state of American education, Obama said states will get unprecedented freedom to waive basic elements of the sweeping Bush-era No Child Left Behind law, calling it an admirable but flawed effort that has hurt students instead of helped them. Idaho was among a handful of
states that vowed states that vowed earlier this year to
ignore the latest No Child Left Behind requirements, saying they set unrealistic benchmarks.
Under the plan Obama outlined, states can ask the Education Department to be exempted from some of the law's requirements if they meet certain conditions, such as imposing

The Idaho Department of En vironmental Quality has filed a complaint against a Twin Falls dairy operator for failin ingpolicies.
The DEQ received its first complaint against Mike Vierstra, 53 , in June 2010. Vierstra is the operator of al,200-cow dairy southwest of Twin Falls. According to court docu-
ments, Vierstra burnt seven field acres without notifying the $D E Q$, receiving apermit or approval. After receiving the complaint, DEQ officials sent multiple violation notices to Vierstra but he did not re-
spond. spond.
Ahearing has not yet been scheduled.
Vierstra was recently sen$\$ 12,000$ fine for violating th Clean Air Act. In 2009, Idaho State Department of Agricul tureinspectors tracked wastepipe on Vierstra's property, A hearing has not yet been scheduled.
During his trial on the Clean Air Act violation, Vierstra argued that an unidentified third party uncapped the pipe that was Leakingintoth Low Line Canal. After his sen-
tencing, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Special Agent Tyler Arnon said Vierstra "failed time and again to comply with the law?'

## Idaho Inmate Challenges Execution

BY REBECCA BOONE
BOISE - Idaho death row inmate Paul Ezra Rhoades has filed a lawsuit in method of execution.
Rhoades, who was convicted of three murders in Idaho Falls and Blackfoot in 1988, says lethal injections are frequently botched. He also argues Idaho's protocol for adminis-
tering lethal injections doesn't require tering lethal injections doesn't require
enough training or experience for the execution team, and that other problems with the system would render his execution unconstitutional.
Rhoades is one of a handful of Idaho death-row inmates whose cases may be nearing an end. The state Department of Correction, in anticipation of
at least one execution occurring withat least one execution occurring with-
in the next year, has been taking several steps to prepare - including updating its execution protocol and building a new execution chamber. The previous chamber, which has been only used once in the past five
decades, was contained insideatrailer decades, was containedinside a trailer. Department spokesman Jeff Ray
said the execution protocol is still being drafted, but it's designed to fully comply with all U.S. Supreme Court rulings.
Rhoades was given two death sentences for raping and murdering 34-year-old Idaho Falls teacher Susan
Michelbacher, whose bullet-ridden body was found in March 1987. He also was given two death sentences for the first-degree murder and kidnap-

But Rhoades' challenge to Idaho' lethal injection method - contained in more than 200 pages of documents
filed late this week - means a judge in Boise's U.S. District Court can put everything on hold to allow time fo the court to consider the method
"This is the first time since 1957 we've had an execution that wasn't volunteer. From my perspective, we're in uncharted ground,' he said. But even if Idaho's methodology is initially found unconstitutional, it will be modified to meet court standards, Anderson said.
"The bottom line is that Idaho is not going to allow the prevention of protocol," he said. "We'll fix the protocol if there's any deficiency found!' Rhoades' attorney, Oliver Loewy with the Federal Defenders of Idaho, wasn't immediately available to com ment on the case.
Because ICaho Department of Correction officials say the protocol is still it's not clear how closely the version included in Rhoades' lawsuit matches the one being adjusted by the department.
The draft protocol mentioned in the lawsuit was obtained through a pub-
lic records request from March 2011. It calls for the use of three chemicals: sodium thiopental (an anesthetic), pancuronium bromide (a drug to paralyze muscles) and potassium chloride (a drug to stop the heart).

## Congress Hits Budget Impasse as Deadline Nears

visit to his native Germany, following an ecumenical service with members of the country's Lutheran church and an evening vesper held in a small chapel nestled deep in the former East Germany.
Germany's Catholic church has seen the numbers of faithful leaving the congregation jump, after hundreds of peo-ple came forward last year with stories of having been physically or sexually abused by members of the clergy. Church leaders had expressed hope that Benedict's visit could help heal wounds left by the scandal.
