## ISP Awards Trooper Shot in July Standoff

Nick Walker was honored by colleagues in law enforcement for his involvement in the apprehension of an accused killer.

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**JEROME** • Idaho State Police Trooper Nick Walker survived the hell of war in Iraq during his 12-month tour in 2004-05. So the former Marine showed no hesitation in chasing down a suspected

killer when the man allegedly took an innocent woman hostage in the stairwell of a Twin Falls hotel. Without a confirmed description of the suspect, Clark Cleveland, Walker and other officers took to the stairwell, making it to the second-floor landing before bullets rained down on them.

Walker was hit in the right thigh as Cleveland allegedly emptied the clip of a .22-caliber pistol on the officers below. For his bravery beyond suffering a bullet wound, ISP presented Walker with its Purple Heart award. A 22-year veteran of the state police, Cpl. Steve Walker, handed his son the award during the Monday ceremony at ISP's Region 4 headquarters in Jerome. Please see **TROOPER, A2**

## New Wendell School on Track for Completion Next Year

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**WENDELL** • Nestled next to Wendell Elementary School, a new school building is starting to take shape. A tall gym roof towers above a fenced construction area visible from the town's main road — North Idaho Street. Exterior brick walls are going up, with spots marked where windows will be installed. Crews broke ground this summer on the approximately 60,000-square-foot facility, which will re-

place the current elementary school. Phase I of the project — all but six of 27 planned classrooms — is scheduled for completion in June. "All in all, everything is pretty close to where it needs to be," said job site supervisor Larry Pollard, who works for Starr Corp., the project's construction manager. Crews are working to get roofing and masonry done before the worst of the winter weather hits.

By the beginning of June, elementary school employees will begin moving into the building. Most of the old elementary school buildings will be demolished in the summer. Superintendent Greg Lowe said most students will be in the new building at the start of next school year. However, Phase II of the project — the remaining six classrooms — won't finish Please see **WENDELL, A2**

## Twin Falls URA Cleared to Purchase Chobani Site

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In just 30 minutes Monday, the Twin Falls City Council approved two more items required to bring Greek yogurt maker Chobani to town. Then, completing some minor business as well, the council adjourned for the week — so quickly that Mayor Don Hall felt the need to reassure his audience that the council had done its due diligence. The lack of questions and debate at the meeting was simply because council members have discussed the Chobani deal plenty already, he said. The company plans to start construction on a Twin Falls plant by the end of the year, and start producing its Greek yogurt there in mid-2012. Here's what the council approved with 6-0 votes: • A resolution necessary for the Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency to acquire the 190-acre site for the Chobani plant at the southwest corner of the intersection of Kimberly Road and 3300 East Road. 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# Judge Grants Injunction in Oasis Liquor License Case

Judge Jonathan Brody ruled last week that the state Alcohol Beverage Control agency may not transfer or re-issue the liquor license held by The Oasis bar of Twin Falls.

Bar owner Rick Carr filed a civil suit against ABC this fall in an attempt to have the bar's seized license returned. According to Carr, mismanagement of the business while he was living in Nevada led to the license's loss. He said a

now-fired business partner wrote a bad check for the annual renewal fee and he never saw a letter from the agency notifying him of the error.

Carr's request for an injunction also asked for the ability to serve alcohol while the case is pending, but Brody balked at that in his written ruling, noting it is "an exercise of power this court does not have."

No further hearings are set in the matter, but the case is still active.

# Judge Grants Reduced Bond for Alleged Child Molester

Steven Virgil Anderson, who is accused of sexually assaulting four girls, recently won a motion to have his bond reduced to \$100,000 from \$500,000, according to court records.

Twin Falls County 5th District Judge Randy Stoker approved the reduction on Nov. 16, under the conditions that Anderson be tracked by court compliance officers with Twin Falls County Probation. If he makes bail, he will be

monitored via ankle bracelet and may not leave the county. He also may not have contact with minors.

The Twin Falls County grand jury handed down 11 indictments against Anderson on Nov. 2, accusing him of molesting four girls, all under the age of 13. One count is for witness intimidation, as he allegedly threatened one of the girls against speaking out against him.

His trial is scheduled for late February.

# Calvillo, Sentenced for Sex Crimes, Again Seeks New Trial

Judgment finally came nearly a year after Valentin Calvillo was convicted of eight felony sex crimes.

Twin Falls County 5th District Judge G. Richard Bevan on Friday ordered Calvillo to serve 30 years in state prison with the possibility for parole after 15. A jury convicted Calvillo on eight of nine counts of lewd conduct and sexual abuse of a minor on Nov. 19, 2010.

His sentencing was delayed so long because Calvillo, 50, skipped his trial after showing up the first few days. The jury proceeded to convict him, despite his reported flight to Mexico.

Upon his return to the U.S. months later, Calvillo

petitioned for a new trial, arguing he misunderstood instructions from his defense counsel when he was told to leave and seek medical treatment about midway through the trial. He was scheduled to testify in his defense the day he allegedly fell ill.

With a new attorney, he unsuccessfully argued for a new trial during the summer and fall. Bevan ruled against it in September.

However, in a handwritten motion filed Thursday, Calvillo is again seeking a new trial, claiming "new evidence has come to light through witness testimony."

Further details on the supposed testimony were not given. As of Monday, Bevan had not ruled on the latest request.

# RUPERT MAN RECOVERING AFTER THURSDAY ELECTROCUTION

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**RUPERT** • A Rupert man who was electrocuted Thursday while hanging Christmas lights at the Idaho Youth Ranch is recovering in a Utah hospital.

According to Youth Ranch staff, Terry Ralph Short, 66, came through surgery well and was in stable condition Monday at the University of Utah's Burn Center in Salt Lake City.

The shock left him unconscious but breathing at 1275

N. 400 E. near Rupert, according to a report from the Minidoka County Sheriff's Office.

According to the report, Short, who is the maintenance man at the Youth Ranch, was lying on the grass when deputies arrived. Scott Yates, of Burley, who owns a bucket truck, was helping Short when he was shocked.

Yates told deputies he was in the bucket of the truck, about 30 feet off the ground, while Short held a string of lights that was connected to

another string in the tree. Yates said a gust of wind blew the hanging string of lights into nearby power lines, which sparked. When he looked down, Yates saw Short lying on the ground.

He told deputies that he had moved the truck after the incident.

According to the report, one of the light strings in the tree was burned and severed, while small pieces of wire and light cases littered the nearby grass. A second string of lights on the ground was also burned.

until next November or December. Students in those rooms will move into the new building mid-year.

Last year, Wendell voters approved a \$9.8 million bond to construct the new elementary school.

Lowe said the timing was right for the project: the last payment was recently made on a bond that paid for Wendell High School in the 1990s.

Elementary School Principal Kevin Rogers said there's a "huge need" for a new elementary school building.

"It will be nice to spread out and have room," he said.

The elementary school is currently in nine buildings — six portables and three made of brick. The oldest was constructed in the early 1960s, while the modular classrooms appeared about 25 years ago.

The scattered layout poses some security challenges.

"There are so many doors in and out of campus," Rogers said.

The school district's enrollment has also increased the past two years and there's a need for more space. Currently, the elementary buildings house about 510 students in preschool through the fourth grade.

The new facility will also

include features the current campus doesn't: parking spots, a bus lane and a gym.

The main entrance to the school will be on Boise Street, between Second and Third avenues.

Lowe said district administrators are also thinking about which forms of technology to include in the new building.

The 26-year-old, who comes from a family of lawmen, downplayed his actions on that July day.

"I know this is a big deal, but it's not anything compared to what I've been through," Nick Walker said. "It's probably weird coming from someone who's been shot, but it could have been a lot worse."

It's also the statement of a man who carries a constant reminder of the hotel siege, as Walker elected to not have the bullet surgically removed.

Walker can't reveal much more about what happened in that stairwell due to the ongoing prosecution of Cleveland. He did, however, credit fellow officers — no matter which agency they represented — who put themselves in harm's way as much as he did. In particular, he singled out Twin Falls Police Officer J.P. O'Donnell, who pulled Walker out of the gunfire and to safety.

"A lot of brave guys were in there," Walker said. "J.P. O'Donnell brought me into the parking lot. He scooped me up, threw me in the back of the car and drove that patrol car as fast it would go to the emergency room. I think pretty highly of him."

Within a few hours of Walker's shooting, Cleveland surrendered.

Once at the hospital, Walker discussed his options with a surgeon, deciding that removal of the bullet would hinder a speedy path to recovery. Walker was interested in getting back on the beat as quickly as possible. He was able to recuperate rather quickly, despite having a chunk of lead buried in his thigh muscle. As a Marine and police officer, he's in better shape than most other people and barreled through his physical therapy.

"He's really been blessed," said Walker's wife, Abbie.

In total, Walker was off duty for barely a month before returning to light duty, such as weapons inspection. Two months from the day he was shot, Sept. 15, he returned to patrol.

The award ceremony was attended by many of the agencies that responded on July 15, once again assembling what ISP Region 4 Capt. Rob Storm called "the thin blue line" of law enforcement. Monday's event was supposed to be a surprise for Walker, and he played along as much as possible, hoping not to spoil it for everyone else.

"I wouldn't be a very good cop if I didn't know something was coming down the way," he said. "I knew a little something."

# The Case against Cleveland

**The suspect:** Clark Jackson Cleveland, 26, of Spring Creek, Nev.

**The charges:** First-degree murder, aggravated assault or battery on certain personnel with a deadly weapon (eight counts), aggravated assault, second-degree kidnapping, eluding an officer.

**The accusation:** Cleveland allegedly shot and killed 43-year-old Utah resident Tracy Ivie on July 15, as he stormed the Hampton Inn in northwest Twin Falls. Cleveland was said to be fleeing an attempted traffic stop along U.S. Highway 30 that morning. Cleveland is also accused of taking Sharon Knudsen hostage and barricading himself in the hotel stairwell, where police say he shot Idaho State Police Trooper Nick Walker. Cleveland gave himself up within hours of the beginning of the standoff.

**The next hearing:** Cleveland is scheduled for a January jury trial in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

agreement requires the URA to re-sell the land to Agro Farma, the New York-based parent company of Chobani.

The company is expected to close on the land next week, said City Manager Travis Rothweiler.

The land is being paid for with \$4.29 million from the URA. Urban renewal districts get their money primarily through tax-increment financing, which allows them to collect any increase in assessed property tax value within their boundaries and use the dollars as incentives for developers.

In this case, the URA will recoup its costs from Chobani, taking a slice of the increased property tax revenues generated by the improvements at the plant.

• A request that puts in place a contract with J-U-B Engineers for professional services needed to design water system improvements along Kimberly Road. Also tied to Chobani, the project will stretch from Eastland Drive to Hankins Road and be paid for with \$2.5 million from the URA.

The design portion of the project is estimated at about \$248,000, said City Engineer Jackie Fields.

Councilman Lance Clow said the improvements could potentially serve others in the future in that portion of southeast Twin Falls besides Chobani.

Councilman Will Kezele was absent.

Firefighters handle this and other fires by donning protective gear and approaching it from less dangerous directions, among other steps, he said. “A garage or a shop fire can be one of the more dangerous things we respond to,” he said.**

FEDERAL GRAND JURY INDICTS BURLEY MAN ON WEAPONS CHARGES

A federal grand jury has indicted 55-year-old Burley resident Carlos G. Paladini on two counts of unlawful possession of a firearm. He has pleaded not guilty and faces a January trial in U.S. District Court in Boise. According to the indictment, prosecutors seek a conviction against Paladini and forfeiture of five specific firearms: a Smith & Wesson 28 Highway Patrolman .357 Magnum revolver, a Star Firestar 9mm semiautomatic pistol, a Hi-Point Model C 9mm semiautomatic pistol, a Bryco Model 38 .380-caliber semiautomatic pistol, and a Fabrique D’Armes De Guerre De Precision .45-caliber semiautomatic pistol. The indictment was handed down on Nov. 9.

Paladini was initially charged by Twin Falls Prosecutor Grant Loeb on felony drug and weapons charges. Loeb dismissed the state’s charges prior to Paladini’s preliminary hearing. The federal indictment makes no mention of drugs, but the state’s criminal complaint had levied the charge of possession of methamphetamine with the intent to deliver. Paladini was arrested in late September, and a search of a residence near Hansen allegedly turned up meth, handguns and rifles. Paladini told investigators he often accepted weapons as payment for meth, according to the police affidavit. The Burley man is now in custody of the U.S. Marshals Service.

Twin Falls Boy Expected to Recover after Being Hit by Car

Police responded Monday to a traffic accident in which a 16-year-old boy was struck by a car and injured on Pheasant Road West in southern Twin Falls.

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RUPERT GIRL FOUND AFTER SIX-HOUR SEARCH

**RUPERT** • A 10-year-old girl’s Monday disappearance from a Rupert day-treatment school touched off a six-hour search. The girl, whom neither police nor school officials identified Monday, was returned safely to her home. She left the Minidoka County School District Service Center in Rupert shortly after she was dropped off by a bus in the morning. District Superintendent Scott Rogers said about 70 people, including 36 from the school district, were involved in the search. The girl was found about 10 miles outside Rupert, near her home. “She had been hiding out in town and apparently got a ride part of the way,” Rogers said. Rogers said the girl and her family will face consequences for her actions, including a possible status offense and possible financial restitution for the search. “It was a really quick response by the community and my hats are off to all the volunteers who were working at other jobs,” Rogers said. Rogers said the girl and her family will be offered extra counseling and the girl will be under line-of-sight restrictions at the school.

# Case of Accused White House Shooter is Rare

**WASHINGTON** • A man who shot an assault rifle at the White House is one of only a handful of people ever accused of trying to assassinate the president, and if the past is any guide he could spend many years in prison or a mental hospital if convicted. Oscar Ramiro Ortega-Hernandez, 21, of Idaho Falls, Idaho, is accused of firing from a car at the White House on Nov. 11. Ortega was arrested last week in Pennsylvania after a four-day search and appeared in court in Washington for the first time Monday. Since President John F. Kennedy was assassinated in 1963, however, only a small group of people has been accused of attempting to kill the president. There's Charles Manson follower Lynette "Squeaky" Fromme, who pointed a gun at President Gerald Ford in 1975 as he shook hands in a crowd. Then John Hinckley, who shot Ronald Reagan in 1981 in an attempt to impress actress Jodie Foster. More recent is the case of Vladimir Arutyunian, who in 2005 threw a hand grenade at President George W. Bush while he was speaking at a rally in the country of Georgia. The grenade malfunctioned and didn't go off.

Ortega's future is less clear. During a hearing Monday, he shook his head when the judge read the charge against him, which carries a possible sentence of up to life in prison. He was appointed a public defender and ordered held without bond. A judge set the next court hearing for Nov. 28, following a psychological evaluation. Some similarities between the two cases are striking. Both men were reported missing by family before allegedly turning up in Washington. Ortega's acquaintances and family have said he told them he was headed to Utah for business but never returned. In Duran's case, his wife reported him missing. Acquaintances in both cases also said both men were upset with the government. Duran's coworkers later testified at trial they had heard him say he would "kill Clinton if he had the chance." In Ortega's case, court documents filed last week allege he told acquaintances that President Barack Obama was the Antichrist and said he "needed to kill him."

A mental health defense played a role in Duran's case and could again in Ortega's. Duran's attorneys put on an insanity defense, arguing he suffered from paranoid schizophrenia and believed an "evil mist" was hovering over the White House, a claim the jury rejected. Ortega's acquaintances say he began acting strangely in recent months, suggesting he believed he was Jesus, according to a court document. His mother, however, told an Idaho newspaper last week that her son has no history of mental illness. Some observers cite a key difference between the cases, however. Authorities say Ortega was driving when he stopped on a street south of the White House and fired from more than 700 yards away. Duran fired at relatively close range at a man who resembled Clinton. "It was a much different situation. There was a guy who walked outside who looked very much physically like Clinton: same height, same hair color," said A.J. Kramer, the head of the Washington federal public defender's office who represented Duran.

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# Meridian Man Pleads Guilty to Child Porn Charges

**BOISE** • Donn Michael Casper, 39, of Meridian, pleaded guilty in U.S. District Court Monday morning to four counts of sexual exploitation of children/production of sexually explicit images of minors, U.S. Attorney Wendy J. Olson announced. In a written plea agreement, Casper admitted to surreptitiously producing sexually explicit videos of four underage males using hidden cameras at his home between August 2008 and June 2011. According to court documents, the investigation began when Canadian police and the U.S. Postal Inspection Service began a joint investigation into the worldwide commercial distribution of child pornography via U.S. Mail and the Internet. During the investigation, Canadian investigators uncovered information that a suspect in Toronto was receiving child pornography from a computer traced to Casper's home in Meridian.

On June 29, 2011, federal investigators and local law enforcement executed a search warrant at Casper's home and seized electronic media and optical discs containing videos depicting sexually explicit images of minors. Further investigation led to the identification of four local victims. Sentencing is set for Feb. 6, 2012, before U.S. District Judge Edward J. Lodge. On each count, Casper is facing a mandatory minimum term of imprisonment of 15 years up to 30 years, a maximum fine of \$250,000, and a minimum of five years up to lifetime supervised release. The case was investigated by the U.S. Postal Inspection Service in conjunction with the Toronto (Canada) Police Service, the Idaho Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force, and the Meridian Police Department.

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# AARP Gives ‘Turkey Awards’ to Idaho Utilities Seeking Rate Hikes

**BOISE •** As Thanksgiving week began Monday, AARP released the “winners” of its new Gem State Turkey Award, rapping Idaho Power, Rocky Mountain Power and United Water for seeking a combined \$122 million in rate hikes while Idahoans struggle through a difficult economy.

“Asking consumers to keep paying more in this economy is a move worthy of recognition,” said Jim Wordelman, state director for AARP in Idaho. “These rate hike proposals are the real turkeys this Thanksgiving, and AARP is calling on the Idaho Public Utilities Commission to ensure they don’t fly.”

The AARP Idaho Gem State Turkey Award will be given annually to highlight those whose policies or actions the organization believes are harmful to the state’s population ages 50 and older. This year’s targets include Idaho Power, Rocky Mountain Power and United Water.

“Idaho Power is looking to sock state consumers with \$83 million in rate hikes, resulting in the average residential consumer’s bill skyrocketing by nearly 9 percent, in addition to a \$1 a month increase in customer’s service charge (bringing in an additional roughly \$500,000 to the company),” the AARP release stated. “A non-binding settlement agreement between the company and the interveners (none representing residential consumers) in the rate hike case,

currently before the Idaho Public Utilities Commission (PUC), still calls for \$34 million in rate hikes, hitting the typical residential consumer with a 4.19 percent higher monthly energy bill.”

Idaho is the only state in the West lacking a utility consumer advocate office to represent residential consumers and small businesses, such as farms, in rate cases and other regulatory issues before the PUC and the courts. AARP supports creation of an advocate office and urges such an office be included in Idaho’s draft Energy Plan, which is being updated.

“I’m betting the overwhelming majority of Idahoans didn’t get a 7 percent, 9

percent or 20 percent raise or cost of living increase last year, and neither should their utility companies,” Wordelman said. “While the Turkey Awards are all in good fun, they highlight very serious issues and not being able to afford soaring utility bills is anything but a laughing matter.”

According to an AARP survey released earlier this year, more than 40 percent of Idahoans 50 and older reported already having difficulty affording their utility bills.

# Police Probe Deaths of 1-month-old Idaho Twins

**POCATELLO (AP) •** Police in southeastern Idaho say detectives are investigating the “suspicious” deaths of 1-month-old identical twin boys whose mother called 911 to report that they weren’t breathing.

Authorities say Kiarra Kimbel, of Pocatello, made the report at 8:35 a.m. Monday.

Lt. Paul Manning says the babies, Gabriel R. Medrano and Tryce E. Medrano, were rushed to the hospital and pronounced dead on arrival. Police say autopsies were planned for Monday evening to determine the cause of the deaths.

The *Idaho State Journal* reports that neighbors said Kimbel has two other children who live with her at her Pocatello apartment. The newspaper reports neighbors said the twins were seen Sunday and appeared to be in good health.


Police declined to release additional details Monday afternoon.

# Ririe Man Walks away Unharmd after Plane Crash

**IDAHO FALLS (AP) •** Authorities in eastern Idaho say a Ririe man escaped without injury after his single-engine plane flipped over while landing on a runway covered with snow and ice.

The Fremont County Sheriff’s Office says Russell Schwendiman was trying to land the plane Sunday on a private runway north of the Ashton Reservoir.


Investigators say the plane flipped on to its top shortly after hitting the landing strip. But police say Schwendiman was healthy enough to walk away from the crash and damaged plane.

## In Congress’ Debt Reduction Panel, We Deserve Better

We deserve parties that can say, ‘We made concessions to the other side that we weren’t batty about, but this at least gets us pointed in the right direction.’

The 12-person Congressional “super committee” tasked with reducing our national debt has thrown in the towel. Out of the six Republicans and six Democrats, not one would break party lines to agree on a plan.

Are we surprised? Not a bit. Disgusted? Absolutely.

Predictably, our bull-headed representatives are already angrily pointing fingers across the aisle. Republicans call out Democrats who refuse to chop any entitlement programs; the Democrats say that Republicans refuse to quash any of the tax breaks benefiting the nation’s rich.

We deserve better.

We deserve a government that isn’t paralyzed by their own collective agendas. We deserve parties that can say, “We made concessions to the other side that we weren’t batty about, but this at least gets us pointed in the right direction.”

Instead, we get a Congress that can’t act — and when they do, it’s to attempt to weasel out of their own rules.

The super committee plan was developed with a purposefully rancid-smelling trigger. If they couldn’t agree on a plan, an automatic reduction of \$1.2 trillion over 10 years was set to kick in. To make it hurt for both parties, the cuts were divided between social and military spending.

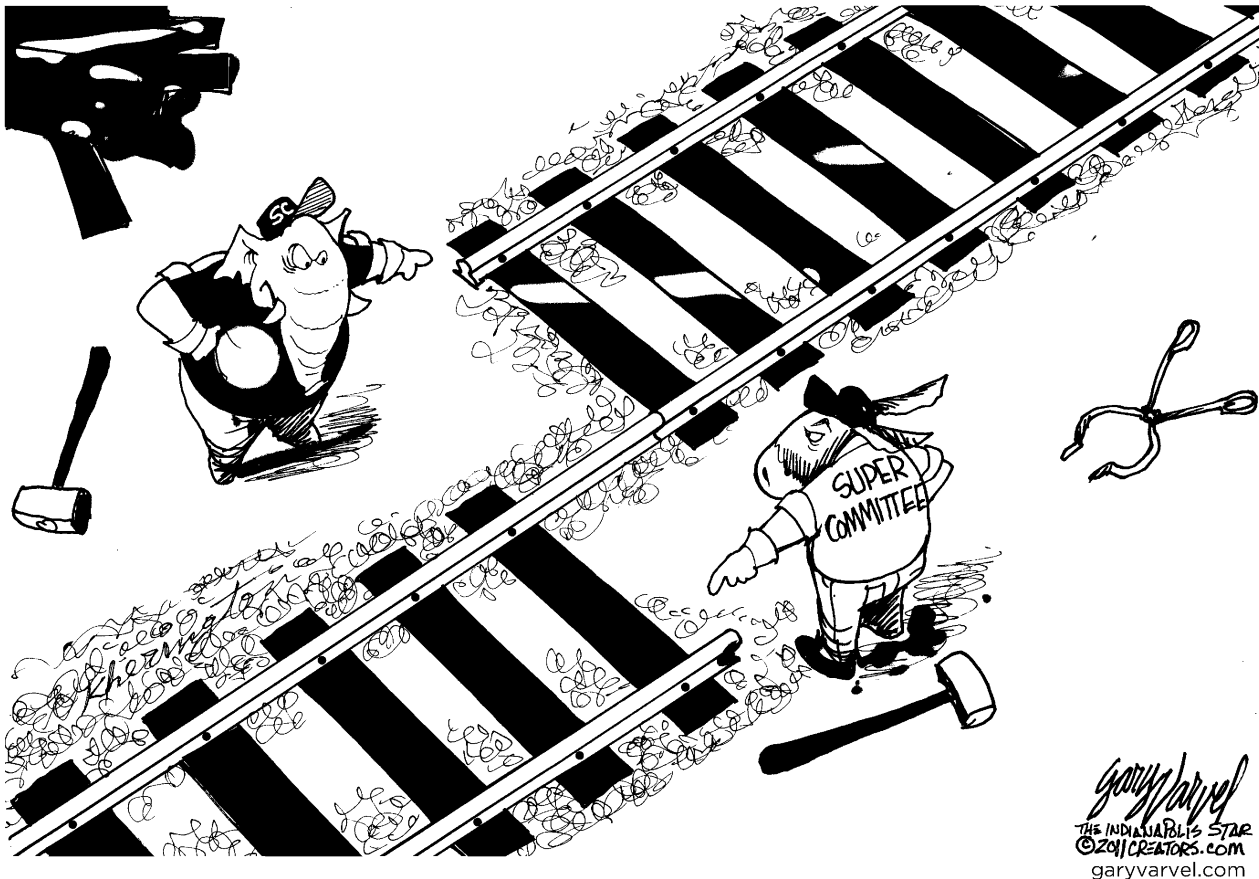
Politicians in Congress who voted to enact the trigger are already drafting legislation to say that the budget cuts would cripple the armed forces and aid programs.

If the politicians could put their fingers down for a moment, they’d realize why the committee failed: in a bipartisan group, a solution must involve cooperation. Stringent tax cuts may be the quickest way out of a debt crisis, but you won’t get agreements from the other side. Concessions have to be made.

As a nation, we’ve become so obsessed with the other side “being wrong,” that our solution to a crisis is to overwhelm the opposition with numbers so we can get “our” agenda passed. We howl at the other side with righteous indignation instead of urging both sides to enact laws that we can all live with.

We live in a republic so our elected representatives can enact the will of the people.

The will of the people is certainly not “argue with each other, then give up.”



## Mitt and Obama Have Pre-existing Conditions

If former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney and President Obama face off in the 2012 presidential campaign, America will witness the singular spectacle of two candidates getting very little love, and plenty of hate, for the same signature achievement: reforming health care.

Both overcame long odds to pass legislation, Romney in Massachusetts, Obama at the national level. Even the specifics of their reform laws are similar: Both include subsidies for private insurance, the establishment of insurance exchanges and a mandate for individuals to maintain a minimum level of coverage. Each man expected to reap credit for his effort. But neither has gotten political mileage out of it; in fact, both may have lost more ground than they picked up.

In another era, we might be celebrating the remarkable fact that both a Democratic president and a leading Republican challenger arrived at fundamentally the same approach to fixing our health-care system.

That is not the America we live in now.

Instead of rejoicing at how we’ve finally solved a national problem with an acrimonious history, we’re about to plunge into a new phase of that battle, with the Supreme Court agreeing to rule on the health law’s constitutionality in its new term, possibly at the height of a presidential campaign that could come down to the two men most tied to the issue.

In the abstract, many Americans say they want just the kind of moderate, constructive leadership that Romney and Obama exercised in passing health-care reform. But these days, moderate policies don’t necessarily make good politics. Romney’s biggest achievement has become his biggest burden in the GOP primaries because tea-drinking Republicans aren’t much interested in compromises. Likewise, on the left, many Democrats



are disappointed that the 2010 Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act didn’t go far enough and, in particular, omitted a “public option” for insurance.

After watching Romney succeed in 2006 with a reform approach descended from a long line of moderate Republican proposals, Democrats gravitated to a similar middle-of-the-road effort that they thought could gain broad, bipartisan support. But in doing so, they made some key concessions to moderation that have proved especially damaging to popular support for national health-care reform. And it didn’t have to be that way.

Primarily to ensure that the Congressional Budget Office would “score” the legislation as reducing the deficit, Obama agreed to delay implementation of the major provisions of the law until January 2014, nearly four years after the bill passed. And contrary to his position during the 2008 campaign, the president also agreed to an individual mandate, again, partly to keep down the program’s cost, even though the mandate predictably became the law’s most unpopular provision and the focus of legal and political challenges.

These concessions have had opposite effects on the emotional commitments in the two parties. While opposition to the mandate has become a rallying point for Republicans, the long delay in implementing reforms has left many Democrats discouraged and uncertain about the law’s benefits. The four-year timetable also undercuts any possible political gain from the reforms; the president will have little to show by the 2012 election and little chance of clearing up the confusion and anxieties about the law.

And what of the CBO’s

projections that the Affordable Care Act would produce budget savings, achieved at such great political cost? Those predictions haven’t won over public opinion. According to surveys, large majorities believe (mistakenly) that the legislation will raise the deficit.

With little direct experience to go on, people are generally responding to the law on a partisan basis, though not with equal zeal: Republicans are strongly against the reforms, while Democrats are only weakly for them. An October tracking survey by the Kaiser Family Foundation found that among the public overall, 51 percent had an unfavorable view of the law and only 34 percent a favorable view, a more negative reading than most other polls.

That’s not to say a majority want to get rid of the law. In Kaiser’s September survey, 33 percent said they wanted to expand it, and 19 percent favored keeping it as it is. By contrast, 16 percent favored repealing the law and replacing it with a Republican alternative, and 21 percent just wanted to repeal it (the remainder said they don’t know).

The results can be interpreted in two ways. On the one hand, more people want to keep or expand the law (52 percent) than want to roll it back (37 percent); on the other, only about one out of five is satisfied with the law as it is. Yet with a partisan deadlock in Washington, there is no chance of amending the individual mandate or making other changes to relieve concerns about the program.

Behind the public ambivalence lie deeper obstacles to public support for health-care reform. During the mid-20th century, the United States created an increasingly complicated and expensive system that enriched the health-care industry and satisfied most Americans but artfully concealed the true costs. Ever since, as the system’s costs and the number of unin-

sured people have risen, reform has become a politically treacherous national imperative: Every remedy has excited a reaction from the insured public and from health-care interest groups.

When Congress passed the Medicare prescription-drug benefit in 2003, surveys indicated that senior citizens opposed the law; they viewed it more favorably only after it went into effect in 2006. Supporters of national health-care reform are hoping for just that kind of swing. Much as Romney’s program gained support in Massachusetts after being carried out, so the national law may win approval in 2014 if people can see how it works in practice.

But even if the Supreme Court upholds the individual mandate, the law may never reach that point if Obama fails to earn any credit for it and loses the election, only to see a Republican successor, perhaps, in a final irony, Romney, sign a repeal and complete a cycle of national frustration.

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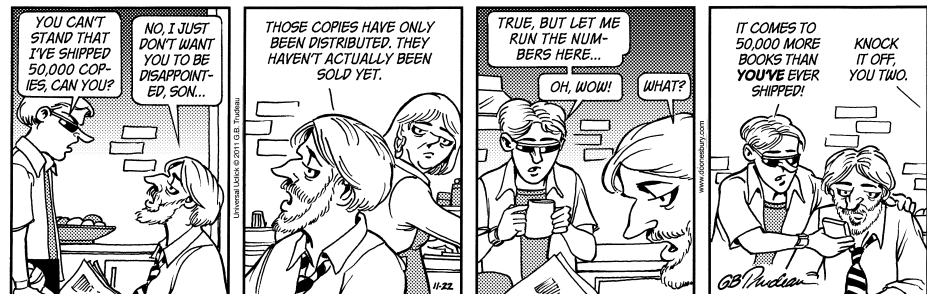
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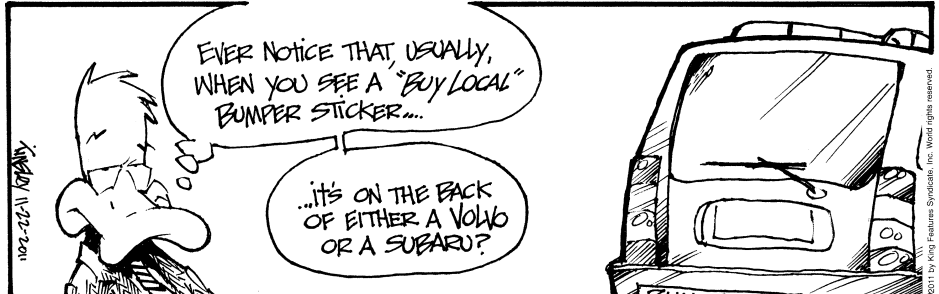

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# N. Idaho Teenager’s Game Teaches Public About Dyslexia

**COEUR D’ALENE** • Noah Pukkila is on a mission to increase awareness about dyslexia.

The Coeur d’Alene Charter Academy eighth-grader has the developmental reading disorder.

“I have a disorder that prevents me from reading up to standard, but the school system in Idaho doesn’t accept dyslexia as a learning disability,” Noah said.

The Post Falls resident makes a family-oriented yard game out of wood called Finn Pin and has sold it during the past two summers at the Kootenai County Farmers’ Market for \$25.

“I’ve raised \$1,500 and I hope to get a car with it some day,” he said. “I start drivers’ education in five months.”

While creating one of the games, Noah placed a number on a pin backward. Rather than throw it away and start over, he had the fun idea to continue on and make it a dyslexia set.

“It looks exactly like what a lot of dyslexics see it as — the numbers are scrambled,” he said.

Noah calls it his “dyslexia awareness edition.”

Noah’s father Marko is Finnish. Hence, the name of the game.

In the game, 12 pins with numbers are set up. Points are earned when pins with the corresponding numbers are knocked over with

a “throw pin” or when multiple pins are knocked over. The object is to reach exactly 50 points. If you go over, you have to go back to 25 points.

Noah will sell his game at the Kootenai County Farmers Winter Market at the Kootenai County Fairgrounds on Dec. 3 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

“I think selling is one of my gifts and talents,” Noah said. “Being an entrepreneur gives me confidence in what I do. My dyslexia awareness game will be ready to be sold along with the other games.”

Noah’s mother Alyssa calls Noah “quite the sales person.”

“It’s a huge self-esteem booster,” Alyssa said. “It gives him the drive to overcome deficits. He sees the value of being in business for himself.”

Noah said he doesn’t see dyslexia as a challenge.

“I just see (reading) as somebody else’s strength,” Noah said.

Noah was home-schooled until the sixth grade.

“His aspiration is to go to college and we know he’ll have to work at it if that’s what he wants,” Alyssa said.

Noah also uses a creative mind to draw characters such as turtles and lizards.

Noah said he’d like to be a business owner.

“There’s a lot of great minds today who have dyslexia, such as Ty (Pennington) from Extreme Home Makeover,” he said.

# Nampa Atheists Find Community

**NAMPA** • When people find out Susan Harrington is an atheist, they’re surprised. Not just because Harrington, of Nampa, doesn’t believe in God, but because she doesn’t believe in God and she’s normal.

“I’m not someone who likes to throw it into people’s faces because it’s a shocker,” Harrington, 47, said about her atheism. “The first thing they say is, ‘Oh, you’re so nice!’”

Harrington, an adjunct college math instructor, and a small group of local atheists meet each Sunday at the Flying M Coffeegarage in Nampa to talk theology and anything else that comes up. Members of the group belong to national and local organizations that promote atheists’ civil rights and the separation of church and state as well as do volunteer work. The Flying M meeting – an unofficial “chapter” of a Boise atheist group – pro-

vides an environment where participants can speak openly about their atheism.

“A lot of atheists tend not to wear it on their sleeve because of the social stigma,” said Harrington, who co-founded Idaho Atheists in 1998 when she lived near Idaho City. “So it’s been great fun to get together.”

Another group participant, Art Rigsby, 69, of Nampa, said the weekly Sunday meeting of atheists is “not too much different from church” from a social perspective.

“We meet like-minded people. We can exchange ideas,” Rigsby said.

David Bohart is a 73-year-old retired businessman and Nampa native. He said he’s attended the group meetings for about a year.

“We’re social creatures, and it’s kind of difficult to find too many of us here,” Bohart said.

The Idaho Atheists group has about 250 members, Harrington said, and an active Facebook page. They hold a diversity of viewpoints on everything but their lack of belief in God. Conservatives, liberals and Libertarians make up the group, Harrington said.

Another atheist group in

Canyon County that Rigsby and Bohart formerly belonged to is the West Valley Freethinkers, formed about three years ago.

Bohart said he began to question the existence of God when he was 5.

“I was told not to ask questions about that,” Bohart said. “Immediately the next question that came up was why I couldn’t ask the questions.”

Bohart said during much of his life it was hard to find information about atheism or find other atheists. But he said the Internet changed that.

The Nampa group wants to offer a community for young atheists, too, Rigsby said.

“A lot of kids take a lot of heat because they don’t believe,” Rigsby said. “Younger kids really feel like they’re out there by themselves. Hopefully we’ll give them a feeling that, hey, you belong to a community and people care about you.”

# Some Boiseans Turn to Social Network to Influence Corporations

**BOISE** • Russ Berger, a physicist in Boise, would like employees to be represented on corporate boards, especially since they’re often sacrificed in layoffs or pay cuts to meet Wall Street expectations.

He also believes no one should be allowed to be CEO and chairman of the board at the same corporation.

To make his opinions known, Berger has begun to use Moxy Vote, a Pennsylvania-based social network created in 2009 to help shareholders, customers and citizens communicate with corporations on corporate governance and other issues, including environmental and social concerns. Founders say about 60,000 people use the site.

“Moxy Vote seems to provide a means to at least help stockholders voice their concerns to the boardrooms of their corporations — the modern way, via the Internet,” Berger said.

Most people likely share at least some of the anger over issues raised by the Occupy Wall Street protests, such as disparities in wealth and the coziness of business lobbyists and government officials, said Mark Schlegel, a founder of Moxy Vote.

But not everybody is going to camp out, and some are frustrated because they don’t

know how to effect change, he said.

“Moxy Vote offers individuals a way to make a difference and take action” by working within the system, Schlegel said.

Through Moxy Vote, shareholders align their proxy votes with other shareholders to make a bigger impact, he said.

One of Moxy’s early successes in 2010 was the teaming up of small shareholders in On2 Technologies that forced Google to increase its offer for the company by 25 percent, Schlegel said.

Customers who don’t own stocks can sign letters on the website addressing issues with various companies. For instance, more than 7,400 people have signed a letter asking Bank of America to disclose its political contributions. A letter to CocaCola with more than 3,200 signatures asks the company to make sure its packaging is free of Bisphenol A (BPA), an industrial chemical that can potentially affect the brain and behavior, and prostate glands in fetuses, infants and

young children.

“Moxy Vote is a great source for people who are voting their own proxies,” said Kathy Stearns, a Boise certified investment adviser with First Affirmative. “It really allows the little guys to

get on the bandwagon.”

An independent website that doesn’t take sides, Moxy Vote also is inviting corporations to interact with stockholders and customers and answer their concerns, Schlegel said.

“We want companies to participate, communicating on proxy votes, telling their story, interacting with folks who don’t agree with them,” he said.

# Super Failure: Deficit-cutting Panel Gives Up

**WASHINGTON** • The failure Monday of Congress' supercommittee — the bipartisan panel that was supposed to cut at least \$1.2 trillion from looming federal deficits — will trigger a fresh series of partisan clashes over taxes, spending, Social Security and a host of other fiscal matters, clashes likely to be begin immediately.

The collapse of the 12-member panel, announced Monday in a joint statement by co-chairs Sen. Patty Murray, D-Wash., and Rep. Jeb Hensarling, R-Texas, sent U.S. stock prices plunging and created at least another year's worth of fiscal uncertainty in Washington, smack in the middle of an already contentious 2012 election campaign.

"After months of hard work and intense deliberations, we have come to the conclusion today that it will not be possible to make any bipartisan agreement available to the public before the committee's deadline," the co-chairs said.

About the only thing the panel agreed on was the final statement of surrender, a four-paragraph press release that vowed to keep fighting for fiscal discipline.

When Congress returns Monday from a Thanksgiving recess, it will quickly confront at least four thorny issues that need to be resolved in the next few weeks.

Lawmakers must consider extending this year's Social Security 2 percent payroll tax cut; approving extended unemployment benefits; adjusting the Alternative Minimum Tax so it doesn't hurt the middle class; and changing how physicians are paid for Medicare patient care.

Each is likely to detonate new partisan skirmishes. Each also could increase the deficit, which reached \$1.3 trillion the last fiscal year. The national debt climbed over \$15 trillion last week.

Next year will bring new challenges. The Bush-era tax cuts expire at the end of 2012, and because of the supercommittee's failure, \$1.2 trillion in automatic spending cuts are to be triggered starting in January 2013. Half will come from defense, half from domestic spending, but lower-income programs and Social Security will be exempt. Medicare cuts would affect providers but not beneficiaries.

Partisan confrontations are likely on each of these issues in an election year when voters are disgusted with Washington, and financial markets are increasingly rattled by Washington's inertia. Stocks tumbled Monday in anticipation of the supercommittee announcement as the Dow Jones Industrial Average fell 248.85 points.

An hour after the supercommittee officially gave up, Standard & Poor's said the U.S. government's credit ratings "are not affected by the announcement." It remains AA-plus, downgraded Aug. 5 from the previous AAA.

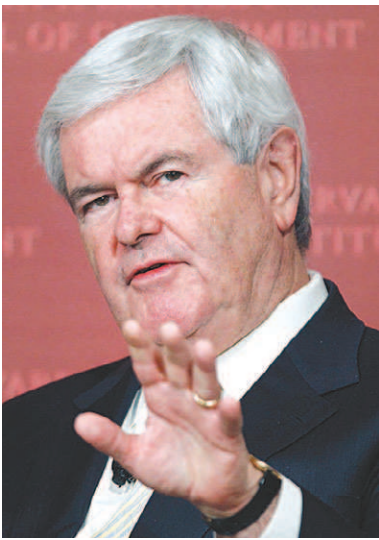

Engineers and geologists on Monday were studying the site along Paseo del Mar in San Pedro, south of downtown Los Angeles, to determine how to stabilize the shifting ground, which has been slowly sliding into the ocean since earlier this year.* — Associated Press

# Missing Girl's Mom Arrested on Child Abuse Charges

**GLENDAL, Ariz.** • Police on Monday arrested the mother of a missing 5-year-old Arizona girl on child abuse charges "directly related" to the girl, and said they don't believe they'll find the child alive. In a news conference that offered the most detail yet about what investigators think happened to Jhessye Shockley, Glendale police said the girl's mother, Jerice Hunter, was now the investigation's "No. 1 focus." Hunter was booked Monday at the Maricopa County jail. A sheriff's spokesman said Hunter was unable to talk to reporters because she had not yet been assigned a housing unit. She was scheduled for her first court appearance Monday night. Hunter previously told The AP she had nothing to do with Jhessye's disappearance and was highly critical of the department's investigation. — Associated Press



# Gingrich Backs Private Retirement Accounts

**MANCHESTER, N.H.** • Republican presidential contender Newt Gingrich on Monday proposed allowing younger workers still decades away from retirement to bypass Social Security and instead choose private investment accounts that would be subject to stock market gyrations. The former House speaker, who has risen in the polls, would allow younger workers to take their share of the payroll tax that funds Social Security and put it in a private account. Employers would still pay their share of the tax, which would be used to pay benefits for current retirees. But it would create a funding shortfall that Gingrich brushed off. "That gap is more than covered by the savings" that would come from giving states control of 185 social welfare programs, Gingrich told reporters after a speech that laid out broad concepts but lacked key details. — Associated Press

# Was California Police Use of Pepper Spray Justified?

**Footage of officer casually spraying an orange cloud over protesters while spectators screamed in horror Friday at University of California, Davis, spread across the Internet, touching off an investigation and debate over police tactics.**

**SAN FRANCISCO** • Viral videos of riot police repeatedly pepper spraying a row of seated, non-violent Occupy Wall Street protesters at a California university has sparked outrage, an investigation and calls for the college chancellor's resignation.

It has also set off a debate about whether the officers were justified and how far they can go to disperse peaceful demonstrators.

While many students, lawmakers and even the university's chancellor saw the officers' actions as excessive, some experts on police tactics say de-

pending on the circumstances, pepper spray can be a better crowd control measure than dragging protesters away or swinging at them with truncheons.

"Between verbalized commands and knock-down, drag-out fights, there's quite a bit of wiggle room," said David Klinger, a former Los Angeles Police Department officer and instructor at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. "When you've got a bunch of people who are clearly noncompliant, locking arms, it doesn't look good (on camera)."

Soon after the spraying on Friday at University of California, Davis, video recordings spread across the Internet.

The footage of an officer casually spreading an orange cloud over protesters while spectators screamed in horror joined other much-discussed pepper-spray incidents, such as the 84-year-old activist hit in the face in Seattle and a Portland, Ore., woman who was sprayed in the mouth.

The university announced Monday that it has placed the police chief and two officers on administrative leave to restore trust.

Still, nearly 2,000 students and residents gathered Monday at the main quad to hear speeches and chant slogans against police and university officials. Students who were pepper-sprayed opened the protest, saying they now feel unsafe on campus.

"We were just kids sitting down in a circle singing," said mechanical engineering student David Buscho, 22, of San Rafael, Calif. "It felt like hot glass ... I was paralyzed with fear."

# Egyptian Cabinet Offers to Resign But Protests Go On

**CAIRO** • Egypt's civilian Cabinet offered to resign Monday after three days of violent clashes between demonstrators and security forces in Tahrir Square, but the action failed to satisfy protesters deeply frustrated with the new military rulers.

The Health Ministry and a doctor at an improvised field hospital on the square said at least 26 people have been killed and 1,750 wounded in the latest violence as activists sought to fill the streets for a "second revolution" to force out the generals who have failed to stabilize the country, salvage the economy or bring democracy.

Throughout the day, young protesters demanding the military hand over power to a civilian government fought with black-clad police, hurling stones and firebombs and throwing back the tear gas canisters being fired by police into the square, which was the epicenter of the movement that ousted authoritarian leader Hosni Mubarak.

By midnight tens of thousands of protesters were in the huge downtown square.

The clashes have deepened the disarray among Egypt's political ranks, with the powerful Muslim Brotherhood balking at joining in the demonstrations, fearing that turmoil will disrupt elections next week that the Islamists expect to dominate.

# Mom of Bomb Plot Suspect Apologizes to New Yorkers

**NEW YORK (AP)**

• The mother of a "lone wolf" accused of plotting to attack police stations and post offices with homemade bombs apologized to New Yorkers on Monday, even as questions arose about why federal authorities — who typically handle terrorism cases — declined to get involved in what city officials called a serious threat.

The mother of Jose Pimentel spoke to reporters outside her upper Manhattan home the day after her son was arraigned in state court on terrorism-related charges. "I didn't raise my son in that way," Carmen Sosa said. "I feel bad about this situation."

She also praised the New York Police Department, saying, "I think they handled it well."

Officials with the NYPD, which conducted the undercover investigation using a confidential informant and a bugged apartment, said the department had to move quickly because Pimentel was about to test a pipe bomb made out of match heads, nails and other items bought at neighborhood stores.

# Man Behind NYC’s Famous Sabrett Hot Dogs Dies

**NORWOOD, N.J. (AP) •** Gregory Papalexis, whose Sabrett hot dogs have become a part of the New York City experience, has died. He was 86.

Papalexis was president, CEO and chairman of Englewood-based Marathon Enterprises, a supplier of hot dogs, buns, onion sauce and other products, and the owner of the Sabrett trademark.

He died Friday in Rockleigh, N.J., according to the Barrett Funeral Home in Tenafly, N.J., which is handling arrangements.

Sabrett hot dogs are sold nationwide. On the streets of New York, they are sold from stainless-steel pushcarts with instantly recognizable blue-and-yellow umbrellas. Marathon also

supplies franks to Papaya King and Gray’s Papaya restaurants, and sells more than 35 million pounds of hot dogs a year.

His son-in-law, Mark Rosen, Marathon Enterprises’ vice president of sales, told The Record of Bergen County that Papalexis was “the single biggest hot dog lover in the world.”

And Papalexis, who retired two years ago, practiced what he preached: He ate Sabrett hot dogs four or five days a week, relatives said. Mark Rosen said franks-and-beans casserole was part of the Papalexis family’s Christmas table each year.

The son of a baker, Papalexis grew up next door to a hot dog factory in upper Manhattan.

**MANCHESTER, N.H. •** Former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney is turning President Barack Obama’s own words against him in the Republican hopeful’s TV first ad of his 2012 White House bid.

Romney’s first television ad is set to start airing in New Hampshire on Tuesday, hours before the president visits the state. The commercial compares Obama’s promises as a candidate — to turn around the economy, stem foreclosures and rescue the middle class — with economic statistics that suggest the incumbent president has come up short.

Romney then pledges a new direction, turning to his biography as a successful businessman.

“I’m going to do something to government,” he says in the ad, using footage taken during a recent stop in Dubuque, Iowa. He then promises to repeal Democrats’ health care overhaul that he says is “killing jobs.”

“It’s high time to bring those principles of fiscal responsibility to Washington, D.C.,” Romney says.

Romney’s 60-second ad features clips of an Obama campaign stop in Londonderry, N.H., in October 2007 and fresh footage from Romney events from recent days. It’s slated to run through the Thanksgiving holiday weekend at a cost of \$134,000.

“The contrast between what he said and what he did is so stark, people will

recognize we really do need to have someone new lead this country,” Romney said in an interview with Fox News Channel to introduce the ads Monday evening.

Romney, who is at the top of state polls and is sitting on a mound of campaign cash, has kept his focus on Obama over the past year and largely has shied from criticizing his GOP rivals.

“I want people to remember that when he was candidate Obama, that he said he was going to get this economy going, he was going to bring people together, be a real leader for change in America,” Romney said.

Obama is set to arrive in

New Hampshire on Tuesday to deliver an economic speech. For months, Romney has given interviews to local reporters in states Obama had on his schedule, either pre-empting the president’s message or rebutting it.

On Tuesday, Romney planned to use one-time rival Tim Pawlenty and Sen. Kelly Ayotte of New Hampshire to make the case for Romney as a superior choice. Both have backed Romney’s presidential bid.

Yet Romney elected to use his first paid television ad not to promote himself or criticize his rivals but to take on the man he hopes to face in November 2012.

“Clearly, the president can’t run on his track record,” Romney said. “His track record is miserable. ... So what he’ll do is try and assassinate, on a character basis, his opponents and/or his opposition. I’m hoping that’s me, but I’m not looking forward to those attacks.”

# Greenhouse Gases Soar; No Signs Warming Is Slowing

WASHINGTON • Heat-trapping greenhouse gases in the atmosphere are building up so high, so fast, that some scientists now think the world can no longer limit global warming to the level world leaders have agreed upon as safe.

New figures from the U.N. weather agency Monday showed that the three biggest greenhouse gases not only reached record levels last year but were increasing at an ever-faster rate, despite efforts by many countries to reduce emissions.

As world leaders meet next week in South Africa to tackle the issue of climate change, several scientists said their projections show it is unlikely the world can hold warming to the target set by leaders just two years ago in Copenhagen.

“The growth rate is increasing every decade,” said Jim Butler, director of the U.S. National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration’s Global Monitoring Division. “That’s kind of scary.”

Scientists can’t say exactly what levels of greenhouse gases are safe, but some fear a continued rise in global temperatures will lead to irreversible melting of some of the world’s ice sheets and a several-foot rise in sea levels over the centuries — the so-called tipping point.

The findings from the U.N. World Meteorological Organization are consistent with other grim reports issued recently. Earlier this month, figures from the U.S. Department of Energy showed that global carbon dioxide emissions in 2010 jumped by the highest one-year amount ever.

The WMO found that total carbon dioxide levels in 2010 hit 389 parts per million, up from 280 parts per million in 1750, before the start of the Industrial Revolution. Levels increased 1.5 ppm per year in the 1990s and 2.0 per year in the first decade of this century, and are now rising at a rate of 2.3 per year. The top two other greenhouse gases — methane and nitrous oxide — are also soaring.

The U.N. agency cited fossil fuel-burning, loss of forests that absorb CO2 and use of fertilizer as the main culprits.

# Where’s the Salt? Hidden in Your Thanksgiving Menu

The traditional holiday fixings show how easy sodium can sneak into the foods you’d least expect.

WASHINGTON • No need for a salt shaker on the Thanksgiving table: Unless you really cooked from scratch, there’s lots of sodium already hidden in the menu.

Stealth sodium can do a number on your blood pressure. Americans eat way too much salt, and most of it comes inside common processed foods and restaurant meals.

The traditional Thanksgiving fixings show how easy sodium can sneak into the foods you’d least expect. Yes, raw turkey is naturally low in sodium. But sometimes a turkey or turkey breast is injected with salt water to plump it, adding a hefty dose of sodium before it even reaches the store — something you’d have to read the fine print to discover.

From the stuffing mix to the green bean casserole to even pumpkin pie, a lot of people can reach their daily sodium allotment or more in that one big meal unless the cook employs some tricks.

“For Thanksgiving or any meal, the more you can cook from scratch and have some control over the sodium that’s going in, the better,” says the American Dietetic Association’s Bethany Thayer, a registered dietitian at the Henry Ford Health System in Detroit.

The Food and Drug Administration this month opened deliberations on how to cut enough salt in processed foods for average shoppers to have a good shot at meeting new dietary guidelines. The idea: If sodium levels gradually drop in

the overall food supply, it will ease the nation’s epidemic of high blood pressure — and our salt-riddled taste buds will have time to adjust to the new flavor.

“Reducing sodium is important for nearly everyone,” Dr. Robin Ikeda of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention told the FDA hearing.

The question is how to make that happen. The prestigious Institute of Medicine and several public health advocates are urging the FDA to order gradual rollbacks, setting different sodium levels for different kinds of foods, a step the government has been reluctant to take.

Food makers want a voluntary approach and say they’re reworking their recipes, some as part of a campaign launched by New York City to cut salt consumption by at least 20 percent over five years.

It will take different strategies to remove salt from different foods — and some may need to be a sneak operation, Kraft Foods Vice President Richard Black told the FDA meeting. Ritz crackers labeled low-sodium were a bust until the box was changed to say “Hint of Salt” and those exact same crackers started selling, he said.

In the U.S., the average person consumes about 3,400 milligrams of sodium a day. The nation’s new dietary guidelines say no one should eat more than 2,300

milligrams of sodium — about what’s in a teaspoon of salt — and half the population should eat even less, just 1,500 milligrams. The smaller limit is for anyone who’s in their 50s or older, African-Americans of any age, and anyone suffering from high blood pressure, diabetes or chronic kidney disease.

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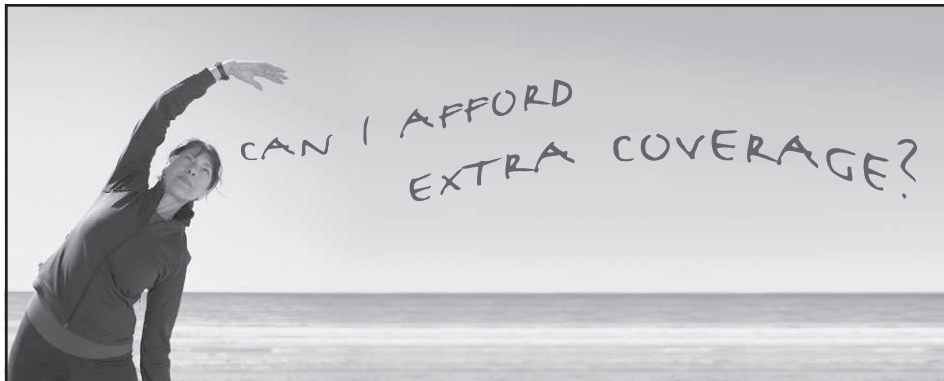
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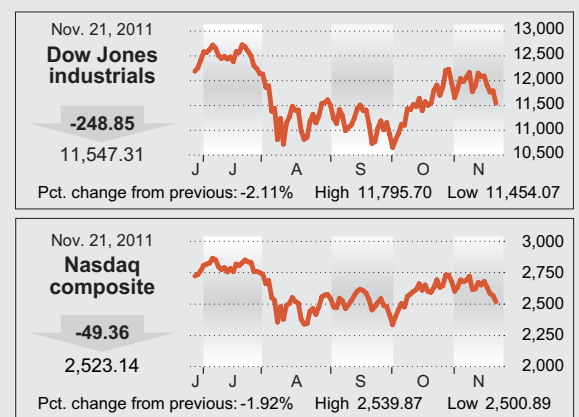

**NEW YORK (AP)** • The stock market was not exactly surprised that a so-called supercommittee in Congress failed to reach a deal to cut the federal budget deficit. But since summer, investors have sold at the first hint of trouble. The result was another day of heavy selling in a market that has grown used to big swings. # Netflix Seeks to Raise At Least \$400 Million

**SAN FRANCISCO (AP)** • Video subscription service Netflix hopes to raise at least \$400 million as it tries to recover from a customer backlash that has battered its stock and tarnished its brand.

The fundraising appeared to rattle some investors still worried about Netflix's ability to recover from a crisis triggered by management's decision to raise its U.S. prices by as much as 60 percent in September.

Netflix shares fell \$1.22, or 1.6 percent, to \$73.25 in Monday's extended trading after the company disclosed its plans in regulatory filings. They'd already lost \$3.59, or 4.6 percent, in regular trading.

# Gates Testifies in \$1 Billion Lawsuit Against Microsoft

**SALT LAKE CITY** • Microsoft's Windows 95 rollout presented the most challenges in the company's history, leading to several last-minute changes to technical features that would no longer support a rival software maker's word processor, Bill Gates testified Monday in a \$1 billion antitrust lawsuit filed by the former owner of WordPerfect. "We worked super hard," the Microsoft co-founder said. "It was the most challenging, trying project we had ever done."

Gates was the first witness to testify Monday as Microsoft lawyers presented their case in the trial that's been ongoing in federal court in Salt Lake City for about a month. He is set to resume testimony Tuesday morning.

Utah-based Novell Inc. sued Microsoft Corp. in 2004, claiming the Redmond, Wash., company violated U.S. antitrust laws through its arrangements with other software makers when it launched Windows 95. Novell says it was later forced to sell WordPerfect for a \$1.2 billion loss. Novell is now a wholly owned subsidiary of The Attachmate Group, the result of a merger that was completed earlier this year.

Gates said Novell just couldn't deliver a Windows 95 compatible WordPerfect program in time for its rollout, and its own Word program was actually better. He said that by 1994, Microsoft's Word writing program was

ranked No. 1 in the market above WordPerfect.

Gates called it an "important win."

He testified later that Microsoft had to dump a technical feature that would have supported WordPerfect because he feared it would crash the operating system.

"We were making trade-offs," he said.

Novell argues that Gates ordered Microsoft engineers to reject WordPerfect as a Windows 95 word processing application because he feared it was too good.

WordPerfect once had nearly 50 percent of the market for computer writing programs, but its share quickly plummeted to less than 10 percent as Microsoft's own office programs took hold.

Microsoft lawyers say Novell's loss of market share was its own doing because the company didn't develop a Windows compatible WordPerfect program until months after the operating system's rollout.

Novell attorney Jeff Johnson has conceded that Microsoft was under no legal obligation to provide advance access to Windows 95 so Novell could prepare a compatible version. Microsoft, however, enticed Novell to work on a version, only to withdraw support months before Windows 95 hit the market, he said.

Microsoft lawyer David Tulchin said Gates decided against installing WordPerfect because it couldn't be made compatible in time for the

rollout. He argued that Novell's missed opportunity was its own fault, and that Microsoft had no obligation to give a competitor a leg up.

"Novell never complained to Microsoft," Tulchin said during arguments Friday. "There's nothing in the evidence, no documents."

Johnson maintains Novell was tricked in violation of federal antitrust laws so Microsoft could monopolize the market.

"We got stabbed in the back," he said.

U.S. District Judge Freder-

ick Motz on Monday denied a motion from Microsoft attorneys to dismiss the case as groundless.

Gates, a billionaire, began by testifying about Microsoft's history. He was just 19 when he helped found the company. Today, Microsoft is one of the world's largest software makers, with a market value of more than \$210 billion.

"We thought everybody would have a personal computer on every desk and in every home," Gates said. "We wanted to be there and be the first."

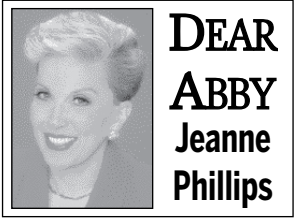

**DEAR ABBY:** A number of things in the letter from “Uneasy in Indiana” (Oct. 21) can be red flags for sex abuse. I have worked in child welfare for 35 years. Abusers often start with “playful touching,” comment about “cute” body parts, continue after being asked to stop, and make power statements that they can touch the child if they want.



If the incident was innocent, why didn't he recognize that it made his daughter uneasy and immediately stop when asked? “Uneasy” already fears he may accuse her of being a paranoid former victim. Abusers, when confronted, often accuse the other parent of “misunderstanding” or “being crazy.” They may also accuse the child of misunderstanding the touches or being provocative.

That “Uneasy” and her husband don't have sex is also of concern — it can mean her husband finds children, not adult women, sexually desirable.

Even if “Uneasy” isn't sure, she should stop leaving the child alone with him. Take her with her to class, leave her with a friend's parents or a safe relative. Let the husband know the touching and comments stop NOW — no excuses — and if there's anything else of this nature she will report it to the authorities.

The time to protect a child is BEFORE something happens. Afterward is too late. Children often tell only one time. If no action is taken, the child won't tell again!

**DEAR SEEN IT ALL:** My thanks to you and the others who wrote to support my advice to “Uneasy in Indiana.” **My readers comment:**

**DEAR ABBY:** I'm a clinical social worker who works with sex offenders in a prison. I'm distressed that the husband “truly believed it was OK and didn't mean ...” Yes, he DID mean to touch his daughter inappropriately. He has begun to groom her for his own sick pleasure.

The key statement in that letter is the girl asked him to stop and he negated her feelings by telling her she “belonged” to him. HUGE red flag! So many offenders I see are infatuated with preteens. “Uneasy” needs to get him to counseling ASAP and never leave her daughter alone with Dad.

**DEAR ABBY:** That husband is playing with fire. I know. After my wife died I playfully spanked and patted my daughter's cute little butt. Her school counselor found out, called child protective services, who called the police, and I was arrested. I wound up serving 2 1/2 years in prison. I'm now on parole and will be on the federal Sex Offender Registry for the next 20 years. That man needs to rethink his actions and get professional help before it's too late for him or his daughter.

**DEAR ABBY:** “Uneasy's” letter made me sick to my stomach, having endured the same treatment from my father. If it's not stopped immediately, it will most likely escalate into incest. The issue is boundaries. Every girl needs them in order to maintain her self-worth, control over her own body and her ability to say “no” without being afraid of offending some guy who wants to treat her like a sex object.

It took years of therapy and work to repair the damage my father caused. This father's problem should be addressed immediately by a professional therapist. “Uneasy” needs to put her foot down and let him know his behavior will not be tolerated. The daughter needs her mother's full support. She has a right to feel safe in her own home.

# N. Idaho School Hit With 2 Football Injury Suits

ASSOCIATED PRESS

**SANDPOINT** • A school district in north Idaho has been hit with a pair of lawsuits over injuries suffered by junior varsity football players.

The civil lawsuits were filed against the West Bonner County School District in 1st District Court, The Bonner County Daily Bee reported Saturday.

One case alleges junior varsity coach Jake Stark tossed a full plastic water bottle at a player's face during a halftime pep talk, causing a laceration. The boy received first aid for the cut, but it was later determined he also suffered a concussion, the lawsuit states.

"They sent him out and played him in the second half," said Sandpoint attorney Brent Fetherston.

Stark, a teacher on staff at Priest River Lamanna High School, did not immediately return a phone message left Monday at the high school by The Associ-

ated Press.

The other complaint alleges a player suffered permanent vision damage after being struck in the eye with a football during practice. The lawsuit claims the coaching staff discouraged the player from wearing his helmet while running pass routes during practice. The player underwent surgery for a detached retina three days after the injury.

The boy lost the center field of vision in his left eye, but still has some peripheral vision, Fetherston said.

West Bonner County School District Superintendent Mike McGuire told the AP that officials have not yet been served with the lawsuit.

"We didn't have school on Friday and we haven't seen anything yet, so there's not much to say at this point," McGuire said.

The lawsuits seek damages of more than \$10,000.

Both lawsuits allege school officials failed to notify the athletes' parents that their sons were injured.

# SEATTLE OUTFIELDER HALMAN KILLED; BROTHER SUSPECTED

**THE HAGUE, Netherlands** • Seattle Mariners outfielder Greg Halman was stabbed to death early Monday and his brother was arrested as a suspect, Dutch police said.

Rotterdam Police spokeswoman Patricia Wessels said police were called to a home in the port city in the early hours of the morning and found the 24-year-old Dutch player bleeding from a stab wound.

The officers and ambulance paramedics were unable to resuscitate Halman.

Wessels said the officers arrested Halman's 22-year-old brother. She declined to give his name, in line with Dutch privacy rules.

"He is under arrest and right now he is being questioned," Wessels told The Associated Press in a telephone interview. "It will take some time to figure out what exactly happened."

No charges have been filed in the case.

Halman hit .230 in 35 games and made starts at all three outfield positions for the Mariners in 2011 before being optioned to Triple-A Tacoma.

Mariners Chairman Howard Lincoln, President Chuck Armstrong and general manager Jack Zduriencik paid tribute to Halman on behalf of the club.

"Greg was a part of our organization since he was 16 and we saw him grow into a passionate young man and talented baseball player," they said in a statement. "He had an infectious smile that would greet you in the clubhouse, and he was a tremendous teammate. Our thoughts and prayers go out to Greg's family."

Because he played professionally in the United States, Halman was not part of the Netherlands team that won the Baseball World Cup in Panama last month. The Dutch beat Cuba 2-1 in the final to become the first European team to win the title.

"The loss of a talented 24-year-old young man like Greg, amid such tragic circumstances, is painful for all of us throughout the game," Commissioner Bud Selig said in a statement. "On behalf of Major League Baseball, I send my deepest condolences to the entire Mariners organization and to all those whose lives were touched by Greg."

Born in the city of Haarlem, Halman played in the Dutch Pro League and was part of the gold-medal winning Dutch squad at the 2007 European Championship and played for the Netherlands at the 2009 World Baseball Classic.

# Verlander Wins AL MVP, 1st Starter in 25 Years

**NEW YORK** • Justin Verlander figured time had run out on his chance to become the first starting pitcher in a quarter-century to be voted Most Valuable Player.

Last Tuesday, he found out about 12:40 p.m. that he was a unanimous winner of the AL Cy Young Award. It was closing in on 1 p.m. Monday, and he still hadn't gotten word on the MVP.

"I had told myself that it wasn't going to happen," he said. "I figured somebody else got the call."

Not to worry, there was just a slight delay because Verlander didn't give the Baseball Writers' Association of America his telephone number, forcing the BBWAA to relay the news through Brian Britten, the Detroit Tigers' director of media relations.

Britten telephoned Verlander at 12:56 p.m., about one hour before the announcement.

"It was just a weight off

my shoulders," Verlander said, "and pure elation, really."

After winning the AL's pitching triple crown by going 24-5 with a 2.40 ERA and 250 strikeouts, Verlander received 13 of 28 first-place votes and 280 points. He became the first pitcher voted MVP since Oakland's Dennis Eckersley in 1992 and the first starting pitcher since Boston's Roger Clemens in 1986.

"Obviously pitchers are not just written off all of a

sudden because they're pitchers," Verlander said.

Boston center fielder Jacoby Ellsbury was second with four firsts and 242 points, followed by Toronto right fielder Jose Bautista with five firsts and 231 points, Yankees center fielder Curtis Granderson with 215 and Detroit first baseman Miguel Cabrera with 193.

Recent history has been against pitchers. Since Eckersley's win, only once had a Please see **VERLANDER, S3**

ARIZONA HIRES RODRIGUEZ AS  
NEW FOOTBALL COACH

Rich Rodriguez turned West Virginia into a national championship contender before flaming out as Michigan coach under enormous expectations.

Those turbulent three seasons with the Wolverines didn't keep Arizona from hiring Rodriguez to overhaul a program that has been mired in mediocrity for most of the past decade.

Athletic Director Greg Byrne posted on his Twitter account Monday a picture of himself with Rodriguez, wearing an Arizona baseball cap, the coach's wife and two children. The tweet said "And the new Arizona football coach and his family is..."

The 48-year-old Rodriguez will be introduced Tuesday during a news conference in Tucson at the McKale Center, home of the Arizona basketball teams.

Arizona has long been a men's basketball power, winning a national title in 1997 and playing in another NCAA final in 2001 under former coach Luke Walton. Under coach Sean Miller, Arizona was ranked 23rd in the latest AP basketball rankings.

But the football program has rarely even contended for conference championships. The Wildcats are 3-8 this season.

Byrne fired coach Mike Stoops last month after he went 41-50 in seven-plus seasons at the Pac-12 school. The Wildcats have not won more than eight games in a season since 1998 under Dick Tomey.

Rodriguez will try to change that with a fast-paced, spread attack that has produced prolific offenses everywhere he has coached.

That, however, wasn't enough in Ann Arbor.

He was fired by Michigan after last season, following three difficult years. He went 15-22 with the Wolverines and the program was cited for rules violations by the NCAA during his tenure.

His last Michigan team went 7-6 — his only winning season there — but set numerous school records on the offensive side of the ball behind speedy quarterback Denard Robinson. And the team Rodriguez left behind for new Michigan coach Brady Hoke is 9-2 going into Saturday's game

against Ohio State.

Before taking over the Wolverines, Rodriguez guided West Virginia to two BCS appearances.

Considered one of the pioneers of the spread offense that has become so prevalent in college football, Rodriguez went 60-26 in seven seasons at West Virginia.

With quarterback Pat White and running back Steve Slaton leading the way, the Mountaineers won the 2006 Sugar Bowl against Georgia and were a victory away from playing for the BCS championship in 2007. That opportunity slipped away when West Virginia was upset at home by Pittsburgh, and the loss set off the events that led to Rodriguez becoming Michigan's coach.

It was a messy divorce between Rodriguez and his alma mater. West Virginia sued him to collect on the \$4 million buyout clause in his contract, a lawsuit that was eventually settled.

Rodriguez has been working as an analyst for CBS Sports Network this year, but had made it clear he wanted to get back into coaching as soon as possible.

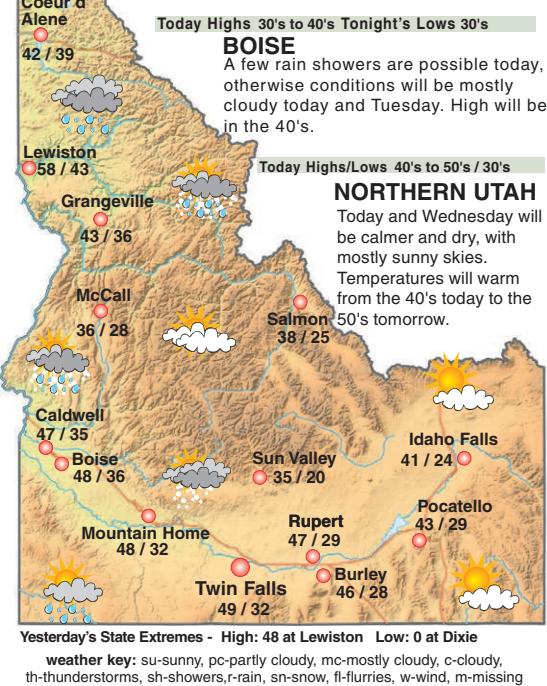

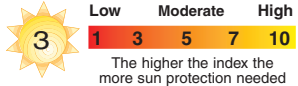

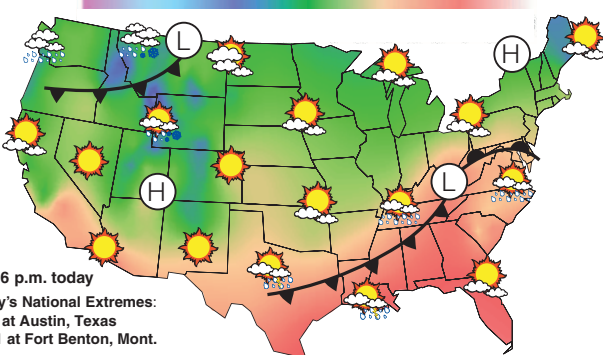

BCS Runs Out of Tweaks — and Luck

Over at the Bowl Championship Series, the short answer to the question of when there will be a playoff in college football remains the same.  
Never.  
But get back in touch with the BCS next week, or better yet, with their sponsors after the Jan. 9 championship game and ask the question then.  
For years now, playoff advocates have been drawing up nightmare scenarios that would shame the BCS out of business, but this season it's practically guaranteed that the title game will leave many fans unsatisfied.  
Last week, four of the top seven teams in the BCS standings lost their footing and left an unprecedented three teams from the same division — the SEC West — holding down the top of the leaderboard.  
Two of them, most likely current No. 1 LSU and No. 2 Alabama, figure to be on hand at the Superdome for the title game. But even if No. 3 Arkansas grabs one of those spots, the newly crowned BCS champion will seem more mythical than ever.  
Remember, the BCS hijacked the postseason in 1998

with the promise of matching the No. 1 and No. 2 teams at the very end. And every time logic didn't jibe with their rankings, the guys in charge "tweaked" the formula after the championship game and promised it wouldn't happen again. You can argue over which school got jobbed the worst since then, but the two unofficial tweaks that matter here — a team must win its conference championship; the BCS finale shouldn't be a rematch of a regular-season game — likely means it's the fans who will feel cheated the most.  
LSU, Alabama and Arkansas all will have played each other by the time next weekend rolls around and it's possible that none of them will be the SEC champion when the game ends on Dec. 3.  
Given the results of that little round-robin tournament so far, only fans of tractor pulls will be rooting to see any two of those three reprise those games in January.  
LSU slogged past Alabama 9-6 in overtime and the Crimson Tide pounded Arkansas 38-14.  
In the past, the waiting period between the end of the regular season and the championship game has always worked in the BCS' favor.

Tempers cool as weeks pass. The outrageous lobbying and occasionally over-the-top remarks coaches make about the selection process recede into the background. Among fans, a kind of fatigue sets in. Arguing over whether either or both teams are deserving gives way to acceptance. It's like walking around with a rock in your shoe.  
What makes this season even more aggravating is that the rankings are just about right. Arkansas ventures into Baton Rouge on Friday and if the Razorbacks pull off an upset and go on to beat SEC East entrant Georgia in the conference championship, they will have earned the trip to New Orleans. There are 14 one-loss teams in the mix at the moment, but few would deny that LSU — even if the Tigers lose to Arkansas — and Alabama would be the most deserving of the lot. The problem is that all three would have flaws we might be willing to overlook if they had to clear a path to that championship game on the field — it's called a playoff — instead of relying on computer operators and best guesses to deposit them there. Now, there's virtually no chance the winner gets the benefit of the doubt from the majority of fans.
