# State Talks Staffing Woes

Idaho trimmed 1,800 state jobs during the recession, putting pressure on existing workers to continue services. Those stresses are part of the reason for this year's push for pay increases.

BOISE • Idaho's budget-writing committee heard testimony Wednesday about the effects of recent years' budget cuts on a

dwindling state work force. Since 2008, Idaho has shed more than 1,800 state employees, Cathy Holland-Smith of Idaho's Legislative Services Office told the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee. Different agencies have different ways of counting employees, so it's hard to quantify exactly how many people the

state employs now, she said. One thing is certain: that number is a lot less than three years ago. And while state agencies have fewer employees, demand for their services hasn't decreased with the

The Department of Correction, for example, can't close prisons in response to budget cuts, furloughs and layoffs, she said. That department has seen a high rate of turnover, especially in its correctional officer ranks. But prisons can't empty out due to staff shortages.

"They don't get to close a prison ... if they have to take furloughs," she said.


And while many officers have had to work overtime to make up for the transitional work force, the state doesn't budget for overtime.

Because of wages that lag behind many other states, Idaho also has a hard time recruiting and retaining talent, said Bob Geddes of the Idaho State Tax Commission.

"The status quo is not stimulating or motivating," he said. He also pointed out that the state's benefits package isn't a selling point for recent college graduates.

"They're younger. They don't depend on medical benefits ... as much as we older employees do," he said. "Quite honestly, they're looking to build a resume rather than retirement."

# Sen. McGee Keeps Job as **GOP Caucus Chairman**

**BOISE** • Idaho Senate Republicans on Wednesday retained Sen. John McGee as caucus chairman, the fourth-highest ranking post in the GOP-controlled chamber.

Republican senators met privately in the state Capitol to determine whether McGee should keep the leadership position in the wake of his drunken driving arrest last year.

The closed session was the first chance for the Caldwell Republican to address his colleagues regarding the arrest and make a case to maintain his

Senate President Pro Tem Brent Hill, R-Rexburg, said the caucus supported a motion to retain McGee. Hill did not share the results of the vote.

"I'm confident we came out united;" Hill said after the meeting.

For McGee, 38, the outcome could

be a sign that the political free-fall that began with his Father's Day 2011 arrest has reached an end. Last summer, he pleaded guilty to drunken driving in a deal that erased accompanying auto theft charges. He served jail time and paid restitution for a stranger's vehicle that he damaged.

But because the Legislature was out, the start of the 2012 session marked the first chance to formally stand before his colleagues to seek a vote of confidence.

A day ahead of the caucus, McGee said, "I really messed up. I showed poor judgment. And I have only myself to blame. Now, I want to earn back trust and respect?"

McGee said senators shared with him disappointment in his behavior, but said before the meeting he was unaware of any challenges to his post, which he's held since last year.

# LUNA TWEET FALLS SHORT

But the state schools chief's claim of 100 percent college enrollment by 2011 Blaine County graduates isn't far off.

TWIN FALLS • After Idaho public schools chief Tom Luna visited Blaine County schools last month, he used social media sites to announce that each of the district's 2011 graduates went to college.

Close, but district officials say that claim isn't accurate. "I can understand how Tom Luna could have misconstrued the information," Superintendent Lonnie Barber

Luna met with school officials while he was in Sun Valley for Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter's December Capital for a Day event.

After hearing a presentation, he emailed Idaho State Department of Education spokeswoman Melissa McGrath with a statement about Blaine County college attendance, which she posted to his Twitter and Facebook pages.

"Congrats to the Blaine County School District; every one of students who graduated from high school last year went on the college," the post read.

# Murder Charge **Tossed for** Dec. Truck **Shooting**

Prosecutor says Michael Thompson will now be charged with involuntary manslaughter for the death of Michael Blair.

RUPERT Minidoka County magistrate judge tossed out the second-degree murder charge against Michael Jared Thompson during Wednesday

hearing, saying there's insufficient evidence to support the charge.

Thompson, 24, was arrested Dec. 17, after 21-year-old Burley resident Michael Kenneth Blair was found shot to death in the cab of Thompson's pickup shortly after midnight that day.

"If ever there was a case that failed to meet its burden, it's this case," Thompson's attorney, Keith Roark, said of the murder charge.

Minidoka County Prosecutor Lance Stevenson argued that all the elements necessary to prove the charge were present, including expressed and implied malice of forethought.

After hearing testimony from Kaylee Jones, a passenger in the truck along with Blair and Kristin Crull, 5th District Magistrate Judge Rick Bollar said the evidence didn't warrant advancing the case to district court. Bollar said Thompson would be released from jail, pending other

After the hearing, Stevenson announced plans to charge Thompson with involuntary manslaughter before he could be released.

Bollar said that evidence presented indicated that Thompson, who was driving the foursome to his home from a Paul bar, produced a handgun but pointed it only at the backseat of his truck, not at a person.

Jones testified that Thompson attempted to end "bickering and arguing" between Blair and Crull by saying, "If you don't shut up, I'm going to shoot one of you."

Jones, who sobbed periodically while testifying, said that Blair then said, "If you're going to shoot someone it might as well be me," and slid from his seat behind Thompson to the center of the seat, placing the gun's barrel in his mouth with his hands over Thompson's hand.

Jones said she turned her head to the side when the gun went off, then felt Blair's head fall into her lap. She added that immediately after the gun discharged, Thompson said Blair had pulled the trigger.

Jones told the court she was scared and left the truck, walking 4 miles to a truck stop before turning herself in at the Cassia County Sheriff's Office

The Minidoka County sheriff's detective who interviewed Thompson after his arrest also said he didn't believe Thompson intended to shoot

Roark said there were elements in the case - like Thompson carrying a concealed weapon — that may have been reckless and illegal. "But that doesn't make this murder."

# SUSPECT IN CHILD ABDUCTION ACCUSED OF USING STOLEN **CREDIT CARD**

TWIN FALLS • A man accused of being involved in the abduction of a 4year-old boy from his father's home arraigned

Wednesday in Twin Falls County 5th Dis-

trict Court on charges of forgery of a financial transaction card and grand theft of lost property.

Daniel D. Thomas, 35, of Buhl, was accused of using credit card belonging to a woman who accidently left it inan ATM inmid-October.

Thomas was connected to the credit card case following his arrest in late November in the child abduction case.

Thomas is accused of helping Stefanie Contreras enter the Pierce Street residence of her child's father on the morning of Nov. 30. Allegedly she entered to take her 4-year-old son, Brandon, while two other men - Thomas, who supposedly carried a pistol, and Kelvin Milo Jr. – accompanied her. Jason Bearce, the father, told police that when he went to confront Contreras in the living room, Thomas shot

in Twin Falls told police they recognized Thomas in sur-

veillance video of the ATM where the card was left from photographs published in the Times-Newsafter his arrest.

Police say the woman's credit card was used nine times and more

than \$1,200 was spent. One of the charges was for \$569.22 at the Twin Falls Walmart.

Police say Thomas was wearing an orange Texas Longhorns hat in surveillance videos from the credit union and Walmart. They said the hat was found in Thomas' property at the Twin Falls County Jail, where he is currently an in-

On Monday, Thomas pleaded guilty to being a felon in unlawful possession of a firearm in relation to the child abduction case. Prosecutors moved to drop related charges of conspiracy to commit child custody interference, burglary and aiding and abetting child custody interference.

Thomas is scheduled to be sentenced March 5 in the child abduction case. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for Jan. 20 in the new forgery and theft case.

# **Committee Considers Changes** to Define Land Board's Focus

BOISE • Idaho's Natural Resources Interim Committee discussed plan changes and legislation regarding controversial state-owned land on Wednesday.

Many of the language changes in the management plan serve to clarify the Idaho State Board of Land Commissioners' functions and priorities, said Department of Lands Director Tom Schultz.

In 2010, the land board bought Boise business Affordable Storage, a move that drew criticism from people concerned about the government competing with private storage businesses in Ada County.

A new section in the plan specifies that the land board will contract with private entities to operate business activities on state-owned assets. It also defines real estate as a broad cross-section of properties, including mining rights and water rights.

Another addition acknowledges the difficulties in assessing appropriate rental rates for the residential real estate that the land board leases. New phrases specify that the board needs to execute its Cottage Site Plan to maximize return for beneficiaries.

Throughout the plan, the word "grazing" was changed to "rangeland" to encompass all possible uses for that land, such as wind farms.

The committee also heard

legislation, co-sponsored by Rep. Grant Burgoyne, D-Boise, and Rep. John Vander Woude, R-Nampa, that would require the land board to lease or sell all non-agricultural improvements on state land to private persons, preventing the state from holding assets like Affordable Storage. The legislation strikes language allowing the board to hold proceeds from sales in a bank fund for up to five years.

Public testimony favored the proposed legislation. Rachel Gilbert of the Tax Accountability Committee expressed outrage that government is allowed to compete with private business, and voiced concern that the procurement of Affordable Storage was a bad invest-

### **Land Board** Overview

Idaho's Constitution establishes the Idaho State Board of Land Commissioners, which is tasked with managing the state's land endowments. Endowments include residential real estate, forest land and rangeland.

The constitution requires the land board to maximize the financial return of those assets for beneficiaries, which include Idaho public schools and the University of Idaho.

Members of the land board are the governor, the attorney general, the superintendent of public schools, the state controller and the secretary of state, as defined by the Constitution.

# **Local Counties Await FEMA Grants**

Funds for heating assistance and to fight homelessness have been delayed, leaving their intended recipients anxious.

GOODING • Linda Leguineche's last-minute excitement has turned into lingering concern.

As service director for Gooding County, Leguineche works to help provide residents with housing and heating assistance. When she first heard of an unexpected grant that could help her work, she jumped right into

"The money would go

straight into helping people in their homes," she said. "It's an important grant."

But though the county was supposed to receive \$2,800 by the end of December, Leguineche hasn't seen any of the money yet.

Leguineche is one of several frustrated county workers caught in a grant allocation nightmare. The grant is distributed through a food and shelter program under the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Federal appropriations fund the program, but when Congress decided to cut back on government spending, the program's budget was reduced by 40 percent. Additionally, because of a

stall in Congress, the funds weren't available until the end of 2011. This caused extra strain on the recipients because the grant's guidelines demanded the money be spent by Dec. 31, 2011.

All eight counties within south-central Idaho were awarded various amounts from the grant. Twin Falls County, with \$5,052, was given the largest amount.

Leanne Trappen, community services director for South Central Community Action Partnership, is the voluntary FEMA coordinator for Twin Falls, Cassia Jerome, Minidoka counties. She said she needs the money to help fund homelessness prevention.

"It's not a lot of money but it's still better than nothing," she said. "I've had to fight just to get half of our allotted amount."

Lincoln County is still anxiously waiting for its \$3,432, said Mary Davidson, the county's welfare director. The money is slotted to help fund the county's food bank.

"I don't know if we're ever going to get it at this point," she said.

local bank publication titled "A Balanced Man" to the photos of his wife and daughters near his desk, the four-term senator's office underscores the public image he's cultivated since his days as a junior staffer for then-U.S. Sen. Kempthorne in Washington

Now the marketing director for West Valley Medical Center in Caldwell, McGee is funny, goodlooking and ambitious, with a fast-track career that has included board of directors posts at his alma mater, the College of Idaho in Caldwell, the Special Olympics and the Canyon County Republican Party – all positions bestowed ordinarily upon someone much older.

That image was damaged the night of June 19, when McGee began drinking at a Boise golf tournament. McGee says he largely blacked out and simply doesn't remember the details of what happened next. According to police,

McGee took a Ford Excursion and cargo trailer from the southwest Boise home of a "complete stranger" and got it stuck in a yard. A breath test showed McGee's blood-alcohol content at nearly twice the legal limit. In 4th District Court in

Boise on July 1, McGee's lawyer, Scott McKay, told a judge there was a medical explanation: The young senator had too much to drink, had fallen and - according to a respected neurologist - sustained a concussion prior to the events leading to his arrest. That accounted for his erratic behavior, McKay suggested.

But Ada County sheriff's officials said they would have provided appropriate treatment for a suspected concussion, not only for an inmate's welfare, but also to protect the law enforcement agency from liability.

No such concerns emerged while McGee was behind bars.

The Legislature hasn't granted a CEC, or change in employee compensation, for state employees since fiscal 2009. The Department of Human Resources proposed a percent meritbased increase in each agency's personnel budget for fiscal 2013.

In his State of the State address, Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter proposed a 3 percent CEC, contingent upon the state meeting its revenue projections, for a total of \$41 million.

"It was a little rough, but we made it through just fine," Matthew Robert Williams said Wednesday.

The 29-year-old Williams and his daughter, Taylor, spent nearly a day in the Minidoka County desert after Williams' truck got a flat tire Jan. 5 on the Carey-Kimama Desert Road. After they were located, the man and his 4-year-old

daughter were taken to the Laidlaw airstrip, about 20 miles north of Rupert, and flown to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center in Twin Falls.

Williams said both he and his daughter were examined and released from the hospital on Friday.

"We didn't really even need to go to the hospital," he said.

The pair had walked nearly a dozen miles before they were located.

According to the Minidoka County sheriff's incident report, the pair left their stranded truck in hopes of making it to a main road and cellphone service so Williams could alert his wife,

Mandi, to their predicament.

Mandi and her father-in-law went to the area, but sought sheriff's assistance after they were unsuccessful in finding

Williams and his daughter had warm clothing but lacked food, water or matches to build a fire. Williams said they settled down into some rocks to spend the night. "I knew where we were at; it

was just hard trying to tell someone else where we were," Williams said.

According to the sheriff's report, more than 50 people scoured the desert from the air and on the ground until the man and child were located at about 4:30 p.m. Friday.

"I just really want to thank the search and rescue people and all those who helped out," Williams said.

17 of 18 graduates two years ago went to college. Last year, all but three did.

In the future, the district plans to ask school counselors to reach out to families in order to get more accurate numbers of how many students actually enroll at a college or university. "The problem with that is

they're hard to track when they leave here," Barber said. Like in many school dis-

tricts, Barber said, the focus has shifted over the years from making sure students graduate to preparing them for higher education.

College is a topic that comes up in classrooms as early as elementary school. In Carey, students in third grade and up visit a different college every year. Thirdgraders in Bellevue have also taken tours of the College of Southern Idaho's Hailey campus.

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# BUHL SEEKS TO CURB TRAFFIC AROUND RANGEN

BUHL • Motor vehicle traffic will still be allowed to traverse the city streets around Rangen Inc. in Buhl, but drivers will be warned those streets are primarily used for

industrial purposes.
Rangens, which manufactures and ships a variety of feedstock worldwide, has a sprawling complex intersected by several city streets, including the intersection of 12th Ave South and Walnut Street.

During Monday's council meeting, Mayor Tom Mc-Cauley said that over the years as the business has grown, so has its industrial traffic needs.

He suggested a "visual attempt" was necessary to keep people from the area, although people can't be barred from travelling the city streets and the city will still be responsible for street maintenance and upkeep.

Crash Cleanup

Signs and painting on the road will be designed in tandem by Rangen and the city. Any cost incurred will be picked up by the company to make sure "Joe Blow ... goes the other way," McCauley said.

Councilman Kyle Hauser agreed with the partnership with the company, saying, "I think it's a good idea."

The council voted unanimously to support the initiative. The city will meet with company representatives, who attended Monday's meeting, to discuss the next steps.

In other business, the city has agreed to extend its contract with Armstrong Consultants, an airport engineering and planning firm from Grand Junction, Colo., for another five years.

Buhl Airport Advisory Board Chairman Neil Ring said the firm has provided services for the Buhl Regional Airport the past 10 years — helping it find

grants, plan facilities improvements and keep it in compliance with Federal Aviation Administration guidelines.

Ring said the FAA suggests municipalities review and renew their consulting contracts every five years. Two companies, including Riedesel Engineers of Twin Falls, went through the entire application process but Ring said the airport board wanted to keep Armstrong.

As the airport liaison, Councilman Bob Linderman said the advisory board expressed overwhelming faith in Armstrong's ability to serve the airport and city.

"They've always been very good about staying on top of any monies that may become available and are just great to work with," Linderman said in a later interview.

The company isn't paid a retainer but compensated on a per-project basis, Linderman said.

In a video released by police, a subject dressed in black pants and a black hooded sweatshirt empties the contents of the safe into what appears to be a black duffel bag.



# New Kimberly Council Confronted with Possible Sewer Dilemma

KIMBERLY • A new mayor and two City Council members had barely taken office Tuesday night in Kimberly when they were asked to approve a major sewer study.

Tracy Armstrong, who defeated incumbent David Overacre in the November election, was sworn in as mayor.

New council members Connie Sowka and Jim Eisenhower began fouryear terms. They replace departing council members Mitzi Cheldelin and Lee McKinlay.

"My advice to the new council would be to vote your conscience and do the best you can," Cheldelin said before giving up her seat on the panel.

Kimberly council members haven't always agreed on things the past few years, but they've respected each others' opinions, Overacre said before giving up the gavel to Armstrong.

One of the first issues the new council will have to tackle this year is a new wastewater agreement with neighboring Twin Falls.

All of Kimberly's sewage is piped to Twin Falls where it's treated before being discharged to the Snake River.

Twin Falls officials want to revise the Kimberly contract, which hasn't been updated since 1987.

As Kimberly has grown, its wastewater flows have increased, and now it's coming close to exceeding some of the limits on total suspended solids and biological oxygen demand stipulated in the existing agreement.

Kimberly could be required to help pay for an upgrade to the Twin Falls wastewater treatment plant or to the main sewer line to

the plant as part of a new contract.

The city could also look at building its own wastewater treatment plant or teaming up with Hansen to build a regional plant.

Kimberly City Engineer Tracy Ahrens told the council that a regional wastewater treatment plant probably wouldn't be costeffective and would likely benefit Hansen more than Kimberly.

"Building a treatment plant comes with a lot of headaches," he said.

Ahrens asked the council to authorize a \$90,000 wastewater study to evaluate current flows and future needs. After much discussion, the issue was tabled in order to give council members time to do some research.

A study of the feasibility of building a regional Kimberly-Hansen wastewater treatment plant is already under way, thanks to a \$40,000 state grant.

Some council members said they would like to see the results of that study before authorizing an independent study for Kimberly.

Public Works Director Rob Wright told the council that a regional wastewater treatment plant might be worth exploring.

"I'm not opposed to it," he said. "But there are obviously a lot of logistics that would have to be worked

Kimberly can't attract any new industries that discharge large amounts of wastewater, such as a dairy processing plant, without an increase in capacity, Wright said.

"Right now we don't want to accept any wet industries," he said. "Dry industries with minimal amounts of sewer discharges, we're fine. There's probably some room (for growth) there."

Kevin Butikofer, 28, pleaded guilty in October to one count sexual exploitation of a child and one count of injury to a child.

He was sentenced Monday in Jerome County 5th District Court to serve three years fixed with the possibility of seven more years in prison for each count. The sentences will run consecutively, so Butikofer will serve a minimum of six years.

Butikofer's sentence will run concurrently to a 2007 Bingham County grand theft charge.

Five counts of lewd conduct with a child under 16, one count of sexual abuse of a child and one count of destruction of telecommunications equipment were dropped by the prosecutor. Butikofer was credited 328 days for time served.

Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies responded Tuesday to a call about a burglary in progress at a home to the south of Murtaugh Lake. A man told police that another man in cargo shorts came to his door at about 1 p.m., asking to come in out of the cold and saying God told him to tell the man about lesus

When the man refused to let his caller, who turned out to be Benjamin Rodney Wherry of Murtaugh, inside, he reportedly watched Wherry walk to a neighbor's house and enter through a back door.

Deputies say they arrived to find Wherry, 26, inside with an Altoids mints tin in his pocket. The tin was empty except for a white powdery residue the deputies describe as not smelling like

According to court documents Wherry, who was not carrying identification, avoided police questions and continued to ask if they knew Jesus.

Wherry was placed in protective custody when the deputies became concerned for his safety and was transported to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center in Twin Falls.

At the hospital, deputies say Wherry finally told them he thought his name might be Ben and he might know his birthday.

A blood test allegedly revealed Wherry had amphetamines in his system. Deputies say they tested the residue from the Altoids tin and it tested positive for methamphetamine

Wherry was arraigned Wednesday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on a charge of possession of a controlled substance. His preliminary hearing is scheduled for Jan. 20.

# LexisNexis Creator, 86, Dies

**NEW YORK (AP)** • Jerome Rubin, who helped bring to market the commercial online database known as LexisNexis and the display technology behind millions of Amazon Kindles and other e-readers, has died in New York. He was 86.

Cornell Medical Center in Manhattan on Monday.

Rubin was trained as a physicist and attorney, but in the 1970s was hired to make commercially viable what was then a novel product - a computer database of state case law. Launched in 1973, Lexis was joined a few years later by its online cousin Nexis.

MOSCOW • Gevork Vartanian, a former Soviet intelligence agent who helped derail a Nazi plot to assassinate allied leaders at a 1943 conference in Tehran, has died. He was 87.

Russia's Foreign Intelligence Service, a top KGB successor agency, said Vartanian died of an unspecified illness Tuesday.

President Dmitry Medvedev sent condolences to Vartanian's widow, Goar, who worked together with him on intelligence missions abroad and helped cement their fame as a legendary spy couple.

Medvedev praised Vartanian on Wednesday as a legendary figure who participated in "brilliant special operations which became part of history of the nation's foreign intelligence."

The Foreign Intelligence Service said Vartanian, whose father was a Soviet intelligence agent in Tehran posing as a merchant, began working for Soviet intelligence when he turned 16. He played a role in foiling a Nazi plot to assassinate Soviet leader Josef Stalin, U.S. President Franklin D. Roosevelt and British Prime Minister Winston Churchill when they held a conference in Tehran in November 1943.

Adolf Hitler ordered operation "Long Jump" after the Nazi intelligence learned of the conference. Vartanian's group shadowed an advance team of Nazi agents, who arrived to set the ground for the mission, helping uncover the plot.

The Foreign Intelligence Service, which goes under its Russian acronym SVR, said that acting on orders from Moscow, Vartanian also joined a British intelligence school in Tehran and obtained information about its graduates sent to the Soviet Union, allowing Soviet authorities to catch them.

The SVR said Vartanian and his wife worked as intelligence agents in several countries between the 1950s and 1986, but didn't name them. They got married several times in different places as part of their cover.

The ITAR-Tass news agency said they worked in Iran, Italy, France and Greece among other na-

Vartanian received the highest Soviet award, the Hero of the Soviet Union medal. After retiring in 1992, Vartanian helped train young intelligence agents, the SVR said. Vartanian's wife also has been honored with medals.

Funeral plans weren't immediately available.

# Time to Run a 'Tebow' Media Option Play

ven fair-minded liberals, of which there must be a few, should acknowledge that the Saturday-Sunday "blitz" of the Republican presidential candidates by ABC and NBC correspondents looked like a play designed by the left wing of the Democratic Party.

Clearly the questions by ABC's George Stephanopoulos and Diane Sawyer about contraception and same-sex



marriage were asked to trap the GOP candidates into delivering sound bites that the Obama re-election campaign could use against the eventual nominee and the party at large. These were the types of ac-

cusatory questions that would never be asked of a Democratic president. One would not expect to hear, for example, a question like this to President Obama: "Mr. President, millions of babies have been legally aborted in this country since 1973; how can you so callously dismiss unborn children, many of whom would now be productive, taxpaying citizens, by taking a pro-choice stance on abortion?"

This is how it works: if you are a journalist who clearly favors the re-election of President Obama, you ask questions of Republicans in an effort to make them look foolish, forcing them to address subjects other than the economy and threats to national security. When you question Democrats, you ask questions people care most about and usually allow the answer, however inaccurate, to go unchallenged.

During last Sunday's NBC News/Facebook debate on "Meet the Press," the conservative Media Research Center (mrc.org) found that, "Out of the 41 questions directed to the six Republican presidential candidates..., 25 of them were from the left, 13 questions were neutral, mainly about the campaign horse race and electability, and only three questions pressed the candidates from the right."

On "60 Minutes" last month, correspondent Steve Kroft delivered this fat softball to President Obama: "Since the midterm elections, you made an effort at bipartisanship. It hasn't worked out that way. ... You gave up a lot. You said you wanted a balanced approach. You didn't get it. You cut a trillion dollars and set up the framework to cut another trillion plus, and the Republicans gave up nothing. I mean, there are people in your own party who think that you were outmaneuvered, that you were stared down by John Boehner and Grover Norquist and capitulated. ... It seems to be all the compromising is being done by you..."

And so it goes in every modern election cycle. To the mainstream media, Republicans are pigheaded and unwilling to compromise with a Democratic president (or a Democratic Congress). That's because in media-land, only Democrats want what is best for "real Americans." Get it? MSNBC has apparently suspended conservative Pat Buchanan because that network doesn't like his "biases," but Democratic biases are just fine with management.

None of this will change as long as liberals continue to dominate major media.

Instead of complaining, which changes nothing, Republicans should run the equivalent of a Tebow option play. They should refuse to participate in any more dogand-pony shows designed to trip them up. Instead, they should create their own panels with an ideological mix of interrogators.

Invite a couple of "wild card" conservative partisans like Rush Limbaugh or Sean Hannity to add to the journalistic mix. If the "Miss America" contest could invite Limbaugh as a judge in 2010, why can't the Republican presidential candidates invite him, or Hannity, to judge and question them? The ratings would be huge and the public would get better answers to more substantive questions than the "gotcha" questions they must now endure.

Perhaps it's too late for this election cycle, but maybe not. All it would take is one such event and the public will instantly see what it's been missing. After that there would likely be no turning back.



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# A \$%& Good Reason to Curse

The following editorial appeared in the Chicago Tribune on Tuesday:

oday the *Chicago Tribune* editorial
page endorses
swearing. Loudly.
(We endorse swearing loudly, that is; our endorsement
itself is sotto voce.)

Oops. Sorry, we forgot to mention one condition: Go ahead and scream that curse ... to relieve physical pain.

British researchers report in the *Journal of Pain* (no, we didn't make that up) that cursing can help many people better tolerate pain. Doctors call it "stress-induced analgesia."

The researchers at Keele

University in England asked subjects to submerge their hands in ice water. Those who swore repeatedly were able to keep their hands in the water for an average of 40 seconds longer than those who merely shouted a non-swear word, the study found.

So why does profanity work better than "fudge"? Possibly by provoking an emotional response — aggression, fear or anger that helps mask or mute pain:

"Our hypothesis is that by swearing, the speaker experiences an emotional response due to breaking a taboo, and the emotional response is sufficient to set off the fight or flight response, which includes an adrenaline surge, increased heart rate and increased pain tolerance," the lead researcher, psychology lecturer Richard Stephens, tells us.

This is great news. The next time your big toe unexpectedly meets the doorjamb, or you slice your finger instead of the bagel, research suggests you've got a fine excuse to blurt out a familiar four-letter word that is not ouch.

But here's the latest twist in the research: Those who curse often and regularly — 60 times a day, as described by researchers — don't get as much pain relief benefit.

About those people curs-

ing more than 60 times a day ... Sure, the modern newsroom is not a hushed cathedral of politesse. But we're also mindful that profanity, like flattery, loses its potency after repeated use. In a 2006 Associated

Press-Ipsos poll, about two-thirds of respondents said they think people curse more today than they did 20 years ago. (Maybe they're just watching too much "Dexter," featuring the exuberantly foul-mouthed Lt. Debra Morgan.)

Swearing a lot is like smoking: You may think it's cool, but it's not. Those who relish a carefully crafted expletive know that less is more.

# **Teacher Evaluations** to Include Parent Input

**BOISE** • At least half of an Idaho teacher's job evaluation will be based on student achievement starting July 1, and what parents think should start counting then too, the state Department of Education said Wednesday while clarifying a timeline for the

new changes. Under a plan by public schools chief Tom Luna, at least half of all Idaho teaching evaluations performed after June 30 will be tied to the academic performance of students. But to some, the law was unclear as to when exactly parents become involved.

The state Department of Education asked lawmakers to further clarify when parental involvement will factor into the evaluations of educators and school administrators.

Lawmakers on the Senate Education Committee voted Wednesday to introduce a bill that says parental input also comes into play on the evaluations after June 30, though just how big a role moms and dads will have in grading their child's educators will be decided by school districts at the local level.

"It's really up to the districts to decide how to incorporate that and how much weighing to give it? said Jason Hancock, who serves as Luna's deputy chief of staff.

Senate Education Committee Chairman John Goedde, R-Coeur d'Alene, said he would try to hold a hearing on the legislation Monday.

Parents across Idaho will have a role in grading the job performance of teachers and in whether an educator gets a raise, as part of a sweeping education overhaul that was approved during the 2011 Idaho Legislature.

School districts and public charter schools were required to develop merit pay plans that could be based on a variety of factors, including improved test scores and attendance rates. At least 29 school districts statewide developed teacher payfor-performance plans based, at least in part, on parental involvement.

Some critics of Luna's education changes have questioned the larger role for parents, saying their involvement might be outside the control of teachers.

### Man's Sentence Suspended for **Ketchum Fire**

KETCHUM (AP) · A Hailey-area construction contractor has been given an 11-year suspended prison sentence and fined \$2,000 after pleading guilty to setting a fire after an argument with his wife, causing an estimated \$400,000 in damage to the house he built.

The Idaho Mountain Express reports 5th District Judge Robert J. Elgee also sentenced 43-yearold Patrick S. Busby to continue psychiatric counseling and treatment for alcoholism.

Busby pleaded guilty to first-degree arson in November for the May 7 fire.

Prosecutors allege Busby was trying to hurt his family and argued Monday for a six-month jail sentence, but defense attorney Keith Roark argued Busby was trying to harm himself.

Busby's wife and daughter sent letters to the court asking that he not be sentenced to prison. His wife filed for divorce in June

# Grocers Mull Idaho Liquor Privatization

**BOISE** • A grocery industry lobbyist met with Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter and other officials last month over mounting a campaign to privatize Idaho's state-controlled liquor sales, as retailers like Costco Wholesale Corp. hope privatization success in neighboring Washington late last year will spread elsewhere.

Northwest Grocery Association President Joe Gilliam met with Otter staff, as well as Secretary of State Ben Ysursa, on Dec. 20 to learn how to get a voter initiative on next November's ballot. Gilliam must collect 47,432 registered voter signatures by April 30.

That tight deadline means a wellfunded campaign is necessary, because proponents would likely need paid signature gatherers. Retailers like Costco, which committed \$22 million for Washington's measure, see untapped profits from states like Idaho that now sell liquor via highly regulated state stores.

"It was a meet and greet procedure," Ysursa said on Wednesday, of his meeting with Gilliam. "They wanted to know the procedure, how it gets on the ballot, the deadlines."

Idaho is among 18 states that still have broad control over liquor distribution, a historical legacy with roots back to the repeal of prohibition.

In January 2011, Otter went on the record as saying he thinks liquor sales is one area of commerce where he thinks the state has an appropriate role to play. That's because of the state Constitution's requirement that Idaho should promote temperance. "The first concern of all good government is the virtue and sobriety of the people," according to the 1890 Constitu-

The Republican governor says he hasn't changed his mind.

"I just don't think Idaho is the environment where that's going to find a soft landing," Otter said.

Some lawmakers also wonder why a change is needed.

"There's nothing wrong with the system we have now;' said House Majority Leader Mike Moyle. "If it isn't broke, don't fix it?'

In Washington, 60 percent of voters in November supported a plan to privatize liquor sales and dismantle controls that have been in place since Prohibition, in a campaign that was the costliest in state history with Costco's contribution. The measure would allow stores larger than 10,000 square feet to sell liquor.

Gilliam, whose group has also been in talks in Oregon over a similar push, didn't return a phone call seeking

But his Idaho lobbyist, Roy Eiguren, said one of the key reasons to push for privatization in Idaho was philosoph-

"There is a fundamental question about whether the state wants to be involved in a private-enterprise function," Eiguren said, adding he thinks private companies like Costco would do a better job at running liquor sales, potentially boosting revenue for beneficiaries that include Idaho cities, counties and courts.

Eiguren said the grocer group plans to decide within 10 days whether or not to press on with the initiative this

Idaho posted a \$50.1 million profit from liquor sales in fiscal year 2011 that ended in July, as people paid more per bottle and as the agency that sells booze to Idaho trimmed staff.

In Washington state, wholesalers provided much of the opposition funding, as retailers will now be able to bypass them and buy product directly from producers.

Idaho foes are already organizing, led in part by the Idaho Beer & Wine

Distributors Association, whose products are sold through grocery

Jeremy Pisca, the group's lobbyist, contends adopting something akin to what Washington voters approved would throw the industry into turmoil and potentially upset the careful balance Idaho has struck with regulating a product that Idaho's founders concluded was a threat to the moral stability of residents.

"They'll sell it to you as privatization, but really, this is deregulation," Pisca said. "Liquor is a product that needs to be regulated. If consumed irresponsibly, it can have serious consequences."

The question of privatizing Idaho's liquor stores isn't new.

Last year, a state agency, the Office of Performance Evaluations, scrutinized how Idaho could boost profits from its liquor business and what the impact of privatization would be. Auditors didn't predict significant new revenue to Idaho with such a move.

"We estimate that completely converting the state to a private system and establishing a liquor tax could generate about the same amount of revenue each year as the state currently receives," they wrote in their Jan. 31, 2011 report.

The Moscow-Pullman Daily News reports Jesse Hewes was sentenced Monday to 12 years in prison – two to 10 years for the manslaughter charge and two for

aggravated drunken driving.

Second District Judge John Stegner said Hewes would be eligible for parole after serving two

Prosecutors alleged Hewes was speeding with a blood-alcohol level of twice the legal limit in November 2010 when he failed to negotiate a curve on Highway 6 near Potlatch.

The crash killed 22-year-old Therra Alexander.

# Idaho Gas Prices Set Record

BOISE • You paid more on average for a gallon of gas in Idaho in 2011 than ever before, according to AAA Idaho.

Gas prices averaged \$3.49 a gallon last year, breaking the previous record of \$3.29 in 2008 when gas spiked briefly to \$4.16, said Dave Carlson, AAA Idaho governmental affairs di-

Idaho's average prices was two cents lower than the U.S. national av-

The price means a motorist driving 12,000 miles and getting 20 miles to the gallon paid \$2,040 for gas last

year, up \$294 from the previous year, Carlson said.

Idahoans were whipsawed by prices in 2011. They started the year at \$2.90. shot to \$3.78 in spring them moderated to \$3.07 by year's end.

Carlson expects more erratic prices in 2012, fed by fears over scarcity of oil supplies if Iran makes good on its threat to close the Strait of Hormuz and if demand from emerging counties such as China and India continues to grow.

Fluctuating prices could also come from the European monetary crisis which sends markets up and down, depending on the news, Carlson said.

## **Tech Classes** Put Idaho Falls Graduates in Fast Lane

**IDAHO FALLS** • When senior Branden Young graduates from Idaho Falls High School later this year, he plans to be well ahead of his peers heading into college.

The 17-year-old is enrolled in AUTO III, an automotive course through the Eastern Idaho Professional-Technical High School, earning dual high school and college credit.

The course has helped Young get closer to his goal of ASE mechanic certification.

"I've always liked automotive, and I wanted to get somewhere with it," "This said. (course) looks great on my record and prepares (me) to go to college."

Automotive instructor Colby Park said Young is gaining a detailed knowledge of vehicles that is far greater than that of most incoming college fresh-

"This gives students such a huge head start, regardless of the college they go to," Park said. "They'll be so far ahead of the curve (compared to) students that just walk in."

Park, an instructor at Eastern Idaho Technical College, also teaches automotive courses for the professional-technical high

As many as 300 students enroll at the professional-technical school each year, taking courses ranging from emergency medical technician training to botany and horticulture.

Young's experience is typical for many students, professional-technical high school coordinator Bobbi Crosser said.

What is not typical is how the school is set up.

The Eastern Idaho Professional-Technical High School is made up of a consortium of schools from Idaho Falls School District 91, Bonneville Joint School District 93, Ririe Joint School District 252, Shelley Joint School District 60, Firth School District 59 and

The school has no centralized location. Classes are taught at high schools in and around Idaho Falls by teachers employed at participating districts.

Students from each district can enroll in courses and are bused between

Districts receive a lot of benefits by combining re-

"By the time students (at each high school) reach their senior year, there may only be five or 10 students taking these advanced classes," Crosser said. "The advantage is that all of the districts can send these kids to one teacher and

have a full class." A full class makes the professional-technical high school eligible to receive additional funding from the Idaho Professional-Technical Education Department. Funds are used to create further courses for students.

# Proposed Law Takes Aim at Smuggling of Cellphones, Cigarettes into Prisons

Idaho Department of Correction says cellphones have been found hidden in packets of dried ramen noodles and hollowed-out Bibles.

**BOISE** • A key state Senate committee voted unanimously Wednesday to introduce legislation that would make it a felony to smuggle cellphones and cigarettes into Ida-

ho prisons after authorities said

such contraband demands huge

prices on the black market.

Idaho Department of Correction officials requested the action at a hearing of the Judiciary and Rules Committee, saying cellphones are the most sought-after contraband behind bars. A basic disposable phone can sell for about \$400, according to the department, while a smartphone with Internet access goes for \$1,200.

Tim Higgins, deputy warden of

virtual prisons, said Idaho inmates have used cellphones to direct drug trafficking operations, intimidate witnesses, plan escapes and set up retaliation beatings against inmates in other penitentiaries.

According to the department, a can of chewing tobacco that would cost about a dollar at a store goes for as much as \$20 inside Idaho's medium- and minimum-security pris-

Inside a maximum security prison, the same can commands a price of about \$40. Inmates pay between \$5 and \$10 for one cigarette.

The high prices can mean major debt for inmates who use. Department officials told the committee that families of inmates are sometimes forced to pay the debts to keep their loved ones from being beaten.

Cellphones have been found hidden inside packets of dried ramen noodles and in hollowed-out Bibles, according to the department.

Under current Idaho law, bringing contraband into a prison is generally considered a misdemeanor, punishable by no more than 6 months in jail or a fine of less than \$1,000.

# Feds Order Closure of Lucky Friday Mine in Wake of Accidents

Company says more than 200 people will lose high-paying jobs in the depressed Silver Valley region.

**COEUR D'ALENE** • Federal safety inspectors have ordered one of the nation's deepest underground mines closed in northern Idaho following an investigation prompted by a series of accidents that killed two miners over the last year.

The Lucky Friday Mine, one of the nation's top silver producers, may remain closed for a year after inspectors determined that sand and concrete material that had leaked from a pipe into a mine shaft over the years needed to be removed.

The material is in the mile-deep Silver Shaft, the mine's main access shaft,

and workers will spend the next year essentially power washing the material from

the walls of the shaft. More than 200 people will lose high-paying jobs in the depressed Silver Valley region, and many will likely seek work elsewhere, said Phil Baker, chairman and chief executive of Hecla Mining Co.

"We are confident the employees will ultimately come back to work for us at the Lucky Friday," Baker said at a news conference at company headquarters.

The closure prompted Hecla to reduce its estimated silver production for 2012 from more than 9 million ounces to about 7 million ounces, all from its remaining Green's Creek mine in Alaska.

The Mine Safety and

Health Administration's closure order was initially issued Jan. 5, but company officials said Wednesday they had been negotiating for several days with federal regulators before resigning themselves late Tuesday to the lengthy shutdown.

The news caused the stock price of Hecla Mining to tumble 21 percent on the New York Stock Exchange on Wednesday, down \$1.23 to \$4.61 per share.

About 275 people work at the mine, and about 185 of those employees will be laid off because of the closure, Baker said. The closure will also put another 50 to 100 contract workers out of a job, Baker said.

Miners average about \$100,000 per year in pay and benefits in a region where there are few other job options.

Production is expected to

resume in early 2013.

The mine has been shuttered since mid-December, when a rock burst injured seven miners.

Federal regulators since then have been conducting a close inspection of the mine because of the series of 2011 accidents. They decided they wanted the sand and concrete material removed because it can break off and fall down the shaft, injuring people or damaging the elevators.

The material federal regulators want removed isn't related to the December rock burst or any of the other accidents at the mine, Baker said.

"While we are disappointed with this order and are considering what action we might take, work has already begun to resume production as quickly as possible," he said.

There are two entrances to the Lucky Friday, but both must be functioning in order for the mine to produce ore, Baker said.

Last month's rock burst was the latest in a string of incidents at the mine, which is about 50 miles east of Coeur d'Alene, where the company is based.

Miner Brandon Lloyd Gray, 26, was buried in rubble while trying to dislodge jammed rock on Nov. 17, and died two days later. On April 15, miner Larry "Pete" Marek was crushed when his work area collapsed. Federal inspectors found company safety failures led to his death.

Before last year, the mine had gone 25 years without a fatality.

# Domestic Violence Deaths Prompt Audit of Law Enforcement in Bannock County

POCATELLO (AP) · A county in southeastern Idaho is performing an audit to determine how well authorities are responding to reports of domestic violence after several deaths were reported in the region last

Of the 17 Idaho deaths that were related to domestic violence in 2011, about half of those fatal incidents were reported in the southeastern corner of the state, where Bannock County

commissioners consented

to the audit in December. The review started this month and will look at how county agencies coordinate and respond to reports of domestic violence. The audit was prompted by the high levels of domestic violence reported in the region, said Danika Chapple, a domestic violence coordinator in Idaho's 6th District Court

system. The review will evaluate agencies that respond to reports of domestic violence and identify any gaps in those efforts, including how they ensure the safety of the alleged victim and hold the suspected offender accountable, Chapple said.

"Interacting with those different key players is going to be important to see what we could be doing differently, or in addition to, or one more check box that we can do that's going to help them in the next stage of the game," Chapple said.

# Caldwell Eye Doc Accused of More Than \$1M in Fraud

**BOISE** • A federal grand jury said Tuesday a 59-yearold Caldwell-based optometrist filed a series of bogus insurance claims with the government and private insurance companies totaling more than \$1 million

since 1993. Christopher Card, who used to work at Total Vision

clinic in Caldwell, could be sent to a federal prison for up to 10 years if found guilty of execution of a scheme to defraud a health care benefit program.

Clinic officials said Wednesday that Card retired from the practice in 2010, even though court records indicate Card is still licensed to practice optometry in Idaho.

The grand jury found evidence that Card defrauded Idaho Medicaid, Medicare, Blue Cross of Idaho, Regence Blue/Shield of Idaho, and the Rail Road Retirement Board of more than \$1 million between 1993 to 2010 by submitting "material false, fraudulent, and fictitious claims for reimbursement" to those pro-

# STEELHEAD SAVVY

### Steelhead anglers give tips on what to use to catch fish this spring.

TWIN FALLS • It's been an unusual winter as far as ice fishing is concerned: There aren't many places to set up a shanty this season. But that doesn't mean there aren't opportunities to fish.

Idaho's spring steelhead season kicked off Jan. 1 in many parts of the Clearwater, Salmon and Snake rivers. If you've never caught one of these oversized trout, now is the time to try your luck. The season won't end until March 31 in some places, and April or May in others.

Head north to the Clearwater River if you want bigger fish, said Joe DuPont, fish manager for the Clearwater region of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

"It's been good for the most part," he said, noting that fish in the river are likely to be caught in the 12-pound range, compared with 5pounders elsewhere.

To make sure you get off to a good start this season, here are tips from those in the know about the best rods, reel, tackle and gear to increase the chance of success. And, of course, some pointers for



your time on the water.

**Getting Started** 

Steelhead fishing isn't for everyone - er, it's not something you can pick up in a day. DuPont said he spent several years learning before he became proficient.

"You've got to put your time in," he said. "Go with someone who fishes for them, or talk with someone. I remember the first time I started to fish for steelhead. Now

"You want to fish where the fish are," DuPont said.

### Better Rods

DuPont likes fast-action rods be-

cause they are more sensitive. But if you're jig fishing or using a bobber, a sensitive rod has little value because detection of fish is the jig

But rods make all the difference when you're bait fishing or fly casting. Angler Garth York, fishing manager at Sportsman's Warehouse in Twin Falls, recommends an 8-weight rod setup.

"That is probably what we suggest," he said. "We've got a large variety of steelhead rods?

### Reels and Line

A reel isn't as important as what you put on it, DuPont said, except that a good reel helps you be able to cast farther. For fly rods, all a reel

does is hold your line. One of the best lines to use is Maxima Ultragreen; a 220-yard spool sells for \$12.99, York said.



# &A: Ducks Unlimited Tells Its Story in New Book

GRAND FORKS, N.D. • Ducks Unlimited marks its 75th anniversary this year, and the conservation group is commemorating the milestone with the release of "The Ducks Unlimited Sto-

Written by Duluth, Minn., author and photographer Michael Furtman, 57, the 200-page hardcover book tells the story of how a small group of avid waterfowl hunters in 1937 decided to take action to restore waterfowl populations devastated by drought and wetland loss.

That early effort blossomed into one of the most successful conservation organizations in history.

Grand Forks Herald out doors writer Brad Dokken interviewed Furtman about the book and the Ducks Unlimited story. Here's an edited version of that conversa-


QUESTION: How did your involvement with this book come about?

**ANSWER:** They actually approached me. They knew they were going to do a 75th anniversary book and had a list of writers they thought could handle it. I don't know if I was the last guy they called or the first guy. I immediately jumped on the chance.

Q: With a project like this, where do you begin?

A: They had cobbled together a pretty basic outline before I met with them and when I flew to Memphis (Ducks Unlimited headquarters), we had a discussion and conference call with members of the 75th anniversary committee, which went on for, like, two hours. And it's a bit of a funny story because when we got done, if you read the preface of the book, I was like a deer in the highlights. All these guys had different ideas of where this book was going to go, and I threw up my arms and said, "I can't work with a dozen different bosses. This isn't going to work with me. Why don't you find someone else?" They said "No, no, no. We want you to write the

tailed outline before I left and determined I would only deal with the editor. It ended up working out really well. There were months and months of research before I started writing.

Q: How did you decide what to leave out of the

A: That was a big concern to me. I mostly wanted to focus on how the organization continued to reinvent itself over the decades as conditions changed and as the priorities changed. Every step of the way they had to kind of reshape the organization without losing the vision of their primary goal.

Q: What did you learn about DU that you didn't previously know during the process of writing this book?

**A:** I've been a member for a long time, so I was pretty familiar with the history, and I've written about waterfowl forever; it's a passion of mine. But I do think the one that strikes me, something I've learned, is just how visionary the founders were. Nobody had ever conceived of working on habitat on such a massive scale before\_ no one. The first aerial surveys of the Prairie Pothole Region were done by DU. The vision and the science both started right at the very beginning. It was not a byguess-and-by-golly operation, and that's pretty much a constant theme all the way through their entire history. It's all science-based.

Q: Are you happy with the

A: I am. I think it's a compelling story. Although I had no involvement in the actual design, I'm really pleased with the efforts of the people at national headquarters that designed the book.

Q: 75 years is a long time for any organization. As someone who's researched the group, why do you think DU has been so successful?

**A:** There's multiple reasons. One is just the passion of the individual members, the volunteers. Without all these local chapters and the passion of those people, the organization would fail. I think two is consistently great leadership down through the decades all the way from the beginning. You have this group of professionals who have the vision and the organization to pull off the habitat work, and then you have this army of just ordinary men and women who are willing to raise the funds and funnel all that fuel to the engine to do the job.

Q: One thing that strikes me about DU is their work isn't something that's happening elsewhere. It's happening right here in North Dakota and Minnesota.

**A:** It really is. Of course, that wasn't always the case. Until the '80s, all of DU's work was in Canada but eventually, it shifted south of the border as it became more and more clear that habitat issues in the U.S. were also restricting duck production. DU has impacted more land across the continent than any other single organization and probably more than all the organizations combined.

Q: The birth of DU coincided with a pretty bleak period for wetlands and waterfowl habitat. Where do you think North American waterfowl and habitat be today without DU?

A: That's a really good question. I hesitate to say we wouldn't have duck hunting today if DU hadn't been around, but I don't think it would be a far stretch. It's an open question. It takes multiple partnerships to do the job today, but they were the only players really in the field for 40 to 50 years, especially in Canada. It would be grim. Ducks would never have gone extinct, but would we continue to have duck hunting seasons? We've been pretty close to having to close the season a couple of times in these 75 years. There's no doubt in my mind their efforts stopped that from happening.

Q: What does DU mean to you personally?

A: The ducks mean a lot to me. The prairies mean a lot to me, and they have all my life. I've been a DU member since the late '70s and '80s. I've never been a passionate

DU member, never involved at the chapter level. Interest in this book didn't grow out of being a DU member. Their interest in me was that I'd written passionately about this resource for so long that I understood it. It's probably helpful I haven't been involved at the grassroots level. I'm not an insider so I think that really helped with the perspective in writing the book.

Q: What message would you like people to take away from the book after reading

A: That just about anything is possible when we work together. DU is a really shining example of working across political boundaries, international boundaries and getting something good done. Not letting our differences stand in the way of achieving something that is good for the commons. And I think that's a powerful message.

Q: The book starts by citing widespread drainage and habitat destruction. Is history repeating itself?

A: I think to large degree, it is. There's enormous pressure being put on the landscape again. We kind of got lulled in the '90s with CRP on the land and now, there's certainly a lot of pressure on it. We've lost wetland protection, thanks to Supreme Court rulings. We need to decide as a society again what we want. There's no givens here.

**Q:** This question isn't so much related to the book, but as a passionate waterfowl hunter, what would you say to people in North Dakota who might take the resource for granted?

A: I love the Dakota prairies and I spend both spring and fall out there \_ springtime photographing and birding and wandering around, and in the fall, I come out to hunt. I know it's easy for people, just as we do here in northern Minnesota, to look out the window and think that's the way it will always be. They shouldn't take it for granted. They have such a spectacular resource out there that I hope they want to preserve it for future generations. Because once it's gone, it's gone.

# The Year Ahead Is Full of Astronomical Treats

ast year was pretty good for space enthusiasts and local sky watchers. Both Mercury and the large asteroid Vesta got their first satellites.

The sun emerged from the most prolonged sunspot doldrums in half a century. And the clouds stayed away for a Christmastime pre-dawn total lunar eclipse.

But 2012 holds even greater sights for interested stargazers. In May, for the first time in a decade, Idahoans will see a (partial) solar eclipse, made more dramatic by its finish occurring just minutes before sunset. The eclipsed sun (viewed with proper filters) may well sport several sunspots, since solar activity is ramping up towards a peak in spring 2013. This summer should thus be the best opportunity to see Northern Lights in over a decade.

In early June a partial lunar eclipse and a transit of Venus will fall within 36 hours of each other. The latter (Venus silhouetted against the sun's face) is a genuine once-in-a-lifetime event that won't repeat until 2117 AD.

The Dawn probe will conclude its exploration of Vesta in July to begin its three-year journey to the largest Main Belt asteroid, Ceres. The following month the behemoth Curiosity rover will make a dramatic, commandostyle landing on Mars to begin its two-year search for Martian life. Planet watchers will get

good views of Venus (dominating the western evening sky until Memorial Day, then the eastern pre-dawn sky from Independence Day until New Year's) and Mars (at its closest since 2010 in early March). Also look for a beautiful evening Venus-Jupiter pairing in mid-March. Saturn will return to the evening sky in the spring, with its rings tilting more our way by the end of the year than they've been since the summer of 2006.

# Hunter Bags a No. 2 Cat

SPOKANE, Wash. • Gary Penrod was out for the late whitetail buck hunt in Washington's Pend Oreille County last month when a mountain lion caught him with his pants down.

The Nine Mile Falls sportsman rallied to the moment, rendering a once-in-a-lifetime memory from the daily duty of answering nature's

At the least, Penrod's encounter reaffirms basic rules for getting close to game: He was sitting still, and it's pretty clear the cougar must have been upwind.

It's an example that the more you get out in the outdoors, the more you'll get out

"I'm a retired teacher and I've always wanted to be able to hunt an entire season," he said, noting this was the year he made that happen.

He didn't fill his deer tag during the general season despite hunting every day in his familiar stomping grounds near Steptoe.

Undaunted, he was determined to bring home venison during the late buck hunt farther north.

On Nov. 15, with his deer tag as well as tags for cougar and bear in his pocket, he set out with hunting partner Wayne Reome to explore a new area northwest of Priest.

After the hunters split up and took stands for the first two hours of daylight, Penrod was moving to another ridge when he had the undeniable urge to take a backcountry bathroom break.

"I had just finished and was just about to pull up my pants when I caught movement out of the corner of my eye," he said. "I slowly turned my head and all I saw was this cougar tail 20 feet away right where I had been walking.

"I grabbed my rifle. He saw me move, took off, and I dropped him at about 25 vards from where I was standing — with my pants still around my knees.

"I know this sounds farfetched, but I swear on my reputation as a teacher of 30 years that this is how it actually played out."

Penrod did not suggest that keeping his cool and killing a cougar at close range makes him braver or more studly than other hunters.

The cougar might have left him alone as soon as it figured out he was a human, not to mention a significantly lighter human than he had been a few moments earlier.

"I had an opportunity and a cougar tag and I took advantage of it," he said.

A Washington Fish and Wildlife Department biologist estimated the cougar weighed more than 150 pounds. Penrod's taxidermist said it weighed closer to 170 pounds.

Either way, it's a huge cat. It measured more than 8 feet long when he brought it to the taxidermist and would stretch to 9 feet

Penrod and his buddy hunted deer for a few more hours after his hair-raising encounter, "but I was so excited about my cougar that my heart really wasn't into deer," he said. "I must admit that I did keep turning around

to check my backtrack." His buddy, Reome, said he may never again feel safe taking an afternoon break to doze and nap on a south-fac-

ing exposure. But the thrill of the hunt soon evolved into the anticipation of the harvest.

Penrod and his wife, Lonna, butchered the cat the next day and remarked to each other that the meat was notably clean and odorless.

Last week they invited Reome, his wife and another couple to savor the rare chance to feast on cougar meat.

"Only one of the ladies thought the meat was a little too exotic for her to try," he

Penrod admitted to being overcautious and overcooking the cougar meat to prevent any chance of dealing with trichinosis. Cougar meat and pork are common carriers of the parasitic worm that causes the disease.

Health agencies say the meat is safe to eat when cooked until the juices run clear or to an internal temperature of 170 degrees.

Even though Penrod apparently exceeded that safety bar, he said the cougar meat was "fantastic."

"It was really mild," he said. "We cooked some beef the same way and served them together for comparison, and the beef tasted stronger than the cougar." The couples paid the ulti-

mate respect to the big lion Penrod had harvested.

"We sat around the table and talked about the meat, the taste and texture, the way it kind of flaked without being chewy or stringy," he said. "Wayne thought it tasted like pork tenderloin. It was very interesting."

but that's what we recommend," he said. "Any of your steelhead fishermen will agree that is the top of the line."

### Fish Upstream

When fishing for steelhead, you should "follow the path of the fish, from the river mouth upstream toward the spawning grounds," according to popular fly fisherman Brian Milne, in an article he wrote for About.com. "Fish typically face upstream, so if you're fishing upstream you're less likely to spook fish."

# Big Game Running in the Big City

KANSAS CITY, Mo. • When Joe Cascone started deer hunting, he thought nothing of driving an hour or two to get out of Kansas City.

Today, he stays in the big city when he wants to hunt.

Through a program managed by the Missouri Department of Conservation, he bow hunts an island of timber within the city limits, not far from the traffic, subdivisions and activity of urban life.

"I used to be one of those hunters who thought you had to get way out of the city to have a good chance at a deer," said Cascone, 41, of Kansas City. "I grew up in the inner city, and we never used to see deer.

"But now we see them all the time in greenways and little pockets of timber. It doesn't take much to hold

"I've taken nice bucks within 20 minutes of my house, hunting with my bow. It's unbelievable."

Cascone is part of a carefully monitored program devised by the city and the Missouri Department of Conservation.

In response to growing deer populations in the city and increased deer-vehicle accidents, the City Council in 2003 passed an ordinance allowing bow hunting in the city under the program.

Private land must be at least five acres to qualify and it must be isolated from houses, roads, and other structures for safety purpos-

Landowners submit requests to the Missouri Department of Conservation, which then has wildlife biologists inspect the property to make sure it meets requirements.

Safety is a priority, and so far there have been no problems reported, said Joe De-Bold, urban wildlife biologist for the Missouri Department

of Conservation. And the hunters who participate? Well, they've found a hunting paradise right here in the

In 2010, 93 hunts resulted in 480 deer being taken -326 does, 104 bucks and 50 button bucks.

Cascone is one of many who are excited about the

He hunts on a patch of undeveloped land that is just blocks from a subdivision, and it didn't take him long to discover that it was full of deer.

"The first time I went there, I saw deer just walking to my stand," he said. "There are more deer in the city than people realize.

"When they build these subdivisions and leave a few acres of timber, those deer will move right in there.

"It doesn't take much to

Cascone shot a doe the first time he hunted in the city. Then this season, he climbed into his tree stand and immediately spotted a big buck trailing does. He fired his arrow and had a deer with an eight-point

"I was in my tree stand for less than 10 minutes," Cascone said.

Cascone's longtime friend, Mike Brogoto, also has found success bow hunting n the city. He took a 14-point buck, his biggest ever, several years ago on land enrolled in the program.

"Hunting in the city, it almost guarantees you that you will see deer," he said. "And the great thing is, you can hunt close to home.

"I probably go out 25 times a season, even if it's only for an hour or two."

Taking a deer is no guarantee, though.

Cascone emphasized that even though they are hunting city deer, they aren't tame, as many people be-

"If you're walking through the woods and they see you,

they're gone," Cascone said. "They wind (smell) you, they're gone.

"You have to hunt the same way as you do anywhere else."

Especially because the hunting is done in an urban setting, safety is emphasized in the program. That's why only archery methods are allowed.

"With bow hunting, the average shot is 20 yards or less," DeBold said. "The hunter has to identify his or her target and let it get close.

"Most bow hunters hunt from a tree stand so they are shooting down at their target and the arrow doesn't travel far. So there are built-in safety factors."

The main goal of the program is to reduce deer numbers in the urban area, which had grown too large in parts of the city. Surveys had shown that the population had grown to more than 100 deer per square mile in some areas, much more than the 35 to 40 per square mile that DeBold said would be acceptable.

Those deer were causing increased vehicular accidents and complaints about doing damage to ornamental plantings in yards.

DeBold believes the private land hunting program, plus a series of managed archery hunts in city parks, is reducing the population, while providing added recreation at the same time.

"We're very pleased with the program," he said. "I keep monitoring the websites of other big cities across the nation and I can't see one that has a program that can match ours."



To reduce rapidly growing deer numbers in Kansas City, Mo., the City Council passed an ordinance in 2003 to allow limited bow hunting on private land within city limits in a program managed by the Missouri Department of Conservation.

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# Blast Kills Iran Nuclear Expert Amid 'Covert War'

TEHRAN, Iran • It seemed a clock-work killing: Motorcycle riders flashed by and attached a magnetic bomb onto a car carrying a nuclear scientist working at Iran's main uranium enrichment facility. By the time the blast tore apart the silver Peugeot, the bike was blocks away, weaving through Tehran traffic after what Iran calls the latest strike in an escalating covert war.

The attack — which instantly killed the scientist and fatally wounded his driver on Wednesday — was at least the fourth targeted hit against a member of Iran's nuclear brain trust in two years. Tehran quickly blamed Israelilinked agents backed by the U.S. and Britain.

Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton denied any U.S. role in the slaying, and the Obama administration condemned the attack. However, provocative hints from Jerusalem reinforced the perception of an organized and clandestine campaign to set back Iran's nuclear ambitions.

The day before the attack, Israeli military chief Lt. Gen. Benny Gantz was quoted as telling a parliamentary panel that 2012 would be a "critical year" for Iran — in part because of "things that happen to it unnaturally!"

The blast killed Mostafa Ahmadi Roshan, a chemistry expert and a director of the Natanz uranium enrichment facility, the centerpiece of Iran's expanding program to make nuclear fuel. Roshan, 32, had planned to attend a memorial later Wednesday for another nuclear researcher who was killed in a similar pinpoint blast two years ago, Iranian media said.

"A heinous act," said Iran's Atomic Energy Organization of Wednesday's bombing.

It added a tone of defiance. "We will continue our (nuclear) path without any doubt ... Our path is irreversible;" said the statement carried on state tel-

The state news agency IRNA said Roshan had "organizational links" to Iran's nuclear agency, which suggests a direct role in key aspects of the program. Another news agency, the semiofficial Mehr, said Roshan had been interviewed by inspectors from the U.N. nuclear watchdog agency — which Iran has accused of placing its scientists in peril by including their names in public reports.

Natanz, in central Iran, is the country's main enrichment site. Officials said this week they were expanding some operations to an underground site south of Tehran with more advanced equipment.

The U.S. and its allies are pressuring Iran to halt uranium enrichment, a key element of the nuclear program that the West suspects is aimed at producing atomic weapons.

# Homicide Drops off U.S. List of Top Causes of Death

ATLANTA • For the first time in almost half a century, homicide has fallen off the list of the nation's top 15 causes of death, bumped by a lung illness that often develops in elderly people who have choked on their food. The 2010 list, released by the government Wednesday, reflects at least two major trends: Murders are down, and deaths from certain diseases are on the rise as the population ages, health authorities said. Homicide was overtaken at No. 15 by pneumonitis, seen mainly in people 75 and older. It happens when food or vomit goes down the windpipe and causes deadly damage to the lungs.

# Van der Sloot Pleads Guilty to Killing Peruvian Woman

**LIMA, Peru** • After Joran van der Sloot pleaded guilty Wednesday to the 2010 murder of a Peruvian woman he met at a Lima casino, his lawyer argued that the killing was tragically triggered by fallout from the very event that originally brought his client notoriety. The "persecution" suffered by Van der Sloot after the unsolved disappearance of U.S. teenager Natalee Holloway five years earlier scarred him psychologically with a kind of post-traumatic stress disorder, defense attorney Jose Jimenez told the three female judges who are to sentence his client Friday. The young Dutchman has been the prime suspect in the Holloway case since she disappeared on Aruba five years to the day before the killing of the 21-year-old Peruvian woman, business student Stephany Flores. # Romney Rolls into S. Carolina – GOP Nomination In Sight?

**COLUMBIA, S.C.** • Mitt Romney swept into South Carolina on Wednesday in pursuit of a confirming victory in the race for the Republican presidential nomination, buoyed by a second straight electoral triumph, bulging campaign coffers and warm words from the state's

top practitioner of tea party politics.
"I don't want to be overconfident," said the Republican front-runner. But increasingly, he was talking about his plans for challenging President Barack Obama in the fall, not his primary foes of the moment.

Running out of time, his GOP rivals

showed no sign of surrender.

Newt Gingrich welcomed Romney into the first Southern primary state with a fresh attack on his business career and a new television ad painting him as a flipflopper on abortion. Said former Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum: "South Carolina is going to be different. It is wide open for anyone."

Texas Gov. Rick Perry drawled his way through a busy campaign day, displaying

a Southern attribute that Romney, the former Massachusetts governor, could not hope to match.

But after a solid win in New Hampshire, Romney got help from unlikely sources.

Toyog Pop Pop Pop Popl who rap second

Texas Rep. Ron Paul, who ran second in New Hampshire, chastised Gingrich and Perry for criticizing the front-runner's experience as a venture capitalist whose firm acquired, slimmed down and then spun off existing companies, often earning large profits in the process.

"I just wonder whether they're totally ignorant of economics or whether they're willing to demagogue just with the hopes of getting a vote or two," he said, without mentioning anyone by

South Carolina Sen. Jim DeMint echoed Paul's remarks, and declared: "I think Romney's going to win here. ... He's hitting a lot of hot buttons for me about balancing the budget, and frankly I'm a little concerned about the few Republicans who have criticized some of what I consider to be free market principles here?"

ples here."

At an evening town hall meeting in Columbia, Santorum defended Romney

while accusing Obama of criticizing business people.

"It's this hostile rhetoric, which unfortunately — and I don't want to stand here and be a defender of Mitt Romney — but unfortunately even some in our own party now, even some running for president will engage in with respect to capitalism;" Santorum said. "It's bad enough for Barack Obama to blame folks in business for causing problems in this country. It's one other thing for Republicans to join in on this."

DeMint has been lobbied heavily by several of the presidential contenders eager for his endorsement and has so far chosen to remain neutral. Still, the remarks by a man who has sometimes taken the tea party's side in clashes with the Republican establishment sent a clear signal that Romney was to be viewed as worthy of support.

The day's events marked the unofficial start of a 10-day campaign that includes a pair of televised debates, millions of dollars in television ads and the first competition of the year in a state with high unemployment, a major military presence and a large population of evangelicals.

# Conflict Between Rich and Poor Strongest in 24 Years

WASHINGTON ● Tensions between the rich and poor are increasing and at their most intense level in nearly a quarter-century, a new survey shows. Americans now see more social conflict over wealth inequality than over the hot-button topics of immigration, race relations and age.

The survey released Wednesday by the Pew Research Center highlights U.S. perceptions of the economic divide, an issue that has moved to the forefront in the 2012 presidential campaign amid stubbornly high unemployment, increasing poverty and protests by the Occupy movement.

The findings come as voters in New Hampshire's primary Tuesday night made clear that the economy was the issue that mattered most to them. In the end, they chose Mitt Romney by a large margin, even as Republican rivals already gearing up for more competitive contests in South Carolina and elsewhere had stepped up populist attacks on him as a heartless corporate

raider who slashed jobs

The Pew survey shows that younger adults, Democrats and African-Americans remained the most likely as in previous years to cite the existence of strong disagreements between rich and poor. But in the past two years, three important swing groups — whites, middle-income Americans and political independents — registered some of the biggest increases in those who now also hold this view.

As a result, majorities of each political party and ideology all agree that serious disputes exist between Americans at the top and bottom of the economic ladder.

Still, while overall U.S. awareness of class conflict has grown significantly in recent years, public attitudes toward wealthy Americans remain largely unchanged. For instance, about 46 percent of Americans hold a disapproving view that rich people are wealthy because they were fortunate enough to be born into money or have the right connections. But almost as many people — 43 percent — say wealthy people are rich "mainly because of their own hard work, ambition or education."

# Mars-bound NASA Rover Adjusts Course for Red Planet

Deep space antennas monitored the one-ton rover nicknamed Curiosity as it fired its thrusters in a choreographed three-hour maneuver

"We're a big step closer to our entry point at the Martian atmosphere," said Arthur Amador of the

NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory.
The course correction is the most important task Curiosity will perform during its 352-million-mile trip to Mars, but it's not unprecedented. Previous robotic explorers have had to adjust their paths several times en route to landing.

# Fed Survey Shows Economy Ended 2011 with Strength

December may end up being the strongest month of 2011: Employers added 200,000 jobs, and unemployment fell to the lowest rate in nearly three years.

**WASHINGTON** • The final weeks of 2011 were among the economy's strongest as Americans shopped and traveled more, ending the year with a

shot of optimism for 2012. That's the bright picture the Federal Reserve sketched in a survey released Wednesday. It said all but one of its 12 banking districts experienced some growth from late November through

the end of the year. Some sectors of the economy, notably housing, remain weak, the Fed said. But consumers spent more freely. Factories made more goods. Americans stepped up travel. And the auto indus-

try enjoyed its best stretch of the year. Economists noted greater confidence in the tone of the report. For example, the central bank described auto manufacturing as "vibrant" in several districts. Consumer spending was deemed "robust" in the Dallas region.

"It has been quite a while since we have seen the Fed use words like vibrant and robust to describe any part of the economy," said Brian Bethune, an economics professor at Amherst College. "I think one of the things driving the stronger language is that things are better than the Fed had been expect-

ing." The one district that didn't experience growth was Richmond, Va., although even there, the Fed said economic activity either "flattened or improved slightly."

The report comes just six months after the economy nearly stalled under the weight of high food and gas prices and supply disruptions from Japan that

slowed U.S. manufacturing. The economy and the job market have both improved since then. And December may end up being the strongest month of 2011. Employers added 200,000 jobs. And the unemployment rate fell to 8.5 percent — the lowest rate in nearly three years.

"The Fed's report Wednesday confirms what everyone else has been seeing in the economic data from retail sales to auto sales and manufacturing - activity is improving," said Jennifer Lee, senior economist at BMO Capital

Markets. Most of the Fed's districts reported holiday sales increased over last year. In particular, New York and Dallas' districts reported healthy gains. Boston, New York and Minneapolis reported exceptional growth in online sales.

Consumers are spending more on cars and travel, the survey noted. Auto sales in the Atlanta area were the best sales in more than two years. Boston, New York, Richmond and Atlanta experienced gains in tourism from a year ago. In Boston alone, businesses expect double-digit growth in hotel revenue in

# Twinkies Maker Hostess Seeks Bankruptcy Protection

**NEW YORK** • The maker of Twinkies, Sno Balls and Wonder Bread is trying to lose the fat.

Hostess Brands is hoping to cut its high costs as it heads back into bankruptcy protection for the second time in less than a decade.

Hostess has enough cash to keep stores stocked with its Ding Dongs, Ho Hos and other snacks for now as it battles rising labor costs and increased competition.

But longer term, the 87-year-old company has a bigger problem: health-conscious Americans favor yogurt and energy bars over the dessert cakes and white bread they devoured

30 years ago. Last year, 36 percent of Americans ate white bread in their homes, down from 54 percent in 2000, according to

NPD Group. Meanwhile, about 54 percent ate

wheat bread, up from 43 percent in Consumption of healthy snacks is growing, too. About 32 percent of

Americans ate yogurt at least once in

two weeks in 2011, for instance, up

from 18 percent in 2000. "We're less likely to be snacking on items that we shouldn't be snacking on," said Harry Balzer, chief industry analyst for The NPD Group, a consumer marketing research firm.

Hostess, which is privately held, doesn't disclose sales figures. But Nyeyoka Bryan, 26, is proof that the company has lost at least some of its hardcore fans.

Bryan said she stopped eating Twinkies at about age 16 because she decided they were unhealthy. Still, the student who was sipping a fruit smoothie in the snack aisle of a Duane Reade store in New York on Wednesday afternoon said she'd be sad if Twinkies disappeared.

"They've been around a long time," she said.

To be sure, Hostess' snacks don't neatly fit into the U.S. trend toward a healthier lifestyle that includes a diet rich in whole wheat foods, fruits and vegetables.

For instance, Twinkies, a snack cake with a mysterious cream filling that epitomizes empty calories, has 150 calories and 4.5 grams of fat. Meanwhile, a Ding Dong chocolate cake

with filling has 368 calories and 19.4

grams of fat

On Jan. 12, 1912, textile workers at the Everett Mill in Lawrence, Mass., (most of them immigrant women) walked off the job to protest wage cuts. The "Bread and Roses Strike," as it came to be known, spread to other mills in Lawrence and lasted until the following March.

## TODAY IN **HISTORY**

On this date:

In 1519, Holy Roman Emperor Maximilian I died. In 1773, the first public

museum in America was organized in Charleston, S.C. In 1828, the United States and Mexico signed a Treaty of Limits defining the

boundary between the two countries to be the same as the one established by an 1819 treaty between the U.S. and Spain. In 1915, the House of

Representatives rejected, 204-174, a constitutional amendment giving women the right to vote. **In 1932,** Hattie W.

Caraway became the first woman elected to the U.S. Senate, after serving out the remainder of the term of her late husband, Thaddeus. In 1948, the Supreme

Court ruled that state law schools could not discriminate against applicants on the basis of race. In 1959, Berry Gordy, Jr. founded Motown Records

(originally Tamla Records) in Detroit. In 1966, President Lyndon B. Johnson said in his State of the Union address that the U.S. should stay in South Vietnam until Communist

aggression there was ended. In 1969, the New York Jets of the American Football League upset the Baltimore Colts of the National Football League 16-7 in Super Bowl III, played at the Orange Bowl in Miami.

**Ten years ago:** The United States intensified its antiterror campaign in eastern Afghanistan, dropping bombs on suspected al-Qaida and Taliban hideouts. Michelle Kwan won her fifth successive U.S. Figure Skating Championships crown and sixth overall. Former Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance died in New

York at age 84.

Five years ago: Two kidnapped boys, Ben Ownby and Shawn Hornbeck, were found alive in the same suburban St. Louis apartment four days after Ben vanished and 41/2 years after Shawn disappeared. (The boys' abductor, Michael Devlin, is serving multiple life terms for kidnapping and sexual assault.) Durham County, N.C., District Attorney Mike Nifong, facing ethics charges, asked to be removed from the Duke lacrosse rape investigation. (State prosecutors later exonerated three suspects; Nifong ended up being disbarred.) Larry Stewart, the anonymous philanthropist Missouri known as "Secret Santa," died at age 58.

### THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Declarer looked beyond the obvious when playing this heart slam. Unfortunately, he did not look far enough, and the slam

Declarer appreciated that the obvious route to 12 tricks was to find the club king with East, and dummy's trumps provided the necessary two entries to repeat the finesse. But South saw another possibility — that he could give up a diamond trick in exchange for two extra winners in which case he would not need the club finesse at all, since there would then be two discards for the queen and jack of clubs.

For this to be so, the most likely lie of the diamonds would be the king in West's hand, with the jack due to fall in three rounds. So declarer cashed the heart ace, then followed with the ace and another diamond. West took the king, and when the jack dropped doubleton from East, followed with a third diamond. East ruffed and South overruffed, but now only one club discard was available. With the club king offside, South down went the slam.

Declarer was on the right track, but failed to allow for the diamond jack being doubleton with East. The way home is, at trick three, to lead the diamond seven toward the queen - without first cashing the ace. West cannot afford to duck, but now a diamond return can do no harm. After South draws trump ending in dummy, both of his losing clubs can be offloaded on dummy's good diamonds.

# Jets Rush to Sanchez's Defense

**NEW YORK** • The fallout from the New York Jets failing to make the NFL playoffs is in full swing, with members of coach Rex Ryan's staff leaving, players taking shots at quarterback Mark Sanchez and other players defending him.

In less than 24 hours, the coaching staff was shaken up with offensive coordinator Brian Schottenheimer walking away, former Dolphins coach Tony Sparano replacing him, and a few assistants saying they won't be back.

Now the latest controversy involves the shaky status of Sanchez.

Some of his teammates say he lacks the work ethic and leadership skills to lead the Jets to the Super Bowl. And with a new offensive coordinator in charge, the window for Sanchez to do so might have gotten a lot

"Mark is heading in the right direction," left guard Matt Slauson said during a telephone interview Wednesday. "He is going to be a great quarterback and I really believe he can lead us to a championship. His rookie year, we went to the AFC championship and again last year. The guy can do it. He can get it done. The rest of the team has to do their part, too."

The Daily News quoted one player, who was not

identified, as saying Sanchez was "lazy and content." Another player suggested the Jets should do all they can to try to bring in Colts quarterback Peyton Manning, if he's healthy, because Sanchez isn't improving.

"Whoever said all that, they're out of their minds and just trippin," defensive lineman Marcus Dixon said. "You can't blame a season on one guy. I mean, come on. It's all unfair. We have Mark Sanchez. He's our quarterback. He's our guy. And that's how just about everyone in that locker room

Sanchez's older brother Nick, who is also one of his agents, told The Associated Press in an email that the quarterback was out of town and unavailable for comment.

Center Nick Mangold defended Sanchez on Twitter and then during a radio interview, saving he "very much so, 100 percent" believes in Sanchez.

"I would say definitely the majority of the team feels the same way about Mark," Slauson added. "I don't know who said those things, but I would definitely say it's a small, small portion of the team that doesn't have confidence in Mark."

Dixon pointed out that Sanchez has gathered the team's running backs, wide receivers, tight ends and other quarterbacks in Southern California at his old high school the past few offseasons to work on team chemistry and camaraderie much of it on his own

dime. "If that's someone who doesn't know how to be a leader or have a good work ethic, then I don't know, man," Dixon said.

If the Broncos stunned the football world - and they did everywhere outside of the Rockies - with their thrilling overtime victory against the Steelers, they could set the universe spinning out of control by beating the top-seeded Pa-

New England isn't nearly as strong as it was in winning three Super Bowls and going undefeated on its way to a fourth NFL title game. Although the Patriots went 13-3 to secure AFC homefield advantage this season, winning their final eight, they have major issues on defense.

Plus, they've lost their last three postseason games: the 2008 Super Bowl to the Giants, then at home against the Ravens

and Jets. "To me it's not 'where,' it's more 'who,' " Broncos coach John Fox said. "They are a very good football team; they've got a lot of playoff experience. We will have to deal with crowd noise; that's always a little bit of an issue but it won't be the first time this season we've had to do that. It'll be a huge challenge and when you get to this point in the playoffs that's kind of how it always is."

New England snapped Denver's six-game winning streak with a 41-23 win in the Mile High City a month ago. So the Patriots are plenty familiar with Tebow and company. "It's always challenging

to go up against an offense like this because you can do so many things," Pro Bowl nose tackle Vince Wilfork said. "You can't just say, 'When they get in this formation, this is going to happen,' or 'When they do this, look out for (this)? You can't do that because you can be attacked and blindsided from so many different ways. "This game is going to

come down to disciplined football for us."

The Patriots always seem to be hosting January games in Foxborough, ever since the "Tuck Rule" win over the Raiders 10 years ago. Because recently they've been vulnerable at home in those situations, and because Denver (9-8) has performed some, uh, miracles, there's a line of thought that the Broncos will surprise the Patriots on Saturday night.

The oddsmakers don't think so: The Patriots are 13 1/2-point favorites, a massive line for the playoffs.

"So I said, 'OK, you had some bad years there that went nowhere. But here it is. What do you do? You could try it somewhere else. Here's a guy that's finally offensively oriented."

Every step since has been more surprising than the next.

Smith has started to shed his draft-bust label and turned around his career under Harbaugh, leading the 49ers (13-3) to the playoffs for the first time in nine years. They'll host the New Orleans Saints (13-3) in the NFC divisional round Saturday at Candlestick, a place fans smothered Smith with boos so often in the past.

"There are so many quarterbacks but they don't have that it factor. I'm starting to see a lot more of that in him right now and it probably has a lot to do with Jim Harbaugh because

he played that position," said former 49ers receiver and Hall of Famer Jerry Rice.

Smith has been by far the most surprising player for the NFC West champions.

The former Utah quarterback threw for a career-best 3,144 yards and 17 touchdowns with only five interceptions, anchoring Harbaugh's version of the West Coast offense with record-tying efficiency. San Francisco finished with 10 total turnovers, equaling the 2010 New England Patriots for the fewest in NFL history.

Smith, who has played under a different coordinator each season and only one preoffensive-minded coach in Norv Turner, has even started to sound like Harbaugh — refusing to relish any vindication and deflecting attention back to the team.

"I had a great season up to this point, but like I said, just got us a ticket to the dance like everybody else," Smith said.
