Supreme Court Throws Out Redistricting Plan

Decision sends commission back to drawing board shortly before election filing opens.

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BOISE • The Idaho Supreme Court overturned a controversial plan to redraw the state's legislative districts Tuesday, ordering the commission that made it to adopt a new district map that more closely follows the state and U.S. constitutions.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loebis filed a petition on behalf of four Idaho counties and four cities in November, arguing that it wasn't necessary to split so many counties to create 35 legislative districts of roughly equal population.

In the 4-1 decision, the Supreme Court agreed that the adopted map splits more counties than is necessary to meet the U.S. Constitution's requirement of one person, one vote. It ordered the Redistricting Commission to reconvene and adopt a map with minimal county splits.

The court specifically declined to recommend or adopt an alternate plan.

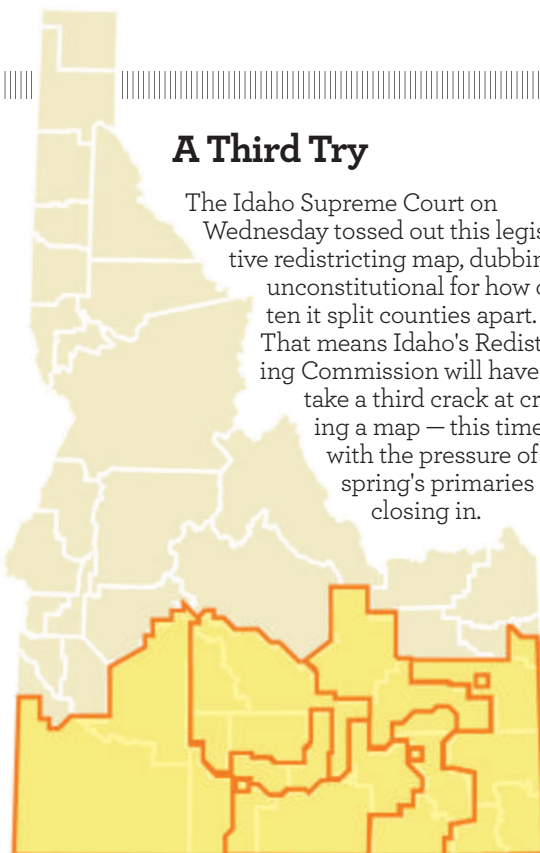
Justice Jim Jones was the lone dissenter. He cited the redistricting committee's power of discretion as the main reason he disagreed with the ruling.

"... I believe this Court should, as it has in the past, grant substantial deference to determinations made by the Commission," he wrote. "In my view, the Commission performed in an exemplary fashion in developing Plan L87." He went on

Storm Brings Grief, Relief to Magic Valley

Wednesday's long-overdue snow and rain led to one fatal crash, several early school releases and relief for local ski slopes.

TWIN FALLS • Wednesday's soft snowfall turned deadly after a car accident resulted in the death of a Twin Falls woman.

It would be the worst accident reported during the Magic Valley's winter storm. While the precipitation was a relief to snow-starved ski resorts, it also caused multiple vehicle collisions and early school releases.

According to Idaho State Police, a collision between a 1990 Ford van and a 2002 Ford truck on Golf Course Road, near the Jerome County Club, led to the death of Toni Martinez, 56. Martinez was headed east in the van when she reportedly lost control and swerved into oncoming traffic. That's when she collided with the truck, driven by Donna Clovis, 73, of Hagerman.

Martinez, who was not wearing her seat belt, was pronounced dead at the time of the crash, according to ISP. Clo-

vis and her passenger, Mary Warner, 78, also of Hagerman, were taken to St. Luke's Jerome with unknown injuries. The pair were wearing seat belts.

Though it was snowing at the time of the crash and the road was covered in snow and slush, ISP noted it was unknown Wednesday evening whether weather was a factor in the crash.

ISP reported only five other accidents along highways and the interstate in south-central Idaho. In the Twin Falls area, drivers experienced minor collisions with other vehicles and even street signs at times.

Nineteen accidents were reported in

Twin Falls between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., said city Crime Prevention Officer Luke Allen. All were caused by slick road conditions.

TWIN FALLS • LMS Defense, Inc., a defensive training firm that provides specialized counterterrorism training to U.S. military, law enforcement and private security professionals, announced Wednesday plans to move its corporate headquarters to Twin Falls.

Company CEO John Chapman said Twin Falls beat out Boise, Salt Lake City and Medford, Ore., in his search for the

right location. "We settled on Twin Falls because it's right in the middle," he said.

With a central northwestern location, Chapman said he will be able to better reach clients in Washington, Oregon, Montana and Wyoming, all underserved markets for advanced law enforcement training.

The announcement about the move was made at the annual NSSF SHOT Show in Las Vegas.

LMS was formerly headquartered in Sparks, Nev., which Chapman said

STATE STAFF: COUNTIES SHOULD BE FIRST STOP FOR MENTAL HEALTH PATIENTS

Administrator says state should be a safety net, not the main provider, when it comes to mental health services.

BOISE • What good are psychiatrist appointments if you don't have a car to get there?

That was the basis of state Division of Behavioral Health Administrator Ross Edmunds' presentation to legislative budget writers Wednesday morning. Edmunds said that instead of being the first line of defense, state

mental health services should be treated as a safety net for those who can't get help elsewhere. He added that that individual communities are better suited to provide the basic foundation of patient support.

In his presentation, Edmunds said communities understand local needs better than the state government, and can make connections to serve mental health patients that the state can't match. Using those connections, local providers can set up patients with housing, community consultation and education, employment and other basics more effectively than a state agency can.

Anti-bullying Bill Aims for Stricter Policies

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TWIN FALLS • A suicide-prevention group is calling for stricter school policies about a common childhood issue.

Earlier this week, Suicide Prevention Action Network of Idaho introduced a bullying prevention bill in the Legislature's Senate Judiciary Committee.

If passed, schools would be required to take steps such as educating students on bullying, developing consequences for the perpetra-

tors and reporting the number of bullying incidents each year to the state.

Lori Stewart, co-president of south-central Idaho's SPAN group, said it's important for schools to have a zero-tolerance policy toward bullying.

"Obviously, bullying is a big issue for adolescents," she said.

The local group doesn't currently provide bullying education in schools. But a number of volunteers have gone through training by the state SPAN organization to

provide support at a school if a student commits suicide.

As a victim assistance coordinator for the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office, Stewart said she hasn't heard of a local suicide that was linked to bullying. But sometimes, she said, it's hard to pinpoint the cause.

Many Magic Valley school districts already have policies prohibiting bullying and outlining the consequences for students who don't com-

ply. In the Twin Falls School District, punishments can lead all the way up suspension or expulsion from school, depending on the incident.

Brady Dickinson, principal at Canyon Ridge High School, said he doesn't think the new bill would lead to many changes in the district's policies.

"We already take a strong stance against bullying," he said.

One change, though,

would be a return to reporting bullying incidents to the state.

Melissa McGrath, communications director for the Idaho State Department of Education, said school districts used to be required to report cases as a result of receiving federal Safe and Drug-Free School grant funding. But last year, that funding — and the requirement — was discontinued.

Dickinson said his district has continued to track its number of bullying incidents using an online system.

Although bullying education isn't mandatory in the Twin Falls School District, it's still a topic that's addressed. At Canyon Ridge High, students hear about bullying policies in their advisory classes and via the student handbook.

Stewart said education about preventing bullying should begin in homes, and adults need to teach children by example.

"In my mind, it just comes down to teaching our children respect and tolerance for difference," she said.

Filer Sets Dates for Wastewater Tour

FILER • Almost two years after breaking ground, Filer city officials are preparing to offer residents a chance to tour the city's new \$15 million sewer treatment facility.

City Council members Tuesday approved scheduling a public open house from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on March 14 and 17.

"There's been a lot of inquiry from people, including Gov. Otter, about when this was going to happen," Mayor Bob Templeman said. "Holding it on two different dates should give everyone a chance to come out."

The membrane bioreactor, put in operation last October, replaces old settling ponds that were originally built in the 1950s. The bioreactor uses a series of filters, ultraviolet light radiation and biological processes to remove impurities and leave behind a water quality suitable for irri-

gation and aquifer recharge. The ponds will remain as a backup system for when the plant needs to be shut down for repairs.

"I've been over there to see it and couldn't detect any odor," Councilman Don Barkley said. "The water that came out the other end was as clear as can be."

The bulk of project funding, including the upgrade of approximately seven miles of city collection pipe, was obtained through five state and federal agencies. The Idaho Department of Environmental Quality provided \$7 million in grants and loans and USDA Rural Development contributed \$5.5 million. The U.S. Army Corp. of Engineers provided \$2 million and \$500,000 came from the Idaho Department of Commerce. The city contributed between \$400,000 and \$600,000 itself.

to say that challengers didn't effectively back up their complaints about the unconstitutionality of the plan.

Secretary of State Ben Ysursa also expressed concern that the court's decision removed discretion from the equation and limited the number of maps the commission could adopt.

"The number of plans you can draw with the minimal county splits is a reduced number, so... their options are reduced," Ysursa said.

Commission member Randy Hansen of Twin Falls said he was disappointed in the court's ruling.

"We had a bipartisan commission that took politics out of it, and now politics are back in the middle of it," he said. The ruling not only takes the human element out of the decision, he added, but affects counties who need to figure out how to set up their precincts before upcoming elections. Candidates for state and local office can file starting Feb. 27.

Loebis said he was happy

Redistricting Rundown

Every 10 years, Idaho must redraw its legislative districts in response to population changes recorded in the U.S. census. Districts can only differ in population by 10 percent.

Last year's first redistricting committee disbanded after failing to adopt a plan within 90 days. A second committee adopted a map that included 12 county splits, including Twin Falls County, prompting a petition asking the Idaho Supreme Court to overturn the map.

What's next? The decision orders the second redistricting commission to reconvene and draw a new map with as few county splits as possible. Secretary of State Ben Ysursa said he hopes the six-member commission will begin meeting as early as next week, and would like to see the group adopt a plan shortly after.

Filing for elections in Idaho opens on Feb. 27.

Welcomed at Home

Twin Falls County legislators praised the Idaho Supreme Court decision to overturn a controversial legislative redistricting map.

The thrown-out map would have split Twin Falls County into three districts from its current two, tying the western and eastern areas of the county to Mountain Home and Burley, and pitting some incumbents against each other in the November elections.

Rep. Stephen Hartgen and Rep. Sharon Block, both R-Twin Falls, said the court made the right decision. Both hope the new map will preserve the county's two districts.

"I would now presume

the burden of proof should be on the commission why that should be changed," Hartgen said.

Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, expressed surprise at the ruling. While he said he and his fellow legislators would seek re-election no matter what district they're placed in — "We'll all grow where we're planted," he said — Heider emphasized the need for the commission to act quickly, especially with filing for elections opening on Feb. 27.

Sen. Bert Brackett, R-Rogerson, agreed.

"I'll play the hand I'm dealt, but I'd like to know what that is sooner rather than later," he said.

Hansen and Ysursa didn't yet know if the reconvened commission would accept public comment.

Regardless, Hansen said he and his fellow members would work with the ruling.

"We'll do the best we can with the direction we receive," he said.

BURLEY LOOKS TO SLICE COSTS AT GOLF COURSE

BURLEY • After years of seeking ways to right a financial losing streak at the city's municipal golf course, Burley officials may take a swing at slicing its golf pro's pay.

The city golf committee suggested reducing the base pay of golf pro Mike Williams by 10 percent, to \$38,000, during Tuesday's City Council meeting. The council unanimously tabled the matter for a later meeting, but not before discussing the idea's merits.

Councilman Steve McGill said the nature of golf has changed and it is simply not as popular as it once was.

"I wonder if this course even requires a golf pro. The fact is, I don't believe it does," McGill said.

The draft contract presented by the committee also included an incentive allowing Williams to earn 10 percent of the course's gross revenues when they top \$380,000.

Councilman Randy Hawkins asked if the incentive was actually reachable and said the course's revenues would have to grow more than 18 percent for Williams' base salary to be even with his 2011 earnings.

"We're basically shooting the messenger, giving him a 10 percent cut and an unattainable incentive program in the economic environment that we're in," he said.

The Division of Behavioral Health operates the state's mental health services and psychiatric hospitals through the Department of Health and Welfare.

Some Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee members expressed concern that Edmunds' proposed structure would push costs back to the county level. Rep. Wendy Jaquet, D-Ketchum, said that might add too much strain to already struggling regions like Blaine County, where Health and Welfare recently closed an office.

"It seems that there's a shift to the counties," Jaquet said, which places an extra burden of funding mental health services on property taxpayers. Other legislators nodded in agreement.

"I'm certainly not trying to create a system that

shifts any costs," Edmunds said. Instead, he wants to clearly define priorities, with local communities handling preventative care and the state dealing with crises.

After the meeting, Edmunds said while he would like to provide seed money to counties or communities to provide those services, there is currently no funding request or money set aside for such an initiative. This is long-term planning, he said, but a goal he would like to achieve soon.

"I want to move very quickly to see this happen because I think it benefits everyone," he said.

was good for military business, but not in other aspects.

"The deal-closer was the infrastructure that was already in place with the (College of Southern Idaho) and very supportive police departments," he said.

The state's business-friendly climate and healthier economic conditions than many surrounding areas also helped.

"There's a lot less red tape in Idaho," Chapman said.

The company plans to locate a counterterrorism training and education center in Twin Falls County. The center will provide tactical training to Northwest civilian forces and provide a testing facility for military and civilian security force products.

Having a center like this close to home will help cut the cost of sending deputies out of state for training, said Chief Deputy Don Newman with the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office.

"Typically we've gone as far

as Utah. We've attended some classes in D.C.," Newman said. "So having this just south of town is huge for us. It's very welcomed, especially when you have a limited budget to invest in this type of training."

In Twin Falls, Chapman is looking for four or five corporate-level employees, and in February will start hiring a support staff of about 20.

Some of the corporate positions have already been filled, but depending on company projects, Chapman said he could hire up to 50 people at certain times of the year for temporary jobs.

"They'll be almost all instructors," he said. "And we hire a lot of temporary role players."

Having CSI's law enforcement training program and the Idaho National Laboratory in Idaho Falls nearby will add more opportunities and expertise, Chapman said.

"Our program is a basic program," said Don Hall, CSI law enforcement program director and Twin Falls city councilman.

The training LMS will provide is far more advanced, but

Hall hopes to use the skills of Chapman and others by having them as guest professors. He wants to offer classroom space for LMS to use.

Having officers and civilians traveling from around the state and country to attend training is a great economic opportunity for the Magic Valley, Hall said.

LMS currently does business with about 50 police departments and teaches about 600 civilian students a year, along with about 30 military contracts it has through the U.S. Department of Defense.

Chapman said his goal is to bring about 20 people a week to the training center from out of town.

"That doesn't sound like a lot, but it starts to add up," he said.

Building a headquarters and training center in Twin Falls County will cost the company about \$600,000, Chapman said. He's also looking at grants to cover some of the costs.

The company, established in 2006, currently operates a large training facility near Reno, Nev., and sends mobile training teams across the globe.

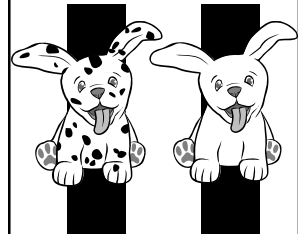

GOP Candidates Are Largely Ignoring Schools

What was striking about following the GOP presidential candidates around New Hampshire earlier this month was how education barely gets talked about on the stump or in debates. Mitt Romney, Rick Santorum, Jon Huntsman. I saw them twice in rallies. Nothing came up. Newt Gingrich? I saw him once. Nothing from him, either. Nor was education an issue during the New Hampshire debates.

The only mention of schools came when Santorum charged President Barack Obama with being an elitist because he said the nation needs to get all kids ready for college. Santorum told a crowd gathered around a frozen lake that he would be fine if his son became a darn good mechanic.

The Pennsylvanian is right: All labor — of the legal kind, that is — has dignity. But hasn't he seen the numbers about how few American kids really are prepared for college? In Texas, fewer than a third of students are on a track that readies them. In Dallas, it's common to find fewer than 20 percent of a traditional high school's students equipped for college.

It isn't like most students are heading for college and those pursuing a technical or trade job are being shunned. The fact is that our schools are producing more kids for trade and technical jobs than those that require a college degree. If not reversed, that trend will limit our economy's potential.

And what about the data that shows college degrees offer greater economic mobility for young Americans? Doesn't Santorum think a degree would help the children of the working families he rightly champions?

To be fair, the Republicans talk some about education on their websites. But, generally, public schools are not coming up much. Romney even spoke at two high schools right before the primary, but there was no talk about school reform.

This differs from the campaign that George W.

Bush ran in 2000 and Barack Obama, for the most part, waged in 2008. Both candidates largely laid the predicate for the education programs they would pursue as president.

The lack of talk about education is worrisome for several reasons.

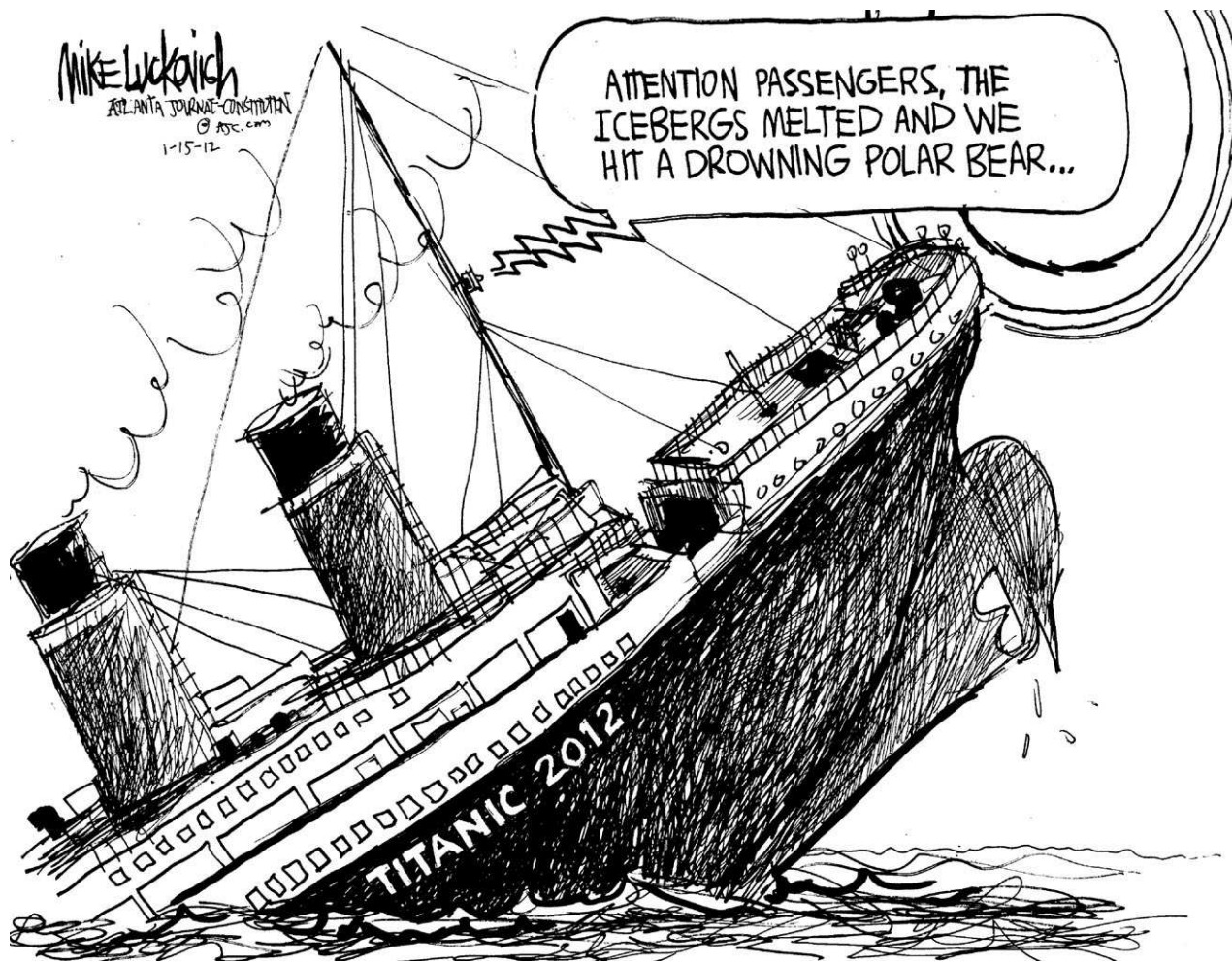
First, education is largely a state function, but the feds do have a say in the matter. No Child Left Behind. Race to the Top. Pell grants. Each of those is a part of the federal portfolio. It would be nice to hear more about what the candidates would do with these programs.

Second, the goal of getting education right in big urban school districts remains elusive. In major cities such as Dallas, districts struggle to "scale up" basics that would help all their schools, not just the top ones. Quality principals. Teacher-leaders. Access to real-time data. Strong middle schools. They are often in short supply. How would the candidates work with states and districts to broaden their repertoire of strong campuses?

Third, the quality of public schools determines how well the country will assimilate its many immigrant families. That's especially so in states such as Texas and California with their large Latino populations.

The candidates eagerly put an exclamation point behind their ideas to toughen up border security. But what about explaining how important it is for schools to help immigrant students move out of a parallel universe and learn English, master civics and become proficient in math and science? And how mastery of those subjects is the way immigrant children can become the leaders of our communities, companies and universities?

Surely these issues are worth having a conversation about on the stump, if we think developing human capital is important.

Consensus Needed on Web Piracy

The following editorial appeared in the Los Angeles Times on Tuesday:

While much of the nation's capital has been engrossed in the debate over unemployment, taxes and spending, lobbyists representing a huge swath of the U.S. economy have been battling over proposals to combat foreign websites dedicated to piracy. The Senate plans to take up its version soon, despite the

lack of consensus about how to rein in pirate sites without censoring legitimate speech or stifling innovation. That would be a mistake.

The bills — the PROTECT IP Act in the Senate, the Stop Online Piracy Act in the House — would authorize the Justice Department to obtain court orders against foreign piracy hotbeds. Those orders would compel Internet service providers and search engines to deter users from accessing those sites, while requiring payment processors

and advertising networks to stop servicing them. The bills would also enable copyright and trademark owners to seek similar court orders against alleged piracy hotbeds regardless of where they were located.

Supporters of the legislation, including entertainment companies and businesses whose brands are counterfeited online, need to acknowledge the near-futility of trying to hide a site on the Internet, and should recognize the suspicions

raised among tech companies by the original version of the House bill.

Meanwhile, opponents of the legislation — which include tech companies, social conservatives and civil libertarians — need to acknowledge the threat from foreign sites that make their living off copyright infringement. The various factions should work toward an agreement rather than having the Senate try to ram through something that is still bitterly opposed by so much of the tech industry.

Cuts Would Undermine Strong U.S. Army

Few may remember that in the weeks before the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, the country was in a debate over the fundamental structure of our national defense. There were some who believed a strategic shift was needed and that the future of modern warfare would be about high-tech weaponry because no adversary would dare challenge America's conventional forces. With that in mind, this new strategy would be paid for, in part, by cutting the size and strength of the U.S. Army.

In 2001, a letter from more than 81 congressmen was sent to then-Secretary of Defense Don Rumsfeld cautioning that while we supported "efforts to ensure that our military is prepared for future conflicts, reduction in the Army's force structure would clearly undermine that goal."

A newspaper editorialized that "relics of the old 20th century force" because "high-tech and precision munitions were increasingly dominating the modern battlefield." Then the terrorists struck, and the conversation turned from the theoretical to the tangible, from

the uncertainty of future threats to the reality of an unprovoked attack.

The realities of Iraq and Afghanistan have proved far different and far more conventional. Because after we shocked, after we awed, we did the most important thing to gain and ensure success: we marched. And it is the American soldier who has borne the brunt of these conflicts, providing 50 to 70 percent of our deployable forces.

Today, we again find ourselves in another debate over the future of America's national defense. I am concerned when I read suggestions by columnists, analysts and part-time experts that the United States doesn't need a strong and decisive standing Army.

To meet current and future threats, our military must remain the finest in the world. Just as we didn't predict Dec. 7 or 9/11, we can't predict the future with any certainty. We can, however, remember the lessons of history: No major conflict has ever been won without "boots on the ground" and a strong, decisive Army will be, as it always has been, the strength of our nation.

May America and Israel always be safe and strong.

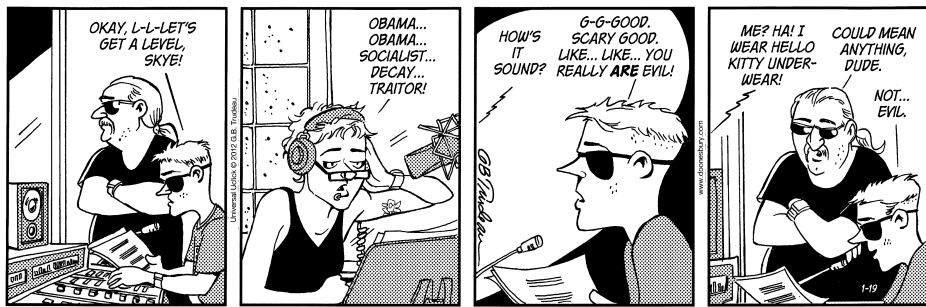

Bedke Unveils Bill to Boot Protesters from State Land

BOISE • About two dozen supporters of the Occupy Boise movement that's erected tents on state property listened quietly as a Republican lawmaker introduced a measure to evict them from the site across from the Capitol.

House Assistant Majority Leader Scott Bedke, of Oakley, told the House State Affairs Committee on Wednesday his bill outlaws camping on Capitol Mall property, without infringing on protesters' free-speech rights.

Occupify Boise pitched its tents around the old Ada County Courthouse starting in November, exploiting a loophole in state law that is silent on whether such groups can live on state land.

Bedke foresees the group's encampment being removed as soon as his bill becomes law — "in a way that would be kind, gentle but firm." Violating the law would be considered an infraction, like a speeding or parking ticket, Bedke said.

"It would happen with the cooperation of the State Police, possibly Capitol Mall security, certainly the Department of Administration," he said. "This is not a prohibition on free-

dom of speech. This is a prohibition of camping on lawns on the Capitol Mall."

The Occupy Boise backers assembled at the Capitol Wednesday were bundled up against the weather, after the first snowstorm of the 2012 winter dropped several inches of snow on their tents just to the southeast of the Capitol.

Geoff Burns, an informal spokesman for the occupiers, told The Associated Press the tents are a symbol of Americans' First Amendment right to express grievances with the government.

"It's not a campsite," Burns said. "We're trying to call attention to the fact that our government represents corporate interests at the expense of the people."

Boise Rep. Phylis King, a Democrat, unsuccessfully sought to kill the bill, saying she thought it was designed to infringe on people's rights to speak their mind. She also didn't like the idea that it would take effect immediately after it was signed by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter, rather than in July, like most new laws.

"I certainly don't think we should throw them out in the middle of winter," King said.

JURY SELECTION TO BEGIN IN FATAL ROAD-RAGE CASE

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) • Attorneys have started picking jurors to take part in the retrial of a man charged with second-degree murder in a 2006 road-rage collision on a rural highway in northern Idaho.

Jury selection began Wednesday in the case of Jonathan W. Ellington, 51, who is getting a second trial after the Idaho Supreme Court ruled last May the first trial was tainted by misconduct by prosecutors and potential perjury by a state police officer.

Prosecutors say Ellington was involved in a road-rage episode that ended when he allegedly ran over Vonette Lee Larsen, 41, on New Year's Day six years ago. Larsen later died of massive head trauma, and Ellington was convicted and sentenced to 25 years in prison for his role in her death.

Ellington's conviction was thrown out in May — after he had spent six years in prison — and he was granted a new trial. He has been out of custody for two months, after posting bond.

Since his release, Ellington has been living and working in Utah, and has also gotten married, the *Coeur d'Alene*

Press reported in a story published Wednesday.

Defense attorney Anne Taylor said the second trial will come down to a matter of analyzing what really happened in the seconds leading up to the incident. Taylor intends to argue that Ellington accidentally ran over Larsen as Ellington tried to flee from a confrontation with Larsen's armed husband, Joel Larsen, and their two daughters, Jovon and Joleen.

"It's nothing more than an accident, unless the jury says so," Taylor said.

During the first trial, prosecutors described the fatal collision and Ellington's actions in a different light. Prosecutors presented evidence intended to show that Ellington encountered Vonette Larsen's daughters driving separately on the road and a confrontation ensued.

The parents later joined the chase, eventually cornering Ellington on the roadway. At that point, Vonette Larsen got out her car and was run over in Ellington's attempt to flee the scene.

Prosecutors will try to show that Ellington, formerly of Hayden, was angry that

day and had been arguing with his former girlfriend before crossing paths with the Larsen sisters. Prosecutors will say Ellington acted intentionally when his vehicle struck Vonette Larsen.

In May, the Idaho Supreme Court ordered a new trial, in part based on the rebuttal testimony of Idaho State Police Cpl. Fred Rice, the agency's top accident reconstruction investigator.

The justices criticized Rice's testimony in the Ellington trial and concluded it conflicted with statements on accident reconstruction he'd made in previous court cases and contradicted training materials Rice had personally prepared.

Rice is not expected to testify in the retrial.

The justices also wrote that the Kootenai County prosecutor engaged in misconduct. They concluded the prosecution's use of "intentional, gratuitous references" to Vonette Larsen "having been run over" had been calculated to appeal to the jurors' emotions.

Attorneys say opening arguments could begin Thursday.

Trial Set for Teen in Shooting

SANDPOINT (AP) • A northern Idaho teen accused of firing a shotgun at a vehicle and injuring two people is expected to stand trial in March.

The *Bonner County Daily Bee* reports 19-year-old, Larry Dean Flanigan Jr. pleaded not guilty to felony aggravated battery and assault. Flanigan claims he acted in self-defense when he fired at the vehicle carrying five people near his Clark Fork home.

The case stems from a Dec. 6 confrontation that started at a high school basketball game and then escalated. Authorities say Flanigan was at home when a vehicle carrying five people, including teen brothers Zachary and Nathan Nesbitt, arrived at the house.

As Deadline Looms, Obama Rejects Canada-Texas Pipeline

WASHINGTON • In a politically explosive decision, President Barack Obama on Wednesday rejected plans for a massive oil pipeline through the heart of the United States, ruling there was not enough time for a fair review before a looming deadline forced on him by Republicans. His move did not kill the project but could delay a tough choice for him until after the November elections.

Right away, the implications rippled across the political spectrum, stirred up the presidential campaign and even

hardened feelings with Canada, a trusted U.S. ally and neighbor. For a U.S. electorate eager for work, the pipeline has become the very symbol of job creation for Republicans, but Obama says the environment and public safety must still be weighed too.

The plan by Calgary-based TransCanada Corp. would carry tar sands oil from western Canada across a 1,700-mile pipeline across six U.S. states to Texas refineries.

Obama was already on record as saying no, for now, until his government could review an alternative route that avoided environmentally sensitive areas of Nebraska — a route that still has not been proposed, as the White House

emphasizes. But Obama had to take a stand again by Feb. 21 at the latest as part of an unrelated tax deal he cut with Republicans.

This time, the project would go forward unless Obama himself declared it was not in the national interest. The president did just that, reviving intense reaction.

“This announcement is not a judgment on the merits of the pipeline, but the arbitrary nature of a deadline that prevented the State Department from gathering the information necessary to approve the project and protect the American people,” Obama said in a written statement. “I’m disappointed

Romney Tries to Sidestep Tax Furor He Ignited

Romney’s campaign is confronted with a new report that he has millions of dollars of personal wealth invested in the Cayman Islands.

SPARTANBURG, S.C. • Mitt Romney tried doggedly Wednesday to sidestep the political furor he had started a day earlier by revealing he pays federal taxes at a rate of about 15 percent, less than millions of middle-income American families.

Facing a new controversy, his campaign confirmed that Romney has money invested in the Cayman Islands but said he was not getting any tax break.

Newt Gingrich, his main rival in this weekend’s South Carolina primary, poked at Romney anew and disclosed that he personally pays more than twice what Romney does.

Just before Saturday’s South Carolina voting, Romney is trying to wrap up his push for the Republican nomination, but it’s been anything but smooth. He’s spent nearly two weeks answering questions and criticism about his personal wealth and tenure at Bain Capital, the private equity firm he founded, and those subjects are sure to come up again in Thursday night’s debate.

Gingrich slapped at the GOP front-runner, saying in Winnsboro that he himself paid 31 percent of his income in taxes for 2010, more than twice what Romney said he paid. Gingrich’s campaign said the 31 percent was the effective federal rate on income, apparently not including Social Security payroll taxes.

Gingrich told reporters that he is not criticizing Romney for paying a tax rate below what many wage-earning Americans pay. Gingrich has proposed a plan that would give Americans the option of paying a 15 percent flat tax — which he notes is the same rate Romney is citing.

“My goal is not to raise Mitt Romney’s taxes but to let everyone pay Romney’s rate,” Gingrich said.

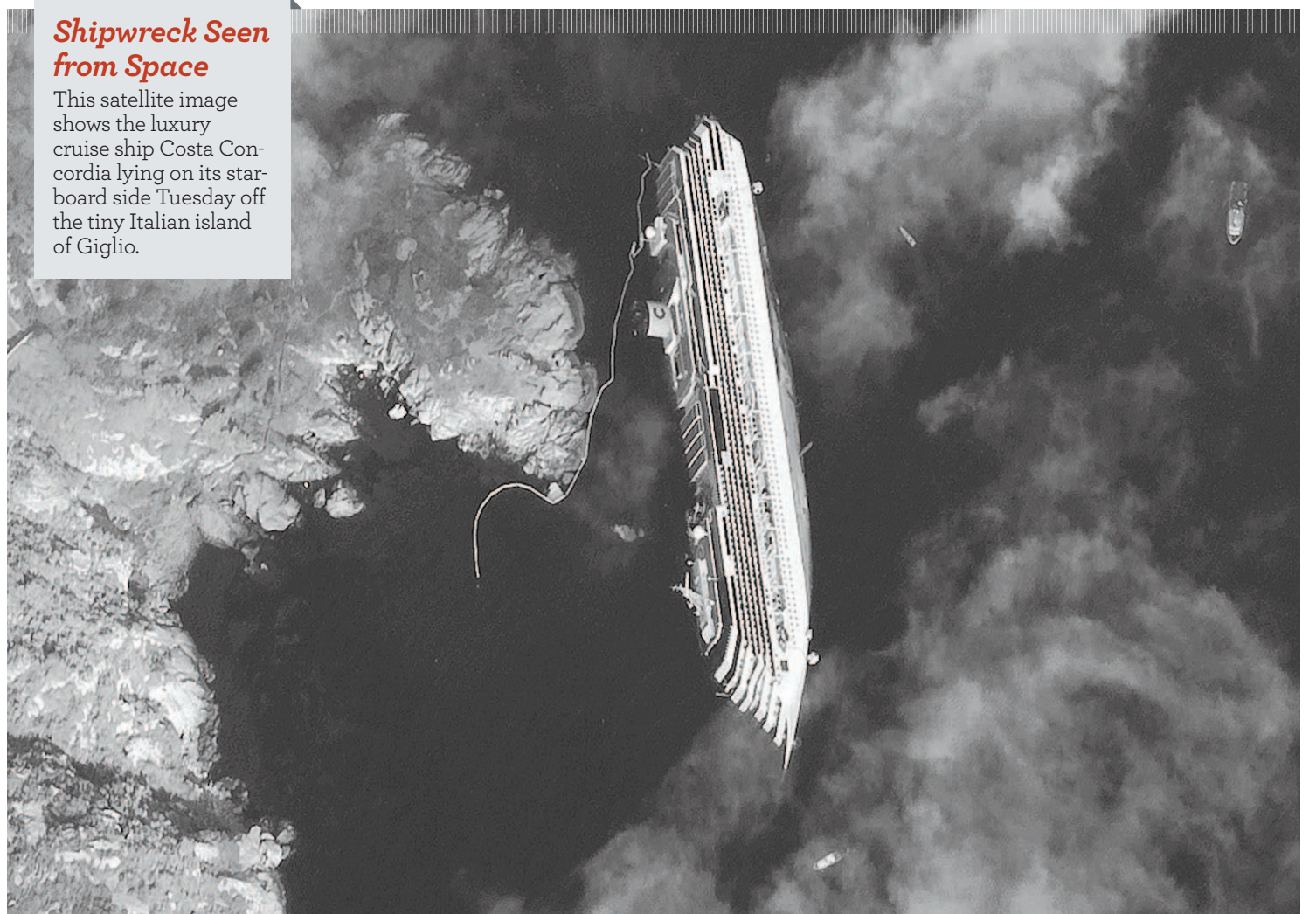

Tales Emerge of Missing, Dead in Liner Disaster

Search for 21 people still unaccounted for grinds to halt after cruise liner shifts on its rocky perch off Tuscan island of Giglio.

ROME • An Italian dad and his 5-year-old daughter. A retired American couple treating themselves after putting four children through college. A Hungarian musician who helped crying children into lifejackets, then disappeared while trying to retrieve his beloved violin from his cabin.

As details emerged Wednesday about the missing and the dead in the grounding of the Costa Concordia, the captain was quoted as saying he tripped and fell into the water from the listing vessel and never intended to abandon his passengers.

The search for the 21 people still unaccounted for in the disaster ground to a halt after the cruise liner shifted again on its

rocky perch off the Tuscan island of Giglio, making it too dangerous for divers to continue. Rough seas were forecast for the next few days.

The bad weather also postponed the start of the weeklong operation to extract the half-million gallons of fuel on board the vessel, as Italy’s environment

minister warned Parliament of the ecological implications if the ship sinks.

The \$450 million Costa Concordia was carrying more than 4,200 passengers and crew when it slammed into a reef and capsized Friday after the captain made an unauthorized diversion from his programmed route and strayed into the perilous waters.

Capt. Francesco Schettino, who was jailed after he left the ship before everyone was safely evacuated, was placed under house arrest Tuesday, facing possible charges of manslaughter, causing a shipwreck and abandoning his ship.

The ship’s operator, Crociere Costa SpA, has accused Schettino of causing the wreck by making the unapproved detour, and the captain has acknowledged carrying out what he called a “tourist navigation” that brought the ship closer to Giglio. Costa has said such a navigational “fly by” was done last Aug. 9-10, after being approved by the company and Giglio port authorities.

However, Lloyd’s List Intelligence, a leading maritime publication, said Wednesday its tracking of the ship’s August route showed it actually took the Concordia slightly closer to Giglio than the course that caused Friday’s disaster.

“This is not a black-and-white case,” Richard Meade, editor of Lloyd’s List, said in a statement.

U.S. Investigates How Al-Qaida Magazine Got Into Guantanamo Cell

An early issue of the magazine contained tips to would-be militants about how to kill U.S. citizens.

FORT MEADE, Md. • A copy of a magazine published by an arm of al-Qaida made its way to a terror suspect at the Guantanamo Bay prison, leading to an inspection of cells and a contentious new policy requiring special review teams to examine correspondence between

prisoners and attorneys, U.S. prosecutors said Wednesday.

Navy Cmdr. Andrea Lockhart told a military judge during a pre-trial hearing that a copy of Inspire magazine got into a cell. She provided no details on who received the magazine or how. But she said the breach showed that prior rules at the base governing mail review were not adequate. Yemen’s al-Qaida in the Arabian Peninsula launched the online, English-language magazine in 2010. An early issue contained tips to would-be militants about how to kill U.S. citizens.

Lockhart is part of the U.S. team

prosecuting the case against Abd al-Rahim al-Nashiri, a Saudi national charged with orchestrating the attack in 2000 on the USS Cole that killed 17 sailors. Al-Nashiri, 47, is considered one of the most senior al-Qaida leaders. He has been held at the U.S. Naval Base in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, since 2006 after spending several years held by the CIA in a series of secret prisons.

Rick Kammen, a civilian attorney for al-Nashiri, told reporters on that his client was not the recipient of the magazine and was not involved in the incident.

How mail between Guantanamo prisoners and their attorneys should be handled consumed several hours of the al-Nashiri’s pre-trial session on Tuesday and Wednesday. At issue is whether even a cursory examination of the legal correspondence violates the attorney-client privilege.

The dispute reflects the untested nature of this latest attempt to resume the military tribunals at Guantanamo. The prosecution of al-Nashiri is already underway and the U.S. is preparing to prosecute five other prisoners accused in the Sept. 11 attacks, yet defense lawyers

and government prosecutors are still fighting to establish basic legal ground rules.

The military commission system has been revised by the Obama administration and Congress, which has refused to allow the administration to move prisoners from the American base in Cuba. The trial system is still sharply criticized by civil and human rights groups and defense lawyers who say the procedures favor the prosecution. Kammen has called the military commissions a “second-class system of justice.”

“Our data suggests that both routes took the vessel within 200 meters (yards) of the impact point and that the authorized route was actually closer to shore.”

New audio of Schettino’s communications with the coast guard during the crisis emerged Wednesday, with the captain claiming he ended up in a life raft after he tripped and fell into the water.

“I did not abandon a ship with 100 people on board, the ship suddenly listed and we were thrown into the water,” Schettino said, according to a transcript published Wednesday in the Corriere della Sera paper.

Initial audio of Schettino’s conversations made headlines on Tuesday, showing an increasingly exasperated coast guard officer ordering Schettino back on board to direct the evacuation, and the captain resisting, saying it was too dark and the ship was tipping.

The officer’s order, “Get back on board, (expletive!)” has entered the Italian lexicon, becoming a Twitter hashtag and adorning T-shirts.

Eleven people have been confirmed dead so far, and 21 are missing. Italian officials have only released 27 names so far, including two Americans, 12 Germans, six Italians, four French, and one person each from Hungary, India and Peru.

The Hungarian victim was identified Wednesday as 38-year-old Sandor Fe-

her, who had been working as an entertainer on the stricken cruise ship. His body was found inside the wreck and identified by his mother, who had traveled to the Italian city of Grosseto, according to Hungary’s foreign ministry.

Jozsef Balog, a pianist who worked with Feher on the ship, told the *Blikk* newspaper that Feher was wearing a lifejacket when he decided to return to his cabin to retrieve his violin. Feher was last seen on deck en route to the area where he was supposed to board a lifeboat.

According to Balog, Feher helped put lifejackets on several crying children before returning to his cabin.

Others among the missing include 5-year-old Dayana Arlotti and her father, William Arlotti, who were on the cruise with the father’s girlfriend. The girl’s parents separated three years ago.

The girl’s mother, Susy Albertini, said she has been desperately calling police, port officials and the cruise company for days for news of her daughter and estranged husband.

“I last heard from her on Thursday,” when she waved goodbye at school, Albertini, 28, told the *La Voce di Romagna* newspaper.

“The absurd thing is that no one can tell me anything, and what little I know is from the newspapers,” she said. “Sometimes they ask absurd questions, like if my daughter knows how to swim. Do they understand she is 5 years old? What kind of question is that?”

It did not take long for the Republicans seeking Obama’s job to slam him.

Newt Gingrich, campaigning for the GOP presidential nomination in South Carolina, called Obama’s decision “stunningly stupid,” adding: “What Obama has done is kill jobs, weaken American security and drive Canada into the arms of China out of just sheer stupidity.”

Republican presidential front-runner Mitt Romney said the decision was “as shocking as it is revealing. It shows a president who once again has put politics ahead of sound policy.”

Project supporters say U.S. rejection of the pipeline would not stop it from being built. Canadian Prime Minister Stephen Harper has said TransCanada could pursue an alternative route through Canada to the West Coast, where oil could be shipped to China and other Asian markets.

Harper on Wednesday told Obama he was profoundly disappointed that Obama turned down the pipeline, Harper’s office said.

that Republicans in Congress forced this decision.”

Republicans responded unsparingly.

“President Obama is destroying tens of thousands of American jobs and shipping American energy security to the Chinese. There’s really just no other way to put it. The president is selling out American jobs for politics,” House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, said. Insisting that the pipeline would help the economy, he declared: “This is not the end of the fight,” signaling that Republicans might try again to force a decision.

The State Department said the decision was made “without prejudice,” meaning TransCanada can submit a new application once a new route is established. Russ Girling, TransCanada’s president and chief executive officer, said the company plans to do exactly that. If approved, the pipeline could begin operation as soon as 2014, Girling said.

Former members of the Cole crew and family members of several of the sailors killed on the ship who spoke to reporters at Guantanamo Wednesday said al-Nashiri is getting better legal treatment than he deserves. “It’s been over 11 years now since the Cole was bombed,” retired Chief Petty Officer Paul Abney said.

He urged that the military commission be allowed to do its work, adding: “They are doing their job to be as fair and honest as possible.”

Al-Nashiri’s defense team, as well as the lawyers for other Guantanamo prisoners and the chief defense counsel for the military commissions, are opposed to the security review of legal mail, which was put in place last month by Navy Rear Adm. David Woods, the prison commander.

Army Col. James Pohl, the judge in al-Nashiri’s case, ordered the detention center in November to stop

Guantanamo guards from reading mail between the prisoner and his lawyers. The judge’s order came after Woods authorized an inspection of detainee cells in October that included reading mail between prisoners and their attorneys.

In late December, Woods issued a new directive requiring legal mail to undergo a security review to ensure prisoners were not receiving prohibited materials, such as top-secret information or objects that can be made into weapons.

The December order from Woods created a “privilege review team” independent of the prison staff that would include attorneys, law enforcement and intelligence experts who would examine legal communications between lawyers and their clients. The goal of the order, prison officials said, was to ensure safety and security on the base while preserving attorney-client privilege by having a group not under the prison’s command perform the mail review.

GOP Campaign Rhetoric Raising Racial Concerns

WASHINGTON • Hoping to win the hearts of Southern conservatives, Newt Gingrich leaned into his argument that President Barack Obama is a “food stamp president” and that poor people should want paychecks, not handouts — a pitch that earned him a standing ovation in South Carolina during a presidential debate on Martin Luther King Jr. Day.

“I believe every American of every background has been endowed by their creator with the right to pursue happiness, and if that make liberals unhappy, I’m going to continue to find ways to help poor people learn how to get a job, learn how to get a better job and learn someday to own the job,” Gingrich said. A day later, he turned the moment — complete with the cheering conservative crowd — into a TV ad as he works to claw his way to the top of the leader board in the closing days of the South Carolina campaign.

Rhetoric like that from Gingrich and other candidates is stoking concerns among some blacks that the political discourse is rewinding to the days of “Southern strategy” campaigning that uses blacks as scapegoats to attract white votes. Yet, it’s unclear whether this strategy — if that’s what it is — will work on an electorate now accustomed to seeing

African Americans in high-ranking positions.

“I see it as a retreat to the sort of bread-and-butter rallying of those who we might call racist,” said Charles P. Henry, chair of African American Studies at the University of California, Berkeley. “I see it as a desperate strategy to draw in those voters and South Carolina would be a better testing ground because of its sizable black population.”

While blacks are of 1.1 percent and 2.9 percent of the population, respectively, in New Hampshire and Iowa, they are almost one in three in South Carolina, where the Civil War began in 1861. That means scapegoating minorities stands to work better there than in either of those previously contested states, Henry said.

“If it works, then one could expect to see it repeated in other primaries where blacks might be a force in state politics,” he said.

Gingrich’s standing ovation came Monday during an exchange with debate panelist Juan Williams, who sought to revisit Gingrich’s assertions in New Hampshire that he would go before the NAACP and talk about “why the African-American community should demand paychecks and not be satisfied with food stamps.”

“Can’t you see this is viewed, at a minimum, as insulting to all Americans, but as particularly to black Americans?” Williams said.

“No, I don’t see that,” Gingrich replied.

Williams said his email and Twitter accounts were “inundated with people of all races who are asking if your comments are not intended to belittle the poor and racial minorities?”

Williams wasn’t the only one wondering.

Last week, when Gingrich faced a crowd at a black church in South Carolina, one woman said his words came across “so negatively, like we’re not doing everything for our young people.”

The NAACP, the Urban League and others condemned Gingrich for dredging up racial stereotypes, and pointed to 2010 Census data showing that, nationally, 49 percent of food stamp recipients were non-Hispanic whites, 26 percent were black and 20 percent were Hispanic.

Gingrich is not alone in using what some blacks interpret to be racial rhetoric or imagery.

Rick Santorum, in a discussion about Medicaid in Iowa, said: “I don’t want to make black people’s lives better by giving them somebody else’s money.” Santorum later denied that his remarks were aimed at blacks.

Ron Paul chose the South Carolina Statehouse grounds, surrounded by Civil War icons and the Confederate battle flag, to talk Tuesday about states’ rights to possibly ignore federal laws they don’t like, which in

the past would have included civil rights and voting laws. Mitt Romney spent King Day campaigning with anti-immigration activist Kris Kobach, architect of two of the strongest immigration crackdown laws in the country. Romney also has said that, if elected, he would veto legislation that would allow illegal immigrants brought to the U.S. as children to earn legal status if they went to college or joined the military.

Politicians know the effect of their words and how those words can help them with conservative voters, especially now that Romney “has sewed up the moderates,” said D’Andrea Orey, chairman of the political science department at Jackson State University in Mississippi.

“This is a calculated move and is not some sort of slip,” Orey said. He added that if politicians can successfully pit blacks against whites, “it creates the kind of contagion that will help to mobilize support” among extremists in the Republican Party.

Former President Jimmy Carter also said he heard familiar undertones in some of Gingrich’s comments. “I wouldn’t say he’s racist, but he knows the subtle words to use to appeal to a racist group,” Carter said in an interview aired Wednesday night on CNN’s “Piers Morgan Tonight.”

The former Democratic president, who like Gingrich is from Georgia, said Gingrich uses terms about welfare “that have been appealing in the past, in those days when we cherished segregation of the races. ... So he’s appealing for that in South Carolina, and I don’t think it’ll pay off in the long run.”

Romney had the ability to pay a lower tax rate by investing in funds located offshore.

A spokeswoman for Romney’s campaign confirmed that the Romneys have money in the Caymans. But the campaign did not say why. Spokeswoman Andrea Saul also said: “ABC is flat wrong. The Romneys’ investments in funds established in the Cayman Islands are taxed in the very same way they would be if those funds were established in the United States. These are not tax havens and it is false to say so.”

While a supporter rushed to Romney’s defense, the former Massachusetts governor tried to duck the issue entirely on Wednesday, making no mention of his tax returns or tax rate during a rally at Wofford College here and declining to take questions from the news media. Instead, he delivered his standard campaign speech and assailed Gingrich, who has been running second in opinion polls in South Carolina.

Romney aides, too, refused to comment about his tax returns or details of his

tax rate when pressed.

His campaign held a conference call featuring surrogates who tried to cast Gingrich, the former House speaker, as an unreliable leader, but the wealth and taxes issue showed no signs

of going away.

At an event in Rock Hill, S.C., Romney kept away from the issue of his taxes, but he criticized Republicans who “jumped on that bandwagon” of criticizing free enterprise. “My good-

ness, I listened to Speaker Gingrich the other night talk about the enterprises I’ve been associated with,” Romney said. “I’m proud of the fact that I worked in the private sector, that I’ve achieved success.”

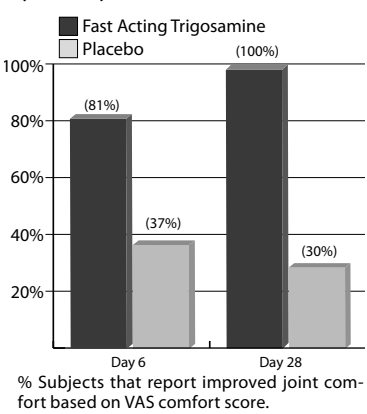

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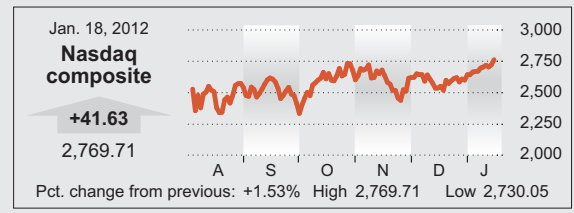
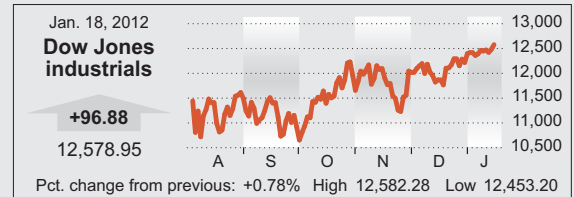
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THE MARKET AT A GLANCE

Dow, S&P 500 Close at Their Highest Since July

NEW YORK (AP) • A surprisingly strong report on the housing market and the prospect of more cash for the International Monetary Fund to fight off a financial crisis powered stocks Wednesday to their highest close since last summer. The Standard & Poor's 500 index closed above 1,300 for the first time since July 28, and the Dow Jones industrial average finished at its highest since July 25. It was also the first time since Jan. 3, the first trading day of the year, that the S&P 500 moved more than 1 percent. The S&P is up 4 percent for the year, the Dow 3 percent.

Mortgage Deal Between Banks, States is 'Close'

WASHINGTON (AP) • A \$25 billion settlement between the nation's major banks and U.S. states over deceptive foreclosure practices during the housing crisis is nearing completion.
Five major banks — Bank of America, JPMorgan Chase, Wells Fargo, Citibank and Ally Financial (formerly GMAC) — and U.S. states are “very close,” Housing and Urban Development Secretary Shaun Donovan said Wednesday.
Separately, two officials briefed on internal discussions say a proposed deal could be announced within weeks. Negotiators are finalizing a draft of the agreement, which must be reviewed by state attorneys general. Under the deal, banks would pay states and the federal government, which would fund programs to compensate homeowners.

EBay's 4th quarter earnings, revenue • EBay reported on Wednesday that its net income grew sharply in the fourth quarter, helped by a gain from the sale of its remaining investment in Skype. Its results beat Wall Street's expectations, boosted by strong holiday sales at its namesake website and growth at PayPal, its online payments business. Investors sent eBay's stock higher in after-hours trading. The company earned \$1.98 billion, or \$1.51 per share, in the October-December quarter. That's up from \$559 million, or 42 cents per share, in the same period a year earlier.

Protest Exposes Silicon Valley-Hollywood Rivalry

One-day outage by Wikipedia and other websites is timed to coincide with key House and Senate committee hearings on anti-online piracy bills that they portray as an attack on a free and open Internet.

LOS ANGELES • In a move that heightens the growing tension between Silicon Valley and Hollywood, Wikipedia and other websites went dark Wednesday in protest of two congressional proposals intended to thwart the online piracy of copyrighted movies and TV programs.
The web-based encyclopedia is part of a loose coalition of dot-coms and large technology companies that fear Congress is prepared to side with Hollywood and enact extreme measures — possibly including the blocking of entire websites — to stop the online sharing and unauthorized use of Hollywood productions.

The fight will test which California-based industry has the most sway in Washington.
For now, Silicon Valley appears to have the upper hand. Supporters of the legislation — called the Stop Online Piracy Act in the House and the Protect Intellectual Property Act in the Senate — say the bills are aimed at protecting jobs in the movie and music industries. But a campaign including tech heavyweights such as Google Inc. and Yahoo Inc. has successfully portrayed the bills as an attack on a free and open Internet.
“It has nothing to do with stolen songs or movies,” said Justin Ruben, executive director of MoveOn.org, which is participating in the blackout. Ruben says tougher legislation — even directed overseas — could make domestic cultural commentators more prone to legal attack.
Rather than showing encyclopedia articles, Wikipedia displayed a blacked-out page describing the protest and offering more information on the bills. Many articles were still viewable on cached pages.
Reddit.com shut down its social news service for 12 hours. Other sites made their views clear without cutting off services. Google blacked out the logo on its home page, directing people to a page where they could add their names to a petition.

The one-day outage was timed to coincide with key House and Senate committee hearings as they prepare to send the bills to the full floor for debate.
However, sponsor Rep. Lamar Smith, a Texas Republican, sought last week to remove a controversial provision from the House bill that could force Internet service providers to interfere with the way Web addresses work for foreign sites deemed dedicated to piracy. He postponed work on the measure until February.
Critics believe such tinkering with core Internet technology treads into dangerous territory that could lead to online censorship. It might also give hackers a new way to wreak havoc.
The White House raised concerns that the bills could stifle innovation. Over the weekend, the Obama administration reacted to two online petitions, saying it “will not support legislation that reduces freedom of expression, increases cybersecurity risk or undermines the dynamic, innovative global Internet.”

At the same time, the administration called on all sides to “pass sound legislation this year that provides prosecutors and rights holders new legal tools to combat online piracy originating beyond U.S. borders.”
That nuanced stance is President Barack Obama's attempt at “threading the needle” between two important constituencies as he seeks reelection in November, said Jeffrey Silva, a technology policy analyst at Medley Global Advisors in Washington.
On the one hand, his administration has defended a free, open Internet as it watched repressive regimes fall in the Middle East with help from social media such as Twitter. It has also been a proponent of the concept of “net neutrality,” which prevents Internet service

providers from slowing online traffic that comes from file-sharing sites known to trade in pirated content.
On the other hand, Obama and other Democrats have gone to Hollywood dozens of times to raise campaign funds over the years.
“The administration is trying to fight to protect the Internet space,” Silva said. “But at the same time, it doesn't want to disenfranchise Hollywood and the business community.”

Indeed, behind the protests and public posturing, both Hollywood and Silicon Valley spend generously to lobby causes in Washington. According to the Center for Responsive Politics, the movie, television and music industries spent a combined \$91.7 million on lobbying efforts in 2011, compared with the computer and Internet industry's \$93 million.
In the 2012 election cycle, the movie, television and music industry offered up \$7.7 million in direct campaign contributions to congressional candidates. The computer and Internet industry contributed \$6.6 million.
Despite the uproar on websites and blogs, PIPA remains firmly in play. Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Patrick Leahy said Tuesday that he intends to push the bill toward a floor vote on Jan. 24. He said much of the criticism of the bill is “flatly wrong.”

But amid the high-tech campaign against the bills, several lawmakers came out in opposition. At least three Senate Republicans who had previously cosponsored the Senate bill — Orrin Hatch of Utah, Roy Blunt of Missouri and John Boozman of Arkansas — issued statements Wednesday saying they were withdrawing their support.

in their first 38 days.
“Sometimes with these, what you don't feed them is more important than what you do feed them,” Bannerman said.

Ryan Franco already uses Alltech's products but said that he was looking for more information about new technology that can benefit his operation.

Pre-production practices are important in feeding the world, Alltech speakers said, but it all comes down to whether the end product is good.
“Food is not nutrition for people,” Bannerman said, “it is an emotional experience and we at Alltech have put our money where our mouth is.”

The Twin Falls stop was part of the Kentucky-based company's 24-city tour through January and early February.

Three speakers — Alltech Regional Sales Manager Tyler Bramble, Strategic Partnership Manager Elizabeth Bagby and Director of National Accounts Jim Bannerman — discussed ideas ranging from how nutrition affects animal genetics and product quality to the food needs of a growing world population.
Alltech is a Kentucky-based global research company that focuses on natural scientific solutions for agriculture and food industry concerns, one of them being animal nutrition and health. It has an Idaho office in Jerome.
Bannerman explained that nutrigenomics is the idea that using specific animal nutrition can cause specific genes to address traits such as fertility, feed efficiency, growth rate, and even disease. He said it's not genetic alteration, rather a four-phase program that improves meat quality through what animals are fed

Local Dairy producer Tony VanderHulst said he attended the lecture because, “the population keeps growing and we need to figure out the most efficient way to feed everyone.” He said he wanted to see what new things Alltech has to offer and received some new information to take home and think about.
Bramble, speaking of efforts to excite customers about the greater agriculture industry, called the present “a really exciting time agriculturally.” He focused on efforts to improve profitability and to make agricultural practices sustainable.
During the lecture, Alltech officials continuously emphasized the importance they place on the youth and their education. Speakers also awarded a biography of Steve Jobs to Kimberly Agriculture teacher Cody Porath.

The Twin Falls Public Library offers a wide range of outdoors-themed books to read until it's warm enough to act on their advice.

"Whether you're a life-long resident or just passing through, these resources will help you get the most out of your warm weather recreation here in Idaho," reads a pamphlet printed by the library that lists dozens of its books focusing on outdoor recreation.

Want to learn about local hiking? Check out "Hike Lewis and Clark's Idaho." What about biking? There's "Mountain Biking Sun Valley, Idaho: Including the Sawtooth Mountains." Is climbing your thing? See "Idaho, a Climbing Guide: Climbs, Scrambles and Hikes."

Like pretty pictures? There's "Backcountry Roads Idaho," full of vivid photos of the Gem State. Need information on campsites, including locations and fees? "Camping Idaho" might be the book for you.

The library also has books about water sports, fishing and birding. Materials can be found in normal circulation and in the Idaho and Pacific Northwest History Room, a browsing section stuffed with tomes about all things Idaho.

Club, where an adult can fish for \$10 and a child (up to 17) can fish for \$3.50.

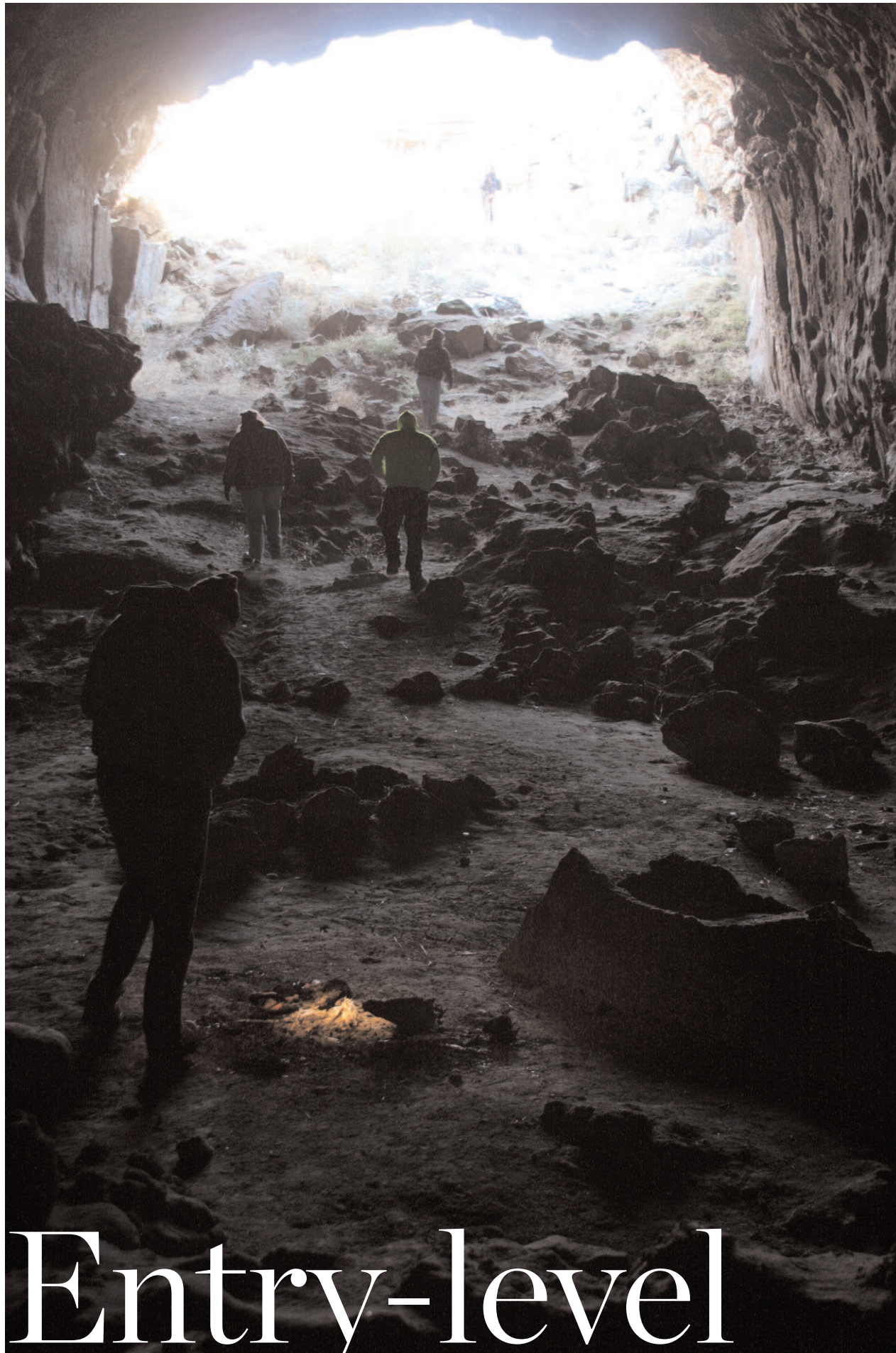
Of course, there are some rules: The lake is a fly fishing-only venue, and your catches must be released. That's OK if you just want to feel a fighting fish at the end of your line.

Entry-level Spelunking

After rounding up a group of Facebook friends, a former Filer police chief leads the way to Bear Trap Cave for a day of exploring.

MINIDOKA • A dry winter breeze pushed white clouds in a blue sky as our group arrived at the lava tube north of Minidoka late Friday morning.

"There it is," said Rupert resident Mike Dudley, pointing to the cave on our left as Cliff Johnson slowed the vehicle. Eight of us from various parts of the Magic Valley had traveled in three vehicles on a dirt road for the past 20 miles, taking in the desert scenery as we talked about outdoor recreation and cop stories.

Johnson, a former chief with the Filer Police Department, said he came across Bear Trap Cave while hunting as a young man, noting the area's open fields are home to plenty of elk, mule deer, coyotes, rodents and snakes.

Friday was Johnson's first day back after more than 20 years. He had invited Facebook friends to go, and several said yes. It's a classic southern Idaho pastime: rounding up a few like-minded lovers of the landscape to check out something cool.

For most on Friday, it was their first time at Bear Trap. On his first visit, Johnson didn't make it far into the cave. "I didn't have any lights at the time," he said. "But I envisioned it as being used by the Indians as a place for shelter."

After stepping from the vehicles, the group grabbed flashlights and gloves. After a few minutes of chitchat, we heard the clarion call: "We all ready?" Johnson said, wearing a worker's helmet with a light on top. For good measure, he carried a flashlight.

We headed into the abyss.

Frozen Gourmets Harvest Fish through Ice

Bryan Lepagnol trudged across Fernan Lake's frozen surface Friday afternoon, pulling a sled filled with fishing supplies.

The sky was blue overhead. The perch were biting. And the ice was like costly crystal: thick, smooth and patterned with frost whirls and air bubbles.

For those willing to bundle up, the small lake east of Coeur d'Alene was an outdoor playground.

"I like the cold," Lepagnol said. "You can get to the fish better than from on the shore, and you're more secluded."

Ice fishing lets him roam all over the lake. And unlike summer, when the lake is congested with motorboats, Lepagnol had the place nearly to himself.

Wool pants and four layers of shirts and jackets protected him from temperatures in the 20s. For traction on the ice, he'd strapped on a pair of spiked lawn aerators.

Lepagnol's dog, Tank — a

Jan. 13 was the first time these people hooked up to explore a cave together, but most said they've explored in smaller groups or by themselves.

"I do it all the time. I shouldn't, but I do," Johnson said about exploring alone, noting that nowadays he mostly is interested in prospecting for gems.

Denise Alexander of Filer and Ruth Harder of Buhl said they've explored a number of caves in south-central Idaho. Alexander estimated that more than 300 explorable caves exist in the valley.

"Oh yeah, there are caves all over the place out here," said Dudley, a Rupert Police Department patrol officer. He's explored several of them, both as a teenager and an adult.

Long-time spelunkers Dennis Seavert and his wife, Trish, of Hunt, explored caves in California, but being fairly new to Idaho they're excited about visiting Gem State caves. Bear Trap was their first — and that's after Dennis had hip surgery in December.

Bear Trap is a major lava tube system, one of several that originated northeast of Kings Bowl Rift thousands of years ago near Craters of the Moon, according to the Bureau of Land Management. The tube can be traced on the surface for more than 15 miles before it is buried by lava flows. A sign posted as an Eagle Scout project by Elden Wright just outside the cave reads: "Approximately 15,000 years old, Bear Trap Cave is probably older than the Wapi flow (2,270 years old) and the Craters of the Moon flow (as young as 2,070 years old)."

As the group walked into the cave, Dennis Seavert used a cane to steady himself among the large rocks visitors have to tread near the cave's opening.

"You doing all right?" Johnson asked.

"Yeah, I'm OK," Seavert replied, stepping slowly.

You don't need to have hip surgery as an excuse to go slow in Bear Trap. It's best to take care over the fallen rocks to make sure your footing is stable.

Also, watch out for rattlesnakes. A 26-year-old Rupert man was bitten five times by a rattler at the cave in August 2011, Dudley said. He's lucky to be alive.

The rock piling ends after several yards and the cave opens up to flat, sandy ter-

Cliff Johnson aimed his light at a colorful mark on a small ledge against a wall. Being a self-proclaimed prospector, he wondered if it was anything of value. It wasn't: just the drippings of a candle used by a former cave visitor.

Our journey came to an abrupt end when the walls narrowed. The cave — one of many former lava tubes in the area — had at one time crashed in, blocking further access. The cave is 150 feet long, according to the BLM.

Revealed by our flashlight beams was other evidence that the cave has had visitors over the years: initials, dates, even a swastika painted on the walls. We also found beer cans, bullet shells and other trash left by careless visitors.

More than 100 feet behind us was the glow of sunlight stealing through the cave's opening, the promise of warmth. We walked toward the light.

On our way out of the cave, we stopped to have our picture taken next to the sign. "Enjoy your visit and remember to ... take nothing but pictures, leave nothing but footprints, kill nothing but time," it reminds visitors.

"I didn't like the graffiti," Alexander said. She wishes people wouldn't leave their imprint like that. "Each cave is unique and different in their own way."

We had traveled a couple of hours to Bear Trap, but our explorations didn't last long. The cave, though wide, was shorter than most of us

expected. Was it worth our time?

Most said yes, though they all wished the cave were longer.

"If only these walls could speak," Harder said. Then with a chuckle: "We might learn more than we wanted to about what's went on in there."

Dennis Seavert's take on the cave: It was an easy one to hike, even for someone with hip surgery. His wife's impression: "It was very in-

teresting," Trish Seavert said.

A while later we were back in our vehicles, the flashlights and gloves tucked away for another day of exploration. As the Johnsons, Dudley and I traveled back along the dirt road, we talked about the landscape, the cave and more cop stories.

"Tell him the one about the cat," Dudley told Cliff Johnson, a smile creasing his face. "You have to tell him the one about the cat."

A Look Back at 2011 Hunting Seasons

For the past six years I've kept an informal personal hunting journal. Within its pages I try to capture the essence of each day's hunt.

I'll certainly mention the beauty of the sunrise, the curious squeaky-wheel sounds the whistler's wings make as they pass overhead, and the big tom turkey that hopped out of the willows and set sail across the stream.

These are the sights and sounds reserved for hunters — individuals willing to get up before dawn to face the wet, dark and cold world.

I also try to analyze the reasons for my successes and failures. Over time I learn to focus on techniques and equipment that work for me and issues that I need to correct.

As the ink dries on my final entry for the 2011 upland game and waterfowl seasons, let me take a moment to flip through this year's notations to see if we can glean any gems that might make the 2012 season our best ever.

Lots of time spent chasing birds in Idaho's steep and deep terrain this fall have convinced me that the 20-gauge is ideally suited for most of our regional upland game, be it forest, sage or sharp-tail grouse, quail, pheasant or chukar. After years of lugging ponderous 12-gauge pumps and autos over hill and dale, I've come to love the smaller, lighter and handier 20s.

The old adage is true with regards to upland hunting: Even on the best days, you'll carry your shotgun a lot more than you'll shoot it.

So why carry more gun than you need? Experienced hunters have found that a potent dose of No. 6

lead shot from a 20-bore corralled by the best patterning choke available will handily bring all of these birds to bag.

My notes also indicate that a pair of quality shooting gloves, light-weight, waterproof hunting boots with lug soles, impact-resistant shooting glasses, a comfortable shooting vest with hunter orange panels, and a portable water bottle are indispensable for truly enjoyable upland hunts.

I made a number of notations about the need to become intimately familiar with my shotguns. I practiced all summer at the trap-sheet range with my 12-gauge without realizing that it's form-fitting synthetic stock would prove much too long when I suited up for December's frigid hunts. I also lost some birds because I failed to put in the necessary range time with my Remington 1100 to find out which choke tube threw the densest pattern with the 2 3/4-inch Winchester XPERT No. 2s that I love for both ducks and geese.

There's also an entry about the big cock pheasant I missed because I forgot that the Winchester 1300 safety button is in a different place than my 1100's.

Consider keeping a personal hunting journal. It will make you a better hunter and is comforting reading during the endless dog days of summer.

Good shooting!

playful, lab-chow mix of seven months — had a harder time with his footing. The dog's legs splayed as he sprinted across the ice, and he skidded when he tried to stop.

The ice occasionally creaked and popped. But it was 5 to 7 inches thick, sturdy enough to support the fisherman's weight.

Tom Burke, an ice skater, was delighted to see Fernan Lake's smooth, glassy surface. After a promising freeze early in winter, the ice had thinned until water lapped along the shore.

"I was playing golf last week at Prairie Falls Golf Club," Burke said. "My buddy's cellphone said it was 59 degrees in the sun."

Plunging temperatures restored skating conditions. Burke, 56, glided across the ice in preparation for an im-

promptu hockey game. He was expecting neighborhood kids to join him with their sticks and pucks after school let out.

"It's got some character — you know that you're skating on a lake," Burke said of the ice. "But it's got some sweet spots, too."

The thermometer read 11 degrees when Warren Sperry and George Clapp, fishing pals from Osburn, Idaho, left their homes around 7:30 on a recent Friday morning. They

stopped at Rose Lake, but decided that the ice wasn't thick enough. At Fernan, the men set up portable ice shanties. The tentlike structures kept them warm, even though their fishing holes threatened to ice over.

By afternoon, they had a bag of perch for a future fish fry.

"We're big fans of fish finders," Sperry said. The sonar devices are "the ticket for finding fish. Once you get one, they'll spoil you."

These added touches to the grounds gathered comments from not only the local people who came to use the grounds every summer but from those around the entire country who came for the numerous national stock shows, professional rodeo and the Miss Rodeo Idaho contest during the fair. The

Neoma and Tom strived to put the fairgrounds on the map for people around the country for 22 years. Neoma was on the Miss Rodeo America Board of Directors and was honored in the Western Stockman Hall of Fame. In 2001, the fair grandstands were named the Shouse Arena. Neoma was recently awarded a 50-year pin from Twin Falls Chapter 29 of the Order of the Eastern Star and another from the Pocatello Chapter of the Social Order of the Beauceant.

Neoma is survived by son, Gary, and Lauren, a daughter that she never had; grandsons, Todd, Steven, Chad and Cory; 11 great-grandchildren; and four, soon to be five, great-great-grandchildren. Neoma was happiest when she had her family and friends around her.

Widespread Snowstorm Wallops Pacific Northwest

OLYMPIA, Wash. • A winter storm that packed winds of 100 mph and dumped more than a foot of snow in the Pacific Northwest could soon give way to another threat: warmer weather and the potential for flooding.

On Wednesday, at least, some residents in Washington state's capital tried to find a way to enjoy the abundance of snow in a region not used to huge snowfalls.

"I love it," said teenager Emily Hansen, who had the day off from high school and spent the morning with her mother taking photos of the growing piles of snow outside the Capitol.

Her mother, however, was more measured, mindful of what the days ahead could bring. "A day or two it's fun, but after a while you start looking at accidents and slush and flooding," Pat Hansen said.

From Olympia to the Oregon coast, the storm closed schools, caused dozens of flight cancellations and clogged roads with snow and hundreds of accidents.

Olympia had nearly a foot of new snow on the ground by late morning. Nearly 11 inches was measured at the airport Wednesday. The record is 14.2 inches on Jan. 24, 1972.

Lewis County, south of Olympia, had the highest snowfall amounts, ranging from 12 to 17 inches.

"It's unusual to get this much snow for western Washington, especially in this amount," said Dennis D'Amico, a meteorologist at the National Weather Service in Seattle.

"A storm that that may drop upward of a foot on Olympia, that's pretty significant," he said. "Whether it's over 12 hours or six hours, it's still a lot of snow to deal with."

By mid-afternoon, only a light snow or freezing rain fell

in the southern part of the state.

"The storm is gradually winding down," said Carl Cerniglia, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Seattle. "What's been left behind is just a really light snow."

Thursday's forecast was for a mix of snow and rain, and the National Weather Service warned that urban and small stream flooding was possible Friday, when another storm was expected to hit the state.

Rain and temperatures in the 40s would start melting snow on the ground.

Also, forecasters warned that heavy rain combined with snow melt could lead to some river flooding, especially in the Chehalis River Basin, an area that has been hit by significant floods in recent years.

A flooding forecast issued by the weather service on Wednesday said that there was a lot of uncertainty "in how much snow water there is and how fast that snow will melt."

Officials in Lewis County said they didn't have yet have concerns about flooding in the Chehalis River, but were monitoring the amount of snow they receive.

Washington residents had plenty of warning as snow showers started over the weekend.

With the heavy snow in sight, Seattle and other school districts canceled classes in advance. Alaska Airlines announced late Tuesday that it canceled 38 flights into and out of Seattle and Portland, Ore.

Washington State University announced late Wednesday it was cancelling all classes Thursday at its Pullman campus in southeastern Washington as significant snowfall was expected overnight.

Many courts and government offices and libraries closed. Garbage collection was postponed. Several Seattle hotels reported all their rooms were booked. Elsewhere,

shoppers stocked up on groceries.

Over a 24-hour period ending at 9 a.m. Wednesday, the Washington State Patrol responded to nearly 500 collisions on western Washington roads, spokesman Bob Calkins said.

"I saw a guy in my rear mirror," said State Trooper Guy Gill. "I saw headlights and taillights and headlights and taillights again as he spun around off the road."

In Oregon, high winds hammered parts of the coast and caused power outages to tens of thousands of customers, with reports of gusts of 110 mph and more. There were no immediate reports of serious damage.

At the Capitol in Washington state, it was business as usual.

Some state employees drove into work, but others walked in, and at least one employee was seen cross-country skiing to the campus. The 60-day legislative session began Jan. 9.

In Tacoma, which had about 7 inches of snow for the morning rush hour, a kilt-clad, barelegged Charles Hetrick frolicked with his dog in a park.

"I've worn nothing but kilts for the last six years, so I didn't even think about it when I put it on this morning," Hetrick said.

In Seattle, a fleet of 30 plows, de-icing trucks and graders were deployed to remove snow from main city streets. It had stopped snowing in Seattle Wednesday afternoon, but several inches of snow were still on the ground.

Hundreds of people careened down Queen Anne Hill, one of Seattle's steepest, on skis, sleds and laundry baskets — narrowly missing cars that crossed the intersection at the bottom.

Jake Munson, an 18-year-old student at the Art Institute of Seattle, joined two friends in sliding down on an air mattress covered with a clear plastic bag.

Skiers Hit the Halfpipe Despite Burke's Injury

PARK CITY, Utah • The afternoon sun has cast a giant shadow across one wall of the imposing 22-foot superpipe at Park City Mountain Resort.

On the other, members of the French national team are illuminated as they catch big air, twisting and spinning as they prepare for another run at the Winter X Games later this month.

Though they just arrived at this Utah mountain town, they know this is the pipe where Canadian freestyle skier Sarah Burke, in critical condition at a nearby hospital, was injured just days ago. And it is the same pipe where champion snowboarder Kevin Pearce suffered a traumatic brain injury two years ago.

Although the athletes training Jan. 12 said they respect the sport's dangers, they'll continue doing what they do.

"The danger is part of the sport, so you have to accept that," said Benoit Valentin, 19, an alternate at the upcoming X Games.

The French currently have some of the best halfpipe skiers in the world, with Kevin Rolland and Thomas Krief, and 2009 Winter X Games Champion Xavier Bertoni.

"We come here because it's the best place to train at this time of the year," French coach Greg Guenet said.

And they come because not only do they want to do well at the X Games but at the 2014 Olympics, where the sport will be included for the first time.

Burke, a four-time Winter X Games champion in half-pipe skiing, has been one of the leading pioneers to have it included in the Olympics.

She was considered a favorite for the Sochi Games and was gearing up to defend her latest X Games gold medal this month in Aspen, Colo., when she suffered a

devastating injury Tuesday afternoon.

Burke, a 29-year-old from Ontario who lives in Squamish, British Columbia, remained in critical condition at University Hospital in Salt Lake City after a successful operation Wednesday to repair a tear to a vertebral artery that caused bleeding in her brain. Medical experts say such a tear can cause bleeding that disrupts blood flow to the brain, which in serious cases can lead to brain damage or death.

Doctors are monitoring her brain function before making definitive pronouncements about her chances of recovery.

Because of her situation, members of the French team training at the Park City superpipe didn't want to talk about the accident.

"We know her and love her and hope she's going to be better," Guenet said. "We send our best to her family and her husband, too. We know him, too."

Another team member did not want to be interviewed at all.

Valentin acknowledged there is always some fear. "We are always scared about doing jumps in the air, but you can deal with that," he said. "You can do what you do, and that's it. But it's always scary." Excitement about the sport's inclusion in the Olympics often overrides that fear.

"It means the sport is bigger than before, and a gold medal for me is the dream," Valentin said.

Dr. Tom Hackett, an orthopedic surgeon and sports medicine specialist at the Steadman Clinic in Vail, Colo., has watched the sport evolve.

"The athletes are growing with the pipes," said Hackett, head team physician for U.S. Snowboarding. "The reason the pipes are getting that big is that's what the athletes

want. A lot of the progression of the sport is athlete-driven; it's not driven by sponsorships or external public influence."

Hackett said the athletes have respect for the danger and potential injury.

"There's plenty of times when they're up on the pipe and they call it quits for the day because they're just not feeling it," Hackett said. "It's not because they're tired or lazy but smart. They realize they need to walk away from the pipe that day."

He said it's coincidental that two major injuries occurred at the Park City superpipe.

"There's only a few places where those pipes are created, and that's where the best athletes go," he said.

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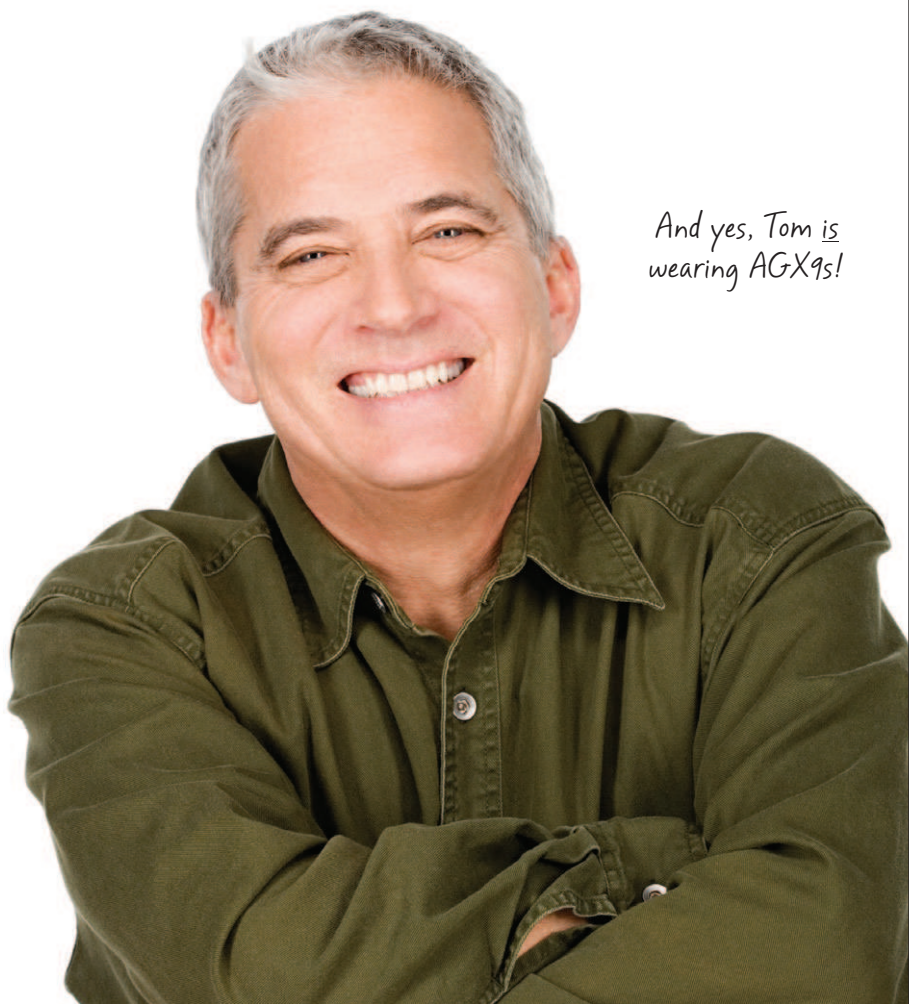

Ratings King 'American Idol' Ready for Its 11th Season

LAS VEGAS • It's been a decade since Texas native Kelly Clarkson was plucked from obscurity and turned into the nation's first American Idol.

Now the TV show that has spawned dozens of other pop stars and talent competitions opened its 11th season Wednesday under a cloud of uncertainty.

Is this Ryan Seacrest's last year hosting the nation's most popular show?

Will fans return after new judges Jennifer Lopez and Steven Tyler embraced flattery over criticism during their debut season last year?

Does America still want pop stars invented by a TV show?

The return of the superstar competition will provide some, but not all of the answers fans want to know as "American Idol" heads into its second post-Simon Cowell season.

Lopez and Tyler were brought on to revamp the show last year after Cowell's departure. Despite the shake-up "Idol" maintained its spot as the nation's most-watched TV show, making it No. 1 for the

eighth-straight season.

But some critics complained that the new format lacked bite. Lopez, Tyler and lone original judge Randy Jackson seemed reluctant to point out contestants' shortcomings last year in the same blunt manner that helped make "Idol" must-see entertainment.

No major changes have been announced for the show's 11th season. Finalists will once again compete in Las Vegas midway through the competition. Veteran music producer Jimmy Iovine, chairman of Inter-

scope-Geffen-A&M, will return as the in-house mentor for the contestants.

Seacrest has said he would like to stay on as the show's host past 2012. His contract ends this year. There have been several reports that Seacrest could replace Matt Lauer, should he decide to leave the "Today" show on NBC.

Seacrest, Lopez, Tyler and Jackson were poised to usher in the new season with a press conference on the Las Vegas Strip Wednesday before the show's season premier,

which focused on Savannah, Ga., auditions. Today's show will feature tryouts in Pittsburgh.

"Idol's" new season opens in a different era from when the show launched in 2002. Then, former judge Cowell helped turn the competition into a national phenomenon with his harsh feedback for the show's less-than-stellar contestants. It was the only singing competition of its kind at the time.

Now, "Idol" remains the nation's TV ratings leader, but faces challenges from NBC's competition "The Voice," and Fox's "The X Factor," which stars Cowell.

"Idol" is still the best TV show of its kind anywhere," Jackson told an audience of TV critics recently. "We are the original. We kind of invented this whole game that everybody is now copying." The show has helped launched the careers of pop stars Clarkson, Jennifer Hudson, Chris Daughtry and Carrie Underwood.

Scotty McCreery, last season's winner, became the first "Idol" to start his post-show career with a No. 1 album since Ruben Studdard in 2003.

RUPERT • The Minico High football team received approval Wednesday from the Idaho High School Activities Association to add a 10th game to its 2012 schedule, in order to participate at the Smackdown in Sactown event Sept. 8 in Sacramento, Calif.

As part of an eight-game, two-day, one-field event, Minico will play McClymonds High from Oakland.

"It will be an experience of a lifetime for our kids," said Minico head coach

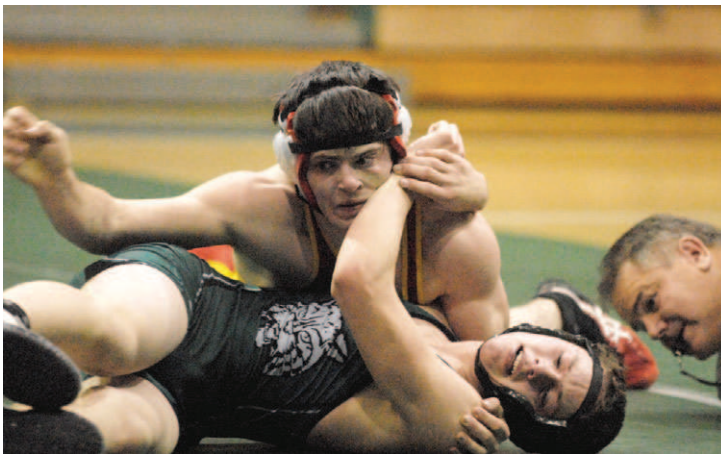

ESPN first reported Wednesday that Tebow got hurt on a third-quarter tackle, then had trouble sleeping because of the pain and underwent an MRI on his chest Monday.

Wozniacki Gets Some Major Advice

MELBOURNE, Australia • Just the mention of Rory McIlroy's name elicited a smile from Caroline Wozniacki.

The top-ranked Dane advanced to the third round at the Australian Open on Wednesday, and there were still three women in the field who had a chance of replacing her at the top of the women's rankings. But instead of the usual questions about how she plans to end her drought at Grand Slam tournaments, she was asked if her boyfriend might be able to help her win her first major.

She smiled, paused, then relayed some of the advice McIlroy offered that helped him overcome similar pressure and win a golf major.

"Well, it's just about you can't really do anything about the past," Wozniacki said. "You just need to look forward. You have a tournament now, and you want to do the best you can. That's it."

"Then if it goes well, it's great. If not, you have the

next one. It's like tennis."

Also Wednesday, second-ranked Rafael Nadal advanced without much trouble from his injured right knee or from German veteran Tommy Haas in a 6-4, 6-3, 6-4 win. Four-time champion Roger Federer didn't even need to pick up a racket because Andreas Beck withdrew from their sec-

ond-round match.

The top-ranked American man bowed out when No. 8 Mardy Fish lost to Alejandro Falla of Colombia 7-6 (4), 6-3, 7-6 (6). But No. 16 John Isner survived a five-setter to beat former Wimbledon finalist David Nalbandian, who was enraged by an umpire who didn't allow him to challenge a disputed line call

because he took too long to ask for a review.

McIlroy was considered a major golf talent on the cusp of a breakthrough when he blew a four-stroke lead and lost last year's Masters. He handled it with such humility that it didn't surprise anyone when he rebounded to win the U.S. Open two months later, when he was 22.

Wozniacki has been on the precipice, losing the 2009 U.S. Open final. Since then, she's held the year-end No. 1 ranking twice but never returned to a championship match. Meanwhile, she's struck up a relationship with the golfer from Northern Ireland.

After racing through the first set in 28 minutes, she had some tough moments in a second-set battle but remained composed to beat Anna Tatishvili 6-1, 7-6 (4). Because of the heat, Wozniacki sat with a bag of ice on her head to cool off.

Third-seeded Victoria Azarenka advanced in a night match with a 6-1, 6-0 win over Australian wild

Look For a Super Bowl Rematch In Indy

Get ready for the rematch. The Super Bowl rematch, not the Harbaugh coaching family reunion.

For a Super Bowl redux to happen, the New York Giants will need another huge road win, this time at San Francisco. And when they get it Sunday, will they face the Baltimore Ravens, who routed them in the 2001 Super Bowl? Or New England, which had its perfect record shattered by the Giants in the big game four years ago?

Read on for that one.

NEW YORK GIANTS (PLUS 2 1/2) AT SAN FRANCISCO

It's hard to say who had the more impressive victory last weekend. The Giants (11-7) outplayed, outcoached and outworked the defending champion Packers at Lambeau Field, where Green Bay hadn't lost since early last season. The 49ers showed more passing offense than anyone imagined and won a shootout with one of the league's most prolific offenses, the Saints.

New York forced four turnovers, one fewer than San Francisco, a major factor in their games.

"We always talk about the turnover margin and, of course, that was huge," Giants coach Tom Coughlin said. "We were plus-3. And we felt very much so for a team that only had 14 turnovers over the course of the entire season, that was exceptional. They were a team with plus-24 and really had played from the other side of it all year long."

The 49ers (14-3) have played from the positive side of it all season, too. They were plus-28, with a minuscule 10 giveaways during the regular season.

So whoever protects the ball will move closer to that trip to Indianapolis.

These rivals have a long history of postseason meetings, including New York's 15-13 win in 1990. Most memorable might be San Francisco's wild 39-38 victory nine years ago after which the league apologized to the Giants for a botched officiating call on the last play.

Their most recent matchup was the 49ers' 27-20 win at Candlestick Park on Nov. 13, the first of four straight losses for the Giants. New York turned it around by winning three of its last four regular-season games to take the NFC East and has gotten

healthy.

"I think it probably surprised a lot of people that the Giants and the 49ers are in the NFC championship game," Niners first-year coach Jim Harbaugh said. "In October and November and September, we were trying to win the next game. That's where our focus was."

The Giants nearly pulled out that November game, and they are vastly improved now. With more balance than the 49ers can muster, they will head to Indy.

GIANTS, 24-13

BALTIMORE (PLUS 7 1/2) AT NEW ENGLAND

The AFC title game shapes up as a classic matchup of imposing offense and immovable defense. In the current NFL atmosphere, with all kinds of points and yardage records being set, the offense has had the edge.

That hardly means the Ravens are incapable of going to Foxborough and repeating their playoff victory there in 2010. That game was decided early when Ray Rice burst through a hole the size of Cape Cod and sprinted 83 yards for a touchdown on Baltimore's first offensive play. The Ravens quickly got another TD, making it 14-0 just five minutes in, and New England never got back in it.

Baltimore didn't get to the Super Bowl that year and has not despite making the playoffs in each of John Harbaugh's four seasons as coach. Harbaugh likes the fact that as a wild card the last three years, the Ravens (13-4) are no strangers to road playoff games.

"It helps, just by the fact that we've done it," Harbaugh said. "Most of our team has been there before, and then those young guys can relate to the older guys, and the older guys can share some wisdom. But it's not going to impact necessarily this game, except to the extent that our guys have been there before and it's certainly not going to be anything new for them. And that's a good thing."

A very good thing is the way Tom Brady played this season for New England (14-3). He comes off a six-touchdown passing performance against Denver, but comparing the Broncos' defense to Baltimore's is ludicrous.

Still, Brady has a versatile cast, led by All-Pro at tight end (Rob Gronkowski) and receiver (Wes Welker), and his offensive line is solid — a key against Terrell Suggs, Haloti Ngata, Ray Lewis and Ed Reed. The Patriots' defensive weakness is against the pass, not an area the Ravens necessarily excel at.

So look for Giants-Patriots II in the Super Bowl.

Giants' Linebacker: Sub in Classroom, Starter in NFL

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. • A little less than two months ago, Chase Blackburn was considering a career as a substitute middle-school math teacher.

Out of work for four months after the Giants failed to re-sign him and with a recently born second child, Blackburn was ready to move on. Playing middle linebacker in the NFL for six seasons would be replaced by teaching algebra to teens and pre-teens in that limbo between grammar school and high school.

Reality had set in and a second career was about to begin — that is until the New York Giants called and told the 28-year-old to grab his bags and get back to New Jersey.

Blackburn not only got back, he earned the starting job on a defense that has helped propel the Giants (11-7) into Sunday's NFC title game against the San Francisco 49ers (14-3).

"It's great to be back in the game," Blackburn said Wednesday after the Giants finished practice. "It was getting to the point where I thought it might not happen this year. I just kept on hoping and hoping and praying that God would give me an opportunity at some point this season, or even next year."

Blackburn's break came after rookie linebacker Mark Herzlich suffered a badly sprained ankle in a lopsided loss to the Saints in New Orleans. With weakside linebacker Michael Boley sidelined because of a hamstring injury and rookie middle linebacker Greg Jones a little green, the Giants called

Blackburn at his home in Ohio on Nov. 29.

His bags were packed and he was on a plane for New Jersey less than two hours later. He practiced the next day and played on Dec. 4 against the Green Bay Packers.

Blackburn even intercepted an Aaron Rodgers pass in a game the Giants lost 38-35.

"Chase is a studier," Giants defensive coordinator Perry Fewell said. "He's a guy that takes notes when you're sitting and lecturing to the classroom. And everybody respects that."

"He asks great questions when we're in the meetings. And so, he brought credibility. He brought a voice that, like I can speak to Chase, Chase can speak to the defense, and we all spoke the same language. We misinterpret a couple things here and there, but everybody knew he was gonna get it right. And he

was gonna work hard to get it right. So I think it settled us down a lot more. Instead of us being indecisive, we became decisive."

The Giants' special teams captain last season and their leading tackler on special teams in his first six seasons in New York, Blackburn has helped solidify the run defense. He's also been timely in making big plays.

None was bigger than his fumble recovery and 40-yard return to the Packers 4-yard line in the fourth quarter of the NFC divisional game this past weekend in Green Bay. Eli Manning hit Mario Manningham for a touchdown on the next play to give the Giants a 30-13 lead that was never threatened.

Defensive end Dave Tollefson is one of Blackburn's closest friends on the team, and he can't say enough about him. He even joked that this is par for the course

with Blackburn, who first made the Giants' roster as a free agent after being signed a week before the season.

"For him to come in and make an impact like he has, it's just been tremendous," Tollefson said. "I am just so proud of him. When he came back, I was surprised it took so long to bring a guy like him back. All the good things you can say about a guy, locker-room guy, plays hard, smart, and I mean he doesn't get enough credit for how athletic he is. It's just another chapter in the Chase Blackburn story."

Defensive captain Justin Tuck said Blackburn is one of those veterans with the ability to step in and get the job done without much practice or film time.

"As he has gotten back and gotten accustomed to it, he has been a great addition for us," Tuck said. "I wish we could have had him all year."

Patriots Getting Ready to Stop Ravens' Flacco

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. • Joe Flacco doesn't put up the numbers, get the respect or have the three Super Bowl rings that Tom Brady has. The Baltimore Ravens' quarterback does have one edge on the Patriots star.

Flacco is 1-0 against Brady in postseason games.

He can stay undefeated and defy the doubters if the Ravens upset the New England Patriots in the AFC championship game on Sunday.

Sure, Flacco was just the 18th-ranked quarterback in the NFL this season, but he's the only one since the NFL-AFL merger in 1970 to reach the playoffs in each of his first four seasons. Brady did it in two of his first four.

"A quarterback has to do what his team needs him to do to win and Joe has done that," Patriots coach Bill Belichick said. "He's been a solid guy since his rookie year in terms of managing the game and using the clock and making good decisions and those types of things."

In Flacco's four years, the Ravens are 44-20 in the regular season and 5-3 in the playoffs. In the same span, although Brady missed the last 15 games with a knee injury in 2008, the Patriots are 48-16 in the regular season and 1-2 in the playoffs.

And the Patriots defense has struggled during the regular season. Only one team allowed more yards passing during the regular season.

The defense did have an outstanding game in last Saturday night's 45-10 divisional win, giving up just 252 yards, but that was against the over-matched Tim Tebow and the Denver Broncos.

"Last week won't have anything to do with this week," Patriots defensive tackle Vince Wilfork said. "We have to play better. We have to make more plays because each game you play it gets tougher and tougher, especially when you're dealing with a ball club we're going to face in the Ravens. They're a stingy team."

The playoff-tested Flacco has a lot more experience than Tebow. He also has running back Ray Rice, who led the NFL with 2,068 yards from scrimmage, and deep threats Anquan Boldin and Torrey Smith.

The Ravens' running attack has been more effective than their passing game, but the Patriots could be hurt if they don't pay enough attention to Flacco and his receivers.

"They have a great running game," Patriots cornerback Devin McCourty said, "but as a secondary, you've got to re-align Anquan Boldin (has been) a great receiver for years

in this league and so is Lee Evans. Then with Torrey Smith being a rookie, what jumps out on the (video) screen is that he can fly and he gets vertical."

The Patriots, dealing with injuries on defense all season, should be close to full strength.

They don't have Andre Carter, their leader in sacks before a knee injury ended his season in the 14th game.

But safety Patrick Chung, their best defensive back, and linebacker Brandon Spikes returned from seven games on the sidelines to play the last regular-season game and first playoff game.

"You can't say enough about (Chung)," cornerback Kyle Arrington said. "He brings a very physical element, or more physical element, to our defense. His presence is definitely known and felt when he's back in the lineup."

The Patriots had the AFC's best record at 13-3, but the Ravens were 12-4, although they were just 4-4 on the road.

But they and Flacco were at their best against the best.

They're 7-0 against playoff teams, including a 20-13 win over the Houston Texans in last Sunday's divisional game.

In those games against playoff teams, Flacco has thrown for 10 touchdowns and just two interceptions

against four of the NFL's top seven-rated defenses — Pittsburgh (first), Houston (second), San Francisco (fourth) and Cincinnati (seventh).

The Ravens gained just 227 yards against the Texans, but Flacco had a 97.1 quarterback rating.

"Joe Flacco is a very capable quarterback," defensive backs coach Josh Boyer said. "He is a guy that can throw the ball 65 yards down the field. He can hit the intermediate routes. He is very smart. He understands when to go to the check downs. Even at times he takes some good sacks. He doesn't put his team in bad situations."

But he's unlikely to lead one sustained drive after another.

Still, if he doesn't give the opponent extra chances by turning the ball over, the Ravens could score enough to win behind their dominant defense.

Especially against a Patriots defense that allowed an average of 411.1 yards during the regular season.

Baltimore coach John Harbaugh thinks they're better than that.

"I see a very capable defense," he said. "I see a lot of talented players who play very hard. (They have) a very big, physical front, talented back end, (and are) obviously well-coached with a good scheme. So I see a big obstacle in front of us."

After being bothered by the bugs in her late-night opening match, five-time Australian Open champion Serena Williams got her wish for a day match against Barbora Zahlavova Styrcova on Thursday.

Clijsters lost her first four Grand Slam finals but hasn't lost one she's contested since her breakthrough in 2005. Her last three titles have come since she returned in 2009 after having a baby.

Her only advice to Wozni-

acki was to use the No. 1 ranking as a steppingstone, and not to see it as a burden.

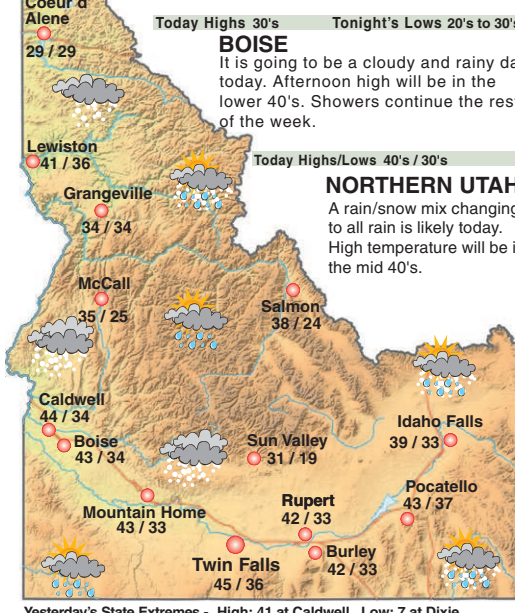

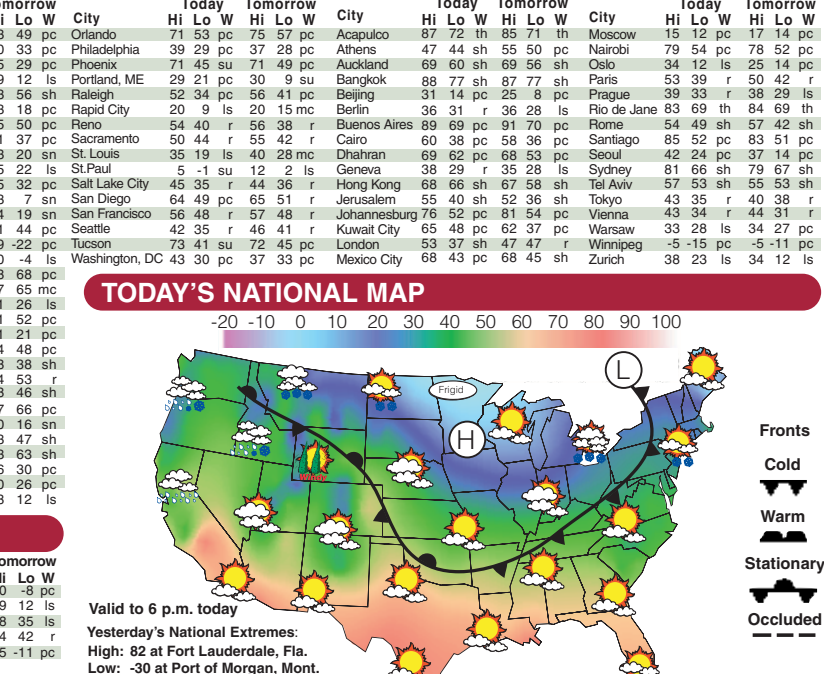

Solo Back On The Pitch As U.S. Women Aim For London

VANCOUVER, British Columbia • The same nimble legs that danced with the stars were back on the pitch Wednesday, darting this way and that on the turf field at BC Place. When Abby Wambach's powerful left foot nailed an 18-yard blast that looked certain to be a goal, Hope Solo made an all-out stretch-dive to her right to save it.
Solo might have had to settle for fourth doing the chacha, Viennese waltz and the like with partner Maksim Chmerkovskiy on "Dancing With the Stars" last fall, but she's still the consensus No. 1 goalkeeper in the world.
"Now you have your everyday citizen knowing who I am," Solo said. "For the game to grow, it needs to get more mainstream media, and I know 'Dancing With the Stars' did just that."
Solo feels the same about her recent nude photo to shoot for ESPN the Magazine, yet another byproduct of the wave of attention the U.S. women's soccer team rode from its second-place finish at the World Cup in Germany last summer. It's a sport that still needs to sell itself, and Solo — outspoken, daring, talented — fits the bill perfectly.
Solo and her teammates are back to serious work over the next two weeks as they attempt to earn their way to the London Olympics. Eight teams are vying for two berths in the CONCACAF tournament; the U.S. opens on Friday against the Dominican Republic.
Might all the celebrity trappings, she was asked, cause her to lose her edge as a soccer player?
"I don't think anybody's ever questioned my focus," she shoots back. "Very competitive, very driven."
Her answer is so direct that's it hard to doubt, even if it seems incongruous coming from someone ca-

Olympian Auctions Off Space on His Shoulder

How much is a spot on an Olympian's shoulder worth?
Nick Symmonds put his skin on the eBay auction site, offering to wear a temporary tattoo with the name of the highest bidder as he competes for a spot on the U.S. team for the London Games this summer.
The stunt wasn't so much to make money as it was to make a point. Symmonds, a four-time U.S. outdoor champion in the 800 meters, is a vocal critic of what he says are the "antiquated" sponsorship rules of track and field's international ruling body, the IAAF, and to a lesser extent, the guidelines of USA Track & Field.
He says those rules limit the amount of money athletes can bring in to pursue their careers.
"My No. 1 goal, aside from making the Olympic team and winning a medal, is to bring awareness to how many struggling athletes there are out there — and wouldn't be if we could just lift these regulations and allow athletes to pursue individual sponsorships a little more freely," he said.
The space on Symmonds' shoulder commanded \$11,100 from a Wisconsin-based active lifestyle marketing firm, Hanson Dodge Creative. In return for the winning bid announced on Wednesday, Symmonds will wear the company's Twitter name prominently displayed on his left shoulder throughout the season.
Symmonds won't be able to show the logo at certain events, especially international meets governed by the IAAF. Instead, he'll wear a big bandage over the tattoo, which he believes will bring even more attention to both the company and his personal cause.
He said he'll have to cover up on Feb. 18 when he is expected to run in the Sydney Grand Prix. The first time he'll be able to show it is on May 5, when he plans to run at the Oregon Twilight in Eugene.
Logos and branding have become a big issue in track because athletes depend on sponsorship dollars to be able to train and travel. But there are numerous restrictions on their use and the results can sometimes be almost comical, with athletes forced to use duct tape to cover company emblems and names on their clothes and shoes.

Camille Herron, who ran in the Olympic marathon trials last weekend in Houston, blogged about how she had to cover up the logos of her sponsors, some of which she thought were approved, and have a witness sign off that everything was hidden.

"It's official: I should seek sponsorship with Duck Tape," she wrote.
There are numerous forces at play when it comes to a track and field athlete's ability to display what essentially is an advertisement.
International rules were relaxed earlier this year to

permit another small logo, in addition to a shoe and clothing sponsor. But some meets have tighter restrictions because of event sponsors. And some sponsors have exclusivity rules written into contracts with athletes that bar them from wearing multiple logos.

GRANTING TO CABLE ONE, INC., A NON-EXCLUSIVE FRANCHISE TO OPERATE AND MAINTAIN A CABLE SYSTEM IN THE CITY OF KIMBERLY, REQUIRING CABLE ONE, INC. TO PAY ALL COSTS OF PUBLICATION OF A NOTICE OF HEARING AND OF THE ORDINANCE, AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KIMBERLY, IDAHO:

Section 1. The Franchise Agreement attached as Exhibit A is incorporated into this Ordinance as though fully set forth, is approved, and the Mayor and Clerk are authorized to sign the Agreement on behalf of the City.

**EXHIBIT A
FRANCHISE AGREEMENT**

THIS AGREEMENT is made this 24th day of January 2012 by and between the CITY OF KIMBERLY, an Idaho municipal corporation (hereinafter Franchising Authority), and CABLE ONE, INC. a Delaware corporation (hereinafter Grantee), to provide for the terms and conditions of the continued operation of a cable system within the city limits of Kimberly.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, CABLE ONE is the successor to King Videocable Company which was awarded a franchise to provide cable services within the City of Kimberly effective August 8, 1995; and

WHEREAS, CABLE ONE and its predecessors in interest have faithfully and hereto and performed in accordance with the terms and conditions of Ordinance 463 granting a franchise to King Videocable Company; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance _____ authorizes a renewal of the cable television franchise to CABLE ONE; and

WHEREAS, the Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984 authorizes the early renewal of a cable franchise upon a public hearing and informal negotiation process; and

WHEREAS the public hearing and informal negotiation process has occurred.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City of Kimberly hereby grants a renewal of the cable television franchise to CABLE ONE in the following terms and conditions:

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS.

1.1 For the purposes of this Franchise, the following terms, phrases, and words shall have the meanings ascribed to them below. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future tense, words in the plural include the singular and words used in the singular include the plural.

A. "Affiliate" means a condition of being united, being in close connection, allied, or attached as a member or branch.

B. "Basic cable" is the tier of service regularly provided to all subscribers including the retransmission of local broadcast television signals.

C. "Cable Act" means Title VI of the Communications Act of 1934 as amended by the Cable Television Consumer Protection and Competition Act 1992, as amended by the Telecommunications Act of 1996, and any subsequent amendments.

D. "Cable services" means

1. the one-way transmission to a subscriber of video programming, other programming service or date communication by a subscriber,

2. subscriber interaction, if any, which is required for the selection by the subscriber of such video programming, or

3. any other programming service.

E. "Cable system" means a facility, consisting of a set of closed transmission paths and associated signal generation, reception, and control equipment that is designed to provide cable service and other service to subscribers.

F. "Channel" means a single path or section of the spectrum which carries a cable service.

G. "City" means the City of Kimberly, a municipal corporation of the State of Idaho.

H. "Council" means the present governing body of the City or any future board constituting the legislative body of the city.

I. "Disconnection" means the discontinuance of all cable service to a subscriber by a cable operator.

J. "FCC" means the Federal Communications Commission, a regulatory agency of the United States government.

K. "Franchising Authority" means the City of Kimberly, Idaho.

L. "Franchise" shall mean the initial authorization, or renewal thereof, issued by the city, whether such authorization is designated as a franchise, permit, license, resolution, contract, certificate or otherwise, which authorizes construction or operation of the cable system for the purpose of offering cable service or other service to subscribers.

M. "Grantee" means Cable One of Idaho.

N. "Gross revenues" means any and all receipts and revenues received directly or indirectly from all sources by the operator of a cable system attributable to the provision of cable service by the cable system within the corporate limits of the City. "Gross revenues" is intended to include, but is not limited to, all income without any offsetting of expenses, costs or depreciation, derived from:

Subscribers receiving goods, equipment, equipment service, or cable service from or through the use of a cable system within the City; revenues for service, installation and repair; and, any and all charges not specifically exempt herein such as delinquency fees, interest, or finance charges.

Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, "gross revenues" is not intended to include income, credits or revenues attributable to the operation of a cable system within the City arising from:

1. Real property transactions;

2. Taxes and Fees paid by a subscriber, the operator of a cable system within the City or another person, which are imposed on any subscriber;

3. Interest (other than interest charged subscribers of the cable system within the City or advertisers for services provided or delivered by the cable system within the City) or dividends on investments received by the operator of a cable system within the City unrelated to the delivery of cable services within the City; or

4. Net uncollectible debts.

Should the FCC rule that high-speed internet services delivered by cable operators is a "cable service" then the parties agree that revenues the cable operator obtains from the provision of that service will be considered as gross revenues under this section and eligible for inclusion in the calculation of franchise fees on a going forward basis.

O. "Headend" means the electronic equipment located at the start of a cable system, usually including antennas, preamplifiers, frequency converters, demodulator and related equipment.

P. "Installation" means the connection of the cable system to subscribers' terminals.

Q. "Normal business hours" means those hours during which most similar business in the City are open to the service of customers and shall include at least four (4) consecutive hours per weekday

R. "Normal operating conditions" means those service conditions which are within the control or are reasonably anticipated by the cable operator, including special promotions, pay-per-view events, regular peak or seasonal demand periods and maintenance or upgrade of the cable system.

S. "Person" means any individual, firm, partnership, corporation, organization, association, or other legal entity.

T. "Public way" means the surface of, and the space above and below, any public street, highway, freeway, bridge, land path, alley, curt, boulevard, sidewalk, parkway, way, lane, drive, circle or other public right-of-way, including, but not limited to, public utility easements, dedicated utility strips or rights-of-way dedicated for compatible uses and any temporary or permanent fixtures or improvements located thereon now or hereafter held by the City in the service area which shall entitle the City and a franchisee to the use thereof for the purpose of installing, operating, repairing, and maintaining the cable system. "Public way" shall also mean any easement now or hereafter held by the City within the service area for the purpose of public travel, or for utility or public service use dedicated for compatible uses, and shall include other easements or rights-of-way as shall within their proper use and meaning entitle the City and a franchisee to the use thereof for the purpose of installing or transmitting franchisee's cable service or other service over poles, wires, cables, conductors, ducts, conduits, vaults, manholes, amplifiers, compliances, attachments, and other property as may be ordinarily necessary and appurtenant to the cable system.

U. "Service Area" means the present municipal boundaries of the City of Kimberly, and includes any additions thereto by annexation.

V. "Subscriber" means a person or user of the cable system who lawfully receives cable services or other services there from with franchisee's permission.

W. "Video Programming Service" means programming which is visually and audibly comparable to programming provided by a television broadcast station.

SECTION 2. GRANT OF FRANCHISE.

2.1 Grant. The Franchising Authority hereby grants to the Grantee a nonexclusive franchise which authorizes the Grantee to construct and operate a cable system in, along, among, upon, across, above, over, under, in any manner connected with Public Ways within the Service Area and for that purpose to erect, install, construct, repair, replace, reconstruct, maintain on, over, under, upon, across, or along any public way and all extensions thereof and additions thereto, such pole, wires, cables, conductors, ducts, conduits, vaults, manholes, pedestals, amplifiers, appliances, attachments, and other related property or equipment as may be necessary or appurtenant to the cable system. Nothing in the franchise shall be construed to prohibit the Grantee from offering any service over its cable system that is not prohibited by federal or state law.

The Grantee agrees to abide by any existing or new ordinance or regulation of general applicability to the operation of the cable system in the service area, adapted in the manner provided by law, so long as it does not substantially impair the rights granted pursuant to this franchise.

2.2 Term. The franchise granted hereunder shall be for a term of ten (10) years commencing on the effective date of the franchise as set forth below, unless otherwise lawfully terminated in accordance with the terms of this franchise agreement.

2.3 Incorporation By Reference. This franchise is granted pursuant to Title 50, Chapter 3 of the Idaho Code and the Cable Act.

SECTION 3. STANDARDS OF SERVICE.

3.1 Restoration of Public Ways. If, during the course of the Grantee's construction, operation, or maintenance of the cable system, there occurs a disturbance in any public way, the Grantee shall, at its expense, replace and restore such public way to a condition reasonably comparable to the condition of the public way immediately prior to such disturbance. Such repair or replacement will be implemented promptly beginning no later than 72 hours after extent of the damage is ascertained but with reasonable consideration given to weather and to the amount of work involved.

3.2 Relocation at the Request of the Franchising Authority. Upon its receipt of reasonable advance notice, not to be less than five (5) business days, the Grantee shall, at its own expense, protect, support, temporarily disconnect, relocate in the public way, or remove from the public way, any property of the Grantee when required by the franchising authority by reason of traffic conditions, public safety, street abandonment, street construction, change or establishment of street grade, installation of sewers, drains, utility pipes, and any other structure or improvements by the Franchising Authority. The Grantee shall in all cases have the right of abandonment of its property. If public funds are available to any similar facilities-based utility as the Grantee, using such street, easement, or right-of-way for the purpose of defraying the cost of any of the foregoing, the Franchising Authority shall make available such funds on behalf of the Grantee.

3.3 Relocation at the Request of a Third Party. The Grantee shall, on the request of any person holding a building moving permit issued by the Franchising Authority, temporarily raise or lower its wires to permit the moving of such building, provided the expense of such temporary raising or lowering of wires is paid by said person, including, if required by the Grantee, making such payment in advance and the Grantee is given not less than five (5) days advance written notice.

3.4 System Upgrade/Channel Capacity and Adaptation to New Technology. At the request of the Franchising Authority, the Grantee shall inform the Franchising Authority at least annually of planned, proposed, and actual changes in the Grantee's cable system and cable services related to subscriber in the service area regarding technological improvements, additional channel capacity, and other matter related to services available to subscribers. The Grantee will provide one channel for the Franchising Authority to use as a character-generated, community bulletin board.

3.5 Aerial and Underground Construction.

A. In those areas of the service area where all of the transmission or distribution facilities of the respective public service utilities providing telephone communications and electrical services are underground, the Grantee shall likewise construct, operate, and maintain all of its transmission and distribution facilities underground. Nothing contained in this section shall require the Grantee to construct, operate, and maintain underground any ground-mounted appurtenances such as subscriber taps, line extenders, system passive devices (splitters, directional couplers), amplifiers, pedestals, or other related equipment.

B. **New Developments.** The Franchising Authority shall provide the Grantee with written notice of the issuance of building or development permits for planned commercial and/or residential developments within the service area requiring underground facilities. The Franchising Authority agrees to require as a condition of issuing the permit that the developer of planned commercial and/or residential developments give the Grantee access to open trenches for deployment of cable facilities and notice of the date of availability of trenches. The developer shall be responsible for the digging and backfilling of all trenches. The Grantee shall be responsible for engineering, deployment of labor and cable facilities located in the trenches. If a new development is not provided by the city due to random error or because the developer does not release the information, the Grantee will hold the Franchising Authority harmless.

C. **Local Improvement District.** If an ordinance is passed creating a local improvement district which involves placing underground certain utilities including that of the Grantee which are then located overhead, the Grantee shall participate in such underground project and shall remove poles, cables, and wires from the surface of public ways within such district and shall place them underground in conformity with the requirements of the Franchising Authority. The Grantee may include its costs of relocating facilities associated with the undergrounding project in said local improvement district if allowed under applicable law.

3.6 Required Extension of Service. The cable system, as constructed as of the date of the passage and final adoption of the franchise, substantially complies with the material provisions hereof. Whenever the Grantee shall receive a request for service from at least 15 residences within 1320 cable-bearing strand feet (one-quarter cable mile) of its trunk or distribution cable, it shall extend its cable system to such subscribers at no cost to said subscribers for cable system extension, other than the usual connection fees for all subscribers, provided that such extension is technically feasible.

3.7 Subscriber Charges for Extensions of Service. No subscriber shall be refused service arbitrarily. However, for unusual circumstances, such as a subscriber's request to locate his cable drop underground, existence of more than 150 feet of distance from distribution cable to connection of service to subscribers, or a density of less than 15 subscribers per 1320 cable-bearing strand feet of trunk or distribution cable, service may be made available on the basis of a capital contribution in aid of construction, including cost of material, labor, and easements. For the purpose of determining the amount of capital contribution in aid of construction to be borne by the Grantee and subscribers in the area in which service may be expanded, the Grantee will contribute an amount equal to the construction and other costs per mile, multiplied by a fraction whose numerator equals the

number of residences per 1320 cable-bearing strand feet of its trunks or distribution cable, and whose denominator equals 15 residences. Subscribers who request service hereunder will bear the remainder of the construction and other costs on a pro rata basis. The Grantee may require that the payment of the capital contribution in aid of construction borne by potential subscribers be paid in advance.

3.8 Service to Public Buildings. The Grantee shall, provide without charge, cable service including internet access and telephone service to each of the Franchising Authority's offices, buildings, fire stations, police stations, all public school buildings, and the Senior Center that are passed by its cable system, as well as other public buildings that may be constructed during the term of this Franchise Agreement. The outlets of cable service provided pursuant to this section shall not be used by the government entity to sell or provide free of charge cable services to private entities in or throughout such buildings. The Grantee shall not be required to provide a cable service outlet to buildings where the drop line from the feeder cable to said building exceeds 150 cable feet unless the governmental entity agrees to pay the incremental cost of such drop line in excess of 150 cable feet.

3.9 Emergency Use.

A. In accordance with the provisions of Federal Communications Commission (FCC), regulations shall maintain an Emergency Alert System (EAS) for use in transmitting Emergency Act Notifications (EAN) and Emergency Act Terminations (EAT) in local and state-wide situations as may be designated to be an emergency by the Local Primary, the State Primary and/or the State Emergency Operations Center, as those authorities are defined by the FCC.

B. The Grantee shall permit only appropriately trained and authorized persons to operate the EAS equipment and shall indemnify and hold harmless the Franchising Authority, its employees, officers, and assigns from any claims arising from use of the cable system or the EAS equipment by the Franchising Authority, its employees, or designated representatives, including, but not limited to, attorney fees and costs.

3.10 Customer Service Standards. The Grantee shall at all times be in compliance with FCC regulations regarding customer service obligations, as now exist or as may be amended. The Franchising Authority reserves the right to enact or enforce any customer protection law, containing more stringent customer service obligations, to the extent not specifically preempted by FCC regulations.

SECTION 4. REGULATION BY CITY OF KIMBERLY.**4.1 Franchise Fee.**

A. The Grantee shall pay to the Franchising Authority a monthly sum equal to five percent (5%) of the gross revenues. Payment for each month's fee shall be no later than forty-five (45) days after the last day of the quarter for which payment is made.

B. In the event the Cable Act and/or other applicable law permits an increase in franchise fees during the term of this franchise, then the Franchising Authority may initiate such an increase with regards to the franchise fee amount. However, prior to implementation of any increase in franchise fees, the Grantee may request a public hearing by the Franchising Authority to discuss said change in franchise fee. Following such a hearing the Franchising Authority may require the implementation of the change in franchise fee.

C. **Late Payment.** All sums which become delinquent shall accumulate interest at the highest statutory rate provided in Idaho Code Title 28, Chapter 22. The accrual of interest is not intended to waive or in any manner restrict the City's ability to elect any procedure or method of collection permissible by law to enforce all the terms and conditions of the Franchise Agreement.

D. **Penalties For Failing To Pay Franchise Fees.** Where the City determines by audit, financial statement, or other method, that franchisee has underpaid franchise fees, other charges owed to City, and where payment was not received by City within the quarter due, franchisee may be required to pay, in addition to any other remedy sought by City, all fees and interest due, and an additional penalty of ten percent (10%) of the total amount owed. Acceptance of any franchise fee payment by the Franchising Authority shall not be construed as an agreement that the fee paid is in fact the correct amount, nor shall acceptance of payment be construed as a release or a waiver of any claim by the Franchising Authority against the Grantee. If the Franchising Authority requests to see financial records to audit Grantee's franchise fee payments, the Grantee will provide such records.

E. **Taxes.** Nothing herein shall limit the Grantee's obligation to pay applicable local, state, or federal sale, property, ad valorem, or other taxes.

F. **Financial Reports.** Each franchise fee payment shall be accompanied by a financial report certified by an officer of the Grantee, or his designee showing the basis for the computation, including the number of customers, and separately indicating revenues received by the Grantee within the Service Area from such items as basic service, pay TV service, other applicable sources of revenue, and such other information directly related to confirming the amount of the Grantee's Gross Revenues as may be reasonably required by the Franchising Authority.

G. **Non-waiver.** Acceptance of any franchise fee payment by the Franchising Authority that the franchise fee paid is in fact the correct amount, nor shall acceptance of payment by the Franchising Authority be construed as a release or waiver of any claim the Franchising Authority may have for further or additional sums payable under the provisions of this Franchise.

4.2 Rates and Charges.

A. Nothing in this Franchise Agreement shall be construed to prohibit the reduction or waiving of charges in conjunction with promotional campaigns for the purpose of acquiring and/or retaining subscribers.

B. Grantee shall provide the Franchising Authority with a minimum of thirty (30) days advance written notice of changes in subscriber rates, if the change is within the control of the Grantee, including any changes in franchise fee amount and external franchise related costs.

4.3. Customer Billing. All billing statements and charges to subscribers shall be:

1. Clear, concise, and understandable;

2. Itemized as to basic cable charges, premium charges, equipment charges, whether payments for purchase or rental, deposits, delinquent fees, and franchise fees.

3. Show all activity during the billing period including optional charges, rebates, and credits. Said billing period shall not exceed forty-five (45) days.

4.4 Renewal. The Franchising Authority and the Grantee agree that any proceeding undertaken by the Franchising Authority that relates to the renewal of the Grantee's franchise shall be governed by and comply with the provisions of the Cable Act, as currently constituted or as may be hereafter amended.

SECTION 5. COMPLIANCE AND MONITORING.

5.1 Communication with Regulatory Agencies. Copies of all petitions, applications, communications, and reports submitted by the Grantee to the FCC or any other federal or state regulatory commission or agency having jurisdiction in respect to matter affecting construction, maintenance, or operation of the Grantee's cable system or service, shall be made available to the Franchising Authority upon reasonable request. Copies of responses or any other communications from the regulatory agencies to the Grantee shall also be made available to the Franchising Authority.

5.2 Technical Standards. The Grantee shall be responsible for insuring that the cable system is designed, installed, and operated in a manner that fully complies with FCC rules and regulations in Subpart K of Part 76 of Chapter 1 of Title 47 of the Code of Federal Regulations as now constituted or as may be amended. As provided in these rules and regulations, the Franchising Authority shall have, upon request, the right to obtain a copy of tests and records required in accordance with such rules and regulations, but have no authority to enforce compliance with such standards.

SECTION 6. BONDS AND OTHER SURETY. For the reason of the Grantee's past performance and investment, no performance bond or other surety is required under the terms hereof. If the Franchising Authority determines, in its reasonable discretion, that a bond or a surety will be required of the Grantee during the term hereof, the Franchising Authority agrees to give the Grantee ninety (90) days written notice stating the reason for the requirement and amount of the bond or surety. The Grantee agrees to post said bond or surety, as required by the Franchising Authority within said ninety (90) day period. The Grantee shall be required to provide standard performance bonds and insurance requirements for encroachment and/or right-of-way work permits.

SECTION 7. PUBLIC EDUCATIONAL AND GOVERNMENTAL (PEG) ACCESS.**7.1 Channel Capacity and Use**

A. Upon the effective date of this Franchise, the Company shall continue to make one (1) Channel available for Access use by the City or by a designated Access provider identified by the City, for Public/Educational/Governmental Access purposes. The Government Access Channel shall initially be Channel 17, and shall remain so throughout the term of the Franchise unless Channel 17 is claimed by must-carry obligations of the Company under FCC regulations.

B. The bandwidth for each PEG Channel shall be at least as broad as the bandwidth of any other Channel offered in the basic tier of service.

7.2 Access Channels on Lowest Tier. All local, educational, and governmental Access Channels shall be carried on the Basic Cable Service tier.

7.3 Relocation of Access Channels. Initially, Channel 17 shall continue to be devoted to Kimberly Government Access, and shall remain so throughout the term of the Franchise, unless the Channel is claimed by a must-carry obligation of the Company under FCC rules, or unless the City gives written permission otherwise. For all other PEG Channels, the Company shall consult with the City before assigning any Channel for the first time, and shall provide the City with a minimum of ninety (90) days notice, and shall use its best efforts to provide one-hundred-twenty (120) days notice, prior to the time PEG Access Channel designations are changed. The Company shall consult with the City prior to making a final determination regarding any changes in PEG Access Channel designations. Any new channel designation for a PEG Access Channel provided pursuant to this Franchise shall be in full compliance with FCC signal quality and proof of performance standards.

7.4 Return Feeds From Origination Points. Following the effective date of this agreement, Company shall continue to provide return programming capabilities from City Hall. However, within 3 months following the effective date of the Franchise, the return feed from City Hall shall be upgraded to an activated fiber optic cable connection to the Company Headend. In addition, one Internet outlet will be provided free of charge in City Hall.

7.5 PEG Access Grant.

A. The City has determined that to meet community needs and interests for PEG Access in Kimberly over the term of the Franchise, the following developments, among possible others, are necessary.

1. Fitting the City facilities for coverage of meetings, including necessary fiber-optic wiring to the site, etc.

B. Accordingly, the Company shall provide, in addition to the channels, training and services, technical assistance, return feeds and other support identified in this section, financial grants to the City for PEG Access development, in the following amount and on the following schedule of due dates:

1. Within thirty (30) days following the due date represented by the effective date of this Franchise: \$4,000 will be due.

C. The City acknowledges the Company's right, consistent with FCC regulations, to pass-through and itemize portions of its Subscribers bill, including but not limited to franchise fees, the amount of the bill allocated to fulfill any new Franchise requirements for PEG Access, and any fee, tax, assessment or charge imposed by any governmental authority on the Company. These itemized charges may be shown "above-the-line" (i.e., prior to the summation of the total amount due).

7.6 Agreement as to PEG Contribution. The Company agrees that all contributions, services, equipment, Facilities, support, resources and other activities to be paid for or supplied by the Company pursuant to or in connection with its performance under this Section shall not be off-set against the payment of franchise fees.

7.7 Rules Determined by the City. The City shall have the authority to manage the operation of PEG Access, and the City may delegate part or all of this authority to a third party. Rules governing the use of all PEG Access resources, including without limitation the public, educational and governmental Access Channel(s), studios, equipment, facilities, services, origination points, and the PEG Access Grant will be determined by the City or a designee of the City.

7.8 Non-Commercial Use. Public, Educational, and Governmental Access Channels shall be utilized solely for non-commercial purposes for the social, educational, cultural, charitable, and informational benefit and general welfare of the community. No Access user shall utilize the Access Channels for any purposes other than as specified and shall not derive any commercial profit therefrom, including the sale of advertising, commercials, or other similar activities. With the exception that the City has the right to delegate its authority to operate and regulate the PEG Access Channels, the right to utilize these channels shall not be assigned by any Access user to any other Person or entity. The limitations of this section notwithstanding, nothing in this Franchise shall prohibit the solicitation and recognition of financial support for the provision of PEG Access by the City or its designee(s), and for charitable, educational or governmental purposes so long as such recognition does not take the form of commercials for the sponsors.

SECTION 8. TERMINATION AND TECHNICAL VIOLATIONS.**8.1 Default, Notice and Termination.**

A. If the Grantee willfully violates or fails to comply with any of the material provisions of this Franchise Agreement, the Franchising Authority shall give written notice to the Grantee of the alleged non-compliance of its franchise. The Grantee shall have thirty (30) days from the date of notice of non-compliance to cure such alleged default or, if such default cannot be cured within thirty (30) days, to present to the City a plan of action whereby such default can be promptly cured. The Grantee shall be entitled to attend the hearing, respond to questions, and explain why termination would be justified.

B. If such default continues beyond the applicable dates agreed to for such cure, the Franchising Authority shall give the Grantee written notice that all rights conferred under this Franchise Agreement may be revoked or terminated by the Council after a public hearing. The Grantee shall be entitled to not less than thirty (30) days prior notice of the date, time, and place of the public hearing.

8.2 Termination for Non-compliance. Subject to state and federal law, in the event that any franchise is terminated by the Franchising Authority by reason of the Grantee's non-compliance, the Grantee shall have the right for six months after the final decision by the Council to attempt to sell that part of the system under such franchise to a third party. If the Grantee is unable to find a buyer within such period, the Franchising Authority may elect to acquire the property of the system located in the streets and public property at a cost consistent with the provisions of Section 627(b)(1) of the Cable Act, as currently constituted or as may be amended. If the Franchising Authority or a third party does not purchase the system, the Grantee shall, upon order of the Franchising Authority, remove the system from the public ways of the Franchising Authority. The Grantee agrees that in no case shall a termination for cause be considered as a "taking".

8.3 Technical Violations. The parties agree that it is not the Franchising Authority's intention to subject the Grantee to penalties or termination for technical violations of this agreement. Technical violations shall include, but are not limited to the following: (a) instances where a violation or a breach by the Grantee of this agreement was a good faith effort that resulted in no or minimal negative impact on subscribers; or (b) where there existed circumstances reasonably beyond the control of the Grantee and which precipitated a violation of this agreement or which were deemed to have prevented the Grantee from strictly complying with the terms of this agreement.

8.4 Transfer of Franchise to Third Parties. The Franchising Authority reserves the right of final approval of all sales and/or transfers of the franchise to third parties, provided that said authority may only be exercised in a reasonable manner. In the event that the franchise is sold to a third party following such approval, the Franchising Authority is entitled to immediate payment of back fees.

SECTION 9. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

9.1 Actions of Parties. In any action by the Franchising Authority of the Grantee that is mandated or permitted under the terms hereof, such party shall act in good faith in a reasonable and timely manner. Furthermore, in any instance where approval or consent is required under the term hereof, such approval or consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

9.2 Equal Protection. In the event the Franchising Authority grants another franchise to any person or entity for the purpose of constructing or operating a cable system within the service area, such additional franchise shall not present materially better terms or lesser obligations for the new franchisee over the terms of the franchise. Nevertheless, if such does take place, the Franchising Authority will immediately modify this franchise so that it is in conformity with the language of the new franchise.

9.3 Notices. Notice required hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given to the required party upon actual receipt. Acceptable methods of delivery include hand delivery, certified or registered mail, and overnight express mail. Notice required hereunder shall be addressed as follows:

At the Dyspeptics Club, West's performance at the bridge table swings alarmingly between the shockingly inept and the startlingly accurate, and East never knows what to expect. North consoles him from time to time by remarking comfortably that at least he gets something other than second-rate from HIS partner, whereas he, North, knows exactly what to expect, but that does not make it any less painful.

In today's deal South's spade game was threatened by a top heart lead. South could not afford to duck, so he took dummy's ace and led a low diamond to his queen. To encourage West to take his ace, he nudged the trick toward him.

But West ducked, perhaps aware that he should resist the temptation to do what South wanted him to. West won the next diamond, cashed the heart queen, then continued with the jack. South ruffed high, but East discarded his last diamond and declarer was left with two club losers no matter what he did next.

South asked his partner if it would have been better to ruff the third heart low, to which North responded by saying, "Yes and no." What did that Delphic utterance mean?

If South ruffs the third heart low, then to defeat the hand, East must pitch his last diamond and not overruff. But declarer can insure the contract against normal trump breaks by pitching a club from dummy, instead of ruffing

In 1955, a presidential news conference was filmed for television for the first time, with the permission of President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

In 1960, the Treaty of Mutual Cooperation and Security between Japan and the United States of America was signed by both countries in Washington, D.C.

In 1966, Indira Gandhi was elected prime minister of India.

In 1970, President Richard M. Nixon nominated G. Harrold Carswell to the Supreme Court; however, the nomination was defeated because of controversy over Carswell's past racial views.

In 1977, in one of his last acts of office, President Gerald R. Ford pardoned Iva Toguri D'Aquino, an American convicted of treason for making wartime broadcasts for Japan.

In 1981, the United States and Iran signed an accord paving the way for the release of 52 Americans held hostage for more than 14 months.

In 1992, German government and Jewish officials dedicated a Holocaust memorial at the suburban Berlin villa where the notorious Wannsee Conference had taken place.

Ten years ago: Israeli troops set off a powerful explosion that gutted the official Palestinian broadcasting building, dealing another retaliatory blow two days after a Palestinian gunman killed six Israelis at a bat mitzvah celebration.

Five years ago: Former Rep. Bob Ney, R-Ohio, was sentenced to 2½ years in prison for his role in a lobbying scandal. (Ney was released from a halfway house in August 2008 after serving nearly a year and a half of his prison sentence.) Denny Doherty, a member of the 1960s folk-rock group The Mamas & the Papas, died near Toronto at age 66.

One year ago: Chinese President Hu Jintao, visiting the White House, declared "a lot still needs to be done" to improve his country's record on human rights; the exchange with President Barack Obama over human rights was balanced by U.S. delight over newly announced Chinese business deals expected to generate about \$45 billion in new export sales for the U.S.
