# **T.F. Council Increases Fees** for Water, Sewer and Trash

The Twin Falls City Council approved a package of increases to water, sewer and sanitation rates Monday that will cost each household an average of \$4.42 more per month.

That's a 6.67 percent increase to the average monthly bill of \$65.62 for those city services combined. The council spent more than two hours talking with city staff, hearing from residents who raised objections and debating the issues.

"Do I eat or do I pay my water bill?" said Pete Johnston, one of sev-

eral seniors who raised concerns about footing the increases on a fixed income. "It makes it a little rough."

In the end, the council went with the recommendations of staff, with the exception of the garbage collection increase. The council voted 5-2 to increase water and sewer rates, with Councilmen Trip Craig and Will Kezele opposed.

Acting on a motion from Councilman Lance Clow, the council pared down a proposed \$3 monthly increase for garbage collection to \$1.37. Clow said that city reserves could offset the other costs from recycling for the upcoming year. That motion passed 6-1, with Councilman David Johnson opposed.



Water costs will increase by 5 percent, or 47 cents more for the base rate and an additional \$1.18 for each 1,000 gallons used above 2,000 allons per month. City officials say declining water revenues created a \$400,000 shortfall.





Costs will increase by \$1.37 per month, to \$16.34 per household. The increase will help offset city costs for its new recycling program, which it's currently subsidizing. City staff recommended a \$3 increase.

# Panel **Agrees on** Political Map...17 **Days Late**

Secretary of State Ben Ysursa says the disbanded redistricting commission's plan carries no extra weight as its replacement prepares to tackle the work the first panel left unfinished.

When the new commission tasked with redrawing Idaho's legislative and congressional boundaries goes to work Wednesday, its members will have 83 plans to consider.

Among those plans will be the one that took the state's original redistrict ing commission 107 days to agree upon. The only problem: That commission had only 90 days to complete its work.

Members of that now-defunct redistricting commission announced Friday that they'd agreed to a plan, but its fate is uncertain, since its approval came 17 days after the commission adjourned and disbanded Sept. 6. This week, the new commission will try to succeed where its predecessor failed by drawing up a new district plan that reflects changes in Idaho's population Please see **REDISTRICTING**, A2

# **Xavier Board** Says New Principal **Should Be** Fired

T.F. School will form an independent panel to determine Bomgardner's fate, much like it did with fired Principal Fulcher earlier this year.

Xavier Charter School's board is suggesting the Twin Falls school's principal be fired only months after he started.

After holding a closed session during its Thursday

meeting, the board voted to recommend the termination of Principal Everett Bomgardner because of "multiple violations of policies and procedures."

The board also voted to extend his leave through Oct. 21. In an e-mail sent to parents, the board indicated hope that the "matter would be resolved by this date."

Bomgardner was placed on paid administrative leave - originally scheduled to end Friday - earlier this month.



The man accused of taking an exgirlfriend hostage Sunday morning in Twin Falls made his first court appearance Monday, when a judge set bond and a future court date on five felony charges.

Edward Hanes, 35, is charged with aggravated assault, second-degree kidnapping, burglary and two counts of grand theft. Twin Falls County 5th District

Secretary of State Ben Ysursa, who received all submitted redistricting plans Monday from the former commission, told the Times-News that, because the former commission no longer has any legal authority, its agreed-upon plan carries no more weight than any other submitted by the public.

"It's up to the new com-mission," he said. "They're the ones that will decide if they like the plans or if they don't."

If the new redistricting panel supports the latest plan, it could mean substantial changes for the Magic Valley's legislative clout.

Western Twin Falls County and Elmore County would be combined into one district, while a more urban district would include much of the city of Twin Falls, except its northeastern portion. That part of the city would be combined with Jerome County and a sliver of western Minidoka County.

Another district would include all of Cassia County, part of Power County, and 81.8 percent of Minidoka County's population.

Currently, Twin Falls and Jerome counties are in separate legislative districts. So are Minidoka and Cassia counties.

# **Cassia Probation to Start Own Testing Lab**

**Cassia County** gears up for testing probationers with own urinalysis lab.

BURLEY • Cassia County adult probation may be the first in the district to open its own urinalysis testing lab.

The lab is expected to cut testing costs in the office by \$36,000.

Cassia County Adult Probation Office Director Amber Prewitt told county commissioners Monday that the lab will allow the department to get test results more rapidly and increase department revenues.

"Our goal is to do more testing for the district," Prewitt said.

Prewitt said the department budgeted \$89,000 in FY2012 for testing, up \$25,000 from this year. The department expects to save \$36,000 by performing its own testing.

Prewitt said the department is also struggling to keep up with costs related to the demand for GPS units used to track probationers and SCRAM bracelets, which monitor the wearer's alcohol use. Prewitt said many judges mission project through the county looks promising.

# TWIN FALLS RAPE TRIAL DELAYED

The suspect in a Twin Falls rape case won't stand trial for a while longer.

Jason Ward, 35, was slated to appear before a Twin Falls County jury this week, as he stands accused of raping a 19-year-old woman in May. His trial was vacated as the attorney of a witness, Colby Redgrave, said he will not allow his client to testify until Redgrave's own legal matter is resolved.

Redgrave, 21, of Twin Falls, is facing his own felony trial this fall, as he is charged with witness intimidation. Prosecutors say he threatened the alleged rape victim by sending text messages to the woman and her family.

Ward's attorney, Doug Nelson, filed an affidavit with the court, explaining that Redgrave will not testify in Ward's trial before his own trial, slated for November, happens.

Nelson asked that Ward's trial be continued. Twin Falls County 5th District Judge G. Richard Bevan approved the request.

Ward remains in custody at Twin Falls County Jail, and a new trial date has yet to be scheduled.

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**USGS Scientists Defend Free Image** Access, Fight for More Funding

In an unstable economy, distributing expensive products for free can appear reckless.

For the past three years, the U.S. Geological Survey has allowed the public to access thousands of satellite images without charge.

In Idaho, agencies use the images to determine water consumption activity. Now that access is being questioned as the USGS requests more money from Congress for future satellite projects.

"Countless colleges and government entities are exploring new ways to use these images," said Rick Allen, University of Idaho water resources engineer at the school's Kimberly Research and Extension Center.

"They wouldn't have done it if it wasn't for free." USGS partners with NASA

in operating two Landsat

satellites that measure climate changes and water evaporation from irrigated agriculture. Both satellites are more than a decade old and have exceeded their design expiration date. Landsat 8 is scheduled to launch in late 2012, but Allen says, ideally, the USGS would want three to four satellites in orbit.

Idaho was one of the first states to use Landsat satellite imagery in 1972. Since then, Idaho Water Resources has used the satellite data to develop irrigated land maps and to monitor water in the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer. According to IDWR, 90 percent of consumptive water in Idaho is irrigated agriculture.

The USGS needs \$48 million now to begin developing Landsat 9, but, earlier this summer, a House bill proposed eliminating funding for the future satellite. The bill was never debated on the House floor but the doubt towards the program's significance remains in Congress, Allen said.

"In the current budgetary climate in Washington, every item needs to be fully justified," Allen said. "We have to justify the expenditure for that satellite. The satellite user community is having to make the case that we can't get the same images with Landsat 9 from any other satellite."

Allen is working with Landsat satellite teams in gathering information on different applications of the satellites' images. He warns that not funding Landsat projects could have serious consequences.

Everybody knows that we should rake leaves in fall, but many don't know "http://landscaping.about.com/od/ landscapecolor/f/why\_rake\_leaves.htm" why we rake leaves. #### Man Gets Deferred Sentence in Billings Shooting

BILLINGS, Mont. • The husband of a woman who was shot in the eye during a gunfight outside a Billings storage facility has been sentenced for returning fire.

District Judge G. Todd Baugh gave 28-year-old Steven Jay Schmaing a three-year deferred sentence Monday. Schmaing, who pleaded guilty in June to felony criminal endangerment, has said he was acting in self-defense when he fired several times at a pickup truck after his wife was hit with gunfire Dec. 20.

No one in the truck was hurt, but Schmaing acknowledged his actions could have injured bystanders.

Prosecutors say Crystal Lundberg fired a pistol into Schmaing's car from a nearby pickup truck, hitting 25-year-old Lindsey Marie Schmaing in the eye. The Billings Gazette reports Lundberg is awaiting trial on a charge of attempted murder.

#### Hundreds of 911 Calls Lead Police Houseto-house

SALT LAKE CITY . Emergency dispatchers say police officers had to go door-to-door to track down a mentally disabled woman who made 200 calls to 911 over a 10-day stretch.

Officials from the Valley Emergency Communications Center say the calls came from a disconnected cell phone in West Valley City that dispatchers could not call back.

Authorities created a grid in a neighborhood last week and walked from house to house to find the person who was making the calls. Police say the calls were made by a mentally disabled woman who had a cell phone that was disconnected but still had a battery charge.

# Kill Order May Doom Ore. Wolf Pack

The decision to kill two more wolves for preying on livestock could mean the end of the first Oregon wolf pack to successfully breed since efforts began to restore the predators.

State wolf coordinator Russ Morgan said Monday that despite this setback, restoration of wolves is moving forward, with individuals striking out for new territories, and the newly formed Walla Walla pack in Umatilla County breeding its first two pups.

"Recovery has a number of barometers," Morgan said from his office in LaGrande, Ore. "If we look at dispersal in the overall area in Oregon, it's clearly expanding.

"The lethal control actions we are involved with now may have the effect of slowing recovery. But it is also tied to recovery. One of the premises of the Oregon wolf plan is that by directly dealing with depredation issues, that helps create a bit of tolerance. I suppose that remains to be seen?

The Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife announced last week that it will kill two of the four remaining members of the Imnaha pack, which has been responsible for 14 confirmed livestock kills over the last two years.

A department hunter is looking first for a member of the pack not collared with a radio transmitter, Morgan said. Then he will go after the alpha male, which goes by the number OR4 and sired the first pups in Oregon since wolves began moving back into the state from Idaho in the 1990s.

Two other members of the pack, the only one of three packs in Oregon that has

been tied to livestock attacks, were shot earlier this year. A third kill order was not carried out, and two members of the pack have left Oregon, one going to Idaho and the other to Washington.

Morgan said the loss of the alpha male and leaving just two survivors of the pack could mean its demise, but he said that prospect had nothing to do with the decision to kill two members.

Enterprise rancher Todd Nash owned the calf whose death earlier this month led to the kill order. It was part of a herd of 150 grazing on private

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land east of Joseph in an area known as The Divide. He was not using nonlethal controls such as flagging and electric fencing but did have a range rider checking the cattle.

Nash was visiting a new grandchild in California when he got the call from the department that they had GPS tracking information on the Imnaha pack that led them to believe they might have gone after his cattle. A friend found the remains of the 550-pound calf.

Nash said losses to wolves are not threatening to put him out of business, but they

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are having an impact. And the compensation program approved by the Legislature this year does not fully cover



Steve Pedery of Oregon Wild blamed the kill order on the fact that Nash has been an outspoken opponent of restoring wolves - an assertion that Morgan denied.

Pedery added that the state needs to do more to prevent livestock attacks without resorting to killing wolves.

"ODFW has been under really intense pressure from the cattlemen," Pedery said from Portland, Ore. "This is really a kill order on the pack. 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#### Idaho Meth **Dealers Sent to Federal Prison**

BOISE • Idaho's persistent methamphetamine scene will be four dealers scarcer for years to come after four men were sent to federal prison for long sentences.

In separate sentencing hearings Monday, the men received punishment for helping keep afloat sales of the illicit stimulant that breaks up families, hurts countless children and ruins lives, often in rural communities.

Israel Jacob Salinas of Nampa will spend 75 months behind bars.

Don Ellingford of Shelley was sentenced today to 124 months, winning the long sentence as a result of at least six previous felony convictions.

Martin Noriega of Mexico will spend 151 months behind federal bars. And Rick

Elliot of Rexburg got 57 months.

### Judge Issues Temp Order in Idaho Abortion Lawsuit

**BOISE** • A federal judge has issued a temporary restraining order to keep a prosecutor from refiling charges against a woman accused of having an illegal abortion.

Jennie Linn McCormack sued over Idaho's so-called "fetal pain" law banning abortions after 20 weeks and over a law that effectively prohibits women in her region from getting a medication-induced abortion.

She filed the lawsuit in federal court after Bannock County Prosecutor Mark Heideman charged her with a felony, saying she obtained an abortion drug over the internet and administered it to herself. Those charges were

later dropped without prejudice, allowing the prosecutor to refile the charge if he chose.

On Friday, U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill issued a 14-day restraining order barring the prosecutor from refiling charges as Mc-Cormack's federal lawsuit moves forward.

#### Rathdrum Officer Killed in **Motorcycle Crash**

CUSICK, Wash. • A police officer from Rathdrum was killed in a motorcycle crash near Cusick on Highway 20.

The Washington State Patrol says 27-year-old Jonathan Franco was riding his motorcycle Saturday when it rear-ended a car that has slowed for an injured deer in the roadway.

KREM reports Franco has been a Rathdrum officer for nearly five years. He is survived by his parents and two sisters.

#### Canyon County Preservationists Try to Save Records

**NAMPA** • A preservation group is trying to consolidate and save Canyon County records that date back to the mid-19th century.

The Idaho Press-Tribune reports that records are in six different locations and in varying condition. To prevent their degradation, the Historic Records Retention Committee is storing the documents at the county courthouse.

# **Activists Say** They Set Fire at Idaho Fur Seller

BOISE • Animal rights activists said they pumped fuel into an Idaho fur and fireworks retailer before setting the place ablaze early Monday, and federal agents said they were taking the claim seriously.

Vlasak, Jerry а spokesman for the North American Animal Liberation Press Office in Los Angeles, said he received a message from activists shortly after the fire began at the Rocky Mountain Fireworks & Fur Co., on Monday morning.

"A hole was drilled into their storage space, and several gallons of fuel were pumped through, as well as multiple other charges being set beneath an adjoining structure," Vlasak said, citing the message. "Ignition devices were set to finish up our work, once we were safely on our way?'

In addition to fireworks, the business in Caldwell, outside Boise, buys coyote and bobcat pelts and sells trapping supplies, including equipment that helps drown beavers. It also sells knives, predator calls and scents to help lure bobcats.

The fire was reported at about 5 a.m. Idaho Highway 30 and a U.S. Interstate 84 exit were closed down. There were no injuries.

The activists said they belonged to a group called "The Arson Unit" and could have ties to the Animal Liberation Front, Vlasak said. They warned that the store must close its doors permanently.

"Stay in business, and we'll be back," their message said.

Radical activist groups including the Earth Liberation Front and the Animal Liberation Front have been blamed for a string of 17 arsons across the West dating back more than a decade, including at ski resorts in Colorado and university laboratories in Washington state. Fourteen people have been convicted of crimes relat ed to those fires. Such groups have been classified as domestic terror threats by the FBI.

A Utah animal rights activist in July pleaded guilty to two federal charges stemming from a pair of 2010 arson fires in the Salt Lake City area, one at the Tandy Leather Factory and another at a restaurant that served a disputed goose liver dish.

Federal agents on Monday weren't dismissing the activist group's claims of responsibility, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives spokeswoman Donna Sellers said. Evidence has been collected from the blaze to be analyzed at one of the agency's laboratories, she said.

"ATF does take the communique seriously," she said. "The claim of re-sponsibility by Animal Liberationists is a lead in this investigation?"

The FBI also said it's helping track down leads.

"We are assisting the ATF to see if there's a connection to domestic terrorism," said Deborah Bertram, an FBI spokeswoman in Salt Lake City.

Vlasak, whose office helps to publicize the illegal activities of activists, said he had no direct knowledge that the activists actually set the Idaho fire. But he said similar statements in past attacks on fur farms or businesses


erhaps it should come as a relief to Idahoans that our state had the Pacific Northwest's lowest percentage of errors in the payment of unemployment benefits over the past three years.

More than 9% of payments in Idaho were paid erroneously, while Washington had a 14.1% error rate, Oregon had a 12.2% error rate and Alaska — under the crack leadership of former governor Sarah Palin — had an 11.8% error rate.

But when that 9% translates into \$82 million paid to residents who had either already returned to work or had not met the state's job search requirements, that relief should be somewhat tempered. A disappointing (but not very surprising) statement from Idaho Department of Labor spokesman Bob Fick said "people in our compliance bureau question whether those numbers accurately reflect the error rate that actually occurs." In other words, 'we don't like the numbers, so they must be wrong.

Fick did point out that nearly \$22.6 million in improperly paid unemployment benefits have been recovered by the state over the past five years. This may sound noble from a state budget management perspective, but let's take a minute to view it from the perspective of the thousands of unemployed workers who had originally received the money. Those that received the \$22.6 million were unemployed at some point - many if not most for a period extending beyond the initial maximum payout of 26 weeks. At some point these workers find employment and begin to see the light at the end of the tunnel. During their transition to work – a seemingly euphoric experience in which they begin to feel better about themselves and their ability to provide for their family - they mistakenly get paid a few extra weeks of unemployment benefits. Some may know it's happened; we suspect the majority do not.

And then they receive the "recovery" notice in the mail, telling them how much they need to repay and how soon they need to find the money. So much for euphoria.



# Paying the Dead

here isn't much about dysfunctional government that shocks me anymore, but this story did.

According to a report by the Office of Personnel Management and reported in Ed O'Keefe's "The Federal Eye" column in the Washington Post, our government has been sending checks to dead people. "In the last five years," O'Keefe writes, "the Office of Personnel Management has made more than \$601 million in payments to dead federal retirees, according to the agency's inspector general. Total annual payouts range between \$100 million and \$150 million."

This isn't something new. Inspector General (IG) Patrick McFarland had urged OPM in 2005 and again in 2008 to more closely monitor such payments. It appears his advice has gone unheeded. "Improper payments to dead retirees are up 70 percent in the last five years," cites the OPM report. In one outrageous case, the son of a deceased annuitant kept receiving federal benefits for 37 years after his father's death. OPM didn't learn about the improper payments until after the son died. Of course, the agency never recovered any of the money. Could this be why the government has no qualms about spending other people's money?



Senator Tom Coburn, Oklahoma Republican, conducted an investigation and reported last October on his findings. Coburn discovered that "the federal government had paid nearly \$1 billion to at least 250,000 dead people since 2000," writes O'Keefe.

I wonder how many of the dead and incarcerated got to vote and for whom?

As congressional Democrats and Republicans play another round of "chicken" over what, if anything, can be cut from the bloated budget and engage in phony theatrics over another possiWal-Mart. The USPS Office of Inspector General reported that employees were paid \$21.9 million for 875,540 hours of 'stand-by' time in FY 2010, and \$4.3 million for 170,666 hours in the first half of FY 2011. The USPS also has a 24 percent vacancy rate in its 284 million square feet of interior office space."

Does this mean the state should not try to recover unemployment benefits erroneously paid? Certainly not.

What it does mean is that the state Department of Labor can and must do a better job in monitoring eligibility and paying only those still unemployed that provide accurate documentation of their job search. Since Idaho's Department of Labor is among many departments and agencies that have had their budget decreased over the past several years, such painstaking attention to detail is more difficult. It is nonetheless necessary.

And if budget "cuts" to the Department of Labor help cause an overpayment of \$82 million, it's clear that not all intended budget savings really pan out. Some budget "cuts" actually cost us more.

# LDS Program Helps Down-and-out Get Back on Their Feet

**IDAHO FALLS** • It's a long way down to rock bottom. Rich Tatham knows it's even further to climb back up.

Tatham, 50, works a modest job at Deseret Industries in Idaho Falls. That job, however, has been a cornerstone for Tatham since he lost his marriage, his dad and a good-paying career during a two-month span five years ago.

He hit bottom when he landed in the Bonneville County Jail after a fourth DUI arrest.

"When things get bad, you start losing options," he said. "It gets to a point where you wake up and your options are either keep drinking, or let myself die. I kept drinking because I wasn't ready to die, but it came to a point where I questioned, 'What am I going to do with my life?'"

In January 2009, after serving four months in jail, Tatham was released. His first stop was The Salvation Army to get a pair of boots. There, he also received a voucher for the DI, where he outfitted himself for the winter and put his name on the DI job waiting list.

After a few months of odd jobs, the DI offered Tatham a job. He accepted and started working for minimum wage.

Slowly, Tatham found stability through routine. He set personal and professional goals with his DI job manager. The DI pays for off-site job training for its employees.

Tatham took advantage, earning two technology certifications through online courses.

Today, he is sober, social and preparing to leave the DI for better opportunities. He credits Alcoholics Anonymous, as well as his experience at the DI, for his turnaround.

"Things have just gotten good ever since," he said.

Tatham is one of thousands of success stories for The Church of Jesus Christ Church of Latter-day Saints Welfare Services.

Since its founding during the Great Depression 75 years ago, the program has fed the hungry, helped the unemployed find work and generally supported those down on their luck.

Since 1985, LDS Welfare Services has provided a total of \$1.3 billion in assistance in the U.S. and 178 countries and territories around the world. That includes more than 63,000 tons of food, 14,000 tons of medical supplies and 93,000 tons of clothing.

Thought global in scope, the program has not only helped Tatham but also thousands of people in similar situations throughout eastern Idaho.

#### The System at Work in Idaho Falls

In the DI receiving area, teams of workers in maroon aprons sort clothes and household items. On the DI floor, cash-poor patrons turn in slips - some issued by Mormon bishops, some issued by nonprofit organizations such as the City of Refuge - for clothes and other goods.

The welfare program assists all people, not just members of the LDS church.

At the LDS Employment Resource Services office next door to the DI, people either unemployed or looking for better jobs learn how to write rsums free of charge.

Before the recession, about eight people walked into the office every day looking for help to find a job.

That figure rose to 25 a day in recent years as the slumping job market meant more people needed coaching on job interviews and job searching, office manager Scott Brizzee said.

More than 1,100 people found jobs last year through the Idaho Falls office. About 70 percent of those were in low-wage jobs, Brizzee said. But some clients with more education or experience found better-paying jobs, including one who found a supervisor's job at Idaho National Laboratory.

At the nearby LDS cannery, pallets of ripening pears were stacked beside pallets of boxes filled with canned pears -ready for shipment around the region, and, if need be, the globe.

About 70 volunteers and welfare program recipients staff the equipment each day.

Before the pears, they canned vegetable soup. Later, they'll can chicken noodle soup, as well as jam, fruits and vegetables, spaghetti sauce and other foods -more than a million cans each year.

Canned food that isn't shipped out will go to the shelves of the adjoining Bishop's Storehouse, taking its place beside the Mormon-made granola, peanut butter and host of other foods and given to the hungry.

The welfare program's massive scope is supported by a rigid infrastructure, but it functions on a less structured basis.

When people fall on hard times -whether they are Mormon or not -they can turn to the LDS bishop in their area ward for help.

After talking through options -maybe there's a boat or RV to sell or a better way to manage money -the bishop authorizes whatever assistance he deems necessary. That can mean food from the storehouse, help paying bills or a job opportunity at the DI.

LDS bishops grant whatever is needed based on two conditions. First, recipients must work for it. Second, the



aid is temporary.

Those two conditions, Ammon Stake President Dwight Whittaker said, set the LDS welfare program apart from federal welfare, which in Idaho can extend to a total of two years per recipient.

Whittaker said prolonged support creates dependency. He said the LDS system works to avoid dependency by mandating that its recipients work and limiting the time of support.

"It's the opposite of a dole," Whittaker said. "It's the opportunity to work and to provide service to someone else. It might be cleaning the flower bed at a meeting place or working here at the cannery. People give back for the assistance they receive."

While the recession has brought hard times to more people in Idaho, the economic downturn also has strapped the state budget.

In his 2010 State of the State and budget address, Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter called upon churches and other community-based groups to step up and provide for their own.

State Rep. Janice McGeachin, R-Bonneville County, said the LDS welfare program is a model for what Otter was talking about.

"I believe that the LDS welfare system is a relief to the state and probably can't be measured," McGeachin said. "It is easy to look around and find ways to help another person. I believe we will become a better society if we help to take care of our

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neighbor instead of just letting the government do it."

#### Tatham is Proof the LDS Welfare System Works When he first set foot in the

DI, he lacked direction. In January, he will move to Moscow to attend the University of Idaho. His bachelor's degree in electrical engineering was obsolete after five years out of the field. He'll attend graduate school to catch up.

While in school, Tatham will use his tech certifications, earned through his training at the DI, to make a decent wage.

Tatham hasn't had a drink in 28 months. He is a

Mormon, but his faith was shaken when his life collapsed. Alcoholics Anonymous is nondenominational but stresses spirituality. That kept the door open for Tatham's slow return to the church as he put the pieces of his life back together.

He heads to graduate school as an active member, crediting both AA and the DI with his recovery and helping him find a greater purpose.

"Going to jail was probably a blessing," Tatham said. "I was on one side of the iron bars and the alcohol was on the other side. My head started clearing. I started seeing there was a way I could put my life back together."

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# NRC BEGINS INSPECTION AT WASH. NUCLEAR I

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) . The Nuclear Regulatory Commission began a special inspection Monday at the Northwest's only commercial nuclear power plant following a series of incidents that occurred while the plant was shut down for refueling.

The inspection centers on three events in which plant operators inadvertently drained reactor coolant from the Columbia Generating Station's reactor vessel during a recent refueling outage, the commission said in a statement Monday. Two other incidents at the plant operated by Energy Northwest also will be reviewed: the temporary loss of shutdown cooling due to an electrical malfunction, and the unexpected insertion of a control rod into the reactor core during a scheduled test.

All of the incidents occurred during the plant's refueling outage, which began in early April.

"All of these events had very low risk significance because the reactor was in a safe shutdown condition," said NRC Region IV Administrator Elmo E. Collins. "But they all appear to have involved poor operator controls and warrant close examination?"

A team of three inspectors will evaluate each event, review Energy Northwest's analysis of the events and determine if corrective actions taken are adequate to prevent recurrence, the NRC's statement said.

Energy Northwest is a public power consortium comprising 28 member utilities. Its 1,150-megawatt nuclear plant in south-central Washington provides about 3 percent of the region's power, roughly enough electricity for 1 million homes.

Northwest Energy

spokesman Michael Paoli said Monday that the incidents did not represent any public health or safety risk. Because the nuclear safety culture is much more sensitive than any other industry, it is important to Energy Northwest that a review be conducted, he said.

The inspectors will write a report on their findings within 45 days.

Energy Northwest shuts down the plant every two years to refuel it and perform other routine maintenance. During this outage, which was scheduled to end June 15, workers also replaced the plant's 25-yearold condenser. The condenser turns steam generated by boiling water in the reactor back into water for reuse in the plant.

However, the work took longer than expected, and Energy Northwest only powered up the plant last week.

Power from the plant is sold to the Portland, Ore.based Bonneville Power Administration, and then to retail customers across the Northwest. That power is valued at more than \$1 million a day.

# Sex Offender Sentenced for Failure to Register

BOISE (AP) • A woman convicted of sexually abusing an Idaho minor two years ago has been sentenced to 10 months in prison for failing to register as a sex offender.

The U.S. Attorney's Office says 33-year-old Lisa Marie Rasho was sentenced Monday for violating the Sex Offender Registration and Notification Act.

Federal prosecutors say Rasho is a transient who

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left Idaho last November and traveled to Michigan, where she failed to register as a sex offender. Rasho was also accused of failing to update her registration in Idaho, which was required after her 2009 conviction in Ada County for sexual abuse of a child under 16.

# Diana Nyad Pushes Through Stings on 'Critical' 2nd Night

HAVANA • Endurance athlete Diana Nyad was about halfway through her swim from Cuba to Florida during what her helpers described as a crucial overnight stretch, overcoming jellyfish stings and ignoring sharks and barracudas on a quest to break her own world record.

Updates have been coming from her handlers via Internet posts, and already Nyad has been in the water longer than her aborted attempt at a Florida Straits crossing last month, when she lasted 29 hours before a crippling asthma attack forced her to call it quits.

As of the last update, she had completed 49 miles (79 kilometers) of the 103-mile (166-kilometer) passage. If all goes well, she hopes to complete the trip Monday morning.

Late Saturday she suffered a second painful sting that affected her face and eyes, and was treated on board a support vessel.

"At this moment it appears that Diana wishes to continue," read a message sent on her Twitter account.

"Tonight, her second night in the open water, may be the most critical," Nyad's website said. "Steve Munatones, the independent observer for the International Swim Federation who is accompanying the expedition, says that swimmers have a much better chance of success if they can make it through the second night."

Earlier Saturday, handlers spotted barracudas in the area, and she also got a visit from a curious shark though her assistants downplayed the incident.

"Around 1pm - and don't everybody get excited here - an Oceanic white tipped shark was spotted near Diana in the midst of the three boat flotilla. ... Rob MacDonald, one of (her safety) divers, swam towards the shark, where they faced off within 10 feet of one another," read a post on Nyad's website.

"I guess he thought I was more aggressive than him, and he turned in the other direction," MacDonald was quoted as saying.

Without a cage to protect her, Nyad is relying on equipment surrounding her with an electrical field that is harmless but deters most sharks. Her divers are there to gently discourage any who make it through.

Nyad's run-in the previous night with a Portuguese Man o' War, described as "scary," left her with stings on her face, arms and side.

Complaining of difficulty breathing, she received oxygen and a steroid shot from her doctors and tread water while she recovered.

When she resumed swimming her handlers noted that her stroke count had dropped to 48 per minute, down from 52-55, but as the day went on she picked up the pace.

"This afternoon - it is stunning to actually witness - Diana is swimming stronger and stronger," her website read. "Her strokes are up to 50 per minute, she is eating pasta, gobbling bananas, bits of peanut but ter sandwiches, along with high-carb & high calorie liquid concoctions." Her website reported that she seemed to revive significantly after consuming blended chicken soup.

The Los Angeles woman pauses every 45 and 90 minutes to rest and refuel on food that her assistants pass to her in the water, but without getting on the boat.

Not all encounters with marine life were unpleasant.

"At 7:10pm, on the crimson horizon of the Straits of Florida, ten pilot whales emerged in the distance just ahead of Diana," said a tweet.

Nyad is making her second attempt in as many months at the Cuba-Florida crossing, a lifelong dream that she first tried as a 28-year-old back in 1978, when she swam inside a steel shark cage for about 42 hours before ending the attempt.

A cageless attempt this August fell short 29 hours in when, gasping for breath, Nyad threw in the towel after an 11-hour asthma attack she blamed on a bad reaction to a new medicine.

# Romney Wins in Michigan Straw Poll

**Texas Gov. Rick** Perry Finishes in a distant second place.

Mich. • Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney says he isn't competing in any straw polls – not even the one this weekend on the island where he spent summers as a boy and where pictures of his father adorn the Grand Hotel and George Romney's legacy as a popular governor hung over the proceedings.

To say Romney was the heavy favorite at the biennial Mackinac Republican Leadership Conference would be an understatement. And he did not disappoint, winning the straw poll with 51 percent of the 681 votes cast. His top rival for the nomination, Texas Gov. Rick Perry, finished second with 17 percent.

For Romney, the victory was especially sweet considering that Perry flew here - a remote island on Lake Huron, accessible only by ferry and where visitors ride bicycles or horse-drawn carriages because automobiles are banned - to deliver a luncheon speech Saturday to conference attendees. Romney was here, too, and gave his speech during Saturday night's dinner program.

Former Godfather's Pizza chief executive Herman Cain, who won the Florida straw poll Saturday, finished third in Michigan with 9 percent, according to the results announced Sunday morning. He was followed by Rep. Ron Paul, R-Texas, with 8 percent; Rep. Michele Bachmann, R-Minn., 4 percent; former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., 4 percent; former Sen. Rick Santorum, R-Pa., 3 percent; and former Utah Gov. Jon Huntsman, 2

# N.Y. SEN. SCHUMER **ACCUSES ONSTAR OF INVADING PRIVACY**

ALBANY, N.Y. • The OnStar automobile communication service used by 6 million Americans maintains its two-way connection with a customer even after the service is discontinued, while reserving the right to sell data from that connection.

Charles U.S. Sen. Schumer of New York says that's a blatant invasion of privacy and is calling on the Federal Trade Commission to investigate. But OnStar says former customers can stop the two-way transmission, and no driving data of customers has been shared or sold.

"OnStar is attempting one of the most brazen invasions of privacy in recent memory," said Schumer, a Democrat. "I urge OnStar to abandon this policy?

But the General Motors Corp. OnStar service says customers are thoroughly informed of the new practice. If a customer says he or she doesn't want to have data collected after service is ended, OnStar disconnects the tracking.

And although OnStar reserves the right to share or sell data on customers' speed, location, use of seat belts and other practices, a spokesman says it hasn't done so and doesn't plan to.

"We apologize for creating any confusion about our terms and conditions," said Joanne Finnor, vice presi-

dent of subscriber services. "We want to make sure we are as clear with our customers as possible, but it's apparent that we have failed to do this. ... We will continue to be open to their suggestions and concerns."

A week ago, OnStar changed its policy and began continuing the connection for ex-customers unless they asked for it to be discontinued.

Finnor noted keeping the two-communication active for former customers could someday allow for emergency messages to be sent even to ex-customers about severe weather or evacuations. The open line could also allow OnStar to alert drivers about warranty information or recalls, she said.

Schumer said he isn't persuaded. He said customers shouldn't have to "opt out" of the tracking after they end service. He accuses OnStar of actively deceiving customers.

Schumer is announcing the effort Sunday by releasing a letter to the Federal Trade Commission seeking an investigation.

OnStar charges about \$199 a year for basic service and \$299 a year for service that includes navigation aid.

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# Drum of Cement Held N.J. Mom's **Remains; Husband Charged**

JERSEY CITY, N.J. (AP) • A woman whose remains

were found inside a 55-gallon cement-filled drum in her apartment building might have been strangled by her husband, authorities said Sunday.

Randy "Amanda" Lehrer was last seen Aug. 17 leaving the diner where she worked, and investigators believe she was killed shortly afterward, Hudson County prosecutor Edward DeFazio told The Jersey Journal.

Her husband, Steven Acuna, was charged with her murder and remained jailed Sunday on \$1 million bail. Lehrer's remains were found Friday in the basement of the apartment building where the couple

# **Defiant Yemeni Leader Makes No Pledge to Step Down**

SANAA, Yemen • Yemen's defiant president addressed his troubled nation Sunday for the first time since returning to the country after an assassination attempt, making no promise to immediately step down but saying he is committed to a deal to end months of spiraling violence.

Ali Abdullah Saleh appeared in improved health after nearly four months of treatment in neighboring Saudi Arabia for severe burns and other injuries he suffered in a June 3 attack on

vice president with overseeing negotiations on the deal, but at no point in his address did he provide any indication he might agree to demands to step down immediately.

Opposition spokesman Mohammed al-Sabri said "Saleh gave a speech full of contradictions."

"There are very clear demands for Saleh: cease violence, quickly transfer power and sign the deal," he said.

Over the past week, Saleh's forces have unleashed heavy shelling on renegade army troops and protesters who have held a sit-in since February at a plaza in the capital they dubbed Change Square. Around 150 people have been killed in the renewed fighting. Armed anti-government tribesmen are also involved in the battles. A committee of tribal leaders and military officials set up to mediate a pullback of forces by both sides has not received a green light from Saleh to start its work, a military official said Sunday, speaking on condition of anonymity because he was barred from releasing information. Military transport trucks were still pouring soldiers into the streets. Yemen's turmoil is of enormous concern to the United States and Europe because the country has become a haven for Islamic militants, including al-Qaida in the Arabian Peninsula, which Washington says is the most dangerous remnant of the global terror network. Al-Qaida-linked fighters have already taken advantage of the unrest to overrun several towns in southern Yemen, expanding their range of influence beyond Yemen's remote hinterlands.

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# **EXPLOSIONS KILL 10 IN HOLY CITY IN IRAQ**

BAGHDAD • Back-to-back bomb blasts ripped through one of the holiest cities in Shiite Islam Sunday, killing at least 10 people in a community still reeling from a deadly bus hijacking earlier this month that left Iraq's Shiites again feeling hunted.

Four explosions struck the city of Karbala over a five-minute period, government officials said, sending thick black smoke over the city. Two of the bombs targeted an Interior Ministry office that issues ID cards. Another struck near a house, shredding its walls and ceiling. And one of the explosions went off half a mile from an important gold-domed shrine.

"Once again, the terrorist enemies of both Iraq and humanity have committed a new crime against the innocent people of Karbala," said Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki, a Shiite.

He called the bombings a "heinous crime," and promised those behind them and the earlier attack on the bus would be punished. He also warned people not to be drawn back into sectarian revenge killings. "We should stay united and cease statements or acts that would help the criminals in their efforts to ignite sedition," al-Maliki said. Ferocious bombing attacks by Sunni insurgent groups like al-Qaida in Iraq targeted the Shiite community whose leaders came to power after the fall of Saddam Hussein. The bloodshed pushed the nation to the edge of civil war. Violence in Iraq has fallen dramatically since the bloodletting of 2006 and 2007, but militant attacks still appear aimed at re-igniting the nation's volatile

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# **Dispute Over Disaster Aid Ends, Avoiding Shutdown**

**WASHINGTON** • Ending weeks of political brinkmanship, Congress finessed a dispute over disaster aid Monday night and advanced legislation to avoid a partial government shutdown only days away.

tance to areas battered by disasters such as Hurricane Irene and last summer's tornados in Joplin, Mo., and also that the government would be able to run normally when the new budget year begins on Saturday.

The Senate approved the resolution after a day of behind-thescenes talks and occasionally biting debate, spelling an end to the latest in a string of standoffs between Democrats and Republicans over deficits, spending and taxes. Those fights have rattled financial markets and coincided with polls showing congressional approval ratings at historically low levels.

The breakthrough came hours after the Federal Emergency Management Agency indicated it had enough money for disaster relief efforts through Friday. That disclosure allowed lawmakers to jettison a \$1 billion replenishment that had been included in the measure – and to crack the gridlock it had caused.

Fatherhood may be a kick in the old testosterone, but it may also help keep a man alive. New research suggests that dads are a little less likely to die of heart-related problems than childless men are.

The study - by the AARP, the government and several universities - is the largest ever on male fertility and mortality, involving nearly 138,000 men. Although a study like this can't prove that fatherhood and mortality are related, there are plenty of reasons to think they might be, several heart disease experts said.

Marriage, having lots of friends and even having a dog can lower the chance of heart problems and cardiacrelated deaths, previous research suggests. Similarly, kids might help take care of you or give you a reason to take better care of yourself.

Also, it takes reasonably good genes to father a child. An inability to do so might mean a genetic weakness that can spell heart trouble down the road.

"There is emerging evidence that

male infertility is a window into a man's later health," said Dr. Michael Eisenberg, a Stanford University urologist and fertility specialist who led the study. "Maybe it's telling us that something else is involved in their inability to have kids."

The study was published online Monday by the journal Human Reproduction.

Last week, a study of 600 men in the Philippines found that testosterone, the main male hormone, drops after a man becomes a dad. Men who started out with higher levels of it were more likely to become fathers, suggesting that low levels might reflect an underlying health issue that prevents reproduction, Eisenberg said.

In general, higher levels of testosterone are better, but too much or too little can cause HDL, or "good cholesterol," to fall – a key heart disease risk factor, said Dr. Robert Eckel, past president of the American Heart Association and professor of medicine at the University of Colorado, Denver.

But, he added, many factors such as job stress affect heart risks and the decision to have children.

# 'Raise My Taxes,' **Town Hall Attendee Tells President**

#### MOUNTAIN VIEW, Calif.

• It's not often that people plead with a president to raise their taxes. But in a town hall event in Silicon Valley, President Barack Obama found an audience in sync with his argument that the rich need to pay higher taxes so that there is enough money for college scholarships, research and public works projects.

Looking out at the crowd Monday, Obama called on a retired Google employee, Doug Edwards, who said: "My question is, would you please raise my taxes?"

The audience applauded.

The question was the ultimate softball for Obama, a chance to lay out his argument for raising taxes on affluent Americans to cut the deficit without slashing the budget for programs to boost the economy.

Last week, Obama released a deficit reduction plan that relies on \$1.5 trillion in additional tax revenue. He is making the case that the wealthiest Americans have made enormous gains at the expense of the middle class in the last few decades and can easily cover a higher tax bill.

Congressional Republicans are balking. They've resisted attempts to saddle

**WASHINGTON** • Who would you put on a stamp? Charlie Sheen? Lady Gaga? Yourself?

Hoping to boost sagging revenue, the U.S. Postal Service on Monday abandoned its longstanding rule that stamps cannot feature people who are still alive and is asking the public for suggestions.

It's a first that means living sports stars, writers, artists and other prominent - or not-soprominent – people could take their places in postal history next to the likes of George Washington, Martin Luther King Jr., and Marilyn Monroe.


"This change will enable us to pay tribute to individuals for their achievements while they are still alive to enjoy the honor," said Post master General Patrick Donahoe.

But it seems to be at least as much about money as admiration.

For years, the post office has been facing severe financial problems due to the growing use of email. A burst of interest in stamp design and collecting – which the Postal Service is seeking to promote partly through social media - could bring in new dollars, since stamps that are collected rather than used for postage provide added revenue.

Poking fun at the Postal Service's money woes, Comedian Stephen Colbert has been pushing to become the first living person depicted on a government-issued stamp. His Comedy Central website proposes a "Farewell to Postage" stamp with a photo of him holding up a smartphone that shows an email telling the Postal Service "See Ya!"

### SUPREME COURT MAY RULE ON HEALTH CARE EARLY NEXT YEAR

**WASHINGTON** • The Obama administration set the stage Monday for the Supreme Court to rule early next year on the constitutionality of the president's health care law by declining to press for a full appeal in a lower court.

The Justice Department announced it will forego an appeal to the full 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta. Such an appeal to the 10-member court could have taken months and delayed a final decision from the high court until at least 2013.

In August, a 2-1 panel of the 11th Circuit became the first appellate court to declare unconstitutional the new requirement that all Americans have health insurance.

Now, the administration can appeal directly to the Supreme Court and ask the justices to schedule the case to be heard and decided during the term that begins next week and ends in June. If the court follows that schedule, the justices will hand down a ruling on Obama's signature legislation just as the election campaign moves into high gear.

# **Dead Sea Scrolls Go Online for First Time**

Surfers can search high-resolution images of the scrolls for specific passages, zoom in and out, and translate verses into English.

JERUSALEM • Two thousand years after they were written and decades after they were found in desert caves, some of the worldfamous Dead Sea Scrolls went online for the first time on Monday in a project launched by Israel's national museum and the web giant Google.

The appearance of five of the most important Dead Sea scrolls on the Internet is part of a broader attempt by the custodians of the celebrated manuscripts – who were once criticized for allowing them to be monopolized by small circles of scholars – to make them available to anyone with a computer.

The scrolls include the biblical Book of Isaiah, the manuscript known as the Temple Scroll, and three others. Surfers can search high-resolution images of the scrolls for specific passages, zoom in and out, and translate verses into English.

The originals are kept in a secured vault in a Jerusalem building constructed specifically to house the scrolls. Access requires at least three different keys, a magnetic card and a secret code.

The five scrolls are among those purchased by Israeli researchers between 1947 and 1967 from antiquities dealers, having first been found by Bedouin shepherds in the Judean Desert. The scrolls, considered by

Huge Floods in Manila as **Typhoon Hits Philippines**

MANILA, Philippines • Massive flooding hit the Philippine capital on Tuesday as typhoon winds and rains isolated the historic old city where residents waded in waistdeep waters, dodging tree branches and debris. At least seven people were killed. Authorities ordered more than 100,000 people across the country to shelter from Typhoon Nesat's rains and wind gusts of up to 106 miles per hour. Schools and offices were shuttered, and thousands were stranded by grounded flights and ferries kept in ports. The typhoon made landfall before dawn over eastern mountainous provinces of Isabela and Aurora, which face the Pacific Ocean, then headed inland through farmlands north of Manila, the government weather bureau said. It was packing sustained winds of 87 mph. The first reported death was a 1 year old who drowned in the central island province of Cataduanes after falling into a river, the government disaster agency reported. As the typhoon moved into Manila, a mother and child were killed after their house was hit by a falling tree in the suburb of Caloocan, and four were reported killed by a collapsing wall in the suburb of Valenzuela. Four fishermen were

missing while more than 50 others were rescued along eastern shores after their boats overturned in choppy seas. Forecasters warned of 12-foot-high waves.

Along downtown Manila's baywalk, cars and buses were many to be the most significant archaeological find of the 20th century, are thought to have been written or collected by an ascetic Jewish sect that fled Jerusalem for the desert 2,000 years ago and settled at Qumran, on the banks of the Dead Sea. The hundreds of manuscripts that survived, partially or in full, in caves near the site, have shed light on the development of the Hebrew Bible and the origins of Christianity.

The most complete scrolls are held by the Israel Museum, with more pieces and smaller fragments found in other institutions and private collections. Tens of thousands of fragments from 900 Dead Sea manuscripts are held by the Israel Antiquities Authority, which has separately begun its own project to put them online in conjunction with Google.

Photography work on the project began earlier this month in conjunction with a former NASA scientist. An advanced \$250,000 camera developed in Santa Barbara, California allows researchers to discern words and other details not visible to the naked eye.

The latest photography effort by two technicians is centered on a fragment of a manuscript known as the Thanksgiving Scroll. On a computer screen was a piece of the Apocryphon of Daniel, an Aramaic text that includes a verse referring to a figure who "will be called the son of God." The first fragments of that will be online by the end of the year.

#### Stocks Jump on Hopes for a Europe Fix; Dow Up 272

NEW YORK (AP) • Stocks had their biggest gains in more than two weeks Monday after European officials pledged to take action to resolve the region's debt problems. The Dow Jones industrial average jumped 272 points, making up about a third of last week's losses. European ministers told a meeting of global finance leaders in Washington over the weekend that they would take bolder steps to fight the debt crisis, which threatens to slow the global economy. President Barack Obama called on Europe's leadership Monday to move more quickly to address the problems. The Dow Jones industrial average shot up 272.38 points, or 2.5 percent, to close at 11,043.86. It was the biggest gain since Sept. 7. JPMorgan Chase & Co. jumped 7 percent to \$31.65, the most of the 30 stocks in the Dow. The Standard & Poor's 500 rose 26.52, or 2.3 percent, to 1,162.95. The Nasdaq composite rose 33.46, or 1.4 percent, to 2,516.69. About three stocks rose for every one that fell on the New York Stock Exchange. All 10 industry groups in the S&P 500 rose.



# **Dollar Turns Lower** Against the Euro

NEW YORK (AP) • The dollar turned lower against the euro Monday as investors evaluated published reports that European officials are working on a plan to help resolve the region's debt crisis.

The plan, reported by British newspapers, is said to include a possible Greek default, a recapitalization of banks and an increase to the bailout fund. The reports said the plan would try to stop the crisis from spreading to other countries.

Global stock markets rose Monday on the hope that officials may do more to contain the debt crisis, though some eurozone officials tried to reduce expectations, saying a quick fix is not likely.

New guidelines from the U.S. Department of Agriculture would eliminate potatoes altogether from school breakfasts and drastically reduce the amount of potatoes served in lunches.

Collins, R-Maine, said the unassuming white potato has its place alongside more highfalutin vegetables in school cafeterias. She believes potatoes are healthy, as long as they're not fried.

"I certainly agree that french fries is not the healthiest choice, but a baked potato can be a good source of potassium for our children," said Collins, who has enlisted Democratic Sen. Mark Udall of Colorado, another potato-growing state, to help her fight the anti-spud movement.

Collins and Udall will attempt to strip funding to implement the new guidelines when the USDA appropriations bill goes to the Senate floor, sometime in the coming weeks or months. The House-approved USDA appropriations bill already prohibits funds from being used to further the proposed USDA guidelines.

The proposal announced by the USDA in January puts focus on fruits, vegetables and whole grains while limiting sodium, banning trans fats and reducing starches

The guidelines would limit starchy vegetables - corn, peas and lima beans, in addition to potatoes - to two servings a week. That's about one cup.

Potato growers across the nation claimed the first major nutritional overhaul of students' meals in more than a decade unfairly singled out and stigmatized spuds, which already took their lumps along with pasta and bread and other carbo-loaded foods during the low-carb diet craze a few years ago.

Many scientists insist there are better alternatives.

Regardless whether it's baked, boiled or fried, a medium-sized potato packs up to 220 calories and is a food that has been associated with weight gain in the U.S., said Dr. David Heber, director of the UCLA Center For Human Nutrition and author of "What Color is Your Diet?"

And folks needn't feel sorry for potato-loving kids, he said.

The National Potato Council says the proposal would carry a large but unknown cost to farmers in lost sales, as well as a \$6.8 billion cost for school districts that will have to line up more costly foods mandated under the guidelines.

And some questioned whether reducing potato consumption at school would yield big improvements in children's health.

Putting an increased emphasis on physical education - getting couch potatoes into the gymnasium or onto a sports field – would have a far greater impact on reducing childhood obesity, said Tim Hobbs, director of development for the Maine Potato Board.

"There's other ways to address childhood obesity. I don't know that limiting potatoes in the school lunch program is going to have the desired impact," Hobbs said.

Virtually all agree that the problem is the french fry, a ubiquitous item on school menus in many parts of the country, sometimes getting served every day.

Reducing the servings of potatoes and french fries is necessary to make room for more servings of healthier vegetables, which are being muscled off school menus, said Margo G. Wootan, director of nutrition policy at the

Center for Science in the

Heidi Kessler, school nutrition manager for Let's Go, a program aimed at fighting childhood obesity at the Barbara Bush Children's Hospital at Maine Medical Center, supports the goals of the proposed school lunch nutrition guidelines. But she agreed with Collins that the US-DA should have focused on the way potatoes are prepared, targeting french fries instead of all white potatoes.

"They're inexpensive, kids like them and they're easy to store," she said, "and they absolutely have nutrient value that can contribute to a healthy diet."

Many schools already are reducing potatoes.

In Portland, where 5,000 meals a day are served at 16 schools, potatoes are limited to once or twice a week, said Ron Adams, food service director for Portland schools.

"The potatoes and some of those other starchy vegetables are part of a balanced diet," Adams said. "It's about how often that those items are on the menu."

The new school lunch guidelines were required by the Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act, which required the USDA to issue science-based guidelines based on recommendations of the Institute of Medicine.

If all goes according to plan, the new rules would take effect next summer. But first, the USDA must review more than 130,000 comments from supporters and opponents. All of those comments will be considered before the final rule is issued, said Kevin Concannon, USDA undersecretary for food, nutrition and consumer services.

Some see the writing on the wall.

The government already put the kibosh on potatoes in the USDA's program for low-income pregnant women and their children, known as WIC, barring federal dollars from being spent on potatoes.

Now the USDA is going after potatoes again.

Wootan said parents are on board.


"When parents tell their kids to eat their vegetables, they don't mean french fries. They don't mean hash browns, either. Potatoes have a role in the school lunch program, but they shouldn't be on the menu every day. The USDA proposal is completely reasonable," she said.





# THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"Immortal patriots! Rise once more: Defend your rights, defend your shore." — Joseph Hopkinson

In today's deal you (West) had to decide whether to take the push to four spades or sit back and try to beat your opponents' game. Since you have no extra spade length, the key may be whether partner has short hearts (and the opponents are bidding on shape) or whether he has two or three hearts, when you may be able to set their game and the sacrifice would prove expensive. On balance it seems right to pass.

Against South's four hearts you lead the spade king, partner plays the six (suggesting an odd number) and declarer the seven. How do you hope to take four defensive tricks?

You need to place partner with the diamond ace and a top club, or both top clubs. Accordingly, it looks important to switch to a club now.

If partner has both minor-suit aces or both top clubs, any small club will probably suffice. However, if partner has the club king without any intermediates and declarer has the club A-9, a switch to the club eight will not be good enough. Declarer will play low from dummy and hold his club losers to one.

To cover every possible situation, you must switch to the club 10. If declarer plays low from dummy, your partner will also play low, and your 10 will force declarer's ace. However, if he covers your 10 with the jack, your Q-8 will be poised over his 9-2 when partner gets in with the diamond ace and leads clubs again.

**DEAR ABBY:** I think your response to "Outgoing Aunt in Texas" (July 16) about the shy 12-year-old girl was misguided. The aunt felt "Tammy's" parents should "make" her come to the phone and speak to her. You felt the child's behavior was rude and said perhaps her mother was covering for her.

Being shy or overly sensitive is an inborn personality trait that can be very disturbing. Forcing a shy person to do something uncomfortable may make the problem worse. Talking on the phone is one of the hardest things for a shy person because he or she can't read the other person's face or body language.

Many l2-year-olds feel awkward in social situations, particularly if they are shy. A loving family member should try to be sensitive to this and not force the child to do something he or she is not comfortable doing. It's possible that Tammy may have a hard time talking to this aunt if she asks Tammy embarrassing questions or makes comments that are hurtful. If that's the case, then Tammy's mom is doing the right thing by trying to protect her. - SHY M.D. IN



DEAR SHY M.D.: Thank you for offering another perspective. Readers who shared their experiences helped me to view this with a fresh perspective. My newspaper readers comment:

DEAR ABBY: Twelveyear-old daughters have a terrible fear of criticism, a fear of failure and a fear of being made fun of by adults and peers. "Outgoing Aunt" sounds heavy-handed to me. I have to wonder what she might have said in the past (or how she said it) that has made Tammy so reluctant to even be in the same room with her. Tammy's mom is right to "cover for her."

DEAR ABBY: It bothered me that "Outgoing Aunt" was so determined and aggressive about speaking to Tammy. Has this aunt





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

been unkind to her in the past? I think the aunt should back off and stop demanding to speak to the child through doors and on the phone. Perhaps the girl isn't shy or rude – just a great judge of character.

DEAR ABBY: You're correct in saying Tammy's behavior may be anxietybased. There is a childhood anxiety disorder called Selective Mutism in which an expectation to speak can cause a child extreme panic. It results in temporary physical paralysis of the vocal cords, and can render a child unable to cry or communicate distress when severely injured.

These children can speak just fine in some situations but not in all others, which can be misunderstood as willful behavior. One of the most common situations in which a child cannot speak is with a close friend or relative.

I had SM as a child and I helped my son find successful treatment for it. Without treatment, Tammy is at a heightened risk for depression, panic attacks, agoraphobia, substance abuse and more. I now speak about this disorder to spread awareness and help others locate resources to seek treatment.

# INJURIES TAKE TOLL ON BRONCOS

Kellen Moore brushed it off as just a doctor thing. Chris Petersen was even more evasive about the black knee brace Boise State's star quarterback sported on Saturday night.

"Kellen watches a lot of TV and when Andrew Luck and Landry Jones wear the knee braces now he wants to be in the club," Petersen quipped. "That's all I think that was about."

The truth is while the fourth-ranked Broncos (3-0) rolled through their first month of the season, they head toward October with a number of potentially concerning injuries.

Moore is seemingly the most noticeable thanks to the bulky brace that was hard to miss during the Broncos' 41-21 win over Tulsa on Saturday night. Moore seemed unfazed, throwing for four touchdowns in less than  $2^{1}/_{2}$  quarters. Yet anytime Moore had to scramble from the pocket — which was rare — his gait was off, jogging back to the huddle with a slight limp.

**BALTIMORE** • The Boston Red Sox found another way to lose, this time on a broken-bat single and an inside-the-park homer, and their 6-3 defeat against the Baltimore Orioles on Monday night dropped them into a tie in the AL wild-card race.

Boston's 17th loss in 22 games enabled Tampa Bay to finally pull even in the duel for the league's final playoff spot. The Rays, who beat the New York Yankees 5-2, trailed by nine games after play on Sept. 3.

With the score 2-all in the sixth inning, Boston starter Josh Beckett (13-7) allowed four runs in an uprising that began with Vladimir Guerrero becoming the career hits leader among Dominican-born players.

Guerrero broke a tie with Julio Franco by bouncing a single up the middle, his 2,587th career hit. The 36year-old Guerrero then stole second base, and after a twoout walk to Mark Reynolds, Chris Davis hit a soft liner to right that brought home the go-ahead run.

Robert Andino followed with a deep fly to center that Jacoby Ellsbury had in his glove before crashing into the wall. Andino sprinted around the bases and made it home as the relay throw bounced past catcher Jarrod

"Maybe a little bit. It's good to get Joe some experience and got Grant in there as well," Moore said. "Down the road they're going to make some big time plays here and they have to get some experience."

Boise State just hopes down the road is 2012.

Knee problems weren't limited to Moore. Center Thomas Byrd saw his string of 36 consecutive starts end when he didn't even suit up. Byrd has battled chronic knee problems and missed most of spring practice to give his knees a break. Byrd has now started 41 of 43 games since the beginning of 2008.

"Thomas will be week to week," Petersen said. "He's old. He's old, old, old. He needs rest."

For most of the night, Boise State was down two starters on the offensive line from the group that started the opener against Georgia. Along with Byrd sitting out, the Broncos saw right guard Jake Broyles go down in the first half Saturday with a leg injury and not return.

The shuffle of the offensive line could be part of the reason Boise State's running game continues to underperform. It was one of Petersen's biggest concerns coming out of Saturday night after the Broncos managed just 131 yards on the ground. Starter Doug Martin had 75 yards on 21 carries, but 14 of those carries were for 3 yards or less, including six runs for no gain or a loss.

The Broncos averaged just 2.9 yards per rushing attempt.

"I think this team is capable with the line that we have and the backs that we have," Petersen said. "We need to be able to run the ball better."

The injury concerns aren't just offensive. Defensive lineman Chase Baker suited up but didn't play with an undisclosed injury. Then the Broncos saw defensive linemen Tyrone Crawford and Billy Wynn each lying on the field in significant discomfort in the second quarter with apparent leg injuries. Each had to be helped off the field, putting little weight on their injured legs and both seemed destined for an early night.

But both were back out for the first series of the second half, allowing the Broncos at least one good injury sign.

"It's football season. You're going to have to play with some bumps and bruises," Petersen said. "But that's why we worry so much because we know how fast things can change. You can see that if Billy and Tyrone go down with those other guys out, it's paper, paper thin, we almost don't have enough guys. We just keep our fingers crossed that we can stay healthy here as the season goes on."



# Cowboys Beat Redskins Behind Romo's Grit, Bailey's Leg

**ARLINGTON, Texas** • Tony Romo's ribs held up just fine. So did Dan Bailey's leg.

Romo persevered through pain to lead enough deep drives to set up Bailey for six field goals, including a 40yarder with 1:57 left to give the Cowboys an 18-16 victory over the Washington Redskins on Monday night.

Dallas' Anthony Spencer chopped the ball from Washington's Rex Grossman with 28 seconds left, and linebacker Sean Lee recovered it, setting off a celebration inside Cowboys Stadium.

Dallas coach Jason Garrett dropped to a knee and pumped his fist wildly at being 2-1 — guaranteeing no repeat of last year's miserable 1-

7 start. The Cowboys are even tied for first place in the NFC East, along with Washington (2-1), which was seeking its

first 3-0 start since 2005. "This was a great win for us," said Romo, who was 22 of 36 for 255 yards. "It was a hard, hard game. ... We had a million mistakes tonight. We have a lot of young guys, but they were out there for a reason. We'll get it right."

Romo lacked zip and accuracy much of the game, and he had trouble with four snaps from his new center. But he was at his best with the game on the line.

He hit Laurent Robinson for a 25-yard gain to set up Bailey's fifth field goal. He then set up the winner on third-and-21 with a scrambling 30-yarder to Dez Bryant that happened to come against cornerback DeAngelo Hall, who last week said he was hoping "to put my helmet on whatever's hurt."

The Romo-Bailey combination has worked like a charm for two straight games. Against San Francisco a week ago Sunday, Bailey made a tying field goal at the end of regulation, then the winner in overtime.

Bailey is an undrafted rookie who was named the nation's top kicker in college last season, at Oklahoma State. His other kicks Monday night covered 41 (twice),

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# Too Early To Give Up On Johnson's Chase?

**CHARLOTTE, N.C.** • There was something different about Jimmie Johnson this year as he readied for yet another challenge to his reign of NASCAR.

The five-time defending champion had a clear understanding that his recordsetting run couldn't last forever. Eventually, somebody would figure out how to beat him, and if Johnson were a gambler, well, he probably wouldn't like the odds of him holding off 11 other drivers for a sixth consecutive year.

That's not to say he had any intention of rolling over for the competition. If Johnson is to be dethroned this year, he's going to go down swinging.

Now, just two races into the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship, many believe 5-time is already on the ropes.

His 18th-place finish at New Hampshire on Sunday dropped Johnson to 10th in the 12-driver Chase field. It's the lowest Johnson has ever been ranked in the 12-driver format, and he trails leader Tony Stewart by 29 points.

He knows he needs to be pretty close to perfect from here on out to hold onto his title.

"We need eight great ones from here," Johnson said. "We can't run 10th anymore. We need a bunch of Ws."

Only Johnson doesn't



seem to have a bunch of victories in him. He's got only one this season, at Talladega in April, and that's actually his only victory over the last year. Then there's the tense radio chatter between Johnson and crew chief Chad Knaus midway through Sunday's race.

With the No. 48 Chevrolet not handling to Johnson's liking, Knaus tried to keep the driver motivated and focused. Johnson didn't want to hear it, told Knaus his cheerleading was "annoying" and essentially demanded the crew chief shut up and let him drive. So, yeah, there's some compelling evidence to the argument that Johnson is in deep trouble after only two weeks.

Do so, though, at your own risk because counting out Johnson is about the dumbest thing his rivals could possibly do right now.

Maybe it seems too long ago, but Johnson prepared for this Chase with seven top-10 finishes in nine races. During a five-race span over the last month, he finished second twice and fourth twice.

And maybe everybody forgets Round 1 of the Chase, when Johnson led 39 laps and had to back off racing for the win to conserve fuel. He was running third when he ran out of gas as he took the flag on the final lap, and he faded to a 10th-place finish.


