## Shattered

One month after rash of vandalism reports, Twin Falls police and victims are still looking for answers.

Retirees, blue-collar workers who like to hunt, people who've lived in their home for years, some just about to move — the one thing they all had in common Nov. 8 was the irritation of being a victim of a petty crime with seemingly no meaning.

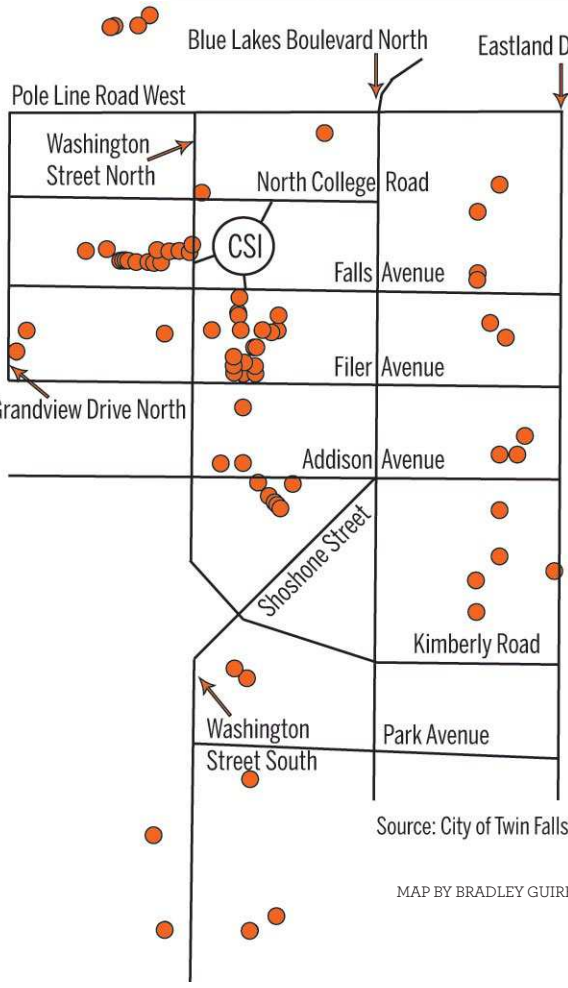
That morning, as Twin Falls residents left home for work, school or to go vote, they discovered shattered glass on the seats of their vehicles and more on the asphalt beneath their tires. In all, Twin Falls police received 98 reports of vandalism in a single day.

Jake Cranney of 212 Ridgeway Drive, where police took eight reports, was woken by his girlfriend, Megan Williams. As she was pulling out of the carport, she noticed a neighbor's truck window was smashed and then noticed Cranney's old fixer-up Dodge Dakota had suffered the same fate. Cranney, like many other vandalism victims, spent his morning sifting through the pea-sized fragments of his window to look for a BB or pellet, much like a prospector searching for gold

## Red Cross Overhaul, Job Cuts Are Aimed to Bolster Work

For the American Red Cross, it has been a doubly challenging year.

While coping with a relentless series of natural disasters, the organization has carried out a nationwide overhaul that slashed more than 1,500 jobs, pared down many local offices, and left some former loyalists with badly bruised feelings.

President Gail McGovern says the 130-year-old Red Cross had little choice but to restructure in order to ward off a projected deficit. It has merged and consolidated many chapters to reduce duplication, and given the national office control over local fundraising so all funds can be spent as strategically as possible.

"We have remarkably loyal donors, and they're also demanding," McGovern said in an interview. "They want to be sure their hard-earned dollars are being used to optimize the mission and are going to help the people we serve."

During the year, McGovern said, the Red Cross has eliminated roughly 1,000 positions at its local and regional chapters and about 170 positions at its Washington headquarters — in each case about 10 percent of the work force. In addition, about 400 posts out of roughly 20,000 were eliminated in the biomedical and blood services division.

McGovern insists that the core missions — notably disaster relief, blood banks and assistance to military families — will not be impaired. She said the Red Cross responded

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## Volunteers Take Drive Beyond Toys

The local Toys for Tots program is providing help for more than just the kids in some locations.

When Peggy Peafnall was first asked to oversee a school Christmas fundraiser, she agreed out of obligation. But four years later, the seasonal toy drive is one of her favorite highlights of the holiday season. "I absolutely love it," she said. "It is a blessing to be part of every year."

flakes in a pan of silt.

“Once every two or three months, we get egged,” Cranney said. “I can deal with that, kids having fun. But this ticks you off.”

The vandalism spanned the city, with at least one report coming from 35 different streets. The streets hit hardest were on the northwest side of town near the College of Southern Idaho and Canyon Ridge High School. Police took nine reports each from Crestview Drive and Washington Street North, eight more from Monroe Street. Calls came in for hours that Tuesday morning. Cranney said an emergency dispatcher told him the city had received at least 20 by the time he called.

Nearly one month has passed since police began investigating the rash of vandalism, but neither they nor the victims are closer to answers. Although investigators have asked the public for leads,

suspects or even surveillance footage from any section of the city hit, there are no suspect descriptions or a vehicle description, much less arrests or criminal complaints.

Officer Luke Allen said because of the scope of the incidents, investigators weren't ruling the possibility of a lone suspect or multiple suspects.

For the victims, money that would have gone to Christmas gift giving or travel to visit relatives or friends instead is going to area auto glass installers. Most residents say they spent on average \$150 for a new window and the labor, not enough to justify filing an insurance claim if their deductible is \$250 or \$500.

“I'm just a redneck with liability,” Cranney joked about his insurance on a blustery Thursday afternoon. He found a cheap window, about \$45, he said, and the endeavor was mostly a success. “The power window still works, but my (power) locks don't.”

vigorously to this year's nationwide onslaught of tornadoes, floods, hurricanes and wildfires.

“If there was any doubt in anyone's mind that we would be able to fulfill the mission, that doubt was removed,” she said. “If anything, we're doing it better.”

The network of chapters is still large — about 600 nationwide, compared to more than 800 five years ago.

The chapters operate with a core of paid staffers and many volunteers, and some have more than one office location in their service area. McGovern said only about 20 of the 1,200 locations nationwide will be closed completely, but many will have reduced staffs and functions.

Such is the case in far-western Nebraska, where the overhaul became acrimonious.

Plans to downgrade the nearly century-old Greater Nebraska Panhandle Chapter into a service center prompted volunteer board members to resign in protest, and its executive director was fired and escorted from the chapter's office in tears.

The upheaval began with an emailed memo in July, according to Rick Tuggle, a Scottsbluff banker and chairman of the chapter's board. The panhandle chapter — which served 11 counties over 14,000 square miles — was told it would be folded into a neighboring Nebraska chapter, Central Plains, with the local board ceding authority over how the money it raised would be spent.

“Keeping the money local did, and does, matter to people out here,” Tuggle said.

Before Tuggle became chairman almost four years ago, the chapter was floundering financially. He recruited doggedly for volunteers, boosting the volunteer board from two to 13 members and helping hire a new executive director.

“About the time ... we were celebrating our victories as a chapter, after three years of operation in the black, we get the letter from regional that says, ‘Oh, guess what? You're not a chapter anymore,’” said Tuggle, who quickly wrote to McGovern, pleading for reconsideration.

Shortly thereafter, the Panhandle group was informed it could remain a chapter in name, but oversight would still go to Central Plains. In August, Panhandle board members met with the executive directors of the Central Plains and Omaha-based Heartland chapters, who said national officials would decide how money they raised would be spent.

By the end of the meeting, six board members had resigned. Some donors then withheld donations, including a \$20,000 pledge rescinded by the local United Way. Next, the

executive directors removed Panhandle director Jann Rouzee, having her escorted her from the building.

Scottsbluff's daily newspaper, the *Star-Herald*, took the side of the local board members in an editorial, saying the higher-ups from afar pushed through the changes “in a bumbling fashion that led to negative publicity and a loss of local support.”

The national Red Cross defended the overhaul across the country as necessary for the organization's fiscal health. It also said the Panhandle region would continue to receive full Red Cross services.

Changes have been felt in most states. In Ohio, the Red Cross merged its Dayton and Cincinnati regions, and laid off at least 29 people — 15 percent of the work force.

In southern Virginia, eight chapters were consolidated into one new administrative region.

In Western Massachusetts, the overhaul was complicated by a decision to cut several programs deemed to be outside the core Red Cross mission. An HIV/AIDS support program was shifted to a regional hospital, but there were hitches finding new agencies to provide non-emergency medical transport.

Richard Lee, executive director of the Pioneer Valley chapter, said about 15 staffers in Western Massachusetts were laid off.

“None of them deserved to lose their jobs,” he said. “That's what made it harder.”

Paul Light, an expert on nonprofits and professor of public service at New York University, said the Red Cross deserved plaudits for undertaking a necessary but difficult task.

“It's exactly the right thing to do, but it is extremely controversial,” he said. “Each one of these chapters has its own identity. Closing one is like closing the local library.”

He said the consolidation should improve disaster response by reducing disparities that sometimes surfaced between relatively strong and relatively weak chapters.

It's the second major Red Cross overhaul in recent years. In 2008, faced with a deficit of about \$210 million, it laid off one-third of the 3,000 employees at its Washington headquarters.

Under the leadership of McGovern, who became president in 2008, the deficit was eliminated, but she says the new cutbacks were needed to prevent fiscal problems from resurfacing. The Red Cross estimates that this year's restructuring will save \$80 million, including salaries and centralizing administrative operations.

“We did not lightly go ahead and make these decisions,” McGovern said. “Layoffs are very difficult in the nonprofit area, because they're not here for the money, they're here because of their hearts.”

afford the presents.

Families fill out an application to verify their level of need and usually need to be at or below the 135 percent of the federal poverty rate.

Last year, the program distributed toys to 6,000 kids, said Paul Johnson, program coordinator.

“I'm guessing it's going to be at least that or more,” he said of this year. “We could very easily see more.”

Peafnall collects applications for Hagerman School District and includes an extra sheet on the form for

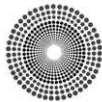
families to make special requests. The forms are then distributed to local churches and the fire department to help meet the extra need.

She says the community's high level of involvement in the toy program has helped keep her wanting to volunteer.

“It's not the same with every application drop-off site, but we're able to get the community on board with this,” Peafnall said. “We've been able to deliver wood to one family along with toys. Sometimes we're out there fixing broken appliances, it all depends what's asked and finding out how we can help them out.”

# Pivotal Week for Europe's Leaders

**BRUSSELS** • Europe's government-debt crisis, which has dragged on for more than two years, is entering a pivotal week, as leaders across the continent converge to prevent a collapse of the euro and a global financial panic that could result.

Expectations are rising that Friday's summit of leaders of the 27 countries in the European Union will yield a breakthrough. An agreement on tighter integration of the 17 EU countries that use the euro — especially on budget matters — would be seen as a crucial first step. That could trigger further emergency aid from the European Central Bank, the International Monetary Fund or some combination, analysts say.

The coming days “will decide if the euro will survive or not,” Emma Marcegaglia, the head of Italy's industrial lobby, Confindustria, said Sunday.

French President Nicolas Sarkozy, German Chancellor Angela Merkel, European Central Bank Chief Mario Draghi and even U.S. Treasury Secretary Timothy Geithner will star in a 5-day financial drama leading up to the summit.

If the summit is a failure, Sarkozy warned last week, “the world will not wait for Europe.”

Sarkozy and Merkel meet in Paris on Monday to unveil a proposal for closer political and economic ties between the 17 euro countries. While the leaders differ on some of the details, their cooperation has been so tight they have come to be known by a single name — “Merkozy.”

The two agree overall on the need for tougher, enforceable rules that would prevent governments from spending or borrowing too much — and on certain penalties for persistent violators.

# Postal Cuts to Slow Down Delivery of First-class Mail

**The changes would provide short-term relief, but ultimately could prove counterproductive, pushing more of America's business onto the Internet.**

**WASHINGTON** • Facing bankruptcy, the U.S. Postal Service is pushing ahead with unprecedented cuts to first-class mail next spring that will slow delivery and, for the first time in 40 years, eliminate the chance for stamped letters to arrive the next day.

The estimated \$3 billion in reductions, to be announced in broader detail on Monday, are part of a wide-ranging effort by the cash-strapped Postal Service to quickly trim costs, seeing no immediate help from Congress.

The changes would provide short-term relief, but ultimately could prove counterpro-

ductive, pushing more of America's business onto the Internet. They could slow everything from check payments to Netflix's DVDs-by-mail, add costs to mail-order prescription drugs, and threaten the existence of newspapers and time-sensitive magazines delivered by postal carrier to far-flung suburban and rural communities.

That birthday card mailed first-class to Mom also could arrive a day or two late, if people don't plan ahead.

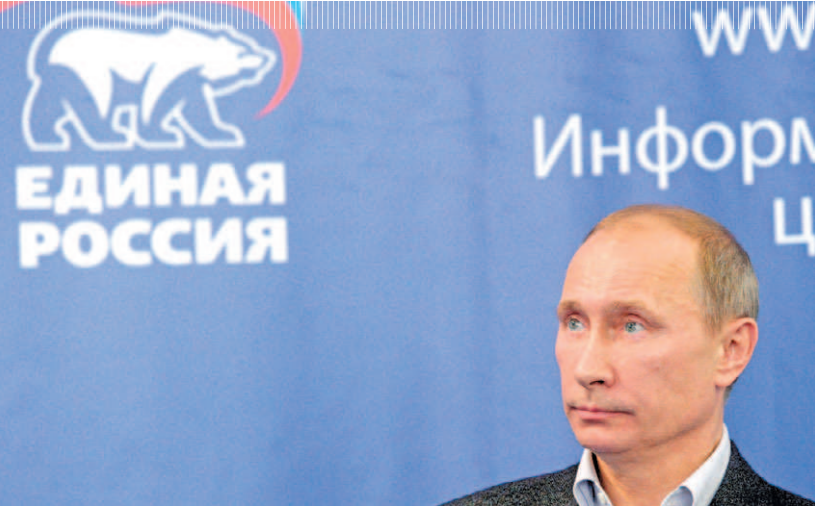
“It's a potentially major change, but I don't think consumers are focused on it and it won't register until the service goes away,” said Jim Corridore, analyst with S&P Capital IQ, who tracks the shipping industry. “Over time, to

the extent the customer service experience gets worse, it will only increase the shift away from mail to alternatives. There's almost nothing you can't do online that you can do by mail.”

The cuts, now being finalized, would close roughly 250 of the nearly 500 mail processing centers across the country as early as next March. Because the consolidations typically would lengthen the distance mail travels from post office to processing center, the agency also would lower delivery standards for first-class mail that have been in place since 1971.

Currently, first-class mail is supposed to be delivered to homes and businesses within the continental U.S. in one day to three days. That will lengthen to two days to three days, meaning mailers no longer could expect next-day

# PUTIN'S PARTY LOSING SUPPORT IN PARLIAMENTARY VOTE

**MOSCOW** • Prime Minister Vladimir Putin's party struggled to hang onto its majority in Russia's parliamentary election, results showed Monday, suggesting Russians were wearying of the man who has dominated Russian politics for more than a decade.

Rival parties and election monitors said even a result of around 50 percent

was inflated, alleging ballot-stuffing and other significant violations at the polls. Many expressed fears that the vote count would be manipulated.

Putin wanted to see his United Russia party do well in Sunday's election as a sign of popular support for his return to the presidency in a vote now three months away. Despite the sobering setback, he was still expected to have little trouble reclaiming the position he held

# Obama Defends American Faith Amid GOP Critique

**WASHINGTON** • Republican Mitt Romney accuses President Barack Obama of considering America “just another nation.” To other GOP politicians running for the White House, Obama has apologized for the United States and is presiding over the nation's decline.

Now comes the counteroffensive.

The president of the United States is defending his faith in America, confronting GOP efforts to undercut his leadership and raise questions about his patriotism as he seeks reelection.

In the battle over “American exceptionalism,” Obama used a recent trip to Asia to highlight America's role as the strongest and most

influential nation on earth. In this election season, responding to the Republican critique is essential for Obama, the only incumbent ever compelled to show a birth certificate to defend his legitimacy.

“Sometimes the pundits and the newspapers and the TV commentators love to talk about how America is slipping and America is in decline,” Obama said Wednesday at a New York fundraiser. “That's not what you feel when you're in Asia. They're looking to us for leadership. They know that America is great not just because we're powerful, but also because we have a set of values that the world admires.”

“We don't just think about what's good for us,

delivery in surrounding communities. Periodicals could take between two days and nine days.

About 42 percent of first-class mail is now delivered the following day. An additional 27 percent arrives in two days, about 31 percent in three days and less than 1 percent in four days to five days. Following the change next spring, about 51 percent of all first-class mail is expected to arrive in two days, with most of the remainder delivered in three days.

The consolidation of mail processing centers is in addition to the planned closing of about 3,700 local post offices. In all, roughly 100,000 postal employees could be cut as a result of the various closures, resulting in savings of up to \$6.5 billion a year.

Expressing urgency to reduce costs, Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe said in an interview that the agency has to act while waiting for Congress to grant it authority to reduce delivery to five days a week, raise stamp prices and reduce health care and other labor costs.

The Postal Service, an independent agency of government, does not receive tax money, but is subject to congressional control on large aspects of its operations. The changes in first-class mail delivery can go into place without permission from Congress.

After five years in the red, the post office faces imminent default this month on a \$5.5 billion annual payment to the Treasury for retiree health benefits. It is projected to have a record loss of \$14.1 billion next year amid steady declines in first-class mail volume. Donahoe has said the agency must make cuts of \$20 billion by 2015 to be profitable.

It already has announced a 1-cent increase in first-class mail to 45 cents beginning Jan. 22.

“We have a business model that is failing. You can’t continue to run red ink and not make changes,” Donahoe said. “We know our business, and we listen to our customers. Customers are looking for affordable and consistent mail service, and they do not want us to take tax money.”

Separate bills that have passed House and Senate committees would give the Postal Service more authority and liquidity to stave off immediate bankruptcy. But prospects are somewhat dim for final congressional action on those bills anytime soon, especially if the measures are seen in an election year as promoting layoffs and cuts to neighborhood post offices.

Technically, the Postal Service must await an advisory opinion from the independent Postal Regulatory Commission before it can begin closing local post offices and processing centers. But such opinions are non-binding, and Donahoe is making clear the agency will proceed with reductions once the opinion is released next March.

“The things I have control over here at the Postal Service, we have to do,” he said, describing the cuts as a necessary business decision. “If we do nothing, we will have a death spiral.”

The Postal Service initially announced in September it was studying the possibility of closing the processing centers and published a notice in the Federal Register seeking comments. Within 30 days, the plan elicited nearly 4,400 public comments, mostly in opposition.

“Where we today have agreements, we need in the future to have legally binding regulations,” Merkel said Friday.

Merkel wants to change the basic EU treaty to reflect the tougher rules on euro countries and make them enforceable. Even if there is general agreement on Friday, actually putting new rules in place through treaty changes could take more than a year. And many economists fear the new rules alone would not be enough to halt the rise in Europe’s borrowing costs.

The hope is that a firm expression of intent, however, would reassure the ECB, so that it can make stronger efforts in the short term. That would give governments time to get their finances under better control and make economic reforms that would improve growth.

The urgency has been heightened in recent weeks as Italy and Spain, the continent’s third- and fourth-largest economies, face unsustainable high costs to finance their debts. The yield on 10-year Italian bonds is around 7 percent. Yields above that level forced Ireland, Portugal and Greece to seek bailouts. By comparison, bond yields in Germany, Europe’s largest and most stable economy, are roughly 2 percent.

“The eurozone is threatened to face an existential situation if it becomes clear over the next few weeks that several member states cannot cover their refinancing needs, or can only do so at suicidal conditions,” former German Finance Minister Peer Steinbrueck told the Sunday edition of German tabloid Bild.

“Everything must be done to hinder the eurozone from breaking up,” he said.

Italy, whose government debt is equivalent to 120 percent of the country’s annual economic output, needs to re-finance euro200 billion (\$270 billion) of its euro1.9 trillion (\$2.6 trillion) of outstanding debt by the end of April.

The size of the problems

facing Italy and Spain are considered too large for the existing funds available to the European Financial Stability Facility (\$590 billion) and the IMF (\$389 billion.) To boost the firepower of the IMF, several economists have proposed that the ECB lend to it.

“We are now entering the critical period,” the EU’s financial chief, Olli Rehn, said last Wednesday.

That same day, the U.S. Federal Reserve, in coordination with the ECB and four other central banks, sought to give stressed-out European banks some relief. The Fed announced a plan to make it cheaper for banks to borrow American dollars, which is the

dominant currency of trade. It was the most extraordinary coordinated effort since October 2008, and it prompted a nearly 500-point rally in the Dow Jones industrial average.

Still, that help did not address the fundamental problem in Europe: unsustainable levels of government debt.

In Italy, Premier Mario Monti had that on his mind as he unveiled his new austerity and growth measures he said his government of technocrats approved Sunday. They include what he called immediate cuts to the costs of maintaining Italy’s bulky political class as well as significant measures to fight tax evasion. As part of the political cost cuts, Monti said

he would forego his salary as premiere.

The package also includes measures to spur growth and competition, while aiming to stamp out rampant nepotism. Monti will outline the measures on Monday to Parliament, which must approve them.

In a sign of how all 17 euro-zone nations see their fates as intricately linked, Dutch Premier Mark Rutte on Monday will be visiting Monti in Rome.

“It is really important that the markets see that Europe is prepared to help the countries in trouble, so long as those countries commit to very tough reforms and austerity programs,” Rutte said.

but we’re also thinking about what’s good for the world,” he said. “That’s what makes us special. That’s what makes us exceptional.”

Republicans have seized on “American exceptionalism,” a belief among many in the nation that the U.S. is special among global powers, and tried to portray Obama as expressing ambivalence about the promise of his own country. The message resounds with party activists who still admire President Ronald Reagan, who memorialized America as that “Shining City on a Hill” during the 1980s.

“We have a president right now who thinks America’s just another nation. America is an exceptional nation,” Romney, a former Massachusetts governor, said during a GOP debate in Las Vegas last month. Even his campaign slogan — “Believe

in America” — suggests that the current president doesn’t.

Others have tried to use it to their advantage.

Texas Gov. Rick Perry, in an interview with Fox News’ Bill O’Reilly last month, said Obama had “traveled around the country making excuses for America, apologizing for America, saying that America is not an exemplary country.”

Former House Speaker Newt Gingrich criticized Obama after 16 Latin American and Caribbean nations filed “friend of the court” briefs in a Justice Department lawsuit against a tough new immigration law in South Carolina, home to an important GOP primary. “It makes you wonder what country does President Obama think he is president of,” Gingrich said.

Obama has given detractors ample material for their attacks.

At a San Francisco fundraiser in October, the

president talked about the importance of investing in education, new roads and bridges and other ways to build the economy.

“We used to have the best stuff. Anybody been to Beijing Airport lately?” Obama said, asking what has changed. “Well, we’ve lost our ambition, our imagination, and our willingness to do the things that built the Golden Gate Bridge and Hoover Dam.” Republicans picked up on the comments, accusing Obama of calling Americans unambitious.

During a meeting with business executives in Honolulu last month, Obama was asked about impediments to investment in the U.S. He said many foreign investors see opportunity here, “but we’ve been a little bit lazy, I think over the last couple of decades.” The “lazy” comments were quickly turned into an attack ad from Perry.

During a 2009 news conference, Obama was asked whether he subscribed to the

concept of American exceptionalism. He said he believed in American exceptionalism, “just as I suspect that the Brits believe in British exceptionalism and the Greeks believe in Greek exceptionalism.”

The president said he was “enormously proud of my country” and highlighted the nation’s “core set of values enshrined in our Constitution” that ensure democracy, free speech and equality. Words that voters are likely to hear more of during the next year.

A Gallup poll in December 2010 found that 80 percent of Americans thought the U.S. had a unique character that made it the greatest country in the world. The survey found that 91 percent of Republicans agreed with the statement.

In the same poll, 34 percent of Republicans said Obama believed the U.S. was the greatest country in the world, while 83 percent of Democrats said he did.

# Conservatives Should Remain Implacable on Tax Hikes

The solution to our unsustainable budget deficits? Many media outlets and liberals, both in and out of Congress, say it must include higher taxes. Worse, they’re pushing the more economically damaging ones.

Conservatives adamantly oppose higher taxes, especially those that would do the economy the most harm, a fact leading the opposition to near apoplexy. Are conservatives just stubborn, just stupid, or do they have a case? In fact, the case is open and shut against tax hikes.

The deficit for 2011 was \$1.3 trillion, or about 8.9 percent of Gross Domestic Product. From 2009 through 2011 the combined deficits were \$4 trillion, and projections for 2012 are not at all encouraging. To put these figures into perspective, the average deficit in the post-war era is about 2 percent of GDP.

Argument one against higher taxes is the economy. Economic growth is the most powerful engine for deficit reduction. According to the president’s own budget analysis, a sustained one percentage point increase in real economic growth would cut the budget deficit by \$3.2 trillion over the next 10 years.

Tax increases generally weaken growth, and some more than others. President Obama favors those that would do the most damage — higher tax rates on investors, savers and small businesses. From a liberal’s soak-the-rich perspective, raising the top tax rates might make sense at full employment. But advocating higher tax rates in the face of enduring high unemployment is truly bizarre.

Absurd claims are commonplace in politics. There is no other explanation for Obama’s asserted belief that conservatives or Republicans just want to keep taxes on the rich low. This recalls an exchange many years ago in a televised discussion between then Majority Leader Dick Armey, R-Texas, and Sen. Jay Rockefeller, D-W.Va., after the West Virginian made a similar accusation to Armey about just protecting his rich friends. If memory serves, Armey responded, “Jay, you’re the only rich person I know, and I gotta tell you, I don’t really like you!”

Note to liberals: Conservatives really don’t care about the rich. The rich can take care of themselves, and often do so by buddying up to the politically powerful.

Conservatives care about freedom. And they care about those who seek to use the opportunities afforded them by this great nation, combined with their own hard work and talents, and the freedom to apply them to become wealthy.

And even more, conservatives care about the processes leading to wealth creation, which also lead to more jobs and higher incomes for everyone else. Liberals want to separate the taxation of the wealthy from the processes that lead to wealth and job creation. The economy just doesn’t work that way. Sorry, guys.

Argument two against higher taxes: even in the long run, the problem with future budget deficits is not a dearth of revenues, but a surfeit of spending. Federal revenues in normal times average about 18.5 percent of our economy. Revenues are deeply depressed today due to the recession and useless tax stimulus such as the payroll tax holiday, but they’ll recover as the economy recovers.

In contrast, while spending is traditionally around 20 percent of the economy today it stands at 24.3 percent. And it will really take off as soon as Social Security and Medicare spending soar. Spending is way out of line, and it’s going to get much worse under current policy. Conservatives have no reason to agree to higher taxes on anyone just so President Obama and his friends can spend more.

Arguably, there could be a basis for a real debate if the economy was near full employment and spending had been pared back to its historical share of the economy. This would leave the budget deficit share close to the traditional 2 percent. We could then have a healthy debate about whether to balance the budget for good by cutting spending further.

Liberals could argue for shared sacrifice or soak-the-rich or whatever their mantra du jour justifying tax hikes. Conservatives would emphasize economic growth and freedom in opposing tax increases. And that would be the debate: balance yea or nay; with or without tax hikes.

# Kagan May Have Conflict in Health Care Case

The Supreme Court’s current session is likely to prove one of the most important in many years. At the heart of a case the justices will consider is the individual mandate in President Barack Obama’s Affordable Care Act, which requires every American to purchase health insurance. If the Supreme Court upholds the individual mandate, it will set a precedent for future Congresses and expand the federal government’s reach into our everyday lives.

But the outcome of the case is not the only issue of concern to the American people. Interest groups on both sides are calling for the recusal of two Supreme Court justices.

Specifically, Justice Elena Kagan may have played a role in the development and defense of the president’s health-care law during her

tenure as U.S. solicitor general. Despite claims from Obama administration officials that Kagan was not involved in the health-care discussions, emails released last month indicate that there may be more to the story. One email shows then-Principal Deputy Solicitor General Neal Katyal telling a public-affairs staffer that Kagan was not involved in any of the discussions or consultations over the legislation.

But in an email dated two months earlier, Katyal forwarded to Kagan information about a meeting at the White House on the health-care law and wrote: “I think you should go, no? I will regardless but feel this is litigation

of singular importance.” Kagan responded by asking Katyal for his phone number.

While we don’t know whether Kagan attended that meeting, her response suggests that she discussed it with Katyal over the phone. This exchange of emails raises the question of whether she tried to hide her involvement by conducting conversations over the phone to limit any paper trail.

We also know from the emails that she personally supported the legislation’s passage. In an exchange with a Justice Department colleague discussing an upcoming House vote on the health-care bill, Kagan exclaims, “I hear they have the votes, Larry!! Simply amazing.”

These emails reveal inconsistencies with the administration’s claims that Kagan was completely walled off from this issue. To help clear

up any confusion, I have written to the Justice Department and the White House to get additional documents and conduct staff interviews. Unfortunately, the administration’s refusal to cooperate with a legitimate congressional inquiry only heightens the public’s concern.

The NFL wouldn’t allow a team to officiate its own game. If, as solicitor general, Kagan did advise administration officials on the constitutionality of the president’s health-care law, she should not officiate when the matter comes before the Supreme Court.

The Obama administration has a responsibility to fully disclose any information about what role Kagan played in the review of the Affordable Care Act. The validity of the outcome at the high court depends on the impartiality of the justices.

This case is far too important for the White House to refuse to provide the facts to the American people.

### National Defense Authorization Act Is Unconstitutional

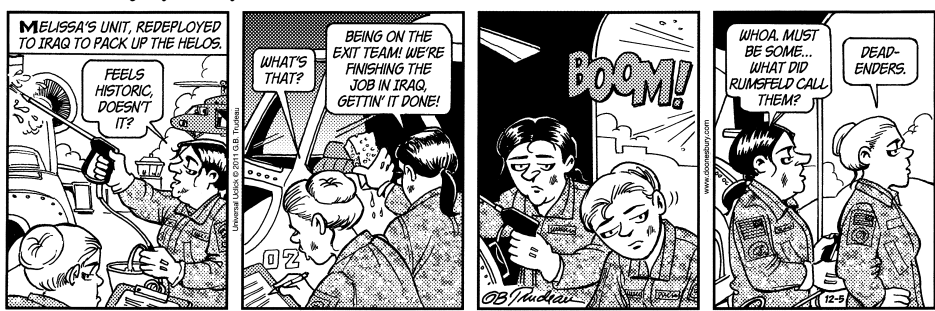

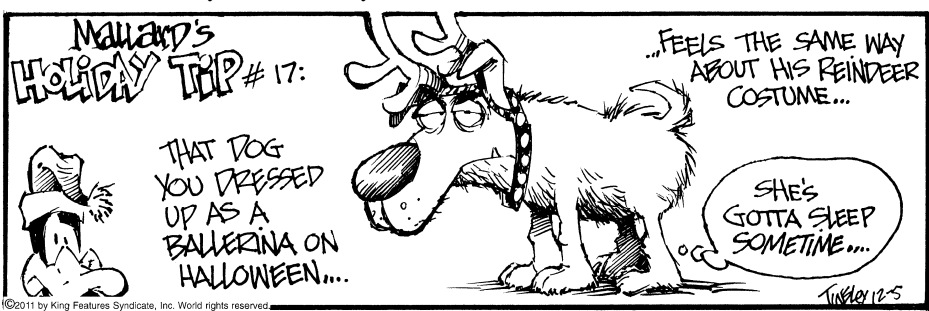

Police say the fake bills were of poor quality and all had the same serial number.

Cafe workers told police the fake money was likely left in a folding check holder by a customer paying at a table.

## N. Idaho Men Arrested After Robbery, Stabbing

**COEUR D'ALENE (AP)** • Two northern Idaho men who police say invaded a home and stabbed two occupants have been taken into custody on suspicion of aggravated battery and robbery.

Police in Coeur d'Alene tell the *Coeur d'Alene Press* that 21-year-old Jacob R. Selaci and 22-year-old Wesley D. Celestine were taken into custody Saturday. Police say the two Coeur d'Alene men entered the home through an unlocked front door early Saturday morning.

Police say two 20-year-old men in the home were stabbed and were treated for non-life-threatening injuries at Kootenai Medical Center.

# Tips on Avoiding Grizzly Bears Not Being Received

**MISSOULA, Mont. (AP)** • The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service needs to do a better job of informing backcountry users how to avoid dangerous encounters with grizzly bears, an official with the agency says.

"We are providing education, but it's not being received," said Chris Servheen, coordinator for grizzly recovery with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. "The problem with communication is the illusion it's actually happening. My candid opinion is we have not been very successful at this at all. Perhaps we need to go to a marketing firm on Madison Avenue — they're really good at getting us to buy things we don't need or want."

Servheen, speaking Wednesday during the winter meeting of the Interagency Grizzly Bear Committee, said the agency has devised sound strategies for humans to avoid conflicts with bears, but they aren't being used.

*The Missoulian* reports that a preliminary review of 2011 bear encounters listed 83 incidents that resulted in two deaths, both in Yellowstone National Park. About 75 percent of the incidents took place in Yellowstone National Park and the rest in northwestern Montana. He said that four out of five times, no one was hurt.

About 38 percent of the incidents involved hunters, 35 percent hikers, and the rest a mix of anglers, campers and ranch-hands working in the backcountry. Servheen said part of the problem is that only 29 percent of the people charged by grizzlies carried pepper spray.

Officials said a female bear with clubs killed 57-year-old Brian Matayoshi of California on July 6. Offi-

cials decided not to kill the bear because it was behaving normally.

The same bear was linked through DNA with the death of 59-year-old John Wallace of Michigan in late August. The bear was killed Oct. 1 and her two cubs placed in the Grizzly and Wolf Discovery Center at West Yellowstone.

In the July attack, investigators said the attack was possibly triggered by the victim and his wife screaming and yelling as they ran from an approaching grizzly mother with cubs.

The August attack wasn't witnessed by anyone, and officials said they might never know definitively whether the same bear killed both hikers. Evidence showed multiple bears, including the sow, were near Wallace's body but not if the sow made any contact with Wallace.

The decision to euthanize the 250-pound female bear was meant to protect park visitors and staff, officials said.

Officials said Matayoshi and his wife, who weren't carrying bear spray, ran from the bear screaming

and yelling.

"Their behavior during the chase contributed to the behavior of the bear and resulted in the death of Mr. Matayoshi," Servheen said.

Wallace was hiking alone and also wasn't carrying bear spray.

Officials recommend hikers carry bear spray, not run from grizzlies, and not hike alone.

Meanwhile, a representative of the British Columbia Ministry of Environment said a new study there found more evidence of Canadian black bears making predatory attacks on humans.

"We're used to defensive attacks by grizzly bears, that are usually triggered by protecting cubs or food or space," said Tony Hamilton. "But now we're seeing black bears that have typically had no previous human contact looking at us as potential prey. We need to re-educate the public."

He said trying to alert people to be non-confrontational around grizzlies but fight back against black bears is making the job for bear managers more difficult.

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# N. Idaho at Center of Fed, Local Wetland Disputes

**BOISE** • An Environmental Protection Agency dispute with a northern Idaho man over whether he illegally destroyed a wetland has attracted the attention of Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter and U.S. Rep. Raul Labrador — and again made northern Idaho a focal point of concern among some residents they’re victims of a heavy-handed federal government.

Priest Lake-area property owner Jack Barron successfully fought off a criminal indictment last year. A jury declared him not guilty in U.S. District Court of violating the federal Clean Water Act, but Barron still faces a separate EPA civil order to restore wetlands he filled in on his property — or be forced to pay \$37,500 daily fines.

Coupled with a similar EPA wetlands case from the region due to be heard Jan. 9 by U.S. Supreme Court justices, Barron’s continuing fight has revived cries that Washington, D.C.-based bureaucrats are trampling on private property rights.

“I believe they’re being heavy handed,” said Bonner County Commissioner Cornel Rasor. “The federal government should have acknowledged the decision of the court, just as citizens are required to do.”

Bonner County’s new, publicly funded Property Rights Council, which Rasor helped establish to pursue free-market solutions to regulation and bolster private-property rights, is now investigating how it might intervene to help Barron.

Barron, who contends his property isn’t a wetland, has

sought help from Otter and Labrador, claiming in an Oct. 14 letter the EPA is trying to eject him from his property.

“The jury found me not guilty,” he wrote. “The EPA refuses to allow me to use my land and is threatening me with more legal charges.”

Otter asked the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality for information about the dispute, then referred Barron to Idaho’s congressional delegation to seek redress with the EPA. On Oct. 20, Labrador demanded the agency tell him why it was continuing to pursue Barron with civil sanctions when the agency lost its criminal case.

The EPA, which contends Barron degraded a wetland that could potentially harm Priest Lake’s water quality, responded to Labrador last month that the criminal-court victory didn’t relieve the agency of its responsibility to enforce Clean Water Act civil provisions.

“In May 2010 the EPA notified Mr. Barron by letter that, even though he was acquitted of criminal charges, he was still required to remove the unauthorized dredged and fill materials on his property and to restore the site,” wrote Dennis J. McLerran, the EPA’s regional administrator in Seattle. “Mr. Barron has refused to comply.”

In the wetlands case that’s to be heard next month in the U.S. Supreme Court,

Mike and Chantell Sackett of Priest River are fighting EPA regulators who determined the couple failed to get needed federal permits before filling a wetland on property they were developing.

The Sacketts sued, but lost in federal court when a judge ruled they weren’t yet entitled to a review of whether their property actually was a wetland.

Consequently, Supreme Court justices are reviewing a narrow question: When does the federal Clean Water Act allow people to appeal to a judge if they disagree with the EPA over whether their property is a federally controlled wetland?

If the Sacketts win their high-stakes battle, the justices’ decision could dramatically change how courts intervene in EPA enforcement.

In the Barron’s case, the 66-year-old and his wife, Jill, in April 2007 began excavation work on land along Lamb Creek four miles from where it flows into Priest Lake, in advance of building a house. The EPA contends the four-acre site is a wetland, requiring a permit from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers before it can be filled in.

In 2009, the agency ordered Barron to restore the property, plant native grasses and monitor developments until 2020.

In court documents, the EPA claims that Barron will-

fully ignored warnings not to proceed without a permit. Idaho already lists Lamb Creek as among its degraded waters, for sediment and high temperatures.

“Permits do not preclude development, but they require the permit holder to avoid, minimize and mitigate impacts to wetlands,” the agency said in a statement on Friday. “When landowners perform work without permits, wetlands are often irreparably damaged or destroyed. When this happens repeatedly, the cumulative impacts can significantly degrade our nation’s water quality.”

Barron didn’t return multiple phone calls on Friday.

His lawyer, James Siebe in Moscow, told The Associated Press in an interview earlier this year that a soil scientist hired as an expert witness at last year’s trial disputed the EPA’s 2008 determination Barron’s property was a wetland. That helped convince the jury to acquit Barron after just 2 1/2 hours on April 8, 2010, Siebe said.

“The jury just saw this as a ‘David and Goliath’ thing,” he said. “A lot of people would really have a lot of heartburn if they knew what the situation really was.”

## Airline Ends Flights Between Boise, Idaho Falls

**IDAHO FALLS (AP)** • Sea Port Airlines has announced that it is discontinuing flights between Boise and Idaho Falls at the end of December.

The airline tells KIFI-TV that customers with a ticket for a flight scheduled after Dec. 31 will be offered refunds. Sea Port started offering the flights in July.

Woods Wins for the First Time in Two Years

THOUSAND OAKS, Calif. • After going more than two years and 26 tournaments without a win, and after so much turmoil in his personal life and with his golf game, Tiger Woods stood over a 6-foot birdie putt Sunday to win the Chevron World Challenge and felt as though nothing had changed.

Finally, the outcome was familiar, too.

Woods poured in the putt to cap off a birdie-birdie finish at Sherwood, close with a 3-under 69 and beat former Masters champion Zach Johnson by one shot. The win ended a drought that lasted 749 days, and might have signaled a change that Woods is on his way back.

He swept his arm across the air, yelled through the din of the gallery and slammed his fist in a celebration that was a long

time coming.

Relief? Satisfaction? Vindication?

Woods wasn't sure, and he didn't much care.

"It just feels awesome whatever it is," he said.

Trailing by one shot with two holes to play, Woods came up with two clutch putts. He holed a 15-footer for birdie on the par-3 17th to pull into a tie with Johnson, then hit a 9-iron from 158 yards that landed on the ridge behind the hole and rolled down to 6 feet.

"I've been in contention twice this year, which is not very often," Woods said. "So that's my third time with a chance to win it. I pulled it off this time."

It was his 83rd win worldwide in tournaments that award ranking points, but his first since he won the Australian Masters on Nov. 15, 2009, back when he looked as though he would rule golf for as long as he played.

Broncos Bowl Involves Vegas, ASU

Aaron Rodgers engineered a last minute drive to set up a 30-yard field goal by Mason Crosby on the final play and the Green Bay Packers remained undefeated and clinched a playoff berth with a 38-35 victory over the New York Giants on Sunday.

Rodgers hit three passes of more than 18 yards on the drive in the final 58 seconds as the Super Bowl champion Packers (12-0) won their

# Tebow Does It Again, Leads Late Rally

**MINNEAPOLIS** • Tim Tebow led yet another late rally, passing for a season-best 202 yards and two third-quarter touchdowns to help the Denver Broncos win their fifth straight game, 35-32 against the Minnesota Vikings.

Matt Prater kicked two field goals in the final 93 seconds for the Broncos (7-5), who moved into a first-place tie in the AFC West with a loss by the Oakland Raiders. Christian Ponder set Minnesota's single-game rookie record with 381 yards passing, including a pair of touchdowns to Percy Harvin, but his sideline throw with 1:33 remaining was intercepted by Andre Goodman to set up the winner.

Harvin had a career-high 156 yards for the Vikings (2-10), who lost their fourth in a row.

Demaryius Thomas caught four passes for 144 yards and both touchdowns for the Broncos, who raised their record to 6-1 since Tebow took over for Kyle Orton as the starter. Tebow completed 10 of 15 passes.

**STEELERS 35, BENGALS 7 PITTSBURGH** • Ben Roethlisberger passed for two touchdowns and set a team record for career completions against error-prone Cincinnati.

Pittsburgh (9-3) swept the season series from Cincinnati (7-5) for the second straight year behind a 28-point explosion in the second quarter fueled by Roethlisberger, running back Rashard Mendenhall and a 60-yard punt return for a score by Antonio Brown.

**CARDINALS 19, COWBOYS 13, OT GLENDALE, Ariz.** • LaRod Stephens-Howling caught a short pass from Kevin Kolb and zipped 52 yards for a touchdown in overtime, snapping the Cowboys' four-game winning streak.

Tony Romo was 28 for 42 for 299 yards for the Cowboys.

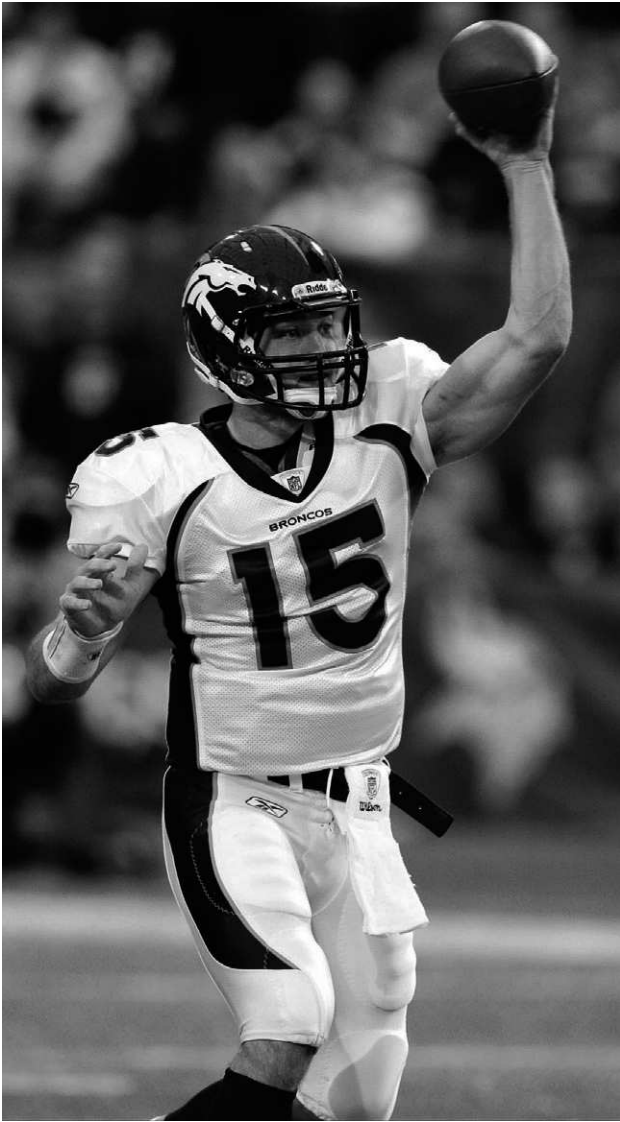
**TEXANS 17, FALCONS 10 HOUSTON** • Rookie T.J. Yates threw a touchdown pass in his first NFL start, Arian Foster rushed for 111 yards and Houston overcame another hamstring injury to Andre Johnson.

The Texans (9-3) have won a franchise-record six straight games, a remarkable feat considering they're down to their third-string quarterback and have played the bulk of their streak without their star receiver. Alex Smith threw second-half touchdowns of 52 and 56 yards to Michael Crabtree and Kyle Williams and David Akers kicked four field goals for San Francisco (10-2) as coach Jim Harbaugh joined George Seifert (1989) and Steve Mariucci (1997) as the only rookie coaches in 49ers history to win the division.

**DOLPHINS 34, RAIDERS 14 MIAMI** • Reggie Bush rushed for 100 yards and a touchdown and once-woeful Miami won for the fourth time in the past five games.

For the Raiders (7-5), who began the day leading the AFC West, the drubbing ended a three-game winning streak. They fell to 6-25 in regular-season games in the Eastern Time Zone since December 2002.

**TITANS 23, BILLS 17 ORCHARD PARK, N.Y.** • Chris Johnson rushed for 153 yards and two touchdowns as Tennessee remained in the playoff chase.

Johnson scored on runs of 48 and 4 yards to match his season touchdown total. It was his third 100-yard rushing game in four outings.

C.J. Spiller had a career-best 83 yards rushing and a touchdown for the Bills (5-7), who continue to spiral out of playoff contention after losing their fifth straight. Stevie Johnson made the game close with a 2-yard touchdown catch with 2:58 left.

**CHIEFS 10, BEARS 3 CHICAGO** • Tyler Palko shook off two miserable starts and threw for 157 yards and a touchdown even though he was briefly lifted for Kyle Orton.

Orton came on to start the second quarter and immediately left the game with an injured finger on his right hand. Palko connected with Dexter McCcluster on a wild 38-yard pass to end the first half on a ball that got deflected by Brian Urlacher and Chris Conte, giving the Chiefs a 7-3 lead

and their first touchdown in three games.

Chicago (7-5) played most of the game without running back Matt Forter, who injured his right knee.

**JETS 34, REDSKINS 19 LANDOVER, Md.** • Mark Sanchez hit Santonio Holmes for a 30-yard touchdown pass with 4:49 to play, and Shonn Greene added a pair of insurance scores.

It was Sanchez's 10th career fourth-quarter comeback or overtime victory, including playoffs, and his second in as many weeks. The win improves the Jets to 7-5 and keeps them in the hunt for an AFC playoff berth in the first five games.

**RAVENS 24, BROWNS 10 CLEVELAND** • Ray Rice rushed for a career-high 204 yards, breaking loose on a game-changing 67-yarder in the third quarter, and the Ravens kept pace with Pittsburgh atop the AFC North.

Rice and Ricky Williams had short touchdown runs and Lardarius Webb returned a punt 68 yards for a TD for the Ravens (9-3), who toyed with the Browns (4-8). Baltimore racked up 290 yards rushing.

**SAINTS 31, LIONS 17 NEW ORLEANS** • Drew Brees passed for 342 yards and three touchdowns, and the New Orleans Saints won their fourth straight, 31-17 over the Detroit Lions on Sunday night.

Brees' performance gave him 4,031 yards on the season, making him the first quarterback in NFL history to eclipse the 4,000-yard mark in the first 12 games of a season.

**PANTHERS 38, BUCCANEERS 19 TAMPA, Fla.** • Cam Newton ran for three touchdowns to set the NFL single-season record for rushing TDs by a quarterback, leading the Carolina Panthers to a 38-19 rout of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sunday.

The 2010 Heisman Trophy winner scored the 11th, 12th and 13th TDs of his career on a trio of 1-yard runs.

When I try to discuss this with her, she says her work requires this constant communication, but I know it doesn’t. There have been times when Aileen’s feelings have been hurt because her son doesn’t want to go someplace with her and prefers to stay with us instead. I suspect that he feels ignored when he’s with her because her thumb is constantly flying across her phone. How can we get her to understand how this might be making her child feel?

**DEAR FULLY PRESENT:** You could and should stage an intervention with your daughter. Aileen is neglecting her son. It’s a shame that before couples are allowed to conceive that they aren’t forced to take parenting classes. The time she spends on Facebook and texting is time she should be interacting with him.

Because she is so easily distracted, you and her father should declare your home to be a digital-free zone unless your grandson is napping or in bed for the night. Consider making discussions with the boy’s pediatrician — and perhaps parenting classes — a condition of her staying in your home. 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## THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

*“There is no such thing as justice — in or out of court.”*

Today’s deal, played by Jeff Aker, comes from the American trials of 2011. The lesson of the day is that when one defender is the danger hand, we frequently have a choice of actions. Either we must try to keep that player off lead for the duration of the deal, or we can let him obtain the lead only for a price he is not prepared to pay. Let’s see how that works in practice.

Declaring three no-trump on a low-club lead, Aker won the club jack in hand and saw that he had six winners in the minors. What is the best way to develop three tricks in the majors?

Assuming West has both top clubs, East must have one of the major-suit aces, or West would have opened. You must keep East off lead, unless he is prepared to sacrifice a trick to play a second club. The best route is to play a diamond to dummy’s jack at trick two, then lead a heart to your queen, a diamond to dummy’s king and a second heart to your jack. If this passes off peacefully, play a spade to set up your ninth trick. Should East hop up with the heart ace to play a club through you, you will have a third heart trick easily enough.

Note that if you play a heart to dummy’s king and East’s ace at trick two, you will be defeated if hearts don’t break and the spade ace is with West.

**ANSWER:** When the opponents are in a contract for which they have no surplus values, you should avoid giving away a trick. I would be unenthusiastic about leading from a broken four-card suit, for example, but I cannot resist leading from a five-card suit (the clubs). There are simply too many good things that happen when we lead from length and too many bad ones when we lead from shortage.

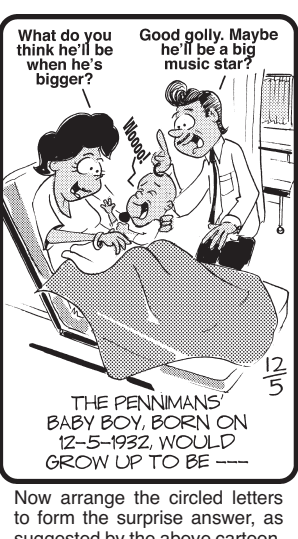
