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## Despite Pest Progress, Black Flies Still Hang Around

Greg Garatea used to wear mosquito netting when he irrigated. But it wasn't mos quitoes the Murtaugh area himself against - it was black flies.
Clouds of black flies, also known as Buffalo gnats, swarm around people and torment grazing livestock. The problem used to begin as
soon as farmers started irrigating in the spring and lasted until a hard frost. But since the Twin Falls County Pest Abatement District began controlling black fly larvae over the winters, the population doesn't become
problematic untill later in the season.
Garatea, a member of the pest abatement district, was able to graze his light calves along the river until the midTle of September this year. that's about a month longer
sures to control stable flies or
house flies have no effect on the black flies.
"You have to control them at the larval stage," Garatea
That's what Manager Kirk Tubbs and the staff of the pest abatement district do. Last year, Tubbs and his crews identified areas in canals and laterals where the black fly larvae were most
prevalent and treated those prevalent and treated those water dried up. They went back in January and February to treat the egg stage. That meant a lower adult population was present early when warm temperatures finally arrived this spring. But
the wet spring also meant the wet spring also meant usual, and they remained high all summer.
Larvae anchor themselves to rocks or vegetation in moving water and let the water bring them food. Depending on water tempera-
ture and food, they can de-

## TW0 MORE S.E. IDAH0 FIELDS INFECTED WITH POTATO PEST

DAHO FALLS (AP) •Two new infestations of a microscopic wormlike pest that attacks potato plants have Idaho, state and federal agriculture officials say. Lloyd Knight of the Idaho Department of Agriculture said that both infestations of the potato cyst nematode
are in the Shelley area. Department spokeswoman Pam Juker said the infestations were found in August and September. The most recent discoveries follow the report last spring of anther infected field. The nematodes were initially discovered in Bingh "None of those original infected fields that were taken out of production in 2006 have been released for production,"' Knight told the ost Register.
The nematodes feed at the roots of potato plants duction by 80 percent. Officials say the pest is not harmful to humans and doesn't have any effect on he potatoes themselves. Tor the U.S. Department of Agriculture's potato cyst nematode programin Idaho Falls, declined to identify he landowners of the most recently infected fields.

ance premiums would ance premiums would ernment subsidies. Impossible, the administration found.
Premiums would be high, at least $\$ 235$ a month and perhaps as much as sign up, and those who did would be very sick Huge deficits would eventually emerge. Maybe CLASS supporters cynically hoped the administration would justify artificially low premiums. Govern-
ment would then have to cover the ultimate shortfalls or throw thousands of elderly into the streets. The administration wisely rejected that path. Writing in The New Relman says that "4the does very little or nothing to address some of the most important causes of the high cost of care and its rapid inflation." Note: Relman isn't a conservative crank. He's a critic of advocates a single-payer government-run health-
care system.
The ACA, Relman writes, doesn't alter fee-for-service reimbursement that gives "all physicians strong financial inservices than needed." The resulting "fragmentation of medical care ... allows specialists to practice in isolation without restraints on cost, causes duplication and disorgan-
ization of services, and discourages the use of pis mary care physicians." Relman also dismisse "accountable care organizations" (ACOs) that sup-

posedly save money posedly save money
through coordinated care by doctors and hospitals. The regulations governing
ACOs will be so compliACOs will be so complicated that there won't be many of them, he writes. "Restructuring the delivery of medical care" is
essential, Relman says. H essential, Relman says. He
takes hope in the growth of multi-specialty groups that include both primary doctors and specialists. Nearly 200,000 doctors, about a quarter of practic-
ing physicians, now ing physicians, now be
long to these groups, he says. On paper, they can better control costs by limiting duplication, fostering cooperation and eliminating wasteful serv ices. But this isn't likely as long as fee
prevails.

from common premises Limiting health-care spending requires explicit ceilings on the dollars put into the system; and changing incentives for doctors and hospitals will create a superior delivery

bating ideas like these, because overhauling the health-care system is important in its own right and for controlling feder al spending. Instead, the ACA skews the agenda. Many of its promises rest,
