# Idaho Runs on Volunteers

A new report shows Idaho in the top tier for residents who donate their time to organizations.

There are many reasons people choose

to volunteer. Patricia Dolars does it for her own "personal satisfaction."

As an advocate for the elderly, Dolars volunteers as an ombudsman for elderly rights, health and welfare. The program is run through the College of Southern Idaho Office on Aging in Twin Falls and requires a commitment of at least a year. It also puts volunteers through a series of training sessions before they meet with clients.

It's a lot of work, and a large time commitment. However, after the first year, Dolars knew she wouldn't be leaving anytime soon.

"It gives me a chance to visit with people," she said. "Volunteering opens up a new world for you. The fact you're putting yourself out there for another person is important and can be really heart warming."

Dolars isn't the only one who loves volunteering in Idaho. Close to 34 percent of Idaho residents volunteer with an organization, making the Gem State one of the top 10 volunteer states, according to a report from the Corporation for National and Community Ser-


Idaho residents tend to volunteer most with religious and educational organizations, and more than 10 percent reported they volunteer with their neighbors.

Educational volunteers are particularly vital as schools have been forced to cut back on budgets, said Dale Layne, Jerome School District super-

This was the Idaho Army National Guard's third deployment during the Iraq War era, and 116th members were stationed in northern Iraq, performing force and convoy protection.



# Idaho **Poised** to Ditch **Federal Ed Law**

Tom Luna, state superintendent of public instruction, says Idaho will be one of the first states to waive basic elements of No Child Left Behind.

BOISE • Idaho will be among the first states to apply for a waiver from the federal government to skirt provisions of the No Child Left Behind education law, according to the state Superintendent of Public Instruction

He was among state school officers who were at the White House on Friday as President Barack Obama and U.S. Education Secretary Arne Duncan gave states guidance on the 9year-old federal law. Decrying the state of American education, Obama said states will get unprecedented freedom to waive basic elements of the sweeping Bush-era No Child Left Behind law, calling it an admirable but flawed effort that has hurt students instead of helped them.

Idaho was among a handful of states that vowed earlier this year to ignore the latest No Child Left Behind requirements, saying they set unrealistic benchmarks.

Under the plan Obama outlined, states can ask the Education Department to be exempted from some of the law's requirements if they meet certain conditions, such as imposing

### Did His Exercise Routine Cause Prostate Worries?

As a man over the age of 65, one of my main health concerns is prostate health. I get yearly digital and PSA tests and usually test out at 1.2 or so. Last January, I had a reading of 4.8. My doctor wanted me to see a urologist, but due to a medical problem in my family, I put off going. I took another test in April and had a reading of 1.2. I had another test in July and had a reading of 2.5. I have heard that men who ride bicycles frequently can have prostate problems. Prior to the 4.8 reading, I had started an exercise routine using a stationary bike. Could this have caused the higher read-

You shouldn't do anything based on a single lab test. Most lab tests are very stable and changes do not happen rapidly. However, organs like the prostate that can be traumatized easily, can reach a different level of PSA in a matter of hours. A single PSA value should be monitored, but is not something one should act upon immediately.

When looking at prostate cancer, it is really the trend that is the important component, not just one reading number, but how that reading changes over a matter of

Look at the trend with how rapidly it changes. There are certain guidelines that physicians have that try to give a guide as to whether or not a trend is consistent with your age or more consistent with prostate cancer.

The faster your PSA is going up, the more likely the cause is prostate cancer, whereas a general upward trend over the years is very consistent with a man getting older. Almost all men's prostates get a

little larger as they age, which produces more PSA.

Anything that will irritate or inflame the prostate will make the PSA reading increase. Yes, you can ride a bike and have a PSA taken the day after the bike ride, and your PSA will be elevated. Within a day or two, your PSA reading should return to its normal range. Other prostate irritations can be caused by rectal exams, intercourse and infections and will also increase PSA levels. If you do have a bladder infection, antibiotics would be the best course of action to reduce the inflammation. It would be wise to repeat your PSA testing a day or two after you have ridden your stationary bike, to ensure the most average PSA reading possible.

less time for the one-on-one interaction that is so important," Layne said. "Volunteers can work with one student at a time — they play a big part in our schools."

It's not uncommon for an organization to use volunteers, but some groups are completely dependent on them. Valley House, Twin Falls' transitional housing organization, looks to volunteers for landscaping, distributing clothing, cleaning and general office upkeep, said Sharon Breshears, the organization's executive director. Breshears says it's impor-

tant to be involved in a community because people can learn about issues they may not have known existed.

"When you volunteer at a homeless shelter, you put a face on the homeless," she said. "That's real and you can't ignore that."

Some volunteers have found that giving up time for free can lead to a paying job,

said Jennifer Caprile, project coordinator for Serve Idaho, the governor's commission on service and volunteerism.

"A lot of people don't know it, but volunteering can be a resume builder," Caprile said. "You come into contact with a lot of people that can lead you to jobs or be job references."

But the personal benefit is an added bonus to volunteering, she said.

"People do it to serve, and at the same time they're getting a reward for themselves," she said.

"The Magic Valley by and far leads the way this year," Browning said during the Harrison Elementary presentation.

In order to earn the Distinguished Schools Award, schools must make "Adequate Yearly Progress" under the federal No Child Left Behind Act for two consecutive years, and reduce the gap between subgroups and the school's general enrollment on Idaho Standards Achievement Test scores.

Schools must also be in the top 5 percent in the state for reducing the gap.

Harrison Elementary received the Distinguished Schools honor in two categories: for making improvements in reading and raising test scores among Hispanic students.

Hispanic students improved about 5.5 percent in reading and 6.42 percent in math on the ISAT compared with last year's scores.

Harrison Elementary Principal Chris Gillette said she enjoyed watching the teachers' reaction to news of the award Friday.

"It was fun to have them be surprised by the recognition," she said.

It's the first time Harrison Elementary has received the award.

Browning said presentations are being scheduled at the other four Magic Valley schools that received state awards.

Kimberly Elementary Principal Craig Maki said it's also the first time his school has received the award.

"It came as a surprise," he said.

The largest increase in student performance at Kimberly Elementary was among Hispanic students, with a 5.3 percent increase in math on the ISAT.

For Filer High School, their Additional Yearly Growth Award was based on making AYP for two consecutive years and showing an increase in test scores for at least one subgroup of stu-

"We'll absolutely be one of the first states to apply," Luna said in an interview with The Associated Press.

"I think this is the first step, it's a symbolic step, but it's an important first step in turning back the authority and control of running our schools back to the states and away from the federal government," he said.

A majority of states are expected to apply for waivers, which will be given to qualified states early next year. Luna said he has been advised that states can start applying for the waivers in November and he will work

with the state Board of Education on Idaho's application.

The No Child Left Behind law set a goal of having 100 percent of students proficient in math and reading by 2014, but states were allowed to establish how much schools must improve each year. Many saved the biggest leaps for the final years because they anticipated the

law would be changed. But it hasn't, and states like Idaho, Montana and South Dakota made plans earlier this year to reject the latest requirements for determining school progress under the law – even if the move toward noncompliance might put them at risk of losing some federal fund-

Secretary Duncan has also said he wants the emphasis to be more on growth than on test scores. Despite allowing states to

do away with the approaching 2014 deadline, Obama insisted he was not weakening the law but rather helping states set higher standards. He said that the current law was forcing educators to teach to the test, give short shrift to subjects such as history and science, and lower standards as a way of avoiding penalties and stig-

The No Child Left Behind law was passed in 2001 with widespread bipartisan support. It sought to hold schools more accountable for student performance and draw better-qualified teachers into classrooms.

But the law has since been widely panned by critics who say it brands schools as failures even as they make progress, discourages high academic standards and encourages educators to teach to the test, as opposed to providing practical classroom learning to students.

No Child Left Behind has been due for a re-write since 2007, and Obama and Duncan had asked that it be overhauled by the beginning of this school year. But a growing ideological divide in Congress has only complicated efforts to do so.

Duncan has said the administration's plan would not undermine efforts in Congress because the waivers could serve as a bridge until Congress acts.

## **Burley Teen** Pleads Guilty to **C-store Robbery**

**BURLEY** • Burley teen pleaded guilty to two counts of felony robbery

and one burglary charge Friday in Cassia

County 5th District Court. The pleas stemmed from the July 27th armed robbery of a Burley convenience store. Family members sobbed

softly in the courtroom as 18-year-old Neftali Ramirez stood before Cassia County 5th District Judge Michael Crabtree Friday and changed his prior not-guilty pleas to guilty.

Under a plea agreement, the state agreed to drop a felony destruction or concealment of evidence charge connected

with the robbery, along with a felony lewd and lascivious conduct charge in a separate case.

Cassia County Deputy Prosecutor Blaine Cannon said the state also agrees not to file other charges that were pending that included enhancement charges and assault.

Ramirez will be sentenced for the robbery charges at 3 p.m. Nov. 29 in district court.

Ramirez was charged after he allegedly entered the Unit 54 convenience store on East 27th Street in Burley and pointed a gun at two store employees.

According to court reports, the robbery only netted Ramirez \$180.

Crabtree said penalty for robbery is five years to life in prison and a maximum \$50,000 fine. The penalty for burglary is one to 10 years in prison and a maximum \$50,000 fine.

### Declo Highway Junction **Repairs Start Monday**



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# Idaho Inmate Challenges Execution

**BOISE** • Idaho death row inmate Paul Ezra Rhoades has filed a lawsuit in federal court challenging the state's method of execution.

Rhoades, who was convicted of three murders in Idaho Falls and Blackfoot in 1988, says lethal injections are frequently botched. He also argues Idaho's protocol for administering lethal injections doesn't require enough training or experience for the execution team, and that other problems with the system would render his execution unconstitutional.

Rhoades is one of a handful of Idaho death-row inmates whose cases may be nearing an end. The state Department of Correction, in anticipation of at least one execution occurring within the next year, has been taking several steps to prepare — including updating its execution protocol and building a new execution chamber. The previous chamber, which has been only used once in the past five decades, was contained inside a trailer.

Department spokesman Jeff Ray said the execution protocol is still being drafted, but it's designed to fully comply with all U.S. Supreme Court rulings.

Rhoades was given two death sentences for raping and murdering 34-year-old Idaho Falls teacher Susan Michelbacher, whose bullet-ridden body was found in March 1987. He also was given two death sentences for the first-degree murder and kidnap-

ping of 24-year-old Stacy Dawn Baldwin, a Blackfoot convenience store clerk. She was shot to death in February 1987.

Rhoades was also sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole after pleading guilty to the March 1987 shooting death of 21-year-old Nolan Haddon, a Blackfoot man who worked at an Idaho Falls convenience store.

Over the past several years, Rhoades has appealed several aspects of his case. The U.S. Supreme Court is expected to decide next month whether it will consider his remaining challenge — a claim that a lower court should have had an evidentiary hearing when deciding whether his attorneys effectively represented him during sentencing.

Deputy Attorney General LaMont Anderson says he expects the high court to decline to hear Rhoades' case. If Anderson is right, the process of setting an execution date may begin: The 9th U.S. Court of Appeals can lift the stay of execution it placed on Rhoades' case, freeing the state attorney general to ask a Bonneville County judge to issue a death warrant, and that request clearing the way for a judge to set an execution date within 30 days of issuing the order.

But Rhoades' challenge to Idaho's lethal injection method — contained in more than 200 pages of documents filed late this week — means a judge in Boise's U.S. District Court can put everything on hold to allow time for the court to consider the method

of execution.

Anderson says it's anyone's guess

what happens then.

"This is the first time since 1957
we've had an execution that wasn't a
volunteer. From my perspective, we're

in uncharted ground," he said.
But even if Idaho's methodology is initially found unconstitutional, it will be modified to meet court standards, Anderson said.

"The bottom line is that Idaho is not going to allow the prevention of an execution based on a defect in the protocol," he said. "We'll fix the protocol if there's any deficiency found."

Rhoades' attorney, Oliver Loewy with the Federal Defenders of Idaho, wasn't immediately available to comment on the case.

Because Idaho Department of Correction officials say the protocol is still being drafted and can't be released, it's not clear how closely the version included in Rhoades' lawsuit matches the one being adjusted by the department.

The draft protocol mentioned in the lawsuit was obtained through a public records request from March 2011. It calls for the use of three chemicals: sodium thiopental (an anesthetic), pancuronium bromide (a drug to paralyze muscles) and potassium chloride (a drug to stop the heart).

There has been a nationwide shortage of sodium thiopental, but the draft addresses that possibility by allowing the state to substitute pentobarbital if the first drug can't be found, according to the lawsuit.

### Missing Utah Mom's Father-in-law Pleads Not Guilty

TACOMA, Wash. • The father-in-law of a missing Utah woman pleaded not guilty on Friday to charges of possessing child pornography and secretly videotaping her, other women and young girls without their knowledge.

Wearing an orange jail-house jumpsuit and with his hands cuffed, Steven Powell, 61, entered the pleas in court in Washington state, and the judge set bail at \$200,000.

Powell's arrest on Thursday at his home immediately set off another court battle, with Susan Powell's father asking another judge on Friday for custody of her two sons.

The boys, ages 4 and 6, had been living at their grandfather's home with their father, Josh Powell, the only named person of interest in her 2009 disappearance. No charges have been filed against him.

The judge at Powell's arraignment ordered him not to have contact with his grandsons. A lawyer for the state attorney general said earlier that the boys had been placed in foster care since the arrest.

After the hearing, Denise Cox, Susan Powell's older sister, said she was worried that Steven Powell would easily post bail. She said she believes that both son and father were involved in the disappearance.

"I'm just hoping for the day that hopefully Josh will join him," she said.

"It's been a long wait and it gets harder every day," she said, as she cried spoke in front of a throng of reporters and television news cameras.

A court commissioner said Friday that he will not decide on the custody of the sons until after the state's child welfare agency finishes its investigation. Another hearing is scheduled for Wednesday.

"We're very concerned

for the welfare of our grandchildren. We're doing everything we can," said Chuck Cox, Susan Powell's father, after the custody hearing.

The arrest — and the

The arrest — and the child custody motion — are the latest twists in a case that has perplexed Utah police, who are on their 12th day of searching a remote stretch of desert near where Josh Powell says he went camping the night his wife vanished.

Prosecutor Mark Lindquist in Washington state said Steven Powell is charged with 14 felony counts of voyeurism and

one count of possession of child pornography.

Lindquist said Utah police investigating Susan Powell's disappearance found "thousands of images of females being videotaped without their knowledge, including Susan Powell," on tapes and disks at his home in an Aug. 25 search.

The videos were found in Steven Powell's bedroom. "The photographer focuses on the women's buttocks, breasts," Lindquist said in a statement. "Many images were of minor females."

The images included shots of two girls who were as young as 8 and 10 years old at the time, the prosecutor said. Authorities determined that the girls lived near Steven Powell from June 2006 to August 2007.

At Powell's arraignment, prosecutor Grant Blinn said detectives are still going through the seized items, but so far have found more than 1,000 video files. He said it appeared he had been secretly videotaping girls or women for at least 10 years.

The arrest prompted a Cox family lawyer to directly accuse Josh — for the first time publicly — of involvement in his wife's disappearance.

"The time has come where we have to stop playing cat and mouse games: Josh Powell had something to do with the disappearance of the mother of these children," attorney Steve Downing told the court commissioner on Friday.

Powell responded: "Everything they said is patently false. I am a good father to my sons."

father to my sons."

Before the hearing, he sat in the back row of the small courtroom wearing a blue jacket, jeans, white sneak-

ers with the treads worn off — and his wedding ring.

Powell flipped through a thick stack of legal documents and told an Associated Press reporter "no" when asked if he had anything to say about his dad's arrest. He ignored several other questions.

Susan Powell's father called the allegations against Steven Powell disgusting. "It very clearly shows her concerns were just about Steven Powell," Chuck Cox said.

In a statement issued late Wednesday, West Valley City, Utah police, who are investigating Susan Powell's disappearance, said Steven Powell's arrest was not related to the missing person case.

They have said Josh Powell has been uncooperative in their investigation.

Josh Powell claims he took the couple's two sons — then ages 4 and 2 — on a midnight camping trip in the mountains west of Salt Lake City on Dec. 6, 2009, the night before she was reported missing.

Also Friday, a Washington state judge issued a permanent injunction barring Josh Powell and his father from further publishing journal pages Susan Powell wrote as a teenager.

wrote as a teenager.

The Powells claimed the journal entries depicted a troubled woman, but Susan's family has been fighting their release, saying they were the personal writings of a young girl and had no bearing on her disappearance.

Authorities planned to wrap up their 12-day search of the desert Friday about 30 miles from where Josh Powell said he went camping that night. At one point, they said they found a

"shallow grave" after cadaver dogs alerted them to the spot.

But they found no human remains. Charred wood chips discovered in the hole have been sent to a lab for testing. The search of the Powells

home in Puyallup, Wash., last month came after police wrapped up a search for evidence in a network of abandoned mines outside Ely, Nev.

Steven Powell said he had a flirtatious relationship with his daughter-in-law and believed they were in love. "Susan was very sexual

with me," Steve Powell told ABC's Good Morning America. "We interacted in a lot of sexual ways because Susan enjoys doing that."

Cox, Susan's father, denied the allegations, and said it was Steven Powell who initiated unwanted sexual advances.

Josh Powell has denied

killing his wife or having anything to do with her disappearance. "I would never even hurt her," a tearful, red-eyed Josh Powell told CBS' Early Show in August.

Josh and his father have said they believe Susan Powell ran off with another man.

"I'm still thinking she left," Steven Powell told The Associated Press in August. "Hopefully they'll be able to find her at some point.... We don't believe she's dead."

# Idaho Soldier Gets 7 Years for Afghan Killing

JOINT BASE LEWIS-Me-CHORD, Wash. (AP) • After tearfully asking for mercy, a 21-year-old Idaho soldier among five charged in the thrill killings of Afghan civilians last year was sentenced Friday to seven years in prison, an Army spokesman said.

Pvt. 1st Class Andrew Holmes sentence comes one day after he changed his plea to guilty in a deal with Army prosecutors. The soldier from Boise confessed in court that he fired a heavy machine gun at a startled, unarmed man from 15 feet away after a co-defendant tossed a grenade at him.

Army spokesman Joe Kubistek said that Holmes will receive a dishonorable discharge after serving his sentence. He'll also forfeit his Army pay.

Holmes' family cried as judge Lt. Col. Kwasi Hawks read the sentence, prefacing it by telling Holmes that, "I hope and I believe you will have a long and productive life, and I believe a happy

But Hawks also told Holmes there was no excuse for the murder.

"You aimed a fully loaded squad automatic weapon at (a) child that stood 15 feet away;' Hawks told him.

Hawks initially wanted 15 years for Holmes but was restrained by the agreement. Holmes will receive credit for the 499 days he has already been behind bars and could leave prison early on good behavior, the Tacoma News Tribune reported.

The soldiers from Joint Base Lewis-McChord south of Seattle were arrested in Afghanistan last year, after prosecutors said they killed three civilians for sport during patrols in January, February and May of 2010.

Holmes was accused of directly participating in the first killing and was initially charged with conspiracy, premeditated murder and other charges. In a deal with prosecutors, he pleaded guilty to murder by an inherently dangerous act, possessing a finger bone from his victim, and smoking

"Please give me the opportunity to be a son, a brother, a nephew," Holmes told Hawks on Friday.

The charges against the

five soldiers from what was formerly known as the 5th Stryker Brigade, since renamed the 2nd Stryker Brigade, are among the most serious war crimes charges to emerge from the Afghan

Prosecutors say that in addition to killing three men, some of the defendants kept body parts severed from the corpses as well as photographs kept as war trophies. Drug use was rampant in the unit, and one soldier who blew the whistle on hash smoking by his comrades was beaten up and threatened in retaliation.

As he delivered his closing argument, prosecutor Maj. Rob Stelle placed a blownup photo of Holmes standing over the boy he killed.

"It was callous, reckless indifference, a depraved heart," Stelle said. "The accused had a choice. He pulled the trigger and ended that man's life?"

Holmes' lawyer, Dan Conway, argued his client was a 19-year-old soldier placed in a difficult situa-

Prosecutors say the alleged victim of a hate crime in Coeur d'Alene has received threats and stopped returning their calls.



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### Caldwell Man Sentenced to 20 Years in Wife's Death

CALDWELL (AP) • A Caldwell man has been sentenced to 20 years in prison after pleading guilty to killing his estranged wife last year.

Judge Renae Hoff sentenced Chris Stone to 20 years in prison, including nine years before he is eligible for parole.

The Idaho Statesman reports that prosecutors had asked for a sentence of 20 years with 10 years fixed. Stone's attorney had asked

for 20 years with seven years fixed.

Court records say 32year-old Florence Stone was picking up her belongings at their house when she was shot on Aug. 29, 2010.

Chris Stone initially said he was defending himself. He admitted at the hearing that the prosecutors' version of events was correct in that he held his wife down, shot her twice, then stabbed himself in the stomach.

### **SANDPOINT BANS ALL USE WHILE DRIVING**

**SANDPOINT (AP)** • The Sandpoint City Council has passed a ban on texting and cellphone use while driving.

A violation will carry a \$10 fine and be a secondary offense, meaning that police officers will need another infraction such as speeding to justify a traffic stop.

The Bonner County Daily Bee reports that the council passed the ban Thursday after months of draft ordinances and public comment.

Council member Carrie Logan initially proposed limiting the ban to texting while driving, but the final ordinance restricts all mobile device use while driving.

The change addresses concerns by Sandpoint Police Chief Mark Lockwood that proving a driver was specifically texting could be difficult to prove.

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# Idaho Boy, 10, Escapes Clash With Mountain Lion

BOISE • A 10-year-old Idaho boy who came face-to-face with a mountain lion in rural Boise County escaped with minor scratches - and concerns that his friends at school wouldn't believe his story, according to state wildlife managers.

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game said Friday the mountain lion was tracked down and killed after the encounter late Thursday. The boy, whose family asked not to be identified, received first aid at home for minor scratches and was expected to get a tetanus shot Friday.

The boy was not traumatized from his encounter, state wildlife officials said.

"His biggest concern was that his schoolmates wouldn't believe him, which is kind of funny," Senior Conservation Officer Matt O'Connell said.

The boy came across the mountain lion while searching for a missing hunting dog with his father near their home in a

rural subdivision about 15 to 20 miles northeast of Boise. The boy ran from the predator but stumbled and fell. It was then the mountain lion took a swipe, scratching the boy's arm and hand.

The child then yelled to his father and stood up, pulling out a hunting knife, which made the predator back down and gave the dad enough time to fire off several shots from his 9mm handgun to scare the lion away, O'Connell said.

Conservation officers with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, along with an offduty officer from the Meridian Police Department, responded to the reported encounter and a couple hours later, tracked down the big cat. The mountain lion, which was estimated to be about 18 months old, was found feeding on the carcass of the family's missing hunting dog, O'Connell said.

"When a lion has actually made physical contact with a person and in conjunction with that, has killed a domestic animal and has been close enough to that residence, the

nized at that time," O'Connell said.

These types of encounters are rare in Idaho, said southwest regional wildlife managmanagers could recall only one other injury by a cougar. That involved a 12-year-old boy and was reported in the early 1990s on the Salmon River, he said.



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# Winter Safety Remains Top ITD Priority

**SANDPOINT** • The Idaho Transportation Department is clarifying its plans for winter highway maintenance in light of declining revenue and budget cuts.

The department said earlier this month that overnight snowplowing was expected to be suspended throughout most of the Panhandle except for Interstate 90 and the Coeur d'Alene area.

The shift from roundthe-clock winter maintenance on highways in the five northern counties was influenced by declining budget allocations for overtime and the hiring of hourly employees.

The matter of funding overtime and hourly workers remains, although the department said this week it intends to keep highways clear through strategic use of resources and work shifts.

"If there's a storm event, the roads will be plowed," said Barbara Babic, ITD's District 1 spokeswoman.

Babic said nighttime crews could plow lanes of travel overnight, leaving shoulder plowing and berm work for daytime crews. District 1 crews may also start shifts earlier in the morning to clear snow from overnight storms rather than plowing all night.

are going to be out there," said Babic.

and wet instead of leaving a snow floor, according to Babic.

The prospect of suspended overnight plowing created a furor among motorists. Some also used the issue as ammunition in political warfare against lawmakers.

District 1 Sen. Shawn Keough said she received a number of emails from voters who accused her of fabricating a funding shortfall in order to increase taxes.

Keough was a member of a task force which developed a series of options aimed at overcoming ITD's funding woes. However, none of the options, which include raising the gas tax, have been implemented.

"Nothing much has changed in the economy since the task force met last year. The task force, the lieutenant governor and the governor continue to be reluctant to increase taxes when the economy has not gotten better," said Keough.

Meanwhile, the department is in the midst of a reorganization process which could wring out additional funding for highway maintenance and projects.

"They are in the middle of reorganizing the entire department to drive money down to the road, whether it's snowplowing or filling potholes. Some of this - at least in my mind anyway – is a realignment and a rearranging of positions within chain," Keough said.

# Judge Asked to Lift Order Blocking Megaloads

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP) . A Montana judge says he will rule next month whether to repeal or change his order to keep an Exxon Mobil subsidiary's oversized oil refinery rigs bound for Canada off Montana highways.

Judge Ray Dayton, of Anaconda, issued a preliminary injunction on July 19 that blocked the transporting of more than 200 so-called megaloads through Montana en route from Idaho to the oil sands of Alberta.

The Missoulian reports that Dayton heard two hours of arguments Thursday as to why he should or shouldn't rescind or modify his order. After the arguments, Dayton said he recognizes the Imperial Oil's desire for a speedy decision, but he'll be out of the office next week and

then will have to sift through a lot of testimony.

Ken Johnson, the project manager of the Kearl Module Transport Project, told the judge that all of the modules that the Exxon subsidiary wants to transport from South Korea to Alberta are now in the U.S.

Some have been hauled to the worksite in Canada, but most are waiting at ports in Washington and Idaho, he said. With winter coming and deadlines looming at the Kearl Oil Sands construction site, Johnson said his company needs U.S. Highway 12 in Montana to get its processing equipment there.

"We need all the routes we can to move all the modules that we have in Idaho and Washington to the site." Johnson said. "We're behind in schedule and we have to accelerate the movements, and so we're looking at all available routes."

Missoula County and three environmental groups contend that Montana transportation officials approved an insufficient environmental assessment and urged Dayton to keep the block on the shipments.

"We think your ruling was well-rounded and well-insulated, if you will, because of the breadth of your findings," attorney Kim Wilson, of Helena, representing the three environmental groups

that joined in the suit, told

Dayton.

Imperial Oil attorney Steve Brown said the order did not take into account evidence that state officials did everything they could to adhere to the Montana Environmental Protection Act.

"The only evidence that can be shown as far as a MEPA violation is evidence of the record, and the court can't go outside the record to find a MEPA violation,"

Brown said.

The company said a test haul to Lolo Hot Springs showed it overestimated the number of turnouts needed to comply with Montana's rule that traffic should not be delayed more than 10 minutes by the slow-moving

Plus, the first 33 modules to arrive in Lewiston have

been split into 65 loads so they can move on the interstates from Coeur d'Alene through Montana to the Port of Sweetgrass.

Thirteen have moved so far and two were scheduled to move Thursday night on an alternate route that involves all-interstate travel through Montana, Johnson

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



# Exxon Mobil to Restart Montana Pipeline

BILLINGS, Mont. • A failed Exxon Mobil pipeline that spilled an estimated 42,000 gallons of oil into the Yellowstone River is expected to restart operations today after getting approval from federal officials.

Changes made during repairs to the Silvertip pipeline have made it less likely to fail again, Montana Department of Environmental Quality Director Richard Opper said. The line broke July 1 after flooding scoured the river bottom and exposed the 12inch pipe, which was buried just five feet deep in some areas.

A replacement segment was installed by drilling a passage for the pipeline an estimated 60 to beneath the feet riverbed.

"There were a lot of eyes on this from our federal

partners," Opper said of repairs to the line. "It was done right. It's a lot safer pipeline now, at least crossing the river."

Company spokeswoman Rachael Moore confirmed Friday that pipeline safety regulators had approved the resumption of opera-

tions along the pipe that runs beneath the river near Laurel.

The flow of oil will resume once integrity checks have been completed on the line, Moore said. She declined to say when that would be, but Opper said he was told Saturday.

Two more of the line's river crossings, at Rock Creek and the Clark's Fork of the Yellowstone, also will be replaced with segments installed through direction drilling. That work is to be completed by next March, Moore said.

"Prior to completion of

the new crossings, (Exxon Mobil) will monitor daily stream flow conditions and institute shut down and isolation procedures if flow conditions exceed agreed upon thresholds," Moore said in an emailed state-

Cleanup of the spilled oil

continues. Dozens of miles of riverbank were fouled by oil, and at the cleanup's peak more than 1,000 Exxon Mobil contractors were involved in removing contaminated vegetation and mopping up crude.

Only about 10 barrels of crude oil, or 420 gallons, were recovered, according to federal officials. Exxon Mobil and the DEQ are negotiating terms of the remaining work.

Silvertip is the main crude source for Exxon Mobil's 60,000-barrel a day refinery in Billings, which had been forced to scramble to find other sources of oil while the line was down.

The company in July estimated the spill could cost it more than \$42 million, although that was only a preliminary figure and final costs could be higher after the cleanup proved more difficult than first expect-

### NTSB Focusing on Aircraft Part that Dropped from Plane in Reno Air Crash

LAS VEGAS • Federal investigators are looking at evidence that something fell off a modified World War II-era racing aircraft as it climbed, rolled and crashed nose-first into spectators, killing 11 during air races in Reno last week,

66 of them seriously. The report made no conclusions, and noted that investigators are trying to extract clues from an onboard data box and camera equipment believed to be from the plane. A final report with findings could take more than a year.

Pilot Jimmy Leeward, 74, of Ocala, Fla., was among the 11 people killed in the crash during the National Championship Air Races. Leeward was a veteran movie stunt pilot and air racer who spoke earlier about modifications he made to squeeze more speed from his P-51 Mustang fighter plane in a bid for a first-place finish.

ter Leeward completed several laps and made a steep left turn toward the home pylon and grandstand. The plane banked suddenly left, then right, turned away from the race course and pitched into a steep nose-high climb, the report said.

The plane then rolled and plunged nose-first into a box seat area in front of the center of the grandstands.

A piece of the aircraft tail was found not quite a mile away from the crash site, NTSB investigators said. Photos showed a tail part, known as an elevator trim tab, missing as the plane went out of control.

Leeward's crew provided to investigators the ground station telemetry data they had gathered, including engine readings and global positioning satellite system information.

The damaged onboard data box was recovered in the wreckage and sent to an NTSB laboratory along with what the report called "pieces of a camera housing and multiple detached memory cards from the airplane's onboard camera."

Investigators were also looking at whether Leeward's health was a factor, safety board member Mark Rosekind said Monday.

Veteran fliers said it's likely that Leeward lost consciousness due to intense gravitational forces during his 400-plus mph climb, and never had a chance to steer out of his death dive.

unconscious," "He's Ernie Christensen, a retired rear admiral and former commander of the Navy's Top Gun fighter school, told The Associated Press in an interview. Christensen noted the P-51 hit the ground at full throttle, indicating that Leeward wasn't in control.

"The power was up and that's an indication he was not in control of the airplane when it hit," he said.

The impact horrified thousands of spectators in the grandstands, and left a crater on the tarmac about 3 feet deep and 6 feet across. It propelled chairs, body parts, blue and red box seat bunting and wreckage over more than two acres. There was no

Rescuers triaged the injured on the tarmac and transported the most seriously hurt to area hospitals where 11 victims remained hospitalized in acute care Friday. Two were moved Thursday to a Reno rehabilitation hospital.

At Renown Regional Medical Center in Reno, two people were in critical condition and six were in fair condition, hospital spokesman Dan Davis said. He said one air crash patient from Renown was moved in fair condition to the hospital's rehabilitation

The other was apparently transferred from St. Mary's Regional Medical Center in Reno, where three people were in serious condition Friday and one patient who had been listed in serious condition had been discharged, hospital spokeswoman Jamii Uboldi said.

NTSB investigations are notably thorough and usually take more than a year to reach findings of fact and recommendations. In the interim, the board makes public information that investigators have gathered before shifting to an analysis of what went wrong and why.

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### Livestock Disease Confirmed in Mont. County

**BILLINGS, Mont.** • Results of disease tests received Friday for a southern Park County cattle herd have confirmed that some of the animals were infected with brucellosis.

The tests were done on milk samples collected from six cows in the 150-head herd, Montana livestock officials said. Those animals were slaughtered Thursday after previous blood tests indicated the animals might be infected.

Brucellosis can cause pregnant animals to prematurely abort and has been largely eradicated nationwide but persists in wildlife in parts of Montana, Idaho and Wyoming around Yellowstone National Park.

The remainder of the unidentified herd has been quarantined. The infection marks the region's 15th cattle or domestic bison since

Until recently, infections brought harsh sanctions on states where the outbreaks occurred. But stricter testing and disease requirements over the past several years prompted federal agriculture officials to adopt a more lenient response to occasional infections.

The government also no longer requires that entire herds be slaughtered when infections are found in just a few animals.

The infected cattle from Park County had all been vaccinated. Because five were still pregnant, veterinarians believe the vaccine was working, said Steve Merritt with the Montana Department of Livestock.

"Normally with unvaccinated cows that had been exposed, they would have lost those calves," he said. But he added that they still could have potentially spread the disease to other cows, necessitating their removal from the herd.

Merritt said cattle on surrounding ranches also would be tested for brucellosis to ensure they were not exposed.

Although the source of the infection has not yet been determined, state officials suspect it may have come from elk.

Despite efforts to contain the disease, it has proven so far impossible to eliminate it from wildlife.

Thousands of Yellowstone bison have been captured and sent to slaughter over the past decade to pre-

vent transmissions to cattle when the bison attempt to migrate in winter to lower elevations in Montana. That has not stopped transmissions from tens of thousands of elk that roam freely across the Yellowstone region.

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## Falling Satellite Slows, Earth Strike Delayed

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. • A 6-ton NASA satellite on a collision course with Earth clung to space Friday, apparently flipping position in its everlower orbit and stalling its death plunge

The old research spacecraft was targeted to crash through the atmosphere sometime Friday night or early today, putting the U.S. back in the potential crosshairs, although most of the satellite should burn up during

"It just doesn't want to come down," said Jonathan McDowell of the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics.

McDowell said the satellite's delayed demise demonstrates how unreliable predictions can be. That said, "the best guess is that it will still splash in the ocean, just because there's more ocean out there."

Until Friday, increased solar activity was causing the atmosphere to expand and the 35-foot, bus-size satellite to free fall more quickly. But late Friday morning, NASA said the sun was no longer the major factor in the rate of descent and that the satellite's position, shape or both had changed by the time it slipped down to a 100mile orbit.

"In the last 24 hours, something has happened to the spacecraft," said NASA orbital debris scientist Mark Matney.

NASA cautioned there was now a slim chance any surviving debris would land in the United States. Earlier this week, the space agency said North America would be in the clear.

"It is still too early to predict the time and location of re-entry with any

certainty," NASA said in a statement. The Aerospace Corp., which tracks space debris, estimates the strike will happen sometime between about 11 p.m. and 3 a.m. EDT, which would make a huge difference in where the debris falls. Those late-night, early morning passes show the satellite flying over parts of the United States.

Any surviving wreckage is expected to be limited to a 500-mile swath.

The Upper Atmosphere Research Satellite, or UARS, will be the biggest NASA spacecraft to crash back to Earth, uncontrolled, since the post-Apollo 75-ton Skylab space station and the more than 10-ton Pegasus 2 satellite, both in 1979.

Russia's 135-ton Mir space station slammed through the atmosphere in 2001, but it was a controlled dive into the Pacific.

Some 26 pieces of the UARS satellite – representing 1,200 pounds of heavy metal – are expected to rain down somewhere.

# Obama Lets States Opt Out of Federal School Rules

**WASHINGTON** • Nearly everyone agrees the fix needs fixing. The No Child Left Behind law that was supposed to improve American education has left schools grumbling at being labeled "failures" state officials fuming and complaints everywhere about required testing.

But President Barack Obama's response on Friday — he's allowing states to opt out - is starting a new round of heated arguments.

There are questions about whether letting states bypass unpopular proficiency standards will help the nation's schoolchildren. And, even as states clamor to use the new waiver option, some lawmakers say Obama is inserting politics in what had been a bipartisan approach to education.

At the White House, the president said he was acting only because Congress wouldn't. He decried the state of U.S. education and called the "No Child" law — a signature legacy of President George W. Bush's presidency - an admirable but flawed effort that ended up hurting students instead of helping them.

Obama's announcement could fundamentally affect the education of tens of millions of children. It will allow states to scrap a key requirement that all children show they are proficient in reading and math by 2014 - if those

states meet conditions such as imposing their own standards to prepare students for college and careers and setting evaluation standards for teachers and principals.

Kids will still have to take yearly tests in math and reading, although the administration says the emphasis will be more on measuring growth over time.

The impact on school kids could vary greatly depending on how states choose to reward or punish individual schools. Under No Child Left Behind, children who attend schools deemed failures after a set period of time are eligible for extra tutoring and school choice. Under the president's plan, it's up to states granted waivers to decide if

### Congress Hits Budget Impasse as Deadline Nears

On Friday, the Senate blocked a bill that would have provided stopgap federal spending and provides aid for people battered by natural disasters.

**WASHINGTON** • Just a week away from a possible government shutdown, lawmakers boxed themselves into a new budget impasse Friday.

With Congress' approval ratings already at an all-time low, a tit-for-tat over disaster aid left Republicans and Democrats — and the House and Senate — in a faceoff that's all too familiar to millions of Americans. Deep partisan disputes pushed the government to the edge of a partial shutdown in April, and to the brink of a debt ceiling crisis

On Friday, the Democratic-controlled Senate blocked a Republican House bill that would provide stopgap federal spending, plus aid for people battered by hurricanes, tornadoes and other natural disasters. The legislation also calls for \$1.6 billion in spending cuts to help defray the disaster costs.

Democrats say it's unprecedented and unfair to require spending cuts to accompany badly needed emergency aid. They are especially unhappy that

the GOP measure would tap clean-energy programs credited with creating

Republicans say that with a \$14 tril-

lion-plus national debt, business-asusual spending is no longer acceptable.

With elections coming, congressional Republicans suggest voters will find it outrageous that Democrats wouldn't accept a mere \$1.6 billion in spending cuts. Democrats are betting voters will find it petty and manipulative to let tornado and hurricane victims wonder if federal aid will be denied because lawmakers want to cut aid to automakers.

The parties' feuding earlier this year prompted a rating agency to downgrade the government's credit-worthiness, which sent shock waves through financial markets. Legislation finally did make it to passage to raise the debt limit and stave off potential default.

This time, it's possible that Congress will find a last-minute way to avoid a shutdown of many federal agencies when the fiscal year ends next Friday. The Senate plans to vote Monday on a Democratic bill that would not require spending offsets to release new money for the Federal Emergency Management Agency. FEMA, drained by several severe storms, could run out by next week, officials said.

In the Senate, however, GOP leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky is confident Republicans will block the Democrats' counter-move with a filibuster. It takes 41 votes to sustain a filibuster in the 100-member Senate, and the Republicans hold 47 seats.

### Palestinians Submit U.N. Statehood Bid

**UNITED NATIONS • The Pales**tinian leader took his people's quest for independence to the heart of world diplomacy on Friday, hoping to galvanize their flagging statehood campaign by seeking U.N. recognition of Palestine and sidestepping negotiations that have foundered for nearly two decades under the weight of inflexibility, violence and failure of will.

The bid to recognize a state in the West Bank, Gaza Strip and east Jerusalem - submitted against the will of a U.S. administration that had pressured President Mahmoud Abbas to drop it laid bare the deep sense of exasperation the Palestinians feel after 44 years of Israeli occupation. International reservations about the move has had the perhaps unintended effect of reenergizing international efforts to seek a negotiated settlement.

After Abbas submitted his formal application, international mediators called on Israelis and Palestinians to return to longstalled negotiations and reach an agreement no later than next year. The "Quartet" – the U.S., European Union, U.N. and Russia urged both parties to draw up an agenda for peace talks within a month and produce comprehensive proposals on territory and se-

curity within three months. U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton said the proposal "represents the firm conviction of the international community that a just and lasting peace can only come through negotiations between the parties." But similar plans have failed to produce a peace agreement in the past, and it was how the two sides could bridge their huge differences and resume talks.

And the Quartet statement was radically different from what diplomats had been hoping to draft since it became clear that Abbas would not back down. U.S. and European officials had been trying to craft a statement that would itself outline parameters of the negotiations, including a reference to borders being based on the 1967 lines and affirm Israel's identity as a Jewish state.

Instead, the Quartet focused on proposing deadlines for steps the

two sides should take.

World sympathy for the Palestinian cause was evident from the thunderous applause that greeted Abbas as he mounted the dais in the General Assembly hall to deliver a speech that laid out his grievances against the Israeli occupation and why he felt compelled to take his appeal directly to

the United Nations. In a scathing denunciation of Israel's settlement policy, Abbas declared that negotiations with Israel "will be meaningless" as long as it continues building on lands the Palestinians claim for that state. Invoking what would be a nightmare for Israel, he went so far as to warn that his government could collapse if the con-

# Pope 'Moved' After Meeting German Victims of Sexual Abuse by Priests

**ERFURT, Germany (AP)** • Pope Benedict XVI met with German victims of sexual abuse by priests and expressed "deep compassion and regret" at the suffering of those abused by members of the clergy, the Vatican said Friday.

The pope met for half an hour with five victims on the second day of his four-day state visit to his native Germany, following an ecumenical service with members of the country's Lutheran church and an evening vesper held in a small chapel nestled deep in the for-

Germany's Catholic church has seen the numbers of faithful leaving the congregation jump, after hundreds of peo-ple came forward last year with stories of having been physically or sexually abused by members of the clergy. Church leaders had expressed hope that Benedict's visit could help heal wounds left by the scandal.

Benedict has been accused by victims groups and their lawyers of being part of systematic practice of cover-up by church hierarchy for pedophile priests, in his earlier roles as an archbishop in Germany and later at the helm of the Vatican morals office.

The Vatican said in a statement following Friday's meeting that the pope was "moved and deeply shaken" and is close to the victims. He expresses the hope that God "may heal the wounds of the victims and grant them inner peace," the Vatican said.

they will use those same remedies.

A majority of states are expected to apply for waivers, which would be given to those that qualify early next year.

State officials have long complained that if they had more flexibility, they could implement positive changes. Now, they will have to step up and prove

"This is really going to change things because it really does put responsibility squarely on the states," said Amy Wilkins, a vice president at Education Trust, a nonprofit that seeks to raise achievement standards in schools.

Officials from Kentucky, Idaho, Wisconsin and Colorado were among those expressing support for the president's plan on Friday.

"I look forward to the federal government narrowing its role in education and allowing Tennessee the flexibility to abide by its own rigorous standards," Tennessee Gov. Bill Haslam, a Republican, said at the White House event.

But Rep. John Kline, R-Minn., who chairs the House Education Committee, wrote in an editorial Friday published in The Washington Examiner that the plan "could mean less transparency, new federal regulations and greater uncertainty for students, teachers, and state and local officials."

Sen. Mike Enzi, R-Wyo., the ranking member on the Senate committee that oversees education, said the president's action "clearly politicizes education policy, which traditionally has been a bipartisan issue that attracts support from both parties."

# Republicans Gather in New Mexico Trying to Lure Hispanic Voters

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. • A conservative Republican group brought its fight for Hispanic votes to New Mexico on Friday, opening a two-day conference

in the presidential battleground state that is home to one of the parties rising Hispanic stars - Gov. Susana Martinez.

Former Sen. Norm Coleman, CEO of the Hispanic Leadership Network, called Martinez the poster child for his effort to make the GOP more inclusive for the minority group that he says shares the party's basic values of strong family, strong education and

"Hispanic Americans are centristright, they just don't always act that way in the voting booth," Coleman

More than 400 people were registered for the conference that featured a speech by Louisiana Gov. Bobby Jindal and video remarks by Nevada Gov. Brian Sandoval and former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush. Martinez was scheduled to give remarks at a Friday dinner.

Panel discussions centered on education and job creation as well as the importance of the Hispanic vote in the upcoming elections and effective advocacy.

New Mexico Democrats held a conference call Thursday to blast the Republicans as hypocrites in their effort to lure traditionally Democratic-leaning Hispanic voters, saying GOP actions on issues important to Latinos speak louder than their rhetoric.

New Mexico Democratic Party Chairman Javier Gonzales said the Republicans "do these fly-ins, dog and pony shows, then go back to policies that ... are contrary to New Mexicans."

But Coleman, along with Hispanic Leadership Network executive director Jennifer Korn and Fred Malek, founder of the American Action Network that is behind HLN, defended their efforts, saying formation of the group marked a long-term commitment that will be around long after next year's presidential elections. Its inaugural conference was held in January in Miami.

"They're just nervous because we are fighting for the Hispanic vote," Korn said of critics.

And it will be a hard fight, panelists

Republican pollster Dan Judy of the Washington, D.C.- based Ayres, McHenry Associates said his research shows the Republican Party has significant problems with Hispanic voters — the country's fastest growing minority group that now numbers about 50 million.

Judy said the GOP should focus on making progress, not trying to win states like New Mexico outright. In the previous election, for example, presidential candidate and Republican Arizona Sen. John McCain took only 30 percent of the state's Hispanic vote, he said.

"We don't need to get to 50 percent plus one," Judy said. "We just need to get in the game."

In video remarks, Bush pointed to Martinez and Sandoval as examples of how the party can reach beyond traditional party-line rhetoric to connect

with Hispanic voters.

"Hispanics are looking for leadership and solutions," he said.

To gain Hispanic support, Bush said the party must make the community feel welcome and include it in discussions as party leaders work to build policy.

Hispanic Republicans came from around the Southwest to participate in the conference.

Jerry Natividad, president and CEO of American Facility Services Group in Lakewood, Co., said he came to Albuquerque to "network with like-minded Hispanics, discuss issues, share thoughts and most important, become very, very focused as a community on the upcoming presidential election."

Greg Vera, an El Paso resident who is retired from the military and federal bureau of prisons, said he wants to make sure the party focuses on military benefits. Albuquerque educator Amy Sanchez said she wanted to get involved because "the whole education system has degraded really fast ... and that is scary to me?"

#### **Statehood**

"This policy is responsible for the continued failure of the successive international attempts to salvage the process," said Abbas, who has refused to negotiate until the construction stops. "This settlement policy threatens to also undermine structure of the Palestinian National Authority and even end its existence."

The speech papered over any Palestinian culpability for the negotiations stalemate, deadly violence against Israel, the internal rift that has produced dueling governments in the West Bank and Gaza, and ignored Jewish links to the Holy Land. Some members of the Israeli delegation, including Foreign Minister Avigdor Lieberman, walked out of the hall as Abbas approached the podium.

Abbas declared himself willing to immediately return to the bargaining table, but with longstanding conditions attached: Israel must first stop building on lands the Plaesitnians claim for their future state and agree to negotiate borders based on lines it held before capturing the West Bank, Gaza and east Jerusalem in 1967. Israel rejects those conditions and has defied international pressure to freeze settlement construction. And it has staked out bargaining positions that are extremely distant from anything the Palestinians would accept. Israeli Prime Minister

Benjamin Netanyahu, addressing the General Assembly shortly after Abbas, said his country was "willing to make painful compromises" in its quest for peace.

### **Budget**

If the GOP succeeds, the Senate could accept the House Republican bill it rejected on Friday. Or legislative leaders could try to negotiate their way past the logjam. Congress was not scheduled to be in session next week, and House leaders said they don't plan to call their members back to Washington.

The governors of four hurricane-damaged East Coast states – including the Republican governors of New Jersey and Pennsylvania - said in a statement that "federal assistance for the victims of storms and floods should be beyond politics?

If the disaster relief agency runs out of money, the most immediate hardships could be felt by storm victims who need assistance checks to continue stays in motels and other temporary housing. Disaster victims could also face delayed aid for crucial repairs of house and structural damage, said FEMA spokeswoman Rachel

She said the disaster relief fund contained no more

than \$175 million, which is already committed to aiding victims of Hurricanes Irene and Lee and the heavy flooding across the Eastern seaboard.

Lawmakers are quarreling over deeply held principles but a minuscule amount of money in an annual discretionary budget of more than \$1.3 trillion. Early Friday, the House

voted 219-203, mostly along party lines, for a spending bill to keep the government operating through Nov. 18. It provided \$3.7 billion in new disaster assistance, partly offset with cuts in two loan programs that finance technological development.

House Democrats balked because the cuts included \$1.5 billion for an Energy Department program that subsidizes low-interest loans to help car companies and parts manufacturers retool factories to meet new fuel economy standards. Democrats said it would cost up to 10,000 jobs.

The Senate rejected the House bill, 59-36.

The Democratic-crafted bill scheduled for a Senate vote on Monday is nearly identical to that House bill, with the major exception that it doesn't require spending cuts to offset the FEMA aid.

Democrats said Republicans are cynical in their newfound insistence on offsetting new programs with spending cuts elsewhere. They noted that less than a decade ago, a Republican-controlled White House and Congress enacted two big tax cuts, new wars in Afghanistan and Iraq, and a prescription drug benefit for Medicare without paying for them.

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., said he would not "capitulate to the job-destroying bill" from the House.

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



#### Europe: Battling a Debt Crisis and Keeping a Watchful Eye on Greece

European policymakers have failed to convince financial markets that they can resolve a massive debt crisis. Investors fear that Greece and other countries will be unable to pay their debts and default, forcing banks to absorb big losses on government bonds.

Greece, Ireland and Portugal have already required bailouts from the European Union and the IMF. Italy and Spain, which are much bigger economies, might need them, too.

A \$149 billion bailout has kept Greece afloat for the past year. It's due for another \$148 billion rescue negotiated over the summer. But creditors are balking at delivering the second package. They say Greece has fallen behind on commitments to cut government deficits and make its economy more competitive.

European officials are speaking openly of the possibility of a Greek default. The fears have spooked international markets. A default by Greece or any of the other troubled European countries would send shock waves through the banking system and the global economy.

Investors are terrified they'll endure a repeat of the panic that struck Wall Street in 2008. Then, banks stopped lending to each other because they were worried about each other's solvency.

Losses on European government bonds could start a similar crisis. If global credit markets were to freeze the way they did three years ago, that would slow economies on both sides of the Atlantic.

European governments have opted for austerity measures, cutting spending and raising taxes instead of taking steps to jump-start sputtering economic growth.

Recent reports suggest the European economy is already decelerating. The IMF just shaved its forecast for European growth this year to 1.6 percent from 2 percent, and for next year to 1.1 percent from 1.7 percent. One closely watched index of industrial activity just signaled an outright contraction.

Pressure is growing on the European Central Bank to reverse course and start cutting interest rates. Just two months ago, the central bank was worried about inflation and was raising rates.

#### The United States: Fed Acts, but What Now?

U.S. markets sank this week even though the Federal Reserve offered a bigger dose of economic stimulus than investors had expected: The Fed plans to reshuffle \$400 billion of its investments in hopes of pushing down interest rates on mortgages and other longterm loans.

Lower rates are supposed to coax consumers and businesses into borrowing and spending. The Fed also plans to invest proceeds from maturing U.S. Treasury debt into mortgage bonds in an effort to support the housing mar-

But economists say the Fed's effort dubbed Operation Twist after a similar Fed program conducted during the Chubby Checker dance craze of the early 1960s - probably won't make much difference.

Rates on mortgages and other loans are already the lowest in decades. Frightened Americans would rather cut their debts than borrow, and businesses aren't seeing enough sales to justify hiring and expanding despite rock-bottom borrowing costs.

The Fed's announcement underscored the fear that the American central bank had run out of tools to stimulate the economy.

That leaves fiscal policy – government spending programs and tax cuts as the only other way to juice growth. But political bickering is preventing Washington from doing much of any-


Fans of "Saturday Night Live" will recognize the phrase "Schweddy Balls" from a late '90s skit starring Alec Baldwin, Ana Gasteyer and Molly Shannon that parodied a monotonous public radio show out of the Midwest. The skit is

rife with unsubtle double entendre and innuendo.

Baldwin played Pete Schweddy, the owner of a holiday bakery called Season's Eatings, who spent a lot of time discussing his Schweddy balls – popcorn balls, cheese balls, rum balls — with the hosts. He ends the bit with "No one can resist my 'Schweddy Balls!"

Not funny, say the women at One Million Moms, a group affiliated with the American Family Association.

Under the "issues" section of its website, the group is urging its supporters to email Ben & Jerry's public relations manager with a letter requesting that no additional Schweddy Balls ice cream be distributed and to threaten to stop buying Ben & Jerry's products if the company does not refrain from choosing risque names for its flavors.

the economy. They are resisting President Barack Obama's \$447 billion plan to generate jobs with payroll-tax cuts and more spending for roads, bridges, schools and other infrastructure projects.

Economist Eswar Prasad of Cornell University says the U.S. government should tolerate higher deficits now to spur economic growth –

as long as it delivers a credible plan to bring its budget under control in the future.

"We are seeing the exact opposite," he says. The government is cutting spending now, but has yet to deliver a realistic plan to curb mediumand long-term deficits.

#### China: Hint of a Slowdown Rattles **Investors**

The powerful Chinese econ-

omy is supposed to account for a third of global growth this year. Increasingly, other countries depend on China's insatiable demand for raw materials and machinery to give their own economies a lift. The mining towns of western Australia, for instance, are booming as they fill orders from China for iron, zinc and coal.

So any signs the Chinese economy might be slowing are sure to frazzle investors. And a report this week

showing that Chinese manufacturing is contracting sent financial markets into a tailspin.

Perhaps it shouldn't have been a surprise: China's central bank has been raising interest rates to slow growth and bring inflation under control.

Analysts say investors overreacted to one limited report. The world's secondbiggest economy may be slowing, they say, but it still boasts enviable rates of growth. The IMF this week lopped just a tenth of a percentage point off its estimate for Chinese economic growth this year, bringing it to a still-sizzling 9.5 percent. Its estimate for the

U.S. is just 1.5 percent. Yet despite China's rising power, experts say its economy is still not big or strong enough to compensate for meltdowns elsewhere: Chinese investment and spending is only one-sixth that of the European Union and United States.

"From a global perspective, China's domestic demand is still way too small to offset the impact of a recession" in Europe and the U.S., Deutsche Bank economist Ma Jun said in a report.



— George Farquhar Rules are made to be broken, they say, and at both tables, when Norway took on Finland in the Junior European Championships. someone missed a chance to

break a textbook rule. Both Souths ended up in three no-trump on the lead of the spade eight. In a fairly desperate situation, they started well enough by winning dummy's spade queen and guessing to play a heart to their king. Then the plays di-

The Norwegian declarer turned his attention to diamonds, dislodging West's entry. He could now duck a spade and kill the suit. West shifted rather desperately to clubs, but declarer finished up with 11 tricks when he subsequently brought the hearts in as

The Finnish declarer sneaked the diamond 10 through at trick three and then went back to hearts. He guessed that suit correctly for nine tricks.

Both declarers must have thought they had done well — and indeed they had. But both Easts  $\,$ had mechanically followed the rules without giving the matter proper thought — second hand low is all very well, up to a point. If either defender had risen with the heart ace at trick two to play a spade through, the contract would have had no play. And why duck the first heart, since your heart nine means that declarer cannot misguess the suit?

Rising with the ace would also have been right had West's honor trick been the heart king, of course, since it would again have preserved his entry.

Today's Highlight: On Sept. 24, 1789, Congress passed a Judiciary Act which provided for an Attorney General and a Supreme Court.

### TODAY IN **HISTORY**

On this date:

In 1869, thousands of businessmen were ruined in a Wall Street panic known as "Black Friday" after financiers Jay Gould and James Fisk attempted to corner the gold market.

In 1911. future Soviet leader Konstantin U. Chernenko was born in Siberia.

In 1929, Lt. James H. Doolittle guided Consolidated NY-2 Biplane over Mitchel Field in New York in the first all-instrument flight.

In 1948, Mildred Gillars, accused of being Nazi wartime radio propagandist "Axis Sally," pleaded not guilty in Washington, D.C., to charges of treason. (Gillars, later convicted, ended up serving 12 years in prison.)

In 1955, President Dwight D. Eisenhower suffered a heart attack while on vacation in Denver.

In 1961, "Walt Disney's Wonderful World of Color" premiered on NBC (it succeeded Disney's anthology series on ABC).

In 1963, the U.S. Senate ratified a treaty with Britain and the Soviet Union limiting nuclear testing.

In 1976, former hostage Patricia Hearst was sentenced to seven years in prison for her part in a 1974 bank robbery in San Francisco carried out by the Symbionese Liberation Army. (Hearst was released after 22 months after receiving clemency from President Jimmy Carter.)

In 1981, four Armenian gunmen seized the Turkish consulate in Paris, killing a guard and holding 56 hostages for 15 hours before surrendering.

In 1991, kidnappers in Lebanon freed British hostage Jack Mann after holding him captive for more than two years. Children's author Theodor Seuss Geisel, better known as "Dr. Seuss," died in La Jolla, California, at age 87.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush ordered a freeze on the assets of 27 people and organizations with suspected links to terrorism, including Islamic militant Osama bin Laden, and urged other nations to do likewise.

Five years ago: In a combative taped interview on "Fox News Sunday," former President Bill Clinton defended his handling of the threat posed by Osama bin Laden, and accused host Chris Wallace of a "conservative hit job." Democrats seized on an intelligence assessment that said the Iraq war had increased the terrorist threat, saying it evidence further Americans should choose new leadership in upcoming elections. The Europeans turned the Ryder Cup into another rout, winning 181/2-91/2 to make history as the first European team to win three straight times.

One year ago: President Barack Obama and Southeast Asian leaders meeting in New York sent China a firm message over territorial disputes between Beijing and its neighbors, calling for freedom of navigation in seas that China claimed as its own. Facebook founder Mark Zuckerberg pledged \$100 million to Newark, N.J., schools a week before the release of the biographical "The movie Social Network." Gennady Yanayev, 73, a leader of the abortive 1991 coup who had briefly declared himself Soviet president, died in Moscow.



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

**BOISE** • Three games into his head coaching career and Tulsa's Bill Blankenship could already write a thesis on adversity.

It has nothing to do with the brutal schedule to begin his first season as the Golden Hurricanes' head coach, a stretch that ends after tonight's game at No. 4 Boise

It started with the suspension of Tulsa's best player, Damaris Johnson, after he was charged with felony embezzlement, followed by a litany of key injuries, the latest to starting quarterback

G.J. Kinne. Oh, and then there was last week's home-opening loss to No. 7 Oklahoma State a game that was delayed more than three hours by weather and didn't end until 3:35 a.m. local time on Sunday morning.

"That sounded awful. To have that kind of delay, that would be tough to go out there and play that late," Boise State receiver Tyler Shoemaker said. "Hopefully we won't have any issues like that here and just get a normal game going."

Normal is about the last

thing Tulsa (1-2) has experienced so far. They are just one of two teams in the country - along with Arizona - that have to play three AP Top 10 teams in the first four games.

It started with the season opener at Oklahoma, then last week's wackiness against Oklahoma State and concludes with serving as the Broncos' home opener.

Asked this week if it's been difficult staying positive through the early adversity, Blankenship snapped back that there isn't another

"What's the alternative?" he said. "Do you want to look in the past? We believe in it enough to put it in our team room – no excuses, no explanations, high expectations, perfect execution. We accomplish those things, we are going to be a great program."

### NBA POSTPONES CAMPS, CANCELS 43 PRESEASON GAMES

**NEW YORK** • The lockout has started doing real damage to the NBA's calendar.

Players won't report at the usual time. The preseason won't start as sched-

And more cancellations could be necessary without a new labor deal soon.

Out of time to keep everything intact, the NBA postponed training camps indefinitely and canceled 43 preseason games Friday because it has not reached an agreement with players.

All games from Oct. 9-15 are off, the league said. Camps were expected to

open Oct. 3. "We have regretfully reached the point on the calendar where we are not able to open training camps on time and need to cancel the first week of preseason games," Deputy Commissioner Adam Silver said in a statement. "We will make further decisions

as warranted."

The players' association did not comment.

NBA.com's schedule page, which has a banner across the top listing the number of games on each day, was changed Friday morning to read "O Games" for each date until Oct. 16,

when there are four games.

Those could be in jeopardy, too, without an agreement by the end of this month or very early October. The league scrapped the remainder of its preseason schedule on Oct. 6 in 1998, when the regular season was reduced to 50 games.

That remains the only time the NBA has lost

games to a work stoppage. The cancellations were inevitable after Thursday's meeting between owners and players ended without a collective bargaining agreement. Both sides still hope the entire regular season, scheduled to begin Nov. 1, can be saved.

one year of probation. "He was at the wrong place, doing the wrong thing and he knew better," said CSI Athletic Director Joel Bate.

"At that point, we have athletic department rules and we had to abide by it for the sake of our school and what we promote."

This is the second **Brooks** brush with the law Brooks has faced in

his one year with the CSI program. He was suspended by the school March 23 for a misdemeanor marijuana-related charge, to which he later pleaded guilty.

Brooks was reinstated to the team in August and was expected to play a prominent role in the Golden Eagles' NJ-CAA title defense this season following a summer during which he completed 20 hours



and enrolled in summer classes.

has. Nobody is above those responsibilities."

Brooks said it's been a humbling experience. "It's a learning experience

for sure. You've got to learn from mistakes like this," Brooks said. "It makes you think a lot more."

Brooks leaves today for Casper (Wyo.) College, where he will play for the Thunderbirds, who along with CSI recruited Brooks out of East

High School in Rochester, N.Y. "It's another chance for me

to play basketball and go to school," said Brooks. "A chance to start over."

In his one year at CSI, the 5-foot-11 guard averaged 15.4 points per game, helping the Golden Eagles to a 33-4 season, capped off with a national championship in March.

"We're obviously going to miss him on the basketball court and the next guy will have to step up," said CSI head men's basketball coach Steve Gosar. "He was a good teammate and a solid contributor both on and off the court.... Kids, sometimes they make mistakes and unfortunately for Jerrold he made a costly one. He isn't a bad kid. He's someone we care about and has come a long way since he's been here, but not as far as we would have hoped?

And if Idaho dispatches the Bulldogs for the first time in nine tries, the Dome will really pulsate. Kickoff is 3 p.m. and will be broadcast on 1310 AM and on KTVB/Ch. 13 in Twin Falls.

But instead of dwelling on what a win over Fresno State might mean for this season, the Vandals are all about making up for what happened late last November.

"We're still red-hot after that loss," senior defensive end Andre Ferguson said of the 23-20 defeat to the Bulldogs. "It was a deciding factor not only for a win but a possible bowl game."

Idaho, 5-6 at the time, needed a victory over FSU to stay in contention for a postseason bid. It regrouped after falling behind 13-0 and took an unlikely lead with 2 minutes left. But Fresno State drove 60 yards for the decisive touchdown - a 1-yard run from A.J. Ellis with 14 seconds remaining.

The final moments still gnaw at UI coach Robb Akey, who has mentioned the loss repeatedly to point out how close the Vandals came to back-to-back bowl bids for the first time in program his-

"I like playing the Fresno game," he said. "It's a physical game. It's a get-after-it game. And I think there's a little something extra on the table when you look at what it cost us last year."

Idaho and Fresno State, both 1-2, have each lost to top-10 opponents - UI to Texas A&M last week and FSU to Nebraska on Sept. 10. And both teams' only wins have come against North Dakota at home.

The Bulldogs have been hard to figure through the first three games. They were a failed two-point conversion from tying the Cornhuskers in the third quarter, yet they also trailed North Dakota, an FCS team, last week in the fourth quarter.

Coach Pat Hill said the problem has been big plays -Fresno gave up a 100-yard kickoff return and 46-yard TD run to Nebraska in the second half.

"I thought we played very, very well in 80 percent of the snaps," Hill said of games at NU and Cal. "We've given up some big plays."

FSU has dealt with an onslaught of injuries to its secondary. The team's top three safeties are either out for the year or dealing with health issues. Defensive back Charles Washington, a true freshman, might see time against Idaho, Hill said.

The Vandals could use a pick-me-up on offense against a Fresno team that ranks 100th in the nation in points allowed. UI has been outscored 71-17 in the first half this year and is averaging 2.5 yards per carry on the ground behind an offensive line that's inexperienced and beat up in the interior.






