# Investing in Science

A five-year grant is allowing CSI students to participate in biomedical research.

College of Southern Idaho student Deena Hardy hopes to become a marine biologist someday.

For two weeks over the summer, she got her first taste of a scientific research experience. The 20-yearold participated in projects involving biodiversity and air quality without leaving Twin Falls.

"It's a really good opportunity," she said. "It was a good transition between school labs and actual research."

Hardy has one semester left at CSI and then plans to transfer to a four-year university to earn a bachelor's degree.

Over a five-year period, CSI is receiving about \$450,000 from the IDeA Network for Biomedical Research Excellence. The money is used to fund research opportunities for students, allow faculty members to provide science outreach to kindergarten through 12th graders and to buy more advanced lab equipment.

CSI, as well as a number of other Idaho colleges and universities, is in its third year of the current grant cycle.

The grant is meant to increase the state's competitiveness for federal biomedical research funding. Another goal is to encourage students to further their education.

"To do that, we've been using our grant dollars to outfit biology and chemistry labs with the most upto-date equipment," said Amy Rice Doetsch, a CSI biology professor

## To Teach Cursive or to Not to Teach Cursive, That Is the Question

**BALTIMORE** • Darius Riley displays the concentration of a tightrope walker as he fastens his eyes on the lined paper in front of him and grips his No. 2 yellow pencil down to its point to make his most perfect curly letters.

"I would rather do it in print because it is faster," Darius, a fifth-grader at Highlandtown Elementary School near Patterson Park, said of his cursive writing. Even his typing would probably be quicker, he says.

Darius may be in the last generation of students to be taught cursive as states begin dropping the subject in favor of spending time on mastering math, science and other

Cursive is not included in the so-called common core standards, which will govern teaching and lesson plans in 46 states beginning next year, leaving states free to shift away from a subject taught for centuries. Hawaii and Indiana have already dropped it.

### **Kimberly** Woman Dies in Idaho Falls Hospital One Month after Car Crash

Kimberly resident Barbara Sievers, 79, died at an Idaho Falls hospital this morning, according to a hospital official.

Sievers was involved in a two-vehicle crash in early November in Twin Falls, and she was taken to Eastern Idaho Regional Medical Center via air ambulance. Police reported that Sievers was hit by 77-yearold Gayle Bennet, of Twin Falls, as he failed to stop at a red light at the intersection of Orchard Drive and Washington Street South.

Sievers, driving a 2001 Buick sedan, was heading eastbound on Orchard, while Bennet was southbound on Washington in his 1991 Dodge pickup truck when he hit the driver's side of Sievers' car. Neither vehicle contained other passengers.

Bennet was treated and released from St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center in Twin Falls the week of the crash.

"We've got a lot of presents," Salinas said. "It's growing. It seems like every year it gets harder, but we have plenty of good help."

With technology pervasive in society and fewer documents that need a cursive signature, some educators say there is no need to bother kids with the tedious, time-consuming lessons on cursive. They argue that we soon may no longer need to sign our names on legal documents or credit card receipts; a scan of our eyeballs or a thumbprint may be all that is needed to identify us. But there's more than just

necessity that should be considered, historians say.

"Cursive writing is a matter of discipline and training in our culture. Is it necessary to the future of sustaining our culture and our understanding of our past? Ibelieve it is;" said Mary-

And he's the first to admit: "As one who has very messy handwriting and nearly illegible script, I have always preferred typing?"

The issue has touched off a national debate and pitted educators against each other. Frank Chiki, head of the elementary section of the National Council of Teachers of English, said one day it may not be necessary to teach students printing, typing and cursive.

"Maybe we won't need to sign our names in the future," he said.

He points to declining sales of hardback books as people buy reading material on ereaders and iPads. "Is there a possibility that writing will go away? It is kind of like the physical book," he said: Its useful life may be on the decline.

Already the need for legible writing and signatures has diminished. Pharmacists, who have fussed for years that many physicians' penmanship on prescriptions is impossible to read, don't see handwritten prescriptions much anymore, said Brian Schumer, a pharmacist at Tuxedo Pharmacy in Greenspring Station.

"Everything is going electronic. Prescriptions are entered into a PalmPilot" and then transferred to a pharmacy, allowing for less chance of mistakes, Schumer said.

Even the courts are less insistent on cursive signatures.

Joel Sher, a Baltimore bankruptcy lawyer, said that when he files papers in federal court, he no longer needs to sign his name because it is all done electronically. Some state courts still require signatures, he said, but they will soon move to electronic filings as well.

But he said, "I still need clients to sign legal documents," including contracts and some letters. "Count me among the old-fashioned who think you should learn a foreign language, you should learn cursive and you should learn typing?"

Not only are historical documents more accessible to scholars who can read cursive, but there's an important lesson in the discipline it takes to create a beautiful handwritten letter or document, historians said.

Alexandra Deutsch, chief curator at the Maryland Historical Society, said that in past centuries, a person's handwriting was seen as a reflection of who they were as a person and how they presented themselves.

"George Washington cultivated a particular signature. It is a very considered signature. That became part of his identity," she said. And good penmanship has always been viewed as a sign of being welleducated, and an indication that the person was self-disciplined. Architects, she said, still have a distinctive style of writing, and scientists must have clear, precise writing when they work in labs.

"It would be a tragic loss to not teach penmanship," she said.

But is there still time in the school day for it?

Research on the importance of cursive writing is mixed. Because not all students have access to computers at school, kids do most work there in

lish, said, "As long as they get their thoughts on paper, as long as they have voice in their writing, as long as they have the grammar (correct), it doesn't matter."

Both are tied to Chobani, which is building a 400worker plant in Twin Falls.

The hearings will focus on an ordinance approving the urban renewal plan's revenue allocation area. That's needed so that the Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency can collect the increased property taxes generated by the improvements that Chobani makes to the property.

The additional property taxes from Chobani's investment will go toward the infrastructure costs tied to the yogurt plant, such as sewer lines.

Also, there exists a resolution authorizing Mayor Don Hall to sign and submit an application to the Idaho Department of Commerce to partially cover the costs of extending an Idaho Power line to Chobani's new site on Kimberly Road. The grant application will request \$550,000.



# For Newt Gingrich, No **Bombast or Apologies**

**WASHINGTON** • Newt Gingrich is trying to preserve his rapid rise in the GOP presidential race by defending his most controversial stands without appearing to be the thin-skinned hothead his critics often describe.

The former House speaker seemed to accomplish that goal in Saturday's debate in Iowa. His challenge will be to sustain the strategy while rivals attack him on the airwaves and the ground, and to convince conservative voters that he's their champion despite his occasional departures from orthodoxy.

Polls suggest Gingrich is the likeliest alternative to former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney heading into the leadoff Iowa caucuses on Jan. 3. So far,

# Russians Scoff At Medvedev Election Inquiry

MOSCOW • President Dmitry Medvedev used his Facebook page Sunday to disclose that he had ordered an investigation into reports of election fraud, a statement his audience greeted with derision.

The posting quickly went viral, and drew more than 8,000 mostly offended and even offensive comments in a little over six hours, revealing the depth of the disillusionment with Medvedev, Prime Minister Vladimir Putin and their government. Tens of thousands of Russians spoke up in demonstrations across the country Saturday, protesting the Dec. 4 parliamentary elections, and they apparently had no intention of returning to their former si-

"Shame!" was a frequent comment, along with "You're pathetic."

The commenters' posts Sunday revealed astonishing candor and courage. It's one thing to stand in a Moscow crowd of up to 40,000, according to estimates, and call for new elections. It's another matter to advertise your anger and disgust on the president's Facebook page, where it doesn't take a KGB agent to make a quick identification.

In posting on Facebook, Medvedev was attempting to respond to Russians who organized Saturday's protest online, who are angry because they suspect the election was rigged in favor of the United Russia Party.

"I agree neither with the slogans, nor the statements voiced at the protests," Medvedev wrote. "Nevertheless, I have ordered checks into all the reports from polling stations, regarding the compliance with the election

One reason for the skepticism that greeted his remarks: Medvedev is the head of United Russia and was the top candidate on its party list in the election. He nominates the chief prosecutor and judges, who might not be eager to pursue those working on behalf of the ruling party.

### **NORIEGA RETURNS TO** PANAMA A LARGELY IRRELEVANT PRISONER

PANAMA CITY, Panama • More than two decades after the U.S. forced him from power, Manuel Noriega returned to Panama on Sunday as a prisoner and, to many

of those he once ruled with impunity, an irrelevant man.

Some Panamanians feel hatred for the former strongman and rejected American ally; a few others nostalgia. But as he returned to his native country for the first time since his ouster, it seemed like few people had any strong feelings at all.

There were no legions of admirers at Panama City's Tocumen airport when the Spanish Iberia airlines' flight touched down, delivering him from Paris' La Sante prison after a stopover in Madrid. The crowds in the capital Sunday were of holiday shoppers.

Noriega, who has served drug sentences in the United States and a money-laundering term in France, was whisked by helicopter to the El Renacer prison to serve out three 20year sentences for the slavings of political opponents in the 1980s. An elevated platform was set up at the prison so journalists could watch him enter, giving Panamanians what likely was their only glimpse of the man who once ran the country like his private fiefdom.

# **Tiniest Babies Are Growing Up Healthy** Despite Odds

CHICAGO • One is a healthy firstgrader, the other an honors college student majoring in psychology. Once the tiniest babies ever born, both girls are thriving, despite long odds when they entered the world weighing less than a pound.

A medical report from the doctor who resuscitated the infants at a suburban Chicago hospital is both a success story and a cautionary tale. These two are the exceptions and their remarkable health years later should not raise false hope: Most babies this small do poorly and many do not survive even with advanced medical care.

"These are such extreme cases;" said Dr. John Muraskas of Loyola University Medical Center in Maywood, Ill. They should not be considered "a benchmark" to mean that doctors should try to save all babies so small, he said.

The report involves Madeline Mann, born in 1989 weighing 9.9 ounces, then the world record; and 7year-old Rumaisa Rahman, whose 9.2-ounce birth weight remains the world's tiniest. Two other babies born since 1989 weighed less than Madeline and a German girl born was

# Northeast States Cut Heating Aid to Poor

**WASHINGTON** • Mary Power is 92 and worried about surviving another frigid New England winter because deep cuts in federal home heating assistance benefits mean she probably can't afford enough heating oil to stay warm.

She lives in a drafty trailer in Boston's West Roxbury neighborhood and gets by on \$11,148 a year in pension and Social Security benefits. Her heating aid help this year will drop from \$1,035 to \$685. With rising heating oil prices, it probably will cost her more than \$3,000 for enough oil to keep warm unless she

# South Korea: 1 Dead after China Captain Stabs Officers

SEOUL, South Korea • A South Korean coast guard officer was killed and another injured Monday when they were stabbed by a Chinese captain whose boat was stopped for suspected illegal fishing in South Korean waters, officials

Two Chinese boats were stopped in Yellow Sea waters rich in blue crabs, anchovies and croaker, but details of the fight were unclear, coast guard officials said.

The officials, who declined to give their names because of the sensitivity of the situation, said the captain of one of the boats stabbed the South Korean officers.

The officers were taken to a hospital in the port city of Incheon. Nine Chinese fishermen were in custody, the coast guard said.

A South Korean officer stabbed in the side died; the other officer wasn't severely injured, the officials said.

There was no immediate comment from the Chinese Foreign Ministry in Beijing.

The coast guard said it has seized about 430 Chinese ships for illegal fishing in the Yellow Sea so far this year, up from 370 last year. The coast guard usually releases the ships after a fine is paid, though violence occasionally occurs.

Chinese fishing fleets have been going farther afield to feed growing domestic demand for seafood.

In 2008, one South Korean coast guard officer was killed and six others injured in a fight with Chinese fishermen in South Korean waters.

Last year, a collision between a Chinese fishing boat and Japanese coast guard vessels led to a diplomatic spat between the countries over disputed islands in the East China

"Those who created, commissioned or sponsored them will be held to account," he said.

That reminded one commenter of Putin's accusations that same day against Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, saying that she criticized the election before the vote was counted and signaled the protests to begin. Earlier, Putin attacked Golos, Russia's only independent monitor, because it receives European and U.S. grants.

The issue could flare just as New Hampshire votes in the Republican presidential primary.

Sen. Olympia Snowe, R-Maine, said she hopes the candidates will take up the region's heating aid crunch because it underscores how badly the country needs a comprehensive energy policy.

Several Northeast states already have reduced heating aid benefits to families as Congress considers cutting more than \$1 billion from last year's \$4.7 billion Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program that served nearly 9 million households.

Families in New England, where the winters are long and cold and people rely heavily on costly oil heat, are expected to be especially hard hit. Many poor and elderly people on fixed incomes struggle with rising heating bills that can run into thousands of dollars. That can force them to cut back on other necessities like food or medicine.

"The winter of 2011-12 could be memorable for the misery and suffering of thousands of frigid households," New Hampshire's Concord Monitor newspaper said in an editorial. "Heating oil prices are expected to hit record highs, and federal fuel assistance may reach a record low for recent years?"

He may ruffle feathers by telling unpleasant truths, Gingrich says, but he's not so incendiary that he's unworthy of being commander in chief.

In the latest debate, Gingrich admitted wrongdoing and regret in only one area: the marital infidelities involved in his two divorces.

"I said upfront, openly, I've made mistakes at times," he said. "I've had to go to God for forgiveness." Voters have every right to examine such matters, he said, and "people have to render judgment?

Noting that he is "a 68year-old grandfather," Gingrich added: "I am delighted at the way people have been willing to look at who I am, to look at what my record has been."

The answer seemed to defuse the potentially emotional issue, though one ri-Minnesota Rep. Michele Bachmann, said Sunday it's one that voters will take a look at "because they want to know who the person is, what the measure of the man or the woman

The debate quickly moved to other topics, on which Gingrich was less apologetic.

He defended his former support for requiring people to obtain health insurance, saying it once was a popular stand with conservatives.

"In 1993, in fighting HillaryCare, virtually every conservative saw the mandate as a less-dangerous future than what Hillary was trying to do," Gingrich said.

Hillary Rodham Clinton was leading the health care effort for her husband, President Bill Clinton.

"I frankly was floundering, trying to find a way to make sure that people who could afford it were paying their hospital bills, while still leaving an out so libertarians could not buy insurance," Gingrich said. "It's now clear that the mandate, I think, is clearly unconstitutional."

Mandated health insurance is at the heart of the 2010 federal law passed at President Barack Obama's urging, and many conservatives despise it. It also is featured in the Massachusetts law pushed by Romney when he was governor.

The other GOP candidates painted both men as too liberal on the topic.

"Newt Romney" will be unable to challenge Obama credibly on health care, Bachmann said.

"It is very clear that there's not a dime's worth of difference between the two of them because both of them have advocated for the health care mandate. ... It's the one issue that our candidate has to take President Obama on with, and they won't be able to debate him on this issue because they're on the same side as the president," she said Sunday.

born last year at her same birth weight.

The report was released online Monday in Pediatrics.

It addresses a question that was hotly debated when Madeline was born 22 years ago, remains hot now – and still has no answer: "What is the real age of viability? No one knows," said Dr. Stephen Welty, neonatology chief at Baylor College of Medicine and Texas Children's Hospital in Houston.

Muraskas and the report's co-authors say most newborn specialists consider babies born after 25 weeks of pregnancy to be viable likely to survive - and so they should receive medical intervention if necessary to breathe. Younger babies are generally in a "gray zone," where intervention isn't always so clear cut, the report suggests.

In Japan, doctors have lowered that threshold - the gestational age - to 22 weeks. Normal pregnancies last about 40 weeks.

Some U.S. doctors will attempt to save babies at 22 weeks, but that is not done routinely, said Dr. Edward Bell, a University of Iowa pediatrics professor.

Bell runs an online registry of the world's tiniest babies, born weighing less than about 14 ounces, or slightly less than 1 pound. Since 1936, 124 have been listed. The registry is compiled from doctors' voluntary reports and so does not represent all survivors.

Bell estimates that about 7,500 U.S. babies are born each year weighing less than 1 pound, and that about 10 percent survive.

Sometimes tiny babies with zero chance of surviving show signs of life at birth, and may be able to breathe for a short time if put in an incubator and hooked up to a breathing machine and intravenous treatments. "But even so, if it's a baby that doesn't have a chance, we don't want to put the baby and the family through the discomfort," Bell said.

Muraskas says his report highlights a sometimes overlooked fact: gestational age is even more critical for survival than size.

### LOOK FOR SUSPECTED **DROWNING** VICTIM

IDAHO FALLS (AP) • Rescuers searched on Sunday for the body of an Idaho Falls man believed to have fallen through the ice on Gem Lake and drowned.

The Bonneville County sheriff's office said the efforts to find 46-year-old David Finnegan continued through the afternoon. Authorities believe Finnegan may have fallen through the ice, perhaps while trying to rescue one of his dogs.

Finnegan was reported missing Friday night after he failed to return home after walking his dogs. Rescue Team coordinator Sgt. Karl Casperson said a cap and ear muffs found in the ice were identified as Finnegan's by his wife, Cheryl Finnegan. Divers also retrieved a dog leash from the water.

Workers from Idaho Falls Power joined emergency workers in the search, checking a dam downstream from the spot where Finnegan likely entered the water.

# CSI's Cowboys Shine at Rodeo Finals

LAS VEGAS • The National Finals Rodeo could be summed up in three words - one apiece for the three cowboys with ties to the College of Southern Idaho rodeo program.

Good. Better. Best.

Good was the end result for Cody DeMers, CSI assistant coach. DeMers finished sixth in bareback riding with a total of 83.5 in the NFR's final round, which concluded late Saturday night. That solidified his seventh-place finish in both the world and NFR aggregate standings. De-Mers' winnings for 2011 were \$115,285.

Cody Wright, a former CSI cowboy, had a better year, winning the NFR's final round in saddle bronc riding, scoring 87.5 aboard the Bar T Rodeo's Eight Ball. He earned an overall eighth-place finish at the NFR, and ended the season ranked fourth in the world with earnings of \$214,142.

The best year, however, belonged to Cody's brother - Jesse Wright - who was tops in saddle bronc at the NFR and just missed beating Taos Muncy for the top spot in the world rankings. Jesse Wright defeated Muncy for the NFR title by 47.5 points, and earned almost \$46,000 for his efforts in Las Vegas. His take Please see RODEO, S3

# Broncos Buck Bears in Overtime

**DENVER** • Wild wins are becoming routine for Tim Tebow and the Denver Broncos, who flail away through most of four quarters before coming through in the clutch.

Matt Prater's 51-yard field goal 61/2 minutes into overtime gave the Broncos a 13-10 victory over the stunned Chicago Bears on Sunday. Prater's 59-yarder with 3 seconds left in regulation tied the score after Tebow led another rally.

"If you believe," Tebow said, "then unbelievable things can sometimes be

It was Denver's sixth straight win and seventh in eight games since Tebow, dubbed the "Mile High Messiah," was promoted to starter. The Broncos have trailed in the second half in six of those victories.

This latest comeback put Denver in sole possession of first place in the AFC West after Oakland's 46-16 drubbing at Green Bay.

# PATERNO FRACTURES **PELVIS** AFTER FALL

**STATE COLLEGE, Pa.** • Joe Paterno fractured his pelvis again following a fall at his home but will not need surgery, a person close to the family told The Associated Press on Sunday.

The former Penn State football coach was expected to make a full recovery after slipping Saturday and was admitted to the hospital the next day, the person added. The person spoke on condition of anonymity because of the sensitivity of the situation.

Paterno, who turns 85 on Dec. 21, is also undergoing radiation and chemotherapy for what his family has said is a treatable form of lung cancer. Son Scott Paterno has said doctors are optimistic about a full recovery from the illness.

Paterno initially hurt his pelvis in August after he was blindsided on the field during preseason practice. It was determined Paterno should remain in the hospital now to facilitate his regimen of cancer treatments while recovering from the pelvis injury, the AP was told.

The person declined to identify the hospital to maintain the family's privacy. An operator at the hospital in State College, Mount Nittany Medical Center, said Sunday there was no patient listing for Paterno.

Paterno was fired last month in the aftermath of child sex-abuse charges against former defensive coordinator Jerry Sandusky, who maintains his innocence. Paterno is not a target of the investigation.

Sandusky is scheduled to appear in court Tuesday after being charged Nov. 5 with the first set of child sex-abuse allegations that dated back to 1994.

Amid mounting criticism that school leaders should have done more to prevent the alleged abuse, trustees dismissed Paterno four days later and accepted school President Graham Spanier's resignation under pressure.

Paterno hasn't spoken publicly since his firing. He was diagnosed with cancer several days later during a follow-up visit to the doctor for a bronchial illness, his family has said.

Cincinnati forward Yancy Gates got a six-game suspension on Sunday for throwing punches, and seven other players were disciplined for their roles in a brawl that ended the annual

crosstown rivalry game. Four Bearcats and four Musketeers were suspended in all. Three Cincinnati players got six-game suspensions, the longest of

those handed out. Gates punched Xavier's Kenny Frease in the face, causing a nasty gash below his left eye, and hit at least one other Musketeer during the fracas on Saturday, which prompted the referees to call Xavier's 76-53 win with 9.4 seconds left.

The Bearcats also gave Cheikh Mbodj and Octavius Ellis six-game suspensions. Ge'Lawn Guyn was suspended for one game. The university planned to make them available for comment on Monday.

Xavier suspended point guard Tu Holloway for one game, guard Mark Lyons for two, and Dez Wells and Landen Amos for four games

Frease was the most badly injured, getting punched

and kicked. He had blood streaming from the cut beneath his left eye and was woozy after the game. Xrays were normal.

# Packers Breeze to 13-0

GREEN BAY, Wis. • Aaron Rodgers threw for 281 yards with two touchdowns and an interception in less than three full quarters' worth of work, Ryan Grant had two touchdowns rushing and Charles Woodson picked off a pass against his former team and Green Bay remained perfect by routing Oakland, 46-16.

With the win, the Packers ran their record to 13-0 leaving them three games short of completing a perfect regular season. And they did it with a near-perfect performance.

Carson Palmer threw for 245 yards with a touchdown and four interceptions for the Raiders (7-6), who looked like anything but legitimate contenders in the AFC West.

**TEXANS 20, BENGALS 19 CINCINNATI** • Rookie T.J. Yates led the biggest drive in Houston Texans history, throwing a 6-yard touchdown pass with 2 seconds left for a 20-19 victory that brought the first playoff berth in franchise history.

With their seventh straight win, the Texans (10-3) moved to the threshold of their first playoff berth. They clinched the AFC South title a few minutes later when Tennessee lost to New Orleans.

#### SAINTS 22, TITANS 17

NASHVILLE, Tenn. • Drew Brees threw two touchdown passes to Marques Colston in the fourth quarter to lead New Orleans to its fifth straight victory.

The NFC South-leading Saints (10-3) had little trouble picking up yards, but struggled to score until Brees and Colston connected on passes of 35 and 28 yards.

for 2011 was \$241,374.

"I just had to focus on myself and I couldn't worry about what Jesse was doing," Muncy said. "It was awesome to watch him ride. I've never seen someone spur over a horse's head like he did. He had a heck of a week, and I'm thankful to have another gold buckle."

Luke Branquinho won his third world steer wrestling championship and third National Finals Rodeo aggregate title, finishing sixth in the 10th and final round with a 4.7-second run. Branquinho, from Los

Alamos, Calif., entered the final round in a threeway fight for the world and aggregate crowns with Jason Miller of Lance Creek, Wyo., and Shawn Greenfield of Lakeview, Ore. But Miller and Greenfield broke the start barrier and received 10second penalties.

"Those guys (Miller and Greenfield) were going in there knowing they had to win good in the rounds to stay ahead in the (aggregate) and get the money they needed,"

Branquinho said. "They were taking a chance, you know.

"If I was in their situation, knowing that I had to win good in the gorounds, I maybe would have clipped the barrier, too. But that's just rodeo. It happens day in and day out in rodeo, and unfortunately for those two it happened in round 10 at the NFR."

Branquinho made \$234,518 this season. Second-place Greenfield finished with \$178,420, and third-place Miller earned \$177,455. At the NFR, Branquinho led with \$146,779, and Greenfield was second with \$98,798.

In the aggregate race, six-tenths of a second separated Miller, Greenfield and Branquinho after nine rounds, but Branquinho prevailed with a time of 41.9 for 10 rounds. Trevor Knowles of Mount Vernon, Ore., and Mickey Gee of Wichita Falls, Texas, tied for first in the round at 3.6.

In barrel racing, Lindsay Sears of Nanton, Alberta, won her second world championship with \$238,064 by securing the \$45,865 bonus that goes to the NFR aggregate standings champion.





# THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"Too late, too late! Ye cannot enter now.' – Alfred Lord Tennyson

When a contract seems simple, check for possible pitfalls, and if they exist, take evasive action. Today's no-trump game from a recent junior trials sees South not getting the point until too late. Given that this was a junior

event, North's initial pass seems surprising, but he did not have a two-diamond pre-empt available. In any event, the best contract of three no-trump was reached easily enough. West led the heart jack, which

South won with the queen. It seems as if South has an easy passage, with just three aces to lose, and possibly the club queen as well. So declarer set about establishing the diamonds. East took the ace and returned another heart, which declarer won in dummy, in order to continue cashing diamonds.

What South had failed to take into account were the five discards he needed to make from hand. He pitched three spades and two clubs, but when he led dummy's spade, East nipped in smartly with the ace to return a club through South's now doubleton king-jack. The defense collected three club tricks, in addition to the aces in the two pointed suits: one down.

Declarer should have countered this possibility by establishing a spade winner at trick two. If a defender takes the ace immediately and returns a heart — as good as anything — South wins in hand and cashes one spade before setting about dislodging the diamond ace.

Whatever happens now, the defenders cannot take more than their four top winners.
