## PARKING, AIR SHOW CASH ON COUNCIL'S LIST TONIGHT

From downtown parking changes to fronting expenses for the 2012 air show, the Twin Falls City Council has a full agenda today.

The council will meet at 5 p.m. today at the Council Chambers, 305 Third Ave. E. in Twin Falls. Here is what they plan to discuss:

**Downtown parking:** The council will consider a shakeup of its downtown parking plan, thanks to recommendations from a task force that has looked at the issue for months. The task force is recommending changes that include removal of parking meters downtown and ending the practice of leasing individual spaces. Also, all city-owned lots would provide free public parking on a first-come, first-served basis. Public parking on downtown streets would be regulated with posted time limits that vary based on location. In retail areas of Main Street, for example, there would be a two-hour limit.

In the public lots, the first row of spaces near alleys and buildings would have a three-hour limit, with no time limit on other spaces. The recommendations also call for the city to retain the ability to lease lots for economic development opportunities.

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## Sagebrush Rebel Keeps Up Fight Against Feds

An aging Fred Kelly Grant is still in demand from counties and tea party groups as conservative elements in the West continue to clash with the federal government.

**NAMPA** • A 75-year-old lawyer who fought private property rights battles alongside Idaho U.S. Rep. Helen Chenoweth and her Nevada rancher husband Wayne Hage in the 1990s is still cultivating the Sagebrush Rebellion's roots.

Fred Kelly Grant has been slowed by age and heart surgery, but he's in demand from counties — and tea partiers who attend his \$150-per-person seminars — as conservative elements in the West's continue to clash with the federal government.

California's Siskiyou County is paying Grant \$10,000 to help block removal of four Klamath River dams. Montana and Idaho counties have enlisted him to trim hated wolf populations and thwart U.S. Forest Service road closures.

What Grant preaches is “coordination,” the theory that federal agencies by law must deal with local governments when revising their public land travel plans or protecting endangered species. Grant insists he's not reviving the discredited “county supremacy” movement, in which a Nevada county once threatened federal employees with prosecution.

“This is not nullification,” simply ignoring federal mandates, he told The Associated Press. “Coordination is working within the system to try and make the system work.”

Hage, who died in 2006, epitomized the Sagebrush Rebellion by battling the federal government over water rights. Chenoweth, killed the same year in a car crash, worried that federal agents would arrive aboard black helicopters to enforce the

**Air show funding:** The council will consider a request to loan \$25,000 to the upcoming 2012 Magic Valley Air Show, which features the Blue Angels. Under the terms of the request, the money would be returned after the air show ends. The event is scheduled for July 28-29. Currently, commitments totaling more than \$39,000 from other sponsors have been collected, according to the request.

**Communication towers:** The council will consider a request to place two new communications towers that officials say are needed to improve communications for fire and

police departments. One 60-foot tower would be on property located at the Twin Falls Chamber Visitors Center, 3591 Blue Lakes Boulevard N., and a 100-foot tower would be located at the City of Twin Falls Gun Range, east of the 4100 block of Hankins Road E. and south of the Snake River Canyon Rim Trail.

**Property bid:** The council will consider a bid of \$128,250 from Allen Nagel, who is seeking to purchase a 0.27-acre track of city property located at 287 Washington St. N. It's the highest bid for the property, which is one of a handful of parcels that the city is trying to sell.

# Sugar City Man Killed on Icy E. Idaho Highway

**REXBURG (AP)** • Authorities in eastern Idaho say a 57-year-old Sugar City man died after he stopped to help a motorist who had slid off the road and was struck by another vehicle

that lost control on the icy highway.

Madison Fire Department officials tell the *Standard Journal* that James Westwood died Friday after being struck by

an eastbound sport-utility vehicle on State Highway 33.

Officials say the SUV contained a man and woman, as well as an 8-year-old girl who was

thrown out the back window into the snow when the SUV rolled down an embankment. Officials say all three were treated and released from an area hospital.

Endangered Species Act.

Grant, a former federal prosecutor in Maryland who once helped guide Stewards of the Range, the Hage family's property-rights non-profit, started his own foundation last year. He, a son and daughter-in-law now give seminars, often to tea party groups, on how locals can demand coordination when Washington, D.C. isn't listening.

Grant insists he's no radical, but he's not above fanning the flames. In 2009, he told a crowd angry about road closures in California's Shasta-Trinity National Forest that he once dismissed those who claimed the United Nations and U.S. government sought to eliminate people from public land as crackpots who saw "a communist behind every sagebrush."

"I thought it was a conspiratorial theory," Grant said, in video footage. "It's not."

Some environmentalists are dubious of Grant's "coordination," saying it's so much fodder on the conservative rubber-chicken circuit for a restive Western audience long unhappy with federal management of vast tracts of public land.

"He's saying a county should adopt its own plan, and the federal government is obliged to make sure its plan is consistent with the local plan," said Jon Marvel, Western Watersheds Project director in Hailey, Idaho. "It's nullification by another name."

Grant insists federal courts side with him.

In 2001, a U.S. District Court judge in Utah ordered the Bureau of Land Management to remove wild horses resettled in Uintah County, in part because the agency didn't coordinate with local officials.

"Coordination does not mean the county gets its way," Grant said. "What it means is, the federal government should be discussing policy with the county, and considering alternatives."

He cites Idaho's Owyhee County, where he says coordination between locals and the BLM beginning in 1990 resolved grazing disputes — and led to ranchers' support for 500,000 acres of federal-

ly protected wilderness created here in 2009.

In California's Modoc County, officials say coordination begun in 1993 helped resolve disputes, including halting plans to curtail grazing.

"The federal government is the one that's ultimately calling the shots on the federal land," said Tim Burke, BLM field manager in Alhambra, Calif. "But the federal government is definitely interested in what the county has to say."

Idaho's Benewah and Custer counties and Montana's Ravalli County enlisted Grant's help as they aim to reduce wolves and reopen backcountry roads closed by the Forest Service and BLM.

"They're not giving us a say in how they're managing our land," said Custer County Commissioner Doyle Lamb.

Ravalli County Commissioner Matt Kanenwisher says he's seen some changes in how federal agencies in Montana respond to counties, but says time will tell if they're taking coordination seriously.

"In the view of coordination, counties aren't a stakeholder — they're a partner," he said.

Almost nowhere has Grant's message resonated more deeply than in California's Siskiyou County, in 14,179-foot Mt. Shasta's shadow. "Coordination" became a catch phrase in the battle over whether four Klamath River dams should be dynamited to help endangered salmon.

Craig Tucker, a spokesman for the Karuk Indian Tribe that favors dam removal, first heard the word after Grant gave a seminar in nearby Redding in 2009 attended by dam-removal foes.

"Now, when those guys open their mouths, the first thing they start talking about is coordination," Tucker said. "It seems to me Fred Kelly Grant has sold people a bill of goods that amounts to snake oil."

Jim Cook, a Siskiyou commissioner who attended Grant's Redding seminar, said Tucker and federal managers dismiss coordination at their own peril.

Maybe it's not a silver bul-

let, "but you do make them explain why they do things," Cook said. "That makes the agencies squirm. It asks, 'Can you come in front of a judge and explain why you blew this policy off?'"

In an Oct. 19 letter, Cook threatened U.S. Interior Secretary Ken Salazar with a lawsuit for "failing to coordinate your dam destruction decision with Siskiyou County. We will not stand idly by and allow you to continue to violate the law," Cook wrote.

Salazar's agency responded Nov. 4, citing 27 meetings with county officials since 2010.

Department of Interior lawyers contend Cook misinterprets federal laws purporting to require coordination.

"We're under no obligation to actually coordinate with these entities," said federal Bureau of Reclamation spokesman Pete Lucero. "What this really boils down to is the fact that we don't agree. The fact that we fail to agree does not mean there's a failure to cooperate with each other."

Short, now 18, was about 6 years old at the time. "We weren't going to get a Christmas that year and we were out of food. They gave us a lot of food."

Kaylynn and Emilee Taylor, 13, have both given hours of their time this year sorting toys and books and packing boxes.

"I do it because it is fun and I get to help out people," said Taylor.

Founded in 1979, today the non-profit charity hands out about 600 boxes

each year filled with food, toys and gifts for families. The boxes will help about 1,800 people.

"Our donations are coming in slowly this year," said Linda Short, president of the Christmas Council.

Over the years, the Christmas Council volunteers have streamlined the process. This year, they have added another quality-control person to double check boxes on distribution day.

Along with the council's core volunteers, there are many other community members from schools, churches, businesses and

families that find ways to donate by offering a great deal, making toys or gifts and gathering food and gift donations in the community.

"We have so many groups that help out and they are all so enthusiastic," said Verlee Frost, longtime Christmas Council volunteer.

Short said they have received more applications this year than last year at this time, and donations are down quite a bit.

The council will accept applications for boxes, which are still available from any Mini-Cassia

school or through the South Central Community Action Partnership, though Dec. 10. The boxes will be distributed Dec. 17.

Due to a box shortage, recipients will need to bring their own empty box and leave it in the car on pick-up day. A helper will bring the applicant's box out to their car and transfer items into the recipient's box.

The council especially needs sturdy new toys for children and gift items for teen boys and adults and food donations.

"A great gift for an adult is anything the giver would like to receive," said Frost.

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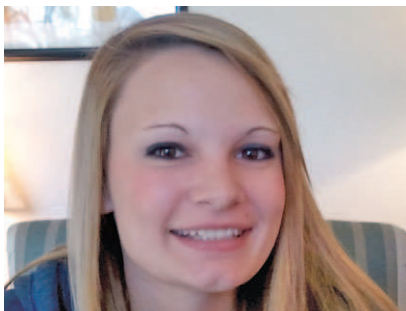

Federer Beats Tsonga to Win 6th ATP Finals

**LONDON •** Roger Federer wasn't about to let Jo-Wilfried Tsonga pull off another improbable comeback.

After a year that saw some uncharacteristic slip-ups from Federer in big matches, the Swiss star shrugged off a second-set letdown to beat Tsonga 6-3, 6-7 (6), 6-3 for a record sixth title in the ATP World Tour Finals.

“I know it's one of my greatest accomplishments,” Federer said. “This definitely is an amazing finish again to the season. I've never finished so strong.”

Federer was by far the most impressive player this whole week at the season-ending event for the top eight players in the world, where his three group-stage victories included his most comprehensive win ever over Rafael Nadal, beating the Spaniard 6-3, 6-0 on Tuesday.

But he looked in danger of faltering against Tsonga when he failed to serve out the match at 5-4 in the second set and then wasted a match point in the tiebreaker.

But Tsonga, who became the first player to rally from a two-set deficit to beat Federer in a Grand Slam tournament in this year's Wimbledon quarterfinals, couldn't pull off another surprise this time.

Playing in his 100th career final, Federer broke for a 5-3 lead in the decider and served out the match to love, sealing his 70th career title with an easy volley.

“I think that was the difference to other matches this year, where I lost so closely,” Federer said. “This time around I was still able to find a way through. I think that was the difference at times during the year, which didn't maybe make this an absolutely phenomenal year.”

Federer finished the season without a Grand Slam title for the first time since 2002, after also wasting a two-set lead against Novak Djokovic in the U.S. Open semifinals – where the top-ranked Serb saved two match points in the fifth set.

Federer took a six-week break shortly after that – in part, he said, to sort out his head after those losses to Tsonga and Djokovic.

Two Sides to Broncos' Defense

Over the season, Boise State's defense has looked dominant at times and feeble at others.

Much of that can be credited to the quality of opponent they're playing, and against Wyoming on Saturday they eliminated the Cowboy offensive attack in a 36-14 victory.

In their two games before Wyoming, the Broncos allowed 35 points in both, with a barely-existent pass defense torched by an average of 411.5 yards in each game.

Boise State defensive end Tyrone Crawford's strip of freshman Cowboy quarterback Brett Smith that led to a Bronco fumble recovery in the second quarter halted Wyoming's strong start permanently, and the Broncos yielded only 191 total yards and only seven points scored by the Cowboys' offense.

“They're just a really good football team, so it was hard to move the ball,” Smith said.

Rather than continue to stretch the field vertically, the Cowboys elected to try extending the field horizontally with a bevy of screens and quick, short

passes into the flats.

“They're really fast,” Smith said. “They're the fastest team we've played and they rally to the ball real well.”

Smith completed 17-of-25 passes for only 78 yards with one touchdown. Guarding against the deep throw, the Boise State secondary provided the Cowboy receivers with plenty of cushion – about 10 yards off – and closed on the screens so fast that the Wyoming receivers could not hold their blocks long enough for the ball carrier to advance downfield. Defensive back George Iloka, a

Syracuse Fires Assistant Basketball Coach Fine

**SYRACUSE, N.Y. •** Bernie Fine was fired Sunday by Syracuse University after a third man accused the assistant basketball coach of molesting him nine years ago.

“At the direction of Chancellor Cantor, Bernie Fine's employment with Syracuse University has been terminated, effective immediately,” Kevin Quinn, the school's senior vice president for public affairs,

said in a statement.

The 65-year-old Fine was in his 36th season at his alma mater. He had the longest active streak of consecutive seasons at one school among assistant coaches in Division I.

Zach Tomaselli, 23, of Lewiston, Maine, said Sunday that he told police that Fine molested him in 2002 in a

Pittsburgh hotel room. He said Fine touched him “multiple” times in that one incident.

Syracuse coach Jim Boeheim said he supported the university's decision to fire his longtime assistant and expressed regret for his initial statements that might have been “insensitive to victims of abuse.”

“The allegations that

have come forth today are disturbing and deeply troubling,” Boeheim said in a statement released by the school. “I am personally very shocked because I have never witnessed any of the activities that have been alleged. I believe the university took the appropriate step tonight. ... I deeply regret any statements I made that might have inhibited that from occurring or been insensitive to victims of abuse.”

# Janikowski's Leg Lifts Raiders Past Bears

**OAKLAND, Calif.** • Sebastian Janikowski kicked a team-record six field goals and Oakland took advantage of three interceptions from Chicago's fill-in starter Caleb Hanie in picking up a 25-20 victory.

Carson Palmer threw for 301 yards and Michael Bush iced the game with a touchdown run in the fourth quarter to lead the Raiders (7-4) to their third straight win against a Bears team missing starting quarterback Jay Cutler.

Hanie struggled in his first career start in place of Cutler, who broke his right thumb last week in Chicago's sixth straight win to put a major obstacle into what had been a promising season for the Bears (7-4).

**PATRIOTS 38, EAGLES 20 PHILADELPHIA** • Tom Brady threw for 361 yards and three touchdowns in a game that all but ended the Eagles' playoff hopes.

Filling in for the injured Michael Vick for the second straight game, Vince Young couldn't keep the Eagles in contention despite a career-best 400 yards passing. The Eagles fell to 4-7 in a season that began with Super Bowl expectations.

Angry fans made their feelings known about coach Andy Reid, chanting "Fire Andy!" in the second half.

The defending NFC East champions fell to 1-5 at home and have lost eight of nine at the Linc, including a playoff loss to Green Bay last January.

Down 10-0 early, the AFC East-leading Patriots rallied behind Brady. New England (8-3) scored on five of its next six possessions, excluding a kneel-down at the end of the first half.

**REDSKINS 23, SEAHAWKS 17 SEATTLE** • Rex Grossman found Anthony Armstrong for a 50-yard touchdown and Washington rallied for 16 fourth-quarter points to end a six-game losing streak.

One play after committing a grounding penalty, Grossman stepped up in the pocket on third-and-19 and found Armstrong in the corner of the end zone.

The touchdown pass was Grossman's second of the game and followed rookie Roy Helu's leaping 28-yard TD run that pulled the Redskins (4-7) within 17-14.

Grossman finished 26 of 35 for 314 yards.

**PANTHERS 27, COLTS 19 INDIANAPOLIS** • Cam Newton threw for 208 yards and ran for one score and DeAngelo Williams scored twice Sunday to help the Carolina Panthers hold off the winless Indianapolis Colts 27-19.

The Panthers (3-8) ended a 12-game road losing streak by winning outside Charlotte, N.C., for the first time since Dec. 27, 2009 when they beat the New York Giants.

Newton was 20 of 27 and carried nine times for 53 yards. Williams ran 15 times for 69 yards including the game-sealing score -a 2-yard TD run with 10:23 left in the game.

The Colts dropped to 0-11 for the first time since 1986 and have lost six home games in a season for the sixth time in the Indianapolis era.

**FALCONS 24, VIKINGS 14 ATLANTA** • Matt Ryan tossed three touchdown passes and Atlanta held on again.

The Falcons (7-4) were up 17-0 at halftime after allowing just 97 yards. But, mimicking the previous week's closer-than-necessary victory over Tennessee, they let Minnesota (2-9) back in the game.

Toby Gerhart, filling in for injured Adrian Peterson, scored from the 1 late in the third quarter. Then, after Dominique Franks inadvertently touched a punt the Falcons were trying to avoid

to set up a Vikings recovery, Christian Ponder went to Percy Harvin for a 39-yard touchdown pass on fourth-and-13 to make it 17-14.

But Ryan responded with a 3-yard scoring pass to backup Michael Palmer, and the Falcons held on downs after Harvin's 104-yard kickoff return to the Atlanta 3.

**TEXANS 20, JAGUARS 13 JACKSONVILLE, Fla.** • Matt Leinart injured his throwing shoulder, overshadowing Houston's victory against the offensively inept Jaguars.

Arian Foster ran for 65 yards and a score, Leinart delivered a perfect touchdown pass to Joel Dreessen before leaving the game and the Texans (8-3) sacked Blaine Gabbert six times. It was good enough for their fifth consecutive win, which moved Houston a little closer to clinching the AFC South.

But Leinart's shoulder could be a serious setback.

The Texans already lost starter Matt Schaub for the season with a right foot injury. Now, they are down to T.J. Yates and newly signed Kellen Clemens.

**JETS 28, BILLS 24 EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J.** • Mark Sanchez threw four touchdown passes, including the winning score to Antonio Holmes with just over a minute remaining.

With the Jets trailing 24-21 and facing a third-and-11 from the Bills 36, Sanchez connected with Plaxico Burress, who made an impressive one-handed grab for the first down. Sanchez quickly ran a quarterback sneak and then, on the next play, rolled out to his right to buy some time and found Holmes alone in the right corner of the end zone to give the Jets the lead with 1:01 left.

The Jets (6-5) entered the game with many players saying they need to win each of their last six to make the postseason. They overcame a valiant comeback attempt by the Bills (5-6), who have lost four straight.

**CARDINALS 23, RAMS 20 ST. LOUIS** • Patrick Peterson tied the NFL record with his fourth punt return for a touchdown this season, Beanie Wells set a franchise mark with 228 yards rushing, and Arizona won its seventh in a row in St. Louis.

Wells averaged 8.4 yards per carry on a career day that included gains of 71 and 53 yards. The latter set up Jay Feely's go-ahead 22-yard field goal with 4:12 remaining. Rookie Sam Acho also

had a career day on defense with two sacks and a fumble recovery for Arizona (4-7), which did enough to overcome another awful outing by John Skelton, who threw two interceptions.

Brandon Lloyd's 16-yard TD catch from Sam Bradford tied it at 20 with 7:46 to go. Nick Miller had an 88-yard punt return in the first quarter for the Rams (2-9) only three days after he re-signed with the team.

**TTITANS 23, BUCCANEERS 17 NASHVILLE, Tenn.** • Chris Johnson ran for a season-high 190 yards, and Matt Hasselbeck threw a 2-yard touchdown pass to Damian Williams on fourth-and-2 with 3:01 left.

The Titans (6-5) forced five turnovers and overcame four turnovers of their own. The Bucs outscored them 14-3 off mistakes even though Tennessee got the ball three times on Tampa Bay's side of the field.

But the Titans got the ninth and final turnover of the game when rookie linebacker Colin McCarthy intercepted Josh Freeman with 2:19 left.

The Bucs (4-7) lost their fifth straight even with LeGarrette Blount running for 103 yards.

**BENGALS 23, BROWNS 20 CINCINNATI** • A.J. Green made a leaping catch for a 51-yard gain in the final minute, setting up a field goal that rallied Cincinnati.

The surprising Bengals (7-4) stayed right behind Baltimore and Pittsburgh in the AFC North with another second-half comeback forged by their rookie big-play combination.

Andy Dalton threw a high down-the-middle pass that Green went way above the defenders to grab. Green was run out of bounds at the 2, and the Browns (4-7) forced Cincinnati to settle for Mike Nugent's 26-yard field goal with 38 seconds left — the Bengals' first lead of the game.

**STEELERS 13, CHIEFS 9 KANSAS CITY, Mo.** • Ben Roethlisberger joked that the broken thumb on his throwing hand was "still attached" after Sunday night's game against the Kansas City Chiefs.

The Pittsburgh Steelers are still tied for lead in the AFC North because of it.

Roethlisberger threw a short touchdown pass to Weslye Saunders in the first half, and the Steelers took advantage of four turnovers by Chiefs quarterback Tyler Palker in a 13-9 victory that allowed them to keep pace with Baltimore atop their loaded division.

## Bush Tax Cuts are Central to Failure of Supercommittee

The following editorial appeared in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch on Wednesday:

Much hot air has been expended, with much coming, about the failure of Congress’ Joint Select Committee on Deficit Reduction to reach an agreement to forestall \$1.2 trillion in budget cuts beginning in 2013. The “supercommittee” thus confirmed the worst suspicions about this Congress: It is not capable of addressing the nation’s debt crisis, not if it would imperil its members’ individual interests. That 9 percent approval rating Congress got in the most recent New York Times/CBS Poll now looks 9 points too high. Floating in the hot air are all manner of excuses: President Barack Obama failed to lead. The Republicans wouldn’t give on tax expenditures. The Democrats wouldn’t be specific about cuts to entitlements. Etc., etc. Ignore it all. Three words explain the supercommittee’s failure and, indeed, much of the debt crisis itself: Bush tax cuts.

Had Congress not enacted President George W. Bush’s tax-cut proposals in 2001 and 2003, at least \$2.2 trillion more would have flowed into the Treasury between 2001 and 2010, according to the authoritative Tax Policy Center of the Urban Institute and Brookings Institution.

Had Congress not decided to pass a Medicare drug benefit and wage two wars off the books, the picture would have been even brighter.

Water under the bridge, right? Well, here’s some water that’s still upstream: If Congress were to allow the tax cuts to expire next year (they’ve already been extended two years because of a deal Mr. Obama struck with congressional Republicans) it would mean an additional \$4 trillion to the Treasury between 2012 and 2020.

Four trillion dollars is precisely the amount that the leaders of the National Commission on Fiscal Responsibility and Reform recommended last December as being needed in the next 10 years to stabilize the debt crisis. But the commission couldn’t get the majority seven votes among its members to send its plan to Congress.

That was Failure to Deal No. 1. Failure to Deal No. 2 came during last summer’s debt-ceiling negotiations, which was resolved with the appointment of the supercommittee, which just executed Failure to Deal No. 3. All of them, and more to come, stem from the Primal Failure, the Bush tax cuts.

Fundamental points:

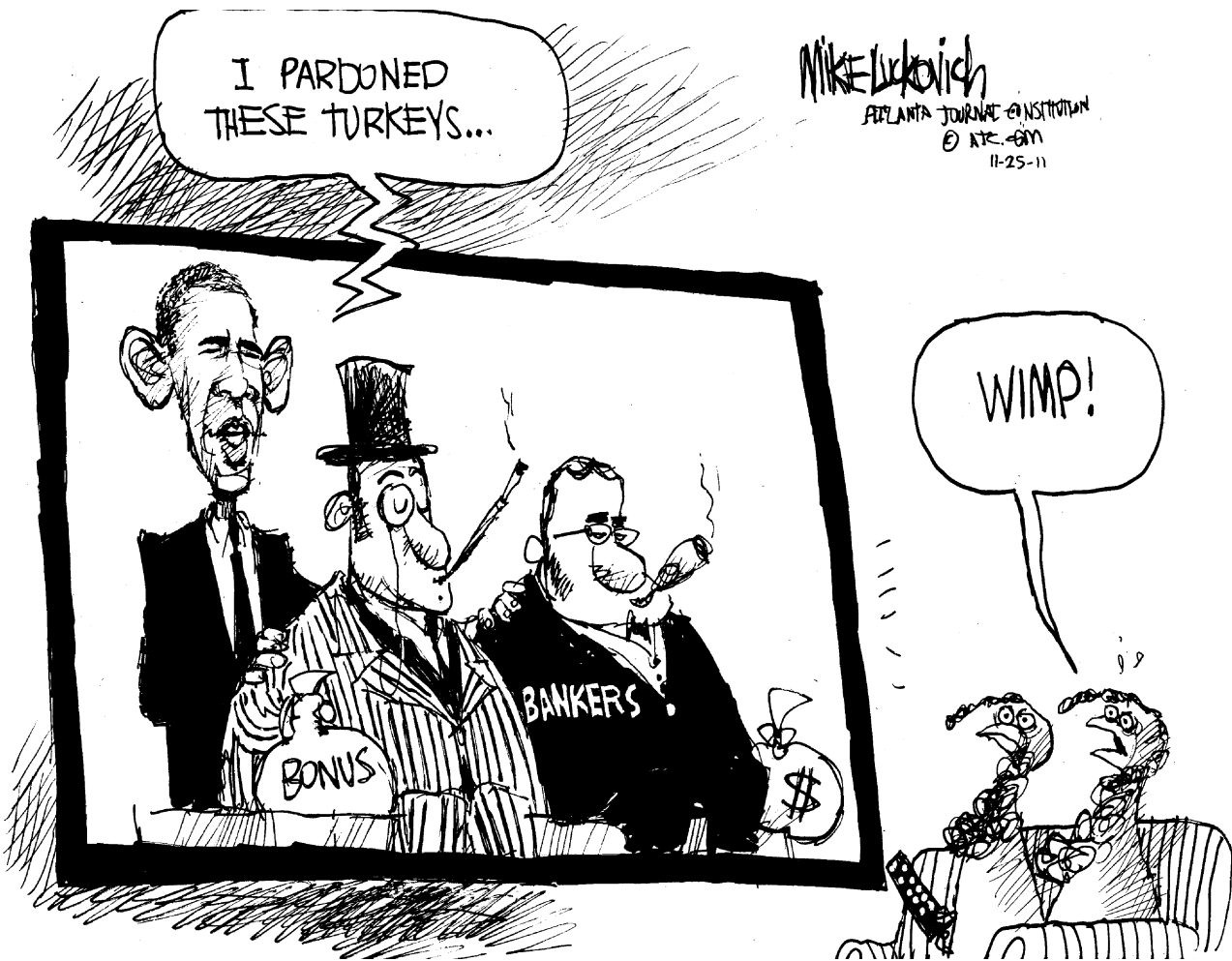
- The United States cannot, without gutting needed programs and savaging the elderly and infirm, cut \$1.2 trillion out of its budget in the next 10 years without increasing revenue. The only way to do that would be to take half of those cuts from defense and security spending, as the deal creating the supercommittee called for. Republicans and many Democrats will balk at that.
- A combination of careful spending cuts, eliminating or cutting back tax breaks and returning the top tax bracket to the pre-2001 level of 39.6 percent could raise or save enough revenue to navigate the crisis responsibly.

- At this point, more than two-thirds of the benefits of the 2001-2003 tax cut packages accrue to the wealthiest 20 percent of American households. This entire crisis has been manufactured to benefit 2 percent of taxpayers, households earning \$250,000 a year or more.
- None of this will be settled before the 2012 elections are over. The campaign will be, and should be, about the ascendancy of greed. It is a fight worth waging. It is a battle worth winning.

## Cyber Monday Cheats Everyone

winter snow or helping seniors pay their heating bills. Not to mention the consumer dollars that won’t circulate in our local economies because the current system rewards online shopping with out-of-state businesses.

What is this loophole? In 1992, the Supreme Court ruled that states could not force a retailer to collect sales taxes unless that retailer had a store, warehouse, or other “physical presence” within the state. At that time, it was a ruling about catalog and other “remote sellers” who, the court decided, shouldn’t have to navigate the often complex tangle of state and local sales tax systems.

But technological changes since 1992 make the court’s decision far more consequential than they could have imagined. Three years after this decision, Amazon.com opened for business and online shopping has exploded since then. At the same time, the court’s fears about tax complexity are obsolete, since computer software now makes it easy

for remote retailers to calculate and collect state sales taxes nationwide.

To be clear, the problem is not that e-retailers are dodging taxes, it’s that they aren’t collecting them from consumers. While every state legally requires shoppers to pay sales taxes directly to the government when retailers fail to collect it, these laws are hopelessly unenforceable as sales taxes were never intended to be paid by individuals.

Those uncollected taxes add up. The losses are growing every year and the cumulative results are staggering. Florida’s losses, for example, are \$715 million this year, a jump of more than \$100 million since last year. Illinois lost \$383 million in 2010, and is facing a \$450 million loss this year. New York and Texas are facing sales tax revenue losses in excess of \$700 million each in 2011, and the list goes on. Every one of those uncollected sales tax dollars is a dollar not spent on public safety or education, and a dollar price advantage we are giving to online retailers but denying to businesses in our own towns.

In an effort to regain those lost dollars, individual states are beginning to strike ad hoc deals with some online

retailers, but the process is burdensome to states and lets too many other companies off the hook.

The good news is that Congress is looking at legislation that would finally allow states to compel online retailers to comply with their sales tax collection laws, so long as those states simplify their sales tax systems and exempt very small businesses. The bad news is, the current Congress is about as gridlocked as the parking lot at your local shopping mall on Black Friday.

But there is reason for hope. Traditional retailers with big pocketbooks, like Target and Home Depot, have finally grown tired of watching their online competitors exploit the no-tax loophole and are making their voices heard in Washington. If these brick and mortar titans succeed, they will, in the process, help level the playing field for small local business and restore the public resources we all depend on.

## Reducing Rape Behind Bars

The following editorial appeared in Saturday’s Washington Post:

This much is welcome: The long and inexplicably arduous process of crafting regulations to reduce rape and sexual abuse behind bars is finally nearing completion. But questions remain about whether the reforms proposed by the Obama administration will suffice to shield incarcerated men, women and children from this particular brand of brutality.

The Prison Rape Elimina-

tion Act of 2003 (PREA) was, especially by today’s standards, a remarkable bipartisan effort. Ideological opposites Frank Wolf, R-Va., and Bobby Scott, D-Va., joined in the House, as did Jeff Sessions, R-Ala., and Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., in the Senate, to sponsor a bill that rejected the notion that sexual abuse is an unavoidable byproduct of incarceration. Lawmakers from both chambers unanimously recognized that such abuse is an unacceptable lapse in institutional order that scars its victims for years and undermines their chances of reintegrating into society.

A commission established by Congress took six years to

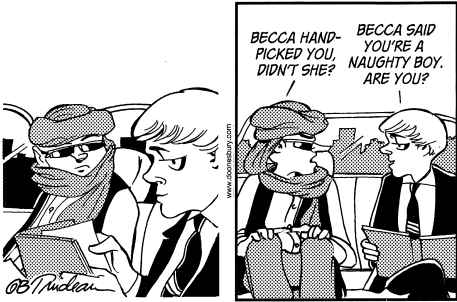
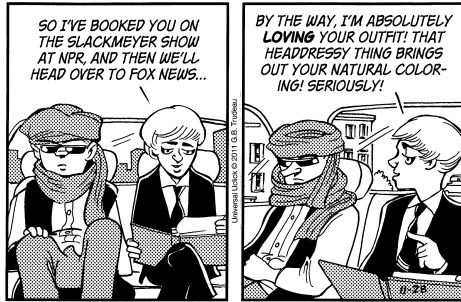
study the matter, and in 2009 it issued compelling and thorough recommendations. Unfortunately, the Justice Department duplicated much of the panel’s work, which delayed the crafting of regulations. The department missed the June 2010 deadline by which new rules were to be implemented; it is now poised to deliver proposed regulations to the Office of Management and Budget, which has roughly 90 days to review the recommendations before they become final.

Attorney General Eric Holder has embraced a number of important reforms, including some that have been opposed by the

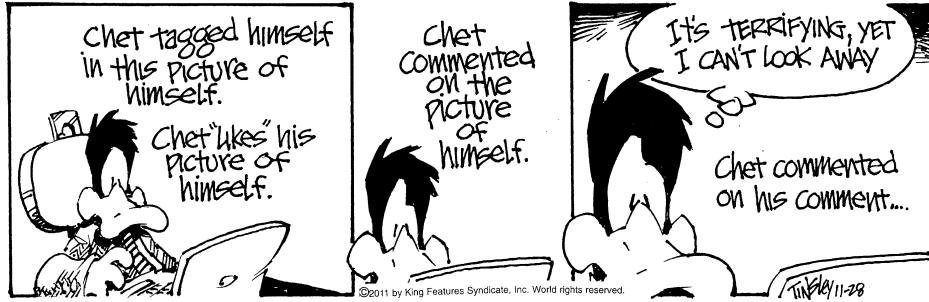
corrections industry. These include: a zero-tolerance policy for rape and sexual abuse behind bars; a prohibition on cross-gender pat-downs and strip searches of juveniles; background checks for corrections officers to ferret out past incidents of inmate abuse; a requirement that every corrections facility designate an on-site PREA coordinator; and the conclusion that PREA covers not just rape but a broader category of sexual abuse, as well.

But Holder and the department have been reluctant to take steps that would ensure the spirit, as well as the letter, of PREA is faithfully followed.

## POACHING MISDEEDS IN IDAHO FOLLOW THREE AUSSIES HOME

**BOISE (AP)** • An Australian lawmaker has sent a letter of apology to an Idaho newspaper that reported the illegal elk and wolf hunting activities of three of his countrymen in Idaho's remote mountains.

Sen. Bob Brown of the Australian Greens political party wrote the letter that was quoted by the *Idaho Statesman* in a story published Friday.

"The episode has been front-page news here, though the popular reaction or, rather, revulsion to that news would not be printable in the same newspapers," he wrote. "We apologize."

Anton Kapeller, 58, pleaded guilty to unlawful killing of an elk, possession and transporting an unlawfully taken elk, and aiding in the take of a closed-season elk. He was fined \$5,792, had his hunting rifle confiscated, and was banned for life from hunting in Idaho. He also was cited for littering.

Darren Tubb, 43, pleaded guilty to taking an elk during a closed season, wasteful destruction of game and transferring a wolf tag. He was fined \$5,268 and also banned for life from hunting in Idaho.

Samuel Henley, 18, pleaded guilty to taking closed-season game and aiding in the taking of closed-season game. He was fined \$2,333 and banned from hunting in Idaho for four years.

The three received the sentences earlier this month in 4th District Court as part of the culmination of a nine-day sting operation that was years in the making. Law enforcement officials said the three were taken into custody on Nov. 3 and, in an expedited process, bonded out of jail six days later.

Idaho has agreements with other states through the Interstate Wildlife Violator Compact that means the three are also banned in those states, which includes the Western U.S.

An Idaho official said his counterparts in the Australian state of Tasmania, where the three live, are also looking at sanctions.

Officials said they had been suspicious of the Australian hunters for years but had a difficult time collecting evidence or reports because the camps were so remote.

So this year law enforcement officials set up a sting that involved eight Idaho Fish and Game officials, one U.S. Fish and Wildlife official, one U.S. Forest Service official, and one Elmore County sheriff's deputy.

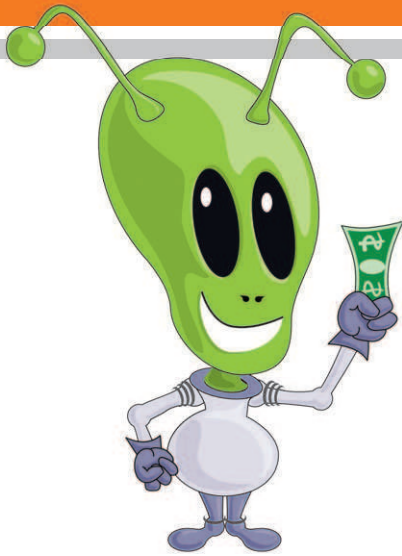
Three of them spent nine days in the remote region near the Australian hunting camp far from roads, using a satellite phone and a messenger to keep in contact with other law enforcement members.

During the operation, officials said the three Australians illegally killed a large bull elk before the season opened, and that one of them shot two wolves, the second one illegally because only one wolf is allowed. Officials took the three into custody at the Queens River trailhead after the three had packed out their gear and loaded the elk antlers into a vehicle.

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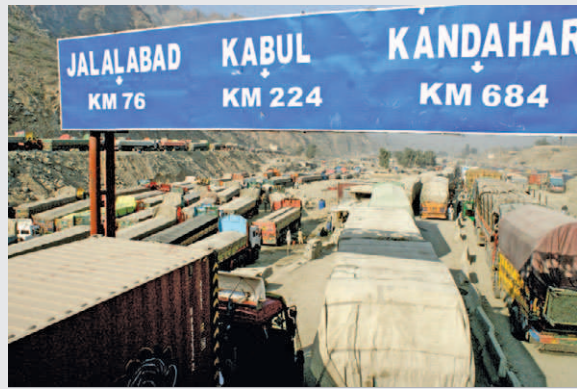

Afghan Officials Say Fire from Pakistani Border Prompted NATO Strikes that Killed 24 Soldiers

ISLAMABAD • Afghanistan officials claimed Sunday that Afghan and NATO forces were retaliating for gunfire from two Pakistani army bases when they called in airstrikes that killed 24 Pakistani soldiers, adding a layer of complexity to an episode that has further strained Pakistan's ties with the United States.

The account challenged Pakistan's claim that the strikes were unprovoked.

The attack Saturday near the Afghan-Pakistani border aroused popular anger in Pakistan and added tension to the U.S. - Pakistani relationship, which has been under pressure since the secret U.S. raid inside Pakistan that killed Osama bin Laden in May.

Pakistan has closed its western border to trucks delivering supplies to coalition troops in Afghanistan, demanded that the U.S. abandon an air base inside Pakistan and said it will review its cooperation with the U.S. and NATO.

A complete breakdown in the relationship between the United States and Pakistan is considered unlikely. Pakistan relies on billions of dollars in American aid, and the U.S. needs Pakistan to push Afghan insurgents to participate in peace talks.

Gingrich Lands Union Leader Endorsement as Romney Keeps Head Down, Continues Deliberate Pace

WASHINGTON • Republican presidential hopeful Newt Gingrich landed the endorsement of New Hampshire's largest newspaper on Sunday while rival Mitt Romney earned a dismissive wave, potentially resetting the race in the state with the first-in-the-nation primary.

For Gingrich, the former House speaker, the backing builds on his recent rise in the polls and quick work to build a campaign after a disastrous start in the summer. Romney, the former Massachusetts governor who has a vacation home in the state and has been called a "nearly native son of New Hampshire," absorbed the blow heading into the Jan. 10 vote that's vital to his campaign strategy.

"We are in critical need of the innovative, forward-looking strategy and positive leadership that Gingrich has shown he is capable of providing," The New Hampshire Union Leader said in its front-page editorial, which was as much a promotion of Gingrich as a discreet rebuke of Romney.

"We don't back candidates based on popularity polls or big-shot backers. We look for conservatives of courage and conviction who are independent-minded, grounded in their core beliefs about this nation and its people, and best equipped for the job," the endorsement said.

The Union Leader's editorial telegraphed conservatives' concerns about Romney's shifts on crucial issues of abortion and gay rights were unlikely to fade. Those worries have led Romney to keep Iowa's Jan. 3 caucuses — where conservatives hold great sway — at arm's length.

Arab League Imposes Sanctions on Syria in an Unprecedented Step

BEIRUT • In an unprecedented move against an Arab nation, the Arab League on Sunday approved economic sanctions on Syria to pressure Damascus to end its deadly suppression of an 8-month-old uprising against President Bashar Assad.

But even as world leaders abandon Assad, the regime has refused to ease a military assault on dissent that already has killed more than 3,500 people. On Sunday, Damascus slammed the sanctions as a betrayal of Arab solidarity and insisted a foreign conspiracy was behind the revolt, all but assuring more bloodshed will follow.

The sanctions are among the clearest signs yet of the isolation Syria is suffering because of the crackdown. Damascus has long boasted of being a powerhouse of Arab nationalism, but Assad has been abandoned by some of his closest allies and now his Arab neighbors. The growing movement against his regime could transform some of the most enduring alliances in the Middle East and beyond.

Retailers Have a Robust Start to Holiday Season

Analysts worry that the heavy marketing hype that pulled in the crowds will steal some thunder from the rest of the season.

More Americans hunted for bargains over the weekend than ever before as retailers lured them online and into stores with big discounts and an earlier-than-usual start to the holiday shopping season.

A record 226 million shoppers visited stores and websites during the four-day holiday weekend starting on Thanksgiving Day, up from 212 million last year, according to early estimates by The National Retail Federation released on Sunday. Americans spent more, too: The average holiday shopper spent \$398.62 over the weekend, up from \$365.34 a year ago.

Art and Anna Destrada from Port Chester, N. Y., were among the holiday shoppers. They started shopping on Thanksgiving evening at a Walmart store, went to various malls in New Jersey on Friday, and got some deals at Macy's on Saturday. They spent a total of \$2,000 on gifts for themselves and others, including a Wii videogame console, clothing and jewelry.

"We've saved for Christmas and put away money all year," says Anna Destrada, 49. "We stayed within our means so we can make a few splurges."

The results for the first holiday shopping weekend show that retailers' efforts to lure shoppers during the weak economy are working. Some like Wal-Mart Stores Inc. and J.C. Penney have been making a stronger push online to better compete with the likes of rival Amazon.com. And major chains like Macy's, Target, Best Buy extended the traditional start to the shopping season by opening their doors at midnight on Thanksgiving evening instead of the pre-dawn Friday hours of years past.

But the question remains whether retailers' will be able to hold shoppers' attention throughout the remainder of the season, which can account for 25 to 40 percent of a merchant's annual revenue. After all, Americans are still very driven by deep discounting and they're more conscious of their spending budgets.

Overall, holiday spending is expected to grow by a modest 2.8 percent to about \$466 billion, according to the NRF. A

fuller picture on spending will come Thursday when major retailers report their November sales figures. But for now, experts agree that retailers will likely have to continue to discount to get shoppers to spend.

"The big question is: How do you close the season?" says Hana Ben-Shabat, a partner at A. T. Kearney's retail practice. "This is a very promotional driven shopper."

Indeed, the earlier hours — which meant earlier door-buster deals — on Black Friday seemed to be what drew many shoppers in over the weekend, particularly the younger crowd.

According to the National Retail Federation, 24 percent of Black Friday shoppers were at stores at midnight. That's up from 9.5 percent the year before when only a few stores were open during that time. Of those shopping at midnight on Black Friday, 37 percent were in the 18-to-34 age group.

"Black Friday has evolved from an early morning shopping activity to a late night entertainment," says Ellen Davis, spokeswoman at The National Retail Federation. "A lot of people stayed up until 1 a.m. or 2 a.m. to go shopping, and then went to bed."

Occupy L.A. Deadline Comes, Many Say They Won't Go

LOS ANGELES • With the clock winding down on a midnight deadline to abandon their weeks-old Occupy Los Angeles protest, hundreds of demonstrators weren't going anywhere Sunday, as they made plans instead to hold an "eviction block party."

Although city officials have told protesters they must leave and take their nearly 500 tents with them by 12:01 a.m. Monday, just a handful were seen packing up Sunday.

Instead, some passed out fliers containing the city seal and the words: "By order of Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa, this notice terminates your tenancy and requires you to attend the Occupy L.A. Eviction Block Party," which the fliers' said was scheduled for 12:01 a.m.

Others attended teach-ins on resistance tactics, including how to stay safe should police begin firing rubber bullets or breaking out tear gas canisters and pepper spray.

"Their plan is to resist the closure of this encampment and if that means getting arrested so be it," said Will Picard, one of the protesters. "I think they just want to make the police tear it down rather than tear it down themselves."

Police, for their part, have said little about what tactic they would take if

protesters ignore the deadline.

Chief Charlie Beck told reporters Friday that officers would definitely not be sweeping through the camp and arresting everyone the minute the clock ticks past midnight.

But in an interview with the Los Angeles Times that was published Sunday, Beck indicated he expects that arrests will become inevitable at some point.

"I have no illusions that everybody is going to leave," Beck said. "We anticipate that we will have to make arrests."

When it comes to that, he said, police officers "will not be the first ones to apply force."

Meanwhile, local clergy and labor leaders implored both sides to ensure that the 2-month-old demonstration remain peaceful.

"We are grateful to the Occupy movement for refocusing the country to the issue of income inequality," Maria Elena Durazo, executive secretary and treasurer of the Los Angeles County Federation of Labor, said in a statement issued Sunday.

"We call for nonviolence in all acts of civil disobedience by Occupy LA and in professional procedures by the LAPD. We are committed to a long-term movement from the 99 percent to hold Wall Street and the banks accountable for devastating our economy," Durazo added.

TEEN TWEETER WILL NOT APOLOGIZE TO KANSAS GOVERNOR

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) • A Kansas teenager who wrote a disparaging tweet about Gov. Sam Brownback is rejecting her high school principal's demand that she apologize.

Emma Sullivan told The Associated Press on Sunday that she's not sorry and an apology letter wouldn't be sincere.

The Shawnee Mission East senior was in Topeka last week when she sent a tweet from the back of a crowd of students listening to Brownback. It read: "Just made mean comments at gov. brownback and told him he sucked, in person."

She actually made no such comment. But Brownback's office saw her post, and she was called into the principal's office. Her apology is due Monday.

Sullivan has received a wave of support, with many saying she shouldn't have been targeted. Her Twitter account now boasts 3,000 followers.

In 1885, at the end of the Third Anglo-Burmese War, British troops occupied Mandalay.

In 1905, Sinn Fein was founded in Dublin.

In 1942, nearly 500 people died in a fire that destroyed the Cocoanut Grove nightclub in Boston.

In 1958, Chad, Gabon and Middle Congo became autonomous republics within the French community.

In 1961, Ernie Davis of Syracuse University became the first African-American football player to be named winner of the Heisman Trophy.

In 1964, the United States launched the space probe Mariner 4 on a course to Mars.

**Five years ago:** At the opening of a NATO summit in Latvia, President George W. Bush rejected suggestions Iraq had fallen into civil war and vowed not to pull U.S. troops out "until the mission is complete." The U.N. Security Council voted unanimously to extend for a year the mandate of the 160,000-strong multinational force in Iraq. Pope Benedict XVI, in Turkey on his first visit to a Muslim country, urged all religious leaders to "utterly refuse" to support any violence in the name of faith.

**One year ago:** European Union nations meeting in Brussels agreed to give 67.5 billion euros (\$89.4 billion) in bailout loans to Ireland to help it weather the cost of its massive banking crisis. WikiLeaks began disclosing over 250,000 private cables written by U.S. diplomats, divulging candid comments from world leaders and detailing occasional U.S. pressure tactics aimed at hot spots in Afghanistan, Iran and North Korea. Actor Leslie Nielsen died in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., at age 84. Samuel T. Cohen, the inventor of the neutron bomb, died in Los Angeles at age 89. Roger Federer won his fifth season-ending title by beating top-ranked Rafael Nadal 6-3, 3-6, 6-1 at the ATP World Tour Finals in London.

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

When a good player lets you score a cheap ruff, think twice about obliging him — it will not usually be in your interest to do what he wants.

In today's deal West led his singleton club against the spade slam, though a singleton in dummy's long suit is less frequently the killing lead than you might think. Had he led a trump, declarer's task would have been hopeless. Incidentally, on a diamond lead, declarer can make by discarding a heart from dummy at trick one and subsequently ruffing a diamond low in dummy, then a heart high (not by any means an obvious line).

Declarer won the club lead in dummy, crossed to hand with a heart, and led another club. West now fell from grace when he ruffed this. Even though he shifted to a diamond to shorten dummy's trumps, it was now easy for declarer to set up the clubs by ruffing just once more in his hand. With the remaining trumps now 2-2, he had a trump left in each hand so he could ultimately ruff dummy's losing heart in his hand.

Suppose West refrains from ruffing the club at trick three. Declarer wins in dummy and ruffs a club high, crosses back to a trump and ruffs another club high. The trouble is that all this ruffing high has generated a trump loser. Although declarer can now draw two rounds of trump and run his clubs, the defense must come to a trump and a heart.

**ANSWER:** It looks natural to lead from a major suit rather than a minor. I have few strong prejudices about opening leads, but borrowing from the French, I do feel strongly that leading from a four-card suit headed by the ace against no-trump is almost always going to be close to my fourth choice. Here a small heart is available as a far more attractive option.
