29, 1845. It even had its own coinage, which you can buy through numismatic channels. Perhaps this explains Texas' independent streak.

When I first moved to Texas to work at a Houston TV station, one of my colleagues had fun asking me to pronounce the names of various streets and towns. I got most of them wrong, because Texans don't pronounce a lot of names and words the way

they are “supposed” to be pronounced.

Oh, and anyone who thinks chicken-fried steak has anything to do with chicken is clearly a “foreigner.”

Texans enjoy laughing at themselves, but they don't take kindly to other people laughing at them. Aggie jokes have been popular for a long time and students or alumni from other Texas schools mostly tell them. The jokes are supposed to highlight the alleged intellectual deficiencies at Texas A&M University. Of course, students and graduates of A&M are not stupid, but the jokes are funny. For example: Did you hear about the Aggie who won a gold medal at the Olympics? He liked it so much that he decided to get it bronzed.

If the elites want to understand Texas, they have to do more than engage in drive-by writing assignments. They should live there, as I did. I still miss much of what Texas offered my family. Rick Perry revives the warm feelings I have for the state. Maybe that's because I finally understand the language.

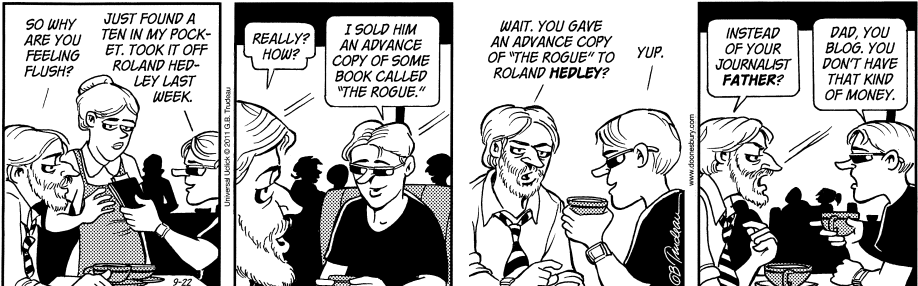

Families Applaud Fix at Eagle Intersection

Ada County Highway District installs traffic light, makes other changes at intersection where 43 crashes have killed two people and injured 36 since 2001.

EAGLE • For years, Jan Leifson asked her teenage children and other relatives not to use the intersection where Ballantyne Road and State Street connected to Idaho 44 just west of Eagle. Last year, her worst fear about the curving, dangerous stretch of road became a reality: Her 85-year-old aunt was killed in a car crash at the intersection. “Unfortunately, it took the death of a loved one to get me to do anything,” Leifson said Tuesday. Just a couple of weeks after her aunt’s death, Leifson

went to an Ada County Highway District Commission meeting to ask that the intersection be made safer. Terry Sayer of Eagle was there to make a similar plea. Sayer was involved in a crash at the intersection in 2005, and had avoided it since. On Tuesday, Leifson and Sayer were on hand to cheer when the Highway District flipped the switch on a new traffic signal at the realigned intersection. Since 2001, 43 crashes involving 120 people with 36 injuries and two fatalities have occurred where the east-west route through Eagle entered the state high-

way on a high-speed curve. The new intersection connects State Street about 1,300 feet to the west, on a straight section of highway that now has the protection of a signal to stop cross traffic for cars entering the highway. ACHD Commissioner John Franden, who represents the Eagle area, described the old section of road as “scary.” ACHD heeded the residents’ and city’s concerns and looked for a way to make the project happen sooner than it had planned. The district was able to move the project up one year because of lower-than-

expected construction costs on other projects. “We were able to put those dollars into this project,” Franden said. “This is a much-needed safety improvement.” The Highway District also didn’t mind paying the full cost of installing a traffic signal on the state-owned Idaho 44. ITD had offered \$300,000 in federal-aid money to pay for part of the signal, but ACHD said waiting for federal money would have delayed the project. This is not the first time the Highway District has picked up the tab to make safety improvements on a state highway. Last year, ACHD approved paying the full cost of installing a traffic signal and right-turn lanes at the

intersection of state-owned Idaho 55 and county-maintained Hill Road, which had been the site of 23 accidents in five years. The signal should be installed in the spring. ITD and ACHD are planning to split the cost of installing a new traffic signal in front of the Ada County Courthouse, where hundreds of jaywalkers cross daily. If both parties approve the spending, the light will likely go up in January. As the Valley’s once-rural highways become more urbanized, high-speed travel along miles of signal-free stretches will become a thing of the past. “Nobody is cheering about a new stoplight,” Leifson said. “But we are all cheering because the road is now safer.”

Cigarette Sparks Fire at Post Falls Apartment

POST FALLS • A cigarette has been determined as the cause of Wednesday morning’s blaze that destroyed three units and damaged nine others at the Falls Park Apartments in Post Falls. Shaena Dunn, Kootenai County Fire and Rescue spokeswoman, said the fire started on a second-story balcony of the three-story complex. No one was injured. Most of the 41 residents in the 24-unit were evacuated, but a few residents didn’t wake up until after the fire was out and after the evacuation process. The fire at 304 W. Fourth Ave. next to Falls Park was reported at 1:42 a.m.

Affected residents are being assisted with housing by a combination of the American Red Cross, families, churches and neighbors. “It was like a dream,” said resident Russ Bottel-son, who lives on the third floor of the building and had the ceiling in a bedroom collapse due to the blaze. “I looked outside and saw flames shooting across my balcony. I threw on a pair of pants, a shirt, grabbed some valuables, started knocking on doors. Then I heard someone yell, ‘It’s going to blow!’” Linda Bell, who lives in the apartment building next to the one that burned, said the flames were massive. “I haven’t seen a fire like that in many years,” she said. “The flames went up 20 feet or more. Thank God everybody got out. I thought the whole building was going to go.”

Rexburg Police Say Man Bites Officer

REXBURG • Police say efforts to get information from a Rexburg man after a report of a fight led to an officer being bitten by the suspect. Calvin J. Wylie, 55, was jailed Monday afternoon on a misdemeanor charge of delaying or resisting arrest. Another misdemeanor charge of battery on an officer was filed Tuesday. He was released on a \$300 bond. Rexburg police say the incident began shortly after 1 p.m. Monday when officers received a call from a woman who reported that a fight had broken out in the Walmart parking lot. Capt. Randy Lewis said the investigation by police indicates that there was an incident between Wylie and an unknown person or persons that involved a heated discussion over alleged damage to Wylie’s car, but no fight actually broke out. One of the arresting officers said that Wylie was initially detained in the parking lot of the Maverik

convenience store on Second East. The officer said Wylie’s car matched the description of one that left the scene of the incident reported at Walmart. Three RPD officers and a deputy from Madison County responded at the Maverik. Lewis said the decision was made to arrest Wylie because he refused to comply with instructions by the officers, including a request to provide identification. Police allege that during the arrest Wylie became aggressive and Wylie and one of the officers fell, and it was then that the officer was bitten. Rexburg police say the bite did not break the skin. Police did not release the name of the officer. Madison Fire Department officials were called to the scene to check out the officer and Wylie, who was reported to have received several facial scratches. Fire department officials say that neither the officer who was bitten nor Wylie was seriously injured in the incident.

More Details Emerge from Strange Assault Case in Bonner County

SANDPOINT • Court documents and police reports are painting a fuller picture in a peculiar Bonner County assault case. Little was known about the circumstances surrounding an incident in which a Vay landowner used a John Deere tractor to dismantle a home on his property with a woman and two children still inside. The episode resulted in three felony assault charges against Paul Fagerlie Finman, who faces trial in 1st District Court this fall. Court documents and other records, meanwhile, reveal that Finman, 56, was entangled in a dispute with an adherent of the sovereign citizen movement named Alexander Duncan Campbell.

Finman inherited the entanglement with the property he purchased off Bandy Road in Vay. Campbell, his wife, son and daughter were living on a home on the ranch rent-free. Eviction proceedings commenced after Finman said he received what he considered to be a death threat from Campbell veiled in Biblical verse. The defense maintains Finman was unaware Campbell’s wife and children were inside when he began destroying the home to deter squatters. Campbell, 66, was not at the home during the incident. Campbell’s children testified at a preliminary hearing that they feared for their lives during the ordeal, although his teenage daughter managed to find the time to document the destruction with a camera from

within the home. Campbell was also in repeated phone contact with his wife during the incident. “They are just being herded by Mr. Campbell. They don’t do anything independently of him,” said Jeremy Featherston, Finman’s Sandpoint defense attorney. Campbell did not respond to a phone message seeking comment. Featherston subpoenaed Campbell to testify at a preliminary hearing, but he dodged it by claiming he was improperly identified in the document. The state has no interest in Campbell as a witness because he was not present when the home was being destroyed. “He has absolutely zero to do with this case,” said Deputy Prosecutor Shane Greenbank.

Emmett Man Faces Child Pornography Charges

EMMETT • An Emmett man faces charges for possession of child pornography following seizure of 10 computers and 30 hard drives from his residence. According to a prepared statement from the Emmett Police Department, officers executed a search warrant at the home Randall L. Niccolls on Aug. 25, after a Boise Police Internet Crimes Against Children Taskforce detective discovered that child pornography had been

downloaded to the suspect’s address. Taskforce officers from the Emmett, Nampa, Caldwell, and Boise police departments and the Ada, Canyon and Gem County sheriff’s departments assisted with the execution of the warrant. Emmett Police arrested Niccolls, who faces two counts of sexual exploitation of a child, according to court records. He is currently free on a \$50,000 bond. His preliminary hearing is scheduled for Nov. 18 in Gem County.

Idaho Woman Drowns in Montana Kayaking Accident

KALISPELL, Mont. (AP) • Authorities say a 51-year-old Idaho woman drowned in the North Fork Flathead River in northwestern Montana after her inflatable kayak became tangled in tree roots. Flathead County Sheriff Chuck Curry says the woman and her husband were in a two-seated kayak about two miles south of Polebridge when the accident happened at about 1 p.m. Wednesday. Curry

says the kayak became entangled in a root ball before it folded, inverted and rolled over. The woman and her 59-year-old husband were wearing life preservers, and The Daily Inter Lake in Kalispell reports the husband freed himself and flagged down help at a nearby road. The victim’s name and hometown are being withheld until relatives can be notified.

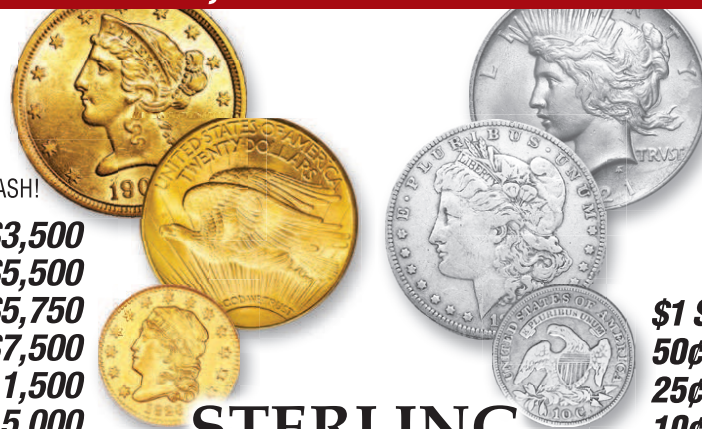

Georgia Executes Davis; Supporters Claim Injustice

JACKSON, Ga. • Georgia executed Troy Davis on Wednesday night for the murder of an off-duty police officer, a crime he denied committing right to the end as supporters around the world mourned and declared that an innocent man was put to death.

Defiant to the end, he told relatives of Mark MacPhail that his 1989 slaying was not his fault. "I did not have a gun," he insisted.

"For those about to take my life," he told prison officials, "may God have mercy on your souls. May God bless your souls."

Davis was declared dead at 11:08. The lethal injection began about 15 minutes earlier, after the Supreme Court rejected an 11th-hour request for a stay.

The court did not comment on its order, which came about four hours after it received the request and more than three hours after the planned execution time.

Though Davis' attorneys said seven of nine key witnesses against him disputed all or parts of their testimony, state and federal judges repeatedly ruled against

granting him a new trial. As the court losses piled up Wednesday, his offer to take a polygraph test was rejected and the pardons board refused to give him one more hearing.

Davis' supporters staged vigils in the U.S. and Europe, declaring "I am Troy Davis" on signs, T-shirts and the Internet. Some tried increasingly frenzied measures, urging prison workers to stay home and even posting a judge's phone number online, hoping people will press him to put a stop to the lethal injection. President Barack Obama deflected calls for him to get involved.

"They say death row; we say hell no!" protesters shouted outside the Jackson prison where Davis was to be executed. In Washington, a crowd outside the Supreme Court yelled the same chant.

As many as 700 demonstrators gathered outside the prison as a few dozen riot police stood watch, but the crowd thinned as the night wore on and the outcome became clear. The scene turned eerily quiet as word of the high court's decision spread, with demonstrators hugging, crying, praying, holding candles and gathering around Davis' family.

2 Americans Freed From Iran Prison Begin Trek Home

MUSCAT, Oman • After more than two years in Iranian custody, two Americans convicted as spies took their first steps toward home Wednesday as they banded down from a private jet and into the arms of family for a joyful reunion in the Gulf state of Oman.

The families called this "the best day of our lives," and President Barack Obama said their release — un-

der a \$1 million bail-for-freedom deal — "wonderful news."

The release capped complicated diplomatic maneuvers over a week of confusing signals by Iran's leadership on the fate of Josh Fattal and Shane Bauer.

Although the fate of the two gripped America, it was on the periphery of the larger showdowns between Washington and Tehran

Obama, Europeans Pressure Palestinians to Drop U.N. Bid

Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas presses toward a formal bid for U.N. recognition that could bring the diplomatic crisis to a head on Friday.

UNITED NATIONS • Furiously scrambling to head off a U.N. show-down, the United States warned world leaders Wednesday that trying to create a Palestinian nation by simple decree instead of through hard negotiations was bound to fail as a shortcut to peace with Israel. Europeans worked to defuse the dispute, too, France urging new talks within a month.

Undeterred, Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas pressed toward a formal bid for U.N. recognition that could bring the issue to a head on Friday.

Addressing the U.N., President Barack Obama and French President Nicolas Sarkozy offered different solutions to defuse the diplomatic crisis. Sarkozy wants the Palestinians seek a lesser form of recognition at the U.N., while joining new talks with Israel.

The Israeli-Palestinian conflict, seen as a defining test of peace in modern times, overwhelmed other matters as

members of the world body watched a crisis deepen before them.

A frustrated Obama declared to U.N. members that "there are no shortcuts" to peace, and he implored Israelis and Palestinians to restart direct talks. His influence limited and his hopes for a peace deal long stymied, Obama didn't directly call on the Palestinians to drop their bid for recognition from the U.N. Security Council. But the U.S. threat to veto any such U.N. action loomed unmistakably.

"Peace will not come through statements and resolutions at the United Nations," Obama told delegates. "If it were that easy, it would have been accomplished by now!"

Study: Dialysis Regimen Might Not be Enough

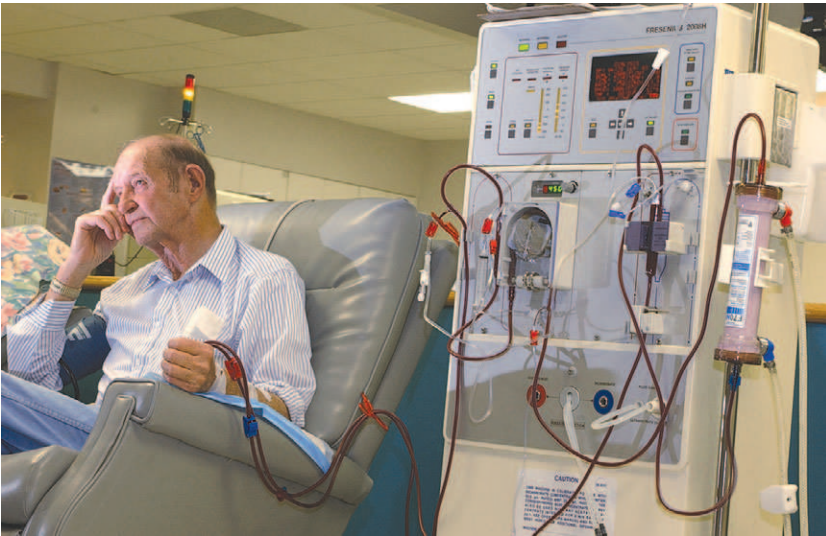
LOS ANGELES • A major study challenges the way diabetics and others with failing kidneys have been treated for half a century, finding that three-times-a-week dialysis to cleanse the blood of toxins may not be enough.

Deaths, heart attacks and hospitalizations were much higher on the day after the two-day interval between treatments each week than at other times, the federally funded study found.

The president of the National Kidney Foundation said she was "very troubled" by the results published in Thursday's New England Journal of Medicine.

"We could be doing a better job for our dialysis patients" and that might mean doing it more often, said Dr. Lynda Szczech, a Duke University kidney specialist who had no role in the study.

Kidneys rid the body of waste and fluids. Most of the 400,000 Americans with failing kidneys stay alive by get-

ting their blood purified by a machine three days a week at dialysis clinics — usually on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays or on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. In both cases, there's a two-

day break between the last session of the week and the next one.

The three-day dialysis schedule has been around since the mid-1960s and

HOUSE KILLS SPENDING BILL WITH DISASTER AID

WASHINGTON • In a rebuke to GOP leaders, the House on Wednesday rejected a measure providing \$3.7 billion for disaster relief as part of a bill to prevent a government shutdown at the end of next week.

The surprise 230-195 defeat came at the hands of Democrats and tea party Republicans.

Democrats were opposed because the measure contains \$1.5 billion in cuts to a government loan program to help car companies build fuel-efficient vehicles. For their part, many GOP conservatives felt the underlying bill permits spending at too high a rate.

The outcome sends House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, and his leadership team back to the drawing board as they seek to make sure the government

Sarkozy supported an observer state status for Palestine but not full U.N. membership for now. That idea would head off a Security Council vote and veto that he said would risk “engendering a cycle of violence in the Middle East.”

The French president proposed a one-year timetable for Israel and the Palestinians to reach an accord.

Palestinian officials made it clear that the latest proposal, while welcome, would do nothing to prevent them from going to the Security Council and seeking full statehood.

“This is a moment of truth,” said Nabeel Shaath, an Abbas adviser.

At the heart of the fight, Abbas and Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu pursued support from other leaders but not each other. Various mediators searched for consensus for a diplomatic solution to preclude the showdown and revive peace talks.

Netanyahu thanked Obama for defending Israel, which fears that a Palestinian state drawn by the U.N. would include borders leaving the Jewish state vulnerable to attack. The United States is Israel’s staunchest defender in demanding that direct talks are the only means to Palestinian statehood, a position that leaves Obama arguing against fast world endorsement of a Palestinian homeland he has repeatedly said he supports.

Palestinian senior aide Saeb Erekat said the pursuit of full U.N. membership would not be slowed: “We will not allow any political maneuvering on this issue,” he said.

Beyond the public eye, U.S. and other officials began to concede that an effort to deter Palestinians from bringing the matter before the world body had failed, and the so-called Quartet of Mideast peace mediators worked on a deal intended to address the long-standing concerns of both sides. The Quartet consists of the United States, the European Union, the United Nations and Russia.

Under that compromise plan, the Quartet would issue a statement in which Israel would have to accept its pre-1967 Mideast War borders, with land exchanges, as the basis for a two-state solution, and the Palestinians would have to recognize Israel’s Jewish character if there was to be a deal, officials close to the talks said.

The officials spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss ongoing diplomacy.

European officials, supported by the U.S., were outlining the compromise agreement to the Israeli and Palestinian governments and asking for tough concessions from each.

BENNETT APOLOGIZES FOR 9/11 COMMENT

Tony Bennett apologized Wednesday for suggesting the United States provoked the 9/11 attacks, saying he was only expressing his feelings as a pacifist when he made the comments during an interview on Howard Stern’s radio show. “There is simply no excuse for terrorism and the murder of the nearly 3,000 innocent victims of the 9/11 attacks on our country,” the 85-year-old crooner said in a written statement. — *The Associated Press*

Satellite on Track for Friday Plunge

LOS ANGELES • A bus-sized, 6.5-ton, 20-year-old NASA climate satellite is falling out of orbit and likely to hit Earth some time Friday. It is impossible to say where.

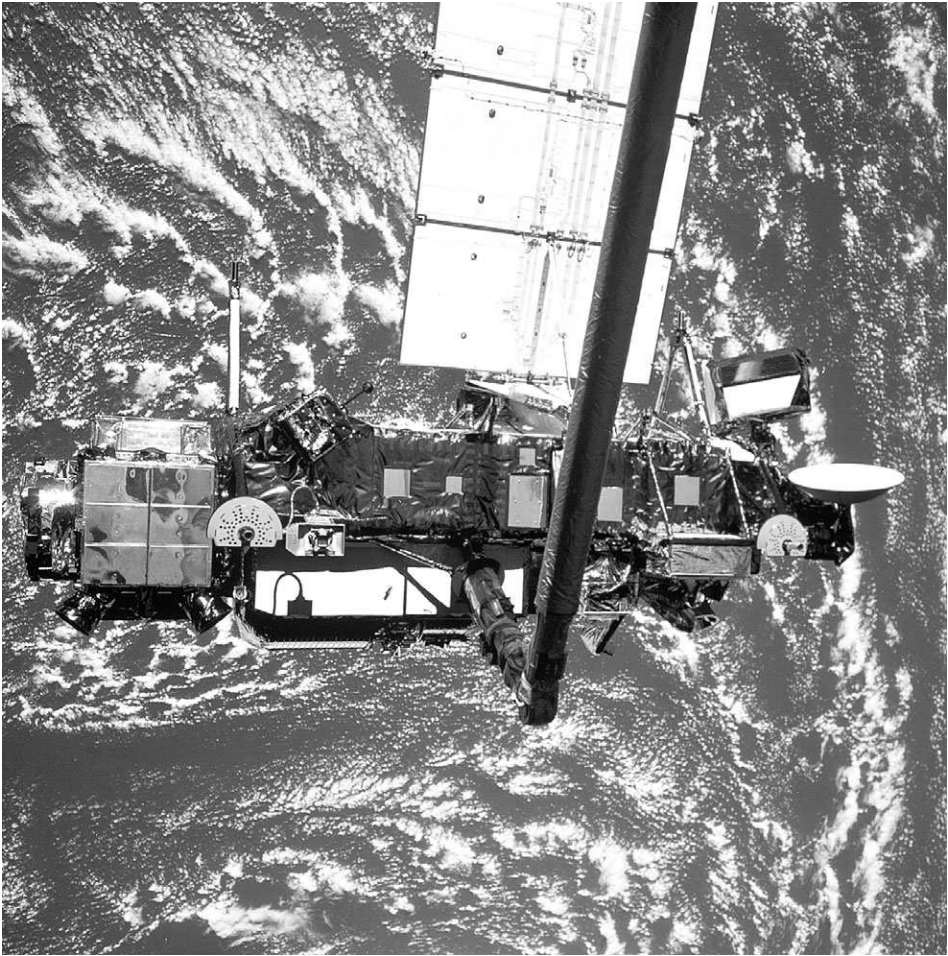
The chances are slim that anyone will see any of the 26 assorted pieces of the Upper Atmosphere Research Satellite that are expected to survive re-entry into the atmosphere. The chances that someone, somewhere on the planet, will be hit by one of those chunks are 1 in 3,200.

The chance that any particular person (in other words, you) will be hit is infinitesimal: one in many trillions, according to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

But that hasn’t stopped a flurry of excitement among space enthusiasts who track satellites and a welter of giddy articles about the possible risks.

FoxNews.com is offering a widget that will allow readers to track the satellite’s progress in real time. Paddy-power.com, an Irish gambling website, is taking bets on where the debris will land. Odds of one or more of the pieces landing in Ireland were pegged at 66 to 1, for example.

A poll item on ABC News’ website asked readers where they thought UARS would crash. Possible answers were “Harmlessly in the ocean,” “In mountains or open plains,” or “My house!” As of Wednesday afternoon, “My house!” was leading “In mountains or open plains”

by a margin of 2 to 1.

Calm down, satellite watchers say. Stuff falls from the sky every day; big stuff — larger than 1,000 pounds and thus weighty enough to generate debris that falls to the ground — falls about once a week.

“It’s business as usual for us here,” said Maj. Michael Duncan, deputy chief of space situational awareness at the Joint Space Operations Center of U.S. Strategic

Command at California’s Vandenberg Air Force Base, which is tracking the falling satellite for NASA (along with 22,000 other, mostly man-made orbiting objects). He said that he wasn’t wholly sure why this particular event was generating such intense attention.

“The UARS re-entry hazard is being overhyped,” said Don Kessler, a retired NASA senior scientist for orbital debris research.

NASA scientists already know a lot about how UARS, which was placed into orbit by astronauts on the shuttle Discovery in 1991 and was decommissioned in 2005, is likely to meet its end.

The satellite, which monitored ozone and other chemicals in the upper atmosphere for 14 years, is slowing because it is now traveling in low orbit, where it encounters resistance from the upper atmosphere, said

gives patients a weekend break from the grueling hours of being hooked up to a machine.

However, doctors have suspected that the two-day hiatus between treatments was risky, and smaller studies have found more heart-related deaths on the day after the gap.

“All the fluids and toxins are built up to the highest extent on Monday morning right before dialysis,” said Dr. Anthony Bleyer of Wake For-

est Baptist Medical Center in North Carolina, who has done similar studies.

The latest research, funded by the National Institutes of Health, is the largest yet. It was done by Dr. Robert Foley of the University of Minnesota and colleagues. All reported receiving fees from dialysis clinics and suppliers.

The team analyzed medical records of 32,000 people who had in-center dialysis three times a week from 2005 through 2008. The average age was 62 and a quarter had been on dialysis for a year or less. After about two years of follow-up, 41 percent had

died, including 17 percent from heart-related causes.

Monday was the riskiest day for people on a Monday-Wednesday-Friday schedule. For those on a Tuesday-Thursday-Saturday schedule, the riskiest day was Tuesday.

Researchers found a 22 percent higher risk of death on the day after a long break compared with other days of the week. Put another way: For every 100 people on dialysis for a year, 22 would die on the day after the long interval versus 18 on other days.

Hospital admissions for

stroke and heart-related problems more than doubled on the day after a long break than on other days — 44 versus 20 for every 100 people treated.

Fixing this problem, however, could be daunting for patients, busy dialysis centers and insurers and it would require a rethinking of how dialysis is currently delivered.

Medicare covers the cost of dialysis, regardless of age, spending about \$77,000 annually per person. It covers thrice-weekly treatment, but people can get a fourth session if needed.

Dr. Paul Eggers of the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases said adjusting how dialysis is done “would require some fairly convincing evidence. I’m not sure this one study would be sufficient to change” standard practice.

Kidney expert Dr. Eli Friedman of SUNY Downstate Medical Center in New York, said he’s in favor of every-other-day dialysis or even daily dialysis. But it would mean “a multibillion dollar change,” said Friedman, who launched the country’s first federally funded dialysis center.

doesn’t shut down on Sept. 30, the end of this fiscal year. It also raises the possibility that the government’s main disaster relief program could run out of money early next week for victims of Hurricane Irene and other disasters.

Earlier Wednesday, Rep. Eric Cantor of Virginia, the No. 2 Republican in the House, had confidently predicted the measure would pass. Now, GOP leaders are scrambling to revive the measure on Thursday in hopes of wrapping up a final compromise with the Senate by the

weekend. A rare weekend session is possible.

One option is to find a different spending cut to offset \$1 billion worth of immediate disaster aid needed to make sure victims aren’t cut off next week.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency has only a few days’ worth of aid remaining in its disaster relief fund, lawmakers said. The agency already has held up thousands of longer-term rebuilding projects — repairs to sewer systems, parks, roads and bridges, for example — to conserve money to provide emergency relief to victims of recent disasters.

The looming shortage

has been apparent for months, and the Obama White House was slow to request additional money.

The White House, a vigorous advocate of greater fuel efficiency for U.S.-made cars, welcomed the result of Wednesday’s vote.

“We are pleased that the House of Representatives today rejected efforts to put politics above the needs of communities impacted by disasters,” the White House communications director, Dan Pfeiffer, announced on his Twitter account. The White House had earlier declined to issue an official statement evaluating the measure, as is typical.

that include Iran’s nuclear program and its ambitions to widen military and political influence in the Middle East and beyond. But — for a moment at least — U.S. officials may be adding words of thanks in addition to their calls for alarm over Iran.

For Tehran, it was a chance to court some goodwill after sending a message of defiance with hard-line justice in the July 2009 arrests of the Americans along the Iran-Iraq border. The Americans always maintained they were innocent hikers.

“Today can only be de-

scribed as the best day of our lives,” said a statement from their families. “We have waited for nearly 26 months for this moment and the joy and relief we feel at Shane and Josh’s long-awaited freedom knows no bounds.”

“We now all want nothing more than to wrap Shane and Josh in our arms, catch up on two lost years and make a new beginning, for them and for all of us,” the statement added.

Obama called it “wonderful, wonderful news about the hikers, we are thrilled ... It’s a wonderful day for them and for us.”

U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon welcomed the hikers’ release, saying he “appreciates the decision to

respond to international appeals on humanitarian grounds,” said spokesman Martin Nesirky. “He commends all parties who helped to secure their release.”

The release came on the eve of Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad’s previously scheduled address Thursday to the U.N. General Assembly’s annual ministerial meeting.

The families waited on the tarmac at a royal airfield near the main international airport in Oman’s capital, Muscat. Also returning to Oman was Sarah Shourd, who was arrested with Bauer and Fattal but freed a year ago. She received a marriage proposal from Bauer while in prison.

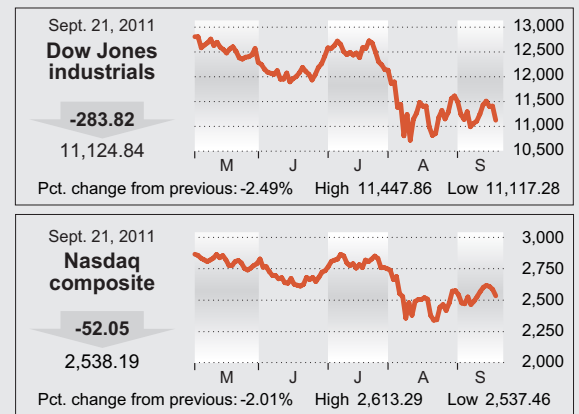

AT&T Gets Small Wins in Antitrust Hearing

WASHINGTON (AP) • A federal judge Wednesday granted small wins to AT&T and T-Mobile in the first hearing of the Justice Department's lawsuit to block the companies' \$39 billion mega-wireless merger.

Judge Ellen Huvelle, of the U.S. District Court of the District of Columbia, set a Feb. 13 trial date — earlier than Justice requested — and declined for now rival Sprint Nextel's request to join the suit, which would have complicated the proceedings.

The decisions take some pressure off AT&T as it works to avoid steep penalties if the deal isn't complete by September 2012. By leaving Sprint out of Justice's case, AT&T and T-Mobile won't have to deal with new arguments from a rival to block the deal. And if a settlement is reached out of court, the companies won't have to deal with more opponents, analysts said.

JEROME • Patience is finally paying off for Jerome's Family Health Services Clinic.

The primary care provider has moved into a new and bigger facility after spending 10 years in a cramped building.

"We've doubled the size, doubled the amount of exam rooms and have already added another physician," said Lynn Hudgens, Family Health Services CEO.

The 6,300 square-foot building is more than twice the size of FHS' previous Jerome location. With the

added room comes the opportunity to offer better medical services in Jerome, Hudgens said.

The clinic currently provides medical, dental and mental health services, but in the new building, all three will be located inside the clinic.

Previously, dental care was provided in a large blue bus outside the old building, while mental health patients were referred to FHS' Twin Falls facilities.

"We are still furnishing the dental exam rooms, but once that is finished we will move

the bus to other areas that need it," Hudgens said.

Located next to the clinic is a newly opened pharmacy, Jerome Drug. FHS has partnered with the pharmacy to offer discounted prescriptions to its patients.

Board members and staffers have been waiting for the new clinic to be built for almost a decade, though a lack of funding always prevented the health care provider from moving. However, the clinic was awarded a federal stimulus grant that helped cover the costs of the new building.

"Finally we have a chunk of federal funding going to something good," said State Rep. Maxine Bell, R-Jerome, one of the clinic's board members. "This clinic is necessary to keep this community healthy."

The new clinic is located at 114 Pioneer Court in Jerome.

Idaho Offers Wolf Trapping Classes • O3

National Hunting and Fishing Day is Saturday

Outdoorsmen will be honored Saturday, which is National Hunting and Fishing Day.

Thirty-four million people today hunt and fish in the United States. By buying hunting and fishing licenses and paying special taxes on firearms and ammunition, bows and arrows, and rods and reels, hunters and anglers generate \$100,000 every 30 minutes, according to a news release by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

This annual total, \$1.75 billion, pays for much of the conservation work of fish and wildlife agencies in every state. These public agencies serve the residents of their states by overseeing all fish and wildlife, hunted species

such as deer and non-hunted species such as robins, as well as all aquatic and terrestrial habitats.

In the 1960s, hunters and anglers embraced the era's heightened environmental awareness but were discouraged that many people didn't understand the role that hunters and anglers played – and continue to play – in the conservation movement.

In 1972, with urging from the National Shooting Sports Foundation, Congress unanimously authorized National Hunting and Fishing Day on the fourth Saturday of every September. President Richard M. Nixon signed the first proclamation of the annual celebration on May 2, 1972.

When Josh Anderson goes hunting, he brings three essential things besides his rifle: his pickup, three dirt bikes and a GPS unit.

The pickup gets him to the desired location, the dirt bikes – which he places at strategic locations in a 15-mile radius – make hauling big game out of the forest easier, and the GPS, complete with mapping technology, decreases his odds of getting lost.

There's a method to his madness, the Twin Falls man said. "I drag the deer to a dirt bike, ride to my pickup, then drive it to pick up the deer and the other dirt bikes, and head home," Anderson said. As for modern technology, it has helped him become a more successful hunter because he can take virtual tours of the places he plans to hunt.

He isn't the only Idaho outdoorsman to jump onto the digital bandwagon. More of today's hunters are using modern mapping technology such as Google Earth and GPS units to pick their hunting spots and find their way in and out of the forest.

Anderson said he'll sit down at his computer and open Google Earth and National Geographic topographical maps, both of which offer different angles to the same location, to get a bearing on where he plans to go. He checks out the difficulty of the terrain, and the likely places that game might hide. Then he plugs desired spots from the maps into his GPS unit and he's ready to go.

"I'll know that over this hill there's a ravine," he said. "Over here there is snow."

Anderson uses the basic edition of Google Earth for free online, and he purchased the National Geographic maps at Sportsman's Warehouse, where he works as a sales associate.

"For 50 bucks you get the entire state of Idaho," he said. That's better than paying \$9 to \$12 a pop for each Forest Service map. "There are more than 1,600 maps of Idaho."

Anderson's enthusiasm and knowledge about modern mapping has earned him a following: The 27-year-old Twin Falls man teaches a class every third Saturday at the store, where hikers and hunters come to learn the benefits of using digital maps and GPS units.

Mark and Sandy Wakefield of Elko, Nev., visited the store Saturday, where they purchased a Garmin GPS unit and Bureau of Land Management public lands digital mapping software. After about an hour in class, Anderson took them outside to use their new unit along the canyon rim.

"We want to get into the modern geocaching game," Mark said. "But we'll also use it for hunting. It'll be really good

Upland Game Bird Seasons Open in October

Idaho bird hunters always look forward to fall, when several upland game bird seasons open.

Get ready. Fall is almost here, and so is game season. Here's a breakdown of some of the hunts.

Chukar

Chukar and gray partridge seasons open Oct. 1, and remain open statewide through Jan. 31.

Daily bag limits are six chukars and six gray partridges. The possession limit after the first day is 12 chukars and 12 gray partridges.

Quail

The bobwhite and California quail seasons run from Oct. 1 through Jan. 31 in western Idaho from Canada to Nevada. But Area 2 in the eastern part of the state is closed. The daily bag limit is 10 total. The possession limit after the first day is 20 total.

The sage grouse season is Oct. 1

Five Tips to Guarantee Safe Hunting

Before you go afield, remember to take these hunter safety tips to heart.

The Gem State's hunting opportunities are as varied as the geographic topography, and sportsmen already are on the prowl for deer and elk.

Add world-class hunting opportunities with upcoming black bear, pheasant and waterfowl seasons and hunters will be taking to the great outdoors by the masses.

Sure, your dogs are ready and the camp menu has been decided for weeks, but keep in mind that in Idaho nearly two people die from hunting accidents every year and another six sportsmen sustain non-fatal injuries, according to accident statistics kept by

the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. That means safety needs should be considered, too.

Here are five safety tips for you to remember:

Pack Emergency Supplies

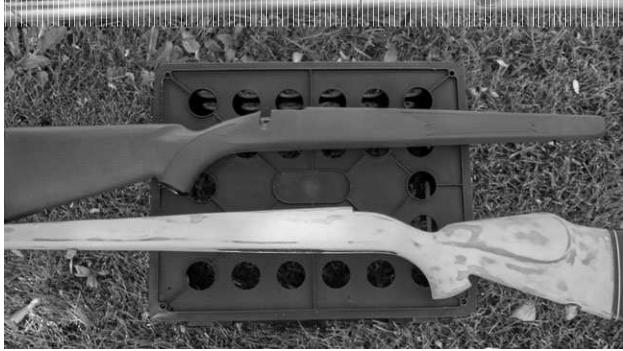
Hunters don't leave home without first-aid kits, but Buhl's Avid Sportsman owner Jerry Eggleston said many overlook how long they could be left to fend for themselves.

"If you shoot a deer close to dark and you're five miles out from camp you may be spending the night out there," Eggleston said.

In addition to bandages, wrap and heat blankets. Eggleston suggests that hunters double-check their stock of waterproof matches and fire starters, as well as emergency food provisions and snake-bite kits.

"We've heard a lot of guys coming

Upgrading Your Synthetic Stocks

'Shooting the Bull'

You can love them or you can loathe them, it doesn't really matter. Either way, synthetic gunstocks are here to stay. Even the most casual perusal of your local gun shop or Big Box store will reveal that roughly half of the firearms available will be bolted into a synthetic stock of some sort.

The odds are good that your favorite model of centerfire or rimfire rifle, shotgun or even handgun is offered in a synthetic-stocked version. This option makes sense from both a practical and economic standpoint.

First of all, the vast majority of synthetic stocked firearms are suited up with relatively inexpensive injection-molded thermoplastic stocks. Once the manufacturer has amortized the initial costs of the molds, these babies can be cranked out by the truck-

load for just a couple of bucks per stock.

There is a tremendous savings over harvesting and machining out either a low-cost hardwood or pricey walnut stock. That savings can be passed on to the consumer and accounts for the relatively low cost of most entry level models.

Synthetic stocks also are environmentally more stable than wood. Not only are they materially stronger, but being non-porous they are not as easily influenced by changes in moisture and temperature. Most will survive being flung out of the scabbard when your pony gets excited on the trail; and they won't warp, changing your rifle's point of impact while trailing an

elk herd through the snow-soaked black timber for two days.

The downside is that the lower end synthetic stocks are not that aesthetically pleasing. They are generally blocky, most have visible molding lines and they are usually available in only one color — black. But with a few simple tools, a modest expenditure and a bit of elbow grease, you can easily transform your bland utilitarian synthetic stock into a thing of beauty.

Pictured in the "before" and "after" photos are the objects of our attention: A friend's solid gray Stevens Model 200 stock and my battered old Weatherby Fibermark .30-06, with the factory paint removed. The restoration process begins by roughing up the stocks' exteriors with a piece of fine-grained sandpaper wrapped around a sanding block. This will remove any previous finish, molding

seams or imperfections, while texturing the surface for better paint adhesion.

Next, carefully clean the stock surfaces and recesses with rubbing alcohol or acetone. In a well-ventilated area, lay down several thin coats of automotive enamel primer or a base coat of Krylon Fusion spray paint, which is specifically formulated for plastics. Continue to lay down successive coats until the desired color and texture is achieved.

Complete your stock's upgrade by applying multiple layers of a matte or glossy clear coat finish.

Remember, these are paints and the finish can be touched up, modified or changed according to your preference. Inspiration in the form of useful hints and tips also is available online.

Hunting seasons are upon us. Why not dress up your utility or scuffed high-grade fiberglass synthetic with a couple coats of fresh paint? They'll be inexpensively transformed from a sow's ear to a silk purse right before your eyes.

College Outdoor Orientation Programs on the Rise

HANOVER, N.H. • Since Dartmouth College pioneered the idea in 1935, outdoor orientation programs have spread to colleges and universities across the country, grown in size, and changed in scope.

The wilderness programs are aimed at helping freshmen transition to college life. They typically involve backcountry trips led by upperclassmen.

Brent Bell, a University of New Hampshire assistant

professor, has spent years researching these programs. He estimates about 200 colleges and universities offer them, and says their number and enrollment are growing.

Most of these programs have stayed true to the outdoor adventure model; others have expanded their offerings to attract a broader group of participants. Colby College in Maine, for example, offers trips focused on painting, "mindfulness and meditation," and photography, as well as backpacking, surfing and rock climbing.

across snakes this year," he said. "We have a picture on our wall of a seven-foot-long rattle snake found north of Bliss."

Clean and Maintain Firearms

You've probably given your rifle a good cleaning prior to heading out for the hunt, but remember to keep the gun clean throughout the trip.

Ryan Horsley, manager of Red's Trading Post in Twin Falls, said falling into a body of water or jamming your rifle's muzzle into the mud while managing rough terrain is common in the field.

While hunters may think a quick swipe with a bore snake will do the trick, Horsley suggests taking a closer look at your gun before shooting again.

"If you've jammed anything, you could have bigger problems than simply mud in the barrel," he said.

Take a Closer Look Before Pulling the Trigger

A common cause of accidental shooting is hunters not being sure of their target, said Idaho Fish and Game Hunter Education Coordinator Ron Fritz. While hunting deer years ago, Fritz said he was about ready to pull the trigger when he caught movement in his peripheral vision.

"It was another hunter coming into my line of fire," Fritz said, noting that Idaho law doesn't mandate wearing safety orange but it is something that could save your life. "Hunters really need to be completely sure of their target."

Don't Trust Existing Tree Stands

Twin Falls hunter Jeremy Hutton knows firsthand the dangers in assuming existing tree stands are safe and secure. While bow hunting more than a decade ago, the stand he was in started to shift under his weight.

Better yet, Hutton said, stick to your own stands.

Educate Yourself on Safety

In Idaho, those born after January 1, 1975 are required to complete a hunter education course in order to purchase a state-issued hunting license, or they must show proof of holding a valid license in Idaho or another state.

Although not required, taking a hunter education class, available online or

through instructor-led classes, is a great way for beginners and experienced hunters to brush up on the basics.

Fritz said the classes are geared to making sportsmen safe, ethical and responsible.

The course includes about 15 hours of class time. Both instructor-led and Internet-based students finish the course with a field day.

Idaho youngsters can take classes in person beginning at age 9 and Internet classes are open to those 10 years and older. Cost: \$8.

Question: I filed a Chapter 7 bankruptcy in early 2004 and received my discharge a few months later. Recently I had to have multiple surgeries. I don't have insurance and owe about \$50,000.00 in medical debt. I need to file another bankruptcy; what are my options?

Answer: The 2005 changes to the bankruptcy laws require that 8 years must pass between the filings of Chapter 7 cases. That means you have to wait until 2012 to file a Chapter 7 case. However, the waiting period between the filing of a Chapter 7 case and a Chapter 13 case is shorter, so you are eligible now. Chapter 13 bankruptcy is a program where you repay some of your debt by making a monthly payment to the Trustee for a period of time between 3 and 5 years. When all your payments are complete, your remaining debt is discharged. The length of time you must make payments and the amount of your payments is determined primarily by your ability to pay as defined by the Bankruptcy Code. Chapter 13 bankruptcy is very complex. You should contact an experienced bankruptcy attorney immediately. DO NOT TRY THIS AT HOME.

New Supernova's Appearance Belies its Importance to Astronomy

Twenty-one million years ago, the collapsed core of a distant, dead star self-destructed in a catastrophic flash of nuclear fusion. Like an earth-sized hydrogen bomb, it released as much energy as the sun will over its entire lifetime. But the evidence of this cataclysm only turned up last month.

A Mount Palomar automated survey telescope discovered Supernova 2011fe, the brightest since 1987, on Aug. 22. Originating 21 million light years away, SN 2011fe's light has been en route since the Hagerman horse's three-toed, Great-Dane-sized ancestor *Merychippus* first grazed in Idaho.

Described as "bright enough to be seen in binoculars," SN 2011fe doesn't hold a candle to SN 1987a, which was more than 100 times closer, and thus visible to the naked eye. (Unfortunately, it was too far south to be seen in North America.) In binoculars SN 2011fe appears as nothing more than a tiny, bluish star visible only from a dark location on a moonless night, with fully dark-adapted eyes. Without a good star chart, it's indistinguishable from the many faint stars visible in the binoculars' field of view.

Despite its unimpressive appearance, SN 2011fe holds promise for refining estimates of the universe's age and size. That's because it's a type Ia supernova, a type of stellar explosion with remarkably consistent energy output, useful as "standard candles"; their

apparent brightness yields a straightforward estimate of distance by comparing them against type Ia explosions in galaxies whose distance has been determined by independent methods.

Twenty-one million light years is close enough to allow further calibration of supernovae as distance indicators. It may even settle the debate over whether type Ia supernovae originate from stellar cores driven to annihilation by gas dumped onto them by a stellar companion, or from the collision of two such cores.

for that?"

He said he sometimes uses Google Earth before going outdoors, but it has its downsides. It's not updated as frequently as he'd like, and it's not easy to access when in the field.

"It's on a computer. I doubt many people take their laptops with them when they go hunting. With this," he said, pointing to his new GPS unit, "you have it all in the palm of your hands."

That's the great thing about GPS units, Anderson said. But they have a downfall.

"People can get download syndrome," he said. "If it breaks down or the batteries die, you have to rely on yourself to get home."

So then, Anderson carries a fourth essential when he goes outdoors: a tried-and-true hardcopy map.

"For emergencies," he said.

Hunting GPS Maps work only with Garmin GPS units, but the neat thing about them is that they show the names of public land owners. \$99. hunting-gpsmaps.com **GPS units** come in a variety of models and features. Basic models, for instance, do not come with topo maps while more advanced units might come with a camera or Walkie Talkie. Garmin is one of the more popular units, Anderson said, but some others include Venture, Oregon, Colorado and Rhino.

Hardcopy maps are always good to have as a backup or to use with GPS units. Average price, \$8-\$15. Visit Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management offices.

sharptail must have a sage/sharp-tailed grouse permit at \$4.75, in addition to a valid hunting license.

The season for forest grouse, which includes


ruffed, spruce and dusky grouse, opened Aug. 30 and runs through Dec. 31, except in the Panhandle Region where the season runs through Jan. 31. The daily limit is four, whether all of one or mixed species, and eight in possession after the first day. Hunters

need only a valid hunting license to hunt quail, chukar, grey partridge and forest grouse.

Turkey

Turkey season opened Sept. 15 in many areas.

All hunters need a valid 2011 Idaho hunting license.

SALAZAR SAYS SOLAR PUSH TO CONTINUE

WASHINGTON • The Obama administration will continue its push for solar energy despite growing controversy over a \$528 million loan to a now-bankrupt California solar panel maker, Interior Secretary Ken Salazar said Wednesday.

Salazar said in an interview with The Associated Press that the Solyndra Inc. case and a delay in the massive Blythe solar project in California illustrate the challenges facing the solar industry. But he remained upbeat about the potential for solar power. The Obama administration has spent billions of dollars to promote it as part of a push for renewable energy.

“I think the future for solar energy is bright,” Salazar said, predicting that success would come over the next several years and convince even cynics that solar can be an affordable alternative to coal-fired power plants and other traditional forms of energy.

Still, Salazar acknowledged risks, including fierce competition from China and changes in technology that have forced some solar companies out of business.

Solyndra was the first company to receive a loan under an Energy Department program to boost renewable energy companies, receiving more than half a billion dollars; but competition from China and the drying up of recession-battered European markets led it to file for bankruptcy and lay off 1,100 workers.

“It’s not going to be a perfect path where every project proposed is going to be built toward completion,” he said, comparing the Solyndra failure and

other high-profile bankruptcies to “dry holes” encountered by early oil and gas explorers.

Salazar, California Gov. Jerry Brown and other elected officials were in attendance in June when Solar Trust of America broke ground on its 1,000-megawatt Blythe solar project in Southern California. The project has been touted as the world’s largest solar power plant and a keystone of the Obama administration’s efforts to promote solar energy.

Last month, the company announced the project was being delayed for at least a year to accommodate a major technology change, from solar thermal troughs to photovoltaic solar panels that convert the sun’s power into electricity.

Salazar called the setback a normal part of the industry’s evolution and said it would not deter him from approving more solar projects.

In the past 18 months, the Interior Department has approved 20 major renewable energy projects, including 13 commercial-scale solar energy plants. The 13 plants together will create about 8,600 construction and operational jobs and produce nearly 5,000 megawatts of energy, enough to power about 1.5 million homes, Salazar said.

Salazar was in Nevada Tuesday to visit the first utility-scale solar power plant built on public lands. The plant, near the California border, is being developed by Arizona-based First Solar and is expected to begin producing energy by the end of the year. The plant is expected to provide enough power for at least 9,000 homes.

The End of the World: R.E.M. Calling it Quits

NEW YORK • R.I.P. to R.E.M.

The alternative rock group that shook up the music world with its experimental, edgy sound and then earned multiplatinum success and a place in the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame announced on its website Wednesday that it has “decided to call it a day as a band.”

“A wise man once said — ‘the skill in attending a party is knowing when it’s time to leave.’ We built something extraordinary together. We did this thing. And now we’re going to walk away from it,” frontman Michael Stipe said in a statement on the website.

“I hope our fans realize this wasn’t an easy decision; but all things must end, and we wanted to do it right, to do it our way.”

The Grammy-winning group, now composed of Stipe, guitarist Peter Buck and bassist Mike Mills, released its debut album “Murmur” in 1983; at the time it was a quartet, with drummer Bill Berry. He left the group in 1997, two years after he suffered symptoms of an aneurysm onstage.

The group got its start in Athens, Ga., coming out of the region’s flourishing indie-rock scene. The band was credited for helping launch college radio with songs such as “Radio Free Europe.”

Later, the mainstream caught on, and R.E.M. became chart-topping rockers, selling millions of albums with hits like “It’s the End of the World as We Know It (And I Feel Fine),” “Losing My Religion” and “Everybody Hurts.”

Stipe, the band’s chief songwriter, crafted songs that were atypical of the standard rock fare. “Man on the Moon” was about the

late comic Andy Kaufman. “Losing My Religion” was not about religion at all, but about trying to relay the feelings of a crush.

The band’s videos also became staples on MTV in the 1990s, including the eye-catching “Losing My Religion” and the stark “Everybody Hurts,” which had Stipe walking through a highway traffic jam.

R.E.M. became one of the more forceful voices of 1990s rock, and came along around the same time as another rock quartet — U2. But whereas U2 managed to maintain (and even increase) its popularity over the years, R.E.M. stumbled commercially in recent years, and their hits dwindled.

The band continued to create music that resonated with critics and their core

group of fans; the group’s last album, “Collapse into Now,” was released in March and a greatest hits retrospective is in the works.

But Mills said the band was running out of ideas.

“During our last tour, and while making ‘Collapse Into Now’ and putting together this greatest hits retrospective, we started asking ourselves, ‘What next?’” he said. “Working through our music and memories from over three decades was a hell of a journey. We realized that these songs seemed to draw a natural line under the last 31 years of our working together.”

Buck said the band parts as “great friends” and thanked fans for their support.

“One of the things that was always so great about

being in R.E.M. was the fact that the records and the songs we wrote meant as much to our fans as they did to us,” said Buck. “It was, and still is, important to us to do right by you. Being a part of your lives has been an unbelievable gift. Thank you.”

Warner Bros. Records chairman and producer Rob Cavallo said, “To call R.E.M. one of the greatest bands in contemporary music is an understatement. They leave behind a body of work whose breadth, honesty, creativity and power has not only inspired millions of fans around the world, but also has influenced — and will continue to influence — generations of songwriters and performers for years to come.”

Warner Bros. is releasing the greatest hits retrospective in November.

Jazz Producer, Historian Frank Driggs Dies at 81

NEW YORK (AP) • Frank Driggs, a music historian and producer who amassed a world-class archive of more than 100,000 jazz-related images, has died. He was 81.

Friend and co-worker Donna Ranieri told The Associated Press that Driggs was found dead in his Manhattan home on Tuesday. She says he died of natural causes.

A 1952 Princeton University graduate, Driggs became enamored with jazz and swing while listening to late-night broadcasts in the 1930s.

He later joined Marshall Stearns, founder of the Rutgers University-based Institute of Jazz Studies, and began documenting jazz history.

Driggs produced numerous recordings, including Columbia Records' "Robert Johnson: The Complete Recordings." He received a Grammy for it in 1991.

Driggs also co-published "Black Beauty, White Heat," a pictorial history of classic jazz culled from his vast collection.

Young Adults Gain Health Insurance Under New Law

Nearly 1 million more young adults have obtained health insurance since the 2010 health-care law began requiring insurers to let adult children stay on their parents' plans until age 26, according to government data released Wednesday.

The jump in enrollment caused the share of young adults who are uninsured to drop from 34 percent at the start of 2010 to 30 percent — or 9.1 million people — by March of this year, according to a national interview survey by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

A Gallup poll also unveiled Wednesday pointed to an almost identical pattern.

Young adults remain more likely to go without health insurance than any other age group.

Still, after the recent stream of dismal poverty and unemployment statistics, Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius welcomed Wednesday's findings as "a really great achievement."

"The economic downturn has taken a toll on employment among young adults," Sebelius said in a conference call with reporters. "In the past, that would have led to even more young people without health insurance. Instead, thanks to the (new law), the number of young adults with coverage has actually gone up."

Technically, neither data source directly addresses how much of this change was a result of the new health-care rule. Administration officials noted, however, that the insurance rate for all other age groups remained essentially unchanged during the same period and that the trend line for young adults closely tracks the timing of the new rule's phase-in.

At the administration's urging, dozens of plans began voluntarily opening their rolls to young adults in late spring 2010, months before the official start date. All plans were required to copy beginning with their next renewal date after Sept. 23, 2010. For many, that meant this January, although some did not renew until later.

Based on the administration's earlier estimate of the

range of uninsured young adults whose parents had private coverage to which they could be added as dependents, anywhere from one-half to one-fourth of eligible young people are now signed on.

Whatever the case, the relatively small number of young adults involved, and the large share likely to be in good health compared with older adults, means any reduction in the cost of caring for the uninsured will probably be limited, analysts said.

For similar reasons, premiums are also unlikely to be substantially affected.

But Sebelius noted that there could be a larger economic benefit.

"As they begin their careers, these young adults will be free to make career choices based on what they want to do, not on where they can get health insurance," she said.

For Luis Silva, 23, the provision means having peace of mind as he pursues a law degree. The University of South Florida senior said he would have been forced to go without insurance if the law had not enabled him to keep coverage through his mother, a bank worker.

"Money is really tight," he said. "I'm putting myself through college, already working a part-time job, literally living on ramen. . . . If it was anything more than \$20 a month, I would not be able to afford it."

Fed Does the Twist: \$400 Billion Plan to Help Revive Economy

WASHINGTON • The Federal Reserve said Wednesday it will shuffle \$400 billion of its portfolio to try to drive down long-term interest rates and get the economy going. But economists doubted it would do much good, the stock market sold off, and the Fed itself was unusually divided over the strategy.

Lowering interest rates makes it cheaper for people and companies to borrow money and spend it throughout the economy, which has slowed sharply more than two years after the Great Recession. Consumer spending makes up most of the nation's economic activity.

But rates are already at historic lows. Americans, still feeling insecure about the future, might not be willing to take on more debt, even at lower rates. Others see no reason to jump into the housing market when prices are still falling. Others can't get credit.

"Frankly, I don't see it having any meaningful impact on the economy," said Bernard Baumohl, chief global economist with the Economic Outlook Group. "What the Fed did today was a distraction."

Yields on U.S. government debt were already among the lowest on record, and investors drove them down further after the Fed announcement. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note, an indicator for mortgages and other long-term loans, closed at 1.86 percent, down from 1.93 percent the day before and the lowest since at least 1962.

Along with the strategy statement, the Fed gave a stormy overview of the economy — slow growth, high unemployment and a slumping housing market. The Fed has already said it will keep short-term interest rates super-low into 2013, a sign that the central bank was not optimistic about the next two years.

Three members of the Federal Open Market Committee, the policymaking arm of the Fed, dissented. There are 10 members in all, including Chairman Ben Bernanke, and usually no more than two dissent. The three have said the Fed's policies may be raising the risk of inflation. The stock market fell quickly after the Fed announcement, which came just before 2:30 p.m. The Dow Jones industrial average, which was down about 20 points before the statement, finished the day down 283 points, or 2.5 percent.

"It's being viewed as perhaps an admission that this is a longer-term issue that the U.S. economy is facing and not one that's going to be solved over a couple of years," said Oliver Pursche, president of Gary Goldberg Financial Services. The Dow closed at 11,124. It had appeared headed for 13,000 earlier this year, but investors grew worried this summer that a new recession is coming, and stocks have been extremely volatile since late July.

Wall Street had expected the Fed move for weeks, and had come to call it Operation Twist. In 1961, the Fed tried something similar and

named it Operation Nudge, the idea being to nudge long-term interest rates lower. Chubby Checker's dance craze was sweeping the nation in the era of "American Bandstand," and the name Operation Twist stuck instead. Economists still argue about whether it worked, but most say it didn't help much.

This time, the Fed will sell \$400 billion from its holdings of short-term U.S. government debt — Treasury bills and notes that mature in three years or sooner. It will use that money to buy Treasury notes and bonds with maturities of six to 30 years. The Fed said the shift would be complete by June.

By comparison, the Fed spent about \$2 trillion on two rounds of bond-buying designed to lower long-term interest rates. Economists generally agree that the Fed

succeeded in driving rates down and kept the economy from getting worse. The Fed's total portfolio is \$2.9 trillion, almost all of it in Treasury securities and mortgage-backed securities.

In general, major loans throughout the economy, like mortgages, track those long-term Treasury securities. Already, the national average interest rate for the most popular type of mortgage, the 30-year fixed, is 4.09 percent, the lowest in six decades. Mark Zandi, chief economist at Moody's Analytics, said the Fed announcement could send it below 4 percent.

Frank Sorrentino, CEO of North Jersey Community Bank in Englewood Cliffs, N.J., said he didn't think the Fed decision would encourage anyone to buy a house or take out a car loan.

Experts: Pilot Likely Unconscious in Reno Crash

RENO, Nev. (AP) • The veteran aviator whose plane slammed into a crowd of Nevada air race spectators at 400 mph had no chance to save his ill-fated flight after likely losing consciousness from acceleration more abrupt and extreme than even what most fighter pilots endure, flying experts said.

Jimmy Leeward's aircraft shot skyward like a rocket Friday before plunging into spectators at what appeared to be full throttle. Federal investigators continue to look for a cause of the crash at the National Championship Air Races that killed 11 people, including Leeward, and injured dozens, but have yet to come to a conclusion.

They're focused on a range of possibilities, including Leeward's health and the structural soundness of the

plane after a piece of the tail called the "elevator trim tab" that helps control the aircraft's pitch appeared to break off before the crash.

Experts who have reviewed

amateur videos from the scene, photos and witness accounts say it appears Leeward wasn't controlling the plane during the fateful last few seconds.

Big 12, Big East Start Picking Up Pieces

Turned away by the Pac-12, the Big 12's most powerful members are trying to find ways to live together again after weeks of hurtling toward a break up.

Texas President William Powers declared Wednesday that the Longhorns — who receive more media money than other members of the Big 12 — are open to a new revenue-sharing model and have already suggested that top-level television and cable money be shared equally.

What's not on the table is the money from Texas 20-year, \$300 million deal with ESPN to create the Longhorn Network, which has been blamed in large part for Texas A&M's pending departure from the Big 12.

"That's never been in play, that's not in play," Texas athletic director DeLoss Dodds said.

So with that line drawn in the sand, the Big 12 leadership has scheduled a key meeting Thursday, Oklahoma President David Boren said.

"The most important goal for the University of Oklahoma is conference stability," he said. "We intend to support actions that will strengthen and stabilize the conference at the very important meeting of the conference board."

The Pac-12 late Tuesday squashed any hope of Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas and Texas Tech heading west in what surely would have been a death blow to the Big 12.

But the conference realignment wheels are still turning, especially with the Aggies planning to join the Southeastern Conference as soon as legal threats are out of the way.

"Certainly the position of Oklahoma State and I think most of the schools, if not all, is that we want to add a 10th team," said Oklahoma State president Burns Hargis, a member of the league's expansion committee. He listed TCU, Houston, SMU, BYU, Utah and Air Force among the potential expansion targets before saying "we've talked about a lot of ideas."

The Big East, left with only six football members after Pitt and Syracuse announced plans to join the ACC, must also find a new way forward while the Mountain West and Conference USA are in discussions about a partnership.

The talk of saving the Big 12 centers on sharing television revenue equally — a core principle of the Big Ten and Pac-12. The Big 12 splits the revenue from its \$1.2 billion Fox Sports contract evenly, but only half of the money from its top-tier deal with ABC goes into equal shares. The rest is weighted toward the programs that play on the network more frequently, such as Texas and Oklahoma.

Dodds said Big 12 athletic directors more than a month ago approved Texas' suggestion to equally share to network revenue around the league. He said the plan has not been voted on by league presidents.

Kellen Just Gives Broncos Moore

BOISE • Boise State senior quarterback Kellen Moore showed in the first two games that he is continuing to improve.

That's difficult to comprehend because it didn't seem like he could get any better.

En route to guiding the Broncos to a 2-0 start, Moore methodically amassed 716 yards and eight touch-downs while completing 78.9 percent of his passes. Last week at Toledo, he picked up 455 of those yards and five touchdowns — second only to his 507-yard game at home against Hawaii last season. Only Ryan Dinwiddie has more 400-yard passing games in Boise State history than Moore.

"I'd like to say that he's really come a long way since being with us, but he came a long ways before he got to us," Boise State head coach Chris Petersen said.

The Prosser, Wash., product and coach's son is efficiently breaking national and school records, and more are likely to fall as the team chases another double-digit win season. Barring some unforeseen event, he could eclipse Colt McCoy's career wins total record of 45 at Texas in as little as six weeks and has only lost twice as a starter.

Overall, Moore is pleased with his start to the season when assessing his own play.

"I think I've played pretty well for the most part," Moore said. "Obviously a few mistakes, few things to correct. That's how the first couple of weeks usually go."

Allowing Moore the opportunity to chase these records and help the team win is a sage offensive line that has not allowed a sack so far this year. Moore is known for his patience in the pocket, gracefully reading the defensive coverage while an unfastened piece of chin-

Having played competitive golf most his life, Preston Otte has faced pressure-packed situations before, but nothing like he will encounter beginning Sept. 29 in Las Vegas in front of TV cameras, amid a circus of A-list celebrities and surrounded by some of the best golfers in the world vying for a piece of the \$4.4 mil-lion purse.

As Otte drilled ball after ball on the practice range the past few weeks, the Burley native tried to wrap his mind around the immensity of this moment in his golf career.

"My game plan is, I am going to prepare the best I can so that come the week of the tournament I can just enjoy myself and enjoy the whole experience," Otte said.

By this time next week, Otte will be teeing off in his first official PGA Tour event, the Justin Timberlake Shriners Hospitals for Children Open at TPC Summerlin in Las Vegas.

"I'm not going to put a bunch of expectations out there and put a bunch of pressure on myself," Otte said. "If I prepare really well, I think that's going to take some of that anxiety and nervousness out and allow me to enjoy the excitement of it all. I don't have to do anything spectacular, but I would love to have a good week of golf, make the cut and do really well on the weekend."

In order to qualify for the event, Otte picked a good time to play perhaps the round of his life. Last month Otte won the PGA Section Qualifier in Boulder City, Nev., breaking the course record with a 61 and destroying the field for a four-stroke victory.

Only the section qualifier winner qualifies automatically for the PGA Tour event, although the second- and third-place finishers gained entry into a Monday qualifier, a last-chance opportunity the PGA Tour has for most of its tournaments.

Fredette, NBA Rookies Making Most of NBA Lockout

PROVO, Utah • Perhaps it is fitting that Thursday's exhibition game between many of the top NBA rookies is being played on a college campus.

Players from former Brigham Young star Jimmer Fredette to UCLA standout Malcolm Lee say they're still living the college life, what with no NBA paychecks because of the NBA lockout.

"People always ask me, 'How's the NBA life?'" said Lee, a second-round pick by the Minnesota Timberwolves. "I basically tell them,

"I'm a college student, the same way I left UCLA."

Of course, some are luckier than others.

Former UConn star Kemba Walker showed up for Wednesday's practice at BYU's Marriott Center wearing his Under Armour gear, complete with the new line of sneakers.

Fredette drove there in a navy blue Hyundai Genesis, a loaner car from a local dealership, and was trying out a pair of shiny white Spaulding basketball shoes.

A few had NBA-logo socks they picked up during pre-draft workouts.

But for the most part, all were players caught between college careers and the step up to the next level.

That made Jimmer's All-Star game a rare opportunity to engage in some real competition in a summer where they've had to find their own.

"You have to enjoy moments like this," said 6-foot-9 Bismack Biyombo, who was picked seventh overall by the Charlotte Bobcats. "A lot of us were drafted at the same time. It's really fun. I'm excited to enjoy this moment and game with those guys."

No one is more eager to get the

game on than Fredette, college basketball's player of the year who was drafted No. 10 overall by Sacramento.

"I'm extremely excited to be able to play in front of the (BYU) fans one more time," said Fredette, who led the nation in scoring last season. "It's going to be a great competition. That's the big thing. We get a couple of days to play in front of great competition, and that's important during the lockout when you're just trying to find ways to stay in shape."

BYU coach Dave Rose is coaching Fredette's team for the exhibition and San Diego State counterpart Steve Fisher is directing a team

captained by Kawhi Leonard, the No. 15 overall pick by San Antonio.

All the players said they had some type of insurance policy as a safeguard should they get injured. But few had contingency plans should the lockout drag on, other than continuing to work out individually or in groups.

Fredette has earned money through clinics, speaking engagements and has some deals pending. And like the other players, he will receive a nice appearance fee for Thursday's exhibition game, which is also a fundraiser for the Vestibular Awareness Foundation.

AN ANNUAL APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HANSEN, IDAHO, LEVYING AD VALOREM TAXES FOR THE CITY FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING ON THE 1ST DAY OF OCTOBER, 2011, AND ENDING ON THE 30TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 2012, UPON ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY IN THE CITY OF HANSEN, IDAHO, TO PROVIDE REVENUE TO PAY (A) THE CITY GENERAL CURRENT EXPENSES AND (B) LIABILITY INSURANCE EXPENSES, AND PROVIDING THAT THE CITY CLERK SHALL FILE A CERTIFIED COPY OF THIS ORDINANCE AND STATE TAX COMMISSION FORM L-2 WITH THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS AND AUDITOR OF TWIN FALLS COUNTY, IDAHO AND FILE A COPY OF THIS ORDINANCE WITH THE SECRETARY OF STATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HANSEN, IDAHO, THAT:

SECTION 1. That the sum of \$778,543.00 be, and the same is appropriated to defray the expenses and liabilities of the City of Hansen, Twin Falls County, Idaho, for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2009.

SECTION 2. The objects and purposes for which such appropriation is made, and the amount of each object and purpose is as follows:

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

The Junior World Championships hold zonal tournaments all over the world to determine the qualifiers for this event. When Poland took on Sweden in a Junior European Championships, the Polish declarer demonstrated a proper understanding of one of the more complex areas of the game — namely, the theory of restricted choice.

In one room the Swedes finished three down in an optimistic four-spade contract when declarer misguessed diamonds early and ran into a ruff. But Bartosz Chmurski, who is now an international player on Poland's open team, reached the more decorous contract of three spades. The lead was a low heart to East's ace, a club back to West's ace, and a low diamond switch. It now seems as if declarer has a straight guess in diamonds, but Chmurski got it right when he hopped up with dummy's king to make his contract.

I think he made the right theoretical play too, having inferred that West had made an awkward lead from K-x-x in hearts at trick one. (Because the defenders did not try to take a ruff, the suit must surely be 3-3.)

Since West might have preferred to lead a diamond rather than a heart had he held the diamond queen, but was relatively unlikely to find an opening diamond lead away from the ace, it was more likely that the diamond ace was in West's hand.

Families Applaud Fix at Eagle Intersection

Ada County Highway District installs traffic light, makes other changes at intersection where 43 crashes have killed two people and injured 36 since 2001.

EAGLE • For years, Jan Leifson asked her teenage children and other relatives not to use the intersection where Ballantyne Road and State Street connected to Idaho 44 just west of Eagle. Last year, her worst fear about the curving, dangerous stretch of road became a reality: Her 85-year-old aunt was killed in a car crash at the intersection. “Unfortunately, it took the death of a loved one to get me to do anything,” Leifson said Tuesday. Just a couple of weeks after her aunt’s death, Leifson

went to an Ada County Highway District Commission meeting to ask that the intersection be made safer. Terry Sayer of Eagle was there to make a similar plea. Sayer was involved in a crash at the intersection in 2005, and had avoided it since. On Tuesday, Leifson and Sayer were on hand to cheer when the Highway District flipped the switch on a new traffic signal at the realigned intersection. Since 2001, 43 crashes involving 120 people with 36 injuries and two fatalities have occurred where the east-west route through Eagle entered the state high-

way on a high-speed curve. The new intersection connects State Street about 1,300 feet to the west, on a straight section of highway that now has the protection of a signal to stop cross traffic for cars entering the highway. ACHD Commissioner John Franden, who represents the Eagle area, described the old section of road as “scary.” ACHD heeded the residents’ and city’s concerns and looked for a way to make the project happen sooner than it had planned. The district was able to move the project up one year because of lower-than-

expected construction costs on other projects. “We were able to put those dollars into this project,” Franden said. “This is a much-needed safety improvement.” The Highway District also didn’t mind paying the full cost of installing a traffic signal on the state-owned Idaho 44. ITD had offered \$300,000 in federal-aid money to pay for part of the signal, but ACHD said waiting for federal money would have delayed the project. This is not the first time the Highway District has picked up the tab to make safety improvements on a state highway. Last year, ACHD approved paying the full cost of installing a traffic signal and right-turn lanes at the

intersection of state-owned Idaho 55 and county-maintained Hill Road, which had been the site of 23 accidents in five years. The signal should be installed in the spring. ITD and ACHD are planning to split the cost of installing a new traffic signal in front of the Ada County Courthouse, where hundreds of jaywalkers cross daily. If both parties approve the spending, the light will likely go up in January. As the Valley’s once-rural highways become more urbanized, high-speed travel along miles of signal-free stretches will become a thing of the past. “Nobody is cheering about a new stoplight,” Leifson said. “But we are all cheering because the road is now safer.”

Cigarette Sparks Fire at Post Falls Apartment

POST FALLS • A cigarette has been determined as the cause of Wednesday morning’s blaze that destroyed three units and damaged nine others at the Falls Park Apartments in Post Falls. Shaena Dunn, Kootenai County Fire and Rescue spokeswoman, said the fire started on a second-story balcony of the three-story complex. No one was injured. Most of the 41 residents in the 24-unit were evacuated, but a few residents didn’t wake up until after the fire was out and after the evacuation process. The fire at 304 W. Fourth Ave. next to Falls Park was reported at 1:42 a.m.

Affected residents are being assisted with housing by a combination of the American Red Cross, families, churches and neighbors. “It was like a dream,” said resident Russ Bottel-son, who lives on the third floor of the building and had the ceiling in a bedroom collapse due to the blaze. “I looked outside and saw flames shooting across my balcony. I threw on a pair of pants, a shirt, grabbed some valuables, started knocking on doors. Then I heard someone yell, ‘It’s going to blow!’” Linda Bell, who lives in the apartment building next to the one that burned, said the flames were massive. “I haven’t seen a fire like that in many years,” she said. “The flames went up 20 feet or more. Thank God everybody got out. I thought the whole building was going to go.”

Rexburg Police Say Man Bites Officer

REXBURG • Police say efforts to get information from a Rexburg man after a report of a fight led to an officer being bitten by the suspect. Calvin J. Wylie, 55, was jailed Monday afternoon on a misdemeanor charge of delaying or resisting arrest. Another misdemeanor charge of battery on an officer was filed Tuesday. He was released on a \$300 bond. Rexburg police say the incident began shortly after 1 p.m. Monday when officers received a call from a woman who reported that a fight had broken out in the Walmart parking lot. Capt. Randy Lewis said the investigation by police indicates that there was an incident between Wylie and an unknown person or persons that involved a heated discussion over alleged damage to Wylie’s car, but no fight actually broke out. One of the arresting offi-

cers said that Wylie was initially detained in the parking lot of the Maverik convenience store on Second East. The officer said Wylie’s car matched the description of one that left the scene of the incident reported at Walmart. Three RPD officers and a deputy from Madison County responded at the Maverik. Lewis said the decision was made to arrest Wylie because he refused to comply with instructions by the officers, including a request to provide identification. Police allege that during the arrest Wylie became aggressive and Wylie and one of the officers fell, and it was then that the officer was bitten. Rexburg police say the bite did not break the skin. Police did not release the name of the officer. Madison Fire Department officials were called to the scene to check out the officer and Wylie, who was reported to have received several facial scratches.

More Details Emerge from Strange Assault Case in Bonner County

SANDPOINT • Court documents and police reports are painting a fuller picture in a peculiar Bonner County assault case. Little was known about the circumstances surrounding an incident in which a Vay landowner used a John Deere tractor to dismantle a home on his property with a woman and two children still inside. The episode resulted in three felony assault charges against Paul Fagerlie Finman, who faces trial in 1st District Court this fall. Court documents and other records, meanwhile, reveal that Finman, 56, was entangled in a dispute with an adherent of the sovereign citizen movement named Alexander Duncan Campbell.

Finman inherited the entanglement with the property he purchased off Bandy Road in Vay. Campbell, his wife, son and daughter were living on a home on the ranch rent-free. Eviction proceedings commenced after Finman said he received what he considered to be a death threat from Campbell veiled in Biblical verse. The defense maintains Finman was unaware Campbell’s wife and children were inside when he began destroying the home to deter squatters. Campbell, 66, was not at the home during the incident. Campbell’s children testified at a preliminary hearing that they feared for their lives during the ordeal, although his teenage daughter managed to find the time to document the destruction with a camera from

within the home. Campbell was also in repeated phone contact with his wife during the incident. “They are just being herded by Mr. Campbell. They don’t do anything independently of him,” said Jeremy Featherston, Finman’s Sandpoint defense attorney. Campbell did not respond to a phone message seeking comment. Featherston subpoenaed Campbell to testify at a preliminary hearing, but he dodged it by claiming he was improperly identified in the document. The state has no interest in Campbell as a witness because he was not present when the home was being destroyed. “He has absolutely zero to do with this case,” said Deputy Prosecutor Shane Greenbank.

Idaho Woman Drowns in Montana Kayaking Accident

KALISPELL, Mont. (AP) • Authorities say a 51-year-old Idaho woman drowned in the North Fork Flathead River in northwestern Montana after her inflatable kayak became tangled in tree roots. Flathead County Sheriff Chuck Curry says the woman and her husband were in a two-seated kayak about two miles south of Polebridge when the accident happened at about 1 p.m. Wednesday. Curry

says the kayak became entangled in a root ball before it folded, inverted and rolled over. The woman and her 59-year-old husband were wearing life preservers, and The Daily Inter Lake in Kalispell reports the husband freed himself and flagged down help at a nearby road. The victim’s name and hometown are being withheld until relatives can be notified.
