Chargedin BurleyMan's Saturday Death

Police have released few details regarding the Saturday night fatal shooting of a 21-year-old Burley man.

The Minidoka County Sheriff's Office released Saturday that 21-year-old Michael Kenneth Blair was found fatally shot shortly after midnight Dec. 17 . rested and charged with second-degree murder for allegedly slaying Blair.
According to a release, a deputy

RENO, Nev. (AP) • A coalition of environmentalists and wild-horse activists is suingthe government to block its implesetting plan to castrate hundreds of wild stallions in eastern Nevada. The lawsuit, filed by the Western Watersheds Project and Cloud Foundation, follows the U.S.
Bureau of Land Management's decision in July to back off a similar plan to castrate hundreds of wild stallions in Wyoming. The suit, filed Wednesday in U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C.,
challenges the BLM's challenges the BLM's
plans to remove 1,800 wild horses from the sprawling Pancake Complex near Ely over the next six to 10 years, and to castrate 200 stallions before releasing them back to th complex as geldings.
The agency defen the castration plan as another way to reduce growing horse herds it says are damaging rangelands.

UIEndingPolicy on SubsidizedClasses

MOSCOW • University of Idaho officials say they are
ending a nearly free tuition program for employees and spouses of other state schools due to a sharp reduction in state funding. "We've got fee-paying and tuition-paying students subsidizes and faculty at the spouses and faculty at the
other colleges, which didn't sit well with the provost," said Ron Smith, vice president for Finance and Administration.
He said Provost Doug
Baker Baker also said the policy was unfair.
The program allowed
those eligible to pay a $\$ 25$ fee and then $\$ 5$ per credit to take traditional or online courses at the University of Idaho. That ends Jan. 1 when online courses will be excluded, students must be accepted
into a degree program and into a degree program and semester. The move has irked some at Lewis-Clark State College. "The faculty are very up-
set about it," said Ruth Lapsley, a business administration professor and the chairwoman of the LCSC Faculty
Senate. She told The Lewiston Tribune that the tuition waiver was a perk for underpaid faculty members. She also said requiring a student to be accepted into a degree program presented a major problem.
"Maybe there's one class that would really help my longer have access to that class, unless I actually apply and become part of a program. In a time when we don't have any travel and
continuing education funds continuing education funds,
that's one way for faculty that's one way for faculty
members to stay up with members to stay up w, Besides Lewis-Clark State College, the change also applies to North Idaho College, Idaho State University, the College of Western Idaho and Boise State University.
Officials of the Moscowbased university say they waived nearly $\$ 125,000$ in student fees in southwest Idaho for the 2010 academic

KHABARI CROSSING, Kuwait • The last U.S. soldiers rolled out of Iraq across the border into neighboring Kuwait at daybreak Sunday, whooping, fist bumping and hugging each other in a burst of
joy and relief. Their convoy's exit joy and relief. Their convoy's exit
marked the end of a bitterly divisive war that raged for nearly nine years and left Iraq shattered and struggling to recover. The war cost nearly 4,500 American and well more than 100,000 Iraqi lives and $\$ 800$ billion from the U.S. Treasury. all - or whether the new government the Americans leave behind will remain a steadfast U.S. ally - is yet unanswered.
The 5 -hour drive by the last convoy of MRAPS, heavily armored personnel car riers, took place under cover of darkness and under strict secrecy to prevent any
final attacks on the withdrawing troops The 500 soldiers didn't even tell their Iraqi partners they were leaving before they slipped out of the last American base and started down the barren desert highway to the Kuwaiti border before dawn Sunday.
The atmosphere was subdued inside one of the vehicles as it streamed down
the highway, with little visible in the blackness outside through the MRAP' small windows. Along the road, a small group of Iraqi soldiers waved to the departing American troops.

## NCSoldier,23,Was LastUSTroopKilled in Iraq

Nefore the last U.S. troops crossed thed border into Kuwait. David Hickman, 23, of Greensboro was the last of those war casualties, killed in November by the kind of improvised bomb that was a signature weapon of this war.
"David Emanuel Hickman. Doesn't that name just bring out a smile to your
face?" said Logan Trainum, one of Hickman's closest friends, at the funera where the soldier was laid to rest after a ceremony in a Greensboro church packed with friends and family.
Trainum says he's not spending time sking why Hickman died: "There aren't enough facts available for me to have sad, and pray that my best friend didn't lay down his life for nothing."
He'd rather remember who Hickman was: A cutup who liked to joke around

 China's Threat in Cyberspace The folPost:

China is waging a quiet, mostly invisible but massive cyberwar against the United States, aimed at stealing its most sensitive military ility to sabd economic secrets and obtaining the ability to sabotage vital infrastructure. This is, by now, relatively well known in Washington, but rela-
tively little is being done about it, considering the tively little is being done ab
enormous stakes involved.
What exactly is happening? Hackers mostly backed by the People's Liberation Army are trying daily to penetrate the computer systems of U.S. gov ernment agencies, defense contractors, technology firms, and utilities such as power and water companies - not to mention the private e-mail accounts of thousands of Americans. To an alarming degree they are succeeding. In recent years hacks have been reported of the State, Defense and Commerce departments; Lockheed Martin; Google, which said its source code and the e-mail accounts of senior government officials were targeted; and the comput er security company RSA, which protects critica networks through the SecureID system.
"The computer networks of a broad array of U.S. government agencies, private companies, universi ties and other institutions - all holding large volumes of sensitive economic information - were tar geted by cyber espionage," said a report issued in October by the Office of the National Counterintellingence Executive. "Much of this activity appears o have originated in China."
As in the case of other novel and slowly developing threats - international terrorism in the 1990s comes to mind - the U.S. response has been slowed by bureaucratic infighting, poor information-sharing and a failure to prioritize the problem above more familiar business with Beijing. The Pentagon has set up a cyber command, but it has the authority to protect only military networks; the Department of Homeland Security jealously guards its prerogative to guard domestic civilian targets. Government agencies often don't share sensitive intelligence with companies, while many companies are reluc tant to report on penetrations of their networks; Google has been a rare exception.
A further difficulty is identifying exactly where cyberattacks originate and connecting them to their government sponsors. Predictably enough, the Chinese government aggressively denies any involvement in the attacks on U.S. agencies and companies - which makes it difficult for diplomats to pressure for a cease-fire. But an encouraging report in the Wor a cease-fire. But an encouraging report in the gence agencies had managed to identify many of the Chinese groups, and even individuals, involved in the cyberoffensive, including a dozen cells connected to the People's Liberation Army.
This should provide an opportunity for the Obama administration to more directly confront the problem. It should demand that Beijing shut down the military-backed groups; if it does not do so, they could be subjected to countermeasures, including sanctions against individuals. Congress could also consider legislation punishing companies connected to the Chinese military if the cyberwar does not cease.
