A Century Old, Yet Still Young

Twin Falls County primes to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the dedication of its courthouse.

From the roof, they could see Mount Harrison to the southeast and Jerome to the northwest. In the bowels of the building, the basement once served as a Cold War bomb shelter.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loeb provided an intimate tour of the century-old Twin Falls County Courthouse on Wednesday afternoon, a

week prior to the celebration of the building's 100th anniversary of its Oct. 18, 1911, dedication.

He took Shauna Robinson and Mychel Matthews through five levels of history and the efforts being made to preserve it, revealing the nooks, crannies and tales even these historians didn't know. Robinson is chairwoman of the Twin Falls County Historic Preservation Commission, and Matthews is the commission's administrator.

They dropped off an enlarged photo of the courthouse while it was under construction, a sepia-hued moment captured by an unknown shutterbug sometime in the summer of 1910. It's one of many historical photos that are framed and displayed around the building. In that particular photo, the courthouse was just a shell of Bedford stone and brick, all exoskeleton with no insides. Only three levels were complete, and an American flag fluttered atop a structural beam where the fourth floor and roof would soon be.

Twin Falls County was barely three

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Limited by Funds, Recharge Starts Up Again

State officials look to take advantage of this year's plentiful water, but sparse resources will hamper efforts.

Another round of water recharge has been approved in order to help replenish a key underground aquifer.

But tight budgets will limit just how much the state can do as it seeks to replenish the heavily used Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer.

The Idaho Water Resource Board met last week and approved \$132,700 to fund 44,245 acre-feet of recharge. An acre-foot is enough water to cover one acre, one foot deep.

This is the second recharge effort the board has led this year. This spring, more than 59,200 acre-feet of water was put back into the Lake Erie-sized aquifer.

All recharge this fall will occur below American Falls, said Rich Rigby, senior adviser for the Idaho Department of Water Resources.

The board seeks to divide recharge equally above and below American Falls. In years past, more attention

At a Glance Aquifer Recharge

What is it? • Essentially, it's dumping water into the ground to let it seep into an aquifer and build the underground body of water back up.

How does it work? • Sometimes, the Idaho Water Resource Board will send water directly to a hole or pit set up as a recharge site. But often, it pays canal operators to let water seep through the walls of their canals, into the ground.

Different sites are chosen to spread recharge across the aquifer, and because it's more effective in some areas than others.

A Gentleman and a Singer

Longtime city resident Art Frantz — dentist, city councilman, veteran and supporter of the arts — died Tuesday at age 90.

Dr. Arthur "Art" Frantz lived a life that was woven into the fabric of Twin Falls.

Frantz was a dentist, but stayed busy elsewhere. He served for 12 years on the Twin

Falls City Council, but he was equally devoted to the local arts scene. He was a founding member of the Dilettantes performing group in 1959, with roles including singer, actor, board member and a couple of stints as president.

Frantz, 90, died Tuesday at the Twin Falls Care and Rehabilitation Center.

Many in the community reflected on his contributions Wednesday. Frantz was on the council into his late 70s, leaving in 1999 after current Councilman Trip Craig won a race against him. His peers say he carried himself well.

"He represented the reason to celebrate living in Twin Falls," said Chris Talkington, a former councilman. "He was optimistic and had a certain dignity about him that lent a graciousness to how he spoke. He had a great deal of dignity. I think that pervaded through the council and kind of provided a modeling for some of us younger whippersnappers."

Frantz lent his artistic talent to Twin Falls Kiwanis Club gatherings as well and led the songs, Talkington said.

Watch for Falling Trout: Fish Spill from Truck in T.F.

Nearly 1,600 rainbow trout successfully made their way to Dierkes Lake on Wednesday, but a few may end up on a grill somewhere.

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game's Hagerman hatchery reported losing between 20 and 50 of the fish shortly after noon, when a latch on the truck transporting them broke as the truck neared Twin Falls. The fish spilled out onto the road near the intersection of Blue Lakes Boulevard North and Fillmore Street, according to hatchery manager Joe Chapman.

The trout were on their way to the lake for the stocking.

"The driver didn't even know he lost them," Chapman said. "In 17 years, this is the first time I've heard of a spill."

Chapman said about 20 rainbow trout were turned in to the regional

Fish and Game office in Jerome Wednesday afternoon. More were unaccounted for, possibly ran over by vehicles or picked up for someone's evening meal. But at 50 cents per fish, the agency won't lose much in terms of financial value. The rest of the trout were successfully transferred to the lake.

Twin Falls emergency dispatchers said the spill didn't cause traffic delays or require an emergency response.

Buhl Puts Bugs to Work in New Wastewater Plant

Mark Holtzen with J-U-B Engineers, who has worked on the project with the city for more than five years, told the City Council on Monday that “seed materials” were added to the system last week. The materials aid in the production of bacteria and other bugs necessary to break down organic matter in the treatment cycle.

Holtzen said progress is being made and that problems typically associated with this point in the process aren’t arising.

“We’re right on track,” he said.

Although the system is treating the city’s sewage, the treated material is not yet being dumped into the Snake River, allowable per the city’s federal discharge permit.

Holtzen said the treated waste could be discharged into the river, as its levels of nitrogen, phosphorus, and other nutrients and pollutants are within permitted levels. But wastewater operators are waiting a few weeks until “all of the bugs are worked out” of the system.

Holtzen expects discharge to resume within the month.

The city is also working to replace water service lines.

Mayor Tom McCauley said a main water line along Ninth Street is currently being replaced. Homeowners interested in getting their main line replaced, to the meter, at a possible discounted rate should contact the city.

The discounted rate is possible because work is al-

ready being done in the area and pipes are already being dug out, saving time and cost compared to if a company was to come into town simply to complete one job at one house.

Economically, all of this infrastructure work being completed within Buhl could help it attract new industry or business, McCauley said while introducing Larry Hall with Southern Idaho Rural Development to the council.

Hall gave a short presentation on a plan he suggested the city develop to retain and build existing business, as well as plug into economic development efforts across the region in an effort to bring new businesses to Buhl.

Hall suggested creating a Buhl Community Council and Urban Renewal Agency. He also proposed a more-narrow focus for the Chamber of Commerce, centering on area beautification, tourism and marketing instead of community events.

Other parts of a development plan could address the function of the Buhl Economic Council, such as creating a Business Improvement District and using “deal-making” practices to fill space in vacant buildings.

Hall also invited Buhl to join in the newly created Southern Idaho Business Forum, which will be meeting on a semi-regular basis in towns across the valley. The forum will invite experts to speak to the city’s local business base, “depending on what the need is.”

years old, having split off from Cassia County. According to the historic commission, construction began in 1908 from a design by C. Harvey Smith, who selected a mixture of classical styles.

“You look at pictures took early on in the century, in the 1900s, and the building really hasn’t changed,” Robinson said. “The appearance is just the same. That historic character has been so well retained. A lot of counties in the state really don’t have that.”

The courthouse cost \$150,000, an astronomical sum at the time, considering no one knew if the town would grow around it. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics’ inflation calculator estimates construction would cost \$3.4 million today.

“It was a real leap of faith to build this grand building like they did,” Matthews said.

During the spur-of-the-moment tour, Loeb showed off an inner office of the county commissioners’ third-floor chambers, where an inmate had tried to dig his way to freedom. According to the story, the prisoner dug through the bottom of the fourth-floor county jail, dropped down and found himself in the district courtroom. However, he didn’t make it far before being recaptured. The hole is not visible, having been covered during renovations in 2009, but it wasn’t filled in, either.

“We just thought it was cool,” Loeb said about keeping the hole.

More of the past lives on at the county courthouse, as some relics found across the county were given new life through the 2009 remodel. Loeb’s office chair used to be the district judge’s bench chair. He also found tables, bookshelves and lighting fixtures in fairly good shape, and made use of those as well. A framed picture of the old district courtroom shows

wooden chairs in the jury box, some of which now reside in the courtroom of Magistrate Judge Roger Harris.

“When they emptied this courthouse and no longer used it as a courtroom, a lot of this stuff was just scattered,” Loeb said. “Enough of it is around to make a nice display, and as much as possible, we’d like to use.”

While the historic commission and county commissioners will hold a celebration of the building on Tuesday, the commissioners and Loeb continue to look to the future. The remodel of the third and fourth floors helped restore some of the old grandeur of the building, and they would like to now spruce up the first two levels.

Future plans are dependent somewhat on when, if and where the commissioners move some of the offices,” Loeb said. “It depends on what happens to the old hospital building and what happens to the clinic building.”

Councilman Lance Clow said Frantz was quiet and thoughtful on the council, but not afraid to speak up when necessary.

“When he spoke up, he spoke with passion,” Clow said.

That extended to the arts. “He was a great singer,” Clow said. “He loved music. He was always passionate about making sure the arts were well-represented.”

A 1938 graduate of Twin Falls High School, Frantz served in the military during World War II before becoming a dentist. He and his wife, Betty, were married for 65 years and had four children.

“I’ve always maintained

that if I could accomplish half of what he accomplished, I would consider myself a success,” said Dave Frantz, his son.

Art made time for his family. When Dave Frantz was in the Marine Corps, his car broke down in a remote California town and his father drove overnight to reach him with the needed car part. Then the elder Frantz followed his son’s car to Oceanside, Calif., to make sure his son safely made it to Camp Pendleton.

In 1996, Art Frantz had a stroke, but recovered and finished his council term. Craig said Frantz was a pleasure to interact with and was helpful.

“He was truly a nice gentleman,” Craig said. “He didn’t say anything bad about anybody.”

A Bit More in the Bank for Jerome School Employees

Employees who saw their pay cut by nearly 6 percent over the past two years will get a 1 percent pay bump this year.

Jerome School District employees should expect to have some extra cash in their pockets within the next few months.

Jerome’s school board unanimously voted Tuesday

night to give their 300-plus employees a one-time raise, which will cost the school district about \$138,000.

Superintendent Dale Layne said the adjustment is meant to return money to employees, who have taken a 5.75 percent pay cut over the last two years.

weren’t sure how enrollment would be affected by Jerome’s first charter school, Heritage Academy, opening its doors in September.

State funding for school districts is tied to the number of students enrolled.

“Enrollment didn’t drop as much as anticipated,” Layne said. There are 50 fewer students this year and, in total, there are about 3,500 students at the district’s five schools.

The decision to adjust employee salaries comes after Jerome’s school board approved a fiscal 2012 budget in July, which included furlough days, job cuts and leaner supply budgets.

The \$17 million budget is a \$1.3 million reduction from last year.

has been given northeast of the dam because there were better opportunities there for recharge.

“Recharge tends to be opportunistic,” Rigby said. “But we do the best we can to balance it out.”

This spring helped create a plentiful water supply, but cash is tight. The Idaho Ground Water Appropriators contributed

\$80,000 to help fund more recharge sites. However, there is not enough money to recharge all of the water that is available.

“There is a limited amount of funding for recharge,” said Lynn Tomina, IGWA’s executive director. “There are a lot of folks who would like to recharge but the money isn’t there.”

The Big Wood Canal Co., North Side Canal Co. and Southwest Irrigation District have agreed to

participate in this fall’s recharge efforts, Rigby said.

North Side Canal added two new recharge sites to help make a greater impact, said Ted Diehl, the company’s manager. However, as of Wednesday, Diehl did not know how much water the company would commit to this fall.

“We’ll probably do quite a bit,” Diehl said. “It’s important so the farmers have both ground and sur-

face water. We’re trying to help them out.”

Southwest Irrigation District has committed to 5,000 acre-feet this fall, said board member Randy Brown.

“It’s not a lot this fall but we’re splitting it up between Cassia and Twin Falls counties,” Brown said.

Recharge efforts will continue throughout December, Rigby said.

“It was a good water year,” he said. “Now is the ideal time to do it.”

Nine Years for Rupert Woman on Federal Meth Charge

A Rupert woman will serve nine years in prison on a charge of trying to distribute more than a pound of meth. Leaha Annette Rivera, 42, was sentenced Tuesday in Boise after pleading guilty to conspiracy to distribute 500 grams or more of metham-

phetamine, according to a press release by U.S. Attorney Wendy J. Olson. She pleaded guilty to the charge on June 27. Rivera was fined \$1,000 and will serve three years of supervised release after her prison term is completed. She admitted to conspiring with Rigaberto Moreno Sanchez, 33, of Rupert, and two others

to distribute the drugs between Sept. 1 and Dec. 15 of last year. Sanchez was sentenced in September 2010 to 14 years in prison on related charges. Both were stopped in Victorville, Calif., and found with 442.5 grams of meth. A jury trial for two other defendants is set for Dec. 6 at the federal courthouse in Boise. The case was investigated by the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration and the Boise Police Department.

The Quiet War Erupts

The following editorial appeared in the Chicago Tribune on Wednesday:

For years, Iran has quietly waged war against the United States, allying with and arming this nation's enemies. Now that war has come to U.S. soil.

Attorney General Eric Holder said Tuesday that federal authorities have foiled a plot by men linked to the Iranian government to kill the Saudi Arabian ambassador to the United States by exploding a bomb, possibly at a Washington restaurant.

This chilling news caps a long, slow, deliberate escalation of Iranian provocation:

- Iran's elite military unit, the Revolutionary Guards, armed its allies in Iraq and Afghanistan to target U.S. troops and accelerate the U.S. military withdrawal. U.S. defense officials say Iranian-supplied weapons have killed U.S. soldiers.

- Iranian speedboats have challenged U.S. and allied warships in the Persian Gulf, setting up a series of near-collisions. The U.S. response? An overture to Iran, to set up a military-to-military hotline to defuse such clashes. Tehran's answer: Forget it.

- American officials say Iran has forged an alliance with al-Qaida, allowing the terrorist organization safe passage to send cash, arms and fighters to its operations in Pakistan and Afghanistan.

- Iran has armed the terrorists of Hamas in Gaza and dispatched thousands of rockets to Hezbollah terrorists in Lebanon, posing a direct threat to Israel, a key U.S. ally.

A quiet, largely client-based war. But this war is no longer quiet.

Holder called the plot “an international conspiracy by elements of the Iranian government.”

Holder said the two men charged, Manssor Arbabsiar and Gholam Shakuri, are connected to the Quds Force, a division of the Revolutionary Guards, the power behind Iran's ruling mullahs. Arbabsiar was arrested and reportedly provided details of the plot, but Shakuri is still at large.

“In addition to holding these individual conspirators accountable for their alleged role in this plot, the United States is committed to holding Iran accountable for its actions,” he said.

So what will the U.S. response be? How will the U.S. hold Iran accountable? By slapping on more economic sanctions? By rushing out a furious diplomatic cable?

Iran is a state sponsor of terrorism. We should learn more about how complicit its leaders were in this attempt to stage a terrorist attack in the U.S. that would have targeted an ally and most likely claimed U.S. lives.

Iran continues to develop a nuclear program. It is a state sponsor of terrorism with a determination to go nuclear. Round after round of economic sanctions haven't deterred Iran, which is closer to atomic bomb-building capability. The Iranians may have conducted experimental work to develop warheads to deliver nuclear payloads.

And now, it appears, Iranian agents were plotting to launch an assault in Washington. The war has come home.



Kicking the Wall Street Habit

So, protesters are occupying Wall Street and downtown banking districts in scores of other cities. Many Democratic politicians have endorsed the movement's spirit and goals.

Now what?

The pols are in no position to enact any further left-populist reforms — laws that create, say, a financial transaction tax, or that make it easier for employees to form unions — so long as Republicans control the House and have veto power in the Senate. For that matter, the Democrats couldn't even get those bills enacted when they controlled both houses of Congress. So what, besides affirming their solidarity with the demonstrators, can they do?

Here's a modest proposal: Refuse all campaign contributions from banks, hedge funds, private equity funds and their partners and employees. From the whole financial sector.

Sign a pledge to go off the sauce.

Unlike the signatories to Grover Norquist's no-tax pledge, lawmakers wouldn't be asking voters to trust them once the election is over. They'd be honoring their pledge before the election. And unlike the Groverians, they wouldn't surrender their powers of judgment and freedom of action



once they're in office. Indeed, their freedom of action would expand because they wouldn't be indebted to “what is far and away the largest source of campaign contributions to federal candidates and parties,” as the Center for Responsive Politics, which tallies all federal campaign contributions, characterizes the financial sector. In the 2008 election cycle, those contributions came to a cool \$500,863,000.

Let me be the first to acknowledge that there are problems with this suggestion. Declining contributions in an era of capital-intensive elections appears at first glance — second, too — to be a sucker's game, a form of unilateral disarmament. But perhaps there's a way that candidates who do take the no-bank-money pledge can compensate for the hole it would blow in their campaign treasuries. The 2008 Obama presidential campaign clearly showed that a popular candidate can raise significant sums in small online contributions.

Imagine a race next year in

a swing House district in which one candidate has taken the pledge. All her messaging — speeches, advertising, the works — would highlight the fact that she's not beholden to Wall Street while her opponent either is (if he's taken its contributions) or may be in the future (if he's declined to take the pledge).

Our pledge-taker has a lot going for her. Since the government bailed out Wall Street, only to see Wall Street decline to bail out Main Street, public antipathy to the institutions and individuals at the commanding heights of the economy has risen to new levels. Add to that the public's anger at the ability of big financial players to influence public policy, and the no-bank-money pledge could well be a winning political message. And one that would lead to distinctly better public policy.

After all, did the financial deregulation of the past two decades get enacted on its merits, or because of the campaign contributions and lobbying prowess of finance? The 1999 repeal of the Glass-Steagall Act, which had kept federally insured commercial banks separate from investment and speculator banks, didn't happen because speculative banking had suddenly become safe. It happened be-

cause Citibank and other institutions made mega-campaign contributions and lobbied ferociously for repeal. The Commodities Futures Modernization Act of 2000, which deregulated derivatives, was enacted because the leading banks believed they could make untold profits if it passed. And because they did indeed make untold profits — in the past decade, banks' gains reached 41 percent of all the corporate profits in America — they had even more money with which to influence our lawmakers.

There are, as I conceded, complexities to all this. Should the pledge apply to all banks or just the big ones? To individual bankers or just their institutions? Why single out finance when there are other socially problematic sectors — oil, say — that use their financial clout to buy favored treatment?

It's the banks, though, that have become the leading target of the left's populist ire. And for an anti-bank movement looking for a program, and a politician looking to ride that populist wave and help diminish the role of money in politics, here's a cause to take up tomorrow morning: For the pols, swearing off the banks' big bucks. For the occupiers and their friends, helping those pols by ponying up themselves.

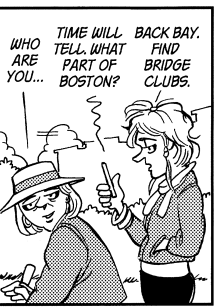
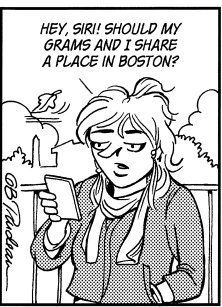
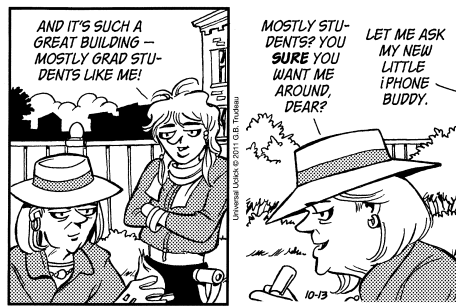

That works for the complex on the north side of Falls. Why not here as well?

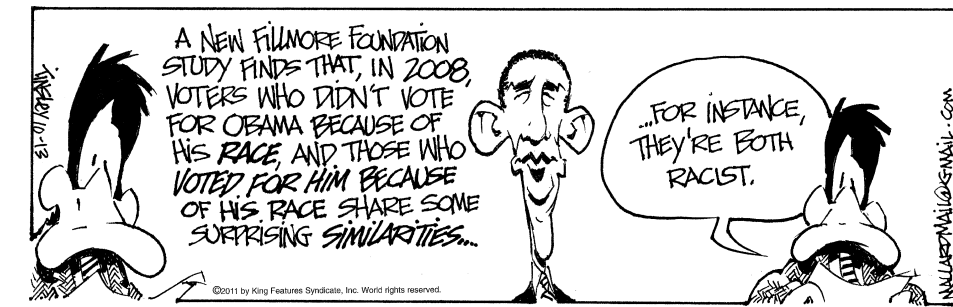

Kimberly Council Says It's Committed to Bringing Nonprofit Health Care to Town

KIMBERLY • The Kimberly City Council unanimously agreed Tuesday evening to continue seeking a state grant for a project for Family Health Services.

The nonprofit health care provider for low-income people is still interested in coming to Kimberly, said City Administrator Polly Hulsey. Council members in turn signaled they're willing to still pursue the project as well.

The block grant would pay for Family Health Services to build a new facility after the old City Hall is demolished. The city would cover the cost of demolition and excavating the existing structure. The city-owned property would then be leased.

The Idaho Community Development Block Grant program, administered by the Idaho Department of Commerce, helps Idaho cities and counties develop needed public infrastructure. Grants are usually handed out in the spring; this year's application deadline for downtown revitalization grants is Nov. 18.

Also Tuesday

The City Council took the next step on a long-awaited project to solve a problematic intersection.

Members approved a resolution with the Idaho Transportation Department for design and construction of a traffic signal at Red Cap Corner, the intersection of Idaho Highway 50 (Kimberly Road) and U.S. Highway 30 (3500 East).

Only incorporated cities with populations of less than 50,000 or counties are eligible to apply for the grants.

Kimberly applied for a grant for the FHS project last fall, and is still waiting to see if it'll be funded amid a delay in the money coming available. State officials are meeting once more this week to look over the last round of applications, Hulsey said, and the city will consider applying again this fall if needed.

"We'll look at it again and we may have to revise the application," Hulsey said.

FHS also pursued a grant on its end that didn't come through, she said.

POLICE WARN OF SHADY POPCORN 'VENDORS'

Twin Falls police are warning residents to be on the lookout for wandering popcorn vendors who want access to your house.

MAN SENTENCED FOR HITTING FRIEND WITH CAR

A Murtaugh man will serve prison time after a night of drinking led to fighting and a man getting hit by a car.

Ronald Anderson, 44, was recently sentenced to the state's retained jurisdiction program on the charge of aggravated battery, for hitting Loren Levesque with a car. Anderson was ordered to serve 365 days in the program, and completion could lead to probation in lieu of more prison time of up to 10 years.

According to the police report, the two men were drinking one night in May when an argument allegedly led Anderson to the idea of pouring sugar in the gas tank of Levesque's race car. At some point, Anderson got in a vehicle and used it to pin Levesque against another vehicle, according to a witness.

Anderson is also ordered to pay \$63,309.22 in restitution, mostly for Levesque's medical expenses.

Calif. Man Changes Plea for Pot Possession

A California man has entered a guilty plea on a reduced drug charge, months after Idaho State Police allegedly found him and two other suspects with approximately four pounds of marijuana in a car.

Michael McCormick, 25, of Ukiah, Calif., pleaded guilty recently to felony possession of marijuana over three ounces, and his sentencing is scheduled for Oct. 31. He was initially charged with felony trafficking, a charge to which he pleaded not guilty. The charge was amended by the state as part of a plea agreement, in which the

state will seek a suspended five-year prison sentence. The recommendation is for a three-year probation, with 120 days to be served in county jail and 100 hours of community service.

ISP officers reported stopping McCormick and two other men along U.S. Highway 93 in southern Twin Falls County in late May and finding marijuana stuffed inside a flat-screen TV box in the trunk of a car.

The other suspects, also from California, Rafael Ayala Jr. and Alfonso Guillen-Fierros, pleaded guilty to reduced charges in September.

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No Leaks Found in N. Idaho Pipeline

CATALDO (AP) • Oil company Conoco-Phillips has restarted a gasoline pipeline that runs across northern Idaho after a series of tests confirmed the line's integrity.

The company spent more than a week to determine if a leak was the cause of a pressure drop discovered in the Yellowstone Pipeline along a six-mile section stretching from the Idaho towns of Cataldo to Enaville.

Spokesman Jeff Callender said crews were unable to find any leak or any other viable explanation for the drop in pressure. The company restarted the pipeline Tuesday.

"We're confident that we have a reliable pipeline," Callender said. "We've gone through all of our own procedures for verifying the integrity of the line, and all the Department of Transportation's."

The company shut down the line Sept. 29 for operational reasons, then two days later discovered a drop in pressure. Company officials then began performing a series of tests to determine if the line was leaking. The company also took other environmental precautions, including placing floating booms downstream of the three locations where the pipeline is buried under the riverbed of the Coeur d'Alene River.

The company hired crews to walk along the line and aircraft overhead looking for evidence of a fuel leak. Crews also tried to detect leaks with acoustic devices and water pressure tests, all to no avail.

"We deployed a lot of resources for this," Callender said.

State Funding for Online Classes Would Vary Widely

BOISE (AP) • State funding for online course providers would vary greatly among school districts under Idaho's new education changes, a newspaper is reporting.

Companies that provide online courses could, in some cases, tap more state funding from some of Idaho's smaller school districts because they receive more money per student under Idaho's funding formula, the *Spokesman-Review* reports.

The model Idaho uses to fund public schools is now largely based on the average daily attendance of students and these amounts differ greatly among districts based on student population and other factors. But with new education changes Idaho adopted this year, online course providers may be entitled to a portion of that money under a new funding formula called fractional average daily attendance.

Idaho is phasing in laptops for high school students while also requiring

them to take online courses to graduate, under the new education changes backed by public schools chief Tom Luna and the governor.

With the new education changes, high school students will be allowed to enroll in any state-approved online class starting next fall — with or without permission from their school district. The company will then be entitled to two-thirds of the state funding sent to school district for that student for that class period.

An online course company could collect amounts that range from \$210 per semester for offering a class to a student in Boise, the state's largest population center, to \$733 for a student in Midvale, a rural town of less than 200 residents, according to state estimates.

This new fractional funding formula would apply unless the school district has a contract with that company to provide online courses for a set amount.

State Rep. Wendy Jaquet, D-Ketchum, sits on a task

force created to help implement Luna's plan to increase technology in the classroom and she questioned the apparent disparities under the funding formula.

"I think if I were a provider, I would first concentrate on these districts where this credit is worth a lot more money," Jaquet said during a meeting of the task force earlier this week. Jaquet asked Luna if he had explored the idea of a funding cap for online course providers.

Luna agreed task force members could continue to discuss the funding formula at their next meeting in November, but said he didn't think the issue warranted changes to the new education laws.

Areva Uranium Project Wins Federal License

IDAHO FALLS • Areva SA has won a federal license to build and operate a gas centrifuge uranium enrichment plant near Idaho Falls, a key step in the French company's plans to expand production of nuclear fuel in the U.S.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission's license for Areva's Eagle Rock Enrichment Facility authorizes the company to enrich uranium for use in the manufacture of nuclear fuel for commercial power reactors.

Areva plans to begin construction in 2012.

Romanian Gets Federal Prison Time for Fraud

BOISE • A Romanian-born man will spend more than three years in federal prison

after pleading guilty to entering the United States illegally, altering a passport to accomplish wire fraud and bilking would-be Internet car buyers of their money.

The 34-year-old Andrei Mirel also must pay restitution of some \$209,000 to 71 victims, including three in Idaho.

In U.S. District Court, Mirel acknowledged how his scheme worked. He used an altered passport to help him defraud people seeking to buy cars over the Internet. They'd wire him money for non-existent vehicles, which he would then transfer to European bank accounts where the cash would become untraceable.

U.S. Attorney Wendy J. Olson called this a "heartless fraud" against people desperately short of cash who were trying to purchase a cheap, reliable car.

Man Pleads Guilty in Underwear Bomb Plot

Nigerian faces mandatory life sentence for the 2009 attack that aimed to kill nearly 300 people on Christmas Day in Detroit.

DETROIT • A Nigerian man pleaded guilty Wednesday to trying to bring down a jetliner with a bomb in his underwear, defiantly telling a federal judge that he acted in retaliation for the killing of Muslims worldwide and referring to the failed explosive as a “blessed weapon.”

Umar Farouk Abdulmutallab, who acknowledged working for al-Qaida and never denied the allegations, entered the plea against his attorney’s advice on the second day of his trial. He stands to get a mandatory life sentence for the 2009 attack that aimed to kill nearly 300 people on Christmas Day in the skies above Detroit.

Abdulmutallab calmly answered the judge’s questions and read a political statement warning that if the United States continues “to persist and promote the blasphemy of Muhammad and the prophets,” it risks “a great calamity ... through the hands of the mujahedeen soon.”

“If you laugh at us now, we will laugh at you later on the day of judgment,” he said.

Abdulmutallab suggested more than a year ago that he wanted to plead guilty but never did. He dropped his four-person, publicly financed defense team in favor of representing himself with help from a prominent local lawyer appointed by the court, Anthony Chambers.

In an interview, Chambers said Abdulmutallab privately renewed his interest in a guilty plea Tuesday before the start of the trial. But it did not happen immediately because the defendant was not prepared to go through the lengthy required question-and-answer session with the judge.

When the two met again Wednesday morning, Abdulmutallab was ready, Chambers said.

Shooting Kills 8 at Hair Salon in S. California

SEAL BEACH, Calif. • A gunman opened fire Wednesday in a busy hair salon, killing eight people and critically wounding another while leaving bodies scattered throughout the business in a normally sedate Southern California beach community. The gunman got into a car

and drove away from Salon Meritage after opening fire about 1:30 p.m. He was stopped by officers about a half-mile away and surrendered without incident while saying he had multiple weapons with him, police Sgt. Steve Bowles said.

His name and those of the victims were not immediately released.

Police were struggling to determine what prompted the shootings.

“There may be something to the motive as to a relationship with somebody in the salon, that is our assumption,” Bowles said.

Serious But Amateurish: U.S. Describes Iranian Plot

U.S. officials say the planned assassination of the Saudi ambassador was conceived in part as proof that such an operation could be carried off.

WASHINGTON • The alleged Iranian plot against the Saudi ambassador to Washington was “amateur hour,” an unusually clumsy operation for Iran’s elite foreign action unit, the Quds Force, U.S. officials said Wednesday as further stranger-than-fiction details emerged of the assassination gone wrong.

The Iranians’ would-be covert operative turned to a woman he met while working as a used car dealer, hoping to find a Mexican drug dealer-assassin, and wound up with an American informant instead, according to two U.S. law enforcement officials.

Other U.S. officials said Manssor Arbabsiar made further mistakes, including arranging a pay-off for the attack in an easily traceable way.

They attributed the missteps to Iran’s relative inexperience carrying out covert operations in the United States and Mexico.

They said the U.S. believes the planned attack on the Saudi ambassador was conceived in part as proof that such an operation could be carried off.

Then, perhaps, Iran would have followed up with a series of attacks against other embassies in the U.S. and in Argentina, officials said.

All of the officials requested anonymity in order to provide details from classified analyses and an active criminal case.

In public remarks, Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton spoke Wednesday of a “dangerous escalation” of what the U.S. claims is an Iranian pattern of franchising terror abroad.

“We will work closely with our international partners to increase Iran’s isolation and the pressure on its government and we call upon other nations to join us in condemning this threat to international peace and security,” Clinton said at a Washington conference.

Her words strongly suggested that the U.S. wants some new action against Iran from the U.N. Security Council, which has already approved several rounds of mild to moderate sanctions on Iran over its disputed nuclear program.

Two men, including a member of Iran’s Quds Force special foreign actions unit, were charged in New York federal court Tuesday with conspiring to kill the Saudi diplomat, Adel Al-Jubeir. Justice Department officials say the men tried to hire a purported member of a Mexican drug cartel to

Next Moves Uncertain on Obama Jobs Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) • President Barack Obama and his Democratic allies in the Senate promise additional votes on pieces of the president’s \$447 billion jobs bill, but how those pieces might be arranged and when the votes might be taken is up in the air.

Instead of immediate votes on more jobs legislation, the Senate is turning to long-stalled spending legislation and then is going on recess at the end of next week.

The jobs package died Tuesday at the hands of Senate Republicans, but Obama and his Senate Democratic supporters promise to force votes on items such as infrastructure spending, jobless assistance, aid to local governments, and tax cuts for individuals and businesses that were major parts of the massive bill.

Obama’s top ally in the Senate says it’s unclear which items will get votes.

“I’m not positive at this time what piece of the president’s bill we’re going to do,” Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., said. Instead, Reid said the chamber will first debate a bundle of appropriations bills setting next year’s budgets for the departments of Commerce, Agriculture, Transportation, and Housing and Urban Development.

Cain Vows to Add Staff, Campaign Aggressively

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) • Seizing modest momentum in the race for the Republican presidential nomination, businessman Herman Cain promised to invest in additional staff and campaign more aggressively in New Hampshire and Iowa.

“We have run this very lean by design. We are now going to ramp up,” he told reporters near the New Hampshire State House Wednesday afternoon. “We now have the money to do so. I didn’t want to get out in front and commit to spending a whole lot of money before I knew that the American people were going to say, ‘You know

what? This long shot may not be such a long shot.’”

Cain, the former chief executive of Godfather’s Pizza, has jumped into second place in some national polls following the repeated stumbles of Texas Gov. Rick Perry.

But unlike Perry, Cain has put little effort into visiting early voting states or building a ground game in the states where presidential contests are typically won and lost. Cain launched a recent book tour that fueled speculation he was more interested in profiting from his growing national profile than winning the election.

STAR HACKING CASE VICTIMS INCLUDE JOHANSSON

A Florida man was charged with hacking into celebrity email accounts in a computer invasion scheme that led to the posting on the Internet of private and revealing information, including nude photos of actress Scarlett Johansson, federal authorities said Wednesday. Christopher Chaney, 35, of Jacksonville, was arrested without incident as part of a yearlong investigation of celebrity hacking. — *Associated Press*

Glenn Zachman, who owns a video news-gathering service, said he arrived at the scene of the arrest shortly after police and saw they had placed plastic bags over the man's hands to preserve possible gunshot residue.

He also saw a bulletproof vest on the back of a patrol car but didn't know if the man, dressed in a button-down shirt and pants, had been wearing it.

The suspect was cooperative when officers, working from a description of the shooter, stopped him near the salon, Bowles added.

TV news video showed the man, in handcuffs, being placed in a patrol car and taken away about 2½ hours after the shooting.

A new white pickup truck that was believed to be his was parked on the modest residential street with its doors open.

Police responding to a report of shots fired found six people dead and three wounded. Two of the wounded died at a hospital. The other person was listed in critical condition.

Bowles said the victims were scattered throughout the salon. One wounded person, a man, was found outside the building. It wasn't clear if he was trying to flee when he was shot or if he was the one wounded survivor.

Police were still trying to determine the sequence of events inside the shop.

"We're unsure at this point if he shot from the entrance and people, as they were shot, ran in seeking cover or seeking shelter, but we have fatalities throughout the salon," Bowles told reporters at a news conference outside the business.

"From my observation, it did look like people were seeking shelter at the time," he said.

Bowles said the salon was busy at the time, with every hair-dressing station in operation.

He didn't know what type of weapon was used or if the man used more than one.

Salon employee Lorainne Bruielle, who wasn't working Wednesday, told the *Long Beach Press-Telegram* the gunman was the husband of another employee.

Bruielle said she talked to the husband of one of the employees involved, who said one worker locked herself in the salon's facial room and was unharmed while another man locked himself in a bathroom but was wounded.

Several visibly distressed people stood near the scene talking on cellphones or to police shortly after the shootings. They declined to be interviewed.

About 4½ hours later, a police officer escorted a woman who was crying and shaking past crime-scene tape and to her car.

Cindy Spinosa, 51, who works at a nearby business, said she heard a siren around the time of the shooting.

"After that one of my coworkers got a phone call from her nephew," Spinosa said. "He was outdoors when the suspect got into his truck and took off.

"It's a little disarming," she said. "This is such a quiet community. We don't expect things like this."

BIKER, BEAST COLLIDE; VIDEO GOES VIRAL

A South African mountain biker's collision with an antelope became an Internet sensation, YouTube said Wednesday. Evan van der Spuy, 16, was competing in a weekend race in a wildlife park when a leaping hartebeest, an antelope that can weigh up to 350 pounds, crashed into him, race organizer Max Cluer said in an interview Wednesday. He said Van der Spuy, whose helmet was broken, was not badly hurt and the hartebeest returned to its herd to graze. — *Associated Press*

Myanmar Frees Dissidents, Keeps Many More Locked Up

YANGON, Myanmar • Myanmar freed an outspoken critic and a major ethnic rebel as it began releasing 6,300 convicts Wednesday in its latest liberalizing move, but kept some political detainees behind bars, dampening hopes for a broader amnesty.

It was not clear how many of the country's estimated 2,000 political detainees were included in the amnesty — one estimate said only 206 of them were freed. But the released included ailing Shan Army commander Hso Hten and comedian Zarganar, who was imprisoned after criticizing the government's re-

sponse to Cyclone Nargis in 2008.

"I will be happy and I will thank the government only when all of my friends are freed," Zarganar told The Associated Press after his release in northernmost Kachin State.

Those held back included student leaders from Myanmar's failed 1988 democracy uprising and a blogger serving a 12-year prison sentence.

Western governments, the U.N. and Myanmar's opposition have eagerly awaited a broad political amnesty as a gesture of liberalization by the elected government after decades of harsh military rule. A failure to follow through on those hopes

could hamper the country's efforts to burnish its human rights record and win a lifting of Western economic and political sanctions.

In Washington, the State Department welcomed Wednesday's releases, but said the Myanmar government had not published a list of those freed or designated to be freed. The department said its initial reports were that the majority of political prisoners remain in detention, including 1988 protest leader Min Ko Naing and ethnic Shan leader Hkun Htun Oo. The U.S., which has been seeking ways to re-engage with Myanmar, reiterated its call for the immediate release of all remaining prisoners of conscience.

carry out the assassination with a bomb attack while Al-Jubeir dined at his favorite restaurant.

U.S. officials believe Iran hoped that an attack of that design would be blamed on al-Qaida. That, in turn, would strike at two of Iran's chief enemies: the U.S., constantly at odds with Iran over its nuclear aspirations, and Saudi Arabia, battling Iran in a diplomatic Cold War for influence across the Persian

Gulf and Middle East.

Saudi Arabia most recently helped thwart Shiite-majority demonstrators in Bahrain, whom Iran backed, and clashed again with Iran in Syria. Iran advised Syrian leaders on how to crack down on demonstrators, while Saudi Arabia has encouraged further protests and called for the Syrian government's ouster.

The Quds Force is tasked with extending Iranian influence through fear and violence, intimidating other countries with assassinations, terror attacks and kidnapping, the officials said.

Such plots are managed by the Quds Force's Special External Operations Unit, and carried out by sometimes unexpected proxies, like anti-Shiite Sunni extremists, the officials said.

The unit answers directly to Iran's supreme leader, Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, who U.S. officials believe is briefed on high-profile operations. While the U.S. has no direct proof, and did not charge in court, that the top Iranian leaders approved this attack, any such operation would be vetted at the highest levels, one of the officials said.

DEADLIEST LISTERIA OUTBREAK IN 25 YEARS

An outbreak of listeria in cantaloupe is now linked to 23 deaths, making it the deadliest known outbreak of foodborne illness in the U.S. in more than 25 years. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said Wednesday that 116 people have been sickened in the outbreak, including those who died. The number of deaths has surpassed a 1998 outbreak in processed meats that was linked to 21 deaths.

Prosecutors were aware of a possible plea, but there were no negotiations. Abdulmutallab had "no interest" in speaking to prosecutors, Chambers said, and was unlikely to get any benefit at this stage of the case.

"It was too late. We were ready to go," U.S. Attorney Barbara McQuade said.

Chambers wanted to go to trial to raise doubts about just how powerful the explosive was. And if Abdulmutallab were convicted, there was also a possible appeal involving the lack of a Miranda warning before a crucial FBI interview.

"I know he prayed about it and came to what he believed was the right decision," Chambers said. "I don't think there was anything done (at trial) that made him say, 'This is a done deal. I have to take a plea.' It was a personal decision."

Passenger Lori Haskell of Newport, Mich., watched the plea by video from a room near the court. She called Abdulmutallab's statement "chilling" but not surprising.

"I'm just really relieved that it's done with," she said.

The Amsterdam-to-Detroit flight was just moments from landing when Abdulmutallab tried to detonate the bomb in his pants. It failed to go off, but his clothes caught fire, and passengers jumped on him

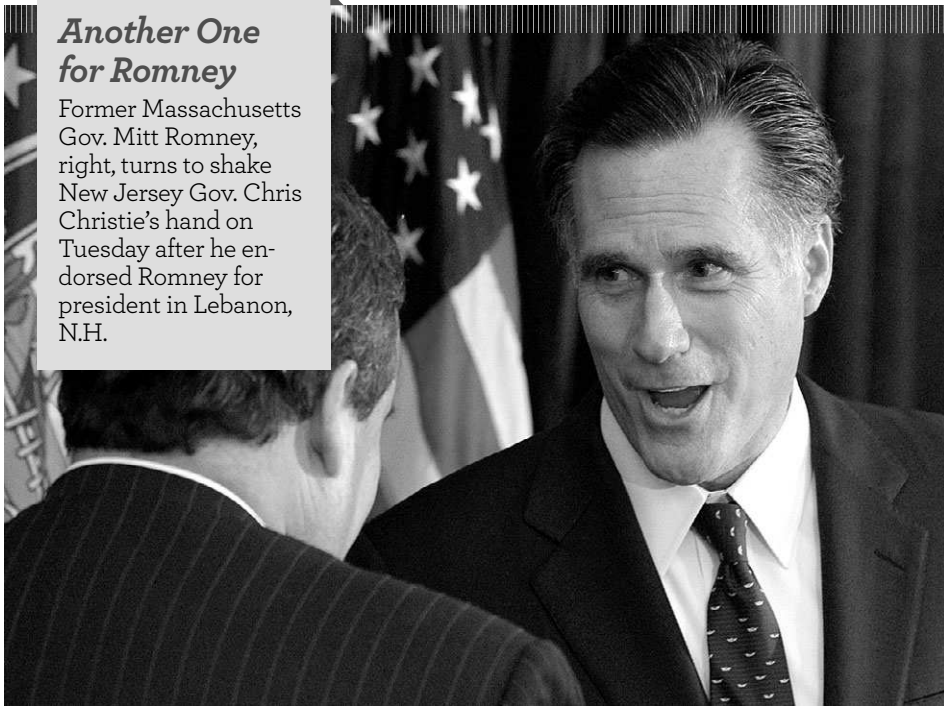

Romney Inevitable? Perry Weighs TV Ads to Slow Him

Perry's advisers say Romney is ripe for sharp criticism of his revised positions on abortion, gay rights and gun control.

WASHINGTON • Mitt Romney seems firmly in command in a Republican presidential field that hasn't figured out how to stop him.

Twelve weeks before the first party voting, the GOP establishment is coalescing around the former Massachusetts governor. He has more campaign experience, money and organization than anyone else. He showed again this week that he's the best debater in the bunch. And President Barack Obama's campaign is treating him almost as the presumptive nominee — even though Romney still faces challenges in some early voting states.

The biggest question in Republican circles is when and how Texas Gov. Rick Perry will use his own substantial campaign funds to buy TV ads hitting Romney's record on health care, abortion, gay rights and job creation.

Perry's campaign, which seems best-positioned to challenge Romney, dropped broad hints Wednesday that the moment is near.

"Now that the field is full, the air war will start soon," said Katon Dawson, former chairman of the South Carolina GOP and Perry's top adviser in the state. "We seem to be inside a 100-day window," Dawson said. "Governor Perry will be extremely competitive on the air."

The tone is different up the coast in New Hampshire. Among rank-and-file Republicans there, even those who favor other candidates have a sense that Romney has gained an air of inevitability. "It's very frustrating," said state Rep. Jim Waddell, of Hampton, who backs former Utah Gov. Jon Huntsman.

Some go even further about Perry's recent drop. "In New Hampshire, he certainly is done," said GOP state Rep. Keith Murphy, who is uncommitted in the race.

Perry's advisers say there's plenty of time to overtake Romney in key states. They are frustrated by bad reviews of the Texan's debate performances, including Tuesday's in New Hampshire. They say it's Romney who is ripe for sharp criticism of his re-

vised positions on abortion, gay rights and gun control, all now markedly more conservative than in the 1990s and early 2000s.

In the debates so far, Perry has generally fallen flat when hitting Romney's "flip-flops" and the health care initiative that required Massachusetts residents to obtain medical insurance. Perry's advisers say aggressive TV ads will do a far more powerful job.

Although Republican and Democratic insiders see Romney as the front-runner, several signs give Perry and the other rivals hope. Most Republican polls show Romney falling well short of a majority of support, as restless voters consider one alternative after another.

Rep. Michele Bachmann of Minnesota surged in mid-summer, then fell as Perry briefly soared. In recent polls, former pizza company executive Herman Cain has ranked as Romney's top rival, although few campaign strategists believe he will be the nominee.

An NBC-Marist College poll in Iowa found that tea party supporters prefer Cain. In national polls, combined support for Cain, Perry and Bachmann exceeds Romney's support.

A Wall Street Journal-NBC News poll of Republican primary voters released Wednesday found Romney and Cain in a dead heat, while Perry dropped to 16 percent. Cain was the first choice of 27 percent of those surveyed, while Romney held firm at 23 percent. The poll had a margin of error of 5.35 percent. The poll was taken Oct. 6-10.

National polls matter less than surveys closer to home in a handful of early voting states, including Iowa, New Hampshire and South Carolina. Many campaign strategists say Perry must win the Iowa caucus, or at least far outdistance Romney there, to survive the New Hampshire primary, where Romney is favored.

The next states to vote will be Nevada, where Romney seems strong, and South Carolina, where Perry hopes evangelical Christians will back him.

The issue of Romney's Mormonism flared at a conservative gathering in Washington last week, and it might be a factor in South Carolina.

Bob Jones III, chancellor

of Bob Jones University, told the Greenville News he's undecided on whether he'll endorse anyone. "There's a vast chasm between what a Mormon believes and what a Christian believes," Jones said. He added, however, "We're really electing a president, not a preacher."

In Iowa, Romney continues an under-the-radar strategy designed to keep expectations low while positioning himself for a possible late surge. Four years ago Romney poured huge sums of money and time into the state, then suffered a crushing loss to Mike Huckabee.

Romney has visited Iowa only twice this year, but he is gradually ramping up his public schedule there. His small but growing staff stays in close touch with his 2008 supporters, and Romney is reaching out to business owners, agriculture workers and the elderly.

Romney seems eager for several of the more conservative candidates to remain viable, to pull support from Perry and possibly open a path for a Romney victory in Iowa with a modest plurality. In Tuesday's debate, when given a chance to ask anyone a question, Romney lobbed a softball to Bachmann, a tea party favorite.

"You've laid out some pretty bold ideas," Romney said, asking about her anti-spending and anti-regulation agenda.

Kevin Meetze of Irmo, S.C., is typical of GOP voters who see Romney as best able to beat Obama.

"I think he's got what to me appear to be practical ideas to address a lot of the issues that we face, particularly financially and in regard with all these other countries that we're having struggles with," said Meetze, who owns a plumbing business.

In a sign of Romney's strength, Obama's chief political adviser, David Axelrod, held a conference call with reporters Wednesday aimed solely at the former Massachusetts governor. In a preview of the flip-flop charges that Perry might raise in TV ads, Axelrod said Romney had shifted his stances on taxes, health care and trade with China.

"If you are willing to change positions on fundamental issues of principle, how can we know what you will do as president?" Axelrod said.

Romney says his changes in positions are based on a genuine evolution of his thoughts, not on political expediency.

Pelosi Filing Shows Loophole in Financial Disclosure Rules

WASHINGTON • A real estate investment by House Democratic leader Nancy Pelosi's husband went undisclosed for years and has opened a window into a loophole that allows House members to avoid specifying some of their financial assets.

In 2010 and 2011, Pelosi voluntarily reported the Sacramento, Calif., land investment as an asset of her multimillionaire husband, Paul. She had not reported the investment for about 10 years previously because it was held by an S corporation her husband had set up, said Nadeam Elshami, a spokesman for the California congresswoman.

Under House financial disclosure rules, lawmakers are not obligated to specify the separate assets of an S corporation — which is a business in which individual investors pay taxes on profits rather than the company.

Pelosi decided in 2010 to voluntarily disclose the investment because the land had become more valuable, Elshami said.

Pelosi first reported in 2010 her husband's investment in Russell Ranch LLC. It was described then as undeveloped residential real estate in Sacramento worth between \$1 million and \$5 million. In 2011, she listed the value between \$5 million to \$25 million.

In 2009, when Nancy Pelosi was the House's speaker, she had vocally promoted the daughter of her husband's business partner in Russell Ranch as U.S. ambassador to Hungary. Elshami said there was no connection between reporting the investment and the ambassadorship. Eleni Tsakopoulos Kounalakis was confirmed by the Senate for the position.

Elshami said Nancy and Paul Pelosi have been friends with the ambassador's family for 25 years.

"The decision was made to list the asset voluntarily and separately for clarity and transparency purposes. It was added to the report because (the value of the land) was a larger amount," he said.

Paul Pelosi had said earlier that he had been a limited partner in Russell Ranch for

more than a dozen years.

"My initial investment was in the \$1 million to \$5 million range," he said. "Recently, the general partner determined that the value of my interest was in excess of \$5 million and that's why it was reported in that category. It's been close to \$5 million for several years."

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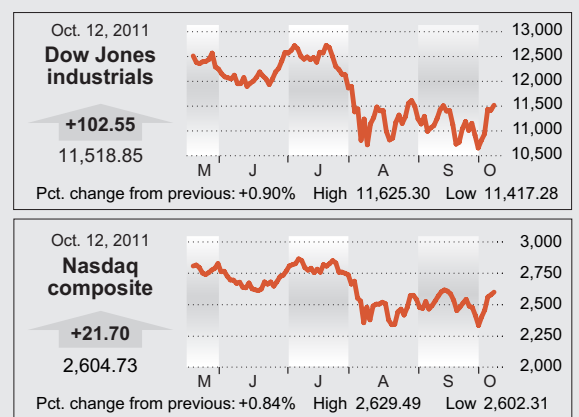

Apple's iMessage Texting Service Takes Aim at Wireless Carriers

Congress Passes Three Free Trade Agreements

WASHINGTON • Congress approved free trade agreements Wednesday with South Korea, Colombia and Panama, ending a four-year drought in the forming of new trade partnerships and giving the White House and Capitol Hill the opportunity to show they can work together to stimulate the economy and put people back to work.

In rapid succession, the House and Senate voted on the three trade pacts, which the administration says could boost exports by \$13 billion and support tens of thousands of American jobs. None of the votes were close, despite opposition from labor groups and other critics of free trade agreements who say they result in job losses and ignore labor rights problems in the partner countries.

“We don’t do much around here that’s bipartisan these days,” said Sen. Rob Portman, R-Ohio, who was U.S. Trade Representative during the George W. Bush administration. “This is an example of where we can come together as Republicans and Democrats realizing that with 14 million Americans out of work, we need to do things to move our economy forward.”

President Barack Obama said passage of the agreements was “a major win for American workers and businesses.”

“Tonight’s vote, with bipartisan support, will significantly boost exports that bear the proud label ‘Made in America,’ support tens of thousands of good-paying American jobs and protect labor rights, the environment and intellectual property. ... I look forward to signing these agreements.”

The agreements would lower or eliminate tariffs that American exporters face in the three countries.

They also take steps to better protect intellectual property and improve access for American investors in those countries. The last free trade agreement completed was with Peru in 2007.

The House also passed and sent to Obama for his signature a bill to extend aid to workers displaced by foreign competition. Obama had demanded that the worker aid bill be part of the trade package.

Years in the making, the votes come just a day after Senate Republicans were unified in rejecting Obama’s \$447 billion jobs creation initiative

The agreement with South Korea, the world’s 13th largest economy, was the biggest such deal since the North American Free Trade Agreement with Mexico and Canada in 1994.

The votes were 278-151 for South Korea, 300-129 for Panama and 262-167 for Colombia. The Senate votes were 83-15 for Korea, 77-22 for Panama and 66-33 for Colombia.

Despite the strong majorities, the debate was not without rancor.

Republicans criticized Obama for taking several years to send the agreements, all signed in the President George W. Bush administration, to Congress for final approval. Many among Obama’s core supporters, including organized labor and Democrats from areas hit hard by foreign competition, were unhappy that the White House was espousing the benefits of free trade.

Lori Wallach, director of Public Citizen’s Global Trade Watch, said the “job-killing” agreements were a “complete flip-flop for President Obama, who won crucial swing states by pledging to overhaul our flawed trade policies.”

In Cartagena, Colombian President Juan Manuel Santos said, “Today is a historic day for relations between Colombia and the United States.” He added that the agreement with his country “is going to generate much well-being for our peoples.”

House Democratic leader Nancy Pelosi said that before taking up free trade agreements the House should be considering legislation passed by the Senate on Tuesday that would punish China for keeping its currency undervalued, a practice that makes its exports cheaper and contributes to China’s huge trade surplus with the United States. House GOP leaders oppose the currency bill and a Democratic attempt to attach it to the Colombia agreement was rejected.

Democratic opposition was particularly strong against the agreement with Colombia, where labor leaders long have faced the threat of violence.

“I find it deeply disturbing that the United States Congress is even considering a free trade agreement with a country that holds the world record for assassinations of trade unionists,” said Rep. Maxine Waters, D-Calif.

To address Democratic objections to the deals, the

White House demanded linking the trade bills to extension of a Kennedy-era program that helps workers displaced by foreign competition with retraining and financial aid. The Senate went along; the House passed it Wednesday, 307-122.

But with the focus in both the White House and Congress on jobs, the trade agreements enjoyed wide bipartisan support.

The administration says the three deals will boost U.S. exports by \$13 billion a year and that just the agreement with South Korea, America’s seventh largest trading partner, will support 70,000 American jobs.

Supporters say the three trading partners already enjoy almost duty-free access to U.S. markets and the agreements will lower tariffs on U.S. goods, making them significantly more competitive.

The U.S. Chamber of Commerce notes that U.S. farm products sold to South Korea face 54 percent tariffs, compared with 9 percent for Korean agricultural goods in the United States, and that U.S. automakers are hit with a 35 percent tariff in Colombia, compared with 2 percent for any vehicles coming from Colombia.

The administration says the trade deal with South Korea could increase exports by \$10 billion, enough to eliminate the current \$10 billion surplus Seoul has with the United States. It would make 95 percent of American consumer and industrial goods duty free within five years.

The vote came a day before Korean President Lee Myung-bak is to address a joint meeting of Congress. On Wednesday he said in a speech at the Chamber of Congress that the agreement would “send a powerful message to the world that the United States and South Korea stand together in rejecting protectionism and that we are open to free and fair trade.”

ARCHERY: TAKING AIM

Archery isn't for just hunters. Some people who've never stalked game like the sport because it's particularly challenging.

It's taken Bryan Krear two decades to become the hunter he is today: skilled, confident, stealthy.

The Twin Falls man is versed in both rifle and archery hunting, but one provides a more satisfying challenge.

"Archery is more of a mental game," he said. "It's about developing confidence in your equipment and ability."

He's not alone. Even people who've never hunted say they like the challenge of archery.

"Archery as a sport is huge," said

Caleb Drake, owner of Advantage Archery in Twin Falls. "A lot more people are getting into it."

Why? People who've shot a rifle and used a bow know the difference: It's more difficult to hit a target with an arrow.

At the Range

The whir of an arrow — and then SLAM! It hit the paper target. It wasn't a bull's-eye, but it was close.

Jonah Ruf, 14, was practicing his archery skills last week, as he does every Thursday at Advantage Archery in Twin Falls. He was at the facility with his two cousins, Nolan Stroup, 16, and

17-year-old Tully Stroup of Twin Falls. The trio were trying out different bows at the shop's 30-yard indoor range. The facility also has a 20-yard range.

Ruf started shooting with a bow a couple of years ago and hasn't yet bagged a game animal. It's not that the Hansen teenager hasn't tried, but he's still learning to judge distance and how to use stealth.

But determining the distance of a target and using the right amount of pressure on the bow are two of the most important things a beginner archer has to learn, his father, Josh Ruf, said in a later interview.

Besides practicing at the indoor shooting range, Jonah Ruf and his dad often go to the South Hills to target practice using water bottles.

These Bows Aren't for Your Hair

Purple bows, pink arrows and flower targets — what would Diana say?

The Roman goddess of the hunt might be impressed with the array of archery gear targeted toward women, or she might be disgusted at the girliness. No matter her opinion, Magic Valley's female archers have plenty of options,

feminine and not, when it comes to shooting.

Caleb Drake, owner of Advantage Archery in Twin Falls, carries gear specifically marketed for women. The bows in particular are built for women's bodies.

"Your primary difference is a woman's bow is going to be lighter, a little more smaller and compact," he said. Most women can't pull back as much weight as men can, so women's bows have a lighter

pull.

The differences extends beyond physical requirements and into accessories, like targets.

"Instead of shooting at red circles they're shooting at flowers and stuff," Drake said.

Colors also set women's gear apart. While some have traditional archery colors and patterns like black, camo and green, others are bright pink and purple.

"The most bright one I've ever

seen is called electric pink," Drake said.

When Jasmine Sharkey of Paul got into archery three years ago, she was immediately drawn to the pink and purple bows. But she started looking at what professional archers use.

"It wasn't the bows for women," she said. Instead, many of them use smaller bows.

"This time I chose the bow the way it shot," Sharkey said.

Not all women use — or can use — the archery equipment marketed for them. Tereasa Guest of Filer uses standard archery gear, mostly because she's tall and women's gear

is too small for her. She prefers bows and gear by Mathews Inc.

Guest digs the color differences — her own bow is lime green and black — because they help set her apart.

Terry Stanger of Kimberly, a 25-year archery veteran, shies away from the pink, but accessorizes with hair feathers that match her gear. She always carries a pink arrow in her quiver for breast cancer awareness, but otherwise shoots with traditional arrows and a lime green-and-black bow (with matching hair feathers, of course).

"We have a lot of fun with it," Stanger said.

Lessons Learned from a Daisy Air Rifle

Thoughts lately have been about my first BB gun. My dad gave it to me for Christmas when I was about 10.

My dad, who loved the outdoors, grew up with guns. Hunting was a way of life for him in the rural backcountry of northeastern Utah. He was a safe hunter and taught me early on how to handle a gun.

"This is not a toy," he said. "You never point this thing at anyone."

I was excited about my new gun — and a little nervous. Because the world was different back then, I'd take my gun to the fields to shoot at soda cans.

One day, I pointed my rifle not at a can but at a meadowlark, not believing I would



actually hit the bird. After all, my Daisy air rifle had a velocity of only 350 fps, not enough power to carry a BB straight for very far.

The BB skipped somewhere near the bird. It hopped away and I moved closer. The second or third shot hit its mark — kinda — and broke the bird's leg. When I saw what I had done — the bird's leg dangling from its body — I started bawling like a baby.

It was my mom who first learned what I had done. She wasn't happy. What if it were a

momma bird that needed to take care of its babies? she scolded. My heart sank even lower.

We found an old bird cage stashed in the garage, and I put a bed of soft towels inside it and found the injured bird. I took care of it for several days afterward — my parents thought it'd help teach me some life lessons.

It did. The bird never recovered and I wound up giving it a memorial service.

I learned that BB guns, even beginner ones like my old Daisy, are not toys. As my dad said, they can put a person's eye out — or take off a bird's leg. But when handled properly they can be a lot of fun. Like when shooting soda cans instead of songbirds.

Steelhead Harvest Opens on Clearwater

Fishing season isn't over in Idaho. Some seasons, like fall steelhead, are just beginning.

The fall steelhead harvest season opens Saturday on the main stem of the Clearwater River upstream of the Memorial Bridge, the South Fork Clearwater River, the North Fork Clearwater River below Dworshak Dam, and the Middle Fork Clearwater River below Clear Creek.

The steelhead harvest season on the lower Clearwater River opened Aug. 1 on a two-mile stretch of the lower Clearwater River from its mouth to the U.S. Highway 12 Memorial Bridge near Lewiston.

The limits on these waters are two per day and six in possession.

The harvest season already is open on the Snake, Salmon and Little Salmon rivers. The limits on these waters are three per day and nine in possession.

The Idaho Department of Fish and

Game expects another good steelhead run this year, but reminds anglers to look for the clipped adipose fin indicating the fish is legal to be kept. Any steelhead that has an unclipped adipose fin must be released unharmed.



Anglers may keep 20 steelhead for the fall season, which ends Dec. 31. Only steelhead with a clipped adipose fin, evidenced by a healed scar, may be kept.

New rules that took effect Aug. 1 allow anglers to transport anadromous salmon and steelhead without the head and tail attached, but only under a number of conditions.

Seven Years After Its Expiration Date, This Mars Orbiter is Still Going Strong

Once upon a time, the running joke in the space exploration business was that Mars was cursed.

While scientists and engineers are famously rational people, they might be forgiven for any superstitious prejudices about the Red Planet: Out of 38 Mars missions launched since 1960, fully half have failed. Some crashed back to earth after failing to reach escape velocity, some crashed into Mars or burned up in its atmosphere, and some simply stopped communicating en route (possibly having exploded in space), never to be heard from again.

These days the Mars curse joke is passé, thanks to several wildly successful Mars missions. While the Opportunity rover — still leaving tracks in Martian sand seven years after landing — has grabbed most of the headlines, the Mars Odyssey orbiter is the longest-lived Mars probe ever.

Mars Odyssey — an homage to Arthur C. Clarke's "2001: A Space Odyssey" — launched in April 2001 and arrived in Martian orbit 10 years ago this month.

At the end of its primary mission three years later, it was still returning images and data, so NASA OK'd an extended mission, still under way today. The orbiter carries three instruments: A visible/infrared camera, a gamma-ray spectrometer (that senses the composition of surface materials via the gamma rays they emit after ra-

dioactive decay or bombardment by cosmic rays), and a radiation detector (which stopped working in 2003 after being zapped by a strong solar flare).

Space doesn't allow a listing of all the discoveries Mars Odyssey has delivered in its first decade, but I'll mention my favorite: Lava tubes on Mars, similar to those found right here in the Snake River Plain (although much larger, due to Mars's weaker gravity). As protected environments, they might well be the best places to look for Martian life.

In Pursuit of Bass and a Diploma

When Brandon Madison enrolled at the University of Iowa in Iowa City he had no idea his shot at a higher education would entail anything more than pursuit of his accounting degree.

Bass fishing was the farthest thing from his mind. Then he learned about Iowa's bass fishing team.

"It was during orientation when a lady approached me about the clubs and organizations available on campus," he says. "She said her favorite club was the fishing team."

Brandon had heard about collegiate fishing, but "I hadn't really thought much about it."

He fired off an email to the club president and got invited to the first meeting.

Now, as he is entering his junior year this fall, his accounting goal is within reach and bass fishing also has become a big part of his college experience. In fact, he and fellow student James Steffen, Argyle, Iowa, have qualified for an FLW Central Division college bass tournament in October on Lake KinKaid at Carbondale, Ill.

"We had a blast fishing the FLW tournament on the Detroit River July 16," he says. "We weighed 12 pounds, 13-ounces of bass to finish in seventh place out of 40 college teams. We were only a few ounces away from fifth place."

That's a big step from Iowa farm ponds where Brandon honed his bass fishing skills.

"I've fished since I was a little kid," he says. "We had a family farm pond near Bronson, Iowa, where I fished largemouth bass and crappies. You can catch everything on a number two Mepps. I learned that there."

Family vacations also took him to a variety of Minnesota lakes including Ottertail and Leech. And there were trips to Canada.

His uncles Chris and Kevin Wilmes, Sioux City, and grandfathers Mike Wilmes and Jerry Madison cultivated his fishing and hunting interests as he was growing up.

"My true obsession is hunting whitetails and turkeys," he says. "I fished summers because it was one of the things you do. But after my experiences in the club, I have learned I really love going to tournaments."

So, when it comes to putting bass in the boat, what are Brandon's favorite techniques.

"I love frog fishing," he says. "It's exciting and it's topwater. I like Texas rigging because I am successful with it. It is a very versatile method of fishing. You can fish it weightless or weedless or many other ways. Early spring to late fall, it will still get bites."

What about the old reliable number two Mepps?

"A lot of people laugh at that old lure," he says. "But it has its place. It will catch a lot of fish."

It's a major step from farm ponds to the massive southern reservoirs and river systems where Brandon and his college fishing team members find themselves competing.

"Farm ponds are a lot easier," he says. "It's easy to find fish. Big bodies of water are fished a lot harder and are a lot harder to fish."

But the bass anglers of the University of Iowa are more than holding their own in the college division. Last year they ranked 14th and this year they are currently ranked 36th out of 206 schools.

Archers Turn Passion for Hunting Into Successful TV Series

KANSAS CITY, Mo. • For Mike Hunsucker and Shawn Luchtel, the ultimate is no longer merely shooting a trophy deer with their bows.

It's hitting a monstrous whitetail while the video camera is rolling.

For Hunsucker and Luchtel, longtime friends from the Kansas City area, that's the burning desire just about every time they slip into the woods these days.

From the days when they would just go out and experiment with videotaping a hunt, they have developed a popular national television show called "Heartland Bowhunter."

During the series, seen on the Sportsman Channel, they and six other crew members take turns in front of the camera, bow hunting near and far.

The "near" part? Some of the footage is shot not far from their backyards.

They both still have fond memories of an opening-day hunt in 2010 when they chased a Jackson County buck that they knew quite well.

"That buck was 4 years old when Shawn shot him, but we had been watching him since he was 2," said Hunsucker, 25, of Lee's Summit, Mo. "We had nu-

merous photos of him on trail cameras, and we knew his routine."

"The deer were coming through this fence opening at just about the same time every day, and we set up near there."

Luchtel sat in a tree stand, while Hunsucker handled the camera. Despite a thunderstorm moving in, the big buck showed up on schedule, Luchtel drew back on his bow and hit his target with an arrow.

All as the camera was rolling.

"We got some real good footage of that hunt," said Luchtel, 25. "That buck was a nontypical that scored 173 — a big one to catch on video."

Hunsucker and Luchtel travel the country looking for similar moments. They have built a strong business model through innovative work. They didn't want the average run-of-the-mill television show on hunting.

They wanted something different. Through different devises they have come up with to allow for unusual camera angles, good editing, and an assortment of on-air personalities, they have accomplished that.

In 2010, "Heartland Bowhunter" was awarded the Best Hunting Show award in the Sportsman Choice Awards competition.

"We can't believe how fast this has developed," Luchtel said of the show, now in its fourth year. "Not long ago, we'd go out for fun and film hunts when we were in high school. Now this has developed into a full-time job for Mike and me. It's unbelievable."

Hunsucker and Luchtel take pride in the fact their show relies on Kansas City-area talent. Their crew members include

Skyler Wirsig of Lee's Summit; Clayton Campbell of Pittsburg, Kan.; Matt, Scott and Nick White of Little River, Kan.; and Ty Easley of Oak Grove. Their production company, Mammoth Media, also is based in the Kansas City area.

And the real stars of the show, big whitetail bucks ... well, they also reside not far from where the television show is based.

For hunting, there's another skill archers have to master, which Jonah Ruf also is still learning: stealth. Bowhunters have to be more quiet than rifle hunters because they have to get closer to their prey. The payoff is a close-and-personal view of an unalarmed animal.

Types of Bows

Nolan Stroup methodically took aim at the paper target inside Advantage Archery and released the tension on the bow.

He missed, but that didn't discourage him from putting another arrow on the line. He's new to archery but already knows what kind of bow he likes best.

"I like the recurve," he said. "It feels better. There's more of an accomplishment using it."

The other bows he tried were a compound and long bow. Most people whom Drake know in the area use compound bows. But if you want something more challenging, he said, go with the recurve or the long bow.

"The long bow is about as traditional as you can get," he said, noting that the recurve is more modern but traditional-looking.

Compound bows have a pulley or "cam" that make pulling the string easier. These bows are popular with women and youth, said Kimberly resident Terry Stanger. But even some adult male hunters like them.

When the string is pulled on a compound bow, the limbs of the bow are pulled inward. The energy supplied to pull the string is stored in the limbs and released only when you let go of the string.

"When you draw it back it might have a little bit of a hard pull, but ... it eases up," she said. "The kinetic energy released off the bow is unbelievable."

Stanger's been shooting for about 25 years and likes to color coordinate her outfit with the bow she's using at the time. She owns several compound bows which can even hold a scope.

Safety First

It takes new archers a while to develop confidence in their ability to use a bow, Stanger said. A good thing to help you out is joining a club, where area archers come together for target practice and competitive shoots.

"Confidence plays a big factor," she said, and so does safety. It is something

"I always make sure they're facing the target before they draw the string back," Stanger said. Like a gun, you never aim the bow at anything you don't intend to shoot.

Don't be discouraged if you can't hit your target

less strength than the more traditional recurve and long styles. Cost for a decent bow ranges from around \$400 to more than \$2,000, Drake said. Compound bows come in a variety of shapes, sizes, colors and levels of sophistication.

Unlike guns, which get their power from cartridges, bows get their power from the shooter. Select a bow with the appropriate draw length, depending on your age and physical characteristics.

right away, she said. It takes a lot of practice and patience to become good at archery.

Drake echoed the sentiment.

"I don't like to say that archery isn't for everyone because I believe it is," he said, "but it takes a lot of patience. ... A bow is a simple weapon but hard to shoot. You can spend hours shooting one day, but the next day you feel like you're back to square one."

River Hunters Show a Zeal for Teal, Wood Ducks

PRAIRIE DU CHIEN, Wis. • Dawn came to the great river in a windless hush, the low sky brushed with muted pink and orange.

As light filled the backwater, a gray, cottony mass drifted overhead, obscuring the tops of the bluffs. Mist settled into the slough.

Mother Nature is a master at balance. As we sat in the damp stillness, the slate-colored sky came alive.

Flock after flock of waterfowl streaked over the horizon, wings ripping air as the birds banked and flared.

The first couple groups were blue-winged teal — tiny, feathered torpedoes that blew through by the dozen.

They were joined by flights of wood ducks, in twos and fours, their rapid wing beats matched with whistling calls.

The season hadn't yet opened, but we had early confirmation — ducks were in good number.

Together with five other hunters and two dogs, I opened the 2011 Wisconsin duck hunting season on Pool 10 of the Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and Fish Refuge.

Mike Pettit, piloted boat No. 1. Pat Kalmerton and I joined Pettit. Our canine companion for the day was Sadie, a 7-year-old Labrador retriever owned by Ryan Kossman.

Kossman had to tend to family obligations Saturday morning but didn't want to keep Sadie from her favorite activity.

The other boat included Dean Crom, Mike Thun, Eric Mathes, and Lucky, Crom's 6-year-old Lab.

We met at Campion Landing at 6 a.m. and discussed our plan for the day.

Pettit, who was born and raised in a hunting family in Prairie du Chien and knows the river as well as any man his age, suggested we motor south to an area called Gerndt Lake.

The backwaters had produced good hatches of wood ducks, mallards and teal this year, Pettit said, and

most were still holding in the area.

His plan was met with wide approval and a few jabs.

"Are you going to run out of gas?" asked Kalmerton, as we loaded gear. "Or is this the year you forget to put the drain plug in?"

The dogs paced excitedly at the sight of gun cases and decoys. They had enough notches on their collars to know — a new season was at hand.

In fact, no dog or hunter had experienced such an opener. Last Saturday was the first day of duck hunting in the newly created Mississippi River Zone.

After decades of duck hunting regulations that split the state into North and South zones, Wisconsin adopted a third zone this fall.

The Mississippi Zone covers a narrow slice along the river, south of Highway 10 and west of the Burlington Northern Santa Fe railroad tracks. It may be the smallest of the three zones geographically, but per square mile it's the most heavily used by ducks and duck hunters.

The boats powered off and slalomed through the dim backwaters. We passed massive beaver lodges and smaller muskrat huts, islands capped with willow and silver maple, and expansive mud flats.

"She's come down," said Pettit, noting the river level. "Wouldn't want to see it any lower this time of year?"

Pettit's 18-foot jon boat was fitted with a short-tailed mud motor. Never was the power source's name more apt. Or needed.

The river was at flood stage earlier in the year. Now, in the give-and-take of land and water, the water was yielding. But it wouldn't be exactly right to say the land was winning.

The most common feature of the sloughs was an amalgam of liquid and solid, a molasses-like mud that threatened to suck the boots off your feet.

We settled the boats about 600 yards apart in a corner of the slough and placed vegetation around the hulls.

HOME-GROWN BUSINESS HAS HUNTERS HOOKED

HARTLAND TOWNSHIP, Mich. • Deer Crack kills. Once dispersed, deer herd to it like moths to a flame, and Deer Crack creator Tom Parshall said a standard 4.4-pound package — which re-tails at about \$6 — will attract deer for a good part of the whole Michigan hunting season.

The precise formulation and balance of 13 minerals is to the deer what crack is for humans, Parshall said, thus the aggressive product name.

If he's boasting, it's only because he can back it up.

The product Parshall began formulating in 1995 in his grandfather's barn — "with two shovels, a wheelbarrow and \$79," Parshall said — is now sold in countless Michigan gas stations and general stores, and even sporting goods retail giant Dunham's Sports.

In fact, Parshall and business partner Rich Owens — who make up Deer Crack LLC — sell Deer Crack to retailers in 46 states.

The duo still make Deer

Crack in the same old Hartland Township barn, but now they make a whole lot more of it: several batches, each one weighing in at nine tons.

"Initially, hunting-supply stores laughed us out of their places with our product," Parshall said.

But they aren't laughing anymore.

"So we went on a marketing attack, targeting gas stations, because we know hunters a lot of times go to gas stations before they hunt," Parshall said. "We couldn't make it fast enough."

Now, everyone wants it, he

said, and the reason is primarily its resounding results.

With Michigan's archery deer season in full swing, Parshall has noticed a 10 percent growth in business, a growth he mostly attributes to the state lifting the baiting ban it had imposed since 2008.

Parshall said the ban, imposed to reduce the spread of chronic wasting disease, was "shameful." It cost his company in the realm of \$500,000 over three years,

with some hunters fearing tickets from the Department of Natural Resources over that period despite controversy over whether the product was actually bait or not.

Frank Kameny, Pioneering Gay Activist, Dies at 86

WASHINGTON (AP) • Frank Kameny was out and proud before people knew what being "gay" meant.

Fired from his job as a government astronomer in 1957 for being gay, he refused to go away quietly. Instead, he got louder. He took his case to the Supreme Court in 1961 and helped stage the first gay rights march in front of the White House and Philadelphia's Independence Hall in 1965.

Kameny died Tuesday at 86, leaving a 50-year legacy as an advocate who chipped away at countless other barriers for gay people in America. Kameny served as the initial protester, leader and legal strategist of what would become a movement, one historian said.

"Frank Kameny was the Rosa Parks and the Martin Luther King and the Thurgood Marshall of the gay rights movement," Yale Law Professor William Eskridge told The Associated Press in May when Kameny's papers became part of a Library of Congress exhibit on U.S. constitutional history.

"Frank never accumulated a nest egg or a retirement fund or any of that," Eskridge said Wednesday after learning of Kameny's death. "His full-time occupation was activism."

In recent years, Kameny

saw changes in society that he never thought possible. Gay marriage became legal in a handful of states, including his adopted city of Washington. In 2009 he stood in the Oval Office as President Barack Obama signed a directive extending benefits to same-sex partners of federal employees. Most recently he celebrated the repeal of the military's Don't Ask, Don't Tell policy.

"Being gay has become infinitely better than it was," he said in May.

Kameny was proud of his work toward gaining equality for gays and lesbians. When his petition to the Supreme Court was put on display at the Library of Congress, he was clearly tickled.

"I suppose you can say at this point, I have become one of the creators of the United States," he told the AP, echoing the exhibit title "Creating the United States."

Gay rights groups said it was Kameny's work that helped make life better for gay Americans and called him a pioneer and an inspiration. He had been in poor health and died on what is celebrated as National Coming Out Day, when many gay people celebrate coming out and encourage others to have the courage to do the same.

More Harm Than Good?

Prostate Testing's Dark Side: Men Who Were Harmed by Treatment

Terry Dyroff's PSA blood test led to a prostate biopsy that didn't find cancer but gave him a life-threatening infection.

In the emergency room several days later, "I didn't sit, I just laid on the floor, I felt so bad," said Dyroff, 65, a retired professor from Silver Spring, Md. "I honestly thought I might be dying."

Donald Weaver was a healthy 74-year-old Kansas farmer until doctors went looking for prostate cancer. A PSA test led to a biopsy and surgery, then a heart attack, organ failure and a coma. His grief-stricken wife took him off life support.

"He died of unnecessary preventive medicine," said his nephew, Dr. Jay Siwek, vice chairman of family medicine at Georgetown University. "Blood tests can kill you."

Since Friday, when a task force of independent scientists said routine PSA testing does more harm than good, urologists who make a living treating prostate cancer have rushed to defend the test, as have patients who believe it saved their lives.

Less visible are men who have been harmed by testing, as Dyroff and Weaver were. The harm is not so much from the test itself but from everything it triggers — biopsies that usually are false alarms, and treatments that leave many men incontinent or impotent for cancers that in most cases were not a threat.

Once a PSA test suggests a problem, many men can't live with the worry that they might have cancer. And once cancer is found, most men feel they have to treat it, usually at the urging of their urologist.

"There are many men who have had serious consequences from treatment. Those stories don't get told and they are not uncommon," said Dr. Len Lichtenfeld, deputy chief medical officer of the American Cancer Society, which thinks the task force reached "an appropriate conclusion" about the PSA test.

"I'm not going to criticize men who believe that their lives have been saved by this test," because that's what doctors have told them, Lichtenfeld said. "If you're sitting there and you wet your pants three times a day, you've got to believe it's worth it, that it saved your life."

Many men who agree to a PSA test do not understand what it is. Some common misconceptions:

- **It shows cancer.** In fact, PSA is just a measure of inflammation, and it can be elevated for many reasons besides cancer: normal enlargement of the prostate with age, an infection, even recent sex, a strenuous bike ride or horseback riding.

- **It's been proven to save lives.** Only two large, well-done studies have looked at this, the task force says. The American study found annual screening did not lower the chances of dying of prostate cancer. However, cancer fear is so great, and belief in the value of screening so ingrained, that half the men assigned to the group not offered PSA tests got one anyway. That made comparisons to the group given annual screening difficult. For that reason, some doctors don't believe the study's conclusion.

The other study, conducted in Europe, found a small benefit for certain age groups screened every two to seven years — not annually. However, one Swedish center had such rosy results that scientists think it may have biased the whole study. If that center is excluded, no benefit from the PSA test is seen.

- **The task force's stance goes against past advice.** Routine PSA testing has been supported by some advocacy groups and by urologists, the doctors who do the tests and treatments. But it has not been pushed by major scientific groups, the American Cancer Society or the government.

- **It finds cancer early so you're more likely to survive.** About 90 percent of prostate cancers found through screening are early-stage. Most will grow so slowly they will never

threaten a man's life, but there's no good way to tell which ones will. Research suggests that tumors causing symptoms are more likely to warrant treatment than those that are not. Also, finding aggressive prostate tumors early may not affect how lethal they prove to be; the PSA test may just let men learn of them sooner than they otherwise would.

The task force said that in the European study, the rate of overdiagnosis from PSA screening — finding cancers that do not need to be treated — was estimated to be as high as 50 percent. Based on that study, 1,410 men would have to be screened, and 48 patients would have to be treated, just to save one life from prostate cancer.

Yet the public perception is that if PSA testing finds a cancer early, it must be good.

"Most people tend to think 'if it may help, I'm all for it.' But we don't know if it will help," said Siwek, the Georgetown doctor whose uncle died.

Once a PSA test suggests a problem, "it's hard to stop the conveyor belt or the cascade effect" that leads to more testing and treatment, said Siwek, who also is editor of the journal American Family Physician. "The inclination is, 'I've got to do something about it.'"

Dyroff, the retired professor, agreed to a biopsy after a blip in his PSA. Days later, he ran a high fever, felt weak and faint, and spent three days in the hospital fighting a bloodstream infection. A week later he relapsed and required a combination of intravenous antibiotics to finally recover.

A recent Johns Hopkins University study found surprisingly high rates of hos-

pitalization after prostate biopsies and a 12-fold greater risk of death in those who develop infections.

Tony Masraff, a Houston restaurant owner, reluctantly agreed to a biopsy and then was diagnosed with prostate cancer in 1999. His urologist pushed surgery and balked when Masraff asked about other options such as radiation. After some research, Masraff decided just to monitor his tumor, and has seen his PSA rise very slowly over more than a decade.

Now 74, he hasn't had treatment "and I never will," he said. "I'm not concerned because I don't want the debilitating effects — I don't want to wear a diaper, and I like women."

Cutthroats Rally Past Cress-Fallen Buhl

BUHL • Despite losing the possession battle, Buhl looked well on its way to reclaiming the Class 3A District IV girls soccer championship.

One incident just before half-time changed everything.

The Community School blitzed Buhl for five goals after the Indians saw goalkeeper Chelsea Cress ejected, paving the way for the trophy to stay in Sun Valley after a 5-2 win on Wednesday.

Hannah Dies bagged a second-half hat trick, while Ellie Swanson and Hayley Murach also scored for the Community School, which advances to next week's state tournament in Caldwell.

"We were getting a lot of chances and we couldn't score,

and I started getting worried that maybe it wasn't going to go in for us," said Dies. "But this gives us a big esteem boost for state, and it's great for us to get some time off because we've got a lot of players with little injuries."

The Cutthroats controlled the opening moments of the game, creating a number of chances but finding themselves unable to stick the ball in the net. That frustration was compounded when Skyler Barger netted on Buhl's first real thrust of the game after 27 minutes, and Tyana Weaver followed that up 11 minutes later with a penalty kick to double the Indians' advantage.

But then came the pivotal mo-

ment, when Cress raced from her box and attempted a sliding challenge on a Cutthroat forward who would otherwise have been clean through on goal. The two collided hard just outside the penalty area, the ball flying from the scene, and the referee didn't hesitate in producing the red card.

"We've really struggled to solve that goalkeeper," said Community School coach Kelly Feldman. "I thought the call was fair, but it was certainly a break for us. We might not have won without it because (Cress) is so good."

Buhl saw out the first half but its resistance was finally broken in the 53rd minute when Dies scored her first on a breakthrough. Four minutes later she struck again to tie it, and right on 60 minutes Swanson provided the winner. Dies and Murach added

to Buhl's misery late on.

"The call is obvious, that we can't question, but the immediate consequence and the gravity of the situation is what we have trouble with," said Buhl coach Araceli Perez Huicochea, who felt Cress was maybe guilty of a foul but not an ejection offense. "It's hard to defend for that long with one player down. If we stay at 11, I believe we're the district champions."

Buhl (12-2-3) hosts Bliss today for the district's second automatic berth to the state tournament. The loser faces the daunting task of beating District III's runner-up Saturday in a play-in to make it.

The Cutthroats (13-4-1) open up state tournament play next Thursday against the District I-II runner-up.

In NBA Dispute, It's All About Caps not Cash

NEW YORK • NBA owners apparently weren't bluffing when they said they wanted competitive balance just as much as a chance to profit.

Though Commissioner David Stern and Deputy Commissioner Adam Silver have insisted throughout the lock-out they needed the potential for both in a new collective bargaining agreement, there was often a belief — even from players — that money mattered most.

Yet it was the salary cap system, not the division of revenues, that emerged as the biggest obstacle to a new labor deal in time to save the start of the regular season.

"The numbers are close enough that that wasn't going to doom the season. The hard salary cap is what's going to doom the season right now," players' attorney Jeffrey Kessler said Monday. "That's the sticking point, because the numbers are close enough that if there

was a fair system, the parties would find a way to get there."

That's not what union president Derek Fisher had predicted less than a month earlier.

Talks had broken down after a meeting in September in which players were prepared to make a new economic proposal, but the league said players conditioned it on owners conceding on the salary cap.

It was clear the union believed management was prioritizing the financial picture when Fisher said afterward that "if we can address these economics, we're not going to lose the season over the system. So that's something that's been clear from the beginning and will remain from our perspective."

The split was never settled, but both sides say they see where compromise could be reached. Players had proposed lowering their guarantee of basketball revenues from 57 percent down to 53, which they said would transfer

Money Never An Issue When Firing Coaches

There wasn't any real need for it, no matter how much Arizona was embarrassed by losing to woeful Oregon State.

The Wildcats weren't going to be in the Rose Bowl, or any other bowl. The season was already lost when university officials decided that head coach Mike Stoops had to go.

Besides, who fires college coaches in the middle of the season, before first quarter grades are even in?

But fire him Arizona did, declaring the Stoops era over in Tucson after 10 straight losses to FBS schools.

It was all done in a very civilized manner, of course. Statements issued by both sides, platitudes flying everywhere. Just to keep everyone happy, there was even a special parting gift of \$1.4 million.

The money wasn't a problem, though it never seems to be in big-time college athletics. Arizona will soon be collecting another \$15 million or so a year under a new Pac-12 Conference television deal, giving it plenty of money to pay off Stoops and enough for a lucrative contract for the man who will take his place.

"If you're going to play in the big leagues, you have to do what you have to do," university President Eugene Sander said.

That should make a lot of would-be coaches happy. New television deals and conference realignments across the country mean millions more will flow into those football programs, and some of the dough will go to boosting coaching salaries beyond even their current astronomical levels.

It should also make them very

Theo Epstein Embarking on Mission Impossible With Chicago Cubs

CHICAGO • To understand why Theo Epstein would leave his one-time fantasy job — he grew up in Brookline, Mass., about a mile from Fenway Park — you first have to probe the psyche of big thinkers and dreamers.

When Epstein became the youngest general manager in baseball history at age 28 years 11 months, his father Leslie told the Boston Globe:

“It’s a little dizzying, that’s a good word. But at Theo’s age, Alexander the Great was already general manager of the world.”

Indeed he was. And he also was undefeated in battle as he conquered what then was considered the whole world.

Now Theo Epstein — if reports are correct — attempts to conquer the baseball world. Ten years after cracking the seemingly impossible Curse of the Bambino in Boston, he takes on the arguably more challenging task of crushing the Curse of the Billy Goat.

To overcome both would make Epstein the baseball equivalent of Alexander the Great — the smartest and greatest general manager in history.

Epstein comes from a family of motivated doers who expect and reward imagination and accomplishment. His grandfather, Phillip and twin brother Julius wrote the screenplay for “Casablanca.” His father was a Rhodes scholar.

Cub fans will argue it will take all Theo Epstein’s creativity to win a World Series at Wrigley Field — and maybe more. After all, the Boston drought lasted “only” 86 years, the one on Chicago’s North Side has existed for 103.

It is the baseball Everest. But then Hannibal drove his elephants over the Alps, didn’t he?

If Epstein is looking for history lessons on the Cubs, he already has done research in Boston.

The situations are so similar it is eerie.

But cures for curses, believed or imaginary, are like fighting an unseen enemy. Perception becomes reality, until proven otherwise.

Over the last century, Cub management teams variably have ignored the so-called Curse or embraced it with holy water and parading a goat around Wrigley Field.

Now they confront it head-on with Epstein, who already has shattered one baseball myth with his mastery of baseball math known as sabermetrics.

It took him two years with the Red Sox to win a World Series and three years to win again, raising expectations to a level that even he couldn’t maintain.

So what will he find when talking to fans at the nearest Wrigleyville Starbucks?

That they are great

doubters, to the point of being inbred from generations of failure. And that many Cubs fans, in fact, have cuddled up to the notion of being “loveable losers.”

It is not unlike what Epstein found in Boston, except this time he comes with a “genius” label already attached.

Attaining genius status sometimes is easier than maintaining it, as he discovered when his star began to fade in Boston.

Some will complain Epstein became complacent and soft from a bloated payroll, so perhaps the challenge of a new Curse will rekindle his creative juices.

Truth is, that while the pressure in Chicago will be nearly overwhelming, it is nothing compared to his first days as general manager in Boston.

Back then, he was returning to his hometown, a city that in the summer lives and dies with only one topic — the Red Sox. There is no second storyline. Even a big Bruins trade would be a third or fourth news item.

Chicago has two baseball teams and, while White Sox fans may not believe it, they are treated mostly equal, especially now that the South Siders have ended their own championship drought (one that actually lasted longer than Boston’s, but without the hype).

He will be entering the blue-collar, big-shoulders, hog-butcher-to-the-world environment that will be foreign, certainly one completely different from provincial New England thinking where Epstein’s Yale degree was considered a pedigree.

Yes, he will be taking over a team that hasn’t won in decades, in an outdated ballpark, with a built-in fan base and new ownership committed to winning — just like in Boston.

But he also will discover it is not as easy as bringing his Boston blueprints along and building an exact replica from them.

Chicago is different and so are the ballpark and the circumstances — and the lower inherited talent level.

They play a lot of day games in Chicago, some say too few and a growing number say too many as the debate over players’ body clocks thrives.

Chicago has Wrigley Field, perhaps as charming to outsiders as Fenway Park is. But it also is crammed, badly in need of expansion to keep up with baseball’s big markets in a recessionary economic environment.

Chicago has a mayor and aldermen and neighbors — not to mention a White Sox fan as governor in a near-bankrupt state — to contend with, not all of them as unified in their love as officials might be in a one-team city.

And yet, the baseball business model is the same — you win with talent. And now we will see how much talent Epstein really has.

Bullpen Helps Cards Edge Brewers

Fernando Salas, Lance Lynn, Marc Rzepczynski and Jason Motte shut down the Brewers to close out the victory. Motte, who had two saves lasting more than an inning in September, got four outs for this save and fanned pinch hitter Casey McGehee to end it.

Carpenter won his seventh postseason game to tie Bob Gibson’s franchise record, but with none of the brilliance of his three-hit shutout over Roy Halladay and the favored Phillies in the deciding game of the division series. He lasted only five innings, with nearly half of his 89 pitches for balls.

The starters’ ineffectiveness was surprising consid-

more than \$1 billion to owners over six years. But in doing so, they expected something in return.

“I think where our paths separate is that they believe to the extent they’re willing to make economic concessions that we should be willing to leave the current system largely intact, and our view is that the current system is broken in that 30 teams are not in a position to compete for championships,” Silver said Monday after the league canceled the first two weeks of the regular season.

Next week, the sides will use the same federal media-

tor who tried to resolve the NFL’s labor dispute months before it eventually ended.

George Cohen, director of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, announced Wednesday that he will oversee negotiations starting next Tuesday in New York.

Cohen said he already has been in contact with representatives of both sides “for a number of months.”

“I have participated in separate, informal, off-the-record discussions with the principals representing the NBA and the NBPA concerning the status of their collective bargaining negotiations,” Cohen said in a statement issued by the Washington-based FMCS.

“It is evident that the ongoing dispute will result in a serious impact, not only upon the parties directly involved, but also, of major concern, on interstate commerce — i.e., the employers and working men and women who provide services related to the basketball games, and, more generally, on the economy of every city in which those games are scheduled to be played.”

The league’s view is that teams willing to keep spending above the luxury tax level have an advantage over teams with payroll constraints. And indeed, teams such as the Lakers and Mavericks, who won the last three NBA titles, are annually among the top spenders.

So owners want a system under which teams with means can’t keep blowing off the cap. Their initial proposal was for a hard salary cap like the NFL has, removing the exceptions that NBA teams possess to spend above the cap.

Players rejected that and the league has since focused on strengthening the luxury tax to deter spenders. But players believe it would become so restrictive, saying in some cases the current \$1 for every \$1 over the threshold penalty would become \$6 or higher, that it would act as a hard cap. And the sides are also clashing over the Bird exception, which allows teams to exceed the cap to resign their own free agents.

nervous — that other schools may follow Arizona’s lead and not think twice about canning a coach in midseason rather than waiting until the end of it, when they’re usually fired.

“People criticize coaches for their lack of loyalty or whatever, but look at what’s happens to him,” Nebraska coach Bo Pelini said. “Loyalty goes both ways you know.”

Not anymore it doesn’t. Sure, every game was always important in a sport where

only a dozen or so are played each season. But now there’s a chance every game could be a coach’s last.

That’s the price you pay in the big leagues. Coaches know that if they don’t get results, management will bring in someone else who can.

It was never supposed to be this way in college athletics, where student-athletes toil for books and board while everyone around them seems to be getting rich. Back in the day when the captain of the team was named Biff, everyone wore letter sweaters and the coach helped with the team

laundry, loyalty really was a two-say street.

Now coaches recruit more players than they will need, and don’t think twice about sending them packing if they don’t fit in. Always a free minor-league training ground for the NFL, college football looks more professional every day.

Except, of course, the players don’t get paid.

Coaches do, though. Win a national title and you’re set for life, as Auburn’s Gene Chizik discovered when he signed a new deal during the offseason that could be worth up to \$4.5 million a year. That put Chizik in the

upper stratosphere of coaches, along with the likes of Mack Brown of Texas (\$5 million a year) and Nick Saban of Alabama (\$4.7 million).

The new coach at Arizona probably won’t get that much, but it’s safe TV money will help get him something north of \$3 million with some incentives. That might prove attractive to someone like Chris Petersen, who now labors for \$1.5 million a year at Boise State, just above the \$1.24 million the NCAA said was the median pay for FBS head coaches in 2009.

Whoever is hired will

head to Arizona knowing that the window of opportunity for winning will narrow even more with a big salary. By firing Stoops now — even after a 1-5 start — Arizona made it clear that the rules have changed when it comes to winning.

That’s probably what promoted Bob Stoops — the Oklahoma coach who happens to be Mike’s brother — to warn coaches to be careful about the job they choose “or you’ll end up like my brother.”

Not that Mike Stoops will be applying for food stamps anytime soon. His contract not only paid him hand-

somely, but he’s leaving with another \$1.4 million to tide him over until he gets his next job.

That could come at Oklahoma, where he coached with his brother before getting the head job at Arizona. Bob Stoops, whose team is undefeated and ranked No. 3 in the country, said earlier this week that just might happen.

“Sure. I mean, if I’ve got enough money to,” Brother Bob said.

Consider it a done deal. Because, among the elite in college football these days, money is never a problem.

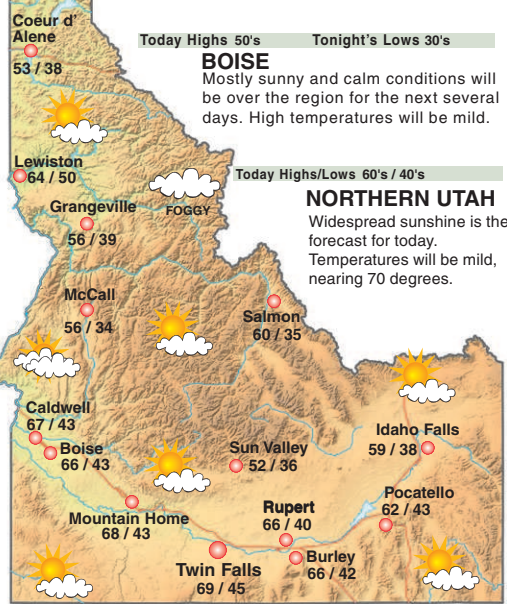

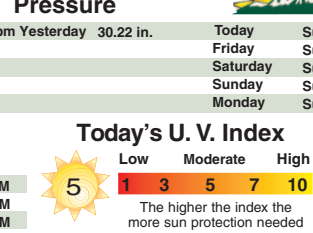

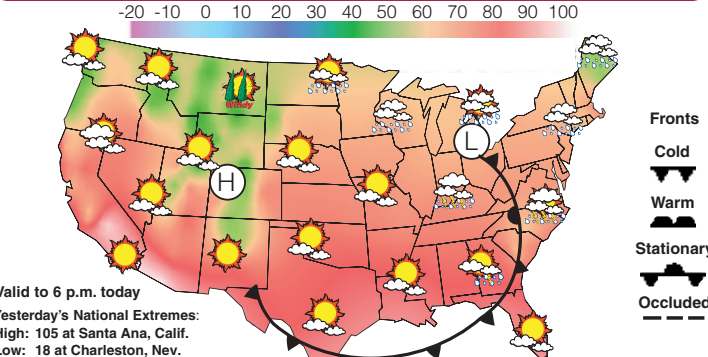

Tiger Grateful To Have Spot In His Own Tournament

LOS ANGELES — Tiger Woods is awfully happy he could announce his own name in the field of the Chevron World Challenge. Woods expressed gratitude to the tournament committee Tuesday after squeaking into the event he hosts. His world ranking barely stayed in the top 50 last month, just high enough to qualify for an exemption, and he'll be at Sherwood Country Club in seven weeks

for the final event of his so-far winless season. After a brutal two-year stretch of personal turmoil and reinvention, Woods appears eager to continue his climb back from his latest low. Woods has dropped from No. 49 to 52 since clinching a spot the Chevron field, and he finished tied for 30th last week in Northern California in the Frys.com Open, his first tournament in nearly two months. "I had (rankings) points rolling off from '09," Woods

said at a news conference in Hollywood. "I had a very good year that year. I won, what, seven times around the world, so all those points are coming off. Unfortunately, I fell quite a bit, and I fell fast. Good news is, by playing next year, I have no points coming off, so I can start rebuilding." Rebuilding is the theme of Woods' life these days as he moves forward from injuries to his left knee and Achilles tendon, along with the disintegration of his marriage and public image. He plans

to play a full schedule in 2012, but he'll play in the Australian Open and the Presidents Cup in the next few weeks before returning to his native California for the Chevron tournament. "I'm really looking forward to going down to Australia and playing because now I have that feeling of playing again, not just hitting ball after ball after ball on the range," Woods said. Woods will join an Ameri-

can-heavy Chevron field of 18 in Thousand Oaks, including Steve Stricker, Jason Day, Matt Kuchar, Nick Watney and PGA Championship winner Keegan Bradley. FedEx Cup champion Bill Haas also received an exemption. Woods has won the tournament four times, but lost in a playoff last year after Graeme McDowell rallied from four strokes back in the final round. Although he blew a late lead, Woods re-

mains proud of his performance while he was still rebuilding his swing with coach Sean Foley. "I had one golf shot only, and that was it," Woods said. "That was going to be a draw. I couldn't hit a fade. What we were working on at the time limited me to only hitting one golf shot. I'm like, 'OK, well, how am I supposed to play this week? I'm going to have to rely on my putter.' So I hit the ball well."

Surging Ravens Host Battered Texans

While the Baltimore Ravens were getting healthier during their bye week, the Houston Texans were ravaged even more by injury. When the Texans head into Baltimore on Sunday, their two best players almost certainly won't be with them. Hardly the formula for an upset. The Texans lost star receiver Andre Johnson before last week's game against Oakland with a right hamstring injury. Then Mario Williams, the outstanding defensive end making an encouraging adjustment to linebacker in Wade Phillips' system, damaged a chest muscle in the loss to the Raiders and is gone for the season. Suddenly, the heavy favorite in the AFC South no longer seems such a cinch to win that division. DERBY WINNER DUTROW BANNED IN N.Y.

NEW YORK • Kentucky Derby-winning trainer Richard Dutrow Jr. had his license revoked and was barred from racing in New York for 10 years by the state's Racing and Wagering Board on Wednesday. In its ruling, the board cited Dutrow's long history of rules infractions, including numerous medication violations. Dutrow won the Derby and the Preakness with Big Brown in 2008 before the colt was pulled up and finished last in the Belmont Stakes in his bid to win the Triple Crown. "New York's racing industry has no place or patience for Mr. Dutrow," board chairman John Sabini said in a statement. "His repeated violations and disregard of the rules of racing has eroded confidence in the betting public and caused an embarrassment throughout the industry. "In order to ensure integrity and honesty in the sport of kings in New York, the Board acted appropriately in barring Mr. Dutrow from participating. His self-described 'game' in New York horse racing is over. We will not permit individuals who cheat and sully New York's world-class racing product." Over the summer, the board's hearing officer had recommended Dutrow be barred for life following three days of hearings. The suspension is effective Oct. 18, but Dutrow's lawyer Michael Koenig filed a motion seeking to stay the ruling. The appeal is expected to be heard Monday.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO, ESTABLISHING SPEED LIMITS FOR MOTOR VEHICLES IN CERTAIN RESIDENTIAL, URBAN OR BUSINESS AREAS OF THE CITY OF JEROME; ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Idaho Code §49-207(2) authorizes authorities of local jurisdictions to set a speed limit lower than 35 miles per hour in a residential, business or urban area on the basis of an engineering or traffic investigation, and

WHEREAS, Idaho Code §49-207(3) permits cities to adopt speed limits not in excess of 65 miles per hour for motor vehicles on arterial highways on the basis of an engineering or traffic investigation, and

WHEREAS, after an investigation by city officials, including a professional engineer and employees of the City of Jerome, it has been determined that certain areas of the City of Jerome constitute residential, business or urban districts, inclusive of school zones, wherein 20 or 25 mile per hour speed limits are necessary for the promotion of the safety and well being of the citizens of the City of Jerome and other persons traveling on those public streets and byways, and that a 45 or 55 mile per hour speed limit on portion of some arterial highways may be appropriate, and that on the remaining streets and roads within the City, or portion thereof, a speed limit of 25 miles per hour would be appropriate and provide for the best public safety, and

WHEREAS, the adoption of those speed limits is in the best interest of the citizens of the City of Jerome and would permit their safety and general welfare.

BE IT THEREFORE ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME as follows:

Section 1: A maximum speed limit of 20 miles per hour for motor vehicles traveling upon the following streets or portions of streets within the City of Jerome, Idaho is hereby established:

DEAR PLANNING AHEAD: All families are different, and it's a credit to yours that you're thinking ahead regarding some of the difficult aspects related to donation. This subject can sometimes be fraught with the potential for perceived coercion. It can be offset by NOT framing it as a "request" from one family member, but as a general family discussion about the loved one's health situation.

Among the issues that should be raised: What does it mean for your younger son to have this rare kidney disease? What's the survival rate for an adolescent who receives a living donor transplant? What is involved in the donation process?

These questions should be raised as a family in conversation with a physician or other members of the kidney care team. Family members can then talk about how they feel about the issue, NOT as a response to a direct question. This provides a chance for better education about the condition as well as the process, and reduces fear.

The decision to be a living donor is a voluntary one and should be entered into free of pressure. Some people may not want to take the risk – and their rights should be respected. The evaluation process is very thorough. It's designed to minimize risk and also can uncover unexpected conditions in the potential donor that are important.

The National Kidney Foundation provides information on its website regarding this subject. Visit kidney.org to learn more.

DEAR ABBY: I share a small office space with a co-worker, "Tammy," who is going through a nasty divorce. At first I tried to be supportive and listen to her problems, but now I think it was a mistake. I now dread going to work because I know I'll have to listen to a litany of complaints as soon as I walk through the door.

I have tried to encourage Tammy to talk to a priest or a psychologist, but she refuses because she's embarrassed. Is it time to inform our manager? I don't want to get Tammy in trouble, but I feel I'm incapable of giving her the kind of support she seems to need. I'm not sure how much longer I can take this. Please help.

DEAR WELL-INTENTIONED: Summon up the courage to tell Tammy that although you care about her, you can no longer listen to her problems because it's distracting you from your responsibilities at work. 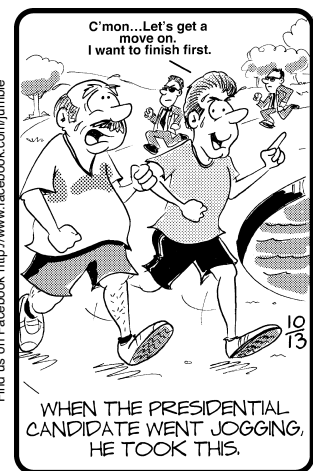

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THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

In today's deal from the Philadelphia world championships last year, two talented female players were in a delicate game contract -- one that required not only a good view or two, but also some help from the defense.

At both tables, against four hearts doubled, West unluckily led the spade king, squashing her partner's 10. At the first table, declarer, Sheri Winestock, won with her ace and played a diamond to dummy's ace. The next trick went heart four, three, two, and a discard, a play that ties a record. Declarer drew trump with the aid of another finesse, then conceded two spades and one diamond.

Note, though, that as the play went, if East had been less frugal with his hearts, playing the jack or king at trick three, he would have defeated the contract. Declarer would have won and played a second diamond, but West could have won, cashed two spades, and given East a spade ruff.

At our second table West also led the spade king against four hearts doubled. Heather Bakhshi also won the ace and led a low diamond, but here, when West instinctively followed low, Bakhshi made the key play of dummy's eight, ducking it into the hand that could not cash the spade winners before she was ready. East won and returned a diamond to dummy's ace. Bakhshi led the heart 10 and ran it, and now could pick up the trumps without loss, ruff a diamond in dummy, and concede just two spade tricks for a tremendous plus 790.

ANSWER: Your hand falls inconveniently between a pre-emptive raise and a limit raise. It is not really that close to either action, is it? Some people deal with this problem by setting aside a two-club call in this sequence as artificial, suggesting a constructive spade raise, though that is typically a three-trump raise. Others use a jump in the other major to show four trumps and 6-9 HCP, which would be ideal here.

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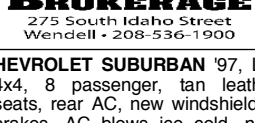

Nine Years for Rupert Woman on Federal Meth Charge

A Rupert woman will serve nine years in prison on a charge of trying to distribute more than a pound of meth.

Leaha Annette Rivera, 42, was sentenced Tuesday in Boise after pleading guilty to conspiracy to distribute 500 grams or more of metham-

phetamine, according to a press release by U.S. Attorney Wendy J. Olson. She pleaded guilty to the charge on June 27.

Rivera was fined \$1,000 and will serve three years of supervised release after her prison term is completed. She admitted to conspiring with Rigaberto Moreno Sanchez, 33, of Rupert, and two others

to distribute the drugs between Sept. 1 and Dec. 15 of last year. Sanchez was sentenced in September 2010 to 14 years in prison on related charges.

Both were stopped in Victorville, Calif., and found with 442.5 grams of meth.

A jury trial for two other defendants is set for Dec. 6 at the federal courthouse in Boise. The case was investigated by the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration and the Boise Police Department.
