Running on Fried Fumes

To show how biofuels can work, CSI environmental technology students plan to start showing off a Dodge Ram they converted to run on vegetable oil.

John Fickbohm may work on diesel trucks, but he goes home smelling like french fries.

As a student in the College of Southern Idaho's environment technology program, Fickbohm has spent the last six months working with his peers to convert a Dodge Ram diesel truck to run on vegetable oil.

"This stuff makes the garage smell a lot better than the normal fuel," Fickbohm said, pointing to a row of five-gallon jugs filled with used vegetable oil.

The truck conversion is the newest project the CSI program uses to bring the application of renewable energy theory into real life.

"Standard fuels aren't going to get cheaper," said Ross Spackman, CSI professor of environmental technology and water resource management. "We need to be teaching students how to use sustainable tools now."

The total cost to convert the truck to run on veggie fuel came close to \$3,500, Spackman said. Students had to add an additional tank in the back, fuel lines to the engine, filters and a switch for the driver to choose between burning vegetable oil Please see TRUCKS, A2

Simpson's Influence Remains in Interior **Budget Bill**

Another round of EPA cuts, protections for grazing highlight a House-passed budget bill.

The U.S. House of Representatives proposes to make it more difficult to sue over federal grazing decisions and would cut the Environmental Protection

Agency's budget, among other changes in a budget bill passed Friday.

The bill funding the Interior Department and the EPA for the current fiscal year passed the House 296-121 and headed to the Senate, which could still dispute its provisions amid a contentious budget climate. Overall, the bill cuts \$31 billion in discretionary spending compared to the fiscal year that ended in September.

Several funding items bore the influence of Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Idaho and the chairman of the House Interior and Environment Appropriations Subcommittee. The desire of his fellow Republicans in Congress to reduce government spending provided an opportunity for Simpson to address environmental issues that concern him.

For example, Simpson was instrumental in adding language that requires environmental groups to exhaust the Bureau of Land Management's administrative review process before they can file lawsuits tied to grazing issues.

Simpson said the step is meant to save money, as he's found that some BLM and Forest Service state and field offices have spent more than half their current budgets on litigation. A proposed streamlined administrative process is also intended to help the Forest Service cut litigation costs tied to its decisions.

Among the hardest-hit agencies is the EPA, which would lose \$233 million to have an \$8.4 billion budget. That's on top of an 18.4 percent cut of \$1.8 billion that the agency was handed this year.

"After unparalleled increases in FY 10, we have reined in EPA spending in significant ways, bringing fiscal sanity back to the way the agency operates and curbing the agency's regulatory overreach," Simpson said in a written release.

Other agencies' cuts varied.

REPUBLICANS FLIP DIMMER SWITCH ON LIGHT BULB LAW

WASHINGTON • The Department of Energy won't be able to enforce rules that ban energy-wasting light bulbs when new standards take effect in January, thanks to a requirement slipped into a federal spending bill.

House Republicans added the provision in response to the concerns of people who mistakenly thought that the 100-watt incandescent light bulb would be banned when new standards go into effect Jan. 1.

"We heard the message loud and clear from Americans who don't want government standards determining how they light their homes," said Rep. Fred Upton, R-Mich., the chairman of the House Energy and Commerce Committee.

Conservative radio talk show host Rush Limbaugh told his listeners this month that the days of the 100-watt bulb were numbered. It soon will be "illegal to buy an incandescent light bulb. ... Well, you can have them but you can't sell them but they're still gonna be gunning for you," he said, according to a transcript of a Dec. 9 program.

In fact, the new standards don't ban incandescent bulbs, but rather require that new ones use about 25 percent less electricity. The extra efficiency is provided by the use of

Health Trust Helps **Local Nonprofits**

With a small operating budget and a faith-based business plan, Jubilee House doesn't qualify for most government grants.

But in a time when limited funding is the new normal, the Twin Falls women's rehabilitation center is breathing a little easier these days. Thanks to a \$29,290 grant from the Twin Falls County Health Initiatives Trust, the organization has now received close to one-third of its annual operating budget.

"We are mainly supported by individual donations," said Kathryn Bausman, the center's executive director. "Something like this is huge."

This isn't the first time the trust has saved the organization from closing its doors. In 2008 the first year the trust distributed grants - Jubilee House received more than \$47,000. Bausman said it's still the largest grant the organization has ever received and the only reason it was able to survive the economic recession.

But like most account balances, the trust had more money back then and gave out larger grant amounts.

In 2006, Twin Falls County voters approved the sale of what was then Magic Valley Regional Please see TRUST, A2

The Proper Care Can Prevent Your Fall

With winter on its way, I want to know what I can do to reduce my risk of injury from falling. I am 70 years old and don't have the sense of balance I had in my youth. — Jack, Filer

Answered by Thomas Shaw, physical therapist, St. Luke's Home Care and Hospice:

here are many things you can do to help yourself in terms of potential injury due to a fall. With the days getting shorter, it is important to have proper lighting both inside and outside your home to reduce the risk of injury from a fall. Outside your home, make sure you have proper lighting near your door and your driveway, which will help you identify slick areas. Inside your home, make sure that you have good lighting in entryways, as they may become slick from ice or snow you can track in from outside.

When you are outside, wear proper shoes with good traction and rubber soles. Be aware of the weather conditions before you go outside. If it is freezing outside and there is ice or snow on your driveway, take small steps and widen your stance. This can give you more control when you walk. Most importantly, slow down, don't be in a rush. Those extra few minutes can save a slip on the ice and injury. Be careful of uneven surfaces or steps. These areas can increase your risk of falling. If you have steps to enter into your home, a stair railing can also help prevent a fall, especially if you are transporting items in and out of your home.

If you do start to fall and you have something in your hands, drop those items and try to brace your fall. It is better to fall while

bracing yourself than falling directly forward or backward. The risk of injury is much higher if you are not able to brace your fall. If you have immediate pain after a fall, call 911 if there is no one available to help you.

Inside your home there are also things you can do to reduce the risk of falling. Keep your rooms and hallways clear of clutter, and make sure throw rugs lay flat and don't curl up. Rugs can be major tripping hazards. If you have to go to the bathroom during the night, have a nightlight in your hallway and bathroom. It is easy to get disoriented when it is dark. Light will help you maintain your balance.

Your sense of balance can affect your ability to walk safely in winter conditions. If you think you may have an inner ear issue which could affect your balance, talk to your primary care physician about ways in which you can improve your balance. Strengthening your core muscles through exercise can improve your balance.

similar percentage of its budget, cut by \$91 million down to \$4.6 billion total. But its program to fight wildland fires is fully funded at \$1.7 billion, Simpson's office said.

The BLM's \$1.1 billion budget would be just \$5 million less than last year.

The National Park Service would lose \$32 million for a \$2.6 billion budget. That amount should keep all national parks open and help the agency avoid furloughs or layoffs.

A rider on the budget bill would prevent the Forest Service from reducing the number of grazing permits it issues for domestic sheep to manage populations of bighorn sheep — bacteria passed on from domestic sheep can decimate bighorns in areas where herds coexist. Simpson said a freeze is needed so a solution can be found.

"I don't believe that putting ranchers out of businesses is an acceptable solution to this problem," he said. "I believe that if we are thoughtful and willing to invest time and energy into research and management, we can find a solution to this problem that conserves both bighorn populations and the domestic sheep industry."

Rick Johnson, executive director of the Idaho Conservation League, said his organization has some concerns with the budget bill, such as the bighorn rider. But he also appreciates the fact that a fund supporting recreation and conservation efforts on federal lands was supported.

"What Simpson is doing is navigating these economic and political challenges in a very difficult time," Johnson said.

Medical Center and shortly after, St. Luke's put \$15 million in an investment fund - it will bring that sum to \$20 million by 2016. The interest from the account is set aside to fund community health improvement.

Board members had close to \$500,000 the first year they distributed money. The board split the amount among 13 nonprofits, with the largest grant topping out at \$105,000. Since then, the trust fund has helped more than 20 nonprofits during the last four years.

This year's budget is a little tighter. The account's interest amount was just a little more than \$300,000 and the maximum amount an organization could receive was \$30,000.

Marcia Donner, volunteer for Interfaith Volunteer Caregivers, says that the money her organization has received from the trust over the years has been critical in keeping the organization afloat.

"We didn't get a grant from them last year and it was tough," she said. "We had to cut services and seriously reevaluate some of our programs. I'm hopeful now we can replace them again."

However, the point of the grants isn't for recipients to grow to depend on them, said Rene LeBlanc, president of the trust's board of directors.

The number of applications has increased while the total account's interest has de-

creased, he said. As a result, the application process has become a multi-month process of filling out applications, interviews and presentations.

"If we had more money we could have funded all of them," he said. "They were all good applications?

But while the organizations shouldn't depend on the grant, it's not uncommon for it to be the largest or only grant these organizations receive, Bausman said.

"I know we're not the only ones who apply, but we're going to keep applying every year," she said. "No question."

The light bulb standards were approved with bipartisan support in 2007 and included in an energy bill that was signed by President George W. Bush.

The provision that Upton got placed into the spending bill will cut off money the Department of Energy would have used to make sure that the regulations are followed. The lighting standards themselves remain. They start with more efficient equivalents of the 100-watt bulb in 2012 and include other bulbs through 2014.

The House passed the spending bill Friday, and final action on it in the Senate was expected Saturday.

The U.S. has had many

other energy efficiency standards over the past few decades. Refrigerators, washing machines and many other appliances use less electricity than older versions did.

Kateri Callahan, president of the Alliance to Save Energy, a nonprofit organization that promotes energy efficiency worldwide, said the light bulb standards were the most important of these energysaving standards. When they're fully in effect, they'll save the equivalent energy of 30 power plants; families will save about \$100 a year in energy costs; and air pollution will be reduced by the equivalent of taking 14 million cars off the road.

Polls show that twothirds or more of Americans already have started to transition to more efficient lighting, Callahan said.

Kim Freeman, a spokeswoman for General Electric Co., said that over the last five years consumer demand for incandescent bulbs has decreased by about 50 percent.

Better light bulbs are the most affordable efficiency upgrade for a home, said Shannon Baker-Branstetter of Consumers Union, the advocacy arm of Consumer Reports.

Kyle Pitsor, vice president for government affairs with the National Electrical Manufacturers Association, said that U.S. lighting companies, which are following the law, are concerned that they will face unfair competition from companies that make inefficient bulbs, once the Department of Energy

and diesel. The truck also has an additional heater to keep the vegetable oil from clumping in colder temperatures.

The conversion process doesn't have to be that complicated or expensive, though, Spackman said. It's not that uncommon for people to simply dump vegetable oil straight into their fuel tanks. It won't destroy the engine, but it won't run as smooth and the oil may clump during the winter, he said.

Along with learning how to convert the truck, students must also learn where and how to find the right vegetable oil.

Fickbohm said constant trial and error is involved in finding the best seed to make the best oil. Students grew

soybeans with the hope of using the seeds to produce biodiesel, but the seeds failed to produce enough oil to make them worthwhile for that purpose. The lesson taught the students and professors that not all seeds are created equal.

"I know a lot about what doesn't work now," Fickbohm said. "Turns out, mustard seed is great for making oil."

When students return to school next semester, they'll start taking the truck out for presentations at local schools, Spackman said. The goal is to teach

younger students the importance of alternative fuels and what options can be made available to them, he said. "I'm already getting calls,"

Spackman said. "We're going to be busy in these next few months."

Broken Water Line Damages Twin Falls Road

Drivers are advised to take care in the area of Washington Street South and Highland Avenue.

A broken water line Friday evening damaged a portion of Washington Street South and affected water services in the city of Twin Falls.

According to a city press release, the water line ruptured at about 4:30 p.m. near Washington's intersection with Highland Avenue, south of the Glanbia Foods factory. Workers who responded quickly stopped water from escaping the line, but estimated more than 500,000 gallons were lost. The 30-inch water line is a

dedicated line that was recently installed as part of the city's arsenic reduction project, the release states. It sits about 12 feet below the road at the point of the break.

The city asks motorists to use extreme caution in the area while the damage is repaired. Washington's southbound lanes suffered "substantial" damage, and freezing temperatures were leading to dangerous ice across all lanes of the road Friday evening.

Filer Schools Plan for Future Construction

FILER • The completion of \$17 million in school construction and capital improvement bond projects has the Filer School District looking again toward future building needs.

Filer School Board trustees approved a motion Wednesday to begin collecting information on the availability of land for possible purchase.

"When the bond was passed in 2008, one thing included was land acquisition and I think we would be prudent to honor that," Trustee Aaron Williams said. "Whoever is sitting here when it comes time to build again will be extremely grateful we got this done now."

The long-range planning committee that developed the original bond proposal determined the current middle school's useful life would not extend another 50 years. Its recommendation was to eventually sell the property and buy land in a different location for a new middle school or high school.

Earlier this year, the school board earmarked the construction bond's remaining \$400,000 balance

for land. On Wednesday, the board decided to obtain recommendations on land availability from at least two real estate firms.

"The intent here is just to have a discussion on whether we're ready to move forward," District Superintendent John Graham said. "We can continue to talk about this because, as far as the finances, we don't have to make a decision right now."

In other action, the board reactivated a community finance committee to propose cuts to help the district manage a projected \$300,000 funding shortfall for the next school year. The committee will also help educate the public on a need for a supplemental levy. The district could seek a public supplemental levy vote during the months of March, May, August or November.

"We need to see a broad cross-section of people on this committee from all the zones," said Trustee Judy Lea Smith. "We want to have a broad representation from the community, so the supplemental passes."

Kimberly Woman to Serve 3-8 Years on Meth Charge

A Kimberly woman who pleaded guilty to possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver could spend up to eight years in prison

eight years in prison.
Lynnsey Dawn Cummings, 29, was sentenced Monday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court to serve a minimum of three years before she is eligible for parole. She must also pay fines and fees totaling \$3,265.50.

Cummings was originally charged with trafficking methamphetamine after Twin Falls police reported finding 30 grams of meth in her car in May after a resident on Paint Brush Drive reported a suspicious vehicle. The witness said Cummings was lying in the fetal position in the car, talking about receiving subliminal messages from the radio. She left the area before police could arrive, but they later located her at an apartment complex on Elizabeth Boulevard.

Officers also reported finding a digital scale, plastic bags with meth inside them, syringes, empty baggies and a ledger inside Cummings' apartment.

Appeals Court Won't Overturn Watts Murder Conviction

Convicted murderer Cameron Watts isn't any closer to getting out of prison.

On Nov. 22, the Idaho Court of Appeals issued an unpublished opinion, stating Watts failed to prove he was strong-armed into pleading guilty to the 2007 murder of Dale Miller.

Miller, 18, was found inside a 55-gallon drum in a Twin Falls apartment garage after being kidnapped by Watts and John McElhiney. Investigators believed Miller owed a drug debt to Watts, who recruited McElhiney to rough up Miller.

Watts, 33, and McElhiney, 33, both pleaded guilty in 2008 and were sentenced to serve life in state prison. They will be eligible for parole after serving 20 years.

Soon after they were sentenced, both men attempted to appeal. Watts filed for post-conviction relief in August 2009, claiming he was coerced into pleading guilty

and his counsel was ineffective in his defense. The district court dismissed the case in April 2010, and Watts took his claims to the appeals court.

After reviewing the case, Judges Karen Lansing and Sergio Gutierrez sided with the dismissal, noting they did not find Watts' testimony about coercion to be credible.

McElhiney has also attempted to appeal his conviction in recent years but was not successful either.

Hailey Man Reaches Plea in Drug Case

charged in Blaine County after the Narcotics Enforcement Team there led an investigation involving undercover drug purchases in the Wood River Valley and surrounding areas.

Police valued the total amount of drugs seized in the investigation at \$26,000, including 6.6 ounces of cocaine and 2.6 ounces of methamphetamine.

Sentencing is scheduled for Jan. 30.

Life on the Bright Side

The stroke that interrupted Terry Schudel's life hasn't kept him from celebrating the holidays.

SPOKANE, Wash. • Terry A. Schudel lives alone in a tiny house north of the Garland District. Just before Christmas in 1996 he had a stroke that robbed him of the right side of his body, and much of

his ability to speak. Talking to Schudel, 50, is a combination of homemade sign language and gestures. A conversation looks much like a game of Charades.

And here Schudel is, standing in his front yard, surrounded by a Christmas display that would delight any child. Icicle lights hang from the gutters; golden tinsel garland has been wrapped around light strings and strung along the walkway. Candy canes hang on the fence while Santa, his sleigh and a reindeer sit in the middle of the yard.

Every Christmas for the 11

years he's lived at 4124 N. Madison St., Schudel has put up Christmas lights. He was right-handed but after the stroke, he learned to do everything with his left hand.

It takes him about six days to put up all the lights.

When asked if his neighbors help him, he answers empathetically: "No."

He's a tall, trim man with a gray beard. He uses his fingers to count out dates and years, much like a baseball umpire counts out balls and strikes. His gray-blue eyes twinkle when he gets a point

A practical man, he named his dog "Hey" because that's a word he can say.

He never married. And when asked if he has kids he shakes his head no, but then changes his mind and holds up one finger.

And then he pulls out his wallet and produces a worn, yellowed picture of a toddler

boy in red pants smiling broadly at the camera.

On the back someone wrote in black pen: Nicholas Justin Holten, 19 months, April 16, 1979.

He has traced the words many times over the years, making sure they don't fade away. Schudel holds his hand at knee level, indicating he hasn't seen Nicholas since he was a toddler.

Schudel was in the Navy from 1979 to 1989. He nods enthusiastically when asked if he liked being in the Navy.

He was 35 when the stroke hit him.

When asked what happened, he mimics his legs giving in, falling over backward, left literally speechless when he woke up. He wasn't aware of any particular risk factors in his life that could lead to a stroke.

Since the stroke he hasn't been able to work full time. Grunting to illustrate the effort, he shows how he does physical therapy at the Spokane Veterans Affairs

Medical Center to stay in

shape. Except for the years he spent in the Navy, he's lived in Spokane all his life.

Last year's snow masses buried his Christmas lights and he had to clear the snow off the displays.

Making an engine sound and a pulling motion, he indicates that he bought a snow blower — then he looks at the sky and shrugs, as if he's saying, "And where's the snow now?"

Though he can't tell a joke, his sense of humor shows clearly and he laughs easily.

He pretends to hold a TV remote in his hand, changing channels, then rolls his eyes: there's nothing exciting on TV these days.

Is he bored? He nods yes. Does he date? He shakes his head no.

Is it hard to date when you

can't speak? Yes, he nods, As dusk settles on a recent Friday afternoon, the sky is

clear and pink to the west. It's getting colder and soon it will be dark.

He checks his watch - it's almost 4 p.m. and that's when he turns on the lights.

Veterinarian Sues F&G over Poaching Charges

SANDPOINT • A Bonners Ferry veterinarian accused of poaching an elk north of Upper Priest Lake has filed a federal lawsuit against the Idaho Department of Fish &

Roland Hall accuses the department of civil rights violations, negligence, intentional infliction of emotional distress, malicious prosecution and slander. The suit was filed in Idaho's U.S. District Court on Monday.

The suit seeks more than unspecified monetary damages and a jury

Hall previously filed a claim seeking \$500,000 in damages from the department.

Attorneys for Hall contend in the suit that the department has a vendetta against their client because of a long-standing dispute over the Continental Mine. Hall is a coowner of the Boundary County lead and silver

Tailings from the mine have been blamed for sterilizing Blue Joe Creek and a road leading to the site has been the subject of a protracted dispute over forest access, according to published media reports.

Idaho Fish & Game's Panhandle region supervisor, Chip Corsi, said he had not seen the lawsuit and could not comment on it.

Hall and Dennis Liermann Jr. were charged at the felony level with poaching after two eyewitnesses reported seeing Liermann poach an elk in Trapper Creek drainage on Sept. 14, 2009, the day before the archery season opened.

Hall said in the civil complaint that he was scouting elk on the day in question and had no knowledge that Liermann intended to unlawfully kill two bull elk.

Charges against Hall, 58, were amended several times before they were dropped altogether.

Prosecutors in Boundary County moved to dismiss the case against Hall after 1st District Judge Benjamin Simpson ruled Hall's remarks to investigators inadmissible because he was not advised of his Miranda rights.

Liermann, a 34-yearold from Naples, ultimately pleaded guilty to misdemeanor poaching charges and was sentenced to 60 days in jail with 54 days suspended.

Hall alleges in the suit that Fish & Game officials knew he was innocent of the crime but pressured his prosecution, withheld exculpatory evidence and issued press releases containing information it knew to be false.

Judge Rejects Second Exam for White House Shootings Suspect

U.S. Magistrate Judge John Facciola said there is no evidence that Oscar Ramiro Ortega-Hernandez is incompetent to stand trial. But he said prosecutors can renew their bid for another evaluation if they believe Ortega's mental health is deteriorating as the case moves forward.

WASHINGTON • A federal judge on Friday denied a government request for a more thorough psychiatric evaluation of a man charged with firing shots at the White House in what prosecutors say was an attempt to assassinate President Barack

The mental state of Oscar Ramiro Ortega-Hernandez, who prosecutors say harbored conspiracy theories and fantasies of killing the president, has been a critical issue since his arrest last month. Obama and his wife, Michelle, were out of town and traveling at the time of the shooting.

A preliminary psychiatric screening already found the suspect competent to stand trial, but prosecutors sought additional testing out of extra caution and to conclusively resolve any concerns about his mental well-being before trial. They said the initial 50-minute screening, conducted in a cellblock of the courthouse, was incomplete because it did not take into account some of Ortega's more bizarre or outlandish behavior and statements. They sought an additional in-patient examination, which would give experts more time to evaluate him.

U.S. Magistrate Judge John Facciola, in rejecting the request, said there currently was no evidence that Ortega was incompetent to stand trial. But he said prosecutors can renew their bid for another evaluation if they believe Ortega's mental health is deteriorating as the case moves forward. He stressed the difference between a defendant's overall mental health and competence for trial - a narrower question.

"A delusional system does not in and of itself compel the conclusion of a defendant's incompetence," he

Ortega, who was 21 at the time of his arrest, sat silently and expressionless next to his lawyer during Friday's hearing.

Federal prosecutors say

Ortega purchased a gun, scope kit and more than 1,200 rounds of ammunition and, after months of shooting practice, drove east from Idaho in mid-October with the goal of killing the president. On the night of Nov. 11, prosecutors say, Ortega pulled up along Constitution Avenue across the Ellipse from the White House and, from more than 700 yards away, fired several rounds from a semi-automatic assault rifle out of the passenger-side window of

Authorities say he drove away, crashed his car and then fled on foot. He was arrested five days later at a Pennsylvania hotel.

his car.

Days after the shooting, authorities located at least five bullet impact points on the south side of the White House on or above the second story — an area where the First Family is known to

One bullet that was found had hit the White House window and was stopped by ballistic glass. The Secret Service didn't disclose the

location of the second bullet, saying only that it "was found on the exterior of the White House."

Obama and the first lady traveled without daughters Malia and Sasha on Friday to San Diego en route to Hawaii for a summit, prior to flying to Australia. The White House had no comment at the time on the shooting or on who may have been home then.

Prosecutors say they want to make sure Ortega's competence isn't an issue at trial.

They've focused on a se-

ries of statements he made in a video submitted to the Oprah Winfrey Network, including calling marijuana the answer to world peace and saying the government was using fluoride and aspartame to dumb down America. His friends and acquaintances have said Ortega called himself the "modern-day Jesus Christ," considered Obama to be the antichrist, claimed to hear a voice from God, and believed that the government was planning on tracking citizens by implanting global positioning system chips inside their bodies.

But Elizabeth Teegarden, a clinical psychologist who at the court's request interviewed Ortega for 50 minutes after his arrest, said Ortega denied being delusional or having hallucinations. She said there was no indication that he intended to harm himself or others, and no evidence of phobias or "bizarre thought content." When asked about statements indicating that he wanted to harm Obama, he either denied having made them or refused to talk about them about altogether.

Ortega's public defender, David Bos, said Ortega not only is able to help with his defense but also "understands highly technical principles."

The next court hearing is Monday, when prosecutors will argue that he should be ordered held without bond before his trial. They say he has no ties to the area and has previous convictions in Idaho for theft, possession of drug paraphernalia and resisting arrest.

Ortega faces two separate bench warrants for failing to appear in court in Idaho and Utah. He faces a maximum sentence of life in prison if convicted of the current charges, prosecutors say.

"The violation charged in the complaint - an attempted assassination of the President of the United States - represents one of the most serious offenses in the federal criminal code," prosecutors wrote in court papers seeking his detention. "The tragedy that would have befallen the nation if Ortega-Hernandez had been successful is unspeakable."

Bonner County Fights Caribou Habitat Plan

SANDPOINT • Bonner County commissioners are preparing to push back against a U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service proposal to designate the southern Selkirk Mountains critical habitat for endangered woodland caribou.

The board is tentatively scheduled to take up the matter at its business meeting on Tuesday. Commission Chairman Cornel Rasor said the county will decide whether to invoke a federal rule requiring agencies to coordinate with local officials on land use matters.

It could mark the first time the conservative county commission will demand negotiations with a federal agency.

"We have a dog in this fight and we have tools that have never been used before," said Rasor.

Fish & Wildlife announced last month it intends to designate 375,562 acres critical habitat for the mammal in Bonner and Boundary counties, in addition to Washington state's Pend Oreille County.

The agency estimates that there are about 46 woodland caribou in the southern

A handful of environmental groups, including the Priest River-based Selkirk Conservation Alliance, petitioned Fish & Wildlife in 2002 to designate critical habitat for the species.

The proposal is chilling spines at Priest Lake, where residents bitterly contested changes to a winter motorized access plan with the U.S. Forest Service a few years ago. Snowmobile tourism is the lake's lifeblood during winter and helps sustain local resorts in the off season.

"The number of businesses that have either gone out of business, bankrupt or sold in the last three years is unimaginable," said Bob Davis of Elkins Resort.

The habitat designation is particularly troubling to Priest Lake residents and merchants and visitors because they feel it could lead to year-round restrictions on forest use. Some are also concerned that the rules could be interpreted to restrict all forms of recreation including hiking and huckleberry picking — in the forest above 4,000 feet.

Priest Lake landowner Don Howell argues the critical habitat designation could serve as backdoor passage to a wilderness designation at Priest Lake.

"It's wilderness by fiat rather than wilderness by congressional designation," he said.





Lucky Friday: Quake May Have Triggered Rock Burst in Mine

SPOKANE, Wash. • A rock burst that injured seven miners underground may have been triggered by seismic activity in Idaho's Silver Valley, the mining company said Friday.

All the injured miners were expected to fully recover from the injuries they suffered Wednesday. The two most serious injuries were a broken arm and a broken pelvis.

The mine remained closed and the federal Mine Safety and Health Administration is investigating.

Hecla Mining Co. said a small earthquake helped trigger a similar rock burst last month in the same area of the Lucky Friday Mine, one of the deepest mines in the nation.

The latest rock burst was unrelated to two separate accidents earlier this year that killed two miners at the Lucky Friday, Hecla president and chief executive officer Phil Baker said.

Hecla said that on Nov. 16, a small seismic event triggered by blasting in the mine caused a rock burst at roughly the same location as the latest accident 5,900 feet below the surface of the silver mine. No one was injured in that incident, Hecla

A rock burst is a common mining accident in which excessive pressure causes a rock to fracture or explode.

There was no blasting in the mine for 24 hours prior to Wednesday's rock burst, Hecla said. That raised the possibility that a seismic event alone caused the

There were 25 Hecla employees and 18 contractor employees underground at the time of the rock burst, and most were not in the vicinity of the mishap, Hecla said. All were immediately evacuated.

The Lucky Friday has produced silver for more than a century. It is located near Mullen, Idaho, 90 miles east of Spokane, Wash. More than 300 people work at the mine, making some of the best wages in a depressed region.

At the Lucky Friday, holes are drilled into the walls of the mine, charges are placed and detonated, and the resulting rubble is collected and hauled to the surface for processing.

In April, a roof collapsed in a tunnel more than a mile underground and trapped Larry Marek. Crews recovered his body nine days later.

In a report following an investigation, Mine Safety and Health Administration regulators criticized Hecla for safety failures that led to Marek's death. They cited Lucky Friday management for failing to install adequate ground support systems and neglecting to test the stability of the area where the collapse occurred.

Last month, miner Brandon Gray was buried in rubble after trying to dislodge a jammed rock bin. He died from his injuries two days

With the high price of silver, the mine is currently undergoing a \$200 million project to deepen it to nearly 9,000 feet to increase access to deeper silver deposits. Hecla officials expect the project to be completed by

Moscow Police Wrap Up UI Murder-suicide Investigation, Find Shooter Acted Alone

BOISE • Police have completed an investigation into the murder of a University of Idaho graduate student, finding a professor acted alone when he killed the young woman he had recently dated outside her Moscow home and then committed suicide.

Ernesto Bustamante resigned from the university Aug. 19 and three days later, gunned down 22-yearold Katy Benoit, police said. Bustamante later checked into a Moscow hotel and requested an 11 a.m. wake-up call for the next day before he turned a gun on himself.

"No evidence to date has been found to indicate that Bustamante acted with or was provided assistance by another person while committing this crime," the Moscow Police Department said Friday.

Bustamante had created files on his personal computer that included Benoit's class schedule and her

home address, police said. A day after the shooting, he was found dead in his hotel room with six guns and medications for bipolar disorder and severe anxiety.

A .45-caliber handgun was among the weapons recovered and one has been identified as the weapon used to kill Benoit on the evening of Aug. 22, which also marked the first day of classes for the fall 2011 semester on the northern Idaho campus.

Benoit met Bustamante in the fall of 2010 when she took his psychology course and by the end of the semester they were dating. Benoit told the university in June that her relationship with Bustamante ended after he had pointed a loaded gun at her head on three separate occasions, detailing the manner in which he would use it.

University officials have defended their response to Benoit's complaint, saying they contacted police immediately and complied with Benoit's wishes while

investigating her claims. Bustamante was served the complaint July 6 after university officials received permission to do so from Benoit. That day, Bustamante used MapQuest to get directions to the home of Benoit's parents in Boise, according to university computer records obtained by the AP and other media outlets.

Bustamante had been directed to have no contact with Benoit and it's unclear if he made the trip to Idaho's capital city.

In an electronic folder on his personal computer, Bustamante created a file with Benoit's address in Moscow on Aug. 9, police said. He created another file with her class schedule Aug. 18, a day before his resignation became offi-

"He had access to student records as a faculty member on that date, and it appears that he used that access to download her class schedule," said university spokeswoman

The folder including the two files was last accessed on Aug. 22, the day Benoit was murdered, police said.

The university convened an independent panel to investigate school policies and procedures following the deaths.

The panel released its findings last month, and suggested administrators develop a better way to handle concerns about disturbing or disruptive behavior by faculty members in an effort to keep students and employees safe. In response, the school created a task force to review and implement the panel's recommendations.

Faculty leaders have also worked to revise university policy to more strongly discourage relationships between faculty members.

Jury Convicts N. Idaho Man in Ex-wife's Death

LEWISTON • A northern Idaho jury has convicted a former Nez Perce County deputy of strangling his ex-wife to death.

The Lewiston Tribune reports a jury deliberated for about nine hours before reaching a verdict Friday that found 38-yearold Joseph A. Thomas guilty of first-degree murder in the death of his former wife, Beth Irby-Thomas.

The Lewiston woman was found on the floor in her living room May 1 with a belt wrapped tightly around her neck.

Prosecutors argued that Thomas had killed his exwife, while his attorney claimed she died accidentally while practicing autoerotic asphyxiation.

Jurors started deliberations Thursday.

Man Who Died in **Washington Fire** Faced Rape Charge

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) • A man suspected of killing his wife and her sister and shooting at firefighters before he died in their burning home on Dec. 7 had been scheduled to surrender the next day to face a child rape charge, authorities said.

Authorities didn't know before the incident that suspect Steven D. Stanbary of Washougal had a history of being heavily armed, schizophrenic, anti-government and violent, Clark County senior deputy prosecutor Dustin Richardson told The Columbian in a story Thurs-

day.
"Had that been clear, the whole process of having an attorney turn him in ... might have been different," Richardson said.

Before the fire, Richardson had just a basic criminal history that showed Stanbary had only misdemeanor convictions because more serious charges had been reduced by plea bargains or other circumstances.

It was later learned that police in Idaho had discovered six AK-47s and a grenade launcher in Stanbary's possession during a 1994 arrest. But that case was dropped to a minor assault in a plea deal.

In addition, information emerged that Stanbary had stopped receiving treatment for delusional schizophrenia in 1988 when he refused to take medications. At that time, his then-wife, Debra Hughes, told Idaho police she believed he was danger-

Richardson said he might have changed his plans for letting Stanbary turn himself in through his attorney if the records had shown a pattern involving weapons. However, police generally don't seek more information on criminal histories of suspects unless the cases show a specific pattern of criminal behavior or dishonesty, he said.

The prosecutors credited the media for bringing those additional details to light after Stanbary's violent death.

Reports released Wednesday show Washougal police suspect Stanbary molested a girl over a number of years beginning when she was 9 and ending several years before she reported it in December 2010.

Richardson had concerns about several aspects of the case and said he didn't believe he had strong enough evidence to charge Stanbury until late November. Stanbary was supposed to turn himself in with an attorney on Dec. 8.

"He obviously had different plans," Richardson said.

Elk Foundation Pulls out of Land Swap

The Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, an early proponent of the Upper Lochsa Land Exchange proposal, has withdrawn from it in protest of a proposal to keep the trading of land restricted to Idaho County.

"The identified federal exchange lands in Idaho County contain very high value wildlife habitat, including significant amounts of crucial winter range for elk, which could potentially be compromised," a letter from M. David Allen, president and CEO of the foundation, states. "Concern about loss of access, land use changes and habitat alterations in traditional hunting areas have also emerged as serious points of contention."

The Upper Lochsa Land Exchange was initiated in 2008 between the U.S. Forest Service and Western Pacific Timber. It originally involved the exchange of 40,000 acres of Western Pacific lands interspersed with Forest Service lands near Lolo Pass for scattered parcels of national forest lands in Benewah, Bonner, Clearwater, Idaho, Kootenai and Latah counties.

Following a draft environmental impact statement released in November 2010 addressing several alternatives, Idaho County commissioners proposed swapping about 45,000 acres of federal lands in Idaho County for Western Pacific lands in the Upper Lochsa drainage – also in Idaho County. By keeping the swap within the county, Idaho County would avoid losing thousands of acres of land from its already meager property tax rolls.

The Forest Service released a supplemental draft environmental impact statement addressing the Idaho County proposal in November and has since held several meetings for public comment. The public comment period ends Jan. 17, but spokeswoman Teresa Trulock said the Forest Service plans to extend that by 30 days.

On Wednesday, Allen of the elk foundation sent a let-

ter to Rick Brazell, Clearwater/Nez Perce Forest supervisor, and to Brian Disney, WPT land manager. In it, Allen says the foundation disagrees with the Idaho County proposal and believes it would have a negative effect on the foundation's mission.

A message left for Blake Henning, RMEF vice president of lands and conservation, was not returned by press time Thursday. "It's really disappointing

to us that they put so much time into this project and felt they needed to pull their support at this time," said Trulock. "If we acquire the Upper Lochsa, we think they would still be willing to show some support in helping to do some restoration work that would help with elk."

Trulock said USFS has analyzed about 62,000 acres of land since beginning the exchange project, and while the Idaho County proposal was added into the mix, none of the alternatives have been dismissed.

"We still have all the other original alternatives on the table," she said, adding Idaho County's acre-for-acre proposal would require approval through Congress as USFS can only negotiate exchanges based on value-forvalue.

"If we're continuing down the road to making a decision within our authority, all of these (public) comments will help us make a better decision in the end," she said.

Trulock said about 20 letters have been received with more expected closer to the deadline. "It's kind of like cram-

ming for a test," she said. "You're going to use all the time you have to comment to make sure you don't miss anything." She said the letters will be

reviewed collectively to allow the same level of consideration and better identify opinion patterns. While RMEF states it will not be a principal to the

project, it states in Allen's letter, "We stand ready to support decisions that align with our mission. In addition, we will support habitat restoration on affected

True, not many Magic Valley residents are yet seeking to hook turbines to their homes. But homemade wind power seems a valuable energy tool for a region that so celebrates individualism.

That city and county officials would take the time to actively educate themselves on the matter is commendable.

JEERS to state lawmakers' double standard on local taxing.

Two years into actual cuts to the state public schools budget, it's fair to say the Legislature didn't avoid raising taxes — it just shifted the dirty work off to the local level. Voter-passed supplemental levies are now propping up more school districts than not across Idaho. And for school districts like Murtaugh, even asking voters to renew existing levies has become much more serious a task.

Meanwhile, the idea of allowing communities to enact their own local option taxes is shocking to many whom we send to Boise. Critics like Rep. Stephen Hartgen, R-Twin Falls, repeatedly refer to it as outsiders trying "to raise your sales taxes" — skipping the fact that local voters would still have the option to refuse any proposals.

The message? Local control isn't OK, unless it's for something that scores political points elsewhere. **CHEERS** to Bill Baker, the retiring Twin Falls District manager for the U.S. Bureau of Land Management who's spent 34 years with the agency.

Baker has overseen fire recovery projects, set up trail systems and sifted through jargon-heavy resource plans — devoted to making them readable to the public.

It takes tenacity and determination to serve that long in the politically and emotionally charged field of land use. We'll look forward to seeing what Baker does with his skills in the private sector.



State: Health Insurance Rate Reviews Cause Public Confusion

IDAHO STATESMAN

BOISE • The Idaho Department of Insurance said it has received a large number of calls from people who are confused about the health insurance rate review process.

The 2010 federal health care reform law requires Idaho to review individual and small-employer health insurance rate increases and requires justification for increases that exceed 10 percent.

The department has received calls from consumers who thought a new process that took effect Sept. 1 kept insurance rates from rising more than 10 percent, said Tricia Carney, spokeswoman for the department. That is not the case; the reviews just require insurers to justify those rates. And that requirement doesn't apply to rate increases that were filed before Sept. 1.

Idaho law allows insurers to raise rates more than 10 percent based on several factors.

"Costs of medical care, individual policy holder characteristics such as age, other risk factors such as smoking – all contribute to the rate a person pays for health care insurance," said Bill Deal, department direc-

The department has posted a link "Health Carrier Rate Justification" on www.doi.idaho.gov that will display information about rate filings as they come in.

The federal website for Idaho's rate justifications is companyprofiles.healthcare.gov. Selecting "Idaho" will display rate justifications or profiles of Idaho's health insurance companies.

Judge Hears 'Sister Wives' Challenge of **Utah Law**

SALT LAKE CITY • Attorneys for a polygamous family made famous on a reality television show on Friday asked a Utah federal judge not to block their challenge of the state's bigamy law.

Kody Brown and wives Meri, Janelle, Christine and Robyn filed a lawsuit in Salt Lake City's U.S. District Court in July.

The stars of the TLC show "Sister Wives" contend the law is unconstitutional because it violates their right to privacy - prohibiting them from living together and criminalizing their pri-

vate sexual relationships. Under Utah law, people are guilty of bigamy if they have multiple marriage licenses, or if they cohabitate with another consenting adult in a marriage-like relationship. Any couple of any sex living together in an intimate relationship is considered marriage-like under the law, and such a living arrangement would be considered a felony. Any couple of any sex living together in an intimate relationship could be considered guilty of a felony under the law.

Formerly of Lehi, the Browns and their 17 children moved to Nevada in January after police launched a bigamy investigation. The Browns practice polygamy as part of their religious beliefs.

Charges Amended in Twin Falls Kidnapping Case

Three of four people accused of abducting a 4-year-old Twin Falls boy have had their charges amended in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

The boy's mother, Stefanie Contreras, 29, is nowcharged with conspiracy to commit child custody interference along with her original charges of burglary and custodial interference.

Daniel D. Thomas, 35, of Hailey, is charged with aiding and abetting child custody interference and unlawful possession of a firearm. Those join his original charges of conspiracy to commit child custody interference and burglary. A charge of aggravated assault

was dropped.

Kelvin Milo Jr., 21, of Twin Falls, is also charged with aiding and abetting child custody interference. He already faces counts of conspiracy to commit child custody interference, burglary and custodial interference.

The changes weren't the result of any new evidence in the case, Prosecutor Grant Loebs said. Reading witness statements and going over the evidence again prompted the amendments.

"The evidence we have indicates that's the proper charge," he said.

All three will have preliminary hearings Dec. 30, along with co-defendant David Altes, who is charged with conspiracy to commit child custody interference.

Extremists Have Busy 2011 in Pacific Northwest

SPOKANE, Wash. • They exist in the margins of the Pacific Northwest.

Some are white supremacists. Some are anti-Semites. Some are anti-government. Many are all of the above.

Sometimes their margins are literal, as they live in small towns near the vast forests that dominate this region. Almost always their margins are social, as many are unemployed, or underemployed, and live alone.

Every now and then, one breaks from the margins and creates a public spectacle.

The latest incident occurred last week as a house in Washougal, Wash., burned to the ground while someone inside shot at firefighters to keep them away. The homeowner has been identified as a self-proclaimed white sep-

It was one of numerous incidents this year in which extremists of various kinds made news in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana.

The crimes involved a white supremacist couple charged in a three-state killing spree; an attempted bombing at the Martin Luther King Jr. Day parade in Spokane; and a former militia member who opened fire on deputies in Montana and

vanished into a forest. To be sure, the perpetrators are by no means representative of the broader, law-abiding population in the Pacific Northwest. But they are part of a trend that has seen extremist activity on the rise nationally. The region has also been the base for some of the highest-profile ones, including the Aryan Nations and the Militia of Montana.

Travis McAdam of the Montana Human Rights Network said the reasons for the trend include the election of a black president, growing distrust with the federal government, the downturn in the economy and the continued growth of minority groups in the population.

"All of this has created a perfect storm of anger, fear, and resentment that white supremacists are trying to tap into and capitalize upon," McAdam said.

The number of hate groups and patriot groups, which do not all share the same beliefs and conduct, has been growing across the country since President Barack Obama was elected in 2008, according to an annual report by the Southern Poverty Law Center in Montgomery, Ala., which tracks extremists.

SPLC's 2010 compilation of active hate groups found 1,002 nationwide. Of those, 15 were located in Oregon and 13 each in Washington, Idaho and Montana, the SPLC said. The group counted 888 hate groups in 2007, before Obama's election.

Obama is also seen as someone who would curtail individual rights such as gun ownership, said Rich King, a professor at Washington State University in Pullman who studies hate groups and teaches a class on white power movements,

Meanwhile, the financial woes sparked by Wall Street have fed anti-Semitic sentiments, King said.

It has been a busy year for extremists in the Northwest.

In the most violent incident, a young couple was arrested and charged in connection with a murder spree that claimed four lives in three Western states.

David "Joey" Pedersen, 31, and his girlfriend, Holly Grigsby, 24, were arrested in California in October. They have expressed white supremacist beliefs.

They are charged in Washington with aggravated firstdegree murder, accused of killing Pedersen's father and his wife in Everett sometime around Sept. 26. They are also suspected of killing 19-yearold Cody Myers in Oregon and Reginald Alan Clark, 53, in Eureka, Calif.

They shot Myers because

his name sounded Jewish, even though he was a Christian, according to court documents. Clark was black.

Grigsby and Pedersen were arrested outside Yuba City, Calif., when a police officer spotted them in Myers' car.

Grigsby told officers "the couple was on their way to Sacramento to 'kill more Jews," court documents said.

In another high-profile incident, a man planted a pipe bomb along the planned route of the Martin Luther King Jr. Day parade in Spokane. The shrapnelpacked bomb was found and disabled before it could explode, but the FBI said it had the potential to kill or injure many of the 2,000 marchers, who included children.

White supremacist Kevin Harpham, 37, was arrested in March and has pleaded guilty to attempted use of a weapon of mass destruction, and the hate crime of placing the bomb in an effort to target minorities. He faces 27 to 32 years in prison when he is

sentenced by a federal judge on Dec. 20.

Another violent incident occurred June 12 outside of Missoula, Mont., when former militia leader David Burgert opened fire on two Missoula County sheriff's deputies on a remote logging road in the Lolo National For-

Burgert disappeared into the forest after the gunbattle, in which no one was injured. He has yet to be found, despite an extensive manhunt.

Burgert is a longtime patriot activist who spent eight years in prison on weapons charges and authorities charged him at the time with trying to spark a revolution. He was released in 2010.

Another outrageous incident occurred in July when a skinhead told a black man he did not belong inside a bar in Bayview, Idaho, and was knocked out with one punch. Daren C. Abbey, 28, woke up to find he was under arrest. "What, you're arresting the white man?" he told deputies, according to court documents.

Abbey agreed to be sentenced on a felony charge of malicious harassment.

Torrent of **Bad Financial News Flows Out of Europe**

DUBLIN • Alarming financial news flowed out of Europe in a torrent Friday, just a week after the EU leaders struck a deal they thought would

contain the continent's debt crisis. The bombardment shredded hopes of a lasting solution to the turmoil that is endangering the euro – the currency used by 17 European nations – and threatening the entire global economy.

In quick succession:

- The Fitch Ratings agency announced it was considering further cuts to the credit scores of six eurozone nations - heavyweights Italy and Spain, as well as Belgium, Cyprus, Ireland and Slovenia. It said all six could face downgrades of one or two notches.
- Moody's Investors Services downgraded Belgium's credit rating by two notches. Belgium's local- and foreign-currency government bond ratings fell to "Aa3" from Aa1," with a negative outlook. The ratings remain investment grade.
- Ireland's economy shrunk again much deeper than had been expected, with its third-quarter gross domestic product falling 1.9 percent. Ireland is one of three eurozone nations kept solvent only by an international bailout.
- Bankers and hedge funds were balking in talks about forgiving 50 percent of Greece's massive debts, a key issue in the debate over Greece's second rescue bailout.
- The red ink in Spain's regional governments surged 22 percent in the last year, endangering the central government's efforts to cut overall Spanish debt.
- France, the second-largest eurozone economy after Germany, warned that it faced at least a temporary recession next year.
- The euro hovered Friday just above \$1.30, a cent higher than its 11month low.

On the positive side, Fitch said France should keep its top AAA credit rating even though the country's debt load is projected to rise through 2014. Italian lawmakers overwhelmingly passed Premier Mario Monti's new austerity package in a confidence vote, even though many still objected to its pension reforms.

SALT LAKE CITY • A federal jury on Friday failed to reach a verdict in a Utah company's \$1 billion antitrust lawsuit against Microsoft Corp. in a case so important to the computer giant that it put Bill Gates on the stand for two days last month. Novell Inc. sued the software giant in 2004, claiming Microsoft duped it into developing the once-popular WordPerfect writing program for Windows 95 only to pull the plug so Microsoft could gain market share with its own product. Novell says it was later forced to sell WordPerfect for a \$1.2 billion loss. The trial began two months ago with jurors getting the case on Wednesday. States Unlikely to Heed NTSB Call for Cell Ban

ST. LOUIS • Lawmakers in Missouri had the chance, after two buses packed with high school band members slammed into a freeway wreck caused by a teenager who was sending a flurry of text messages, to impose tougher limits on driver cellphone use. It got filibus-

Federal transportation officials are citing that accident in pushing for states to enact an all-out ban on cellphone use by drivers, restricting the use even of hands-free devices. But spurring lawmakers to take up the cause may be difficult. Skeptical lawmakers give the proposal little chance at succeeding in state capitols around the country, and many aren't planning on introducing ban bills.

The reason? While acknowledging growing safety concerns, lawmakers are wary of inconveniencing commuters and say a complete ban would be one of the deepest government intrusions yet into the daily lives of motorists who have woven their phones tightly into their daily routines. Others are worried a ban would be unenforceable. And the cellphone legislation in most states already took years to get approved.

"It's a popular thing to pass another law," said Bill Stouffer, a Missouri Republican and chairman of the state's Senate Transportation Committee. "But anything that takes your eyes off the road is just as deadly as texting or talking on the cellphone. Where does it end? Why not ban map reading or eating while driving?"

The centerpiece of the NTSB's proposal was an August 2010 wreck southwest of St. Louis in which a pickup truck slammed into the back of a semi cab that had slowed for road construction, and the buses then crashed into the wreckage. The pickup driver, Daniel Schatz, 19, and a bus passenger, Jessica Brinker, 15, died. Thirty-eight people, mostly students, were hurt.

Investigators said Schatz had sent and received 11 texts in 11 minutes just before the accident.

The NTSB's recommendation far exceeds the patchwork, and largely unenforced, prohibitions many states now have. Thirty-five states and the District of Columbia ban texting while driving, while nine states and Washington, D.C., bar handheld cellphone use. Thirty states ban all cellphone use for beginning drivers. No state bans the use of hands-free devices for all drivers.

In Idaho - which has historically resisted federal mandates and is one of seven states without any sort of regulation on the use of cellphones by drivers - proposed bans have been rejected the last two legislative sessions after lawmakers questioned their enforceability and the need for new government dictates. South Dakota has a broader law discouraging "distracted driving" but lawmakers have steadily opposed specific bans on electronic devices.

"I was listening to all this heart-wrenching testimony against texting behind the wheel, and I got to thinking about all the calls I'd gone off to where someone was hurt in a car accident;" said South Dakota Republican Rep. Betty Olson, an emergency medical technician from Prairie City. "In just about all of them, they were distracted, so what they were doing was already against the law," Olson said. "They wouldn't be paying any more attention to a law banning tex-

European Union leaders confirmed Friday they have distributed the text of their proposed new budget-stability treaty, a pact designed to deter runaway deficits and supposed to become EU law by March. But as growth prospects fade across the continent, governments are facing the likelihood that Europe's debt crisis will prove longer and tougher to overcome than even their most recently revised fore-

Until this week, EU leaders held up Ireland as the model for how a debt-struck nation should behave - defying economic gravity by simultaneously growing its economy while sucking billions out of that same econ-

omy in Europe's longest austerity drive.

But on Friday, Ireland announced its third-quarter gross domestic product fell 1.9 percent, its national product 2.2 percent. Economists had expected only an 0.5 percent fall for GDP and none at all for GNP. The latter figure is considered a better measure of Ireland's economic vitality because it excludes the largely exported profits of about 600 American companies based in the country.

Ireland has been cutting spending and hiking taxes since late 2008 and has plans to keep doing so through 2015. Next year's target is 2.2 billion euros (\$2.9 billion) in cuts and 1.6 billion euros (\$2.1 billion) in extra charges, including a hike in national sales tax to 23 percent and introduction of a new 100 euro (\$131) tax on every property.

But the country's finances this year are seriously out of whack: It is spending 57 billion euros (\$74.5 billion), including 10 billion euros (\$13 billion) to keep its five nationalized banks afloat, but collecting just 34 billion eu-

The Obama administration says the released information threatened valuable military and diplomatic

sources and strained America's relations with other governments.

But Manning's defense will argue that much of the information posed no risk. In addition to the question of bias, his lawyer argued that Almanza wrongly denied a defense request to call as witnesses the "original classification authorities" who decided to mark as secret the material WikiLeaks published. Instead, Almanza accepted unsworn statements from those people, Manning attorney David Coombs said.

"Let's put witnesses on the stand," Coombs said. "Why is this stuff classified? Why is it going to cause harm?"

Procedural maneuvering dominated the start to what already was an arcane military justice process. The hearing in Fort Meade was open to the public, with limited seating, and no civilian recording equipment was allowed. Instead of a judge, a presiding officer will deliver a recommendation whether prosecutors have enough evidence to bring a suspect to trial. A military commander then makes the final decision.

The tangling centered on whether Almanza, an Army Reserve lieutenant colonel, is biased because of his civilian job as a Justice Department prosecutor.

of sexual abuse — a figure that rose to 1 in 5 among children who spent part of their youth in an institution such as a boarding school or children's home, whether Catholic or not.

"Sexual abuse of minors," it said bluntly, "occurs widely in Dutch society."

The findings prompted the archbishop of Utrecht, Wim Eijk, to apologize to victims on behalf of the Dutch church, saying the report "fills us with shame and sorrow."

The abuse ranged from "unwanted sexual advances" to rape, and abusers numbered in the hundreds and included priests, brothers and lay people who worked in religious orders and congregations. The number of victims who suffered abuse in church institutions likely lies somewhere between 10,000 and 20,000, according to the probe, which went back as far as

The commission behind the investigation was set up

last year by the Catholic Church under the leadership of a former government minister, Wim Deetman, a Protestant, who said there could be no doubt church leaders knew of the problem. "The idea that people did not know there was a risk ... is untenable," he told a news conference. Deetman said abuse con-

tinued in part because bishops and religious orders sometimes worked autonomously to deal with the abuse and "did not hang out their dirty laundry?' However, he said the commission concluded that "it is wrong to talk of a culture of silence" by the church as a whole.

Colm O'Gorman, executive director of Amnesty International in Ireland and a victim of clergy abuse, criticized the Dutch inquiry because it was established by the church itself.

"It is the Dutch government that should be putting in place a meaningful investigation," O'Gorman said.

Even so, he said the report "highlights widespread abuse on a scale I think would be shocking to most Dutch people?"

Research Firm Boosts Holiday Outlook

NEW YORK (AP) • ShopperTrak, a Chicago-based research firm, is announcing it's upgrading its holiday sales forecast, a day after the nation's largest retail group boosted its outlook.

ShopperTrak now believes that sales for the November and December period combined will rise 3.7 percent. That's up from the original 3 percent growth forecast issued in September when the economy's recovery looked more uncer-

The 3.7 percent forecast is still below the 4.1 percent growth registered in the year-ago period, according to ShopperTrak's measure.

The National Retail Federation said Thursday it now expects holiday sales to rise 3.8 percent, up from the 2.8 percent forecast made in early October.

ShopperTrak measures foot traffic in 25,000 stores in the U.S. and blends those figures with economic data.

Nov. State Unemployment Decline is Largest in Decades

More than 3,000 more Idahoans were put to work in November, when unemployment dipped to a two-year low of 8.5 percent.

vember, employers maintained largerthan-normal payrolls during the month. A reduction of 2,300 jobs from October was about half the average decline over the prior four years.

While Idaho still has more jobless workers than at any time before the Great Recession, state labor officials pointed to continuing signs of recovery. If current unemployment numbers hold up through revision in January and February, state unemployment will have reduced by 1.2 percentage points in only eight months.

The last time such a reduction occurred was after the early 1980s double-dip recession, labor officials said.

Nationally, unemployment came in at 8.6 percent in November.

South-central Idaho workers are finding better job prospects than the state average, as unemployment in the eightcounty area came in at 7.8 percent for the month. Gooding County continued to lead the pack at 6.8 percent, while Camas County unemployment reached an areahigh 12.9 percent.

SEC Charges Ex-Fannie, Freddie CEOs with Fraud

WASHINGTON • Two former CEOs at mortgage giants Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac on Friday became the highest-profile individuals to be charged in connection with the 2008 financial cri-

In a lawsuit filed in New York, the Securities and Exchange Commission brought civil fraud charges against six former executives at the two firms, including former Fannie CEO Daniel Mudd and former

Freddie CEO Richard Syron. The executives were accused of understating the level of high-risk subprime mortgages that Fannie and Freddie held just before the housing bubble burst.

"Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac executives told the world that their subprime exposure was substantially smaller than it really was," said Robert Khuzami, SEC's enforcement director.

Khuzami noted that huge losses on their subprime loans eventually pushed the two companies to the brink of failure and forced the government to take them over.

The charges brought Friday follow widespread criticism of federal authorities for not holding top executives accountable for the recklessness that triggered the 2008 crisis.

Before the SEC announced the charges, it reached an agreement not to charge Fannie and Freddie. The companies, which the government took over in 2008, also agreed to cooperate with the SEC in the cases against the former execu-

The Justice Department began investigating the two firms three years ago. In August, Freddie said Justice informed the company that its probe had ended.

Many legal experts say they don't expect the six executives to face criminal charges.

"If the U.S. attorney's office was going to be bringing charges, they would have brought it simultaneously with the civil case," said Christopher Morvillo, a former federal prosecutor now in private practice in Manhattan.

Robert Mintz, a whitecollar defense lawyer, says he doubts any top Wall Street executives will face criminal charges for actions that hastened the financial crisis, given how much time has passed.

Mudd, 53, and Syron, 68, led the mortgage giants in 2007, when home prices began to collapse. The four other top executives also worked for the companies

during that time.

In a statement from his attorney, Mudd said the government reviewed and approved all the company's financial disclosures.

"Every piece of material data about loans held by Fannie Mae was known to the United States government and to the investing public," Mudd said. "The SEC is wrong, and I look forward to a court where fairness and reason — not politics – is the standard for justice."

Syron's lawyers said the term "subprime had no uniform definition in the market" at that time.

"There was no shortage of meaningful disclosures, all of which permitted the reader to assess the degree of risk in Freddie Mac's" portfolio, the lawyers said in a statement. "The SEC's theory and approach are fatally flawed."

According to the lawsuit, Fannie and Freddie misrepresented their exposure to speeches and congressional testimony. Fannie told investors in

subprime loans in reports,

2007 that it had roughly \$4.8 billion worth of subprime loans on its books, or just 0.2 percent of its portfolio. That same year, Mudd told two congressional panels that Fannie's subprime loans represented didn't exceed 2.5 percent of its busi-

The SEC says Fannie actually had about \$43 billion worth of products targeted to borrowers with weak credit, or 11 percent of its holdings. Freddie told investors in

late 2006 that it held between \$2 billion and \$6 billion of subprime mortgages on its books. And Syron, in a 2007 speech, said Freddie had "basically no subprime exposure," according to the suit.

The SEC says its holdings were actually closer to \$141 billion, or 10 percent of its portfolio in 2006, and \$244 billion, or 14 percent, by 2008.

Syron also authorized especially risky mortgages for borrowers without proof of income or assets as early as 2004, the suit alleges, "despite contrary advice" from Freddie's credit-risk experts. He rejected their advice, "in part due to his desire to improve Freddie Mac's market share."

Fannie and Freddie buy home loans from banks and other lenders, package them into bonds with a guarantee against default and then sell them to investors around the world. The two own or guarantee about half of U.S. mortgages, or nearly 31 million loans.





On this date:

In 1777, France recognized American independence.

In 1830, South American patriot Simon Bolivar died in Colombia.

In 1925, Col. William "Billy" Mitchell was convicted at his court-martial in Washington of insubordination for accusing senior military officials of incompetence and criminal negligence; he was suspended from active duty.

In 1939, the German pocket battleship Admiral Graf Spee was scuttled by its crew, ending the World War II Battle of the River Plate off Uruguay.

In 1957, the United States successfully test-fired the Atlas intercontinental ballistic missile for the first time.

In 1961, an arson fire at a circus in Niteroi, Brazil, killed 323 people.

In 1975, Lynette Fromme sentenced in Sacramento, Calif., to life in prison for her attempt on the life of President Gerald R. Ford. (She was paroled in Aug. 2009.)

In 1979, in a case that aggravated racial tensions. Arthur McDuffie, a black insurance executive, was fatally injured after leading police on a chase with his motorcycle in Miami. (Four white police officers accused of beating McDuffie were later acquitted, sparking riots.)

In 1981, members of the Red Brigades kidnapped Brig. Gen. James L. Dozier, the highest-ranking U.S. Army official in southern Europe, from his home in Verona, Italy. (Dozier was rescued 42 days later.)

1986, Eugene Hasenfus, the American convicted by Nicaragua for his part in running guns to the Contras, was pardoned, then released.

Ten years ago: Marines raised the Stars and Stripes over the long-abandoned American Embassy in Kabul, Afghanistan. Gunmen raided Haiti's National Palace, killing at least ten people in an attack the government described as a failed coup attempt (opponents accused the government of staging the attack to clamp down on dissent).

Five years ago: Gunmen in Iraqi army uniforms kidnapped some 30 people at the Red Crescent offices in downtown Baghdad (about half were released the same day). Searchers on Mount Hood in Oregon found the body of missing climber Kelly Iames (two other climbers, Brian Hall and Jerry "Nikko" Cooke, remain missing). Dodgers reliever Larry Sherry, the most valuable player of the 1959 World Series, died in Mission Viejo, Calif., at age 71. Yul Kwon emerged as the winner of "Survivor: Cook CBS'

Islands." One year ago: President Barack Obama signed into law a huge, holiday-season tax bill extending cuts for all Americans, saluting a new spirit of political compromise as Republicans applauded and liberals seethed. Federal prosecutors reached a settlement with the estate of Florida philanthropist Jeffry (cq) Picower in which his widow, Barbara, agreed to return \$7.2 billion that her husband had reaped from Bernard Madoff's giant Ponzi scheme. Don Van Vliet, a musician and artist who'd performed a complex brand of experimental rock under the name Captain Beefheart, died in Arcata, Calif., at age 69. New Orleans quarterback Drew Brees was voted the 2010 Male Athlete of the Year by members of The Associated



Patrick Jourdain has been secretary or president of the International Bridge Press Association for 30 years. He is also a player: His team won the Crockford's Plate in England earlier this year, and he presented the following deal from the event as an example of clear thinking.

Against three no-trump the lead of the club six went to East's king. When the club two came back, South had a choice of hands in which to win it. Before you read on, you might care to consider how you would ad-

At the table declarer took dummy's ace, preserving the queen as a later entry to hand. He then cashed his top spades in hand and dummy's two top diamonds. On the second of these, West pitched a heart rather than a club. Declarer now decided to cash the spade ace, cross to hand with the diamond king, and exit with the fourth round of diamonds to East to force a heart play. Alas, with spades 5-3, East had two spades to cash and the heart ace was the setting trick.

If you judge that clubs are likely to be 5-2, you can avoid having to rely on the heart suit. You need to win the second club in hand and play four rounds of diamonds. With no club to return, East can do no better than exit with a spade. Having taken your spade and diamond winners in hand, you cash dummy's two black aces to give you nine tricks.



out later than others. You should also ask your mother to point out to your dad that what he's doing is counterproductive. Perhaps she can make him see the light. If that doesn't work, arrange other transportation to and from school so you will be less dependent on your father.

"What happened was for the first time really since I've been at Utah State, players were kind of calling out each


other. We decided during that meeting to really take accountability for our own actions, for everything that we were doing on and off the field," Turbin said.


"We feel pretty good where we're at right now," said Leavitt, who burned Minico from the perimeter with three 3-pointers. "All we can do is just keep improving."

Bonds Gets 30-day Home Sentence — At Worst

SAN FRANCISCO • Eight years of being investigated for steroid allegations ended for home run king Barry Bonds on Friday with a 30day sentence to be served at home. No more - and

maybe less. U.S. District Judge Susan Illston immediately delayed imposing the sentence while Bonds appeals his obstruction of justice conviction. The former baseball star was found guilty in April not of using steroids, but of misleading grand jurors.

Even without prison time, the case has left its mark on the seven-time National League MVP. His 762 career home runs, and 73 homers in 2001, may forever be seen as tainted records, and his ticket to baseball's Hall of Fame is in doubt.

Bonds declined to speak in court. Well-wishers hugged the 47-year-old in the hallway courtroom after the hearing was over, and a smattering of fans cheered him as he left the courthouse. It was a marked departure from his initial court

appearance four years ago, when guards had to clear a path for Bonds to get through dozens of onlookers to his SUV.

"Whatever he did or didn't do, we all lie," said Esther Picazo, a fan outside the courthouse. "We all make mistakes. But I don't think he should've gotten any kind of punishment at all."

Bonds was sentenced to two years of probation, 250 hours of community service, a \$4,000 fine and 30

days of home confinement. It will take time to determine whether he serves any of it; his appellate specialist, Dennis Riordan, estimated it would take nearly a year and a half for the 9th U.S. Circuit

Court of Appeals to rule. Assistant U.S. Attorney Matthew Parrella called the sentence a "slap on the wrist" and the fine "almost laughable" for a superstar athlete who made more than \$192 million for playing

baseball.

Parrella had sought 15 months in prison and argued that home confinement wasn't punishment enough "for a man with a 15,000-square-foot house with all the advantages."

"The defendant basically lived a double life for decades before this," Parrella said. He ripped Bonds not only over performance-enhancing drugs but over his personal life: "He had mistresses throughout his marriages."




