Moving? You're in the Minority

While Idaho grows, fewer Americans are relocating as the nation crawls out of the **Great Recession.**

With less in their pocketbooks, more Americans are

staying put. According to recent census data, only 11.6 percent of Americans changed residences between 2010 and 2011. The rate is the lowest since the U.S. Census Bureau began tracking movement in 1948 – beating out 2008 and 2009, when people hunkered down as the

market collapsed. Slightly more people moved from other western


U.S. economy and housing

states to Idaho last year than Idahoans moved away. But overall, migration patterns are slowing down.

The low moving rates stem primarily from the effects of a still-troubled housing market, said Jan Roeser, a regional economist for the Idaho Department of Labor. Homeowners' inability to sell their homes quickly or at a profitable price deters people from moving.

"People can't sell their homes," she said. "At least, not without going under water or not getting the

County to Auction Former St. Luke's **Properties**

Twin Falls County is putting seven pieces of commercial property on the auction block this week.

The decision follows the move of St. Luke's Health System to new digs along Pole Line Road.

The county had leased the property to St. Luke's for its assortment of clinics and services tied to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center. With the health care provider moved out, Twin Falls County officials want to get out of the real estate business.

"Our real goal here is we don't want to be this big property owner in this county," County Commissioner Leon Mills said. "I think it's far more legitimate to turn it back to the tax rolls and let the other business people have it."

The county's still hanging on to to the main hospital building, awaiting the results of a study that will show if moving county government offices to the former St. Luke's structure is an affordable idea.

A decision on that will come by the end of the year, Mills said. While the

It's like a weird cross between an anthropomorphic Thanksgiving dinner and an edible snowman. I built one with turkey legs as eyebrows I felt pretty proud about

Idahoan isn't the only potato group with awesome marketing. The Idaho Potato Commission's website is a spud lover's online mecca. It has hundreds of recipes featuring the beloved tuber, including Potato Lollipops (which I'm totally making) and Idaho Potato

Throughout the site, you see references to Spuddy Buddy, a Russett Burbank with a face, limbs and a red T-shirt.

If, for some reason, you feel the need to buy a 3foot-tall stuffed Spuddy Buddy, you can do so on the commission's website for \$42.50.

You can also buy a



Spuddy Buddy snow globe. The product description says only this: "Yes, Spuddy really is using a crinkle cut French fry for a snow board."

My favorite marketing ploy, though, is Stunt Tater, another personpotato hybrid by the Idaho Potato Commission. Stunt Tater, who has a bizarre human face superimposed onto the potato skin, performs BASE jumping, tightrope walking and Evel Knievel-like tricks.

What is going on with these crazy spuds? I called Don Odiorne, vice president of food service at the commission.

The games and Stunt Tater are meant to appeal to a younger audience, he said. Spuddy Buddy is recognizable but has limitations. He can't talk, and he has to maintain a squeaky-clean image. Stunt Tater can be irreverent, which appeals to teens and young adults, Odiorne said.

"I know it's kind of crazy, but I'm having a lot of fun with it," he said.

For his part in the Dietrich home invasion robbery, Baker will serve eight to 10 years in state prison. Baker pleaded guilty to an amended charge of felony conspiracy to commit burglary in August. Judge John Butler on Tuesday imposed the prison term and a \$1,000 fine on Baker in Lincoln County 5th District Court in Shoshone. Butler is allowing the state 60 days to submit a request for restitution.

Baker is one of three defendants who have pleaded guilty and been sentenced to prison in the case. A fourth suspect, Aaron Donabedian, maintains his innocence and is scheduled for a January tri-

Investigators fingered the group for an early morning robbery, which took place in the Conners' country home in Dietrich on March 9. The Conners - David and his wife, Colleen - were awakened that morning to the sound of their dogs' unrelenting barking, a warning that David

David grabbed a shotgun and attempted to scare off the trespassers, but he was overpowered, his own gun turned against him by a pair of men: Jeremiah Bennett and, allegedly, Donabedian. Jamie Taylor

and Baker waited in a van outside and did not enter the residence.

Baker sat in chains at the defendant's table on Tuesday, listening to the thoughts and fears that the Conners felt. David could not attend the hearing, but Colleen read an email he sent to a friend shortly after their morning encounter.

"I was thinking, 'I hate this floor and I thought my brains would be scattered all over it," Colleen read from a single sheet of paper. She had her say as well, chastising Baker. "You could have been a hero" had he

called police instead of waiting outside and allowing the robbery to take place, Colleen said. "You make a really crummy criminal."

Baker responded, in a soft voice betraying his hard look, "I'm sorry for that evening. I can't take back that evening."

Prosecutor E. Scott Paul noted during his recommendation that Baker had failed a stint in a state treatment program in 2006, saying Baker allegedly threatened staff members at a state correctional facility. In that case, a drug conviction from Twin Falls County, his full sentence was then imposed.

Baker's defense attorney offered explanations for his client's behavior. During court hearings, Baker was observed as nonchalant in manner, smiling and rocking back and forth in chairs. David Haley said Baker suffers from a mental disorder which causes him to act inappropriately in stressful situations.

Butler, before imposing judgment, countered that regardless of his life's hardships, Baker made the choice to participate in the robbery.

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TFSD Fund Balance Continues to Shrink

In the wake of reduced state and federal funding, the district has carried over less money during each fiscal year since 2008.

The Twin Falls School District has little wiggle room for unexpected expenses, as the district's fund balance is at its lowest point in 10 years.

The district had \$2.3 million in fund balance at the end of June — money not spent and carried over from the previous year. It's enough to pay school district operating expenses for three weeks.

"We're trying to retain as much funds as we can to get the job done," Fiscal Affairs Director Bob Seaman said.

Also, that money could be used if there's an unforeseen event or emergency at a

Three weeks' worth of operating fund balance is less than what Ray Ware, a local accountant for Ware & Associates, recommends.

"I like to see two months," he told the school board.

In Other Business

During their Monday night meeting, Twin Falls school board members also:

Heard concerns from Anna Scholes, Vera C. O'Leary Middle School Parent Teacher Student Organization president, about the new requirement that eighth-grade O'Leary students have to take a hybrid science class this year, with both in-person and online components. "In effect, the school district is doing a science experi-

ment with my kids," she said. Scholes says she understands online classes will expand and she's not opposed to that, if classes are delivered well. Superintendent Wiley Dobbs will present his response

during the December school board meeting. Approved the annual Idaho Financial Accounting Re-

porting Management System report. Approved a minor revision to a policy about annual con-

tract employees. Trustees also heard about three other changes to procedures, but didn't take action. One of them is a Reduction

in Force rubric, which would be used to make job cuts if needed.

Board members approved an annual financial audit report Monday night for the 2011 fiscal year, which ended June 30. Trustee Mary Barron was absent from the meeting.

The school district received an "unqualified opinion" on the audit, which means there weren't any material weaknesses or concerns. Ware said it's the equivalent of getting an "A"

on a school paper.

The district's fund balance at the end of each fiscal year has fluctuated. The high point was in 2008, and the amount of money saved at the end of each year has dwindled since.

Seaman said the district has received less money from federal and state sources over the past three years. That means more of the fund balance has been used for operating expenses.

Carryover money can also be used to fill the gaps between the five yearly payments the district receives from the state.

"You need to have enough cash on hand to operate until the next payment," Seaman said.

The school district received about \$37.72 million in general fund revenue during the last fiscal year. That money comes from county, state and federal sources, as well as local property taxes.

School district expenses were also lower than they've been in the past. Ware told school board members that expenses last year were the lowest they'd been since

Instructional expenditures - including teacher salaries and benefits, supplies and materials - totaled about \$22.9 million during fiscal 2011.

The district also spent about \$15 million on support services, which include employee salaries and benefits, services for special needs students, custodial costs, textbook purchases and building maintenance.

The plan calls for western Twin Falls County, including Buhl, to join Elmore and Owhyee counties in a legislative district. The city of Twin Falls gets its own district, and the eastern half of the county joins Cassia and Power counties.

That has the council worried — not about the quality of leadership that may be available in Mountain Home, but about the connection

those leaders may have with the far-flung community.

"The representation we need would be lost with redistricting," said Councilman Bob Linderman. Mayor Tom McCauley

said previous district boundaries meant legislators were highly visible and accessible. They knew the community, its economy and unique challenges, he said.

McCauley said Buhl

would be "hard-pressed to run someone from this area against the Mountain Home area" because of the differences in population. He questioned the fairness of pairing the communities together.

Councilman Michael Higbee threw his support behind joining the lawsuit after finding out that Twin Falls County would cover the legal costs.

"Especially with no cost involved (to the city), sign me up," he said.


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

Five Apply to Fill Term of Wilder Rep. Pat Takasugi

Five residents of Canyon County's District 10 have applied to fill the remaining 14 months of Rep. Pat Takasugi's term, and tonight that district's GOP Central Committee chairs will choose finalists to forward to Gov. C.L. 'Butch' Otter

The deadline for applications was Monday night, but District 10 Rep. Darrell Bolz said it's possible – although not likely – that additional names could be nominated at Wednesday's meeting.

Takasugi, first elected to District 10's House Seat A in 2008, died Nov. 6 after a battle with appendix cancer.

The five applicants, all District 10 residents, are: Gayle Batt of Wilder, who filled in for Takasugi during the 2011 legislative session; Scott Syme of Wilder; Tom Tingey of Caldwell; Kent Marmon of Caldwell; and Jim Rice of Caldwell.

Otter will select one of the finalists to complete Takasugi's term, which continues through 2012.

Wednesday's meeting begins at 7 p.m. in the public meeting room of the Canyon County Courthouse, 1115 Albany St., Caldwell.

Republicans Look to Fill Seat of Idaho Sen. Stegner

LEWISTON (AP) • Republican leaders will have 10 days to decide on potential candidates to replace Idaho Sen. Joe Stegner once his resignation becomes official Nov. 30.

The University of Idaho announced Friday that Stegner had been tapped to become the school's chief lobbyist and his new job starts Dec. 1.

The Lewiston Tribune reports that once Stegner resigns from the Idaho Senate at the end of this month, the Republican Central Committee for his legislative district will have 10 days to nominate replacement candidates, and then provide the governor with three names.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter will have 15 days to appoint one of the candidates to serve out the remainder of Stegner's seventh term.

At least one incumbent lawmaker — Republican Rep. Jeff Nesset of Lewiston — says he's interested.

Idaho Officials Approve 'Fracking' Rules

The rules were negotiated by representatives of the oil and gas industry, environmentalists, local governments and several residents of Payette and Washington counties, where drilling has started or drilling rights are being leased.

BOISE • Rules regulating drilling and the controversial fracking technique were approved Tuesday by the Idaho Oil and Gas Conservation Commission.

The rules, aimed at protecting surface and groundwater and landowners, were approved by a 3-0 vote with acting Gov. Brad Little recusing himself because he is negotiating with a company seeking drilling rights. Little, Idaho's lieutenant governor, was standing in for Idaho Gov. C.L. 'Butch' Otter who is at a conference in Maui.

Secretary of State Ben Ysursa, state schools chief Tom Luna and State Controller Donna Jones voted to send the rules to the Idaho Legislature for final approval. Attorney General Lawrence Wasden, who was attending the meeting by phone, left before the vote.

The rules were developed in a negotiated rulemaking that included representatives of the oil and gas industry, environmentalists, local governments and several residents of Payette and Washington counties where drilling already has started or leasing of drilling rights is going on.

The rules set a 15-day period for public comments for drilling and well treatments, also called minifracking because liquids are pumped down wells under high pressure to increase flows. Horizontal fracturing, or fracking is done only in shale deposits and uses higher pressures.

The gas in southwest Idaho is not found in shale and no one is talking about fracking here. But many of the same fluids are used in well treatments and the rules require pits used to hold the liquids be lined. No pits are allowed in areas set aside for drinking water protection.

The rules also set up bonding requiring \$10,000 plus an additional

dollar for every foot drilled. A company could have up to 30 wells for a \$150,000 bond, under the rules.

Owners of the surface rights, which aren't necessarily tied to the subsurface drilling rights, must be notified 60 days in advance of drilling. The state would get no more than \$5,000 bond to cover lost agricultural income and lost value in improvements.

That was the limit of the commission's authority, said Eric Wilson, of the Idaho Department of Lands, who wrote the rules. If they wanted to do more, "we believe there would need to be statutory changes."

Little, chairing the Oil and Gas Commission and the Land Board for the first time, asked how they would be compensated if the land had a higher value such as development.

Tom Schultz, the new Department of Lands director, who just came from Montana said the experience in other states is that with millions in profits at stake companies usually seeks quick fair deals.

"The value tends to be standardized," he said.

Amanda Buchanan, a Weiser resident who participated in the rule-

making, urged the commission to protect landowners.

"What you consider to be a potential economic boon for the state could be a devastating loss to a property owner's single largest investment, the land she lives on,"

Buchanan said.
She and others urged the commission to ban cancer-causing liquids for use in fracking.

So far Bridge Resources and its partner, Paramax Resources Ltd., both of Canada, have drilled 11 wells in Payette County. Three of the 11 wells can produce at economic levels naturally. Four require stimulation through fracking, officials said. The other four were dry.

But Bridge announced last week it was selling off its Idaho properties. It had no representative at the meeting.

Instead Richard Brown and Chris Weiser, of the Arkansas exploration company Weiser-Brown testified. Its Idaho subsidiary, Snake River Oil and Gas, has been leasing drilling rights throughout the region and already has 24 people working in the state.

"We think these rules allow us to explore," Brown said, praising the Lands staff and negotiators.

Mom: Idaho Girl Had Bumps, Scratches Before Death

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) • The biological mother of an Idaho girl who suffered fatal head injuries while in foster care claims she noticed scratches and bumps on her daughter during supervised visits before the toddler's

Samantha Richardson alleges that she saw physical and behavioral changes in her 2-year-old daughter Karina J. Moore before the girl died in January 2009, the Coeur d'Allene Press reported Tuesday.

Richardson sued state officials in April, saying she reported abuse allegations to social workers twice but her concerns were never addressed. The foster parents, Jeremy and Amber Clark of Post Falls, were arrested and charged this month with two counts of injury to a child and other felonies.

A grand jury in Kootenai County also charged them on Nov. 2 with destroying, altering or concealing evidence and perjury. The Clarks have been appointed public defenders, who declined to comment on the case to the Coeur d'Alene Press.

The public defenders could not be immediately reached Tuesday by The Associated Press because a call to the Kootenai County Public Defender's Office prompted only a recorded message.

The Clarks had been foster parents to Karina for more than a year when the child died. They told police that Karina fell about four feet down a flight of carpeted stairs, and Amber Clark said she performed CPR until emergency responders arrived and flew the toddler to Sacred Heart Medical Center in Spokane.

Karina was at the bottom of the stairs when police arrived, according to authorities. The child was declared brain dead at the hospital. The Spokane County Medical Examiner's Office ruled the case a homicide, citing blunt force head injuries.

The grand jury indictment accuses the Clarks of causing or inflicting injuries to Kari-

na's head or permitting the injuries to occur. The Clarks are also accused of "causing the child's body temperature to drop under 96 degrees or permitting the same to occur; or by withholding medical care" for her.

The indictment includes allegations that the Clarks abused another child in their care when they forced a boy who was 4 or 5 years old to take ice baths and inflicted injuries to his body and head as part of abuse alleged to have occurred in December 2007 and January 2008.

Karina and two of her siblings, a brother and sister, had been living with the couple. Richardson claims that during her first supervised visit to see her children in November 2008, she noticed Karina had a knot on her head.

Richardson also claims her son told her he didn't like it when the Clarks spanked Karina for not listening.

"That was the very first thing he said to me in that visit," Richardson told the newspaper.

Richardson claims that during a third visit on Christ-

mas Eve in 2008, Karina had black eyes and scratches on her face.

The other children were removed from the Clarks' care after Karina was injured and taken to the hospital. The couple had been a registered foster family for years and had taken in dozens of kids before Karina and her siblings

went to live with them.



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Police: Drunk Driver Likely Caused Four-vehicle Pile Up

BOISE • William Timothy Larkin is being held in the Ada County Jail on a felony charge of aggravated DUI after police say he was driving drunk - and likely under the influence of prescription drugs - when he was caused a four-car pile up in West Boise Monday night.

A Boise woman had to be cut out of the wreckage from the car Larkin is accused of driving into, and she remained hospitalized Tuesday afternoon with what police described as serious injuries. Another woman, who was a passenger in the car, suffered several broken bones and was released from the hospital by Tuesday morning.

Police say Larkin was driving a pickup truck westbound on Overland Road, near the Vinnell Way intersection, at 7:15 p.m. Monday when he drove into the eastbound lanes and collided head-on with a Ford Focus.

The force of the impact pushed the Ford Focus into another car behind it, which knocked that car off the road. Another pickup was damaged when it was hit by a box that flew out of Larkin's truck, according to reports.

Police said they detected a strong odor of alcohol coming from Larkin and also found evidence he had been taking at least three prescription medications. Police say Larking failed field sobriety tests before he was arrested.

A suspected blood alcohol content percentage level was not available Tuesday as Larkin did not take a breath test at the jail. A blood draw was taken for later evidence testing, according to reports.

Larkin was to make his initial court appearance later Tuesday. The DUI is being charged as a felony because Larkin is accused of causing "great bodily harm, permanent disability or permanent disfigurement," according to Idaho code.

Republicans Lose Way by Misreading Bush History

n 2006 and 2008, voters inflicted on Republicans the worst back-to-back electoral drubbing any party has received since the Great Depression, when Franklin Delano Roosevelt all but destroyed the Party of Hoover. Republicans quickly reached a consensus about why they lost so badly: They had failed to be sufficiently Republican.

This consensus still moves the party – and since it is false, it moves them to

make mistakes. "We lost our way" was the cliche that expressed the Republican theory. "I believe we did not just lose our majority, we lost our way," said Rep. Mike



Pence of Indiana, as he ran to replace the House Republican leadership after the 2006 elections. "In recent years, our majority voted to expand the federal government's role in education by nearly 100 percent, created the largest new entitlement in 40 years, and pursued spending policies that created record deficits, national debt and rampant earmark spending."

So widespread did this view become that the Republican leadership itself embraced it. Eric Cantor, Paul Ryan and Kevin McCarthy — high-ranking House Republicans all — wrote in a 2009 op-ed, "By the fall of 2006, it had become abundantly clear that Republicans had severely lost our way." Among other mistakes, "we had significantly increased federal spending." Speaker John Boehner has said the same thing: "Republicans lost our way on fiscal responsibility."

There are elements of truth in the conservative story. Bush-era Republicans did spend too much, refusing to make room for increased security budgets by cutting anything else. Bush's sincere belief that K-12 education could be reformed from Washington was naive. The Republicans' almost uniform rejection of President Barack Obama's stimulus and health-care legislation really did contribute to their victories in 2010.

But there's little evidence that big government was the reason, or even an important reason, for Republican defeats at the end of the Bush years. Take the top item on the list of conservative charges against Bush, his expansion of Medicare to cover prescription drugs. That idea was overwhelmingly popular, including among self-described conservatives whom pollsters contacted. It's hard to believe that Bush would have won Florida in 2000 without promising to match the Democrats on the issue, or that he would have won Ohio in 2004 without having made good on the promise. He won both states by small margins, and through them the Electoral College.


It seems much more likely that Republicans lost in 2006 because of the bleeding in Iraq, corruption in Washington, wage stagnation and the lack of any agenda by the party to do anything about these or other problems. Some of these issues had faded in importance by 2008, but in that year voters were also ready for a change after eight years of Republican control of the White House and, above all, dismayed by the economic crisis. In 2008, 60 percent of voters said the Republican presidential candidate, John McCain, wasn't "in touch with people like them" – and 79 percent of people who felt that way voted against him. That's what defeated Republicans, not a perception that they were doctrinally impure.

This isn't ancient history. The view that Republicans must avoid accommodation at all costs - that the principal obstacle to achieving conservative policy goals is a lack of spine and not, say, a lack of popular support made them lose at least two Senate races in 2010. In Colorado and Nevada, conservative primary voters rejected two electable, conventionally conservative candidates because they were considered part of a compromising establishment. If Republicans fall two votes short of repealing Obama's health-care plan in 2013, the mythology they have created will be part of the reason

That mythology influences the Republican presidential primaries, too. It's why they have, to an unusual extent, showcased unpopular ideas that have no chance of going anywhere, such as abolishing the Environmental Protection Agency. It is part of the reason for the resistance to former Massachusetts governor Mitt Romney: Conservatives fear he would be a big-government Republican, like Bush, and lead the party again to ruin.

Meanwhile, the real mistakes of the Bush years keep being made. Republicans had nothing to say about wage stagnation then and are saying nothing about it now. The real cost of Republicans' fixation on ideological purity is that it distracts them from their real problems, and the nation's.

Financial Regulation Remains Weak

ven as the Occupy Wall Street movement begins to stall, the reasons to protest abuses in the financial industry continue to accumulate, beginning with the spectacular, \$41-billion collapse of Jon Corzine's MF Global Holdings in October.

Here we are, four years after the economy began to implode due to reckless practices by the banking and financial industry, and the misconduct continues virtually unabated. Mr. Corzine, trying to turn a small financial company into a big player on Wall Street, began making big bets on risky ventures such Italian government bonds, apparently - according to investigators — using funds he was supposed to be safeguarding for his clients., i.e., playing with other people's money.

It was a gamble that the euro-zone would never allow a collapse similar to the demise of Lehman Brothers, thus setting off another economic plunge around the world, and would ultimately step in and bail out weak currencies to pay investors 100 cents on the dollar. That would have yielded big bonuses for MF Global and others who made a similar risky bet. But it didn't turn out that way – at least not in time to save Mr. Corzine.

The company went over the cliff and took with it the money of its investors. Trustee James Giddens is trying to find \$600 million in missing customer money. The Commodity Futures Trading Commission, the first to detect the missing funds, has ordered the firm to retain all relevant records in a broad "do not destroy" notice.

As it turns out, MF Global has told regulators, the firm failed to segregate client accounts, one of the factors, along with the missing money, that led to bankruptcy. That is a fundamental violation of Wall Street rules, but, hey, there's no cop on the

street, at least not one with the power to head off potential disasters before they occur.

Congress, after a protracted fight and over the objections of platoons of lobbyists, created the Consumer Protection Financial Bureau as a way to rein in abuses on Wall Street, but Republicans have been fighting a rear-guard action for months to prevent anyone from heading the agency.

That effectively prevents the CPFB from being able to exercise its full authority. MF Global may have gone belly-up anyway, but this episode shows the desperate need for more oversight on Wall Street and the failure of some of its denizens to learn from the mistakes of the past.

That's one of the lessons from this incident. We $\,$ should be well past the day when anyone believes that self-regulation is the way to go, but there is no sign that Republicans on Capitol Hill will lift their objections to President Obama's nominee to head the bureau. The irony is that Mr. Corzine is a prominent liberal Democrat, having been both a governor and U.S. senator from New Jersey proving once again that greed has no party.

Meanwhile, other evidence of a dysfunctional economy remains abundant. New census data indicate that the ranks of America's poorest have increased to a record highone in 15 people. On the other end of spectrum, a comprehensive study found that 280 of the biggest publicly traded American companies faced income tax bills equal to only 18.5 percent of their profits over the last three years – just over half of the official corporate rate of 35 percent.

In Washington, the Senate has rejected President Obama's latest version of a jobs bill and the Supercommittee to fix the budget remains deadlocked. As long as that remains the case, there's no hope of sparking a genuine recovery and giving the middle class reason to hope for a better day.

sometimes necessary for the defense of our nation — never stops being hell. It's hazardous, demanding, tedious, frightening, gruesome, precarious and frustrating.

The expectations that service members have of "the boss" during wartime duty aren't high or unreasonable: Adequate equipment and weapons; competent officers to lead them; capable medics to care for the injured; honorable treatment of their remains should they die for their country; and compassion and support for their families.

The unfolding stories about mishandled remains at the Dover Port mortuary outrage an American public that reveres those who

make the ultimate sacrifice. Words can't adequately describe the anguish and doubts that military families are experiencing.

For 18 years, media were banned from observing the return of war dead at Dover Air Force Base after President George H.W. Bush initiated a blackout during the 1991 Gulf War. The president believed a prohibition against photographs was

necessary to protect the privacy of the families of fallen soldiers.

The irony is that what went on during the blackout years as accepted military policy disrespected the soldiers and their families much more than a photograph ever could.

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Daisher Puts a Different Twist on Skydiving and Kayaking

The list of things Miles Daisher hasn't jumped off may be shorter than the list of things he has.

By his own count, he's jumped from more than 140 places, including bridges, cliffs, dams, buildings, cranes smokestacks, antennas — even a tree. He skis off mountains wearing a chute-like "speed wing." He dreams of jumping a motorcycle over the Snake River Canyon this summer, opening a parachute and flying across the canyon.

He's done 2,966 jumps, possibly more than any other BASE (building, antenna, span and earth) jumper in the world.

Who would do 57 BASE jumps in a single day? Daisher did, setting the unofficial world record.

Daisher's fascination with aerial stunts began when he was a kid, after he saw "Hooper," a movie about a Hollywood stuntman. When he was about 12, he began jumping off fences, trees, the roof of his one-story house and cliffs at a lake.

He took up bungee jumping in college. He even took a dive from the third story of his frat house, his dad said.

"He put a couple mattresses on the ground and did flips," said retired Air Force Col. Phil Daisher (pronounced "dasher"), a pilot who flew fighter jets, spy planes and tankers.

While the elder Daisher never had occasion to jump out of a perfectly good plane, his son got hooked at age 25. Now it's his career. Since 2001, he's been part of the Red Bull Air Force promotional stunt team, traveling the world and performing on the energy drink company's tab.

Daisher, 42, has logged more than 3,100 skydives.

This year, he's traveled to New Zealand, Switzerland Korea and Mexico jumping and flying in "wing suits." Two weeks ago, he parachuted from a helicopter 5,000 feet above UNLV's Sam Boyd Stadium to the deliver the game ball for the Boise State game.

"I landed on the 10-yard line and ran the ball into the endzone," said Daisher. He gave a quick Heisman pose for the cheering crowd.

Daisher's willingness to try new things — and skill in pulling it off — earned him a mention in Ripley's Believe It or Not's new "Strikingly True" book for a stunt called "skyaking" — climbing into a kayak then pushing yourself out of a plane at 13,000 feet.

"The daredevil has invented a new sport,"

the Ripley's book says.

"I'll be right up there with a seven-fingered wombat," Daisher said. "I'm honored."

Not His Idea

Parachuting with a kayak was the brainchild of his friend Scott Lindgren, who was shooting kayaking videos in 2002.

"Early on, I asked him to do all sorts of stupid stuff," Lindgren said from his Lake Tahoe home.
"Leggetht wind of what Miles was up to He

"I caught wind of what Miles was up to. He was into stunts, and we were into filming it," said Lingren, who made the extreme sports film "Burning Time."

Daisher says he's done 54 skyaking jumps. He's tried different boats, and not all handled well in the air.

"We had one boat that worked really well," Lindgren recalled. "Then we switched boats, and he ended up getting stuck upside down."

Daisher had to pull the skirt and get out of the boat before he could parachute to safety. (The boat has its own chute.)

"People have some crazy fascination with skyaking now," said Lindgren.

Landing on Water

The logistics of how to safely land a kayak in water after jumping from a plane do inspire fascination.

"It takes a lot of balance to get a kayak to stay upright in freefall," Daisher said. He enjoys doing tricks, including rolls, flips and flat spins.

The surface area of the boat slows the descent significantly, to about 98 mph compared to about 120 mph lying flat on your belly. There's about a minute of freefall.

"It's hard for a cameraman to stay with me," Daisher said.

He's managed to land in the water every time. The first jump was into a 10-by-100-foot pond.

"I do what's called 'swooping' for my landing," he said. He turns his steep dive horizontal before he hits the water. "You're doing 50 miles per hour across the water when you touch down," he said.

"You use that speed. Speed is your friend when you're coming in with a kayak," Daisher said. "If you land hard, you're going to compress your back."

Skybiking Not a Good Plan

As crazy as skyaking sounds, Daisher has

done crazier. You can watch a video online of He

"It isn't hard to stay upright in freefall on a bicycle — it's impossible," said Daisher.

He wasn't injured, but he's in no hurry to

try that one again, he said. He injured himself a lot growing up, but the worst injury he's sustained as an adult is a broken shoulder. He has had close friends die

in aerial accidents.

him parachuting with a bike.

In the past decade, Twin Falls has become a mecca for BASE jumpers because the Perrine Bridge — spanning the 486-foot-deep Snake River canyon — is one of the few places where it's legal to BASE jump.

Daisher was living and skydiving in the Bay Area in the early 2000s, visiting Twin Falls a couple times a year to jump. He was thinking of moving there when he met Nikki Geist in California. She was from Twin. They moved to Idaho in 2004, got married and now have three children.

"Miles is a great guy," Twin Falls County Sheriff Tom Carter said. "He is really, really intense. He just lives life to the fullest."

Daisher spoke at Carter's Rotary club last year.

"He wants everybody to be as excited as he

is," Carter said. "He gave a great talk, and everybody loved it." He credits Daisher for establishing the an-

nual Perrine Bridge Festival, which brings BASE jumpers to town to raise money for children with special needs.

Carter skydived once, but has never tried BASE jumping.

"It sounds crazy as hell to me," he said. "To Miles, it sounds really rad. We should all live in Miles' world."

By 4:30 a.m., the park was empty, wiped clean of any traces of the camp that had been there since Sept. 17. Tents and sleeping bags were hauled away to the dump. Workers used power washers to blast the stone plaza clean.

It wasn't clear what would happen next to the demonstration. Mayor Michael Bloomberg said protesters would be welcomed back, but would no longer be allowed to erect tents or unroll sleeping bags. A judge's ruling later in the day upheld the city's crack-

"I don't know what we'll do," said Chris Habib, a 36-year-old artist from New York, who was milling with other protesters near Zuccotti Park. He said he hoped the group could settle on a new protest site. He said he was confident the movement would continue even if its flagship camp was dismantled.

"A judge can't erase a movement from the public mind," he said.

Congress Pushes Back on Healthier School Lunches

USDA's proposed standards could have pushed pizza-makers and potato growers out of the school lunch business.

WASHINGTON • Who needs leafy greens and carrots when pizza and french fries will do?

In an effort many 9-year-olds will cheer, Congress wants pizza and french fries to stay on school lunch lines and is fighting the Obama administration's efforts to take unhealthy foods out of schools.

The final version of a spending bill released late Monday would unravel school lunch standards the Agriculture Department proposed earlier this year. These include limiting the use of potatoes on the lunch line, putting new restrictions on sodium and boosting the use of whole grains. The legislation would block or delay all of

those efforts. The bill also would allow tomato paste on pizzas to be counted as a

vegetable, as it is now. USDA had wanted to only count a half-cup of tomato paste or more as a vegetable, and a serving of pizza has less than

Nutritionists say the whole effort is reminiscent of the Reagan administration's much-ridiculed attempt 30 years ago to classify ketchup as a vegetable to cut costs. This time around, food companies that produce frozen pizzas for schools, the salt industry and potato growers requested the changes and lobbied Congress.

School meals that are subsidized by the federal government must include a certain amount of vegetables, and USDA's proposal could have pushed pizza-makers and potato growers out of the school lunch business.

Piling on to the companies' opposition, some conservatives argue that the federal government shouldn't tell children what to eat. In a summary of the bill, Republicans on the House Appropriations Committee said the changes would "prevent overly burdensome and costly regulations and ...provide greater flexibility for local school districts to improve the nutritional quality of meals."

Supercommittee: Boehner Calls Tax Plan 'Fair Offer'

As time grows perilously short for agreement by the deficit-fighting panel, House Speaker says that adding tax reform would generate economic growth.

WASHINGTON • House Speaker John Boehner publicly blessed a Republican deficit-reduction plan Tuesday that would raise \$300 billion in additional tax revenue while overhauling the IRS code, bucking opposition by some GOP presidential hopefuls and colleagues wary of violating a longstanding point of party orthodoxy.

Boehner, the top Republican in Congress, spoke as time grew perilously short for agreement by the deficit-fighting "supercommittee." The panel has until a week from Wednesday to vote on any compromise, but several officials said that in reality, perhaps as little as 48 or 72 hours are available to the six Republicans and six Democrats.

While Boehner's voice is important, his endorsement does not mean all Republicans will follow him or that a deal is in sight. Republicans have been unified for two decades in opposition to higher taxes, while Democrats on the supercommittee insist on additional revenue before they will agree to cuts in benefit programs like Medicare as part of a compromise.

The speaker said that the plan, outlined a week ago to Democrats on the committee, was "a fair offer." Adding tax reform would generate economic growth, he said, speaking as the supercommittee groped for a compromise to reduce red ink

Scores of Soldiers, Civilians Killed as Syrian Crisis Accelerates

BEIRUT • Army defectors ambushed dozens of Syrian troops and regime forces gunned down civilians during one of the bloodiest days of the 8-month-old uprising, which appeared Tuesday to be spiraling out of President Bashar Assad's control. Up to 90 people were killed in a gruesome wave of violence Monday, activists said. The extent of the bloodshed only came to light Tuesday, in part because corpses lying in the streets did not reach the morgue until daylight. As the bloodshed spiked, Assad's former allies were turning on him in rapid succession — a sign of profound impatience with a leader who has failed to stem months of unrest that could explode into a regional conflagration.

Lost JFK Assassination Tapes Discovered

PHILADELPHIA • A long-lost version of the Air Force One recordings made in the immediate aftermath of President John F. Kennedy's assassination, with more than 30 minutes of additional material not in the official version in the government's archives, has been

found and is for sale. There are incidents and code names described on the newly discovered twoplus hour recording, which predates the shorter and newer recording currently housed in the National Archives outside Washington and the Lyndon B. Johnson Library in Texas. The shorter recording was thought to be the only surviving version of the tape.

The asking price is \$500,000 for the reel-toreel tape, which is inside its original box with a typewritten label showing it was made by the White House Communications Agency for Army Gen. Chester "Ted" Clifton Jr.

It is titled "Radio Traffic involving AF-1 in flight from Dallas, Texas to Andrews AFB on November 22, 1963."

"As Americans have looked to the history of the Kennedy assassination in search of answers, somewhere in an attic there existed a tape made years before the only known surviving version, of the con-

versations on Air Force One on that fateful day," said Nathan Raab, vice president of The Raab Collection, a Philadelphia historic documents dealer that put the tape up for sale Tuesday.

The recording is the highlight of the personal effects from the estate of Clifton, who Kennedy's senior military aide and was in the Dallas motorcade when the president was assassinated.

Clifton, who died in 1991, had kept a collection of audio tapes, documents, photographs and video stemming from his years in the Kennedy and Johnson administrations. The Raab Collection, which is selling the tape and the rest of the archive, acquired the items at a public sale from Clifton's heirs after the death of Clifton's wife in

"At a time when there really wasn't what we consider today a chief of staff, Clifton carried on many of those functions," Raab said. "He retires in 1965, this goes with him."

The recording consists of in-flight radio calls between the aircraft, the White House Situation Room, Andrews Air Force Base and a plane that was carrying Kennedy press secretary Pierre Salinger and six Cabinet members from Hawaii to Tokyo when the president was assassinated.

School districts have said some of the USDA proposals go too far and cost too much when budgets are extremely tight. Schools have long taken broad instructions from the government on what they can serve in the federally subsidized meals that are given free or at reduced price to low-income children. But some schools have balked at government attempts to tell them exactly what foods they can't serve. Reacting to that criticism,

House Republicans had urged USDA to rewrite the standards in a bill passed in June. The Senate last month voted to block the potato limits in its version, with op-

position to the restrictions led by potato-growing states.

Neither version of the bill included the latest provisions on tomato paste, sodium or whole grains; House and Senate negotiators added those in the last two weeks as they put finishing touches on the legislation.

The school lunch proposal is based on 2009 recommendations by the Institute of Medicine, the health arm of the National Academy of Sciences. Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack said they are necessary to reduce childhood obesity and future health care costs.

USDA spokeswoman Courtney Rowe said Tuesday that the department will continue its efforts to make lunches healthier.

was sustained by her faith.





Hurshell Eugene Culley

July 2, 1916-Oct. 25, 2011

Calif. • Hurshell Culley Eugene peacefully passed away at his home in California on Tuesday, Oct. 25, 2011, at the age of 95.

The only son and eldest child of Thurman and Grace "Hursh" Culley, was born July 2, 1916, in McCleansboro, Ill., infected

with malaria he'd contracted from his sick, pregnant mother. Not expected to live, he was placed in a shoe box on the oven door for warmth and fed tiny spoons of coffee. In 1917 after he and Grace recovered, the family moved to Rupert, Idaho. Thurman found work as a teamster at the Minidoka Dam project, where Hursh grew up with his beloved sisters, Mary Jo Gosney, Millie Fournier and Gladys Massio. His beloved niece, Judy (Parkin), was added to the family along the way. Playing the trumpet in dance bands, Hursh paid his way through Albion State Normal School in Albion, Idaho. He competed in college swimming, boxing and track events. Graduating in 1936, he was business manager of the Albion Panthers "Sage" yearbook. That summer, he worked as a health aide for the U.S. Department of Forestry on Idaho/Montana border.

After marrying his childhood sweetheart, Myrtle Deno, in October of 1936, Hursh took his first teaching job in Castleford, Idaho. Jesse Owens, winner of four Olympic gold medals in track in Nazi Germany's 1936 Olympics, came to Castleford that year advertising he could outrun the fastest horses in that area. The races were held at the school. Since Hitler had unsuccessfully tried to refuse to award the gold medals to him because he was black, Jesse was wellknown. Hursh and his students got to watch Mr. Owens win most of his races that day and, of course, Hursh asked him how he did it.

Leaving Castleford for Ketchum, Idaho, in 1940 for a position as principal, he enjoyed famous visitors like Bing Crosby and Gary Cooper who frequented the Sun Valley Lodge. To encourage his students in the literary arts, he invited Ernest Hemingway to his school but turned him against using some of his more colorful words in his presentation. The summer of 1941 found Hursh as a forest ranger on Mount Baldy. Both he and Myrtle were teaching in Ketchum when World War II broke out. Knowing military duty was coming, Hursh and now pregnant Myrtle, moved to Portland, Ore., where he became a Boy Scout executive. Their first child, Patricia, and their second child, Charles, were born, and he became acquainted with Alfred Hitchcock, an ardent Boy Scout volunteer.

After serving in the Army of the Pacific from 1944 to 1946, Hursh returned to Scouting, first in Portland, then in Pocatello, Idaho, where his third child, Philip, was born. From Pocatello, Hursh accepted a position as chief executive of the BSA Council in Great Falls, Mont. Deciding the minus 40 degree winters were not for him, the family left Montana in 1949, moving to Blackfoot, Idaho, where he opened "Culley Motor Company," selling Studebakers and Packards in the post-war auto boom. While there, his fourth child, Clista, was born, and he completed his BA degree at Idaho State University in Pocatello. In 1955, Hursh returned to Scouting in San Francisco, Calif., and earned his master's degree (cum laude) with an administration certificate at San Francisco State College. In

1966, he returned to teaching in a small town in California until he retired to Healdshurg, Calif., at age 65.

Hursh was a Mason and Shriner for more than 60 years. He visited Galveston, Texas, where his eldest grandson graduated from the University of Texas Medical School and

was so pleased and proud of the new Shriner's Burn Center located just across from the medical school. He was active in Rotary, Lions and Kiwanis. Hursh was a quiet man, who dedicated his life to loving his family, improving the lives of young people and learning. He was a giving person. His love was unconditional. His wry sense of humor often caught his audience off guard - once "tongue in cheek" telling his greatgranddaughter, Jessica, he was sorry she hadn't had enough money to buy herself designer jeans that didn't have holes in the knees.

Hursh was a gentleman, a scholar, a charmer and funny. He chronicled family history in photos. He truly was interested in you and your lives and was open to new, exciting experiences like celebrating his 90th birthday with his eldest grandson's family in Texas. The highlight of that trip for him was "cruising" the byways and highways, as a passenger in Steve's classy new Porsche. He was an artist, designing and making jewelry and beautiful woodcarvings. His handmade hook (no machinery allowed) was displayed at the 1939 World's Fair on Treasure Island in San Francisco Bay.

Those of us who remain here loved him dearly and will miss him so much. But we know he's happier in his new home where his unfailing belief in God has taken Hurshell was preceded in

death by his beloved wife of 68 years; his son, Charles; his sister, Mary Jo; and brothers-in-law, Ken Gosney and Al Massio. 

WASHINGTON • The U.S. Postal Service said Tuesday it has lost \$5.1 billion in the past year, pushing it closer to imminent default on a multibillion-dollar payment and to future bankruptcy as the weak economy and increased Internet use drive down mail volume.

The financial losses for the year ended Sept. 30 came despite deep cuts of more than 130,000 jobs in recent years and the closing of some smaller local post offices.

Losses will only accelerate in the coming year, Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe warned, citing fasterthan-expected declines in first-class mail. He implored Congress to take swift, wide-ranging action to stabilize the ailing agency's finances as it nears a legal deadline Friday to pay \$5.5 billion into the U.S. Treasury for future retiree health benefits.

Congress is expected to grant a reprieve, but that will only delay the day of reckoning for an agency struggling for relevance in an electronic age. Based on current losses, the Postal Service says it will run out of money - or come dangerously close - next September, forcing it to halt

"We are at a point where we require urgent action,'' Donahoe said.

In the event of a shutdown, private companies such as FedEx and UPS could handle a small portion of the material the post office moves, but they do not go everywhere. No business has shown interest in delivering letters everywhere in the country for a set rate of 44 cents for a first-class letter.

For the fiscal year ended Sept. 30, the post office had income of \$65.7 billion, down \$1.4 billion from the previous year. Expenses totaled \$70.6 billion.

The loss of \$5.1 billion was less than a previous estimate of \$10 billion, but only because the \$5.5 billion payment - originally due Sept. 30 — was deferred until Nov. 18 with the approval of Con-

Volume for standard mail advertising and similar items - improved somewhat, indicating some signs of economic recovery. But it generates less income.

The Postal Service has struggled to find its role in an Internet age but insists it can eventually return to profitability with legislative changes.

While the economy of Greece is dragging down European markets, Greek yogurt was hailed Tuesday as a boon for Magic Valley

business. The south-central Idaho economic community gathered Tuesday at the Southern Idaho Business Forum for an update of the economic situation from a global, national and local perspective. The forum was organized by the Idaho Small Business Development Center, the Idaho Department of Labor and Southern Idaho Rural Development.

For the U.S. economy, the problems don't have to do with inflation or labor shortages, said Brian Greber, director of business research and economic development for Boise State University's College of Business and Economics.

"There's a confidence issue," he said. That's keeping businesses from making deep investments and hiring more people, he said.

"We're past the financial collapse," he said. "It's the confidence collapse we're not past?"

Idaho's economic recovery is a two-step process, he said. It will require business investment, and a recovery of the housing market, which will allow people to sell homes outside of Idaho and move to the state.

Of course, the recent announcement that Chobani, a New York-based Greek yogurt manufacturer, will build a 400-employee plant in Twin Falls didn't escape attention.

Greber said the dairy industry is one of the fastest growing for the state, expanding from 1.9 billion pounds of milk in 1980 to 12.8 billion in 2010. The addition of Chobani is what economists like to call "new money." That's because the industry creates a product that's largely sold and consumed outside Idaho, bringing in a new source of economic strength, Greber said.

"It's the exact type of new money enterprise you want," he said.





With Olive Oil, Beware of Labels

Paolo Pasquali does not like to be called a crusader for good olive oil. But when I visited his oleoteca, the tasting room he built at Villa Campestri, his "olive oil resort" in the hills north of Florence, it was impossible for him to talk of anything

At lunch, dinner and breakfast the next morning, Pasquali rhapsodized about the storied history of the olive and fumed about consumers' feckless embrace of cheap oil. And, for most of the time, his pitch sounded like that of any number of upstart chocolate, coffee or cured-meat producers: Like wine, my product deserves more respect.

That is, until Pasquali reached into an imposing antique sideboard and pulled out a silver tray holding several small, brown apothecary bottles. "Smell this," he said, waving one labeled "rancid" under my

It didn't smell bright or floral, like Pasquali's oil. But it did smell familiar. The rancid oil smelled like most olive oils I had had at restaurants and cooked with at home.

It has been about 30 years since many Americans began giving up their lard and Crisco for more-healthful extra-virgin oil. But that extra-virgin label has proved a poor guide to choosing the highest-quality oils. According to a recent study by the UC Davis Olive Center, 73 percent of the top five brands of imported extravirgin olive oil failed to meet accepted international standards for extra-virgin. Moreover, a separate report revealed that 44 percent of consumers actually preferred rancid or fusty oil, a possible result of the prevalence of substandard extravirgins available to American consumers.

Now, a new movement is afoot to redefine extra-virgin, teaching consumers – and the marketplace what makes high-quality olive oil. Last year, Pasquali helped build an olive oil tasting program at the Culi-

nary Institute of America in California's Napa Valley. An international organization, 3E, has created a "superpremium" category for extra-virgin oils that meet exacting standards of production, milling and storage. At the "Beyond Extra Virgin" conference this summer in Cordoba, Spain, the executive director of the International Olive Council, the guardian of the current extra-virgin standard, acknowledged that better label information should be a "priority for the sector."

New students of olive oil often believe the product was better before the sector industrialized. But extravirgin oil is, in fact, a 20thcentury invention. New technology allowed for faster picking and pressing and, therefore, fresher oil. Modern storage techniques eliminated exposure to heat and light, two factors that lead to rancidity. Indeed, the European Parliament invented the term "extra-vir-

gin" only in 1960. Many Americans believe it refers to the first pressing of the olives, but in fact it's a baseline standard that embraces any oil made by solely mechanical means, instead of chemical treatment, and with less than 0.8 percent of free acidity, a laboratory measurement of rancidity. (Formerly, the limit was 1 percent.) Extra-virgin oils also are forbidden to have "disgusting odors such as rancidity, putridity, smoke, mold and olive fly."

"Extra-virgin just means it's free of defects," said Greg Drescher, executive director of strategic initiatives at the Napa CIA. "Can you imagine a stamp of approval in the wine industry that says it's good enough

because it's not defective?"

(Norton, 2011). Generous government subsidies encouraged farmers and corporations to overstate their production figures and to make up the difference with inferior olive oil or even seed oils. Americans aren't the only consumers who are cheated. "There is no difference between Tuscany and the United States," said Pasquali, who takes his own olive oil with him to local restaurants. "We're all in the same boat."

Rampant fraud makes it difficult for high-quality producers to compete. But critics say the extra-virgin standard fails even the market of legitimate oils. The minimum sensory and chemical requirements admit a huge range of oils. Some are perfectly fine. Others are extraordinary. "But as a consumer, it's impossible to look at a shelf of bottles and be able to guess which is which," said Drescher.

International organization

3E (pronounced "tray ay" because it's Italian) is trying to change that with the debut of its "super-premium" category. The group gives that stamp of approval to 21 including producers, Pasquali's Villa Campestri and McEvoy Ranch, in Marin County, Calif. To receive the 3E certification, oil must pass rigorous chemical and sensory analyses. (Where extra-virgin allows oils with 0.8 percent free acidity, for example, 3E allows just 0.3 percent.)

Producers also must submit documentation about cultivation, milling and storage practices and on-site inspections. The aim is to certify the oil in a particular bottle and not as is done for, say, Burgundy and Bordeaux wines - the estate. So a producer's oil might make the cut one year but not the next. Super-premium olive oils cost far more than the supermarket stuff. Half-liter bottles run between \$30 and \$55.

The result: Noodles ready to be placed into a pot of chicken pieces and broth.

"Some people like to shake off the extra dough," she said. "But I like to leave it on because it makes the broth thicker."

"It's pretty tasty," he said. Dayle, 75, has been cooking since she was a teenager in Southern California. She'd always heard that the way to a man's heart was through his stomach. "So I thought, I better learn to cook," she said. She found out later that the saying might not be entirely true: Her first husband left her to raise three children on her own.

She and Herman were married in 2007. Now that she has raised her family she also has five grandkids and two great-grandchildren and is thinking about a time when she is no longer with them, Dayle wanted to leave something of herself behind.

With about 300 recipes, her cookbook is titled: "Nunu's Talk'n Atacha With Her Cookbook!"

"My mother was called Noni and my grandmother was called Nana," she said.

"So when the grandkids

came along they decided I needed to be called Nunu. It got to the point where everybody knows me as Nunu."

en completely with water. Place pot over mediumhigh heat and bring to a boil. Lower heat and continue cooking until chicken is falling away from the

Remove chicken from the cooked broth; set aside until it's cool enough to handle with your hands. Remove skin; remove meat from bones. Cut meat into bite-sized pieces and set aside.

Strain chicken broth and place it back into the pot. Add chicken bullion granule to taste, if needed.

For the noodles:

6 tablespoons milk 1 1/2 teaspoon salt 3 cups flour

Beat the eggs in a bowl, and then combine eggs, milk and salt. Add enough flour that when stirred together it makes a stiffsticky dough.

On a floured surface, take a ball of dough (about the size of a large lemon or small orange) and flatten into a pancake-like circle (about the thickness for pie crust). Repeat procedure. Place the circles on a clean dish towel and sprinkle liberally with flour. Stack the circles in layers, with plenty of flour between. Be sure to include flour on top of the

Next, roll the stack as if you were making a jelly roll. With a sharp knife, cut across the roll, making 1/4- to 1/2-inch slices. Sprinkle with more flour, as needed. Separate the noodles and spread loosely; let them sit while you heat the broth back to the boiling point. Drop noodles into boiling broth a handful at a time (do not dump the whole pile in all at once). Using a longhandled spoon, separate noodles as they're added to the broth. Cook for 10 minutes.

Add chicken chunks back to the noodles and broth, and serve.

Note: As you drop the noodles into the boiling broth, you also will be dropping excess flour. This is good, as it will thicken the broth. Recipe courtesy of Dayle Click-Schmitz of Twin Falls.

Surprising Yet Simple Dessert

Mango With White Chocolate Yogurt

6 servings.

5 ounces white chocolate, preferably with at least 33 percent butterfat, such as Valrhona Le Blanc 35 percent

3/4 cup plain wholemilk or low-fat yogurt 24 skinned hazelnuts, toasted and caramelized, for gar-

nish (see note) 3 large ripe mangoes (about 1 1/4 pounds

Break the chocolate in-

to small pieces and place in a large heat proof bowl. Suspend the bowl over a medium saucepan filled with a few inches of barely bubbling water (over medium heat). Let the chocolate melt slowly, stirring occasionally until smooth.

Place the yogurt in a mixing bowl, then gradually stir in the melted white chocolate to form a sauce. Cool to room temperature.

Break the caramelized hazelnuts into coarse pieces.

Peel the mangoes and cut their flesh away from the pit, creating long, thick half-moons, or cut into bite-size chunks. If you leave them in long strips, figure 4 strips per serving.

Divide the mango among individual plates. Spoon equal amounts of the yogurt mixture over each portion, then sprinkle with the hazelnuts. Serve

right away.

Note: Toast hazelnuts in a small, dry skillet over medium-low heat for 4 to 6 minutes, shaking the pan occasionally so the nuts turn a slightly darker shade of brown all over. Cool. To caramelize the toasted hazelnuts, lay a piece of parchment paper or a silicone liner on a heatproof surface. Heat 1/4 cup of sugar and 1/4 cup of water in a small, dry skillet over mediumhigh heat, stirring just until the sugar has dissolved. Cook without stirring for several minutes to form a lightly golden syrup. Add the toasted hazelnuts and stir to coat, then use a slotted spoon to transfer the nuts to the paper or silicone mat, separating them so they won't stick together. Cool completely.

Have Your Cake and Eat It Too

I have joined the cupcake craze. Except that I don't want the calories, carbs and fat that come with these yummy delights.

So I shrunk my cupcakes not their size, but their fattening ingredients.

After all, people say you can do anything with a cupcake. Fill them. Leave them plain. Decorate them. So why not make them healthy?

I came up with this recipe for red velvet cupcakes, which remain satisfyingly large, yet have just 98 calories and under than 3 grams of fat each. Compare that with the standard cupcake, which can crash in with 513 calories and 26 grams of fat.

Red velvet cake has been around for decades. It started as the signature dessert at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City. The cake had always captured my heart. But for dieting it plays hard to get. I wanted to come up with an adaption that would capture the richness of its namesake (minus the butter, sugar and white flour).

Red velvet cake is a very mild chocolate cake, but it is chocolate cake nonetheless. And yes, it is red. Unsweetened cocoa powder and natural red food coloring round out the tradition in this recipe. As for healthing it up, I did that with some simple but tasty substitutions you can try with just about any baked good. Here are the key changes:

· Whole-wheat pastry flour and flaxseed meal. Both are used to replace nutritionally bankrupt white flour. Whole-wheat pastry flour lends a light, fluffy texture to the cake. Add flaxseed meal (ground flaxseeds) and you've got a cupcake high in omega 3's, protein and both insoluble and soluble fiber. Flaxseed meal is a dieter's dream, as it helps you feel full. Look for it in the natural or bulk sections of the grocer, as well as in the baking aisle.

• Stevia and agave syrup. Both replace the sugar, while cutting calories. Stevia is an herb known for its natural (and intense) sweetness with zero calories. It bakes beautifully. Agave is a honey-like sweetener that is sweeter than sugar, so you don't need to use much. And make sure you buy raw agave, as some are highly processed.

ally is served with a cream cheese frosting, and I haven't veered from tradition. After your cakes have cooled, you'll frost them with a mixture of sugar-free vanilla pudding and low-fat cream cheese (this takes mere seconds to whip together). The frosting has a nice sweet flavor and hardly any calories. Trust me, for anyone in your family who prefers their desserts as decadent as they come, they won't be disappointed!

Tips:

• Add 1 teaspoon of cocoa powder and I packet of stevia sweetener to the frosting for chocolate frosting. It will only add 1 calorie per cupcake.

 Spraying the paper liners with nonstick spray keeps very low-fat cupcakes, such as these, from sticking to the

paper. • Don't have enough time? These cupcakes also can be "baked" in the microwave. Place paper muffin liners in four 6-ounce microwavesafe custard cups. Spray the papers and custard cups lightly with cooking spray. Spoon the batter into the paper liners. Microwave on 50 percent power (medium) for 1 minute and 20 seconds to 4 minutes, or until the tops feel firm when lightly just touched. The cupcakes will puff up high while cooking, then deflate when the microwave stops. Carefully remove the cupcakes from the custard cups right away and cool completely on a wire rack before frosting. Microwaves can vary widely in cooking power; be sure to watch carefully as you cook.

Red Velvet Cupcakes

Start to finish: 25 minutes. Servings: 4.

2 eggs 5 packets natural Stevia sweetener (powder)

2 teaspoons vanilla extract 1 teaspoon red food coloring

2 tablespoons buttermilk 1 tablespoon agave nectar 1/4 cup whole-wheat

pastry flour 2 tablespoons flaxseed

meal

2 teaspoons unsweetened cocoa powder

1/8 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons prepared vanilla sugar-free, fatfree pudding (such as Jell-O)

2 tablespoons fat-free cream cheese, softened

Heat the oven to 350 degrees. Line 4 large (2 1/2inch) muffin cups with paper liners. Lightly coat the liners with cooking spray. Separate the egg yolks and whites, discarding 1 of the yolks. Place the remaining egg yolk in a medium bowl. Place the 2 egg whites in another medium bowl.

To the whites, add 2 packets of the Stevia, 1 teaspoon of the vanilla, and 1/2 teaspoon of the food coloring. Mix and set aside. Add the remaining 3 packets Stevia, 1 teaspoon vanilla, and 1/2 teaspoon food coloring to the egg yolk. Whisk the yolk mixture for 3 minutes. Add buttermilk and agave.

Whisk until combined. In a small bowl whisk together flour, flaxseed meal, cocoa powder and salt. Add to yolk-buttermilk mixture and beat on low just until combined.

Using an electric mixer, beat the egg white mixture on medium to high until stiff peaks form. Working in 3 batches, fold the egg whites into the buttermilk mixture, being careful not to deflate the whites.

Spoon the mixture evenly into the muffin cups. Bake for 12 to 15 minutes, or until the tops spring back when lightly touched. Transfer the cupcakes to a wire rack and cool.

Meanwhile, to prepare the frosting in a small bowl combine the pudding and cream cheese. Mix until smooth. Spread or pipe evenly over each cupcake. Per serving: 98 calories; 3 g fat (24 percent of total calories, 1 g saturated); 54 mg cholesterol; 14 g carbohydrate; 5 g protein; 2 g fiber; 187 mg sodium.

COOKING THE 'BIG BANANA' OF THE STARCH WORLD

They're sold by the bananas, but they probably belong closer to the pota-

Because while plantains may resemble bananas, they taste and cook more like a tuber. And in much of the world, that's how these starchy fruit — sometimes called a "cooking banana" - are used. In Africa and India, they often are used as the base of stews and curries, much as potatoes would be.

In this one-pot dinner from Brazil (inspired by a similar recipe in Leticia Moreinos Schwartz' "The Brazilian Kitchen"), simmered plantains make a delicious base to a chicken curry. They also provide a natural starch that thickens the sauce.

When shopping for plantains, look for large, firm fruit. The thick skin can vary from green to yellow to black. Green is unripe, while yellow to black colors indicate the plantains are ready. But be warned – even ripe plantains are not pleasant eating when raw. Stick with recipes such as this one for cooking.

Got leftover plantains? They also can be thinly sliced and fried, then dusted with salt, paprika and sugar.

Chicken and Plantain Moqueca

Start to finish: 45 minutes. Servings: 4.

- 2 pounds boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut into chunks Salt and ground black pepper
- 3 tablespoons olive oil, divided
- 1 large yellow onion, diced 2 green bell peppers, cored and cut into chunks
- 4 cloves garlic, minced 1 tablespoon grated fresh ginger
- 1 tablespoon minced jarred jalapeno slices 2 cups chicken broth 15-ounce can coconut
- milk 1/4 cup tomato paste 2 bay leaves
- 3 ripe (skins should be yellow and black) plantains, peeled and cut into 1-inch chunks 2 tablespoons chopped
- fresh cilantro

Rum Cream Enlivens This Pumpkin Soup

Bursting with the warm flavors of fall, this soup is velvety and rich, a lovely starter to a several-course meal. Or, with a salad and some nice brown bread and butter, a fine entree.

You'll need to soak 1 cup of apple wood chips in water for 1 hour.

The pumpkin can be smoked up to 2 days in advance. Scoop out the pulp, put into a sealed container and refrigerate.

The soup recipe is from columnist Jim Shahin; the rum cream recipe is adapted from "The Inn at Little Washington: A Consuming Passion," by Patrick O'Connell and Tim Turner (Random House, 1996).

Smoked Pumpkin Soup With Rum Cream

8 to 10 appetizer servings or 4 to 6 main-course serv-

For the soup:

- 1 medium (about 4 pounds) pumpkin
- 3 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1 medium shallot, minced 5 cups no-salt-added chicken broth
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/8 teaspoon freshly ground allspice 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1/2 cup heavy cream 1/8 teaspoon freshly grated nutmea
- 1/4 teaspoon salt, or to taste Dash freshly ground black

For the rum cream:

1 cup heavy cream Finely grated zest and freshly squeezed juice from 1/2 lemon (1/4 teaspoon zest and 1/2teaspoon juice)

3 tablespoons good-quality dark rum Pinch sugar

For the soup: Drain the water from the wood chips.

Prepare the grill for indirect heat: If using a charcoal grill, light the coals. When the coals are hot, scatter the wood chips directly onto them. If using a gas grill, place 1 cup of the drained chips in a smoker box or an aluminum foil pouch punctured on top with a fork

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to release smoke. Place the smoker box or foil pouch between the grate and briquettes, close to the flame. Preheat on high until you see smoke, then reduce the heat to medium (350 degrees).

Meanwhile, discard the pumpkin stem. Cut the pumpkin in half from top to bottom. Scrape out all of the seeds and fiber.

When ready to grill, place the unpeeled pumpkin halves, flesh sides down, on the far side of the grill, away from the coals or flame. Smoke the pumpkin for 60 to 90 minutes, until a fork slides easily through

Remove the pumpkin from the grill. When cool enough to handle, use a spoon to scrape the

pumpkin flesh from its skin into a bowl. Discard the skin. Melt the butter in a large

pot over low heat. Add the shallot and cook for about 5 minutes, until soft. Add the broth, cinnamon, allspice and orange juice. Increase the heat to medium-high and bring to a boil, then reduce the heat to mediumlow. Stir in the pumpkin; cook for 10 minutes, then add the cream and nutmeg, stirring to incorporate. Turn off the heat. Let cool for about 20 minutes.

Working in batches,

transfer the soup to a food processor. Puree until smooth, then strain into a clean pot. Place over low heat and keep warm. Season with the salt and pepper.

For the rum cream: Pour the cream into the bowl of a stand mixer or handheld electric mixer. Beat on medium speed until soft peaks form. Add the lemon zest and juice, rum and sugar. Continue whipping until the cream

is almost stiff. Cover and refrigerate until ready to

Divide the soup among individual bowls; top each portion with equal amounts of the rum

cream. Serve right away. Per serving: 390 calories, 29g fat, 18g saturated fat, 120mg cholesterol, 230mg sodium, 25g carbohydrates, 2g dietary fiber, 6g sugar, 6g protein.

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

NEW YORK • There was little question Justin Verlander would unanimously win the AL Cy Young Award. Now, the far more intriguing question: Will he take the MVP, too?

"Do I think it's possible? Yes. Would I like to win it? Of course," he said during a conference call. "It's kind of a weird scenario."

No starting pitcher has won the MVP trophy since Roger Clemens in 1986, with Dennis Eckersley the last reliever to get it in 1992. Many say pitchers shouldn't win the MVP, period.

But Verlander's season — he won the pitching version of the Triple Crown, led Detroit to its first division crown in 24 years and drew every first-place vote Tuesday in the Cy Young race – has ratcheted up the debate in a crowded MVP field that includes Curtis Granderson, Jacoby Ellsbury, Jose

Bautista, Miguel Cabrera and more. "Pitchers are on the ballot," Verlander said. Bolstering the case for all pitchers, Verlander pointed to the "tremendous effect we have on the day of our game."

Sandusky TV **Interview Could** Haunt Him at Trial

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. • Former Penn State assistant football coach Jerry Sandusky's admission that he showered with and "horsed around" with boys could be used by prosecutors trying to convict him of child sex-abuse charges.

Experts in criminal law and crisis management questioned Sandusky's decision to give a TV interview in which he said there was no abuse and that any activities in a campus shower with a boy were just horseplay, not molestation.

"Mr. Sandusky goes on worldwide television and admits he did everything the prosecution claims he $\ did, except for the ultimate$ act of rape or sodomy? If I were a prosecutor, I'd be stunned," said Lynne Abraham, the former district attorney of Philadelphia. "I was stunned, and then I was revolted."

Abraham, who led a grand jury probe involving 63 accused priests from the Philadelphia archdiocese, was retained this week to lead an internal investigation of The Second Mile, the children's charity founded by Sandusky, from which he allegedly culled his victims.

NBA PLAYERS FILE ANTITRUST LAWSUITS AGAINST LEAGUE

ASSOCIATED PRESS

NEW YORK • Locked-out NBA players including Carmelo Anthony and Kevin Durant filed class-action antitrust lawsuits against the league on Tuesday in at least two states, moving pro basketball's labor dispute from the negotiating table to federal court.

Attorney David Boies, who represented the NFL during that sport's work stoppage and now has been brought aboard by basketball's players, said the NBA lockout violates antitrust laws by refusing to allow players to work.

Boies also said NBA Commissioner David Stern's ultimatum to the now-disbanded union to accept the owners' last economic model or face a harsher proposal "turned out to be a mistake" that strengthens the players' case because it proves that the collective bargaining process had ended.

"If you're in a poker game, and you run a bluff, and the bluff works, you're a hero. If someone calls your bluff, you lose. I think the owners

overplayed their hand," Boies said at the players' association headquarters. "They did

a terrific job of taking a very hard line and pushing the players to make concession after concession after concession, but greed is not only a terrible thing - it's a dangerous thing."

Dangerous enough to cost the league billions of dollars in damages if players win.

"We haven't seen Mr. Boies complaint vet but it's a shame that the players have chosen to litigate instead of negotiate," NBA spokesman Tim Frank said in a statement. "They warned us from the early days of these negotiations that they would sue us if we didn't satisfy them at the bargaining table, and they appear to have followed through on their threats."

Even so, Boise said he hopes it won't be necessary to go to trial.

Anthony and Chauncey Billups of the Knicks, NBA scoring leader Durant, rookie Kawhi Leonard and Grizzlies forward Leon Powe were listed as plaintiffs in the complaint that was filed in the Northern District of California against the NBA and the owners of its 30 teams. That case has been assigned for now to U.S. Magistrate Judge Donna M. Ryu in Oak-

The 67-year-old said in a statement Tuesday that he's retiring to pursue other interests with his wife,

Bernstein was the first NHRA driver to eclipse the 300 mph barrier in Gainesville, Fla., in 1992 and won four straight Funny Car titles from 1985-88. He followed with Top Fuel titles in 1996 and 2001.

Bernstein also had success as a team owner, becoming the first to earn wins in NHRA, NASCAR and CART.

Formula One

AUSTIN, Texas • Construction of a racetrack to host the U.S. Grand Prix starting next year has been halted in a contract dispute between Formula One, race promoters and developers.

That move, and a separate announcement by state Comptroller Susan Combs that \$25 million in state money for the race will not be paid in advance, cast doubt about the future of the race.

The project was hailed as a \$300 million boon to the Austin economy and a critical breakthrough in the U.S. market for Formula One, which hasn't held the U.S. Grand Prix since 2007 in Indianapolis.

Circuit of the Americas officials, including billionaire Red McCombs, say

construction won't resume until they have a contract from Formula One to stage the race in Austin next year.

College Football

Running back Knile Davis is practicing with Arkansas again, offensive coordinator Garrick McGee said.

Davis, a junior, suffered what was described as a season-ending ankle injury in the preseason. It was unclear whether he would return to a game this season.

Davis rushed for 1,322 yards and 13 touchdowns last season, the most for any running back in the Southeastern Conference.

He was a preseason all-SEC selection before breaking his ankle during a team scrimmage on Aug. 11.

NFL

Texans quarterback Matt Schaub hopes he can return this season from a foot injury, though he acknowledges "it doesn't look good."

Schaub injured a Lisfranc joint in his right foot in the second quarter of Sunday's 37-9 win in Tampa Bay. He stayed in the game, but only threw three passes in the second half.

Coach Gary Kubiak called the injury "significant" and Schaub said on his weekly radio appearance with KILT-AM that his foot "is not visibly looking too good." Schaub said he will meet with more doctors over the next week to gather as much information as possible.

U.S. Offense Wakes Up, Defeats Slovenia

The United States won for just the second time since Jurgen Klinsmann took over as coach, with Clint Dempsey and Jozy Altidore scoring in a two-minute span late in the first half to lead the Americans over Slovenia 3-2 on a foggy Tuesday night in Ljubljana.

Tim Matavz scored twice for Slovenia, and Edson Buddle got the opening goal for the Americans, who had been outscored 5-2 in going 1-4-1 since Klinsmann replaced Bob Bradley in late July. The former German star and coach switched to a more attack-oriented 4-4-2 against the Green Dragons, who played another exciting match against the U.S. following their controversial 2-2 tie in the first round of last year's World Cup.

"It looked much better," Klinsmann said. "It's a process, and that process, besides results, is going really well."

The Americans, who have dropped to 34th in FIFA's world rankings, finished a disappointing year 6-8-3, their worst record since going 7-9-11 in 1994. But this was their first victory in Europe 31/2 years, having gone 0-5 since winning at Poland in March 2008.

"It's always good to come over and win on European soil," Dempsey said.

On a night when the fog prevented players from seeing clearly for more than 10 or 20 yards, Buddle put the U.S. ahead in the ninth minute off a pass from Dempsey after a defensive mixup.

Matavz tied the score in the 26th as an American offside trap failed. Dempsey scored with a header in the 41st and Altidore made it 3-1 when he converted a penalty kick two minutes later, giving the U.S. its highest-scoring first half since June 2008 against Barbados.

But Slovenia, ranked 27th in the world, responded with a furious rally after halftime, and Matavz cut the deficit in the 61st, just after Bostjan Cesar's corner kick had bounced off the crossbar.

Buddle and Altidore started up front as Klinsmann went to a two-forward formation. Michael Bradley – son of the former coach - and Buddle got their first starts since Klinsmann's debut in August

WOODS SENSES THINGS ARE LOOKING UP DOWN UNDER

The motto for Tiger Woods these days is to move forward, and that covers a lot of terri-

Woods nearly made it through his entire interview Tuesday at the Presidents Cup before he was asked about the prospects of playing Adam Scott and ex-caddie Steve Williams, who caused such a stir over a racial comment he made to disparage Woods two weeks ago.

Would it not be better to face him early and get it out of

"It's already done," Woods said. "I addressed it last week and I said life goes forward, not backward."

He is ready to put behind a summer of injuries, especially after such a promising showing last week in the Australian Open when he was twice within one shot of the

lead on the back nine and finished third, two shots behind, his best result against a full field in two years.

Woods even sounded resigned to moving beyond such a successful partnership with Steve Stricker.

It took a dozen years and 16 partners in the Presidents Cup and Ryder Cup until Woods found what appeared to be the perfect partner. Two years ago at Harding Park, they became the first tandem to win all four team matches in the Presidents Cup, and the first to go 4-0 in any cup in 30 years.

They won two out of three matches at the Ryder Cup last

But there were growing indications that U.S. captain Fred Couples might break them up for some matches when the Presidents Cup gets under way at Royal Mel-

"Hopefully, we'll get put out there together," Woods said. "I know that we feel very comfortable with one another and we were talking about it today. There's a certain comfort level about each other's games."

He added, however, that the pairings for the week have not been decided.

"A lot of pairings have not been set in stone," Woods

Woods was excited the way Stricker hit the ball in a practice round Tuesday, particularly because Stricker last competed Sept. 25 at the Tour Championship while dealing with a neck injury that weakened his left arm. The turf is firm at Royal Melbourne, yet Stricker never flinched when he had to go after a shot.

The problem isn't finding a partner for Woods, rather finding a good fit for Dustin Johnson.

A year ago, the United States thought it had a dream pairing in Johnson and Phil Mickelson, a pair of swashbucklers who often play money games against each other in practice rounds at the majors.

They lost both matches badly in Wales, with neither one reaching the 17th hole.

"Me and Phil will not be playing together this week," Johnson said with a grin. "We do better playing against each other than with each other. We're good buddies. We love playing each other. But as Phil put it, we didn't have good energy."

Where does that leave Johnson? Someone suggested Woods, and he didn't

"That's a possibility," Johnson said. "I don't know if we're supposed to be saying who we are playing with yet. ... Obviously, me and Tiger will be a great team if we do play together. It's up to Captain Couples, whether he wants to put us together."


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Fish Thrilled to Make ATP Final

When it comes to the ATP World Tour Finals, Mardy Fish is quick to admit he's simply happy to be there.

"I'm sort of taking the approach of, 'Kind of excited to be a part of this thing;" said Fish, who will be making his debut at the season-ending tournament for the top eight men in tennis a few weeks before his 30th birthday.

"I know well enough that you can't take it for granted," the American said Tuesday on a conference call with reporters. "There's no guarantee that anyone's going to be back here doing this thing again, and so I'm going to take it all in."

Fish, who was born in Minnesota and now lives in California, will face 10-time Grand Slam champion Rafael Nadal when play begins Sunday in London. Fish's other opponents in round-robin play will be Roger Federer, owner of a record 16 major singles titles, and Jo-Wilfried Tsonga.

"There's really not too many holes there - apart from me, I think," Fish said with a chuckle. "I still don't feel like I really belong in that group. But I'll take it. I'll enjoy it for sure."

The tournament's other four-man group includes No. 1 Novak Djokovic – who won the Australian Open, Wimbledon and U.S. Open this season - along with Andy Murray, David Ferrer and Tomas Berdych.

Fish is ranked No. 8; he reached his career-best of No. 7 in August. Before this season, he never had been better than 16th. He went 43-22 in 2011, with one title and two runner-up finishes, and reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon for the first time before losing there to Nadal.

After years of playing in the shadow of former No. 1 Andy Roddick, Fish emerged as the highest-ranked American for the first time.

In 1776, British troops captured Fort Washington in New York during the American Revolution.

In 1885, Canadian rebel leader Louis Riel was executed for high treason.

In 1907, Oklahoma became the 46th state of the union. 1917, Georges Clemenceau again became prime minister of France. In 1933, the United States and the Soviet Union estab-

lished diplomatic relations. In 1959, the Rodgers and Hammerstein musical "The Sound of Music" opened on Broadway.

In 1960, Academy Awardwinning actor Clark Gable died in Los Angeles at age

In 1966, Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard was acquitted in his second trial of murdering his pregnant wife, Marilyn, in 1954.

In 1973, Skylab 4, carrying a crew of three astronauts, was launched from Cape Canaveral on an 84-day mission.

In 1981, the Senate confirmed Dr. C. Everett Koop to be surgeon general. Oscar-winning actor William Holden, 63, was found dead in his Santa Monica, Calif., apartment. On the ABC-TV soap opera "General Hospital," Laura Webber (played by Genie Francis) married Luke Spencer (played by Anthony Geary).

Ten years ago: Investigators found a letter addressed to Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., containing anthrax; it was the second letter bearing the deadly germ known to have been sent to Capitol Hill. A University of Georgia football fan rushing to catch his flight ran past guards and through a passenger exit at Hartsfield Atlanta International Airport, forcing officials to halt flights; the man, Michael Lasseter, was later sentenced to five weekends or ten days in jail and 500 hours of community service.

Five years ago: Democrats embraced Nancy Pelosi as the first woman House speaker in history, but then selected Steny Hoyer as majority leader against her wishes. African, Arab, European and U.N. leaders agreed in principle to a joint African Union-United Nations peacekeeping force for Sudan's Darfur region. Gunmen abducted a private security team of four Americans and an Austrian in southern Iraq. (All five were later slain.) Minnesota Twins' ace Johan Santana won the AL Cy Young Award. Nobel Prize-winning economist Milton Friedman died in San Francisco at age 94.

One year ago: President Barack Obama presented the Medal of Honor to Army Staff Sgt. Salvatore Giunta, the first living service member from the Afghanistan and Iraq wars to receive the nation's top military award. U.S. Rep. Charles Rangel was convicted on 11 of 13 charges related to financial misconduct, prompting fellow lawmakers to censure the 80-year-old New York Democrat. The engagement of Prince William and Kate Middleton was announced in London. Hollywood publicist Ronni Chasen, 64, was shot to death in her Mercedes on Sunset Boulevard. (Police believe the killer was Harold Martin Smith, who took his own life when confronted by officers.) Roy Halladay of the Philadelphia Phillies unanimously won the NL Cy Young Award.
