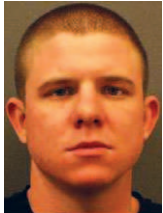

Murder Charged in Burley Man's Saturday Death

Police have released few details regarding the Saturday night fatal shooting of a 21-year-old Burley man.

One Burley man is dead and another is accused of his murder.

The Minidoka County Sheriff's Office released Saturday that 21-year-old Michael Kenneth Blair was found fatally shot shortly after midnight Dec. 17. Michael Jared Thompson, 24, was arrested and charged with second-degree murder for allegedly slaying Blair.

According to a release, a deputy responded to the area of 500 W. 245 S., between Heyburn and Paul, for a possible drunken driver. Once the driver stopped, the deputy saw a female covered in blood exit the vehicle. Blair's body was discovered upon a search of the vehicle.

Minidoka County Sheriff Kevin Halverson noted in a release that the investigation continues into the death of Blair.

According to Idaho's online court records system, neither Blair nor Thompson have any significant criminal convictions in the state.

Minidoka County Sheriff's Office officials have not released further details about the incidents surrounding Blair's death and refused further comment on Sunday.

Picking Up the Tab

Counties cover some cost for out-of-district college students.

About half the students at the College of Southern Idaho are from outlying areas — and that leaves their home counties responsible for paying part of the tab for their education.

Twin Falls and Jerome counties are part of CSI's taxing district, meaning residents pay property taxes to help support the operations of the college.

Out of the college's more than 8,000 students, though, several thousand students live outside those two counties.

"We do have a significant number from other counties," said Jeff Fox, executive vice president and chief academic officer at CSI.

An Idaho law — put on the books in 1965 —

allows students who live outside a community college taxing district to still pay the same price for tuition and fees. That's because their home counties are helping subsidize their education.

Out-of-district counties pay \$50 per credit for each student in their area attending an Idaho community college. There's a cap of \$500 per semester and a total of \$3,000 for a student's education, according to Idaho Code.

In Gooding County, the number of students taking classes at a community college hasn't changed drastically over the years.

"It's actually stayed pretty consistent," County Clerk Denise Gill said.

One reason for that, she says, might be

The Twin Falls council will meet at 5 p.m. today in council chambers, 305 Third Ave. E.

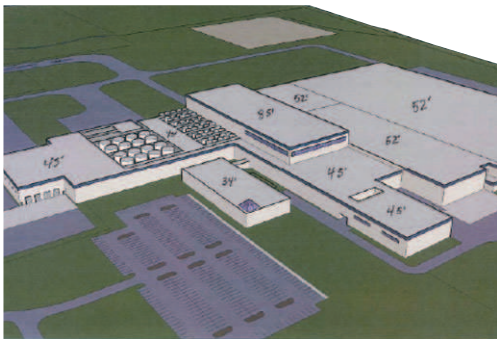
Here's a look at the details:

- **Community gardens:** The council will look at a policy for community gardens on city-

owned property.

The proposal includes guidelines such as: produce cannot be sold as retail; only drip irrigation can be used and the organization that runs the community garden is responsible for developing and maintaining it. Any lease term for a community garden would be five years. The proposal also asks for city code to be changed to allow community gardens on private

property through a special use permit.

• **Chobani:** The council will consider a request to allow the Chobani yogurt facility to be built at a height of up to 90 feet at its site along Kimberly Road in southeast Twin Falls. That's needed because the zoning requirements of the new plant's site usually only allow buildings up to 50 feet tall.

• **Road safety:** The council will consider a request to

put two informational signs near the top and bottom of the Canyon Springs Grade. The signs will advice pedestrians, cyclists and motorists about the proper and safe use of the road, according to a city memo.

• **Impact fee report:** Council will hear a report about the impact fee program. Impact fees are collected on new development to help the city with costs for growth. The council will consider a recommendation to avoid doing any inflation-related increases to the fees for 2012.

because the county's population has remained fairly static recently.

However, U.S. Census figures show the population of the county increased 9.2 percent from 2000 to 2010, up to 15,464 residents.

Gooding is home to one of

CSI's off-campus centers, which offers residents with a variety of class options.

Over the past four or five years, Gooding County has paid reimbursements to community colleges for between 265 and 314 students any given semester. The highest numbers were during the spring 2011 semester.

In Minidoka County, reimbursement data shows

similar trends.

County Clerk Patty Temple said the county paid for reimbursements for 437 students during the fall 2010 semester, totaling \$132,850.

That number increased slightly during the spring 2011 semester to 465 students, but the reimbursement amount was slightly lower — \$132,400.

Not all of those reim-

bursements were for traditional college students, though.

Some are high school students taking dual-credit classes, allowing them to earn high school and college credit simultaneously. This fall, more than 1,500 students from 54 high schools statewide were enrolled in dual-credit classes through CSI.

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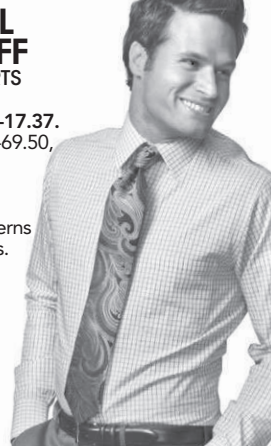
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E. IDAHO PRODUCES ANOTHER BIG LOTTERY WINNER

BOISE (AP) • Idaho Lottery officials say an Idaho Lottery Powerball ticket purchased in eastern Idaho is worth \$200,000.

Idaho Lottery Director Jeff Anderson says the ticket purchased in Idaho Falls matched five numbers in Saturday's Powerball draw, but not the Powerball number.

Lottery officials report it's the 10th Powerball ticket sold in Idaho during the last two years that matched the first five numbers to win at least \$200,000. Seven of those tickets were purchased in eastern Idaho.

The most recent winner has 180 days to claim the money.

BLM Sued Over NV Mustang Castration, Roundup Plans

RENO, Nev. (AP) • A coalition of environmentalists and wild-horse activists is suing the government to block its implementation of a precedent-setting plan to castrate hundreds of wild stallions in eastern Nevada.

The lawsuit, filed by the Western Watersheds Project and Cloud Foundation, follows the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's decision in July to back off a similar plan to castrate hundreds of wild stallions in Wyoming.

The suit, filed Wednesday in U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C., challenges the BLM's plans to remove 1,800 wild horses from the sprawling Pancake Complex near Ely over the next six to 10 years, and to castrate 200 stallions before releasing them back to the complex as geldings.

The agency defends the castration plan as another way to reduce growing horse herds it says are damaging rangelands.

IDAHO RANCHER SPREADS WORD ABOUT WOLVES

PENDLETON, Ore. • Like an itinerant preacher, Casey Anderson has a message.

The 56-year-old Idaho ranch manager was a popular speaker at ranchers' gatherings the past year: October at the Cattle Producers of Washington annual meeting in Moses Lake, Wash., and in January the Intermountain Rangelands Symposium in Twin Falls, Idaho. In May 2010, he spoke at a public symposium in La Grande cosponsored by the Oregon Cattlemen's Association.

His message is simple: Wolves are coming. Get ready.

"I want to show the facts and have the scientific research to back it up," he said. "That's my message. I don't have to raise my voice, yell and holler, scream and point

my finger. Most of the information you get is from wildlife biologists, the Humane Society, Defenders of Wildlife, and they have their agenda. Most of the things they say are not true. That's the way I give my talk."

Anderson, a Pendleton native who learned his trade in the Blue Mountains, speaks against a backdrop of anxiety and conflict as wolves spread into Eastern Oregon, reclaiming territory they haven't inhabited in 65 years.

He is no Cassandra. He knows firsthand what impact wolves have on a big livestock operation. What's more, he has data to bolster his claims. Or, he has some data to suggest that wolves prey on cattle in ways researchers are just beginning to comprehend. His PowerPoint presentation consists of charts and graphs — the record of wolf and cattle movements

tracked by satellite — interspersed with photographs of mutilated calves.

But the study Anderson cites, and is part of, is still under way. An Oregon State University researcher involved with it cautions against reading too much into what Anderson, who runs the OX Ranch east of the Snake River, has to say. Another said he's fine with Anderson's presentation, and points out that OX Ranch owners Tim and Joe Hixon are widely recognized wildlife conservationists.

"I'm not really nervous about Casey's presentation," said Douglas Johnson, professor of ecology and rangeland management at Oregon State University, Corvallis. "I guess I wouldn't put this as any kind of us against them. The way we look at it is an issue that we really need some hard information so people can make policy decisions."

As wolf numbers in Oregon grow — the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife confirms 25, with more likely — livestock producers gird for increased conflict with wolves. State wildlife authorities attribute at least 20 calf and cow deaths to wolves in Oregon since May 2010. The

state killed two wolves in Wallowa County in May 2010 after deciding the pair was responsible for killing a calf. Two more Wallowa

wolves of the Imnaha pack, including the alpha male, were marked for elimination after a calf was killed Sept. 22 near Joseph.

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UI Ending Policy on Subsidized Classes

MOSCOW • University of Idaho officials say they are ending a nearly free tuition program for employees and spouses of other state schools due to a sharp reduction in state funding.

"We've got fee-paying and tuition-paying students subsidizing the education of spouses and faculty at the other colleges, which didn't sit well with the provost," said Ron Smith, vice president for Finance and Administration.

He said Provost Doug Baker also said the policy was unfair.

The program allowed those eligible to pay a \$25 fee and then \$5 per credit to take traditional or online courses at the University of Idaho. That ends Jan. 1 when online courses will be excluded, students must be accepted into a degree program and can take only six credits per semester.

The move has irked some at Lewis-Clark State College.

"The faculty are very up-

set about it," said Ruth Lapsley, a business administration professor and the chairwoman of the LCSC Faculty Senate. She told *The Lewiston Tribune* that the tuition waiver was a perk for unpaid faculty members.

She also said requiring a student to be accepted into a degree program presented a major problem.

"Maybe there's one class that would really help my teaching," she said. "I no longer have access to that class, unless I actually apply and become part of a program. In a time when we don't have any travel and continuing education funds, that's one way for faculty members to stay up with their particular program."

Besides Lewis-Clark State College, the change also applies to North Idaho College, Idaho State University, the College of Western Idaho and Boise State University.

IRAQ UPDATE

KHABARI CROSSING, Kuwait • The last U.S. soldiers rolled out of Iraq across the border into neighboring Kuwait at daybreak Sunday, whooping, fist bumping and hugging each other in a burst of joy and relief. Their convoy's exit marked the end of a bitterly divisive war that raged for nearly nine years and left Iraq shattered and struggling to recover.

The war cost nearly 4,500 American and well more than 100,000 Iraqi lives and \$800 billion from the U.S. Treasury. The question of whether it was worth it all — or whether the new government the Americans leave behind will remain a steadfast U.S. ally — is yet unanswered.

The 5-hour drive by the last convoy of MRAPS, heavily armored personnel carriers, took place under cover of darkness and under strict secrecy to prevent any final attacks on the withdrawing troops. The 500 soldiers didn't even tell their Iraqi partners they were leaving before they slipped out of the last American base and started down the barren desert highway to the Kuwaiti border before dawn Sunday.

The atmosphere was subdued inside one of the vehicles as it streamed down the highway, with little visible in the blackness outside through the MRAP's small windows. Along the road, a small group of Iraqi soldiers waved to the departing American troops.

Man Says He Set Woman Afire over Debt

NEW YORK • As Deloris Gillespie went up the elevator to her fifth-floor Brooklyn apartment, carrying groceries, her killer was waiting. Though no one may have seen him, he had been in the building long enough for neighbors to have smelled something odd.

Surveillance video from inside the small elevator shows that he looked something like an exterminator, with a canister sprayer, white gloves and a dust mask, which was perched atop his head like a pair of sunglasses. The sprayer was full of flammable liquid.

When the elevator opened Saturday afternoon, the man sprayed the 73-year-old woman, who turned around and crouched down to try to protect

NC Soldier, 23, Was Last US Troop Killed in Iraq

GREENSBORO, N.C. • As the last U.S. troops withdrew from Iraq on Sunday, friends and family of the first and last American fighters killed in combat were cherishing their memories rather than dwelling on whether the war and their sacrifice was worth it.

Nearly 4,500 American fighters died before the last U.S. troops crossed the border into Kuwait. David Hickman, 23, of Greensboro was the last of those war casualties, killed in November by the kind of improvised bomb that was a signature weapon of this war.

"David Emanuel Hickman. Doesn't that name just bring out a smile to your face?" said Logan Trainum, one of Hickman's closest friends, at the funeral where the soldier was laid to rest after a ceremony in a Greensboro church packed with friends and family.

Trainum says he's not spending time asking why Hickman died: "There aren't enough facts available for me to have a defined opinion about things. I'm just sad, and pray that my best friend didn't lay down his life for nothing."

He'd rather remember who Hickman was: A cutup who liked to joke around

HOUSE GOP LEADERS WANT
NEW PAYROLL TAX CUT BILL

WASHINGTON • Top House Republicans rebelled Sunday against a bipartisan, Senate-approved bill extending payroll tax cuts and jobless benefits for two months, reigniting a politically fueled holiday-season clash that had seemed all but doused.

The House GOP defiance cast uncertainty over how quickly Congress would forestall a tax increase otherwise heading straight at 160 million workers beginning New Year's Day. House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, said it could be finished within two

weeks, which suggested that lawmakers might have to spend much of their usual holiday break battling each other in the Capitol.

A day after rank-and-file House GOP lawmakers used a conference call to spew venom against the Senate-passed bill, Boehner said he opposed the legislation and wanted congressional bargainers to craft a new, year-long version.

"The president said we shouldn't be going anywhere without getting our work done," Boehner said on NBC's "Meet the Press," referring to President Barack Obama's oft-repeated promise to postpone his Christmas-

time trip to Hawaii if the legislation was not finished. "Let's get our work done, let's do this for a year."

A spokeswoman for House Majority Leader Eric Cantor, R-Va., said the House would vote Monday to either request formal bargaining with the Senate or to make the legislation "responsible and in line with the needs of hard-working taxpayers and middle-class families."

Cantor spokeswoman Laena Fallon did not specify what those changes might be, beyond a longer-lasting bill. Boehner, though, expressed support for "reasonable reductions in spending" in a House-approved payroll tax bill and for provisions that blocked some Obama administration anti-pollution rules.

Democrats leaped at what they saw as a chance to champion lower- and

Angela Alvarez, 46, was in critical condition following Friday's shooting inside a complex that houses more than a thousand Southern California Edison employees. There was no update to her condition Sunday.

Authorities identified the shooter as Andre Turner, 48, of Norco in Riverside County. Investigators have said Turner methodically picked off his co-workers with a semiautomatic handgun, and then shot himself.

herself, New York Police Department spokesman Paul Browne said. The attacker sprayed Gillespie in the face and continued to spray her "sort of methodically" over her head and parts of her body as her bags of groceries draped off her arms, Browne said.

Then, Browne said, the attacker pulled out a barbecue-style lighter and used it to ignite a rag in a bottle. He waited a few seconds as Gillespie huddled on the floor. Then he backed out of the elevator and tossed the flaming bottle in.

Neighbors in the Prospect Height building quickly reported a fire, but had no idea that a woman was being burned alive.

Overnight, a 47-year-old man stinking of gasoline went into a police station and implicated himself in Gillespie's death, Browne said. The suspect, Jerome Isaac, told police he set her on fire because she owed him \$2,000 for some work he had

done for her, Browne said.

Jaime Holguin, who lives on the same floor as Gillespie, saw surveillance pictures of the attacker and said, "Oh, my God!"

Holguin, the manager of news development for The Associated Press, said the attacker looked like a man who lived with Gillespie for about six months last year and appeared to have been helping her out.

That arrangement apparently ended by early 2011, but months later Holguin started seeing the man nearby on the street, looking "a lot more disheveled."

Browne said that after setting Gillespie ablaze, Isaac set another fire at his own apartment building nearby, then hid on a roof before turning himself in to police.

Isaac was arrested Sunday on murder and arson charges. The Brooklyn district attorney's office had no information on whether he had an attorney.

Residents were evacuated and kept away from the six-story building for hours Saturday night as police investigated.

middle-income Americans by accusing Republicans of threatening a wide tax increase unless their demands are met. If Congress doesn't act, workers would see their take-home checks cut by 2 percentage points beginning Jan. 1, when this year's 4.2 percent payroll tax reverts to its normal 6.2 percent.

"They should pass the two month extension now to avoid a devastating tax hike from hitting the middle class in just 13 days," said Dan Pfeiffer, the White House communications director. "It's time House Republicans stop playing politics and get the job done for the American people."

House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi said by opposing the Senate bill, "Tea party House Republicans are walking away once again, showing their extremism and clearly demonstrating that they never intended to give the middle class a tax cut," said House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif.

Adam Jentleson, spokesman for Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, said the

Nevada Democrat would be "happy to continue negotiating a yearlong extension as soon as the House passes the Senate's short-term, bipartisan compromise to make sure middle-class families will not be hit by a thousand-dollar tax hike on January 1."

Keeping this year's 2 percent point payroll tax cut in effect through 2012 would produce \$1,000 in savings for a family earning \$50,000 a year. The two-month version would be worth about \$170 for the same household.

On Saturday, the Senate voted 89-10 for its legislation, which was negotiated by Senate Republican and Democratic leaders and backed by solid majorities of senators from both parties. It would provide a two-month extension of the payroll tax cuts and jobless benefits and prevent scheduled 27 percent cuts to doctors' Medicare reimbursements during that period, reductions that could convince physicians to stop treating elderly patients covered by the program.

That measure was praised by Obama, and even Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., expressed optimism that the measure

China’s Threat in Cyberspace

The following editorial appeared in Friday’s Washington Post:

China is waging a quiet, mostly invisible but massive cyberwar against the United States, aimed at stealing its most sensitive military and economic secrets and obtaining the ability to sabotage vital infrastructure. This is, by now, relatively well known in Washington, but relatively little is being done about it, considering the enormous stakes involved.

What exactly is happening? Hackers mostly backed by the People’s Liberation Army are trying daily to penetrate the computer systems of U.S. government agencies, defense contractors, technology firms, and utilities such as power and water companies — not to mention the private e-mail accounts of thousands of Americans. To an alarming degree, they are succeeding. In recent years hacks have been reported of the State, Defense and Commerce departments; Lockheed Martin; Google, which said its source code and the e-mail accounts of senior government officials were targeted; and the computer security company RSA, which protects critical networks through the SecureID system.

“The computer networks of a broad array of U.S. government agencies, private companies, universities and other institutions — all holding large volumes of sensitive economic information — were targeted by cyber espionage,” said a report issued in October by the Office of the National Counterintelligence Executive. “Much of this activity appears to have originated in China.”

As in the case of other novel and slowly developing threats — international terrorism in the 1990s comes to mind — the U.S. response has been slowed by bureaucratic infighting, poor information-sharing and a failure to prioritize the problem above more familiar business with Beijing. The Pentagon has set up a cyber command, but it has the authority to protect only military networks; the Department of Homeland Security jealously guards its prerogative to guard domestic civilian targets. Government agencies often don’t share sensitive intelligence with companies, while many companies are reluctant to report on penetrations of their networks; Google has been a rare exception.

A further difficulty is identifying exactly where cyberattacks originate and connecting them to their government sponsors. Predictably enough, the Chinese government aggressively denies any involvement in the attacks on U.S. agencies and companies — which makes it difficult for diplomats to pressure for a cease-fire. But an encouraging report in the Wall Street Journal this week said that U.S. intelligence agencies had managed to identify many of the Chinese groups, and even individuals, involved in the cyberoffensive, including a dozen cells connected to the People’s Liberation Army.

This should provide an opportunity for the Obama administration to more directly confront the problem. It should demand that Beijing shut down the military-backed groups; if it does not do so, they could be subjected to countermeasures, including sanctions against individuals. Congress could also consider legislation punishing companies connected to the Chinese military if the cyberwar does not cease.



Otter’s Third-term Talk is Nothing But Bluster

Idaho Gov. Butch Otter twice said last week that he’ll seek re-election in 2014, at age 72. My take: He hasn’t made up his mind.

There are three reasons for the bluster.

First, Otter’s keen to avoid a prolonged lame-duckhood. Since he took office in 2007, his fellow Republicans in the Legislature have had the upper hand. They crushed his signature initiative — money for roads — in 2008 and 2009, and have driven the tough budget decisions ever since.

In the upcoming 2012 session, Otter faces many lawmakers hostile to his plan to establish a state-run health insurance exchange instead of waiting for the U.S. Supreme Court to overturn the Affordable Care Act. Creating a state exchange is the top priority of Otter’s friends at the Arid Club, as well as Main Street business folks who much prefer state officials to feds.

That issue connects to No. 2: Otter’s broke. His last campaign report, for the six months ending in June, showed \$206,000 in debt and \$10,444 in cash.

The governor is a thrifty man. He needs the well-heeled to retire his debt. If they think he’s unlikely to run, they’ll be less inclined

to bail him out.

It’s no coincidence the breast-beating came last week, in a Tuesday appearance on “America’s Morning News,” a talk show aired in Boise on KINF AM 730, and Wednesday in Coeur d’Alene at the North Idaho Governor’s Ball.

On Jan. 7, Otter is hosting the 2012 Governor’s Dinner to benefit his campaign. Tickets are \$500 and are being hawked on the campaign’s Facebook page.

Gold Sponsors can pay \$5,000 for a table of eight, and Silver Sponsors get four tickets for \$2,500.

Governor in Waiting?

Which brings us to No. 3: Otter’s feeling blue about recent editorials saying he’s “mailing it in,” leaving the heavy lifting to Lt. Gov. Brad Little, who insiders have long seen as Otter’s hand-picked successor.

Since Nov. 13, Otter has spent three weeks on junkets or vacation in Hawaii, Florida and Las Vegas, opening wide the door to claims he’s going through

the motions.

That he backed away from leading a trade mission to Mexico and Brazil early this month and sent Little instead isn’t consistent with a re-election mode. This is a guy who sees himself a brilliant salesman, first at the J.R. Simplot Co., then as lieutenant governor, now as governor. Otter sent a clear message by choosing to go to the National Finals Rodeo: My downtime is more important than Idaho’s economy.

Ignoring the Media

On the radio Tuesday, Otter commiserated about the troubles of his presidential pick, saying Mitt Romney should ignore the media. “If you believe everything that they write, then you get to feeling bad about it,” he said.

Otter’s a politician who wants to be liked, sort of like Bill Clinton. It’s a comparison he may not relish, but it’s apt.

In 2010, he was asked at an Idaho Press Club event how the media might mend their relationship with him. Otter bared his tender core, saying, “I’d just like — I would like to see some compassion, maybe that’s the word I’m looking for, some compassion. This is a tough,

tough position to be in. And it’s not fun.”

Don’t get me wrong. Otter may well run in 2014, though I’d say it’s 2-1 against him making a race as a septuagenarian. In addition to Little, Congressman Raul Labrador, Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna and Attorney General Lawrence Wasden all are ready for higher office. They’ve waited their turn, and it would be ill-mannered for Otter not to step aside for the youngsters.

Otter told “America’s Morning News” that he used to support term limits — “Go serve a few years and then get out” — but has reconsidered.

“I’m planning on running again in 2014,” he said. “It’s a ways off, but I see no reason not to because we put a lot of good things in place. I want to see those things mature, and I want to start a movement here in Idaho that’ll spread across the United States.”

An ambitious aim, and he may well mean it.

But I seriously doubt Otter has decided to seek a third consecutive four-year term two years before he must. The last governor to gain such notoriety for out-of-state travel, Republican Bob Smylie, had worn out his welcome when he sought a fourth term in 1966 and suffered a career-ending embarrassment, losing to Don Samuelson.

Otter may believe in his heart that he’s “planning to run.” But planning and doing are altogether different.

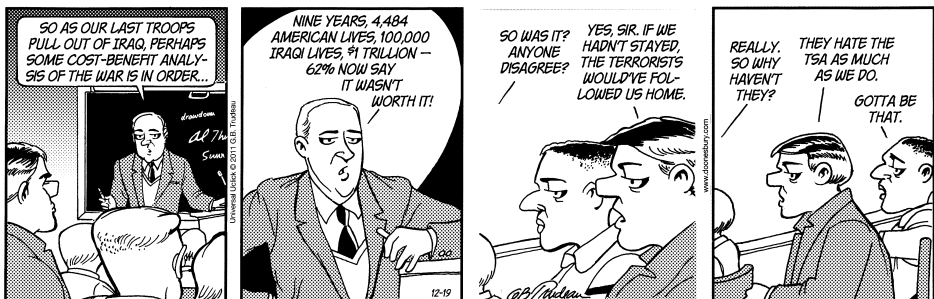

Witness Links Private to Secrets Seen on WikiLeaks

FORT MEADE, Maryland • A computer-crimes investigator testified Sunday he found more than 10,000 diplomatic cables and other sensitive information on the work computer of the Army private charged with spilling a mountain of secrets to WikiLeaks.

Moreover, Special Agent David Shaver told a military hearing he discovered evidence that someone had used the computer to streamline the downloading of the cables with the apparent aim of “moving them out.”

It was the government's first hard evidence linking Pfc. Bradley Manning with the wealth of confidential government information that showed up on WikiLeaks: battlefield reports from Iraq and Afghanistan, diplomatic communications, a military video showing a U.S. helicopter attack that killed 11 men, and more.

Shaver's appearance capped the third day of a hearing that will determine whether Manning will be court-martialed on 22 charges, including aiding the enemy. The testimony was potentially the most damaging so far.

Shaver said the material he found at the intelligence analyst's workstation in Iraq was all linked to the username

bradley.manning or Manning's user profile.

He said he examined two computers that were assigned to Manning while he was working in Baghdad in 2009 and 2010.

The other machine, he said, contained evidence that someone had conducted more than 100 searches using the keywords “WikiLeaks” and “Julian Assange,” the organization's leader.

Those terms seemed “out of place” on a computer that was used for analyzing intelligence about Iraq, said Shaver, who is to be cross examined by Manning's defense Monday.

Shaver told the hearing that in addition to the cables, he found assessments of Guantanamo Bay terrorist detainees and several versions of the 2007 helicopter attack video on Manning's computer.

Manning's lawyers have neither acknowledged nor denied that the intelligence analyst was behind the leaks.

Instead, they have pressed the government to explain why Manning remained entrusted with access to highly sensitive information after showing hostile behavior to those around him. A supervisor who might have shed light on that question Sunday refused to testify.

Manning, 24, could face life in prison if convicted.

In camouflaged fatigues and dark rimmed-glasses, he sat mostly forward for the third straight day, appearing calm, listening intently to the witnesses and occasionally writing on paper in front of him.

He didn't speak Sunday except for the few occasions he leaned over to consult with his civilian defense attorney, David Coombs, each time first switching off the defense table microphone for privacy.

Turner's death was ruled a suicide, Los Angeles County coroner's Lt. Larry Dietz told The Associated Press. Turner had worked at Edison for seven years, utility spokesman Steven Conroy said.

Abhay Pimpale, a 38-year-old independent contractor from Montebello, was also injured. He was released from the hospital Saturday. Pimpale, the father of a 3-year-old son and a newborn baby, declined to speak to reporters, telling KCAL-TV he only wanted to “spend time with my family.”

The two other men killed were Henry Serrano, 56, of Walnut, and Robert Scott Lindsay, 53, of Chino Hills, coroner and company officials said. Turner and Lindsay died at the scene. Serrano died while being taken to a hospital, the coroner's office said.

Lindsay was a manager in the IT division at Edison and worked for the company for 29 years, company officials said. He was married and was a father. Serrano, a manager in the same area, was with the company for 26 years.

All five people worked in the same area of the same

building at the office park in Irwindale, a small industrial city in the San Gabriel Valley, authorities said.

Authorities have released no information on a possible motive for what the Edison statement called “one of the most horrific events the company has experienced in its 125-year history.”

Turner's wife, Jean Turner, wrote in a brief statement given to KTLA, “We are in shock and still trying to process this tragic event. Our hearts and prayers go out to all the victims and their families.”

Deidre Corbin, a neighbor in an upscale neighborhood near a golf club in Norco, said she spoke with Jean Turner shortly after the shooting was reported.

“I had asked her if she received a call, a text, or anything from him,” Corbin told KCAL-TV. “She said that she hadn't heard anything.”

It was not until hours later that Jean Turner learned it was her husband who authorities identified as the gunman.

Horried employees barricaded themselves behind locked doors and hid under desks Friday afternoon as Turner walked through the office firing a semi-automatic handgun, authorities said.

“My heart goes out to the Iraqis,” said Warrant Officer John Jewell, acknowledging the challenges ahead. “The innocent always pay the bill.”

But after crossing the berm at the Kuwaiti border, lit with floodlights and ringed with barbed wire, the troops from the 3rd brigade of the Army’s 1st Cavalry Division were elated. They cheered, pumped fists in the air and gave each other chest bumps and bear hugs. “We’re on top of the world!” shouted one soldier from the turret of his vehicle.

“It’s just an honor to be able to serve your country and say that you helped close out the war in Iraq,” said Spc. Jesse Jones, a 23-year-old who volunteered to be in the last convoy. “Not a lot of people can say that they did huge things like that that will probably be in the history books.”

Spc. Brittany Hampton joked that no one was going to believe her back home when she told them she was in the very last of the 110 vehicles in

the convoy to exit.

“But we really truly were the last soldiers in Iraq. So it’s pretty awesome,” she said.

The quiet withdrawal was a stark contrast to the high-octane start of the war, which began before dawn on March 20, 2003, with an airstrike in southern Baghdad where Saddam Hussein was believed to be hiding, the opening shot in the famed “shock and awe” bombardment. U.S. and allied ground forces then stormed from Kuwait across the featureless deserts of southern Iraq toward the capital.

Saddam and his regime fell within weeks, and the dictator was captured by the end of the year — to be executed by Iraq’s new Shiite rulers in 2006. But Saddam’s end only opened the door to years more of conflict as Iraq was plunged into a

vicious sectarian war between its Shiite and Sunni communities. The near civil war devastated the country, and its legacy includes thousands of widows and orphans, a people deeply divided along sectarian lines and infrastructure that remains largely in ruins.

In the past two years, violence has dropped dramatically, and Iraqi security forces that U.S. troops struggled for years to train have improved. But the sectarian wounds remain unhealed. Even as U.S. troops were leaving, the main Sunni-backed political bloc announced Sunday it was suspending its participation in parliament to protest the monopoly on government posts by Shiite allies of Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki.

President Barack Obama stopped short of calling the U.S. effort in Iraq a victory in an

interview taped Thursday with ABC News’ Barbara Walters.

“I would describe our troops as having succeeded in the mission of giving to the Iraqis their country in a way that gives them a chance for a successful future,” Obama said.

In the final days, U.S. officials acknowledged the cost in blood and dollars was high, but tried to paint a picture of victory — for both the troops and the Iraqi people now freed of a dictator and on a path to democracy. But gnawing questions remain:

Will Iraqis be able to forge their new government amid the still stubborn sectarian clashes? And will Iraq be able to defend itself and remain independent in a region fraught with turmoil and still steeped in insurgent threats?

Green Bay's run at perfection comes to a halt in Kansas City against inspired Chiefs defense.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. • Mike McCarthy never put a whole lot of stock in a perfect season, except as a means of gaining home-field advantage and setting the Green Bay Packers up for another Super Bowl run.

Well, they still have a chance to earn home-field advantage.

The perfect season? That's history.

Kyle Orton threw for 299 yards to outduel Aaron Rodgers, and the Kansas City Chiefs rallied behind interim coach Romeo Crennel for a shocking 19-14 victory on Sunday that ended the Packers' 19-game winning streak. It was their first loss since Dec. 19, 2010, at New England.

"I personally always viewed the undefeated season as, really, just gravy," McCarthy said. "The goal was to get home-field advantage and win the Super

Bowl. That's what we discussed.

"We were fortunate enough to be in the position to possibly achieve the undefeated season," he added, "but we still have the primary goal in front of us, and that's to get home-field advantage."

Green Bay, playing without leading receiver Greg Jennings and top rusher James Starks because of injuries, can wrap up the No. 1 seed in their final two games against Chicago and Detroit. But the Packers no longer have the pressure of becoming the second team in NFL history to win a Super Bowl with a perfect record, or extending the second-longest winning streak in league history.

"I think our goal ultimate goal is to win a Super Bowl. The next step is getting that number one seed in the playoffs," Rodgers said. "We've got a home playoff game — we've got a bye secured."

Rodgers was 17 of 35 for 235 yards and a touchdown, and he also scampered 8 yards for another touchdown with 2:12 left in the

Brees completed 32 of 40 passes to help the Saints (11-3) overcome a slow and sloppy start and stay two games ahead of Atlanta in the NFC South. Brees is 304 yards from breaking Dan Marino's single-season record for yards passing with two games to play.

REDSKINS 23, GIANTS 10
EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. • Rex Grossman threw a 20-yard touchdown pass to Santana Moss and Washington hurt New York's playoff hopes.

Grossman threw a 20-yard scoring pass to Santana Moss, Darrel Young scored on a 6-yard run after one of three interceptions by the Redskins (5-9) and Graham Gano kicked three field goals. It was Washington's second win in its last 10 games.

PANTHERS 28, TEXANS 13
HOUSTON • Cam Newton threw two touchdown passes, DeAngelo Williams ran for a score and Carolina ended Houston's seven-game winning streak.

Newton completed 13 of 23 passes for 149 yards, outplaying opposing rookie quarterback T.J. Yates. The Panthers (5-9) built a 21-0 halftime lead, then ended Houston's second-half rally when linebacker James Anderson intercepted Yates in

the end zone midway through the fourth quarter.

TODAY IN HISTORY

In 1777, Gen. George Washington led his army of about 11,000 men to Valley Forge, Pa., to camp for the winter.

The fires that had burned beneath the ruins of the World Trade Center in New York City for the previous three months were declared extinguished except for a few scattered hot spots.

Five years ago: A Libyan court convicted five Bulgarian nurses and a Palestinian doctor of deliberately infecting 400 children with HIV and sentenced them to death. (The six later had their death sentences commuted, and were transferred to Bulgaria, where they were pardoned and set free.)

One year ago: The body of an American tourist, Kristine Luken, 44, was found near a road outside Jerusalem. (A Palestinian man was later sentenced by an Israeli court to life in prison for stabbing Luken.) Belarus' President Alexander Lukashenko won re-election. Philadelphia's DeSean Jackson returned a punt 65 yards for a touchdown as time expired in the Eagles' 38-31 comeback win at the New York Giants; it's the only game-winning punt-return touchdown as time expired in NFL history.

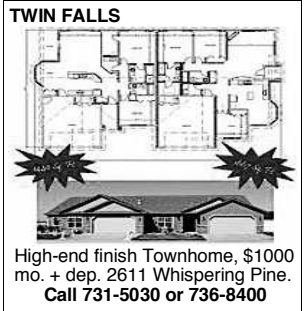

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

It is particularly satisfying to discover when looking at a deal played or defended by experts that you can do better than the participants. Today's deal is one such example.

It is easy to relax when you are looking at two and a half tricks in your own hand and your partner doubles a game contract before you get the chance to bid at all. As the field discovered, relaxation at the table can prove very expensive.

The point is that at six of the seven tables from a major event where South played four spades doubled, West led a heart, which allowed declarer to get rid of his losing club and wrap up 10 tricks.

Geir Helgemo, who led a club at trick one, must have been surprised to find it earned him a game swing. However, while I believe the heart lead deserved the loss of IMPs that it generated, the club lead is by no means cast-iron, though it seems preferable to any other of the side-suits.

In my opinion the lead of the spade ace stands out if one considers all the options. West is essentially uninterested in ruffs, but he may, for example, have to sacrifice a trump trick to stop a crossruff. More to the point, retaining the lead preserves a valuable tempo. The sight of dummy will frequently make the defense easier — on this occasion the shift to clubs becomes obvious, but on a different day another play might be necessary.

ANSWER: Your partner's double just shows a good hand, so declarer's best chance of taking tricks here is on a crossruff.
