## Idaho Looks a Little Less Country, More Suburban

**BOISE** • How will Idaho's legislative politics look after redistricting concluded this week? A little less country, a little more suburban, as the state's power base continues its shift to more populous areas from its agrarian roots.

The sprawling metropolis

along U.S. Interstate 84 from Caldwell to Boise picked up three new legislative districts, while those vast open spaces in Idaho's sparsely populated interior, its southern desert and remote southeast shed clout because they either shed population or grew at a snail's pace.

Sorry, liberal Boise, this transition won't mirror neighboring Washington and Oregon, whose

densely populated coastal plains have resulted in Democratic-leaning legislatures. Idaho's new landscape clearly indicates the drama inside the Capitol will increasingly be directed by Republican lawmakers from places like Kuna and Eagle, Meridian and Nampa.

"Generally, we think of the suburbs as less conservative than the rural areas," said Gary

Moncrief, a Boise State University political science professor. "But I don't think that equation holds in Idaho. It has a pretty solidified Republican dimension."

Population changes require new maps every decade, to preserve one-person, one-vote principles that reflect Idaho's latest U.S. Census tally.

## Bring in the Parents? Here's a Bonus

**In the first year of education reform, some local teachers' merit pay hinges on how well they can engage with parents.**

It's fall parent-teacher conference time and for some Magic Valley schools, there's an added incentive to get parents involved.

At Wendell High School, teachers will receive merit bonuses based on the percentage of parents who show up for the conferences.

Under a package of education reform

bills passed earlier this year by the Legislature, school districts were required to develop their own pay-for-performance plans.

Teacher bonuses, which will be distributed for the first time in 2012, can be based on a variety of factors, such as test scores and average daily attendance rates. Both district and state goals must be met.

Wendell Superintendent Greg Lowe said his district decided to base teacher

bonuses on parent participation in high school conferences because it's been a problem in the past.

"They have really struggled to get parent involvement at parent-teacher conferences," he said.

To prepare for the conferences earlier this month, an automated phone message went out to remind parents.

Up to 70 percent of the possible

## CROWDED FIELD FOR KIMBERLY ELECTIONS

The 2011 redistricting effort was delayed by lawsuits, while this latest edition required two redistricting commissions to complete the work; the first bogged down in a partisan stalemate after 92 days.

Secretary of State Ben Ysursa said Wednesday he's heard of no lawsuits brewing against the 2011 plans — so far. But he won't discount the possibility.

In all, 33 of 105 total state representatives and senators were "redistricted out" — either forced to face incumbents in 2012 or resign.

Seven Idaho House districts feature potential incumbent battles in 2012, with five in the Senate. Most victims are Republicans, simply because the Idaho Legislature is four-fifths GOP; even prominent lawmakers like House Speaker Lawrence Denney, Majority Leader Mike Moyle and Majority Caucus Chairman Ken Roberts got lumped in.

On Thursday, four-term GOP Sen. Joyce Broadsword from Sagle announced she'll retire in 2012, rather than face Sandpoint Republican Sen. Shawn Keough.

No hard feelings, Broadsword said.

"I have huge respect for the redistricting committee," she said. "No matter

who is working on it, it's a tough job."

Dolores Crow, a Republican, and Democrat Ron Beitelspacher, who led 2011's second three-Democrat, three-Republican redistricting panel, said both sides' commitment to ignore partisan politics and incumbency was key to the unanimous agreement after just three weeks.

"I don't have a clue where any of these legislators live," Beitelspacher said. "I have no clue what their addresses are."

Not everybody is buying that, however.

Lou Esposito, a Republican member of the first commission who was a fierce defender of GOP interests, contends the second panel's 6-0 vote shows Republican panelists should have held out for more.

"The Democrats were looking at where incumbents were, they got everything they wanted, and so they voted accordingly," said Esposito, a campaign consultant for U.S. Rep. Raul Labrador, R-Idaho.

Other Republicans were more forgiving, including state GOP executive director Jonathan Parker.

Parker doesn't think Democrats deserve equal representation on the redistricting panel because of their meager Legislature numbers. That's why the party is considering whether to ask lawmakers

to initiate reforms next year. Still, Parker is ready to accept what the 2011 panel's decision.

"The fact that they did get a 6-0 vote and reached an agreement, I think there was a lot of compromise on both sides," he said. "Idaho is a conservative state, the Republican Party is the party of conservative ideals and at the end of the day, we'll be successful. I'm not all that worried about it."

Minority Democrats, an endangered Idaho species at just 20 legislators, said they did as well as could be expected given the state's steady march right over the last decade as newcomers among the now-1.5 million residents embrace Idaho's conservative traditions.

They'll hold their own in

urban Boise and Pocatello, though unsettled territory includes southeastern Idaho, where conservative Oneida County joined a Bannock County district. And eastern Boise's new District 18, which has swung back and forth between parties, includes an even broader swath of rural Ada County.

"With one or two minor tweaks, I'd say it's the best thing that can be expected under the circumstances," said George Moses, Esposito's chief Democratic antagonist on the first redistricting panel.

Democratic Party Chairman Larry Grant also said the congressional map, where the border between Idaho's 1st and 2nd congressional districts shifted to the west in

Boise, carries challenges and opportunities. The loss of urban voters in the 1st Congressional District could mean Democrats will struggle to regain the U.S. House seat Labrador wrested from former Congressman Walt Minnick in 2010.

But Grant suggests more Boise residents in the 2nd Congressional District could help sway an election there, especially if U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson, a moderate Republican, is beaten by a conservative rival in the newly closed GOP primary.

"The Republicans would help us out by nominating another nut case," Grant said. "A closed Republican primary is going to make a big difference to some of those folks."

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# Despite Pest Progress, Black Flies Still Hang Around

Greg Garatea used to wear mosquito netting when he irrigated. But it wasn't mosquitoes the Murtaugh area rancher was trying to protect himself against — it was black flies.

Clouds of black flies, also known as Buffalo gnats, swarm around people and torment grazing livestock. The problem used to begin as soon as farmers started irrigating in the spring and lasted until a hard frost. But since the Twin Falls County Pest Abatement District began controlling black fly larvae over the winters, the population doesn't become problematic until later in the season.

Garatea, a member of the pest abatement district, was able to graze his light calves along the river until the middle of September this year. That's about a month longer than he usually can. Mea-

sures to control stable flies or house flies have no effect on the black flies.

"You have to control them at the larval stage," Garatea said.

That's what Manager Kirk Tubbs and the staff of the pest abatement district do. Last year, Tubbs and his crews identified areas in canals and laterals where the black fly larvae were most prevalent and treated those areas in November, after the water dried up. They went back in January and February to treat the egg stage.

That meant a lower adult population was present early when warm temperatures finally arrived this spring. But the wet spring also meant river levels were higher than usual, and they remained high all summer.

Larvae anchor themselves to rocks or vegetation in moving water and let the water bring them food. Depending on water temperature and food, they can de-

velop into an adult in as little as a week, Tubbs said. He has identified particularly productive stretches of the Snake River in which a million black flies per mile are developing every day.

He has treated some of those sections of river later in the summer when water levels are lower, but the higher flows this year made treating the river cost-prohibitive. The district has spent \$180,000 controlling black flies this year.

Higher water levels coupled with the abnormally warm temperatures in September and early October have allowed the population to continue to build. That's generated calls about why black flies are worse this year than ever.

Actually, data Tubbs collected from traps show the black fly population is lower this year compared to previous years. The difference now is the season has lasted longer.

Because each female can lay up to 200 eggs, the population increases exponentially. Twin Falls is the only county in south-central Idaho that treats black fly so as populations build in neighboring counties, the flies — which can travel 20 to 30 miles — migrate into the county.

Tubbs knows there are areas within the county where black fly populations have become troublesome. He would like to treat the larvae in those areas again this fall, but isn't sure he will be able to. He is waiting for a new federal permit to be approved so that he can apply a natural bacterial product called Bti (Bacillus thuringiensis v. israelensis) to the water.

"People don't notice when they don't have black flies around, but they do notice when they have them," Tubbs said. "But this is as good as control can get unless we go to a Magic Valley-wide control program."

# TWO MORE S.E. IDAHO FIELDS INFECTED WITH POTATO PEST

**IDAHO FALLS (AP)** • Two new infestations of a microscopic wormlike pest that attacks potato plants have been discovered in eastern Idaho, state and federal agriculture officials say.

Lloyd Knight of the Idaho Department of Agriculture said that both infestations of the potato cyst nematode are in the Shelley area. Department spokeswoman Pam Juker said the infestations were found in August and September. The most recent discoveries follow the report last spring of another infected field.

The nematodes were initially discovered in Bingham County in April 2006.

"None of those original infected fields that were taken out of production in 2006 have been released for production," Knight told the *Post Register*.

The nematodes feed at the roots of potato plants and can reduce crop production by 80 percent. Officials say the pest is not harmful to humans and doesn't have any effect on the potatoes themselves.

Tina Gresham, director for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's potato cyst nematode program in Idaho Falls, declined to identify the landowners of the most recently infected fields.

She said workers have been taking soil samples from fields that are being

sent to the University of Idaho lab for analysis. She said wet weather stopped work, but recent dry weather has allowed sampling to resume.

She said U.S. Department of Agriculture considers about 1,500 acres infected, and another 15,500 acres are being regulated because it's possible soil from infected fields might have been transferred. Knight said the agency is still trying to determine the extent of the infestation.

"We're still trying to deal with those associated acres and get those acres narrowed down," Knight said.

Officials say it's unclear how the nematodes entered the state. Experts say nematodes are typically transported on contaminated soil, one possibility being on farm equipment that moves from field to field. But nematodes can also be transported on workers shoes or clothing. Workers in the regulated or infested fields in eastern Idaho are required to clean their boots and pants before leaving a field.

Knight said it's unclear when the fields that are infested or regulated might be returned to potato production.

"We're still finding some of those infested acres," Knight said, "but we're making progress on the associated acres."

# 7.2 QUAKE IN TURKEY KILLS 138

The death toll is expected to rise as rescue teams sift through the rubble of pancaked buildings in eastern Turkey.

**ANKARA, Turkey** • Cries of panic and horror filled the air as a 7.2-magnitude earthquake struck eastern Turkey, killing at least 138 people as buildings pancaked and crumpled into rubble. The death

toll was expected to rise as rescuers sifted through the rubble and reached outlying villages.

Tens of thousands fled into the streets running, screaming or trying to reach relatives on cell phones as apartment and office buildings cracked or collapsed. As the full extent of the damage became clear, survivors dug in with

shovels or even their bare hands, desperately trying to rescue the trapped and the injured.

“There are many people under the rubble,” Veysel Keser, the mayor of the district of Celebibag, told NTV. “People are in agony. We can hear their screams for help.”

Celebibag is near the hardest-hit area: Ercis, an eastern city of 75,000 close to the Iranian border and on one of Turkey’s most

earthquake-prone zones. The bustling city of Van, about 55 miles south of Ercis, also sustained substantial damage. Highways in the area caved in. The temblor struck at 4:41 a.m. MDT, the U.S. Geological Survey said.

Prime Minister Recep Tayyip Erdogan said at least 93 people were killed in Van, 45 others died in Ercis, and about 350 were injured. Several people were still trapped under rubble, he said,

without citing any estimates.

Erdogan said rescue work would continue through the night.

Up to 80 buildings collapsed in Ercis, including a dormitory, and 10 buildings collapsed in Van, the Turkish Red Crescent said. The sheer number of collapsed buildings gave rise to fears that the death toll could rise substantially.

## Costly Iraq War Could Mark Shift in U.S. Approach

**BALI, Indonesia** • In the final days of the U.S. war in Iraq, the outlook for America’s military entanglements is markedly different from the confusing, convulsive first days.

Early on Iraq looked, to many, like one in a string of big conflicts in a “war on terror.”

That was the view of John Abizaid when the now-retired Army general led U.S. forces in Iraq in 2003-04. At a U.S. base in northern Iraq one day in early 2004, Abizaid told soldiers preparing to return home that he hoped they would remain in uniform and keep building combat experience.

Asked by an Associated Press reporter why he had made that pitch, Abizaid said, “I think the country is going to face more of these (ground wars) in the years ahead.”

That was a widely accepted, and often dreaded, view at the time.

Now, with the last American troops set to depart by year’s end, Iraq seems more likely to signal an end to such long and enormously costly undertakings in the name of preventing another terrorist attack on U.S. soil — at least under the administration of President Barack Obama. He opposed the Iraq war and has declared that “the tides of war are receding.”

With Obama also pledging to end the U.S. combat role in Afghanistan within three years, the military’s focus is turning to places such as Yemen and Somalia.

There, the approach is different. Aerial drones, proxy forces and small teams of U.S. commandos are the preferred formula for containing the Islamic extremists who would plot terrorist attacks against the U.S.

Libya, too, has so far been a case for limited U.S. military intervention. The U.S. cleared the sky ahead of a NATO-led air campaign to protect civilians without putting any troops on the ground.

It took about eight months and cost

## LIBYA DECLARED FREE, BUT GADHAFI DEATH QUESTIONED

**TRIPOLI, Libya** • Libya’s interim rulers declared the country liberated on Sunday after an 8-month civil war, launching the oil-rich nation on what is meant to be a two-year transition to democracy. But they laid out plans with an Islamist tone that could rattle their Western backers.

The joyful ceremony formally marking the end of Moammar Gadhafi’s 42-year tyranny was also clouded by mounting pressure from the leaders of the NATO campaign that helped secure victory to investigate whether Gadhafi, dragged wounded but alive out of a drainage ditch last week, was then executed by his captors.

The circumstances of Gadhafi’s death remain unclear. In separate accounts late Sunday, two Libyan fighters said Gadhafi was hurt after being captured, but was able to stand. One said that when he and others placed Gadhafi in an ambulance, the former Libyan leader had not yet suffered what Libya’s chief pathologist said was a fatal gunshot to the head.

Critics said the gruesome spectacle of

his blood-streaked body laid out as a trophy for a third day of public viewing in a commercial freezer tests the new leadership’s commitment to the rule of law.

Britain’s defense secretary, Philip Hammond, said the Libyan revolutionaries’ image had been “a little bit stained” by Gadhafi’s violent death. Both he and U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton said a full investigation is necessary.

Gadhafi’s capture and the fall of his hometown of Sirte, the last loyalist stronghold, set the stage for the

## Officials: Solider Kills Deputy, Then Self in Ga.

**ATLANTA** • A National Guardsman who appeared to be drunk and firing gunshots at passing cars shot and killed a sheriff’s deputy, then committed suicide on a Georgia road, authorities said Sunday.

Evidence shows Spc. Christopher Michael Hodges, 26, fired 35 rounds from his M4 semiautomatic rifle, Richmond County Sheriff’s Capt. Scott Gay said. Hodges and Deputy James D. Paugh, 47, were found dead on the side of Bobby Jones Expressway after 1 a.m. Sunday.

Hodges served in the Tennessee National Guard but was on temporary duty at Fort Gordon in eastern Georgia for training, said Buz Yarnell, a spokesman for the military post. Yarnell said he was not aware of any problems with Hodges before the shooting

and he would not say if Hodges had previously been deployed in combat.

Sheriff Ronnie Strength told *The Augusta Chronicle* that Paugh was off duty and on his way home when he saw a suspicious car on the side of the road. He was shot several times when he stopped to check on the car and apparently fired two shots from his service weapon before he was killed.

“He was just checking that car. He pulled over his motorcycle and didn’t even get to put the kickstand down before the suspect began firing on him,” the sheriff said.

An autopsy is scheduled for Monday in Atlanta. Yarnell declined to release more information on Hodges until the investigation is complete.

The sheriff’s department said Paugh had been with the department for 17 years and was an avid motorcycle

Douceur was evacuated

two months after she began experiencing vision, language and memory problems while working at the National Science Foundation’s South Pole research station. Doctors believe she had a stroke, though she’s expected to recover almost completely with proper treatment.

She has said she should be in Baltimore until Thursday and doesn’t know when she’ll return to Seabrook, a coastal town 40 miles southeast of Concord.

## Obamacare's Broken Promises

Hard times continue for the Affordable Care Act (aka Obamacare). The administration has scrapped the law's long-term care insurance program, covering nursing homes and home health care. The program was deemed unrealistic. This is a harbinger. As the law is implemented — assuming the Supreme Court doesn't declare it unconstitutional or Republicans don't repeal it — disappointments will mount.

Nursing homes are expensive; typical costs can run up to \$80,000 per patient annually. Home health care averages almost \$22,000. The ACA mandated that the long-term insurance, called CLASS (for Community Living Assistance Services and Supports), be self-sustaining. Private insurance premiums would cover costs without government subsidies. Impossible, the administration found.

Premiums would be high, at least \$235 a month and perhaps as much as \$3,000. People wouldn't sign up, and those who did would be very sick. Huge deficits would eventually emerge. Maybe CLASS supporters cynically hoped the administration would justify artificially low premiums. Government would then have to cover the ultimate shortfalls or throw thousands of elderly into the streets. The administration wisely rejected that path.

Writing in *The New York Review of Books*, Relman says that "the law does very little or nothing to address some of the most important causes of the high cost of care and its rapid inflation." Note: Relman isn't a conservative crank. He's a critic of insurance companies and advocates a single-payer, government-run health-care system.

The ACA, Relman writes, doesn't alter fee-for-service reimbursement that gives "all physicians strong financial incentives to provide more services than needed." The resulting "fragmentation of medical care ... allows specialists to practice in isolation without restraints on cost, causes duplication and disorganization of services, and discourages the use of primary care physicians."

Relman also dismisses "accountable care organizations" (ACOs) that sup-

posedly save money through coordinated care by doctors and hospitals. The regulations governing ACOs will be so complicated that there won't be many of them, he writes. "Restructuring the delivery of medical care" is essential, Relman says. He takes hope in the growth of multi-specialty groups that include both primary doctors and specialists. Nearly 200,000 doctors, about a quarter of practicing physicians, now belong to these groups, he says. On paper, they can better control costs by limiting duplication, fostering cooperation and eliminating wasteful services. But this isn't likely as long as fee-for-service prevails.

Something needs to force change. Republicans have a strategy. Rep. Paul Ryan would convert Medicare into a voucher system. Medicare beneficiaries would receive a fixed amount and would shop for the most appealing health plan that their money would buy.

Relman's solution is not entirely dissimilar. He would replace fee-for-service with an annual per-patient payment to doctors who would be responsible for the patient's "comprehensive care." Both Ryan's voucher and Relman's lump sum are what health experts call "capitation" or "global payments." The big difference is that Relman would have government administer the payments directly, with attendant regulations.

Despite profound differences, both these radical proposals proceed from common premises: Limiting health-care spending requires explicit ceilings on the dollars put into the system; and changing incentives for doctors and hospitals will create a superior delivery system. We should be debating ideas like these, because overhauling the health-care system is important in its own right and for controlling federal spending. Instead, the ACA skews the agenda. Many of its promises rest, like CLASS, on unrealistic assumptions. Disappointments loom, and the needed debate is deferred.

## Vitamins may be less than magic

Supplements are big business; Americans buy more than \$20 billion worth annually. But most of us have little evidence of whether they help, hurt or make no difference at all.

And what we don't know about supplements can hurt us. An American study to see whether vitamin E prevents prostate cancer discovered that, instead, it raises the risk of this disease. A Finnish

study, meanwhile, has found that some supplements, particularly iron, are associated with an increased risk of death in older women.

If these new results make you think twice before taking supplements without a doctor's advice, that's just fine. As Jaakko Mursu, a co-author of the Finnish study, wrote in the *Archives of Internal Medicine*: "We see little justification for the general and

widespread use of dietary supplements."

It would be nice to think that there's a magic pill, readily available in any shopping center, that will give us the gift of better health and longer life. And some supplements really are beneficial.

But for the most part, health and longevity are associated with eating right, exercising, shunning tobacco, drinking only a little, staying busy and

connected to others, and getting adequate sleep. It helps to pick the right parents, of course, since genes matter a great deal as well.

As it turns out, "moderation in all things" is better advice than "take your vitamins," for the latter, we now know, are best consumed with a grain of salt.

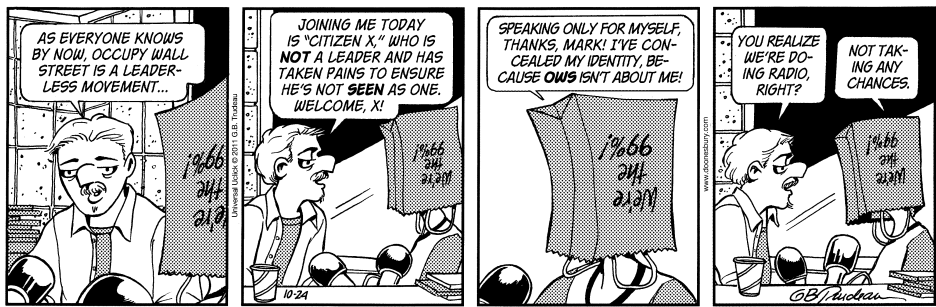

the U.S. about \$1.1 billion to achieve the Libyan rebels' goal of toppling Col. Moammar Gadhafi.

The potential for bigger conflicts persists in places such as Pakistan, whose growing arsenal of nuclear weapons sets it apart from other potential hot spots.

Iran is a major worry, too, in light of its suspected drive to build a nuclear bomb and its proclaimed goal of wiping out Israel. But a U.S. invasion of Iran, on a scale like Iraq, seems highly unlikely for now.

There are other troublesome security challenges facing the U.S., including in Asia where China is expanding its military and asserting its influence.

But the Obama approach — not unique, but distinctive in comparison to that of his predecessor, George W. Bush — is to try to prevent festering security problems from growing into full-blown crises.

The U.S. military can play a role in those cases without being called on to invade and depose a government.

Robert Gates captured this idea in a speech last winter to Army cadets at the U.S. Military Academy in which he said it would be unwise to ever fight another war like Iraq or Afghanistan.

"In my opinion, any future defense secretary who advises the president to again send a big American land army into Asia or into the Middle East or Africa should 'have his head examined,' as General MacArthur so delicately put it," Gates said.

U.S. scientists recorded over 100 aftershocks in eastern Turkey within 10 hours of the quake, including one with a magnitude of 6.0. Authorities advised people to stay away from damaged homes, warning they could collapse in the aftershocks.

Residents in Van and Er-cis lit campfires, preparing to spend the night outdoors while the Red Crescent began setting up tents in a stadium. Others sought shelter with relatives in nearby villages.

Rescue efforts went deep into the night under generator-powered floodlights. Workers tied steel rods around large concrete slabs in Van, then lifted them with heavy machinery.

Residents sobbed outside the ruins of one flat-topped eight-story building, hoping that missing relatives would be found. Witnesses said eight people were pulled from the rubble, but frequent aftershocks hampered search efforts. By late evening, some joy emerged as a ninth, a teenage girl, was pulled out alive.

Erdogan urged residents to stay away from damaged buildings and promised assistance to all survivors.

"We won't leave anyone to fend for themselves in the cold of winter," he said.

Around 1,275 rescue teams from 38 provinces were being sent to the region, officials said, and troops were also assisting

search-and-rescue efforts.

In Er-cis, heavy machinery halted and people were ordered to keep silent as rescuers tried to listen for possible survivors inside a seven-story building housing 28 families, NTV reported.

Some inmates escaped a prison in Van after one of its walls collapsed. TRT television said around 150 inmates had fled, but a prison official said the number was much smaller and many later returned.

Nazmi Gur, a legislator from Van, said his nephew's funeral ceremony was cut short due to the quake and he rushed back to help.

"We managed to rescue a few people but I saw at least five bodies," Gur told The Associated Press. "It was such a powerful tremor. It lasted for such a long time,"

"But now we have no electricity, there is no heating, everyone is outside in the cold," he added.

Authorities had no information yet on remote villages but the provincial governor was touring the region by helicopter and the government sent in tents, field kitchens and blankets.

The earthquake also shook buildings in neighboring Armenia and Iran.

In the Armenian capital of Yerevan, 100 miles from Er-cis, people rushed into the streets in fear but no damage or injuries were reported. Armenia was the site of a devastating earthquake in 1988 that killed 25,000 people.

long-awaited declaration of liberation, delivered by the head of the National Transitional Council, Mustafa Abdul-Jalil.

He did not mention the circumstances surrounding Gadhafi's death — mobile phone videos showed the wounded leader being taunted and beaten by a mob after his capture. But he urged his people to avoid hatred.

"You should only embrace honesty, patience, and mercy," Abdul-Jalil told a flag-waving crowd of several thousand at the declaration ceremony in the eastern city of Benghazi, the birthplace of the uprising against Gadhafi.

Abdul-Jalil laid out a vision for a new Libya with an Islamist tint, saying Islamic Sharia law would be the "basic source" of legislation, and that existing laws that contradict the teachings of Islam would be nullified.

He outlined several changes to align with Islamic law, including putting caps on interest for bank loans and lifting restrictions on the number of wives Libyan men can take. The Muslim holy book, the Quran, allows men up to four wives.

Abdul-Jalil thanked those who fought and fell in the war, saying they "are somewhere better than here, with God." Displaying his own piety, he then stepped aside from the podium and knelt to offer a prayer of thanks.

Using Sharia as the main source of legislation is stipulated in the constitution of neighboring Egypt. Still, Egyptian laws remain largely secular as Sharia does not cover all aspects of modern life.

Libya's revolt erupted in February as part of anti-government protests spreading across the Middle East. Islamist groups stand to gain ground in neighboring Tunisia and Egypt, which shook off their dictators several months ago. Tunisia has taken the biggest steps so far on the path to democracy, voting Sunday for a new assembly, while Egypt's parliamentary election is set for next month.

Libya's struggle has been the bloodiest so far in the region. Mass protests turned into a civil war that killed thousands and paralyzed the country. Gadhafi loyalists held out for two more months after the fall of the capital of Tripoli in late August. Gadhafi's hometown of Sirte fell last week, but Gadhafi's son and one-time heir apparent, Seif al-Islam,

apparently escaped with some of his supporters.

The anti-Gadhafi forces enjoyed strong Western political and military support during their revolt, especially from the U.S., Britain and France, and NATO airstrikes were key to their victory.

Abdul-Jalil paid tribute to the Gulf Cooperation Council, a six-nation alliance led by Saudi Arabia, the Arab League and the European Union. NATO performed its task with "efficiency and professionalism," he said.

President Barack Obama congratulated Libyans on the declaration.

"After four decades of brutal dictatorship and eight months of deadly conflict, the Libyan people can now celebrate their freedom and the beginning of a new era of promise," he said.

# MOUNTAIN JESUS STATUE COULD LOSE ITS LEASE

**HELENA, Mont.** • A statue of Jesus on U.S. Forest Service land in the mountains over a Montana ski resort faces potential eviction amid an argument over the separation of church and state.

The Forest Service offered a glimmer of hope late last week for the statue's supporters by withdrawing an initial decision to boot the Jesus statue from its hillside perch in the trees. But as it further analyzes the situation before making a final decision, the agency warned rules and court decisions are stacked against allowing a religious icon on the 25-by-25 foot patch of land.

The statue has been a curiosity to skiers at the famed Big Mountain ski hill for decades, mystifying skiers at its appearance in the middle of the woods as they cruise down a popular ski run.

But the Freedom From Religion Foundation isn't amused by the Jesus statue. The group argued that the Forest Service was breaching separation of church and state rules by leasing the small plot of land for the Jesus statue, and is pushing the agency to stand by its original decision to remove the religious icon.

"This has huge meaning for Americans. And if you aren't religious it has huge meaning as well," said Annie Laurie Gaylor, with the Madison, Wis.-based group. "If skiers think that it is cute, then put it up on private property. It is not cute to have a state religious association."

The local Knights of Columbus, a Catholic fraternal organization, have maintained the statue ever since members that included World War II veterans, who were inspired by religious monuments they saw while fighting in the mountains of Europe, erected the monument in the 1950s. But the group thinks the large statue made of a cement-type material is too fragile in its current state to be moved around the rugged mountainside to a different location.

The Forest Service in August initially rejected a renewal of the 10-year lease. It said the religious nature of the statue was obvious and

believed it could be placed on private land as close as 2,600 feet away. The Knights have never been charged for use of the public land.

The agency, under fire from Congressman Deny Rehberg and others, announced Friday it would withdraw that decision and open the issue again to public comment. It said a notification that the statue is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places could help — but is far from a guarantee it can stay.

Gaylor, with the group fighting the statue, called it a "ruse and a sham" to consider it an historic marker.

"This has been an illegal display. The lease should have never happened," said Gaylor. "Just because a violation is long lasting doesn't make it historic. It makes it worse. It makes it all the more reason to get rid of it."

Bill Glidden, Grand Knight of the Kalispell Council, recently submitted the request asking the Forest Service to change its mind. He stressed the historical significance of the statue to the Whitefish, and believes it honors the memory of the veterans who installed it.

"We would like to see it stay there. The community would like to see it say there," Glidden said. "It's more than just a religious icon, it is a memorial to our vets."

Rehberg, a Republican, is telling the Forest Service he agrees the historical significance outweighs other concerns.

"The Forest Service's denial of the lease defies common sense. Using a tiny section of public land for a war memorial with religious

themes is not the same as establishing a state religion," Rehberg said in a statement. "That's true whether it's a cross or a Star of David on a headstone in the Arlington National Cemetery, an angel on the Montana Vietnam Memorial in Missoula or a statue of Jesus on Big Mountain."

The Forest Service in its original decision pointed to case law stacked against such a statue, and argues rules prevent the federal government from favoring or promoting religion. The Knights were ordered in that August letter to have a removal plan in place by the end of the year, and must have the statue moved and the site restored in a year.

Phil Sammon, media coordinator for the Forest Service's Northern Region, said the agency is carefully looking at the issue.

"We absolutely understand the local importance and local history of this statue," he said. "That's what makes this a complicated issue."

Whitefish resident Bob Brown, a former state legislator and Montana secretary of state, said the issue dominated talk at his American Legion meeting this week. He said residents, few old enough to remember a time when it wasn't there, don't understand the turmoil.

"We all agreed around the table this is a tempest in a teapot. This is making trouble for us in our little community. Why don't they just leave us alone?" Brown said. "We are accustomed to it. It is part of our tradition here. So we are thinking, 'why does anyone want to tear that down?'"

## Family, Friends of Dead Utah Teen Seek Answers

**NORTH OGDEN, Utah (AP)** • Family and friends of a 16-year-old Utah girl whose body was found in a shallow grave were awaiting the results of an autopsy and police investigation into her death.

Authorities announced Saturday that the body found last week in the shallow grave in a rural area north of Salt Lake City belonged to Alexis Rasmussen. She was last seen the night of Sept. 10, when she was babysitting for Eric and Dea Millerberg of North Ogden.

The couple has been arrested on unrelated charges, but neither has been named as suspects in Rasmussen's case. Police have declined to comment about the couple.

The girl's aunt, Tammy Reed, said police haven't told the family the cause of death or even whether detectives believe she was murdered.

"We're all saddened," she said. "We want to know why and how and who."

Rasmussen's mother had given her permission to stay at the Millerberg home that night because it was late. She was last heard from around 11:30 p.m. when she texted her mother saying the Millerbergs hadn't returned home. The couple said between 11 p.m. and midnight, she told them she was leaving to meet a friend at a local school, police said.

Family members have acknowledged that Rasmussen had run away before, and police previously said they were treating the investigation as a missing person case.

## Antisocial Side of Social Media Helps Police Track Gangs

For weeks, police came up empty in their search for a gang member charged with distributing the drug ecstasy — until they turned to Facebook.

It took a few keystrokes for Prince George's County, Md., officers to find their man's user profile, where they had expected to see his usual rantings about police and coded tidbits about his chosen trade. But what they discovered was even more helpful: That very morning, the fugitive had posted a photograph of himself wearing what one officer described as a "very distinctive" purple and teal shirt.

A few hours later, a photo of the suspect in hand, officers spotted the alleged dealer on the street. "We picked him out right away," said Sgt. John O'Donnell of the Prince George's gang unit. "You couldn't have missed him. He knew we were looking for him. But he couldn't help himself from updating Facebook."

The arrest of the alleged dealer highlights the increasing use of Facebook and other such social networking sites by street and drug gangs to broadcast messages, boast of successes and recruit new members, according to local and federal authorities. The sites offer a never-ending panoply of gang members' comments about drug dealing, weapons and violence, as well as photographs of gang tattoos and of members flashing gang signs and standing under gang-related graffiti — an intelligence boon for law enforcement.

Police and federal agents say they often turn first to Facebook and Myspace, two

popular social media outlets, to gather information about gangs, their members and their "friends."

In Prince George's, for example, undercover police have "friended" many gang members to help keep tabs on them and to better understand associations within the groups. Social media pages are not always available for public viewing, but users who do not properly set their security settings can leave their pages open for all to see, including the police.

In Washington, D.C., officers comb sites to produce a weekly "Social Media" report for detectives on the latest information and trends related to street gangs, an ever-evolving universe of idiosyncratic neighborhood crews with assorted alliances and beefs.

"It's like a spider web of connections," said Lt. Michael Pavlik, head of the department's intelligence unit. "You find one and track that down, and find a friend and then follow that. It's a wealth of information, and it helps you keep up with them in a way we never imagined just a few years ago."

Federal authorities have also tapped into Facebook and Myspace for help in major gang investigations.

In one case, members of an alleged drug gang in Washington openly discussed the narcotics trade on a member's Facebook profile page, according to court papers filed by the FBI in March.

"SNITCHES WANT ME LOCKED UP," one alleged dealer wrote, the papers say. About 20 minutes later, he added that he had been frisked by police. "The streets don't love me," he wrote, according to agents. "Jumpers came out like I had a bomb strapped to me yesterday."

three home runs, Holland restored some of the pitching dominance of the first two games.

Holland, 2-0 in 10 career postseason appearances, allowed only four baserunners: Lance Berkman doubled in the second and singled in the fifth, and Nick Punto and Furcal in the sixth and ninth.

Holland struck out seven. He got assistance from third baseman Adrian Beltre, who made a leaping catch on Furcal's liner starting the game.

Jackson struggled with his control after left after 5 1-3 innings and seven walks — three short of Bill Bevens' Series record from 1947. Jackson went to three-ball counts on four of his first 10 batters but mostly escaped trouble with the help of some long outs — four flyouts at or just in front of the warning track.

MIAMI • Fans chanted Tim Tebow's name in derision. They hooted as he missed open receivers, got buried under blitzes and kept falling short on third down.

Then he led an improbable comeback that became the latest chapter in the legend of Tebow.

In his first start this year, Tebow rallied the Denver Broncos with two touchdown passes in the final 2:44 of the fourth quarter to force overtime, and Matt Prater's 52-yard field goal gave them an 18-15 win Sunday over the stunned Miami Dolphins.

"It's tough to say, but man, Timmy did a great job," said Dolphins center Mike Pouncey, who played with Tebow at Florida. "Hopefully the critics will get off him about what he can't do and talk about the things that he can do, and that's figure out a way to win the game, no matter what."

The Broncos appeared beaten when they trailed 15-0 with 5:23 left and took over at their 20. At that point Tebow was 4 for 14 for 40 yards.

"It was my fault we were in that position," he said. "Silly things kept happening. On the sidelines, we were still believing. We wanted it, and they believed in me for more than 60 minutes."

In the frantic final minutes of the fourth quarter, Tebow led TD drives of 80 and 56 yards sandwiched around a successful onside kick. He scored a 2-point conversion standing up with 17 seconds left to tie the game.

In overtime, Denver's D.J. Williams sacked Matt Moore to force a fumble and recovered it at the Miami 36. Three plays later Prater hit the game-winner.

"It was never in doubt," said Denver's relieved coach, John Fox.

The Broncos (2-4) won for the first time in the eight games they've

## BOISE STATE STICKS AT NO. 5 IN AP TOP 25

NEW YORK • After a chaotic Saturday in college football, the Boise State football team is ranked No. 5 in the Associated Press Top 25, released Sunday.

The Broncos moved past upset losers Oklahoma and Wisconsin but were jumped by Stanford and Oklahoma State.

The top five are LSU, Alabama, Oklahoma State, Stanford and Boise State.

No. 1 LSU and No. 2 Alabama have locked in their spots for the biggest regular-season game in Southeastern Conference history.

With both heading into an off week, LSU and Alabama are virtually assured of meeting on Nov. 5 in Tuscaloosa as the top two teams in the country.

It'll be the second 1 vs. 2 matchup involving SEC teams, but the first time came in the conference championship game.

Oklahoma, the preseason No. 1, dropped eight spots to No. 11 after its

first loss of the season. The Sooners fell 41-38 to Texas Tech on Saturday night, snapping a 39-game home winning streak.

The Red Raiders moved into the ranking for the first time this season at No. 19.

Wisconsin also dropped eight spots after its first loss of the season, falling to No. 12 following a 37-31 loss to Michigan State on the final play of the game.

The Spartans moved up six spots to No. 9.

LSU received 49 first-place votes from the media panel. Alabama got nine and No. 5 Boise State had one.

No. 6 Clemson has its highest ranking since 2000, when the Tigers spent four weeks at No. 5.

No. 7 Oregon, Michigan State, Arkansas and undefeated Kansas State round out the top 10.

Moving into the rankings this week along with Texas Tech were No. 20 Southern California, No. 21 Penn State and No. 24 Cincinnati, which is ranked for the first time this season.

**In 1537,** Jane Seymour, the third wife of England's King Henry VIII, died 12 days after giving birth to Prince Edward, later King Edward VI.

**In 1648,** the Peace of Westphalia ended the Thirty Years War and effectively destroyed the Holy Roman Empire.

**In 1901,** widow Anna Edson (correct) Taylor became the first person to go over Niagara Falls in a barrel.

**In 1931,** the George Washington Bridge, connecting New York and New Jersey, was officially dedicated (it opened to traffic the next day).

**In 1940,** the 40-hour work week went into effect under the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938.

**In 1945,** the United Nations officially came into existence as its charter took effect.

**In 1949,** construction began on U.N. headquarters in New York.

**In 1952,** Republican presidential candidate Dwight D. Eisenhower declared in Detroit, "I shall go to Korea" as he promised to end the conflict. (He made the visit over a month later.)

**In 1987,** 30 years after it was expelled, the Teamsters union was welcomed back into the AFL-CIO. (However, the Teamsters disaffiliated themselves from the AFL-CIO in 2005.)

**In 1991,** "Star Trek" creator Gene Roddenberry died in Santa Monica, Calif., at age 70.

**Ten years ago:** The House narrowly passed a \$100 billion economic stimulus package. Two trucks crashed head-on in a main tunnel through the Swiss Alps, igniting a fire and killing 11 people. O.J. Simpson was acquitted in Miami of grabbing another driver's glasses and scratching the man's face in a road-rage argument.

**Five years ago:** American officials unveiled a timeline for Iraq's Shiite-led government to take specific steps to calm Baghdad and said more U.S. troops might be needed to quell the bloodshed. The St. Louis Cardinals gained a 2-1 World Series edge as they defeated the Detroit Tigers 5-0. (Before Game 3 began, baseball players and owners finalized a five-year collective bargaining agreement.)

**One year ago:** Following the latest release of secret U.S. military documents by WikiLeaks, British Deputy Prime Minister Nick Clegg told BBC television that allegations of prisoner abuse and civilian killings in Iraq were extremely serious and needed to be investigated.

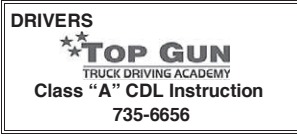

**THE ACES ON BRIDGE®** Bobby Wolff

“The eye may see for the hand, but not for the mind.”

— Henry David Thoreau

Many years ago I played a bridge match against a school for the blind. We used Braille cards, and when playing a card, we naturally announced what it was, for the benefit of our opponents. The convention was that only cards over a certain rank were named entirely, the others being described merely as “small.” But “small” is not good enough on some hands. Cover up the East-West cards before planning your line of play in three no-trump on a “small” diamond lead to East’s 10 and your queen.

You really need to know what that small diamond was, don’t you? If diamonds break 4-4, which you would expect if West had led the four, then there is time to knock out both top clubs, establishing nine tricks with three spades, one heart, two diamonds and three clubs. On the other hand, if diamonds are 5-3, that line of play will probably lead to defeat because East will win the first club and clear diamonds so West can cash the suit when he gets in with the club ace. If diamonds are 5-3, the best chance is to play on hearts, which provide a reasonable chance for four tricks. However, on the actual layout, any reliance on heart tricks is doomed while the club play succeeds.

I would probably play the same way on the lead of the diamond five, but on a higher spot-card lead, I’d assume the lead was fourth highest from five.

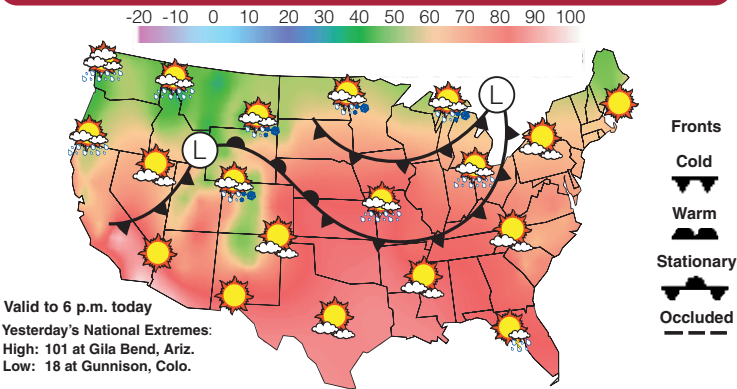
