Six Area School Districts to Seek Levy Renewals

Residents in a handful of Magic Valley towns will be asked March 13 to support their schools by providing voter-approved funding.

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TWIN FALLS • With a March election looming, six Magic Valley school districts are moving forward with the task of asking voters to renew the extra funding they've provided schools in the past.

After getting school board approval, districts had a Friday deadline to submit a resolution to their county clerk to include levy renewal issues on the March 13 ballot.

Information came in from Jerome, Kimberly, Murtaugh, Minidoka County, Cassia County and Hansen school districts. Supplemental levies — funded by increases in residents' property taxes — have helped keep their operations up and running.

The Cassia County School District is asking voters to renew a two-year levy issue for \$681,244 each year.

"What we're asking our voters to do is give us budget stability," Superintendent Gaylen Smyer said.

In Jerome, Superintendent Dale Layne said a newsletter will be sent out to residents by mid-February with information about the district's levy. The school district is seeking renewal of its one-year, \$650,000 levy issue.

"It's been in place for about 12 years," Layne said, although the amount has fluctuated during that time.

For Kimberly residents, Superintendent Kathleen Noh said they'll have a chance to learn more about the school district's ballot measure.

Idaho Traffic Fatalities Continue to Fall

Preliminary data shows 167 people died on Idaho's roads in 2011, more than 40 fewer than the year before.

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TWIN FALLS • Idaho is on track to lead the nation in decreasing traffic fatalities over the past two years, cutting its road-related deaths by 31 percent, according to the Idaho Transportation Department.

The statistics putting Idaho in the lead were provided by the National Safety Council, said Mel Coulter, communications specialist with ITD.

Regionally, the northwestern states including Idaho, Washington, Oregon, Montana and Alaska showed the greatest decrease in fatalities. Arizona, Hawaii and California had the next steepest decline, according to the National Safety Council's website.

Preliminary data indicated 168 people died on Idaho's roads in 2011, 41 fewer than in 2010 and 58 fewer than in 2009. But that number has already changed, said Steve Rich, an analyst with ITD. One of the fatalities in question was later ruled a natural death, bringing the total state-wide fatalities to 167.

Final reports on traffic fatalities in 2011 will not be finalized until May, he said.

ITD attributes the lower numbers to drivers making better decisions on the road.

Two Decades Later, CSI's Winning Streak Stands

College basketball's longest home winning streak finally came to an end 20 years ago today in Twin Falls. But it's what happened in eight victorious years that preceded that loss that helped define CSI's high desert hoops juggernaut.

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TWIN FALLS • What took more than eight years to build was torn down in 20 minutes.

Routinely packed with more than 3,000 raucous fans, the College of Southern Idaho gymnasium sat in near silence as Brian Santiago and a Utah Valley men's basketball team loaded with future NCAA Division I talent had CSI on ropes. The streak — a college hoops record 137 straight home victories — was slipping away.

No last-second heroics were needed for Utah Valley. Nor was there a flurry of lead changes. It was simply a decisive 84-68 drubbing handed out by the Wolverines.

CSI players and coaches would no longer have to talk about a record they'd established only five games prior. It now belonged to the record books and historians.

But 20 years later, what was undone on Jan. 31, 1992, is part of the rich

More Funding to Stop Smoking?

Local health district officials hope they can offer smoking-cessation classes to more adults this year.

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TWIN FALLS • After restricting smoking cessation classes to only a segment of the public, Idaho health officials hope to now expand their services with more funding.

The state funds a website and an 800 number that offer support for those looking to quit smoking, but Idaho's health districts are the main organizations that offer public cessation classes. And as budgets have tightened, the classes have only been offered to "priority" targets over the past year.

The South Central Public Health District (SCPHD) only offers classes to teenagers who have a court order from a judge to attend them or pregnant moms participating in the Women, Infants and Children Program.

The health districts' cessation classes are funded through the Millennium Fund, made up of tobacco settlement proceeds. This year, district officials are requesting \$750,000 to fund more classes and the instructors in charge of leading the sessions. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter recom-

Debate over Tax Hike Continues

One possible source of extra funding for state smoking-cessation programs? An increase to the state tobacco tax, though proponents of the idea face quite the fight.

On Monday, more than 8,000 postcards were sent to the Idaho Capitol supporting such an increase. Idaho's 57-cent tobacco tax is one of the lowest in the nation. The average tobacco tax across the U.S. is \$1.46.

Like last year, Idaho's health leaders are pushing for an increase of \$1.25. But the tax hike will likely face even more opposition this year than it did when proposed in 2011, since 2012 is an election year.

Legislation on the issue has yet to be presented.

mended distributing \$500,000 to the districts for that purpose.

In a recent report from the American Lung Association, Idaho received an "F" in smoking cessation resources. The re-

port graded states on Medicaid coverage, state employee health insurance plans and the state's quitline.

The report found that while Medicaid covers seven cessation medications — like nicotine replacement gum or patches — it fails to cover counseling and puts an annual limit on funding at-tempts to quit smoking.

Last year, health districts requested \$500,000 to continue offering the classes and received \$250,000.

That meant the SCPHD received \$33,000 to cover the cost of the classes, said Rene LeBlanc, the district's director. If the district gets its requested budget amount, the district could receive close to \$100,000.

"After our funding got cut in half, we had to focus on teens and pregnant moms," LeBlanc said. "We would like to offer it back up to adults again."

The classes are important because of the high success rate they usually achieve, said Elvia Caldera, a SCPHD health education specialist.

Almost three-quarters of the 70 teenagers enrolled in cessation classes in the last year no longer smoke, and a third of the 60 pregnant women have given up the smoking habit, she said.

Filer Man Pleads Not Guilty to Trafficking Pot

TWIN FALLS • Bryndon Scott Walker, a 19-year-old Filer man, pleaded not guilty Monday to a charge of trafficking marijuana in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

On Dec. 1, Walker and Crickett Rachel Ray, 18, called police alleging three Latino males had entered their house at 108 Main St., in Filer at about 9 p.m. The pair said the three men demanded the residents hand over meth. One man, identified only as "Juan," was said to have a gun.

Police made no arrests in connection with the alleged incident, but both

Ray and Walker were charged with trafficking in marijuana after police say they found more than four pounds of marijuana and a container of different pills and drug paraphernalia.

In a parked 1997 Mercury Mountaineer outside the house, police say they found a book called "Growing Marijuana — How to Plant, Cultivate, and Harvest Your Own Weed." Court documents also allege the SUV was driven by both Ray and Walker.

Ray pleaded not guilty to the charge in December and faces a Feb. 28 trial. Walker's next hearing hadn't been scheduled yet Monday.

A community meeting is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. Feb. 8 in the Kimberly Middle School commons.

The Kimberly School District is seeking continuation of a two-year levy issue for \$300,000 each year.

In Hansen, Superintendent Dennis Coulter said the school board was scheduled to make a final decision on a levy issue amount during a Monday night meeting.

However, he said he expected it will remain at \$190,000 — the same as previous years.

The Murtaugh School District will ask voters to renew a two-year levy issue for \$150,000 each year. Superintendent Michele Capps wasn't available for comment Monday.

In Minidoka County, the school district is asking for renewal of a plant facilities levy issue for \$1.2 million each year. Money would be used to repair and maintain school buildings.

Superintendent Scott Rodgers said district staff plans to make presentations to local service groups. An informational meeting for Minidoka County residents is also scheduled for 6-8 p.m. Feb. 28 at the district service center, 310 10th St. in Rupert.

In order for a school district levy issue to pass, a simple majority vote is required.

School districts have four opportunities each year to get a levy issue on the ballot. Some districts — including Wendell,

In south-central Idaho, agencies are writing fewer speeding tickets, but the number of people caught drinking and driving is up a little. These changes aren't necessarily because drivers are committing the crimes at different levels than in 2010, said Lt. Kevin Haight, Idaho State Police patrol commander for Region 4.

"We have seen our DUI arrests increase, however I would say that is more likely because we have a DUI team now," Haight said. "That's their primary focus, so you see more in general."

In the Magic Valley, Haight said his patrol officers saw fewer road fatalities in 2011 and there have been only two traffic deaths in January so far.

Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies issued fewer speeding tickets in 2011 than in 2010, but slightly more tickets for drunken driving. In total, the deputies wrote 1,716 speeding tickets in 2010 and 907 in 2011. Deputies wrote 138 tickets for driving under the influence in 2010 and 141 DUI tickets in 2011.

"Our department is down from four traffic deputies to two," said Lori Stewart, spokeswoman for the sheriff's office. "This can account for a significant reduction in citations, as their primary duties are responding to acci-

dents and traffic enforcement."

Last weekend in Florida, 10 people died in a massive traffic accident due to low visibility cause by fog and smoke from a wildfire. These weather hazards are rare in Idaho, but there are other hazards like ice and snow, Haight said.

"In the spring we have some severe dust storms," he said. "We've had some multi-vehicle pile-ups."

As more police are out on the road with the help from ITD grants, Haight expects the number of offenses to continue to drop.

"People see us out working," he said. "We're not out to spoil anybody's fun, we're out to keep to highways safe. That's our job."

T.F. County Won't Challenge New Legislative District Map

TWIN FALLS • It's not the map they want, but it's the map they need now.

They're still "dismayed" over Idaho's new political boundaries, but Twin Falls County officials won't repeat their challenge of the state's first attempt to redraw its legislative districts.

Idaho's Redistricting Commission agreed Friday on a map of new state legislative districts that splits seven of Idaho's 44 counties in creating 35 legislative districts. That decision came after Twin Falls County and three other counties successfully challenged the constitutionality of the commission's first map in the Idaho Supreme Court.

While the new map follows the high court's direction to

split as few counties as possible — it splits five fewer than the previous map — Twin Falls County officials argue that dividing the county into three districts is unnecessary.

They might not like the map, but they're not going to sue over a plan they called "substantially better" than the first.

"Our victory in the Supreme Court resulted in a better plan for Twin Falls County and more constitutional redistricting of the entire state," Commission Chairman George Urie said in the written release. "We believe it is important now to get on with the business of redrawing precincts and letting our voters and candidates know where they are voting and running."

Time is running short to

prepare for this year's election cycle. Feb. 27 marks the first day that candidates can file with their county clerk or the Secretary of State's Office.

In the new map, Twin Falls County is split into three districts — more than the current two — with Castleford and the county's western reaches paired in District 23 with Elmore and Owyhee counties. Most of the city of Twin Falls is in District 24, while the bulk of the county — including Filer, Buhl and Kimberly — is grouped with Jerome County in District 25.

Of the plan, Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loeb said: "It's not a good plan, but it's an acceptable one. It's considerably better than the previous plan that extended Twin Falls districts all the way to Chubbuck."

Jim Patrick to Run for District 25 Senate Seat

Bert Brackett to challenge Corder for Senate seat in new District 23.

TWIN FALLS • Rep. Jim Patrick, R-Twin Falls, has declared his intention to run for the District 25 Idaho Senate seat in this year's election.

Patrick, who has served in the House since 2006, said he decided to run for the vacant seat after looking at the new map of Idaho legislative districts approved Friday.

"I like doing different things, so it will be kind of a new experience for me," Patrick said. This is Patrick's second bid for the Idaho Senate; he lost his 2002 campaign. He is currently serving his third term in the House.

On Friday, the Legislative Services Office listed Republican Sen. Bert Brackett as being in the new District 25.

The reason: Brackett lives in Three Creek, an unincorporated area in west Owyhee County, but he filed for the 2010 election using an address in nearby Rogerson, which is in Twin Falls County.

Previously, that wasn't a problem, as Rogerson and Three Creek were both in District 23. But with the new legislative boundaries, Three Creek is in 23, and Rogerson is in 25.

Brackett said Saturday that he plans to file in District 23, which would pit him against Sen. Tim Corder, R-Mountain Home, and leave the Senate seat Patrick plans to seek without an incumbent.

Candidates seeking office in this year's election cycle can begin filing with the Secretary of State's Office or county clerks on Feb. 27.

testimony. It will be added to the public record and shared with the committee.

Arrive early: Testimony will be given on a first-come, first-serve basis (with some allowances, granted at the chair's discretion, for geographic diversity).

Be polite: Committee members are most receptive to constructive, thoughtful comments. This is a forum meant to gather public input, and everyone should feel comfortable sharing their opinions.

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Gambrel Acquitted on 2 Counts, Jury Hung on 3rd

TWIN-FALLS • Kody Gambrel will spend Valentine's Day in court for the second year in a row after a Twin Falls jury couldn't decide whether to acquit or convict the 24-year-old for a charge of battery on officers.

The jury acquitted the Twin Falls man on two other charges of battery on officers he received while serving a 180-day sentence for misdemeanor driving under the influence in January 2011.

Twin Falls County Jail deputies said Gambrel fought with them and Gambrel was charged with three counts felony battery or assault on certain personnel.

The three-day trial started Jan. 25 and wrapped up

Friday with the hung jury.

Last year at this time, Gambrel was awaiting a Feb. 14 preliminary hearing on the case. This year, he's scheduled for a Feb. 14 status hearing in Gooding County 5th District Court.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loeb's petitioned for and was granted the appointment of a special prosecutor in the case, noting that the office has in the past had "personal and professional contact with the defendant and/or his immediate family causing a conflict as to the prosecution of the defendant by this office."

Gambrel is the son of former Twin Falls Police Detective Curtis Gambrel.

The Gooding County Prosecutor's Office has handled the case.

T.F. MAN GETS PROBATION FOR INTIMIDATION

TWIN FALLS • A Twin Falls man was sentenced Monday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court to two years' supervised probation for intimidating a witness.

Colby Redgrave, 22, was originally charged with two counts of witness intimidation because of alleged threats made to a 19-year-old woman who accused Jason Jay Ward, 36, of rape.

One of the charges was dropped and Redgrave pleaded guilty to the second charge in November.

Ward pleaded guilty in December to raping the 19-year-old woman last May. He could face up to 15 years in prison and an additional

\$5,000 fine. Ward is scheduled to be sentenced Feb. 13.

According to court records, officers found the victim near railroad tracks close to Grandview Drive at around 3:45 a.m. on May 27, after she called 911.

The police report claims that Redgrave sent text messages to the alleged victim and family members despite being warned by detectives not to contact them.

The messages contained vulgar slurs and claims that authorities don't have a case against Ward. Redgrave was arrested after detectives were notified of the messages.

Along with probation, Redgrave must pay \$225.50 in fines and fees.

House Passes Bill on Teacher Evaluations

BOISE (AP) • A measure clarifying when parents will start to play a role in the evaluation of their child's teacher has cleared the Idaho Legislature.

The Idaho House voted 68-0 for the bill Monday. The legislation cleared the Senate last week as state lawmakers work to refine a sweeping education overhaul that was introduced last year by public schools chief Tom Luna.

Under the education

changes signed into law last spring, at least half of a teacher's job evaluation will be based on student achievement starting July 1, and parental input will also be a factor. But to some school districts, the law was unclear as to when the parents become involved.

The legislation approved in the 2012 session aims to clarify that parental input also comes into play starting July 1.

Idaho Senate Passes Bill to Revise Online Ed Law

BOISE (AP) • State senators voted in favor of deleting a portion of Idaho's new education laws that defines an online course and says the instructor cannot be physically located in the same school in which the student is receiving the virtual instruction.

The Idaho Senate voted 33-0 Monday to remove the provision that says teachers and students must be separate during the online instruction. The clause

aimed to ensure the state was providing distance education, as the new education changes intended.

But Republican Sen. Dean Mortimer of Idaho Falls says the distance provision could also cause problems, such as prohibiting a teacher from loading online course material in the same school where students are taking the class.

A bill now headed to the Idaho House would delete the clause.

Progress, but No Arrests Yet in Jerome Burglaries

Shoshone-Bannock School Files Complaint over Alcohol Inquiry

BOISE • A school district on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation says two of its best basketball players were wrongfully accused of drinking alcohol and asked to take a breath-analysis test before a game in Clark County earlier this month.

The Shoshone-Bannock School District has filed a complaint with the Idaho High School Activities Association over the Jan. 13 incident at a Dubois high school.

Clark County Sheriff Bart May approached the two student athletes with a Breathalyzer test kit, saying an audience member had reported they smelled of alcohol. Athletic director Lyndon Smith and head basketball coach Lester Stewart intervened, telling May that he would have to obtain a warrant. The test was not administered.

Smith felt the interrogation of the players, who are Native American, may have been racially motivated, and the Shoshone-Bannock district is considering filing a civil rights complaint, he said Friday.

"I do believe there were racial overtones in the way they went about things," said Smith, who is Caucasian.

The sheriff vehemently denied the claim, saying he acted appropriately when investigating a report that the teenagers may have been drinking alcohol before the varsity game at Clark County High School.

"It had absolutely nothing to do with race," May told The Associated Press on Monday.

He also denied that he hoped to give the home team the upper hand with his ques-

tioning of the two players, who were the same shooters that led the Shoshone-Bannock team to a 66-52 victory against Clark County during a Dec. 17 matchup.

May's son plays for Clark County, where his brother, Darrin May, also coaches the girls basketball team. May dismissed notions that his ties to the school were a factor in his decision to investigate the alcohol report.

The Shoshone-Bannock players were on the varsity team and not yet dressed in their uniforms when an audience member pointed them

out, May said. That person was identified in May's report as county commissioner Bill Fredrickson.

"He said they reeked of alcohol," said May, who was wearing plain clothes at the time but was armed and identified himself with his badge.

When confronted, the boys denied that they had been drinking, according to the sheriff, who did not smell alcohol on the players. May then went to his office about three blocks away to retrieve his Breathalyzer test, and approached the two boys, who were sitting in the stands.

OKLAHOMA CITY • A year after Republicans swept into office across the country, many have trained their sights on what has long been a fiscal conservative's dream: the steep reduction or even outright elimination of state income taxes.

The idea has circulated among academics and think-tank researchers for years. But it's moving quietly into mainstream political discourse, despite the fact that such sweeping changes would almost certainly mean a total rewiring of tax systems at a time when most states are still struggling in the aftermath of the recession.

"I think there's going to be more action that way," especially as Republican governors release their budget plans, said Kim Rueben, an expert on state taxation at the Brookings Urban Tax Policy Center.

Last year, GOP lawmakers in many states quickly went to work on a new conservative agenda: restricting abortion, cracking down on illegal immigration, expanding gun rights and taking aim at public-employee unions.

Emboldened by that success, the party has launched income tax efforts in Idaho, Kansas, Maine, Missouri, Ohio, Oklahoma and South Carolina. But it's not clear how all those states would make up for the lost revenue, and Rueben said she's not aware of any state in modern history that has eliminated an income tax.

Nine states already get by without an income tax, mostly by tapping other sources of revenue. Nevada and Florida rely on sales taxes that target the tourism industry. Alaska has taxes on natural resources, and Texas imposes substantial property taxes. The other five states are: New Hampshire, South Dakota, Tennessee, Washington and Wyoming.

But in the rest of the country, income taxes pay for bedrock government services, including roads and bridges and schools and prison systems.

In Oklahoma, Republican Gov. Mary Fallin says gradually cutting the top income-tax rate of 5.25 percent will make the state more attractive to businesses, help spur economic growth and ensure Oklahoma is competitive against neighboring states such as Texas. Although the personal income tax does not apply to corporate earnings, supporters say company executives and employees will prefer to live in a state that doesn't tax personal income.

South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley is pushing this year to consolidate four personal income tax brackets and to phase out corporate income taxes. She promises to seek more tax cuts in the future.

Missouri has a bill to reduce income taxes and offset the lost revenue by raising the cigarette tax.

And Maine's GOP-controlled Legislature voted last year to lower the income tax from 8.5 to 7.95 percent, taking 70,000 low-income citizens off the income-tax rolls.

Idaho Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter has

Romney Keeps Pressure on Before Florida Vote

GOP officials in Florida anticipate a big turnout, more than 2 million voters, up from a record 1.9 million in the Republican primary in 2008.

MIAMI • Cheered by new polls, Mitt Romney is all but predicting victory in Tuesday's Republican presidential primary. Newt Gingrich is looking past Florida to regroup, vowing he won't stay buried long.

"With a turnout like this, I'm beginning to feel we might win tomorrow," an upbeat Romney told a crowd of several hundred at a stop in Dunedin on Monday as he and Gingrich zipped across the state making their final appeals.

Gingrich, in turn, acknowledged that his momentum had been checked but promised not to back down. He characterized Romney as an imposter, and his team started to plot a strategy for upcoming contests.

"He can bury me for a very short amount of time with four or five or six times as much money," Gingrich said in a television interview. "In the long run, the Republican Party is not going to nominate ... a liberal Republican."

GOP officials in Florida were anticipating a big turnout, more than 2 million voters, up from a record 1.9 million in the Republican primary in 2008. More than 605,000 Floridians had already voted as of Monday, either

by visiting early voting stations or by mailing in absentee ballots, ahead of the total combined early vote in the GOP primary four years ago.

In the span of a volatile week, the tables have turned in this potentially pivotal primary state.

Gingrich rode a triumphant wave into Florida after a South Carolina victory nine days ago. But since then, Romney and his allies have pummeled the former House speaker on TV and on the campaign trail. Romney turned in two strong debate performances, while Gingrich faltered. Now opinion polls show the former Massachusetts governor with a comfortable lead here.

Romney and Gingrich have been the only two candidates to compete in Florida in earnest. Neither former Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum nor Texas Rep. Ron. Paul campaigned much in the state, and they were elsewhere on Monday.

Clearly in command, Romney flew to stops in media markets in northern Florida and the populous swing regions of central Florida, determined to keep Gingrich from surging late.

Romney renewed attacks on his rival as an untrustworthy, Washington influence peddler at the outset of two separate ap-

Fla. Governor Orders Probe of Deadly Crash

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP) • Gov. Rick Scott is ordering an investigation into the Florida Highway Patrol's decision to reopen an interstate highway shortly before a pair of pileups happened that killed 10 people.

Scott on Monday ordered the Florida Department of Law Enforcement to investigate the FHP's decision and any other circumstances that led up to Sunday's crashes on Interstate 75 outside of Gainesville.

The FHP had closed the road for more than three hours early Sunday after heavy smoke from a nearby brushfire and fog combined to make the highway impassable. Fifteen minutes after the highway reopened, the pileups happened, with survivors reporting smoke and fog so thick they couldn't see.

The FHP earlier defended its decision, saying the visibility was clear enough but deteriorated rapidly.

"We went through the area. We made an assessment. We came to the conclusion that the road was safe to travel and that is when we opened the road up," highway patrol spokesman Lt. Patrick Riordan said in a news conference.

"Factors changed quickly," he said. "Drivers have to recognize that the environment changes. They have to be prepared to make good judgments."

At least a dozen cars and six tractor-trailers were involved, some vehicles burst into flames. Three bodies were so badly burned they haven't been identified yet, he said. No names of victims have been released pending notification of relatives, Riordan said.

Syrian Troops Push Back in Fight on Edge of Damascus

BEIRUT • Syrian forces pushed dissident troops back from the edge of Damascus in heavy fighting Monday, escalating efforts to take back control of the capital's eastern doorstep ahead of key U.N. talks over a draft resolution demanding that President Bashar Assad step aside.

Gunfire and the boom of shelling rang out in several suburbs on Damascus' outskirts that have come under the domination of anti-regime fighters. Gunmen — apparently army defectors — were shown firing back in amateur videos posted online by activists. In one video, a government tank on the snow-dusted mountain plateau towering over the capital fired at one of the suburbs below.

As the bloodshed increased, with activists reporting more than 40 civilians killed Monday, Western and Arab countries stepped up pressure on Assad's ally Russia to overcome its opposition to the resolution.

U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton and the British and French foreign ministers were heading to New York to push for backing of the measure during talks Tuesday at the United Nations.

"The status quo is unsustainable," Clinton said, saying the Assad regime was preventing a peaceful transition and warning that the resulting instability could "spill over throughout the region."

The draft resolution demands that Assad halt the crackdown and implement an Arab peace plan that calls for him to hand over power to his vice president and allow creation of a unity government to pave the way for elections.

If Assad fails to comply within 15 days, the council would consider "further measures," a reference to a possible move to impose economic or other sanctions.

British Prime Minister David Cameron called the situation in Syria "appalling" and appealed Monday to Russia to back the U.N. Security Council resolution.

"It is time for all the members of U.N. Security Council to live up to their responsibilities instead of shielding those who have blood on their hands," Cameron said.

Pythons Likely Wiping out Glades Mammals, Study Finds

Burmese pythons foreign to Florida's Everglades have wreaked havoc on the national park's native wildlife. Over 10 years, three animals have all but disappeared.

MIAMI • For the first time, scientists have put numbers to the toll Burmese pythons have had on native wildlife in the Everglades.

But one word can sum it up: carnage.

In the decade since the giant constrictors started showing up in significant numbers, mammals once among the most common in Everglades National Park have declined dramatically, according to a

study published online Monday in Proceedings of the National Academy of Science.

The study, based on night field surveys conducted over 10 years, found three animals had all but disappeared. Opossum sightings fell 98.9 percent. Raccoons — once so abundant park managers warned visitors to safeguard food from roaming groups of the wily thieves — dropped 99.3 percent. Marsh rabbits, brown bunnies frequently seen foraging along

suggested reducing the individual income tax rate from 7.8 percent to 7.6 percent, the same as the corporate income tax rate, and then gradually lowering both to 7 percent. But business groups have said they would rather get help eliminating the personal property tax businesses pay on their equipment.

In Ohio, Gov. John Kasich's 2010 campaign included a pledge to phase out the state's personal income tax, though without a timetable for doing so. Thus far, the state's fiscal situation has stymied the governor's efforts to achieve his goal, other than implementing a previously scheduled income tax cut.

As one way to compensate for the lost revenue, the Oklahoma governor and others have suggested eliminating other kinds of tax breaks and incentives, specifically transferrable tax credits offered to certain businesses. But that would still fall woefully short in Oklahoma, where the income tax provides more than one-third of all state spending.

Still, 23 Republicans in the Oklahoma House have signed up as sponsors of a measure to abolish the income tax over the next decade without raising any other taxes.

"Our goal is to transform Oklahoma into the best place to do business, the best place to live, find a quality job, raise a family and retire in all of the United States. Not just better than average, but the very best," state Rep. Leslie Osborn said.

Lower taxes appeal to many voters, but some wonder how the state could get by if lawmakers abandon a major source of money.

"I personally would favor paying less taxes, but to me, it's like where are we going to make up the difference?" said Steve Schlegel, a bicycle shop owner in Oklahoma City. "I already feel like government is underfunded at the moment."

Roger Garner, a letter courier, said he would accept higher property taxes if it meant eliminating the income tax.

"Get rid of it," Garner said. "Florida doesn't have it. Texas doesn't have it. We don't need it. If something is needed, we can figure out a way to pay for it at the local level."

Conservatives say the lost revenue will be made up by increased economic activity — more businesses paying corporate taxes and more employees paying property taxes and spending money. But economists warn those predictions are unrealistic.

Without creating an alternative funding system, "it's clearly irresponsible to propose taking action against the income tax," said Alan Viard, an economist with the American Enterprise Institute, a Washington, D.C.-based conservative think tank.

Former Oklahoma Treasurer Scott Meacham, a Democrat who helped negotiate a series of small income tax cuts, urged state leaders to be careful tinkering with the state's economy, which is currently enjoying double-digit revenue growth and has one of the 10 lowest unemployment rates in the country.

NEARLY 14-POUND BOY BORN IN IOWA

An Iowa woman has given birth to a boy weighing 13 pounds and 13 ounces — without the aid of surgery. Asher Stewardson was born Thursday at Mercy Medical Center in Des Moines, measuring 23 ½ inches long. Fifteen months ago, his brother, Judah, arrived weighing 12 pounds and an ounce at birth. The boys' mother, Kendall Stewardson, says she endured six hours of labor without an epidural injection because a cesarean wouldn't have been good for her or Asher.

roads in the pre-python past, didn't appear at all. Observations of bobcats, foxes and deer all also fell precipitously.

"We started this study saying, man, it appears we're not seeing many mammals," said Michael Dorcas, a biology professor at Davidson College in North Carolina and the study's lead author. "When we actually did the calculations, we were astonished by the magnitude of the declines."

The study suggests a near-collapse of mammal populations in the park and points to the python as prime suspect.

Frank Mazzotti, a wildlife ecology professor at the University of Florida, likened the study to a grand jury investigation — an important initial finding that shows mammal numbers shrinking at the same time the park's python population was booming, rising from two captures in 2000 to 322 in 2010.

"We examined all the evidence and there is enough to indict pythons but we haven't gone to trial yet," said Mazzotti, one of 11 university and federal government researchers who co-authored the peer-reviewed study.

He cautioned that research is needed to refine and confirm the impact of the snakes. Other factors, such as changes in Everglades water levels, could potentially have contributed to the mammal decline as well, he said.

Still, the study finds the link strong, noting little support for other causes of the mammal decline. There were no known diseases or significant environmental changes, such as losses of important habitat or shifts in water management regimes.

"Our data are consistent in any number of ways with python as the primary reason or maybe the only reason, either directly or indirectly," said Dorcas, author of the book "Invasive Pythons in the United States."

The Obama administration pointed to the findings as more justification for the decision earlier this month to ban the import and interstate sale of Burmese pythons, two types of African rock pythons and yellow anacondas.

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

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Lee Gets Final OK to Exit Bankruptcy

DAVENPORT, Iowa • A bankruptcy judge on Monday gave final approval to Lee Enterprises Inc. to re-finance its debt, which enabled the newspaper publisher to exit a prepackaged Chapter 11 bankruptcy.

The publisher of the *St. Louis Post-Dispatch* and nearly 50 other newspapers, including the *Times-News*, filed for bankruptcy protection on Dec. 12 to compel a small minority of its lenders to agree to a re-financing plan that gives the company more time to repay about \$1 billion in debt. The plan, approved last week by Chief U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Kevin Gross, extends Lee's repayment due dates to December 2015 and April 2017.

Lee's stock rose 4 cents, or 2.8 percent, to \$1.47 in midday trading.

Even Tax-leery Otter Backs Internet Sales Tax

BOISE (AP) • Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter backs taxing Internet sales to level the playing field between virtual businesses and brick-and-mortar establishments on Idaho's Main Street. Otter made the remarks to Idaho chamber of commerce leaders meeting in Boise on Monday.

Anti-tax conservatives in the House Revenue and Taxation Committee have killed previous proposals to deepen Idaho's involvement with a national movement to tax Internet sales. Idahoans are required to report Internet purchases to the State Tax Commission when they pay their annual income taxes, but few people actually report them.

Idaho Ag Broke Records in 2011

Though 2012 brings more uncertainty to farmers and dairy producers, there's much to celebrate about the year gone by.

BOISE • Agriculture is still king in Idaho's economy, but the throne is a little rickety.

On Monday, Garth Taylor of the University of Idaho gave presentations on the state of agriculture in Idaho to the Senate and House agriculture affairs committees. While Idaho's farmers broke production and revenue records in 2011, a volatile market and high expenses make for an uncertain 2012.

Taylor kicked off his presentation by announcing that almost all agriculture except for onions produced more in cash receipts in 2011 than in previous years. At \$2.6 billion, net farm income is up 88 percent from 2010.

Milk was the largest revenue producer and earned \$537 million more in 2011

than in 2010.

But the news isn't all good for Magic Valley's dairy producers. The dairy market is always volatile, Taylor said, and it's been worse in recent years. "Horrible" accumulated debt, high feed and operating costs, and continually dropping milk prices will contribute to continued financial distress for dairies, Taylor predicted.

Greek yogurt may help. Currently, Idaho exports about 3 million pounds of milk per day, said Brent Olmstead of Milk Producers of Idaho. Chobani is expected to buy up an additional 2 million to 2.5 million pounds of milk daily for its new Twin Falls facility, slated to open this year.

That doesn't mean the milk market will stabilize, but Taylor hopes it will put a floor under the fluctuation. "Jerome, Idaho, is the epicenter of

growth in the dairy industry in the world," Taylor said. "Where else would you want to put a yogurt plant?"

The news is good for growers, too. Idaho's acreage has stayed static, Taylor said, but yields on potatoes, sugar beets and other plants have increased thanks to research and genetics. Taylor expects that trend to continue.

That doesn't necessarily mean new jobs, though. The reason: New, more efficient technology. Taylor cited Simplot's recent closure of potato processing plants across Idaho, which led to the loss of about 800 positions in the company. One new factory will process the same amount of potatoes with fewer workers.

"This is where farmers are their own worst enemy," Taylor said.

But overall, he said, it's a good time to be in agriculture in Idaho.

"We're just breaking all kinds of records," he said. "Crops, income, gross, everything like that."

Lack of December Snow Hurts Ski Gear Sales

The snow sports market recorded \$2.2 billion in sales for the season through December, which is down 2.2 percent from a year ago.

DENVER • A lack of snow in December has hurt sales of ski, snowboard and other winter sports gear this season, but things could turn around if heavy storms that arrived in January keep coming, a snow sports retail industry researcher said Wednesday.

The snow sports market recorded \$2.2 billion in sales for the season through December, which is down 2.2 percent from the same period a year ago, SnowSports Industries America research director Kelly Davis said.

Sales through November had been up from last season, which ended with a record \$3.3 billion in sales, but then came low snowfall in December, or what Davis called "six weeks of hell."

"It's pretty hard to do business in snow when there is no snow," she said at the annual SIA Snow Show convention in Denver.

Through December, snowboard sales were down 4.5 percent in units and 1 percent in dollars from a

year ago. However sales of alpine skiing equipment in specialty stores were up in the West. Davis said it's possible that better snow conditions in the Pacific Northwest lifted alpine ski sales in the West. Alpine skiing is still the most popular snow activity, with about 11.5 million participants out of 21.2 million snow participants overall in sports that include cross-country skiing, snowboarding and snowshoeing.

Average retail prices in snow apparel have risen about 3 percent, but labor costs in Asia and production costs also are growing, so profit margins are shrinking, Davis said. Sales of accessories are down 18 percent through December. People tend to buy more hats, gloves, goggles and the like at resorts or on the way there, and the low snow has hurt accessories sales, Davis said.

The lower-than-average snow also has affected resort visits. In Colorado, the trade group Colorado Ski Country USA said skier visits at its 22 member resorts

through Dec. 31 were down 10.65 percent from the same period last year. Vail Resorts Inc. has said early-season visits to its four Colorado resorts and two in the Lake Tahoe area are down 15.3 percent overall from last year.

The good news is, the economy doesn't seem to be affecting snow sports consumers that much anymore. Snow sports participants tend to be more highly educated and wealthier than average consumers, with a majority living in households with incomes topping \$100,000, Davis said.

Figures from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics show spending in 2010 was up for toys and hobbies, which includes spending for snow gear. "It's not spending just to spend anymore. It's spending on things that bring value to your family," Davis said.

Rocker or mixed and reverse camber shapes in skis and snowboards are continuing trends in new equipment sales.

And recently, the snow has been falling.

"Let's hope winter was just late and not completely absent," Davis said. "Snow is going to bring sales to the market."

McDonald's Pushes Ahead with New Look

CHICAGO • With half-moon shaped booths, low stools, wooden blinds and flat-screen TVs, most patrons might expect to pay \$8 for a burger, or \$4 for a smoothie. But the decor isn't a harbinger of price. This is the new look of a remodeled McDonald's, purveyor of Happy Meals and value deals as well as upscale coffee drinks.

The Oak Brook, Ill.-based burger chain is reaching critical mass on a nearly decade-long, multi-billion-dollar global renovation and rebuilding project it's betting will boost sales, traffic and brand perception. Restaurants undergoing simultaneous interior and exterior remodels are expected to see a 6 percent to 7 percent increase in same-store sales upon reopening, no matter where they are located.

"We are playing a little bit of catch-up," said Dennis Weil, McDonald's vice president of concept and design, adding that retail remodels now need to happen more frequently. "Styles change faster, and customers have a higher need for novelty, and their tastes change faster as well."

Once an area has reached 40 percent to 60 percent completion in the remodeling process, Weil said, consumers begin to view the brand differently, stop in more often and buy higher-end items. Analysts say at that point they can also see the lift in sales.

McDonald's plans to open 1,300 restaurants and remodel 2,400 in 2012, spending about \$2.9 billion, the company said last week. The chain pays 40 percent to 45 percent of a franchisee's remodeling costs for each restaurant, which averages about \$600,000 in the U.S. By year-end, the chain will have completed interior renovations on about half of its 33,000 restaurants worldwide.

When Winning Is Really Losing

Two weeks ago, Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loeb and the Twin Falls County commissioners thought they had successfully led a five-county lawsuit that challenged the redistricting map proposed by the second Redistricting Commission. Turns out they were wrong.

That map was created — and challenged — back in November and was thrown out by the Idaho Supreme Court earlier this month. The court's ruling concluded that the map created in November split more counties than was necessary to meet the U.S. Constitution's requirement of one person, one vote. The five-county lawsuit — and the Idaho Supreme Court ruling — was due in no small measure to the Redistricting Commission chopping up Twin Falls County and placing portions of it in three separate districts.

On Thursday, the Redistricting Commission began its work anew and hammered out its latest map in less than a day and a half. The problem is the "new" map still divides Twin Falls County up three ways.

County Prosecutor Loeb — who led the "successful" challenge back in November — was not pleased with the newly drawn map. At least, he wasn't on Friday. "Our argument was you can't split counties for no reason," Loeb said then. "Twin Falls County was again split for no legitimate reason when a plan was offered by Randy Hansen (one of the six members of the Redistricting Commission) which would have avoided doing that, and which would have disadvantaged no other county and no other identifiable group of people."

Yesterday, Loeb met with the county commissioners to discuss the possibility of challenging the latest redistricting map. When push came to shove, they decided to back off — acquiescing to a bad plan in the name of, well, time, pressure and political expediency.

County Commission Chairman George Urie stated yesterday, "Our victory in the Supreme Court resulted in a better plan for Twin Falls County and more constitutional redistricting of the entire state." Really? A victory? When the commissioners' press statement released late Monday afternoon says they were "dismayed" by the new plan and reiterates that Twin Falls County was "unnecessarily" divided three ways, when Loeb says "It's not a good plan" — how is it that Urie can consider this a victory?

When our county commissioners refer to defeat in the redistricting battle as "victory," we're disappointed. When Twin Falls County starts a fight on our behalf and then fails to see it through, we're disappointed. And the residents of Twin Falls County should be disappointed, too.

War through Weakness?

One of the memorable slogans from the Reagan administration was "peace through strength." Reagan believed a strong defense was a safeguard against enemy attacks and the best hope of victory should America go to war.

President Obama is taking the opposite approach. Defense Secretary Leon Panetta recently announced cuts in defense spending of \$487 billion over the next 10 years. Supposedly, these cuts will reduce the federal deficit, but Congress always finds new ways to spend money, so I am not optimistic.

The cuts were announced before critical questions were asked: What is America's role in the world in the 21st century? Where does the military fit into that role? The administration thinks a sleeker, more mobile military — like SEAL Team Six, which has had recent successes taking out Osama bin Laden and rescuing hostages from Somali pirates — is the way to go, but even the highly-trained SEALs can't confront, say, a nuclear threat from Iran's Mahmoud Ahmadinejad or China's increasing military power. The administration says it will preserve its



manpower and weapons systems in the Middle East and shift resources to Asia.

Ships and planes take time to build. If America is not building them to ward off present and future threats, someone else — like the Chinese — will. The world does not remain stagnant and threats are not always obvious.

Rep. Todd Akin, R-Mo., chairman of the Seapower and Projection Forces Subcommittee, says he is "deeply concerned" by the announced defense reductions, including the elimination of "at least 12 new Navy ships over the next five years and retiring at least nine ships earlier than planned."

Akin also worries about what will happen to the estimated 100,000 soldiers and Marines who will become unemployed in a struggling economy.

According to the website U.S. Government Spending.com, <http://www.usgovernmentspending.com/> past-spending, defense spending fluctuated in the

last century. It hit a peak of 42 percent of GDP during World War II, declining to 10 percent during the Cold War to about 5 percent today.

Reagan's defense buildup followed cuts during the Carter administration. Reagan increased defense spending from 5.6 percent of GDP in 1979 to 7 percent of GDP by 1986. President George W. Bush's administration increased defense spending from 3.6 percent of GDP near the end of the Clinton administration in 1999, to 6 percent in 2010, to confront Islamic extremism.

The Obama administration, usgovernmentspending.com adds, plans to drop defense spending to 4.6 percent of GDP by 2015.

Do these reductions parallel a decline in the threats against America and American interests? Quite the opposite. The administration engages in wishful thinking about the so-called "Arab spring," which is devolving into a religious tornado with the radical Muslim Brotherhood calling the shots in Egypt and elsewhere and the Taliban poised to regain control in Afghanistan.

French President Nicolas Sarkozy and Afghanistan

President Hamid Karzai have agreed that NATO should pull out all combat forces from Afghanistan by next year, not 2014, as planned. This can only encourage the Taliban, who have recently been sending signals they are not the bad guys most people rightly think they are.

A recent story noted that public statements by the Taliban make them sound more "moderate," adding, "The big unknown is whether this new rhetoric represents a meaningful transformation — or is merely designed to sugar-coat the Taliban's real aims."

It's a safe bet to say it's the latter.

The "big unknown" is what a sound U.S. defense strategy should take into account. As former Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld once put it, "There are known knowns. There are things we know we know. We also know there are known unknowns ... there are some things we do not know. But there are also unknown unknowns — the ones we don't know we don't know."

It is to protect not only against the "known knowns," but the "unknown unknowns" that a credible defense strategy should be maintained. Cutting our defenses without a plan of action is an invitation to war.

Big Brother on Your Bumper

The following editorial appeared in the Baltimore Sun on Friday:

In George Orwell's novel "1984," the unblinking eye of government surveillance is omnipresent and inescapable. Orwell could not have known what technology would one day make his nightmare scenario possible, but he could foresee that whatever it was, the government would misuse it.

Last week, the Supreme Court agreed. In a case that for the first time sought to put limits on the government's growing use of digi-

tal technology to monitor Americans, the justices came down firmly on the side of privacy. The court ruled unanimously that secretly tracking people's movements by attaching GPS devices to their cars violated the Fourth Amendment's ban on unreasonable searches unless police first get a warrant from a judge.

In throwing out the conviction of a suspected drug dealer sentenced to life imprisonment on the strength of evidence obtained through GPS tracking, the justices rejected the government's claim that it had

essentially unlimited power to monitor people's movements.

The government argued the man had no expectation of privacy when he traveled on public roads and that in any case tracking his movements through the GPS was no different than assigning dozens of police officers to visually shadow his comings and goings. The only difference was the GPS accomplished the same task more efficiently.

But writing for the court's majority, Justice Antonin Scalia dismissed that claim, on the grounds that in-

stalling the device on a private car constituted a "search" under the Fourth Amendment and therefore required police to obtain a warrant. In concurring opinions several of the justices suggested that the requirement for a warrant may also apply to a much broader range of technologies.

For example, the GPS units in many smart phones emit signals that allow cell-phone companies to reconstruct the minute-by-minute movements of their customers, as do the navigation systems built into many new cars.

Audit Shows Problems in Idaho Treasurer's Office

BOISE • Legislative auditors released a report Monday accusing Treasurer Ron Crane of improperly documenting his office's expenditures, violations they say include failing to use Idaho's accounting system to track annual trips to New York City.

Crane broadly disputed the auditors' seven-page review, contending no previous reviews of his office raised similar concerns. Still, he agreed to record future expenditures through the state's accounting system, in hopes of bolstering confidence he's properly tracking his office's affairs.

"This office has begun using the Travel Express system administered by the state controller's office," Crane told auditors, in his official response. "Travel vouchers will be prepared for all participants (on the New York trips) so it is clearly evident that expenses are transparent and within state policies."

Don Berg, manager of the Legislative Services audits division, said Monday he stood by his staff's findings based on an assessment of treasurer's office records from 2008-10. Berg said he plans to issue a follow-up report in 90 days that would measure Crane's progress.

"Although the first sentence in each one of his responses is he disagrees, the substance of it is, he's at least willing to move forward with what we recommend," Berg said.

For months, it's been public knowledge that Crane's office was under official scrutiny, after The Associated Press reported he used stretch limousines on New York trips to transport family members and their luggage, adding hundreds of dollars to the cost of the trips.

In November, Crane agreed to have family members pick up their share of ground transportation in the future.

Also, Monday's report states, instead of reporting costs from the New York accounting system, Crane instead let them be deducted from hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of short-term debt securities that Idaho sells annually, without reviewing whether they were accurate.

Additionally, some meals on hotel invoices appeared to be for guests, not

participants in the trip, auditors wrote. And since just a single member of the New York-bound delegation turned in expenses from meals or travel for state review, auditors concluded "this situation raises serious concerns that meals and other costs of official travel were paid for by others and that pecuniary benefits in excess of \$50 were received" in violation of Idaho law.

Crane said nobody on the trips did anything wrong.

"All meals and other costs were compliant with Idaho statutes relative to pecuniary benefits — and evidence was given to support that contention," he wrote.

This is not the first time Crane has had to answer questions regarding his use of state funds.

Canyon County Prosecutor Bryan Taylor announced last week he wouldn't pursue a criminal case against Crane for nearly \$8,000 in charges to state credit card the treasurer used to gas up his personal vehicle.

Taylor determined Idaho travel policies that would likely forbid state employees from using a state-issued credit card to gas up their personal cars don't apply to elected officials like Crane.

Taylor did recommend Crane avoid making undocumented trips with taxpayer-funded gasoline, including to church, the post office and the store, in the future.

Crane agreed, telling auditors in a statement that while it's his right to use the card for his private car, he's "developed a procedure for documentation of expenses relating to gas card usage."

Berg, of the audits division, said Monday he's seeking clarification from the Idaho attorney general's office on whether travel policies governing state employees also apply to officials like Crane.

Auditors also concluded Crane exceeded his office's authority with several programs, including the annual "Smart Women Smart Money" conference he helps fund through a \$10,000 annual donation from his office's budget that's paid to a nonprofit organization he created to run the financial literacy event.

Crane contends his office has organized the financial sessions for more than 10 years.

hoops history of a Golden Eagles program that's now defending its third national championship and an ongoing — albeit more modest — 27-game reign of home victory heading into Saturday's game against North Idaho College.

The Game

CSI, ranked No. 1 in the country and averaging more than 100 points a contest, came into the Friday game sitting first in the Scenic West Athletic Conference standings. Its players carried with them swagger, certain they'd avenge a December loss Utah Valley handed them in Orem, Utah.

"I just remember being kind of cocky. We were a cocky team," said CSI guard Clayton Johnson. "We really underestimated how good those kids were."

Utah Valley head coach Duke Reid — winless in his first 26 tries against CSI coach Fred Trenkle his Golden Eagles — had a high-scoring squad led by Santiago, who earned Utah Valley's career record for 3-pointers made and would later star at Fresno State.

Santiago averaged 17 points per game. Teammate Chris Koford, who followed Santiago to Fresno State, averaged 15. Craig Wilcox (BYU) scored 12 and Doug Chapman (Utah) added 13. Santiago came off a screen early in the game to hit his first 3-pointer of the night. That sparked him, he said, and the Wolverines trailed CSI only 35-31 at the half.

"At halftime, I literally remember walking into the locker room," Santiago said. "I was separated from the team and on the other side of the set of lockers and I remember walking back and forth, thinking, 'This is really going to happen. We're going to beat these guys.'"

Against CSI, Utah Valley ditched its normal game plan to run a methodical four-corners offense, shooting with five seconds or less on the shot clock every time down the floor and running a full-court press to slow the high-flying Golden Eagles to a painful crawl.

Midway through the second half, Santiago's second 3 of the night extended a mounting Utah Valley lead to 50-39.

"We played a completely different team that night. We weren't prepared," said CSI guard Trent Rose, now a professor at Brigham Young University-Idaho. "Coach had prepared us for the possibility of them doing something different, but it wasn't their normal brand of basketball."

CSI rallied to 52-48, but that's as close as the Golden Eagles would get as the Wolverines iced the game at the free-throw line. CSI, some Scenic West coaches would say, had always benefited from favorable calls at home. Not this night.

"In that gym, even if you got out to a big lead, in the years previous and all the teams that came in there during that winning streak, if you got a lead, you weren't going to win. You've just got a lead," said Santiago, now a senior associate athletic director at BYU. "I remember that not very often in that league do you get a favorable whistle, especially from officials on the road and at CSI. But we got a good whistle that night."

Utah Valley scored 19 of its final 27 points from the free-throw line.

"We didn't get those loose balls, we didn't get any calls, we didn't get offensive rebounds, we didn't get those things," said Johnson, who later starred at UNLV. "We still felt though, we're the

College of Southern Idaho, you know? We knew we could make another run in a minute. The minute never happened."

CSI fans, stunned to see their Golden Eagles overwhelmed and about to lose, didn't know what to do.

"Some of them were booing. I don't know how you boo when you've won 100 or whatever games in a row," Santiago said. "Some of them were just silent, just distraught, with their hands on their chins, like, 'I can't believe this is happening.' Some of them were leaving."

For the Golden Eagles, the postgame locker room was somber. The streak, which began Dec. 7, 1984, was over. The 1991-92 CSI team established the all-time, all-

sport home winning streak only weeks earlier with a win against Ricks College.

"We thought we were going to run them off the gym," said Johnson, who lives in Las Vegas. "It was a low point (in the season). We needed that though, in that particular time. Our heads were big."

The Golden Eagles went on to finish third at that year's NJCAA Division I National Tournament, with a 34-4 record.

The Streak

The streak started in the Golden Eagles' first year under Trenkle, who coached CSI longer than any other man in the program's history. It led to four national tournament appearances and a championship in 1987. But as the streak grew, so did expectations.

"Really, there was some relief once it was all over," Trenkle said. "There was so much pressure. Unbelievable pressure."

The coach wasn't even aware of his team's pursuit of history until the *Times-News* pointed it out to him as it neared 100 straight home victories.

"I had no idea. From there, it was a big deal. The TV station in Boise came down and broadcast No. 99 and 100

against Ricks and North Idaho," Trenkle said. "And then it was Kentucky (129) and Trinidad at 132 games. The pressure just built up."

And fans kept coming out. As CSI drew nearer to the record of 132 games set by Trinidad Community College of Colorado in the 1960s, the gym became more and more packed.

"I've never seen a group of fans leading up to my time there that were so supportive of a program. It was somewhat easy to play hard for them," said CSI guard David Cason, a freshman in the 1991-92 season. "They came and they supported every single game."

Trenkle attributes much

of the success at home to the fan base.

"We had fun teams that ran up and down the court. People loved to see it. People used to have to come early, hours before the game," Trenkle said. "These kids would get radical. It was a distinct home advantage."

The streak was nearly broken in 2001, but Hutchinson (Kan.) Community College's women's team snapped in-state rival Seward County's 135-game roll of 135 games.

Cason, now an assistant coach at Vanderbilt, doesn't see CSI's streak being topped any time soon.

"In basketball, it's just so difficult. There's so much parity now. It's tough to do that, do what we did," he said.

Said Rose: "It was bitter-sweet to be there. We broke the record, then a few games later it ends. It went on for a lot of years and we were lucky enough and I was lucky enough to be there for part of it."

FIRST SUPER BOWL NO-SHOWS: ICE AND SNOW

INDIANAPOLIS • Patriots coach Bill Belichick could leave his familiar hoodies in the hotel drawer. There was no need to bundle up for the start of only the fourth Super Bowl week in a northern city.

Ice and snow? Notable no-shows.

Fans threw open their jackets as they walked around downtown streets near Lucas Oil Stadium on Monday, hoping to get a glimpse of a celebrity in town for the game between New England and the New York Giants. Temperatures in the mid-to-upper 50s were forecast for the start of the week, well above normal.

The sunshine felt so good that it made for a joke or two.

"I know the way we're preparing and the way we've controlled the weather, which is hard to do," Colts owner Jim Irsay said, smiling. "But we've had certain techniques that were going to keep hidden, and I hope they hold."

Already, it's way better

than Dallas. Weather is a major concern when the title game goes north, but some of the biggest problems came down south last year. Snow and 100 hours of sub-freezing temperatures snarled traffic and led to injuries when an icy patch fell off the stadium roof and hit six workers.

Indianapolis watched and prepared. "You can have anything in Indiana," Super Bowl Host Committee spokeswoman Mel Raines said. "Our plan is intended for everything."

In its first three times at a northern exposure, the NFL's title game has experienced a little of every-

thing. The ground-breaking game came after the 1981 season in Detroit, a test of whether it would work outside the sunny climes of Florida, New Orleans, Texas and California. The week leading up to the game between the Bengals and 49ers included bursts of snow culminating in nasty conditions for game day.

Burley Selects Thomas As Football Coach

BURLEY • The Burley High School administration will recommend Jed Thomas to the Cassia County School District Board to be its next head football coach.

A former star player at Burley, Thomas accepted the offer on Friday, Burley athletic director Gordon Kerbs confirmed. The hire is pending approval by the school board, which is scheduled to meet Feb. 22.

"I'm very excited about it," Thomas said. "It's a great opportunity. I've always dreamed of being a head coach."

If approved, Thomas, 27, would replace Jeff Green, who resigned Jan. 11 after

two seasons. It is Burley football's fourth coaching change in the past 10 years.

Thomas said his plans include short-term and long-term goals. A top priority, he said, is to strengthen the congruency between the youth league, junior high and high school programs.

"The ultimate goal is winning state, and we need to get that mentality in the players," Thomas said.

The last time Burley had a winning season it went 5-4 in 2002, when Thomas was a senior all-state running back.

After graduating in the spring of 2003, Thomas went on to become a three-time All-Frontier Confer-

ence honoree at Carroll College in Helena, Mont., helping the Saints to three NAIA national championships. He earned another national title during a two-year stint as a graduate assistant coach.

Thomas returned to Burley after finishing at Carroll and became a Bobcats assistant coach under Eugene Kramer, Green's predecessor. He spent last season assisting at Valley High.

Upon school board approval, Thomas said he would go to work immediately to surround himself with a loyal and quality staff that he hopes can resurrect a program that has a 19-68 record over the

past 10 seasons.

"I'm going to stress the importance of fundamentally sound football," Thomas said. "We're going to start with the basics. We can't overlook anything. My philosophy is you have to know how to do the little things before you can actually play football."

Although he won't be a certified teacher at the school, Thomas said his players must perform in the classroom first and foremost.

"I expect a lot out of my kids," Thomas said. "Kids are going to realize the importance of school before football. Football is a privilege, not a right. You have to earn your playing time on the field, and that starts in the classroom."





FRANCHISE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made this 24th day of January 2012 by and between the CITY OF KIMBERLY, an Idaho municipal corporation (hereinafter Franchising Authority), and CABLE ONE, INC. a Delaware corporation (hereinafter Grantee), to provide for the terms and conditions of the continued operation of a cable system within the city limits of Kimberly.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, CABLE ONE is the successor to King Videocable Company which was awarded a franchise to provide cable services within the City of Kimberly effective August 8, 1995; and

WHEREAS, CABLE ONE and its predecessors in interest have faithfully and hereto and performed in accordance with the terms and conditions of Ordinance 463 granting a franchise to King Videocable Company; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 589 authorizes a renewal of the cable television franchise to CABLE ONE; and

WHEREAS, the Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984 authorizes the early renewal of a cable franchise upon a public hearing and informal negotiation process; and

WHEREAS the public hearing and informal negotiation process has occurred.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City of Kimberly hereby grants a renewal of the cable television franchise to CABLE ONE in the following terms and conditions:

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS.

1.1 For the purposes of this Franchise, the following terms, phrases, and words shall have the meanings ascribed to them below. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future tense, words in the plural include the singular and words used in the singular include the plural.

A. "Affiliate" means a condition of being united, being in close connection, allied, or attached as a member or branch.

B. "Basic cable" is the tier of service regularly provided to all subscribers including the retransmission of local broadcast television signals.

C. "Cable Act" means Title VI of the Communications Act of 1934 as amended by the Cable Television Consumer Protection and Competition Act 1992, as amended by the Telecommunications Act of 1996, and any subsequent amendments.

D. "Cable services" means

1. the one-way transmission to a subscriber of video programming, other programming service or data communication by a subscriber,

2. subscriber interaction, if any, which is required for the selection by the subscriber of such video programming, or

3. any other programming service.

E. "Cable system" means a facility, consisting of a set of closed transmission paths and associated signal generation, reception, and control equipment that is designed to provide cable service and other service to subscribers.

F. "Channel" means a single path or section of the spectrum which carries a cable service.

G. "City" means the City of Kimberly, a municipal corporation of the State of Idaho.

H. "Council" means the present governing body of the City or any future board constituting the legislative body of the city.

I. "Disconnection" means the discontinuance of all cable service to a subscriber by a cable operator.

J. "FCC" means the Federal Communications Commission, a regulatory agency of the United States government.

K. "Franchising Authority" means the City of Kimberly, Idaho.

L. "Franchise" shall mean the initial authorization, or renewal thereof, issued by the city, whether such authorization is designated as a franchise, permit, license, resolution, contract, certificate or otherwise, which authorizes construction or operation of the cable system for the purpose of offering cable service or other service to subscribers.

M. "Grantee" means Cable One of Idaho.

N. "Gross revenues" means any and all receipts and revenues received directly or indirectly from all sources by the operator of a cable system attributable to the provision of cable service by the cable system within the corporate limits of the City. "Gross revenues" is intended to include, but is not limited to, all income without any offsetting of expenses, costs or depreciation, derived from:

Subscribers receiving goods, equipment, equipment service, or cable service from or through the use of a cable system within the City; revenues for service, installation and repair; and, any and all charges not specifically exempt herein such as delinquency fees, interest, or finance charges.

Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, "gross revenues" is not intended to include income, credits or revenues attributable to the operation of a cable system within the City arising from:

1. Real property transactions;

2. Taxes and Fees paid by a subscriber, the operator of a cable system within the City or another person, which are imposed on any subscriber;

3. Interest (other than interest charged subscribers of the cable system within the City or advertisers for services provided or delivered by the cable system within the City) or dividends on investments received by the operator of a cable system within the City unrelated to the delivery of cable services within the City; or

4. Net uncollectible debts.

Should the FCC rule that high-speed internet services delivered by cable operators is a "cable service" then the parties agree that revenues the cable operator obtains from the provision of that service will be considered as gross revenues under this section and eligible for inclusion in the calculation of franchise fees on a going forward basis.

O. "Headend" means the electronic equipment located at the start of a cable system, usually including antennas, preamplifiers, frequency converters, demodulator and related equipment.

P. "Installation" means the connection of the cable system to subscribers' terminals.

Q. "Normal business hours" means those hours during which most similar businesses in the City are open to the service of customers and shall include at least four (4) consecutive hours per weekday

R. "Normal operating conditions" means those service conditions which are within the control or are reasonably anticipated by the cable operator, including special promotions, pay-per-view events, regular peak or seasonal demand periods and maintenance or upgrade of the cable system.

S. "Person" means any individual, firm, partnership, corporation, organization, association, or other legal entity.

T. "Public way" means the surface of, and the space above and below, any public street, highway, freeway, bridge, land path, alley, curb, boulevard, sidewalk, parkway, way, lane, drive, circle or other public right-of-way, including, but not limited to, public utility easements, dedicated utility strips or rights-of-way dedicated for compatible uses and any temporary or permanent fixtures or improvements located thereon now or hereafter held by the City in the service area which shall entitle the City and a franchisee to the use thereof for the purpose of installing, operating, repairing, and maintaining the cable system. "Public way" shall also mean any easement now or hereafter held by the City within the service area for the purpose of public travel, or for utility or public service use dedicated for compatible uses, and shall include other easements or rights-of-way as shall within their proper use and meaning entitle the City and a franchisee to the use thereof for the purpose of installing or transmitting franchisee's cable service or other service over poles, wires, cables, conductors, ducts, conduits, vaults, manholes, amplifiers, compliances, attachments, and other property as may be ordinarily necessary and appurtenant to the cable system.

U. "Service Area" means the present municipal boundaries of the City of Kimberly, and includes any additions thereto by annexation.

V. "Subscriber" means a person or user of the cable system who lawfully receives cable services or other services there from with franchisee's permission.

W. "Video Programming Service" means programming which is visually and audibly comparable to programming provided by a television broadcast station.

SECTION 2. GRANT OF FRANCHISE

2.1 Grant. The Franchising Authority hereby grants to the Grantee a nonexclusive franchise which authorizes the Grantee to construct and operate a cable system in, along, among, upon, across, above, over, under, in any manner connected with Public Ways within the Service Area and for that purpose to erect, install, construct, repair, replace, reconstruct, maintain on, over, under, upon, across, or along any public way and all extensions thereof and additions thereto, such pole, wires, cables, conductors, ducts, conduits, vaults, manholes, pedestals, amplifiers, appliances, attachments, and other related property or equipment as may be necessary or appurtenant to the cable system. Nothing in the franchise shall be construed to prohibit the Grantee from offering any service over its cable system that is not prohibited by federal or state law.

The Grantee agrees to abide by any existing or new ordinance or regulation of general applicability to the operation of the cable system in the service area, adapted in the manner provided by law, so long as it does not substantially impair the rights granted pursuant to this franchise.

2.2 Term. The franchise granted hereunder shall be for a term of ten (10) years commencing on the effective date of the franchise as set forth below, unless otherwise lawfully terminated in accordance with the terms of this franchise agreement.

2.3 Incorporation By Reference. This franchise is granted pursuant to Title 50, Chapter 3 of the Idaho Code and the Cable Act.

SECTION 3. STANDARDS OF SERVICE.

3.1 Restoration of Public Ways. If, during the course of the Grantee's construction, operation, or maintenance of the cable system, there occurs a disturbance in any public way, the Grantee shall, at its expense, replace and restore such public way to a condition reasonably comparable to the condition of the public way immediately prior to such disturbance. Such repair or replacement will be implemented promptly beginning no later than 72 hours after extent of the damage is ascertained but with reasonable consideration given to weather and to the amount of work involved.

3.2 Relocation at the Request of the Franchising Authority. Upon its receipt of reasonable advance notice, not to be less than five (5) business days, the Grantee shall, at its own expense, protect, support, temporarily disconnect, relocate in the public way, or remove from the public way, any property of the Grantee when required by the franchising authority by reason of traffic conditions, public safety, street abandonment, street construction, change or establishment of street grade, installation of sewers, drains, utility pipes, and any other structure or improvements by the Franchising Authority. The Grantee shall in all cases have the right of abandonment of its property. If public funds are available to any similar facilities-based utility as the Grantee, using such street, easement, or right-of-way for the purpose of defraying the cost of any of the foregoing, the Franchising Authority shall make available such funds on behalf of the Grantee.

3.3 Relocation at the Request of a Third Party. The Grantee shall, on the request of any person holding a building moving permit issued by the Franchising Authority, temporarily raise or lower its wires to permit the moving of such building, provided the expense of such temporary raising or lowering of wires is paid by said person, including, if required by the Grantee, making such payment in advance and the Grantee is given not less than five (5) days advance written notice.

3.4 System Upgrade/Channel Capacity and Adaptation to New Technology. At the request of the Franchising Authority, the Grantee shall inform the Franchising Authority at least annually of planned, proposed, and actual changes in the Grantee's cable system and cable services related to subscriber in the service area regarding technological improvements, additional channel capacity, and other matter related to services available to subscribers. The Grantee will provide one channel for the Franchising Authority to use as a character-generated, community bulletin board.

3.5 Aerial and Underground Construction.

A. In those areas of the service area where all of the transmission or distribution facilities of the respective public service utilities providing telephone communications and electrical services are underground, the Grantee shall likewise construct, operate, and maintain all of its transmission and distribution facilities underground. Nothing contained in this section shall require the Grantee to construct, operate, and maintain underground any ground-mounted appurtenances such as subscriber taps, line extenders, system passive devices (splitters, directional couplers), amplifiers, pedestals, or other related equipment.

B. **New Developments.** The Franchising Authority shall provide the Grantee with written notice of the issuance of building or development permits for planned commercial and/or residential developments within the service area requiring underground facilities. The Franchising Authority agrees to require as a condition of issuing the permit that the developer of planned commercial and/or residential developments give the Grantee access to open trenches for deployment of cable facilities and notice of the date of availability of trenches. The developer shall be responsible for the digging and backfilling of all trenches. The Grantee shall be responsible for engineering, deployment of labor and cable facilities located in the trenches. If a new development is not provided by the city due to random error or because the developer does not release the information, the Grantee will hold the Franchising Authority harmless.

C. **Local Improvement District.** If an ordinance is passed creating a local improvement district which involves placing underground certain utilities including that of the Grantee which are then located overhead, the Grantee shall participate in such underground project and shall remove poles, cables, and wires from the surface of public ways within such district and shall place them underground in conformity with the requirements of the Franchising Authority. The Grantee may include its costs of relocating facilities associated with the undergrounding project in said local improvement district if allowed under applicable law.

3.6 Required Extension of Service. The cable system, as constructed as of the date of the passage and final adoption of the franchise, substantially complies with the material provisions hereof. Whenever the Grantee shall receive a request for service from at least 15 residences within 1320 cable-bearing strand feet (one-quarter cable mile) of its trunk or distribution cable, it shall extend its cable system to such subscribers at no cost to said subscribers for cable system extension, other than the usual connection fees for all subscribers, provided that such extension is technically feasible.

3.7 Subscriber Charges for Extensions of Service. No subscriber shall be refused service arbitrarily. However, for unusual circumstances, such as a subscriber's request to locate his cable drop underground, existence of more than 150 feet of distance from distribution cable to connection of service to subscribers, or a density of less than 15 subscribers per 1320 cable-bearing strand feet of trunk or distribution cable, service may be made available on the basis of a capital contribution in aid of construction, including cost of material, labor, and easements. For the purpose of determining the amount of capital contribution in aid of construction to be borne by the Grantee and subscribers in the area in which service may be expanded, the Grantee will contribute an amount equal to the construction and other costs per mile, multiplied by a fraction whose numerator equals the number of residences per 1320 cable-bearing strand feet of its trunks or distribution cable, and whose denominator equals 15 residences. Subscribers who request service hereunder will bear the remainder of the construction and other costs on a pro rata basis. The Grantee may require that the payment of the capital contribution in aid of construction borne by potential subscribers be paid in advance.

3.8 Service to Public Buildings. The Grantee shall, provide without charge, cable service including internet access and telephone service to each of the Franchising Authority's offices, buildings, fire stations, police stations, all public school buildings, and the Senior Center that are passed by its cable system, as well as other public buildings that may be constructed during the term of this Franchise Agreement. The outlets of cable service provided pursuant to this section shall not be used by the government entity to sell or provide free of charge cable services to private entities in or throughout such buildings. The Grantee shall not be required to provide a cable service outlet to buildings where the drop line from the feeder cable to said building exceeds 150 cable feet unless the governmental entity agrees to pay the incremental cost of such drop line in excess of 150 cable feet.

3.9 Emergency Use.

A. In accordance with the provisions of Federal Communications Commission (FCC), regulations shall maintain an Emergency Alert System (EAS) for use in transmitting Emergency Act Notifications (EAN) and Emergency Act Terminations (EAT) in local and state-wide situations as may be designated to be an emergency by the Local Primary, the State Primary and/or the State Emergency Operations Center, as those authorities are defined by the FCC.

B. The Grantee shall permit only appropriately trained and authorized persons to operate the EAS equipment and shall indemnify and hold harmless the Franchising Authority, its employees, officers, and assigns from any claims arising from use of the cable system or the EAS equipment by the Franchising Authority, its employees, or designated representatives, including, but not limited to, attorney fees and costs.

3.10 Customer Service Standards. The Grantee shall at all times be in compliance with FCC regulations regarding customer service obligations, as now exist or as may be amended. The Franchising Authority reserves the right to enact or enforce any customer protection law, containing more stringent customer service obligations, to the extent not specifically preempted by FCC regulations.

SECTION 4. REGULATION BY CITY OF KIMBERLY.

4.1 Franchise Fee.

A. The Grantee shall pay to the Franchising Authority a monthly sum equal to five percent (5%) of the gross revenues. Payment for each month's fee shall be no later than forty-five (45) days after the last day of the quarter for which payment is made.

B. In the event the Cable Act and/or other applicable law permits an increase in franchise fees during the term of this franchise, then the Franchising Authority may initiate such an increase with regards to the franchise fee amount. However, prior to implementation of any increase in franchise fees, the Grantee may request a public hearing by the Franchising Authority to discuss said change in franchise fee. Following such a hearing the Franchising Authority may require the implementation of the change in franchise fee.

C. **Late Payment.** All sums which become delinquent shall accumulate interest at the highest statutory rate provided in Idaho Code Title 28, Chapter 22. The accrual of interest is not intended to waive or in any manner restrict the City's ability to elect any procedure or method of collection permissible by law to enforce all the terms and conditions of the Franchise Agreement.

D. **Penalties For Failing To Pay Franchise Fees.** Where the City determines by audit, financial statement, or other method, that franchisee has underpaid franchise fees, other charges owed to City, and where payment was not received by City within the quarter due, franchisee may be required to pay, in addition to any other remedy sought by City, all fees and interest due, and an additional penalty of ten percent (10%) of the total amount owed. Acceptance of any franchise fee payment by the Franchising Authority shall not be construed as an agreement that the fee paid is in fact the correct amount, nor shall acceptance of payment be construed as a release or a waiver of any claim by the Franchising Authority against the Grantee. If the Franchising Authority requests to see financial records to audit Grantee's franchise fee payments, the Grantee will provide such records.

E. **Taxes.** Nothing herein shall limit the Grantee's obligation to pay applicable local, state, or federal sale, property, ad valorem, or other taxes.

F. **Financial Reports.** Each franchise fee payment shall be accompanied by a financial report certified by an officer of the Grantee, or his designee showing the basis for the computation, including the number of customers, and separately indicating revenues received by the Grantee within the Service Area from such items as basic service, pay TV service, other applicable sources of revenue, and such other information directly related to confirming the amount of the Grantee's Gross Revenues as may be reasonably required by the Franchising Authority.

G. **Non-waiver.** Acceptance of any franchise fee payment by the Franchising Authority that the franchise fee paid is in fact the correct amount, nor shall acceptance of payment by the Franchising Authority be construed as a release or waiver of any claim the Franchising Authority may have for further or additional sums payable under the provisions of this Franchise.

4.2 Rates and Charges.

A. Nothing in this Franchise Agreement shall be construed to prohibit the reduction or waiving of charges in conjunction with promotional campaigns for the purpose of acquiring and/or retaining subscribers.

B. Grantee shall provide the Franchising Authority with a minimum of thirty (30) days advance written notice of changes in subscriber rates, if the change is within the control of the Grantee, including any changes in franchise fee amount and external franchise related costs.

4.3. Customer Billing. All billing statements and charges to subscribers shall be:

1. Clear, concise, and understandable;

2. Itemized as to basic cable charges, premium charges, equipment charges, whether payments for purchase or rental, deposits, delinquent fees, and franchise fees.

3. Show all activity during the billing period including optional charges, rebates, and credits. Said billing period shall not exceed forty-five (45) days.

4.4 Renewal. The Franchising Authority and the Grantee agree that any proceeding undertaken by the Franchising Authority that relates to the renewal of the Grantee's franchise shall be governed by and comply with the provisions of the Cable Act, as currently constituted or as may be hereafter amended.

SECTION 5. COMPLIANCE AND MONITORING.

5.1 Communication with Regulatory Agencies. Copies of all petitions, applications, communications, and reports submitted by the Grantee to the FCC or any other federal or state regulatory commission or agency having jurisdiction in respect to matter affecting construction, maintenance, or operation of the Grantee's cable system or service, shall be made available to the Franchising Authority upon reasonable request. Copies of responses or any other communications from the regulatory agencies to the Grantee shall also be made available to the Franchising Authority.

5.2 Technical Standards. The Grantee shall be responsible for insuring that the cable system is designed, installed, and operated in a manner that fully complies with FCC rules and regulations in Subpart K of Part 76 of Chapter 1 of Title 47 of the Code of Federal Regulations as now constituted or as may be amended. As provided in these rules and regulations, the Franchising Authority shall have, upon request, the right to obtain a copy of tests and records required in accordance with such rules and regulations, but have no authority to enforce compliance with such standards.

SECTION 6. BONDS AND OTHER SURETY. For the reason of the Grantee's past performance and investment, no performance bond or other surety is required under the terms hereof. If the Franchising Authority determines, in its reasonable discretion, that a bond or a surety will be required of the Grantee during the term hereof, the Franchising Authority agrees to give the Grantee ninety (90) days written notice stating the reason for the requirement and amount of the bond or surety. The Grantee agrees to post said bond or surety, as required by the Franchising Authority within said ninety (90) day period. The Grantee shall be required to provide standard performance bonds and insurance requirements for encroachment and/or right-of-way work permits.

SECTION 7. PUBLIC EDUCATIONAL AND GOVERNMENTAL (PEG) ACCESS.

7.1 Channel Capacity and Use

A. Upon the effective date of this Franchise, the Company shall continue to make one (1) Channel available for Access use by the City or by a designated Access provider identified by the City, for Public/Educational/Governmental Access purposes. The Government Access Channel shall initially be Channel 17, and shall remain so throughout the term of the Franchise unless Channel 17 is claimed by must-carry obligations of the Company under FCC regulations.

B. The bandwidth for each PEG Channel shall be at least as broad as the bandwidth of any other Channel offered in the basic tier of service.

7.2 Access Channels on Lowest Tier. All local, educational, and governmental Access Channels shall be carried on the Basic Cable Service tier.

7.3 Relocation of Access Channels. Initially, Channel 17 shall continue to be devoted to Kimberly Government Access, and shall remain so throughout the term of the Franchise, unless the Channel is claimed by a must-carry obligation of the Company under FCC rules, or unless the City gives written permission otherwise. For all other PEG Channels, the Company shall consult with the City before assigning any Channel for the first time, and shall provide the City with a minimum of ninety (90) days notice, and shall use its best efforts to provide one-hundred-twenty (120) days notice, prior to the time PEG Access Channel designations are changed. The Company shall consult with the City prior to making a final determination regarding any changes in PEG Access Channel designations. Any new channel designation for a PEG Access Channel provided pursuant to this Franchise shall be in full compliance with FCC signal quality and proof of performance standards.

7.4 Return Feeds From Origination Points. Following the effective date of this agreement, Company shall continue to provide return programming capabilities from City Hall. However, within 3 months following the effective date of the Franchise, the return feed from City Hall shall be upgraded to an activated fiber optic cable connection to the Company Headend. In addition, one Internet outlet will be provided free of charge in City Hall.

7.5 PEG Access Grant.

A. The City has determined that to meet community needs and interests for PEG Access in Kimberly over the term of the Franchise, the following developments, among possible others, are necessary.

1. Fitting the City facilities for coverage of meetings, including necessary fiber-optic wiring to the site, etc.

B. Accordingly, the Company shall provide, in addition to the channels, training and services, technical assistance, return feeds and other support identified in this section, financial grants to the City for PEG Access development, in the following amount and on the following schedule of due dates:

1. Within thirty (30) days following the due date represented by the effective date of this Franchise: \$4,000 will be due.

C. The City acknowledges the Company's right, consistent with FCC regulations, to pass-through and itemize portions of its Subscribers bill, including but not limited to franchise fees, the amount of the bill allocated to fulfill any new Franchise requirements for PEG Access, and any fee, tax, assessment or charge imposed by any governmental authority on the Company. These itemized charges may be shown "above-the-line" (i.e., prior to the summation of the total amount due).

7.6 Agreement as to PEG Contribution. The Company agrees that all contributions, services, equipment, facilities, support, resources and other activities to be paid for or supplied by the Company pursuant to or in connection with its performance under this Section shall not be off-set against the payment of franchise fees.

7.7 Rules Determined by the City. The City shall have the authority to manage the operation of PEG Access, and the City may delegate part or all of this authority to a third party. Rules governing the use of all PEG Access resources, including without limitation the public, educational and governmental Access Channel(s), studios, equipment, facilities, services, origination points, and the PEG Access Grant will be determined by the City or a designee of the City.

7.8 Non-Commercial Use. Public, Educational, and Governmental Access Channels shall be utilized solely for non-commercial purposes for the social, educational, cultural, charitable, and informational benefit and general welfare of the community. No Access user shall utilize the Access Channels for any purposes other than as specified and shall not derive any commercial profit therefrom, including the sale of advertising, commercials, or other similar activities. With the exception that the City has the right to delegate its authority to operate and regulate the PEG Access Channels, the right to utilize these channels shall not be assigned by any Access user to any other Person or entity. The limitations of this section notwithstanding, nothing in this Franchise shall prohibit the solicitation and recognition of financial support for the provision of PEG Access by the City or its designee(s), and for charitable, educational or governmental purposes so long as such recognition does not take the form of commercials for the sponsors.

SECTION 8. TERMINATION AND TECHNICAL VIOLATIONS.

8.1 Default, Notice and Termination.

A. If the Grantee willfully violates or fails to comply with any of the material provisions of this Franchise Agreement, the Franchising Authority shall give written notice to the Grantee of the alleged non-compliance of its franchise. The Grantee shall have thirty (30) days from the date of notice of non-compliance to cure such alleged default or, if such default cannot be cured within thirty (30) days, to present to the City a plan of action whereby such default can be promptly cured. The Grantee shall be entitled to attend the hearing, respond to questions, and explain why termination would be justified.

B. If such default continues beyond the applicable dates agreed to for such cure, the Franchising Authority shall give the Grantee written notice that all rights conferred under this Franchise Agreement may be revoked or terminated by the Council after a public hearing. The Grantee shall be entitled to not less than thirty (30) days prior notice of the date, time, and place of the public hearing.

8.2 Termination for Non-compliance. Subject to state and federal law, in the event that any franchise is terminated by the Franchising Authority by reason of the Grantee's non-compliance, the Grantee shall have the right for six months after the final decision by the Council to attempt to sell that part of the system under such franchise to a third party. If the Grantee is unable to find a buyer within such period, the Franchising Authority may elect to acquire the property of the system located in the streets and public property at a cost consistent with the provisions of Section 627(b)(1) of the Cable Act, as currently constituted or as may be amended. If the Franchising Authority or a third party does not purchase the system, the Grantee shall, upon order of the Franchising Authority, remove the system from the public ways of the Franchising Authority. The Grantee agrees that in no case shall a termination for cause be considered as a "taking".

8.3 Technical Violations. The parties agree that it is not the Franchising Authority's intention to subject the Grantee to penalties or termination for technical violations of this agreement. Technical violations shall include, but are not limited to the following: (a) instances where a violation or a breach by the Grantee of this agreement was a good faith effort that resulted in no or minimal negative impact on subscribers; or (b) where there existed circumstances reasonably beyond the control of the Grantee and which precipitated a violation of this agreement or which were deemed to have prevented the Grantee from strictly complying with the terms of this agreement.

8.4 Transfer of Franchise to Third Parties. The Franchising Authority reserves the right of final approval of all sales and/or transfers of the franchise to third parties, provided that said authority may only be exercised in a reasonable manner. In the event that the franchise is sold to a third party following such approval, the Franchising Authority is entitled to immediate payment of back fees.

SECTION 9. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

9.1 Actions of Parties. In any action by the Franchising Authority of the Grantee that is mandated or permitted under the terms hereof, such party shall act in good faith in a reasonable and timely manner. Furthermore, in any instance where approval or consent is required under the term hereof, such approval or consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

9.2 Equal Protection. In the event the Franchising Authority grants another franchise to any person or entity for the purpose of constructing or operating a cable system within the service area, such additional franchise shall not present materially better terms or lesser obligations for the new franchisee over the terms of the franchise. Nevertheless, if such does take place, the Franchising Authority will immediately modify this franchise so that it is in conformity with the language of the new franchise.

9.3 Notices. Notice required hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given to the required party upon actual receipt. Acceptable methods of delivery include hand delivery, certified or registered mail, and overnight express mail. Notice required hereunder shall be addressed as follows:

THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

"Nothing needs a Trick but a Trick; Sincerity loathes one."
— William Penn

When dummy comes down in four spades on a top club lead, it is easy to see that there are now three established fast losers (two hearts and one club) and declarer has to find a way to dispose of his third-round heart loser.

The natural approach might be to win the club and duck a heart, but the defenders can prevail by continuing the attack on clubs. Now if South plays a second heart, East will win and play back a spade. If South takes the heart ruff in dummy, he can escape from the North hand only by leading diamonds, promoting a trump trick for West.

An alternative approach of taking the diamond finesse also fails as the cards lie, since the defenders now have four top winners, while ruffing a diamond before drawing trump seems to establish a trump trick for West. So what's left?

The winning line is straightforward enough, but hard to spot. South wins the club lead and cashes the spade ace. When both opponents follow, he takes the ace and king of diamonds, then leads the diamond jack, planning to pitch a club if East follows low. This line virtually insures the contract no matter who has the diamond queen. If East covers the diamond jack, South must ruff high, then cross to the spade king to lead a diamond winner and pitch the club loser. No matter what happens next, he can lose no more than two hearts and one trump.

ANSWER: Your hand has real slam potential (imagine the facing hand with six good spades to the ace and the diamond queen plus the two other aces). Alas, since a bid of four diamonds would be natural, not a cue-bid, you must bid four hearts now. In such a space-constrained auction, this simply shows a good spade raise, neither promising nor denying a heart control. Second choice: a pessimistic raise to four spades.



In 1606, Guy Fawkes, convicted of treason for his part in the "Gunpowder Plot" against the English Parliament and King James I, was executed.

In 1797, composer Franz Schubert was born in Vienna.

In 1865, Gen. Robert E. Lee was named general-in-chief of all the Confederate armies.

In 1917, during World War I, Germany served notice it was beginning a policy of unrestricted submarine warfare.

In 1929, revolutionary Leon Trotsky and his family were expelled from the Soviet Union.

In 1944, during World War II, U.S. forces began a successful invasion of Kwajalein Atoll and other parts of the Japanese-held Marshall Islands.

In 1945, Pvt. Eddie Slovik, 24, became the first U.S. soldier since the Civil War to be executed for desertion as he was shot by an American firing squad in France.

In 1950, President Harry S. Truman announced he had ordered development of the hydrogen bomb.

In 1958, the United States entered the Space Age with its first successful launch of a satellite into orbit, Explorer I.

In 1971, astronauts Alan Shepard, Edgar Mitchell and Stuart Roosa blasted off aboard Apollo 14 on a mission to the moon.

In 1992, leaders of the U.N. Security Council's member states held an unprecedented summit, after which they issued a declaration on collective security, arms control and nuclear non-proliferation.

In 2000, an Alaska Airlines jet spiraled into the Pacific Ocean off Port Huene, Calif., killing all 88 people aboard.

Ten years ago: The Bush administration handed abortion opponents a symbolic victory, classifying a developing fetus as an "unborn child" as a way of extending prenatal care to low-income pregnant women under the State Children's Health Insurance Program. Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld said in a speech that the United States had to prepare for potential surprise attacks "vastly more deadly" than those on 9/11. Kentucky, cited by the NCAA for more than three dozen recruiting violations, was placed on three years' probation.

Five years ago: President George W. Bush, visiting Wall Street, delivered his "State of the Economy" speech in which he took aim at lavish salaries and bonuses for corporate executives. Delaware Sen. Joe Biden formally launched his bid for the Democratic presidential nomination. Nine blinking electronic devices planted around Boston threw a scare into the city in what turned out to be a marketing campaign for a late-night cable cartoon. Best-selling author and columnist Molly Ivins died in Austin, Texas, at age 62.

One year ago: A federal judge in Florida declared the Obama administration's health care overhaul unconstitutional, siding with 26 states that argued people cannot be required to buy health insurance. Egypt's military promised not to fire on peaceful protests and recognized "the legitimacy of the people's demands." Myanmar opened its first parliament in more than two decades, an event greeted with cautious optimism by opposition lawmakers despite the military's tight management of the event.
