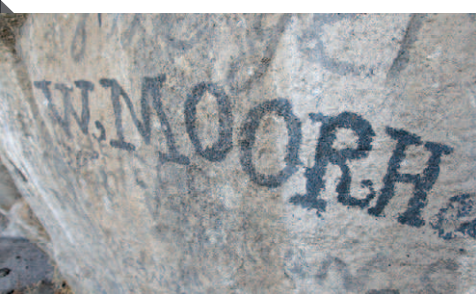

Fairfield, Rupert Mourn Missionary

BURLEY • Residents in two Magic Valley communities are mourning the loss of a Camas County High School graduate and former Rupert resident

killed Tuesday in Texas. Derek Jason Walker, 20, of Fairfield was killed when he and two fellow Mormon missionaries were struck by a car at 7 p.m. Tuesday in Donna, a southern Texas town near the Mexican border. A Church of Jesus Christ of

Latter-day Saints release says 21-year-old Taylorsville, Utah, resident Trevor Reinhold was also killed in the collision. Zachary Todd Harris, 19, of Huntsville, Ala., was treated for injuries and later released from an area hospital. Walker is the son of Camas County 5th District Magistrate Judge Jason Walker and Cindy Walker. The 2010 Camas County High graduate attended East Minico Middle School in Ru-

pert and completed his freshman year at Minico High School before his family moved to Fairfield. "He was happy-go-lucky and a true joy to be around," Camas County High School Principal Jeff Rast said. Walker's father was a Minidoka County prosecutor before he took office as a 5th Judicial District judge in 2007. Minidoka County 4-H Coordinator Jeni Bywater said Walker was

Twin Falls' incoming council members already have plans that extend beyond gathering up campaign signs. They won't get sworn in until January, but their work is already beginning. The elections will put three new council members in the seven-member body, and also provide a full term to Rebecca Mills Sojka, who has been in office since January. E-HARASSMENT? IT'S A REALITY FOR TODAY'S TEENS

While sexual harassment in schools has moved into the digital forum, most instances remain unreported, according to a survey.

Sexual harassment among teens isn't just something that happens face-to-

face or during school hours. Harassment via social media, such as Facebook and text messaging, is becoming more common. Canyon Ridge High School Principal Brady Dickinson said he hasn't noticed any trends in the number of reported sexual harassment cases at the school. "We haven't necessarily seen an increase," he said. "The means are just different. Students use social media

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FIFE, HANCE FACE MORE CHARGES

Lee Fife and Jerry Hance were arraigned on more felony charges in connection with a series of alleged burglaries from the weekend. The duo is accused of burglarizing property belonging to Gordon Paving, the SeaPac fish hatchery and Clayton Homes, a manufactured housing seller.

Fife, 40, of Twin Falls, is now charged with two counts of felony burglary, theft by possession of stolen property and malicious injury to property. Those are in addition to the initial two counts of burglary and one count of grand theft. He is held in Twin Falls County Jail on \$150,000 for both cases.

Hance, 28, of Buhl, faces four more burglary charges for a total of six, and one count of grand theft. Hance is also in jail with \$50,000 bond for each set of charges.

Investigators say the men stole TVs and Blu-ray players from Clayton Homes, attempted to steal a Ford SUV from SeaPac and burglarized from vehicles at Gordon Paving during the weekend.

Both men are slated for preliminary hearings on Nov. 18. Fife is scheduled for an additional preliminary on Dec. 9. He also awaits a February trial, accused of ramming his car into police patrol vehicles earlier in 2011. Fife was shot by police during the alleged incident.

active in 4-H and enjoyed showing pigs in the county fair.

“I think the greatest memories I have of Derek are the public speaking contests he participated in for 4-H,” Bywater said.

The three missionaries were struck at 7 p.m. by 32-year-old Mexico resident Jose Luis Garza Flores, who Texas Highway Patrol officials say fled the scene but later surrendered to police at the Texas-Mexico border.

Texas Highway Patrol Trooper Johnny Hernandez said the men were riding their bikes southbound on Midway Road when Garza-Flores apparently collided head-on with them while attempting to overtake another northbound vehicle.

Hernandez said the victims wore helmets and were using bicycle lights when they were struck. It was dark at the time of the crash. Charges are pending against Garza Flores.

The Walkers have three children in the Camas County School District and a son at Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah, said Mike Owsley,

an LDS stake president serving as spokesman for the Walker family.

“The family is handling this amazingly well,” Owsley said Wednesday. “I was called out at about 9 p.m. to let the family know and it was tough duty.”

Rast said students and staff at the Fairfield school Walker graduated from held Wednesday assembly to help students cope with their grief.

“For the most part, the students are taking it really hard,” Rast said. “Some students checked out and went home because the grief was just too much. There are a lot of hugs going around and there was not a dry eye in the assembly.”

Owsley said Walker had served his church mission for about 14 months and was scheduled to return home in fall 2012. Funeral arrangements have not been announced, but will be handled by Demaray Funeral Service – Gooding Chapel.

“I loved that young man,” Owsley said. “He was so excited to go on that mission.”

Crash Victim Identified as Hansen Man

Genaro Maciel, 31, of Hansen, was the victim of Tuesday night’s one-vehicle fatal wreck, according to the Twin Falls County Sheriff’s Office.

Spokeswoman Lori Stewart said Maciel died at

the scene after being ejected from his vehicle near the intersection of 2950 North Road and Rock Creek Road. Deputies were unable to positively identify Maciel without the aid of family, as he was not carrying identification. There were no passengers in the vehicle.

Maciel crashed his 1998 Buick Century sedan at approximately 7:30 p.m. while heading westbound on 2950 North. It is not clear why Maciel crashed, but Stewart said alcohol may be a factor. The crash remains under investigation.

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City of Kimberly Prepares for New Mayor

KIMBERLY • Though he won't take his seat till January, Tracy Armstrong isn't wasting any time preparing for his new job as the city of Kimberly's mayor.

On top of designing a new communication system for Kimberly citizens, Armstrong is also feeling out community leaders who would be interested in participating in a council advisory committee.

"I don't have any power yet, I'm just putting out feel-

ers and getting feedback," he said.

Armstrong campaigned on a need to reunite the city and increase communication between city officials and the public. One tool he may use would be a communication board to help alert residents of important meetings and upcoming decisions.

He pointed to the failed city recycling measure as an example that residents had lost confidence in the city. While he doesn't know if the council will continue to pursue a single-stream recy-

cling program, he said everything must first start with gaining back trust.

Armstrong replaces incumbent David Overacre, who has been Kimberly's mayor for the past four years — also serving on city council from 1993-2005. Overacre did not return calls for comment Wednesday.

Kimberly residents wasted no time flexing their voice in this year's election. According to the Twin Falls County Clerk's Office, an

impressive 45 percent of Kimberly registered voters showed at the polls this year.

Also welcoming change: residents of nearby towns who work and visit Kimberly during the day.

Lauren Peters, a former Kimberly resident, said she was excited at the thought of a new mayor.

"It was time for him to leave," he said. "My mom still lives in Kimberly and from my experience, I think it's just an overall good thing."

Debi Rice, owner of DeEties Floral in Kimberly, said she too is excited that Kimberly will be under a new mayor.

A resident of Twin Falls, she said she hopes for improvement in how Kimberly's water is managed. Kimberly voters chose in 2009 to raise their utility rates — at the time, a possible average increase of 60 percent — to repay a bond for a massive overall of the city's system. The resulting increase, Rice said, has been a struggle.

Armstrong said he has ideas to help address the

utility rates, but declined to discuss details about his future plans.

"It's not only my voice that will be in on this decision," he said. "But I have a few ideas I'm going to present to the council in January."

The new mayor is joined by two new City Council members, James Eisenhower and Constance Sowka.

"I'm excited to work with both Connie and Tracy," Eisenhower said. "We share many of the same feelings, and that is having the people's best interests in mind."

Child Porn Collector to Serve Three Years

A Kimberly man found in possession of child pornography will serve at least three years in prison.

Donald Morris, 44, was sentenced to a maximum 24 years with the eligibility of parole Monday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court. Morris pleaded guilty to 15 counts of possession of sexually exploitative material of children. In a plea agreement, the state dropped another 20 felony complaints.

Morris was also or-

dered to pay a \$3,000 fine and register as a sex offender.

He missed his original sentencing date in early October, claiming to be in a treatment facility in Wyoming. A \$250,000 warrant was issued for his arrest, and he resurfaced later in the month.

Morris was initially charged in June, after a private citizen and an area pawn shop owner turned over three computers containing child pornography last year. The computers were traced back to Morris.

much more now."

In a nationwide study of nearly 2,000 seventh-through 12th-grade students, about 30 percent reported being sexually harassed last year via electronic means.

The study by the American Association of University Women also showed that nearly 50 percent of students surveyed reported being sexually harassed.

Dickinson said there's usually only one or two cases of sexual harassment reported each year at Canyon Ridge. Other types of harassment, he said, are more common.

Like many school districts, the Twin Falls School

District has a no-tolerance policy for all forms of harassment. The four-page policy specifically on sexual harassment prohibits the act via verbal statements, "obscene comments" and electronic devices.

Dickinson said the topic of harassment at schools has become "a hot topic" nationally over the past five years or so. As a result, he said he's seen more students who are willing to talk with school staff members about it.

"They are more inclined to come talk with us now than in the past," he said.

However, results from the national survey show that only 9 percent of students who were sexually harassed last year reported the incident to a parent or their school.

In Twin Falls, the punishment for students who harass their classmates can include in-school suspension or, after repeated cases, expulsion.

Students can also be punished for a case that happens outside of school hours, but it's sometimes challenging to track down the details.

In the past, students who have been harassed have printed out an image of their Facebook page with the inappropriate comment and brought it to school administrators, Dickinson said.

There haven't been any cases of expulsion at Canyon Ridge for a sexual harassment case, he said. Most of the time, students aren't repeat offenders after being suspended.

"We've been successful in getting them to stop," he said. "We haven't had a case where a student continued with their behavior."

The Wealth Divide: The Bottom 60% in the U.S. Has Never Had More Than 11% of the Wealth

We hear a great deal these days about the

top 1 percent and the bottom 99 percent in the American economic pyramid. But we also need to consider the 11 percent.

From 1776 to the present, the bottom 60 percent of the American population, as University of Southern California historian Carole Shammas has documented, has never had more than 11 percent of the country's wealth. We may embrace the American dream of broad prosperity and wealth equity, but we have never been close to achieving it.

There has been an explosion of studies examining inequality in the United States recently. They have been both illuminating and, at times, confusing. Sometimes people refer to the top 1 percent and bottom 99 percent using income, and at other times the studies look at wealth. Sometimes they have focused on individuals, sometimes on households, where there might be two or three earners.

Does it matter? Yes. Let's start with the difference between income and wealth. The top 1 percent of today's earners make more than \$700,000 annually, and the top 1 percent in terms of wealth have assets of more than \$9 million.

There's a big difference between the two kinds of money. Income lasts only as long as you have the job, and it has a tendency to get spent once it's earned. Income taxes, which are hard to evade on earnings, come out of it, as do the expenses of daily life. But wealth is forever, as long as the possessor can resist risky investments and live on the income from it rather than the principal. Many of the returns on acquired wealth come from capital gains, which are taxed at a lower rate of 15 percent. Other returns are sheltered from taxes in a variety of ways.

It is a lot better for the pocketbook, it turns out, to have a trust fund than to work as a stock trader, especially in a downturn like ours. Enduring wealth also translates into enduring political power in our system.

And what about wealth for the rest of us? How are we faring? Let's consider the situation of those American households in the second quintile of wealth, those who find themselves in the 60th to 80th percentiles in comparison with other American households. This group took a serious hit in the Great Recession. For most middle-class families, the biggest items in their strongboxes are their homes and their retirement savings — 401(k)s and the like. Our persisting crisis has put 23 percent of mortgage-holders underwater, meaning they owe more on their houses than they are worth. Even the 77 percent of mortgage-holders who aren't underwater have taken a substantial reduction in the worth of their property, as have those 30 percent to 40 percent of homeowners who have no debts or encumbrances on their houses. And retirement savings have also been battered by an unpredictable stock market and low interest rates on savings accounts.

Inequality as an issue has simmered just beneath the surface of public concern over the last quarter of a century as the median income of American households has fallen by about 4 percent. The wealthiest Americans have experienced a very different reality. Consider the top one-tenth of 1 percent. For the two decades before the recession, the American economy saw greater productivity and more wealth generation, but despite the predictions of supply-siders, little of that wealth trickled down. Instead, it redounded in a hugely disproportionate way to the benefit of the 13,000 households in the top 10th of the top 1 percent.

Never in the history of the United States has there been such a concentration of wealth in the hands of a small elite. We now rank 27th in the least-equal countries, falling between Portugal and Chile.

But let's get back to the bottom 60 percent of American households and how they have never enjoyed more than 11 percent of the country's wealth. Doesn't that figure suggest we should review the content of the American dream and emphasize what is actual rather than illusory? We have a constitutional government, widespread enjoyment of personal freedom and government policies that protect opportunity. Perhaps the current public conversation about the 1 percent and 99 percent can focus on the fundamental question of how long political equality can survive amid such economic inequality.

A Bogus Charge of Hypocrisy

Politico reported this week that conservatives are opening a new attack line on Elizabeth Warren by targeting her personal wealth. The idea seems to be that it's somehow "hypocritical" for her to support higher taxes on the rich and to employ soak-the-rich rhetoric for political gain, because, well, she's rich herself.

In fact, Warren calling for higher taxes on her own

class — ones that would mean she has to pay more — is the opposite of hypocrisy.

What's more, this argument is rooted in the thoroughly phony idea — widely pushed on the right — that calling for higher taxes on the wealthy is somehow an

attack on wealth, success and individual initiative.

But this raises an interesting question: What percentage of wealthy people join Warren in supporting higher taxes on themselves?

It's not easy to pin this down, it turns out. A recent poll found that a majority of millionaires support such a move, but that poll was flawed.

So I asked The Post's polling team to take a look at its data. The high-end-income group with a suffi-

cient sample size is comprised of individuals making more than \$150,000 — not ideal for measuring the sentiments of the top 1 percent, obviously, but still useful, the team tells me.

Post polling guru Peyton Craighill looked at the last three Post-ABC News polls, taken over the spring and summer, that measured support for raising taxes on those with incomes of more than \$250,000 a year. They show, he reported, that "about six in 10 of those with incomes of \$150,000 or more support raising taxes on those with incomes of \$250,000 as a way to reduce the deficit."

It looks like there may be a lot of rich "hypocrites" like Elizabeth Warren out there.

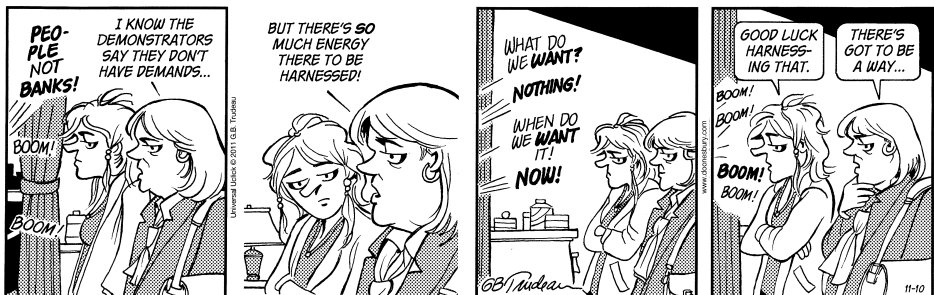
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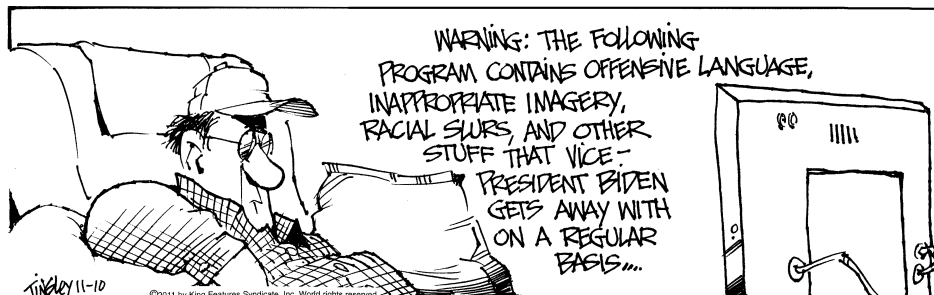
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Idaho Lab Accident May Stem From Damaged Container

BOISE • All 16 workers exposed to radiation at the Idaho National Laboratory were allowed to go home following the incident, which officials Wednesday said likely resulted from decades-old plutonium powder that escaped its damaged stainless-steel shell.

After a follow-up lung scan Wednesday, one worker still tested positive for radioactive material in the lungs and was receiving extra attention at the lab's medical facility. Seven of the employees tested positive for external skin contamination, and six had positive nasal swipes.

All 16 workers will undergo weeks of testing, including urine analysis to evaluate their level of exposure. Plutonium, if it remains in the body, can cause cell damage.

Lab health director Sharon Dossett said none of the exposed workers was exhibiting outward symptoms of radiological exposure. They were allowed to go home because they posed no threat to others, she said.

"These isotopes are internal hazards; they're not external hazards," Dossett told reporters at a news conference Wednesday. "There's no hazard to their family members or anybody they would come into contact with."

INL officials declined to provide details about the workers, including their genders.

The lone employee who tested positive for radioactive material in the lungs Wednesday had breathed in

Americium-241, an isotope commonly found in nuclear waste. While the lung scans aren't sensitive enough to detect plutonium, the presence of Americium-241 proves plutonium is there, too.

"It's for sure," Dossett said.

According to lab officials, it may be weeks before the extent of all the workers' exposure is known.

Idaho National Laboratory officials said filters meant to keep radioactive material from being released from exhaust systems inside the facility functioned properly. There was no risk to the public or the environment, the laboratory said in a statement.

The lab has designed and constructed 52 reactors since its founding in 1949 in the desert west of Idaho Falls.

One of those reactors, the Zero Power Physics Reactor, was dismantled last year, but 6-inch-long plutonium fuel plates that date back to research done in the 1970s remain inside the building.

Early Tuesday afternoon, workers were recovering the fuel so it could be shipped to a U.S. Department of Energy facility in an undisclosed state. The lab originally reported it was bound for Nevada but later retracted the statement.

Lab officials suspect the stainless steel cladding that surrounded the plutonium was damaged years ago, beginning a slow-but-steady process of plutonium oxidation that led to the exposure. When workers opened an aluminum box that housed the fuel plates and cut away plastic wrapping, they noticed several grains of powder that escaped.

Capitol Evacuated After White Powder Found

BOISE • Investigators say the powdery substance found in a letter at the Idaho Capitol has been deemed non-toxic.

The state Capitol was evacuated Wednesday morning as authorities investigated the substance found in a letter or package. Other media reported there was also a bomb threat.

FBI Spokeswoman Deborah Bertram says the investigation is ongoing, but preliminary lab tests show the powdery substance is not toxic.

The *Idaho Statesman* reports police dogs found no evidence of an explosive device, and employees were allowed to return about 2 p.m.

School Denies Negligence in Driver's Ed Death

KETCHUM • The Blaine County School District says neither the district nor its driving instructor were negligent or reckless in a crash last October that killed a 15-year-old student.

The *Idaho Mountain Express* reports the district made its statement in an answer to a wrongful death lawsuit filed by the parents of Austin Hennefer of Carey.

Dennis and Maryanne Hennefer allege that the driving instructor was negligent and reckless in having their son perform a three-point turn on an icy highway. The car was struck by an oncoming vehicle.

The school's response says the parents' injuries, if any, were caused by the negligence or fault of Austin Hennefer and/or people other than the school district.

Lawyer Gets 50 Years in Plot to Murder Wife

COEUR D'ALENE • An Idaho attorney who once represented the white supremacist Aryan Nations group was sentenced Wednesday to 50 years in federal prison in the

failed plot to kill his wife and mother-in-law.

Edgar J. Steele wanted the women dead so he could collect on an uninsured motorist insurance policy and be free to pursue a relationship with a woman from Ukraine, prosecutors said. He paid \$10,000 in silver to another Idaho man who agreed to kill the women, authorities said.

The would-be hit man, Larry Fairfax, testified during Steele's trial that he accepted the silver because he was desperate for money, but

never intended to carry out the plan.

Steele, 66, was convicted in May. He was sentenced by U.S. District Court Judge B. Lynn Winnill.

Faculty Change Policy in Wake of Murder-suicide

BOISE • A new policy at the University of Idaho would strongly discourage relationships between faculty members and students following a murder-suicide, in which a

professor killed a graduate student he had taught and dated, then took his own life.

Ernesto Bustamante resigned Aug. 19 and three days later, gunned down 22-year-old Katy Benoit outside her Moscow home, police said.

Faculty leaders on Tuesday approved revisions to university rules on faculty-student relationships. The move still needs approval from the full faculty and University President Duane Nellis.

Woman Who Accused Cain Complained in Next Job

WASHINGTON • Three years after Karen Kraushaar settled her sexual harassment complaint against Herman Cain and quit the trade association where they worked, she filed another complaint at her new job. She argued that supervisors there unfairly denied her request to work from home after a car accident and accused one of them of circulating a sexually oriented email, The Associated Press has learned.

Kraushaar, 55, says she later dropped the complaint that she filed while working as a spokeswoman at the Immigration and Naturalization Service in late 2002 or early 2003 and left the agency to take a job at the Treasury Department. She says she considered the immigration service complaint “relatively minor.”

But three former supervisors say the allegations, which did not include a sexual harassment claim, were investigated and treated seriously. Two former supervisors say she initially demanded a settlement of thousands of dollars, a promotion on the federal pay scale, reinstated leave time and a one-year fellowship to Harvard’s Kennedy School of Government. The promotion itself would have increased her annual salary between \$12,000 and \$16,000, according to salary tables in 2002 from the U.S. Office of Personnel Management.

Details of the second complaint come as Kraushaar says she will provide specifics about the allegations she made against Cain, the GOP businessman now running for president who led the National Restaurant Association when she worked there. She is reaching out to three other Cain accusers, suggesting they can schedule a joint news conference to rebut Cain’s insistence that he has never sexually harassed anyone.

Cain’s campaign said news of Kraushaar’s complaint at the immigration service and details about another accuser’s financial problems were “interesting revelations.”

“We hope that the court of public opinion will take this into consideration as they, the women, continue to try to keep this story alive,” spokesman J.D. Gordon said in a statement Wednesday.

The Cain campaign projected an air of business as usual with the release of his first TV ad of the season and the announcement that he will appear on the “Late Show with David Letterman” on Nov. 18.

USDA Yanks Plan for Christmas Tree Fees

WASHINGTON • Is the Obama administration really taxing Christmas trees? No, but the White House said Wednesday it was reversing its decision to approve an industry-sponsored Christmas tree promotion program after conservatives accused the Agriculture Department of spoiling Christmas with a new tree tax. The program — similar to familiar industry campaigns like “Got Milk?” “Beef: It’s What’s For Dinner” and “The Incredible Edible Egg” — would have been fully funded by fees on the industry at 15 cents per Christmas tree sold. The industry had asked the USDA to set up the program. Conservative critics said the costs could eventually be passed on to consumers. The National Christmas Tree Association said it wouldn’t have an impact on the price consumers pay for their trees.

GOP Candidates: No Bailouts for Europe, Autos and Banks

Candidates seem to speak with one voice in saying Italy and other European countries should rise or fall on their own without any American bailout.

ROCHESTER, Mich. • United in agreement for once, Republican presidential rivals warned forcefully Wednesday night the United States could be doomed to the same sort of financial crisis that is afflicting Europe unless federal deficits are drastically cut and the economy somehow revived.

Though sexual harassment allegations facing Herman Cain have dominated the GOP campaign for more than a week, the debate in economically ailing Michigan focused almost entirely on financial worries and proposed solutions in the U.S.

The candidates generally stuck to practiced speech lines — with a late exception. In the middle of one answer, Texas Gov. Rick Perry found himself unable to recall the names of all three of the Cabinet-level agencies he wants to eliminate, even leaning over to Rep.

Ron Paul for help at one point. “The third agency of government I would do away with — the Education, the Commerce. And let’s see. I can’t. The third one I can’t. Oops,” he said, forgetting for a moment that he wants to abolish the Department of Energy. On one specific issue that Congress must address soon, the candidates

generally backed an extension of the Social Security payroll tax cut scheduled to expire at the end of the year. That was a rare moment of accord with President Barack Obama and many congressional Democrats, who have been warning that consumers could be hurt if the reduction is not renewed.

Emails Show Fundraiser Discussed Effort to Win White House’s Help

E-mails and interview notes offer most complete picture yet of Tulsa billionaire George Kaiser’s interest in helping Solyndra win additional federal support.

WASHINGTON • A major Obama fundraiser strategized with one of his associates last year about how to get White House and Energy Department assistance for a solar company in which his family funds had a substantial interest, according to emails released Wednesday by House Republicans.

Tulsa billionaire George Kaiser advised on how to press officials for federal contracts and additional loan assistance for Solyndra, the failed solar company that left taxpayers on the hook for \$535 million in federal loans, the emails show.

But they also appeared to back up Kaiser’s assertion that he did not directly lobby the White House and only advised associates on how to proceed.

The document releases came in two waves, first from Republicans on a House committee investigating Solyndra and then from angry committee Democrats, who argued that a selective release of materials gave a misleading picture of Kaiser’s role. Together, the emails and interview notes released by battling sides offered the most complete picture yet of Kaiser’s access to the Obama administration and his interest in helping Solyndra win additional federal support.

Kaiser worried in February 2010 that his involvement might be questioned if an investigative reporter should discover his connection to Solyndra and link it to the names on President Barack Obama’s bundlers list, one email shows.

But his associate assured him that because he had not personally lobbied the White House, controversy could be averted.

Kaiser was a bundler for Obama’s 2008 campaign and has been a frequent White House visitor, using meetings with top officials to seek stimulus funds for projects based in Tulsa, Okla., and to discuss his charitable projects, he has said.

Democrats Make Offer to Cut Deficit by \$2 Trillion

WASHINGTON • Democrats on Congress’ supercommittee secretly presented Republicans with a revised deficit-cutting proposal earlier this week that calls for a blend of \$1 trillion in spending cuts and \$1 trillion in higher tax revenue over the next decade, officials in both parties said Wednesday night, adding that compromise talks remain alive though troubled.

The previously undisclosed offer scaled back an earlier Democratic demand for \$1.3 trillion in higher taxes, a concession to Republicans. At the same time it jettisoned a plan to slow the growth in future cost-of-living increases in Social Security benefits, a provision liberal Democrats oppose.

Italian President Tries to Calm Anxious World Markets

ROME • With markets tumbling around the globe, Italy’s president promised emphatically Wednesday that Silvio Berlusconi will step down soon as premier and lavished honors on a leading economist, who instantly became Berlusconi’s presumed successor.

Across the Ionian Sea, the debt crisis in Greece deepened with the breakdown of talks aimed at creating a power-sharing government to prevent the country from slipping into bankrupt-

cy. The collapse came just minutes after the prime minister delivered a farewell speech to the nation.

The chaos reverberated around the world, and investors pulled money out of Europe. The Dow Jones industrial average plunged more than 3 percent, the euro slipped 2 percent against the dollar, and Italy’s key borrowing rate spiked at a dizzying high of 7.4 percent.

“I’m not prepared to raise taxes on working Americans in the middle of a recession that’s this bad,” said former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, a sentiment quickly seconded by former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney.

Perry disagreed, and Rep. Michelle Bachmann of Minnesota said she opposed the one-year reduction when it was approved late last year. She said it had so far “blown a hole of \$100 billion in the Social Security trust fund.”

Asked about Europe’s financial troubles, the candidates seemed to speak with one voice in saying Italy and other European countries should rise or fall on their own without any American bailout. And several of the White House hopefuls warned that unless U.S. deficits are cut and the economy invigorated, America is headed for the same type of downward spiral.

“Europe is able to take care of their own problems. We don’t want to step in and bail out their banks and their economies,” former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney said as he and GOP rivals met for the first time in three weeks in campaign debate.

Even so, he said the United States should continue contributing to organizations like the International Monetary Fund that are working to prevent a melt-down in troubled economies overseas.

Paul was more emphatic about the debt. “You have to let it liquidate. We took 40 years to build up this worldwide debt,” he added.

Cain said there wasn’t much the United States could do to directly to help Italy at present because the

economy there is in such difficult shape. “We need to focus on the economy or we will fail,” he said, referring to the U.S. and calling for spending cuts, a strong dollar and measures to stimulate growth.

The Cain accusations did come up, though briefly.

“The American people deserve better than someone being tried in the court of public opinion due to unfounded accusations,” he said when the question came up early in the debate. “I value my character and my integrity more than anything else. And for every one person that comes forward with an unfair accusation there are probably, there are thousands who come forward and say none of that ever happened with Herman Cain.”

Romney, a former venture capitalist, was asked if he would keep Cain on the job as a CEO given the accusations. He responded, “Herman Cain is the person to respond to these questions. He just did.”

On another point, Cain felt it necessary to make a post-debate apology to House Democratic leader Nancy Pelosi, whom he had called “Princess Nancy” for sidetracking Republican legislation when she was speaker.

The announced topic for the evening was the economy, a subject that produced few if any early sparks among rivals who often spar energetically.

Perry, Gingrich, Bachmann and former Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum joined Romney, Cain, Paul and Huntsman on stage at Oakland University in Michigan, a state where unemployment is 11.1 percent and well above the national 9 percent jobless rate.

The one-page proposal was handed to Republicans at a meeting Monday night attended by some but not all members of the super-committee. At the same session, GOP lawmakers in attendance advanced a revised proposal of their own that signaled for the first time they would be willing to accept higher revenues as part of a plan to cut deficits over the next decade.

Given the unusual secrecy of the meeting and the committee’s Nov. 23 deadline to produce at least \$1.2 trillion in savings, it appeared that the pace of activity on the panel was accelerating. Less clear was whether there was still time to bridge enormous differ-

ences on priorities, or whether each side was laying the groundwork for trying to blame the other in case gridlock triumphs.

The committee, comprising six Republicans and six Democrats, has been working for weeks. Evidence of progress has been scarce, with Republicans demanding large cuts in benefit programs such as Social Security and Medicare, while Democrats pressed for additional tax revenue as a condition for agreeing to make deep spending cuts.

Few details are known of the session Monday night, except that Sen. Pat Toomey, R-Pa., outlined a plan on behalf of the four Republicans in attendance, and Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., countered with the revisions in an earlier Democratic proposal.

Investors fear Italy might follow Portugal and Greece into begging for a bailout from its partners in the euro. But Italy’s 1.9 trillion euro (\$2.6 trillion) debt is far too great for Europe to cover.

On Tuesday, Berlusconi announced he would step down after Parliament passes a series of economic reforms to stave off financial ruin in Italy. But there was growing fear he doesn’t have the will or the clout to push the measures through. And some worry the wily premier will try to stay in power.

On Wednesday, with the markets in turmoil, Italian President Giorgio Napolitano in effect put Berlusconi on notice that he and the world’s markets are expecting Berlusconi to keep his word and leave soon.

Parliamentary whips feverishly worked out a timetable to ensure that the Italian Senate would give final approval Friday to the package of measures, aimed at stimulating

growth and reining in debt, according to state TV. It said the lower house would do the same on Saturday, meaning Berlusconi could be out before the weekend is over.

Berlusconi’s top political aide, Angelino Alfano, confirmed the scenario, saying on a TV talk show Wednesday night that Berlusconi would resign sometime between Saturday and Monday, as soon as the economic reform law is passed.

In a surprise move, Napolitano named Mario Monti, who runs the prestigious Bocconi University in Milan, as senator-for-life, an honor given to notable figures that bestows voting privileges in the upper house of Parliament.

Monti was already being eagerly touted by market analysts, political commentators and some Italian politicians as having the international respectability and economic know-how to guide the country through the financial storm. His new title appeared intended to move him into position to try to form a post-Berlusconi government.

Turkey: Quake Kills At Least 7, Dozens Trapped

ASSOCIATED PRESS

ANKARA, Turkey • Rescue workers have pulled out 23 survivors from the rubble of three buildings, collapsed by an earthquake in eastern Turkey, the country’s disaster management authority said Thursday. At least seven were killed and dozens of others trapped.

Deputy Prime Minister Besir Atalay said Wednesday’s quake toppled 25 buildings in the city of Van but only three of them were occupied since the others have been evacuated after suffering damages in last month’s powerful temblor.

The magnitude-5.7 quake was a grim replay of

the previous magnitude-7.2 earthquake that hit Oct. 23, killing more than 600 people.

Rescue workers speeded up their search for survivors by daylight on Thursday, trying to open tunnels into the debris, CNN-Turk television reported. The workers used the glare of high-powered lights to work throughout the night despite several aftershocks.

Atalay said Thursday that the rescue work was concentrating at the site of two collapsed hotels and one apartment building. The disaster management authority said 23 survivors were pulled out along with the bodies of seven people.

His family foundation was the biggest investor in Solyndra, but he has denied that he had any involvement in discussions of Solyndra’s 2009 federal loan.

Republicans investigating the failed solar company have seized on Kaiser’s Solyndra connection to allege that Obama donors got preferential treatment under the stimulus program. The White House has denied the allegation, saying that Solyndra’s loan and all other Energy Department loans were based on merit.

On Wednesday, Kaiser spokesman Renzi Stone responded to the new documents in an email: “To reaffirm our previous public statements, George Kaiser had no discussions with the government regarding the loan to Solyndra.”

The emails show discussion between Kaiser and Steve Mitchell, the manager of his family investment

fund, who also served on Solyndra’s board, about how to appeal to the White House for assistance in winning federal contracts.

In a separate email, Kaiser describes a White House stimulus meeting at which Solyndra came up. Every official at the meeting had a “thorough knowledge” of Solyndra and described it as a poster child of their program, he wrote.

White House spokesman Eric Schultz said the email threads were incomplete and out of context but supported the administration’s position that it had done nothing wrong.

“Even the documents cherry-picked by House Republicans today affirm what we have said all along: This loan was a decision made on the merits at the Department of Energy,” Schultz said in a statement. “Nothing in the 85,000 pages of documents produced thus far by the Administration or in these four indicate any favoritism to political supporters.”

Expect Packed Planes and High Airfares for Holidays

Travelers planning to fly for the Thanksgiving holiday face two helpings of bad news: Ticket prices are expected to be 6 percent to 12 percent higher than last year, and empty seats will be even harder to find.

Because airlines have cut thousands of available seats for the holiday, low-fare airline tickets for the busiest days will go quickly, leaving only high-priced seats or fares for flights several days before or after the holiday.

An estimated 23.2 million Americans are expected to fly during the 12-day period before and after Thanksgiving, a 2 percent decline from last year, according to the Air Transport Association.

Dow Sinks 3 Percent as Europe Uncertainty Deepens

NEW YORK • The Dow Jones industrial average dropped more than 350 points Wednesday after Italy's borrowing costs soared and talks collapsed in Greece on forming a new government.

The euro dropped 2 percent against the dollar and Treasury yields sank below 2 percent as money moved money out of Europe and traders bought U.S. government bonds. Goldman Sachs, Morgan Stanley and other large banks were hit hard on worries over their ability to handle a financial crisis brought on by trouble in Europe.

The yield on the benchmark Italian government bond spiked above 7 per-

cent, evidence that investors are losing faith in the country's ability to repay its debt. Greece, Portugal and Ireland required financial rescues when their government bond yields rose above the same mark. Unlike those countries, Italy's \$2.6 trillion in debt is too large for other European countries to rescue.

In Greece, power-sharing talks fell apart between the country's two main political parties, raising doubt about whether the country will be able to receive the next installment of emergency loans it needs to avoid default.

Italian Premier Silvio Berlusconi promised late Tuesday to step aside after a new budget is passed, but there are concerns that the transition to a new govern-

ment will be difficult. Markets see Berlusconi as an impediment to the kind of far-reaching economic reforms Italy needs to remain solvent.

"The market loves a quick solution and we're obviously not getting one," said Mark Lehmann, director of equities of JMP Securities. "We've had a strong rally off the bottom and any piece of bad news is going to be responded to negatively."

The Dow sank 3.2 percent to close at 11,780.94, the biggest drop since Sept. 22. The Dow fell 276 on Monday of last week and then 297 points the following day after the Greek prime minister said he would put an unpopular package of austerity cuts to a public vote. That raised

the prospect that the measures would fail and Greece would default. The referendum was later scrapped. The Dow gained back nearly all that ground over the following five days.

The S&P 500 lost 43 points, or 3.6 percent, to 1,233.

The Nasdaq composite slid 97, or 3.5 percent, to 2,631. Both the S&P 500 and the Nasdaq are below where they started the year. The Dow is still up 2 percent.

The slide was broad. Only three stocks in the S&P 500 index rose: Best Buy Co. Inc., Boston Scientific Corp. and Yahoo! Inc. Financial firms and material producers fell the most. Morgan Stanley plunged 8 percent and Goldman Sachs lost 7 percent.

Europe Drags Down General Motors' 3Q Profit

DETROIT • The fragile European economy is dragging down General Motors' profits, forcing its management to look harder for cost cuts and ways to boost revenue in the struggling region.

GM said Wednesday that its third-quarter net income fell 15 percent from a year earlier, pulled down by losses in

Europe and South America and weak earnings in all areas except North America and China.

The company's shares fell nearly 10 percent to \$22.55 late Wednesday as GM executives were backed off an earlier prediction that the company would break even before taxes in Europe this year.

Europe faces a financial crisis and could slip into recession. Growth is

slow in several key nations. Italy, the region's third-biggest economy, is bucking under the weight of government debt. Greece faces default unless it can accept a new debt deal, and the region also is dealing with high unemployment, stingy bank lending and declining exports. General Motors Co. is among the first U.S. corporations to forecast lower earnings due to the problems.

ALMO • The climbing possibilities draw people to City of Rocks from all over the world, but the first adventurers who came through the area left their mark

In south-central Idaho, the Oregon Trail ran next to the Snake River. Other pioneers found themselves in Cassia County, close to the Utah border.

It's been about 150 years since those settlers passed through Magic Valley on their way farther West, but shadows of their mi-

gration remain today.

At City of Rocks, pioneers painted their names in axle grease on the rock as they spent the night at the site, according to Shawn Willsey, geology professor at College of Southern Idaho.

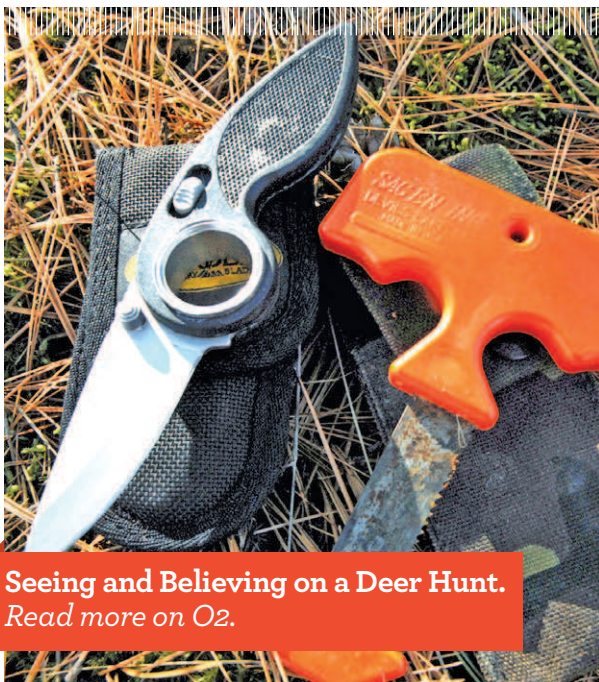
Some signatures are still clear, like one that reads "A. Freeman, June.12.50." Others are faded and smudged. The earliest names date back to 1849, according to "The Oregon Trail Revisited," by Gregory Franzwa.

If you go to Register Rock, don't touch. The oils from your fingers can damage the signatures.

Don't Forget to Report on Tags

Hunters are required to file a report on their deer, elk and pronghorn hunts within 10 days after harvesting, or within 10 days after the end of the hunt if they did not harvest.

Hunters are required to file a report for each tag they bought whether they went hunting or not.

To file reports, hunters need to know their tag numbers or hunting license numbers, the number of days they hunted, the game management units they hunted in, the date they harvested, and the number of antler points on the animal they harvested, or the length of the horns for pronghorns in inches. These harvest data are valuable to Idaho Fish and Game for managing big game populations.

Hunters who have not filed their reports will be sent a reminder postcard. Some hunts are still open, a few until the end of December. Reports should be filed when the hunt is over.

Sure, Beard was busy. But the late start to 2011's fall weather was a discouragement — and not just for Beard.

Deer seasons were off to a slow start this year, according to Idaho Department of Fish and Game and area hunters. And weather was a big factor.

A long winter caused deer in some places, such as the Bennett Hills, to linger on winter range longer than they usually do, which caused some fawn and doe mortality, said Regan Berkley, a regional biologist with Fish and Game. And a warmer fall kept the animals in the mountains longer, where they could better hide from hunters.

"There are a couple of units I've heard great things out of," Berkley said. "And a couple that have been a little slow at times"

It wasn't until the last week in October that business picked up for Jeff Frost, owner of Intermountain Taxidermy.

"The weather was just so dang hot," Frost said. "When it's like that the deer don't have much of an excuse to move around a lot. They stay up high, they stay more nocturnal."

Twin Falls resident Dan Hadley went hunting with a group of friends to units 53 and 46 in late October and early November. Three of the five members harvested a deer, he said. The group didn't see as many bucks as they usually do in those areas.

"We saw a lot of doe," Hadley said, noting that most of the hunters he knows complained about the late start of ideal hunting weather.

The South Hills is one area where there have been reports of hunter success, Berkley said. "We've had really good reports from that area throughout the season. Again, we had a little bit of a slow opener but it picked up nicely."

What's the outlook for deer hunting next year?

"I'm going to hold off on that until we see what winter does," Berkley said.

Seeing and Believing on a Deer Hunt

COOK, Minn. • The sky was black and clear and the south wind that blew Friday night still blew when we awoke at 4:30 a.m. one Saturday. It was opening morning of deer season, and my brother, Dick, his son, Brian, my son Cole and I wanted to be in our stands by 7:15.

Following the diffuse light of our head lamps, we walked a narrow trail that winds a half-mile through jack pine and popple and some red and white pine. This higher ground has yielded some deer to us through the years. But each of us prefers to hunt lower country and the swampy lairs of the bucks that lurk there.

Every waking moment, deer this far north roll the dice. Bears sniff out their fawns, wolves catch them on ice, cars splatter them in the night. Comparatively, we represented little threat: Dick sits in a swamp stand farthest to the south, Brian to the west, Cole the east and I the north. Except for a noon lunch sometimes spent around a campfire, sprawled in a half-circle on the forest floor, we, each of us, pass these days alone with our thoughts, watching swamps and particularly the edges of swamps and the trails formed there.

The sun came up and there were no shots. On occasion

within a half-hour of light seeping through the bare tree limbs that arch over the piece of country, a deer reveals itself, ghostlike. Seen just then, the animal gives itself up less by what we can see than by how it carries itself. Does travel light-footed and are not just a little curious, stopping and chewing and looking around, as if one motion was dependent on the next. Bucks, especially the good ones, are heavier and often move in the manner of champion boxers entering the ring.

If you've seen a deer move this way, you'll recall it when you see it again; the subconscious records such sensory perceptions indelibly.

Hunters who don't see deer for a long while from their stands begin to see them everywhere. Tree stumps and deadfalls take the form of heads or legs, and branches, antlers. I killed a deer the first time I ever hunted, and I told my dad afterward that I had seen so many animals that finally I had to shoot one. This was in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, in woods not unlike those my brother, nephew, son and I hunted on this Saturday. Deer typically aren't plentiful in these landscapes, except in successive years of open winters, with little snow. Looking back, I'm unsure whether any of the many deer I saw that first morning of hunting were actually deer except the one I

shot. The upshot is the crack of my hand-me-down lever-action .30-30 set the table for a lifetime of expectations that some seasons are met and others not.

When we met for lunch the sun was high in a bluish sky. We had seen no deer. Sandwiches we had made early that morning and stashed in our packs were broken out and the time was passed in good humor. Each of us knew the business has no role here, and in that respect deer hunting is a welcome diversion from modern life. Mystery does, however, gather round all of hunting, and acknowledgment of its presence is an acknowledgment that no outcome can be predicted.

Which, in the end, is hunting's price of admission, and one season ticket holders gladly pay.

Midafternoon came and went, then ushered in late afternoon. The wind, strong from the south all day, was unrelenting. Overhead the sky became a winter's gray-blue, and the temperature fell.

Deer on windy days that would otherwise move often bed down. Still and quiet is how they like their woods, beneath the croak of a raven passing overhead, and the flitting of chickadees, tree to tree.

There are also areas throughout south-central Idaho where you can see wagon ruts carved into rocks.

At Milner Dam, you can see deep wagon ruts, said Twin Falls historian Jim Gentry.

"The Milner Ruts are really good," Gentry said. From the west entrance to Milner Dam, look north. You'll see a shelter and the beginning of a hiking trail that will take you to the wagon ruts.

Head west and you can see more ruts southeast of CJ Strike Reservoir, about 21 miles south of Mountain Home. Look for marked

sections along hiking trails that designate the ruts.

Oregon Trail ruts aren't cordoned off, and you can walk on them all you like. But compared to other Idaho landmarks, like geological spots, they're fragile. Don't drive on them, especially when they're rainy and muddy, pleads the Idaho Chapter of the Oregon/California Trail Association.

The Latest Mars Rover Is the Biggest, Best Yet

The era of Mars rovers commenced on Independence Day 1997, when the microwave-oven-sized Pathfinder (AKA "Sojourner") punctured the red planet's atmosphere, deployed parachutes, fired retrorockets, and plunged to the surface in a room-sized cocoon of airbags, finally bouncing to a halt in the Ares Valley.

For the next three months, it crept around its lander, analyzing rocks and soil and taking photographs before its batteries ran out.

The golf-cart-sized, solar-panel-powered Mars Exploration Rovers, whose wildly successful missions began in January 2004, descended to the surface with parachute/retro-rocket/airbag landings similar to Sojourner's. Spirit finally succumbed to a bitter Martian winter while mired in powdery soil in May. But its twin, Opportunity, keeps right on rolling with more than 21 miles on its odometer and counting.

Next up is the Mars Science Laboratory "Curiosity," awaiting a post-Thanksgiving launch. Curiosity — a relative behemoth — is roughly the size of a Mini Cooper and packed with science experiments. Weighing in at a ton (just over 700 pounds in Mars's weaker gravity), Curiosity is too heavy for airbags. Instead, it will execute the first precision landing on Mars, employing a steered atmospheric entry, supersonic parachute deceleration, and retro-rocket slowed descent stage, after which the rover will rappel to the surface, commando-style, on a 25 foot bridle.

Sojourner, designed for 30 days of operation, survived for 85. Spirit and Opportunity lasted 25 and 30 times longer, respectively, than their 90-day design lifetimes. (Who knows how much longer Opportunity might run?) Curiosity's primary mission of one Martian year (686 days), powered by the heat of decaying plutonium converted to electricity, is to search for traces of microscopic Martian life, and analyze the environment to determine how likely that life might be, even if it remains undetected.

If the past is prologue, Curiosity might still be leaving tracks in Martian soil well into the 2020s.

Throughout France, Luxemborg and Belgium each Nov. 3 is celebrated as St. Hubert’s Day in reli-



gious circles. During these festivities special mass blessings are said for the safety and success of hunters and the health of their animals. Dogs are blessed for protection from disease, and special religious music for hunting is performed. The cumulative result of the service is to bring the spirit of the hunt into the church.

For many European hunters, making a pilgrimage to St. Hubert, Belgium, on St. Hubert’s Day is like a Muslim making a pilgrimage to Mecca.

Last week was St. Hubert’s Day. What better way to celebrate than by mentoring a kid hunting or fishing?

More Off-season Activities to Be Allowed at Ski Areas

A new law has made it easier for ski areas leasing federal land to expand off-season activity offerings, and U.S. Forest Service officials say the permitting opportunities could help give a year-round economic boost to local communities.

The Ski Area Recreational Opportunity Enhancement Act of 2011 signed into law this week amends the National Forest Ski Area Permit Act of 1986, which allowed only nordic and alpine skiing on Forest Service lands. Under the new law, ski areas can offer features like mountain bike terrain parks, zip lines and Frisbee golf courses.

“What it does, more than anything, is formalizes and encourages people to look at offering off-season activities that would benefit themselves and their communities,” said Phil Sammon, media coordinator for the Forest Service’s Northern Region in Missoula.

Year-round use of ski areas could sustain 600 extra jobs and bring in more than \$40 million to communities, a Forest Service news release said.

The act won’t change existing permits and still requires ski areas to go through a review and approval process, Sammon said. But if a ski area is interested in adding less traditional activities, the new rules could pave the way for easier approval.

“A lot of the environmental analysis would already be done, the recreation area already exists,

we wouldn’t have to do much more analysis with that concession already there,” Sammon said.

Montana Snowbowl owner Brad Morris welcomed the new rules, but said he doesn’t have immediate plans to expand offerings at the ski area, located on the Lolo National Forest just north of Missoula.

“We don’t have anything planned, but the zip lines was one of the things we looked into and are seriously considering doing,” Morris said. “We knew we had to work it around the land we own, (this new law) would make it a little easier.”

Whitefish Mountain Resort, located in part on the Flathead National Forest, already offers year-round activities, but most exist on a portion of the resort’s privately owned land. The resort offers mountain biking trails, zip lines, treetop tours and alpine slides to tourists and recreationists who flood the area during the summer.

Spokeswoman Riley Polumbus said the year-round activity has generated an economic boost for the resort.

“It’s been good for business — we had one of the busiest summers ever,” she said.

That bodes well for the Whitefish community.

“If (tourists) figure there’s a day to two days’ worth of things to do at Whitefish Mountain, that’ll give them more time to eat and shop,” she said. “If we have more things going on, we’re going to create more jobs to run these activities. It’s definitely helping every day.”

Hunter’s Persistence Pays Off in the Final Moments of Muzzleloader Season

WICHITA, Kan. • For three years, Scott Carlson got frequent nighttime trail camera photos of a big non-typical buck on his hunting grounds. But he rarely saw it in the daylight.

It was the final minutes of the muzzleloader season on Oct. 2 and Scott Carlson was hurrying toward the buck of his dreams.

Time, he knew, wasn’t on his side because hunting the buck during the 11-day firearms season beginning Nov. 30 probably wasn’t an option.

The non-typical buck had broken one antler by early October the previous two falls.

“I suspected he had a problem with his horns and they were easy to break,” said Carlson, of Atwood, Kan. “Plus I never knew if I’d ever get another chance to see him. I saw him five times in three years and most of those were right

at dark.”

So it often goes with world-class bucks. The deer he shot that evening is most likely the largest whitetail shot with a muzzleloader in Kansas.

Carlson first learned there was a special buck on his Unit 1 private hunting grounds in September 2009, when a young buck with many extra points showed up on a trail camera. He estimates the buck would have grossed about 150 inches of antler at the time.

He never saw the buck during the daylight that year, but found a broken right main beam in September.

Going into the 2010 muzzleloader season, Carlson had more nighttime trail camera photos of the buck he guessed might then score about 190 inches. He found its broken main beam the first week of October.

The buck again was fairly common on camera this past summer.

“He was pretty consistent

on one trail camera, heading down into a creek bottom,” Carlson said. “I’m guessing he was heading down there to drink.”

Carlson plants no food plots and puts out no feeders to hunt over. His plan for this season was to take a seat overlooking several canyons that lead from pasture lands into the creek bottom the buck frequented.

Like the previous two seasons, Carlson headed into this fall’s seasons thinking he’d shoot the big non-typical or nothing.

Carlson was beginning to think it was going to be another nothing season when he saw a deer several canyons over late on Oct. 2.

“I suspected it was him, but it was far enough away I really couldn’t tell,” Carlson said. “I didn’t have a lot of time to get around two draws and make sure I had the wind in my favor.”

As the sun was setting, Carlson peeked into the canyon where he’d seen the buck and got his first really

good look at the big white-tail.

At 80 yards with a scoped-muzzleloader, Carlson easily made a quick kill.

“He was bigger than I thought,” Carlson said of walking up to the downed buck. “I was surprised to see all of his points were intact. Seeing him in person was impressive, very impressive.

Antlers that are 30 1/2 inches wide on the outside with 30 scorable points have a way of being impressive.

The antlers carry four droptines and each sprouts multiple points. The rack carries about 80 inches of non-typical points.

Carlson’s taxidermist scored the buck unofficially at 255 gross inches, netting about 245 inches after deductions. An official net score will be obtained 60 days after the deer was shot.

Per Carlson’s research, he expects the buck to be one of the top 10 non-typicals killed in the world with a muzzleloader during modern times.

Douglas B. 'Buzz' Bradshaw

Jan. 6, 1910-Nov. 7, 2011

KETCHUM • Douglas B. "Buzz" Bradshaw passed away Monday, Nov. 7, 2011, at his home in Ketchum, Idaho, just two months before celebrating his 102nd birthday.

Buzz was born to Grace and R.D. "Rex" Bradshaw on Jan. 6, 1910, in Payette, Idaho, where he, his brother, Ken, and sister, Edith, spent their childhood. His official name of Douglas only lasted until he got his first pair of the popular Buster Brown shoes; from then on, the family began calling him "Buss." Later, when he became known for his honey, this nickname was altered slightly to "Buzz."

Rex had learned his beekeeping in Long Island, N.Y., where his family had emigrated from Ireland when he was an infant. As a young man, Rex moved to Idaho and started a honey business in 1905. His children were involved from a young age. Edith graded the honey and, each year, Buzz and Ken left school a month early to help when the honeybees began to swarm.

After graduating from Payette High School, Buzz and Ken took turns attending college one year and spending the alternate year selling honey from a Model A Ford truck. Buzz first studied at the University of Idaho but later transferred to Stanford University, where he earned his letter in gymnastics and graduated from the School of Business in 1933 with a degree in business and economics. He then returned to Idaho to join his father and brother in the family's newly formed honey-producing company, R.D. Bradshaw and Sons, located in Wendell, Idaho.

It was in February 1934 at a Saturday night dance at the American Legion Hall in Gooding, Idaho, that Buzz first laid eyes on Myrle Robertson. Buzz always chuckled when he recalled spending most of that next summer trying to convince Myrle to marry "the son of a beekeeper who peddled honey for a living." Buzz and Myrle were married Sept. 30, 1934, at Myrle's family's home in Gooding, with family and friends present. To this union, two sons were born, Douglas John and Robert Benn Bradshaw.

Buzz focused on the marketing aspects of the business, while his brother, Ken, developed the production side. Buzz created "3 BEARS" and "SPUN HONEY" brands with distribution in super-market chains throughout the West and Midwest. By the time the family honey business was sold in 1964 to Sioux Honey Association of Sioux City, Iowa, it had become the largest independent honey-producing and packing business in the United States.

Two years later in 1966, Buzz and his two sons purchased the Ray Wells Food Brokerage Co. in Los Angeles, Calif. Bradshaw Inc., as it was renamed, provided Buzz the opportunity to focus all his energy and talent on a business he loved. His leadership, motivational ability and national marketing experience were instrumental in building the company into one of the major food brokerage firms in the Western United States, with more than 800 sales professionals on staff. The family sold the business in 1997 to focus on its other enterprises. With Buzz's support, the family had established several other businesses in food, beverage and house wares, most notably Bradshaw International, which has become the national market leader in kitchenware. Buzz has taken great pride knowing that company management today includes his grandsons, Brett and Scott.

Buzz and Myrle loved the Wood River Valley. They honeymooned in Ketchum and spent many weekends and summers there with friends and family. In 1954, they purchased property and



built their first home on Knob Hill. In 1973, they built their present home next to the original house and began commuting seasonally back and forth between Ketchum and their home in Indian Well, Calif. They always called Ketchum "home."

Buzz took an active interest in local affairs and, in 1960, he and Myrle donated three lots that would become part of Ketchum's Knob Hill City Park. A wonderful storyteller and writer, as he approached his 90th birthday, Buzz decided to write a book detailing the Bradshaw story. In just under a year, he wrote and published "Ninety-five Years and Beyond: The Bradshaw Story." Each family member received a copy at Christmas that year, and the book was also donated to the Ketchum Community Library's regional history collection.

Known for his upbeat, positive attitude, Buzz never lost his passionate love of life. He and Myrle traveled the world. An avid reader, he was continually learning and keeping up to date on current affairs, as well as the activities of family and friends. It wasn't unusual to sit down with Buzz and, in one conversation, cover world history, foreign policy, sports standings or the day he and Myrle spent traveling over Afghanistan's Khyber Pass. Buzz loved and inspired people and was particularly interested in the well-being of young people, especially his family and grandchildren.

Buzz was a member of the National Food Brokers Association, a life member of the Masonic Lodge and the Thunderbird Country Club and a longtime member of the Boy Scouts of America, St. Thomas Episcopal Church in Ketchum and Phi Gamma Delta Fraternity. In 1979, Buzz was the recipient of the National Conference of Christians and Jews annual Humanitarian Award, the first food broker in Los Angeles to receive this award.

Buzz leaves behind Myrle, his wife of 77 years; and his sons, Doug (Nancy) of Gardnerville, Nev., and Ben of Sun Valley, Idaho. He is also survived by his grandchildren and great-grandchildren, Laurie (Eric) Mensing of McLean, Va. (children, Michael, John and Lauren), Scott (Wendy) Bradshaw of Temecula, Calif. (children, Cameron and Kyle), Anne (Jim) Hines of Cardiff, Calif. (children, Connor and Chad), Karin Failla of Santa Monica, Calif., Darin Failla of Sacramento, Calif., Jill (Taylor) Pillsbury of Laguna Beach, Calif. (children, Jack, Audrey and Charlie), and Brett (Samantha) Bradshaw of Laguna Beach, Calif. (children, Rex and Archie). He will be missed, as well, by his step-great-grandchildren, who knew him as their own grandpa, Elijah, Liberty, David, Lei Livety, Zeke and Lilly. Buzz is also grieved by close nieces and nephews, Carol Stranahan, Connie Wilde, Gary Bradshaw, and James and William Hansel.

A funeral service will be held at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 15, at St. Thomas Episcopal Church in Ketchum, Idaho. At a later date, a celebration of Buzz' life will be held in Southern California.

BSU’s Rice Adjusting Again to New Team, New Conference

BOISE • Leon Rice began his first season as Boise State coach adjusting to a team filled with unfamiliar players and preparing for a group of new conference foes.

Turns out Rice is revisiting that scenario in his second year on in Boise.

The Broncos return just five players from a team went 22-13 last year, Rice’s first season at the helm and the Broncos’ last as a member of the Western Athletic Conference.

The challenge is getting those veterans to mix with a bunch of young, inexperienced teammates and a Mountain West Conference schedule that promises to be more challenging the last year.

Only one of the Broncos’ returning players started more than half of last season’s games — forward Ryan Watkins with 23 — as Rice juggles making his team competitive in the short term and build a program for the long haul.

The 16-player roster includes eight freshmen, two junior-college transfers and Oregon transfer Drew Wiley. Two of the incoming freshmen are imports from Australia.

“I’ve never had a team with this many question marks,” said Rice, who came to Boise State after a long career as an assistant coach at Gonzaga.

The leading returning scorer is senior guard Westly Perryman, who averaged 6.1 points per game. So anyone who can show they can score consistently will be in the mix for

‘I Wish I Had Done More’

Penn State trustees fire legendary coach, school president over sex abuse scandal coverup.

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. • Penn State trustees fired football coach Joe Paterno and university president Graham Spanier amid the growing furor over how the school handled sex abuse allegations against an assistant coach.

The massive shakeup Wednesday night came hours after Paterno announced that he planned to retire at the end of his 46th season.

But the outcry following the arrest of former assistant coach Jerry Sandusky on molestation charges proved too much

for the board to ignore.

Speaking at his house to a couple of dozen students, Paterno said, “Right now, I’m not the football coach. And I’ve got to get used to that. After 61 years, I’ve got to get used to it. I appreciate it. Let me think it through.”

He shook hands with many of the students, some of whom were crying.

Other students were upset. A large crowd descended on the administration building, shouting “We want Joe back!” then headed to Beaver Stadium.

One key question has been why Paterno and other top school officials did-

n’t go to police in 2002 after being told a graduate assistant saw Sandusky assaulting a boy in a school shower.

Paterno says he should have done more. Spanier has said he was not told the details of the attack.

Sandusky has denied the charges.

Defensive coordinator Tom Bradley will serve as interim coach while Rodney Erickson will be the interim school president.

Earlier in the day, Paterno said in a statement he was “absolutely devastated” by the case, in which Sandusky, his onetime heir apparent was charged with molesting eight boys in 15 years, with some of the alleged abuse taking place at the Penn State football complex.

POLICIES ‘WORTHLESS’ IF PEOPLE DON’T DO WHAT’S RIGHT

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Before one thinks that anything along the lines of the Penn State sexual abuse scandal could ever happen here, administrators and decision-makers across the state and in the region nonetheless enact and enforce laws to protect people.

As the nation is learning, events like those involving the Penn State football program, which has built a sterling reputation over the years of doing things the right way under coach Joe Paterno, no program at any level is immune. But whether in Magic Valley or Happy Valley, plenty of safeguards are in place in the hopes any future wrongdoing never gets to that level. It’s up to individuals to make sure problems are identified and resolved before they evolve into a crisis that engulfs a community.

Twin Falls School District policy requires district employees to report any suspected abuse of a child within 24 hours. It also requires employees to notify the superintendent within 24 hours of being charged with a misdemeanor or a felony.

The district also has stringent bylaws to deal with harassment and hazing, be it “innocent” or something more outrageous like the recent Blackfoot High School criminal case.

But policy is only as effective as the people charged with its upkeep. If it’s not enforced, that’s when there is disconnect in protocol, like the one that ostensibly took place at Penn State, can occur.

“Having a policy in place is really important, but also policy without people following the policy is a worthless policy. There’s a human factor there that you’ve got to do what’s right, and if we do what’s right we’re always safe,” said Twin Falls High School athletic director Mike Federico. “If a policy’s in place ... it’s either insubordination or ignorance (if it’s not followed). Either you don’t know the policy or you’re just not going to follow the policy. That’s the job of our administration to know which is which.”

AREA COACHES SHOCKED, ‘DISGUSTED’ OVER NEWS OF FALLEN IDOL

College of Southern Idaho men’s basketball coach Steve Gosar said only one word.

“Disgusted.”

Gary Krumm, the head football coach at Jerome said this isn’t a football issue anymore.

Longtime Kimberly football coach Kirby Bright was stunned upon hearing the shocking and graphic news out of Penn State surrounding athletic director Tim Curley and Vice President Gary Schultz, who were charged with perjury and failing to report what they knew about one-time assistant coach Jerry Sandusky’s alleged abuse of young boys.

“To have that happen to that program and under that man (Joe Paterno) who had been there for 50 years and represented himself and the university the way he did, I just can’t understand it,” said Bright, a longtime Penn State fan. “It’s hard to grasp.”

Bright just finished his 18th season coaching the Bulldogs and said he’s been a fan of Paterno and Penn State since running back John Cappelletti won the Heisman Trophy in 1973.

“I used to love watching the linebackers play at Penn State. The whole, ‘Linebacker U’ thing, I ate it up at a young age,” Bright said.

Now he’s left to watch a university which has always been as squeaky clean as their white uniforms, rocked by these allegations.

“I’ve always liked the plain uniforms and the white helmets and what Penn State stood for,” Bright said. “To have all that crash down in front of you is tough. If you can’t believe that, it makes you wonder what’s real?”

Paterno, fired Wednesday night, came under intense scrutiny for his actions, or lack of action some would say,

NBA Players, Owners Meeting as Deadline Expires

NEW YORK • As Commissioner David Stern’s deadline passed, the NBA and its players continued negotiating Wednesday in an attempt to end the lockout.

The two sides met for more than eight hours to try to hash out a deal to save the season.

Stern had issued an ultimatum to players: Accept the league’s latest proposal by 3 p.m. MT Wednesday or it will be replaced with a much harsher one that would drive the sides even farther apart.

Players said Tuesday they wouldn’t

accept the current one as configured and suggested another negotiation session.

The current offer calls for players to receive between 49 percent and 51 percent of basketball-related income, though union officials said it would be impossible to get above 50.2 percent. Players were guaranteed 57 percent of BRI under the previous collective bargaining agreement.

The next proposal would call for a 53-47 revenue split in the owners’ favor, essentially a hard salary cap and salary rollbacks, which the league orig-



inally sought but had taken off the table. Both proposals were sent to union executive director Billy Hunter on Sunday.

The meeting featuring small groups from both sides was arranged Wednesday morning.

Failure to make a deal likely would increase the calls for the union to decertify so the players can file a lawsuit against the league in court, a risky and lengthy tactic that likely would doom the 2011-12 season. Union officials have downplayed the idea, but players might have no other leverage once the more

Heisman Race Still Andrew Luck's to Lose

Andrew Luck came into this season as one of the most overwhelming Heisman Trophy favorites college football has had in years.

Luck has played well, albeit against Stanford's relatively weak schedule so far, and according to the Web site Heismanpundit.com, which conducts a weekly straw poll of voters, the junior quarterback is still the clear front-runner.

For better or worse, that can change Saturday when No. 3 Stanford plays No. 6 Oregon. It's the biggest game on the Cardinal's schedule and it's the showcase game of the college football weekend — scandals aside.

If Luck helps avenge last year's 52-

31 loss in Eugene, and keeps the Cardinal in the national championship race, his Heisman stock should soar. If he and the Stanford stumble, the race would be wide open.

Luck's statistics are excellent (2,424 yards, 26 touchdown passes and a 174.1 passer rating that is fifth in the country), but not much different than other Heisman contender quarterbacks.

Wisconsin's Russell Wilson has 2,238 yards, 21 touchdowns and a 196.7 rating. Baylor's Robert Griffin III has 2,781 yards, 26 touchdown passes and a 188.1. Boise State's Kellen Moore has 2,229 yards, 29 touchdowns and a 179.5. Oklahoma State's Brandon Weeden has 3,212 yards, 26 touchdowns and a 158.5 rating.

Then there is Houston's Case Keenum, who has been setting NCAA career records weekly and putting up crazy stats for the Cougars. Keenum's line: 3,626, 34 and 192.4.

Alabama's loss last week against LSU was a setback for running back Trent Richardson, but he certainly shouldn't be eliminated from the Heisman race. The Tide's bruising tailback was the best offensive player on the field in a 9-6 game, with 89 yards rushing and 80 receiving.

He was second in the Heisman-pundit.com poll this week. Moore and Keenum were tied for third.

But this Heisman is Luck's to lose. The picks:

At Stanford, Research Doesn't Stop on the Field

STANFORD, Calif. • The moment Stanford wide receiver Chris Owusu collided with a defensive back at Oregon State last week, information about the severity of his head injury started to emerge on the sideline.

Just not from a trainer or doctor.

Instead, a sensor in his mouthpiece relayed data through a wireless transmitter for instant analysis. The detailed diagnosis went beyond a simple screening, giving insight on an injury that will sideline the starting receiver when No. 3 Stanford faces No. 6 Oregon on Saturday night.

In an unprecedented field research study, about two dozen Stanford players are wearing mouthpieces equipped with tiny sensors to measure the number and force of head impacts during games and practices. The sensors provide information to the sideline, where team trainers and doctors monitor hits as they happen.

"If you go back and look at the four-year career of a collegiate football player, how many hits are they actually receiving? That's what we want to find out," said Dr. Dan Garza, Stanford's team physician and assistant professor of

orthopedic surgery. "And, secondly, is there a threshold for concussions? Or is there at least a zone where we say this is highly likely going to be a concussion? Maybe we can alert players to that ahead of time."

Even with the football team gaining unprecedented notoriety, real-world issues at Stanford come first.

The mouthpieces are slightly thicker than the nor-

mal ones, but they offer the same protection. The difference is the devices contain accelerometers and gyrometers that measure the linear and rotational force of head impacts, and a radio inside transmits the data to sideline computers.

Stanford researchers dropped a crash-test dummy some 4,000 times to ensure the sensors corresponded to what the brain is experiencing from the mouth. The study is

being funded by the Stanford Department of Orthopedic Surgery with support from the athletic program.

Garza presented 24 mouthpieces to the team and explained how they functioned before the season. Players were not asked to participate — they could decide on their own.

The response has been so overwhelming that there are more players asking for the devices than ones wearing them.

"This is a tragedy," Paterno said. "It is one of the great sorrows of my life. With the benefit of hindsight, I wish I had done more."

John Surma, the vice chair of the board of trustees said, "these decisions were made after careful deliberations and in the best interests of the university as a whole."

He said Paterno was told by telephone that he was out after spending most of his life at Penn State and guiding its football teams to two national championships in the 1980s.

"The past several days have been absolutely terrible for the entire Penn State community. But the outrage that we feel is nothing compared to the physical and psychological

suffering that allegedly took place," Surma said.

The firings came three days before Penn State hosts Nebraska in its final home game of the season, a day usually set aside to honor seniors on the team.

The ouster of the man affectionately known as "JoePa" brings to an end one of the most storied coaching careers — not just in college football but in all of sports. Paterno has 409 victories — a record for major college football — won two national titles and guided five teams to unbeaten, untied seasons. He reached 300 wins faster than any other coach.

Penn State is 8-1 this year, with its only loss to powerhouse Alabama. The Nittany Lions are No. 12 in The Associated Press poll.

After 19th-ranked Nebraska, Penn State plays at Ohio

State and at No. 16 Wisconsin, both Big Ten rivals. It has a chance to play in the Big Ten championship game Dec. 3 in Indianapolis, with a Rose Bowl bid on the line.

After meeting Tuesday, Penn State's board of trustees said it would appoint a committee to investigate the "circumstances" that resulted in the indictment of Sandusky, and of athletic director Tim Curley and a vice president Gary Schultz, who are accused in an alleged cover-up.

Paterno notified Curley and Schultz about the 2002 abuse charge and is not a target of the criminal investigation. Curley and Schultz have been charged with failing to report the incident to the authorities.

Sandusky, who retired from Penn State in June 1999, maintained his innocence through his lawyer. Curley has

taken a leave of absence and Schultz has decided to step down. They also say they are innocent.

The committee will be appointed Friday at the board's regular meeting, which Gov. Tom Corbett said he plans to attend, and will examine "what failures occurred and what measures are necessary to ensure" similar mistakes aren't made in the future.

Sandusky founded The Second Mile charity in 1977, working with at-risk youths. It now raises and spends several million dollars each year for its programs. Paterno is listed on The Second Mile's website as a member of its honorary board of directors, a group that includes business executives, golfing great Arnold Palmer and several NFL Hall of Famers and coaches.

severe proposal is put into play.

Stern and Deputy Commissioner Adam Silver were joined Wednesday by Spurs owner Peter Holt, the chairman of the labor relations committee, and lawyers Rick Buchanan and Dan Rube. Besides Hunter and president Derek Fisher, vice presidents Roger Mason Jr. and Maurice Evans, economist Kevin Murphy and attorney Jeffrey Kessler represented the union.

Kessler took part just hours after saying he regretted telling the Washington Post that owners are treating players like "plantation workers" during the ongoing lockout. He said he planned to call Stern and apologize.

Besides the revenue split, the sides still are divided on elements of the salary cap system, mostly relating to the spending rules for teams that are over the luxury tax level. Players want those teams to remain options for free

agents, whereas the league thinks talent would be more evenly distributed throughout the league if payrolls were more balanced.

Players indicated after their meeting Tuesday that they would be open to reducing their BRI take if owners made some changes on the system issues. Players offered to go to about 51 percent Saturday, with 1 percent going into a fund for retired player benefits.

But the league has placed as much importance on the system as the split, making it difficult to find compromise on the handful of items that remain unsettled. Owners believe there won't be the competitive balance they desire until payrolls are more equally balanced. A month of games already has been canceled. Hunter said Tuesday he had heard Stern also planned to cancel games through Christmas without a deal Wednesday, though Stern later told NBA TV that "we have made no such plans, and we have had no such discussions."

playing time. At least 10 players are in the running for a starting job in the run-up to Boise State's regular season opener Nov. 11 against Colorado Christian.

"We are starting from scratch with the whole system and we have to make some tweaks to adjust to the guys we have," Rice said. "It's a completely different team and it's going to be a little different style than what we had last year."

Due to the bushel of questions and number of newcomers, Boise State was predicted to finish last in the eight-team Mountain West, a league ranked as the nation's fourth-toughest a year ago.

"Of course it's motivation," Watkins said. "No one wants to be picked last. We're going to work harder to prove everybody wrong about that."

Rice isn't surprised with the cellar-dweller forecasts.

"When you look at how those predictions are made, it's usually based on how many guys you have coming back and how many starters do you have coming back and when you look at our team, we have a whole rebuild," Rice said.

"Plus, we're going into this Mountain West and there are terrific basketball teams. You have really good basketball teams with great coaches and really, really good home-court advantages. It's a big mountain to climb."

Boise State's initial tasks are figuring out a starting lineup and the player rotation.

Perryman started 13 games last season and has stepped up his leadership skills and appears to be the starting point guard. Freshman Derrick Marks has been impressive in practice and could get some minutes from Perryman.

Sophomore Jeff Elorriaga

and Aussie Igor Hadziomerovic are the leading contenders for the shooting guard job. Elorriaga started 11 games last season and Hadziomerovic played on Australia's under-19 national squad at the FIBA world champions during the summer.

Playing on the same Australian team was forward Anthony Drmic, who had a stellar showing for the national team. Drmic and Wiley, who played two seasons at Oregon, are battling for playing time.

Watkins is a leading candidate for a frontcourt starting spot after averaging 5.7 points last season. Junior-college transfer Jerrell Crayton and sophomore Thomas Bropleh also are in the mix.

Junior-college transfer Kenny Buckner figures to be the starter in the post after averaging 11.7 points and 9.5 rebounds for College of Southern Idaho, which won the junior-college national title last season.

"CSI did their stuff at a high level for a junior college," said Buckner, "but here everything is done at a way higher level so the jump is huge still."

While Rice tackles the project of ramping up Boise State's basketball fortunes, the program's future still has some unknowns. The school's successful football program is expected to jump to the Big East as a football-only member and the basketball program will be joining a yet-to-be specified conference.

"It was interesting for me to come in here and change leagues as soon as I got here," Rice said. "I wasn't even prepared for that so when that happened, 'Wow, we're in the Mountain West!'"

But by the time Boise State moves again, Rice expects to have a foundation. In that case, he won't be learning a whole crop of new players again — just new opponents.

The College of Southern Idaho runs an even tighter ship. Any question of illegal activity, whether it's students, administrators, or athletic staff, is reported to authorities.

"We have extensive checks on staff before they're hired and I guess you just monitor and keep your ears open," said CSI athletic director Joel Bate. "We try not to deal with anything in house. If it is staff, or anybody involved that we have knowledge of, we have to alert the authorities."

To most reasonable people, the colloquial "Good Samaritan" approach sounds like nothing more than common sense, something that should be stan-

dard operating procedure anywhere.

If it really is, how on earth could such a galling failure to apply that axiom ever take place?

Federico went back to the adage of insubordination or ignorance.

"Administrators are always thinking in terms of if our policy is set, should have checkpoints to make sure that things like that don't (go unreported)," Federico said. "Lots of people are doing the right thing every day. You get a few that don't do what they're supposed to, and that really puts a bad taste in people's mouths."

"If we don't learn from things like this, we're missing the boat. Delicate issues are just that: They're delicate, but they're issues that always need to be addressed."

in his involvement of Sandusky's alleged abuse. In 2002, then graduate assistant Mike McQueary allegedly caught Sandusky molesting a young boy in the Penn State locker room and came to Paterno with the news.

Paterno said he told Curley and Schultz, but no investigation ensued and the allegations were never reported to the police, which many people said Paterno should have done.

"He said that he didn't know the particulars. But you have a moral responsibility to (do something)," Gosar said. "I think it's your responsibility to thoroughly know what's going on in your program and it's your responsibility not just to report it to

Heinz Claims Poker's Big Prize

LAS VEGAS • Earlier this year, Pius Heinz was deciding whether to play cards full-time.

Now that the 22-year-old German has won the \$8.72 million prize at the World Series of Poker, he can steer his life in pretty much whatever direction he wants.

"Honestly I'm not sure what I'm going to do with the money," Heinz said early Wednesday after winning the main event in a marathon session of Texas hold 'em. "Probably my family is going to get a couple gifts."

Heinz won with an ace high, just nine hands after using the same hand to boost himself from a nearly insurmountable disadvantage against 35-year-old Martin Staszko.

Heinz called an all-in bet from Staszko with an ace and a king. Staszko held a seven-10 of clubs.

The board was a five of clubs, deuce of diamonds, nine of spades, jack of hearts and four of diamonds, helping neither

player but cementing Heinz's win in the \$10,000 buy-in tournament that started in July.

Staszko won \$5.43 million for second place, a nice consolation prize, but it comes without a bracelet — the prize given to WSOP event winners and coveted by all serious card players.

"Have you ever won it?" Heinz asked 2010 title winner Jonathan Duhamel as Duhamel handed him the bracelet.

"It's got to be the happiest day of my life," Heinz said. "But I can't believe what happened — it's unreal."

Staszko, a chess whiz who once worked for three years at an auto paint shop, said he thought his finish would help poker in his native country.

"I'm never happy if I don't win," Staszko said. "But it's not too bad. Second place is OK."

Staszko, who mainly plays online, said he'll be back to Sin City and the series.

"I'll come back next year," he said. "I hope I can win a bracelet."

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEYBURN, IDAHO, APPROVING THE NORTHWEST HEYBURN INDUSTRIAL URBAN RENEWAL PROJECT URBAN RENEWAL PLAN, WHICH PLAN INCLUDES REVENUE ALLOCATION FINANCING PROVISIONS; AUTHORIZING THE CITY CLERK TO TRANSMIT A COPY OF THIS ORDINANCE AND OTHER REQUIRED INFORMATION TO COUNTY AND STATE OFFICIALS; WAIVING THE READING RULES; APPROVING THE SUMMARY OF THE ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEYBURN:

SECTION 1: It is hereby found and determined that:

(a) The Project Area as defined in the Plan is a deteriorated or a deteriorating area as defined in the Law and the Act and qualifies as an eligible urban renewal area under the Law and Act.

(b) The rehabilitation, conservation, and redevelopment of the urban renewal area pursuant to the Plan are necessary in the interests of public health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the City.

(c) There continues to be a need for the Agency to function in the City.

(d) The Plan conforms to the Comprehensive Land Use Plan for the city of Heyburn, as amended.

(e) The Plan gives due consideration to the provision of adequate park and recreation areas and facilities that may be desirable for neighborhood improvement (recognizing the mixed use components of the Plan and the need for overall public improvements), and shows consideration for the health, safety, and welfare of any residents or businesses in the general vicinity of the urban renewal area covered by the Plan.

(f) The Plan affords maximum opportunity consistent with the sound needs of the City as a whole for the rehabilitation and redevelopment of the urban renewal area by private enterprises.

(g) The Plan provides a feasible method for relocation of any displaced families residing within the urban renewal area.

(h) The Project Area and Revenue Allocation Area may contain certain open land, but the Agency does not intend to acquire any open land on any widespread basis, and that the Project Area is planned to be redeveloped in a manner that will include both residential and non-residential uses. Provided, however, that if portions of the Project Area and Revenue Allocation Area are deemed "open land" the criteria set forth in the Law and Act have been met.

(i) The Project Area which is identified for nonresidential uses is necessary and appropriate to facilitate the proper growth and development standards in accordance with the objectives of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan for the city of Heyburn, as amended to overcome economic disuse, the need for improved traffic patterns and the need for the correlation of this area with other areas of the City.

(j) The base assessment roll of the Project Area does not exceed ten percent (10%) of the assessed value of the City.

(k) The urban renewal area, which includes the deteriorating area, as defined in Idaho Code Section 50-2018(9), includes agricultural operations which have been used within the past three (3) consecutive years, provided, however, Agency has contacted the property owner and obtained the written consent to include this property within the proposed project area.

SECTION 2: The City Council finds that the Project Area and Revenue Allocation Area may consist of predominantly open land, that the Agency does not intend to acquire any open land on any widespread basis, and that the Project Area is planned to be redeveloped in a manner that will include nonresidential uses. Provided, however, the City Council finds that if portions of the Project Area and Revenue Allocation Area are deemed "open land," the criteria set forth in the Law and Act has been met.

SECTION 3: The City Council finds that the Plan meets the sound needs of the City and will provide opportunities in an area that does not now contain such opportunities, and nonresidential uses are necessary and appropriate to facilitate the proper growth and development standards in accordance with the objectives of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan for the city of Heyburn, as amended to overcome economic disuse, the need for improved traffic patterns, and the need for the correlation of this area with other areas of the City.

SECTION 4: The Plan, a copy of which is attached hereto and marked as Exhibit 3 and made a part hereof by attachment, be, and the same hereby is, approved, along with the changes reflected on the Change Sheet, attached hereto as Exhibit 4. As directed by the City Council, the City Clerk and/or the Agency may make certain technical corrections or revisions in keeping with the information and testimony presented at the October 26, 2011, hearing, and incorporate changes or modifications, if any.

SECTION 5: No direct or collateral action challenging the Plan shall be brought prior to the effective date of this Ordinance or after the elapse of thirty (30) days from and after the effective date of this Ordinance adopting the Plan.

SECTION 6: Upon the effective date of this Ordinance, the City Clerk is authorized and directed to transmit to the County Auditor and Tax Assessor of Minidoka County and to the appropriate officials of the city of Heyburn, School District No. 331, West End Fire Protection District, Heyburn Cemetery District No. 3, Minidoka Highway District, and the State Tax Commission a copy of this Ordinance, a copy of the legal description of the boundaries of the Revenue Allocation Area, and a map or plat indicating the boundaries of the Revenue Allocation Area.

SECTION 7: The City Council hereby finds and declares that the Revenue Allocation Area as defined in the Plan (defined as the Project Area in the Plan), the equalized assessed valuation of which the Council hereby determines is in and is part of the Plan is likely to increase as a result of the initiation and completion of urban renewal projects pursuant to the Plan.

SECTION 8: The City Council hereby approves and adopts the following statement policy relating to the appointment of City Council members as members of the Agency's Board of Commissioners: If any City Council members are appointed to the Board, they are not acting in an ex officio capacity but, rather, as private citizens who, although they are also members of the City Council, are exercising their independent judgment as private citizens when they sit on the Board. Except for the powers to appoint and terminate Board members and to adopt the Plan, the City Council recognizes that it has no power to control the powers or operations of the Agency.

SECTION 9: So long as any Agency bonds are outstanding, the City Council shall not exercise its power under Idaho Code Section 50-2006 to designate itself as the Agency Board.

SECTION 10: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage, approval, and publication and shall be retroactive to January 1, 2011, to the extent permitted by the Act.

SECTION 11: The provisions of this Ordinance are severable, and if any provision of this Ordinance or the application of such provision to any person or circumstance is declared invalid for any reason, such declaration shall not affect the validity of remaining portions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 12: One-half, plus one of the City Council members finding good cause, the City Council hereby dispenses with the rule that this Ordinance be read on three different days, and have hereby adopted this Ordinance, having considered it at one reading.

SECTION 13: The Summary of this Ordinance, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit 4, is hereby approved.

SECTION 14: All ordinances, resolutions, orders or parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, rescinded and annulled.

SECTION 15. SAVINGS CLAUSE: This ordinance does not affect an action or proceeding commenced or right accrued before this ordinance takes effect.

SUMMARY OF PLAN

The Northwest Heyburn Industrial Urban Renewal Project Urban Renewal Plan ("Plan") was prepared by the urban renewal agency of the city of Heyburn, the Heyburn Urban Renewal Agency ("Agency") pursuant to the state of Idaho Urban Renewal Law, the Local Economic Development Act, the Idaho Constitution, and all applicable laws and ordinances and was approved by the Agency. The Plan provides for the Agency to undertake urban renewal projects pursuant to the Idaho Urban Renewal Law of 1965 as amended. The Plan contains a revenue allocation financing provision pursuant to the Local Economic Development Act, Chapter 29, Title 50, Idaho Code, that will cause property taxes resulting from any increases in equalized assessed valuation in excess of the equalized assessed valuation as shown on the original base assessment roll as of January 1, 2011, to be allocated to the Agency for the urban renewal purposes.

- The general scope and objectives of the Plan are:
- a. The elimination f environmental deficiencies in the Project Area, including, among others, deteriorated and inadequate public improvements including certain streets and improvements; improvements to public utilities including water and sewer improvements, fire protection systems; other public improvements; removal, burying, or relocation of overhead utilities; extension of electrical distribution lines and transformers; and improvement of irrigation and drainage ditches and laterals;
- b. The assembly of land into parcels suitable for modern, integrated development with improved pedestrian and vehicular circulation in the Project Area;
- The replanning, redesign, and development of undeveloped or underdeveloped areas which are stagnant or improperly utilized because of excessive rock, limited traffic access, underserved utilities, and other site conditions;
- d. The strengthening of the economic base of the Project Area and the community by the installation of needed site improvements to stimulate new private development providing, employment, and economic growth;
- e. The provision of adequate land for street rights-of-way;
- f. The reconstruction and improvement of a major street corridor to allow traffic flows to move through the development along with the accompanying utility connections, through the Project Area;
- g. The provision of public service utilities such as water system improvements, main sewer system improvements (which may be located outside the Project Area), and certain pretreatment improvements within the Project Area;
- h. The establishment and implementation of performance criteria to assure high site design standards and environmental quality and other design elements which provide unity and integrity to the entire Project, including commitment of funds for planning studies, achieving high standards of development, and leveraging such development to achieve public objectives and efficient use of scarce resources;
- i. The strengthening of the tax base by encouraging private development, thus increasing the assessed valuation of properties within the Revenue Allocation Area and the Project Area as a whole and benefiting the various taxing districts in which the urban renewal area is located; and
- j. The funding of necessary public infrastructure to accommodate both public and private development.
- Any such land uses as described in the Plan will be in conformance with zoning for the city of Heyburn and the Comprehensive Land Use Plan, as amended as adopted by the City Council. Land made available will be developed by private enterprises or public agencies as authorized by law. The Plan identifies various public and private improvements which may be made within the Urban Renewal Area.
- The Urban Renewal Project Area and Revenue Allocation Area herein referred to is located generally as follows:
- An area consisting of approximately 69 acres generally bounded by 300 South Road on the north, Highway 27 on the east, and on the south and west by the eastern and southern boundaries of the planned Magic Valley Business Park subdivision, and as more particularly described as follows:

DESCRIPTION: PROJECT AREA AND REVENUE ALLOCATION AREA BOUNDARY LEGAL DESCRIPTION.

TOWNSHIP 10 SOUTH, RANGE 23 EAST, BOISE MERIDIAN, MINIDOKA COUNTY, IDAHO.

SECTION 8: A PORTION OF THE NORTHEAST QUARTER, MORE PARTICULARLY DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS:

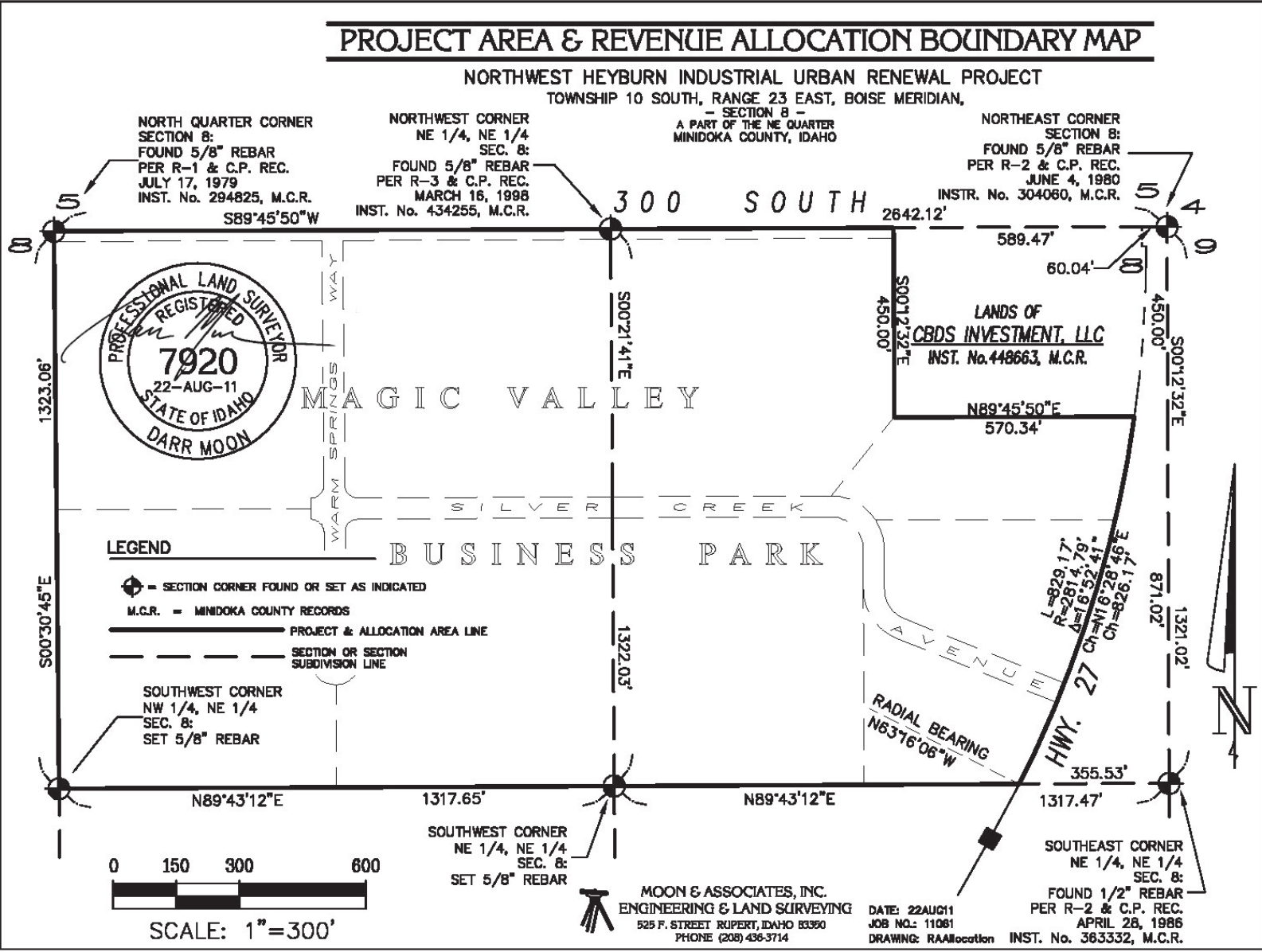

Sections 300 through 323 discuss the proposed redevelopment actions, participation opportunities and agreements, cooperation with public bodies, property acquisition standards and requirements, relocation, demolition, and property disposition.

Sections 402 through 404 discuss the type of land uses authorized in the Project Area and list other controls by referencing the applicable County ordinances.

Section 405 describes design guidelines for development.

The Plan also contains a major section on financing. Among other sources, the Plan will utilize revenue allocation financing, authorized by Chapter 20, Title 50, Idaho Code. This statute was approved in 1988 by the Idaho Legislature. Section 504 and Attachment 5 discuss revenue allocation financing and show how such financing has worked and would work in the Project Area in the future if certain new private developments occur as estimated. Increases in assessed valuation of real and personal property in the Project Area that occur after January 1, 2011, will generate revenue for the Agency to pay project costs. Project costs include street improvements, parking facilities, and other public improvement costs. The assessed valuation of real and personal property on the base assessment roll is still available for use by the other taxing districts, Minidoka County, city of Heyburn, School District No. 331, West End Fire Protection District, Heyburn Cemetery District No. 3, and Minidoka Highway District to finance their operations. The Plan authorizes the Agency to sell revenue bonds to finance project costs and to use annual revenue allocations to pay the debt service.

The program outlined in the Plan emphasizes the installation of needed public improvements, street improvements, utility work, and other costs to encourage private development.

Attachment 5 describes in detail the cost and financing methods for complete repayment of the debt incurred used to finance the Project and to also fund the additional described activities.

No change in the land use designation or the potential uses in the area have been proposed. The Plan follows the underlying zoning classifications of the city of Heyburn. Proposals for certain zone changes are made in the Plan.

Sections 600 and 700 describe cooperative activities by the Agency with the City.

The duration of the Plan is for twenty (20) years. A termination process is described in Section 800 of the Plan. The Agency is required to prepare an annual report each year describing its activities during the previous year.

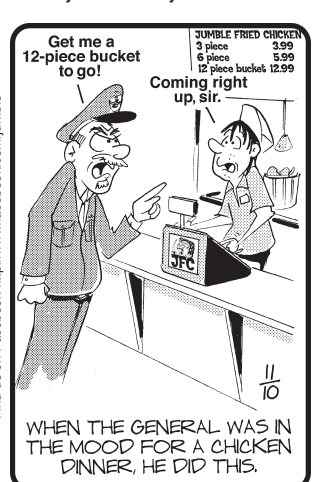

In today's deal the auction to three no-trump was informative to the defense. In response to his partner's double, West led the club eight, and East naturally put up his queen. Reading West's lead as top of a doubleton, declarer held off. Even if diamonds broke 3-3, South knew he would need a trick from the heart suit, and he had calculated that so long as East held no more than one of the missing top heart honors, the contract would succeed, since West would have no more clubs to play through.

At trick two, East continued with the club king, won by South's ace. Declarer still had a club stopper, and when he tackled hearts, East gained the lead and dislodged the club jack, but with no further entries, he could not enjoy the suit he had worked so hard to establish.

See the difference if East plays the club nine on the opening lead. South must win with the jack, but now when he plays a heart, West wins with the king, and still has another club to push through. Whether South holds up the club ace or not, East will regain the lead with the heart ace to cash the clubs.

Third hand plays high, but there is a time and a place for everything. It is often easy to see that one should withhold the ace on the first round of a suit. It is less easy to see that this applies to positions like the one in today's deal.

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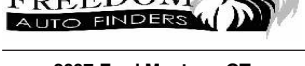
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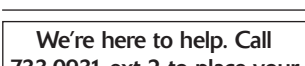
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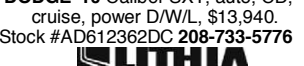
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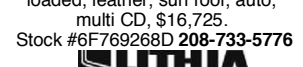
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Kimberly Prepares for New Mayor

KIMBERLY • Though he won't take his seat till January, Tracy Armstrong isn't wasting any time preparing for his new job as the city of Kimberly's mayor.

On top of designing a new communication system for Kimberly citizens, Armstrong is also feeling out community leaders who would be interested in participating in a council advisory committee.

"I don't have any power yet, I'm just putting out feelers and getting feedback," he said.

Armstrong campaigned on a need to reunite the city and increase communication between city officials and the public. One tool he may use would be a communication board to help alert

residents of important meetings and upcoming decisions.

He pointed to the failed city recycling measure as an example that residents had lost confidence in the city. While he doesn't know if the council will continue to pursue a single-stream recycling program, he said everything must first start with gaining back trust.

Armstrong replaces incumbent David Overacre, who has been Kimberly's mayor for the past four years — also serving on city council from 1993-2005. Overacre did not return calls for comment Wednesday.

Kimberly residents wasted no time flexing their voice in this year's election. According to the Twin Falls County Clerk's Office, an impressive 45 percent of

Kimberly registered voters showed at the polls this year.

Also welcoming change: residents of nearby towns who work and visit Kimberly during the day.

Lauren Peters, a former Kimberly resident, said she was excited at the thought of a new mayor.

"It was time for him to leave," he said. "My mom still lives in Kimberly and from my experience, I think it's just an overall good thing."

Debi Rice, owner of De Eties Floral in Kimberly, said she too is excited that Kimberly will be under a new mayor.

A resident of Twin Falls, she said she hopes for improvement in how Kimberly's water is managed. Kimberly voters chose in 2009 to

raise their utility rates — at the time, a possible average increase of 60 percent — to repay a bond for a massive overhaul of the city's system. The resulting increase, Rice said, has been a struggle.

Armstrong said he has ideas to help address the utility rates, but declined to discuss details about his future plans.

"It's not only my voice that will be in on this decision," he said. "But I have a few ideas I'm going to present to the council in January."

The new mayor is joined by two new City Council members, James Eisenhower and Constance Sowka.

"I'm excited to work with both Connie and Tracy," Eisenhower said. "We share many of the same feelings, and that is having the people's best interests in mind."

The council approved the project, with Mayor Paul Fries concluding it will be an asset to the city.

Also Tuesday, Jo Elg, general manager of United Electric Co-op, presented the City Council with an amendment to the Residential Exchange Program Settlement Agreement with the Bonneville Power Administration. Those municipalities already signed up for the program must vote unanimously to admit new members, she said.

"There were, however, some of Bonneville's customers that chose not to sign the settlement agreement," she said, "and I think they've had remorse that they didn't sign that agreement, so they went to Bonneville and have asked for the opportunity to become parties to the settlement agreement."

Elg didn't name cities now seeking to join the settlement, but said the United Electric board approved the amendment and recommended the council do the same. Council members took her advice and did so following her presentation.

And, the council appointed former Fire Chief Larry Pool to the Planning and Zoning Commission to finish the term of resigned P&Z member JoAnn Smith. Pool will serve through Nov. 7, 2014.

The council's next meeting will be at 7 p.m. Nov. 22 at City Hall.

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Child Porn Collector to Serve Three Years

A Kimberly man found in possession of child pornography will serve at least three years in prison.

Donald Morris, 44, was sentenced to a maximum 24 years with the eligibility of parole Monday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court. Morris pleaded guilty to 15 counts of possession of sexually exploitative material of children. In a plea agreement, the state dropped another 20 felony complaints.

Morris was also or-

dered to pay a \$3,000 fine and register as a sex offender.

He missed his original sentencing date in early October, claiming to be in a treatment facility in Wyoming. A \$250,000 warrant was issued for his arrest, and he resurfaced later in the month.

Morris was initially charged in June, after a private citizen and an area pawn shop owner turned over three computers containing child pornography last year. The computers were traced back to Morris.

much more now?"

In a nationwide study of nearly 2,000 seventh-through 12th-grade students, about 30 percent reported being sexually harassed last year via electronic means.

The study by the American Association of University Women also showed that nearly 50 percent of students surveyed reported being sexually harassed.

Dickinson said there's usually only one or two cases of sexual harassment reported each year at Canyon Ridge. Other types of harassment, he said, are more common.

Like many school districts, the Twin Falls School District has a no-tolerance policy for all forms of harassment. The four-page policy specifically on sexual harassment prohibits the act via verbal statements, "obscene comments" and electronic devices.

Dickinson said the topic of harassment at schools has become "a hot topic" nationally over the past five years or so. As a result, he said he's seen more students who are willing to talk with school staff members about it.

"They are more inclined to come talk with us now than in the past," he said.

However, results from the national survey show that only 9 percent of students who were sexually harassed last year reported the incident to a parent or their school.

In Twin Falls, the punishment for students who harass their classmates can include in-school suspension or, after repeated cases, expulsion.

Students can also be punished for a case that happens outside of school hours, but it's sometimes challenging to track down the details.

In the past, students who have been harassed have printed out an image of their Facebook page with the inappropriate comment and brought it to school administrators, Dickinson said.

There haven't been any cases of expulsion at Canyon Ridge for a sexual harassment case, he said. Most of the time, students aren't repeat offenders after being suspended.

"We've been successful in getting them to stop," he said. "We haven't had a case where a student continued with their behavior."
