Area Educators Ponder Supplemental Funding

With election dates looming in May, area school officials are beginning to decide whether they'll ask voters for funding through supplemental levy issues.

A handful of Magic Valley school

districts are seeking renewal of

their supplemental levies - mon-

ey used to keep their operations

up and running in an era of state funding cuts.

Districts are deciding if they want to ask voters to approve a levy issue during the March 13 election. Requests to put an item on the ballot must be submitted to county clerks by Jan. 27.

"The majority of our districts do have supplemental levies," said Tim Hill, deputy superintendent of finance for the Idaho State Department of Education. Since March alone, school district budgets have been propped up by more than \$77.3 million of voterapproved funding.



Wendell Speaks Out on Proposed Jail

The Gooding County sheriff and Rocky Mountain Corrections presented their plans Wednesday while taking steps to acquire land.

WENDELL • The Gooding County Jail continues to move from concept to reality as the desired property in Wendell is shored up.

While officials prepared to show Wendell residents their first look at a mock-up of the lock-up on Wednesday night at Wendell High School, private investors reached an agreement to purchase seven acres along North Frontage Road.

Property owner Gabby Cavazos, who

lives in Texas, confirmed he has accepted an offer to buy seven of the nine acres next to Interstate 84. So far, neither he nor his real estate agent have offered details on the land price.

According to Walt Femling of Rocky Mountain Corrections, Municipal Capital of Denver is raising capital under the name Gooding Facilities LLC. He said the company has financed \$1 billion in jail projects across the country.

Townsfolk showed up at the school auditorium to hear the pitch and ask questions of county leaders. What will it look like? Who is paying for it? Will our taxes go up? Why Wendell?

Many people, like Kayla Winmill,

came in skeptical but had their minds changed by the answers they found.

"Hopefully, it's the start of something new, because Wendell is struggling right now," she said.

Investors will buy the land and pay for construction, but Gooding County will maintain, staff and run the jail as part of an annually renewable lease agreement. Because no county tax dollars will be spent in the purchase of land or construction, residents do not have to pass a bond.

Femling noted local folks can even invest a small amount of capital toward the project.

The facility has an approximate price tag of \$7 million to \$8 million, but Femling emphasized that nothing has gone to bid. The final cost is contingent on the price of the land and future construction costs.

Judge Orders Idaho to Increase Some Medicaid Rates

BOISE • A federal judge says the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare needs to increase Medicaid payments for some services for the developmentally disabled, a ruling that will cost the state at least \$4 million more a year.

U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill ruled Monday in a lawsuit first brought by five businesses against the state in 2009. The businesses contended that the state was wrong to keep providers at pay rates based on a 2006 study when two subsequent studies showed the cost of providing services had increased considerably.

According to the lawsuit, the 2006 daily rate for one type of service was about \$268. That compares to a daily rate of \$496 suggested by the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare's own study done in 2009. Lawmakers failed to give the department funding for the rate increase, however, so providers were kept at the lower 2006 rate. Winmill said that the law on Medicaid rates is clear: They must incorporate the actual cost of providing a service.

Sixty-one residential habilitation agencies in the state provide supportive living services to 6,202 clients, Winmill noted. The agencies provide homes and round-the-clock supervision for developmentally disabled clients who cannot live alone, as well as support for clients who need help to safely live in their own homes.

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while there is an obvious need to improve the bird's population, there isn't much money available to move conservation efforts forward.

Federal officials have declared the sage grouse warrants endangered-species protection but have held off from actually listing the bird as endangered. Meanwhile, local working groups are attempting to continue their work to improve grouse habitat and grow populations throughout the state — all in hopes of averting a listing.

As a South Magic Valley working group member, Rob Lonsinger estimated his group will need \$80,000 to fund its projects next year.

The group's members spent last year clearing juniper brush throughout southern Idaho. Removing the brush was meant to improve grouse habitat, but the group lacks data to show grouse populations have since improved.

"We want to know if we're being effective but we don't have the data yet," said Lonsinger, who is also a regional wildlife biologist for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

In order to get the money needed for monitoring equipment, Lonsinger will compete against other working groups and other conservation organizations for governmentfunded grants.

The group is currently reviewing 20 grant options from state and federal programs that help fund sage grouse conservation. The grants range from \$10,000 to \$75,000, with different requirements on how and where to spend the money. Lonsinger is hopeful the group will receive a grant but is worried the amount may be too small.

"We're really going to have to pull at every chance we can get," he said. *Please see* **GROUSE, A3**



SUN VALLEY ADMINISTRATOR SUES CITY

Sun Valley City Administrator Sharon Hammer is suing her employer and three city officials, alleging that she's been harassed repeatedly by Councilman Nils Ribi and unfairly targeted for termination.

Hammer is seeking a judgment of \$1 million or another amount as determined at trial for the alleged actions of Ribi, Councilman Robert Youngman and city attorney Adam King, who are all named as defendants.

Hammer is also seeking an immediate return to active duty with the city. She was placed on paid administrative leave for unspecified reasons on Nov. 18 through a letter Mayor Wayne Willich sent her, court records show.

The lawsuit alleges that Ribi continually attempted to direct Hammer's work, contrary to city policy. When Hammer refused to take his orders, Ribi became more abusive, raising his voice and causing her to avoid him, according to the lawsuit.

Ribi would not comment for this story.

Hammer alleges she tried to work out the problem and had discussions with Willich and King about the situation. But nothing changed after the mayor talked to Ribi about it, the case says.

In recent months, Ribi and Youngman have shown an interest in firing Hammer, according to the lawsuit. After a Nov. 11 closed-door council meeting, Willich told Hammer that Ribi and Youngman wanted him to seek her resignation, according to the lawsuit.

She refused and later was put on administrative leave.

Since then, Hammer alleges, Kirtlan Naylor, the attorney representing Sun Valley in the lawsuit, insinuated to Hammer and her lawyer, James Donoval, that the leave is connected to criminal behavior - misuse of public funds or property. In her suit, Hammer decries that action as improper given her lack of opportunity to respond to it.

Naylor declined to comment on the case, other than to say that responses will be made in court.

Hammer alleges she hasn't been given the due process required of government employees who face disciplinary actions. The case also notes she's received a professional award for her finance work in Sun Valley.

In court filings, Hammer describes the defendants' actions as a "kangaroo court" or "witch hunt."

"We're just kind of waiting to find out what's happening," said Donoval, also Hammer's husband. "She shouldn't even be on administrative leave."

The case also alleges Ribi has a history of harassing behavior. The lawsuit alleges that Ribi's neighbors sold their home and moved out of state to avoid him following occasions in which he disrobed to his underwear and performed a "strange form of yoga" in front of their window.

Open House Reveals the Vital Mission of Bill's Place

Melissa Rathbun arrived at Bill's Place for a second chance on Dec. 5.

She had spent seven months at the Twin Falls home for former female inmates earlier this year, but relapsed into drug addiction and was arrested in July for violat ing her probation on a 2010 conviction for acquiring a controlled substance by fraud.

"I was an addict ... I am an addict," Rathbun said. "I relapsed again and they were willing to take me back."

Bill's Place held an open house Tuesday, treating guests to holiday snacks and resident-led tours. The house is open to women who have recently been released from prison and are under some sort of supervision program such as probation, parole or a specialty court.

Bill Brockman, a founding board member whom the program is named after, said residents have a home at Bill's Place as long as they're moving toward recovery. Women

who come to the program must meet several requirements in order to be accepted into and stay in the program.

Bill's Place only accepts offenders convicted of nonviolent crimes. It doesn't accept those charged with sexual offenses or crimes against children.

"We can't handle that, we're not designed to do that," Brockman said.

Once admitted, residents must attend group meetings, commit to some sort of religious study and attend a weekly worship service. Women in the program are also required to find employment within two weeks of arriving.

Residents have been cut some slack on their job search during the economic downturn, said Beverly Wood, the house manager, but they still must look daily. Wood, a former Bill's Place resident, has been its manager for nearly four years and is known to run a tight ship.

"They either love me or hate me," she said.

Frank Neumeyer, senior probation and parole officer with the Idaho Department of Corrections, is the supervisor for both Bill's Place and Serenity House, another women's recovery center.

Neumeyer performs frequent home checks and drug tests, and follows the women's progress in finding jobs and attending court-ordered counseling. Women who come to Bill's Place are similar to many of his parolees, but residents have a pretty good track record of not getting in trouble again, he said.

"Having the house manager helps keep them accountable," he said.

For Rathbun, the structured environment helps. When she began to relapse into addiction it was Wood who noticed first.

"She's like 'A-ha! I know you're messing up;" Rathbun said. "She called me on it. You don't find people like that."

Bill's Place is mostly funded through an annual golf tournament and a craps shoot fundraiser, along with donations.

Right now, the program costs about \$1,500 to fund

each month, Brockman said. When each resident can pay the \$300 rent the program asks for, the bills can get paid. But the truth is, most residents can't pay all the rent, he said.

"They're always behind," Brockman said. With court costs and fees to pay, many residents don't have enough left for rent.

As Rathbun gets back on her feet at the house, she hopes to return to her job at AmeriPride Linen and Apparel Services, where she worked for two years. In the meantime, Rathbun said she's warming up to what Bill's House has to offer.

"When I came in the second time I had a more open mind," she said. "The first time I was set in my ways and didn't want to change."

Now, Rathbun said, she is going to take all she can soak up and run with it.

"I've just got to take everything and keep moving forward," she said.

Twin Falls School District: The dis-

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soon decide if they want to seek renewal of the district's long-running \$650,000 annual levy.

"That has become an important part of our daily operations now," Superintendent Dale Layne said.

Money from the supplemental levy goes into the school district's general fund. For more than a decade, it's helped cover operating expenses such as paying employee salaries.

'It's everything other than buildings and facilities," Layne said.

Trustees will make a decision either during their Tuesday meeting or during a special meeting in January. Layne said it's difficult to decide to ask for money now, as it would be awarded for the next fiscal year, which the state budget hasn't been set for. Idaho's lawmakers will do that important work starting Jan. 9, when the Legislature convenes in Boise.

District officials know this: They won't ask for an increase if they do pursue supplemental funding, Layne said, because they received some unexpected state funding at the end of the year.

The Kimberly School District might also pursue renewal of its two-year levy issue for \$300,000 each year.

"If we don't, we'll have to look at making \$300,000 worth of cuts," Superintendent Kathleen Noh said.

The item is on the agenda for the Kimberly School Board's 7 p.m. meeting today at Kimberly Intermediate School.

Murtaugh School District is one step ahead in the process, as its board on

If a levy issue is approved, the district will receive \$1.2 million each year for

trict doesn't plan to pursue a supplemental levy this year. A two-year, \$7.5 million levy issue was approved by voters last year.

Castleford School District: Superintendent Andy Wiseman said the district might seek a supplemental levy issue during the May 15 election, but a decision hasn't been made yet. Gooding School District: The district isn't pursing a supplemental levy issue this year. Voters approved a two-year, \$325,000 levy issue last vear.

Shoshone School District: A decision hasn't been made vet about whether the district will seek a renewal of its current levy.

Dietrich School District: Superintendent Neal Hollingshead said the district isn't planning to pursue a supplemental levy issue at this point.

two years. Money would be used to repair and maintain school buildings.

"We run this at the same amount every two years," Superintendent Scott Rogers said.

He said although the school district's need is greater than it used to be, administrators are sensitive to the needs of residents and don't want to raise taxes.

In order for a school district levy to pass, a simple majority vote is required. Idaho Code limits levy issues to two years in length, but there isn't a restric tion on the dollar amount that can be sought.


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Osterhoudt Receives up to 12 Years After Probation Violations

Franklin Scott Osterhoudt will serve up to 12 years in prison for multiple felonies he committed from 2009 to 2011.

For the latest felony, the 22year-old Twin Falls man was sentenced Monday to two to four years in prison after he was convicted of aggravated battery for crushing another



breaking the leg of Richard Wilson while they fought after he reportedly threw an Osterhoudt object at Wilson's car,

smashing the windshield. Police found Wilson lying with a broken leg on the sidewalk near Quincy Street and



Addison Avenue. Wilson said he was driving with his 9year-old daughter when he saw Osterhoudt stand in the road, then throw the object.

According to a police report, Wilson's tibia and fibula were broken and he required four hours of surgery to implant metal rods into his leg.

Osterhoudt will also be required to pay restitution of \$8,982.89 and court costs of between \$95 and \$150.

The battery conviction violated Osterhoudt's probation for two convictions from 2009, and he now must serve those sentences consecutively with his newest.

In 2009, Osterhoudt was accused of statutory rape, which he pleaded down to injury to a child in exchange for a sentence of 31/2 to 10 years. He was also convicted in 2009 of possession of a controlled substance, which carried a two- to fouryear sentence.

In each case, Osterhoudt was ordered to complete the state's retained jurisdiction

treatment program and then received four years probation in lieu of prison time.

With the two 2009 sentences being combined and credit for time served in the retained jurisdiction program, the earliest Osterhoudt will be released is in five years.

Gooding County would pay a per-bed, per-day lease, coming out to roughly \$1.15 million per year. Sheriff Shaun Gough said the approximate cost is \$20 per inmate, per day. The county will charge other jurisdictions a minimum of \$40, which is how the county will generate revenue.

Gough estimates the sheriff's office could save \$500,000 annually, as other counties would pay Gooding County to house their overflow inmates.

"No one wants to pass a bond in three counties for a shared facility," Femling told the audience. "It's impossible."

Gough has championed

the location as ideal for the county because of its proximity to the interstate, which makes the site attractive to other jurisdictions. An average of 25 to 30 inmates at the county's current jail are from Gooding County, which potentially leaves more than 120 beds available to rent.

Gough said the location could score a federal contract to hold U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement deportees, who are flown from Joslin Field, Magic Valley Regional Airport south of Twin Falls.

The annexation of the property into Wendell city limits has begun, said Mayor Brad Christopherson, as Cavazos has signed a letter of consent. From here, a survey of the land may be conducted, and the matter would then go to the city's planning and zoning commission.

Residents expressed concerns that the city's water and sewer services cannot support a structure this size without an overhaul - the city's recent attempt to expand its wastewater facility was snarled by a lawsuit. Christopherson said an agreement was recently reached on the sewer matter, and work could be complet ed by late 2012.

Wendell could reap a windfall in property taxes, as the investors will own the land and building. Thus, the city can collect tax revenue. Gough said he was working with the county assessor to determine an estimate of potential revenue.

Christopherson attended the meeting and has given a thumbs-up to the project. "I've tried to find a reason

to not support this, but I can't," he told the audience. Resident Ken Ruby also

left the meeting feeling better about the proposed jail. "Moving and putting the

jail here is positive, and I can't see a downside," he said. "Shaun is knowledgeable and wouldn't mislead us."

There aren't any waiting lists of people to receive the services, he said in the ruling, nor are there any documented instances of agencies turning clients away because they couldn't afford to provide care.

The state's attorneys had argued that those facts showed the Medicaid rates as set in 2006 must have been adequate, otherwise there would be a dearth of providers. Still, said Winmill, actual provider costs - not just outcomes - must be taken into account.

Department of Health and Welfare spokesman Tom Shanahan said the department was reviewing the ruling.

James Piotrowski, the attorney who represented the

"We can provide time and support but a grant is imperative."

Local working groups were once funded by government earmarks apportioned to them by Congress. Earlier this year, earmarks were frozen in an attempt to reduce government spend-

ing. "We don't where our next source of funding will come from," said Jon Beals, project manager for the Idaho Governor's Office of Species Conservation.

Beals said this year's \$1 million earmark has already been promised out for projects and working group facilitators. By spring, when groups typically apply for project funding, there may not be any of that funding left.

THEIR VIEW Occupy Still Has Problems Hitting the Right Targets

Shipping companies make terrible scapegoats for our country's economic ills. Although Goldman Sachs is assuredly guilty of past malfeasance, to target the companies it has financed is unfair.

The following editorial appeared in the Los Angeles Times on Tuesday:

rom Portland, Ore., to Long Beach, Calif., on Monday, Occupy Wall Street demonstrators who had been kicked out of encampments at parks and city centers picketed shipping companies instead, and tried unsuccessfully to shut down port traffic. That makes a certain kind of sense for a group that's as incensed about corporate misdeeds as it is by failures in government policy, but we're still not sure it's aiming at the right targets.

In some ways, going after shipping companies is a brilliant next step. At the Port of Long Beach, protesters picketed SSA Marine, a giant port operator partly owned by Goldman Sachs; at the Port of Hueneme, about 150 protesters targeted Del Monte Foods, which is owned by the leveraged buyout firm KKR. These shippers hit about half a dozen hot buttons common to Occupy protesters: They're owned by big financial companies that contributed to the global economic meltdown, they're a stand-in for all the woes brought by globalization, and they tend to have questionable environmental records (SSA is involved in plans to build a highly controversial coal-shipping terminal in Washington state) as well as labor practices. By hiring nonunion, independent contractors as truckers, SSA Marine has raised the ire of the Teamsters and other local activists.

Yet at the same time, these companies make terrible scapegoats for our country's economic ills. Although Goldman Sachs is assuredly guilty of past malfeasance, to target the companies it has financed is both unfair and strategically clueless. SSA Marine isn't responsible for Goldman's shenanigans involving mortgage-backed securities. Further, financing provided by the likes of Goldman keep businesses alive and the economy flowing; without it, joblessness would be worse than it is.

Moreover, blocking projects meant to transport fossil fuels will do little or nothing to end their use; the only sensible way to solve our climate and pollution problems is to change government emissions policies. And by injecting itself into the port trucking issue, Occupy is stepping into a legal and political morass. The shipping industry didn't get America into this economic mess, and there is little it could do to get us out. In times of rising joblessness, it's common to blame foreign competition for the losses at home. But blaming ports or shippers for the changes wrought by an increasingly global economy is sort of like fingering automakers for urban traffic congestion. In its search for a new direction, Occupy Wall Street would probably do better to occupy the National Mall than San Pedro.





Ground Force officials expect contacts made during the visit to yield another \$8 million in sales in the next two years.

Both men pleaded guilty to conspiring to commit the May 14 robbery. Wray received a sentencing enhancement for infliction of great bodily harm.

Boise Fertility Broker Pleads Guilty to Fraud

ST. LOUIS • An Idaho woman who operated a fertility brokerage business has admitted to defrauding six Missouri women who provided eggs for the business.

Janae Helgerson of Boise pleaded guilty Wednesday to

wire fraud in U.S. District Court in St. Louis. Sentencing is March 16.

Helgerson was arrested in February. Her business, Mid-West Egg Donation, matched couples seeking to conceive a baby with women willing to provide eggs. Federal prosecutors say Helgerson collected payments from couples, but egg donors in Missouri failed to receive nearly \$30,000 owed to them.

Former County Worker Charged with Theft, Fraud

CALDWELL • A former Canyon County building and grounds keeper has been charged with felony counts of grand theft and fraud.

The Idaho Press-Tribune reports a grand jury indictment against Andrew Eveland was filed Monday by the Idaho Attorney General's Office.

Court documents show Eveland defrauded the county in southwestern Idaho of more than \$64,000 and stole items including several computers, a pair of 40-inch television monitors, grounds keeping tools and more than 300 landscaping blocks.

Eveland was employed as Canyon County's superintendent for building and grounds from 1995 until March 2011. County officials declined to release details on his departure earlier this year, citing personnel issues.

She says her brother had planned to move into an assisted living home a week later. Lords was a military veteran who, according to his family, had resided in southeastern Pocatello for most of his life. A funeral mass will be held at St. Anthony's Church in Pocatello on Saturday.

Alleged White House Shooter in Court Friday

WASHINGTON • A federal judge has set a new court date to hear more evidence about the mental health of a man accused of firing shots at the White House in November.

Oscar Ramiro Ortega-Hernandez of Idaho appeared Wednesday in a federal court in Washington. where a judge set another hearing for Friday. Ortega is accused of using an assault rifle to fire at the White House on the evening of Nov. 11, when President Barack Obama was out of town. He is charged with at tempting to assassinate the president.

Acquaintances have said Ortega acted strangely in recent months, suggesting he believed he was Jesus and calling Obama "the devil." A psychiatric preliminary

screening found him competent to stand trial, but federal prosecutors are asking for more extensive tests.

SUV Hits Man in Wheelchair

LEWISTON • A man has been hospitalized after his wheelchair collided with a sport-utility vehicle in Lewiston.

Lewiston Police Capt. Roger Lanier told the Lewiston Tribune that it appears the man's wheelchair was

dragged for a short distance by the vehicle in the Tuesday night collision. Lanier said the man was wearing a dark blue jacket and did not have any reflectors or lights on his wheelchair.

Police have not released the names of the man or the driver of the SUV. The driver wasn't injured in the collision, but the man in the wheelchair was taken to St. Joseph Regional Medical Center by ambulance.

House Passes \$662 Billion Defense Bill

It was a rare instance of bipartisanship in a bitterly divided Congress. The Senate is expected to pass the measure today and send it to Obama.

WASHINGTON • The House passed a massive \$662 billion defense bill Wednesday night after last-minute changes placated the White House and ensured President Barack Obama's ability to prosecute terrorist suspects in the civilian justice system.

The vote was 283-136 and reflected the strong support for annual legislation that authorizes money for the men and women of the military as well as weapons systems and the millions of jobs they generate in lawmakers' districts.

It was a rare instance of bipartisanship in a bitterly divided Congress. The Senate is expected to pass the measure on Thursday and send it to Obama.

The House vote came just hours after the administration abandoned a veto threat over provisions dealing with the handling of terrorism suspects.

Applying pressure on House and Senate negotiators working on the bill last week, Obama and senior members of his national security team, including Defense Secretary Leon Panetta and Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, had sought modifications in the detainee provisions.

Negotiators announced the changes late Monday, clearing the way for White House acceptance.

In a statement, press secretary Jay

Carney said the new bill "does not challenge the president's ability to collect intelligence, incapacitate dangerous terrorists and protect the American people."

Specifically, the bill would require that the military take custody of a suspect deemed to be a member of al-Qaida or its affiliates and who is involved in plotting or committing attacks on the United States. There is an exemption for U.S. citizens.

House and Senate negotiators added language that says nothing in the bill will affect "existing criminal enforcement and national security authorities of the FBI or any other domestic law enforcement agency" with regard to a captured suspect "regardless of whether such ... person is held in military custody."

The bill also says the president can waive the provision based on national security.

Dems Drop Millionaires Tax in Yearend Dispute

WASHINGTON • Democrats backed away from their demand for higher taxes on millionaires as part of legislation to extend Social Security tax cuts for most Americans on Wednesday as Congress struggled to clear critical year-end bills without triggering a partial government shutdown.

But Republicans, frustrated that a bipartisan \$1 trillion funding bill was being blocked by Senate Democrats, floated the possibility of repackaging the measure and passing it Friday in defiance of President Barack Obama and his allies in control of the Senate. Stopgap funding runs out Friday at midnight.

In a written statement late Wednesday, White House Communications Director Dan Pfeiffer said the administration objected to several environmental, financial and other provisions in the mammoth spending bill and said Congress should approve a short-term spending measure to avoid a federal shutdown and give lawmakers time to iron out their final disputes.

Senate Rejects 2 Balanced Budget Amendments

WASHINGTON • The Senate on Wednesday voted against changing the Constitution to require a balanced budget as Congress hit yet another dead end in its search for a way out of its fiscal morass.

Two proposals for balanced budget amendments were doomed by the partisanship that dominates Congress. All but one Republican voted against a Democratic measure, and every Democrat opposed the GOP-backed version. Amendments to the Constitution must be approved by two-thirds of the House and Senate and threefourths of state legislatures.

With the votes, Congress fulfilled a commitment to take up balanced budget amendments that were part of the agreement last summer to raise the government's debt limit in exchange for \$2 trillion in future spending cuts.

The House held its vote last month, falling 23 votes short of reaching the twothirds majority.

How They Voted cap spending and bind

Idaho's two senators voted for the GOP version of the balanced budget amendment. Here's what they said about the measure:

Sen. Mike Crapo: "The national debt is at \$15 trillion and rising. In 1997, a balanced budget amendment failed to pass the Senate by just one vote. Since then, Congress has added nearly \$10 trillion to our national debt. It's time for the excess spending to stop. It's time to put our fiscal house in order. A balanced budget amendment, like the one we have in Idaho, would cap spending and bind each successive Congress in perpetuity."

Sen. Jim Risch: "Since I came to Washington, Congress has borrowed between \$4 and \$5 billion every day. This reckless spending must stop. A balanced budget amendment would require Congress to do what it has repeatedly tried and failed to rein in rampant overspending. It is the only collar that will control Congress since it has no self control. I will continue to advocate for a balanced budget amendment to the Constitution like almost every state already has."

Survey Finds 1 in 4 Women Hurt in Domestic Violence

ATLANTA (AP) • It's a startling number: 1 in 4 women surveyed by the government say they were violently attacked by their husbands or boyfriends.

Experts in domestic violence don't find it too surprising, although some aspects of the survey may have led to higher numbers than are sometimes reported.

Even so, a government official who oversaw the research called the results "astounding?"

"It's the first time we've had this kind of estimate" on the prevalence of intimate partner violence, said Linda Degutis of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The survey, released by the CDC Wednesday, marks the beginning of a new annual project to look at how many women say they've been abused.

One expert called the new report's estimate on rape and attempted rape "extremely high" – with 1 in 5 women saying they were victims. About half of those cases involved intimate partners.



Treasury Sells 30-year Bonds at a Record Low Yield

NEW YORK (AP) • High demand for U.S. government debt pushed the yield on the 30-year Treasury bond down to a record low Wednesday.

Worsening concerns about Europe's latest efforts to contain its debt crisis are keeping demand brisk for Treasury securities. The Treasury Department sold \$13 billion worth of 30-year bonds at a record low yield of 2.925 percent.

Investors bid \$3.05 for every dollar of bonds up for sale, much higher than the average of \$2.81 over the past four auctions. Nomura securities analysts said in a note to clients that investors had an "insatiable appetite" for Treasurys.

Take That Back! Returns are Big for the Holidays

NEW YORK • Ah, the warm feelings of the holidays: Comfort and joy. Good cheer.

And buyer's remorse.

People who rushed to snag discounts on TVs, toys and other gifts are quickly returning them for much-needed cash. The shopping season started out strong for stores, but it looks like the spending binge has given way to a holiday hangover.

Return rates spiked when the Great Recession struck and have stayed high. For every dollar stores take in this holiday season, they'll have to give back 9.9 cents in returns, up from 9.8 last year, according to the National Retail Federation's survey of 110 retailers. In better economic times, it's about 7 cents.


This time of year, fractions of a penny add up. Stores are expected to ring up \$453 billion during the holiday season. Merchants make up to 40 percent of their annual sales in the last two months of the year.

Returns are typically associated more with January than December. After all, that hot pink sweater with yellow stars on the sleeves may not be exactly what your sister had in mind. But these days, more is going back before it ever gets to Santa's sack.

"When the bills come in and the money isn't there, you have to return," says Jennifer Kersten, 33, of Miami. She spent \$300 the day after Thanksgiving on books, movies and clothes for her nephews. Last week she returned half of it.

Some reasons for the many unhappy returns:

Silage and silicon continue to blend in modern agriculture, and local entrepreneur Jeff Sanstrom has based his business around this shift in philosophy.


Sanstrom has developed MyScaleNet.com, a website that allows farmers, dairymen and others to compile reports on how their goods are moved and weighed in real time.

For example, drivers hauling cut hay can upload information from a weigh station to the website for instant tracking. Gone is the need to keep paper records and follow up with the arduous task of calculating a season's worth of data into a final report.

Companies can also track commodity shipments to make sure their loads are reaching the correct destinations.

"We take out the headache of manually managing each transaction as it happens," Sanstrom said.

The company he co-owns with his sister was founded nearly 13 years ago, he said, when a customer approached him about programming a weigh scale to report a weight on a ticket that could be printed out, thus eliminating some hand-finished paperwork. From there, he recruited other software developers

to help him build a program to help clients track multiple commodities going to multiple locations.

The key to making it work was put ting the software online. That way, the customer doesn't have to invest in expensive hardware or install periodical updates to computer software. Everything is done through a web browser.

Sanstrom Sale Co. of Twin Falls.

MyScaleNet.com manages between 2,000 and 3,000 transactions per day, Sanstrom said, and his client base reaches from California to South Carolina.

Future products include a system to

track employee movements to make sure work is being completed on time. If a worker oversleeps a 2 a.m. milking and doesn't clock in, a text will be sent to the employee first and then to a supervisor.

"It's like a time clock on steroids," he said.

There are also plans to create smartphone apps for Apple and Android systems, to further help users access their information on the go.

SUN SHINES ON THE MOUNTAIN, AND KEVIN PEARCE RIDES AGAIN

BRECKENRIDGE, Colo. • Basking in the sun and snow, surrounded by his fans and friends, Kevin Pearce carved sweet turns down a gentle run called "Springmeier" – kicking up just enough powder behind him to remind people that, yes, this kid can still ride.

The three trips he took down that hill, some might say, were a storybook ending to a life-altering journey that began when Pearce nearly died during a training accident while preparing for the Olympics.

Or was it a new beginning?

"That's kind of my goal," Pearce said, "is to continue to have special days like this."

Yes, Tuesday was a special day — the 24-year-old champion snowboarder's first trip down the mountain since Dec. 31, 2009, which is when he banged his head on the halfpipe in Utah while try-ing a difficult trick that, had he pulled it off a few months after that, might have won him a gold medal at the Vancouver Olympics.

The accident left him in a coma and his life hung in the balance for several days. When he finally awoke, severe head trauma turned the most basic of activities - walking, talking, seeing straight - into pressing challenges for the young athlete.

In the back of his mind, though, as he labored through his grueling rehabilitation, Pearce never gave up hope that he might ride again - if not across a rail or through a halfpipe, then at least down a mountain.

On a sunsplashed afternoon in the Colorado high country, 712 days after the accident, he did.

The day began with a trip to Vail, where Pearce hooked up with snowboarding mogul Jake Burton and the close-knit group of pro snowboarders who call themselves the "Frends" – because there is no 'I' in friendship.

After a few mellow trips on that mountain, Pearce came

to Breckenridge to ride with other friends, along with the public, a few hundred of whom cheered when he walked out of the lunchroom and toward the lift, ready to ride again.

"I didn't know if anyone was going to show up today," Pearce said. "When I walked out there and there were all these people there to support me and have my back the way they have for the last two years, it brings this feeling. It's a hard feeling to explain."

Instead of sporting the old "I Ride For Kevin" stickers that dotted every mountainside after the accident, those on the slopes with him on this day wore stickers and T-shirts with a new message: "Ride With Kevin."

The return to the snow wasn't without the most minor of falls, a very small tipping that came courtesy of a rider who bumped him on the hill. No damage done, though. Only smiles at the bottom, where two years of hard, emotional work - filled with hundreds of tiny steps forward and a fair share of tiny steps

"I don't think anyone in this room except my mom and my brother have any idea what's really going on with me right now," Pearce said, a few hours after the ride. "There's so much more than what you see?

the mountain in a bright blue jacket, Pearce was the star, even with dozens of world-class riders practicing nearby for the Dew Tour event that will take place on the same mountain later this week.

Pearce will be on hand for that, though he knows joining those guys at the top is not in his future. "Jumps and halfpipes and rails and that stuff aren't important to me anymore," he said. "What's important to me is to be able to get up there and be happy with what I'm doing. Riding powder. Riding with all my friends. There are so many things you can do up on the mountain that don't involve competition. That stuff, that's the stuff I'm looking forward to the most."

Cassidy's mom, Marie, went on the hunt along with mentor Meghan Roos.

"I know that hunting wasn't her favorite thing, Cassidy said of her mom, "but she did it for me."

Marie said she was impressed with Roos as a men-

Duck Jerky: A No-foul Waterfowl Treat

n a scale from one to 10, the wild game cuts that have traditionally competed for the coveted No. 10 position at my family's dinner table have been sagebrush-fattened pronghorn antelope steaks; the breast meat of their rangeland neighbor, the sage grouse; and, of course, my duck and goose offerings.

After years of trial and error, I'm happy to report that I've finally found a recipe that never fails to please my family's discriminating palates: jerky.

Though it lacks the panache of a Hickory Farms package, my kids and inlaws always remind me to include a vacuum sealed bundle of my jerky in their Christmas stockings. For someone who loves to hunt these animals as much as I do - particularly the more assessable ducks and geese

— it's a win-win situation. Because well-cured jerky does not require refrigeration, it provides a ready-toeat snack when you're on the road or in the field. Additionally, if it's properly packaged and stored, jerky can be used as a high-calorie supplement to your home/emergency food storage supply.

Though excellent commercial jerky preparations are available, my family favors a simple soy saucebased recipe for ducks and geese that I found at jerkyfaq.com. Check out this and other websites for the basic ingredient list and proportions. Once you've selected



your marinade, follow these simple steps for creating excellent jerky.

Preparation. I prefer the European method of keeping uncleaned birds in cold storage in my garage for several days following their harvest. (If this troubles you, simply clean your birds immediately upon returning home.) To collect the meat, I use sheet metal shears to separate the breast from the bird. At this point, I like to trim the meat from the bone, remove the skin and fat, carefully clean and then soak for an hour in a tub of cold, salty water to draw out clotted blood and debris.

Next, I clean, rinse and inspect the meat before patting it dry with a paper towel. Then I place the dry strips into a sealable plastic baggie and slide into the freezer for several hours. This allows the meat to stiffen, which makes cutting it into 1/4to 1/2-inch strips much easier. For a bolder flavor, I place the meat strips into a food storage bag, pour in my soy-based marinade, seal and refrigerate overnight. Jerkying the Meat. To jerk the meat, I simply remove it from the bag, shake it over the sink to remove excess fluid, and then place it on the dehydrator racks or







Blagojevich Seeks to Enroll in Prison Substance-abuse Course

CHICAGO • Convicted former Illinois Gov. Rod Blagojevich wants to enroll in a substance-abuse program at a federal prison outside of Denver, a move that could shave up to a year off of his prison sentence.

Blagojevich's legal team, however, has downplayed the request, briefly mentioning the drug program by only its acronym in court Tuesday, resulting in hardly anyone noticing among a throng of reporters. A day later, the attorneys declined to comment at all.

But the move raises questions about whether Blagojevich suffers from a real substance abuse problem or

is simply angling to reduce his stiff 14-year sentence.

Two former associates of another convicted former Illinois governor, George Ryan, said Wednesday that they remember it didn't take much to get into the Residential Drug Abuse Treatment Program – as little as regularly consuming five alcoholic drinks a week before they had been incarcerated.

"Any defense lawyer in town that's worth their salt all know about this and they all try to get their clients in," said Scott Fawell, Ryan's former chief of staff who cut his sentence by about eight months by completing the drug program at a federal prison in Yankton, S.D.

Study Shows Songbirds Believe What They Hear

When Franklin D. Roosevelt said we have nothing to fear but fear itself, he could have easily been talking about songbirds.

A new study shows that the mere sound of predators reduces both the number and survival rate of songbird offspring, regardless of the true threat. The finding could have important implications for protecting songbirds and a host of other wildlife.

Ecologist Liana Zanette of the University of Western Ontario and her colleagues studied song sparrows on several of the small Gulf Islands in British Columbia. They surrounded nesting areas with netting and electric fencing to keep out predators and set up speakers broadcasting the sounds of other animals. In some areas, they played the sounds of predators, such as raccoons, hawks and owls. In others, they played nonpredator sounds, including seals, geese and hummingbirds.

Female birds exposed to the sounds of predators showed drastic changes in behavior. They

built nests in denser and thornier plants, spent more time watching for predators and less time collecting food, and produced fewer eggs something that has been linked to lower food consumption.

Once their eggs hatched, the mothers provided less food to their nestlings and did not venture as far in search of food. The birds exposed to predator sounds produced 40 percent fewer fledglings than birds exposed to nonpredator sounds, the team reported Monday in Science.

The findings have wide implications for species conservation, said ecologist and study co-author Michael

Clinchy of the University of Victoria. For instance, neutering programs to control feral cat populations operate under the assumption that well-fed feral cats won't harm birds and other wildlife.

"But our results show that the mere presence of this introduced predator is enough to negatively impact native wildlife," Clinchy said. That's especially concerning because many feral cat programs are located in conservation parks.

The new findings, Clinchy said, could also help clear up a long-standing debate about the effectiveness of reintroducing wolves to Yellowstone National Park - an initiative that began in 1995 in an effort to restore native flora and fauna. Proponents of the wolf reintroduction said that wolves, which once thrived in Yellowstone but went extinct in the 1920s, control the elk population, in turn allowing native plants and smaller animals to flourish. But critics said the 50 percent decrease in the elk population since 1995 can't be due to wolves because they don't kill and consume enough elk per year.

"Our results corroborate evidence that wolves are decreasing elk numbers," Clinchy said, "not by killing but by scaring them." Frightened elk, he said, are known to behave similarly to the sparrows exposed to predator sounds – they spend time in safer places and consume less food, leading to decreased offspring.

More research is needed

before the results can be applied to other animals, said Thomas Martin, a University of Montana ecologist who was not involved in the study.

"They looked at a single species, and clearly this will differ across species and across habitat types," he said. "This now opens the door to other studies."

SPRING STEELHEAD SEASON TO OPEN

Prepare your rods, anglers. Spring steelhead season opens Jan. 1.

The steelhead limit is three per day, nine in possession and 20 for the season. Once limits are reached, the angler must stop fishing, even catchand-release.

Steelhead anglers may use only barbless hooks, except on the Boise River, and may keep only hatchery steelhead marked with a clipped adipose fin.

F&G Seeks Comments on Upland Game Seasons

Now's a good time for Idaho bird hunters to speak up.

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game is working on recommendations for furbearer and upland game hunting season rules for 2012-13 and 2013-14.

Final recommendations will be presented to the Fish and Game Commission in January. All rules, except for sage grouse, will be published in one brochure.

Some things to be considered include expanding youth hunting opportunities; moving upland game bird seasons to the third Saturday in September; increasing the chukar/gray partridge bag limit back to eight each; increasing possession limits to three times the daily bag limit; reductions in fall turkey hunting in the southeast and southwest regions; increasing otter quotas in the Panhandle, Clearwater and Southeast regions; a few changes to areas open or closed to beaver trapping in the Clearwater and Magic Valley regions.

Sagegrouse seasons will be set separately during the August 2012 commission meeting.

BONDS' SENTENCING BRINGS **BALCO SAGA NEAR A CLOSE**

SAN FRANCISCO • The largest federal criminal investigation into sports doping began more than nine years ago with a tax agent digging through the trash of the now notorious Bay Area Laboratory Co-Operative. Barring an appeal, the government's work comes to an anti-climactic end Friday when Barry Bonds - the probe's highest-profile catch - is sentenced for obstruction of justice.

In between, the federal government spent millions of dollars and untold staff hours obtaining the convictions of 11 people. Six of them, including track star Marion Jones, were ensnared for lying to grand jurors, federal investigators or the court. Five men, including Bonds' personal trainer Greg Anderson, pleaded guilty to steroid distribution charges stemming from their BALCO connections.

The investigation in general – and the pursuit of Bonds in particular ignited a debate over whether the government's long involvement was the best use of public resources.

Hot Start Carries Declo Past Gooding



Baker netted 12 of his points in the first half as Declo (3-3 overall, 1-0 Canyon) took control in small spurts - a 9-0 run in the first quarter, a 7-0 run early in the second, and an 8-0 run capped by a Hayden Hanson's buzzer beater heading into halftime.

"We knew we had to get out to a quick start and shut them down; our main goal was defense," said Declo's Kai Garner, who had 12 points, eight rebounds and five steals.

Declo's biggest lead was 18, but the Hornets went cold in an eightminute slump without a field goal in the second half.

"I think we got kind of lazy and we started rushing things and forcing passes into areas that weren't open," Garner said. "And we didn't play very good defense, either. We didn't move very well in our zones." Led by 14 points from Jared Parke and 13 from Carter Flora, Gooding (3-3, 1-1) rallied to make it a six-point game with 5:12 remaining. That's as close as the Senators got. Declo won it from the foul line, converting 8-of-12 down the stretch while Gooding hit just one shot from the field in the final five minutes. "They're good," Gooding coach Joey Zubizarreta said of Declo. "They're athletic in every position. They're fast and they can all shoot. If you give them easy looks, it doesn't matter if its two-foot jumpers or threes, they're going to hit it." For a Gooding squad that won only four games last season, confidence and gusto from the get-go seems to be missing, despite evident talent and athleticism. for everybody else," Scott said. "The grand jury is the bedrock of the criminal justice system in the United States."

The probe did lead directly to former U.S. Sen. George Mitchell's in-depth investigation of drug use in Major League Baseball and his seminal Mitchell Report, which in turn prompted MLB and its players' union to strengthen their steroids policy. Yet the relatively short list of convictions leaves some, perhaps most notably the BALCO founder himself, unimpressed. "Obviously, the BALCO case brought about a greater public awareness regarding the rampant use of drugs at the elite level of sport, which is a good thing," said Victor Conte, the BALCO founder and president who spent four months in prison after pleading guilty to steroids distribution. "As the BALCO case comes to a close, I don't think it was the highest and best use of the tens of millions of taxpayer dollars that were spent on the case." Bonds will have 14 days after his sentencing to file a notice of appeal. The trial itself ended ambiguously in April about three weeks after it began. The jury concluded Bonds purposely evaded responding during testimony to a grand jury investigating steroids distribution in sports with a rambling non sequitur to a question about drug injections, and the jurors convicted him of obstruction of justice.

More than seven years after he testified before a grand jury investigating BALCO, Major League Baseball's alltime home runs leader was convicted on just one of four remaining counts against

him. And the jury deadlocked on whether Bonds lied about taking performance enhancing drugs.

Now, federal sentencing guidelines suggest a prison term of between 15 months and 21 months. But federal probation officers are recommending that Bonds receive no time, citing his charitable work, the nature of the crime and his otherspotless criminal wise record. U.S. District Judge Susan Illston has sentenced two other BALCO figures convicted of similar crimes to probation and house arrest.

Was it all worth it?

"It absolutely was," said MacGregor Scott, the former U.S. attorney for Sacramento, now in private practice at Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe. "It brought a focus and awareness to the steroids issue that wasn't there before."

Scott said prosecutors had to go after Bonds once they concluded he lied to the grand jury when he denied knowingly using performance-enhancing drugs and said he allowed only doctors to inject him. Dozens of other athletes testified truthfully, Scott said.

"There aren't two sets of laws, one for Bonds and one Pocatello converted a fourpoint play after being fouled on a 3-point attempt and it put away Minico from there.

Arizona State athletic director Lisa Love announced Wednesday that Graham will replace Dennis Erickson, who was dismissed following a 6-6 season in which the Sun Devils dropped their final four games.

Graham spent just one season in Pittsburgh, where he led the Panthers to a 6-6 mark and a tie for second place in the Big East.

The move caps a tumultuous season for the Panthers, who announced in September that they're leaving the Big East for the ACC by 2014 and will now be looking for their fourth head coach in the last 13 months.

Graham is 49-29 in a sixyear head coaching career that includes stops at Tulsa and Rice.

"Criteria for our head coach was established, and the word that was at the forefront of discussions was 'energy' ... energy toward promoting our program in the community and with former players," Love said in a statement. "Energy towards instilling discipline, leadership and in recruiting. Energy toward representing our brand

in every facet of the program. In Todd, we have not only hired a young and sitting head coach, but one with a history of success on the field and in hiring top-notch assistant coaches."

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

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

The purpose of the hearing is for public input on amendments to the Water Quality section and the addition of an implementation section of the Coordinated Water Resource Management Plan. A summary of the proposed changes to the plan follows and a completer text of the proposed changes can be obtained at the County Clerk's Office in Cassia, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln and Twin Falls Counties Monday through Friday during the hours of 9: to 5:00pm. Gooding County Offices are closed on Fridays.

The proposed revisions will correct grammar, errors and update wording in the Water Quality section of the plan. The Preface has been changed to delete Minidoka county as a member county and the description of the Planning Area reflects this change. The Situation Statement has been revised to include aquatic nuisance species, recharge, cloud seeding, climate change and federal mandates and court decisions. Aquaculture facilities are now included under the Situation Statement for CAFO's. Item 19 under Policy Statements pertaining to water usage and diversions has been deleted. A section on aquatic nuisances species has been added which includes goals, objectives and strategies for preventing the introduction of these species. This section calls for education of the public, law enforcement, sportsmen and recreational groups. It also promotes the development of boat and equipment cleaning stations at recreation areas in the region. The Hydro Power situation statement has been updated and a new strategy AO1.a has been added to ensure there are no negative impacts to water quality from modifications to existing facilities. The Private, Municipal and Industrial waste treatment section has been revised to include commercial enterprises and the term "Middle Snake River" used throughout this section has been revised to "waters of the region". Goal B, Strategy B01.b has been added requiring commercial and light industrial land uses to use municipal waste treatment systems unless there is insufficient capacity and what a developer must base their plans on when constructing private systems. BO1.c has been added calling for increased monitoring and enforcement of regulations for certain commercial and light industrial uses. BO1.f has also been added encouraging continued monitoring for pharmaceuticals in ground waters of the region. Goal C with objectives and strategies has been added to this section dealing with the development of heavy industry in the region. The purpose of this Goal is to protect surface and ground water quality within the region as it relates to heavy industry development. A waste treatment plan must include a contingency plan and assure there will be no negative impact from the escape or discharge of pollutants. This goal also calls for the construction of monitoring wells, Proper handling of commodity storage and solid waste landfills, dust and smoke stack remediation plans. The Field Agricultural Situation Statement has been updated to reflect the current number of farms, number of acres farmed and economic data. The goals, objectives and strategies of the Field Agricultural section has minor changes to correct spelling and phrases. Strategy BO2.g was added to promote research and the use of approved genetically engineered crops to reduce the use of pesticides and fertilizer. The Animal Agriculture Situation Statement has been changed to reflect current economic information for livestock operations. The definition of a Concentrated animal feeding operation (CAFO) has been changed to the definition used by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). A definition of an animal unit has been removed from the plan as each member county has their own definition of an animal unit. Strategies BO1.a, b, d, e, f and g have been eliminated and incorporated under new Strategies BO1a, b and c. BO1e is new and encourages monitoring for pharmaceuticals in ground and surface water. BO1f is also new and encourages increased monitoring and enforcement of regulations for chemical storage, mixing, application, waste disposal and spills including fuel storage. The Ground Water Recharge Situation Statement has been changed to reflect current information and recognize the Comprehensive Aquifer Management Plan (CAMP) in the recharge portion of the plan concerning the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer. Strategy A01.d was eliminated under ground water recharge since the concern was already covered by strategy A01c. In the Definition Section the definitions for Chemical, Nutrient, Organic and Sediment Contaminates are removed and replaced by a definition for Contaminates as defined by the EPA. The definitions for Commercial and industrial properties is eliminated since both are defined by the member counties. A definition for Evapotranspiration (ET) has been added which is Water that is transpired from the leaves of plants and evaporated from the soil. Definitions have been added for NPDES, NRCS, TMDL as the abbreviations are used within the plan. A definition of wetlands has been included as defined by the EPA. A new section, The Drinking Water Protection Plan, has been added to the Water Quality portion of the Coordinated Water Resource Management Plan. The purpose of this section is to address the concerns of cities and drinking water associations in protecting source water from contamination. The plan allows cities and member counties to work together in forming community advisory boards, delineating water protection areas, identifying potential sources of contamination, managing drinking water protection areas and planning for the future. This section outlines regulatory and non-regulatory approaches to protecting source water from contaminant sources within drinking water protection areas. Protection areas will be defined by the cities, drinking water associations and counties and set forth by overlays to county zoning maps. The Drinking Water Protection Plan will be implemented by the adoption of a Drinking Water Protection Ordinance by each county. A sample ordinance is attached to this section of the plan. The implementation will include an overlay to the county zoning map, an inventory of potential sources of contamination and the recognition of a contingency plan for contamination. The sample ordinance defines various water protection overlay districts depending on the time of travel for source water. Each district includes a description of land uses that will or won't be allowed with the county being the ultimate authority for land situated outside the city limits or the boundaries of a water association. A new section to the Coordinated Water Resource Management Plan titled Implementation is added. The implementation portion of the plan reflects the way the plan has been adopted by the member counties. It calls for the application of policies included in the plan to apply to policies, resolutions and ordinances adopted by the member counties. It call for coordination with planning and zoning commissions of the member counties as well as state and federal government agencies. It also calls for education, adoption and practice of water quality protection and conservation measure both in county facilities and new development. It further mandates that the plan must be continually reviewed and update as needed. Any person may attend the hearing and written and/or oral testimony shall be taken. 





THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"A nice man is a man of nasty

— Jonathan Swift

Bridge is as full of cliches and aphorisms as any sporting activity. A phrase that gets used a lot is the "power of the closed hand." It means that declarer, by leading toward his own hand, the unknown quantity, can put the defenders under a lot of pressure.

Consider today's deal, which arose at Board-a-Match, which is a strange hybrid form of scoring. Each team takes on another at pairs scoring, and whoever does better on the board gets a point, regardless of the margin of victory. This leads to attempting to justify nonbridge decisions which was my excuse for opening one no-trump with the South cards.

After a transfer and a mildly aggressive invitational raise by my partner, I declared four spades. Of course this auction has protected all the side suits, but the 4-1 trump split and the heart-honor location made the game contract extremely tough. given the third-and-fifth lead of the heart three. A full point was at stake, since in the other room two spades had produced nine tricks.

Having won my heart queen at trick one, I decided to put East under pressure by playing the diamond ace, ruffing a diamond in dummy, then leading back a small heart. Falling for the bait, East rose with the ace, then shifted to a club. I put in the 10, and when it won, only the bad trump break held me to 10 tricks.

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

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

Osterhoudt Receives at Least 5 Years After Probation Violations

Franklin Scott Osterhoudt will serve up to 12 years in prison for multiple felonies he committed from 2009 to 2011.

For the latest felony, the 22-yearold Twin Falls man was sentenced Monday to two to four years in prison after he was convicted of aggravated battery for crushing another man's

leg during a fight. Osterhoudt was arrested in June for breaking the leg of Richard Wilson while they fought after he reportedly threw an object at Wilson's

car, smashing the windshield.

Police found Wilson lying with a broken leg on the sidewalk near Quincy Street and Addison Avenue. Wilson

said he was driving with his 9-year-old daughter when he Osterhoudt saw stand in the road, then throw the object.

Osterhoudt tibia and fibula were broken and he required four

hours of surgery to implant metal rods into his leg. Osterhoudt will also be required to pay restitution of

were kept at the lower 2006 rate.

Winmill said that the law on Medicaid rates is clear: They must incorporate the actual cost of providing a service.

Sixty-one residential habilitation agencies in the state provide supportive living services to 6,202 clients, Winmill noted. The agencies provide homes and roundthe-clock supervision for developmentally disabled clients who cannot live alone, as well as support for clients who need help to safely live in their own homes.

There aren't any waiting lists of people to receive the services, he said in the ruling, nor are there any documented instances of agencies turning clients away because they couldn't afford to provide care.

The state's attorneys had argued that those facts showed the Medicaid rates as set in 2006 must have been adequate, otherwise there would be a dearth of providers. Still, said Winmill, actual provider costs not just outcomes – must be taken into account.

Department of Health and Welfare spokesman Tom Shanahan said the department was reviewing the ruling

its next meeting.

torney who represented the residential habilitation agencies, said the ruling means that providers for the most severely disabled clients will be able to provide better staffing numbers, hire better-qualified staffers and make an overall improvement to the quality of care.

Piotrowski said his clients were frustrated that they had to resort to a lawsuit to fix the issue. He said the department and the business used to have a good cooperative relationship, but it has deteriorated over the years. Still, he said, they were

pleased by the outcome. "Winmill is telling the de-

partment to actually use the cost studies that they do, and implement the rates that their own analysis says is required," Piotrowski said.

The companies included Inclusion Inc.; Exceptional Child Center Inc.; Living Independently for Everyone Inc.; Tomorrow's Hope Satellite Services Inc.; and WDB Inc.

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The battery conviction violated Osterhoudt's probation for two convictions from 2009, and he now must serve those sentences consecutively with his newest.

In 2009, Osterhoudt was accused of statutory rape, which he pleaded down to in-

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jury to a child in exchange for a sentence of 31/2 to 10 years. He was also convicted in 2009 of possession of a controlled substance, which carried a two-to four-year sentence.

In each case, Osterhoudt was ordered to complete the state's retained jurisdiction

treatment program and then received four years probation in lieu of prison time. With the two 2009 sen-

tences being combined and

credit for time served in the retained jurisdiction program, the earliest Osterhoudt will be released is in five years.









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
