Supreme Court Tosses GOP Lawsuit

An unusually public Republican Party dispute over firing two redistricting commissioners ended Wednesday, clearing the committee to resume work today.

BOISE • The Idaho Supreme Court on Wednesday dismissed a lawsuit filed by state Republican leaders seeking to boot two redistricting commissioners, freeing the panel to reconvene without threat of interruption by a bitter internal GOP dispute.

State Republican Chairman

Norm Semanko and House Speaker Lawerence Denney had sought to fire Randy Hansen and Dolores Crow, levying accusations including that they'd insufficiently represented GOP interests by voting with Democrats in a unanimous 6-0 decision in October to approve new legislative maps.

The justices' decision is a victory for Secretary of State Ben Ysursa and Idaho Attorney General Lawrence Wasden, also Republicans, who fought Semanko's and Denney's redistricting move on grounds they had no legal right to remove the commissioners.

"Counsel for (Semanko and Denney) failed to file a brief showing a clear right to relief sought under statute or Constitution of the state of Idaho," the justices wrote in a terse, one-page ruling.

Denney said Wednesday he was unlikely to file a renewed complaint.

"If that's their decision, we'll just move ahead," the Midvale Republican said. Attempts to reach Semanko for comment were not immediately successful.

The redistricting commission, including Hansen, a former Twin Falls Republican House member, and Crow, a former Republican representative from Nampa, is due to reconvene today in another bid to craft a plan that meets Supreme Court muster.

When reached Wednesday afternoon, Hansen said he was already in Boise and didn't factor the lawsuit into his decision to attend today's redistricting meeting.

"We thought that they would"

dismiss the case, Hansen said. "But I didn't follow that because I just knew we were going to do our work regardless."

Justices last week ruled the plan the commission supported in October split too many counties to be constitutional.

Hansen said he had met with Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loebs to go over a map that Loebs had submitted to the committee. The map, which is the fifth submitted by Loebs, contains only five county splits.

Idaho's Courts Feeling the Squeeze

Issues of a growing caseload and lagging pay for judges highlighted Chief Justice Roger Burdick's Wednesday presentation to lawmakers.

BOISE • Idaho's courts are feeling the strain from budget cuts, too.

On Wednesday, Idaho Supreme Court Chief Justice Roger Burdick presented his State of the Judiciary report to the Idaho House and Senate. He described a judicial system struggling to keep up with an increased caseload while dealing with limited resources.

Burdick said the state has seen a 151 percent increase in mental health commitment proceedings since 2006, a jump he attributed to decreased availability of mental health treatment. Divorce and child custody cases have risen by 10 percent, and district court civil cases — including civil, medical and business disputes — have jumped by 30 percent.

"The challenge, then, is how to meet this upward trend with static resources," Burdick said.

It's not all bad news for Idaho's judiciary. In the last year, Idaho's drug

ANOTHER WATER MAIN BREAK BLOCKS T.F. TRAFFIC

TWIN FALLS • City work crews worked Wednesday to patch the source of a leak in a main Twin Falls water line.

City workers detected a leak near the intersection of Washington Street and Falls Avenue early in the morning. They soon began digging up pavement to where they thought the leak might have been coming from.

Public Works Manager Jon Caton said the leak came from an older 8-inch water pipe that cracked.

Workers backfilled around the pipe with concrete to stop the leak. It wasn't immediately clear why

the pipe had cracked.
"There wasn't anything obvi-

ous or apparent," Caton said.

If the leak had been found un

If the leak had been found under the intersection of Washington and Falls itself, the city would have had to close the intersection until it was fixed. But Caton said that won't be needed. Southbound drivers on Washington today approaching Falls should expect the intersection's left turn lane and the right-most lane traveling through the intersection to

cember near the Glanbia Foods facility in southern Twin Falls, while a decades-old pipe in Rock Creek Canyon also failed earlier this month, causing the loss of about a day's worth of city potable water.

Feds Seek Alternatives to Restricting Popular Rock Climbing Areas

JEROME • Depending on who you talk to, the discussion of recreational access within Cassia and Power counties can easily get personal.

And as a federal advisory group seeks alternatives to barring rock climbing

and other recreational uses of public land in the counties' southern reaches, special interest groups are speaking up.

On Wednesday, the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's Resource Advisory Council met in Jerome to discuss access to federal land at Cedar Fields and the Castle Rocks Inter-agency Recreation Area.

Due to increased foot traffic, the sites are showing signs of erosion, said Suzann Henrikson, a BLM archaeologist in Burley.

Because of their archaeological significance, the sites are given historical preservation status. But once damage from recreational use — fire pits, graffiti,

HAILEY • Now that the state's legislative session is up and running, the Blaine County School District is keeping an eye on the future of a source of funding that accounts for more than half its budget.

The 3,400-student school district relies on a \$29.5 million annual levy on local property taxes to fund its operations.

The levy's history dates back more than five years.

And now, some area legislators expect the topic of its future to return during this year's session.

Idaho school districts used to receive part of their funding from local property tax revenue. But in 2006, state legislators changed the system through the Property Tax Relief Act to base funding on state income and sales taxes instead.

"They removed property tax as a funding mechanism for public education in Idaho," said Heather Crocker, director of communications for the Blaine County School District.

Blaine Co. Schools Eye Future of \$29.5M Levy

However, four resort-area school districts — Blaine County, Avery, Swan Valley and McCall/Donnelly collected more in property tax revenue than what they'd receive under the revised state system.

As a result, they were exempted from the act and a budget stabilization levy was created for each district without voter approval.

That situation, though, nearly changed last year. Rep. Dennis Lake, R-Blackfoot, sponsored a bill that would have required the four school districts to get voter approval starting in 2013 in

order to renew the levy issue. Although the bill passed the state's House last year, it didn't make it out of a Senate committee

Lake said Wednesday that he expects a similar bill about the levy system to come up again during this year's legislative session.

"The point is still the same," he said. "People need the chance to vote on the tax." But Sen. Michelle Sten-

and mental health courts helped 20 babies be born to newly clean and sober mothers.

"There can be no greater legacy than having these kids start out in a sober, safe home with parents who will teach them the rewards of sobriety and accountability," Burdick said.

Burdick also mentioned the Snake River Basin Adjudication, formed in 1987 in Twin Falls to handle legal issues regarding water disputes throughout much of the state. In that time, the court has completed more than 150,000 claims, Burdick said, and has fewer than 1,900 left to adjudicate. That's unprecedented, Burdick said.

"Under the leadership of District Judge Eric Wildman, we are now starting to draft the final decree for the Snake River Basin's water resources," he said.

Burdick ended his speech stressing the need to have a more attractive compensation plan for judges, saving Idaho ranks 47th in the nation for trial judges' pay. He also emphasized his desire to keep an attractive retirement plan for judges.

"We must begin a conversation with the Legislature, the governor, and county clerks and commissioners about how best to address the pent-up demand for judges, court facilities, and new resources needed to conduct safe, timely hearings on the vital issues facing everyday Idaho citizens," Burdick said.

An officer met with the 11year-old girl who through interviews, written reports and drawings told police Allen had tried to kiss her and raped her on two occa-

In a third incident, police say the girl had trouble remembering details and said Allen had given her and the two other girls alcoholic lemonade.

Police say the 14-year-old girl reported Allen made sexual contact with her so many times she was not sure of a total number of incidents. The girl reported the last time was Oct. 1.

In a written statement to police, the 16-year-old girl described two occasions when she was raped by Allen.

According to police, the mother of two of the girls

confronted Allen and his wife in their home the evening of Oct. 16. In an interview with Allen's wife, police say she told them the girls' mother began punching Allen, calling him a pervert and told him to call police and report her if he was innocent. According to the report he did not call police.

Police say Allen's wife told them he would often go outside alone with the girls and she believed he had abused them.

Allen denied all allegations during interviews with police and said the only contact he had with the girls was a hug, or putting an arm around them.

Allen was held on at \$25,000 bond and a preliminary hearing is scheduled for Feb. 3.

BURLEY • Concerned parents of Raft River Elementary School students asked the Cassia County School Board on Tuesday for answers to relieve overcrowding in the Malta school's classrooms.

"What is the possibility of getting a couple more teachers so we can split some of those big classes?" asked parent Gary Bake. Bake said he helps in the fifth-grade class, which has 36 students.

"It's just crazy, it's crazy," he said. "It's not a good atmosphere for learning or anything."

Raft River sixth-grade teacher Sherry Lewis said she's concerned that classroom overcrowding could result in safety issues. Lewis said desks went wall to wall in her classroom when she put extra desks in her room to accommodate the 36 students she'll have in her class next year.

"We're well aware of your crowded conditions. We've been in the classrooms and know there are some challenges there," said district Superintendent Gaylen Smyer.

Smyer said the district must provide a safe environment for students, but safety concerns don't direct funding to help pay for more teachers. State funding for teaching positions is based on each school's average daily student attendance level. More students mean more money for teachers.

"It restricts our ability to be able to meet all of the needs in the community," Smyer said. "We recognize your needs and it's a high priority for us."

BUHL MAN TRIES TO ELUDE POLICE ON SCOOTER

BUHL • A Buhl man was arrested Tuesday on charges of possession of a controlled substance, possession of drug paraphernalia and resisting arrest after attempting to flee Buhl police officers on a gaspowered scooter.

At about 11:12 a.m., a Buhl police officer reported seeing Mark Allen Kelly, 33, run a stop sign at Poplar Street and Broadway Avenue North while driving the scooter. The officer said he recognized Kelly and knew he had a suspended driver's license.

The officer tried to initiate a traffic stop but was delayed because of traffic. Meanwhile, Kelly drove out of sight

down an alley. Several deputies from the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office also responded and searched for

While searching, the officers were told a hang-up 911 call had been made from a house in the area. When they arrived, the officers found fresh footprints in the snow and the house's front door unlocked. They searched the house for an injured person but found the house was

A deputy spotted a suspicious man matching Kelly's description near Buhl High School and detained him.

When the officers tried to handcuff Kelly, he began fighting with them. Eventually, they were able to get him under control and found he had a glass pipe with crystal residue and a baggie with a crystal substance in it. The substance in the pipe later tested positive in a field test kit for methamphetamine and the substance in the bag was sent to the State Lab for

testing. At about 5:30 p.m. a man came to the Buhl Police Department and filed a report of a missing scooter matching the description of the one Kelly was driving. The scooter has not yet been recovered.

Kelly is scheduled for a preliminary hearing for the possession charge on Feb. 3 and a pretrial hearing for the other charges on Feb. 14. He is being held in the Twin Falls County Jail on \$10,000 bond.

APPEALS COURT UPHOLDS T.F. MAN'S SEX ABUSE CONVICTION

BOISE • The Idaho Court of Appeals has affirmed the conviction of a Twin Falls man despite errors made during the trial in district court.

In August 2010, Dwain K. Whitaker, then 48, was sentenced to 20 years to life in prison after being found guilty of 11 counts of lewd conduct with a minor child and three counts of sexual abuse of a child younger than 16.

Whitaker appealed the

conviction, saying testimony by his wife that he had viewed pornography should not have been entered into evidence since it had nothing to do with the charges in the trial.

According to Idaho Rule of Evidence 404, "other crimes, wrongs, or acts" are not admissible to prove the character of a person in court.

According to the Court of Appeals decision, the district court made an error when it allowed the testimony under the reasoning that viewing adult pornography is legal. The decision said even though viewing adult pornography is legal it was still an "act" that could be considered wrong by some, and could be considered a negative characteristic about Whitaker.

The court concluded that even though the error was made, it was harmless since the evidence of Whitaker's guilt came from the testimony of the two victims and a medical expert.

Redistricting

"We'll have to see how that fits and complies with what the Supreme Court and the state have said," Hansen said. "We certainly will take any plan, including Grant's, very seriously."

Redistricting in Idaho required every 10 years, to preserve one-person, onevote principles after population changes - has been fraught with difficulty.

A first six-member commission made up of three Democrats and three Republicans last summer foundered on partisan bickering and adjourned without agreeing on a plan. The replacement panel, which included Crow and Hansen, unanimously agreed on new maps after less than a month, but that immediately prompted two lawsuits.

The conflict intensified late last week, when Denney announced that House members were unhappy with Crow, his appointee, because she "gave too much

away" to minority Democrats by joining the unanimous vote approving the redistricting maps that were later ruled unconstitutional.

Semanko contended Hansen, his appointee, deserved to be ousted because he was behind the previous plan that was challenged in the Supreme Court by Twin Falls County.

This very public dispute, pitting GOP leader against GOP leader, has touched off a nerve within the dominant Idaho political party's inner circles.

In a guest editorial to Idaho newspapers, former Republican Gov. Phil Batt decried what he called Semanko's and Denney's efforts to replace Hansen and Crow "with hard-line party loyalists."

they want 100 percent Republicans of their own variety."

And House Assistant Majority Leader Scott Bedke, R-Oakley, told reporters that some House members were doing their best to distance themselves from the fiasco.

If anyone had asked him if the party should go after Crow and Hansen, Bedke said he would have advised restraint.

"No, I was not consulted," Bedke said, before the ruling. "If I had been, I would have expressed some reluctance about going down this road."

The six-person, bipartisan commission also includes Republican Sheila Olsen, and Democrats Ron Beitelspacher, Shauneen Grange and Elmer Martinez.

Senate President Pro Tem Brent Hill, R-Rexburg, never sought to replace Olsen, his appointee. Democratic leaders also stuck by their appointees.

foot traffic and such - causes site erosion, that status can be stripped. The BLM's typical response to such signs of damage is to close off a site in order to protect its ecological and historical integrity, Henrikson said.

The debate is controversial among rock climbers and local members of American Indian tribes who have vested interests in the area.

Shoshone-Bannock Tribe member Merceline Boyer said the area is still visited by tribal members. Over the years, she said, she's seen sites get trashed or disrespected by recreational land

"These places are sacred," Boyer said. "It's where our ancestors went and it's where we still go today. We want this land protected."

However, rock climbers and other recreationists oppose the closures just as strongly.

Since the 1990s, Cedar Fields has been a popular destination for climbers, said Jack Brennan, a member of the Eastern Idaho Climbers Association.

"We think there should be a common ground between the BLM and rock climbers," he said. "Climbing has been taking place in these areas for years. We should not have our freedoms taken away now."

Rock climbing in the Castle Rocks area has already been banned for the past two years. BLM officials are looking to see if the ban should be extended in conjunction with a ban on rock climbing in Cedar Fields.

Brennan agreed that BLM should protect culturally sensitive lands but argued that the historical sites are usually not at the base of a cliff where climbers gather.

For now, the RAC decided a subcommittee should be appointed to find an alternative to closing the sites. The group will seek an option that won't polarize the two groups but still follows federal guidelines that regulate a historical site.

Otter Expects Idaho to Get Federal Health Exchange

Resistance in the Idaho House, federal deadline effectively kills issue.

BOISE • Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter doubts that the Legis-

lature will create a statebased health insurance exchange this session. "I'd say right now the chances are pretty good

we're not going to have a state-designed exchange because of the timeline itself," Otter said Wednesday.

Earlier this month, Otter outlined several advantages to creating a state-run system and website where Idaho families and business owners could go to compare and purchase health insurance.

Several lawmakers have said the exchange issue would be this year's signature state policy battle.

An exchange system is mandated by the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act championed by the Obama administration.

Otter is a critic of the president's health care package but said a state exchange could give Idahoans more control over buying insurance and offer more stability to Idaho's insurance companies and their employees.

The alternative to a state exchange appears to be passing up a \$20.3 million federal grant and accepting whatever substitute exchange system the federal government creates for states that do not comply with that aspect of the federal health care law.

Although Otter spoke in favor of a state exchange three weeks ago, he said Wednesday that the state does not appear to have enough time to meet the federal government's January 2013 deadline to have an exchange accepted.

"Quite frankly, the clock is running and I don't know that we've got time to put together a state exchange," Otter said.

In 2010, Idaho lawmakers sued the federal government over the Obama administration's health law, contending it was unconstitutional.

To become law in Idaho, any exchange bill would have to successfully clear the House Health and Welfare Committee, which is led by Idaho Falls Republican Rep. Janice McGeachin.

"I oppose implementing an exchange as defined under the federal (health care) law," McGeachin said Wednesday.

Last week, Idaho Falls Republican Rep. Linden Bateman spoke in favor of a plan that appears to be gaining traction in the House.

"Why couldn't we just ignore everything and, if the court did rule against (Idaho's lawsuit), we could call a special session of the Legislature?" Bateman said Jan. 17. "There is a possibility we're wasting a lot of time when we could just announce to the whole world we're not going to fuss with this and assume that very possibly the court will rule in our favor."

But a state exchange is not a dead issue.

Rep. Dean Cameron, a Rupert Republican who owns an insurance agency, has worked with other lawmakers and business leaders to design what he termed an "industry-driven" plan for a state exchange. He urged lawmakers who oppose a state exchange to read the bill, suggesting it would both push back against the federal government and offer more affordable options to local businesses.

"Much of the opposition is not opposed to (our bill), they're opposed to the ideology and opposed to anything that has anything to do with the Affordable Care Act, and we're trying to get people past that," Cameron said. "We'd love to know the outcome of the lawsuit, but we may not know until July and we we'd love to know what the outcome of the presidential election is going to be, but we won't know that until November."

Alex LaBeau, president of the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry – an influential business lobbying group - said his members voted to support a state exchange.

Idahoans who have coverage questions or problems with claims would be better served working with local insurance regulators, LaBeau said, not the federal bureaucrats who would manage an alternative federal exchange.

LaBeau also said that those who oppose a state exchange are effectively endorsing a federal system.

"We've always known we would be under a tight time frame," LaBeau said. "But we prefer to operate and work with the state Department of InsurFarm Starts Generating Electricity IDAHO STATESMAN

Idaho Wind

BOISE • Commercial operations began Wednesday at the Rockland Wind Farm Project in American Falls in southeastern Ida-

The project is the second large Idaho wind installation by Ridgeline Energy and Diamond Generating Corp. The 80-megawatt farm includes 44 wind turbine generators.

"Thanks to the remarkable support we have received from Power County officials, local businesses, residents and land owners this project finished on schedule and without a single losttime accident," said Dennis Meany, president of Ridgeline Energy.

Since construction began in March, more than 170,000 labor hours were used to build access roads, collections systems, an on-site substation and turbines. Nearly 60,000 of those hours were contributed by workers in American Falls, Southeast Idaho and surrounding areas. During peak construction, the project employed more than 160 workers.

Ten full-time employees will live in American Falls to monitor and maintain the farm. Two of those are long-time residents of American Falls and Aberdeen.

Bonner County Residents Blast Caribou Habitat Plan

Mountains - nearly 200 citizens turned out to show their concerns at Tuesday's coordination meeting between Bonner County commissioners and U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service officials.

The meeting, called by commissioners and held at the Inn at Priest Lake, was set with the hopes of altering or influencing the designation process through the coordination.

An open forum for over an hour, the audience pulled no punches showing their displeasure with the proposal, asking "where are these caribou" and "what will happen to this land after it's designated as critical

Questions posed to U.S. Fish & Wildlife officials, who had the answers but left the audience members with mixed emotions and a foreshadowed outcome of gloom if the proposal goes forward.

Fish & Wildlife announced last November it proposed designating 375,562 acres in Bonner and Boundary counties and Washington state's Pend Oreille County as vital habitat for the endangered reindeer relative.

Woodland caribou were listed under the Endangered Species Act in 1984, with Fish & Wildlife estimating a herd of 46 caribou in the recovery area. County officials, along

with those in attendance who live around and frequent the area, contend, however, that those numbers are over-inflated and expressed that as few as only "one or two" caribou may be present.

Fish & Wildlife Super-

visory Biologist Bryon Holt opened the meeting by reiterating the proposal is, "just a draft" and "input from experts and community members is still needed."

He added that the woodland caribou were listed under the Endangered Species Act in 1984 and the Selkirk Conservation Alliance and several other environmental groups sued in 2002 to bring about habitat protections. A subsequent suit in 2009 forced Fish & Wildlife to designate critical habitat.

Holt would also try to reassure everyone in attendance that "private activities will still occur without interference from 'the fed.' even after designation." And that the proposal is somewhat "redundant."

"To the average person you're not going to see a difference," he added.

A sentiment that didn't sit well with the audience, who collectively seemed to feel the designation will 'open the flood gates' for further government action. Even calling the proposal a complete, "land grab" while citing Agenda 21 as the main driving force behind the decision. Agenda 21 is an action plan of United Nations for sustainable development.

Mike Nielsen, along with fellow commissioner Lewis Rich and commission Chairman Cornel Rasor, also pointed out that "the language in the proposal is so vague that it could include prohibiting activities such as snowmobiling, hiking and huckleberry picking.

All activities that are the lifeblood of the local community, audience members and officials said.

Lawmakers Hear About Occupy Boise Incidents

BOISE • Stolen toilet paper. Dumpster diving. Showering in state office buildings and walking around with nothing more on than a towel.

These are among the alleged trespasses committed over the past few weeks by Occupy Boise members living in the tent city on the grounds of the Old Ada County Courthouse at 5th and Jefferson streets.

In testimony before a legislative committee, state Department of Administration Executive Director Teresa Luna also said her agency has incurred about \$9,000 in costs since the protest began Nov. 5, including hiring an extra security guard to monitor campers and to remove graffiti.

Luna said complaints about the encampment have lessened in recent weeks.

Members deny the toilet paper thefts, saying they have a large supply of donated or purchased paper (for use in their portable toilets). "It's a public building,"

said Occupy member Glen E. Garity, who admitted using the showers in a locker room/bathroom at the Len B. Jordan building once in November. He said Tuesday that a sign that now indicates the showers are for Capitol employees only wasn't there when he used the facility. He said he never walked in a hallway clad only in a towel.

But that isn't the most serious of challenges that Occupy Boise has faced.

The House State Affairs Committee voted 13-5 to send HB 404 to the full House. A motion failed that would have stopped the bill from taking effect

Occupy members vow they won't leave their "indefinite vigil." The Idaho Attorney General's Office

offered an informal opinion this week that the bill is constitutional, but Occupy members believe the Idaho Constitution offers greater protections for redressing grievances to the government than does the U.S. Constitution.

"What the attorney general failed to address ... was the whole freedom-of-assembly clause," said Occupy Boise member Dean Gunderson.

If the Legislature passes the bill, Occupy Boise will seek a court injunction to prevent it from taking effect until the issue has been resolved in the courts, Gunderson said.

Occupy members did a meet-and-greet with Legislators Tuesday.

"I think it's gone extremely well," said Occupy member Rachael Raue, 55, of Nampa, who sat at a table of cookies with her dog Lily, a bichon frise. People chatted over the sound of a loud generator, which was brought to the site after power to the courthouse was cut Monday.

Some of Occupy's biggest challenges come from within. One member, Art Stark, was arrested recently on vandalism charges of spray painting two government buildings.

In the past few weeks, police have been called to the encampment for two physical altercations, including one Occupy member pulling a knife on another, Luna said. Security officials were recently called to the camp by an Occupy member who accused another member of stealing items from his tent.

Gunderson said he was the person who was threatened with the knife. Occupy members had asked a man to leave because he'd been verbally abusive and used racist language. The man responded by taking a knife from the group's kitchen and threatening Gunderson early one morning.



Fed Says Full Recovery May Take 3 More Years

Central bank says it will probably not increase its benchmark interest rate until late 2014 at the earliest.

WASHINGTON • The Federal Reserve signaled Wednesday that a full economic recovery could take nearly three more years, and it went further than ever to assure consumers and businesses that they will be able to borrow cheaply well into the future.

The central bank said it would probably not increase its benchmark interest rate until late 2014 at the earliest -ayear and a half later than it had previously said.

The new timetable showed the Fed is concerned that the recovery remains stubbornly slow. But it also thinks inflation will stay tame enough for rates to remain at record lows without igniting price increases.

Chairman Ben Bernanke cautioned that late 2014 is merely its "best guess." The Fed can shift that plan if the economic picture changes. But he cast doubt on whether that would be neces-

"Unless there is a substantial strengthening of the economy in the near term, it's a pretty good guess we will be keeping rates low for some time," he said.

The Fed has kept its key rate at a record low near zero for about three years. Its new time frame suggests the rate will stay there for roughly an additional three years.

The bank's tepid outlook also suggests it's prepared to do more to help the economy. One possibility is a third bond-buying program that would seek to further drive down rates on mortgages and other loans to embolden consumers and businesses to borrow and spend more.

In a statement after a two-day policy meeting, the Fed said it stands ready to adjust its "holdings as appropriate to promote a stronger economic recovery in the context of price stability."

Treasury yields fell after the midday

announcement. But yields stopped falling after the bank later issued forecasts for the economy and interest rates. They showed that while some members foresee super-low rates beyond 2014, six of the 17 members forecast a rate increase as early as this year or next. It was the first time the Fed had re-

leased interest-rate forecasts from its committee members. It will now do so four times a year, when it also updates its economic outlook. The rate forecasts are an effort to

provide more explicit clues about the Fed's plans. They also coincide with a broader Fed effort to make its communications with the public more open.

Lower yields on bonds tend to encourage investors to shift money into stocks, which can boost wealth and spur more spending.

Stocks, which had traded lower before the Fed's announcement, quickly recovered their losses. The Dow Jones industrial average closed at 12,758.85, its highest close in more than eight months.

Some economists said the new late-2014 target may foreshadow further Fed action to try to invigorate the economy.

Julie Coronado, an economist at BNP Paribas, said she thought the Fed was indicating that it will step up its purchases of bonds and other assets if economic growth fails to accelerate — even if it doesn't slow.

That is a "very low bar indeed," she wrote in a note to clients.

Other analysts fear that the Fed's longer-term timetable for a rate increase could hamstring it, even though Bernanke stressed the Fed's ability to adjust rates as it sees fit.

Dana Saporta, an economist at Credit Suisse, worried that the much-longer timetable would compromise the Fed's credibility if it must raise rates sooner because of unexpectedly strong growth and inflation.

"It's striking that the Fed would make an implicit commitment for almost three years," Saporta said. "It seems like an awfully long time to make such a statement. Given that no one knows what will happen ... the (Fed) may eventually regret this."

iPhone, iPad App Rewards Beinga

Company expects to make more money from advertisers and networks than it gives away in rewards.

LOS ANGELES • Want to earn stuff by watching TV? A free app for that

debuted Wednesday. When you tap the screen, Viggle's software for iPhones and iPads listens to what's on, recognizes what you're watching and gives you credit at roughly two points per minute. It even works for shows you've saved on a digital video recorder.

Rack up 7,500 points, and you'll be rewarded with a \$5 gift card from retailers such as Burger King, Starbucks, Apple's iTunes, Best Buy and CVS, which you can redeem directly from your device.

With some back-of-the-envelope math, you can figure that it would take three weeks of watching TV every night for three hours to earn enough for a latte at Starbucks.

But the company plans to offer bonus points for checking into certain shows such as "American Idol" and 1,500 points for signing up. You can also get extra points for watching an ad on your device. The beta version awarded 100 points for watching a 15second ad from Verizon Wireless.

"Viggle is the first loyalty program for TV," said Chris Stephenson, president of the company behind Viggle, Function (X) Inc. "We're basically allowing people to get rewards for doing something they're doing already and that they love to do."

The idea behind Viggle is that if people have an added reason to watch TV, the size of the audience will increase, allowing makers of shows to earn more money from advertisers. Advertisers such as Burger King, Pepsi and Gatorade have also agreed to pay to have point-hungry users watch their ads on a mobile device.

In exchange, users earn points, which Viggle converts into real value by buying gift cards at a slight discount from retailers.

If the company gets the pointcount economy right, it can end up making more money from advertisers and networks than it gives away in rewards.

The app will also give the company valuable insight into who is watching what, as redeeming rewards requires putting in your age, gender, email address and ZIP code.

"It really shows what social TV is going to evolve into," said Michael Gartenberg, a technology analyst at research firm Gartner. "For folks behind the scenes, this is a great way of seeing who really is watching."

New Map for What to Plant Reflects Global Warming

WASHINGTON • Global warming is hitting not just home, but garden. The color-coded map of planting zones often seen on the back of seed packets is being updated by the government, illustrating a hotter 21st century.

It's the first time since 1990 that the U.S. Department of Agriculture has revised the official guide for the nation's 80 million gardeners, and much has changed. Nearly entire states, such as Ohio, Nebraska and Texas, are in warmer zones.

The new guide, unveiled Wednesday at the National Arboretum, arrives just as many home gardeners are receiving their seed catalogs and dreaming of lush flower beds in the spring.

It reflects a new reality: The coldest day of the year isn't as cold as it used to be, so some plants and trees can now survive farther north.

"People who grow plants are well aware of the fact that temperatures have gotten more mild throughout the year, particularly in the wintertime," said Boston University biology profes-Richard Primack. "There's a lot of things you can grow now that you couldn't grow before!"

He stand the giant fig tree in his suburban Boston yard stands as an example: "People don't think of figs as a crop you can grow in the Boston area. You can do it now."

The new guide also uses better weather data and offers more interactive technology. For example, gardeners using the online version can enter their ZIP code and get the exact average coldest temperature.

Also, for the first time, calculations include more detailed factors such as prevailing winds, the presence of nearby bodies of water, the slope of the land, and the way cities are hotter than suburbs and rural ar-



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

Moines, Iowa, St. Paul, Minn., and even Fairbanks, Alaska, are in newer, warmer zones.

Those differences matter in deciding what to plant.

For example, Des Moines used to be in zone 5a, meaning the lowest temperature on average was between minus 15 and minus 20 degrees. Now it's 5b, which has a lowest temperature of 10 to 15 degrees below zero. Jerry Holub, manager of a Des Moines plant nursery, said folks there might now be able to safely grow passion flowers.

Griffin, Ga., used to be in zone 7b, where the coldest day would average between 5 and 10 degrees. But the city is now in zone 8a, averaging a coldest day of 10 to 15 degrees. So growing bay laurel becomes possible. It wasn't recommended on the old map.

"It is great that the federal government is catching up with what the plants themselves have known for years now: The globe is warming and it is greatly influencing plants (and animals);' Stanford University biology professor Terry Root wrote in an email.

The changes come too late to make this year's seed packets, but they will be in next year's, said George Ball, chairman and CEO of the seed company W. Atlee Burpee, which puts the maps on packages of perennials, not annuals. But Ball said many of his customers already know what can grow in their own climate

and how it has warmed. "Climate change, which has been in the air for a long time, is not big news to gardeners," he said.

Mark Kaplan, a New York meteorologist who helped create the 1990 map, said the latest version clearly shows warmer zones migrating north. Other experts

The 1990 map was based on temperatures from 1974 to 1986, the new map from 1976 to 2005. The nation's average temperature from 1976 to 2005 was twothirds of a degree higher than it was during the old time period, according to



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the National Climatic Data Center.

USDA spokeswoman Kim Kaplan, who was part of the map team, repeatedly tried to distance the new zones on the map from global warming. She said that while much of the country is in warmer zones, the map "is simply not a good instrument" to demonstrate climate change because it is based on just the coldest days of the year.

David W. Wolfe, a professor of plant and soil ecology at Cornell University, said that the USDA is being too cautious and that the map plainly reflects warming.

The revised map "gives us a clear picture of the 'new normal' and will be an essential tool for gardeners, farmers and natural resource managers as they begin to cope with rapid climate change," Wolfe said in an email.

The Arbor Day Foundation issued its own hardiness guide six years ago, and the new government map is very similar, said Woodrow Nelson, a vice president at the plant-loving organization.

"We got a lot of comments that the 1990 map wasn't accurate anymore, Nelson said. "I look forward to (the new map). It's been a long time coming."

Nelson lives in Lincoln, Neb., where the zone warmed to a 5b. Nelson said he used to be in a "solid 4;" but now he has Japanese maples and Fraser firs in his yard - trees that shouldn't survive in a zone 4.

Vaughn Speer, an 87year-old master gardener in Ames, Iowa, said he has seen redbud trees, one of the earliest blooming trees, a little farther north in recent years.

"They always said redbuds don't go beyond U.S. Highway 30," he said, "but I'm seeing them near Roland," 10 miles to the north.

A Presidential Rerun

ummertime is usually when TV networks air repeats of shows we've already seen. In his State of the Union Address Tuesday night, the president got a five-



month jump on the summer season by re-running a class-envy video he has broadcast more times than local stations have shown episodes of "The Andy Griffith Show"

Instead of a credible assessment of the state of the union, which is not good, the president delivered a slightly toned down campaign speech. We heard more of the same about how "the rich" aren't paying their "fair share" in taxes.

There was an unserious nod to government overspending to which he has massively contributed. Why should those of us who work for a living give more money to a government that under Democrats and Republicans has been such a poor steward of what we have already provided? Confiscating all of the wealth of Mitt Romney, Warren Buffett and every other billionaire and millionaire in the country would have a negligible effect on the national debt, unless government decided to live within taxpayers' means.

Having Warren Buffett's secretary, Debbie Bosanek, in the gallery with first lady Michelle Obama was cheap theatrics. If the president doesn't think it "fair" that she pays a higher tax percentage than her boss, let him ask Congress to lower her percentage with a flat tax. Bosanek may pay a higher tax rate, but Buffett pays a lot more money to the federal government.

President Obama wants four more years to continue the policies he's inflicted on us the last three years. Why would anyone believe that his policies, which are not succeeding and can't succeed, will miraculously work given more time?

This president has squandered a great opportunity. As the country's first African-American president, Barack Obama had the chance to lead poor African-Americans out of poverty by encouraging them to embrace the principles that would allow them to become self-reliant instead of stoking envy of the successful. He had that responsibility. He has failed to live up to it. That is a tragedy, not only for him, but for those he left behind.

Envy has never created a single job, put a family back together, encouraged a man to provide for his children or endowed young women with the kind of self-regard that would encourage them not to create children they too often neglect. The state of many poor African-Americans remains how it has been for years — too many fatherless children, too many uneducated, hopeless women and too many men in prison. President Obama might have done something about that beyond more government programs and handouts. Tuesday night, he spoke of no more government handouts. Which ones will he cut?

Optimism, self-regard and the economic, social and spiritual principles that built and sustained America, offering opportunity, not guaranteed outcome, are what the president should be stressing. Government is not our keeper. We are our own and our neighbor's keepers. Addicting more and more people to government and the view that others owe them a living is the worst form of covetousness. In case the president missed it in Jeremiah Wright's church, there's a commandment against coveting your neighbor's property.



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A Brighter Energy Future?

week after President Obama denied the application for the Keystone XL pipeline - which would carry oil from Canada's tar sands deposits in Alberta to U.S. refineries along the Gulf of Mexico – it's time for an energy reality check. What's the future hold? It may be better than you think. That's one message from the U.S. Energy Information Administration's latest "Annual Energy Outlook," which projects the supply and demand for fuels through

Even Obama struck an optimistic tone in his State of the Union. The EIA report suggests three important conclusions.

First, despite big gains in energy efficiency and increases in "renewables" (wind, solar, biofuels), fossil fuels will remain the mainstay of America's energy system for years. In 2010, fossil fuel represented 83 percent of U.S. energy consumption, with oil at 37 percent, natural gas at 25 percent and coal at 21 percent. Although total energy use grows only 10 percent between 2010 and 2035, the fossilfuel share stays high at 77 percent in 2035. Oil is 32 percent, natural gas 25 percent and coal 20 per-

Second, it would take herculean efforts to cut greenhouse gas emissions sharply. The gains in effi-

ciency and the expansion of renewables are offset by increased energy demand from a larger population (390 million in 2035, up from 310 million in 2010) and more homes, office buildings, shopping malls and cars. In 2035, emissions of carbon dioxide the largest greenhouse gas - are reckoned to be 3 percent higher than in 2010. This contrasts with the declines of 50 percent to 80 percent by midcentury that some scientists say are needed to stabilize global temperatures.

Finally, U.S. oil and natural gas production are growth industries. For years, they seemed in irreversible decline. Oil imports were rising, and higher natural gas demand would be met by foreign liquefied natural gas (LNG). Now, advances in "fracking" (using pressurized water to "fracture" tight oil and gas formations) have opened new fields. From 2007 to 2010, U.S. oil production rose from 5.1 million barrels a day (mbd) to 5.5 mbd. By 2020, it will hit 6.7 mbd, projects the EIA. Oil imports are declining, and higher natural gas output will turn the United States into an exporter by 2016, says EIA.

Viewed this way, our energy future seems reassuring. We've become vastly more efficient. In 2010, it took about half the energy to produce a dollar's worth of output (gross domestic product) as in 1980. This reflected more fuel-efficient vehicles - a response to higher gasoline prices and government fuel economy standards - and a shift from an energy-intensive industrial economy to a service economy. An office complex with 5,000 workers uses less energy than a steel mill with 5,000 workers. The EIA expects these trends to continue; energy use per dollar of GDP is projected to drop 42 percent from 2010 to 2035.

Meanwhile, domestic energy production is rising and — astonishingly — import dependence is rapidly falling. In 2010, oil imports accounted for 49 percent of U.S. consumption, down from 60 percent in 2005. By 2035, imports could decline to 36 percent, projects the EIA.

All this seems good news.

But we don't view energy this way. We clamor for grander goals: becoming energy "independent" or stopping global warming.

And these — as the EIA report also shows — are unreachable anytime soon, if ever. Barring vast new discoveries, we won't produce enough oil to meet our needs. Indeed, the EIA's assumption about

biofuels, which roughly triple by 2035, could be too optimistic. If so, oil imports would exceed EIA projections. (In 2035, the EIA expects biofuels to account for 12 percent of liquid fuel use, up from 4 percent in 2010.)

The same is true of global warming. It's hard to see how, under plausible assumptions, greenhouse gas emissions could be reduced substantially in the foreseeable future. The pressures of population and economic growth overwhelm improved energy efficiency or shifts to "green" energy. For example, renewable fuels (wind, solar, geothermal, biomass) are projected to more than double by 2035. Still, including hydropower, they account for only 16 percent of electricity generation in 2035. Coal and natural gas dominate.

We need to view matters as they are, not as we wish them. Take the Keystone XL pipeline. We may depend indefinitely on oil imports, but not all imports are equal. Canadian oil, transported south by pipeline, is almost as secure as American crude. Canadian oil sands now produce about 1.9 million barrels a day; by 2035, the EIA expects that to reach 5 mbd. Rejection of Keystone did nothing to cut greenhouse emissions. It simply spurred Canada to explore ways to sell to China and other Asian customers.

The energy outlook isn't half bad. With common sense, it could be even better.

UI President Nellis Calls Faculty Pay **Top Priority**

BOISE • University of Idaho President Duane Nellis bemoaned the loss of key faculty members due to the budget crunch Wednesday, saying most employees on Moscow campus have not had a salary increase in four years and boosting compensation is his highest priority.

"I worry about morale on campus. I worry about losing some of our best people. We've already lost some really outstanding people," Nellis told AP after he reported to the Idaho Legislature's budget writing committee. "I just can't emphasize enough how we need some indication of support there?"

Nellis told the panel he was encouraged by the governor's budget recommendation for the next fiscal year, which includes a \$16.9 million boost in state support for Idaho's public universities. The governor's budget also includes a 3 percent pay bonus for state workers, including university professors and faculty, but that's only if state tax revenues stay on track.

A legislative committee, however, opted Tuesday for a tax revenue forecast that's about \$33 million less than the one favored by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter, a Republi-

Nellis, when reporting to the Idaho Legislature's budget writing committee, was asked to list his priorities given the lower revenue target.

"I think the lowest priority from my perspective is the dollars the governor has recommended for the rainy day fund," Nellis said. "I just don't know if this is the year to do that?"

Otter has proposed replenishing a reserve account for public schools and kicking in the first state payment to a similar account for higher education. Under the governor's budget, the state would shift \$4.9 million into a reserve account for Idaho's universities and colleges.

The lower revenue target will make it difficult for lawmakers to carry out the governor's plan to replenish Idaho's rainy day accounts, said Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, who co-chairs the budget writing committee.

State reserves have been drained to nearly nothing from \$384 million four years ago.

"We'll have to put some toward the reserve funds because of a statutory requirement," Cameron said. "But we may end up looking at triggers, should our revenue exceed expectations, for additional money into reserve funds."

Nellis listed wheat breeder Robert Zemetra, a professor of plant breeding and genetics, among the faculty members who have left the university amid the budget shortfalls, which have forced employees in recent years to take on more responsibilities while their wages remain, for the most part, unchanged. Zemetra went to Oregon State University, where he will earn a significantly higher salary, Nellis said.

"He's just one example of the types of faculty that we've lost due to our budget situation," Nellis

If state revenues turn out to be less than what the governor projected and lawmakers do away with Otter's proposed \$41 million in pay bonuses for state workers, Nellis said it would be very difficult for the university to find the money elsewhere to provide faculty a wage in-

WASHINGTON (AP) America's public school teachers are seeing their generations-old tenure protections weakened as states seek flexibility to fire teachers who aren't performing. A few states have essentially nullified tenure protections altogether, according to an analysis released Wednesday by the National Council on Teacher Quality.

The changes are occurring as states replace virtually au-"satisfactory" teacher evaluations with those linked to teacher performance and base teacher layoffs on performance instead of seniority. Politically powerful teachers' unions are fighting back, arguing the changes lower morale, deny teachers due process, and unfairly target older teachers.

The debate is so intense that in Idaho, for example, state superintendent Tom Luna's truck was spray painted and its tires slashed. An opponent appeared at his mother's house and he was interrupted during a live TV interview by an agitated man. Why? The Idaho legislature last year ended "continuing contracts" - essentially equivalent to tenure for new teachers and said performance, not seniority, would determine layoffs. Other changes include up to \$8,000 in annual bonuses given to teachers for good performance, and parent input on evaluations. Opponents gathered enough signatures to put a referendum that would overturn the changes on the November

Luna says good teachers shouldn't be worried.

"We had a system where it was almost impossible to financially reward great teachers and very difficult to deal with ineffective teachers. If you want an education system that truly puts students first, you have to have both," Luna said.

On Tuesday night, President Barack Obama weighed in on the issue during his State of the Union address. He said schools should be given the resources to keep and reward good teachers along with the flexibility to teach with creativity and to "replace teachers who just aren't helping kids learn?'

Tenure protections were created in the early 20th century to protect teachers from arbitrary or discriminatory firings based on factors such

as gender, nationality or political beliefs by spelling out rules under which they could be dismissed after a probationary period.

Critics say teachers too often get tenure by just showing up for work — typically for three years, but sometimes less, and that once they earned it, bad teachers are almost impossible or too expensive to fire. The latest statistics from the National Center for Education Statistics, dating to the 2007-2008 school year, show about 2 percent of teachers dismissed for poor performance, although the numbers vary widely by school district.

The analysis by the National Council on Teacher Quality, a research and policy group that seeks to improve the quality of teaching, documents the shift in laws. In 2009, no state required student performance to be central to whether a teacher is awarded tenure; today, eight states do. The analysis also says four states now want evidence that students are learning before awarding

Other changes:

• In Florida, tenure protections were essentially made null and void with policy changes such as eliminat ing tenure-like benefits altogether for new teachers, but also spelling out requirements under which all teachers with multiple poor evaluations face dismissal.

• Colorado and Nevada passed laws saying tenure can be taken away after multiple "ineffective" ratings. • Eleven states now require districts to consider teacher performance when deciding

ations. Florida, Indiana and Michigan adopted policies that require performance to be factored in teacher

salaries. A growing body of research demonstrates the dramatic difference effective teachers can play in student lives, from reducing teenage pregnancies to increasing a student's lifetime earnings. Meanwhile, while controversial, teacher evaluations have evolved in a way that proponents say allows better accounting of students' growth and of factors out of a teacher's control, like atten-

The Obama administration has helped nudge the changes with its Race to the Top competition, which allowed states to compete for billions of education dollars, and offering states waivers around unpopular proficiency requirements in the No Child Left Behind education law. To participate in either, states have to promise changes such as tying teacher evaluations to performance.

"There's a real shift to saying all kids, especially our most disadvantaged kids, have access to really high quality and effective teachers. And, that's it's not OK for kids to have ... an ineffective teacher year after year," said Sandi Jacobs, vice president of the National Council on Teacher Quality.

Jacobs said tenure should be meaningful, but that in 39 states it's automatic.

"That's the problem with tenure, everybody gets it,"

she said. "If you're held to a high bar where you've really demonstrated that you are effective in the classroom, then there's nothing wrong with that as long as the due process rights that you do get are reasonable."

But many teachers feel under siege. They argue the evaluation systems are too dependent on standardized tests. While teachers' unions have gotten more on board with strengthening teacher evaluations, they often question the systems' fairness and want them designed with local teachers' input.

Randi Weingarten, president of the American Federation of Teachers, said unions understand the tenure process needs change, but that too often, school administrators have used it as an excuse to mismanage. "They want teachers to basically do exactly what they say, give them no resources and then blame them if they don't in a time of tremendous fiscal instability and fiscal pressures;" Weingarten said.

In Boise, Lane Brown, 56, a biology and horticulture teacher who moved from a private school a few years ago to a public alternative high school to seek new challenges after three decades of teaching, said her school's climate has dramatically changed.

"There's nobody in this building that doesn't understand it could be one of us, not just the newest teacher or the teacher with the fewest number of students. It could be anybody, ... which is scary. Every teacher here is saying, 'I don't know if I'm going to have a job next year," Brown said.

In Florida, teachers fear expressing what they feel is best for students, said Andy Ford, president of the Florida Education Association.

"Teachers see positions not being filled, class sizes increasing, more demands, more testing, and you add all that together with their economic uncertainty about continued employment and

it certainly doesn't allow you to go out and plan for long term investments like a home," Ford said.

Kathy Hebda, the deputy chancellor for education quality in Florida, said the contract-related changes were not done in "isolation," but as part of broader changes that improve accountability and provide teachers feedback.

Michelle Rhee, the former schools chancellor in Washington, D.C., acknowledged widespread mistrust among teachers about evaluations, but she said once teachers are brought into discussions, many are won over.

"If we know who the effective teachers are, if we know what kind of an impact effective teachers can have on individual kids and on our society overall, then why wouldn't we take the obvious step of utilizing the information on who are the most effective teachers to make our staffing decisions?" said Rhee, whose education advocacy group StudentsFirst is pushing for changes to layoff policies based on seniori-

Coming up, Missouri legislators appear poised to take up the contentious topic of teacher tenure. In Connecticut, the Connecticut Education Association launched a TV advertising campaign after Democratic Gov. Dannel P. Malloy and legislative leaders said education reform and possibly tenure — will be the major focus of this legislative session. Louisiana Gov. Bobby Iindal and New Jersey, Gov. Chris Christie, both Republicans, are eyeing tenure law changes. "Tenure laws will be under

assault for many years to come," said Marjorie Murphy, a professor of history at Swarthmore College who wrote a book about the teacher labor movement. Murphy said ending tenure protections will "take over any sense of fair play between employer and employee. All of that will be gone."

Otter Says He's **Against Moving** Primary to August

BOISE • Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter opposes moving Idaho's primary election to August, largely due to concerns it would result in an even lower turnout than the current primary in May.

Otter made the comments Wednesday to reporters from the Idaho Press Club.

Rep. Tom Loertscher, an eastern Idaho Republican, has introduced a measure that would shift the primary election to August.

With Idaho still without redistricting maps governing legislative boundaries, moving the primary from May would allow for more time to sort out complications.

It would also give incumbent lawmakers more time to campaign after legislative sessions.

But Otter said a primary in August — when people are still on summer vacations would damage voter partic-

Bill to Revise **Education Law** Heads to Idaho Senate

BOISE • A bill headed to the Idaho Senate would delete a portion of the state's new education laws that defines an online course and says the instructor cannot physically be in the same school in which the student is receiving the virtual instruction.

Idaho is requiring high school students to take at least two credits online.

Republican Sen. John Goedde told the Spokesman-Review the changes stipulated that teachers and students be separate during the online course instruction to ensure the state was providing distance education, as the law intended.

But the state Board of Education says the clause could cause problems, such as prohibiting a teacher from loading online course material in a school where students are taking the class. Also, the board rule requiring online learning defines such courses.

Idaho Senate Passes Bill on Teacher **Evaluations**

BOISE • Lawmakers in the Idaho Senate have approved legislation to clarify when parents can start weighing in on teaching evaluations.

The bill cleared the chamber Wednesday on a unanimous vote. It is among a series of tweaks being considered by lawmakers working to refine a massive education overhaul that was signed into law last year, with backing from public schools chief Tom Luna.

The plan says at least 50 percent of a teacher's job evaluation will be based on student achievement starting July 1, and parental input will also be a factor. Republican Sen. John Goedde of Coeur d'Alene says to some school districts, the law was unclear as to when parents become involved.

Legislation now headed to the Idaho House clarifies that parental input also comes into play July 1.

Panel Approves Higher Fees for Oversized Loads

BOISE • The Idaho Transportation Department is seeking permission to charge a little more for truckers hauling huge loads across state highways.

Agency officials say they hope a proposed fee increase for oversized load permits will help offset a \$645,000 annual cost to administer the program.

IDT official Regina Phipps told state lawmakers this week the agency is required to recoup costs for overseeing the program.

The Senate Transportation Committee approved a rule change raising fees for permits by \$18 to \$70 depending on the permit.

The Lewiston Tribune reports that most of the increases target loads that can't be reduced in size because those shipments require more staff time to review.

The boy spent about a week in the intensive care unit suffering from an apparent overdose of a prescription drug. The boy also tested positive for methamphetamine.

Survey: ID Medicaid Processor Doing Better

BOISE (AP) • Many Idaho health care providers are happier with the service they're receiving from a California company that processes the state's Medicaid claims, but one-third of the providers still aren't satisfied, a new survey found.

Molina Medicaid Solutions began handling claims and issuing payments on behalf of the state in 2010. Dozens of health care companies complained that delayed payments caused financial difficulties and some went out of business.

The state responded by decreasing and withholding some payments to Molina for failing to meet the standards of the contract and put in place a pay-for-performance contract that levies monetary penalties when the company fails to meet standards.

A 2011 audit by the state's Office of Performance Evaluations found 72 percent of the state's Medicaid providers were either "unsatisfied" or "very unsatisfied" with the claims process.

The same auditing group surveyed just more than half of the state's 10,000 Medicaid providers, with 59 percent saying Molina is either doing "better" or "much better" than when the system was introduced, The Post Register reported Wednesday.

"We appreciate the recognition from providers who say they have seen improvements, but we're not going to sit back" said Del Bell, Molina's executive account manager in Idaho. He said the company improved its performance by increasing the number of Idaho employees and launching new training programs.

The most recent report found that two of the health care providers' most common complaints the number of claims that were delayed and the inability to reach Molina customer service representatives - were addressed. Wait times to reach customer service agents decreased from an average of more than 35 minutes in August 2010 to just over a minute last week, said Idaho Department of Health and Welfare spokesman Tom Shanahan.

SHOSHONE • An extraordinary world lies hidden inside the narrow, deep incision snaking across a basalt field north of Shoshone.

Thousands of years of erosion have sculpted wildly fantastic shapes in the walls of the Big Wood River's native channel, as waterborne stones scoured and ground and polished the softer basalt. Those who've peered over the edge or hiked into the depths — speak of the spectacle in awe.

"It's just amazing the power the water has when it gets flowing like that, when it picks up the grits and fines, and what it can do to rock," said Lynn Harmon, general man-

ager of the Big Wood Canal Co. Informally dubbed Black Magic Canyon, the sculpted riverbed downstream of Magic Dam is an internationally unique resource that the Bureau of Land Management fought a long court battle to protect from mining claims in the

"These outstanding specimens may well be the best examples of their kind in the nation, if not in the world," wrote BLM geologists Terry S. Maley and Peter Oberlindacher in a 1994 publication for the Idaho Geological Survey.

The Big Wood's waters are all captured in Magic Reservoir at certain times of year, leaving the riverbed dry for hikers. And a roadside kiosk just off Idaho Highway 75 provides easy access to one stretch of the channel. But the most astonishing formations lie east and southeast of Kinzie Butte in a remote section of sagebrush-and-lava desert that's sometimes too muddy to access and always dangerous.

"It's seldom visited, actually," said David Freiberg, outdoor recreation planner for the BLM's Shoshone Field Office, who gets only four or five inquiries a year about that stretch of riverbed. "It's not for the weak, really. You want to be pretty sure-footed before you embark through here."

Read This before Going

Seeing the sculpted rocks of the Big Wood River channel requires care and preparation. But the payoff is well worth it.

Call first: When water is released from Magic Reservoir, anyone hiking in the steep-sided Big Wood River bed could be caught and drowned. Before planning a hike anywhere along the channel, you absolutely must call ahead to the Big Wood Canal Co. in Shoshone: 886-2331. The office is open only on weekdays, so you'll have to think ahead for any weekend exploring.

If there's water in the canyon,

Keep both hands free: This is a wonderland for photography, but bring a backpack to carry your gear. "You can't just walk through it. You have to be able to kind of climb through it," Bureau of Land Management geologist Johnny Garth said. "You need to have your

Difficult Timing

And you absolutely must call ahead to the Big Wood Canal Co. in Shoshone, to ask about water releases from Magic Reservoir. Those incredible channel walls could become a death trap for any hiker caught in the riverbed when the dam opens.

When the water level in Magic Reservoir is high, the canal company might release water into the Big Wood River channel anytime from mid-February to early May for flood prevention, Harmon said. The normal start of those water releases is early March, he said, but doublecheck before hiking at any time. The company has done some unusually timed releases during some winters.

"We probably get, oh, half a dozen calls a year. It's not as extensive as you would think," Harmon said. "There may be a lot of people that really aren't aware of that fea-

To see it yourself, look for an op-

hands free. That's very important." Dangers: Much of the channel's length is remote — and difficult for rescue workers to access if you slip on ice or fall off a rock. Wear sturdy shoes and beware of unstable footing at every step. Tell someone where you're going and when you'll return, and carry a cell phone (though you won't

have a signal inside the canyon). "You can get killed anywhere out here. And it's cold, of course," said David Freiberg, a BLM outdoor recreation planner. Freiberg carries a first aid kit when in the canyon, and basic survival supplies aren't a bad idea, either.

One more note about danger: Rattlesnakes are extremely numerous here, and as the weather

warms they'll resume activity. **Information:** For more pointers about Black Magic Canyon, call the BLM's Shoshone Field Office at 732-7200.

All that bold and elegant beauty had only 10,000 years to form.

The Big Wood River channel cuts through 800,000year-old basalt, in places eroding through to a depth of more than 50 feet and exposing at least three lava flows. But that's not the river's ancient route.

Lava that flowed from Black Butte Crater 10,000 years ago — now dubbed the Shoshone lava field – displaced the river, forcing it to carve a new channel southeast of Black Butte. So today's sculpted features in the rerouted channel are younger than the 10,000year-old lava flow whose perimeter it follows.

Mountain Rocks

While Smith photographed those carvings, my husband scanned the canyon-bottom beds of polished pebbles, dropping a few gorgeously colored stones into his pockets. Their variety was stunning, and many had fine fractures filled with veins of white

So why, in the middle of a huge lava field, could he engage in a southern-Idaho ver-

sion of beachcombing? The Big Wood River is fed by streams draining the Boulder, Pioneer and Smoky mountains to the north. So those mountains - before the 1907-10 building of Magic Dam were the source of the pebbles and cobbles that sculpted the Big Wood channel. During an ice age some 7,000 to 10,000 years ago, fast-flowing water from melting glaciers moved large loads of that sediment, a powerful sculpting force.

Masses of those small, polished rocks are collected along the channel bottom or trapped in the very potholes they helped to grind out. Quartzite and granitic rocks account for the biggest percentages, but geologists list at least seven other rock types among them.

You don't have to remember your high school geology lessons, though, to appreciate their diversity - or their honeycomb artwork on the lava

As waters drove and swirled those pebbles century after century, new potholes in the basalt overlapped older ones. Undercut by erosion, boulders fell from the rim to be resculpted on the channel bottom. Cut through by bigger holes, pothole relicts were left hanging or suspended on the channel walls.

The result is a complex wonderland of whimsical shapes — and an intriguing cutaway view of lava flows.

Each footstep reveals another breathtaking swirl of rock, another moment in the story of the Snake River Plain's violent creation.

Two Options for Enjoying Black Magic Canyon

It's possible to access the Big Wood River channel in many places along its length. But here are two options that will keep you away from private property:

For Easiest Access

Get there: About 18 miles north of Shoshone on Idaho Highway 75, turn west on West Magic Road. You'll immediately find a parking pullout on the north side of the road, with an informational kiosk explaining the geology of Black Magic Canyon. A paved trail leads to a picnic table, then to the edge of the Big Wood River chan-

Hiking tips: From that entry point, the downstream direction (to your right) initially looks more promising. In some places you'll walk on a wide path of stones, between sculpted basalt walls that average about 8 to 10 feet high. In other spots you'll do a little scrambling over rocks, but nothing too seri-

If you choose the upstream hike (to your left) instead, it will quickly bring you to walls more like 20 to 25 feet tall, with more spectacular shaping. You'll find a couple of huge carved bathtubs before the channel is blocked by fallen rocks.

Timing: You can do this hike now (call 886-2331 first to check for water releases), even if recent storms' snow and mud haven't dried up.

If you time your visit later in the year, between water releases, you might encounter a gross and slippery covering on the channel bottom at this particular point: aquatic plants, rotting stuff and snails.

For the Most Spectacular Sight

Bureau of Land Management geologist Johnny Garth says the most remarkable stretch of the channel is east and southeast of Kinzie Butte. But this remote and difficult hike is only for the careful and well prepared. For a one-way, one-mile hike, take at least one companion and two vehicles.

Get there: On Idaho Highway 75 north of Shoshone, drive a mile north of Johnny's Country Store and turn east onto 520 N. Follow 520 N. as it curves to the north. At the point where the paved road curves back to the west, leave the pavement and continue north on a graveland-dirt road.

 Take note of your odometer as you leave the pavement. Where the gravel road splits the first time, take the left fork. Where it splits the second time, go

 Soon, you'll be driving roughly parallel to the river channel. About 1.7 miles after leaving the pavement, you'll cross a wooden bridge over a canal. You'll cross a second wooden bridge at a diversion dam which allows the canal company to shift flows from the riverbed into the canal. Immediately after the dam is the spot to leave one of your vehicles; that will be the end-point of your one-mile hike. (This is 2.1 miles after leaving the pavement.)

· In the second vehicle, get back onto the same gravel road and check your odometer again. About 0.6 miles from your first parked vehicle, you'll find yourself driving onto the canal bank. At 0.9 miles from your first parking spot, drive down off the canal bank onto a faint track that heads east through the sagebrush, directly toward the riverbed. Park beside the river channel, which is shallow at that point - an excellent place for hikers to enter.

Hiking tips: Start out early in the day, so that you'll have hours of daylight remaining if anything goes wrong. And allow



yourself plenty of time to hike slowly and appreciate the magnificent shaping of walls that are more than 40 feet high in places. If you stop for a lot of photography, this one-way hike could easily take two hours.

"This is so remote, if you got hurt you'd be really sorry," said David Freiberg, a BLM outdoor recreation planner. Timing: The past week's

storms made these dirt roads impassable because of snow and mud. How quickly they dry out depends on weather condi-

"Any significant snow, and you can forget about it," Freiberg said.

Freiberg said the perfect time to hike this stretch is early spring — but before the Big Wood Canal Co. begins releasing water from Magic Reservoir. And that timing is unpredictable; you must call ahead to the canal company (886-2331) before planning a hike.

This Astronomer Quietly Achieved Great Things

ne of the nice things about astronomy is that it's a small science, in the sense that the number of professional astronomers is pretty few.

That means, if you travel in astronomy circles, you've got a pretty good chance of meeting someone who has made a significant contribution to our understanding of the universe.

I have been so fortunate. From 1988 to 1994, I worked on the scheduling team for the Hubble Space Telescope. And working in the room adjacent to my work space was the greatest astronomer I've had the pleasure to call my friend.

Unlike the vast majority of his peers, Charlie Kowal never got a PhD.

While this would limit most astronomers' ability to secure a good position and make their mark in the field, it didn't hold Charlie

Before coming to Hubble, Charlie discovered 81 supernovae, five comets, two moons of Jupiter, and 19 asteroids — including a whole new class of asteroids orbiting between Jupiter and Neptune (the Centaurs).

If that weren't enough, he also unearthed evidence that Galileo had unknowingly observed and recorded Neptune while observing Jupiter, predating its discovery by 233 years. Later, he authored a book on asteroids, and worked on the first spacecraft mission to land on an asteroid.

Tip of the Week: Downsize the Tackle

DETROIT • When I first encountered European ice fishermen in Finland a few years ago, I was amazed by the delicacy of their tackle. They fished mostly for small species, the size of perch and bluegills, and thought 4pound line was heavy.

I watched one man sitting on a bucket use a thin wooden rod about 9 inches long with a couple of bent pegs to wrap the 1-pound line around.

His tiny marmooska jigs, about the size of a No. 12 trout fly, were tipped with tinier maggots he stuck on the back of the hook with a dab of honey. He hooked perch after perch on the lake Perca fluviatilis that looks like our yellow perch (Perca flavescens) but commonly grows twice as big.

He landed the fish handover-hand, explaining through an interpreter that he could get a better feel of how much pressure the fish was putting on the threadthin line.

Later we went to a lake filled with Arctic char, and the Finnish anglers used 3pound line and 12-inch rods to land hard-fighting char that averaged about 2 pounds.

As we fished, I thought of my American friends who routinely use heavier rods rigged with spinning reels and 10-pound line and then complain because they don't

This is a lesson in the advantages of downsizing your tackle during the ice fishing season when the water is often at its clearest, the fish are less active, and you need every edge you can get.

The little jigs we used for perch fishing in Finland had an added advantage _ they stayed horizontal in the water rather than having the tail sections hang below the jig

I wasn't surprised to see the same extremely light line and small jigs being used over the past few seasons by the top anglers in major ice fishing tournaments in the

Some of those competitors had fished tournaments in Finland, Russia and other home with their luggage full of tackle and their heads filled with ideas.

Why not take a cue from those hardy Finlanders and rig your ice rods with 2pound line? And rather than big snap swivels, tie the line directly to the eye of the jig or use the tiniest snap connection you can find, the ones about the diameter of a BB.

If you use a bobber, try one about twice the size of an unshelled peanut, and add split shots to the line until only the top half-inch or so of the bobber is above water.

It requires a bit more fiddling than many fishermen are willing to do, but the result might be a successful day when everyone else is getting skunked.

Ind. House Deals Blow to Labor in Rust Belt

INDIANAPOLIS • In another blow to organized labor in the traditionally union heavy Midwest, Indiana is poised to become the first right-to-work state in more than a decade after Republican lawmakers cleared the way on Wednesday to ban unions from collecting mandatory fees from workers.

Over the past year, Republicans have pushed for other anti-union laws in battleground Rust Belt states where many of the country's manufacturing jobs reside, including Wisconsin and Ohio, but they also have faced backlash from Democrats and union supporters. Wisconsin last year stripped public sector unions of collective bargaining rights

Despite massive protests outside the Capitol, Wisconsin's GOPdominated Assembly passed a law backed by Gov. Scott Walker in March that strips nearly all collective bargaining rights from organized labor. Walker is now preparing for a recall election after opponents turned in a million signatures aimed at forcing a vote and ousting him from office.

In November, Ohio voters repealed a law limiting collective bargaining rights that was championed by Gov. John Kasich and fellow Republican lawmakers.

Indiana would mark the first win in 10 years for national right-to-work advocates who have pushed unsuccessfully for the measure in other states following a Republican sweep of statehouses in 2010. But few right-work states boast Indiana's union clout, borne of a long manufacturing legacy.

Oklahoma, with its rural-based economy that produces comparatively fewer union jobs than Indiana, passed right-to-work legislative is 2001

tion in 2001.

Indiana's vote came after weeks of protest by minority Democrats who tried various tactics to stop the bill. They refused to show up to debate despite the threat of fines that totaled \$1,000 per day and introduced dozens of amendments aimed at delaying a vote. But conceding their tactics could not last forever because they were outnumbered, they finally agreed to allow the vote to take place.

The House voted 54-44 Wednesday to make Indiana the nation's 23rd right-to-work state. The measure is expected to face little opposition in Indiana's Republicancontrolled Senate and could reach Republican Gov. Mitch Daniels' desk shortly before the Feb. 5 Super Bowl in Indianapolis.

"This announces, especially in the Rust Belt, that we are open for business here," Republican House Speaker Brian Bosma said of the right-to-work proposal that would ban unions from collecting mandatory representation fees from workers. NATION WORLD **BRIEFS**

Giffords Bids Emotional Farewell to Congress

WASHINGTON • Steady in her sneakers and grasping the helpful hand of a colleague, Rep. Gabrielle Giffords walked onto the House floor as colleagues approved her border security bill on the day she retired from elected office. Giffords made her way down the center aisle that divides Democrats from Republicans, a distinction the Arizona congresswoman had tried to blur with her moderate politics and good nature. Colleagues quickly enveloped her slight frame, offering an outstretched hand — or, more often, a kiss on the cheek. In ovation, lawmakers stood. Friends have said the three-term Democrat has never been one to tackle goals halfway. It was fitting, then, that she closed out her career on Wednesday with a legislative victory. The House unanimously passed the border security bill she had authored.

Daring Raid in Somalia Frees U.S., Danish Hostages

Rescue is carried out by SEAL Team 6, according to U.S. officials — the same outfit that carried out bin Laden mission.

MOGADISHU, Somalia • Held captive since last fall, an ailing American woman and a Danish man will soon be safely on their way home after a bold, dark-of-night rescue by U.S. Navy SEALs. The commandos slipped into a Somali encampment, shot and killed nine captors and whisked the hostages to freedom.

The raid's success was welcome news for the hostages and their families, for the military and for President Barack Obama, who was delivering his State of the Union speech and beginning a five-state tour as the mission wrapped up. He did not mention it in his address but dropped a hint upon arriving in the House chamber by telling Defense Secretary Leon Panetta, "Good job tonight."

It was the second splashy SEAL Team 6 success in less than a year, following last May's killing of Osama bin Laden in Pakistan.

The SEALs encountered some degree of resistance from the kidnappers at the encampment, two U.S. officials said, and there was a firefight during an approximately 1- to 1 1/2-hour operation

One defense official said it was likely that the SEALs killed the kidnappers rather than capture them because they encountered armed resistance or the threat of resistance.

threat of resistance.

The Pentagon was mostly tight-lipped about details on Wednesday, citing a need to preserve the secrecy that can give SEALs and other special operations forces an edge against the terrorists, criminals and others they are ordered to kill or capture around the world under hazardous and often hostile conditions.

Special operations forces, trained for

clandestine, small-team missions, have become a more prominent tool in the military's kit since the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks. The Obama administration is expected to announce on Thursday that it will invest even more heavily in that capability in coming years

After planning and rehearsal, the Somalia rescue was carried out by SEAL Team 6, officially known as the Naval Special Warfare Development Group, according to two U.S. officials who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss a secret mission. The same outfit did the bin Laden mission, the biggest counter-terror success of Obama's presidency. It was not clear whether any team members participated in both operations.

One official said the SEALs parachuted from U.S. Air Force aircraft before moving on foot, apparently undetected, to the outdoor encampment where they found American Jessica Buchanan, 32, and Poul Hagen Thisted, a 60-year-old Dane, who had been kidnapped in Somalia last fall. The raid happened near the town of Adado.

Pentagon press secretary George Little said the captors were heavily armed and had "explosives nearby" when the rescuers arrived on the scene, but he was not more specific. He declined to say whether there was an exchange of gunfire and would not provide any further details about how the rescue was completed beyond saying all of the captors were killed by the Americans.

The American raiders caught the kidnappers as they were sleeping after having chewed the narcotic leaf qat for much of the evening, a pirate who gave his name as Bile Hussein told AP by phone. Hussein said he was not present at the site but had spoken with other pirates who were, and that they told him nine pirates had been killed in the raid and three were "taken away."

A Pentagon spokesman, Navy Capt. John Kirby, said U.S. officials could not confirm that the kidnappers were engaged in piracy. He referred to them simply as "criminals."

Army to Cut Combat Brigades

WASHINGTON • The U.S. Army plans to slash the number of combat brigades from 45 to as low as 32 in a broad restructuring of its fighting force aimed at cutting costs and reducing the service by about 80,000 soldiers, according to U.S. officials familiar with the plans.

Officials said the sweeping changes will likely increase the size of each combat brigade — generally by adding another battalion — in a long-term effort to ensure that those remaining brigades have the fighting capabilities they need when they go to war. A brigade is usually about 3,500 soldiers, but can be as large as 5,000 for the heavily armored units. A battalion is usually between 600-800 soldiers.

The brigade restructuring will unfold over several years and is intended to save money without eroding the military's ability to protect the country and wage war when needed. Army officials contend that while there would eventually be fewer brigades, building them bigger will give them more capabilities and depth, and will reduce stress on the

They said specialty units, such as Army special operations forces, would not be affected by the cuts.

Reducing the overall number of brigades will also eliminate the need for the headquarters units that command and oversee them.

Officials acknowledged that merging battalions together into larger brigades could shift some soldiers to different bases across the country, although that effort could be stymied by members of Congress who don't like to see the staffing decline at bases that feed the local economy. Officials said the Army will try to limit such shifts.

The cuts come as the Pentagon puts the finishing touches on its 2013 fiscal year budget, which must reflect about \$260 billion in savings in its five-year plan. Congress has ordered the Defense Department to come up with a total of \$487 billion over the next 10 years.

CAIRO • Hundreds of thousands thronged major squares across Egypt on Wednesday, marking the first anniversary of the uprising that toppled Hosni Mubarak with rallies that laid bare the divisions that have replaced the unity of last year's revolt.

Cairo's Tahrir Square, the epicenter of the 18 days of protests against Mubarak, was transformed into the focal point of the rivalry between revolutionary activists intent on showing they can still mobilize the street, and the Muslim Brotherhood, who emerged as Egypt's dominant political force af-

ter a landslide victory in parliamentary elections.

The secular activists want continued protests to force the immediate ouster of the generals who took power after Mubarak's fall, saying they are just as dictatorial as the former president. The activists touted their powerful turnout as a sign they can pressure the Brotherhood, who they fear will accommodate the military in order to ensure their own political dominance.

"I have hope that these marches will be a message to the Brotherhood as much as the military council," said Sahar Abdel-Mohsen, who walked 3½ miles in a giant march across Cairo to Tahrir.

"We all know even if the Brother-


hood are strong, the military council is still stronger. ... What we all want is an end to military rule," she said.

Both sides were intent on bringing out as many supporters as possible to show their weight in a nation still reeling from the aftershocks of Mubarak's ouster.

The Islamists got off to a strong start, taking up positions in the morning and claiming the right to police the square, with Brotherhood volunteers checking the bags of those entering.

From a large stage with 10 loudspeakers, they blared religious songs and chants of "Allahu akbar," setting a tone of celebration for what they called the successes of the revolution, particularly the newly elected parliament.

In today's deal, from the 2010 Gold Coast event in Australia, a straightforward auction would be the one shown here. With five hearts, North would have looked for a 4-4 spade fit by using checkback, so his actual bidding shows only four hearts.

In six no-trump on a passive diamond lead, declarer wins and must develop one extra trick from the majors. Best is to go after hearts first, to take advantage of the chances in both majors.

At one table Anton Blagov went after hearts by leading low from dummy. When East played low without discomfort, he judged that she could not have the king, so he inserted the nine successfully. However, the normal play is to lead a heart to the queen, losing to the king.

Best for West is to return a diamond now. Declarer cashes the heart ace himself (the Vienna Coup), then runs the clubs. In the four-card ending, declarer has the heart nine and three spades left, and dummy has its four spades. What can East keep? Answer: Nothing works. What declarer mustn't do is test spades early. If he runs the spades before the hearts, he will disrupt his own communications.

Bulletin editor David Stern noted that his mother, Gerda, brought home the slam, but 80 or so declarers went down in six no-trump by playing spades prematurely. An alternate and unsuccessful approach would have been to endplay East with a spade to lead hearts, but the recommended approach is a better percentage play.

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
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
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
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


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Raptors Get First Win at Utah Since 2004

DVOKOVIC ENSURES ORDER MAINTAINED

MELBOURNE, Australia • With Novak Djokovic clutching his leg and struggling to breathe, it looked like the "Big 4" semifinal lineup at the Australian Open might not come together.

Then Djokovic's championship instincts kicked in.

The top-ranked Serb held off No. 5 David Ferrer in a second-set tiebreaker Wednesday night and then raced through the third set for a 6-4, 7-6 (4), 6-1 win, setting up a rematch of last year's final against fourthranked Andy Murray.

Order was restored.

For 10 days, nearly everyone at Melbourne Park has talked about the top four players and how they are on a higher level than the rest of men's tennis. But with the other three already in the semis, Djokovic looked to be in trouble in the sec-

"No, I don't have any physical issues," Djokovic said, playing down any

health concerns. "I feel very fit and I feel mentally, as

well, very fresh. "It's just today I found it very difficult after a long time to breathe because I felt the whole day my nose was closed a little bit. I just wasn't able to get enough oxygen."

The win ensured that the top four men reached the semifinals for the third time in four Grand Slams. At times he looked exhausted. At times he looked sore.

"Look, you know, in these conditions, at this stage of the tournament, when you're playing somebody like David, somebody that has great shots from both sides from the baseline, makes you always play over five to 10 shots in the rally, your physical strength and endurance comes into question," Djokovic calmly explained of his on-court demeanor. "Actually I'm not concerned about that at all.

"I'm really fit and I have no concerns of recovering for the next match. It's just a matter of breathing better through the nose."

Nadal and Federer will play on Rod Laver Arena on Thursday night, with the Australian great in attendance - partly to celebrate 50 years since he completed his first Grand Slam of winning all four majors in

In the day session, 2008 Australian Open winner Maria Sharapova will play Wimbledon reigning champion Petra Kvitova, and defending Australian champion Kim Clijsters will take on No. 3 Victoria Azarenka. Three of the four excluding Clijsters – can finish the tournament with the No. 1 ranking.

Azarenka is the only one of the semifinalists who hasn't won a major - the last eight women's titles have been shared among six women.

Not so the majors on the men's side, which have been much more tightly held.







always recover, because there are always more squares with money in their pockets who think they know more than the guys across the counter who have the point spread thing down to a science. Casinos have lost money only once

on the Super Bowl in the last 10 years, taking a beating in 2008 when the Giants - who were 13-point underdogs -

beat New England, 17-14. And this could be one of the highest bet Super Bowls ever, rivaling the \$94.5 million wagered in Nevada and untold millions elsewhere - on the Steelers-Seahawks game in 2006.

"It's probably the best matchup there could be," said Jimmy Vaccaro, a longtime bookmaker who helps run sports books in several casinos for Lucky's Race & Sports Book. "The general public rules these events and

they like these teams." Banker won't be wagering that much himself. He never did make huge bets, preferring to make his money on volume instead.

And it's not like the old days when he had runners in different cities finding the best lines from bookmakers to lay his action on. Certainly not like the time he took a Minneapolis bookmaker for \$30,000, only to be told he wasn't going to get paid. He got the money the next day,

after asking a friend with, shall we say, connections, to look into the matter.

"There wasn't a bookmaker dead or alive that I didn't beat," Banker said. "I had runners everywhere, in New York, Miami, Chicago, all seeing different numbers. But now it's all the same numbers everywhere."

Computers and corpora-

tions have replaced pencils and candy store bookmakers. Online betting will dwarf anything even Las Vegas takes in on the game.

It's enough to make an aging gambler yearn for the days he once knew.

"It's very, very tough now," Banker said. "If I had to do it all again, I couldn't do it. I'd be driving a taxi."



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
