Fear of Scrutiny Can Silence Sexual-harassment Victims

CHICAGO • Victims of sexual harassment often remain in the shadows for one simple reason: fear.

Fear of accusations becoming public, of having their entire lives scrutinized.

Fear they may be judged uncharitably by people who don't know them.

Examples of those fears were made real as the political scandal engulfing Republican presidential candidate Herman Cain swirled through the media in recent weeks, reminding people who have experienced sexual harassment, along with their attorneys and advocates, how emotionally devastating it can be to step forward.

"It's horrible," said Laura Beth Nielsen, a researcher at the American Bar Foundation and an associate professor of sociology and law at Northwestern University. "I can't tell you how many (accusers) have gone bankrupt, gotten divorced or start (having) drinking or drug-use problems. ... Most people are unprepared for how long it's going to take and the emotional *Please see* **SILENCE, A3**

First-year Teachers Adjust to Life in Their Classrooms

It may be Heidi Shewmaker's first year in her own classroom at Horizon Elementary School, but she's not new to education.

After working at the school for 10 years as a support staff member, she decided to go back to school to become a teacher. She earned a bachelor's degree from Idaho State University's Twin Falls campus.

Shewmaker was able to find a

job as a third grade teacher in Jerome – the district in which she wanted to work.

"I was lucky enough to find a job in a market that's not so great," she said.

Shewmaker is one of four new teachers in Jerome this year. Like many school districts, there's a program to help new teachers.

"We have a good mentoring program where we're paired up with a veteran teacher," Shewmaker said. They're required to meet at least once a week to talk about curriculum and student assessments.

"The mentor is also very good with answering any questions I have with my planning," she said.

At many Magic Valley school districts, first-year teachers receive guidance from veteran teachers.

There are 17 first-year teachers in the Twin Falls School District and Associate Superintendent Patti O'Dell says that's a typical number.

"It's our goal to get them off to a great start and retain them in our district," she said.

A retired teacher is assigned to mentor each new teacher. They provide emotional support and help with common teaching practices such as parent-teacher conferences and setting up a classroom.

Instructional coaches – as well as grade level and department teams – also help new teachers.

CHOBANI HITS COUNCIL AGENDA AGAIN TODAY

The business of Greek yogurt continues today in the Twin Falls City Council.

Once again, the council has an agenda that continues the work of bringing in yogurt manufacturer Chobani to Twin Falls, a company that will hire 400 people at its production plant. The council meets at 5 p.m. today in Council Chambers, 305 Third Ave. E., Twin Falls. The redevelopment deal between the city and Chobani's parent company, New York-based Agro Farma, was approved Nov. 3.

That was the main hurdle, but procedural steps and planning work still remain.

Here are the details of what the council will consider:

• A resolution that's needed for the

Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency to acquire the 190-acre site at the southwest corner of the intersection of Kimberly Road and 3300 East Road, which will be used for the yogurt plant. Under the terms of the already-inked redevelopment agreement, the URA will resell the land to Agro Farma. The company's investment into its Twin Falls plant is required to be at least \$128 million.

The land is being paid for with \$4.29 million in urban renewal district funding. Urban renewal districts get their money primarily through tax-increment financing, which allows them to collect any increase in assessed property tax value within their boundaries and use the dollars as incentives for developers. The mechanism means that instead of those additional property tax revenues going to tax districts, *Please see* **COUNCIL, A**2

CSI Trustees to Decide on Design Contract for New Building

The College of Southern Idaho is kicking off a project to bring its technology programs under the same roof.

College trustees are expected to select an architectural firm for the design phase of the Applied Technology and Innovation Center project during today's board meeting. Vice President of Administration Mike Mason said the college went through an architect selection process and is recommending approval of a \$485,000 contract with Boise-based Lombard Conrad Architects.

The 29,600-square-foot center will include the wind energy, manufacturing technology, environmental technology, and heating/ ventilation/air conditioning technology programs, and possibly drafting.

Construction is scheduled to begin this summer.

"We hope to start in midto-late July and break ground," Mason said. "It will be about a one-year project."

There's about \$6.6 million budgeted for the new center. The college will pay \$2.2 million, while the other \$4.4 million will come from a federal grant CSI was awarded earlier this year.

Conrad Architects, it would include design services and LEED certification. The Leadership in Energy and **Environment Design status** is an energy efficiency recognition given by the U.S. Green Building Council.

The Applied Technology and Innovation Center would be the second building on campus to gain such certification. The Health Sciences & Human Services Building received "gold" certification – the second highest status when it was completed last year.

they are diverted to pay for infrastructure needs tied to development.

The \$4.29 million is one piece of the \$17.15 million in urban renewal dollars that are helping the project, with the remaining money covering infrastructure.

The company plans to start construction by the end of the year and begin production in mid-2012.

In other business: • The council will





"Instructional coaches provide support to all teachers in the district, but pay particular attention to new teachers," O'Dell said.

In Kimberly, all new teachers participate in a mentoring program, even if it's not their first time in a classroom.

"We mentor all teachers who are new to our district even if they've taught for a number of years," Superintendent Kathleen Noh said.

Mentor teachers receive a stipend for meeting with a new teacher before or after school, as well as during planning periods.

Brett Welch, a first-year Algebra II teacher at Kimberly High School, said his mentor teacher is in a neighboring classroom.

"We meet once a month to see how things are going," he said.

Last month, the district set up a substitute for Welch's classes and let him observe other teachers' classes in the district.

"That was a big benefit for us," he said. His mentor teacher has also observed his classes and given pointers.

The Buhl School District also pairs veteran teachers with first-year teachers. The majority of the six new teachers this year are at Popplewell Elementary School.

Principal Ron Anthony said a few are from the East Coast. Since there aren't many teaching jobs available around the country, he said, people are more willing to look further away from home.

"The job market for new teachers is tough," he said.

During the first few months in their own classroom, first-year teachers face both challenging and rewarding experiences.

Sara Toledo, a first-year English as a Second Language teacher at Canyon Ridge High School, said it's a challenge adapting to her students' changing needs.

"The curriculum is always changing with the students," she said.

Toledo said her students are "wonderful" - it's just difficult not having years of experience to rely upon when a new situation arises.

"I think we all know what we should be doing," she said. "It's about how we can put that into action on our own."

For Shewmaker, the first challenge "was being in the classroom full time and being in charge of all my students," she said.

toll it's going to have?"

Sexual harassment complaints often take years to end, result in small compensation payments and leave the reputations of the accuser and the accused scarred. Attorneys say many cases are settled early in the process for a few thousand dollars, and a 2004 bar foundation study found that once employment discrimination cases get to court, they were settled for an average of \$30,000.

"Even if they win, they feel like they've lost," Nielsen said. "Some say, 'I'm glad I made the point that they couldn't do that? But by and large, they feel pretty chewed up and spit out by the justice system."

Twenty years after Anita Hill's sexual harassment claim against Supreme Court nominee Clarence Thomas brought the issue out in the open, multiple allegations of inappropriate workplace behavior by Cain have reignited a national discussion of the problem.

Cain has denied sexually harassing anyone. But since news broke that two sexual harassment claims against Cain were settled while he was president of the National experienced gut-wrenching sexual harassment in a small central Illinois town.

Lockard was the treasurer of First Baptist Church in Canton. She accused the pastor of harassing her starting in 2003 by, among other things, making sexual remarks, massaging her shoulders without her permission and informing her that the office dress code required her to wear halter tops and miniskirts. She also alleged that the church tried to cover up the situation, then terminated her position when she took her complaints to board members.

Lockard's case dragged on for six years before she ultimately got satisfaction when the state's Human Rights Commission awarded her about \$63,000 in September 2009. But the emotional toll was immense.

In such a small community, it was difficult to be anonymous. At the supermarket, she would run into acquaintances who would turn around and go the other way. People called her a liar and accused her of destroying the church. They wrote letters to the editor of the local paper questioning her character and motives.

"It did hurt to read those letters," Lockard said. "You weren't even there? But people just don't want to believe this stuff goes on." An analysis of statistics from the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commis-

sion shows that the number of sexual harassment complaints filed nationally has gone down by 26 percent since 1997. Last year, 11,717 cases were filed.

Experts believe there are two primary reasons for the drop. One is increased workplace education. Another is simply a desire by both sides to resolve the issue and avoid the emotional toll that comes with litigation.

Attorney Joan Eagle and Zev Eigen, an assistant professor of law at Northwestern University, have each represented defendants in sexual harassment suits. They said accusations can wreak havoc on the lives of those falsely accused. Long after a case is settled, the accused must live with co-workers and family members wondering if there's any substance to the claims.

The attorneys said some cases are baseless attempts to get money out of employers sometimes small payouts are issued to make cases like that go away, demonstrating how a settlement is no proof of guilt. However, Eagle said, repeated settlements may hide a wonder how people can say serial harasser behind confidentiality clauses that prevent an airing of the issues. her job in telephone sales at International Profit Associates, a Buffalo Grove consulting business known as IPA that agreed last year to pay \$8 million to settle a class-action suit brought by the EEOC. "It was like walking into

hell," said Mastro, 49, one of 81 women in the class when the parties settled.

The suit alleged that women were regularly propositioned, offered money for sex, groped, slapped, pinched and subjected to attempted rape. The company admitted last year in court filings that it had engaged in "an unlawful pattern or practice of tolerating sexual harassment" for nearly eight years.

Mastro said the experience left her traumatized.

"It was to the point where . as I approached the parking lot, my hands would visibly shake," she said.

She said she stayed because she needed the money, but after 10 months, "I couldn't stand anymore?

She didn't file a complaint while at the company but later became part of the lawsuit, which was filed in 2001. That suit stretched out nearly 10 years, preventing her from put ting the experience behind her.

When a lawyer called to tell her the case had been settled for \$8 million, she said, "I broke out in tears, because I didn't think it was enough" to punish the company.



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Restaurant Association, at least two other women have come forward with similar allegations.

A number of conservative pundits have painted Cain as the victim of a smear campaign, and the female accusers who have been identified have had their backgrounds and personal lives scoured by the Cain campaign and the media.

On Wednesday, one of the women who received a settlement from the restaurant association, Karen Kraushaar, told The New York Times: "Anyone should be able to report allegations of sexual harassment without fear that their lives and careers will be put on public display and laid open to public scrutiny."

Though never caught in a publicity whirlwind the likes of which Cain's accusers have seen, Cheryl Lockard said she

Stewart Wins NASCAR Championship

HOMESTEAD, Fla. • Tony Stewart insisted he wasn't a title contender when NASCAR's championship race began.

When it became clear he actually was a viable threat, he kicked it into another gear and vowed to go for broke in his pursuit of Carl Edwards.

Did he ever.

Stewart used a powerful and relentless drive - some might suggest the best in NASCAR history - on Sunday in the season finale to seize his third NASCAR championship. He overcame a hole in the grill of his Chevrolet, a rain delay, used

debatable fuel strategy and made 118 passes on the track to win at Homestead-Miami Speedway.

That shows how bad I wanted to win this thing," Stewart said. "When you're going for a championship, you can't hold anything back. I couldn't leave anything on the table."



SEC West Dominates New BCS Standings

Playoff Would Increase Drama the BCS Curtails

Those who try to pass off the BCS as the best thing for college football will use the latest wild and riveting weekend of upsets and dramatic finishes as an example of why a playoff is a bad thing.

"Every game counts," is the slogan BCS Executive Director Bill Hancock likes to work into the Bowl Championship Series press releases.

If there was a playoff, he and his followers argue, the tension-filled games that resulted in Oklahoma State, Oregon and Oklahoma getting kicked to the back of the queue in the national championship race wouldn't be nearly as exciting.

Don't believe them. More than anything, this season is proving that the regular season is by no means a playoff – Alabama wasn't eliminated by losing to LSU, and Oklahoma State wasn't eliminated by falling at Iowa State - and having a real one would only increase Alabama, Arkansas, Stanford, Oklahoma State and Virginia Tech - have a shot to reach the BCS national championship game Jan. 9 in New Orleans.

Sorry, Boise State and Houston, you have no real shot, and that alone should be enough to make you want a playoff.

During the final two weeks of the season, the only games with national championship implications involve those six teams - sort of. In reality, as long as LSU and Alabama take care of business, the rest are moot, too.

The Big Ten might as well not even exist (SEC fans' dream). Same goes for the Big East (yes, the Big East still exists).

How much more interesting would the scramble for the Big East crown be if there was a long-shot chance to make a national championship run – or at least to pull a playoff upset – waiting for the winner?

The argument against a playoff is that it would lessen

LSU-Alabama Round 2 is just a few victories away.

A weekend filled with upsets left the Southeastern Conference rivals in the top two spots in the BCS standings released Sunday.

And Arkansas is third, further increasing the possibility of an all-SEC BCS championship game Jan. 9 in New

Orleans that would be a rematch of a regular-season game.

It's the first time in the 14-year history of the BCS that the same conference had to top three teams in the standings.

If the Tigers can beat Arkansas on Saturday, then Georgia in the SEC title game Dec. 3, and the Crimson Tide beats Auburn on Saturday, it's almost a lock that LSU-Alabama will play again, this time at the Superdome.

LSU beat Alabama 9-6 in overtime Nov. 6 in Tuscaloosa.

Oklahoma State, which suffered the most surprising loss of the weekend, fell to fourth place. The Cowboys were unbeaten and second in the BCS standings, but were upset 37-31 in double overtime at Iowa State on Friday night. "You just never know what to expect

any more with what happens every Saturday," Oklahoma State coach Mike Gundy said.

Still, Oklahoma State is not out of it. The Cowboys just need some help from Please see BCS, S3 the fun.

There are arguments to be made against the BCS beyond the fact that it's an unsatisfying way to crown a champion.

But we'll leave the not-atall-small matter of whether the Bowl Championship Series is a legal and ethical way for major college football to conduct its multibillion dollar business for another time. There are intriguing arguments on both sides and at some point antitrust attorneys might have to make those in a courtroom.

We'll concentrate on the competition.

Heading into the final two weeks of the season there are eight teams with either zero or one loss in major college football. Of those teams, it's safe to say that six - LSU,

the importance of games such as Iowa State's 37-31 double OT upset over Oklahoma State, which was two victories away from playing for the BCS title before stumbling in Ames.

Maybe it would, but wouldn't that be more than made up by the fact that additional teams would be alive in the national championship chase as the season winds down?

Everybody who is so convinced that Alabama and LSU are the two best teams - and they sure do look the part - probably thought Boise State had no shot to beat Oklahoma in the 2007 Fiesta Bowl.

Rodgers' Late TD Helps Packers Beat Bucs 35-26

GREEN BAY, Wis. • Aaron Rodgers missed a few more throws than he usually does, and even threw an interception with the game still in doubt.

He just wasn't at his best against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sunday - until he absolutely had to be.

With the Packers clinging to a two-point lead and trying to fend off a late rally, Rodgers threw a 40-yard touchdown to Jordy Nelson with 2:55 left and the Packers survived a scare from the Buccaneers for a 35-26 victory.

With a 10-0 record going into a Thanksgiving Day game at Detroit, the Packers remain perfect, even if their quarterback walked away expecting much more from himself. Rodgers threw for 299 vards with three touchdowns, including a pair to Nelson, but wasn't happy with the way he played.

"I'm just frustrated," Rodgers said. "I didn't throw the ball very well. I'm not trying to be ridiculously humble right now, I'm just frustrated. The ball wasn't coming out the way I wanted it to today?"

The Packers' defense also had trouble stopping quarterback Josh Freeman and tackling running back LeGarrette Blount, giving Packers coach Mike McCarthy plenty of mistakes to point out going into what will be a much-hyped matchup with the Lions.

"I think it was great for us," McCarthy said. "Adversity is awesome. We're getting ready to play a big game on national TV on Thanksgiving, and adversity (offers) healthy situations to learn from. Especially when you overcome it."

Freeman threw for 342 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions for the Buccaneers (4-6), who have lost four straight but didn't back down against the reigning Super Bowl champions.

Blount had 107 yards rushing for Tampa Bay, including a rambling 54-yard touchdown run in the second quarter where he broke at least six tackles.

Tampa Bay was penalized nine times for 55 yards, but Buccaneers coach Raheem Morris wasn't using it as an excuse.

"Penalties are what they are, they are judgment calls and the judgment went against us a lot of times," Morris said. "It is what it is"

The victory moved the Ravens into a first place tie with Pittsburgh, but Baltimore is 2-0 against the Steelers and holds the tiebreaker advantage.


Bengals rookie quarterback Andy Dalton threw for 373 yards but was intercepted three times.

Atlanta jumped ahead on Matt Ryan's 17yard TD pass to Tony Gonzalez and was up 20-3 in the third quarter after Michael Turner scored on a 4-yard run.

Hasselbeck went out with a sprained elbow and Locker nearly led an improbable comeback. The rookie threw for 140 yards after taking over late in the third quarter.

COWBOYS 27, REDSKINS 24 OT

LANDOVER, Md. • Dan Bailey kicked a 39yard field goal 9:21 into overtime to give Dallas its third straight win.

The Cowboys rallied after allowing a late fourth-quarter touchdown and improved to 6-4, keeping the pressure on the first-place New York Giants in the NFC East.

The Redskins lost their sixth straight, their longest skid since their 0-7 start in 1998. They sent the game to overtime on Rex Grossman's 4-yard fade pass to Donte' Stallworth with 14 seconds remaining in regulation.



THEIR VIEW *Five Myths About Student Loans*

ere are five popular myths about student loans: 1. Forgiving student loan debt would help stimulate the economy.

People who want all student loan debt forgiven argue that getting rid of monthly loan payments would lead to increased consumer spending, thereby providing a quick boost to the struggling U.S. economy. However, only about 40 percent of all outstanding student loan debt is actively being repaid. The remaining borrowers are still in school or otherwise not paying their loans back, so they wouldn't immediately benefit from forgiveness.

And a "forgiveness stimulus" would have a limited impact. According to my calculations based on data from the Education Department's Direct Loan Program, annual payments and default collections total about 5.6 percent of these outstanding direct loans. If this proportion is similar for other kinds of education debt, then forgiving the nearly \$1 trillion in outstanding student debt would inject at most \$56 billion per year.

2. All education debt is good debt.

Certainly, taking out loans to pay for college is an investment in your future and a key to a better-paying job. So it's good debt. But too much of a good thing can be bad for you.

Students who graduate with high debt often must abandon certain career aspirations. I've spoken to hundreds of borrowers who are behind on their student loans, and they tell me they have delayed major life events, such as buying a car or a home, getting married, having children, or saving for their children's college education or for retirement. According to a recent survev by Monster Learning, about a third of recent col-

York state case more than 20 years ago. It requires that the borrower cannot maintain a minimal standard of living while repaying the loans, that the circumstances that prevent repayment will probably persist for most of the life of the loans and that the borrower made a good-faith effort to repay the loans. In the words of one bankruptcy judge, a successful undue hardship petition requires a "certainty of hopelessness?"

According to the Educational Credit Management Corp., a guarantee agency that manages the student loans of federal borrowers with an active bankruptcy filing, about 72,000 federal student loan borrowers filed for bankruptcy in 2008, but only 29 succeeded in obtaining a full or partial discharge of their loans. That's 0.04 percent. You're more likely to die of cancer or in a car crash than to have your loans discharged in bankruptcy.

4. Widespread defaults on federal student loans would worsen the government's deficit.

Some people argue that the student loan "bubble" could be the next to pop. Yet despite the recent increase in default rates to nearly 9 percent, federal education loans remain profitable for the government.

And the government has strong powers to compel repayment on defaulted loans. For example, it can garnish up to 15 percent of take-home pay without a court order for a borrower who is 12 months behind on student loan payments. The government can also intercept federal and state income tax refunds and lottery winnings, and offset up to 15 percent of Social Security disability and retirement benefit payments

State Charges Buhl Man with 'Mayhem' for Alleged Ear-biting

Miller was being held at Twin Falls County Jail for an alleged probation violation when the Worstells' complaint was filed. He was convicted of misdemeanor battery charges in June. Miller refused to talk to police about the new allegations. The state has charged Miller with aggravated assault for allegedly causing Larson's concussion and mayhem for allegedly biting off James Worstell's ear. Miller is held on \$50,000 bond.

Police Burn Protest Tents to Clear Cairo's **Tahrir Square**

CAIRO • Egyptian soldiers and police set fire to protest tents in Cairo's Tahrir Square and fired tear gas and rubber bullets in a major assault Sunday to drive out thousands demanding that the military rulers quickly transfer power to a civilian government. At least 11 protesters were killed and hundreds were injured.

It was the second day of clashes marking a sharp escalation of tensions on Egypt's streets a week before the first elections since the ouster of longtime authoritarian leader Hosni Mubarak in February. The military took over the country, promising a swift transition to civilian rule. But the pro-democracy protesters who led the uprising have grown increasingly angry with the ruling generals, and suspect they are trying to cling to power even after an elected parliament is seated and a new president is voted in.

Street battles continued throughout the day and long into the night, spreading to side streets and sending a wave of injuries to makeshift clinics on the streets.

The military-backed Cabinet said in a statement that elections set to begin on Nov. 28 would take place on time and thanked the police for their "restraint," language that is likely to enrage the protesters even more.

"We're not going anywhere," protester Mohammed Radwan said after security forces tried unsuccessfully to push the crowds out of Tahrir, the epicenter of the uprising. "The mood is

In the capital, Information Minister Mahmoud Shammam said ex-Intelligence Minister Abdullah al-Senoussi was captured alive on Sunday by revolutionary fighters from a southern region called Fazan, not far from where Gadhafi's son was seized on Saturday while trying to flee to neighboring Niger.

Fighters tracking al-Senoussi for two days caught up with him at his

The two days of clashes were some of the worst since the uprising ended on Feb. 11.

NYC MAYOR: AL-QAIDA SYMPATHIZER ARRESTI

NEW YORK • An "al-Qaida sympathizer" accused of plotting to bomb police and post offices in New York City as well as U.S. troops returning home has been arrested on numerous terrorism-related charges.

Mayor Michael Bloomberg announced at a news conference Sunday the arrest of Jose Pimentel of Manhattan, "a 27year-old al-Qaida sympathizer" who the mayor said was motivated by terrorist propaganda and resentment of U.S. troops in Afghanistan and Iraq

"He appears to be a total lone wolf. He was not part of a larger conspiracy emanating from abroad."

New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg

Police Commissioner Raymond Kelly said police had to move quickly to arrest Pimentel on Saturday because he was ready to carry out his plan.

"We had to act quickly yesterday because he was in fact putting this bomb together. He was drilling holes and it would have been not appropriate for us to let him walk out the door with that bomb," Kelly said.

The police commissioner said Pimentel was energized and motivated to carry out his plan by the Sept. 30 killing of al-Qaida's U.S.-born cleric Anwar al-Awlaki.

"He decided to build the bomb August of this year, but clearly he jacked up his speed after the elimination of al-Awlaki," Kelly said.

Ten years after 9/11, New York remains a prime terror ism target. Bloomberg said at least 13 terrorist plots have

targeted the city since the Sept. 11 attacks. No attack has been successful. Pakistani immigrant Faisal Shahzad is serving a life sentence for trying to detonate a car bomb in Times Square in May 2010.

Pimentel, a U.S. citizen originally from the Dominican Republic, Pimentel was "plotting to bomb police patrol cars and also postal facilities as well as targeted members of our armed services returning from abroad," Bloomberg said Sunday.

2013, according to the Congressional Budget Office. This action, called a "sequester," would also generate \$169 billion in savings from lower interest costs on the national debt.

Defense Secretary Leon Panetta says the required cuts of up to \$454 billion to the Pentagon would be "devastating" and leave a "hollow force." Defense hawks of Capitol Hill promise they won't allow them to be that deep.

But that effort will be complicated by the insistence of other lawmakers that the overall amount of the budget cuts be left in place.

"I can't imagine that, knowing of the importance of national defense, that both Democrats and Republicans wouldn't find a way to work through that process so we still get the \$1.2 trillion in cuts, but it doesn't all fall on defense," said supercommittee Republican Sen. Jon Kyl of Arizona.

The panel's failure also sets up a fight within a battleweary, dysfunctional Congress over renewing a payroll tax cut and jobless benefits

for the long-term unemployed, both of which are set to expire at the end of the year. Both proposals are part of President Barack Obama's \$447 billion jobs plan.

Extending the current 2 percentage point payroll tax cut isn't a popular idea with many Republicans, but allowing it to expire could harm the economy, economists say. So too would a cutoff of unemployment benefits averaging about \$300 a week to millions of people who have been out of work for more than six months.

Serious negotiations ended Friday after Democrats rejected a \$644 billion offer comprised of \$543 billion in spending cuts, fees and other non-tax revenue, as well as \$3 billion in tax revenue from closing a special tax break for corporate purchases of private jets. It also assumed \$98 billion in reduced interest costs.

Officials familiar with the offer said it would save the government \$121 billion by requiring federal civilian workers to contribute more to their pension plans, shave \$23 billion from farm and nutrition programs and generate \$15 billion from new auctions of broadcast spec-

trum to wireless companies. Democrats said the plan was unbalanced because it included barely any tax revenue.

"Our Democratic friends are unable to cut even a dollar in spending without saying it has to be accompanied by tax increases," Kyl said.

On Saturday, Sen. Rob Portman floated an even smaller plan, said a lawmaker directly familiar with the panel's work. It, too, was rejected. The lawmaker required anonymity because of the secrecy of the talks.

The committee faces a Wednesday deadline. But members would have to agree on the outlines of a package by Monday to allow time for drafting and assessing by the Congressional Budget Office.

Over the past couple of weeks, the two sides have made a variety of offers and counter-offers, starting with a more than \$3 trillion plan from Democrats that would have increased tax revenues by \$1.3 trillion in exchange for further cuts in agency budgets, a change in the measure used to calculate cost-of-living increases for Social Security beneficiaries, and curbs on the growth of Medicare and Medicaid.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

This week's deals mark the fact that the Fall Nationals are taking place right now in Seattle. They all come from last year's championships in Orlando.

Robb Gordon, an expert who plays with his wife in most of the major championships, read the cards beautifully in this deal from the second final session of the Mitchell Open Board-a-Match Teams. At Board-a-Match the scoring is closer to that of pairs — all that matters is that you beat your opponents' result against your teammates. How much you beat them by is irrelevant.

Gordon was South, and when the opponents bid and raised clubs, Gordon placed his partner with a singleton, so bid on to five hearts. After the club lead, he ruffed the second round of diamonds and successfully handled the trumps by leading the king. When the queen appeared, no finesse was necessary. Then he played the spade ace and was delighted to see the 10 fall. Next he led a spade to dummy's nine for an impressive plus 650. What a waste!

The reason is that Gordon's teammates had "sacrificed" in six clubs, and when the defenders did not take both aces, but instead tried to cash two spades, declarer could draw trump and negotiate the diamond queen to pitch all three of dummy's heart losers. Now he could take a ruff in dummy for the 12th trick. Plus 1540 was the winning score for East-West, as was 650 for North-South.

Only a strong sequence in another suit would make you feel different and you do not have that. The club five looks right — giving count may be more important than showing honors.
