BURLEY • Arson is the suspected cause of a fire that broke out late Friday, destroying an old potato processing plant on West Main Street in Burley.
Cassia County Sheriff Randy Kidd
said investigators were interviewing said investigators were interviewing
two suspects Monday in connection with the fire that started at about 11:40 p.m. at the building owned by High Desert Milk.
Burley Fire Chief Keith Martin said fire investigators believe the blaze started in the an old office area in the building's southeast corner. It
burned west about halfway through the building before it was brought under control.
Martin said three or four people reported seeing multiple juveniles running from the building shortly before the fire was reported. "Any evidence on what actually tin said.
Martin said the department battled the blaze with its new ladder truck, which worked well. An excavator was brought in during the night to knock down a section of the south wall, which was leaning

The wood and steel -framed roof collapsed onto the first floor and into the basement.

The federally funded program for young children and their families has a growing waiting list in the area, but services can't expand without congressional approval.

## TwinFallsCouncil Concernedabout LegislativeClout

The Twin Falls City Coun-
cil is concerned enough
about the outcomeof leg-
islative redistricting to
consider joining a potential
legal challenge.
The council aired opin-
ions on Monday about how
the ecity fared in redistrict-
ing, a process that realigns
the state's 35 legislative
districts based on popula-
tion changes each decade.
The biggest change for
the city was being placedin
its own legislative district.
Previously, the city was
splitinto two separate dis-
tricts that also stretched
into Twin Falls County.
"We got the short end of
the stick", said Councilman
Lance Clow, who asked for
the discussion.
The way Clow sees it,
the city wound up withless
representation because
now only three lawmakers
from one district will rep-
resent the city. Under the
old map, as many as six
legislators could have been
elected from within city
limits.
Other council members
agreed that they'd like to
get more information and
discuss the issue further,
though that doesn't mean
anything's a done deal.
They didn't make any
decisions about a legal
challenge, and are tenta-
tively planning a closeddoor session for Nov. 7 to get more information and weigh options. Any deci-
sion would need to be in open session afterwards. It's possible that the city could join a legal challenge if Twin Falls County files one contesting the outcome of redistricting. Legal challenges to redistricting can be filed by anyone, and
would go directly to the Idaho Supreme Court for a ruling.
Councilman Will Kezele said the city should carefully ask the question of plan, cautioning that a difplan, cautioning that a dif-
ferent result could pose problems as well. In other words, the council approved a change that slightly eases the process of getting a city animal permit. City ordinance still requires threeing within 300 feet of a proposed site for a permit to approve the request. But the applicant no longer has to get a signature from absolutely everyone in that

cious and deceitful propagand"" in Syria's state-run media that they feared could incite violence against the career diplomat.
President Bashar Assad's regime re Wanded by recalling its ambassador to Washington, Imad Moustapha, for
consultations. A Syrian embassy spokesman declined comment on the American allegations.

The flap comes after months of growing friction between Washington and Damascus. In August, President Barack Obama led other Western governments in calling for Assad to step

Ford has traveled widely this year to meet Syrian opposition leaders and offer them public support. His highprofile visits, including attending the funeral of a Syrian activist, have heart-

"I'm here to say that we can't wait for an increasingly dysfunctional Congress to doits job,"'the president declared inremarks prepared for an appearance in Las
Vegas, the epicenter of foreclosures and Vegas, the epicenter of foreclosures and
joblessness. "Where they won't act I jobless
will."
Making a case for his policies and a new effort to circumvent roadblocks put up by Republican lawmakers, Obamaalso laid out a theme for his re-election: "There is no excuse for the games and gricllock we've seenin Washington. Folks tience for it:"
The new rules for federally guaranteed loans represent a recognition that measures the administration has taken so far on housing have not worked as well as expected.
His jobs bill struggling in Congress, can't wait" - to highlight his administrative initiatives and to shift blame to congressional Republicans for lack of action to boost employment and stimulate
aneconomic recovery.
Later in the week, Obamaplansto announce measures to make it easier for
college graduates to pay back federal loans. Such executive action allows Oba-
ma to address economic ills and other domestic challenges in spite of Republican opposition to most of his proposals. While Obama has proposed prodding the economy with payroll tax cuts and
increased spending on public works and increased spending on public works and
aid to states, he has yet to offer a wholeaid to states, he has yet to offer a whole grams. Economists point to the burst housing bubble as the main culprit behind the 2008 financial crisis. Meanwhile, the combination of unemployment, depressed wages and mortgages

to put a strain on the economy. While the White House tried to avoid predicting how many homeowners would benefit from the revamped refinancing program, the Federal Housing Finance Administration estimated an additional 1 millionpeople would qualify.

Emmert says he'll also ask the board to allow colleges and universities to year-to-year scholarships.
