# Is Yogurt in Twin Falls' Future?

Greek yogurt producer Chobani could bring hundreds of jobs to a selected site in the West, and Twin Falls is in the running.

Twin Falls is one of a handful of cities in Idaho and Nevada being considered as a site for a Greek yogurt production plant.

Chobani, a New York-based manufacturer of Greek yogurt, has visited Twin Falls as well as Carson City, Nev., in recent months in its efforts to find a spot for a facility near the West Coast. If it becomes a reality, a Chobani facility would bring a needed boost to the economy of Twin Falls, which has seen little largescale growth in recent years aside from the C3 call center opening in 2010.

A Western facility would allow Chobani to be more flexible in its distribution of its products, said Nicki Briggs, a spokeswoman for Agro Farma, Chobani's parent company.

ma, Chobani's parent company. "We have spoken with the folks at Twin Falls," she said, adding that several locations are under consideration and no decision has been made.

Briggs said the company has visited potential sites in the last few months and declined to name other places under consideration.

With fewer wildfires to put out, Idaho isn't feeling any heat from tighter regulation of flame retardant.

Wildfires consumed close to 381,000 acres this year in the state, much less than in years past. Fire officials predicted flames to be low this year and speculate that next year should be the same.

But as Idaho firefighters take a break from fighting flames, some of them will be under stricter guidelines on how they use fire retardants to do so next year.

The U.S. Forest Service recently released an updated plan on how it will acres of land throughout 44 states. A 2010 court order forced the agency to evaluate how to use retardants without harming environmentally sensitive land, water and endangered species.

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management, which bases firefighting aircraft out of the Twin Falls airport, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service are still deciding whether to adopt the Forest Service's new approach.

The use of retardants has been debated over the years because they can cause unintentional environmental consequences. Retardants are made up of water and fertilizers that suck *Please see* **FIRE SEASON, A2**

# Work Worth \$25,000

The first principal of Twin Falls' new Canyon Ridge High School was honored Wednesday with a national prize for his performance.

For the past few weeks, Canyon Ridge High School Principal Brady Dickinson unknowingly planned his own awards ceremony.

After hearing Idaho Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna was coming to Twin Falls and wanted to have a patriotic ceremony in advance of Veterans Day, Dickinson coordinated with student groups and made sure things were ready to go.

But during the Wednesday assembly, Dickinson was caught off guard when he was named the 2011 Milken Educator of the Year in Idaho, an honor that comes with an unrestricted \$25,000 award.

"I had no idea it was coming," he said after the assembly.

Twin Falls City Manager Travis Rothweiler and Melinda Anderson, the city's economic development director, both declined comment on the company. Jan Rogers, executive director of the Southern Idaho Economic Development Organization, also wouldn't speak on the subject, citing the organization's policy of not commenting until a company makes a decision.

Larry Werner, city manager for Carson City, said his community is in the running for the yogurt plant as well, and is still waiting to hear back from Chobani.

"We thought it was going to Twin Falls, but we've not been told 'no' or 'yes,'" he said.

Werner said, under the scenarios he was told about, the potential plant's employee count would begin at about 400 or 500 workers and gradually grow to about 1,500.

Carson City provided the company information about city infrastructure like transportation and water drainage systems, he said.

Werner said Chobani representatives mentioned Twin Falls to him, adding that the company was professional and didn't try to use a potential deal with Twin Falls as leverage.

"They were not pitting us like: 'Twin Falls can do this. What can you do?""

Chobani also has visited with Fallon, Nev., a region with a strong dairy and agricultural presence. Fallon City Engineer Jim Souba said the company has visited a potential site and had preliminary discussions in recent months, adding that he's uncertain of what decision the company will make.

Despite the recession, Chobani has been growing. The company announced in 2010 plans to expand its manufacturing facility and production hub in New York.

If the company follows the same business practice it has used for its New York facility, it could also be a boon for the region's dairy economy. Agro Farma used an estimated 25 million pounds of milk each week at its South Edmeston, N.Y., facility, with an economic impact of \$300 million annually for that state's farming community, according to the company.

Danny Campos, director of investor relations with the Northern Nevada Development Authority, is working with Carson City and Chobani.

He said his guess is that there will be a decision made within 30 days, though he declined to comment further.

"Most of it's confidential," Campos said. "We don't even have the authorization to announce anything about it publicly."

# **City Issues, Newspaper Spat Mark Burley Forum**

Write-in candidate Ramsey withdraws from the election after questioning newspaper rival Lenkersdorfer's ethics during Tuesday's forum.

BURLEY • After a contentious start to Tuesday's Burley City Council candidates forum, the crowd of candidates fielded questions on city issues in front of a packed house at the Burley Public Library.

Write-in candidate Mike Ramsey joined Tom Tolness, Joyce Merrill, Russ Mallory, incumbent Jay Lenkersdorfer, Sam Kuoha, Randy Hawkins, Dennis Dexter and John Craner for a discussion on the issues. But when Ramsey directed his comments specifically toward Lenkersdorfer, his efforts were thwarted by forum moderator Rick Bollar, a 5th Judicial District magistrate judge.

Ramsey said his political campaign was based on trying to bring awareness to the conflicts of interest presented when the owner of a newspaper is also a city councilman. Lenkersdorfer owns a Burleybased weekly newspaper which regularly reports on the council's actions, while Ramsey operates a rival Burley weekly.

Bollar interrupted Ramsey several times at the beginning of the forum, reminding the young write-in candidate to focus on city issues, adding that veiled references to a specific individual were not acceptable.

"I don't need to mention names," Ramsey said. "If you've all lived here and watched it, you all know."

Lenkersdorfer, who had ample oppor-

tunity later in the forum, refrained from addressing Ramsey's claims that his position on the council has been harmful to the community. Before the forum ended, Ramsey announced his withdrawal from the election.

When asked to list what they believe are the top issues the city faces by Bollar, the candidates answered with a variety of responses. Many said that thoughtfully guiding economic development and preserving the joint law enforcement agreement with Cassia County were among the city's top priorities. Many also addressed concerns of professionalism and animosity regarding the council and its meetings.

Craner said fixing the city's far-reaching negative reputation will be important, while Hawkins, Dexter and Merrill also touched on topics regarding the council's relationship with the community.

Tolness suggested providing more youth activities, including making the city's current airport into a teen hangout after a new airport can be built. Dexter said working with other governmental bodies to unify Mini-Cassia will be key, a sentiment Kuoha also touched upon.

Lenkersdorfer said aging infrastructure is a top city issue, and although upgrading the streets is a pressing need, aging sewer lines are also a concern. He added that how the city will keep fees low as the costs of services rise will be an issue.

Mallory said maintenance of city streets is also a major concern.

In summing up their candidacies, most candidates noted their time to devote to representing the city and their backgrounds in public service. Voters will elect three council members during the Nov. 8 election. The four-year terms will start in January.

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# Sun Valley Turns to Voters for Road and Fire Funding

Three bonds set to sunset may give Sun Valley hope that voters will let a fourth begin.

Sun Valley residents will be asked to approve a \$14.15 million general obligation bond during the Nov. 8 election.

About 85 percent of the money will pay for road and path reconstruction. The remaining \$600,000 would go to fire department equipment, including half the bill for the aerial tower truck the Sun Valley Fire Department shares with the Ketchum Fire Department. Sun Valley would also buy new radio equipment and new air packs for firefighters, each of which cost \$175,000.

City officials argue that conditions are right at the moment to minimize the projects' costs. Mayor Wayne Willich said road reconstruction will cost substantially more if the roads are allowed to deteriorate further. In addition, the city's aerial tower truck is 23 years old. When such trucks turn 25, insurance rating

agencies discount their rating to zero, degrading the city's fire rating system.

The final details of the bond aren't quite finished if it's approved, the council will decide whether to pursue a 15- or 20-year term based on what the rates are in February. That will provide some flexibility, and the project may come in cheaper if the city can minimize interest and pay it off in fewer years.

But Councilwoman Joan Lamb points out that three bonds Sun Valley residents are currently paying — the Blaine County Manor bond, Sun Valley's 1997 bond, and the Land, Water and Wildlife bond — will be complete by the time payments would begin on the new bond. Residents paying about \$488 in taxes per \$1 million of assessed property value would continue to pay about the same amount after the transition, according to the city.

What's more, residents likely wouldn't have to begin making payments on the bond until December 2012 or even sometime in 2013, Willich said.

Bond interest rates and bids for road construction are low right now, so the council thinks it can save taxpayers money by bidding out the work now, said Councilman Nils Ribi.

Willich said Sun Valley would construct new roads and paths with concrete asphalt, grinding up the current asphalt on the spot and mixing it with concrete. Not only will this procedure give the new paths and road longer life than the current surface material, but workers won't have to bring in a new base material or haul away the old.

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# Meridian Man Sentenced for Stabbing His Mother

**BOISE (AP)** • A Meridian man convicted of killing of his mother and kidnapping his wife earlier this year was sentenced Wednesday to life in prison.

Fourth District Judge Patrick Owen ordered 25year-old Michael James Lee to serve at least 32 years, which would make him at least 57 before he becomes eligible for parole.

Authorities were called to the scene of the Jan. 4 stabbing after Lee's wife, bound in chains, escaped from the car trunk and ran for help.

Lee later acknowledged kidnapping his wife and putting her in the trunk of his car before driving to his mother's home in Eagle. He ate dinner with his mother, 46-year-old Lynn Marie Blake, before stabbing her 22 times in front of his infant daughter, who was unharmed, detectives said.

Lee pleaded guilty in May to first-degree murder, second-degree kidnapping, and felony battery in connection with Blake's death. Five other charges including rape and aggravated assault were dropped as part of a plea deal, though Lee acknowledged he raped his wife and battered his mother's roommate.

Prosecutors say Blake's roommate, who suffered torn eye muscles during the attack, continues to heal from her injuries

On Wednesday, Lee's now ex-wife told Owen that she was torn by the prospect of a long sentence for her former husband, because it means their young child will grow up without a father.

# UI Releases Timeline in Prof Murder-suicide

**BOISE** • A psychology professor who gunned down a graduate student he had dated and then took his own life two months ago had disclosed his bipolar disorder shortly after he was hired in 2007, according to a timeline released Wednesday.

University of Idaho President Duane Nellis discussed the release of personnel records for Ernesto Bustamante, 31, at a news conference.

Bustamante was found dead in his hotel room Aug. 23 with six guns and medications for bipolar disorder and severe anxiety. Moscow police a day earlier had found the body of 22-year-old Katy Benoit, who was shot nearly a dozen times outside her Moscow home.

Bustamante disclosed to the psychology department that he managed his mental illness with medication after starting his employment on Aug. 12, 2007, the university said in the timeline.

"We, as an institution when we hire people, we're not allowed to ask for medical conditions, or anything like that," Nellis said at the news conference on the Moscow campus. "Bipolar is something that's certainly treatable."

As early as the fall of his first semester, three or four students went to psychology department chair Ken Locke to express concerns about Bustamante's behavior, saying he was "flirtatious" and showed favoritism to students.

Bustamante, who is originally from Venezuela, was confronted about the complaints and told Locke that his interactions with a student who was also Hispanic had been misunderstood, the university said.

Benoit had met Bustamante last fall when she took a psychology course he was teaching, and by the end of the semester they were dating.

In December 2010, Bustamante met with administrators to discuss a complaint that an anonymous caller put into a university hotline, saying Bustamante was having sexual relationships with students and had been abusive toward one of them. The student at the center of the abuse allegations was not Benoit and denied that Bustamante had exhibited improper behavior, refusing to file a complaint against him.

Bustamante denied any violations of university policy.

Benoit's relationship with Bustamante ended in May, after he put a gun to her head and told her how he would use it to kill her. She told others he had threatened her with a gun twice before. That month, he informed Locke that was experiencing withdrawal symptoms due to a change in his medication.

Bustamante had been known to alternately refer to himself as a "psychopathic killer" and "the beast," according to police. After the couple split, Benoit alerted school officials that she was becoming increasingly concerned for her safety and filed a sexual harassment complaint with the university on June 12.

Bustamante denied the allegations and filed his own complaint against her on July 8, claiming defamation of character. Bustamante resigned his position as assistant professor Aug. 19, and police say he was in the

process of moving to New Jersey for another job.

The quickest way for the university to remove Bustamante from campus was for him to sign a separation agreement.

"I'm not sure the university had knowledge about his employment anywhere else," said Nellis, who was also unsure if administrators in the psychology department had been contacted by the New Jersey employer.

School officials had contact with Benoit more than a dozen times to discuss the situation and urge her to take safety precautions. The final meeting came Aug. 22, the first day of the fall 2011 semester and the same day police said Bustamante shot Benoit 11 times with a .45caliber handgun outside her home.

Nellis announced Wednesday that the university would take action to bol-

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ster its consensual relationship policy and expand sexual harassment training.

"We've come together in the wake of an unthinkable tragedy," Nellis said. "Going forward we'll be stronger and wiser."

Media outlets were ex-

pected to receive Bustamante's personnel documents today. A judge ordered the documents released Oct. 3 after the university and several media outlets petitioned the court to rule they were a matter of public record.

ometime in 2012, I will begin the ninth year of my life under an FBI gag order, which began when I received what is known

as a national security letter at the small Internet service provider I owned. On that day in 2004 (the exact date is redacted from court papers, so I can't reveal it), an FBI agent came to my office and handed me a letter. It demanded that I turn over information about one of my clients and forbade me from telling "any person" that the government had approached me.

National security letters are issued by the FBI, not a judge, to obtain phone, computer, and banking information. Instead of complying, I spoke with a lawyer at the American Civil Liberties Union and filed a constitutional challenge against the NSL provision of the Patriot Act, which was signed into law 10 years ago Wednesday.

A decade later, much of the government's surveillance policy remains shrouded in secrecy, making it impossible for the American public to engage in a meaningful debate on the effectiveness or wisdom of various practices. The government has used NSLs to collect private information on hundreds of thousands of people. I am the only person from the telecommunications industry who received one to ever challenge in court the legality of the warrantless NSL searches and the associated gag order and to be subsequently (partially) un-gagged.

In 2004, it wasn't at all clear whether the FBI would charge me with a crime for telling the ACLU about the letter, or for telling the court clerk about it when I filed my lawsuit as "John Doe." I was unable to tell my family, friends, colleagues or my company's clients, and I had to lie about where I was going when I visited my attorneys.

For years, the government implausibly claimed that if I were able to identify myself as the plaintiff in the case, irreparable damage to national security would result. But I did not believe then, nor do I believe now, that the FBI's gag order was motivated by legitimate national security concerns. It was motivated by a desire to insulate the FBI from public criticism and oversight.

In 2007, *The Washington Post* made an exception to its policy against anonymous op-eds and published a piece I wrote about my predicament. In August 2010, the government agreed to a settlement, and I was finally allowed to reveal my name to the public in connection with my case, but I am still prevented – under the threat of imprisonment – from discussing any fact that was redacted in the thousands of pages of court documents.

I don't believe that it's right for Americans' free speech rights to be bound by perpetual gag orders that can't be meaningfully challenged in a court of law. The courts agreed, but the NSLs and the gag orders live on. Now the FBI is supposed to notify NSL recipients that they can

For decades, Washington has been an indispensable partner to state and local governments in dealing with juvenile justice challenges. But that partnership will be endangered if Congress gets its way.

The federal government awards grants to states and localities that adopt policies proven effective in preventing juvenile delinquency or in dealing with youths who run into trouble with the law. The amounts in question are a pittance when compared to the overall federal budget, but they are critical to maintaining policies.

House lawmakers would eliminate funding altogether for the delinquency-prevention component and cut the latter program by roughly one-third. The Senate approach cuts 27 percent and 38 percent, respectively. The Obama administration is asking for an \$18 million increase for the first program and an \$8 million boost for the latter.

# When Pumpkins Fly: **Cannon Builders Craft Contraptions for Cause**

**NAMPA** • Three amateur artillery teams took aim at targets in a field Sunday afternoon to benefit Canyon County Habitat for Humanity, their air-powered cannons lobbing pumpkins thousands of feet and reducing wooden doors to splinters.

It was a perfect day for the fourth annual Great Pumpkin Launch, hosted by the Whistle family on their Nampa farm. Clear blue skies and temperatures in the high 60s greeted onlookers as gourds flew through the air like cannonballs. A horn blast warned onlookers before each powerful burst of air, followed by the audible whistle of a pumpkin speeding away at near-supersonic velocities.

Sunday's event was just for fun, and to raise money for the needy in Canyon County. But competitive pumpkin launching is serious business, culminating in the annual World Champion Punkin Chunkin event in Delaware.

So just how far can these home-build howitzers launch a gourd?

"I have shot 3,900 feet," pumpkin cannoneer Justin Harrison said of his trailermounted contraption. "I've shot a slug of ice over a mile.... This is a top cannon in the world for distance. If you go to the World Champion Punkin Chunkin, and you look at how far everybody shot, anything within 4,000 feet is top six."

Harrison's machine can throw a pumpkin so far, in fact, that it's nearly impossible to track its path - they tend to disappear from view near the peak of their arc. And they can do serious damage to anything that gets in their way.

"I can literally put a pumpkin through a car," Harrison said. "I don't care what part - not the engine, but anywhere in the body without breaking the pumpkin. Through sheet metal, both sides."

Wayne Richey, another local cannon builder, had perhaps the most unique design – his device was made to look like a giant double-barreled shotgun. And, he said, it takes a certain caliber of person to participate in this activity.

"Fairly sharp people build these. These are real guns," Richey said with a laugh. "The people that do this aren't rednecks, they're fairly competent people. Very capable and intelligent."

In addition to pumpkin launching, Sunday's event also featured a small farmers' market, live music from the High Desert Band, and games for the kids. All proceeds benefit the Canyon County chapter of Habitat for Humanity, which builds homes for those in need throughout the communi-

"We just finished building a home in Caldwell. It's going to close by Thanksgiving probably," executive director Marcia Davis said. "And we just started another house in Nampa. We're building that one in conjunction with Nampa School Districts."

And, Davis continued, Habitat always needs help. Anyone who can swing a hammer or work in their building materials thrift store is invited to volunteer. Of course, cash donations are always welcome.

"It's expensive to build a house," she said with a laugh.

The Kootenai County Sheriff's department has received 91 reports of home burglaries over the past two months, more than four times the 21 burglaries reported during the same period last year.

The agency has received reports of suspicious people checking out residences by knocking on doors during the daytime hours and pretending to sell firewood or offer dog-walking services, said police department spokesman Maj. Ben Wolfinger.

Wolfinger said the poor economy and illegal drugs are likely the reasons for the increased break-ins.

"We expected some increases in theft and burglahas drug on," Wolfinger told the Spokesman-Review. "That's certainly an issue. It's hard to say. Historically, where you've got a burglar, you've got a drug user. So we don't know if there's a new influx of addicts in the area."

The homes that have been targeted are blocked from the view of neighbors possibly by a long driveway or trees or shrubs. Sheriff's deputies have leads, but have not made any arrests in connection with the break-ins, Wolfinger said Monday.

OAKLAND, Calif. • The display of police force in Oakland, Calif., and Atlanta has unnerved some anti-Wall Street protesters.

While demonstrators in other cities have built a working relationship with police and city leaders, they wondered on Wednesday how long the good spirit would last and whether they could be next.

Will they have to face riot gear-

clad officers and tear gas that their counterparts in Oakland, Calif., faced Tuesday? Or will they be handcuffed and hauled away in the middle of the night like protesters in Atlanta?

"Yes, we're afraid. Is this the night they're going to sneak in?" said activist William Buster of Occupy Wall Street, where the movement began last month to protest what they see as corporate greed. "Is this the night they might use

unreasonable force?" he asked.

# Longevity's Secrets Sought in DNA of 100-year-olds

**NEW YORK** • George Eberhardt turned 107 last month, and scientists would love to know how he and other older folks like him made it that far. So he's going to hand over some of his DNA.

He's one of 100 centenarians taking part in a project announced Wednesday that will examine some of the oldest citizens with one of the newest scientific tools: wholegenome sequencing, the deciphering of a person's complete collection of DNA.

Scientists think DNA from very old healthy people could offer clues to how they lived so long. And that could one day lead to medicines to help the rest of us stay disease-free longer.

**DENVER** • President Barack Obama recalled his struggles with student loan debt as he unveiled a plan Wednesday that could give millions of young people some relief on their payments. Speaking at the University of Colorado Denver, Obama said that he and his wife, Michelle, together owed more than \$120,000 in law school debt that took nearly a decade to pay off. He said that sometimes he'd have to make monthly payments to multiple lenders, and the debt meant they were not only paving for their own degrees but saving for their daughters' college funds simultaneously.

"I've been in your shoes. We did not come from a wealthy family," Obama said to cheers.

Obama said it's never been more important to get a college education, but it's also never been more expensive. Obama said his plan will help not just individuals, but the nation, because graduates will have more money to spend on things like buying homes.

"Our economy needs it right now and your future could use a boost right now," Obama said.

Obama's plan will accelerate a meas-

quired payment on student loans from 15 percent of discretionary income annually to 10 percent. He will put it into effect in 2012, instead

of 2014. In addition, the White House says the remaining debt would be forgiven after 20 years, instead of 25. About 1.6 million borrowers could be affected.

He will also allow borrowers who have a loan from the Federal Family Education Loan Program and a direct loan from the government to consolidate them into one. The consolidated loan would carry an interest rate of up to a half percentage point less than before. This could affect 5.8 million borrowers.

Student loans are the No. 2 source of household debt. The president's announcement came on the same day as a new report on tuition costs from the College Board. It showed that average in-state tuition and fees at four-year public colleges rose \$631 this fall, or 8.3 percent, compared with a year ago. Nationally, the cost of a full credit load has passed \$8,000, an all-time high.

Student loan debt is a common concern voiced by Occupy Wall Street protesters. Obama's plan could help him shore up re-election support among young voters, an important voting bloc in his 2008 election.

# **Europe Reaches Key Deal to Help Greece**

BRUSSELS (AP) • European leaders agreed Thursday morning on a crucial plan to reduce Greece's debts and provide it with more rescue loans so that the faltering country can eventually dig out from under its debt burden.

After a marathon summit, EU President Herman Van Rompuy said that the deal will reduce Greece's debt to 120 percent of its GDP in 2020. Under current conditions, it would have grown to 180 percent.

That will require banks to take on 50 percent losses

on their Greek bond holdings - a hard-fought deal that negotiators will now have to sell to individual bondholders.

Van Rompuy also said the eurozone and International Monetary Fund which have both been propping the country up with loans since May of 2010 – will give the country another 100 billion euros (\$140 billion). That's slightly less than the amount agreed in July, presumably because the banks will now pick up more of the slack.

# **Republican Candidates' Tax Plans Would Benefit Wealthy Americans**

WASHINGTON • The Republican Party is catching flat-tax fever, setting up an electionyear fight with Democrats over whether wealthier Americans should pay more taxes or get tax cuts.

Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney became the

latest to punch the tax button Wednesday, telling a Virginia audience that he'll soon update his economic proposal to spell out how to flatten the tax code.

A day earlier, rival Rick Perry proposed an optional flat 20 percent tax on income. Both followed Herman Cain's pitch for a flat 9 percent income tax as part of his 9-9-9 plan, which helped him jump to the top tier

of candidates for their party's 2012 nomination. Newt Gingrich and Michele Bachmann also support a flat tax.

A flat tax – so called because it would set one tax rate for all income groups while taking away many or all deductions would simplify taxes. It also would almost certainly give big tax cuts to wealthy Americans.

need 10,000 "We genomes, not 100, to start to understand the link between genetics, disease and wellness," said Venter, who is cochairing the X Prize contest.

The 107-year-old Eberhardt of Chester, N.J., played and taught tennis until he was 94. He said he's participating in the X Prize project because he's interested in science and technology. It's not clear his genes will reveal much. Nobody else in his extended family reached 100, and he thinks only a couple reached 90, he said in a telephone interview.

So why does he think he lived so long? He credits 70 years of marriage to his wife, Marie. She in turn cites his "intense interest in so many things" over a lifetime, from building radios as a child to

pursuing a career in electronics research.

But scientists believe there's more to it, and they want to use genome sequencing to investigate. Dr. Richard Cawthon of the University of Utah, who is seeking longevity genes by other means, says it may turn up genetic features that protect against multiple diseases or that slow the process of aging in general.

Protective features of a centenarian's DNA can even overcome less-than-ideal lifestyles, says Dr. Nir Barzilai of the Albert Einstein College of Medicine in New York. His own study of how centenarians live found that "as a group, they haven't done the right things."

Many in the group he studied were obese or overweight. Many were smokers, and few exercised or followed a vegetarian diet. His oldest participant, who died this month just short of her 110th birthday, smoked for 95 years.

"She had genes that protected her against the environment," Barzilai said. One of her sisters died at 102, and one of her brothers is 105 and still manages a hedge fund.

Earlier this month, Scripps Health of San Diego announced a different genome project involving the elderly. The Scripps Wellderly Study will receive the complete genomes of 1,000 people age 80 and older from a sequencing company

Republicans say cutting taxes, especially on the wealthy, helps spur investment, economic growth and hiring.

At the same time, most of the Republican candidates propose other changes that also would mean big tax cuts for high-income Americans, such as eliminating taxes on dividend income or capital gains, and eliminat ing the estate tax, which Republicans call the "death tax."

Their push comes at the same time that Democratic President Barack Obama is

higher-income Americans. He has proposed raising taxes on those making more than \$200,000 and has endorsed a push by Senate Democrats to raise taxes on income above \$1 million.

The debate comes as new data show that the wealthiest Americans have greatly increased their share of U.S. income in recent decades. you. Just respect your neighbors and keep the camps clean and safe.

Business owners and residents have complained in recent weeks about assaults, drunken fights and sanitation problems. Officials are trying to balance their rights and uphold the law while honoring protesters' free speech rights.

"I understand the frustration the protesters feel ... about inequity in our country as well as Wall Street greed," Baltimore Mayor Stephanie Rawlings-Blake said. "I support their right to free speech but we also have rules and laws."

Some cities, such as Providence, R.I., are moving ahead with plans to evict activists. But from Tampa, Fla., to Boston, police and city leaders say they will continue to try to work with protesters to address problems in the camps.

In Oakland, officials initially supported the protests, with Mayor Jean Quan saying that sometimes "democracy is messy."

But tensions reached a boiling point after a sexual assault, a severe beating and a fire were reported and paramedics were denied access to the camp, according to city officials. They also cited concerns about rats, fire hazards and public urination.

Demonstrators disputed the city's claims, saying that volunteers collect garbage and recycling every six hours, that water is boiled before being used to wash dishes and that rats have long infested the park.

When riot gear-clad police moved in early Tuesday, they

were pelted with rocks, bottles and utensils from people in the camp's kitchen area. They emptied the camp near city hall of people, and barricaded the plaza.

Protesters were taken away in plastic handcuffs, most of them arrested on suspicion of illegal lodging.

Demonstrators returned later in the day to march and retake the plaza. They were met by police officers in riot gear. Several small skirmishes broke out and officers cleared the area by firing tear gas

The scene repeated itself several times just a few blocks away in front of the plaza.

Tensions would build as protesters edged ever closer to the police line and reach a breaking point with a demonstrator hurling a bottle or rock, prompting police to respond with another round of gas.

The chemical haze hung in the air for hours, new blasts clouding the air before the previous fog could dissipate.

The number of protesters diminished with each round of tear gas. Police estimated that there were roughly 1,000 demonstrators at the first clash following the march. About 100 were arrested.

On Wednesday, Oakland officials allowed protesters back into the plaza where their 15-day-old encampment had been raided but said people would be prohibiting from spending the night, potentially bringing another clash with police.

In Atlanta, police in riot gear and SWAT teams arrest ed 53 people in Woodruff Park, many of whom had camped out there for weeks as part of a widespread movement that is protesting the wealth disparity between the rich and everyone else

# Prosecutor: Woman Shot Neighbor to Keep Him Quiet

**FORT DODGE, Iowa** • Iowa prosecutors tried Wednesday to debunk a woman's longheld claim that she was the victim of a home invasion when she shot a 20-year-old neighbor in 2001 and started building their case that she killed him as part of a bizarre plot to frame her ex-husband.

Prosecutor Douglas Hammerand said in an opening statement that Tracey Richter committed first-degree murder in the Dec. 13, 2001, death of Dustin Wehde at her home in Early, a small town in northwest Iowa. He said Richter had Wehde write a diary saying he had been hired by her ex-husband to kill her, but then she killed Wehde hours later after they were interrupted and she worried he would tell others about what he had done.

Richter, 45, appeared to fight back tears as defense at-

Thursday in Fort Dodge. The jury of six men and six women listened intently to testimony and studied pictures of Wehde's dead body, Richter's bruised neck and the two-story Victorian home where the shooting happened.

Richter blew a kiss at her fiance, who sat in the front row, as she entered court.

Hammerand told jurors the prosecution's case centers on a pink spiral notebook that investigators found in Wehde's car after the shoot ing. The diary appears to be in Wehde's handwriting and claims Richter's ex-husband Iohn Pitman hired him to kill her and their 11-year-old son, Bert, and make it look like a murder-suicide. Hammerand said investigators decided to keep the notebook a secret because they knew anyone with knowledge of it was involved in the death. Richter told a friend a few months after the shooting that it had been found and would lead to Pitman's arrest. Pitman, who divorced Richter in 1996, was seeking custody of Bert at the time, and a court hearing was scheduled in two months. Richter worried she would lose her child and Pitman's \$1,000-per-month child support if Wehde told police he had created the diary. Hammerand said. The notebook contains details few people knew, such as the name of Pitman's divorce attorney, he said. Hammerand said Wehde's writing in the notebook was interrupted mid-sentence when Richter's friend, Marie Friedman, showed up at her door, planning to spend the night. Friedman testified that no one answered the door for several minutes, but Richter came out as Wehde was leaving. Friedman said she was surprised when Richter told her she could not stay over because she had to pick up Bert from basketball practice. They had planned a stayover because her husband worked at Richter's husband's computer business and the men were away on

business. She said she left after they had tea and talked for an hour.

Hammerand said Richter then had Wehde come over again, and she killed him in her bedroom, firing nine shots, including 3 to the back of the head that would have been instantly fatal.

Bandstra, the defense attorney, portrayed Wehde as an anti-social loner who had a history of mental health issues and aggressive behavior. He said prosecutors will not be able to prove that he had permission to be in Richter's home that night or that she had him write the diary.

Testimony from Friedman and her husband, Ray, backed up his description. Ray Friedman said he had played paintball with Wehde, thought he was deeply troubled and told his wife and Richter's then-husband, Michael Roberts, to stay away from him. Roberts was friendly with Wehde.

# Weeks of Debt Talks Fail to Close Gap

**WASHINGTON** • Republicans on Congress' deficit-reduction supercommittee outlined a plan Wednesday that includes spending cuts but none of the increases in tax revenue sought by Democrats, completing an initial exchange of offers that left the two sides far apart despite weeks of secret talks.

Officials also said the Democratic proposal on Tuesday and the GOP counter-proposal 24 hours later both included a provision to slow the inflationary increase in future Social Security benefits, suggesting it could become part of any compromise that might emerge.

The Republican offer calls for somewhat more than \$2 trillion in deficit savings over a decade, according to officials in both parties. Less than half of that amount would come from increases in items such as Medicare premiums, the sale of public lands and airport fees – measures that increase government revenue without changing personal or corporate taxes.

Spending cuts include about \$500 billion from Medicare over a decade and another \$185 billion from Medicaid, these officials said.

By contrast, Democrats want \$1.3 trillion in higher tax revenue, a similar amount in spending cuts and enough other savings elsewhere in the budget to finance a \$450 billion jobs bill along the lines that President Barack Obama is recommending.

The officials who described the rival approaches did so on condition of anonymity, saying they were not authorized to provide details of the committee's confidential discussions. In private, each side also disparaged the other, providing yet another indication that the panel's deliberations have not shown significant progress.

Still, the exchange marked a quickening in the pace of activity by the committee after dozens of hours of closed-door meetings, and senior leaders in both parties are becoming more involved.

The panel of six Republicans and six Democrats has until Nov. 23 to recommend deficit savings of \$1.2 trillion. But in fact, most if not all of the decisions must be made by early next month to give the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office time to render precise estimates on their costs and impact on future deficits.

Whatever the committee recommends must be approved by both houses of Congress in December if lawmakers want to avoid automatic spending cuts of \$1.2 trillion across a range of federal programs.

There were signs of Democratic dissension one day after Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., outlined a proposal on behalf of his party's negotiators.

According to several officials, he called for \$1.3 trillion in increased tax revenue over a decade, and \$1.3 trillion in spending cuts. Another \$1 trillion in savings would come from the presumed reduction of Pentagon costs in Iraq and Afghanistan and \$500 billion more from a reduction in interest costs resulting from declining deficits.

Those savings would be on top of cuts that Congress approved earlier in the year of nearly \$1 trillion.

# PERRY SAYS 'NO DOUBT" OBAMA IS A CITIZEN

**WASHINGTON (AP)** • Republican presidential candidate Rick Perry said Wednesday that he has "no doubt" that President Barack Obama is an American citizen, staking out a definitive position on the matter

after spending several days stoking widely debunked claims that the Democrat was born overseas.

Perry's comments come as he's struggling to right his troubled campaign, and as some Republicans question whether he's done irreparable damage to his run by dabbling in the so-called "birther" controversy in recent days.

Some Republicans privately worry that his comments about Obama's birth certificate may have endeared him to the party's conservative wing that questions the legitimacy of Obama's presidency but also may have started to marginalize the Texas governor from the larger electorate. That could put the general election at risk should Perry win the GOP nomination.

His comments certainly irked several GOP luminaries, like former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush, who in recent days have urged Republican presidential candidates to stop raising the issue. Others, like Mississippi Gov. Haley Barbour and campaign rival Jon Huntsman say it's bad for the GOP.

"If we take our eye off the ball called debt, if we take our eye off the ball called our position in the world – continue going with you know, two wars simultaneously – of course we can lose it," Utah's former governor said, speaking on ABC news' political webcast "Top Line" on Wednesday. NEW YORK (AP) • Stock indexes finished higher Wednesday following reports that China will come to the aid of Europe by investing in a financial rescue fund. # Writer Isaacson on Steve Jobs: 'I Just Listened'

Steve Jobs told Walter Isaacson he wanted him to write his biography because he's good at getting people to talk.

"I just listened," said Isaacson, whose book, "Steve Jobs" (Simon & Schuster) went on sale Monday. Jobs, was a man full of deep contradictions, a product of 1960s counterculture who went on to found Apple Inc.

In an interview with the Associated Press yesterday, Isaacson said Jobs was a compelling storyteller with "fascinating stories." Sometimes, Jobs told tales two or three times, often with slight variations. But through more than 40 conversations with Jobs, as well as interviews with his family, close friends, co-workers and rivals, Isaacson painted a rich portrait of a complex figure.

# THE 787 TAKES FLI AND LIVES UP TO ITS PRON

ABOARD ALL NIPPON AIRWAYS FLIGHT 7871 • It's the plane that is supposed to change the experience of flying.

No more stuffy noses, dry throats or severe fatigue. Larger windows to provide a stronger connection to the world outside. And mood lighting that can either ease jet lag or turn the plane into a nightclub at 40,000 feet.

And for the most part, Boeing's 787 succeeds. Flying it is more enjoyable. But it's still flying. Just because the plane is new doesn't mean the food will taste better or you won't be stuck in front of a kicking kid.

There has been plenty of hype sur-

rounding the 787, a long-range plane marketed as The Dreamliner that carried its first passengers Wednesday on a fourhour flight from Tokyo to Hong Kong. It has been called "revolutionary" and "a game-changer?

And, indeed, a sleek design makes the plane stand out the moment you step on board. A higher ceiling - at least the perception of one – reduces claustropho-bia. And natural light pours in, creating a welcoming feeling.

Maybe that 10-hour flight won't be so bad after all. Maybe.

The biggest benefit should come from features that fight jet lag. Those couldn't really be experienced by the 240 reporters and aviation enthusiasts who made the relatively short inaugural flight.

They include a doubling of the humidity, to 16 percent, and bringing the cabin's pressure closer to what it feels like on the ground. Planes are normally pressurized to 8,000 feet, higher than any point on the East Coast. Air inside the 787 is made to feel the equivalent of 6,000, slightly higher than Denver. The pressure and humidity changes should lead to fewer headaches and leave passengers with more energy after long trips.

# **Voice-activated iPhone Could Snarl Laws on Drivers' Texting**

WASHINGTON • Apple's iPhone 4S is one of several new devices that make it possible to send text messages with both hands on the wheel. As drivers begin to use these new technologies, states may have to decide what they will and won't allow on the road.

When Apple introduced its new iPhone 4S earlier this month, tech analysts raved about the phone's voice-activated personal assistant, nicknamed "Siri." One thing they loved was how Siri can be used to dictate text messages

without typing - or read incoming texts aloud - a convenience that seemed perfect for life behind a steering wheel. "Big news for drivers," declared The New York Times' David Pogue. The Wall Street Journal's Walt Mossberg noted that he'd had success using Siri to dictate emails and text messages in the car.

There's just one problem. Texting while driving is illegal in dozens of states. And while some states have written their laws to allow for hands-free use of emerging voice-activated texting technologies, many others haven't.

For instance, laws in Maine and

Michigan disallow reading text messages while driving - something that iPhone 4S users may be compelled to do if they want to spell-check Siri's dictation before sending a text. Connecticut and Maryland prohibit text messaging from handheld devices, a possible pitfall since Siri users must push the iPhone's home button to activate the system. Vermont's statute bans the sending of electronic communications, making no allowance for hands-free texting.

Siri is not the only voice-activated application available to drivers. Similar applications, including Vlingo and Sensory, can be downloaded to cell phones. Carmakers are in on the action, too. Ford and BMW have designed speech-totext systems for some of their newest vehicles, allowing drivers to hear messages as they are received and dictate messages that the car's systems will send.

# Locals' Secret

A private landowner's goodwill is your ticket to Vineyard Lake, a fantastic but hidden bit of wilderness just minutes from Twin Falls.

EDEN • The locals would like to keep Vineyard Lake to themselves.

Beloved by generations of Magic Valley explorers and swimmers, this clear jewel of a lake hidden away in the Snake River Canyon is little known in wider circles. You won't find signs or tidy trails leading to the springfed Vineyard Lake, and that's just fine with nearby residents.

"They love it, and they prefer that these things be kept local knowledge and not common knowledge," said Jenny Everton of Twin Falls. "Those little secret spots, people like to believe they're the only ones that know."

There's good reason for reticence.

The lake and the springs that feed it are on public land. But hikers' most practical route down to the lake

is not, and any disrespectful use could close it off.

Jane Ehlers' husband, David, owns the rim land on the east side of Vineyard Lake and allows hikers to cross the couple's cow pasture, she said.

"It's one of those things you can't avoid, because of the attraction there," Jane Ehlers said. "We don't mind if they cross, if they don't do any damage."

Hunting on the Ehlerses' land is by permission only, but hikers don't have to ask before setting off for the lake, she said. "We're trying to trust."

That could change if her husband finds property damage, she added. "If people really tear things up, he might close off the access."

# A Sweet Spot

It's worth behaving yourself here.

Vineyard Lake is a refreshing oasis in a desert landscape – a quiet bit of wilderness where you can watch wildlife or ponder the fantastic shapes within the Snake River Canyon's walls. Follow the lake's inlet for a couple of hundred yards and you'll find something even more surprising:

# Getting to Vineyard Lake

The attraction: This small, clear lake nestled inside a Snake River Canyon bowl is fed by springs in the canyon wall.

The lake and springs are on U.S. Bureau of Land Management land; the BLM allows but doesn't promote recreation there. The private owner of canyon-rim land east of the lake allows hikers to access Vineyard Lake through a pasture.

It's a short but rough hike into the canyon - not one for children, inferior shoes or a careless attitude.

Find the trail: Start at the Garden of Eden truck stop on Idaho Highway 50, north of the Hansen Bridge. (Hint: Many locals still call the truck stop "Traveler's Oasis.") Turn west onto 1010 South. After a few curves, the road will become 1000 South. Then it will turn 90 degrees to the right and become 1000 East. Immediately before reaching an overpass, turn left (west) onto 900 South. The paved road will curve a few times before ending at the T formed by a farmer's dirt road.

Turn left onto the dirt road. After four-tenths of a mile, you'll spot a wide gap between two fence posts on the right side of the road. A third fence post offset between them allows hikers into a cow pasture while keeping cows from escaping. You're entering private property; be respectful.

Where to hike: Walk directly west from that cow-pasture entrance, following another fenceline. After a couple of jogs in the fence, the path will veer to your right. When you see a cluster of trees on your left, it's time to leave the cow path and start down into the canyon on your left.

The BLM doesn't maintain a trail to Vineyard Lake, but frequent use has made it fairly easy to find. It's a short hike down to the lake, but expect to scramble over big rocks in a number of places.

There's more than one way to see the outdoors. Suzie Richardson's favorite is on horseback, whether close to home or on trails farther away.

That's the neat thing about southcentral Idaho, the Twin Falls woman said its plentiful places for good riding.

What makes a place perfect for an outing with horses? Terrain that's easy on their hooves, pretty scenery and not a lot of people, she said.

If you own a horse, here are five places to consider for your fall rides:

# Niagara Springs

On a recent Sunday, Richardson met up with friend Joann Cary to ride trails at Niagara Springs in Wendell.

Richardson was on her palomino, Wishy, while Cary rode Rio.

"I just started riding there in the spring when I found out about it," Richardson said. "There's sand. It's easy on the horses' feet."

The scenery is mixed, she said. There's desert and places where there's more foliage.

Fall is a great time to ride because of the colored leaves. On some parts of the trail you can even catch glimpses of the Snake River, she said. "It's really pretty."

From Jerome, take Bob Barton Road west to the Rex Leland Highway (1950 East). Follow it south until it turns into Niagara Springs Road, which enters Niagara Springs State Park.

# Big Smoky

The farther north you go, the more mountainous and wooded scenery vou'll see.

One of Cary's favorite places to ride is near the Big Smoky Guard Station near the South Fork of the Boise River in Fairfield. Terrain is dirt paths with lots of hills and stretches of open fields.

"There are nice big mountains there that have some sequence," she said. "But there's nice big valleys to ride in."

Her favorite thing about the area: "You're in God's country. I really enjoy God's creations, nature and the mountains. Horseback riding is the most peaceful, stressless thing you can do."

To get there from Fairfield, travel 18 miles north on Forest Road 094 and one mile west on FR 337.

# Devil's Corral

Richardson likes to ride in desert terrain. One of the best places for that is Devil's Corral, north of the Perrine Bridge in Jerome.

The area offers a lot of up-and-down trails, she said, and there usually aren't a lot of people around. The people who do use the area, however, often are ATVers and dirt bikers. But Richardson said the users she has encountered have always been considerate.

"Most of the people I run into are good about slowing down when they see you on horseback," she said. "It's been a great area to ride."

# Storing Your Bike for Old Man Winter

on't let this happen to you: Open the garage to start your motorcycle, only to find that the bike's battery is dead, the sparkplug is caked with gunk, and there's likely something else going on with the engine.

A couple of hundred dollars later, the bike is back in your garage. You've learned a tough and rather expensive — lesson, but you're ready to ride.

This all happened to me earlier this year because I had not properly stored my motorcycle during the cold months that it sat in my



garage, unused.

I don't want you to go through the same thing. So here's what you should do to your motorcycle or off-road machine before Old Man Winter arrives. It might save you some frustration and money come spring.

• Remove the battery and store it in a dry, warm place, said Rob Glodowski, vice

president of Action Cycles 'n Sleds in Twin Falls. A battery starts to drain if it sits unused for a couple of weeks; cold temperatures also lessen battery life. If you have \$50, you might consider buying a selfmetering charger that keeps the battery freshly charged all year long. Simply hook it up to the battery and plug it into an electrical outlet.

• Draining fuel from your bike is a good idea, Glodowski said, because condensation can show up inside the tank. Or you can use a stabilizer in the fuel that will help keep it from varnishing.

• Drain water and check antifreeze levels of liquidcooled machines. This is especially important for watercraft. Otherwise, ice can form in radiators and lead to hefty repair costs.

• Leave the sparkplug intact. Removing plugs leaves holes in the engine block, allowing dust particles and/or moisture can get into the engine.

I was going to take my bike for one last ride before I prep it for winter. But I had a change of mind when I woke up this morning: It's already getting cold out there.

# Oregon Has New Wolf Pack in Snake River Country

Oregon has a new wolf pack in the Hells Canyon area along the Idaho border, and two members of the state's original pack have split off to roam new territory in the central part of the state – developments that move the state closer to taking wolves off the state endangered species list.

State wolf coordinator Russ Morgan said Tuesday that tracks show at least five wolves in the Snake River unit, near the northern end of the Hells Canyon National Recreation Area on the Idaho border. Photos show at least one pup. Morgan emphasized that they have only been able to document five, and there could well be more.

Morgan said biologists have picked up scat samples and sent them off for genetic analysis to see where the new pack's members have come from — Idaho or an existing Oregon pack.

This is the fourth pack to establish in Oregon since wolves introduced in Idaho started moving west in the 1990s. Once four packs produce two pups a year for three years running, the

species can be taken off the state endangered species list, though protections would remain in place.

Meanwhile, radio collar tracking data shows two young males from the Imnaha pack in northeastern Oregon have gone west into Central Oregon. Two others went east to Idaho. The Imnaha pack was the first to produce pups and has become the most notorious because it is the only one to have preyed on livestock.

Two of the four remaining members are under a kill order from the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife. The Oregon Court of Appeals has put a temporary stay on the order while it considers a challenge from the conservation group Oregon Wild.

"Generally it's good news for wolf recovery in Oregon if ODFW or poachers don't shoot them," said Rob Klavins, of Oregon Wild. "This should provide the state an opportunity to refocus on conservation rather than killing wolves at the request of people who think the only good wolf is a dead wolf."

Oregon Cattlemen's Association President Bill Hoyt and northeastern Oregon rancher Todd Nash did not immediately return telephone calls for comment.

Morgan said there have been no reports of livestock attacks linked to the new Snake River pack or the two young wolves roaming Central Oregon.

The 3-year-old wolf known as OR-3 left the Imnaha pack in May. A tracking flight picked up his collar in July in Wheeler County and the Ochoco Mountains at the end of September.

The wolf known as OR-7 left the Imnaha pack Sept. 10 and has gone through six counties — Baker, Grant, Harney, Crook, Deschutes and, most recently, Lake.

"Every time he shows up somewhere, within a week or two he is somewhere else," said Morgan. "There is no way to tell where he ends up. For all we know he may end up in California."

# *Things You Should Know About Elk Tags*

Question: "I purchased a sportsman's package and was getting ready to redeem my elk tag receipt for a Sawtooth B elk tag when I was told the quota had already been reached. I have been elk hunting this unit for a number of years and now I can't get a tag for my regular area. What's up with that?"

**Answer:** There are two issues affecting this situation. First, when you purchase a sportsmen's package you prepay for a hunting license and an array of big game tags and permits, including an elk tag. The specific tag you choose is not determined until you actually obtain the tag at a license vendor.

When the sportsmen's package is issued, the vendor issues you an elk tag receipt redeemable at a later time at any license vendor for the actual tag you select. So, while you have paid for a tag, you have not selected and/or been issued the tag for the specific zone.

Many hunters wait until their hunting plans are firmed up before they redeem their receipts for a specific elk tag. The key is to not wait too long.

Second, some elk zones have experienced down turns in population. Rather than implement controlled hunts in those units, general A and/or B elk tags have been capped to restrict hunter numbers. Tags for these "capped" zones are sold over the counter on a first-



come, first-served basis.

When hunters decide they want tags from a capped elk zone they should not wait to redeem their receipts or purchase their tags. These capped zones never used to sell out but this year sales quotas have been reached in over half of the elk zones with general tags quotas.

Waiting until the last minute exposes the hunter to the risk of not getting a tag in the desired area when the quota is filled.

The department works hard to maximize hunter's options and hunting opportunity as biologists strive to balance population goals with various social limitations, sportsmen desires, and habitat restrictions.

There still are many general hunt elk zones with tags available. At this point your only option is to select a zone with unlimited tags or a zone where the cap has not yet been reached. Your local vendor or your regional Fish and Game office will have a list of elk zones with tags available.

**LICKING, Mo.** • Rich Wade pulled his johnboat up to a gravel bar in the shadows of a bluff on the Big Piney River, and paused to pay his respects to a special place in his life.

"This is where I scattered the ashes of a good friend who just loved being on this river," said Wade, 69, a longtime guide on the scenic float stream. "He had hired my dad and me for 35 years Wade said with a laugh. "I remember how I'd paddle my brother and a friend down river and we'd always catch fish — sometimes limits of smallmouths 2 to 3 pounds."

Wade started guiding when he was 12, helping his dad with some his longtime customers. From the first trip, Wade didn't disappoint.

"We caught limits and I got a nice tip," he said. "We had a lot of smallmouths back in those days."

And the Big Piney still does. Wade doesn't have to

Wade readily admitted that fishing trips like that don't come along every day. But he's learned to never underestimate the beautiful river. "I'm on this river yearround," he said. Count Wade as one of them. He has lived most of his life on the beautiful river that cuts through the southeast Missouri Ozarks.

He inherited his dad's love for fishing and guiding on the river, and for the most part, that's all he's ever done for a living.

Several days a week, he takes customers into a beautiful and secluded world that few get a chance to experience.

He paddles through gurgling riffles, past towering bluffs, through narrow valleys and over clear pools where fish scatter as the johnboat approaches.

Wildlife often outnumber humans in this world. In fact, Wade said, "There are many floats when we won't see another person."

That's just the way Wade likes it.

"I wouldn't even have to catch a fish to enjoy myself on the Big Piney," he said. "It's just so peaceful and relaxing being out here.

"It's a great place to work, I'll tell you that."

But there are many days when Wade is so busy catching fish he doesn't get a chance to totally soak in his beautiful surroundings. The Big Piney is chock-full with hard-fighting smallmouth bass, lurking behind the rocks and boulders that can be seen below the clear water. And Wade is a master at catching them.

"When I was 7 or 8, I watched my dad catch a 6pound smallmouth on a canepole and a minnow, and I thought, 'This is for me,'" reminisce about the "good old days" when he talks about the Big Piney's glory days.

In many ways, these are the good old days. The beautiful stream still is home to a thriving population of smallmouths.

On the right day, The Big Piney still provides a glimpse of its greatness.

Days like a recent Sunday. As Wade and I prepared to launch at Teeter's Eddy for a six-mile float to Slabtown, he looked at the gray, threatening sky and smiled.

"It's going to be a good day," said Wade, who lives in Licking, Mo. "These smallmouths love it when it's gray like this. They'll hit all day."

Moments into the float, Wade's prediction started to come through. He tossed a Gulp plastic minnow to the edge of large rock and felt a jolting strike before the bait had even settled to the bottom.

He set the hook and watched a bronze rocket burst out of the water, signaling it was ready to fight. The 13-inch fish struggled for a minute, but it wasn't long before it was in the boat.

"They're fighters, aren't they?" Wade said as he released the fish.

That fish was the first of many. As we floated through some of the Ozarks' finest scenery, we caught fish after fish on a variety of lures. The most productive lures were a series of baits made by Z-Man – the ZinkerZ, the Rain MinnowZ and the Finesse ShadZ. We also caught fish on Swimming Minnows, Gulp baits and topwater plugs.

By the time we were done, we had caught and released 77 smallmouth bass — six of them 15 inches or longer and 43 goggle-eyes, some of

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# The Convoluted History Behind the Most Embarrassing Planet Name

n 1783, English astronomer Sir William Herschel acknowledged that his serendipitous telescopic discovery two years earlier was, indeed, the first planet beyond the five known since antiquity. The next problem:

What to call it? In a transparent bit of sycophancy toward his patron, King George III, Herschel suggested calling the new planet "Georgium Sidus" ("George's Star"). But



Herschel's astronomical peers wouldn't hear of it.

The features of the classical (naked eye) planets matched their Roman god namesakes: The fastest planet, Mercury, was named for the wingfooted messenger god. The brightest planet, Venus, was

paired with the luminous goddess of love. Bloody, red Mars was the war god. Jupiter moved at a stately pace and shone brilliantly, appropriate for the king of the gods. Saturn, venerable father of Jupiter, shone less brightly and moved more slowly, as though diminished with age.

Following the pattern of parentage established by Jupiter and Saturn, the German astronomer, Johann Bode, suggested that the "new" planet, the dimmest

and slowest yet, should be named after Saturn's father, the timeworn god of the sky. But instead of Caelus - the name of the Roman sky god - Bode proposed Uranus, the Latinized version of the Greek sky god Ouranos, father of Cronus (the Greek equivalent of Saturn) and grandfather of Zeus (the Greek Jupiter).

Had Bode chosen Caelus (pronounced "SEE-loose") there may have been confusion over the pronunciation,

Springs gush from the walls in a hidden corner of the canyon to fill the lush, fantastically clear pool that drains into Vineyard Lake.

"You can be out there and not get the feeling that Twin Falls is, what, 20 minutes away," said Max Yingst, recreation planner for the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's Jarbidge Field Office.

"It's private. It's cold, clean water. And it's a fun little spot that you feel like is kind of exclusive," said Jennifer Moss of Twin Falls.

Moss used to hang out there all afternoon with her Jerome High School friends, and she was back this June to get a suntan while her friends jumped off cliffs into the water. Ron Mothershead of Kimberly remembers January scuba diving in Vinevard Lake in the '80s, looking at trout and crayfish. Heather Abrams of Hansen gathered crayfish for her high school biology class years ago and became a regular visitor.

"Definitely my favorite place to hike," Abrams said. "It's not something you would expect. You go through this kind of treacherous hike down there, then it's almost like stepping into another world. It's so beautiful."

# Be a Respectful Visitor

Yes, there are other ways to reach Vineyard Lake.

They'll remain on public land, but they face a stiff climb to the lake and must cross a narrow board wedged into the rocks high above the water.

So for most explorers, the cow-pasture route is the best.

Here's how to be considerate on private land:

• Park single-file on the edge of the Ehlerses' dirt scared one of the Ehlerses' calves over the edge of the canyon rim, and getting the calf back onto level ground was a dangerous operation for both the animal and its rescuers.

# **States Talk** Immigration **Economics** at **Utah Summit**

SALT LAKE CITY • As more states consider stronger immigration laws, political, business and relileaders from gious throughout the West examined the economic impact of enforcement measures and guest-worker programs during a oneday summit Wednesday in Salt Lake City.

Participants generally opposed the strict enforcement laws passed in Alabama and Arizona. Instead, they pointed to a package of bills passed in Utah that included an enforcement law modeled on Arizona's but balanced by a program that will allow illegal immigrants to work and pay taxes in Utah if they register with the state.

The law does not protect them from federal prosecution; the state is looking for a federal solution before the law goes into effect in 2013.

The Utah guest worker program was a key component of the Utah Compact, an initiative pushed as a more compassionate way to handle immigration.

"The success of the Utah Compact has put the spotlight on Utah," Attorney General Mark Shurtleff said. "Now we have an opportunity to affect the national immigration debate in a really positive way?"

In Idaho, lawmakers have backed away from passing their own immigration laws, in part because of the potential impact on the state's agricultural businesses. That is preferable to passing laws that are not "well thought out," said Brent Olmstead, a lobbyist for the Idaho Business Coalition on Immigration Reform.

"We'd like to see at minimum a guest worker program where the supply of that labor meets the demand, and addresses in some way the workers who are already here," Olmstead said.

The impact of new laws has been immediately evident in Georgia, where the agricultural industry esti-

It was an exercise in preparing for an unpredictable future, he said.

The new Rigby High School, which is under construction, will see its students through decades of change as eastern Idaho education adapts to the 21st century.

"The things our students need from their school building are different and are going to be different," Tolman said. "So we needed to build a school that could cope with that."

Tolman said his district largely accomplished that by opting for more open space that could be used for things besides sitting students in a row of desks.

Throw a dart into any group of educational professionals and you'll hit someone who is planning for the same reality: The school system today's parents went through can't prepare students for tomorrow's world.

Wendy Horman, a board member for Bonneville Joint School District 93, is part of a task force charged with putting the technology requirements of the Students Come First education reforms into practice. She also serves on the boards of several education foundations.

Horman said she's discussed some aspect of the shifts at every one of her recent meetings.

"Post-secondary preparedness is a big part of what these students need from us," he said.

Preparing for life after public school is a theme woven throughout most of the ways education reform is playing out in eastern Idaho.

In Erin Becker's sixthgrade classroom at Edgemont Gardens Elementary School, students who have completed their lessons are told to work together on Becker's iPad.

There's an app for almost everything she wants to do in her classroom, Becker said.

Becker can record her students reading and play it back to them. She can assign them a computer presentation and they can use a program similar to PowerPoint to work on it.

She can put her students to work on math skills under the guise of allowing them to play a game.

Becker has a master's degree in educational technology, making her one of Idaho Falls School District 91's "go-to" women when it comes to bringing technology into classrooms.

"It engages them in a way that me standing at the board talking to them just can't," Becker said. "They want to use it, so they want to learn."

What's more, she said, being technologically literate and learning to use technology in creative ways is a skill set students must have later in life.

Matt Dyorich, a history teacher at Hillcrest High School, goes a step further with the real-world applications of his class.

"I think about what things I want (my students) to learn, and then I work backwards and design a project around that," he said.

The catch is, those "things" aren't the traditional names-and-dates history, Dyorich said. They are things such as critical thinking, teamwork, communication and creativity. Dyorich's students learn about an ancient battle between Alexander the Great of Macedonia and Darius of Persia by designing a battle plan. They are given the details and told they have Alexander's resources. Then they must draw up a plan to defeat Darius.

history, but I try as much as possible to bring things back to their lives and teach them life skills," he said. "That's just the only way it's ever

At Nex+Gen, the classrooms have no doors and the architects were liberal with windows. There are plenty of open, common spaces rather than narrow hallways and alcoves.

"It's not the most important thing about our school, but it is important," Stanton said. "It's part of what's different about our school."

A traditionally designed school is set up for students to sit in one spot in a closedoff classroom and listen to a teacher talk, a model that is fast falling by the wayside, he said.

District 93 is in the midst of planning for a new high school because of runaway growth in the district. Members of the district's facilities planning committee are asking for advice left and right, including from Rigby High's Tolman.

They already are wondering how to design the school as a flexible place.

"We have to remember that whatever we do with this school has to last through a lot of changes," Superintendent Chuck Shackett said at a Sept. 21 committee meeting. "That includes a lot of changes we can't predict right now."



# **Denver Gets** Season's First **Snowfall** as **Obama Visits**

# Widow of Man Killed by Research Bear Sues

**CHEYENNE, Wyo.** • The widow of a man killed by a grizzly bear hours after the animal awoke from tranquilizers in the wild country near Yellowstone National Park has filed a \$5 million wrongful death lawsuit against the federal government.

The lawsuit filed Tuesday in U.S. District Court in Cheyenne says researchers were negligent in trapping a bear along a trail and close to cabins, and by prematurely taking down signs that warned passers-by of their work in the area.

The 430-pound male grizzly mauled Erwin Evert of Park Ridge, Ill., on June 17, 2010. Evert had been hiking about a mile from a cabin where Evert and his wife, Yolanda, lived during the summer. The cabin is about six miles outside the Yellowstone East Entrance.

"The family is very interested in ensuring an unbiased report of the events of his death comes out," Yolanda Evert's attorney, Emily Rankin, said Wednesday. "That's what the purpose of this lawsuit will be." The government didn't

take advantage of many opportunities to prevent the mauling, said the Everts' daughter, Mara Domingue. "The family is very interested in ensuring an unbiased report of the events of his death comes out." Emily Rankin, Yolanda Every's attorney

"They could have talked to him, they could have posted a notice on his door, they could have posted signs at the trailhead, and of course, left the signs up in the area where the bear was recovering," Domingue said in a statement through Rankin. "Had they done even one of these things, my dad would still be alive today."

Officials with the Interagency Grizzly Bear Study Team, a federal agency under the U.S. Geological Survey that monitors grizzly bears in the Yellowstone ecosystem, did not immediately return a message Wednesday seeking comment.

The lawsuit names the United States of America as the sole defendant.

The attack occurred on the same day two study team scientists had snared and tranquilized the bear in the Kitty Creek drainage. The scientists were leaving the backcountry when they came across Yolanda Evert, who told them her husband was overdue from his hike.

One of the researchers rode a horse back to the trap

site and found Evert's body. Authorities shot and killed the bear from a helicopter two days later.

An investigation by an ad hoc group of grizzly bear experts found that the researchers had removed the warning signs after they wrapped up their work and began to head back to the trailhead.

The report said Evert knew about the research and told others he wanted to "catch up with the guys" and learn more about what they were doing. Evert was attacked about a third of a mile off the main trail, well away from his usual hiking route, the report said.

The lawsuit says the researchers took down their warning signs three days too early because the signs said the area would be closed from June 11, 2010 to June 20, 2010. Also, the researchers saw Erwin at his cabin at least twice but never warned him about their work, the suit claims.

Study team guidelines state that bear researchers must always warn the public about any traps or when there is potential for a confrontation, the lawsuit says. "Mr. Evert was unfairly blamed for contributing to his own death," Rankin said.

The researchers baited the snare with deer meat. They tranquilized the snared bear so they could take samples, give it antibiotics and fit it with a radio collar, then left the animal to go check on another snare site. The lawsuit claims the scientists left the bear before it was fully awake in violation of study team policy.

Evert was a botanist who had recently published a book, "Vascular Plants of the Greater Yellowstone Area: Annotated Catalog and Atlas."

# Hormones Feed Hunger After Weight Loss, Researchers Find

As if people needed a reminder that losing weight is hard and maintaining weight loss is even harder, a study has found that for at least a year, subjects who shed weight on a low-calorie diet were hungrier than when they started and had higher levels of hormones that tell the body to eat more, conserve energy and store away fuel as fat.

The report, published Wednesday in the *New England Journal of Medicine*, helps explain why roughly 80 percent of dieters regain lost pounds within a year or two of tors cited the drugs' marginal effectiveness and concerns about their safety if used over long periods.

The Australian study paints a "very comprehensive" and "really discouraging" picture of the breadth of the body's response to weight loss, said Dr. Daniel Bessesen, an endocrinologist and obesity researcher at University of Colorado's Denver Health Medical Center. It captures just how many resources the body musters to ensure that weight is restored - a long list of hormones that regulate appetite, feelings of fullness after eating and how calories are used.

The study enrolled 50

one-year mark. Four withdrew during the eight-week period of dieting — a rigorous 550-calorie per day regimen. Seven failed to lose 10 percent of their body mass, which had been set as a condition of continued participation.

And five withdrew during the yearlong "weight maintenance" phase, when subjects got regular counseling on a diet-and-exercise plan to help them hold steady at the new weight.

Of those who remained, the average weight loss at 10 weeks, when hormone levels were first measured, was just short of 30 pounds.

The researchers, led by Joseph Proietto of the University of Melbourne's Department of Medicine, write that more than one solution to obesity will likely be necessary: "a combination of medications" that will have to be safe for long-term use.

proached. The challenges of weight control quickly became evident. Thirty-four of 50 enrolled subjects made it to the jects had gained back an average of just over 12 pounds. But after and between meals, their appetites — and the hormones that influence hunger — rebounded even more robustly.

The hormones — including leptin, ghrelin, amylin, cholescystokinin and insulin vary widely. Some are secreted from the gut, others by the pancreas or fat cells themselves. Some increase appetite, some tell the brain that enough food has been eater, and others help regulate how calories are used.

# Body of Missing Canadian Skydiver Found in Utah

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** • The body of a renowned skydiver missing since June has been found in the mountains of southern Utah, his family said Wednesday.

David Roy Brown, 37, originally from Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, had been living in the United States for about a decade. He moved to Utah about two months ago to teach at Skydive Moab.

Authorities said he was last seen June 29 and had left behind most of his belongings, including his driver's license, Canadian passport, credit cards, clothing and cash.

An early search of the area around Moab turned up no clues. Friends, family and fellow skydivers later performed additional searches, some souring over the red rock desert region using motorized paragliders, but again turned up nothing.

Brown's family said a hiker found his remains Sunday in the nearby mountains. It wasn't immediately clear how he died, but authorities didn't suspect foul play. An autopsy will be performed.

Moab Police Chief Mike Navarre was unavailable for comment Wednesday afternoon.

"We are devastated by our loss of such a gifted young man," Brown's sister, Wendi TeKamp, said in a statement Wednesday. "We will miss Dave's smile and sense of adventure."

TeKamp also thanked authorities and volunteers for their exhaustive searches.

Family members said Brown was a world recordholding national champion skydiver with more than 13,000 jumps.

# Father of Artificial Intelligence Dies in Calif.

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP) • John McCarthy, a pioneer in artificial intelligence technology and creator of the computer programming language often used in that field, has died. He was 84.

"Safety Man Ray." He re-

Stanford University, where McCarthy was a professor for four decades, announced McCarthy's death Monday. The school said he died at his Palo Alto home but did not provide a cause.

Tributes to McCarthy flooded into Twitter, where people mourned the loss of another Silicon Valley technology innovator. Apple Inc. co-founder Steve Jobs and C programming creator and UNIX co-developer Dennis Ritchie died earlier this month.

McCarthy was a leader in the artificial intelligence field, coining the term in a 1955 research proposal. He said "every aspect of learning or any other feature of intelligence can in principle be so precisely described that a machine can be made to simulate it?

He went on to create the MIT Artificial Intelligence Lab and the Stanford Artificial Intelligence Lab, serving as its director from 1965 to 1980.

In 1958, McCarthy invented the programming language Lisp, which paved the way for voice recognition technology, including Siri, the personal assistant application on the newest iPhone.

McCarthy also developed the concept of computer time-sharing, which allowed multiple users to interact with a single computer. That lay the foundation for cloud computing today.

Born in Boston on Sept. 4, 1927, McCarthy moved west to pursue a degree in math at the California Institute of Technology. He received a doctorate in math from

Princeton in 1951, and then became a professor at Princeton until 1953. He did turns at MIT and Dartmouth before settling at Stanford in 1962 until his retirement at the end of 2000.

"He could be blunt, but John was always kind and generous with his time, especially with students, and he was sharp until the end," said Ed Feigenbaum, professor emeritus of computer science at Stanford and a colleague recruited by Mc-Carthy in the 1960s. "He was always focused on the future. Always inventing, inventing, inventing?

**NEW YORK •** NBA owners and players were engaged in another marathon session Wednesday, meeting for more than 10 hours in talks aimed at ending the lockout.

The two sides got back to the table with a small group meeting less than a week after three intense days of mediation didn't produce a new labor deal.

Negotiations broke down last Thursday when players said owners insisted they agree to a 50-50 split of revenues as a condition to further discuss the salary cap system.

The first two weeks of the season already have been canceled, and

The players have lowered their proposal to 52.5 percent of basketball-related income, leaving the sides about \$100 million apart annually, based on last season's revenues. Players were guaranteed 57 percent of BRI under the previous collective bargaining agreement.

The postponement came after a travel day for the teams. This two-day gap is the longest at the World Series since 1989, when the Bay Area earthquake left the Athletics and Giants idle for 11 days.

"It's just a rainout, that's it," Texas star Michael Young said. "I don't know if people think we're going to sit in our hotel rooms all night biting our nails. We're going to get something to eat, get some rest and be ready to go."

After a damp season and postseason, Major League Baseball announced the decision about 41/2 hours before the scheduled first pitch. At the time, no drops had fallen at the ballpark.

"I'm not even sure why they canceled it," Cardinals outfielder Lance Berkman said. "This is better than the weather for Game 1. I guess I'm going to lie back on the couch like a big, fat pig and watch a movie."

Maybe Berkman could've joined La Russa. The Cardinals manager planned to go see "Moneyball."

By late afternoon, a light mist turned to drizzle and then to steady rain. More showers were on the way throughout the night.

This was the first Series washout since 2008 at Philadelphia. That year, Tampa Bay and the Phillies were tied in the sixth inning when rain and snow turned the field into a quagmire, forcing a suspension. It rained the next day, too, and the game finally resumed two days later, with the Phillies winning to take the crown.

Because of the debate about how to handle that situation MLB adopted a rule a few months later mandating that any postseason game stopped in progress would be resumed at the point of suspension, rather than being postponed and starting over.

If the Patriots are the NFL's team of the last decade, the Steelers are a close runner-up.

Indeed, Pittsburgh has won two Super Bowls since the Patriots last grabbed the title. Since 2005, the Steel Curtain owns three AFC crowns to one for New England.

But the Patriots (5-1) have won three of the last four meetings and Tom Brady nearly always out plays Ben Roethlisberger when they face off. New England is 6-1 against Pittsburgh when Brady starts, and he is averaging 286 yards passing a game with 14 touchdowns against three interceptions versus the Steelers.

Even when the Steelers have been strong on the turnover charts, it hasn't helped much against Brady and Co. Now, Pittsburgh (5-2) is at the bottom of the conference with a minus-9 differential and has a measly three takeaways. That must change Sunday at Heinz Field when the 3point favorite Patriots visit.

"I've been here for most of those losses, (Brady) has had our number," linebacker Larry Foote said. "We have to try and correct that this Sunday."

It is no easy chore, particularly with AFC East leader New England coming off a bye. Still, the Patriots are struggling on defense, Brady has been sacked 11 times and thrown eight picks. Pittsburgh has 17 sacks and has won three straight to take the AFC North lead.

"They don't dance around. They're not finesse whatsoever," Patriots defensive tackle Albert Haynesworth said. "Everybody runs hard. They don't mind hitting. They like to hit. It's a very physical team. More physical than we have seen this year."

And New England is more potent offensively than anyone the Steelers have seen, ranked first in yards passing and overall offense and averaging just under 31 points a game. "They are doing what they usually do," Pittsburgh coach Mike Tomlin said. Which means beating the Steelers. PATRIOTS, 30-23

The excitement is back in Smith's voice, and for good reason.

He's on pace to shatter Jerry Rice's single-season record of 1,848 yards set in 1995. Smith has four games with at least 140 yards receiving and is averaging 21 yards per catch. He's averaging 116.8 yards receiving per game, second only to New England's Wes Welker.

That's fairly remarkable considering as recently as July, Smith still wasn't sure he wanted to come back to Carolina.

Smith, who has two years left on his current contract, didn't publicly demand a trade in the offseason, but it was pretty clear he was open to such a move.

"We talked about (his future) and it was a great conversation," said Rivera, hired in January to replace Fox after a 2-14 season. "He really voiced his opinion and concerns about us and about what he had gone through the last couple of years. I just told him to give us a chance and let things unfold."

Smith was frustrated over the way he was used the past two seasons and it's hard to blame him. After posting a 1,421-yard season in 2008, Smith's numbers dropped dramatically the last two seasons as he became more of a decoy in Fox's run-first offense. After four straight 1,000-yard seasons, Smith had 982 yards receiving in 2009 and only 554 in 2010.

our kids are more prepared."

While the undefeated regular season and conference championship are nice, the Spartans have been preparing all summer and fall for this moment - the postseason. Although Minico has dominated its conference for the past several years, it hasn't quite been able to break through to 4A's upper tier where programs like Blackfoot, Hillcrest, Pocatello and Bishop Kelly reside.

"We'd really like to make a statement in the playoffs," Perrigot said. "I think we made some changes in our program to hopefully get us over that hump."

Most noticeably those changes included switching to a wing-T offense, which has resulted in one of the most productive offensive teams in school history, scoring 39.6 points and gaining 408.7 yards per game. In comparison, the 2008 Minico team that reached the Class 4A semifinals averaged 33.5 points and 335.8 yards.

However, the Spartans had a serious setback two weeks ago when leading rusher Brady May suffered an ankle injury. After averaging 184.5 yards per game this season, he was limited to just 30 yards on nine carries last week against Twin Falls. May is expected to play Friday, but it's uncertain how effective he'll be.

What's more, Tanner Stallings, who was leading the Spartans with 12 tackles per game, is out with a knee injury.

With the game of the year a week away, and No. 1 LSU and No. 2 Alabama taking the weekend off, the other national championship contenders will be jostling for position behind the SEC superpowers on Saturday.

No. 3 Oklahoma State can either bury or buoy the Heisman hopes of Baylor quarterback Robert Griffin III, who is going to have to overcome his team's bad defense to pull off the type of upset that could make him a finalist.

No. 4 Stanford and No. 6 Clemson are both on the road against dangerous conference rivals.

Andrew Luck and the Cardinal are at No. 20 Southern California, which has run off three straight victories while scoring 109 points behind quarterback Matt Barkley and star receiver Robert Woods.

# Hoops Focus Still There for Summitt

**KNOXVILLE, Tenn.** • Pat Summitt has handled the talk about her dementia diagnosis the same way she manages Tennessee basketball and her life: with control and determination.

The Hall of Fame coach dictated how news of her condition was revealed in August and has made it clear since that she wants the focus to be on the Lady Volunteers basketball program and not her. "That's the reason for when I came out with dementia and Alzheimer's," Summitt said. "I knew I had to do it, and I did it. I've got a good game plan. I feel good about it, and I think it motivated this team." She's stuck to that plan, speaking reluctantly at practices about her diagnosis while steering conversations to Tennessee's strengths, weaknesses and chances for a ninth national championship. On Thursday, she'll face more questions about dementia and Alzheimer's disease when she makes her first major public appearance for the annual Southeastern Conference media day in Birmingham, Ala. "I don't want it to be all about me. I want to be able to help other people know you can live your life with dementia," Summitt said. She's got plenty of basketball to talk about, with the Lady Vols unanimously picked by the media this week to defend their SEC title and senior forward Shekinna Stricklen tabbed as the league's preseason player of the year. Assistant coach Dean Lockwood doesn't think Summitt or anyone on the team will be distracted by talk of Summitt's condition. "Once you've accepted something, it becomes part of your daily existence. That's part of us now," Lockwood said. "They'll answer questions, but after a while it's going to become 'ho hum? (The players are) very focused on doing well. I think maybe this has given them an incentive to do it even more for a coach they love and respect."



but not a lot who do it at this level," said Chris Barnes, who won gold for the United States in men's doubles. "The same with soccer. There are a lot of people who can kick the ball. That does not make them soccer players."

Bowling has an image problem, and top officials know it. The sport has a low profile, it draws few fans and little media attention, and big-time sponsors are scarce.

Kevin Dornberger, the president of the sports governing body, the FIQ, said plans are afoot for a televised world tour in 2013.

"That will go a long way toward curing our visibility problem," said Dornberger, adding that people need to distinguish between "beer and fun" bowling and the elite variety.

The tournament in Guadalajara is another step in that direction.

The Pan American Games is about as close as many of the world's best bowlers can get to the Olympics. Like squash, cricket, roller-skating and sumo wrestling, bowling is recognized by the International Olympic Committee but not part of the Olympic program.

"I think we deserve to be in the Olympics," said Neil Stremmel, the vice president of the United States Bowling Congress. "You can see somebody at your local bowling center smoking and drinking, and who has a big gut. They might bowl a good game here or there. But those aren't the people you see on TV, or the people you see here."

Bowlers want more respect, and they get it at the Pan American Games.

At the 42-lane Bolerama Tapatio, Barnes and teammate Bill O'Neill mingle with fans, cheerfully signing autographs and making small talk. Two of the world's top-ranked bowlers, they teamed for gold in doubles and one is likely to earn another title in singles on Thursday.

Antonio Franco Munoz paid \$20 for a souvenir bowling pin, walked right up to the two Americans and asked them to sign it.

"Here is was very easy to get the autograph," Munoz said. "I can't imagine trying this at a football stadium where Chicharito is playing. Impossible."

Chicharito is the nickname of Javier Hernandez, a native of Guadalajara who plays for Manchester United and could be Mexico's most famous athlete. ASSOCIATED PRESS

Far below Chicharito in the psyche of many sport fans in Mexico are Sandra Gongora and Aseret Zetter, who won silver in women's doubles. Gongora graduated from Wichita State in 2010, which is to bowling what Duke is to college basketball.

"Bowling has the same excitement as other sports," said local fan Pedro Manjarrez, drinking a beer from a foam cup and cheering on

Gongora and Zetter. "Just not as much sweat."

O'Neill called bowling a game of "invisible obstacles." "In golf you can see the bunkers, the

hazards," O'Neill said. "In bowling it's the oil on the lanes. People just see the game as throwing the ball and knocking down pins."

If only it were that easy to win a gold medal.

"At the highest level these athletes train like any athletes," said Dornberger, the FIQ president. "They study the technology of the game like any other athletes. But the average person can't differentiate between the social and the high level athletes because there are no clear distinctions. There are no different pins, no different lanes."

Looking ahead, Dornberger is working to get bowling on an IOC short list in 2015. From that list a sport could be picked in 2017 to be added to the 2024 Olympic program.

"It's a long way out," Dornberger said. "But if we don't start planning now, it's a longer way out."

Summitt made it clear to

Pat Summitt insisted nothing would change she was still the coach and she still expected them to win a national championship — and so far they're on track.

the Lady Vols that nothing would change after she told them in August she'd been diagnosed with early onset Alzheimer's. She was still their coach, and the plan to win a national championship this season hadn't changed.

What has changed for Summitt is her daily routine.

While drinking her morning coffee she'll play brainbender games on her iPad or work on math skills to help keep her mind sharp. She adds coconut oil to her daily protein shakes. Son Tyler Summitt writes out her todo lists to keep her organized, and Summitt occasionally will take a few extra breaks outside of her daily naps that she claims have been a key to her ongoing success.

She still has her friends and staff over for dinner from time to time, and she has no problem joking with her assistants, like she did after a 6 a.m. Monday practice last week.

# **ORDINANCE NO. 1092**

BILL NO. 576 AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO, ESTABLISHING A NEW FEE FOR THE PLACEMENT OF PUBLIC ROAD BANNERS, ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Jerome presently allows for public road banners to be placed upon poles erected and maintained by the City of Jerome located on South Lincoln Avenue; and

WHEREAS, city staff expend considerable time assisting in the placement of the public road banners, expending city funds for the placement and maintenance of the public road banners; and

WHEREAS, many public road banners placed upon same situs often times do not have sufficient reinforcement or design to properly notify the public of the public announcement intended and often times are damaged by wind and elements in their placement due to faulty design; and WHEREAS, maintenance and replacement of the poles supplied

by the City of Jerome and maintained by city staff require a commensurate fee be allowed for public road banner placement for future maintenance and replacement.

BE IT THEREFORE ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME as follows:

- Section 1: Any person or entity intending to request permission for erection and placement of a public road banner at same situs located on South Lincoln Avenue for public announcements must follow specific requirements for design, spacing, size, webbing, and reinforcement to be determined, periodically, by the City of Jerome Public Works Department.
- Section 2: Any individual or entity intending to erect and place a public road banner must pay a \$50 fee to the City of Jerome prior to the erection and placement of the public road banner to compensate the City of Jerome for hanging and taking down the banners and providing for future maintenance and replacement of the poles

Section 3: This Ordinance shall be effective upon its passage and publication as provided by law. PASSED BY THE COUNCIL this 18th day of October, 2011.

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Let's see how imaginative you are. Look at all four hands in the diagrammed deal and try to figure out how South went down in three no-trump. Bear in mind that South was an expert player and was unlikely to do anything absurd.

On West's low heart lead against three no-trump, East played the gueen and South had to win the king. South decided to live or die by the diamond finesse and not mess with the spades. Going for five tricks in spades. necessary if hearts were not 4-4, would require West to have both spade honors.

Accordingly, South cashed the two top clubs, then crossed to the spade ace to take the diamond finesse. But a funny thing happened on the way to that finesse, East dropped the spade king under the ace!

Now who can blame South for thinking that it would be safer to play West for the spade jack than East for the diamond king? After all, if South can score five spade tricks, he doesn't need the diamond finesse. South crossed to the diamond ace and ran the spade nine. Shock! East won the jack, returned a heart, and six tricks later (the opponents were able to cash five more hearts and the diamond king, plus the spade jack), South wound up down three!

East had visualized declarer's problem and gave him a losing option. South swallowed the bait.

ANSWER: Although you would normally bid one spade over one diamond, you should pass over a pre-empt in direct seat (though you might act in balancing seat). The drawbacks to acting with marginal values when relatively long in your opponent's suit are obvious - and not just that you might run into a penalty. Your partner will certainly expect you to be stronger or more offensively suitable than this.

# When Pumpkins Fly: **Cannon Builders Craft Contraptions for Cause**

**NAMPA** • Three amateur artillery teams took aim at targets in a field Sunday afternoon to benefit Canyon County Habitat for Humanity, their air-powered cannons lobbing pumpkins thousands of feet and reducing wooden doors to splinters.

It was a perfect day for the fourth annual Great Pumpkin Launch, hosted by the Whistle family on their Nampa farm. Clear blue skies and temperatures in the high 60s greeted onlookers as gourds flew through the air like cannonballs. A horn blast warned onlookers before each powerful burst of air, followed by the audible whistle of a pumpkin speeding away at near-supersonic velocities.

Sunday's event was just for fun, and to raise money for the needy in Canyon County. But competitive pumpkin launching is serious business, culminating in the annual World Champion Punkin Chunkin event in Delaware.

So just how far can these howitzers home-build launch a gourd?

"I have shot 3,900 feet," pumpkin cannoneer Justin Harrison said of his trailermounted contraption. "I've shot a slug of ice over a mile. ... This is a top cannon in the world for distance. If you go to the World Champion Punkin Chunkin, and you look at how far everybody shot, anything within 4,000 feet is top six."

Harrison's machine can throw a pumpkin so far, in fact, that it's nearly impossible to track its path – they tend to disappear from view near the peak of their arc.

And they can do serious damage to anything that gets in their way.

"I can literally put a pumpkin through a car," Harrison said. "I don't care what part - not the engine, but anywhere in the body without breaking the pumpkin. Through sheet metal, both sides."

Wayne Richey, another local cannon builder, had perhaps the most unique design his device was made to look like a giant double-barreled shotgun. And, he said, it takes a certain caliber of person to participate in this activity.

"Fairly sharp people build these. These are real guns," Richey said with a laugh. "The people that do this aren't rednecks, they're fairly competent people. Very

In addition to pumpkin launching, Sunday's event also featured a small farmers' market, live music from the High Desert Band, and games for the kids. All proceeds benefit the Canyon County chapter of Habitat for Humanity, which builds homes for those in need throughout the community.

"We just finished building a home in Caldwell. It's going to close by Thanksgiving probably," executive director Marcia Davis said. "And we just started another house in Nampa. We're building that one in conjunction with Nampa School Districts."

And, Davis continued, Habitat always needs help. Anyone who can swing a hammer or work in their building materials thrift store is invited to volunteer. Of course, cash donations are always welcome.

POST FALLS (AP) • Authorities in northern Idaho's Kootenai County suspect lagging unemployment in the region could be a reason behind a dramatic increase in home burglaries, including break-ins that are happening in broad daylight. The Kootenai County Sheriff's department has received 91 reports of home burglaries over the past two months, more than four times the 21 burglaries reported during the same period last year. The agency has received reports of suspicious people checking out residences by knocking on doors during the daytime hours and pretending to sell firewood or offer dog-walking services, said police department spokesman Maj. Ben Wolfinger. Wolfinger said the poor economy and illegal drugs are likely the reasons for the increased break-ins.

"That's certainly an issue. It's hard to say. Historically, where you've got a burglar, you've got a drug user. So we don't know if there's a new influx of addicts in the area."

The homes that have been targeted are blocked from the view of neighbors possibly by a long driveway or trees or shrubs. Sheriff's deputies have leads, but have not made any arrests in connection with the break-ins, Wolfinger said Monday.

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
