Arson Suspected in Burley Structure Blaze

Friday's fire caused extensive damage to former Simplot potato processing plant.

BURLEY • Arson is the suspected cause of a fire that broke out late Friday, destroying an old potato processing plant on West Main Street in Burley.

Cassia County Sheriff Randy Kidd said investigators were interviewing two suspects Monday in connection with the fire that started at about 11:40 p.m. at the building owned by High Desert Milk.

Burley Fire Chief Keith Martin said fire investigators believe the blaze started in the an old office area in the building's southeast corner. It burned west about halfway through the building before it was brought under control.

Martin said three or four people reported seeing multiple juveniles running from the building shortly before the fire was reported.

"Any evidence on what actually caused the fire was burned up," Martin said.

Martin said the department battled the blaze with its new ladder truck, which worked well.

An excavator was brought in during the night to knock down a section of the south wall, which was leaning out toward U.S. Highway 30.

The wood and steel-framed roof collapsed onto the first floor and into the basement.

High Desert Milk CEO Randy Robinson said he believes the building is likely a total loss. His company bought it from J.R. Simplot Co. between 2007 and 2008 to tie the company's new milk plant on Bedke

A Coach's Comeback

Nearly lost to a medical mystery, Dietrich High girls basketball coach Acey Shaw is attacking his rehabilitation with the same optimistic fervor that made him a hometown hero.

DIETRICH • It's a crisp fall evening as cool air rushes into the packed gymnasium through open doorways.

Hanging from the rafters above the painting of a mischievous Blue Devil are dozens of dark blue state tournament and championship banners. Gene Shaw's name is on seven for the girls basketball teams he guided over the years.

One banner stands out, however — Carolina blue with "State 3rd Place 2010" and the name "Acey Shaw" written in white letters. Another banner will soon join it, with the name of Acey Shaw under "State Champions 2011."

Dietrich's latest hero coach sits in his wheelchair behind the Blue Devils volleyball team. Acey high-fives his daughter, Jacey, a freshman on the Dietrich team vying for a district volleyball title against

Gooding Co. Sheriff Rules Out Homicide in Shoshone Man's Death

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The Gooding County Sheriff's Office continues to investigate the case of Juan Carlos Perez-Garcia, whose body was found Friday morning in Gooding County. But, Sheriff Shaun Gough has ruled out homicide as a cause of the man's death.

Gough said the investigation is nearly complete, but he is waiting on a toxicology report to determine the cause of death. The body was taken to the Ada County coroner last week for an autopsy.

Perez-Garcia, 25, of Shoshone, was found near 1500 E. 2100 S., approximately 4 miles southwest of Gooding. Law enforcement received a call at 10:16 a.m. from passing motorists who found his body. He was last seen by family on Thursday night, driving a green 1993 Chevrolet Blazer.

The vehicle was not in the vicinity of Perez-Garcia's body, but was found Friday afternoon in Jerome.

Head Start Officials Note Growing Need

The federally funded program for young children and their families has a growing waiting list in the area, but services can't expand without congressional approval.

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A larger, more diverse group of people are seeking services through the College of Southern Idaho's Head Start program.

As the nation continues its protracted crawl out of the economic downturn, there are more people in need than slots available. Head Start Center Supervisor Ruby Hite said she's seen college graduates apply for the program after losing their jobs and meeting federal poverty guidelines for the first time.

Head Start provides educational, health, nutritional and social services cost-free to children and families living at or below federal poverty levels. CSI Head Start Director Mancole Fedder said the federally funded program helps break the cycle of poverty

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Twin Falls Council Concerned about Legislative Clout

The Twin Falls City Council is concerned enough about the outcome of legislative redistricting to consider joining a potential legal challenge.

The council aired opinions on Monday about how the city fared in redistricting, a process that realigns the state's 35 legislative districts based on population changes each decade.

The biggest change for the city was being placed in its own legislative district. Previously, the city was split into two separate districts that also stretched into Twin Falls County.

"We got the short end of the stick," said Councilman Lance Clow, who asked for the discussion.

The way Clow sees it, the city wound up with less representation because now only three lawmakers from one district will represent the city. Under the old map, as many as six legislators could have been elected from within city limits.

Other council members agreed that they'd like to get more information and discuss the issue further, though that doesn't mean anything's a done deal.

They didn't make any decisions about a legal

challenge, and are tentatively planning a closed-door session for Nov. 7 to get more information and weigh options. Any decision would need to be in open session afterwards.

It's possible that the city could join a legal challenge if Twin Falls County files one contesting the outcome of redistricting. Legal challenges to redistricting can be filed by anyone, and would go directly to the Idaho Supreme Court for a ruling.

Councilman Will Kezele said the city should carefully ask the question of what it wants to replace the plan, cautioning that a different result could pose problems as well.

In other words, the council approved a change that slightly eases the process of getting a city animal permit. City ordinance still requires three-fourths of households living within 300 feet of a proposed site for a permit to approve the request. But the applicant no longer has to get a signature from absolutely everyone in that radius if an effort is made to reach all households. Permits are required for farm animals, such as chickens.

by helping young children up to age 5.

"If you can fuel that fire when the greatest opportunity for growth is happening, the investment will pay off incredible dividends," he said.

As of last month, 673 people were enrolled in Head Start and Early Head Start at 11 sites in south-central Idaho, according to a report presented to CSI trustees. In Twin Falls, there are 32 slots available for the Early Head Start program and they're all full, with about one dozen people on a waiting list.

Early Head Start is the newest program offering, in its second year in Twin Falls, Jerome, Rupert and Burley. Pregnant women, infants and toddlers up to age 3 can receive assistance.

Shortly before a child turns 3 years old, there's an opportunity to transition him or her into the Head Start program for older children. Even if there's not a spot open, the child will continue to receive services.

Fedder said having both Head Start and Early Head Start means there's the op-

portunity to provide services to families for a longer period of time.

"We can potentially serve children from the womb to age 5," he said.

The Head Start program serves preschool-aged students and there are about 30 people on the waiting list for the Twin Falls center. Fedder said the waiting lists are shorter now than they've been in the past since the school year is in full swing.

With Twin Falls' unemployment rate hovering around 9 percent, though, not everyone who meets federal poverty guidelines will be able to receive services.

For the current 2012 fiscal year, the CSI Head Start/Early Head Start program has a \$4.64 million operating budget to use to fund its programs. However, programs can't expand without congressional approval, Fedder said.

The program's governing bodies — the CSI board of trustees and a policy council made up of parents — can decide to prioritize factors for admission, such as children who live in a household where alcoholism is a problem or who have a family member deployed overseas with the armed forces.

Delayed Frost Hits Magic Valley

Running a month behind, the first Magic Valley frost is finally here.

According to the National Weather Service, southern Idaho typically has its first freeze by Sept. 27. However, this will be the second year in a row that the Magic Valley

has experienced a delayed frost.

Daytime highs for today and Wednesday are expected to peak below 50. The cooler temperatures are expected to last until the middle of the week with the temperature rounding down to 25 degrees by early Wednesday morning, said Dave Groenert, meteor-

ologist for the National Weather Service in Boise.

Depending on when spring hits this year, the Magic Valley could experience one less month of frosts, Groenert said.

The fewer freezes may be good news for warm-blooded folks, but can be concerning for farmers who depend

on the freeze to kill pests and diseases in the ground.

A variety of factors combined to push back almost all of Idaho's first frosts, Groenert said.

"We're coming off of a cool, wet spring and we had a warm, dry September," he said. "But it's hard to pinpoint what's causing it each year."

Camas County. Acey's father in law, John Howard, sits to his side, holding court with passersby who stop to say hello and shake Acey's hand.

One of Acey's oldest friends, Lee Cook, grabs Acey's right hand, leaning in close to offer encouraging words. It's still hard for Acey to speak, as it takes most of his breath and energy to let out a few words in a low, raspy roll.

But his right hand offers a firm grip, unlike the left side of his body, which is still recovering from a rare medical condition that turned his life upside down.

...

On Feb. 19, Acey led his Dietrich girls to a 55-51 victory over rival Richfield for Idaho's small-school state championship. He awoke the next day to tend to his cows, delivering a new calf like he had countless times before while working on the family farm.

With the newborn calf shivering from the frigid temperatures, he cranked the heat in his truck, warming the calf in the cab while he drove around town. Within hours he was sick, dizzy and seeing double.

By March, he was in intensive care at University of Utah Hospital in Salt Lake City, unable to see or walk.

"To win the state championship one week and the next your husband is fighting for his life, it was a really scary time," said Acey's wife, Jalyn. "Seeing your kids and them not knowing what's going to happen with their dad, that was hard."

Doctors found swelling in Acey's brain, but were at a loss for why. He was tested for everything under the sun: meningitis, multiple sclerosis, genetic diseases, but nothing added up.

His vision worsened and he was declared legally blind. Jalyn had their three children — Jacey, 14, Kade, 12, and Jett, 7 — come to Salt Lake so their father could see them for a final time.

"It was really hard to ... it was just hard to think that he wouldn't be able to see his kids, you know?" Jalyn said.

Steroid treatment reduced the brain swelling and slowly Acey's vision returned. Dozens of spinal taps and test results were sent around the world, as medicine's best minds wrestled with a puzzle they couldn't solve.

Finally, the breakthrough

came with a positive test for Chlamydia pneumonia, a virus Acey breathed in from the mother cow's placenta when he warmed the shivering calf.

The virus usually attacks the lungs, but in Acey's case traveled straight to his brain, robbing him of muscle coordination. Doctors believe the virus caused a type of rare encephalitis, which killed some nerves in his brain.

Acey and Jalyn spent more than three months together at University Hospital, Acey unable to talk for long stretches, breathing with the help of a ventilator.

For about a month they communicated exclusively through sign language.

When Jalyn left the room to eat lunch or grab some air outside, Acey would time her.

"He'd say, 'You better be back in an hour.' If I was even five minutes late, he'd tell me I was late," said Jalyn, who met Acey while both attended Ricks College in Rexburg.

On April 20, Acey celebrated his 37th birthday in the hospital with friends, family and ice cream. By early June, he was well enough to be moved to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center, where he spent another six weeks before returning home on July 15.

In all, Acey was hospitalized for 88 days.

"It was a long stretch and it's hard to talk about, you know? It was really hard when we weren't sure (if he was going to live)," Jalyn said. "This is the person that you love, who you thought you were going to raise your kids with. It was really hard to see him hurting."

News of Acey's struggle hit Dietrich hard, but the 332-person town rallied around his family.

Jalyn kept a blog of Acey's progress to keep friends and family connected. But her posts soon were followed by hopeful comments from the

Richfield High School girls basketball team, anonymous community members, and teams from Shoshone High School.

"The overwhelming love and support from people has just blown us away," said Jalyn, who has hundreds of letters from people around the Magic Valley.

Soon, those wishes became donations to help the Shaws with mounting medical costs. Longtime friend Teresa Smith set up a benefit fund at Wells Fargo Bank. To date, the account has raised \$28,000.

In April, Shoshone High School Athletic Director Tim Chapman, orchestrated a faculty basketball game between Shoshone and Dietrich high schools. Hundreds watched, while more made elaborate desserts to raffle off. That night alone raised \$17,000.

The District IV athletic directors offered a challenge to every Magic Valley school to raise \$200 for Acey's cause. Checks flowed in from Burley and Rupert, Twin Falls and Jerome, Richfield and elsewhere around the region.

At one point, when Jalyn's car broke down, she went to Lee's Automotive in Shoshone, ready to pay for the fix. Instead, an anonymous donor had already picked up half of the tab. The shop paid the rest.

"I don't know why people go through these tragedies," Cook said. "But it's times

like these that make a community stronger. You see how they rally around Acey and his family?"

Cook, the athletic director at Carey High School, has known Acey for most of his life. Cook was always a friend of the Shaws, "farming friends, cow friends, coaching friends," he said, and it was fun for him to watch Acey grow into a talented, young coach.

"He wants his kids to do the very best that they can do," Cook said. "He was really enthused about the prospects of this season. I think after winning the state title he was so excited he could hardly contain himself."

Determined to again take the clipboard and lead the Dietrich girls, Acey attacks his rehabilitation with the same fervor he applied to halftime deficits.

"You look at somebody like that, you just think the quality of life is so different than what he's used to, and how can he be happy still?" Jalyn said. "How can he be so positive? I don't know how he does it."

Since his condition is so rare, it's still unknown when Acey will be back to walking and shouting along the sideline. Doctors say it could take anywhere from two to three years, as they hope that Acey's brain will have the ability to retrain itself.

His father-in-law, Howard, has been Acey's assistant throughout the years and will take over the Dietrich girls basketball program this season.

Asked about his team's chances of a repeat championship season, Acey quickly held up one finger to indicate that his team lost only one senior last year.

"I think we have a chance," he said. "We should be really good ... but you never know."

"I just know that I'm blessed."

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Schoen Apologizes for Eminent Domain Memo

Blaine County Commissioner Larry Schoen on Monday issued a written apology for the acrimony caused by a memo discussing the use of eminent domain to expand Friedman Memorial Airport in Hailey.

The memo, sent to Friedman Airport Manager Rick Baird, addressed the use of eminent domain on “any lands that could be determined to be necessary for expansion of Friedman Memorial Airport.” A bevy of area officials worked to relocate the airport after the Federal Aviation Administration said it should be moved. However,

the \$300 million price tag for a new location to the south has shifted efforts toward making improvements at the current location.

Schoen said Monday that the memo was intended to refer only to vacant farmland south of the airport. Schoen said he doesn’t support using eminent domain to claim homes east of Idaho Highway 75 for the project and doesn’t believe it will be a necessary step in improving the airport.

“I regret and apologize sincerely to my community for the anxiety and confusion this memo has caused, most particularly to the people of Hailey living along Highway 75 adja-

cent to the airport and also to my colleagues on the Airport Authority, Hailey City Council and Board of County Commissioners,” Schoen wrote.

Schoen said the memo was to be shared only if discussion of acquiring that farmland was raised during a recent meeting he knew he wouldn’t be able to intend.

“Securing safe, reliable, affordable air service for Blaine County into the future is a critically important goal that engages the entire community,” he said. “I look forward to working with my colleagues thoughtfully and carefully to achieve it in ways that are acceptable and benefit all.”

Broken Buhl Intersection to be Fixed Starting Today

A traffic signal damaged at the main eastern entrance to Buhl should be repaired and back in operation this week, according to the Idaho Transportation Department.

On Aug. 18, a semitrailer hit the signal pole on the northwest corner of Broadway Avenue and Clear Lake Road — also U.S. Highway 30 and Idaho Highway 46. The intersection has since functioned as a four-way stop while ITD examined the damage and weighed its options.

Crews will work during the day today and Wednesday to install a new pole, mast and signal heads, and an overhead luminaire. Work may continue at the site through the rest of the week and may cause other temporary delays.

ITD officials initially feared it could take as long as four months to fix the signal because they thought the pole foundation would need to be replaced. However, their investigation found the foundation remains in good shape.

Meth Trafficking Suspect Set for Trial

A 55-year-old Twin Falls man suspected of trafficking in methamphetamine pleaded not guilty and is scheduled for trial.

Miles Miller is slated to face a jury starting Dec. 14 in Twin Falls County 5th District Court, having entered his plea last week on the felony accusation.

Police arrested Miller in July after allegedly finding 56 grams of meth in his home. They stopped Miller for allegedly running stop signs

and, upon detaining him, found him in possession of nearly \$2,500. They took Miller back to the house for the search, where he claimed to keep drugs in a safe. He provided the combination, the report says, and police found syringes, metal spoons, plastic baggies and crystal powder which field tests showed as meth.

Detectives also noted other alleged characteristics of dealing at Miller's house, including nine surveillance cameras and multiple mobile phones.

Kimberly Meth Dealer Gets Prison Sentence

A Kimberly man who pleaded guilty to trafficking in meth was sentenced to prison time and hefty fines last week in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

Bernardo Benites, 42, could serve up to 15 years in state prison and was slapped with \$20,000 in fines. He pleaded to two counts of felony trafficking in August, which netted him two 15-year sentences to run concurrently. He is eligible for parole after six years. Each count also carried a

\$10,000 fine. In addition, Benites was ordered to pay \$8,765.26 in restitution.

Benites was arrested as part of a multi-agency investigation into drug dealing in the Magic Valley earlier this year. Officers from the Idaho State Police and the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives allegedly found Benites in possession of 115.7 grams of meth during a Feb. 15 search of his truck. Earlier that month, undercover officers allegedly made multiple meth purchases from Benites and recorded the buys.

ANTI-DISTRACTED DRIVING FILM TO PREMIERE IN NOV.

A locally produced anti-distracted driving film about the 2008 death of a Twin Falls teen is scheduled to premiere Nov. 5.

The one-vehicle crash that claimed the life of 15-year-old Trevor Hine is recreated in "It Only Takes a Second: An Anatomy of a Vehicular Manslaughter," a short feature to educate Idaho teens about the dangers of distracted driving.

Hine was riding with his friend, Trevor Lutz, now 18, along Interstate 84 in Jerome County when Lutz overcorrected upon realizing he was on the eastbound lane's right shoulder. The car crossed both lanes and crashed in the median west of Exit 168.

The film was made with involvement from Idaho State Police, Jerome County 5th District Magistrate Judge Thomas Borreson, Lutz and his family, and the family of Hine.

It will screen at 6 p.m. Nov. 5 at Twin Falls High School's Roper Auditorium.

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FEMALE METH SUSPECT PLEADS TO AMENDED CHARGE

A Kimberly woman accused of trafficking meth has pleaded guilty to an amended criminal charge.

Lynnsey Cummings, 29, entered her plea last week in Twin Falls County 5th District Court, to the amended charge of possession of a controlled substance with the intent to deliver.

Twin Falls police claim they found approximately 30 grams of methamphetamine in her vehicle in May, after a resident on Paint Brush Drive reported

a suspicious vehicle. The witness said Cummings was lying in the fetal position in the car, talking about receiving subliminal messages from the radio. She had left the area before police could arrive, but they later located her at an apartment complex on Elizabeth Boulevard.

Sentencing is slated for Dec. 12.

\$500 Reward Offered in Canyon County Jail Escape

BOISE • Canyon County Sheriff's deputies are seeking public help to find Eric Dominguez — and are offering \$500 for anyone that provides information that leads to his arrest.

Dominguez escaped from the Canyon County Detention Center just after 7 a.m. Sunday with fellow inmate Alberto I. Maldonado.

Deputies caught Maldonado minutes later but were still looking for 34-year-old Dominguez as of 2:30 p.m. Monday. Officials say Maldonado and Dominguez were on kitchen duty at the jail when they escaped.

Sheriff's officials say Dominguez may still be in the Caldwell area. "We know he has close ties to the community," Capt. Craig Hanson said Monday afternoon.

Dominguez pleaded guilty to three counts of felony injury to a child and causing great bodily injury in August and was set to be sentenced on those charges later this week.

Prosecutors said he violently shook and seriously injured his twin infant sons.

He was charged June 8 after both babies were hospitalized within a few days of each other.

One baby was taken to the hospital May 31 with severe retinal hemorrhaging, fractured ribs, broken legs, head trauma and a broken toe, prosecutors said. His brother, brought to the hospital on June 2, had broken ribs and a broken leg.

According to court documents, Dominguez told investigators of two incidents, on May 24 and May 31.

He said he was frustrated because both babies were crying. Dominguez admitted he would squeeze the babies while they were on the bed so they would not move and also wrapped them tightly in blankets. He also said he pulled the babies across the bed by their legs.

Sheriff's officials said Sunday a safety plan has been put in place to protect the children.

Does Infrastructure Spending Hurt More Than It Helps?

In a recent television ad for her network, MSNBC host Rachel Maddow stands below the Hoover Dam and asks whether we are still a country that can “think this big” — Hoover Dam big. The commercial is built on the assumption that American greatness is advanced by federal spending on major infrastructure projects.

If I had my own television commercial, I’d stand in front of the wreckage of Idaho’s Teton Dam, which, like the Hoover Dam, was built by the federal Bureau of Reclamation. The Teton Dam was based on shoddy engineering and a flawed economic analysis. It collapsed catastrophically in 1976, just a year after it was built.

Increased infrastructure spending has significant support in Washington these days. President Obama wants a new federal infrastructure bank, and some members of both parties want to pass big highway and air-traffic-control funding bills. The politicians think these bills will create desperately needed jobs, but the cost of that perceived benefit is too high: Federal infrastructure spending has a long and painful history of pork-barrel politics and bureaucratic bungling, with money often going to wasteful and environmentally damaging projects.

For plenty of examples of the downside of federal infrastructure, look at the two oldest infrastructure agencies — the Army Corps of Engineers and the Bureau of Reclamation. Their histories show that the federal government shouldn’t be in the infrastructure business. Rather, state governments and the private sector are best equipped to provide it.

The Corps of Engineers has been building levees, canals and other civilian water infrastructure for more than 200 years — and it has made missteps the entire time. In the post-Civil War era, for example, there were widespread complaints about the Corps’ wastefulness and mismanagement. A 1971 book by Arthur Morgan, a distinguished engineer and former chairman of the Tennessee Valley Authority, concluded: “There have been over the past 100 years consistent and disastrous failures by the Corps in public works areas. . . resulting in enormous and unnecessary costs to ecology and the taxpayer.”

Looking at the Corps and Reclamation, the first lesson about federal infrastructure projects is that you can’t trust the cost-benefit analyses. Both agencies have a history of fudging their studies to make proposed projects look better, understating the costs and over-

stating the benefits.

Even if federal agencies calculate the numbers properly, members of Congress often push ahead with “trash” projects anyway. Then-Sen. Christopher Bond of Missouri vowed to make sure that the Corps’ projects in his state were funded, no matter what the economic studies concluded, according to extensive Washington Post reporting on the Corps in 2000. And the onetime head of the Senate committee overseeing the Corps, George Voinovich of Ohio, blurted out at a hearing: “We don’t care what the Corps cost-benefit is. We’re going to build it anyhow because Congress says it’s going to be built.”

Taxpayers are double losers from all this infrastructure. They paid to build it, and now they are paying to clean up the environmental damage. In Florida, for example, the Corps’ projects, along with federal sugar subsidies, have harmed the Everglades. So the government is helping to fund a multibillion-dollar restoration plan. In the West, federal irrigation has increased salinity levels in rivers, necessitating desalination efforts such as a \$245 million plant in Yuma, Ariz. And in a large area of California’s San Joaquin Valley, federal irrigation has created such toxic runoff that the government is considering spending up to \$2 billion to fix the damage, according to some estimates.

When the federal government “thinks big” it often makes big mistakes. And when Washington follows bad policies, such as destroying wetlands or overbuilding dams, it replicates the mistakes nationwide. Today, for instance, Reclamation’s huge underpricing of irrigation water is contributing to a water crisis across much of the West.

The recent infrastructure debate has focused on job creation, and whether projects are “shovel ready.” The more important question is who is holding the shovel. When it’s the federal government, we’ve found that it digs in the wrong places and leaves taxpayers with big holes in their pockets. So let’s give the shovels to state governments and private companies. They will create just as many jobs while providing more innovative and less costly infrastructure to the public. They’re ready.

I believe there is more we can do to become more business friendly and show prospective companies that Kimberly is the place to be.

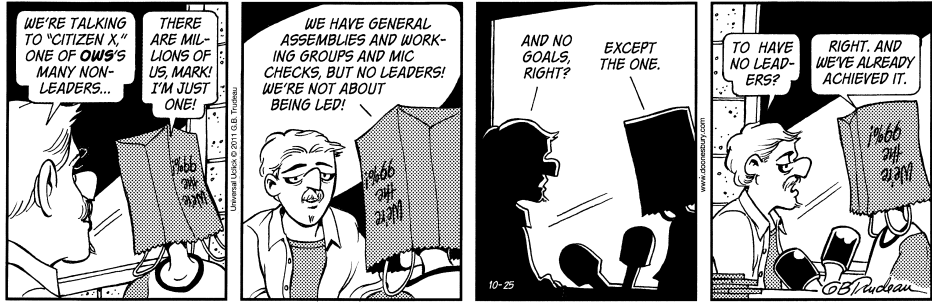

Potlatch Pays Fine to Settle Forest Trespass Case

BOISE • Federal prosecutors say Potlatch Corp. has agreed to pay more than \$19,000 in civil penalties to resolve pending investigations into alleged trespassing and illegal timber cutting in federal forests.

The settlement announced Monday also details changes Potlatch has made in its surveying policy and procedure when conducting forest management activities on lands adjacent to U.S. National Forests.

The government investigated allegations the company removed timber in the Idaho Panhandle National Forest in 2008 and cut a new access point along a forest service road in 2010 on the Clearwater National Forest.

Prosecutors say the company responded by voluntarily developing a new landowner policy that requires the company to verify and mark boundaries on land adjacent to federal forests before cutting trees.

Lawsuit Filed Over PCBs in Spokane River

SPOKANE, Wash. • Two environmental groups are suing the Environmental Protection Agency for what they say is its failure to force the Washington Department of Ecology to create a plan to clean-up PCBs in the Spokane River.

The Spokane branch of the Sierra Club and the Center for Environmental Law and Policy have filed the lawsuit in federal court.

They contend they have for seven years asked the agencies for a river cleanup plan and warned them not to permit adding more pollution to the Spokane River.

PCBs are industrial compounds associated with liver disease and cancer.

Attorney's Injury Delays N. Idaho Man's Re-trial

MOSCOW • A judge has postponed opening arguments in the re-trial of a northern Idaho man accused

of killing a 21-year-old woman at her Moscow home in 2001.

The proceedings scheduled to start Monday in Latah County were delayed after an attorney for 28-year-old David J. Meister suffered a back injury over the weekend. Second District Judge Carl B. Kerrick moved opening arguments to Tuesday.

Meister is charged in the slaying of Tonya Hart, who was shot twice at point-blank range.

The Idaho Supreme Court overturned Meister's original conviction and life sentence last year, ruling a district judge had erred in refusing to allow evidence that some other person may have been the shooter.

Police: Nampa Man Arrested for Kidnapping

BOISE • Police say a southwestern Idaho man has been arrested on charges of felony kidnapping and aggravated battery after several witnesses reported that he punched a female pedestri-

an and attempted to drag her into his vehicle.

Police say 57-year-old James Kopp of Nampa was pulled over for speeding on U.S. Interstate 84 early Saturday after the assault

was reported.

Officers responded at 2 a.m. to a Boise intersection, where a woman told police she had just crossed the street when a man she didn't know got out of his car and

punched her in the head, knocking her to the ground. Witnesses told police the man, later identified as Kopp, fled in his vehicle.

Panetta Says U.S. Military At ‘Turning Point,’ New Focus on Asia

TOKYO • The winding down of wars in Iraq and Afghanistan marks a pivot point for the U.S. military, which must now focus on looming threats such as the rising military might of China, Defense Secretary Leon Panetta said Monday.

Panetta used his first visit to Japan as Pentagon chief to sound an emerging theme of the Obama administration: America will remain a global economic and military power despite coming budget reductions, and the Asia-Pacific region will be central to U.S. national security strategy.

In a question-and-answer session with U.S. and Japanese troops at Yokota Air Base, Panetta ticked off a list of threats that he said demand more U.S. attention as it completes its departure from Iraq this year and targets 2014 for the withdrawal of combat forces from Afghanistan. He mentioned cyberattacks, the nuclear ambitions of Iran and North Korea, Mideast turmoil and “rising powers” — an allusion to China.

“Today we are at a turning point after a decade of war,” Panetta said. Al-Qaida is among a range of concerns that will keep the military busy, but as a traditional Pacific power the United States needs to invest more effort in building a wider and deeper network of alliances and partnerships in this region, he said.

“Most importantly, we have the opportunity to strengthen our presence in the Pacific — and we will,” he said.

He did not elaborate on whether that would mean adding ships or other forces, but he emphatically said budget cuts would not be a factor.

“We are not anticipating any cut-backs in this region,” he said.

In an opinion piece published Monday in a Japanese newspaper, Panetta accused North Korea of “reckless and provocative” acts and criticized China for a secretive expansion of its military power.

He wrote that Washington and Japan share common challenges in Asia and the Pacific.

“China is rapidly modernizing its military,” he wrote, “but with a troubling lack of transparency, coupled with increasingly assertive activity in the East and South China Seas.”

China’s military budget of \$95 billion this year is the world’s second-highest after Washington’s planned \$650 billion. Beijing is developing weapons such as the “carrier killer” DF 21D missile that analysts say might threaten U.S. warships and alter the regional balance of power.

Syrian Attacks Target Envoy

U.S. Withdraws Ambassador to Damascus, Citing Threats

Robert Ford’s high-profile visits this year to Syrian opposition leaders have stirred a violent reaction that U.S. officials say the Syrian government has encouraged.

WASHINGTON • The Obama administration has temporarily withdrawn its ambassador to Damascus, citing threats against his personal safety following his outspoken criticism of Syria’s brutal crackdown on pro-democracy protesters.

Ambassador Robert S. Ford returned to Washington because of what U.S. officials called a campaign of “malicious and deceitful propaganda” in Syria’s state-run media that they feared could incite violence against the career diplomat.

President Bashar Assad’s regime responded by recalling its ambassador to Washington, Imad Moustapha, for consultations. A Syrian embassy spokesman declined comment on the American allegations.

The flap comes after months of growing friction between Washington and Damascus. In August, President Barack Obama led other Western governments in calling for Assad to step down, a sign of frustration at the regime’s repeated use of armed troops to put down street protests that began last March.

Ford has traveled widely this year to meet Syrian opposition leaders and offer them public support. His high-profile visits, including attending the funeral of a Syrian activist, have heartened critics of Assad. But they also have stirred a violent reaction that U.S. officials say the Syrian government has encouraged.

Last month, dozens of pro-government Syrians attacked an embassy motorcade in Damascus and trapped Ford and other U.S. diplomats for about 90 minutes in an office building where he was meeting with a political

opposition figure.

Ford described the attack in a Facebook post:

“Protesters threw concrete blocks at the windows and hit the cars with iron bars. One person jumped on the hood of the car, tried to kick in the windshield and then jumped on the roof. Another person held the roof railing and tried to break the car’s side window. When the embassy car moved through the crowd, the man fell off the car,” he wrote.

“Americans understand that we are seeing the ugly side of the Syrian regime which uses brutal force, repression and intimidation to stay in power.”

State Department spokesman Victoria Nuland said Monday that the administration intends to send Ford back to Damascus once the threat has eased. The visit to Washington will “give him a little bit of a break” from a harrowing assignment, she said.

Doctors Split Over Extra Tests for Cholesterol

WASHINGTON • For heart health, you’re supposed to know your numbers: Total cholesterol, the bad LDL kind and the good HDL kind. But your next checkup might add a new number to the mix.

More doctors are going beyond standard cholesterol counts, using another test to take a closer look at the bad fats — a count of particles that carry LDL through the blood.

Cardiologists are divided over the usefulness of that approach. Proponents contend it might help them spot at-risk patients that regular checks might miss, or get more information about how aggressively to treat them.

But so far, guidelines from major heart organizations don’t recommend these extra tests. They’re pricier than regular cholesterol exams, although Medicare and many other insurers pay

Turks Weep as Quake Survivors, Bodies Pulled from Rubble

ERCIS, Turkey • Distraught Turkish families mourned outside a mosque or sought to identify loved ones among rows of bodies Monday as rescue workers scoured debris for survivors after a 7.2-magnitude quake that killed at least 279 people.

Rescue teams with generator-powered floodlights worked into the night in the worst-hit city of Ercis, where running water and electricity were cut

by the quake that rocked eastern Turkey on Sunday. Unnerved by over 200 aftershocks, many residents slept outside their homes, making campfires to ward off the cold, as aid organizations rushed to erect tents for the homeless.

Victims were trapped in mounds of concrete, twisted steel and construction debris after over a hundred buildings in two cities and mud-brick homes in nearby villages pancaked or partially collapsed in Sunday’s earthquake. About 80 multistory buildings

THE McRIB MAKES A McCOMEBACK

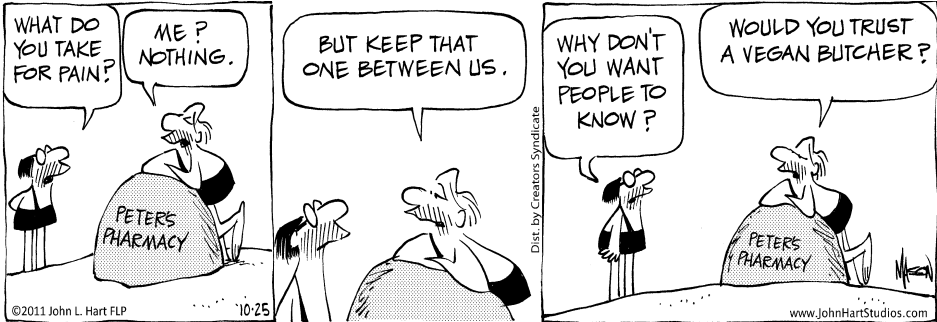

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Government Job Losses a Growing Drag on U.S. Economic Recovery

WASHINGTON • Conservative Republicans have long clamored for government downsizing. They're starting to get it — by default.

Crippled by plunging tax revenues, state and local governments have shed over a half million jobs since the recession began in December 2007. And, after adding jobs early in the downturn, the federal government is now cutting them as well.

States cut 49,000 jobs over the past year and localities 210,000, according to an analysis of Labor Department statistics. There are 30,000 fewer federal workers now than a year ago — including 5,300 Postal Service jobs canceled last month.

By contrast, private-sector jobs have increased by 1.6 million over the past 12 months. But the state, local and federal job losses have become a drag on efforts to nudge the nation's unemployment rate down from its painfully high 9.1 percent.

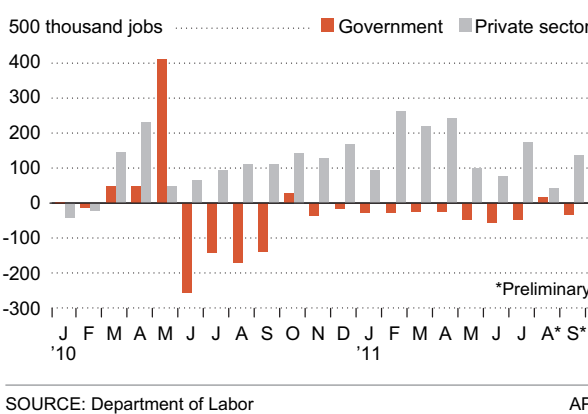
The economy has been expanding, at least modestly, since the middle of 2009. And state and local governments are usually engines of job growth during recoveries. But not now, said economist Heidi Shierholz of the labor-aligned Economic Policy Institute.

"The public sector didn't start to lose jobs right away. But then it did as the budget crunch really hit. State governments are not allowed to run deficits. So the private sector is expanding while the public sector is shedding jobs — to the tune of 35,000 jobs a month," she said.

President Barack Obama sought to ease the crunch by including \$35 billion to prevent layoffs of police, firefighters and teachers in his

\$447 billion jobs package. But that big bill hit a GOP wall in Congress.

Efforts to pass what Obama called "bite-sized pieces" of the big bill have stalled, too. Republicans don't want to swallow them, regardless the serving size. Senate Republicans blocked the \$35 billion installment late last week when Democratic leaders called it up as stand-alone legislation.

The dynamic is already reverberating through the gathering presidential campaign cycle, with Republicans making an issue out of what they depict as Obama's inability to turn the economy around. This has been driven home in every one of the frequent Republican presidential debates, and is certain to become even more intense as the GOP field narrows. The weak economy is a main factor in Obama's current approval ratings, the lowest of his presidency.

No sitting president since Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1936 and 1940 has been elected with the unemployment rate as high as it stands today — hovering near or above 9 percent for more than two years. In 1936, the rate was 17 percent and in 1940, 15 percent, but then it was on a down-

ward trend from over 24 percent earlier in the Great Depression.

Ronald Reagan's durable 1980 campaign slogan that government "is not the solution to our problem, government is the problem" is a cherished GOP refrain. Most recently, it's been echoed in tea party calls for smaller government.

Yet the federal bureaucracy grew by leaps and bounds during Reagan's eight years in office — and under every Republican and Democratic president since.

Reagan-inspired conservative visions of smaller government are usually premised on deep spending cuts, low taxes, and program eliminations. All current GOP presidential contenders have subscribed to this line, as have GOP congressional leaders.

The recession-forced shrinkage of state, local and federal workforces — even as the federal debt continues to swell — is not exactly what tea party activists and other fiscal conservatives had in mind.

Cities and counties are hampered by lower property tax revenue because of collapsing real estate values. States are hurt by lower income and sales tax revenue

because of the deep recession and stubborn unemployment.

The National Association of State Budget Officers says states were able to sustain spending growth through 2010 principally with federal stimulus money. But it has since dried up. The loss of the federal stimulus "combined with a slow recovery in state revenue collections will continue the tight resource environment for states in fiscal 2012," reports the association. Most state fiscal years begin in July.

Private business gains are too modest to significantly lower the unemployment rate, despite last week's claim by Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid that "private-sector jobs have been doing just fine."

Economists suggest roughly 200,000 new jobs a month — or 2.4 million a year — are needed to significantly lower the jobless rate. It takes from 100,000 to 150,000 new jobs a month just to tread water and match working-age population growth.

All told, since the recession began, local governments have bled 405,000 jobs, state governments 50,000. The federal government has added a net 63,000 jobs after subtracting the more recent losses.

Statistically, the recession ended in June 2009, but it's been a tough slog since for nearly everybody. One exception: The number of people earning \$1 million a year or more increased in 2010 by nearly 20 percent, the government reported last week.

Efforts to spur job growth — while also addressing chronic deficits — have been snarled by adamant GOP refusal to raise taxes of any kind, and Democratic stands against trimming popular government health and retirement programs.

FOR THE HOLIDAYS, PRICE MATTERS MORE THAN ANYTHING ELSE

NEW YORK • Forget style, quality and customer service. This holiday season, all that matters is price.

A week before Halloween and two full months before Christmas, stores are desperately trying to outdo each other in hopes of drawing in customers worn down by the economy.

Wal-Mart, the biggest store in the nation, joined the price war Monday by announcing that it would give gift cards to shoppers if they buy something there and find it somewhere else cheaper.

Staples and Bed Bath & Beyond have already said they will match the lowest prices of Amazon.com and other big Internet retailers. Sears is going a step further, offering to beat a competitor's best price by 10 percent.

"The days of marketing the stuff in your store because it was a hot brand are over," says Dave Ratner, owner of Dave's Soda & Pet City, a Massachusetts pet food and supplies chain.

For the holidays, Ratner plans to offer 20 percent off pet accessories if customers buy a bag of dog food. Customers, he says, just want a deal.

Almost four years after the onset of the Great Recession, they've learned to expect one, too. In better times, retailers could afford to keep prices higher and use promises of higher quality and better service to lure people into stores.

Those days are over. In a recent poll of 1,000 shoppers by America's Research Group, 78 percent said they were more driven by sales than they were a year ago. During the financial melt-

down in 2008, that figure was only 68 percent.

Wal-Mart last year went back to its "everyday low prices" roots, a bedrock philosophy of founder Sam Walton, rather than slashing prices only on certain items to draw in customers. Now everyday low prices might not be low enough.

So it's trying something it is calling the Christmas Price Guarantee. It works this way: If you buy something at Wal-Mart from Nov. 1 to Dec. 25 and find the identical product elsewhere for less, you get a gift card in the amount of the difference.

The deal excludes online prices and some categories of merchandise — groceries, live plants, tobacco, prescription drugs and wireless devices that require a service agreement.

But it is good even if weeks pass between your purchase and spotting the better deal. And it applies even to big items like TVs, for which prices can drop steeply as Christmas approaches.

Duncan MacNaughton, chief merchandising officer for Wal-Mart's U.S. stores, told reporters Monday that he has noticed "much more promotional intensity and gimmicks" among competitors.

"This gives customers peace of mind that we are an advocate for them," he said.

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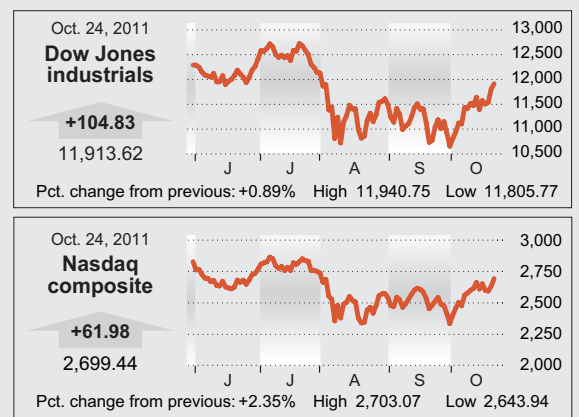
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THE MARKET AT A GLANCE

The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose to 1,254.19. That is just 3.45 points, or 0.3 percent, below where it started the year. It's the highest close for the S&P 500 since Aug. 3. If the S&P 500 finishes the year with a gain, it will be its biggest turnaround since 1984. The Nasdaq composite rose 61.98, or 2.3 percent, to 2,699.44. The gains turned the Nasdaq positive for the year.

Netflix Loses 800,000 U.S. Subscribers in Tough 3Q

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) • Netflix's video subscription service lost 800,000 customers in the third quarter – the biggest exodus in its history – even as its earnings rose 65 percent.

The losses were larger than management had previously warned. The unwelcome surprise, contained in financial results released Monday, was compounded by a forecast calling for millions of Netflix Inc.'s DVD-by-mail subscribers to cancel the service in reaction to dramatic price increase that took effect last month.

The bad news bruised already battered stock as the shares plunged by more than 26 percent.

Netflix lost its luster among consumers and investors by raising prices as much as 60 percent in the U.S. and bungling an attempt to spin off its DVD-by-mail rental service.

Obama Offers Mortgage Relief on Western Trip

Obama's proposal would let homeowners, who are still current on their mortgages, refinance no matter how much the value of their home has dropped below what they still owe.

LAS VEGAS • President Barack Obama offered mortgage relief on Monday to hundreds of thousands of Americans, his latest attempt to ease the economic and political fallout of a housing crisis that has bedeviled him as he seeks a second term.

"I'm here to say that we can't wait for an increasingly dysfunctional Congress to do its job," the president declared in remarks prepared for an appearance in Las Vegas, the epicenter of foreclosures and joblessness. "Where they won't act, I will."

Making a case for his policies and a new effort to circumvent roadblocks put up by Republican lawmakers, Obama also laid out a theme for his re-election: "There is no excuse for the games and gridlock we've seen in Washington. Folks out here don't have the time or the patience for it."

The new rules for federally guaranteed loans represent a recognition that measures the administration has taken so far on housing have not worked as well as expected.

His jobs bill struggling in Congress, Obama tried a new catchphrase – "We can't wait" – to highlight his administrative initiatives and to shift blame to congressional Republicans for lack of action to boost employment and stimulate an economic recovery.

Later in the week, Obama plans to announce measures to make it easier for college graduates to pay back federal loans. Such executive action allows Obama to address economic ills and other domestic challenges in spite of Republican opposition to most of his proposals.

While Obama has proposed prodding the economy with payroll tax cuts and increased spending on public works and aid to states, he has yet to offer a whole-sale overhaul of the nation's housing programs. Economists point to the burst housing bubble as the main culprit behind the 2008 financial crisis. Meanwhile, the combination of unemployment, depressed wages and mortgages that exceed house values has continued to put a strain on the economy.

While the White House tried to avoid predicting how many homeowners would benefit from the revamped refinancing program, the Federal Housing Finance Administration estimated an additional 1 million people would qualify. Moody's Analytics say the figure could be as high as 1.6 million.

Under Obama's proposal, homeowners who are still current on their mortgages would be able to refinance no matter how much their home value has dropped below what they still owe.

"Now, over the past two years, we've already taken some steps to help folks refinance their mortgages," Obama said, listing a series of measures. "But we can do more."

At the same time, Obama acknowledged that his latest proposal will not do all that's not needed to get the housing market back on its feet. "Given the magnitude of the housing bubble, and the huge inventory of unsold homes in places like Nevada, it will take time to solve

these challenges," he said.

In spelling out the plan to homeowners in a Las Vegas neighborhood, Obama chose a state that provides the starkest example of the toll the housing crisis has exacted from Americans. One in every 118 homes in the state of Nevada received a foreclosure notice in September, the highest ratio in the country, according to the foreclosure listing firm RealtyTrac.

Presidential spokesman Jay Carney criticized Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney for proposing last week while in Las Vegas that the government not interfere with foreclosures. "Don't try to stop the foreclosure process," Romney told the *Las Vegas Review-Journal*. "Let it run its course and hit the bottom."

"That is not a solution," Carney told reporters on Air Force One. He said Romney would tell homeowners, "You're on your own, tough luck."

The president also was using his visit to Las Vegas to promote a \$15 billion neighborhood revitalization plan contained in his current jobs proposal that would help redevelop abandoned and foreclosed properties and stabilize affected neighborhoods.

The Nevada stop was the first leg of a three-day tour of Western states, blending his pitch for boosting the economy with an aggressive hunt for campaign cash.

From Nevada, Obama will head for the glamor of Hollywood and the homes of movie stars Melanie Griffith and Antonio Banderas and producer James Lassiter for some high-dollar fundraising. On Tuesday, he will tape an appearance on "The Tonight Show" with Jay Leno. He will also raise money in San Francisco and in Denver.

Revenue fell short of analysts' expectations, however, and the company reduced its planned 2011 timber harvest. The company reported net income of \$25.6 million, or 63 cents per share, for the quarter that ended Sept. 30. That was up from \$18.1 million, or 45 cents per share, a year ago. Revenue fell 3.8 percent to \$152.9 million, from \$158.9 million a year ago.

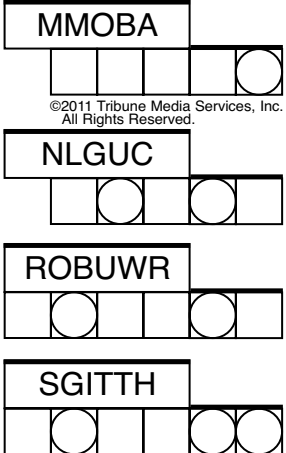

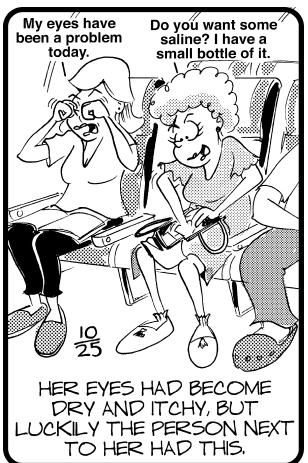

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"It is admirable to consider how many Millions of People come into, and go out of the World, Ignorant of themselves, and of the World they have lived in."

Part of the trouble with finding the best opening lead is that we are initially taught a number of rules: "lead partner's suit," "fourth highest of your longest and strongest," etc. These rules are no substitute for listening to the bidding and making a logical deduction.

Sitting West, what would you lead against three no-trump? While it could be right to lead a spade, the decent five-card minor is more promising. (When in doubt, pick a major over a minor against no-trump; here, you are not in doubt. Five-card suits are more attractive than four-carders.)

Now, which diamond would you pick? The 10 is the obvious choice, but there is a strong case for hanging on to your top cards in the suit. North rates to have minor-suit length since he did not use Stayman, and if he has diamond length, it would be a mistake to squander the queen, 10 or nine.

As the cards lie, a high diamond would be fatal since you would no longer be able to set up the suit effectively. Declarer is under no pressure at all and has plenty of time to establish his nine tricks.

However, look at the play on a low diamond lead. Declarer must duck East's jack, or else West can use his two entries to establish and cash his diamonds. If East's diamond jack holds and he finds the incisive spade switch, declarer will lose two spades and one trick in each of the other suits.

ANSWER: It would be premature to bounce directly to three no-trump. Your side could be lay-down for a slam, or you might have a better game in either red suit. For the time being, it is quite sufficient to cue-bid two clubs, planning to bid three no-trump at your next turn.

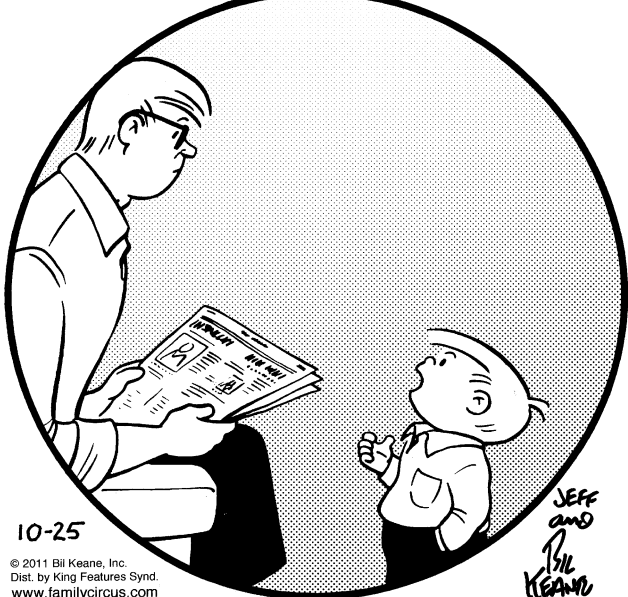

DEAR ABBY: I read with interest your excellent advice to “Nowhere and Everywhere” (Aug. 17), who asked about letting family members know about her polyamorous relationship. It is not realistic to expect family members to immediately accept this lifestyle if they were raised with different beliefs about sexual exclusivity in marriage. I advise couples to “test the waters” first with the most open-minded family member by bringing up the subject of a “friend” who is in an open relationship. If the relative reacts in a neutral or positive way, it may be safe to disclose the truth. Ask this person how the rest of the family might respond to the news. Couples should carefully assess whether their relationship is strong enough to withstand potential rejection.

There is a price to pay for being open, and one for staying secretive. The latter requires lying to family members and excluding one partner from family events, causing pain for everyone. (The cornerstone of polyamorous relationships is HONESTY.)

Families do become more accepting over time if they see that the couple's marriage is not threatened by the polyamory and that everyone seems happy. I advise couples to expect drama and disapproval at first, but to be patient and keep reaching out to family members to give them time to get used to this new situation.

Basque Pelota: Hard Sport Eyeing Growth

GUADALAJARA, Mexico • Cricket is sure to stump a Chilean. Argentines are unlikely to understand American football. Baseball is bound to confound a Russian. And don't expect a Greek to get the intricacies of golf.

But, hey, they're all easy compared to Basque pelota, a vast array of court sports played by pounding a ball against a wall with a bare hand, paddle, racket or basket.

The barehanded variety is the essence of the sport, which has its roots in the Basque provinces of southwestern France and northern Spain but is part of the Pan Americans Games in Mexico. And it's also the one that can cause the most pain.

Repeatedly smashing the ball causes swelling, which is often relieved by using a razor to cut small incisions

between the knuckles to draw blood and bring some relief. Some players tape their hands heavily, but that doesn't provide much protection.

"We're used to it," said Tony Huarte, a top U.S. player of hand pelota at the Pan Am Games.

Huarte grew up in San Francisco and moved to his parents' birthplace near Pamplona in northern Spain when he was 12.

"People say: 'Wow, you guys are nuts for playing with a bare hand,'" Huarte said. "And you realize they are kind of right. We are kind of nuts. It does hurt. If you just stop and think about it for a minute it looks crazy from the outside."

Basque pelota is simple at its core, but it consists of 14 disciplines played on four different kinds of courts that vary in size and are made up of a front wall, a longer side wall running

Rangers in a Strange Land

Texas gets to within one win of first World Series championship by beating Cards, 4-2

ARLINGTON, Texas • A long drive by Mike Napoli, a lucky bounce near the mound and suddenly the Texas Rangers were on the brink of their first World Series championship.

Napoli delivered the biggest hit of his charmed season, lining a tiebreaking two-run double in the eighth inning that sent the Rangers past the St. Louis Cardinals 4-2 on Monday night for a 3-2 edge.

The slugging catcher then capped off his night of double duty, throwing out a would-be base stealer in the ninth as Albert Pujols struck out.

"Pujols is going to put it in play, he's a good contact hitter," Napoli said, "and they were just starting the runner, 3-2. As soon as I got it, I just got rid of it and put it on the bag."

Texas will try to wrap it up in Game 6 on Wednesday night in St. Louis.

If the Rangers eventually do win that elusive crown, the Texas fans who stood and chanted Napoli's name may forever remember his two-run hit.

"Just trying to get some-

thing to the outfield, you know, get a sac fly, get that run across the board," Napoli said. "I was trying to stay short and I got a pitch I could handle over the middle of the plate and put it in the gap."

If the Cardinals lose, there's no doubt which play will stick with manager Tony La Russa for a long, long time.

It was 2-1 when Texas put runners on first and second with one out in the eighth, and reliever Marc Rzepczynski was summoned. David Murphy followed with a bouncer back to the mound, a possible inning-ending double play in the making.

NCAA WEIGHS PAYING STUDENT-ATHLETES \$2K

Boise State president Kustra opposes proposal, saying it could widen gulf already existing in college football.

WASHINGTON • NCAA President Mark Emmert backed a proposal to allow conferences to increase grants to student athletes by \$2,000, "to more closely approach" the full cost of attending college, beyond the athletic scholarships athletes receive for tuition, fees, room, board and books.

Emmert told the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics on Monday that the proposal will be finalized this week and he'll ask the NCAA Division I Board of Directors to support it at their meeting Thursday. He noted that student athletes have limited opportunities to work outside the classroom and playing fields, and that the current model of athletic scholarship hasn't changed for 40 years.

Emmert says he'll also ask the board to allow colleges and universities to provide multiyear grants, instead of year-to-year scholarships.

"We are going to create a model that would allow — probably ... up to \$2,000 in addition to" tuition, fees, room and board, books and supplies.

Emmert said he expected all of the Bowl Championship Series conferences to adopt it — at least those six

that get automatic bids to BCS bowl games — because they have the revenue stream to afford it.

"Will schools underneath that?" he asked. "I don't know. So you don't want to put a conference or a school in a position with a mandatory expense, and the only way to pay for it is to cut scholarships?"

One university president on a later panel said he opposed the proposal. Boise State president Robert Kustra urged supporters of the plan to look at the support that Division I student athletes receive, and compare it to "the rest of our students, who are making minimum wage, collecting tips, trying to find their way into their next semester at the university ... Go back and examine the life of a student athlete in intercollegiate sports in America today, and see how privileged they are to be where they are and the opportunities they have."

Kustra also warned that the proposal will give some schools a competitive advantage over others.

"You just heard President Emmert say that some conferences will, some conferences won't. Well gee, I wonder who will, and I wonder who won't," he said to laughter. "I think I know the answer to that. The haves will, and the have-nots will try — I'll try — but many will not be able to. And so what you're doing, then, is fueling a little bit more of this BCS/anti-BCS debate." Boise State belongs to the Mountain West Conference, which does not receive an

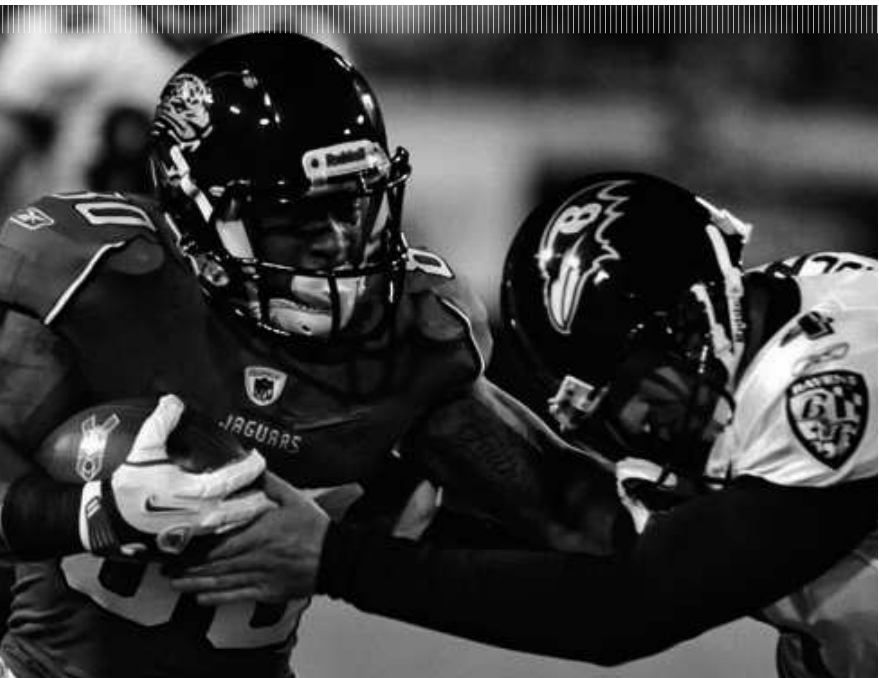

Jaguars Beat Ravens At Their Own Game, 12-7

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. •

On one night, on one big stage, the Jacksonville Jaguars did everything better than the Baltimore Ravens.

Maurice Jones-Drew ran for 105 yards against the NFL's best run defense, Josh Scobee kicked four field goals and the Jaguars snapped a five-game slide with a 12-7 victory over the Ravens on Monday night.

Stepping into the national spotlight for a few hours, the Jaguars used their best defensive effort in five years to slow down Ray Rice, Joe Flacco and Co.

Jacksonville (2-5) didn't allow a first down until the 5:26 mark of the third quarter, a mix of stout defense and inept offense. Flacco finally got the Ravens (4-2)

on the scoreboard with a little more than two minutes remaining. He capped a 90-yard drive with a 5-yard touchdown pass to Anquan Boldin.

The Ravens failed to recover an onside kick when the ball bounced inches short of going the required 10 yards. Scobee followed with his third field goal of at least 50 yards.

Baltimore had a final possession, but in fitting fashion, Jacksonville's defense came up big. Drew Coleman stepped in front of Ed Dickson and intercepted Flacco's final pass.

The Ravens finished with 146 total yards. The Jaguars had 205.

Baltimore finally got a first down on its 28th play of the game when Rice broke off a 12-yard run. That was only the second play longer than 10 yards

for the Ravens, although they picked up two more first downs on the drive. It ended when Dwight Lowery sacked Flacco, and Billy Cundiff's 52-yard field goal was wide right.

That gave the Jaguars first-and-goal from the 3, but Blaine Gabbert failed to complete two passes in the end zone and Scobee kicked a 22-yard field goal.

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WTA Expresses Condolences over Turkey Earthquake

ISTANBUL • The elite of women's tennis awaits the start of the WTA Championships, expressing condolences for a country coping with a devastating earthquake that has left about 270 people dead.

The 7.2-magnitude quake struck Tuesday in eastern Turkey near the border with Iran, far from the tournament in Istanbul. Istanbul, the country's largest city with more than 12 million

people, lies in northwest Turkey near a major fault line.

Women's Tennis Association officials briefed the eight players on the quake. The season-ending tournament runs from Tuesday to Sunday at Sinan Erdem Arena.

Second-ranked Maria Sharapova said she received many phone calls and e-mails expressing concern.

"I think it gives us an opportunity to sit down and say, 'We're very, very lucky

and fortunate to be doing what we're doing,'" Sharapova said. "These things that happen around the world, you just never know where it can happen. I mean, this was only a few hours from here."

Top-ranked Caroline Wozniacki arrived in Istanbul on Thursday and wanted to pass along condolences on behalf of all the players.

"All our thoughts are with everyone affected, and of course it's never nice

when something like this happens," said Wozniacki, whose profile in Turkey has risen since she signed a commercial deal with a Turkish airline last year. "I definitely got a few messages yesterday and just asking if everything was OK, and if we're all OK here."

At the draw ceremony Sunday, CEO Stacey Allaster said: "We will do whatever we can to support the people of Turkey in some small way through the

power of sport."

Istanbul will host the \$5 million event through 2013. The tournament was held in Qatar the last three years.

WTA EXTENDS CEO ALLASTER'S CONTRACT

The Women's Tennis Association has extended the contract of CEO Stacey Allaster until 2017.

The WTA announced Monday that Allaster, who has been in charge since 2009, was given a five-year extension after an unanimous vote by its board of di-

rectors.

Board representative Steve Simon says Allaster "has done a tremendous job," adding that her "innovative thinking has positioned the WTA for a very bright future."

Allaster says she is "honored to have the opportunity to continue to lead women's tennis."

Venus Williams, the chair of the players' council, also praised Allaster for her work on players' health and marketing.
