The downtown parking proposal is an overhaul on several fronts, as a task force has offered changes that include removal of parking meters
downtown and ending the practice downtown and ending the practice

city-owned lots would provide free public parking on a first-come, first-served basis. Public parking on downtown streets would be regulated with posted time limits that vary based on location.
The council will also decide on an ordinance that will put in a

"I would rather do it in print because it is faster," Darius,

would probably be quicker, he says. Darius may be in the last generation of students to be taught cursive as states begin dropping the subject in favor of spending time on mastering math, science and other skills.
Cursive is not included in the so-called common core standards, which will govern teaching and lesson plans in
46 states beginning next year, leaving states free to shift 46 states beginning next year, leaving states free to shift
away from a subject taught for centuries. Hawaii and Indiana have already dropped it.

With technology pervasive in society and fewer documents that need a cursive sig-
nature, some educators say nature, some educators say
there is no need to bother kids with the tedious, time-con suming lessons on cursive They argue that we soon may no longer need to sign our names on legal documents or credit card receipts; a scan of may be all that is needed to identify us.

## Russians ScoffAtMedvedevElection Inquiry

MOSCOW • President Dmitry Medvedev used his Facebook page Sunday to disclose that he had ordered an investigation into reports of election fraud, a statement his audience greeted with derision.
The posting quickly went viral, and drew more than 8,000 mostly offended and even
offensive comments in a little over six hours, revealing the depth of the disillusionment with Medvedev, Prime Minister Vladimir Putin and their government. Tens of thousands of Russians spoke up in demonstrations across the country Saturday, protesting the Dec. 4 par-
lamentary elections andthey apparently had no intentio lections, and they apparently had no int
"Shame!" was a frequent comment, along with ''You're pathetic.'
The commenters ${ }^{\prime}$ posts Sunday revealed astonishing candor and courage. It's one thing to stand in a Moscow crowd of up to 40,000, ac cording to estimates, and call for new elec tions. It's another matter to advertise your page, where it doesn't take a KGB agent to make a quick identification.
In posting on Facebook, Medvedev was atempting to respond to Russians who organized Saturday's protest online, who are angry
because they suspect the election was rigged I "I agree neither with the slogans, nor the wrote. 'Nevertheless, I have ordered checks into all the reports from polling stations, regarding the compliance with the election laws."
One reason for the skepticism that greeted his remarks: Medvedev is the head of United Russia and was the top candidate on its party prosecutor and judges, who might not be eager to pursue those working on behalf of the ruling party.
