Manufacturer **Expected to BringAbout** 400 Jobsto **Twin Falls**

A major food manufacturer will announce today the details of a decision to bring a new facility to Twin Falls, the Southern Idaho Economic Development Organiza-

The company, which isn't named in the press release, will invest more than \$100 million and bring about 400 jobs to the region. The company will be operational in 2012. Although the company isn't named, Chobani, a New York-based manufacturer of Greek yogurt, confirmed last week to the Times-News that Twin Falls was among a handful of locations under consideration for a production facility in the

The press conference will take place at 10:30 a.m. today in the Twin Falls City Council Chambers, 305 Third Ave. E.

Company executives, Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter and Twin Falls Mayor Don Hall will make the announcement. Officials also will sign a development agreement between the city and company.

Before the announcement, there will be a joint meeting of the Twin Falls City Council and Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency at 8:30 a.m. in council chambers to consider a development agreement and urban renewal plan.

Like the press release, the city's meeting agenda also doesn't have any names of any companies.

The agenda describes the two items as "consideration and possible action on a development agreement" and "consideration and possible action on an urban renewal

Salaries and Expenses Rise at St. Luke's

At first glance, a 22 percent increase in revenue over the past three years may seem fantastic. But at St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center, expenses are climbing

Over the past three years, the hospital's profit margins have tightened from 9 to 4 percent. But while expenses rise, so have the medical center's salaries.

Hospitals are required to disclose their highest-paid employees and detail how much they pay in compensation, benefits and other expenses like country club expenses or gym fees.

The current chief executive officer, Jim Angle, was hired after the latest tax forms were released. But previous CEO Mark Schwartz, made close to \$290,000, minus benefits and other compensated expenses. Schwartz received a 5 percent salary increase in the 2010 fiscal year and a 24 percent increase in the fiscal year ending in 2009.

The hospital did increase the amount it spent on employee salaries and compensation by 7 percent from the 2009 to 2010 fiscal years. However, the hospital had only seven more employees by the end of 2010 than in 2009.

In order to stay competitive with other employee salaries, St. Luke's Health System determines salaries based on the 50th percentile of other national hospital salaries, said health system spokesman Ken Day.

High Schools Gear Up for SAT Requirement

High school juniors no longer get to decide if they want to take the SAT - it's a requirement.

Beginning this year, all 11thgraders in Idaho must take a college admissions test in order to graduate from high school. The Idaho State Department of Education will foot the bill, allowing students to take the SAT for free on April 18.

Although it's a few months before testing day, some high schools have already started preparing their students.

Twin Falls High School Principal Ben Allen said social studies classes are breaking reading assignments into smaller chunks and asking students to respond to a few questions about the text — similar to the format used on the SAT.

"They get the practice of reading and being able to dig a couple of facts out," he said.

In addition, the school's website has an SAT "word of the day" posted.

Students at both TFHS and Canyon Ridge High School also prepare for the test during their

Twin Falls police are searching for two suspects who are allegedly responsible for a rash of vehicle burglaries and fraudulent credit card use.

Police released surveillance camera footage of one male and one female suspect on Wednesday. Still images show a large male with a shaved head and a middle-aged female with long, brown hair with bangs.

Residents have recently reported stolen debit and credit cards, which were left in unlocked vehicles overnight. Police believe the burglaries are occurring between 3-5 a.m. The thieves are supposedly buying lottery tickets and junk food at convenience stores.

Police Lt. Steve England says the two underage students face charges of lewd conduct with a minor, while Zuniga-Alvarez made an initial court appearance Monday on a charge of sexual abuse of a minor under 16.

Police say the girl alleges the suspects offered her a ride home from school last Tuesday, but instead drove her to a park and took turns assaulting her.

What it costs • Nothing at this point. However, if approved in the future, it could cost each household an additional \$3.50 per month.

What it needs to pass • As an advisory question, the measure won't be approved or disapproved.

move forward.

"If there seems to be a large, wide-scale support for this, we'll discuss it further," he said.

Implementing a singlestream recycling program in the city of Jerome has been

a topic of discussion on and off for the past few years. A single-stream recycling program means residents wouldn't have to separate their recyclables - everything goes into one bin.


The city has received a few proposals from companies for a possible recycling service. Residents would likely pay an additional \$3.50 per month for each household on top of regular sanitation fees.

Voters will be asked on the ballot to answer "yes" or "no" if they're interested in having a recycling program. There isn't a specific percentage of "yes" votes the city is seeking in order to move forward.

"It's just to help us in our discussions," Shine said.

Truck Driver Charged in Construction Zone Crash Idaho State Police reported

KETCHUM (AP) • A Utah truck driver has been charged with felony vehicular manslaughter for a construction zone crash that killed an Idaho woman this summer.

The Idaho Mountain Ex*press* reports 47-year-old Byrus Lyndon Gatewood of West Valley, Utah, was charged on Oct. 26 for the June 28 death of 62-year-old Dayle Evan Fowler of Hailey. Gatewood made an initial court appearance in Jerome County Magistrate Court on Friday and posted a \$25,000 bond.

After Pilot Program, Filer Seeks Feedback on Recycling

FILER • City officials are asking Filer residents to voice their opinion on making recycling part of regular sanitation servic-

In August, the City Council allowed Western Waste Systems to set up a two-month garbage recycling test program focused on 100 homes. Though initial trials have proven successful, Mayor Bob Templeman cautioned that making this service a permanent part of citywide utilities would mean increasing the current \$4.87 residential and \$8 commercial sanitation rates by \$3.50 each.

"Each one of us need to poll at least 10 to 15 of our neighbors, between now and our next council meeting, to see what they have to say about the idea," Templeman said.

As an incentive for participation, the city or individual home could receive a percentage of the recycling income in rebates or profit-sharing. Councilman Bob Parent suggested that the city use these funds to offset the additional expense.

"Instead of asking residents to take on additional costs, I don't see why we couldn't use this money and have the city just pay," Parent said. "You know Western Waste will be making money on this, or they wouldn't be doing it."

In other business, public hearings were scheduled for 7:30 p.m. on Dec. 6 and 20 to gather residents' comments on sewer rate changes set to take effect next year.

Effective Jan. 15, the city will increase its monthly sewer rate charge from the current \$47.50 to \$70.50. This change, starting with the March 1 bill, will be used to help make the annual \$591,000 payments on 30-year bond loans for the new \$12.5 million wastewater treatment facility.

Idaho Supreme Court to Hear State's Appeal in Pepcorn Case

The Idaho Supreme Court will hear arguments today on whether convictions from 2008 against a former Cassia County teacher should stand.

Justices from the state's highest court are scheduled to hear the continuing case of James Frederick Pepcorn Sr., who won an appeal earlier this year to have convictions of child sex crimes overturned. In April, the Idaho Court of Appeals remanded two of the felonies back to district court for a new

Pepcorn was convicted of rape, sexual abuse and two counts of lewd conduct with a child under 16. But the appeals court threw out the rape conviction and one of the lewd conduct charges. Prosecutors appealed that deci-

Pepcorn taught school in Cassia County from 1966 until his retirement in 1994 and was a Boy Scout and church leader. The criminal charges stem from incidents involving now-adult family members between 1992 and 1995, but courtroom testi-

mony was allowed from other alleged victims spanning back 30 vears.

Both vacated convictions were challenged based on a federal rule that prevents pri-

or crimes or acts from being used as evidence of character to convict someone of a crime, unless they are directly linked to the crime through motive, preparation or other related fac-

According to the Court of Appeals' opinion, Pepcorn correctly argued that the district court erred during his trial by permitting evidence of other alleged incidents of sexual misconduct with minors. The court concluded the errors were harmless on two of the convictions but necessitated a new trial for the other two.

The Idaho Attorney General's Office is handling the appeal, while Pepcorn is represented by Roark Law Offices of Hai-

The hearing is scheduled to begin at 8:50 a.m. at the Theron W. Ward Judicial Building in Twin Falls. It is open to the pub-

from around the Magic Valley and the state also serving in the 116th started calling him "chief?

"Some people got a kick out of it," Foster said. "It always sparked an interesting conversation, especially with highly ranked individuals who thought it was funny that I was an enlisted man in the Army but an agency executive back home?

Though he had earned the title, Foster had to wait about 13 months to fully move into his new job. It was excruciating, he said, to know his next step in his 12-year career in law enforcement would have to wait until he got home.

His job as a cavalry scout was to recon routes through the streets of Baghdad as part of the security detail for visiting dignitaries and other VIPs. Other duties were similar to those in his first career as a police officer, he said.

In the downtime he had, Foster was able to carve out a few minutes here and there to keep in touch with the Buhl Police Department. Sgt. Kevin Hanner ran the force as interim chief, emailing Foster to discuss the department's annual budget or other key issues. Foster said he talked with Hanner weekly and Mayor Tom Mc-Cauley at least once a

"I did help write the budget, and I had a part in that decision process," Foster said. "(Communication) was mostly informational, keeping me posted while I was gone. They wanted me to come back and not be

shocked or surprised."

Four weeks have passed since Foster returned to work, and he's found that some changes are more apparent than others. Of his staff of 10 employees, he had never met two of them until recently. Yet he can still drive down to Bowers Field on a Friday night and cheer the Indians.

"Buhl is basically the same," he said. "Not a lot has happened while I was gone." That's just fine with him.

St. Luke's Magic Valley receives tax breaks thanks to its nonprofit status. But those come with the expectation that it will provide charity care to local patients.

Currently, hospitals are not required to give out a minimum amount of charity care. For the first time, the Internal Revenue Service has required hospitals to disclose the total amount in their tax forms.

The Twin Falls medical center's charity care is close to 9 percent of its expenses, which falls fairly close to the

national average listed in a 2009 IRS study.

While the amount of free or reduced care has increased, the amount reimbursed through state and federal funding has dropped, Day said.

According to the form, the majority of charity care came from \$22 million in unreimbursed Medicaid costs. The hospital also didn't receive \$7 million of Medicare payments.

"Reimbursement levels are decreasing," Day said. "We're going to have to rely less on the state and more on our own budgets in years to

advisory classes.

At Canyon Ridge, all juniors and seniors will also take the ACT college admissions test this year, funded through a federal GEAR UP grant. This means students could request an exemption from taking the SAT this spring.

Canyon Ridge Principal Brady Dickinson said he thinks students will choose to take the SAT, since the test is paid for and will be given during the school day. "We're really promoting

for students to take both," he said.

Allen said requiring all juniors to take the SAT will increase the number of students statewide who continue on to college.

New high school graduation requirements were approved by the state Legislature in 2007. The money to pay for them was appropriated through the Students Come First reforms passed earlier this year.

The Idaho State Department of Education entered into a one-year, \$920,000 contract with The College Board to deliver the SAT or ACCUPLACER test — which provides information about a student's academic skills beginning this spring.

Canyon Ridge juniors Jameson Brown, Jared Berry and Amanda Miller have all taken either the SAT or ACT a few times before.

Brown, who hopes to study computer science at Stanford University, said he's studied more about how to take the college entrance tests than about the material that could be on them.

"You can't really study what's on the test," Berry


agreed. He plans to study engineering in college.

Conflict of Interest? You Bet!

n what is likely the media's most extensive policy on ethics in journalism, the New York Times' policy on employees seeking public office is both concise and spot on. It states "No staff member may seek public office anywhere. Seeking or serving in public office violates the professional detachment expected of a journalist. Active participation by one of our staff can sow a suspicion of favoritism in political cover-

And while neither *The News-Journal* or *The* Voice (or even The Times-News) is likely to be confused for the New York Times, their policy is timely for those who live — and vote — in Burley.

News-Journal Publisher Jay Lenkersdorfer currently sits on the Burley City Council.

Mike Ramsey, owner/publisher of The Voice, was for a short time a candidate for the Burley City Council — sort of, but apparently not really.

To Mr. Ramsey's credit, his short-lived write-incandidacy was designed to point the inherent conflict of interest in Jay Lenkersdorfer running a newspaper and being a city council member. We agree. What we take issue with is that Ramsey took on Lenkersdorfer with no apparent regard for the seven other candidates for Burley council. Ramsey made it personal and that was wrong.

Lenkersdorfer believes that being editor and publisher of a newspaper in no way conflicts with being a voting member of the Burley City Council. Let's see. In those roles Lenkersdorfer oversees both the news coverage and the opinions expressed by the News Journal. He claims that he separates fact from opinion and that he does not edit city council stories written by his reporter except for "accuracy"; that Lenkersdorfer the editor does not make changes that reflect positively on Lenkersdorfer the council member. Although we're skeptical, let's assume that he does not.

The point is that the News-Journal reporter is tasked with writing city council meeting stories about their boss. How likely is it that the reporter will question city council comments expressed by their boss; dig deep into why he voted "Yea" or "Nea" on a particular matter; or solicit feedback from residents or other council members on his effectiveness as a city official?

Lenkersdorfer sincerely believes that there is no conflict of interest in publishing a newspaper and being a member of the Burley City Council. We believe that he is sincerely naïve and that neither Burley residents nor News-Journal subscribers are served by this chicanery. Since Lenkersdorfer will not exercise "professional detachment" or remove himself from this "suspicion of favoritism," it's time for the voters of Burley to do it for him.

Publisher's Note: The Times-News is a competitor of both the News-Journal and the Voice for both readers and advertising customers. Competition is good and media competition in the Mini-Cassia area is no exception. The fact that we are competitors has been the reason we have not commented on this issue in the past. We should have, and feel that doing so prior to next Tuesday's Burley City Council election is neces-

Conflict of Interest

Deja vu! An article written by Ben Botkin in last Sunday's Times-News addressed the issue of "conflict of interest" as it affects those who are candidates in this year's election for Twin Falls City Couneil. And so it is with candidates for city council positions in all communities in our area.

The crux of the problem is violation of ethics which, in this case, involves the principles of conduct governing an individual or a group, a sticky interpretation in anyone's lexicon, particularly when determining individual perceptions of the word itself.

According to a quotation from Twin Falls candidate Shawn Barigar, we could fall back on the old rationale, human interest, and call it "bias" rather than "conflict of interest." a statement which certainly provides some "wiggle room" for those who don't want to adhere to a strict stance on moral principles. I don't believe that journalists have this option. Drawing the line between bias and conflict of interest requires some fine tuning, and in the case of the newspaper industry, there is a clear-cut mandate which negates this confusion.

The American Society of Professional Journalists admonishes its members to avoid associations which could compromise journalistic integrity, especially those which would create conflict of interest. In my opinion, a candidate running for a second term on the Burley City Council, Mr. Jay Lenkersdorfer, is in direct violation of journalistic ethics. Mr. Lenkersdorfer is the editor of the Weekly Journal primarily covering news in the Mini-Cassia area which includes discussion of local politi-

cal issues. He is also part owner of the newspaper. I and other local citizens have asked this councilman/editor to recuse himself from either the council or from his position with the newspaper, in other words, to avoid the conflict of interest in which he is now engaged.

Obviously, Mr. Lenkersdorfer does not personally recognize the conflict created by his dual positions. He continues to pursue his candidacy and to publish his newspaper without any acknowledgement of this blatant violation of journalistic ethics and, on several occasions, has promoted his own political agenda in his publication. Sadly, this man does not seem to understand the implications of the power of the press. His quest for political influence could be better fulfilled by creating a professional, ethical news publication which would gain him incredible power to influence his community on a weekly basis. Otherwise, he will simply be another politician sitting on a city council.



Third Worker Says Cain Harrassed Her

Candidate denies new harassment charges, accuses Perry of fueling stories.

WASHINGTON • Former restaurant executive Herman Cain faced a new set of sexual harassment allegations Wednesday, with a report that a third former employee had described unwanted, sexually aggressive behavior from him and a Republican pollster saving he had witnessed at

least two such incidents. Cain continued to deny the charges. Speaking to the Northern Virginia Technology Council, he ascribed the reports to "factions that are trying to destroy me personally as well as destroy this campaign." And he indicated he believes that the rival campaign of Texas Gov. Rick Perry is fueling them - an accusation that a Perry spokesman denied.

Just about the only thing that was becoming clearer as the controversy headed into its fourth day was that it is not going to go away anytime soon.

The third accuser is an unidentified woman who told the Associated Press that she had considered filing a workplace complaint against Cain for what the news service described as "sexually suggestive remarks or gestures" when she was working at the National Restaurant Association and he was the head of the group.

The alleged misbehavior occurred about the same time that two co-workers settled separate harassment complaints against Cain, each reportedly for five figures.


Meanwhile, pollster Chris Wilson - who said he polled for the National Restaurant Association during Cain's tenure, and whose firm has more recently done work for an outside super PAC supporting Perry - told Oklahoma radio station KTOK that he had witnessed harassment by Cain toward a very low-level staffer who was maybe two years out of

college. "I was around a couple of times when this happened, and anyone who was involved with the NRA at the time knew that this was going to come up," Wilson told interviewer Reid Mullins.

The restaurant association has not commented on the specifics of the allegations, citing confidentiality agreements that it has signed with the two

original accusers. One of those accusers, now a federal employee, said earlier that she wanted to tell her story and rebut Cain's assertion that her claims were unfounded. Her attorney, Joel Bennett, had said she was considering asking the restaurant association to free her from the confidentiality agreement.

Thousands of Wall Street Protesters Disrupt Busy Port

OAKLAND, Calif. • Several thousand Occupy Wall Street demonstrators gathering in Oakland forced a halt to operations at the nation's fifth busiest port Wednesday evening, escalating a movement whose tactics had largely been limited to marches, rallies and tent encampments since it began in

Police estimated that a crowd of about 3,000 had gathered at the Port of Oakland by about 6 p.m. MDT. Some had marched from the city's downtown, while others had been bused to the port.

Port spokesman Isaac Kos-Read said maritime operations had effectively been shut down, and interim Oakland police chief Howard Jordan warned that protesters who went inside the port's gates would be committing a federal offense.

In Philadelphia, protesters were arrested earlier Wednesday as they held a sit-in at the headquarters of cable giant Comcast. Military veterans marched in uniform in New York, angry at their dim job prospects. And parents and

their kids, some in strollers, formed a "children's brigade" to join the Oakland, Calif., rallies.

"There's absolutely something wrong with the system," said Jessica Medina, a single mother who attends school part time and works at an Oakland cafe. "We need to change that?"

In Los Angeles, New York and other cities, demonstrators held their own rallies in solidarity with the Oakland protesters, who called for Wednesday's "general strike" after the city became a rallying point last week when an Iraq War veteran was injured in clashes with

Protesters, city officials and business leaders were optimistic the strike would be peaceful, and there was little to no visible police presence all day.

Greece's Lenders to Cut Off Help Until Referendum

Cynthia Lummis, R-Wyo., a member of the conservative Republican Study Group, said the intent was to compel the supercommittee to craft a strategy "so big, so comprehensive, so inclusive that any great statesman or stateswoman could hardly resist voting for it."

"To succeed, all options for mandatory and discretionary spending and revenues must be on the table," the group wrote, adding that previous deficit reduction task forces have suggested a goal of reducing the debt by \$4 trillion over the next Please see DEBT, N2

Feds: Men Got Terror Plot Ideas from Novel

GAINESVILLE, Ga. • In the violent underground novel "Absolved," right-wing militia members upset about gun control make war against the U.S. government. This week, federal prosecutors accused four elderly Georgia men of plotting to use the book as a script for a real-life wave of terror and assassination involving explosives and the highly lethal poison ricin.

The four suspected militia members allegedly boasted of a "bucket list" of government officials who needed to be "taken

out"; talked about scattering ricin from a plane or a car speeding down a highway past major U.S. cities; and scouted IRS and ATF offices, with one man saying, "We'd have to blow the whole building like Timothy McVeigh."

Federal investigators said they had them under surveillance for at least seven months, infiltrating their meetings at a Waffle House, homes and other places, before finally arresting them Tuesday, just days after discovering evidence they were trying to extract ricin

from castor beans. "While many are focused on the threat posed by international vio-

lent extremists, this case demonstrates that we must also remain vigilant in protecting our country from citizens within our own borders who threaten our safety and security," said U.S. Attorney Sally Quillian Yates.

The four gray-haired men -Frederick Thomas, 73; Dan Roberts, 67; Ray Adams, 65; and Samuel Crump, 68 – appeared in federal court Wednesday without entering a plea and were jailed for a bail hearing next week. They apparently had trouble hearing the judge, some of them cupping their

Thomas and Roberts were

charged with conspiring to buy an explosive device and an illegal silencer. Prosecutors would not say whether the men actually obtained the items. Adams and Crump were charged with conspiring to make a biological toxin. Relatives of two of the men said

the charges were baseless. The public defender assigned to the case had no comment.

Prosecutors said that Thomas was the ringleader and that he talked of carrying out the sort of actions described in "Absolved," an online novel written by former Alabama militia leader Mike Van-

PORTLAND, Texas • The 23-year-old daughter of a Texas family law judge says she feels some regret about posting an online video of him lashing her with a belt several years ago, but she hopes it forces him to get help. The clip posted last week on YouTube shows Aransas County Court-at-Law Judge William Adams violently lashing his thenteenage daughter more than a dozen times in the legs. Hillary Adams told The AP on Wednesday that her father was angry because she illegally downloaded media files and that she set up the camera because she "knew something was about to happen." - Associated Press

Although windows at two bank branches and a Whole Foods store were broken and graffiti was painted inside one of the banks, officials described the protests as peaceful and orderly and said no arrests had been made.

"It is important to acknowledge the word is watching Oakland tonight," city administrator Deanna Santana said as demonstrators began to gather at the port. "And we need to ensure it remains a safe place for everyone."

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Cash-short Chicago Mulls Easing Pot Law

CHICAGO • A Chicago alderman says he's found a way for the city to raise desperately needed cash that will also keep more police officers on the street: Marijuana.

Alderman Danny Solis introduced an ordinance to the City Council on Wednesday that would make possession of small amounts of marijuana a ticketable offense with a \$200 fine rather than a misdemeanor that carries jail time. He estimates the change would generate \$7 million a year and, since the vast majority of such cases are dismissed, would save police and courthouse workers money and time.

"In these trying times of the economy, we could really use the revenue generated by fines versus arrests," Solis said. "And each (arrest) means police officers are spending an inordinate amount of time outside the neighborhoods, inside the district offices doing paperwork."

Similar laws exist around the country, but unlike in other states and cities where the debate has often focused on marijuana use, the discussions in Chicago have centered almost entirely on money and wasted resources.

Mayor Rahm Emanuel has not endorsed the ordinance, but said recently that a member of the police department's gang unit made a similar suggestion, and he had passed the idea on to Police Superintendent Garry McCarthy and his first deputy

"I asked them to look into it and that's what they are doing right now," Emanuel told reporters.

McCarthy also has not endorsed the ordinance, but while some law enforcement organizations elsewhere in the U.S. have opposed such measures, he has signaled he's open to it — for some of the same reasons Solis cited.

"With minor possession, it would be in everybody's interests to free up officers, keep them in the field (where they) effectively enforce the law," department spokeswoman Sarah Hamilton said.

Solis' plan would levy a ticket for someone in possession of 10 grams or less of the drug — roughly the equivalent of 10 marijuana cigarettes — that could be cleared with a \$200 fine and up to 10 hours of community service. Currently, the offense is a misdemeanor that carries up to six months in jail and a \$1,500 fine.

The ordinance would still be stricter than some elsewhere in the U.S. In California, for example, possession of as much as an ounce of marijuana, or 28 grams, is an infraction no more serious than a speeding ticket. Under a more than 30-year-old state law in New York, people caught with 25 grams are only ticketed as long as the drug is out of public view.

Supporters of the proposed change in Chicago argue that arrests for such infractions add up to a colossal waste of time. Of the 8,625 misdemeanor marijuana cases between 2006 and 2010, about 87 percent were dismissed, according to statistics from the Cook County Clerk of the Circuit Court.

Citing the high dismissal rate, Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle recently recommended that Chicago police stop making arrests for small amounts of marijuana.

Poorest Poor in U.S. Hits Record 1 in 15 People

Numbers underscore breadth and scope by which the downturn has reached further into mainstream America.

washington • The ranks of America's poorest poor have climbed to a record high − 1 in 15 people − spread widely across metropolitan areas as the housing bust pushed many inner-city poor into suburbs and other outlying places and shriveled jobs and income.

New census data paints a stark portrait of the nation's haves and have-nots at a time when unemployment remains persistently high. It comes a week before the government releases first-ever economic data that will show more Hispanics, elderly and working-age poor

have fallen into poverty.

In all, the numbers underscore the breadth and scope by which the downturn has reached further into mainstream America.

"There now really is no unaffected group, except maybe the very top income earners," said Robert Moffitt, a professor of economics at Johns Hopkins University. "Recessions are supposed to be temporary, and when it's over, everything returns to where it was before. But the worry now is that the downturn which will end eventually will have long-lasting effects on families who lose jobs, become worse off and can't recover."

Traditional inner-city black ghettos are thinning out

and changing, drawing in impoverished Hispanics who have low-wage jobs or are unemployed. Neighborhoods with poverty rates of at least 40 percent are stretching over broader areas, increasing in suburbs at twice the rate of cities.

Once-booming Sun Belt metro areas are now seeing some of the biggest jumps in concentrated poverty.

Signs of a growing divide between rich and poor can be seen in places such as the upscale Miami suburb of Miami Shores, where nannies gather with their charges at a playground nestled between the township's sprawling golf course and soccer fields. The locale is a far cry from where many of them live.

One is Mariana Gripaldi, 36, an Argentinian who came to the U.S. about 10 years ago to escape her own country's economic crisis. She and her husband rent a two-bedroom apartment near Biscayne Bay in a middle-class neighborhood at the north end of Miami Beach, far from the chic hotels and stores. But Gripaldi said in the past two years, the neighborhood has seen an increase in crime.

"The police come sometimes once or twice a night," she said in Spanish. "We are looking for a new place, but it's so expensive. My husband went to look at a place, and it was \$1,500 for a two-bedroom, one bath. I don't like the changes, but I don't know if we can move."

About 20.5 million Americans, or 6.7 percent of the U.S. population, make up the poorest poor, defined as

those at 50 percent or less of the official poverty level. Those living in deep poverty represent nearly half of the 46.2 million people scraping by below the poverty line. In 2010, the poorest poor meant an income of \$5,570 or less for an individual and \$11,157 for a family of four.

That 6.7 percent share is the highest in the 35 years that the Census Bureau has maintained such records, surpassing previous highs in 2009 and 1993 of just over 6 percent.

Broken down by states, 40 states and the District of Columbia had increases in the poorest poor since 2007, and none saw decreases. The District of Columbia ranked highest at 10.7 percent, followed by Mississippi and New Mexico. Nevada had the biggest jump, rising from 4.6 percent to 7 percent.

Congress Honors Japanese-American Veterans of WWII

WASHINGTON • Thousands of Japanese-Americans who fought in the fiercest battles of World War II and became some of the most decorated soldiers in the nation's history were given an overdue thank-you from their country Wednesday when Congress awarded them its highest civilian honor.

Nearly seven decades after the war's beginning, Congress awarded three units the Congressional Gold Medal. In all, about 19,000 Japanese-Americans served in the units honored at a ceremony Wednesday: the 100th Infantry Battalion, the 442nd Regimental Combat Team and the Military Intelligence Service.

"This has been a long journey, but a glorious one," said Sen. Daniel Inouye, D-Hawaii., who lost his right arm fighting with the 442nd and was one of the honorees Wednesday.

About 1,250 people attended the award ceremony at the Capitol. About a quarter of those present were former soldiers, now in their 80s and 90s. Hiroshi Kaku, originally from Hawaii, served in the 442nd and his older brother, Haruo, served in the 100th. He said he volunteered for the Army because he had something to prove.

"We wanted to show American citizens that we loved our country," Kaku said. "We were born and raised here."

After Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor, Japanese-Americans were viewed with suspicion. Nearly 110,000 were sent to internment camps. Lawson Sakai learned how much the world had changed when he drove with some of his buddies to the local Navy recruiting station and tried to enlist. While his white friends were quickly accepted, Sakai was considered an "enemy alien" and could not join.

Sakai then watched as the FBI rounded up Japanese-American leaders in Los Angeles. When the federal government authorized the re-

location of people with Japanese ancestry, a sister and some of his friends were sent to internment camps.

"We were blackballed," Sakai said. "Basically, they took away our citizenship."

Sakai's story is similar to thousands of other "Nisei," or second-generation Japanese-Americans. Even as they fought in Europe, many Japanese-American troops had family members who would spend much of the war in U.S. internment camps. American officials, citing concerns that those of Japanese ancestry could be security risks, sent men, women and children to camps around the country.

Sakai served in the 442nd, which consisted of volunteers, about two-thirds from Hawaii and the rest from the mainland. The 442nd experienced some of the most horrific fighting in Europe and became the most decorated unit in U.S. military history for its size and length of service. In just 10 months of combat, more than 700 were killed or listed as missing in action.

Sakai, 88, was wounded four times and received a Bronze Star and Purple Heart. He said the years following the war were difficult and that he often drank to deal with his memories. Now, he said, he's able to take pride in his peers' accomplishments and the subsequent congressional recognition.

"We certainly deserved the record that we produced. It was done by shedding a lot of blood. As far as I know, we didn't give up an inch of ground. We were always attacking and the Germans were always on the higher ground," he said.

The 442nd fought in eight major campaigns in Italy, France and Germany. One of the units attached to the 442nd was the 100th Infantry Battalion, which was comprised exclusively of Japanese-Americans from Hawaii who had been drafted prior to Pearl Harbor. They received the nickname the Purple Heart Battalion because of the tremendous number of casualties they endured

Polish Pilot Rejects Hero Label for Safely Landing Crippled 767

WARSAW, Poland (AP) • The Polish pilot hailed for landing a Boeing 767 jetliner on its belly after its landing gear failed stepped into the public eye Wednesday looking stiff and uncomfortable, and insisted that all the talk of heroism "is exaggerated."

Capt. Tadeusz Wrona set the jetliner down so gently that many of the 231 people on board thought it had landed on its wheels — until they saw fire, sparks and smoke rising from beneath the aircraft as it slid down the Warsaw airport runway.

The 54-year-old pilot for the Polish national carrier LOT deflected the praise, saying he merely did what he was trained to do. "We knew we could make no mistake and that the contact with the ground should not be hard," Wrona told a news conference in Warsaw. "I am absolutely sure that

each of us (pilots) would have done it the same way, and that the result would have been the same?' In the United States,

video of Wrona's landing Tuesday immediately evoked memories of the "miracle on the Hudson," when Capt. Chesley "Sully" Sullenberger landed a crippled US Airways jet in the Hudson River in 2009 and saved 155 lives.

His voice shaking at times as he struggled for words, Wrona said he felt "a huge relief" when he knew everyone aboard the flight from Newark, N.J., had reached

safety — and he wondered whether he might have executed the landing even more effectively.

"When I stopped on the runway, I still was not sure that everyone was safe because smoke and some burning from friction appeared on the ground," Wrona said. "I felt huge relief when the head flight attendant reported that the plane was empty."

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

WASHINGTON • The Federal Reserve sketched a bleaker outlook Wednesday for the economy, which it thinks will grow much more slowly and face higher unemployment than it had estimated in June.

The Fed's gloomier forecast shows that the recovery from the recession has continued to fall short of expectations. Some economists said it makes the Fed more likely to act further to try to boost the economy, though probably not until early next year.

One option would be a program similar to the Fed's \$600 billion in Treasury bond purchases, which it completed in June. Some economists think the Fed could buy mortgage-backed securities instead.

Speaking at a news conference Wednesday, Chairman Ben Bernanke said that if conditions worsen, the Fed would consider buying more mortgage-backed securities. He declined to specify what would trigger such a move.

"Bernanke did not go out of his way to dampen growing expectations" that another round of purchases is coming, said Dana Saporta,

an economist at Credit Suisse. "If anything, he stoked those expectations."


Still, a more aggressive effort to boost the economy would likely face resistance within the Fed. Ian Shepherdson of High Frequency Economics said the economy would have to deteriorate before the Fed would launch another round of purchases.

The Fed now predicts the economy will grow no more than 1.7 percent for 2011. For 2012, it foresees growth of about 2.7 percent. Both forecasts are roughly a full percentage point lower than its June forecast.

Obama Heads to Group of 20 Amid Questions on Greece

WASHINGTON • The United States has an important role to play in helping guide Europe through its financial crisis, but it is ultimately Europe's problem to solve, the White House said Wednesday as President Barack Obama headed for an economic summit in France.

Obama left Wednesday evening on an overnight flight to France aboard Air Force One. The Group of 20 industrialized and developed nations meets Thursday and Friday in Cannes, a summit that's shadowed by the European debt crisis and Greece's surprise plans to put a bailout deal to a popular vote.

Press secretary Jay Carney said Greek Prime Minister George Papandreou's call for a referendum on the Europe bailout plan was certain to be a topic of discussion for Obama and

world leaders. Papandreou has infuriated European leaders and rocked financial markets, putting in jeopardy the long-sought deal to resolve the European debt crisis.

Without criticizing the Greek plan, Carney said it made clear the need for Europe to act.

"The events in Greece ... only underscore the need for Europe to come together and to unite behind conclusive action that resolves this crisis," Carney said at the White House.

He said that the U.S. has unique insight on the European financial crisis because of its experience dealing with its own financial crisis, as well as its position as the world's largest economy. But Carney made clear that the U.S. has no plans to offer financial support to Europe as cash-rich China may do.

"We have said that this is a European problem and that the Europeans have the capacity to resolve it, the resources necessary to resolve it, and need to take conclusive action to do so;" Carney said.

FDA Approves Innovative, Noninvasive Heart Valve

WASHINGTON • Federal health officials have approved a first-of-a-kind artificial heart valve that can be implanted without major surgery, offering a new treatment option for patients

who are too old or frail for

the chest-cracking proce-

dure currently used. The Food and Drug Administration said late Wednesday it approved Edwards Lifesciences' Sapien heart valve, which can be threaded into place through a major artery that runs from the leg up to the heart. Cardiologists say the highly anticipated new approach will help old, sickly patients who cannot undergo the more invasive open heart surgery, which has been used to re-

place valves for decades. Other companies have won approval for less-invasive heart valves before, but Edwards' implant is the first replacement for the aortic valve, the heart's main door-

About 300,000 U.S. patients suffer from deterioration of the valve, which forces the heart to work harder to pump blood, often

Every year about 50,000 place the valve, which involves sawing the breastbone in half, stopping the heart, cutting out the old valve and sewing a new one into place. Thousands of other patients are turned away, deemed too old or ill to survive the operation.

The Mayo Clinic's Dr. David Holmes said the Sapien valve is a "game changer" for those inoperable patients, many of whom are in their 80s with medical conditions like diabetes, emphysema and liver disease.

"We don't have very good therapy for them at this time some of them receive palliative care and some receive medication," said Holmes, who is president of the American College of Cardiology. "But this is really a mechanical problem, and for mechanical problems medications don't work very well."

Edwards' transcatheter valve is threaded through the femoral artery via a small incision in the leg, and then guided up to the heart via catheter. The valve is then wedged into the aortic opening by an inflatable balloon, replacing the natural heart valve. The device is made from cow tissue and polyester supported by a steel

FDA based its approval on a 365-patient study that compared outcomes for patients with the valve and those who received basic comfort care and other nonsurgical treatment. After one year, 70 percent of patients with the valve were still alive, compared with only 50 percent of those who received alternatives.

ROCKING OUT

You've seen Balanced Rock and Snake River Canyon. But how did they form?

OAKLEY • On Oct. 21, College of Southern Idaho professor Shawn Willsey addressed a crowd of students at City of Rocks. This is one of the most geologically interesting areas in the United States, Willsey said.

"This may be the premiere attraction in all of southern Idaho," he said, pointing to the soaring granite formations in the distance. "But I might be biased."

Snake River Canyon, Craters of the Moon, Balanced Rock they're all landmarks that help set south-central Idaho apart. But what's the geology behind them? The Times-News talked with Willsey to get a brief geological overview of five of the area's most famous features.

Having a beginner's understanding of geology has helped Willsey's students appreciate Magic Valley's features. Scott Bolen of Filer can't help but note the rocks as he travels through

"It drives my wife crazy," Bolen said as he took a break from examining crystals in the rocks.

Classmate Jake Semons agreed. "I definitely notice it more," he said. "My wife tells me to shut up sometimes."

You don't need to take a course on geology to appreciate the basics. Here is a quick take on what makes Magic Valley's rocks so special:

Balanced Rock

What you're looking at:

When most people think of Balanced Rock, they think of the area's namesake: The Africa-shaped formation is certainly unique, but the columns in the surrounding area are neat in their own right. The formations are made from rhyolite, a silica-rich volcanic

columns formed as a result of cooling. "Basically, when hot volcanic rock cools and contracts, it develops these vertical cracks in it," Willsey said. Rhyolite cracks in a 120 angle, giving them the angular appearance.

As for Balanced Rock, it's not a product of wind erosion like most people assume, Willsey said.

"Wind is pretty wimpy," he said. In order to effectively erode rock, it has to carry sediment. Instead, the biggest factor was frost getting into cracks and fracturing off pieces of rock.

What you're looking at: Some of the oldest granite in North America. To see other rocks this old in the west, you'll have to go to the bottom of the Grand Canyon, Willsey said.

How old is it? The oldest rocks are 2.5 billion years old, Willsey said. Other spires come from a separate magma chamber that formed about 27 million years ago.

How did it form? There are multiple formations at City of Rocks. One of the most famous, Twin Sisters, is a perfect example of the unique geology of the area — and the massive timespan over which it formed.

At first glance, the two rounded rocks that protrude from the ground look similar. But take a closer look: The sister rock to the south is more ragged and fractured, and is darker in color than the north rock. That's because the south sister is 2.5 billion years old, while the younger one is 28 million years old — nearly 100 times younger than her "twin." The theory behind the formation: The second rock protruded from that 27 million-year-old magma chamber, pushing the older sister up as it rose from the ground.



Malad Gorge

How old is it? That's a point of contention, but one theory is that floods cut into the gorge 15,000 years ago, Willsey said. The source of the flood's water is in question, but it's clear a swollen river cut the canyon at one point.

How did it form? The floods that most likely formed the gorge weren't the same as the Bonneville Flood from Bonneville Lake, Willsey said. Instead, the rush of water came from glaciers that let off water.

The Malad River was much stronger back then - strong enough to rip large boulders out of the canyon walls and carry them down-

Checking Up on Check Stations

Question: "During the fall I encounter many Fish and Game check stations and sometimes I'm thoroughly checked for compliance with the regulations, license, tags, bag limits, etc. Other times the staff only wants to know where we hunted, how much game tion. we saw, and takes samples or measurements of our deer. At those stations compliance seems unimportant. How come there is so much variability between checking stations, and what are all the samples

used for?" Answer: There is a big difference in the goal and focus of personnel at the different check stations you

may encounter. As you noted, the focus of the enforcement compliance check station is to deter and detect violations of fish and wildlife laws. Conservation officers, occasionally assisted by local law enforcement, operate these check stations at locations and times when violations are most likely.

Generally, all traffic is stopped and non-hunters are promptly released on their way. Hunters and anglers may be detained a little longer to check harvested game animals and compliance with hunting and fishing rules.

The most common type of check station encountered during the fall is the "game management" check station. The primary objective at game management check stations is to monitor harvest and hunting effort.

Game management check stations are generally operated at the same time and location over a number of years to help biologists monitor health of game populations and estimate harvest and hunting trends. The non-hunting traffic need not stop, however; all hunters and anglers, whether they have game in possession or not, are re-



quired by Idaho law to stop and report at any check sta-

Game management check stations usually are staffed by department biologists and volunteers. For the safety of our staff and the public, these check stations are only operated during daytime.

Personnel at these stations collect information about hunting conditions, health and condition of the animals, and relative abundance of game. Using harvested game animals as a way to monitor the health of populations, biologist weigh carcasses and measure the thickness of fate covering the breastbone of field dressed fawns and yearling deer. This information is used as an index to habitat condition and pre-winter body condition.

Lymph nodes in the neck of some deer also are collected to test for chronic wasting disease at the wildlife laboratory. A front incisor is collected from some adult bucks to determine age. Combined with antler measurements, the tooth age data will help biologists develop a computer model linking antler size with age.

Biologists also collect information on the numbers hunters and number of animals harvested by sex and age for each game management unit. A survey about their general hunting satisfaction and use of motorized vehicles concludes their interview at the game management check station.

500 recipients would be selected by a computergenerated drawing.

If approved, the 500 tags would be for designated areas in Unit 45, Hatch said, not for the whole unit.

"There is no sagebrush," he said. The department is worried about deer mortality, and offering controlled hunts is a better way to deal with the deer than letting them starve over the cold months, he said.

Another problem: When the snow flies, deer come down from the hills to forage. More deer in the area are expected to show up on highways this year when they can't find food, thus endangering travelers and themselves.

Deer are the depart-

ment's primary concern, but the lack of winter range also affects other critters, such as sage grouse and pygmy rabbits. About 40 percent of the deer in the Smoky-Bennett Population Management Unit have been affected by the fire; this includes units 43-45, 48 and 52.

Managing wildlife in the area is a long-term problem, according to Brad Lowe, a regional wildlife biologist with Fish and Game. And this winter is an important indicator of the future.

"After 15 years the sagebrush might look more like how we're used to seeing it," he said, "but in some cases it can take 100 years."

I wish Fish and Game, BLM, the landowners and especially the deer a lot of luck this winter. It's already getting cold out there.



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High-tech Fare for Waterfowl

his column is in response to complaints and expressions of concern from increasing numbers of biologists, conservation and anti-hunting organizations regarding the lead shot-induced poisoning of waterfowl and shorebirds in eastern flyways.

The federal government mandated the use of nontoxic (non-lead) shot for waterfowl hunting nationwide in the fall of 1986.

As many of you clearly recall, the initial steel-shot loadings were a dismal failure. Not only were they considerably more expensive than their lead counterparts but, more importantly, they were much less effective. Many hunters were so disappointed with their performance that they gave up duck and goose hunting all together.

The subsequent loss of game department funding from the decreased sales of hunting licenses and duck stamps was a bitter pill for wildlife officials to swallow.

This diminished per formance should have come as no surprise. The nature of steel (iron) itself dictates its ballistic inferiority to lead. Steel is a less dense metal. In fact, steel pellets are 30 percent lighter than their lead counterparts.

Initially that sounds good, because after all, lighter means faster. And truly steel shot does outpace its heftier mates at the muzzle. But out there where the birdies quake and honk – generally about 40 yards - the lighter steel has shed more of its initial velocity and winds up sorely lacking in knockdown

To compensate for this disparity, manufacturers concocted a number of exotic blends of metals that matched and in some cases exceeded the density of lead. Many of these hybrids trump the performance of steel but, alas, they all are insanely expensive. I simply can't justify \$2 per trigger pull shotshells.

A more economical approach manufacturers recommended was to select



steel shot two to three sizes larger than your traditional lead pellet choices. For example, substitute No. 2 steel for No. 4 lead, chamber BB, BBB or T steel in place of No. 2 lead, etc. To further enhance performance of their steel, ammo makers developed new wads and powders that really boosted shot column velocities. It all began with Kent Fasteel, Winchester XPERT High Velocity loads and has recently culminated with the fastest of the fast: Remington's Hyper-Sonic Steel that generate a shoulder thumping 1700 fps. Ouch!

To increase the knockdown power of steel, which, due to its extreme hardness, tends to whistle through game without imparting as much clout as lead/lead alternatives, Federal pioneered the evolution of non-spherical steel loadings with its Black Cloud FS Steel line.

An annular ring was added to its standard shot, creating the company's Flite Stopper pellets. Popularized by the Hunting Channel's Duck Commander series, the FS Steel does have a distinct edge (pun intended) for folding big Northern mallards and distant honkers.

For 2011-12, Federal eclipsed this performance with its new 1635 fps. Black Cloud High Velocity line. Winchester put its own unique spin on this concept with its new line of Blind Side shotshells this fall. Early field tests with the hexagonal (six-sided) pellets are promising.

As the 2011-12 waterfowl season heats up, I would be thrilled if you would email me with your personal experiences with any of these new offerings. I'll report your findings in future

Judge Closes 6 Off-road Trails in Federal Forest

BOISE (AP) • A federal judge has decided to temporarily close down trail access to offroad vehicles in sections of the Salmon-Challis National Forest pending a review of the forest's travel plan.

The order issued Tuesday follows a February ruling that the U.S. Forest Service had ignored evidence showing significant damage to trails and the landscape from off-road vehicles when it crafted its 2009 plan.

Environmental groups that challenged the policy in court say the latest ruling is another step to protecting valuable public resources.

Brad Brooks of The Wilderness Society says the closure will ensure trails are protected until the forest managers can craft rules better protecting soil, water and vegetation from ATV's and other vehicles.

A Little Wet? No Problem

Don't let a little autumn shower deter your plans to enjoy a few more romps in the outdoors before winter

The Wood River Bike Path offers cyclists, walkers and roller-skiers miles of scenic pavement on which to roll with views of the snowcapped mountains to the north and the sounds of elk bugling as the sun begins to lighten the sky.

Just don't hit one of the elk — or the many deer and fox – who use the path, in addition to the humans.

Constructed over the old railroad tracks that once ferried sheep out of Ketchum and skiers to Sun Valley, the 20-mile path runs from Gannett Road in Bellevue to Hulen Meadows just north of Ketchum.

Interpretive signs placed along the route tell the tale of the Ketchum Depot, which once stood near the present-day site of the Wood River Community YMCA; the Philadelphia Smelter, which boasted Idaho's first electric lights, the

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historic Pegram Railroad bridges and other historic sites.

"The path is a community treasure," said Jim Keating, director of the Blaine County Recreation District, which maintains the path.

Pick up a free pamphlet describing the trails and its interesting points at area outdoor shops.

Snooze With a View

One of the best places to kick back and relax is at Boxcar Bend along the bike path on the east side of Highway 75 about a half-mile north of East Fork Road.

The spot, which overlooks the Big Wood River and a plethora of golden aspen trees, was named for Union Pacific boxcars that were lowered into the river in 1965 and filled with large boulders to prevent flooding. You can still see three of the boxcars, although subsequent floods have moved them around from their original sites.

There are a couple benches to sit, offering great views of fly-fishermen casting their lines below and big game animals, which often hang out on the opposite bank. Sawdustcovered trails lead to the river's

Gunning for Billy the Kid

Watch the mountain goats of Easley and Silver peaks as they prepare for winter in the mountains north of Ketchum.

One of the easiest ways to spot a goat is to head to Billy's Bridge 17 miles north of Ketchum along Highway 75. There's an observation deck with telescope just downhill from the parking spot. Turn it on the Boulder Mountains, exercise a little patience and start watching for what might initially look like rocks get up and move.

The meadow beyond, which comprises cross-country ski trails in the winter, makes a nice fall hike when you're finished looking.

Follow the course downhill, taking advantage of paved walkways where you can and then proceed north until you're ready to turn uphill and follow the upper part of the course back.

You can lengthen your route by following the Corral Creek trail east of Trail Creek Cabin and returning via Trail Creek Road and the nature trail just north of Boundary Creek Campground. Stop at the Sun Valley Club to warm up with a hot beverage or a snack of mini-Kobe beef sliders lamb sliders or tostadas.

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



Eldon Russell (Russ) Barnes passed on at his home Sunday, Oct. 31, 2011.





McCourt, MLB Agree on Process to **Sell Dodgers**

LOS ANGELES • Embattled Los Angeles Dodgers owner Frank McCourt and Major League Baseball reached an agreement late Tuesday to sell one of the sport's most storied franchises, ending a seven-year run that included four trips to the postseason before recently becoming mired in legal troubles capped by a filing for bankruptcy protection.

A joint statement said there will be a "court-supervised process" to sell the team and its media rights to maximize value for the Dodgers and Mc-Court. The Blackstone Group LP will manage the sale, which could include Dodger Stadium and the surrounding parking lots.

The announcement came as the Dodgers and MLB were headed toward a showdown in U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Delaware at the end of the month as mediation between both sides was ongoing.

McCourt and baseball Commissioner Bud Selig have traded barbs since MLB took control of day-today operation of the team in April over concerns about the team's finances and the way it was being run. McCourt apparently realized a sale of the team he vowed never to give up was in his best interest and that of the

Case Keenum Prepares to Break Record Under Radar

Poor Houston. College football's most overlooked undefeated team will spend another week toiling in relative obscurity. Record-breaking quarterback Case Keenum and the super-charged and 14thranked Cougars (8-0) are at lowly Conference USA rival UAB on Saturday.

The game kicks off at old and antiquated Legion Field in Birmingham, Ala., at 5 p.m. MDT.

That's right, an hour before No. 1 LSU and No. 2 Alabama get going in Tuscaloosa.

The Blazers don't draw well even when they are the only game in town. The announced attendance for UAB's home game against Central Florida on Thursday, Oct. 20 was 8,872. Overall, UAB has averaged 18,294 for its three home games, 108th

Even if a huge contingent of Cougars fans makes the

trip East, there will be plenty of seats available at Legion Field - capacity about 71,500 – for what is likely to be another record-breaking night for Keenum.

The sixth-year senior tossed nine touchdown passes in 73-34 victory against Rice last week to become the NCAA's career leader in TD passes. He's already passed the career total offense mark held by Hawaii's Timmy Chang this season and with 267 yards passing against the Blazers a solid half for Keenum – he'll break the NCAA career record of 17,072 held by Chang.

If a record falls in a stadium with nothing but empty seats, does it count?

made public. "He came to that realization at the end of today."

McCourt filed for bankruptcy protection in June after the league rejected a 17-year TV contract with Fox, reported to be worth up to \$3 billion, that he needed to keep the team afloat. Selig noted that almost half of an immediate \$385 million payment would have been diverted from the Dodgers to McCourt.

The franchise's demise grew out of Frank Mc-Court's protracted divorce with Jamie McCourt and the couple's dispute over the ownership of the team. The divorce, which played out in public in court, highlighted decadent spending on mansions and beach homes and using the team as if it were their personal credit card. They took out more than \$100 million in loans from Dodgers-related businesses for their own use, according to divorce documents.

In bankruptcy filings, attorneys for MLB said Mc-Court "looted" more than \$180 million in revenues from the club for personal use and other business unrelated to the team.

"The Dodgers are in bankruptcy because Mr. McCourt has taken almost \$190 million out of the club and has completely alienated the Dodgers' fan base," the baseball attorneys wrote.

As the former couple continued to fight over ownership of the team, the Dodgers' home opener against the rival San Francisco Giants kicked off a year of even worse publicity. A Giants fan, Bryan Stow, was nearly beaten to death in the parking lot. Stow's family has sued the Dodgers, and his attorney said medical bills could reach \$50 million.

In the outpouring of public sympathy, attention focused on cutbacks in se-

curity at Dodger stadium and fans turned their animosity toward Frank Mc-Court. Scores of police were dispatched to patrol the stadium after the attack.

Dodgers attorneys claimed Selig deliberately starved the club of cash and destroyed its reputation in a bid to seize control of the team and force its sale.

"As the commissioner knows and as our legal documents have clearly shown, he approved and praised the structure of the team about which he belatedly complains," the team said in a statement.

The team was asking Judge Kevin Gross in Delaware to approve an auction of the team's television rights as the best path to exit bankruptcy. But the league wanted to file a reorganization that called for the team to be sold.

Last month, Jamie Mc-Court cut a deal with her ex-husband to settle their dispute over ownership of the team they bought in 2004 for about \$430 mil-

The terms of the settlement between the Mc-Courts weren't disclosed publicly, but a person familiar with it who requested anonymity because it's not meant to be public told The Associated Press that Jamie McCourt would receive about \$130 million. She also would support the media rights deal worth up to \$3 billion.

That removed her from the number of opponents Frank McCourt was facing in bankruptcy court because Jamie McCourt had initially lined up behind MLB and Fox in asking the bankruptcy court to reject his bid to auction Dodgers television rights.

All the bad publicity appeared to drive fans away. There was a 21 percent drop in home attendance from last season and it was the first time in a non-strike year since 1992 that the Dodgers drew fewer than 3 million people.

Husky Stadium Set for Last Game Before Facelift



SEATTLE • After more than nine decades during which it hosted Husky football, NFL games, presidential speeches and commencement addresses, Husky Stadium is getting ready to say farewell for a time.

The brittle waterfront stadium with a setting nearly impossible to match in all college football will host its final football game, a showdown between Washington and No. 6 Oregon, on Saturday before most of the facility comes tumbling down over the next few months as part of a major renovation. If all goes to plan, the Huskies will christen their new dog house Sept. 7, 2013, against Boise State.

In its place in less than two years will be a \$250 million football-only gem, the latest entry into the facility arms race that has college football.

"The stadium means so much to this football program, but I can't even imag-

ine in 18 months from now, when the new Husky Stadium is up, how much more it's really going to mean to this program and university," Washington coach Steve Sarkisian said. "I'm excited for the sledge hammer to come, for the process to start. Eighteen months can't come fast enough."

The images and sounds of Husky Stadium have become as synonymous with college football as any other stadium in the country. The

location is one of two spots in the country where a flotilla of yachts and pleasure boats create a boatgating experience, but only here does Mount Rainier stand prominent in the distance with bald eagles swooping overhead.

racing's richest two days. "He went into the winter with about as much buzz as you can have with a 2-yearold," Pletcher said of Uncle Mo. "He started off the year well, unfortunately, the liver infection cost us a big chunk of the spring and summer.

But we're back in excellent shape now."

Initially, Uncle Mo was treated for a gastrointestinal infection, but he didn't respond before the Derby, in which he was the second favorite, and was scratched the day before the race.

He wasn't eating right, he didn't look good and he began dropping 200 pounds. Veterinarians were puzzled when biopsies of his stomach, liver and lymph nodes didn't immediately produce answers and put his life in jeopardy. His case reminded them of filly Devil May Care, who ran in the 2010 Derby and was trained by Pletcher.

She became sick and had elevated liver enzymes (like Uncle Mo) before being diagnosed with a non-contagious form of hepatitis. She died of cancer in May.

"We were all concerned that Uncle Mo was going down that path," said Repole, who was told there was a 25 percent chance that his colt had cancer. "When a 1,250-pound animal is hurting internally, he can't say, 'Hey Mommy, my tummy hurts? It's hard to figure out what it is."

"The next manager must have leadership and communication skills; he must place an emphasis on preparation and accountability; he must establish high standards and a winning culture; he must have integrity and an open mind; and he must have managerial or coaching experience at the major league level," Epstein said.

Epstein spoke with Sandberg on Wednesday

and let him know that he wasn't in the Cubs' plans. Sandberg, who managed in Chicago's minor league system and left the organization after Quade was chosen to replace Lou Piniella during the 2010 season, does not have major league managerial or coaching experience. Sandberg managed Philadelphia's Triple-A team last season and could be a candidate in St. Louis.

Epstein's First Act:

Firing Cubs' Quade

Another potential candidate in Chicago could be Terry Francona, Epstein's manager in Boston who did not return to the Red Sox after their epic September collapse. Another name that's been mentioned is Tampa Bay Rays bench coach Dave Martinez, who once played for the Cubs.

Epstein fired Quade but made sure he did it in person by traveling to Florida. He called Quade an "outstanding baseball guy" but said it was time for a

Quade got the job after the Cubs went 24-13 during a 37-game interim audition at the end of the 2010 season. He had replaced Piniella - who retired — on an interim basis.

But the Cubs then stumbled through another disappointing year, finishing fifth in the NL Central with a 71-91 record that extended their infamous World Series championship drought to 103 years.

Richardson Carries Incentive vs. LSU

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. • Alabama's Trent Richardson is eager to show what he can do against No. 1 LSU.

Not because Saturday night's showdown is the type of game that serves as a showcase for the Heisman Trophy candidate. The star tailback for the No. 2 Crimson Tide said it's because he was injured and didn't play much against the Tigers.

"This game means a lot to me because I didn't get to play in it last year except for about one quarter," Richardson said. "So I really can't wait to showcase what a healthy Trent can do in this game."

Richardson was hurt when LSU's Patrick Peterson slammed him to the ground on a short touchdown catch and became an otherwise nonfactor in last year's game, carrying six times for 28 yards. He left it with a torn abdominal muscle, a slightly torn knee ligament and a bitter memory.

Richardson missed the next two games and wasn't particularly effective in the final two behind Mark Ingram.

The nation's No. 3 run defense will greet him on Saturday night at Bryant-Denny Stadium, and Richardson has an idea of what to expect after last year's run-in. "That's always in the

back of my head, these guys took me out," he said. "And I had to sit out two more games after that. It's in my head already that I know they're going to try to come right at me and they're going to try to take me down?"

The Tigers have already withstood one of college football's best running backs, holding Oregon's LaMichael James to 54 yards on 18 carries in the opener. Both are Heisman candidates and prolific runners, but have decidedly different styles.

"LaMichael James was more of a speedster," LSU defensive tackle Bennie Logan said. "To contain him, you just had to keep your head up. Trent Richardson is more of a power ball guy. No one man is going to tackle him. We are working on pursuing the ball. We can't let just one man tackle him. We have to group tackle him."

Richardson's 989 rushing yards leads the league and his 18 total touchdowns - including one receiving puts him tied for second nationally in scoring.

LSU coach Les Miles singles out Richardson's 76-yard run against Mississippi when he froze a defender near the end zone with a stutter step.



ORCHARD PARK, N.Y. • Overlooked and discounted for much of his career, Buffalo Bills running back Fred Jackson can't even get a break in his own home.

"My wife took me in the fifth round," Jackson said, shaking his head in mock frustration while discussing where his wife, Danielle, selected him in a football fantasy draft this year.

"She's in a league with family and friends and told them not to touch me," Jackson said. "But I told her I'm not going to continue to sit there while she's skipping over me."

It wouldn't be the first Jackson's been skipped over. Not that getting ignored has ever stopped him.

The Division III Coe College product, who didn't get a sniff at the NFL until after two years of arena football and a stop in NFL Europe, Jackson has used his head-down, hardpounding rushing style to bully his way into joining the league's elite tier.

In playing a key role in the Bills' 5-2 start, Jackson's fourth in the league with 721 yards rushing and second with 1,074 yards from scrimmage. And his yards from scrimmage total is more than Hall of Famer Thurman Thomas ever produced through seven games with Buffalo, and second-most in team history behind O.J. Simpson, who had 1,106 in 1975.

It's enough to have Jackson grab a mention as an NFL midseason MVP candidate as the Bills prepare to host the New York Jets (4-3) on Sunday.


And it's enough for Jackson to have finally captured the Bills' attention in regards to re-negotiating the two years left on his contract.







It is rare to find both tables in a match exploiting the power of the closed hand (i.e., the idea that declarer can put pressure on his opponents by leading toward his hand and not toward the exposed holding in dummy). However, in a recent European Championship we were lucky enough to observe

This hand cropped up in the match between France and Germany in the 1995 European Championship and is a nice example of good play by both declarer and the defense.

Against three no-trump Paul Chemla led a natural if unfortunate low heart, won by dummy's jack, and it is worthwhile taking a few seconds to consider how one would proceed from here as declarer. Klaus Reps found the excellent shot of a low club from dummy, but Michel Perron played his 10 in perfect tempo, which held the trick. Back came a second heart, and Reps won the ace to play a second club. He took some time over his decision, but eventually played dummy's queen (which would only be wrong if Perron had ducked from the doubleton K-10, as indeed he had). Now a third round of hearts

left Reps without resource. The contract and opening lead were the same at the other table in this match. The French declarer also found the low club lead from dummy at trick two, but the German defender rose with the king, and now declarer had no further problems.

funny that I was an enlisted Foster said he talked with man in the Army but an agency executive back home?

Though he had earned the title, Foster had to wait about 13 months to fully move into his new job. It was excruciating, he said, to know his next step in his 12year career in law enforcement would have to wait until he got home.

His job as a cavalry scout was to recon routes through the streets of Baghdad as part of the security detail for visiting dignitaries and other VIPs. Other duties were similar to those in his first career as a police officer, he said.


Witnesses reported seeing young teenagers running from the building prior to the fire, according to the sheriff's press release.

Sheriff's detectives interviewed multiple people during their investigation and requested that charges be filed against the juvenile.













Sidewalks

"At this rate it will take 10 years for us to catch up the south side of Burley," Egan said. Egan asked the council to consider taking applications through the winter to expedite progress.

Burley Administrator Mark Mitton said all the sidewalks in the current LID have been measured and the concrete will be poured next year.

Mitton said crews just got too busy during the summer season to get the work completed.

Also Tuesday

The Burley City Council addressed a number of other items at its regular meeting. They included:

• The council approved moving forward with a study of the costs and services needed to proceed with some annexation in southwest Burley. The city will study the costs of annexing 16th Street to Washington Avenue, a quarter mile south of 100 S. and west to 200

Councilman Casey Andersen dissented, saying he generally opposes forcing people to annex into the city.

The council unanimously agreed to send a request to the city's planning and zoning commission to work on annexation of several islands of property within city boundaries.

• Councilman Vaughn Egan also proposed annexing a number of homes at 700 W. 400 S. in Minidoka County, which is con-

tiguous to property in north Burley. Area resident Jim Bryant spoke up and said homeowners have already signed a petition against annexing the area.

> "I guess we'll pass on that," Egan said.

• The council unanimously approved a Minidoka County Highway District agreement for road maintenance on annexed roads in north Burley.

• Egan suggested the city consider forming a committee to study what type of city waste transfer station and recycling center it needs. Egan said the city could use a \$60 per household landfill fee that residents already pay, but is set to expire in 2014, to pay for the project. No action was taken.

• The council received an update on the city's industrial wastewater improvements, which are now expected to cost \$6 million instead of the orig-

inal estimate of \$8 million. City Administrator Mitpaid for by grants and by the users of the city's industrial plant.

Asked by Councilman Jay Lenkersdorfer about reports of a bad smell in the area, Mitton said the city is investigating if it's coming from the plant. Workers have capped a vent and plan to repair some rips in the cover, which will allow the city to definitively determine if

the plant is a source. Mitton said the smell could also be wafting over from the Heyburn plant, which is right across the river from Burley's plant.

 Thornton Construction in Burley won a bid for a new 80-foot by 80-foot boat dock that will be installed at the city's new park on Bedke Boulevard. The \$61,500 bid was approved contingent upon the approval of a needed permit.

• The city engineer will study whether right-hand turn lanes should be established along Hiland Av-
